By re-designing a previous type of collapsible trailer, which was on the market only briefly, Guenther said his firm has come up with one "which we think is much more convenient and liveable."

He explained that the trailer is assembled of steel structural supports for sturdiness and stability. He said much of the remainder of it is of aluminum construction to keep the weight down.

Local contractors have already started work on the construction of the 5,500-square-foot addition to the present E-Z Enterprises plant here. When it is completed, manufacturing of the trailer will be stepped up. "We've got to work up to about 10 trailers a day," Guenther declared.

Plymouth will be the only manufacturing site for the trailers "at least to start," he added.

E-Z Enterprises previously has engaged in the manufacture of drapery hooks and drapery hardware. But increasing entry into the field by other manufacturers has cut the profit margin to a bare minimum and the move to manufacture camping trailers was described as a future effort to diversify, Guenther said.

E-Z Enterprises now employs only about eight workers, but once manufacture of the collapsible trailer gets underway, Guenther expects his number of workers to increase to about 20.

Widely-known for his efforts in local civic and charitable affairs, Guenther is also a partner in a trailer financing firm elsewhere. He said that full-financing services will be made available to purchasers of the trailers.

Guenther also has business interests in Puerto Rico, where he and his associates operate a building industry supply firm.

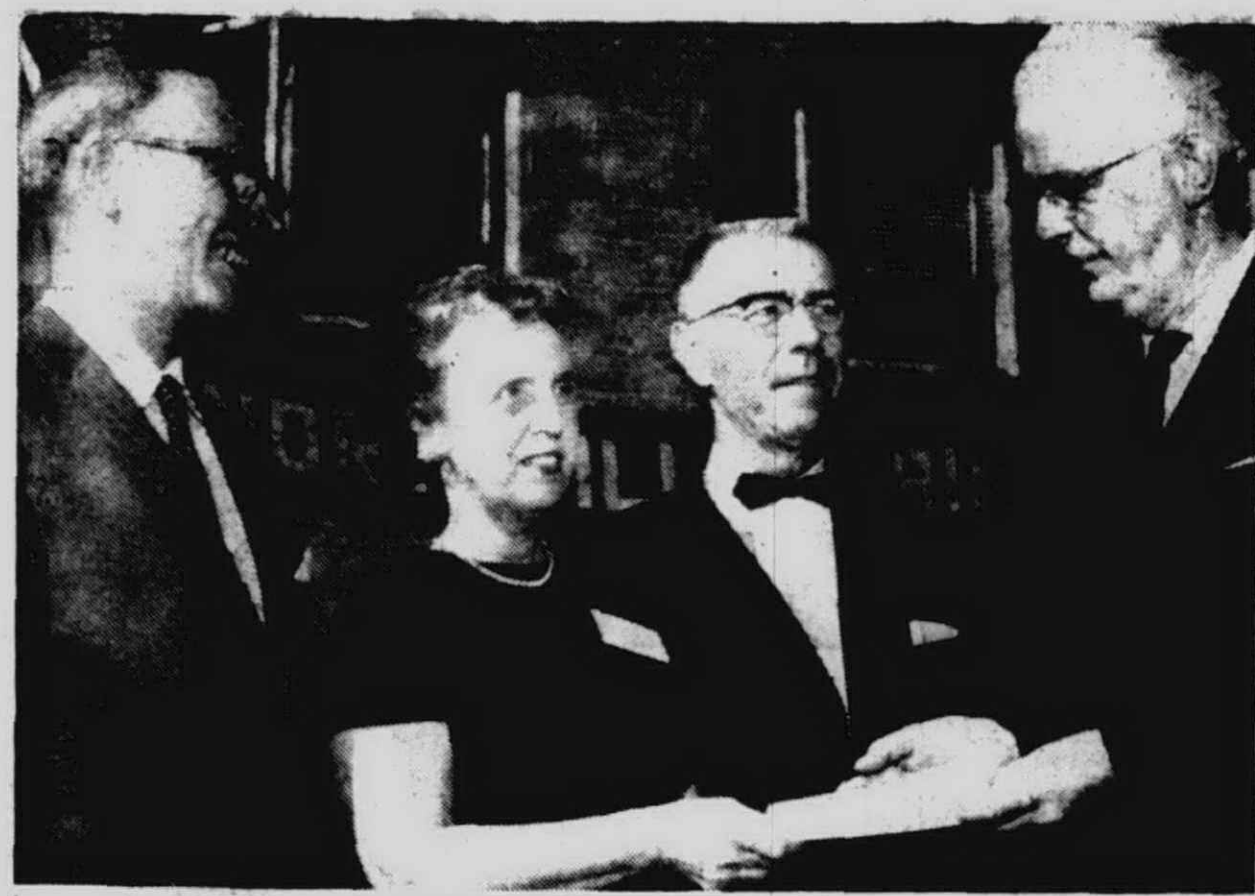

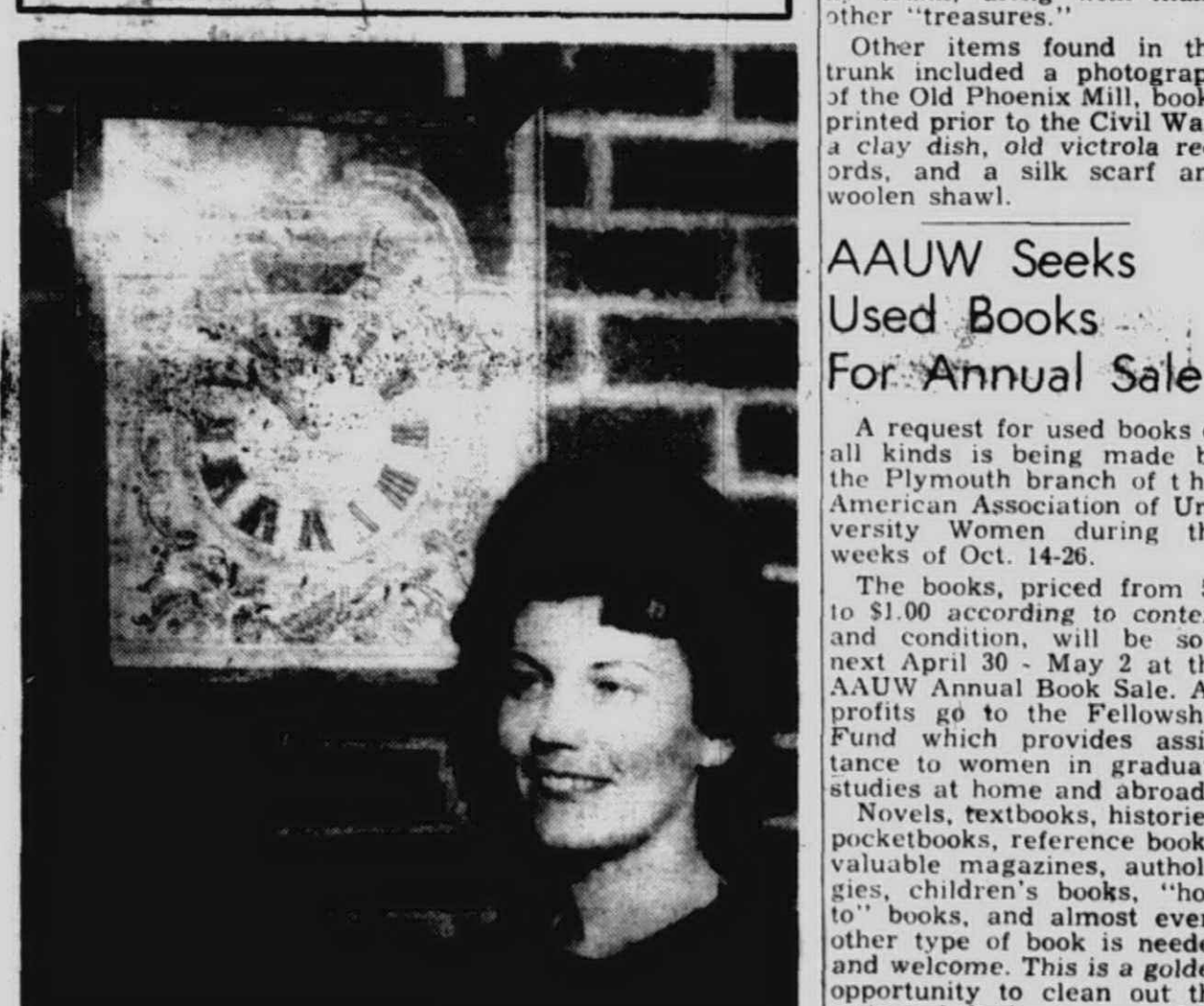

- 1 lb. ground beef
 - 2 cloves garlic (crushed)
 - 8 oz. tomato sauce
 - 2 lb. can of tomatoes
 - 1 1/2 tsp. salt
 - 1/2 tsp. oregano
 - 1/4 tsp. pepper
 - 1/2 lb. lasagne noodles
 - 1/2 lb. Mozzarella cheese
 - 1 lb. cottage cheese
 - 1/2 C. parmesan cheese
 - Brown hamburger, add salad oil, garlic, tomato sauce, tomatoes, salt, oregano and pepper and cover and simmer for 15-20 minutes.
 - Cook lasagne noodles in boiling salted water for 15 minutes, drain and rinse. Then fill casserole dish with alternate layers of noodles, slice Mozzarella cheese, cottage cheese, meat sauce and parmesan cheese, ending with a layer of meat sauce and parmesan cheese. Bake for 15-20 minutes at 375 degrees.

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Two Housewives Battle Air Pollution Problem

A struggle by two local housewives to clear the air in the northeast corner of Plymouth Township seems no nearer a solution today than it was 10 years ago when they first took up the challenge.

Mrs. Fred Davids and Mrs. Michael Small have been arguing for stricter air pollution controls here in hopes of reducing so-called industrial "fall-out."

"All we would like to see is clean air and a livable condition around our neighborhoods," the two women declared.

Mrs. Davids, of 39627 Plymouth Rd., has lived here since 1946. Her home is within a half-mile of the nearest industry, Mrs. Small, 39200 Schoolcraft, is a 10-year resi-

dent and lives about one-quarter mile from the nearest industry.

Both complain that soot and "flyash" from local factories invade their homes, soiling furniture, carpets, walls and fixtures. The two women say the industrial soot is harmful to autos and the outside of houses.

"When it falls," said Mrs. Small, "it falls on every blade of grass and on absolutely everything. It's a nuisance and a health hazard. We have to breathe this air."

Having talked and corresponded with executives of local industries as well as Township officials and people at the Wayne County Health Department, the two women

now are hopeful that a legal opinion may be the answer to the problem.

Sometime ago, Mrs. Davids, husband a captain with the Michigan State Police, appealing. He asked that the prosecutor's office be requested to give an opinion on the applicability of the Township's air pollution ordinance.

"Mrs. Davids said the legal opinion, when it is issued, will determine whether the ordinance applies to the industries in the area.

"If it does," she said, "then I should think they (the industries) would have to comply with the ordinance. Everyone else has to comply with the law."

The ordinance, according to Mrs. Davids, was written in 1957. It places certain restrictions on "air contaminants, particulate matter of dust, odor and gases."

The women have also circulated a petition and gathered 186 signatures of residents in their neighborhoods.

The petition reads: "We, the undersigned, do hereby respectfully petition and urge the governing board of the Township of Plymouth to take the necessary and positive action to bring about the abatement of a serious nuisance in said township."

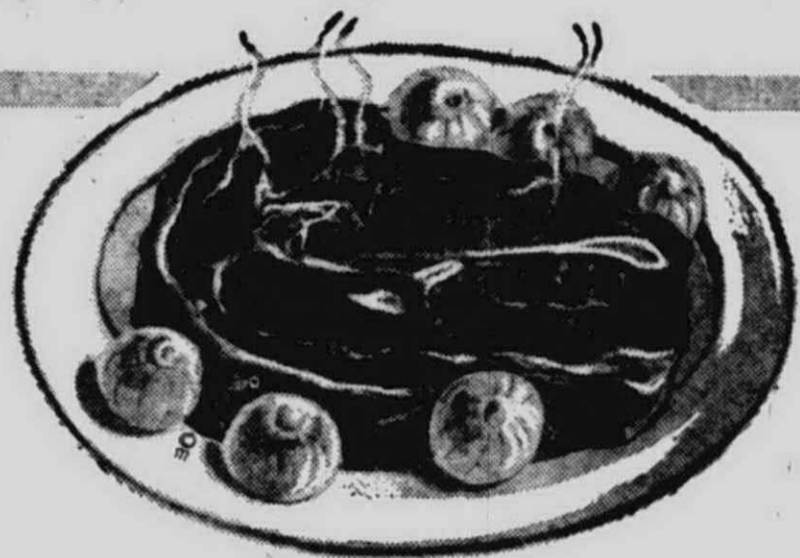

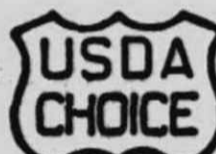

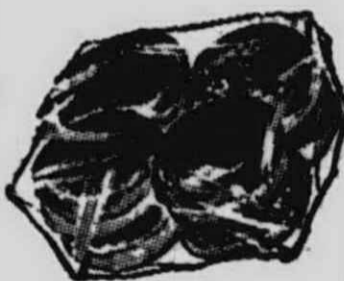
