

Plymouth Seeks Record Total in 1963 Drive

Set Fund Goal of \$66,480

Faced with the additional expense of a new Family Service Bureau which will go into operation in September, the Plymouth Community Fund goal has been set at an all-time high of \$66,480 for the 1963 campaign starting on Oct. 10.

That was the announcement of PCF President

Russell Isbister and Campaign Chairman Robert Stremich following a meeting of the Board of Directors at which the 1964 budget was approved.

The PCF had a goal of \$45,050 in 1962 and went over the top by an astounding \$20,000 for a total of slightly more than \$65,000 when the

final figures were compiled.

With that as a basis and with the knowledge that the new Family Service Bureau operation will cost an estimated \$17,500 for the first year, the Board decided to set their sights at the highest peak in history.

"We feel we can reach it," said Isbister and Stremich, "if we receive the same community-wide co-operation and support that has marked past drives and especially that of 1962."

The 1963 campaign will officially open with the torch lighting ceremonies in Kellogg Park on Thursday, Oct. 10 and the final reports will be made on Friday, Nov. 1.

The budget for 1964 includes slight boosts for some of the agencies, cuts for others but generally the totals are the same as for 1963. The big difference is the \$17,500 addition for the much needed Family Service Bureau.

The budget by agencies includes:

Isbister indicated the Board had studied all requests from the participating agencies in making up the 1964 budget.

The only cuts were to the Youth Club which was reduced from \$2,200 to \$2,059.

The new Family Service Bureau will be housed in the Veterans Memorial Center until such time that the operation reaches a point where it will require larger quarters. The Board plans a study of the future for the Bureau as soon as there is some indication of what the future needs will be.

FACTS and OPINIONS

In the world of local government, a subject which will be occupying headlines in the immediate weeks ahead is a thing called "County Home Rule." Since the title alone doesn't provide much of a clue as to what is involved, the subject is worth a once-over-lightly before it becomes more prominent.

Only Wayne County is concerned at the moment. The general idea of "Home Rule" is to put Wayne County into a different and separate category from other Counties in the State.

As a starting point, Wayne County would be permitted to write its own Charter, containing the rules by which it would govern itself. As of today, Wayne's legal authority is defined and limited by State law, as is that of all other Counties.

The rub of the subject is what would go into any such Wayne "Home Rule" County charter. For instance: should it call for partisan or non-partisan elections?

There is considerable academic support for the idea that local government works best on a non-partisan basis, such as in Plymouth and Livonia, which are "home rule" cities. This is in contrast to the Townships, where party politics still prevail.

Over a period of years, the Democratic party has gained absolute control of any and all County elections. Bolstered by the disciplined Democrat vote inside the City of Detroit, candidates of that party invariably win the County seats (such as sheriff, prosecutor, clerk) by margins of 3 to 1 and upward. In some cases these days, the GOP doesn't even run a candidate for county offices.

Thus it can be assumed as foreordained that there will be strong blocs of power resisting any suggestion that a County charter should be non-partisan.

Another sensitive area is voter representation. Under the rules of the state constitution, Detroit has a hammerlock now on the Board of Supervisors, which is the County legislative body. Other parts of the County long have strained and complained about their lack of representation, in terms of population and other interests.

But everyone knows that the politicians in power today within the Board of Supervisors will release their grip only if required to do so by sheer force.

Along with the general Charter theories, there are some specific matters relating to "County Home Rule" which would stir local home revolution. E.G.: should a new Charter call for County-wide assessment, through a single agency, stripping local assessors of their power?

Or the water system, now exclusively the "Detroit water system," with out-county customers. Should this be a County function, under home rule?

Phases of "metropolitan government" will be touched upon at the same time as "County Home Rule" is discussed. Brought into sharp focus again will be the differences in problems, and in political strength, between the inner city of Detroit and those of us out-County.

Some of the fireworks will go off next month when the Legislature is asked to pass a bill that would permit Wayne to proceed to put Home Rule to a vote of the people.

Appropos of the previously discussed Interstate freeway proposed to be built down the Plymouth Township-Livonia line, thence along Schoolcraft through Livonia and Redford Township, a key fact emerged for the first time this week.

The date proposed by the Michigan Highway Department to begin construction is late 1963, with the completion date two years thereafter.

One leg of the freeway will start near Grand River Ave. and Haggerty Rd. and drop south to Monroe. This will cover 37 miles and cost \$42 million. Bids on the northern portion of this leg will be taken late in 1963. This part will run close beside the new Schoolcraft Community College.

The plan is to have a cloverleaf leaving this new road at Schoolcraft road, with those driving to Detroit turning easterly on Schoolcraft road, which will be built into a new freeway, wider than the present road, and depressed with limited access. Once into Detroit, the "Schoolcraft Freeway" would link with a new "Grand River Freeway" which would start at the Ambassador bridge and head north.

Assuming there are no changes in plans (and some of it could be changed at any time) the whole thing wouldn't be really in full, normal use until 1971, eight years from now.

Forecasts about the size and nature of our communities in the future always are interesting, if not entirely certain. The Greater Detroit Metropolitan Planning Commission this week took a look at future population, and predicted the following:

Which, among other things, gives an idea of where the new schools will have to be built around here in years to come.

Loses College Brick Work; Now He Wants 'Gift' Back

Sam Burtman, 31512 Myrna, Livonia, owner of the Century Brick Co., 14910 Linwood Ave. in Detroit, isn't happy with the fact that his firm didn't receive the contract to furnish bricks for the new Schoolcraft College, located at the intersection of Seven Mile and Haggerty Roads.

He expressed his displeasure in a letter to Board President Harold Fischer and College President Dr. Eric Bradner and demanded the return of \$5,177 in securities he "donated" to the college for the construction of a Bell Tower.

The letter and Burtman's changed attitude have the College Trustees in a quandary since they don't know whether they can legally return the funds. They are awaiting a decision from their new attorney, Edward Draugelis, and hope to be able to act on the matter in their next meeting on Aug. 21.

Burtman's displeasure appeared in mid-July when Schurrer Construction Co., general contractor for construction of three buildings on the new campus, awarded the brick contract to Stevens Brick Co., of Detroit, on a sealed bid of \$67 per thousand, contrasted to a sealed bid of \$74 per thousand by the Century Brick Co.

Stevens submitted a proposal for delivery within two weeks and the Century proposal was for six to eight weeks.

Immediately after the contract was awarded, officials said, an indignant Burtman called Dr. Bradner and Fischer complaining that as a matter of honor and the fact that he had aided the college with donations and a loan (he also had put up \$1,000 so the college could get an option on its land) he felt his firm should have been given the contract.

The \$1,000 loan for the land option was paid back later when the Board received its first checks from tax receipts of the college district.

Both Fischer and Dr. Bradner said they informed Burtman that the decision rested with the general contractor and was out of the hands of the Board.

However, in his letter demanding return of the Bell Tower funds, Burtman wrote that the owner has the prerogative to instruct the architect, and the architect in turn tells the contractor where to place the order for the material that is in the specifications.

It was learned the specifications for the brick stated it should be of the type and color as that of a sample furnished by Mr. Burtman.

After the awarding of the

brick contract, it was learned that Stevens Brick Co. could and is furnishing brick that meets the specifications of the sample.

In his letter to Fischer and Dr. Bradner, Burtman wrote: "Now, gentlemen, you and the School Board were going to honor us on the Bell Tower. As of this writing (July 30), both Mrs. Burtman and I are not interested in any honors, or anything else pertaining to this project."

"We gave the Wayne County Community College 545 shares of stock valued at the time at \$9.50 per share. If you have not disposed of the stock, I would like to have you return it to us. If you have sold the stock, kindly send us a check for \$5,177.50.

"We are going to leave the \$1,500 that Mrs. Burtman gave to the School Board for the 'Mollie Burtman Fund' for students who are unable to get sufficient financing, as we do not want to jeopardize the helping of students. The only

thing, we want to make sure it is a perpetual fund. If we would have had your co-operation, this perpetual fund would have been built up to \$10,000 in the very near future.

"After summing up the whole situation, Schoolcraft College is the bigger loser than Sam Burtman."

That's the way the situation stands at the moment and the Board hopes to have an opinion from Draugelis at the next meeting as to what to do next about the money.

Candidates for the positions of Plymouth City Clerk and a vacancy in the Water Dept. will be given oral examinations Thursday afternoon in the Commission Chambers of the City Hall, according to City Manager Albert Glassford.

Board Hires 6 Teachers, Two Resign

Acting on the recommendation of Supt. Russell Isbister, the Plymouth School Board accepted two resignations, approved contracts for five teachers and granted one leave of absence.

The resignations were from Urey Arnold, administration aide and head of the vocational training program at the Senior High, and Mrs. Elizabeth Horner, first grade teacher at Gallimore for the past semester.

Arnold left to accept the position of Superintendent of Schools at Richmond and has been on the job there for a month.

A leave was granted to Mrs. Mary Fritz, teacher at Starkweather for the past 10 years.

Contracts were approved for Lauren Dennison, Barbara Feret, Mrs. Marlene Vander Velde, Edgar Kleinsmith, Sonja Windish and Alice Schmittgen. Dennison will teach industrial arts in the junior highs.

The other assignments are in the elementary schools and include: Miss Feret, second grade at Farrand; Miss Schmittgen, fifth grade at Smith; Kleinsmith, sixth grade at Junior High West; Mrs. Windish, first grade at Smith; and Mrs. VanderVelde, fifth grade at Gallimore.

Glassford indicated that 60 applicants took the written exam for the clerk's post and 14 for the water department job last week.

The tests were conducted by Commissioner Robert Smith, head of the Senior High School counseling staff, assisted by Mike Hoben, football coach and a member of Smith's staff.

They recommended that Glassford accept the top ranking 25 per cent of applicants

for both jobs for the oral examinations.

Thus, Glassford has sent invitations to 15 of those seeking the clerk position and to the four highest ranked in the water department exam.

The oral examinations will be conducted by a three-man committee headed by Northville City Manager Bruce Pothoff and including Don Sutherland, of Plymouth, and Wayne City Clerk Richard Root.

Plymouth Board Tightens Rules On Tuition Fees

Rules and regulations for tuition, non-resident students were revised by the Plymouth School Board when it made several revisions in the policies.

Tuition for non-resident students, who are members of sending school districts approved by the Board, shall be due and payable on the following schedule: first payment, on or before Feb. 1; second payment, on or before June 15.

Tuition for non-resident stu-

dents not members of approved sending school districts are due and payable on the first day of each month in which the students are in attendance.

Any non-resident student whose supporting tuition is in arrears shall be denied the privilege of attending school in the Plymouth district. The Board took firm action on this policy and ordered the administration to follow it to the letter.

There has been some laxity on the part of participating districts in making the payments. Thus the Board's ruling, pay or the student will be denied use of the Plymouth facilities.

Students who are in attendance when they become non-residents may complete the current school year as tuition paying students if they are senior or if there is one month or less remaining in the school year.

The tuition rates were \$345.42 for senior and junior high and \$328.06 for the elementary grades during the past year. The charges for the 1963-64 term shall be determined by the superintendent as soon as all figures are available from the State Department of Public Instruction.

The Board also ruled that non-resident students who are not members of sending districts approved by the Plymouth Board must receive certificates of admission from the administrative offices. None shall be admitted to classes without the certificates.

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Fischer, Kelly Miss School Board Meet

School Board President Gerald Fischer and Building and Ground Supt. Tom Kelly were absent from Monday's meeting of the Plymouth Board of Education.

Fischer is on vacation but will return in time for the meeting on Sept. 9 while Kelly suffered rib injuries when he slipped and fell in his front yard Sunday afternoon. He'll be back at his duties within a few days.

Band Parents Pay Fare to Interlochen

The Plymouth Board of Education Monday approved acceptance of a check for \$477 from the Band Parents Association to cover bus transportation of the bandmen to the Interlochen camp during the week of Aug. 26 through Sept. 2.

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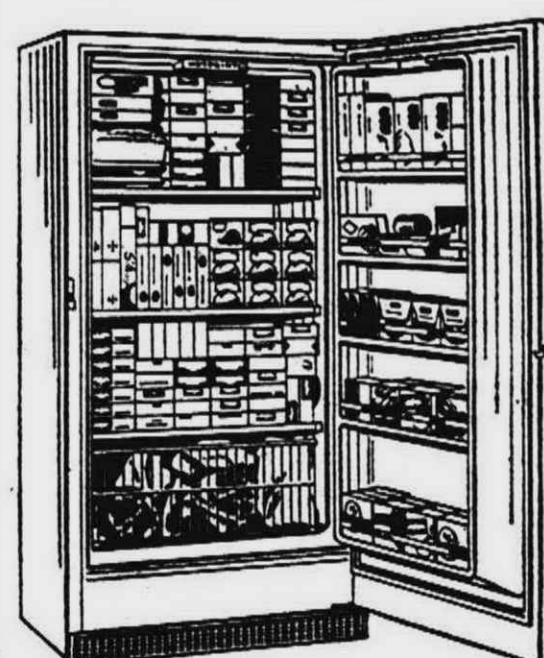
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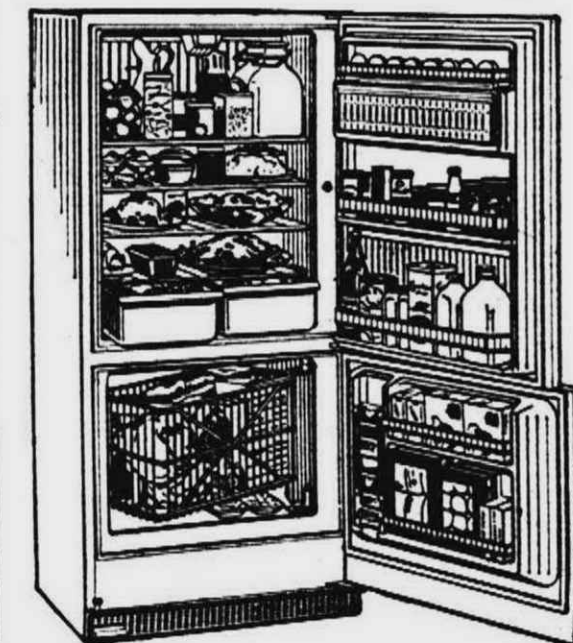


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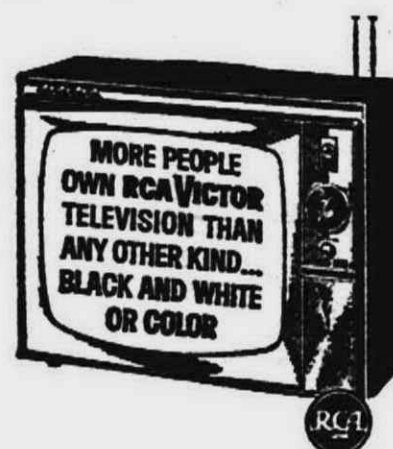
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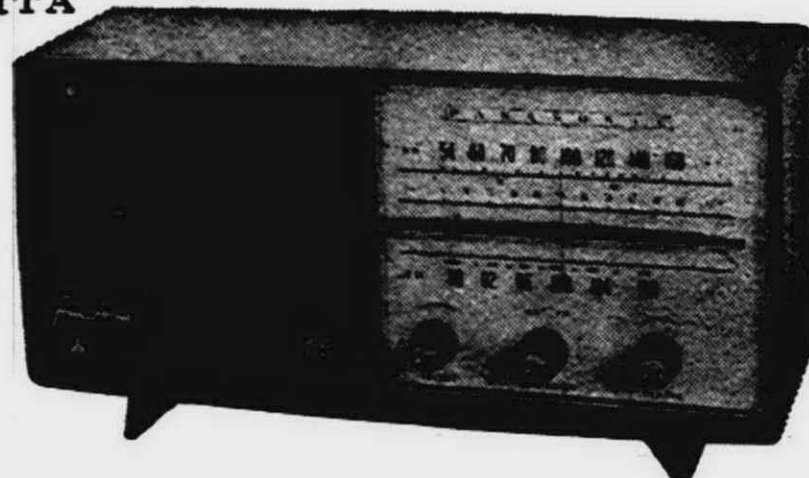


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To Women It May Concern

Twenty-four top women from Michigan will be serving on the Governor's Commission including Mrs. Kory. She also looks after her husband Don and two sweet and active daughters.

But all the women serving are busy women—Genevieve (Hap) Hazard, Vice President of Campbell Ewald; Myra Wolfgang, Secretary-Treasurer of the Hotel and Restaurant Workers Union; Kay Eyde, Women's Program Editor WMSB-TV; Mrs. Katherine Hafstad, Professor of Meteorology, are a few. Delores will be working with top women and we will hear more from her.

They have meetings scheduled around the state during the month of August. Report will be forthcoming on equal job opportunity—pay for equal compensation, opportunity for advancement, fringe benefits, etc.

Delores' appointment is to her choosing. She received a Political and Civil Rights committee assignment.

One of the points she discovered in talking door to door with homemakers is so many of us discriminate against ourselves. Believe me lady none of us want to be masculine—and the cookie that feels she is being unfeminine because she thinks, is as antiquated as the smelling salts.

In questioning women on their voting preference it shocked Delores to discover how many said "I'll have to ask my husband." It would serve this one right if instead of bowling with the boys her man was attending meetings to have the vote taken away from her and he told her just vote "yes" honey on proposal number 3—and the next morning she would be back to being chattel once more (exaggerated for emphasis).

Delores feels too many women's groups shy away from politics and its issues on the idea it isn't lady-like or it's too troublesome. School Custodial Staff Doubles In Plymouth

The custodial and maintenance staff of the Plymouth Community School system has more than doubled in the 10-year period from 1955 through 1964, according to statistics released by Assistant Supt. in Charge of Business Melvin Blunk.

The school board was accused by union representatives of not increasing the custodial and maintenance personnel in proportion to the increase in enrollment and in the number of rooms.

Blunk was requested by The Observer to compile figures for the period dating back to 1955 when the enrollment started the climb that boosted the total from 3,727 then to a projected 5,584 for the 1963-64 term.

The figures show that the Plymouth system had a custodial and maintenance staff of 21 in 1955 and it has grown to a total of 42½ at the present time.

At the same time, the number of rooms in the various school buildings has grown by 74 in a period dating back to 1957.

Blunk's chart shows the following growth in the number of classrooms: 1957, Gallimore School, 13, and Junior High West, 32; 1958, Farrand School, 13; 1959, Senior High, five; 1960, Bird School, three; 1960 Smith School, five; and 1960, Senior High, three.

The school system uses the following number of workers in the custodial and maintenance departments at each building: Allen, 2; Bird, 2½; Senior High, 14½; Junior High East, 10; Smith, 2¾; Starkweather, 2; Gallimore, 2; Farrand, 2; Junior High West, 4½; outlying schools, ½; for a total of 42½.

This is in direct contrast to the 21 employed in 1955-56 when the enrollment was 3,727 against 42½ at the moment with the projected enrollment of 5,584.

Plymouth Board Requires Interest For Sabbatical Leaves

The Plymouth School Board tightened its policies on tuition, non-resident students and sabbatical leave Monday, approving revisions recommended by the school administration.

The sabbatical leave policy was revised to include provisions for charging interest at the rate of six per cent if the employee on leave does not return to the school system.

The Board requires the employee to sign a note for repayment of the amount received during the leave but discovered there was no provision for interest should the employee leave the system.

The new policy requires payment in two years from the date the employee terminates with interest at six per cent. The rule does not apply in cases where the person becomes incapacitated to work or in cases where the rule is waived by the School Board.

Di Ponio Dolly Du Page 4283936, a five-year-old, owned by Angelo Di Ponio, Plymouth, produced a record 18,245 lbs. of milk and 601 lbs. of butterfat in 331 days.

Michigan State University supervised the weighing and testing of production as a part of the official breed improvement programs of the Holstein-Friesian Association of America.

In announcing the record, a spokesman for the national Holstein organization said that it compared to the average cow's annual output of 7,211 lbs. of milk containing 270 lbs. of butterfat.

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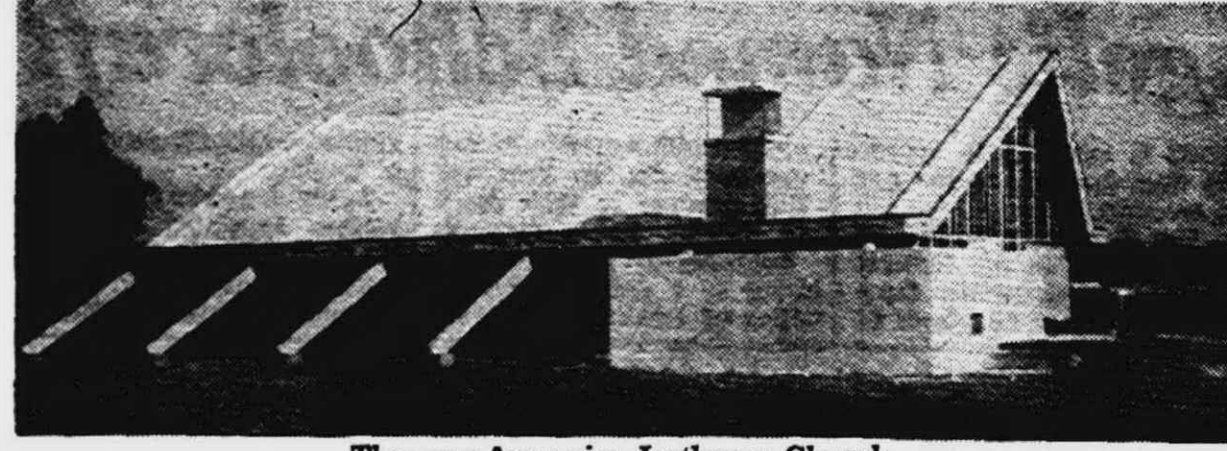
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The new Ascension Lutheran Church

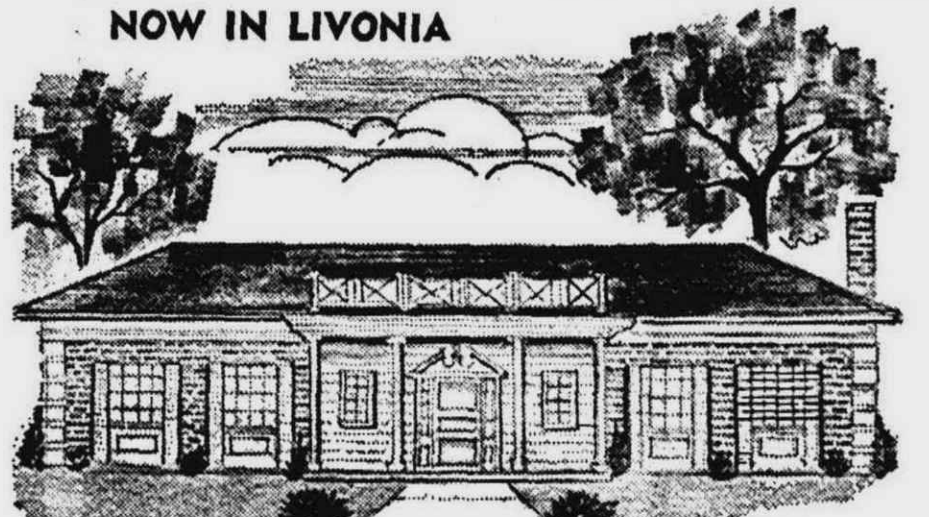

A new water main will be installed in the north end of Blunk Street north of Junction. It should give customers in that section better service and more pressure since they formerly were serviced by a 34" service line.

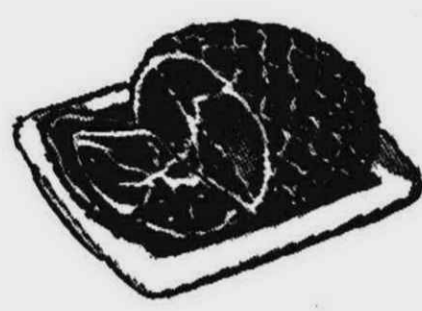

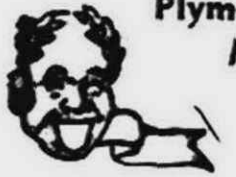

'Curtain Going Up'

The curtain came down quite unexpectedly in the middle of my review of "Here's Love," the new Meridith Willson musical on view at the Fisher for the next two weeks. What precipitated such action on the part of the "stagehands?" Let me hasten to assure everyone that the unfinished condition of the review was old Wally's fault. Knowing the limitation of space, your reviewer should have condensed his material. Often times my material gets a bit verbose and forces the column into a Part I - Part II situation. Here, then, are the remainder of my reactionary remarks regarding "Here's Love."

What to do about this casting error? As cruel a suggestion as this may be, I feel Mr. Willson will have to do some recasting to bring this show into sharp focus and make it acceptable for the discerning Broadway clientele. John Riatt, Robert Goulet or Howard Keel might have been better choices. Elaine Stritch or Gretchen Wyler could give more vocal power to the gal's part. And my choice for Santa would have been Stubby Kaye. He has the price quality that is lacking in Naismith's interpretation. And Stubby sings like a pudgy lark. Get busy on that phone, Mr. Willson. I'm sure you'd do a great deal for your show by having leads that sing first, act secondly instead of the other way around as you now have in "Here's Love." Robert Preston might have been able to talk-sing his way through "The Music Man," but with as delicate and sentimental a show as "Here's Love," you need singers to slip the audience into that syrupy mood.

"Here's Love" can be a joyful year-round Yuletide package of good cheer if the chief Santa Willson inserts some new ear-catching songs and hires a trio of competent carolers. Columbia Records (it's their \$380,000 backing the show) would have a happier, healthier and more profitable Christmas if some changes were made during the next eight weeks before "Here's Love" opens in New York City.

Regardless of how the critics will carp, Mr. Willson's fine musical reputation will carry him into a profitable run for "Here's Love." The New York advance has already taken a healthy turn upward. Washington, the next stop for this musical, is about sold out. "Camelot" and "No Strings" experienced the same kind treatment from the public. It pays to have written a few successful musicals. When you come to think about it, a great deal of life operates this way: build a good reputation and it's difficult to believe an individual can be bad. Bank auditors can lend loads of testimony to this theory.

What happened to Ed Goodwin out at Northland? Old Wally went out to see "Calculated Risk," hoping to see Ed doing the role of the watchman, but when Wally got there the stage was bare—no Ed Goodwin. Bill Marcus, Northland's

assistant producer, indicated that Ed lost his voice on opening night. A similar incident happened with Ann Blythe the week before so Ed was in good company. Ed took a rain check on the part until his throat all cleared. Here's hoping he recovers since we have always admired Ed's histrionic work.

University of Michigan's splendid production of "Monique" concluded a week's run in the air-conditioned Lydia Mendelssohn theater. William McGraw staged this French thriller so competently that you had goosebumps popping out on goose-pimples. Jeanne Lucas showed her versatility by taking on a highly dramatic role. Miss Lucas has been seen mostly in comedy roles. Bob McKee, Dave Hirvela, Tom Manning, Margaret Sinclair, Al Katz, Barb Bartneck, and Joan Lieber performed their roles with professional aplomb. There was a feeling of balance and ensemble acting. Each actor made his character live and leave an imprint on you.

Adams Reigns As Golf Champion

Len Adams, who likes to play once a week, reigns as Livonia's new men's golf champion.

He took the title from Robert McCamant in a playoff at Idyl Wyld Golf Club when Adams shot a 76 to his rival's 81. The pair had finished the regular 54 holes deadlocked at 224.

It marked the first major title the 43-year-old Adams, who works as a foreman at Willow Run and is the father of three boys and girls, ever had won. Previously, his biggest golf achievements came in shop tournaments.

Adams had to come from behind both in the regulation round and in the playoff. In the tournament proper, he virtually knocked himself out of contention with an opening round 81.

Tourney officials sought to have Adams finish the meet in the first flight, but he asked—and received—permission to stick in the championship flight.

"I knew I was a better golfer than that 81," said Adams.

He showed he was by finishing with 73 and 70 to get his 224 and thus putting the pressure on McCamant to catch him to force the extra playoff.

Came the playoff and Adams "skied" to 40 on the first nine to fall behind by two shots. But after McCamant had seared to seven when he ran into fence trouble on the twelfth hole, Adams put on a dazzling finish to turn the match into a rout.

Adams birdied three of the final four holes. On both 15 and 16 he chipped to within 2 1/2 feet of the pin for an easy drop and his birdie. On No. 17 Adams flubbed a short putt to take a bogey (one over par). But he finished with a birdie four on No. 18 by reaching the green in two and sinking a pair of putts.

What went wrong for Adams on the first nine of the championship playoff?

"My hands were very sore," he explained. "I had played in the General Motors meet the day before and the meet took all day. I blew that one when I went wild on the final two holes. I finished with a 75, one behind the leader."

"Since I'm not used to playing more than once a week, I found it tough the next day to grip the clubs in my match against McCamant. At least that's the way it was first on the first nine.

"When I made the turn, I started to settle down and when Bob shot that seven on the twelfth, it really provided the spark which led me to roar through the final few holes."

Talking about his game, Adams said that the strong suit was driving.

"I've always done well in driving and hole-in-one contests, because I can get the ball 'way out," added Adams. "When I got those birdies on the final holes against McCamant, it was mainly because I was able to get the ball so close to the pin. Anybody can push in putts of a couple feet."

Adams and McCamant lead a five-man Livonia delegation to the Recreation Association of Michigan tournament at Mid-

land on Sept. 7. Al Moreland, D. P. Hickey and Bill Booth will round out the Livonia entry.

The M&M is Michigan's richest and the nation's oldest trotting stake, dating back to the early '90s.

Nite Shirt, speedy star of the Kelly Katona stable of

Milan, is the choice of the railbirds in the early predictions in the field of 11. The big trotter has won six of 16 starts including one in 2:01.4 at Sportsman's Park in Chicago just 10 days ago.

He has been racing in the Windy City since the close of the Hazel Park meeting and has met and defeated all of the better trotters in that area.

More than that he'll have the services of Frank O'Mara, of Palms, Mich., who won the M&M a year ago with Top Pro, a three-year-old from the Belle-Aire farm in Ohio.

O'Mara will be gunning for

an unprecedented second straight championship and believes he has Nite Shirt at his best to turn the trick.

However, it isn't going to be easy for the 11-horse field includes many of the better trotters from the east, west and south.

The most prominent challengers are: Pack Hanover, inaugural winner at Wolverine; Music Maker, the Ohio speedster who captured the Michigan trotting derby earlier at Northville Downs; Dubble T. Gay's Buddy, Just Jamie and Marco Hanover.

The M&M is scheduled for two dashes over a distance of a mile and will go as the sixth and ninth races on the program.

Legislators Find Local Support for State Minimum Wage Law

A four-member legislative investigating team found what appeared to be a broad base of support for a proposed state minimum wage law during a public hearing in Livonia last Tuesday.

Two labor union officers, a retired Northville pensioner, a women's club representative, a migrant worker and a Unitarian Church spokesman were joined by the President of the Livonia City Council in defense of a plan to hike the state minimum wage to \$1.15.

Three local theater operators, however, told the committee that they'd be forced to cut services or go out of business if the minimum wage is applied to them. They were joined by an official of the Michigan Restaurant Association in asking exemptions for the two industries from the proposed law.

Hyman Blum, operator of the Terrace Theater, led off testimony, saying, "We'd be forced to reduce our staff of ushers 30 to 35 per cent if we go to a minimum wage of \$1.25." He said that 22 of the 30 employees

were high school youngsters, 16 to 20 years old, who considered their employment "spending money jobs" and were paid 75 cents to \$1.10 an hour. "We employ more than we need, so we can give our customers a lot of service," he added.

Blum was followed by Edward J. Hohler of the P & A Theaters in Plymouth and Northville and the Civic Theater in Farmington. Claiming his profit was \$10,000 last year, he said a minimum wage hike to \$1.15 an hour would cost him an additional \$7,000 a year. "I'll be out of a job and I assure you that the young people who work for me will be out of jobs," Hohler said he was "providing a service to the young group by giving them an opportunity to make spending money." They're paid 70 cents an hour.

Joe W. Busic, manager of the new Mai Kai Theater said the minimum wage law would force him to cut three of his seven ushers from the payroll.

Representative James Ka-

roub (D — Highland Park) commented that the two new theaters constructed in Livonia seemed to "testify to the healthy business condition of the theater industry."

John Lathers, representing the First Unitarian Church of Ann Arbor, was the first of several to testify in favor of minimum wage legislation. "The federal minimum of \$1.25 seems to me to be no more than adequately high," he said, "when one considers that more than this is needed to provide minimum standards of support for a family by Welfare Department standards."

"... We are not of the opinion that a business ought to be excluded from coverage for the reason that the employer may suffer or be driven out of business. A business surviving on the basis of grossly underpaid help is close to the condition of a vampire — living on blood."

Myra Wolfgang, officer in the Hotel and Restaurant Workers Union, urged that minimum wage laws be applied, if passed, to her industries as well as to convalescent home employees. Claiming that the increased wage rates would not hurt the industry, she said, "Thirty other states have minimum wages and in New York and California, where you have your most successful restaurant businesses, you have a minimum wage." She cited an example of a restaurant chain which paid its workers nothing in Louisiana, where there isn't a minimum wage, but paid them the minimum \$1.15 in New York.

Joined by Mort Furay, union officer and chairman of the Michigan Committee for a Minimum Wage, she said that trained nurses' aides in convalescent homes "deserve more than the 65 cents an hour they're now paid on an average... these convalescent homes are profit-making organizations. Study their profit rate," she urged, "compared to their wage rate."

Rendering opposing testimony, Richard Teranes, spokesman for the Restaurant Association, claimed, "During the last five years, the net profit to net worth ratio, which is the measure of an owner's return on his investment, ranged between 1.7 and 6.7 per cent in the restaurant industry." A minimum wage, he said, would probably cause "business failures, bankruptcies, loss of savings and loss of investors' capital."

Livonia City Council president Sydney Bagnall, a Restaurant Association member, took issue with Teranes and said that as an individual member he favored the minimum wage proposals. Others who testified included:

• Mrs. Millie Rowison, representing the South Redford Business and Professional Women's Club, who said her group, locally and statewide, favored minimum wage legislation. "Our young women and girls aren't doing so well; we're particularly concerned about dime store employees and domestics."

• Mr. Flores, migrant worker from Texas, who said, "Food and clothing prices are high," and "we must pay travel expenses between one crop and another." There are 60,000 migrant workers in the state, he added, who are paid mostly on a piece work basis.

• Mr. Reinhard, retired Northville Township resident, who said a minimum wage would hike purchasing power. "Let's pay a little more money," he said, "and we'll have a little more buying power." Conducting the hearing, besides Karoub, were Senator Ray Dzundzel, and Representatives Don Gordon and Marie Hager. Tuesday's session was one of a series of public hearings to sound out opinion on minimum wage proposals.

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Ford Employment Soars To 34,000

Ford Motor Company reported that its average worldwide total employment for the first six months of 1963 was 314,000 and its worldwide payrolls for the January-June period totaled approximately \$950,000,000.

Kenneth D. Cassidy, vice president, Industrial Relations, pointed out the 1963 figures were substantially higher than the company's 298,000 average worldwide employment and \$868 million payroll in the first half of 1962.

Cassidy also reported Ford employment data for payroll operations in the United States, exclusive of Philco Corporation:

Payrolls for the first six months of 1963 totaled \$668,436,709—the highest for any January-June period in the company's 60-year history and 8.5 per cent higher than the same period last year.

Total average employment for the period was 166,203—an increase of 3,235 over 1962 and highest for any first six-month period since 1957.

Gross average hourly earnings of \$3.22 for U.S. Ford

employees in the period also set a record—up 14 cents from \$3.08 per hour last year. Ford employment and payroll levels in Michigan paralleled the high national totals, Cassidy said.

Average total employment in the state for the first six months of the year was 8,148,1, up 4,095 from the same period a year ago and the highest for any similar

period since 1957. Ford January-June payrolls in Michigan totaled \$367,113,577, highest ever for the period and more than \$32,000,000 above the first half of 1962. Gross average hourly earnings for Michigan Ford employees also climbed to a record of \$3.26 compared with a previous high of \$3.13 per hour for the first six months of 1962.

Tell Plymouth Kiwanians To Make Evaluations Now

"Evaluate yourself and then follow four steps that will help you do better in your daily living and work," was the advice given members of the Southgate and Plymouth Ki-

wanis Clubs in the annual joint meeting at Lofy's Arbor Lil.

The speaker was Paul Sampson, president of the Sampson-Hill Co., who addressed the group on the subject of "Potentially Speaking."

Sampson pointed to the example of nine business leaders in Chicago, each with a high individual potential, who met in 1923 to discuss future plans and 30 years later were financial failures.

"These men were able to manage business successfully but not themselves," he pointed out. "At the end of 30 years, two were in prison, two had committed suicide, two were in mental institutions and all were moral and financial failures."

"Each of us should carefully review our assets and strengths, our liabilities and weaknesses. The average man develops only 10 per cent of himself and shows little skill in controlling or managing himself."

Sampson warned of the danger of thinking ourselves better

than we are and of accepting defeat before making an honest effort to complete the task at hand.

"There are four cornerstones we should follow in our efforts to better ourselves," he said. These are: 1—Learn to make a decision; 2—Become a self starter, one will never get a lawn mowed unless he starts it; 3—Strive for excellence since the average man is nothing more than the worst of the best or the best of the worst; 4—Develop more courage.

"Recognize the value of obstacles and opposition, and the probability of error in a new undertaking, so that when you miss a putt on a golf green, your whole day isn't spoiled."

Prior to reading the June 19 article by the Honorable Mayor of Livonia, this writer has attempted to keep partisan politics out of our local government. But, because our non-partisan mayor did not have his demands met he is carrying what appears to be a personal vendetta against honored Democrats, conscientious councilmen, and taxpayer businessmen. All this because he can't put OUR post office in HIS civic center.

As the honorable state representative for Livonia has so often said in his articles, let's examine the facts.

No. One: Mayor Moelke wanted the post office located in the civic center. Since he is our mayor, a voter, and a taxpayer it was his privilege to convey his opinions to our elected officials and postal authorities.

No. 2: The postal authorities expressed interest in building a new post office in the south end of Livonia. It was to replace the existing building presently located on Plymouth Road. This building is too small, old and lacks adequate parking facilities. They care less where it goes as long as the voting taxpayer is happy.

No. 3: Aside from being the president of the Livonia Democratic Club, Mr. Mardiros is a businessman, voter, taxpayer, and aggressive citizen.

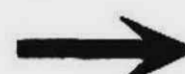

U of M Collects Political History

ANN ARBOR—Personal papers of a number of outstanding Michigan political figures have been added to The University of Michigan Historical Collections this year.

F. Clever Bald, director, said two important collections were received dealing with the career of Senator Arthur H. Vandenberg. These include 54 items of correspondence of Senator and Mrs. Vandenberg with A. Brooks Smith, 1932-51, and 29 volumes of scrapbooks on the senator's career, and correspondence with him collected by Ralph H. Smith.

Of great importance are the papers of John B. Swainson, Bald said. These 170 feet of records for the years 1954-63 contain his correspondence, speeches, notes and other papers covering his career as state senator, 1955-58, lieutenant governor, 1959-60, and governor, 1961-62. These papers are not yet open for research.

The Michigan Historical Collections now is the depository of personal papers of some 20 Michigan governors.

Two former chairmen of the state Republican party deposited collections of their personal papers: Lawrence B. Lindermer gave one box of papers covering the years 1957-61 and Mrs. Owen J. Cleary contributed 10 feet and two volumes of her husband's papers dealing with his service as secretary of state, as Republican party chairman, and as an educator for the years 1954-59.

Former Ann Arbor mayor, William E. Brown gave his personal papers for the years 1945-62.

A collection throwing light on 19th Century Michigan politics are the papers of the Brackley and Horatio Shaw family. Much of the correspondence in these papers concerns the legislative service of Brackley Shaw, 1869-79, and 1881-84.

Eighteen volumes, 1917-36, containing the decisions of Judge George Arthur Malcolm of the Supreme Court of the Philippine Islands were contributed by Mrs. Malcolm as the beginning of a substantial collection covering his distinguished career in the island republic.

Four volumes of scrapbooks of the late Willard J. Maxey, 1957-62, were also received, dealing with his service as director of Michigan Department of Public Welfare.


Several important additions were made to already established collections of political figures. These include two Charles M. Ziegler scrapbooks, 12 boxes of Representative Martha W. Griffiths' papers, 15 boxes of Representative Nell Staebler's papers, four boxes of G. Mennen Williams' papers, and additional files of correspondence of Frank Murphy.

Livonia Student Assists in Disease Research Project

The challenge of working on new scientific investigations into cancer, leukemia, arthritis and other diseases is being met this summer by an Albion College student from Livonia.

Ron Tallman, son of Mr. and Mrs. B. Tallman, 9970 Freemont, is assisting two college professors who have been awarded three-year research grants for studies on molecular structure and synthetic membranes.

Dr. Paul H. Carnell, chairman of Albion's chemistry department, is involved in a project to determine the characteristics of synthetic membranes that are porous to small-sized particles. According to medical authorities, the experiment is significant because functions of various human membranes, they believe, have a connection with cancer and the other diseases. Data may also be found, they said, to lessen the problem of converting sea water to fresh water.

In addition to Tallman, who is a junior at Albion, three other students will assist the two professors in their work.

Dr. Carnell has been given a \$23,420 grant from the National Health Institute for the project. A second Albion professor, Dr. John W. Crump, has received an \$11,520 grant from the Petroleum Research Fund for an attempt to determine stability of certain organic compounds which contain the same atoms, but differently arranged within a molecule.
