Honest Abe came to Michigan to make a political speech in behalf of someone else-John Fremont, the GOP presidential candidate in 1856. Lincoln spoke in Kalamazoo outdoors, at Bronson Park, on Aug. 27,

The Republican party was new and the burning issue of the time was the Kansas-Nebraska Act of 1854, which opened up new territory for the spread of slavery. There was a slogan: "Free speech, free press, free soil, code.) free men with FREMONT!"

Michigan had a third party known as the "Know Nothings" going hot at that time, and it was stealing votes from the GOP's Fremont. Millard Fillmore was the Know-Nothing candidate. If Fremont and Fillmore could have joined forces against the Democrat James Buchanan, then Mr. Lincoln's candidate would have made it. Instead the final vote showed: Buchanan -1.838.169; Fremont — 1.341.264; Fillmore — 874,534. Lincoln told his Kalamazoo listeners, "The ques-

tion can be avoided in but two ways. By the one, we must submit and allow slavery to triumph, or by the other, we must triumph over the black demon."



The ance Clinic" care of The Ob. diagnosis of disturbance in server, 33050 Five Mile Road, children is much akin to the diagnosis of physical ailments in that we look for symptoms indicative of problems. In physical ailments the symptoms of problems include pain, fever, nausea, inflammation, and skin irritation. In emotional disturbance, we observe such symptoms as retardation in learning; conduct disorders such as lying, stealing, fire setting, vandalism, truancy, punitive and sadistic acts; personality disorders such as withdrawal, excessive day dreaming, nail biting, thumb sucking, bed wetting, and the like; and in more severe cases attempts at suicide and homicide.

> Q: Are all children who exhibit such symptoms emotionally disturbed?

A: Definitely not. Almost all children show some signs of emotional disturbance at one time or another in the process of growth and development. Emotional disturbance can be compared to virus attacks on the upper respiratory system which vary from the common cold to pneumonia. Emotional problems should be given special attention when they become sufficiently repetitious or severe as to be a real problem for the child, his parents, and his associates.

Q: What are the advantages of having a child treated at a



# Plymouth Twp. Board Scans Fire Dept. Reorganiza

A special study committee, appointed by Plymouth Township Supervisor Roy Lindsay to scan the Township Fire Department with emphasis on reorganization, has agreed upon four recommendations to the Board following a meeting earlier in the month.

The committee, composed of Trustees Louis Norman, Ralph Garber and Dick Lauterbach, has held meetings with the firemen and the Civil Service Commission with a thought of setting up a chain of command, settling the controversial fire chief problem and wrestling with anticipated negotiations with the recently organized Plymouth Township local of the International Firefighters Association.

In a brief report to the Board Tuesday, the committee indicated it has agreed upon four recommendations to be presented to the Board.

The recommendations include: 1-That the Board abolish the position of part-time Fire Chief by not appropriating monies in the 1964-5 budget for the position. That the ranking officer of the Fire Department shall continue to serve as acting head until such time that the Board deems it necessary to appoint a full-time department head, fire chief or safety director.

2-Establish ranks within the Fire Department detailing a line of command, the ranks to be filled by appointment of the Supervisor in full compliance with the Civil Service Act.

3 - That all Firemen shall have been in service for at least three years before becoming eligible for promotion to Sergeant; must be a sergeant for at least a year before being eligible for promotion to higher ranks.

4-The committee recommends that the pay for a sergeant shall be an additional \$200.

Supervisor Lindsay earlier requested the Civil Service Commission to set up a competitive examination for the post of sergeant.

At the same time, the Trustees denied a request from Capt. Barney Maas for time off and expenses to attend the Fire Department Instructors Conference in Memphis, Tenn. from March 14 through March

Trustee C. Veach Sparks objected on the grounds that the absence of Maas would leave the department without any officer in charge



Johnson and Anderson, the City consultant engineers, have had field crews in town and are getting plans ready for the water works improvements. This is in regards to replacing all old four-inch water mains with a larger size, for increased pressures and better distribu-


