City manager Albert Glasford said the December 19 letter was apparently written in protest against Christmas decorations at the playing of carols in the park. Last Friday Glasford commented: "We'll accommodate him and take him down."

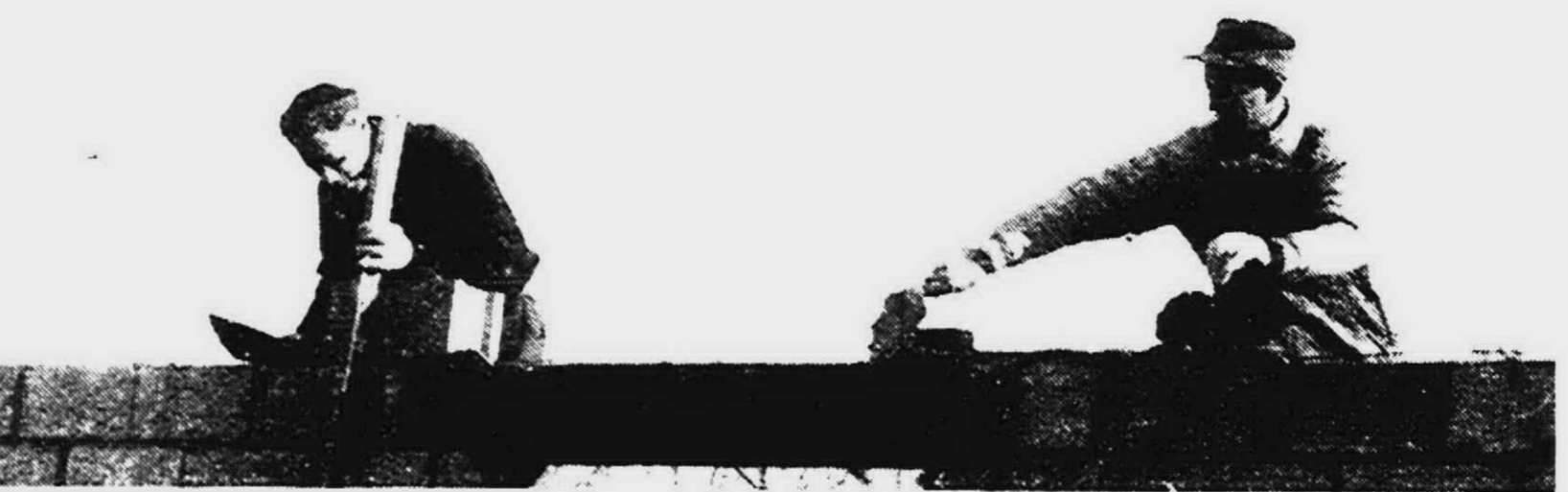
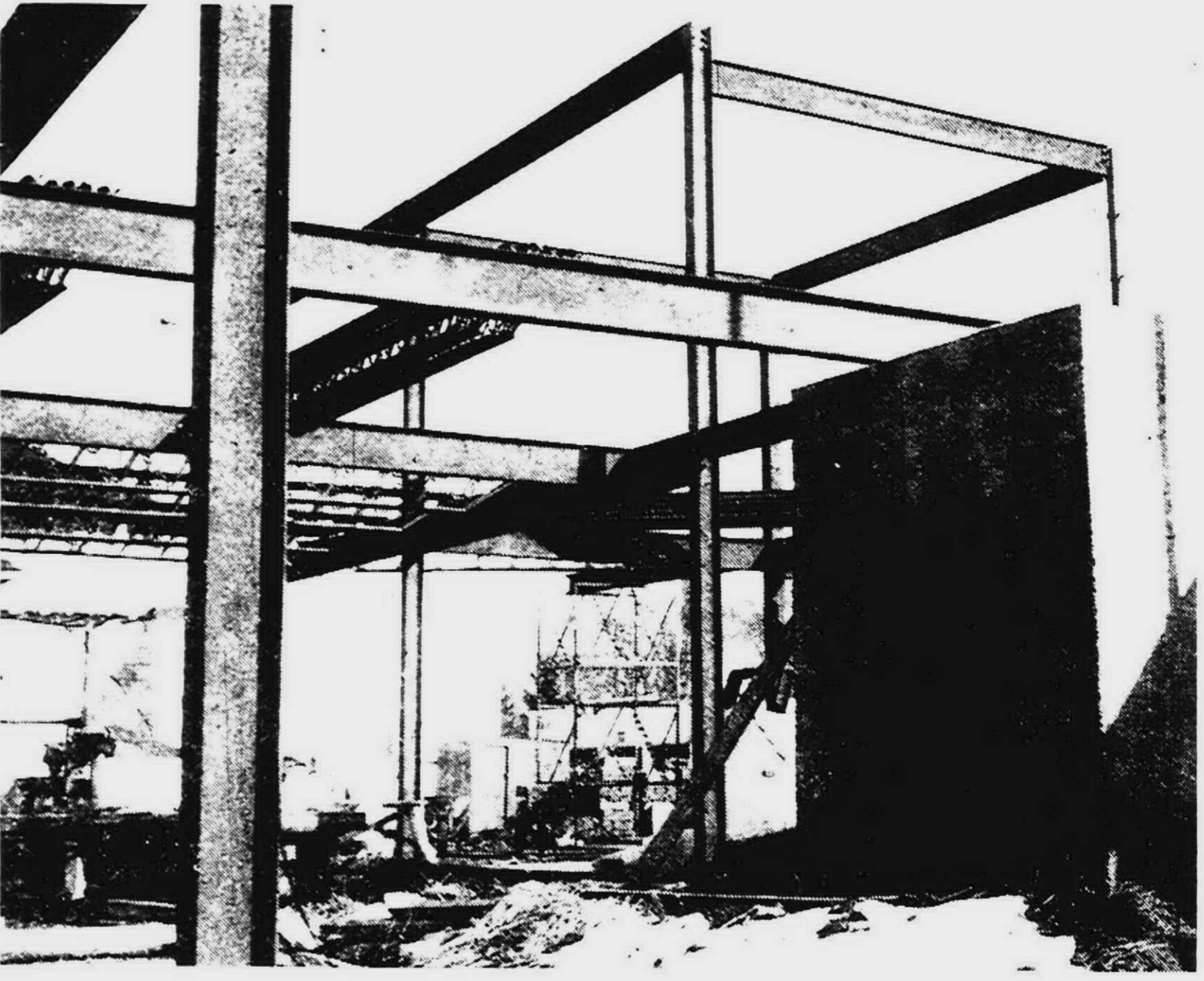

## Commissioners Table Rezoning And O.K. Accounting Machine

PLYMOUTH REALTOR Leon Merriman and Kenneth Way of Plymouth both objected to the proposed rezoning of a property on Plymouth Street. Both men objected to inconsistencies under the municipal zoning ordinance. Merriman said, "I don't believe the planners looked at some of the lots. I say that unless they have specific plans for certain buildings, I don't believe it is the duty of the commission to devalue property." Another man supported Merriman's and Way's objections. A representative from Johnson and Anderson Inc., consulting engineers, recommended stress on concrete construction of a new two or three million gallon reservoir is sited at the proposed location on Beck Road. He said, while concrete represents a 20 per cent increase in cost over steel construction, it provides a maintenance free end product. The commission ordered city manager Albert Glasford to call further meetings of the water commission and water boards to discuss the proposals.

**Film Shows You How "Teleregister" Gives Stock Market Service**

Something unique in movies takes place in Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer's new comedy, "The Wheeler Dealers," when for the first time film audiences will be able to see the newest electronic device, an "instant" stock market service.

This latest development in automation, rather than palpitation, gets star billing along with Lee Remick and James Garner for important sequences of the Martin Ranshoff production.

Called "Teleregister," it is the only board of its kind in operation. MGM arranged to have it shipped directly from the corporation's headquarters in Stamford, Connecticut, to the studio sound stage. The Teleregister stands 15 feet high and is 36 feet long. It has 29 panels, each weighing 300 pounds. It totals five tons of electronic equipment, with 3 million indicators and 35,000 miles of circuit wiring. And it shows 300 stocks.

In addition to the giant Teleregister are the Teletele stocks and answer approximately 125,000 stock inquiries a day. By dialing a four digit number, the user has the latest market quote flashed visually to his desk on a miniature TV screen within three to four seconds.

There are 685 Teleregister boards located from coast-to-coast, with approximately 115 Teleteles installed in broker's offices in 100 American cities. The enormously expensive Teleregister boards take from three to four weeks to install, but at MGM a set crew managed it in the record time of four days.

During use of both Teleregister and Teletele in "The Wheeler Dealers," quotations from the New York Stock Exchange were registered simultaneously on the board in the studio. This was accomplished by special permission of the New York Stock Exchange, although the right to photograph on the actual floor of the Stock Exchange was denied.

Perhaps the reason can be traced to the film's good-natured spoof of Wall Street, although "The Wheeler Dealers" concerns itself primarily with the affairs of the ticker between a well-oiled Texan (James Garner) and a well-designed stock broker (Lee Remick) and their desire to merge.

But Hollywood did everything to insure the dignity of "The Market." The Teleregister was installed on wall-to-wall carpeting!
