

### Approves \$1.2 Million Water, Sewer Projects

# Township Board Paves Way To Develop West Section

The long awaited step that most believe will open the western side of Plymouth Township to much-needed development, was taken last Tuesday by the Township Board when it unanimously approved a \$1,200,000 sewer and water-line expansion.

The program will be financed partly through increased millage and partly through revenue.

The Trustees voted to name the firm of Kenower and MacArthur as financial consultants, and the matter of financing the two projects was turned over to the new firm for final approval.

Engineer Herald Hamill presented the 1964 sewer and water program as amended by the Board at a special meeting on Jan. 28 for final approval.

The expansions, the most important for the Township in several years, will place water and sewers into the

western section and are expected to bring a tremendous building program there within a short time.

Hamill, in making the presentation, indicated the new water lines will place the Township in a position where it can complete a loop around its entire boundaries by tapping into the Detroit mains when they are made available at Five Mile Road and Sheldon within a year.

"It will be possible for the Township to tap in at Sheldon and Five Mile Roads," he said, "run a line to St. John's Seminary and then out Five Mile to Beck Road and down to

Ann Arbor Road to complete the circuit."

Under the plans outlined by Hamill, the sanitary sewer extension will have a total estimated cost of \$850,000. The water main project is estimated at \$350,000 for the total of \$1,200,000.

Supervisor Roy Lindsay hailed the two projects as "the biggest things that have happened to Plymouth Township in years. This is a tremendous step forward, one that we all know will bring a big growth to the entire area in a comparatively short time."

The plans also include a section along Joy Road and a part of the Township adjacent to Lakepointe subdivision where water and sewers are needed.


In other actions: The Board referred plans for insurance coverage back to the Plymouth Insurance Association for a presentation at the March meeting.

Approved temporary appointment of George Huger as Township Plumbing Inspector pending the return of ailing Robert Williams to duty. Williams has been hospitalized for more than two months.

Greeted Township Attorney Earl Demel back to his duties as counsel after an absence of more than two months because of illness.

Approved payment of \$16 to Canton Township upon request of the Wayne County Office of Civil Defense for delivery and stocking of shelters in Plymouth Township.

Approved payment of \$20 for cost of filing fees for restricted radiotelephone operator permits as required by the Federal Communications Commission for 10 members of the volunteer fire department.

## Rezone Plymouth Rd. For New Apartment

After one of the hottest meetings in years in which tempers ran short and charges and counter charges filled the air until Mayor Richard Wernet called a halt, the Plymouth City Commission Monday approved a PR-2 classification for the Pfeiffer property on Plymouth Road by a 5-2 vote.

This appears to pave the way for the construction of a 134-unit apartment building by the Living Modes, Inc. of Detroit. At least that was the indication during Monday's torrid session although it wasn't entirely determined that the rezoning was exactly for that purpose.

The Commission held a hearing on the proposed rezoning earlier and decided to turn the matter back to the Planning Board for additional study and a recommendation.

The Board met last Wednesday and rejected the PR-2 zoning by a 4-3 vote. Then within hours, two members are reported to have changed their minds on the grounds that there was some misrepresentation at the meeting.

Thus when the matter came up first on Monday's agenda, the zoning board, residents of N. Holbrook who have been fighting the proposed change, representatives of Living Mode, Inc. and the Commissioners donned their battle togs for a showdown scrap.

And it quickly developed into exactly that when brought to a head on a motion by Commissioner George Lawton, supported by James Jabara, to rezone the property to PR-2.

The PR-2 classification is modified professional residential district under the Board's code.

Commissioners Arch Vallier and Robert Smith attacked the motion bitterly on the grounds of spot zoning and that it was depriving N. Holbrook residents of their rights in making a new zoning that would lower the value of their properties.

"We as a City Council should lean over backward to protect our people," declared Vallier. "This proposed action will hurt the valuation of the properties along N. Holbrook. We should take every step to protect the rights of these people, not try to submerge them."

Smith indicated he wasn't against apartments but opposed strip or spot zoning as would be the case in this instance.

"I feel the people in the Holbrook area need our protection," he said, "I fail to see where we are helping them when we actually are hitting them where it hurts most—the pocketbook—by lowering the value of their properties."

Residents of the area, including Robert Maurer, Harlan Hickerson, George Seibert and Harold Joff spoke against the proposed rezoning.

City Treasurer and Assessor Kenneth Way, who resides in the N. Holbrook area, charged that the lower tax rate in Plymouth this year wasn't due to

## FACTS and OPINIONS

With his birthday still close behind, it was interesting to discover that Abe Lincoln made one, and only one, visit to the State of Michigan during the entire 56 years of his life. (And how many of the readers could have answered correctly as to President Lincoln's age when the gunman snatched his life?)

Honest Abe came to Michigan to make a political speech in behalf of someone else—John Fremont, the GOP presidential candidate in 1856. Lincoln spoke in Kalamazoo outdoors, at Bronson Park, on Aug. 27, 1856.

The Republican party was new and the burning issue of the time was the Kansas-Nebraska Act of 1854, which opened up new territory for the spread of slavery. There was a slogan: "Free speech, free press, free soil, free men with FREMONT!"

Michigan had a third party known as the "Know Nothings" going hot at that time, and it was stealing votes from the GOP's Fremont. Millard Fillmore was the Know-Nothing candidate. If Fremont and Fillmore could have joined forces against the Democrat James Buchanan, then Mr. Lincoln's candidate would have made it. Instead the final vote showed: Buchanan — 1,838,169; Fremont — 1,341,264; Fillmore — 874,534.

Lincoln told his Kalamazoo listeners, "The question can be avoided in but two ways. By the one, we must submit and allow slavery to triumph, or by the other, we must triumph over the black demon."

For this timely data, we are indebted to the Michigan Historical Society.

It has been a week of discovery. We kept tripping over items which possibly are no secret to some of our citizens, but which nonetheless astounded Facts and Opinions.

Until Monday, for example, I did not realize that a really serious, prosperous firm has staked its success on a new product . . . to wit, Tricycles for senior citizens.

They discovered that retired people (and particularly those in housing colonies where cars are restricted) enjoy riding and pedaling for both exercise and transportation. But two-wheelers are difficult to pilot for some of the retirees.

A company experimented, came up with a kit which adds two wheels to a standard bicycle, makes for a steady platform beneath grandfather and grandmother, and sales have been booming. The retirees enjoy the labor of making the simple conversion with the kit, among other things.

Another new product based on the needs of older folks (and some medical cases) is a small portable stair-climber. The passenger sits down on it, and it crawls up, step by step, being moved along by endless rubber treads. It works on batteries and costs about \$1,000. I saw a man take one from a car trunk in Lansing and set it to "walking" up the capitol steps, plunk, plunk, plunk . . . and well, it attracted a crowd of astounded people, he assured.

**Political Notes:** Jack McDonald, Supervisor of Redford Township, says he'll run as the GOP's lamb against Martha Griffiths for Congressman from this area—provided the law is changed so that Township elections would be held next Spring and not this fall. That would enable him to "run for free" so as to speak, keeping his \$13,000 Supervisor post to return to. It will take a change in the new Constitution, however, to get Township elections shifted from November, 1964 to April, 1965.

## Festival Continuity Plan Ok'd

Continuity of operation and perpetuation of the Plymouth Fall Festival was assured last week when the Rotary Club approved a plan recommended by the Festival steering committee after a thorough study of similar events in other cities in Michigan and the Midwest.

The committee recommended that the Rotary Club gradually drop sponsorship through means of an election that would place the responsibility on the entire community within a space of three years.

It was the opinion of the committee that the Festival has grown too large in recent years for the sponsorship of one service organization.

The committee's recommendations also were approved by the Kiwanis, Lions and Junior Chamber of Commerce, all of whom participated actively a year ago, as well as practically every other organization in the community.

The recommendations included:

- 1—The Plymouth Rotary Club appoint a nine-member executive committee; three members to serve three years; three to serve two years; and three to serve a single year. Thereafter each set of new members to be named to three-year terms.
- 2—This committee to be named at once and to be given full power for the operational function annually of the Fall Festival.
- 3—Each year thereafter, the three new members of the executive committee to be elected in the month following the Festival by a committee composed of the Mayor of Plymouth, the Supervisor of Plymouth Township, and the president of each participating organization.

## Plymouth CC Plans Aid To Business

Initial steps toward aiding the community's business climate, were taken by the Plymouth Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors in recommending the formation of a Local Business Development Corporation.

The Board went a step further and named George Lawton, City Commissioner, executive manager and Treasurer of the Plymouth Credit Union, member of the Industrial Development Corporation and the Plymouth Trust Fund, as chairman.

The new corporation would have the same objectives of the Industrial Development Corporation with the exception that it would deal only with local businesses.

Lawton stressed the proposed LBDC would:

- 1—Not operate in the same area as the Industrial Development Corporation.
  - 2—It would blend in with the groups now working for economic development of the community.
- "The LBDC will not interfere in any way with the work now being conducted by the Junior Chamber of Commerce or that of the senior chamber and the Retail Merchants Division," said Lawton. "We would like to feel that we would implement the work of these groups rather than deter or duplicate their efforts."

## Hear Rumors of New Industry on Arlen Property

With a water line assured along Lilley Road from Ann Arbor Road to the National Concrete Products Co. plant by recent action of the Plymouth Township Board, rumors are prevalent that Frank Arlen has sold a portion of his carnival grounds acreage for an industrial development.

Arlen, who is head of the Plymouth Industrial Development Corporation which aims to bring industry to the city, has refused comment.

However, the rumors gained credence when he refused permission to the Little League officials for a permit to sponsor the Mills Brothers circus for a single Saturday in early May.

Joseph Bida, Little League president, sought permission for use of the grounds but reportedly was told the land wouldn't be available. Bida is seeking another site for the afternoon and evening performances of the circus.

The Arlen acreage is located in Plymouth Township directly across Lilley Road from the School Board Administration offices and the Veterans of Foreign Wars Home.

# Festival Continuity Plan Gets Approval

Taking a stand that a mere technicality prevented an area planning authority from materializing when this appears to provide the best method of broadening the tax base for the school system as well as units of government, the Plymouth Chamber of Commerce has taken action it hopes will lead to the establishments of a Greater Plymouth Community Planning Authority.

The Chamber Board passed a resolution encouraging the City of Plymouth, Plymouth Township and Canton Township to provide financial support to such an Authority.

The resolution asks the units that cannot provide financial aid to seek ways of providing assistance to the proposed Authority.

The Chamber agrees to participate to the fullest extent of its resources in seeing that the objective of developing and promoting a tax base is successful. It also agrees to suggest a meeting place and create any atmosphere desired for a meeting to aid in an early implementation.

Plans for a Plymouth Community Planning Authority first came to light last fall when the City, School Board and Plymouth and Canton Townships were asked to join in financing such a board with the idea of boosting the tax base by inducing industry to locate in the area through promotion, brochures and other implements.

Under the plans at that time, the School Board was asked to contribute \$7,500; the City and Plymouth Township, \$5,000 each; and Canton Township, \$2,500.

A steering committee, composed of Plymouth former Mayor Harold Guenther, City Commissioner George Lawton, School Board member Ernest Henry, Plymouth Township Treasurer Mrs. Elizabeth Holmes and Phil Dingley, of Canton Township, was named to try to get the project off the ground.

Plymouth's City Commission voted its \$5,000 to show its approval and then waited for action from the other groups.

It was apparent from the start that the School Board carried the key to success of the project. It also was ap-

parent within a short time that the Board, which was non-committal on the subject, wasn't inclined to act quickly.

The Board asked its counsel, Attorney William Sempliner, for an opinion. He opined that the Board could not legally use school tax monies for any other use than school purposes and that a Planning Authority didn't fall into that category.

That put a damper on the project since neither Plymouth Township nor Canton Township was inclined to take any action unless all units participated.

Those interested in the Authority requested State Representative Paul Chandler, publisher of the Observer Newspapers, to secure an opinion from the Attorney General.

This opinion said the School Board could legally participate in the financing of such an Authority. The Attorney General is generally rated as the state's highest legal authority on state statutes.

After reading the Attorney General's opinion, School Board members, who agreed that formation of such an Authority was excellent public relations and could boost the tax base by bringing in industry, indicated they would ask for a referendum rather than take the initiative in allocating funds for such a project.

In an informal discussion following the monthly meeting two weeks ago, the Board members more or less took a stand that they wouldn't get involved in a Planning Authority regardless of what action other governmental units took.

# Plymouth Twp. Board Scans Fire Dept. Reorganization

A special study committee, appointed by Plymouth Township Supervisor Roy Lindsay to scan the Township Fire Department with emphasis on reorganization, has agreed upon four recommendations to the Board following a meeting earlier in the month.

The committee, composed of Trustees Louis Norman, Ralph Garber and Dick Lauterbach, has held meetings with the firemen and the Civil Service Commission with a thought of setting up a chain of command, settling the controversial fire chief problem and wrestling with anticipated negotiations with the recently organized Plymouth Township local of the International Firefighters Association.

In a brief report to the Board Tuesday, the committee indicated it has agreed upon four recommendations to be presented to the Board.

The recommendations include:  
1—That the Board abolish the position of part-time Fire Chief by not appropriating monies in the 1964-5 budget for the position. That the ranking officer of the Fire Department shall continue to serve as acting head until such time that the Board deems it necessary to appoint a full-time department head, fire chief or safety director.

2—Establish ranks within the Fire Department detailing a line of command, the ranks to be filled by appointment of the Supervisor in full compliance with the Civil Service Act.

3—That all Firemen shall have been in service for at least three years before becoming eligible for promotion to Sergeant; must be a sergeant for at least a year before being eligible for promotion to higher ranks.

4—The committee recommends that the pay for a sergeant shall be an additional \$200.

Supervisor Lindsay earlier requested the Civil Service Commission to set up a competitive examination for the post of sergeant.

At the same time, the Trustees denied a request from Capt. Barney Maas for time off and expenses to attend the Fire Department Instructors Conference in Memphis, Tenn. from March 14 through March 27.

Trustee C. Veach Sparks objected on the grounds that the absence of Maas would leave the department without any officer in charge

## Additions Need Early Planning

At last — you've decided to build that new room addition — and just in time to keep your home's seams from exploding.

But — have you decided how you're going to heat the added room? Will it be hooked into the present warm-air system? Is your present heating plant large enough for adding the new room? Do you want electric heat? How about insulation?

These are basic, important questions — so perhaps the first thing to do is to find a home improvement expert to consult with about the entire project, including heating.

If the addition isn't too large, your present heating plant might be adequate to heat the new room, too. If so, your home improvement dealer simply has the hot air ducts or hot water pipes extended into the new room.

But remember that how much heat the new room needs for comfort depends on its size and how well it is insulated. Even if an entirely new system is needed to heat the added room, thorough insulation will pay off in lower fuel bills.

Assuming that you decide the old heating plant won't be adequate, what are your options?

1. All-electric heating of the added room is one possibility. The heaters may be baseboard-type units or recessed into the walls to radiate into the room. Some have blowers that force air over heated elements.
2. A new fuel-burning central plant can be installed that will heat the whole house, including the added room. If your old furnace is due for replacement, this option might make sense.
3. A second fuel-burning furnace or space heater can be installed in a closet of the new room addition, with no connection to your existing heating plant. Usually, this type will be the forced air type, with ducts running in the crawl space under the floor.

## A&P Names Murray Area Sales Chief

Promotion of Robert J. Murray to director of sales of A&P Food Stores' Central Western Division, effective March 2, was announced by Division President Byron Jay.

He will replace Edward A. LePage, who has been elevated to the post of national sales director of the parent company in New York. In his new assignment, Murray will direct sales activities for the division's six-state area extending from Memphis, Tenn. to Sault Ste. Marie, Mich.

Murray has been with the food chain since 1934, starting as a store clerk in his home town of Saginaw. He received his first managerial appointment in 1937 and managed A&P stores in Saginaw, Bay City, Midland and Flint prior to coming to Detroit in 1944.

In Detroit, he was associated with the sales department for six years and was a store supervisor three years. He became assistance sales manager for the Detroit Unit in 1956 and three years later was advanced to sales manager.

In April 1962, he was elevated to field superintendent of the company's Detroit Unit and held this post until last December when he was made assistant director of sales for the Central Western Division.

## MBA Told City Hall Hits Mark

Facing a Sept. 30 deadline for project completion, the Municipal Building Authority, which has charge of the construction and operation of Plymouth's new City Hall received the welcome news from Contractor Ernest Burger that the work is running only a few days behind the time schedule.

Burger expects to get even ahead of the schedule as soon as the weather breaks.

Meanwhile, the MBA first decided on Friday, April 24 as the date for the City Hall cornerstone-laying ceremonies and then indicated a preference for a date during Michigan Week, May 17-23.

There is some possibility that the MBA may hold the cornerstone ceremonies in conjunction with ground-breaking for the new reservoir to make the day one that will long be remembered.

Chairman Harold Guenther reported one of the two homes on Dodge Street, that have to be removed for the new highway skirting the City Hall when completed, was razed last week. The Criger home, second of the dwellings, will be removed by March 1.

In the meantime, DPW workmen started demolition of the city garage, at the rear of the old City Hall, and expected to have the task completed by Wednesday of this week.

The MBA has an Aug. 1 target date for moving the city offices into the building. It plans to tear down the City Hall annex by June 1, the old City Hall by Sept. 15 and have the new road completed and ready for use well in advance of the Sept. 30 deadline.

2. **DARK COLORS** absorb light. They make things look smaller and heavier. They make things seem closer. If used on too large surfaces, they can tend to depress.
3. **BRIGHT COLORS** make areas seem larger than they are. They attract the eye and can be used to draw attention away from unattractive objects. Used in large quantities they can be distracting.
4. **WARM COLORS** — the reds, oranges, yellows and yellow greens — seem to advance toward you. They convey a feeling of warmth and are emotionally stimulating.



There will also be some new valves put in and a few fire hydrants to replace old ones. There will be more about this in a future column.



### Burroughs Experts Teach Youths

## Franklin High Students Find Computers Easy

Kids and computers are compatible.

A joint experiment in "COBOL" by the Burroughs Corporation and Franklin High School of Livonia proved so successful that five seniors have been given the opportunity to proceed with advanced training after completing a "beginners" class conducted at Franklin last fall.

COBOL means "Common Business-Oriented Language"; it is a machine "language" or program, a language in which a program can be written if it is to be solved by a computer. Participation in the jointly sponsored course was strictly voluntary; no credit or other material benefit was offered for the training. To avoid problems of limitation, only seniors in advanced commercial education and advanced mathematics classes were invited to join.

Following an initial meeting in October, sessions were conducted at Franklin High School every Monday, Wednesday and Thursday afternoon for one hour following the regular school schedule. The first few sessions were devoted to orientation with several computer experts assisting Burroughs, psychologist, Dr. Alvin Ugelow, course instructor. All later sessions were supervised only by Dr. Ugelow; during these meetings, students worked with programmed materials provided by the company.

Culminating the concentrated program was a visit to Burroughs' Detroit plant and the presentation of certificates at Franklin. Dr. Felix Kopstein, Director of Auto-Instructional Systems of Burroughs Corporation, presented the awards.

Those who will continue with "advanced" work will

be Kathy Luttinen, Mary Monaghan, Charles Spriggs, James Symons, and Chuck Wilson. In all, 20 of the 31 Franklin students who began the 10-week course completed it and received certificates. Other finishers were Roberta Brozek, David Chambo, Rich Elliott, Maudie Lou Flippen, Charles Hemeyer, Marilyn Hill, George Lahti, Charles Nouhan, George Oliver, Bob Petryk, Guy Potok, Carol Reynolds, Jill Ritchie, Jack Shaw, and Carol Weymouth.

Mutual curiosity provided impetus for and implementation of this test program. Burroughs wanted to know if high-school students could master computer language from the company's programmed learning materials. Franklin wished to provide interested students the opportunity of exposure to some of the problems involved in working

with computers. Furthermore, the school has seriously considered offering to selected students, as part of the school program, actual work with small commercial computers.

The course evolved directly from discussions shared by Dr. Albert Goldberg, Coordinator of Instructional Materials for the Livonia Public Schools; David D. Amerman, Franklin's Principal; Dr. Paul E. Johnson, Livonia's Assistant Superintendent for Instruction; Dr. Alvin Ugelow and Dr. Felix Kopstein, Burroughs representatives; and Charles Zoet, Franklin Research

Director, who coordinated the program. At the present time, Franklin and Burroughs personnel are evaluating the program by the use of questionnaires completed by the participating students and by comparison of the high school students' work with that of Burroughs' own employees.

Among the certainties resulting from the Burroughs-Franklin COBOL experiment was that the students performed much better than had been anticipated. Talented high schoolers, apparently, can feel perfectly at home in the world of computers.

## Plain Facts On Need For R.U. Schools

What do Redford Union children need to insure a complete, full-time, accredited school program?

They need what they've always needed and what R.U. Schools have traditionally provided. They need classes of reasonable size staffed by competent teachers in adequate classrooms. They need books, lights, heat, janitors, and transportation.

All children need general classrooms in which to learn English, reading, math, and social studies. All children need libraries to search for knowledge in many fields.

For one child a shop may provide the most essential training. For another a science laboratory or language room may be more important.

Still other students may need special services such as homebound teaching, classes for hard of hearing, classes for gifted children, or classes for mentally retarded children.

Redford Union Schools has a fine tradition of providing programs to fill the varied needs of all children, regardless of their aptitudes and ambitions.

But this program of quality education is in jeopardy.

Two urgent needs must be filled if we are to continue a program of the right education for every child:

1. More space must be provided for junior high school and high school students.
2. More operating money must be found to operate schools for all children from kindergarten through twelfth

grade.

Why must we have more space for our children to learn? Because we have more children to educate. Our school-age population has grown from 11,703 in 1960 to 13,327 in 1963.

Our seven grade schools are near capacity but appear to be adequate to fill the needs of elementary children in the foreseeable future. The grade school population seems to be about steady now.

But large classes are advancing from grade schools and parochial schools into junior high schools. As this happens, junior high school buildings are becoming overcrowded. The school census indicates that this situation will become worse.

As the larger junior high school classes move up to high school, Redford Union is becoming overcrowded. Most tenth-grade students are on less than full-day programs. This situation threatens to become worse.

Enrollment in grades seven to 12 grew from 2,762 in 1959 to 3,733 in 1963. By 1968 at least 4,160 students are expected.

A proposal to add and equip rooms at Pearson Junior High School and Redford Union High School would provide enough space for at least five years.

A bond issue of \$1,750,000 would build and equip 23 rooms at Redford Union High School and 15 rooms at Pearson Junior High School. The cost of these bonds would not increase taxes because it would be covered by continuing a levy for a bond issue to be paid off this year.

Why do the schools need

more income to continue good education? It costs more today to educate our boys and girls than it did five years ago.

Obviously, as the school population has increased it has cost more to educate more children.

Our greatest increase in students has been in the upper grades, however, and it costs more to educate children at this level. Older children studying more advanced and more specialized courses need to be taught in smaller classes requiring more teachers in more rooms with more expensive supplies.

The cost for instruction goes up each year. An increasing salary schedule competitive with neighboring school districts is necessary to keep a competent faculty.

School costs everywhere have been rising along with living costs. It costs us more yearly for heat, light, water and supplies.

The yearly cost per R.U. school child in the 1963 audit was \$425.31, which is lower than in Detroit and in most of our neighboring school systems.

Total costs are now exceeding revenue in the Redford Union School District. This year the operating cost of all school activities will be approximately \$4,400,000, with an estimated income of about \$4,120,000. This means we are spending \$280,000 more than we are taking in. This deficit is being made up this year by drawing from the school district's bank account or operating surplus, which will be depleted soon.

We must increase our income or drastically cut our expenditures. This would mean cuts in personnel, including our teaching staff, which would mean larger classes. There would be less money for supplies and equipment.

The 3 1/2 mill operating tax increase, which will bring in approximately \$250,000, will go a long way toward closing the gap between expenditures and income. It is hoped that with additional state aid we can close the gap. We are now operating at a level of expenditures that would require 3 1/2 mills extra to balance the budget.

In other words it now costs more than our income to provide the basic school programs at Redford Union Schools.

The voter is asked to approve a 3.5 mill operating tax increase on March 2. This levy would increase taxes at the rate of \$5.25 per thousand dollars assessed valuation.

The alternative to increasing classroom space in the upper grades is more half days in Redford Union High School, and at Pearson and Lola Valley as well. Our North Central accreditation would be in doubt.

The losers would be our children.

Redford Union has always supported its children with proper school programs.

Scott McIntyre hit for four baskets and Fred Matevia five points to pace Bentley in the



As a result of the weekend conquests, Clarenceville now is assured at least a .500 season for regular play.

Two tough league efforts remain. This Friday Clarenceville goes to Clarkston, then winds up the following Friday at Bloomfield Hills. Clarkston and Bloomfield Hills currently share first place in the league.

Here are two more dates for preps to jot down: May 9—the annual Detroit Tiger baseball clinic at Tiger Stadium; Aug. 31—the day when prep footballers can start drills next fall.

Did you know that the state prep association also conducts two regional ski meets and a state gymnastics meet? How come, then, no state high school baseball tournament is held in Michigan? Such a tourney is held in other states in the Midwest.
