# Swim Club Faces Problem Over Rezoning

Unless sponsors of the proposed Colony Swim Club Inc., a private swim and recreational facility with a membership limited to 300 families from the Plymouth Community, look for a new site, the prospects of opening in early July appear rather dim.

The non-profit organization, which already has received initial fees of \$300 from more than 200 families, requested permission to install swimming facilities for the club from the Plymouth Township planning commission last week and learned that it will probably be three months before a final decision.

Trustee Joseph Fletcher, 12176 Amherst Court, represented the proposed club and made the application for the construction of \$120,000 non-profit, private club facilities at the site on the southwest corner of Ann Arbor Trail and Beck Roads. The club has an option on 8.5 acres there.

Fletcher, who had discussed the application

with Township Clerk John McEwen earlier, was much dismayed when told by Chairman Irving Rozian that the application was out of order since a petition for rezoning should have been filed first.

Rozian pointed out, after a conference with other members of the board, that the Township ordinance requires a C-2 zoning for a private club. The land in question is zoned R-1-E, country estates district.

Furthermore, Rozian told Fletcher that rezoning requires study by the board, a resolution for an open hearing and then the planning recommendation is turned over to the Township Board for final decision.

During the course of the conversation, it was brought out that the proposed swim club site is only a short distance from the Mango Inn where the board turned down a request for a C-2 zoning last month.

All of which means that Fletcher and his

associates will have to take their chances on waiting for at least three months and go through an opening hearing with the prospects that the project may be rejected.

That's why those close to the project are thinking of seeking a new site within the confines of the City of Plymouth or in a C-2 zoned plot in the township.

After due consideration, the planning board decided to refer the matter to Township Attorney Earl Demel for a ruling and tabled the matter until the April 15 meeting.

Prior to the ruling by Rozian, Fletcher had told the board that the plans called for the Club to sink a well for water until such time as the Township's lines were extended to the area of the land.

He indicated a Ferndale architect had designed the proposed facilities and that the sponsors hoped to have the swimming pool in operation by early July.

"This club would be used approximately 90 days each summer," Fletcher said. "We already have the initial fees of 200 families and have an additional 200 on a waiting list. Under our original plans, we wanted to limit the membership to 300."

The facilities would feature a 25-meter pool with two 30 by 30-foot eels for diving and training non-swimmers.

Adjoining the pool would be a colonial bath house and future plans call for picnic area, shuffleboard courts and tennis courts.

However, there was another note of warning for Fletcher and his associates. The meeting attracted a large gathering of residents of the area surrounding the proposed site and the feeling seemed to be that few if any were in favor of a spot zoning for the construction of a private club, swimming pool or anything else other than something that met the requirements of a R-1-E zoning.

# Delay Apartment Rezoning

The question of whether Stewart Oldford and Sons will receive an opportunity to build apartment buildings at the northwest corner of Sheldon and Ann Arbor Roads in Plymouth Township is still as much in the air today as it was prior to last week's public hearing

before the planning commission. More than 75 jammed the Township Hall for the meeting and listened intently for more than an hour as spokesmen and residents of the area expressed their sentiments against the

proposed rezoning of the area from single dwelling to multiple dwelling.

There wasn't any question at the end of the hearing as to the feeling of the property owners in the area—all were opposed. However, there is considerable question in the

minds of the nine-member commission which voted to table the matter pending further study.

It was the second time the commission has held hearings on the proposed rezoning. The first was on a small parcel at the extreme north section of

the acreage and then the second was on the remaining land—it came after Oldford had presented a second petition.

The Commission voted to consider the two petitions as one and then a resolution to table the matter until a later meeting.

"It isn't that we are trying to duck out of a decision at this time," said Chairman Irving Rozian, "but it is the opinion of this commission that we need more time for study—especially after learning the feelings of the residents in the area."

Those speaking against the rezoning included: Robert Myers, Clare Blvd.; Scott Harris, Albert Simkins, developer of the adjoining Park Lane subdivision who bitterly opposed the spot zoning; Mrs. Joseph Rogers, David Leaverton, Clarence Alandt, Mrs. Marie Okain, Cecil Sharrard and John Breatham.

Representatives of the Cam Chem. Co. appeared before the board to seek permission to build an industrial building on a site located on old Schoolcraft Road. After considerable discussion, the representative asked the commission to drop his request since he felt he wasn't getting satisfaction.

Later the representative appealed to Supervisor Roy Lindsay who took steps to assure him that the Township would do everything possible to keep him and his proposed plant in the township. At last reports, Cam Chem Co. was again considering plans to build and add another small plant to the area.

In other actions at the lengthy meeting which took more than five hours, the Commission:

Approved a public hearing on April 15 for the rezoning of land near the Plymouth Bowl to R-3 for the construction of apartment units by Birckelbaw and Herman.

Tabled a request from Virginia Appelfoh for rezoning property located on the east side of Ridge Road between Powell and Ann Arbor Roads from agriculture to country estates district.

Tabled a request from Ten Mile Lakes Building Co. for rezoning for subdivision purposes approximately 433 acres including a lake in the Ann Arbor Road-Napier Road section.

Ordered a public hearing on April 15 on a petition from George Rubin of Detroit for rezoning the land at the southwest corner of Ann Arbor and Sheldon Roads from single dwelling to commercial.

Accepted a petition from JAR Corporation for rezoning 43.24 acres on the east side of Beck Road between Joy Road and the Woodlore subdivision from country estates district to suburban residential district.

## School Board Future Plans Include New High School By 1970

Plymouth's school board is thinking of a new high school in 1970, a new elementary school by 1967, expansion of the existing facilities at Farrand and Allen schools within a year and a 12-room addition to the present senior high building in two phases for much needed vocational education by 1966.

That's what more than 200 parents of fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth graders were told by Board President Gerald Fischer in a panel discussion Monday night at Junior High West sponsored by the school's Parent-Teacher-Student-Association.

Billed as a meeting to inform parents of the reasons for the transfer of all sixth grades to Junior High West at the start

of the 1964-5 term, the panel included: Fischer, Supt. Russell Isbister, Principal William Harding and Board Secretary Mrs. Esther Hulsing.

The plans for next fall will have all sixth and seventh graders at Junior High West and all eighth and ninth graders at Junior High East.

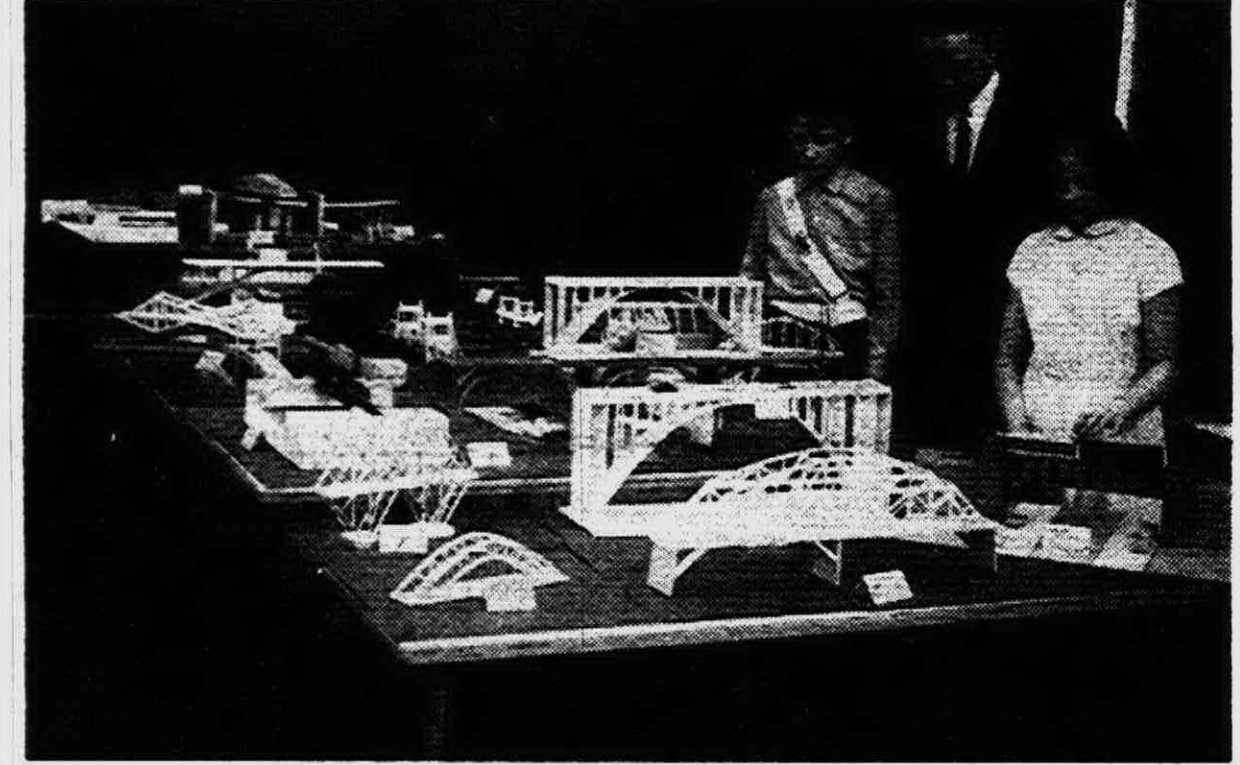
Fischer reiterated that it was only a temporary measure until such time that the enrollment in the 7 through 9 grades would use all space at the junior highs and facilities in the elementary schools were capable of taking care of grades through the sixth year.

When that stage is reached, then the system will go back to the Kindergarten through six in the elementary schools, 7 through 9 in the junior highs and 10 through 12 in the senior high.

"We on the Board are trying to keep up the high quality of education in the Plymouth school system without excessive tax burden on property owners," Fischer said. "We feel the community can attract industry with a reasonable tax rate, good schools and a high level of education."

This was his answer to the Board's building and financing fund plan of site sinking which is being used in the expansion program.

Isbister explained the reasons behind the shifts and the reasons for the double run of buses; Harding told of the reasoning behind the 6-7, 8-9 program; and Mrs. Hulsing explained the Board's constant study for a better curriculum.

## Smith School Proud Of Its "Engineers"

It may be a bit early to hand out tips about the future but area plants constantly on the lookout for promising engineers could well take a second look at the group of sixth graders taught by John Donegan at Smith School.

At least that's the impression

of all who visited the classroom last week to inspect the display of more than 23 different types of bridges constructed by the youngsters (in miniature models) as part of a class project on the theme of "Engineers at Work."

It seemed like a little more than one could expect from sixth graders when Donegan made the original assignments. But even he was amazed when the students, all between the ages of 11 and 12, began bringing back the beautifully designed and skillfully constructed bridges.

Matter of fact, Supt. Isbister was astounded with the models when he made a tour of inspection at the invitation of Principal Ruth Eriksson.

"I have seen some excellent work by sixth grade youngsters on previous visits to the various schools," he said, "but these bridges were so perfect that one just had to think they were made by engineering students at a much higher level. It appears as if there are quite a few engineers of the future in this class."

Stewart Dodge, 12, son of Mr. and Mrs. Stewart Dodge, 1327 S. Main and Connie Woodward, 11, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Woodward, 860 Palmer, served as guides and spokesmen for the sixth graders in displaying the unusual models.

It was a four-week project for the class and all 33 students joined in with the result that all 33 turned in models of 23 different types of bridges.

Some took as many as three weeks to put the bridges together, showing evidence of the pride they took in doing a good job.

ous span, beam, arch, bowstring arch, cantilever, suspension, covered, Basque lift, rope, swing with motor, double swing, draw and pontoon bridges.

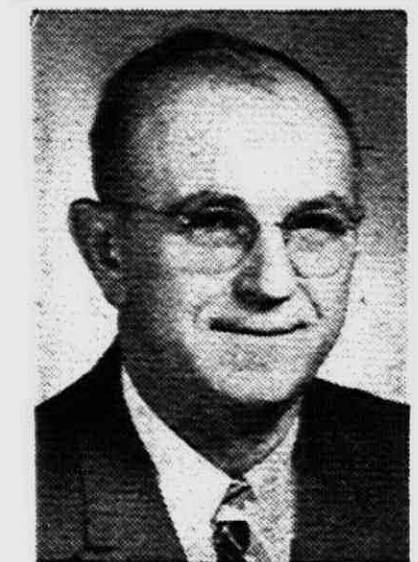
serve as toastmaster and Harold Guenther, former Plymouth Mayor, past president of the Rotary Club and Chamber of Commerce, will deliver the principal address.

LANSING—It was a stupid Bill involving community colleges that they were debating in the Michigan House of Representatives last Friday and I got up on my feet to complain about it.

When I sat down somebody seemed to have shut off breathing, turned on the perspiration valves and turned off the energy serum.

In stages I managed to get to the back of the chamber and into the elevator and then to the first aid room. And then, in increasingly accelerated order, under a doctor's stethoscope, ambulance, and hospital.

It was one of the most predicted coronary attacks of all time... namely, mine.

It has been building for at least the full eight years that I have been trying to build newspapers and help communities in this area, working around the clock and around the calendar in defiance of all good medical rules.

In recent days the exhaustion and the anxiety and the stress—not a little of it generated by this tragic Livonia pension mess—has been over-powering.

Through the years many friends have wondered why I would assume so much hard work and it has always been a little hard to explain to outsiders.

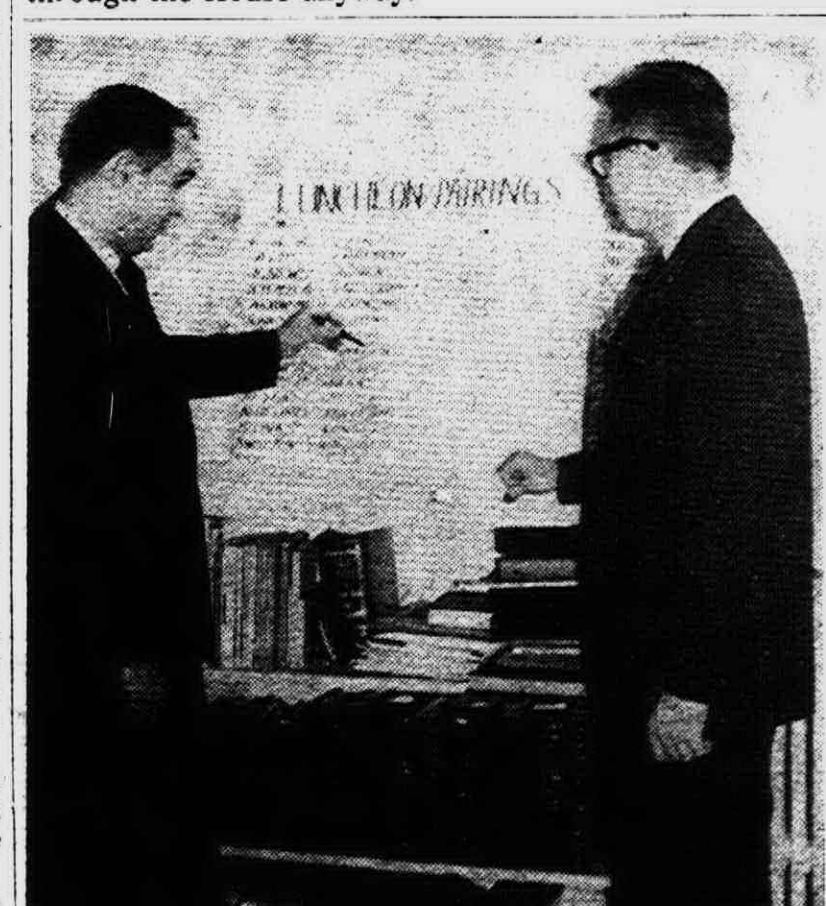
I have always known the answer for my own purposes and sometimes I would try to laugh it off and say, "Why do people climb mountains? Simply because they are there to climb, and they feel the urge to do it."

To others with whom I am more familiar, I tried to explain my belief that since I am only going to live once, I want my community to have been a little better for my having passed through than if I had't, and that hard work was the main thing I had to throw into the contest.

While lying on my back here in Sparrow Hospital I've read a lot of newspapers and in the Ann Landers column I ran upon a paragraph she has found among President Kennedy's speeches:

"A man does what he must, in spite of personal emergencies, in spite of obstacles, danger, pressures... and that is the basis of all human morality."

Which gets the job done of explaining I hope. The devil of it is that the crazy college bill passed through the House anyway.

# Area Red Cross Workers Participate In Disaster Clinic

More than 175 volunteer members of the Detroit Red Cross Disaster Organization including 10 from the Redford-Livonia-Plymouth area participated in a Disaster Institute recently designed to evaluate their preparedness should disaster strike in the Wayne County areas served by the chapter.

Following a disaster-type dinner served by Red Cross Chapter volunteers, the Disaster Institute members heard Enso Bighinatti, Assistant Director, Disaster Services, American Red Cross in Washington, speak on disaster action locally, nationally and internationally.

Originally scheduled to speak was Robert Edson, National Director of Disaster Services, who remained in Washington because of the Ohio Valley flood situation.

In commending the Detroit Chapter on its highly organized preparedness program, Bighinatti likened the Disaster Institute to the type of meeting that would be held immediately following a disaster strike in Detroit or surrounding areas.

"Disaster," said Bighinatti, "is not a responsibility of Disaster Services alone. It is a total American Red Cross responsibility. There is one Red Cross. When disaster strikes we are, each and every one of us, involved."

In discussing Red Cross disaster relief work, Bighinatti emphasized the need for organization, upon which mobility and strength depend. He pointed out

the importance of survey in assessing damage, casualties and need.

He spoke of the two major phases in disaster relief — emergency and recovery. The emergency phase is involved

with immediate needs, such as food, clothing and shelter given on a mass care basis. In the recovery phase, registrations are taken for aid in rehabilitation and the long road back to normal living again.

Through continual research carried on in conjunction with Michigan State University, and review of disaster experiences, the Red Cross has been able to make considerable progress in speeding up

casework and in processing requests for aid. Continued improvement in coordinating disaster workers and streamlining areas of authority and responsibility are part of the work of Disaster Services,

said Bighinatti. Maintaining public trust and fulfilling the public's expectations are foremost among Red Cross responsibilities. Smooth operation in time of disaster confirms the public's confidence

and allows for greater success when, in time of need, everyone must work calmly together.

Whether in wartime or time of natural disaster such as the Ohio Valley floods which affected over 110,000 persons, the

strength of Red Cross and its ability to give relief and long-term recovery help to victims depends on expert organization and unity between all Red Cross individuals in all areas of Red Cross activity.

# 50,000 Volunteers To Aid In Mass Polio Immunization

More than 50,000 volunteers are being sought for the mass anti-polio campaign scheduled for Sunday, April 19 and again on Sunday, June 14, when the medical societies of Wayne, Oakland and Macomb counties hope to immunize as many as four million persons in the tri-county area.

Dr. Francis Rhoads, of Detroit, speaking for the tri-county medical associations in a press-radio-television kickoff luncheon last week, announced that assurances of all-out cooperation already have been received from scores of organizations in

the area including the Wayne, Oakland and Macomb County Osteopathic Associations.

Dr. Stephen Mihalich, president, and Dr. Raymond Gadowski, secretary-treasurer of the Wayne County Osteopathic Association attended the luncheon.

"All three of the Osteopathic Associations in the area are cooperating," said Dr. Mihalich, "and we expect to have the full support of 550 physicians from the metropolitan district serving the various stations."

Dr. Mihalich said the osteopaths have cooperated in previ-

ous drives with the Wayne County Medical Society—in two polio inoculation campaigns and in the diphtheria drive of several years ago.

Other organizations pledging cooperation are the Nurses and Pharmacists Associations of the three counties.

Immunization stations will be set up in schools throughout the three counties.

The Detroit area program is part of a campaign being conducted on a community-by-community basis to wipe out polio throughout the country.

Although the nation is now

relatively free of this dread paralyzing disease, health authorities warn that polio runs in waves. There is always the danger of an outbreak. Health authorities feel mass immunization programs will eliminate that danger and make polio as rare as vaccinations have made smallpox.

Chairman of the campaign in Wayne County is Dr. Rhoads, who is chairman of the Wayne County Medical Society's Public Health Committee.

In Macomb County, the campaign is headed by Dr. Gerald Morris. The Oakland County

chairman is Dr. Worth W. Henderson, with Dr. Robert Bookmyer, as co-chairman.

They emphasize that all persons over the age of one year should take the two doses, regardless of previous immunization through Salk shots or oral vaccine.

The vaccine to be used in the Detroit program is Orimune, made by the Lederle Laboratories, a division of the American Cyanamid Company.

It is the relatively new trivalent type vaccine. That is, it provides protection against all three strains of poliovirus.

Earlier oral vaccines were monovalent, providing protection against one strain and requiring three dosages six weeks apart to be completely effective. Only two doses of the trivalent vaccine are needed, and protection starts two to three weeks after the first dose.

The vaccine will be given in liquid form on sugar cubes. It is pleasant tasting, designed to appeal particularly to children, who are the most susceptible to polio.

There are no harmful after-effects.

A donation of 50 cents or

more will be asked of each person receiving the vaccine, but the medical societies stress that no one will be turned away because of lack of funds.

The funds will go for administrative costs of the project and for the vaccine. All of the work at the immunization stations will be performed free, with doctors and other professional personnel donating their services, and volunteers supervising registration.

It is estimated that 30 to 40 persons will be required to man each station. Participating will

be physicians, nurses, pharmacists, the women's auxiliaries of the medical societies, PTAs, and the Boy and Girl Scouts to handle the lineups.

About 900 stations will be set up, with each expected to handle 3,000 to 5,000 persons.

In miles, Pleasantville, Iowa, is a long way from South Redford School District. In similarity of problems, it is not so far away at all. In fact, they have much in common. Many of the Pleasantville townspeople now ruefully admit that they were "asleep at the last election."

Pleasantville has a sign as you enter that says "1,023 friendly people live here—and a few knuckleheads, too." Well knuckleheads have to live someplace and they certainly do. Believe me, Redford Township has its share.

In Pleasantville the town is divided and they are now calling each other Communists or John Birchers, 19 of the town's 34 teachers have quit, and replacements cannot be found to teach 700 children.

The N.E.A.-affiliated Iowa State Education Association has urged all teachers to refuse jobs in Pleasantville. The Iowa House of Representatives has voted unanimously to investigate.

If you think this sounds strange and far off—well, it is in miles, but the same situation is knocking at the door of South Redford School District right now.

Birch member Virginia Crawford has not put her name on the ballot as yet, but she demanded to be appointed to fill a vacancy made by a resigning Board member, who resigned because of above mentioned tactics.

MacGriff and his allies are doing everything possible (including defeating the last issue of 10 renewable mills and four additional mills) to try to start a hate war in South Redford.

A group of parents petitioned the Board to return to the ballot in April. Maybe it is not too late. Pleasantville would like another chance.

Birch Society members distribute literature in Livonia and Plymouth too, but so far have made no inroads.

Extremists will never go out of style completely in this country. We have freedom of speech, so why should they? But as long as they are labeled so, the average of us can recognize the rightists, the leftists, the pristine, the communists or the Birchers, as long as we recognize and VOTE—therein lies the danger—THEY, the left, and the right and the reds and the pures ALWAYS vote and those of us that like our Country the way it is—our homes—our schools—and our church and God—had better get out and do the same.

# Observer Hails Prep Cage All Stars

Selected by the coaches and other officials who have paid close attention to the prep cage scene, here are the top five players:

Dave Graves, Clarenceville  
Tom DeWitt, Redford Union  
Bill Bollin, Bentley  
Jerry Samuelian, Thurston  
Cal Luibrand, Plymouth.

Two of the players, Graves and Bollin, drew acclaim on the all-area teams announced a week ago by The Detroit News. Graves was placed on the News' All North-Area team, while Bollin was placed on the News' All-West team.

Following is a rundown on the feats recorded by the five players honored on the Observer's All-Area Team:

**GRAVES** — A three-year standout on the Clarenceville varsity. Was picked on the All-Wayne Oakland League team as an unanimous choice. Averaged just under 20 points and 17.3 rebounds during the 1963-64 season. Was the team captain and most valuable player.

Said Coach Jim Leary of Graves: "This kid really worked. He was easy to coach and reacted well to every suggestion and to every situation. He helped us break even during the season." Graves has been an all-around great at Clarenceville.

He won all-league honors at fullback in football and also is the defending league high hurdles track champion.

**DEWITT** — Another three-year varsity letter-winner on the hardwood. This 200-pounder scored 313 points during the recent season and also hauled in 292 rebounds to set a new record in the latter category. The old rebounding mark of 264 was held by Len LaPla, the ex-R. U. great.

Coach Milo Karhu described DeWitt as "a 100-percent player, who gave everything he had every second he was on the floor." DeWitt averaged 43 per cent on his shots from the floor and 70 per cent from the charity line. His high rebounding game was 20 against Bentley early in the season. DeWitt ran on the R. U. cross country team last fall and is preparing now to represent his school in the half mile in the forthcoming track season.

**BOLLIN**—One of the most discussed prep athletes the area has produced in recent years. A foot injury kept him inactive during a great part of the 1963-64 season. He came back in time to help Bentley beat Allen Park in the school's key game which decided the Suburban Six League title in Bentley's favor.

Then he helped Bentley win the District Crown for the second straight year. Scored an average of 20 points per

game. His rebounding average was 15 per game. Played on the Bentley varsity for three years. He has been recommended for appointments to either the Naval or Air Force Academies. Plans to accept one or the other.

**SAMUELIAN**: Captain and most valuable member of his Thurston team, despite the fact he was one of the smallest players on the floor. Excellent shot, canning 110 out of 230 tries as he finished with 259 points for a 17-point average. His high game was 35 points against Ecorse. He also hauled in 105 rebounds, although it wasn't his job to crash the boards.

Hailed by Coach Mike

Pasternak for his defensive work: "We used Jerry as our chaser in our zone defense," he declared. "We always put him on the other team's best player, and Jerry always came through in fine style." Samuelian's consistency also drew compliments from his coach. Samuelian was a fine driver on the court and boasted an excellent pop shot from 10-15 feet out. Played football for Thurston and also is the league's No. 1 broad jumper in track.

**LUIBRAND**: Voted along with Gary Grady as the most valuable member of the Plymouth team. Averaged 13 points per game and operated as a center and forward, al-

though he usually spotted his rivals from three to four inches. Notwithstanding his size, Luibrand led the Rocks in rebounding.

"It was amazing at times how Cal would get up there and snatch the ball away from much taller foes," declared Rocks Coach Charles Ketterer.

Named on the Observer's second Area team were: John Page (Thurston), Larry Duffield (Franklin), Ben Maebach (Redford Union), Fred Matevia (Bentley), and Gary Grady (Plymouth).

Graves, Bollin, Samuelian, Page, Duffield, DeWitt and Luibrand all received honorable mention acclaim on The Detroit News all-state team last Saturday.

Sentimentality usually has no place in this sports offering. But you couldn't blame a typewriter puncher for saying an extra prayer just before Detroit Northern took the floor against Benton Harbor in the finals of the state Class A basketball tournament up at East Lansing last Saturday night.

We had to pull for Northern. And on several counts. After all, we happened to go to Northern and should we say that we were a member of the Class of '35? (This has to give away our age).

Then, too, the Saturday night game was to mark the end of the coaching line for one of the state's greatest mentors—Eddie Powers. For some 40 years, Powers has been turning out fine, young athletes. He spent his first six or seven years up at Pontiac Central . . . and the went to Detroit Northern to stay.

As you know by now, Northern didn't win. Benton Harbor came on with a strong rally to turn back Northern.

Even in defeat, Powers had to be the toast of the Detroit-area coaching community. He had brought back the Detroit Public School League, as far as state competition was concerned, and given a highly-favored team more than it bargained for.

It was a great day and night for the Detroit area. River Rouge cleaned up its fourth straight Class B title.

Grosse Pointe St. Paul copped the laurels in Class C. And, Charley Forsythe, the state director, gave out a hint that the day may not be too far away when the state windup in basketball is moved into Detroit to take advantage of the facilities available at Olympia, Cobo Arena and the U. of D. Memorial Building.

This is something we suggested last year and the year before that. It is our feeling that the state prep classic has outgrown the Lansing area.

Wonder how much truth there is to the rumor that Basketball Coach Bob Bentley of Franklin was hanged in effigy the other day.

We realize that all rumors aren't facts, but somehow nothing that happens around Franklin High would surprise the operator of these words.

Somebody along Joy Road seems to have the wrong notion when it comes to high school sports.

There were squawks last fall because Franklin didn't win all of its football games. Even though Jack Hudnut turned out a team which was in contention for the league crown and wound up by showing rival Bentley a few things, one heard moans and sobs around Franklin.

It was pretty much the same in basketball during the campaign which ended a few weeks back.

The complainers seem to forget that Franklin has been in operation less than two years . . . that high school sports history in Michigan shows that it usually takes a new school from four to six years before it starts to turn out power-houses in athletics.

Sports tradition just doesn't develop overnight. Nor can the greatest coach — and Franklin has boasted two of the best in Hudnut for football and Bentley for basketball — bring forth winners without the horses.

We suspect that somebody had the notion that all of Livonia's finest athletes have lived — and still live — on the south side . . . which would mean that Franklin would attract the bulk of the standouts.

Obviously, this isn't true. The good athletes are spread around Livonia. You'll find them at Franklin . . . at Bentley . . . at Clarenceville.

Despite all of its great tradition, Bentley has had some problems in the last couple of years since the split cost the Five Mile Road school many athletes to Franklin.

But Bentley has started to recover and in due time Franklin will climb the highest pedestal. However, it's not going to help the situation around Franklin if the bystanders protest and complain.

Just take it easy at Franklin. Your day in the sun will come . . . maybe sooner than you expect.

## Bentley Shy on Veterans

The job of rebuilding the Bentley High school baseball team has started.

So far Coach Roger Hanton has had to conduct drills indoors, which has handicapped his efforts with a major task ahead.

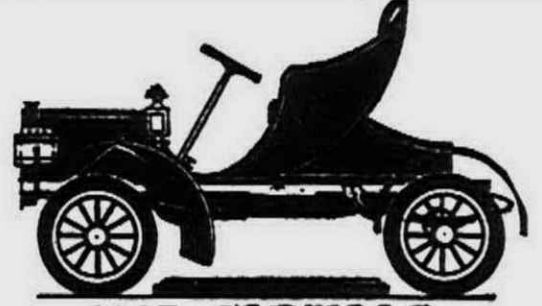

Was life so much easier in the old days? Maybe yes. Maybe no. It all depends on what you have in mind. If you're thinking about your income tax return, yes. If you're thinking about fixing up the lawn, no.

I remember, and it wasn't so long ago that, when there were three things we had to do every Spring no matter what. First we had to fill the big heavy roller with water and trundle it over every inch of lawn. Then we had to spread lime. A nasty, messy job if ever there was one. And then we had to get down on hands and knees and grub out old crabgrass plants. How we kids hated that.

**Lumber Paneling Makes Good Divider**

Solid lumber paneling is not only distinctive in and of itself, but it can also create distinctions between activity areas within a room.

The lines of demarcation which can be achieved with wall paneling may be either visual or physical.

To visually separate different activity areas, certain walls or sections of walls may be paneled while the remaining wall space is left unpaneled. In this way, a specific area of the room becomes the focal point.

**Fireplace Wall**  
An example of this sort of visual delineation would be the treatment of a fireplace wall on which the mantle itself is kept simple. The center of interest is created through the effective contrast between the brick or stone of the fireplace and the vertical rise of the paneling.

Similarly, an unusual collection of paintings or other wall hangings could be displayed to advantage against a wall paneled with solid lumber—such as clear, vertical grain Larch from the Western Pine region.

To emphasize a study corner in a larger room—a family or living room, for instance—that corner might be paneled in knotty Ponderosa Pine and bookcases built-in, thereby creating a comfortable room within a room. In like manner, a difficult alcove might be transformed into a distinctive and distinct dining area simply by installing

handsomely patterned paneling on its three walls.

It is also possible to differentiate between activity areas in a room where all the walls are paneled by using a different installation design or pattern on the featured wall.

Thus, in a room where vertical paneling has been used throughout, the fireplace wall might be done in horizontal or even diagonal paneling. In using the same wood species, but varying the installation, the differentiation can be achieved without disrupting the integrity of the decor.

**Room Dividers**  
The alternative to visual demarcation is physical separation via paneled screens and room dividers. These devices are more definitive than is the paneled feature wall, but as they are usually neither solid nor built to ceiling height, they divide space but do not enclose it.

For instance, many of today's homes are not designed with entrance foyers, nor are the living rooms such that they will stand being chopped off with a solid wall to create an entrance hall. However, an effective entrance can be achieved with a divider built of solid lumber.

Such a divider might be a simple screen of vertical White Fir 1 x 2's, or something of a lattice-work nature. Or it might be a series of shelves at random intervals which could accommo-

date plants or a collection of glassware and china.

**Dining Areas**  
Another area in which the solid lumber screen can produce effective results is in the case of the non-existent dining room. Rather than simply establish one end of the living room as a dining area, it is possible to construct a handsome and not-

too-space-consuming divider which would serve, on both sides, as a backdrop for furniture. This sort of divider is most effective if it is solid perhaps two-thirds of the way up and open from there to the ceiling.

Open-work screens can also be used to span the wide opening between two definite rooms where the opening is an alter-

nate entrance that is not used, but shouldn't be sealed off with a solid door.

# 'Curtain Going Up'

Shakespeare's glory and fame, always in ascendancy, will reach new heights in the month ahead. April is his official birth month. Four hundred years ago Master Will Shakespeare first saw the light of day in jolly, old England.

To help celebrate the event radio and TV folks have planned numerous theatrical tributes. On Channel 9's Festival TV program (Wednesdays at 9:30 p.m.) three Shakespearean events have been scheduled. On April 8 a two-hour production of "Twelfth Night" is already set. "Hamlet," a three-hour version with Christopher Plummer, will grace the small screen on April 15. This version of the dreary Dane was filmed on location at Elsinore Castle in Denmark. You can't get much closer to the ghost of Hamlet's father. Finally, the Verdi opera, "Othello" will be sung in English for the first time on April 22. Personally, I like my "Othello" in the prose, non-singing version, but I'm willing to tune in and see what Verdi has done with this powerful tragic love story. I'll admit it's perfect fare for the larger dimensions of the operatic stage.

On the Wayne State Campus Dr. Leonard Leone and his enthusiastic corps of workers continue to honor Shakespeare with their nightly performances in the Hilberry Classical Theater. Old Wally finally found time to attend a performance in the Hilberry Theater. "Romeo and Juliet" was the play. And you know even if Shakespeare did say, "The play's the thing," I'm afraid that any production of "Romeo and Juliet" needs less play and more thing-a-ma-jigs to surround the thin plot.

At the beginning of "Romeo" a member of the company makes the announcement about the differences between the Montagues and Capulets and indicates we will see the results of such a bitter struggle. He specifically indicates that the drama will unfold in a "two hour traffic upon this stage." My only complaint after seeing various versions of "Romeo" is that no one ever takes the Bard seriously about this time limit. There

are many scenes in "Romeo" that could be deleted.

The Wayne State production of "Romeo" moves as rapidly as it can under the burden of a long script. The beautiful, imaginative Queen Mab speech titillated our mundane ears. Juliet's undying devotion to Romeo came through loud and clear. Gertrude Crippen's crusty, fusty characterization of Juliet's Nurse added fun and spice to an "off-on" evening of entertainment. Of course, many folks seeing "Romeo" for the first time might not be as familiar with the script as old Wally. They could well enjoy every minute of the superb Wayne State Classical production. From the opening procession replete with music and beautiful costumes to the closing moments after the tragic deaths of the star-crossed lovers I'm sure you'll marvel at the breadth and depth of the new Classical theater.

As a constant attendee of the Stratford Shakespearean Festival old Wally felt the need for certain "extras" in staging that were missing in "Romeo." More incidental music to bridge the scenes. True, the addition of music might have impeded the flow of action. Solution to this problem: use the blue pencil and cut down on the dialogue in each scene. Shakespeare's poetical language is beautiful, but too much of anything makes the item commonplace. And where were the props? An occasional chair or bench would have relieved the constant practice of kneeling. Again, let me remind everyone that the Wayne State Classical Theater is excellent and provides Detroit with some exciting productions of Shakespeare. Old Wally can't help comparing it with Stratford. Really such comparison is far from fair. If Dr. Leone and his staff had the time and money that Michael Langham and his Stratford staff have, I'm sure we would see more opulent productions at the Hilberry Classical Theater on Cass and Hancock.

"Julius Caesar," "As You Like It," and "Antony and Cleopatra" alternate on the bill with "Romeo." Prices are reasonable at this unique theater where the action swirls all around you. Takes a bit of adjusting to realize that actors are coming at you from all sides, but the effects achieved make your evening complete. Help celebrate the great Bard's birthday by going to see all four of his plays at the Hilberry Classical Theater. You'll find it's an educational and entertaining experience.

Sub-committees on Evangelism, Worship, Education, Public Relations, Stewardship, Property, and Management will be selected by the Church Council at its first regular meeting in April. These will involve between 45-50 men and women in addition to the Church Council.

# Jews Mark Passover, Festival of Freedom

A major Jewish holiday, Passover, commemorating the Exodus of the Israelites as Hebrew slaves from Egypt, will be observed by Jews throughout the world beginning at sundown, Friday, March 27th.

Moses serves as the central figure in the Passover story found in the Biblical Book of Exodus. The narrative tells of the time when the Israelites fled from enslavement under the tyrannical Pharaoh of Egypt. They were forced to endure bitter hardships at the hands of their oppressors, building pyramids and other monuments out of mortar and stone. Then, after a series of ten plagues, the Egyptian ruler bade Moses to take his people into the desert.

The holiday is observed for seven days by Reform Jews, and for eight days by Orthodox and conservative Jews. During the first evening, families unfold the story of the Exodus at the Seder, a home worship service which includes a festive ritual meal. The Seder meal and all of the foods eaten during Passover are reminders of the ancient struggle for freedom in

Egypt. Best known of the foods is the matzah (unleavened bread) eaten during the entire observance of the holiday. Most Reform Jews celebrate the Seder for only one evening, as also practiced in the State of Israel. Orthodox and Conservative Jews, however, also hold a Seder on the second night. Sometimes this ritual is conducted on the second evening by all three branches of Judaism in the synagogue.

This year, Passover and Easter coincide on the calendar. Such an occurrence is particularly significant when the ecumenical feeling is so prevalent in the world today; when men of varying creeds and faiths have, perhaps for the first time, extended the hand of friendship and understanding across religious lines.

While Easter and Passover are different from one another, both call for the resurrection of the world's great desire for peace; both see in the liberating spirit of God the salvation of humanity.

### Chief Warns Drivers Of Crackdown

The frequency of fatal accidents that the State of Michigan has experienced so far indicates that if the present trend continues this year will record the highest number of traffic deaths in the history of the State.

As of March 15, the first 75 days of 1964, 384 persons met death compared to 273 in 1963. This is an increase of 41 percent.

This means that five persons on the average are losing their lives each day over the State.

"In an effort to combat this rising tide of fatalities and accidents, a vigorous all-out enforcement and educational campaign is being carried on to reduce traffic law violations, with special attention to those drivers who exceed the speed limit or drive too fast for conditions," said Chief of Police James N. Jordan of Livonia.

"I hope all drivers will cooperate in bringing down traffic deaths and accidents. We do not enjoy issuing traffic tickets, but if drivers violate the traffic laws, they can be sure that police officers are alert to enforce them.

"It is a known fact that strict compliance with traffic laws enacted for the protection of the motoring public results in a decrease in motor vehicle accidents."

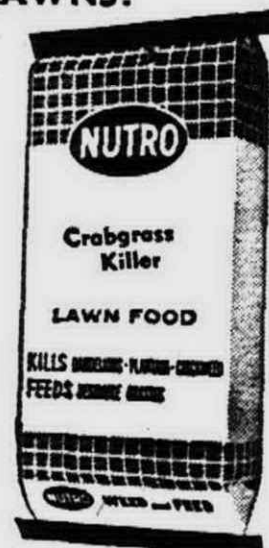

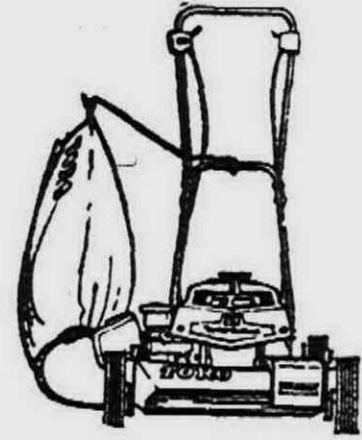
