City Approves Concrete Tank

Unanimous authorization of pre-stressed concrete construction for Plymouth's new 2-million gallon reservoir was granted Monday evening by the city commission at its regular meeting held at the city hall.

The approval came in the wake of recommendations made by Phil Hampton of Johnson and Anderson Engineering of Pontiac.

Although the concrete tank will cost more for initial construction, maintenance costs will be substantially lower, resulting in a savings of about \$14,000 over a 30-year period, Hampton said.

Steel construction would cost about \$100,000 to build.

Concrete will cost \$120,000. However, steel tanks must be repainted at regular intervals.

In addition, Hampton pointed out, steel tanks are susceptible to bullet holes from stray rifle shots while concrete is not.

Upon a motion by commissioner Arch Vallier, commissioners instructed the engineers to proceed with drawings for the pre-stressed concrete tank.

Hampton told commissioners they must advertise for bids on the project by May 1.

APPROVAL followed a special meeting of the commission last Wednesday when they voted formal acceptance of nearly \$300,000 in government grants for the reservoir and water system improvement projects.

Commissioners voted to approve City Manager Albert Glassford's request for \$1,100 from the unappropriated reserve account to the tree care account for the spraying of Elm trees in Plymouth.

Neva Lovewell Succumbs at 71

The Plymouth community was saddened Monday by the sudden death of Mrs. Neva Lovewell, of 365 Pacific Ave.

The long-time Plymouth resident died at her home early Monday morning at the age of 71, as a result of coronary thrombosis.

Funeral services will be held at the Schrader Funeral

Home at 1 p.m. Thursday, Feb. 6. Dr. Henry J. Walsh will officiate. Interment will be in South Lyon Cemetery.

Active in social work the better part of her life, she was affiliated with Hull House, in Chicago, in settlement work for three years; took an active part in the Plymouth Canteen Club, operated during World War II for soldiers; and had been a board member of the Easter Seal Society of Western Wayne County for the past eight years.

A civics, sociology and English teacher at Plymouth High School for 26 years, she returned June 20, 1958. During those years she was assigned to the visiting teacher service for two years, during which she kept up contact between the school and home.

Her personal interest in her pupils did not end upon their graduation, as she kept in close touch with them, long after, and was always avail-

Mail Editor Chosen As Top Weekly Columnist

At award ceremonies held in East Lansing last weekend, Plymouth Mail editor Dave Wiley was named one of Michigan's leading weekly newspaper columnists.

Wiley took first place in the category for original columns on one topic and first honorarium mention in the classification for columns on a variety of topics.

The two awards were among five swept by the Ogemaw County Herald in West Branch, Michigan where The Mail editor worked before coming to Plymouth.

In its class, The Herald took a first prize in news coverage, a third prize in typography and placed third in general excellence.

Rezoning Tabled Again at Hearing

Holbrook St. residents turned out Monday night at the City Commission meeting to protest the rezoning of two lots on Plymouth Road from C-2 to a PR-1 designation.

The lots are located between existing multiple family buildings and the Middle Rouge park.

Homeowner Kenneth Way of 302 N. Holbrook attacked the move to rezone the property, saying it constituted a change in the city master plan for the area.

He claimed Holbrook property owners would be hurt financially if the rezoning were approved.

A spokesman for the Pfeiffer estate, which includes the property in question, said the property had been on the market since the owner's death.

from persons who want to erect multiple family dwellings on the property. He said rezoning would work to the advantage of all concerned.

A check of the records has disclosed that the planning commission never recommended the specific zoning change now under consideration, according to commissioner Arch Vallier.

"I think there is a question about this matter and the planning commission should make a definite recommendation before we take action," Vallier commented.

He said the original recommendation grew out of a planning commission hearing held on Sept. 25, 1962 and the planning group made a general recommendation, not specifying lots 271 and 272.

Vallier said he thought the matter should be returned to the planning commission for a firm vote.

"I'm not so sure the planning commission agrees," he said, "and there's another dangerous thing involved. If we change the zoning, we have no assurance multiple dwellings will be built."

Vallier said he thought it was not fair when persons purchased property in an area zoned residential, only to see the zoning changed.

Robert D. Maurer of 216 N. Holbrook told the commission he was opposed to the move.

"I AM certainly opposed to this rezoning on the basis that it creates a precedent for spot rezoning," he said.

Maurer claimed rezoning would reduce the value of property in the area.

A woman told the commission she opposed the zoning change because neighbors were currently under way to build multiple dwellings on lots 269 and 270.

Safety Award Presented to Local Industry

An award of merit for operating 1,298,902 hours without a disabling injury was presented Thursday to the installation division of Western Electric Company at luncheon ceremonies held in Plymouth's Mayflower Hotel.
