

Plymouth Seeks Record Total in 1963 Drive

Faced with the additional expense of a new Family Service Bureau which will go into operation in September, the Plymouth Community Fund goal has been set at an all-time high of \$66,480 for the 1963 campaign starting on Oct. 10.


That was the announcement of PCF President



The PCF had a goal of \$45,050 in 1962 and went over the top by an astounding \$20,000 for a total of slightly more than \$65,000 when the

final figures were compiled.

With that as a basis and with the knowledge that the new Family Service Bureau operation will cost an estimated \$17,500 for the first year, the Board decided to set their sights at the highest peak in history.

As a starting point, Wayne County would be permitted to write its own Charter, containing the rules by which it would govern itself. As of today, Wayne's legal authority is defined and limited by State law, as is that of all other Counties.

Phases of "metropolitan government" will be touched upon at the same time as "County Home Rule" is discussed. Brought into sharp focus again will be the differences in problems, and in political strength, between the inner city of Detroit and those of us out-County.

Some of the fireworks will go off next month when the Legislature is asked to pass a bill that would permit Wayne to proceed to put Home Rule to a vote of the people.

Appropos of the previously discussed Interstate out of the hands of the Board. freeway proposed to be built down the Plymouth Township-Livonia line, thence along Schoolcraft through Livonia and Redford Township, a key fact emerged for the first time this week.

The date proposed by the Michigan Highway Department to begin construction is late 1968, with the completion date two years thereafter.

One leg of the freeway will start near Grand River Ave. and Haggerty Rd. and drop south to Monroe. This will cover 37 miles and cost \$42 million. Bids on the northern portion of this leg will be taken late in 1968. This part will run close beside the new Schoolcraft Community College.

The plan is to have a cloverleaf leaving this new road at Schoolcraft road, with those driving to Detroit turning easterly on Schoolcraft road, which will be built into a new freeway, wider than the present road, and depressed with limited access. Once into Detroit, the "Schoolcraft Freeway" would link with a new "Grand To Dine With PEA River Freeway" which would start at the Ambassador bridge and head north.

Assuming there are no changes in plans (and some of it could be changed at any time) the whole thing wouldn't be really in full, normal use until 1971, eight years from now.




Fischer, Kelly Miss School Board Meet

School Custodial Staff Doubles In Plymouth

nance staff of the Plymouth Community School system has more than doubled in the 10year period from 1955 through 1964, according to statistics released by Assistant Supt. in Charge of Business Melvin Blunk.

The school board was accused by union representatives of not increasing the custodial and maintenance personnel in proportion to the increase in enrollment and in the number of rooms.

Blunk was requested by The Observer to compile figures for the period dating back to 1955 when the enrollment started the climb that boosted the total from 3,727 then to a projected 5,584 for the 1963-64 term.

The figures show that the Plymouth system had a custodial and maintenance staff of 21 in 1955 and it has grown to a total of 421/2 at the present time.

At the same time, the number of rooms in the various school buildings has grown by 74 in a period dating back to 1957.

following growth in the number of classrooms: 1957, Gallimore School, 13, and Junior High West, 32: 1958, Farrand School, 13; 1959. Senior High, five; 1960, Bird School, three; 1960 Smith School, five; and 1960, Senfor High, three.

The school system uses the following number of workers in the custodial and maintenance departments at each building: Allen, 2; Bird, 212; Senior High, 141/2; Junior High East, 10; Smith, 234; Starkweather, 2; Gallimore, 2; Farrand, 2; Junior High West, 412; outlying schools, 12; for a total of 421/2.

This is in direct contrast to the 21 employed in 1955-56 when the enrollment was 3,727 against 4212 at the moment with the projected enrollment of 5,584.

DPW News **And Notes** In Plymouth

Plymouth Dept. Public Works Work on the Urban Renewal project on S. Mill Street has been completed and all properties leveled with the exception of two buildings near Ann Arbor Trail.

A water main and service line break had workers on the go a week ago Sunday and the repairs were made in record time. A total of 173 catch basins in the south section of the city have been cleaned.

An inspector from the Michigan State Agriculture Department has been working with DPW employes checking trees inside the city limits for Dutch Elm disease. They have been inspecting trees on city and private property. If diseased, a tree is red tagged and must be removed within 10 days.

To date the group has taken 3 dead samples, condemned eight elm wood piles and 87 elm trees with 19 trees to be sampled this week.

A blowoff was installed on the water main at Six Mile and Northville Roads and two water services repaired, one on Sheldon Road and the other on Starkweather Ave.

The Allard Construction Co. has completed the moving of water lines on Northville Road so that the bridges may be widened. The water department is sorry for any inconveniences caused users during the changeover.

A new water main will be installed in the north end of Blunk Street north of Junction. It should give customers in that section better service and more pressure since they formerly were serviced by a 3/4" service line.





'Curtain Going Up' By Wally Roberts

The curtain came down quite unexpectedly in the middle of my review of "Here's Love," the new Meridith Willson musical on view at the Fisher for the next two weeks. What precipitated such action on the part of the "stagehands?" Let me hasten to assure everyone that the unfinished condition of the review was old Wally's fault. Knowing the limitation of space, your reviewer should have condensed his material. Often times my material gets a bit verbose and forces the column into a Part 1 - Part II situation. Here, then, are the remainder of my reactionary remarks regarding "Here's Love."

What to do about this casting error? As ernel a suggestion as this may be, I feel Mr. Willson will have to do some recasting to bring this show into sharp focus and make it acceptable for the discerning Broadway clientele. John Riatt, Robert Goulet or Howard Kell might have been better choices. Elaine Stritch or Gretchen Wyler could give more vocal power to the gal's part. And my choice for Santa would have been Stubby Kaye. He has the pixie quality that is lacking in Naismith's interpretation. And Stubby sings like a pudgy lark. Get busy on that phone, Mr. Willson. I'm sure you'd do a great deal for your show by having leads that sing first, act secondly instead of the other way around as you now have in "Here's Love." Robert Presion might have been able to talk-sing his way through "The Music Man," but with as delicate and sentimental a show as "Here's Love," you need singers to slip the audience into that syrupy mood.

"Here's Love" can be a joyful year-round Yuletide package of good cheer if the chief Santa Willson inserts some new earcatching songs and hires a trio of competent carolers. Columbia Records (it's their \$380,000 backing the show) would have a happier, healthier and more profitable Christmas if some changes were made during the next eight weeks before "Here's Love" opens in New York City.

Regardless of how the critics will carp, Mr. Willson's fine musical reputation will carry him into a profitable run for "Here's Love." The New York advance has already taken a healthy turn upward. Washington, the next stop for this musical, is about sold out. "Camelot" and "No Strings" experienced the same kind treatment from the public. It pays to have written a few successful musicals. When you come to think about it, a great deal of life operates this way: build a good reputation and it's diffcult to believe an individual can be bad. Bank auditors can lend loads of testimony to this theory.

What happened to Ed Goedwin out at Northland? Old Wally went out to see "Calculated Risk," hoping to see Ed doing the role of the watchman, but when Wally got there the stage was bare-no Ed Goodwin. Bill Marcus, Northland's


