Open Forum Fails To Give Answers For Civic Center

Citizens of the Plymouth Community are much aware of the need and value of a civic center but haven't any definite idea of financing such a project.

That was the conclusion reached at the open forum of

the Citizens for Plymouth Community in the auditorium of the Junior High East.

More than 70 interested persons, including most of the civic, service, business and industrial leaders, sat in on one of the 11 discussion groups in the session chaired by School Supt. Russell Isbister.

The results were very inconclusive in regard to the civic center although the groups were almost unanimous in expressing concern, interest and willingness to pursue area planning for industrial development.

Isbister indicated the findings of the forum would be discussed in a meeting of the 15-man steering committee this week at which time a determination would be made as to future forum sessions.

Sam Hudson, public relations director of the Evans Products Co., gave a report on the findings of a committee named to make a survey of civic centers throughout the state that would fit into the planning and financing of the Plymouth Community.

However, Hudson told of the experiences in four different state communities, none of which actually touched on a Plymouth situation.

In three of the communities, the land was donated for the center. Two have backing of private funds, one was started by a fund raising campaign over a long period of time and the fourth was financed from funds secured from that community's share of the state's tax on parimutual betting at a track in the city.

The reports from leaders of the 11 groups indicated a thinking toward a theater type building which would include kitchen and cafeteria facilities.

Type of operation brought a variety of suggestions, ranging from a community-backed to an operation under the direct supervision of the school board.

Matter of fact, there was considerable conjecture from some groups as to whether the community needs a civic center at this time or whether the matter should be taken under a lengthy study before any decision is reached.

Financing brought a number of suggestions including a one-mill levy over a 10-year period, have the construction costs included in the School District's building and site sinking fund; use of federal funds on a matching basis if available; and start the ball rolling with a fund raising campaign with a millage vote later.

Plymouth Church Backs Its Ministers

Presbyterian Session Endorses Sermon

Rev. Edward Castner, associate pastor of the First United Presbyterian Church, has received the endorsement of the Church's Session for his controversial sermon recently on "racial justice" which was published a week later in the Observer Newspapers.

In the meeting of the Session of the First United Presbyterian Church on Sept. 18, it was moved and approved that the session endorses (1) the right of the ministers to make whatever statements they feel called upon to make and (2) the church stands behind the pronouncements of the United Presbyterian Church in

the U.S.A. on the question of race.

It was moved that the action of the Session be communicated to the congregation by being printed in the church bulletin and in the newspapers, if possible. (It is possible in the Observer Newspapers just as it was possible to have the sermon published

in the Observer Newspapers and not in other publications in the area.)
The Session also approved a resolution that the sermon preached by Rev. Castner on Sunday, Sept. 1 be printed and made available to members of the congregation and any others interested in securing copies.

Plymouth Opens Night School Occupational Program Monday

Plymouth's venture into night school classes with full credit towards a diploma—first step in the answer to the dropout

problem which is receiving attention on a national level—starts Monday night when three classes hold their first

sessions at Plymouth Senior High School.

Phil Johnson and Mike Hoben, members of the high school staff who are serving

as co-ordinators of the classes under the school system's adult education program, Tuesday indicated that there were still openings for registrations in the business training class.

The three classes include: Occupational English, which meets Monday and Thursday from 7 to 9 p.m.; Occupational Shop, meeting Monday and Tuesday from 7 to 9 p.m.; and Business Training, meeting Monday and Tuesday from 7 to 9.

The co-ordinators report full enrollments for the Occupational English course but stated they would squeeze in a few more if registrations are received before the start of the sessions.

Johnson may be reached at the senior high school and Hoben may be contacted at the Y.M.C.A. Young Adult Employment Bureau office in the Plymouth Credit Union Building on S. Harvey street or by calling 453-2904.

Under the plans approved by School Supt. Russell Isbister and the Plymouth School Board, credit will be given toward a high school diploma on the basis of a half credit per course per semester. Matching credit will be given for work where work and the courses are related.

Thus a night school student may earn a maximum credit of six hours per year.

The courses will consist of the following:
Occupational English—20 hours of Business English, 20 hours of Speech and 24 hours of oral expression and spelling.

Occupational Shop—20 hours of welding, 20 hours of basic math, 24 hours of drafting and blue print reading.

Business Training—20 hours of typing, 20 hours of business machines and 24 hours of office procedures.

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FACTS and OPINIONS

With the bulldozers fast leveling the buildings and grading the site upon which Plymouth's new City Hall will stand, every local citizen today feels a certain swell of pride and anticipation.

The plans for the City Hall guarantee that it will be a handsome building, completely in keeping with Plymouth's magnificent library. In putting up new City Hall an additional benefit is that considerable ancient housing also will go down.

The net effect is to make one wonder—what after the new City Hall? Here will be the second unit of a genuine Civic Center Area, completely modern and in the best of colonial taste.

There have been discussions about a possible civic auditorium and meeting place. It is a thought to be pursued diligently.

Facts and Opinions would make another suggestion.

PLYMOUTH HIGH SCHOOL across the street is fast becoming old and inadequate. It offers Plymouth youngsters much less than high schools in neighboring areas, all of which have been built in recent years.

Let the Board of Education appoint a special Citizen's Committee to analyze in depth the idea of razing the present high school (except the gymnasium and newer portion) and erecting a new one, larger and modern, on the exact same site. It would follow the modern colonial appearance of the new City Hall and new Library.

It would contain an adequate auditorium and other "civic center" features. And it would extend the development so magnificently started by Library and City Hall.

In due time, this observer will comment at length on the virtues and shortcomings (and there are plenty of both) of Governor Romney's proposed tax package, but today the reader should be reminded of two special public hearings on the matter.

These hearings will be held by the House Taxation Committee, which is the group that will have more to say about the future of the proposals than any other body. What emerges, or does not, from the committee when it returns to Lansing, will determine the nature of the program.

What they decide the public really wants, is what the legislators are going to offer, whether it happens to agree with the Governor's own ideas or not. We earnestly beseech any citizen with a viewpoint to make himself heard at one of these public hearings this week.

On Thursday (Sept. 26) there will be sessions at the Veteran's Memorial Building in Detroit at 10 a.m. (for senior citizens), and at 2 p.m. (where city income taxes will be discussed). The scene shifts to Cass Tech high school Thursday evening for an 8 p.m. hearing on the general matter of reform. On Friday (Sept. 27) the hearings will be held in the City-County building in Detroit, starting at 10 a.m.

The following was plucked from "The Muskegon Chronicle":

A few days ago a Muskegon resident asked for directions about the best route from Muskegon to Wayne County's Metropolitan airport on I.94 just west of Detroit.

She was told to turn right at the first stoplight on I.96 after leaving Muskegon.

She found this hard to believe, but decided to do as told and see what happened.

The instructions were correct. The first stoplight beyond Muskegon on I.96 and I.96 is at Livonia, where the expressway ends only a few miles from the Detroit city limits. By turning right there and driving south 16 miles, she would find herself at their entrance.

So a person literally can drive from Muskegon to Livonia, or vice versa, without encountering a stoplight anywhere along the route. In the process you will bypass Lansing, Grand Rapids and all points in between. A visitor from some other state or country, motoring via I.96, might reasonably conclude that Michigan is chiefly farmland.

Today the state's second largest city, Grand Rapids and its capital city, Lansing, are only names on signs as you drive, uninterrupted, the length of I.96. If you start at the Detroit end, your first stoplight will be at Summit Avenue on the Norton-Glade Expressway in Muskegon.

DPW News And Notes In Plymouth

The crew at Riverside Cemetery have been busy cleaning up after six funerals during this week.

The business area and most of the south part of the city has been swept. Several hours were spent out at the city dump, on Chubb Road, covering debris and cleaning up the yard.

The crew has started to rake leaves in the city parks. This job will continue for some time now that fall has settled upon us.

Houses were dye tested on N. Holbrook from Spring Street to Plymouth Road to see if they were properly connected to the sanitary sewer.

A water service was repaired at 875 Ann Arbor Road. A 2" water tap was made at Haggerty Road and Plymouth Road for the new Burroughs Credit Union Office, and a 1 1/2" water tap was made at Rose and Amelia and a sanitary sewer tap at Rose and Amelia.

A sanitary sewer manhole was raised on Hartsough between S. Harvey and McKinley. Sanitary sewers were flushed in the south end of the City.

Early Friday morning an 8" water main broke at Hartsough and McKinley. This caused the Smith School to be without water and to be closed for the day. Some of the residents in this district were without water for a short time. This was repaired in record time even with the handicap of working in the rain.

Hydrants were flushed in the south part of the city Wednesday, Thursday and Friday evening of last week. Hydrants will be flushed over the remainder of the city on Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday evenings from 9:00 p.m. until approximately midnight. This will continue until all hydrants have been flushed.

During this time if any rusty water happens to get into your hot water tank please remember that the tank should be completely drained as follows:

a. Shut off cold water intake prior to draining the hot water tank.

b. Open a hot water faucet in a wash tub etc.

c. Open drain valve on your hot water tank and allow any rusty water to drain off.

d. Reverse steps a, b, and c and refill the hot water tank.

e. Allow hot water to run in wash tub until clear, for surge of water after the tank has been drained may dislodge rust in the pipes from the hot water tank to the wash tub.

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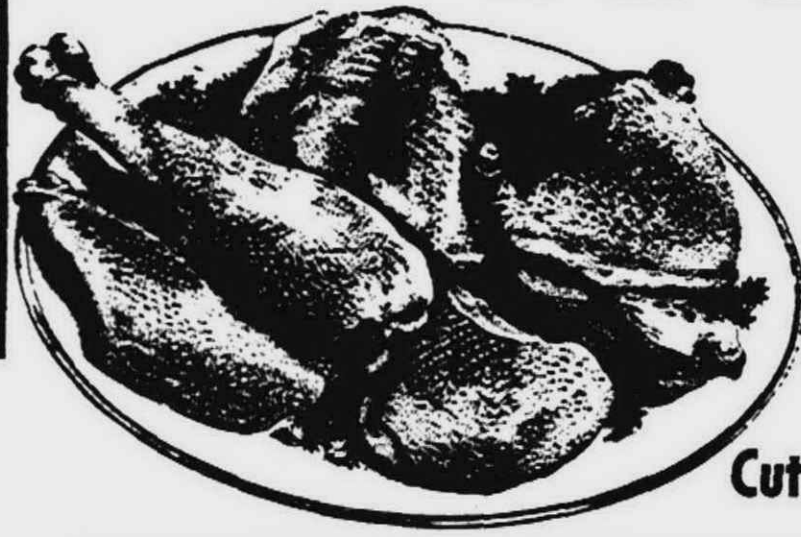
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St. Paul's Church To Dedicate New Building

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Jewish Atonement Begins Sundown, On Friday

The observance of Yom Kippur, the most solemn day of the Jewish religious calendar, begins at sundown, Friday, Sept. 27.

Yom Kippur means Day of Atonement, and at special services Friday night and Saturday the worshiper seeks the spirit of penitence and an attitude of forgiveness.

The services on Friday night commences with the chanting of Kol Nidre, "All Vows," one of the most celebrated of all liturgical melodies. It is a musical prayer beseeching divine mercy for rash conduct during the past year. At sunset on Saturday the services are concluded with a final blast of the ram's horn (shofar), betokening the end of the Holy Day period, which began with the observance of the New Year ten days earlier. According to traditional reckoning this is the year 5724.

Marked by many as a fast day, Yom Kippur was instituted as a result of the injunction in the Book of Numbers in the Bible, verse 7, of chapter 29, which calls for a "holy convocation," when "ye shall afflict your souls," which is Scriptural language for fasting.

The sermons, prayers and ritual music on the Day of Atonement apply not only to individual morality but also to

group morality. Here is a typical passage from the Yom Kippur ritual as contained in the Prayer Book:

"O Lord, hasten the day when all evil shall be destroyed and wickedness shall be no more. Quicken us to work with the righteous of all nations and creeds, to bring about Thy kingdom upon earth, so that hatred among men shall cease, that the walls of prejudice and pride, separating peoples, shall crumble and fall, and war be destroyed forever."

Services will be conducted by Rabbi David Jessel of Temple Beth Am at the Maly and Samuel Cohn Building, W. Seven Mile Rd. at Osmus:

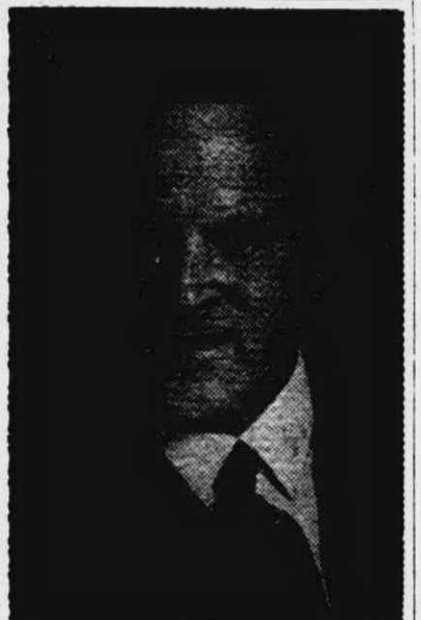

a week ago, the Schoolcraft College Board of Trustees Monday voted to accept the low bids for construction of the new library on the campus at

the intersection of Haggerty and Seven Mile Roads. When opened, the low bids for the three phases totaled \$522,117, almost 20 per cent

over the estimates and considerably above the allotment of \$427,000. However, the Trustees decided to take advantage of alternates in the general construction and electrical bids,

trimmed a few more items off the plans at the suggestion of Architects Eberle M. Smith Associates, Inc., and finally whittled the total to \$470,000. Then with all of that taken into consideration, the Board

approved acceptance of the low bids. It is believed that construction will start in the near future so that the library will be ready for use when the college opens its doors in September of 1964.

The general construction contract went to Schurrer Construction Co. on its bids of \$326,149 after the Board voted to eliminate alternates one and two. The plumbing contract went

to the Gillies Plumbing and Heating Co. on its offering of \$21,278 and the electrical contract to Jones-Sherman, Inc., on its bids of \$147,050 after the elimination of the two alternates.

Principal At Adams Dies At 42

Plan Clinics For C'ville Teachers

Dr. Harry Hahn, Director of Instruction and Reading Specialists for Oakland County Schools, will conduct a series of meetings with the Clarenceville secondary teachers at the Clarenceville High School.

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Wants To Continue To Service Trucks

The Livonia City Council received this letter:

Gentlemen:

"I am writing to you to ask for your help in keeping my means of livelihood and providing what I believe is unjust interference and harassment on the part of your inspection bureau.

"I have resided in Livonia for nine years at 28736 Westfield and for the past six years I have operated a gasoline service station and garage at 28434 Joy Road, corner of Harrison, in the City of Livonia, under a lease with Sun Oil Company.

"As you gentlemen may know, there is not very much profit in the sale of gasoline alone and a good portion of my income re-

sults from servicing motor vehicles, including changing oil, lubricating and in some cases, repairs. Many of these vehicles are trucks which are owned by Livonia citizens in my neighborhood and which are left with me sometimes over night in order that these vehicles can be properly serviced and made ready for use the following day.

"I believe that about two years after I started in business and commenced servicing vehicles, a group of stores was constructed behind my station and I have an idea that some of the proprietors may have complained to your Bureau of Inspection. This has apparently resulted in your new chief inspector, R. L. Sanderson, who does not live in Livonia and

who seems to be very familiar with impersonal, indifferent and complicated regulations of a large city, taking actions against me to prevent me from servicing motor vehicles, particularly these trucks in the manner above indicated. Mr. Sanderson does not seem to be familiar with conditions here in Livonia and the desist order which he recently served on me indicates that he is more interested in technicalities than my means of livelihood.

"In view of the fact that I have been on this location for six years, during which I have continuously operated in the same manner that I am today, and in view of the fact that I was there before the stores at the rear of me and before Mr. Sand-

Eugene Duston, Republican member of the Board and also director of debate for Thurston High School, wrote to the Editor of "Township News":

"An item appearing on page two of your issue of Sept. 19 contains a factual error and presents some misconceptions about the nature of high school debate.

"The article referred to was about the Thurston (not Pearson as reported) debate team and is headed "Pupils Asked Debate Gov't. Socialism," etc. The question for debate is chosen in a nationwide vote, with all high school debate teams in the country debating the same topic. Questions which are of current interest are generally selected. Each high school debates both sides of the question. Students generally select the side (for or against) with which they agree. As to the question that the proposal for medical care at public expense is socialist—this argument will undoubtedly be used by negative teams.

"To have a winning record a debate team must have good arguments and win on both sides of a question. I hope my school will win a substantial number of debates on both sides of the issue of Federalized medicine. Many may disagree with the affirmative of the question, but in debate we adopt a basic principle of American law—even the guilty deserve a defense. While affirmative teams provide the defense, the negatives will be trying to show that there is none, and the team that does the best debating will win."

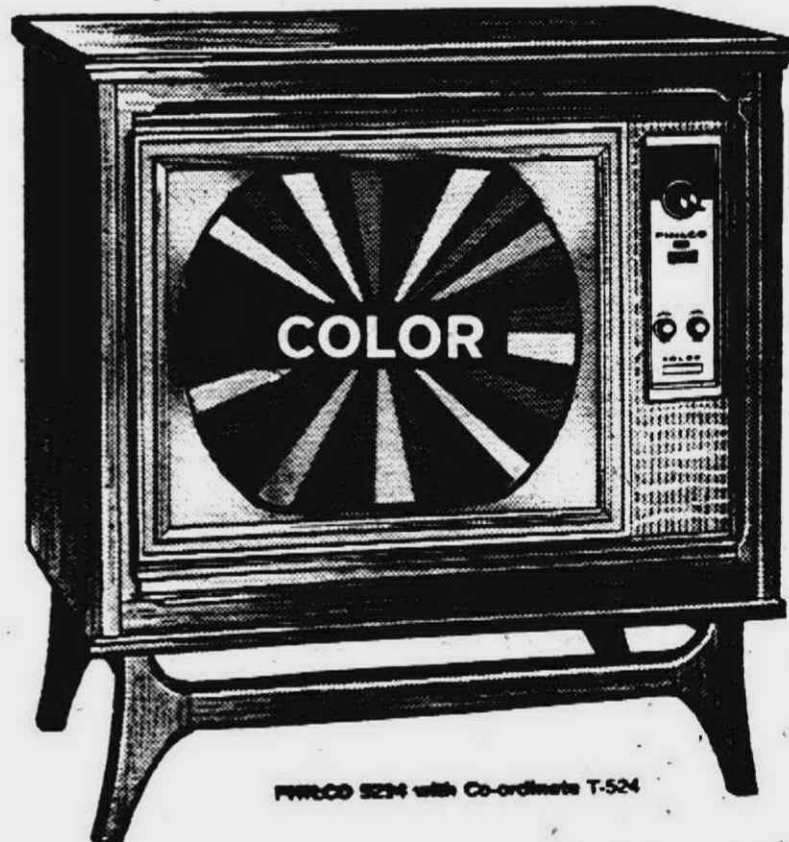

A week ago, they put Rip to eternal rest. Cancer had silenced Bill's whistle in the pink of his life.

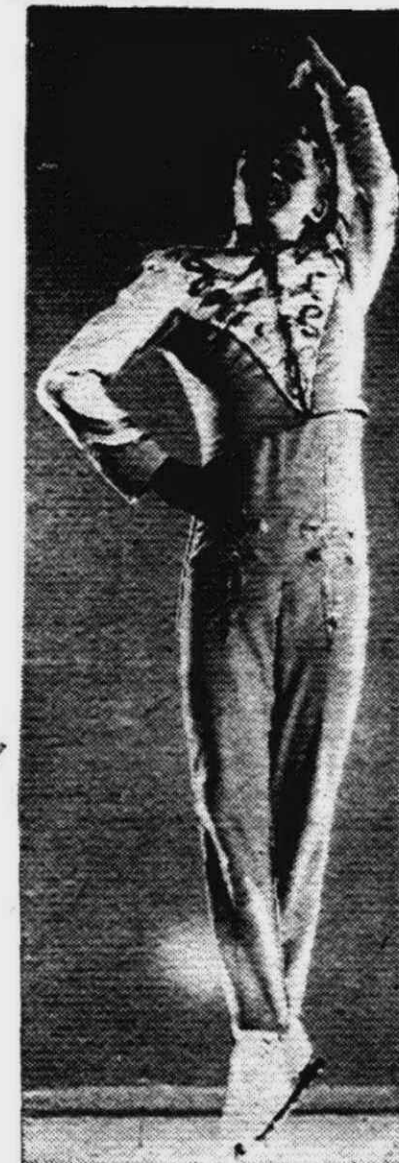
He was just 43.

Five Livonia Students Reach Scholarship Semi-Finals

other scholarship-granting agencies and financial aid sources. Studies show that about 50 per cent of the Semifinalists obtain financial aid from sources other than the Merit program.

In notifying the Livonia principals of the selections, National Merit Corporation president

John M. Stalnaker said, "These students are not only intellectually able, but characteristically they are also ambitious, energetic, and resourceful. In honoring them we pay credit, too, to the families, teachers, and communities which have aided them in their efforts to succeed."

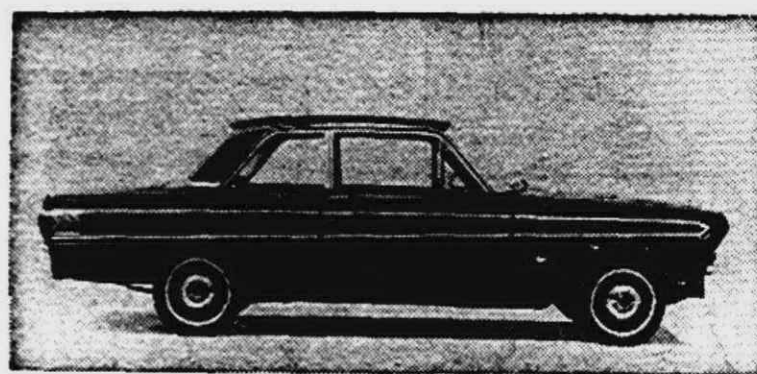

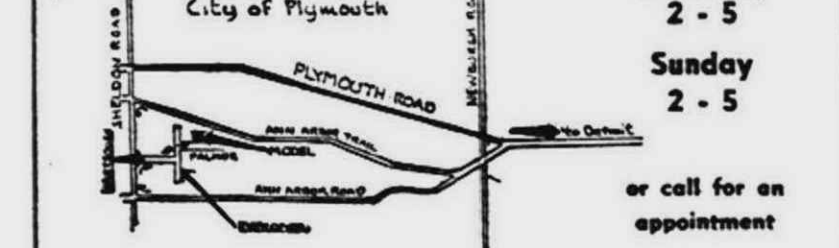

Study In Data Processing Offered To 20 At Franklin

Sometime next month approximately 20 volunteer students from the Franklin High School will begin a program of study involving the newest techniques of data processing.

The mutual effort to provide up-to-date, accurate educational experiences for high school youngsters came about after several meetings of representatives of the Burroughs Corporation and members of the Livonia Division of Instruction and the high school staff at Franklin.

Final plans for the project were outlined at an August meeting at Franklin High School with Dr. Felix Kopstein and Dr. Alvin Ugelow of the Burroughs Auto-Instructional Systems Division; David Amerman, Franklin principal; and Dr. Albert L. Goldberg, Coordinator of Instructional Materials Services, Livonia Public Schools.

Students selected for the program will complete the first unit of a programmed textbook which involves a new computer "language" known

as COBOL—Common Business Oriented Language. COBOL is a language for the use of computers, and it has been accepted as a standard by leading computer manufacturers and governmental agencies.

More than a year's work has gone into the development of the COBOL text, which consists of three units. Burroughs officials feel certain that a student who successfully finishes the material (all three units) is capable of taking his place in the job market as a competent programmer. Franklin students will be given the first unit only.

Said Dr. Kopstein, "We're extremely interested in how high school youngsters feel about this method of learning and also how they react to data processing in general." Principal David Amerman indicated the school's feeling about the project, "The field of data processing is going to demand more people than ever in the next decade. We are anxious to determine what part the school can play in training students for work in this area."
