





### Apartments **Rise at Price** Of \$550,000

Formal ground-breaking ceremonies, marking the start of work on a \$550,000 apartment project in Plymouth Township, will be held at 11 a.m. Thursday.

Although some preliminary work has already been done, construction of the Lake Pointe Apartments, along Wilcox Rd. near the entrance to Lake Pointe subdivision. will not get rolling in earnest until later this week.

When the first stage is completed sometime next year, the apartment project will consist of three buildings containing 44 apartments, most of them of two-bedroom design.
