School Board Approves Pay Boost For Teachers

Increases Range From \$200-\$400

After receiving \$100 across the board, cost of living pay hikes in each of the past two years, teachers in the Plymouth School system were given salary increases ranging from \$200 to \$400 by the Board of Education Monday night.

The pay boosts vary on the basis of educational training, service and additional credit hours. All but two levels are in a range from \$250 to the \$400 growth and continued improveceiling.

The proposed salary improvement was reached by Supt. Russell Isbister after numerous meetings with the school board's finance committee and a salary committee from the Plymouth includes most teachers in the

administrative staff and with \$8.250 at present. the permission of the Board. stepped into the negotiations and finally received approval of the PEA and the Board of Education on the schedule adopted Monday.

The salary improvement amounts to \$62,840, and doesn't include the increments which total \$41,360 for the 1964-5 school year.

Isbister termed the negotiations as satisfactory at all times and praised the PEA committee, headed by John Howe and John Hoben, for its fine cooperation in dealing with the vexing salary problem.

"The upper adjustment in the salary schedule for the teachers is a timely one," said Isbister. "It is fair yet moderate in the light of what other districts have done or are doing this year for teachers. It will place the Plymouth Community Schools in a competitive position in its ability to attract and

retain competent teachers. "It will require additional revenue which for this next year must come from increased state aid, increased tax base, increased class sizes, economies in all areas of the budget and from the cash balance.

"I am happy to say that my relationship with the PEA committee during this last month while the negotiations were going on have been most friendly and co-operative. The PEA representatives approached this problem with a sense of justice and fair play. "The Board of Education also

recognized its responsibility in providing for the teachers an equitable salary schedule-one which encourages professional ment in teaching." Isbister stressed that the

Board is not thinking of a millage increase at this time.

"As has been stressed more than once by Board President Gerald Fischer, there are no Education Association which plans for increased miliage at this time unless something drastic happens," said Isbister.

However, he didn't eliminate the possibility of a request for additional operating millage next fall unless the state boosts its school aid considerably.

> Need for the study committee came last fall when Supervisor Lindsay was notified by the Wayne County Board of Roundup of Supervisors that it could no longer maintain the police protection for the Township provided by the Road Patrol from the Sheriff's Department.

The Board of Supervisors recommended that Plymouth Township along with other can Association of University townships in Wayne County, begin to think seriously of providing its own police services.

The study committee learned that cost of such services ranges from \$115,000 in Nankin Township to \$336,-756 in Redford Township.

Each is much larger than Plymouth and each has a much larger budget to work with.

Nankin Township Supervisor William Faust reported that his government purchases the protection from the Sheriff's Road Patrol. It has 14 men under contract who work exclusively for the Township. Nankin purchased, completely equipped and marked four patrol cars. The total police budget for the fiscal year was nearly \$115,000.

Redford, which has a population of more than 75,000, maintains its own police department, consisting of 34 fulltime officers under civil service. It allots \$336,756 in the budget for the depart-

ment. Lauterbach also received a report from the Redford Post of the Michigan State Police which is headed by Capt. Fred Davids, a resident of Plymouth Township.

Capt. Davids reported his post handled 85 complaints and made 103 traffic arrests in the Township during 1963.

He reported in his letter that the equipment per uniform ofpletely outfits each man with the exception of socks and underclothes.

The outfits include three pairs of trousers, two uniform blouses, four uniform shirts, raincoat, overcoat, night stick, handcuffs,, badge, cap ornament, identification eard and two pairs of shoes. From our point of view House Bill 438, sponsored by Rep. Mrs. Marie Hager of Lansing, falls into that category in the current session. Innocently enough, the wording would permit

any school district to set up "day care programs" and to charge tuition or fees for such programs and to accept gifts as part of the financing.

The Bill passed the House by a lop-sided vote and almost without debate. It slipped by easily, I believe, because the legislators had other things on their minds and didn't really catch the significance of innocentthe Public Health Committee, sounding "day care programs." Put another way, this Bill will use the Trivalent form of would put the State, via the local school district, into the babysitting business.

There is no There is nothing in the Bill which would require limit as to the age of the children involved, they could be infants or they could be of school age. There is no requirement, such as a teacher certificate, determining who shall supervise the day care program. And there is no restriction that such centers be opened only during the months when school is in session. They could operate throughout the summer and for 12 months a year.

No matter how it sounds in print, the aim is purely to provide day-time child tending services for those mothers who need or desire it.

Facts and Opinions solidly supports the idea, which probably is no surprise to those who read a column here several weeks ago wherein was discussed the "Status of American and Suburban Women." Many women interrupt their education for marriage and immediately plunge into the managing of a family and raising of children, functions which traditionally put a permanent conclusion to milady's formal education. In modern times this has come to be regarded as undesirable. For one thing it tends to match husbands and wives who have different depths of interest and knowledge. Also the modern mother faces some 25 years or more of life after her children have grown and left the home and the absence of education makes those years more barren than they need be. In addition, the ranks of widowed and divorced women are multiplying tremendously and the solitary woman is at a relative disadvantage if her education has been cut short.

So for all of these reasons, and more - such as the young married couples on the nation's college campuses - an adequate day care program for children is desirable for all those who need or wish, formal schooling of one kind or another.

Day centers have their purpose for mothers who may be incapacitated, physically or mentally, or for those mothers who must devote almost full time to a single child who may be handicapped or retarded. There also is a huge group of working mothers who do so with the blessings of their husbands, and because an inner voice tells them they must, solely because they find the keeping of a home in today's modern scene not sufficiently satisfying; too menial; leaving too much spare time; utilizing too little of their total self. We have moved a long way from the period when

the home was a little factory wherein the lady manufactured food and clothing from raw materials. Our rural areas are losing population in great numbers to the mechanized swift urban sections and the women folk go

WITH LARRY LAWRENCE

The other week, in this space, I mentioned the beautiful lawns in England that are so much admired by all visitors. Now there is one more point about them that I would like to bring up and that is the question of grass clippings.

In England you never see them left on the lawn. In fact, you can't buy a mower over there without a contrivance for catching the clippings. Here, many people leave them to decompose on the theory that they help the soil texture by putting back some of the material lost by mowing.

The fact of the matter is that, whereas the value of the clippings is negligible, there is a lot to be said against them. When they turn brown they can give a lawn an unpleasant burned-out look. Worse than that is their tendency to form a mat or what nurserymen call "thatch." Another thing: matted grass makes a good breeding ground for fungus diseases.

So don't think that sweeping up lawn clippings is a waste of time. Far from it. And if you can buy a grass catcher to attach to your mower, by all means do so. Some mowers have an ingenious catcher that is supported on its own feet so that the weight of the clippings is taken off your hands

Tips on Proper Time to Prune

Most home gardeners, who raise their bushes and When you trim trees first retrees from "mere seedlings," have a tendency not to prune branches. It becomes dangerous often enough and far enough according to Michigan State trim large trees and a profes-University horticulturists.

First, why prune at all? (1) To remove broken, dead, diseased and insect damaged branches.

(2) To produce a more sturdy and dense plant

(3) To control the growth of the plant and produce the desired size and shape. (4) To improve flowering and

fruiting. Then, when should you

prune? From the point of view of necessity, you can prune at practically any time of the year. Boughs can be cut from evergreens for Christmas decorations. Early blooming spring shrubs like pussy willow and forsythia can be pruned early and "forced" into blossomed boughs in the warm basement,

Normally, plants which lose their leaves in the winter can be more easily pruned during the dormant season because it is easier to see the framework of the branches. As a general rule, shrubs and

bushes flowering on new growth during the current season (roses for example) grow better if pruned early in the spring. This induces the production of flowering wood.

Those that flower on last year's growth (like forsythia) should be pruned as soon as flowering is finished.

Maple and yellow wood trees bleed less when trimmed in the summer. It's easier to trim most shade trees in fall and winter months.

How far do you go when pruning?

When pruning hybrid tea and floribunda roses early in the spring, before growth begins, you cut back the black and dead canes, MSU horticulturists recommend. Old canes that look diseased and split are cut to the crown, Vigorous growing roses can be cut back more

Climbing roses should not be pruned until flowering has old stems that have produced flowers and cut back the new vigorous canes to where they are the size of a lead pencil.

Shrubs that are over-grown should be pruned by cutting back older, discolored canes to the ground level. Reshape the clump by pruning back the branches to side shoots.

Ground covers and vines can be pruned to suit the location. Vines need to be trimmed to keep them within bounds, away from windows or on a trellis.

> You can prevent the weight of the limb from tearing the main trunk when removing a large branch. Make the first saw cut from beneath the branch a few inches from where the limb joins the trunk. Then make the next cut a few inches farther out on the limb. When the limb breaks with its weight you will have a stub left. This can be sawed flush with the main truck and the wound treated with asphalt wound dressing or sprayed with a aerosol spray specially prepared for this purpose.

Funk Tells Plans For Tax Sales

County Treasurer Louis H. Funk said Monday that his office has 11,879 parcels of land throughout the County listed to be offered at the Tax Sale beginning May 5, for non-payment of 1961 taxes.

The sale of all of the descriptions would yield a total of \$899,954.24, including all interest and penalty charges through April 30.

Funk also warned Wayne County taxpayers that all 1960 taxes sold at the May, 1963 sale must be redeemed by the end of April to safeguard title to the property.

At the present time, title to 1,839 parcels amounting to \$129,960.12 will go to the State of Michigan effective May 5 unless redeemed prior to that time.

The same deadline is in effect on an additional 2,218 descriptions totaling \$115,222.57 on which tax certificates were issued to professional tax title buyers at the May, 1963 Tax Sale. These buyers are entitled to the issuance of a tax deed upon presentation of their certificate to the Auditor General of the State of Michigan.

Funk urges all taxpayers in the County, owing 1960 and/or 1961 taxes, to pay immediately to protect their property.

Copy Machine Installed at Livonia Library

Instant photo-copies from book pages, magazines, newspapers, personal and business documents can now be made with the new Docustat selfservice photocopy machine recently installed in the Carl Sandburg Library. The head librarian, Skip Rosenthal, explained that the device is a fully automatic coin operated machine which offers students and the public an efficient and completely private method of copying data maintained for public reference in the library. In just thirty seconds the unit copies anything placed on its glass top. One or even two pages at a time can be copied from books simply by placing the book on the glass. Pages do not have to be removed from books or magazines.

Mr. Rosenthal also said that this is the only available machine that will copy the large size magazine pages used by Life and other magazines. Gifted Child May Irritate His Elders

ANN ARBOR-Parents of a "gifted child" may find them- not pass by the county road or selves hankering after a more recognize the helpless exprespeaceful and uninterrupted sion of distress. existence, says Warren A. Ketcham, University of Michigan professor of education.

"The gifted child has some imposing characteristics, but they won't exactly make him an unmixed blessing," says Ketcham.

"He will frequently irritate adults. His curiosity will make it difficult to keep him within sight and hearing. His physical size and strength will enable him to get lost more quickly and effectively than other chil-

"He will ask questions about matters which are not thought to be suitable for the thoughts of little children. At an early age he will have real purpose about which he will be very persistent to the utter despair and consternation of his parents and others. He'll probably be labeled a problem child in the neighborhood." Ketcham lists typical characteristics which may lead parents to suspect their child of

being gifted: "Most gifted children accomplish almost everything sooner Y.W.C.A. at 25940 Grand River. and better than less able children of the same age. There are, of course, exceptions.

When compared with other children of the same age in a community the gifted child will be larger and stronger, will talk earlier and more, will be more curious about his surroundings, will be more apt to notice events and changes in the home, will need less rest, will be more independent of his parents.

"He will become interested in printed words and numbers earlier, and will be more apt to want to go to school before the legal age for entrance. A suspicion of giftedness would be based on the presence of most or all of the characteristics over a period of several years." However, Ketcham advises, "Before a parent takes a suspicion of his child's giftedness too seriously he needs to consider an important fact. The odds are against him. If the term means only a very select group of children whose intellectual ability is far above most

of their age mates, the odds are

still smaller, only about two in

100 children."
