## Would Refer Regional Planning Decision To Voters

# School Board Urges Step Up In Anti-Smoking Drive

Alarmed by the federal government's report on the effects of smoking, the Plymouth School Board Monday passed a resolution asking for a step up in the health and education program stressing the harmful ef-

fects of smoking and for strict enforcement of the school system's rule banning smoking by students on school grounds. The resolution was presented by Ernest Henry and received support from Robert Utter.

President Gerry Fischer and Mrs. Esther Hulsing. All stressed need for immediate action in lieu of the alarming federal report issued Saturday. "We can't start this pro-

gram too early in the grades as far as I'm concerned," said Henry in making the motion. "Matter of fact I believe the education should start as early as possible so that the

youngsters can carry the message home to their parents."

At the same time, the Board, after a review of the recent opinion on participation in regional planning authority handed down by Attorney General Frank Kelley, decided to withhold action until a more careful study of the matter.

However, it was the opinion of the Board that a final decision on spending money for such an Authority should be made by the voters in a referendum.

"Inasmuch as we have two opposite opinions, one by our counsel, William Sempliner, and the other by the Attorney General, I don't feel we should be forced into a decision," said Carl Schultheiss, "I think this is something that should be decided by the electorate in a referendum."

President Fischer read a communication from Sempliner in which he reiterated his previous opinion.

His letter read:

"I have studied with great interest the opinion which the Attorney General gave to Mr. Chandler concerning the power of the School District to participate in a regional planning commission.

"With all due respect to the Attorney General and to his great office, I do not change the opinion I gave to the School Board in July. The Attorney General relies wholly upon the inclusion of the two words 'School District' in Section 1 of the Statute. It is my opinion that those words were errant and inadvertently included in the Act, and I still believe that the legislature did not intend, and the Courts would not permit, school districts to take action of this kind.

"I disagree wholly with the Attorney General in his conclusion that operating funds may be devoted to meet the expenses of the Planning Commission. These funds were raised from taxes levied for educational purpose, and a diversion of those funds to other uses should not and cannot legally be made without approval of the electorate.

"I believe, however, that you should inform the Board if they should wish to participate in the Planning Commission they may do so without personal responsibility or liability in reliance upon the opinion of the Attorney General."

In other actions, the Board: Decided to speed up action on the proposed additions to Farrand and Allen Schools by hiring an architect within the next six weeks. The Board will interview six or eight candidates before making a decision on one to draw plans for the expansions.

Heard plans for a curriculum review at the Junior High East Library on Monday, Jan. 27 when some methods of teaching will be aired along with a study of additional new methods now on the market. The review also will include report on existing materials now being used in the system and new ones that teachers and the administration would like to introduce. The meeting is open to the public and starts at 8 p.m.

Supt. Russell Isbister was granted permission to attend the American Association of School Administrators convention in Atlantic City from Feb. 15 through 19.

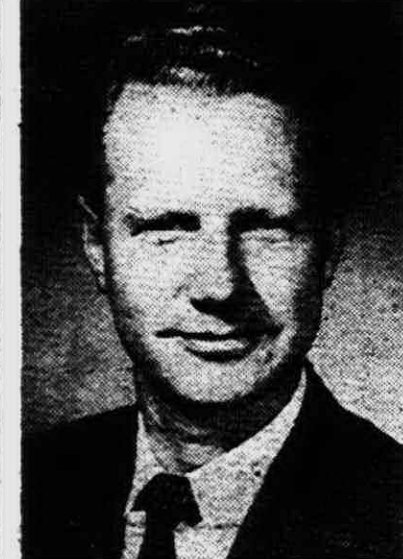
Township Clerk John McEwen reported 462 removed from lists there and City Clerk had a total of 431.

## Burroughs Starts Moves; Stromback To West Coast

First effects of the recent realignment and consolidation of several Burroughs Corporation manufacturing and engineering divisions were felt in Plymouth with the announcement of appointments of executives to new assignments by James R. Bradburn, vice president, manufacturing and engineering.

Burroughs shocked the entire area on Dec. 26 when it made known plans to abandon the huge plant on Second Ave. in Detroit, with a transfer of some 2,000 workers to the Plymouth division and a loss of jobs to more than 1,500.

The initial changes find D. E. Stromback, general manager of the Plymouth division, becoming general manager of the ElectroData Manufacturing and Engineering Division in Pasadena, Calif.

George Baird, Plymouth division's manager of engineering, has been appointed manager, operator attended equipment activity, Michigan division.

Herbert D. DeBorde, who has been corporate director of manufacturing since 1960, has been appointed general manager of the new Michigan Manufacturing and En-

gineering Division. This was formed by the consolidation of the Detroit and Plymouth divisions, has been named manager of general manufacturing activity, Michigan division.

J. B. Rice, Jr., presently general manager of the ElectroData division, will succeed DeBorde as corporate director of manufacturing and report to Bradburn.

Brian W. Pollard, now corporate director of engineering, will be manager, data processing activity.

Stromback, who has been general manager of Plymouth division since 1958, joined Burroughs in 1949 as a design engineer at Burroughs laboratories in Paoli. He moved to Plymouth in 1955 as manager of engineering.

Baird has been with Burroughs 14 years when he was named manager of the electro-mechanical department at the laboratories in Paoli. He became assistant director of engineering in 1957 and in 1958 was transferred to Plymouth as manager of engineering.

DeBorde has been with Burroughs since 1951 and has held several management positions at Plymouth, Detroit, Military Electronic Computer divisions and Control Instrument division. He was appointed director of manufacturing in 1960.

Blossom joined Burroughs in 1931. He became assistant superintendent of Detroit Manufacturing and Engineering division in 1948 and since that time has had various management assignments in that facility. Since 1957 he has been general manager of the Detroit division.

Rice was with ElectroData Corporation when it became a division of Burroughs in 1956 and at that time was director of the division in 1960.

Pollard joined Burroughs in 1959 as assistant to the general manager, ElectroData division.

# Plymouth Rifle Club Wins in Court

The Western Wayne County Conservation Association can make use of its \$190,000 rifle range and clubhouse at 6700 Napier Road in Plymouth Township provided the firing does not exceed a noise level of 88.25 decibels.

That was the decision handed down by Circuit Judge Joseph Montante as he set aside temporary injunctions that had kept the club from using its facilities since 1962.

The injunctions, obtained by Clyde Smith, an Oak Haven trailer salesman and eighth grade teacher, were dissolved by Judge Montante.

The Judge also ruled that the range could be used only from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. on weekdays and from 10 a.m. to dusk on Sundays. He instructed the club to raise its protective backwall from 38 to 43 feet.

The club was organized in 1932 and had just completed several new projects when the temporary injunction halted operations.

Judge Montante declared the rifle range is safe and the noise from firing is not excessive.

Before moving to the Plymouth Township site, the club operated a range in Nankin Township.

construction of a 300-yard range should members decide on such a project in the future. The Judge visited the range, arranged simulated meets to test the noise and had sound recordings taken.

"The court does not find the noise to be such as would shock a person of ordinary sensibilities or cause actual discomfort," he said.

He pointed out that there is not proof to sustain the claim that a hazard exists.

## FACTS and OPINIONS by Paul Chandler

Residents of this area should have particular interest in these points raised in Governor Romney's "State of the State" speech last week:

- 500 new beds are sought for retarded children at the Plymouth State Home.

- The Governor would increase by \$10 per student the community college aid formula and increase from \$1,500,000 to \$3,000,000 the state funds available for community college buildings. The latter are matching funds, granted by the state if the local districts matches them.

- School districts and community colleges should expand vocational education and specialized training programs and facilities, Gov. Romney said.

- He wants an "equitable and effective annexation procedure" adopted during this legislative session because "in many areas, annexation is clearly needed for orderly and efficient local government and is blocked by archaic annexation provisions."

Everywhere one goes today—among friends or in official places—there is concern about mental health. The malady is spreading.

In terms of treatment, there is new effort to avoid, wherever possible, individual distress from reaching a community health treatment, on an out-patient basis, will become more common almost immediately, not only because it's less expensive but because in many cases it's more effective since it doesn't sever distressed persons from normal home environment.

## SC Finds Many Try Books Again

With total entrance applications creeping over the 800 mark against a ceiling of 1,200 full and parttime students, Schoolcraft College officials are amazed at the number of applicants who have been out of school for several years.

The age range varies between a low of 16 (high school seniors) to many in the mid-50s, some of whom will attend as fulltime students. Some will carry only one or two courses.

Registrar Norman Dunn made a study of early applicants and found that many of the out-of-school group, currently employed in local plants or businesses, will continue to work while attending college. Most will enroll for one or two courses in the day or evening.

Dunn's survey showed that 25 applicants were interested in teaching careers. Many are entering business administration, engineering, liberal arts or police administration.

The two-year-curricula are attracting others in such areas as electronics, manufacturing processes and allied technical fields.

The applicants run the gamut from students fresh out of high school to housewives, professional workers and others who haven't attended classes for more years than they care to remember.

Typical examples include three Plymouthites who recently participated in the initial counseling, entrance tests at Livonia's Bentley High: They are:

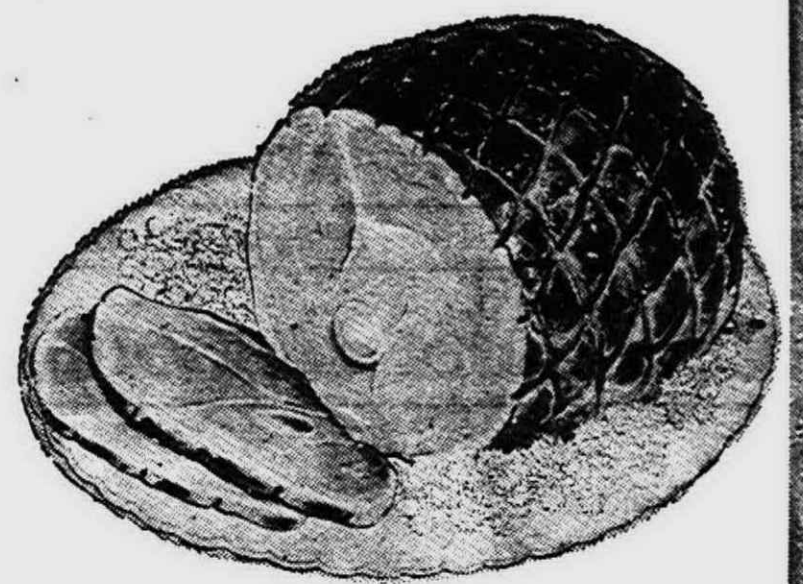

LANSING—Never in Michigan history have so many automobile license plates been in such bad shape from rust and weather damage.

With the time to renew licenses close at hand, car owners are distressed because they are afraid their plates can't make it another year and yet, only the small tabs are being sold, with the plates themselves supposed to survive another 12 months.

It is possible to buy new plates for one dollar, I want to report today. A check shows that, back in August, the Secretary of State also became concerned about the high rate of rusting on the 162 passenger license plates. Since that time, the local branch managers have been instructed to sell a new set of plates for one dollar per set.

This applies only to passenger automobile plates. The car owner must visit the office with the vehicle title, both plates, and fill out a form. The new set of plates will have a different number, but they'll be fresh and glossy. Branch managers are under orders to be as "liberal as possible" in determining whether the plates are sufficiently rusted to justify replacement.

**Edison Plans Three-Day Run Of Heat Show At Wonderland**

For the first time Livonia will see Detroit Edison's new traveling Electric Heat Show. The huge van will be located at Wonderland for three days starting Thursday and continuing through Saturday.

Forty feet long, custom constructed by Fruehauf Trailer and outfitted by Detroit Edison personnel, the van tells the story of electric heat from installation to insulation.

"The Edison Electric Heat Show has the dual purpose of informing the home owner and instructing the contractor," said George Mathews, Edison Assistant Manager Detroit Wayne Sales. "We designed the traveling displays to be entertaining with a purpose."

Entrance and exit doors are in the side of the van. They open from the bottom and

pull down to the ground, revealing self-contained short stairways with steps and railings. The entrance door remains open during visiting hours.

However, the interior is protected by a curtain of air across the front entrance. It provides a constant stream of air which allows the door to remain open, even in severely cold weather.

Inside, seven different types of electric heating equipment made by ten different manufacturers are displayed. They include heat pump, baseboard, wall panel, forced air, ceiling panels and ceiling cable.

They are operational; a visitor to the Show can experience the instant response of electric heat by adjusting thermostatic controls himself. Proper installation of vapor

barriers and insulation is also demonstrated, as well as the use of humidistats to control vent fans for exhausting moisture.

All the equipment is displayed in situated, home-like surroundings to show how unobtrusively electric heating units fit into a room.

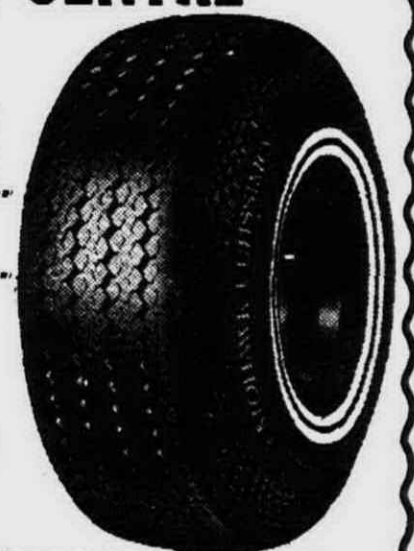

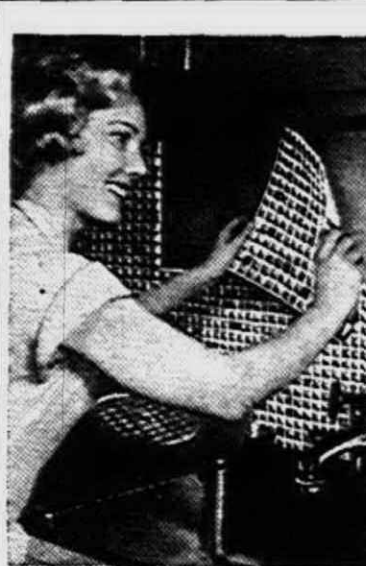

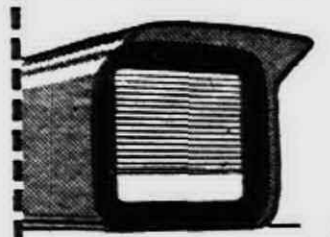

# Mayor's Aide Threatens Her Job, Says Livonia Employee

A female employee of the Livonia city water department charged today that her job was in danger because her car has carried a bumper sticker urging the election of former Mayor William Brashear.

Judith C. Beaton said her superior, David Jones (an appointee of Mayor Moelke) had written a letter to the civil service commission threatening her dismissal.

Jones' letter to the civil service commission said: "Civil Service Commission 'City of Livonia, Michigan 'Gentlemen:

"Please be informed that I am placing Mr. Darold Jennings in direct supervision of Mrs. Judith Beaton and Miss Ruth Ann Allen, to daily supervise the Billing Operation and report to me progress of quality and quantity of work done.

"These two employees are not performing their work in a satisfactory manner and unless some improvement is noted, because of this, further steps of discipline will be taken.

"If you have any questions in this regard, please contact me at Extension 233."

Mrs. Beaton wrote a letter herself immediately to the civil service commission and it said:

"A short time after the above letter was handed to me, I was called into Mr. Jones' office and was subjected to abuse, insults, and obscene language and violent rage principally because I had on the bumper of my personal automobile a political sticker pertaining to the coming City election.

"When I informed Mr. Jones that the City Charter, as well as the United States Constitution protects American citizens in the right to participate in elections, he flew into an even greater rage and said that Civil Service employees cannot participate in any political activity.

"On the same day that I received the letter, he also informed me that the Little Hoover Commission suggested that he get rid of two employees in the Water and Sewer Division and he strongly implied that, because of my political activities, I would be one of the two employees.

"Sub-Section L, Chapter V of the City Charter provides as follows:

"No person in the classified Civil Service . . . shall be appointed, removed, promoted, demoted, or in any way favored or discriminated against because of his political, racial, or religious opinions or affiliations . . .

"The above Charter provisions are consistent with the well established rights of American citizens under the Federal Constitution.

"No specific fault has been found with the performance of my work and I am convinced that Mr. Jones is attempting to discriminate against me and punish me solely because of my political opinions and affiliations. I have obtained legal advice and if this type of discrimination persists, I will feel obligated to present this entire matter to the City Council, the Wayne County Prosecutor, and to take such other proceedings against Mr. Jones personally and any others associated with him which will protect my rights and interests as a Civil Service employee."

After these letters had gone into the record, Jones on Tuesday delivered the following letter to Mayor Moelke:

"Dear Mayor Moelke:  
"On January 10, 1964, I received a telephone call from the radio station. He asked me to comment about a routine disciplinary action taken by me in an effort to improve the daily output of water bills.

"According to radio, Mrs. Judith Beaton, one of the bookkeeping machine operators in this department, has accused me of subjecting her to abuse, insults and violent rage as well as other mis-treatment. Be assured that this unwarranted attack upon me is so ridiculous it is almost funny. It is a deliberate attempt to confuse the voters of the Primary Election by implying that Moelke Appointees are some kind of political nuts or misfits.

"The action with regard to Mrs. Beaton was a direct result of a comment made by Mr. Sydney Bagnall, President of the City Council, at our last Council meeting. Mr. Bagnall asked how the Water Department could claim that water rates could be reduced particularly because of greater efficiency, when the Citizens Research Group said that the billing operation could get by with one less machine operator. The answer is obvious — that greater efficiency is still possible through closer supervision, installation of outside meter reading devices which could eliminate meter out cards, and etc.

"The letter from Mrs. Beaton goes into great length in vain to prove that a classified Civil Service employee has the right to use City owned parking lots to promote candidates of their own choice. She even attempted to promote candidate former Mayor William Brashear by parking her car in such a place that everyone entering or leaving the Water Board Building would come in direct view of a Brashear bumper sticker. The

charter is clear on this point. "NO OFFICER OR EMPLOYEE IN THE CLASSIFIED CIVIL SERVICE SHALL DIRECTLY OR INDIRECTLY MAKE, SOLICIT OR RECEIVE ANY ASSESSMENT, SUBSCRIPTION

OR CONTRIBUTION FOR ANY POLITICAL PARTY OR ANY POLITICAL PURPOSE WHATSOEVER. ANY EMPLOYEE VIOLATING THE PROVISIONS OF THIS SECTION MAY BE REMOVED FROM

OFFICE BY ACTION OF THE CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION."

"Are we ready in Livonia to start using our City parking lots and other City facilities for promoting political candi-

dates? If so where do we stop — with paint bombs! Just as the City Charter forbids a Government from using its power to discipline a person for his political opinion or affiliation, it also provides for a method

of preventing City employees from using City facilities to promote parties or persons."

Plymouth Pare-Weighters Club Crowns A Queen

(The first in a series highlighting a club or organization in the Plymouth community.)

The Plymouth Pare-Weighters' Club, affiliated with the national TOPS (take off pounds sensibly) organization, is a comparatively new club in Plymouth. It meets each Wednesday at 8 p.m. in room 105 in the High School.

It came into being in 1962 when Mrs. Fran Schieff of Northville helped organize the first club and served as its first leader. Mrs. Doris Root was the first leader from Plymouth, followed by Mrs. Patricia Laidlaw who headed the club in 1963.

The membership dues are six dollars per year for the first two years; four dollars thereafter. Once the desired weight is reached, that member graduates but can still re-

tain her membership in the club by attending one meeting each month.

The only requirement for graduation in the club is a paper from the applicant's doctor stating what her desired weight should be.

The local club is governed by the by-laws of the national TOPS organization and their own 9-member executive board. Their officers include a leader, co-leader, secretary, treasurer and weight recorder, who maintains a file with each member's record of weight reduction. These figures are kept secret should a member desire.

The club is divided into groups according to weight. For example, group IV includes those whose weight is more than 150 pounds but less than 200.

Those who have lost pounds are cheered. Each missed meeting also costs 25 cents. The two members who slip the most must take home the piggy plate and the bib which reads "DO NOT FEED," which they must display in their kitchens as reminders of their gain.

The members with the largest weight loss becomes the queen for that year. The Plymouth club's queen for 1963 is Mrs. Nellie Johnson who appears in the picture wearing her crown. Her award will be an expense-free trip to the TOPS national convention at Kansas City. Attending with her will be the leader, Mrs. Della McLarty and each will receive \$75 spending money.

# Doors Open, Crowds Large At The 1964 Model Homes

suffering from a nervous rather than a physical disorder; people who almost constantly suffer from tension; people who have difficulty with an angry temper."

The purpose of the group approach is to defeat the "alone" feeling; to share the distresses with others who know. One of the objectives is to train the nervous to avoid violent reaction (through use of will) to the "trivial irritations". But the whole program is carefully planned, includes lessons and advice from Dr. Low, a "big brother" phone call plan where advice or assurance can be had, and much more.

"It's difficult to explain, easy to demonstrate," one member told me.

On Sunday, Feb. 16, at Our Lady of Good Counsel Church in Plymouth, a panel of doctors will assemble to explain and demonstrate Recovery, Inc. The meeting starts at 8 p.m. Everyone at all concerned—about themselves or about their dependents—will be welcome. A phone call to GL 3-2409 will yield other information.

If all from this area attend who could benefit, it will be a huge meeting.

## Council Takes First Step To Curb Noisy Trucks

Plymouth's City Commission has taken the first step to halt through truck traffic in the downtown business section — it passed to first reading a through truck ordinance.

Commissioners have had numerous complaints from downtown merchants about through trucks—large ones, most carrying gravel and steel—grinding across Main street and Ann Arbor Trail at all times of the day and night.

So, they decided it was about time to halt such activities, especially along the not-so-long-ago paved Main street.

The new ordinance, which amends Ordinance 245, known as the through truck code forbids truck travel except upon public streets or highways designated as through commercial vehicle routes on through truck routes.

These include:  
**Plymouth road**—from N. Mill to the East city limits.

**Northville Road**—from North city limits to Mill street.

**Mill Street**—from North city limits to South city limits.

**M-14 (Ann Arbor Road)**—from West city limits to East city limits.

**Sheldon Road**—from C&O Railroad to Ann Arbor Trail.

The operation of commercial vehicles and trucks upon all other public streets, highways or alleys, is prohibited except that none of the restrictions imposed shall prevent the delivery or pickup of goods anywhere within the city limits.

The restrictions will not prevent any vehicle from going to or returning to the property, within the city limits, where it is stored, maintained or serviced.

"We feel this new ordinance will have the desired affect," said Mayor Richard Warnette. "We don't want heavy trucks screeching and roaring through the downtown section but at the same time we can't stop trucks from entering that district if they are making deliveries.

"Our aim is to check the huge gravel and steel trucks. We believe this will adequately take care of the matter and the police department has promised to enforce the new code to the letter once it is officially adopted."

# Deyo Rips Opinion Of Attorney General

Plymouth Municipal Judge Harry Deyo, veteran of many complicated legal battles during his long career as an attorney and lawyer, in a letter to the editor of the Observer Newspapers, disagrees with Attorney General Frank Kelley's opinions that the Plymouth School Board may participate in the organization of a regional planning commission.

Kelley's opinions, requested by State Representative Paul Chandler, publisher of the Observer Newspapers, stated flatly that the Board could participate.

These were the reverse of opinions handed down by William Sempliner, attorney for the Board, in mid-summer. Sempliner said the Board could not participate.

Sempliner and Kelley were asked the same questions:

1—May the Board of Education of the Plymouth Community Schools participate in the organization of a regional planning commission in the Plymouth area in accordance with Act 281, PA 1945, as amended by Act 196, PA 1952?

2—May the Board of Education use operating funds to pay a pro rata share of the cost of operating such a regional planning commission?

Rep. Chandler received requests from several Plymouth residents to seek the opinion from the Attorney General. The requests came shortly after the publication of the Sempliner opinion to the School Board.

Judge Deyo challenges the validity of Atty. General Kelley's opinion in his letter, giving reasons for his challenge. The letter:

Editor:  
Our local newspapers recently carried articles reporting that Attorney General Kelley has ruled that under Act 281, PA 1945, as amended by Act 194 (not Act 196), PA 1952, the Plymouth Community Schools may participate in the organization of a regional planning commission. This purports to override an opinion to the contrary by Mr. Sempliner, attorney for the school district.

Because taxpayers have an interest in the proper and legal use of school monies, attention is invited to the following: Sec. 1 of Art. XI, Constitution of 1908 provides that schools and means of education shall forever be encouraged. The Supreme Court has pointed out the distinction between "Education" and "Local Government" (Atty. Gen. vs. Thompson, 168 Mich. 511).

While the Constitution of 1963 has apparently wiped out the primary school interest fund (see Sec. 9 and Sec. 11, Art. XI, Constitution 1908) it did adopt verbatim said Sec. 1 of the Constitution of 1908.

It follows that as Act 281, PA 1945, as amended, undertakes to plunge school districts into local government and to permit use of school monies for other than school purposes, said

act may be held unconstitutional. The most decisive reason or point against the correctness of the Attorney General's opinion is a simple rule of statutory construction.

Act 281, PA 1945 was last amended in the year 1952. Act 269, PA 1955, known as "The School Code of 1955," was enacted, of course, subsequent to said Act 281. As stated by the Attorney General, Plymouth Community Schools is a third class district organized under Chapter 4, Part 1 of said code as amended. In said chapter the powers of the school board are recited and strictly defined. At no place therein is the board given power to use school money for regional planning.

Section 566 of The School Code of 1955 requires the consent of a majority of the school

tax electors of the district voting on the question before school monies may be used for any other purpose than that for which raised.

As said code of 1955 is silent as to school money for regional planning and recites in detail the powers of school boards, it repeats by implication, most striking and direct, said Act 281 insofar as it applies to school districts.

For the above reasons, it would appear that said school district or its board may not use school money for the mentioned purpose and that its attorney is correct.

The opinion of the Attorney General or any other attorney upon a question is, of course, not final. Any person having an interest may challenge an opinion or action in the courts.

## Plymouth To Pay More For Policemen In Court

Plymouth Police Officers will receive overtime for local court appearances and \$10 per day plus mileage and meals for off duty appearances before the Circuit Court.

The City Commission approved the compensation for off duty appearances in court following a recommendation by City Attorney Edward Draugelis for such pay and a recommendation from Director of Public Safety Kenneth Fisher setting up a pay schedule.

Fisher recommended that

(1) an off duty officer receive \$10 per day plus mileage and meals for appearances before the Circuit Court and (2) an off duty officer receive one hour of overtime pay (at straight time rate) for all local court appearances.

Fisher pointed out that the City adopted a policy of paying \$5 plus meals and mileage for Circuit Court assignments several years ago but that such scale was inadequate now.

The recommendations were approved unanimously after Fisher pointed out the entire schedule would cost the city less than \$350 annually. A check of records for the fiscal years of 1962 and 1963 showed a total of 14 trips to Circuit Court by off duty officers.

# 'CURTAIN GOING UP'

"What light breaks in yonder window? Et tu, Brutus. Oh, Rosalind, tell me again how thou dost love me. Now, Marc, prithee hand me that asp."

Have you ever read four more disjointed sentences? Or are you way ahead of me and you fully realize that I am quoting all too loosely from four Shakespearean plays that will be opening at the Hilberry Classic Theater starting this week.

On January 15, a new concept in theater-going for the Detroit area audiences will be unveiled at Cass and Hancock on the Wayne State University campus. The Hilberry Classic Theater will begin a six month's showing of four Shakespearean plays: "Julius Caesar," "As You Like It," "Romeo and Juliet," and "Anthony and Cleopatra."

Professional actors have been training for the past four months for successive openings. Each week a production will premiere, starting with "Julius Caesar" on Jan. 15. After the first month, all four plays will alternate on an equal basis throughout the week. If you have yet to experience repertory theater, here is your chance to see "Julius Caesar" one evening, come back the next and see the same actors doing different roles in "Romeo and Juliet." You'll find the experience a rewarding one.

Director Leonard Leone has kept the size of the theatre intimate. Only 500 seats in the entire auditorium. In other words, there isn't a bad seat in

the place. You will not have to strain to catch the lovely Shakespearean poetry. The lyricism of the lines should come through loud and clear.

The expansive nature of the stage will provide an exciting media for actors and directors. In fact, the stage completely surrounds the audience. During some of the professional scenes in "Julius Caesar" many new effects will be gained. All in all, old Wally eagerly awaits the opening of the Hilberry Classic Theater.

The Plymouth Theater Guild is not opening a classic theater, but they are deep in the process of planning how to renovate the high school auditorium prior to the opening night of "The Drunkard." Producer Mary Ann Nichols and her house committee will have to figure out how to get 75 tables and 300 chairs set up, decorated, and some sawdust on the floor. The high school auditorium must be transformed into a typical turn-of-the-century Music Hall. Naturally, real beer will not be served. Genuine pretzels will be available and the soft version of beer (root beer) or coffee can be sipped by the audience as they watch the stirring melodrama.

Ray Maidment, Jr., has his scenery crew (Tom Dorset, Norma Loveless, and Jake Rumpf) busy drawing floor plans, making out work schedules, and planning the intricacies of many scene shifts. "The Drunkard" has four acts, 17 scenes. It's easy to see why the scenery crew is hard at work long before

the actors have begun blocking out the play.

Actors are receiving their scripts this week. A mix-up in Boston delayed the scripts. Ace Azar (lovable Wash in "Destiny Rides Again") has been selected to be the venemous Lawyer Cribbs. Quite a switch from the likeable sourdough character that Ace portrayed in the Livonia-Redford musical, Eliska Cowan, 9032 Laurel, tied down the wide-eyed heroine's role. Her daughter, Kathy, will enact that role of her nine year daughter, Julia. Joan Walker won the comic role of Miss Spindle. John Augustine, a newcomer to the Guild (appeared as the Cow in the Children's show), will be seen as William Dowton.

Kenneth McLeod, formerly with the Somerville, Mass. community theatre, has been assigned the task of doing the lighting for "The Drunkard." Kathie Moore will be assistant director.

Musical advertisements, so necessary to any "Drunkard" production, are already in the works. Louise Byrd has been re-christened the Bowery Night-

engale. She will lead the community singing and have her own specialty spot. Joel Johnson, Joe Knollenberger, and Thomas Shea have agreed to provide some between-acts ragtime music on a tuba, bnjo and a honky-tonk piano. Dancers doing the cakewalk (The Weavers — who else) have been booked for an olio number. "The Drunkard" has even hired an official photographer in the person of Charlie Bousquet.

# Rep. Chandler Presses Bill to Allow Voting at Age 18

Action to have the Michigan minimum voting age reduced to 18 years from 21 will be pressed immediately in the Legislature by State Representative Paul Chandler of Livonia and Harry DeMaso of Battle Creek.

The two representatives said they would co-sponsor new legislation aimed at amending the first section of Article II of the Michigan Constitution which prevents anyone in the

state from voting until age 21 has been attained.

"At age 18, many young men and women are more interested in government and more informed about it than a great many citizens 21 and older," said Chandler and DeMaso. "The three-year waiting period between high school graduation at 18 and the start of voting privilege at 21 does little to improve

citizenship and, in some ways, permits enthusiasm to wane."

"There is intellectual dishonesty toward youth, and basic democratic inconsistency where a government calls upon young men and women to assume some acts of responsibility—such as military service—but denies them a voice in shaping policy."

A recent United States Presidential Study Commission

urged the states to reduce the age limit to 18. Two have such a limit today (Georgia and Kentucky) and the two newest states, Alaska and Hawaii, have limits of 19 and 20.

Representatives DeMaso and Chandler said they both represented districts where large numbers of teen-agers reside, and that they "had been deluged with requests for the new age limit from young men and

women who believe they are being unfairly deprived of a chance to vote. Most of them have received intensive education in government in their high school classes.

"There is an inconsistency in Michigan as to what really constitutes the age of maturity. The legal age indicating majority varies from subject to subject, depending on whether we're considering marriage,

voting, military service, smoking, drinking or driving a car.

"Our legislation on the 18-

year limit will take the view that if one is old enough to marry, drive a car, and go

into military service, he or she is also mature enough to use the ballot prudently."

and the classroom to the south at Westbrook Elementary.

The secretary and treasurer were authorized to repay \$80,000 in a note taken out to borrow in anticipation of state aid receipts.

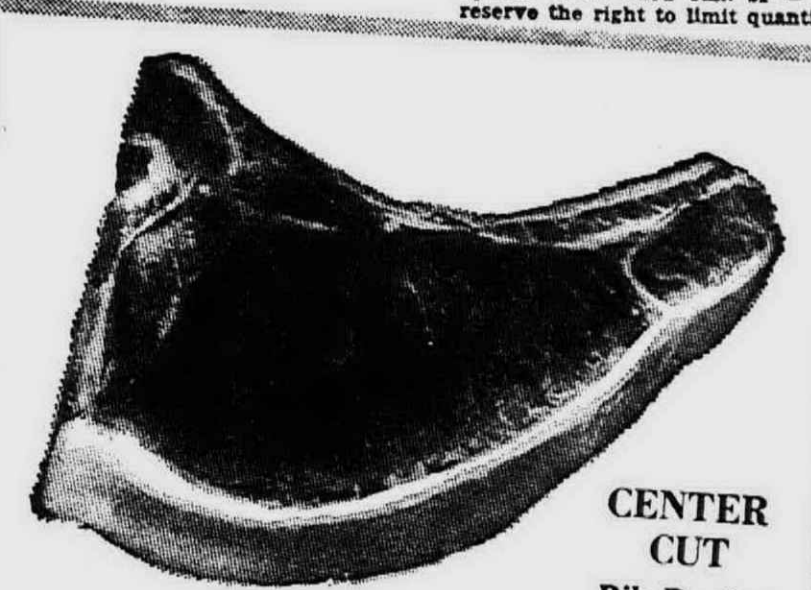

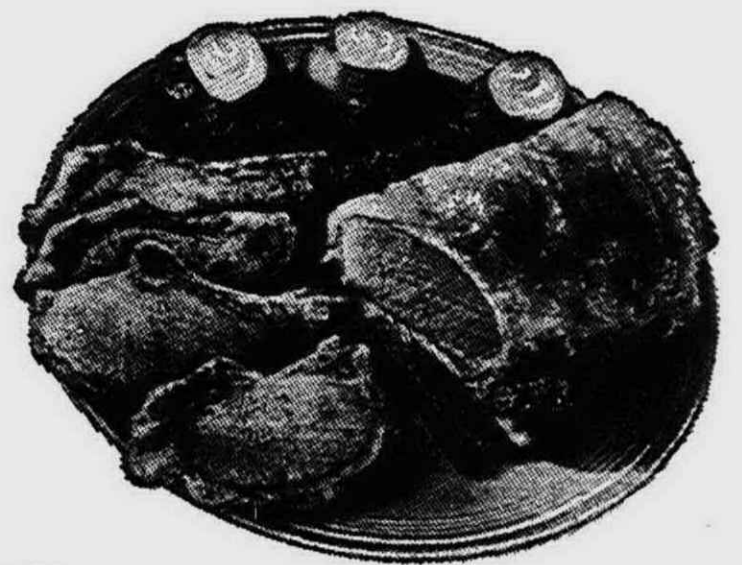

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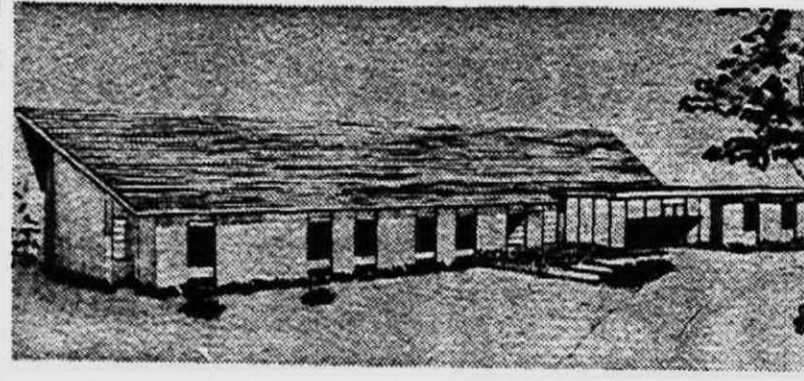
