examination for fire-fighter to fill a vacancy on this department's staff was created Dec. 1 when Capt. Paul Albright resigned.

Art Lenaghan, 22, of 9326 Rucker, has been appointed a temporary fire-fighter for 90 days in order to keep the department at full strength.

Worth recommended establishing an eligibility list, filling the fire-fighter vacancy, then holding a "promotional examination" to determine the department's second captain.

(One captain is assigned to the fire station on Ann Arbor Rd. at the township hall and the other is on duty at Fire Hall No. 2 on Schoolcraft Rd. in Lake Pointe Village.)

Worth suggested naming Maas as a 90-day temporary successor to Norman.

"If I assume the added responsibilities of fire chief," Maas told the board, "I feel I would be entitled to the added compensation." He referred to the stipended paid the acting chief.

Lindsay called a 10-minute recess and the Board and Civil Service commissioners met privately in the Supervisor's office.

When the meeting reconvened, Lindsay announced that Maas was the choice as a temporary successor to Norman.

"Remember," Lindsay told Maas, "you're not the acting fire chief, you're acting head of the department."

Under the Civil Service arrangement, there exists some confusion as to whether the Township even can claim a post of "acting fire chief."

Lindsay said that Maas would receive extra compensation for his added duties as "acting head of the department" but exactly how much this additional pay will be was not announced.

It is believed it will amount to a 90-day pro-rated share of the \$2,500 annual stipend that Norman was being paid.

During the 90-day temporary period, it was understood that the Civil Service Commission will follow through on the matter of permanently filling the fire-fighter vacancy and then will see to the selection of a second captain for the department.

The Civil Service Commission will also work with the three-member committee — of Norman, Lauterbach and Garber — to come up with nominations whereby Lindsay may then fill the position of "acting fire chief."

to build a new church and parsonage on the Canton Township side of Joy Rd.

National Concrete Products had earlier asked to become a water customer of the Township. It presently gets its water from the City, but has complained of the rust content of City water.

In order for the firm to tap in to the Township's supply, the Township must construct a half-mile water line from Ann Arbor Rd. north along Mill St.

Board members had acknowledged the need for such a line to serve the area along Mill St. adjacent to the C and O railroad, but they had agreed to wait until the necessary funds were available.

The project will cost approximately \$20,000, Engineer H. J. ... will be stated.

The Board awarded a contract for the purchase of a half-ton pick-up truck from West Bros., Inc. for \$1,788. It was the low bid among four submitted.

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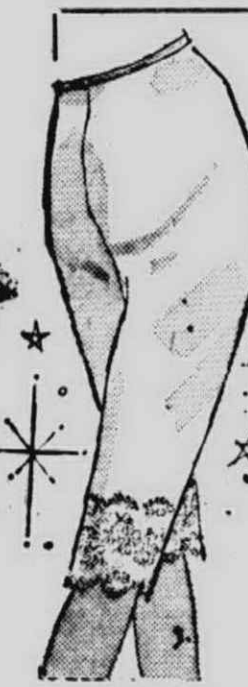


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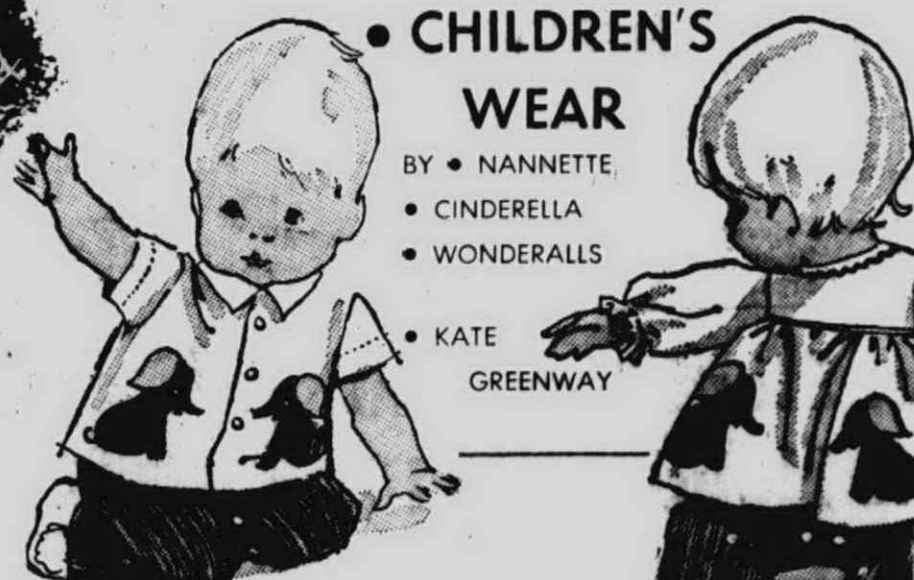

Madonna Fund Raising Dinner Reaps \$1,000

Close to \$1,000 was raised at a special Madonna building fund-raising dinner held at Thunderbird Inn last Monday evening.

Proceeds will be used to help finance the current building expansion now going on at Madonna College, including a dormitory to house 50 students, a cafeteria which will accommodate 450 persons; a faculty residence to house 50 instructors and a male faculty residence for 6 instructors, all of which are expected to be completed by the end of January.

Detroit William Bannon of the Detroit House of Correction last Tuesday's meeting. Bannon said that discipline taught in the home by his parents was the most important factor in combating juvenile delinquency. Our young people will not recognize law and order in the street if they have not had proper training in the home. He said that the foundation of America is with our children of today and it is the family's responsibility to make that foundation a sound one.

Bannon, who was the warden at Southern Michigan Prison in Jackson for 11 years prior to coming to DeHoCo this spring, said he felt that participation in church activities and organizations like the Boy and Girl Scout programs were very important. He pointed out that of the nearly 6,300 inmates at Jackson when he left, only two had been Boy Scouts.

The Garden Club of Plymouth was cited by Bannon for donating time to teach the women inmates at DeHoCo how to care for a garden and to do flower arranging. He said this giving of time was much more beneficial than just the donation of money.

The last two meetings of this year will be held Monday, Dec. 23, and Monday, Dec. 30, rather than on Tuesday nights. The Plymouth High Key Club will meet Dec. 23 to distribute toys and other items they have collected for the donation to the Plymouth State Home and Training School.

Chips from the ROCK

It was just ten years ago this week that the following appeared in this column. Because it is certainly timely now because we have so many fine new young families in our community I felt they might be interested in the Christmas story which follows.

At any rate I am sure that thirty years later some of my wife's kindergarten students, now living in Plymouth, near, might remember hearing the story because she said was a Christmas must in all of her kindergarten classes.

"Holiday tradition and the various things people in celebration of these events is a most interesting study. Our particular household has had its Christmas leaning from top to bottom and all is in readiness for the annual visit from old St. Nick. Querying my wife of the extensiveness of her cleaning brought forth the comment that along with the joys and headaches of a holiday her mind was constantly filled with a Christmas story she learned in college. She informed me that all of the years she taught school she had

passed it on to hundreds of children and has told it in our home many times during the last 20 years to our children.

Because it is a different kind of a Christmas story and because it has so much influence in our particular home we thought you might like to tell it to your children one of the nights before Christmas as they gather around the Christmas tree before going to bed. Written by Sara Cone Bryant, the story is named "The Golden Cobwebs."

"This is about something wonderful that happened to a Christmas tree ever and ever so long ago, when it was once upon a time."

"It was before Christmas, and the tree was all trimmed with popcorn and silver nuts and (name the trimming of the tree before you), and stood safely out of sight in a room where the doors were locked, so that the children should not see it before it was time. But ever so many other little house-people had seen it. The big black pussy sat it with her great green eyes; the little gray kitty saw it with her little blue eyes; the kind house-dog saw it with his steady brown eyes; the yellow canary saw it with his wise, bright eyes. Even the wee, wee mice that were so afraid of the cat had peeked one peek when no one was by."

"But there was some one who hadn't seen the Christmas tree. It was the little gray spider!"

"You see, the spiders lived in the corners, — the warm corners of the sunny attic and the dark corners of the nice cellar. And they were expecting to see the Christmas tree as much as anybody. But just before Christmas a great cleaning-up began in the house. The house-mother came sweeping and dusting and wiping and scrubbing, to make everything grand and clean for the Christ-child's birthday. Her broom went into all the corners, poke, poke, — and of course the spiders had to run. Dear, dear, how the spiders had to run! Not one could stay in the house while the Christmas cleanness lasted. So, you see, they couldn't see the Christmas tree."

"Spiders like to know all about everything, and see all there is to see, and they were very sad. So at last they went to the Christ-child and told Him all about it."

All the others see the Christmas tree, dear Christ-

child," they said, "but we who are so domestic and so fond of beautiful things, we are cleaned up! We cannot see it, at all."

"The Christ-child was sorry for the little spiders when He heard this, and He said they should see the Christmas tree."

"The day before Christmas, when nobody was noticing, He let them all go in, to look as long as ever they liked."

"They came creepy, creepy, down the attic stairs, creepy, creepy, up the cellar stairs, creepy, creepy, along the halls, — and into the beautiful room. The fat mother spiders and the old papa spiders were there, and all the little teeny, tonty, curly spiders, the baby ones. And then they looked! Round and round the tree they crawled, and looked and looked and looked. Oh, what a good time they had! They thought it was perfectly beautiful. And when they had looked at everything they could see from the floor, they started up the tree to see more. All over the tree they ran, creepy, crawling, looking at every single thing. Up and down, in and out, over every branch and twig, the little spiders ran, and saw every one of the pretty things right up close."

"They stayed till they had seen all there was to see, you may be sure, and then they went away at last, quite happy."

"Then, in the still, dark night before Christmas day, the dear Christ-child came, to bless the tree for the children. But when He looked at it — what do you suppose? — It was covered with cobwebs! Everywhere the little spiders had been they had left a spider-web; and you know they had been just everywhere. So the tree was covered from its trunk to its tip with spider-webs, all hanging from the branches and looped around the twigs; it was a strange sight."

"What could the Christ-child do? He knew that house-mothers do not like cobwebs; it would never, never do to have a Christmas tree covered with those. No, indeed."

"So the dear Christ-child touched the spiders' webs, and turned them all to gold! Wasn't that a lovely trimming? They shone and shone, all over the beautiful tree. And that is the way the Christmas tree came to have golden cobwebs on it."

Remus Letter To City Leaves Commission Cold

A letter from Gerald Remus, general manager of Detroit's water board, to City Manager Albert Glassford made a small splash at Monday night's regular Commission meeting here.

It told, in part, that a meeting originally scheduled for Dec. 9 with Plymouth and Northville officials had been cancelled, as City Commissioners had already known.

The letter said further: "We doubt if any progress is made in meetings of that type any way."

Commissioners debated the next move in attempting to solve the water situation as it now exists.

They continue to feel that the City has need for a water reservoir. Insiders also suspect the Commissioners have been reasonably more favorable in recent months to the prospects of subscribing to Detroit water service here eventually.

The contract required by Detroit of all its water customers is at present still a stumbling block. It contains several aspects that City of Plymouth seeks to negotiate.

Among the questionable facets of the contract — in the eyes of Commissioners here — is one pertaining to water storage. The Commission wishes to know if the construction of community storage facilities affects the rate charged the community.

While Remus, in his letter to Glassford, did not seem interested in meeting with Plymouth officials, he did state that "There are several paragraphs in our contracts that are negotiable."

City Commissioners Monday night did not appear over-

ly heartened by that sentence in Remus' letter.

At any rate, the three-member water study group set up earlier by the Commission agreed to meet with City Attorney Edward Draugelis to draft a statement as to objectionable parts of the contract offered by Detroit.

It appeared that the resulting statement of objection might be directed to the water board itself and not to Remus.

Further discussion of the on-again-off-again water predicament here is expected to be put aside until sometime after the New Year.

In other matters Monday evening, the Commissioners passed the first reading of a zoning ordinance amendment which will ultimately enable greater industrial expansion on small lots in the City.

The Commission adopted a band shell policy at the recommendation of Manager Glassford. The Commissioners set 8 p.m., Jan. 6, for a hearing on a proposed rezoning of certain lots along Plymouth Rd. They also took under advisement a proposal by Attorney Draugelis to reimburse policemen who appear in court on their off-duty hours.

My sister, Miss Rachel Reiman of 160 W. Ann Arbor Trail, Plymouth, Michigan, was born, and has lived at this address all of her life. She is now passed 70 years of age and alone.

A few months ago the City of Plymouth, Michigan, took her home and income property in an Urban Renewal project. The price they paid was very unfair considering what they took away from her. This was estate property, left by our father Fred A. Reiman who was a resident of Plymouth, Michigan, for 50 years before his death 20 years ago.

My sister has never been able to work and my father left her the home and income property so she would be taken care of as long as she lived. She has kept up her home and paid her expenses

on the income she had. Now her home and her income has been taken away from her and this has created a real hardship for her. The money paid by the City of Plymouth is tied up in Probate Court because it is estate property. In the meantime, what is she to live on and where is she to find a place to live with no money to do anything with?

The City of Plymouth and Urban Renewal promised to assist in relocating and to help people affected by this project but nothing has been done in this case. They, in the City Hall of Plymouth, Michigan, know they can not replace what they have taken away from Rachel Reiman, for the price they paid for this home and business property, which was her sole support.

What is this life long, senior citizen of Plymouth, Michigan to do for a home, income, and security, and why hasn't some one from the City of Plymouth, Michigan, been to see Rachel Reiman and tried

to help to replace and create an income for her, after all, that is what the City of Plymouth has taken away. There must be some one, some place who can help her.

I myself am a widow of many years and I help what I can. I am unable to work full time and my income is limited.

If, in any way, this can be brought out in your paper so the general public will know what a hardship has been caused in this case, I would appreciate it.

2-Inch Snow Brings City Bill of \$1,530

The first round of a four-month battle between the City's DPW workers and O'Neil Winter ended in something of a deadlock after two inches of snow fell early last Wednesday evening.

The snow came down unimpeded, but once it had arrived DPW crews shoveled it to one side and spread sufficient salt to erase any danger that otherwise might have remained.

Whether the DPW men would honestly consider the initial struggle as one that resulted in a deadlock is a horse of another color, however.

In fact, they spread more than 130 tons of salt to lend safety to City streets and had to wage an all-night battle to achieve even that end.

Joe Bida, DPW superintendent, reported that his workers started Wednesday night at 10:30 p.m. and remained on the job until 8 a.m. the next day just battling the elements.

He said that by 6 a.m. Thursday all the main streets were cleared.

Cost of battling the first heavy snowfall of the season was \$1,530, Bida said. His 1963-64 snow removal and salt budget is \$9,500. He presently has a 400-ton stockpile of salt in anticipation of the next heavy snowfall.

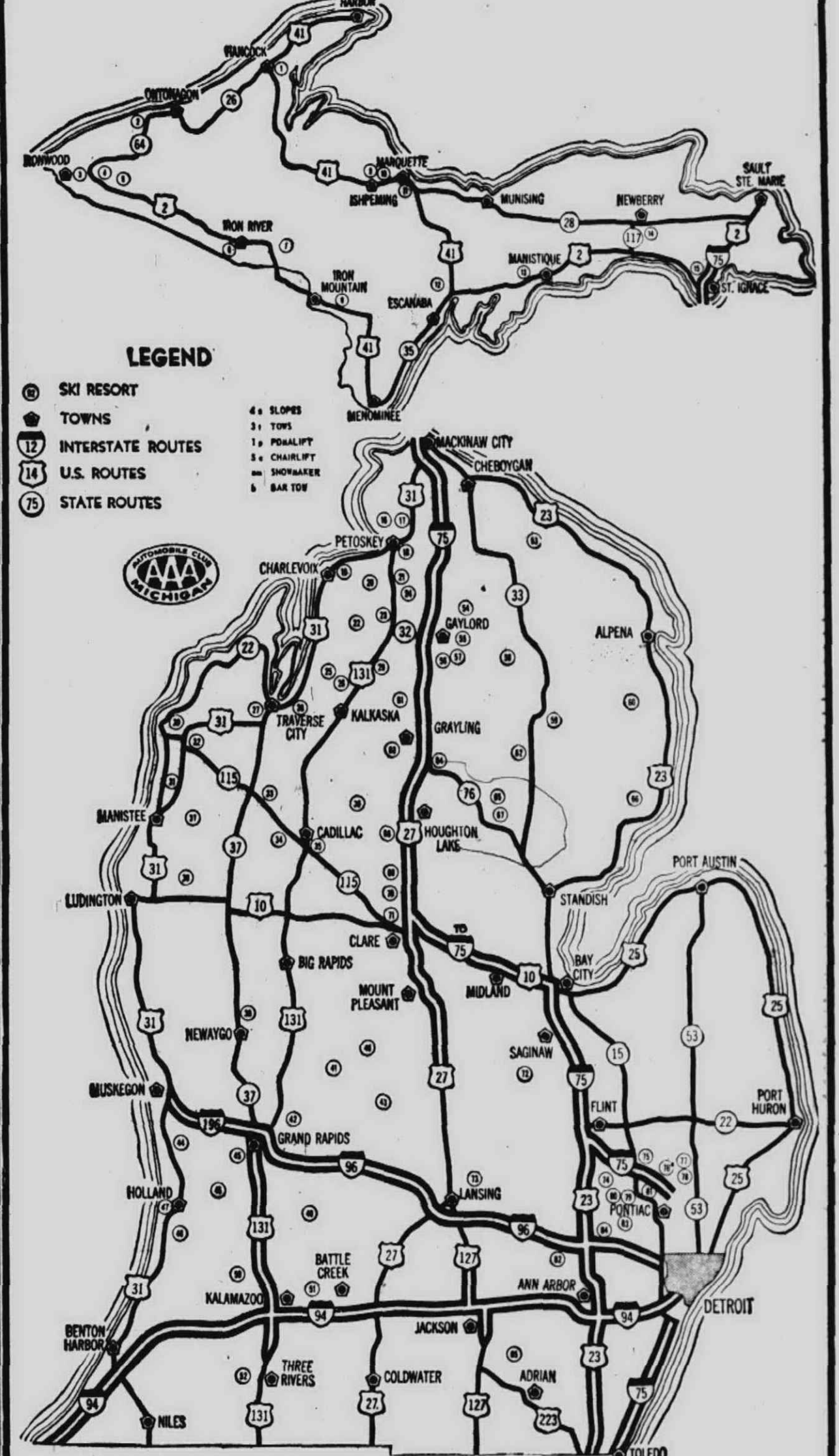
