St. Joseph Plans Refresher Course For Nurses

A nursing refresher course will be offered at St. Joseph Mercy Hospital, Ann Arbor, from Feb. 7 through March 13 to provide an opportunity for inactive nurses to learn current practice.

Concerning the program, Medical Nursing Supervisor Sister Mary A. Francis, R. S. M. noted that much has been said recently about the current need for more nurses to meet the needs of today's society. She said:

"One source of such 'nursing manpower' is the group of inactive nurses who could return to work but who hesitate because they have not been able to keep up with the rapid advances in the medical, hospital and nursing fields today."

In an effort to meet the need, she said, St. Joseph Mercy Hospital is offering the five-week refresher course.

Classes will be scheduled Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m.

Current Michigan licensure is required of all applicants. The fee for the course is \$15 plus 48 hours of volunteer clinical service (supervised). The fee will be refunded upon employment after the course.

Listening Post Lecturer Will Be U of M Professor



The second lecture in the Plymouth Listening Post series, sponsored by the American Association of University Women, will be Thursday, Jan. 23.

Prof. Arthur W. Burks, a philosophy professor at the University of Michigan, will speak on "Men and Machines." Burks holds degrees in mathematics and philosophy and has written extensively on both subjects.

A principal designer of the first electronic computer in the mid-1940's, Dr. Burks has also served as consultant on computers to various educational and research centers.

An informal question and answer period and a coffee hour will follow Burks' speech.

James Stewart Plays One of His Favorite Types in Latest Comedy

James Stewart is a winner; the prototype of what the motion picture industry and general public consider a star. Admittedly particular about the roles he portrays, Jimmy has a built-in sense of responsibility to movie-goers. He believes that motion pictures should be entertaining and offer a great variety of themes to ticket buyers.

As far as his personal preference is concerned, he likes doing comedies, whodunnits, and good westerns. He is very Broadway hit by Phoebe and Henry Ephron with a screenplay that has been internationalized by Nunnally Johnson. This makes the fourth picture in which Jimmy has worked with director Henry Koster, the last being "Mr. Hobbs Takes a Vacation."

Playing a father on the screen is a natural for Jimmy—his wife Gloria, their twin daughters Judy and Kelly, aged 12, and Gloria's sons by a previous marriage, Ronald, 19, and Michael, 17.

He has spent over a quarter century in motion pictures and captured just about every honor in the book, including an Oscar for "The Philadelphia Story" in 1940. "Take Her, She's Mine," his 64th film, is the first he's made since "Mr. Hobbs" but in the interim he attended the Berlin Film Festival, where he won the Special Golden Bear Award as the Most Popular American actor.

Basic theme of the story centers around two divergent points of view—the sanctity of the individual and his right to live, versus the thesis that in war the few are expendable for the good of the many.

The superannated second lieutenant (Keenan Wynn) is to be pitied as a much less than psychopath who kills out of a misguided sense of patriotism. The officer charged with his defense (Robert Mitchum) also cannot be blamed for his willingness to "play the army game." The plot is complex in that the murder victim is a British non-com, the setting a British-American Joint Command in India near the end of World War II and the urgency of a quick trial, pre-determined verdict of guilt and a fast execution. The 20th Century-Fox release opens at the Mai Kai Theatre on Wednesday, Jan. 22.

NATIONAL BANK EARNINGS GAIN

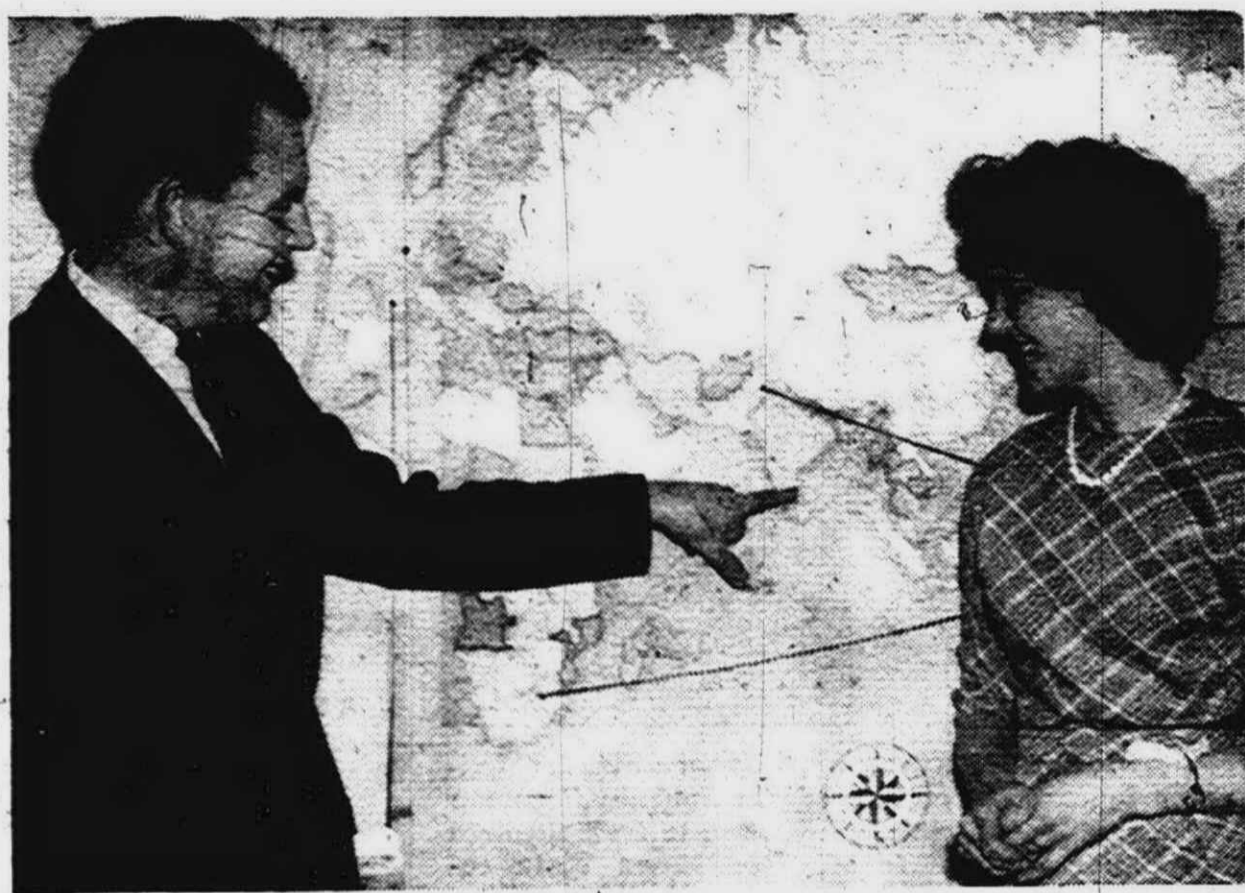
Net operating earnings of National Bank of Detroit for the year ended December 31, 1963 were \$18,060,998 or \$5.02 per share, it was reported by Donald F. Valley, chairman, and Henry T. Bodman, president. This compares with \$18,845,151 or \$4.68 per share in 1962.

Capital, surplus, and undivided profits on December 31, amounted to \$189,434,089, as compared with \$180,586,069 at the end of 1962, which is an increase of \$8,848,020.

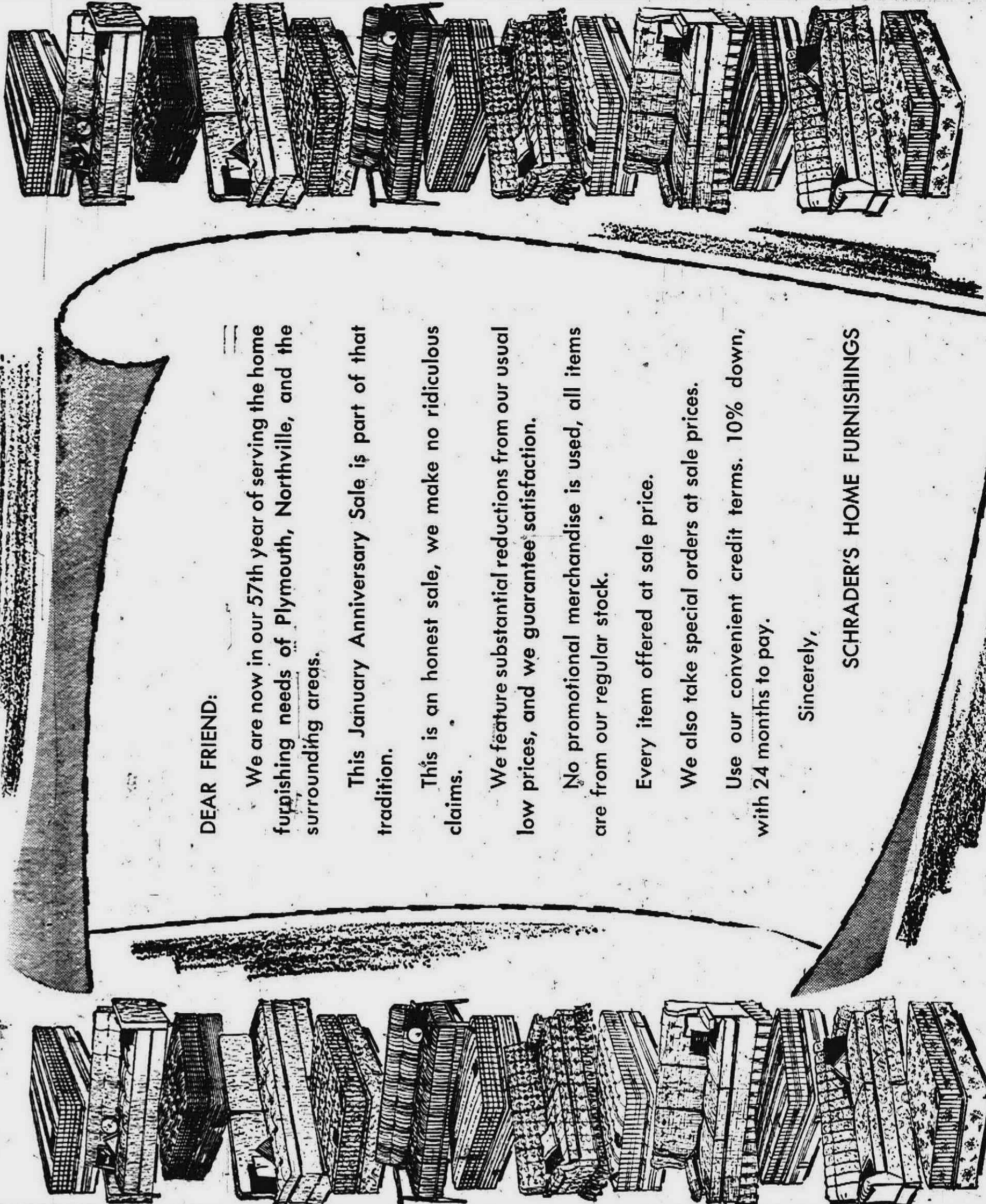

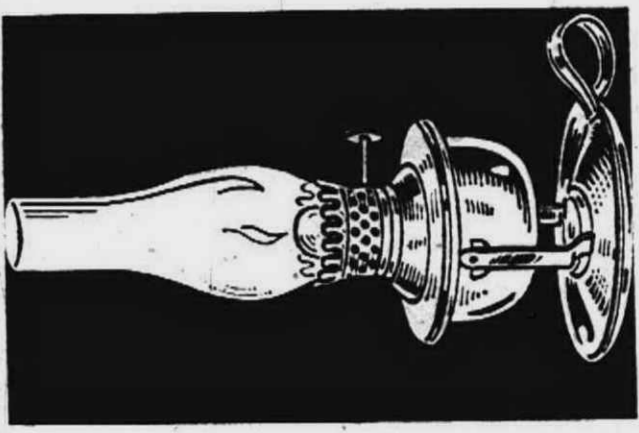
