Fischer said the Board's future building plans include construction of two new elementary school buildings, additions to elementary schools where needed and necessary and additions to the senior high in the next five years.

"We feel that the two junior highs will adequately take care of the seventh, eighth and ninth grades through the fiveyear period without need of expansion. All of this is based on our projected rate of enrollment increase," he indicated.

Fischer said the Board has been studying the situation from all angles for weeks and is fully aware that the present setup will not provide adequately for the expected future growth of the school district.

"The Board is in accord that we need the renewal of the eight mills." he pointed out. "It may well be that we will need more but we on the Board feel that it should come from the state or an increased tax base in the community.

"We need the building and site fund now so that we can continue the program on a timely basis. We must know now how far we can go in the years to come so that we can draw up a building program to take care of the anticipated future needs. We can't afford to have a gap in the program.

"The Board has no plans for any major secondary school expansions at this time nor for the next five years. We feel the junior highs are adequate and additions will take care of the senior high enrollment during the five-year period. We are not thinking in terms of a new high school building and it has never been seriously considered in any of the meetings of the Board of the facilities committee.



It provides relief in exact reverse to the "ability to pay" concept which Governor Romney says tees: is the foundation of his reform program.

(d) A flat 20 percent rebate also provides more help and assistance for a free-spending and/or relatively wealthy school district than it does to one which has been struggling to make ends meet, or to one which has low tax valuation and a small amount of tax dollars "behind each student." (Governor Romney contends that a better "state aid formula" to equalize differences between rich and poor districts is in the works for next year; but it is equally logical to argue that this 20 per cent rebate in itself is an adjustment in "state aid," too, and the whole subject should be opened right now.)

The world seems to be divided into two camps those who absolutely pledge undying loyalty to Judy Garland and those who think she is a big nothing. I am one of the intense loval ones.

True, I will concede occasionally I am worn out when she finishes an interview with someone because it seems an army of ants is marching through her underclothing — but on the other hand — fat she is not. Everyone knows what a challenge it is, how hard, how much conversation has to go into losing even five pounds (if not you - surely you have a wailing friend), Sisterto go from where she was to where she is now must have taken sheer fortitude. The true Judy, to me, is when she stands behind that old trunk of hers (her last two Sunday night shows) and sentimentally reminisces about things she pulls out of it-I like her, the way she looks and the way she belts out a song. Many times I dislike members of my own profession who are so wise, so smart-apple, so greedy for a story-and many many times so darn wrong.

Another gal with bad press I would like to have a chance to interview from a different angle is Madam Nhu. Concede, she appears like the "dragon-lady," maybe she is. But, to me, this high-powered personality makes some sense. If you saw "Meet the Press" the other evening on television you would have a glimmer of what I mean. The real problems of a country transmitted through communication from our "man" abroad to our State Department and then "sold" through the press to usin my opinion-is oft times completely garbled. We are so afraid of "losing face" and being wrong. For so powerful a country we can act awful dumb, going way back to the time right after World War II when we sent complicated machinery to China to work its fields which rusted for lack of know-how; when we should have sent mules and horses to get them started.

Is it not possible Madam Nhu is telling the truth when she says her government is a strong ally of ours against Communism. That they want to be "independent, a democracy, to improve," and are begging for guidance. And the only suggestion to date brought by our "man" is for her and her husband to leave their country because they are "controversial." How stupid.

They are controversial because they are fighting, fighting for a democracy in their country. It would be far easier for Madam Nhu to take all the money and keep still-Isn't it possible she believes if she tells the truth it might be better for her country — and with simple truth get through to us — instead of a lot of diplomatic double-talk.

The responsibility for the self-cremating Buddhists are somehow tied in to her in the American mind—Now, really think about it. No matter how oppressed you might be aren't there just a million ideas you would get to throw off this oppression before you would sit down in the street, pour alcohol over yourself and light a match? Wouldn't YOU think of something else? Isn't this sort the thinking of a fanatical mind? Madam Nhu says they are not oppressed in practicing their religion, but they are more political than religious. In her country, remember, they are fighting for a democracy which gives freedom of religion. From where I sit I think we are putting every stumbling block possible in their way - including telling the champions of the cause to

get out of town. But, as everyone knows, it takes patience and perseverance to accomplish great things, move mountains and break through the veil of ignorance.

On a different plain we would like to pay tribute this week to the patience and perseverance of two Catholic sisters (as well as blood sisters) in our midst.

They are Sister Mary Columbine and Sister Mary Calasantia. It was not an easy road, there were many stumbling blocks in their way, to make the gleam in their eye that was St. Mary Hospital, become a reality. Even now it is bursting at the seams, hardly large enough to render all the service demanded

of it daily.

A further milestone was passed this week when Madonna College "capped" their first graduating class of nurses. If hard toward this end, there should be. They have earned the right to be proud. 





DPW News And Notes In Plymouth

By SUPT. JOSEPH BIDA Plymouth Dept. Public Works Work is continuing on the repair of the sanitary sewer on Blunk Street and is now completed. All of the streets were swept during the week.

Dye testing has been going on to determine if proper connections are made on Forest, Deer, Kellogg and Joy Streets. Grading and discing has been going on at Point Park, at Ann Arbor Trail and Ann Arbor Road. This should soon be ready for seeding. Three 34" and one 1" water taps were installed.

The creek at Burroughs and Harding Street was flushed and disinfected. Grading, prime, and seal coating of the following streets was completed: Harding, north of Burroughs; Evergreen between Sheridan and Penniman; Blunk, north of Junction; Burroughs-Coolidge to Harding; and Goldsmith-Sheldon to Lena.

Due to so many putting out leaves in the street, the Department of Public Works will start picking up at the north end of the city and work south. This procedure will continue until all are picked up.

The Public Works Department started to put the new chemical into the water at the wells. This is called Warren No. 1004 Multi Prep Water Treatment which is supposed to do the following:

1. Cleans the well, well casting and well screen. 2. Cleans the pumping unit.





The addition of the many Spanish references became a bit much after awhile. One half expected to see Jose Greco come pouncing out to do his famous heel stamping dance or a full fledged bull fight develop in the second act. Mr. Baldridge proved in last year's "Merchant of Venice" that many of these added touches could be handled delicately.

Perhaps if the script had been chopped to the bone, the neverceasing rain from Spain on the Trueblood stage-plain might have been more sufferable. It seems a paradox, but in what is called 'the era of the specialist,' today's employer looks not only for a person who can perform a specific job, but seeks the individual who is well rounded and versatile. He knows that, in a very real sense, all of his employes represent his organization every moment of the day and are greatly responsible for his public image.

Here are a few Personnel by Morgan pointers to help you fit this pattern . . . to help you get the job and to progress in it:

1. Be careful of your grooming. Most companies ask that their employes be nest, but not extreme. Dresses worn on Fifth Avenue in New York are not necessarily suitable for work. Men should be careful of extreme cuts

An overpowering, gushing personality is not necessary, but a friendly, willing attitude is. 3. As a representative of your new company you should

at least have a smattering of general knowledge and current events. A few minutes each day with the newspaper, including the editorials and the business page, will do wonders. to do is of prime importance. But more and more employers, when considering an employe for promotions and additional responsibilities, are looking for a person who is not only technically skilled, but skilled in human

Keep this in mind when you apply for a job . . . and when you get the job.
