## Agency Starts Operations In February

# Plymouth Acquires Worker For Family Service



ANNA JUNG Accepts Plymouth Post

After a delay of more than six months, during which Plymouth Community Fund and Ann Arbor Family Service Agency officials searched for a capable director, the Plymouth Family Service agency will open for business on Monday, Feb. 3.

That was the announcement of Mrs. Dolly Brenner, executive director of the Ann Arbor agency, as she named Miss

Anna Jung, of Southfield, as the director of the Plymouth office.

Mrs. Brenner along with Mrs. Ethel North and Rev. David Davies, members of the Com-

munity Fund Board of Directors, have been seeking a case-worker since mid-summer.

Originally, the Community Fund set a target date of Sept. 1 for the opening but

the committee wasn't able to find a worker suitable for the Plymouth operation until a month ago when Miss Jung made application.

At the moment she is a dis-

trict director of Family Service for Metropolitan Detroit where she has demonstrated unusual skill as a caseworker and a supervisor.

A native of Dickinson, N.D.,

where she was the daughter of parents of German descent, Miss Jung received her early education at the small town there and then completed her high school work in Detroit.

She is a graduate of Wayne State University and also received a master's degree from WSU in Social Work.

It was her particular interest in the needs of a smaller community that influenced her in applying for the Plymouth position where she will have a maximum opportunity to contribute to the development of a sound family service program.

Miss Jung will be in charge of the Plymouth office under the supervision of Mrs. Brenner and the Ann Arbor agency. Under this arrangement, she will have the advantage of psychiatric consultation in Ann Arbor.

The Family Service agency was set up by the Community Fund during the summer following a lengthy report by Mrs. Meta Eckstein, of the University of Michigan, who made a strong recommendation for such a service. Her report pointed to the need of Family Service consultation, giving figures to back the recommendation.

After a study of the Eckstein report, the PFC Board set a budget of \$17,000 for the agency in 1963-4. It provides for an office in the Veterans Memorial Building, 775 N. Main, with a caseworker—Miss Jung—and an office secretary to be hired in the near future.

Miss Jung has had several years experience in social work. She was employed by the Wayne County Bureau of Social Aid before going to the Family Service of Metropolitan Detroit in 1954.

Other experience includes intake caseworker for Girls Training School and assistant director and caseworker for the North Dakota State Psychiatric Clinic.

The last named post was in Dickinson, N.D., when she returned to her hometown to aid in setting up a family service agency. However, she received a call back to Detroit and returned to the Motor City to take up duties as a district director in Metropolitan Detroit.

Mrs. Brenner hailed the selection of Miss Jung as the Plymouth caseworker and office director.

"We feel very fortunate in obtaining Miss Jung, who can be expected to bring to the Plymouth Community a high degree of professional competence in helping troubled people resolve their family relationship problems," she said.

Contacted at her home in Southfield, Miss Jung was elated over the chance to take charge of a smalltown office.

"This is a challenge to me," she stated. "I came from a small town in North Dakota and have always wanted to work at that level. From what study I have been able to make, Plymouth needs a service of this type and I hope that, with the assistance of the Ann Arbor Family Service, we will be able to ease many of the family problems."

### Grace Kuans to Sing In Recital at Albion

Grace Kuans, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Kuans, 1416 Hartsough, Plymouth, will participate in a recital in Goodrich Chapel on the Albion College campus Friday, Jan. 10 at 8 p.m. The program is open to the public.

Miss Kuans, a soprano, is a junior and is majoring in music education.

## 6 Students Make Study Of Plymouth

Does a typical suburban city in the United States differ from the same size city in their native land?

Answers to questions arising from the query were sought by six graduate students from the University of Michigan who visited, toured and studied Plymouth on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday.

The sextet, representing Europe, the Far East and the Far West, were continuing a program started by the University's International Center a year ago. A similar group studied the City of Oak Park in the pilot program.

Arrangements were made for the Plymouth visit by Mrs. Janice Miller, administrative assistant at the Institute, with William Raisch, social studies teacher at Plymouth High.

The six students included: Shigeo Kashimo, of Japan, a newspaper reporter taking graduate work in the English Language Institute; Toshiaki Taga, Japan, graduate student in Economics; Kuo-Chang Wang, China, graduate student in Public Administration; N. M. Eschwar, India, graduate in Industrial Engineering; Nit Sammapan, Thailand, graduate in Nuclear Science; and Karl Macho, Austria, a visiting professor in German.

The group met the high school faculty and visited classes Monday morning and early afternoon; met the City development heads in the late afternoon and attended the Commission meeting at night.

Tuesday was devoted to tours and visits of classes at the Junior High East and Bird School in the morning, lunch at Burroughs.

## Council Oks Purchase Of \$8,500 Machine

Opening the New Year with a session that went more than three hours and was marked by a heated exchange between the City Attorney, Commission and brothers and sisters of Rachel Reiman, Plymouth's Council approved purchase of an \$8,500 accounting machine.

Discussed plans for a two-million gallon reservoir and passed a new no-through truck ordinance.

Once the Commission disposed of the Reiman matter, the meeting progressed rapidly—but more than an hour was devoted to listening to the Reimans and an explanation of the situation by City Attorney Edward Draugelis, Urban Renewal Director and City Manager Albert Glassford and various members of the Commission.

The problem revolves around the purchase of the Rachel Reiman properties on Ann Arbor Trail for the Urban Renewal project. The City went through condemnation proceedings to secure the property more than eight months ago but haven't been able to take possession.

The Reimans insist that the City find a home for their sister that will provide an income and living quarters—such as she now has.

The City insists that under the URA regulations, it is required only to assist in the search for such a dwelling. Draugelis and Mayor Richard Wernette told the family that several homes had been suggested but all rejected by the family.

"Under the URA provisions, we have only to assist," said Draugelis. "We have tried but none of the homes has been acceptable to the family. I feel that we have fulfilled our obligations."

However, on recommendation of Draugelis, the Commission voted to give the Reimans until March 1 to vacate the premises.

The trustee for Miss Re-

man will be required to make a report to the Commission at the end of each 15-day period as to progress. Meanwhile, the Commission and URA officials will assist in every way possible.

After considerable discussion,

the Commission, on a resolution offered by Commissioner George Lawton, approved purchase of an \$8,500 accounting machine from Burroughs as the first step in revising the accounting system.

## FACTS and OPINIONS

Many schools in nearby areas recently have been stepping up their individual efforts to enforce non-smoking rules. The idea is commended here, and urged to our local high schools for considerations.

Hardly anyone realizes that there is a state law prohibiting smoking until age 21, and also restricting the sale of tobacco to minors. It's a law that has been declared "unenforceable" however, and hardly anybody tries to enforce it. As a result there are such statistics as 41 percent of the junior classes in the metropolitan area now using cigarettes; smoking habits traced in many instances back to the fifth grade; and so on.

The schools concerned are working on the theory that they must take the matter into their own hands. Violators generally are suspended from school for short periods of time—three days for offense No. 1; five to seven days for the second offense, etc.

The cancer menace causes the new interest in enforcement of course.

At the same time, Facts and Opinions has come upon a survey done in the State of Washington which shows a "direct relationship between a student's smoking habits and his school work and activity."

Those who smoke earn lower grades, participate in few extra-curricular activities, and more often fail to finish high school than do non-smoking students of comparable capacity.

The researcher refused to speculate on whether smoking caused inferior performance, or whether the same character traits led to both smoking and sluggish scholarship.

It may be recalled that earlier studies show a direct relationship between a teen-ager's possession of a car and his grades. On a national scale, it appears that when a youngster gets a car, his marks drop one grade, on an average.

We regard it as the responsibility of society, educators and parents to restrict use of tobacco and cars by teen-agers to an absolute minimum. After reaching a mature age — and we'd pick age 18 — then the youngster is free to make-or-break on his own judgment.

When Detroit failed to land the Olympics there were several broken hearts hereabouts and an attempt at examination to see "what went wrong."

Our belief long has been that hardly anybody in the world is eager to do the United States in general any favors, let alone worry about Detroit specifically. This results from our national lack of ethics, our smugness with material prosperity, our hypocrisy on such matters as racial freedom and personal honesty.

## Wayne Stapleton Dies In New Years Crash

Services for Wayne Stapleton, 20, 1420 Junction, Plymouth, who was killed in an auto accident at the intersection of Joy and Sheldon Roads early New Year's morning, were conducted Saturday in the Church of Christ with burial in Riverside Cemetery.

Stapleton and Donna Van Tubergen, 30, of Garden City,

were instantly killed and four others injured when Ronald J. Murphy, of Garden City, ignored a stop sign at the intersection according to sheriff's deputies. His car was struck broadside by Stapleton.

Stapleton and Miss Van Tubergen were riding in separate cars.

Murphy and his wife Margaret; Stapleton's wife Dolores, 21; and Lawrence Cowger, 20, 47097 Joy, Plymouth, and his wife, Carol, 19, were injured and taken to Wayne County General Hospital.

Wayne County Road Patrol deputies said Murphy would be charged with failing to stop for a traffic sign.

Stapleton was born Feb. 21, 1941 in Terre Haute, Ind., a son of Roy and Kathryn Ruth Shores Stapleton. He moved to Plymouth in 1950 and was employed at the Ford Motor Co.

Surviving are: his wife, Carol; a son, Wayne, Jr.; a sister, Mrs. Beverly Jean Thompson, Plymouth; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Roy Wayne Stapleton of Plymouth; and his grandmother, Mrs. Lillie Shores of Terre Haute.

The body lay in state at the Schrader Funeral Home until the time of the services at the church.

## DPW To Start Tree Pickup In City Thursday

Plymouth's Department of Public Works will pickup Christmas trees on Thursday and Friday according to an announcement by Supt. Joseph Bida.

Men and trucks will cover every street within the city limits starting at 8 a.m. each day. Bida urges all householders to have the trees at the street curbs by Wednesday night so that workers will be able to make the pickups as rapidly as possible.

## 946 Voters Face Friday Deadline-Loss Of Ballot

Don't lose your vote!

That was the warning of City Clerk Richard Shafer and Township Clerk John McEwen to 946 voters who will lose that right unless cards by office closing time

Shafer reported receipt of 73 cards in the past week for a total of 260 of the 722 mailed out on Dec. 10. That is slightly more than 36 per cent back in the folds. He indicated the City has registered 20 new voters since the first of the year.

McEwen's figures show receipt of 292 cards from the total of 774 with 56 returns in the past week. Like the City, the Township total is slightly more than 36 per cent of the total.

McEwen has recorded 10 new registrations since last Thursday.

The suspension notices are a result of a state law passed last spring making a two-year voting eligibility period uniform throughout the state. The notices contain a card to be returned within 30 days of the mailing so that the recipients may reregister.

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# Begin Series Of Entrance Exams For Schoolcraft College

Another first and another milestone in the history of students took counseling tests that determine qualifications for admission to the college when it opens its doors next August on

the new campus at the intersection of Haggerty and Seven Mile Roads in Livonia. A total of 766 applications have been received to date including 393 from Livonia and

Clarenceville, 160 from Garden City, 103 from Plymouth and 41 from Northville. The counseling tests were started the first week in January in order to enable college

officials to test all current applications between now and the end of February. Dates for other tests are: Saturday, Jan. 11, Franklin High in Livonia; Saturday,

Jan. 25, Clarenceville Senior High; Saturday, Feb. 15, Garden City Senior High; and Saturday, Feb. 29, Plymouth High. The tests are given to high

school seniors and those who have been out of school for some length of time. In Saturday's initial examination, the 114 taking the tests ranged in age from 16 to 51.

The results will be given to the student and his college counselor to assist in determining the selection of courses. Area residents wishing to attend Schoolcraft but not pre-

sently enrolled in high school may not have secured full information concerning applications and the required testing program. Those wishing to attend are reminded that admission to the tests is by a Testing Admission Card which may be secured only after application for admission has been filed. Application blanks may be secured through the College Registrar.

The Registrar is available at GA 7-6620 and the college office is located at 9901 Newburgh Road, Livonia. College President Dr. Eric Bradner urges all interested to make applications at once. He pointed out that the College has a wide variety of programs both technical and academic. Residents of all ages may enroll as part-time or full-time students, taking one or more courses.

"It is possible," said Dr. Bradner, "for a young person to work part-time and finance his own education. Identical courses will be available in both day and evening." To date applications show students interested in many career areas including: 48 in technology; 32, technical engineering; 27, practical nursing; and 145 in secretarial and allied fields.

Those planning to transfer to senior colleges have indicated interest in a variety of curricula, including: 128, teaching; 19, police administration and hotel management; 41, medical fields; 104, liberal arts; six, home economics; 46, engineering; and 47, business administration.

Dr. Bradner, who has supervision over the hiring of a faculty, indicated he has offered contracts to 21 with 17 signed and four still outstanding. The College will have a total of 45 instructors covering 20 fields when classes start on the new campus.

Of those under contract, seven are from the junior college level; five from universities; and nine from high schools and industry.

The Department of Public Works was busy last week flooding skating ponds. Gerald Wells, 1300 Palmer, Plymouth, is among the Detroit Edison employees who will be honored by the company in January for 40 years of continuous service.

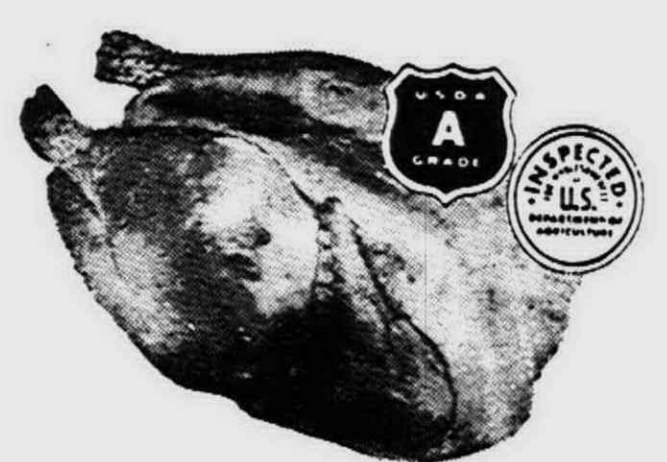
Wells, of the traffic and services division of Edison's purchasing department, joined the company in January 1924. He is a member of the Motor City Traffic Club.

Following is a portion of a letter recently come upon and unpublished elsewhere, so far as I know. It was written by Avery Brundage, member of the Olympic committee representing the U. S.

"Despite rumors you may have heard," wrote the American representative. "I myself voted for Detroit and considering the lack of confidence internationally in the United States, due to our peculiar foreign policies for the last 30 years, I think you did well and I am sure no other United States city would have fared better."

Further testimony that Governor Romney is far from ready to wash his hands of his elected office, and of politics, is contained in this year-end report from the Governor:

"I would like to make a few personal observations about the past year.

"Being governor has been a priceless experience. I enjoy it. I have found many satisfactions, as well as many drawbacks.

"During my life, I have worked hard and long at various times. But as governor, I have worked harder and longer without a break than ever before.

"The experience has provided me with a greater appreciation of public officials of both parties and the jobs they do, the responsibilities they carry. By the same token, it has sharpened my insight into the potential for good that accompanies public office, and has forced the regrettable recognition that in too many cases that potential is not realized as fully as it should be.

"The past year has served to re-emphasize my basic beliefs in several things:

"The need for two strong responsible political parties.

"The need for less narrow, blind partisanship that ignores merit in favor of personal party gain.

"The fact that the ultimate responsibilities of government rest on individuals, and the accompanying need for informed, concerned citizens.

"The essential need for public interest government, and the development of political parties based on informed active citizenship to assure public interest government.

"During the past year as governor, I have found many satisfactions that I hadn't expected, and I have found some pitfalls and drawbacks that I hadn't foreseen.

"I find that being governor of Michigan is a rewarding, stimulating and challenging experience."

"All cotton knits may shrink a little," says Bernetta Kahabka, clothing specialist at Michigan State University. "A highest quality T-shirt may shrink as much as five per cent, but it will shrink evenly." "Some retailers," she continues, "frankly recommend clothes of knitted fabrics one size larger especially if you plan to dry them in a tumbler dryer."

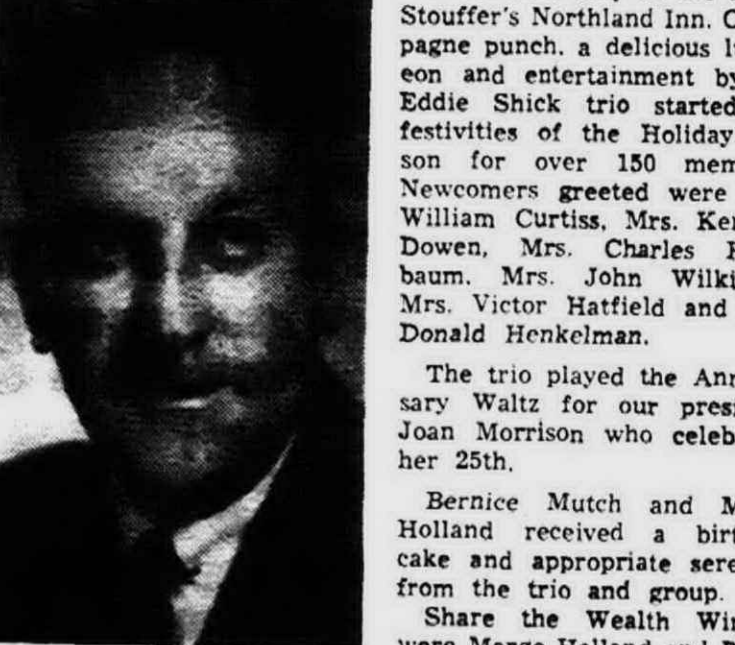

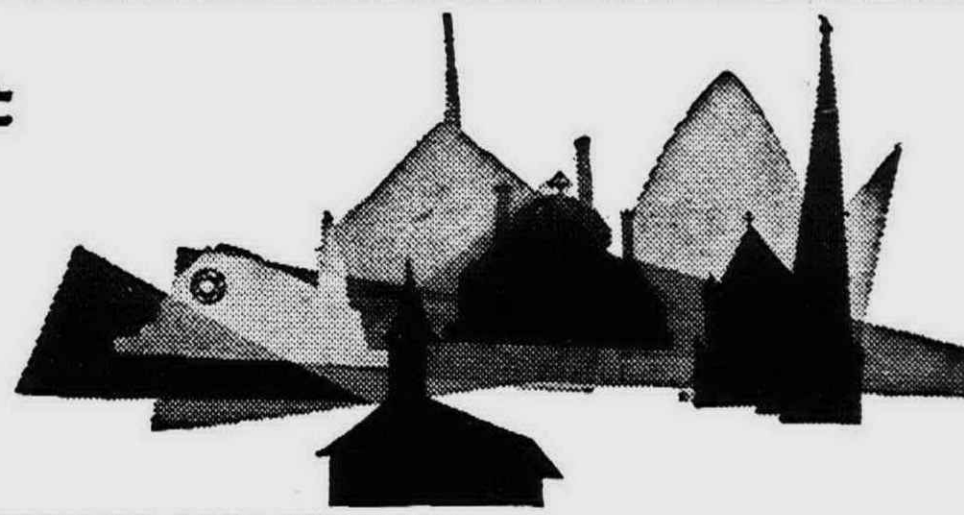

In the 200-yard medley relay, Wiebeck was the leadoff man as he, Jim Vedder, Duthie and Amberg swam a 1:47.2 to land second behind Lansing Everett's quartet which was clocked in 1:46.9.

## SPORTS OBSERVER

Back in the land of cold and snow and still dreaming about the Americana Hotel, the sunshine, the palm trees and sun bathing down in Miami Beach.

And what's there to talk about so early in the new year? The high school athletes are back in action . . . going full strong in basketball, swimming and wrestling. There won't be too much of a pause for the preps until they wrap up their schooling in June.

The big subject around the prep beat centers around the changes in the timing of basketball games.

Under the new regulations, the clock stops every time the referee blows his whistle. This means that there actually is more playing time in every game.

It used to be that the clock would keep ticking away when a violation was called for steps, carrying the ball, too long in the free-throw lane and when the ball sailed over the out-of-bounds line.

Under those condition, several seconds would elapse before the ball was put back into play.

But now when infractions occur, the timer presses the button and the clock stands still until somebody touches the ball again in the field of play.

Prep followers are protesting that games now are much longer . . . also that scores are greater than ever.

Just before the holiday break, one high school in Detroit scored something like 125 points in a 32-minute game. That's more points than any college or pro team averages . . . and remember that the colleges play a 40-minute game and pro tilts run 48 minutes, exclusive, of course, of any overtime action.

State Director Charles E. Forsythe sees nothing wrong in the new timing provisions.

He says that a study shows that games aren't much longer, if any, compared to previous years. He also doubts that scores have mounted to the point that anybody become too concerned.

Forsythe also notes that the rules make it possible for preps to play more and also for more preps to get into the games . . . which, after all, is the most important item of all.

Our thoughts on the subject are these: It's okay to permit the varsity teams to play eight-minute quarters with the clock stopping for each violation, etc. But when the reserve and freshman teams, which aren't schooled as fine as the varsities or as experienced, take to the floor and produce a lot of whistle-blowing . . . this adds up to a much longer game than the fans care to see, especially when they are present chiefly to watch the varsity attraction.

'Twas a fine party the Detroit Tigers tossed for the press, radio and TV Tuesday night at the Sheraton-Cadillac Hotel. The big wheels from the Tigers all were present and from what you heard . . . the Tigers are optimistic over what's going to happen for them in 1964.

The Tiger affair followed on the heels of the annual winter luncheon staged by the Baseball Writers of America's Detroit chapter. We're proud still to be a member of this fine organization along with Tommy Thompson, who's also connected with the Observer newspapers.

Speaking of baseball, while down in Florida, we strolled past the ball park in Hollywood where several exhibition games annually are staged. It was the day after Christmas . . . and guess what the gentlemen in charge of the diamond was doing? He was watering the grass!

Have to mention the subject . . . but with the crazy way the temperature fluctuates around these parts . . . when are we going to have a nice artificial ice-skating rink so the kids and grown ups can get full use of their new skates received from Santa Claus?

They tell me that the team which could fool everybody in the Suburban Six League prep race this year belongs to Plymouth High. It should be quite a struggle when the Rocks go against Bentley later this month.

When you make only ten points in one quarter and eight in another, things usually end up on the unhappy side for a team in the modern scheme of basketball.
