

Slate Summer Swim Classes In Livonia's Franklin, Bentley High Pools

The summer swimming program offered by the Livonia Public Schools will be held at the Bentley and Franklin pools beginning Monday, June 15. Beginning swimming instruction for elementary students (3-12) at shoulder through the present 6th grade) will be offered in four sessions of two weeks each. Classes will meet for one hour each day (Monday through Friday) starting at 12:00 noon, 1, 2, 3 or 4 p.m.

Session I will start June 15 and continue through June 26. Session II starts June 29 and continues through July 10. Session III starts July 13 and continues through July 24. Session IV starts July 27 and continues through August 7. Registration for elementary students living north of the C & O railroad will be at Bentley, Saturday, June 23 starting at 9 a.m. Registration for elementary students liv-

ing south of the C & O railroad will be at Franklin, Saturday, June 6 starting at 9 a.m. A final registration for elementary students will be at Bentley, Saturday, June 13 starting at 9 p.m. Transportation will be available from the nearest public elementary school providing registration is made for the session scheduled for your area. Beginning swimming instruc-

tion for 7th grade students and above will be held two days each week (Tuesdays and Thursdays) for eight weeks from 11 a.m. to 12 noon. Junior High students should register at the nearest Junior High School. Students at Bentley, register with Mr. Anders. Students at Franklin, register with Mr. Hudaut. All registrations should be in by

June 6. No transportation will be provided. Advanced swimming instruction is a special class for students who know how to swim, but would like to learn more about the finer points and also take part in scheduled meets with schools in the surrounding areas. This class is open to boys and girls of all ages, however, students will swim in their own age groups. Classes will be scheduled

for three periods of instruction per week for eight weeks, either from 8 to 9, 9 to 10, or 10 to 11 p.m. Students should register for this class at the same place as they would for beginning swimming instruction. No transportation will be provided. Junior and Senior Life Saving classes are open to competent swimmers only. The Junior Life Saving class is open to students between the ages of

12 to 15. The Senior Life Saving class is open to students 16 years of age or older. Classes will be held two days each week (Mondays and Wednesdays) for eight weeks from 11 to 12 noon. Students should register at the same place as they would for beginning swimming instruction. No transportation will be provided.

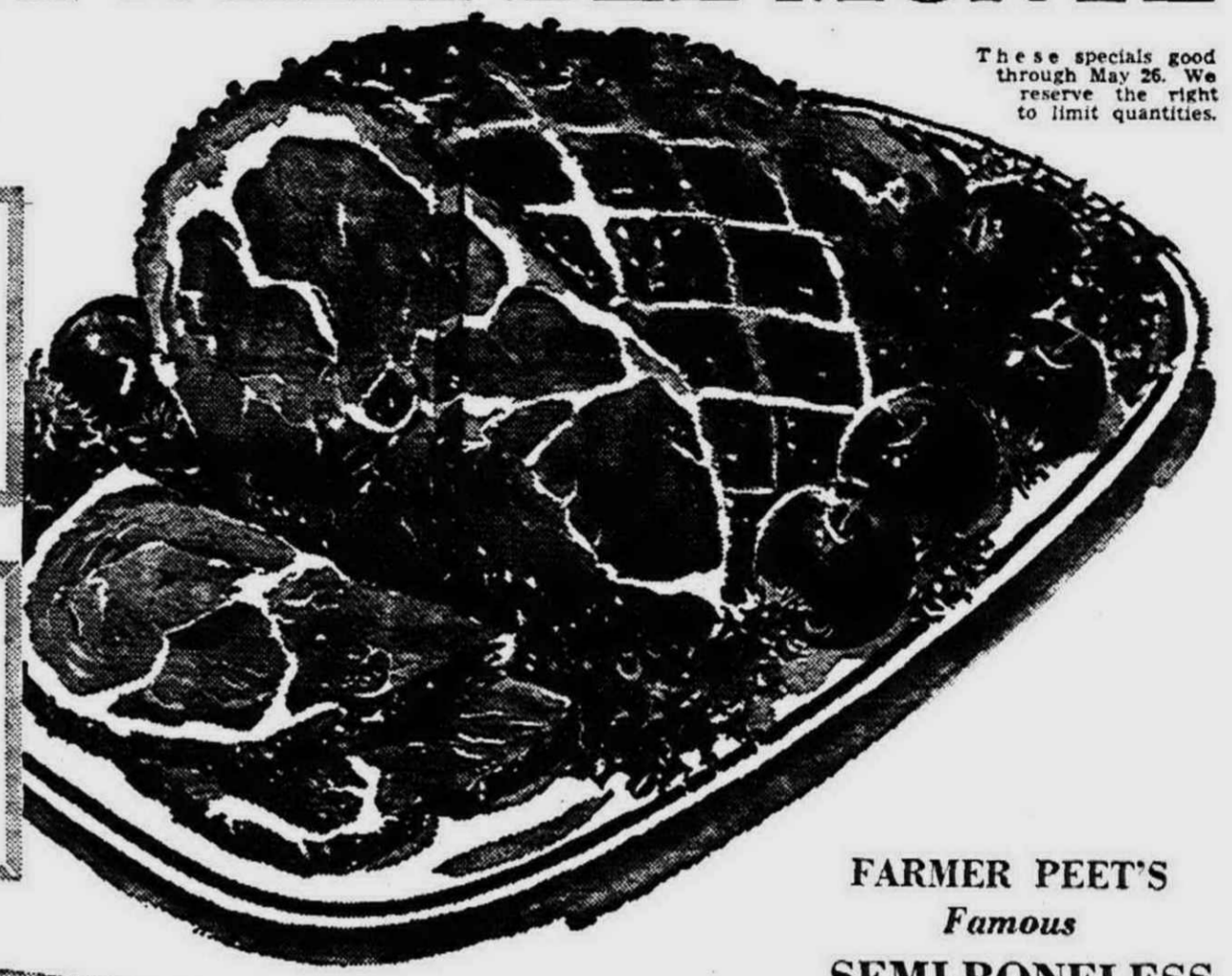

One of the "apportionment" battles at the moment involves wherein Livonia, Plymouth and Redford will be placed for its delegate to the U.S. Congress.

Martha W. Griffiths is the Congresswoman today. The district includes Northville, Plymouth, Livonia, Redford Township and a big chunk of northwest Detroit. About two-thirds of the total voters in "our district" live in Detroit.

● One plan (GOP sponsored) in Lansing today would hook Redford, Livonia, Plymouth and Northville to a big chunk of Oakland County to the north, including Pontiac.

● Another plan (Demo sponsored) would sever Plymouth and Northville and send them over to the west, joining up with Ann Arbor, Jackson and what all. This same scheme would leave Redford Township hooked to northwest Detroit. And Livonia?

Well, Livonia, according to the plans of T. John Lesinski, would be attached by a corridor heading south. Once the district was abreast of Dearborn, a big bulging cul-de-sac would go over and rope heavily-Democratic Dearborn into the district. Then back down to the down-river Townships.

And, believe it or not, both plans are screamingly defended by their authors as "fair."

Local Problems Conference Draws 5 Livonia Officials to Nation's Capitol Today

Five Livonia city officials are in Washington today and tomorrow for the annual Michigan-Washington Conference of Community Officials, sponsored for the third year by U. S. Senator Philip A. Hart.

Mayor Harvey Moelke, Clerk Addison Bacon, and Councilmen Edward McNamara and John Dooley will join City Attorney Harry Smit in representing Livonia at the day-long session Thursday.

They will hear reports from Secretary of the Interior Stewart Udall and R. Sargent Shriver, director of the U. S. Peace Corps, and the President's anti-poverty campaign, along with other officials.

According to Hart, "the conference will provide a thorough discussion of the President's poverty program, other pending legislation, and current problems pertinent to local communities."
