Plymouth Township has had a population growth of 10 per cent in the three years since the last federal census in 1960 with a total of 9,200 on July 1, 1963 compared to 8,364 on April 1, 1960.

That was the report of the Population and Housing Committee of the Regional Planning Commission in its 10th report on population and occupied dwellings in the fivecounty Detroit region which includes: Wayne, Oakland,


The report shows an increase of 836 persons in the Township in the three-year period during which the number of occupied dwelling units jumped 11.5 per cent from 2,009 to 2,240.

The City of Plymouth had a 7.2 per cent growth in the same period, climbing from 8,766 in 1960 to 9,400 in 1963. The number of


Parents of Plymouth High students are asked to indicate their preference of times with first, second and third choices on a slip given the student to turn over to the teacher.

### **DPW News** And Notes In Plymouth

By Supt. Joseph Bida

Plymouth Dept. Public Works At this date it has cost \$2,120 to collect the leaves over the city and there is much more

Dye tests have been taken at various locations this week to check if proper sanitary sewer connections have been made.

One stop box was replaced and O-1" water tap installed, also a sanitary sewer was extended on Junction Avenue and two taps installed. The picnic tables and all of the benches were taken out of the parks and stored for the winter.

There was a broken 12" water main at Mill Street and Amelia and the necessary repair has been taken care of.

New waste containers were installed on a trial basis. three on Main Street and three on Ann Arbor Trail. These are attached onto the parking meters. It is hoped that the public will cooperate to keep the uptown section of the city more neat.

Continuation of article of last week in regards to information on our water system from the report of 1929 -

Several consumers are supplied by taps on the present supply line. One, a gravel pit situated about one-half of a mile east of the collecting well, apparently makes intermittent use of this supply. An abandoned gravel pit situated about one-half mile west of Moreland Road and one-half mile south of Fishery Road was supplied, but now now longer has a pipe connection.

The water supply for drinking fountains and other uses in Cass Benton Park and Phoenix Park, the requirements for potable water in the two Ford Motor Company plans and the supplies of several other consumers along the Plymouth-Northville Road are also served from this line. This present line was installed in 1921 and is still in operation.

In 1916 the demands of the Village for water had increased to such an amount that the supply line did not deliver water to the Village in adequate pressures. This situation was met by the construction of a booster pumping station on North Mill Street read its intersection with the Plymouth-Northville Road.

This station is a small reinforced concrete and brick structure in which are housed two electric motor-driven Rees-Roturbo horizontal shaft pumping units, each having a rated capacity of 100 gallons per minute against a total suction and discharge head of 100 feet.

These units take their suction from the supply main and deliver directly into the distribution system. Piping is so arranged that they are normally operated as two separate units but may be connected in tandem in order to develop higher pressures for fire serv-

The distribution system of the Village of Plymouth consists of approximately the following lengths of street-main: 18,500 feet of 4-inch pipe, 66,-200 feet of 6-inch pipe, 3,000 feet of 8-inch pipe, 1,600 feet of 10-inch pipe.

In the park near the intersection of Church and Harvey Streets is located an elevated steel tank 28 feet in diameter having a holding capacity of 150,000 gallons. The full level of the tank is about 102 feet above the concrete piers upon which the tower rests. This tank was rebuilt in 1960.

Functional comfortable living is the byword in today's modern house. And a good heating system is a "must" if the home owner is to receive maximum comfort in his home. There the two main points to consider according to the Air Distribution Institute, an association of manufacturers making duct work.

The first is to be sure that the heating system has the necessary capacity to comfortably heat your home even on the coldest winter days.

The other is the proper installation of the duct work or pipes so that each room gets its proper share of distributed heat.

The heating system in your home may prove to be the most important single item for better living. There isn't much glamour in a heating system but don't make the mistake of ignoring it.

Livability requires good heat control during the long winter months and if the house is uncomfortable because of an improper heating system, a costly

remodeling project may result. While the outside of the house may be architecturally perfect, the "insides" are more important and unless the prospective home purchaser is well versed in the mechanical details of the heating system, expert advice should be secured.

Stapling with a staple gun is particularly quick and easy with this type of tile.
