Plymouth Hosts Farmington Friday ocks Go! Beat Those Falcons

Off to an auspicious start with a 26-12 victory over Northville in the traditional battle between old rivals on the Northville athletic field, Plymouth High's Rocks will pry the lid off their home campaign Friday night when they entertain Farmington.

The kickoff is slated for 8 p.m. with the colorful marching band under the direction of James Griffith taking over some 15 minutes earlier for the flag-raising ceremonies.

Coach Mike Hoben, who generally has a grim look at this time of the year in his usual pessimistic

manner, had a bit of a smile after the opening triumph and went so far as to voice an opinion that the Rocks might have a chance to win the home opener.

For Hoben that's one of the most optimistic statements of the year since he isn't known for making any predictions about the season of a single game for that matter.

Blessed with 16 lettermen and six regulars from last year, it appears as if the Rocks will be on the upswing this season and victory over the Falcons would give them an excellent start.

This year's club is built around the play of the six starters from a year ago, including: Capt. and End Dick Egloff, Tackles Kevin Huntington and Dave Sackett, Guard Hal Smith, Fullback Dave Agnew, Left Half Roger Tobey and Right Half Gary Grady.

The offense will go as the quarterbacks go and this has placed a bit of pressure on Junior Terry Cosgrove and John Daniel. Each performed well in the Northville opener with the latter turning in an excellent job as a passer with six completions in eight tosses.

Agnew started the year with a pair of touchdowns, both on short runs; Tobey tallied once and Grady, who may develop into one of Plymouth's greatest backs, electrified the crowd with a 75-yard scoring jaunt on a kickoff.

This is Hoben's eighth season as head coach and nothing could please him more than to have the 1963 team jell into one of the better combinations since he took over.


Despite Farmington's 19-0 loss to Livonia Bentley in its home opener last week, the Falcons are always dangerous against the Rocks. Thus Hoben has been drilling his squad overtime most of the week in preparation.

Mike wants to win this game as much as any on the schedule, since it is the initial appearance of his latest creation before the home folks.

He lost such standouts as Dick Schryer, Hugh Sarah and Mark Schultheiss from last year's squad but believes he has filled most of the holes with the exception of quarterback.

Filling the shoes of Schryer poses a task because Dick was one of the area's best. However, Cosgrove and Daniel are coming along well and Hoben expects that they'll take up the slack at that post.

Other than that Hoben and his aides have been busy correcting some of the faults revealed against Northville. They expect to have a much smoother and more polished machine for the home opener.

It is lighted whenever the car is operating, day or night, and frankly it's baffling to a stranger.

We learn now that the lights are running "safety lights". Their purpose is to prevent a car being washed out in a background and hence unnoticeable to an oncoming driver. It also aims to improve depth perception and improve passing judgments for oncoming drivers. Say its boosters: "... the running light gets rid of the ancient explanation, 'I never even saw the car coming'."

The reason the running lights are seen in thick numbers near Indianapolis and Columbus is that the major newspapers in those cities staged long and eloquent promotional campaigns on behalf of the lights. Greyhound Bus Co. reports in that area that running with lights on in daylight hours has cut its accidents 15 percent.

Anyway, the Jaycee Club of Livonia is having its important annual auto safety belt sale in the Wonderland Center parking lot all day next Saturday and Sunday. A wayfarer from Plymouth, Redford or Livonia can stop and have his belts installed in a jiffy for \$5.95, knowing that any profit goes to civic causes.

And this year for the first time, the Jaycees also are selling "running safety lights." They cost \$1.75, plus about \$2 for installation.

Consumers **Pays Refunds To Customers**

Gas customers of Consumers Power Company this month are receiving gas service bills from the Company reflecting their share of a refund which totals \$2,400,000.

The refund recently was made to Consumers by its Pipeline Gas Suppliers.

Customers will find an average of \$3.70 taken off their bills if they are gas space heating customers. If they use gas for such things as cooking and water heating but not for space heating purposes, the average deduction from current bills will be about 70 cents, the Company said.

Commercial and industrial customers of the Company will be refunded varying amounts according to the amounts of gas used in the three - month period March-May of this year. the period on which the amount of the refund is based.
