

Storm Damage Mounts Into Thousands of Dollars

High Winds, torrential rains and hail slashed through the Plymouth Community Friday evening, toppling trees, smashing glass, downing power lines and causing damage, estimated by one source at \$100,000.

A Detroit Edison spokesman said damage to Edison lines and equipment was the worst since the ice storm of 1948. He estimated that 1,400 customers in Plymouth and Plymouth Township were out of service for periods ranging from a few minutes to, in a few cases, 11 hours.

Street lights were out as late as yesterday, he said. The largest area affected

was bounded by Ann Arbor Trail on the north, Ann Arbor Road on the south, Mill Street on the east and Sheldon Road on the west, where power was off from three to seven and a half hours.

Ten line crews, including one from the Lapeer area and another from Bad Axe were on duty in the Plymouth Community. Plymouth insurance agencies were swamped with claims. One office reported 75, while another said more than 500 claims had been turned in.

AT ONE location, lightning struck a bathroom exhaust vent and traveled into the room, chipping and pitting the porcelain fixtures. Claims included trees blown

on houses, broken glass, roof damage, chimneys blown off and hail damage to awnings and aluminum siding.

At the Crestwood Apartment site on Sheldon Road, two carports under construction were blown down. Damage was estimated at between \$6,000 and \$8,000.

City police, fire and public works personnel were called in as power lines and trees fell, blocking streets and creating hazards. Red distress flares glowed through the city, marking trouble locations.

On Union St., just off S. Main, a gigantic tree fell, lifting sidewalk slabs to nearly 90-degrees as its roots raised. Streets were

filled with water for a short period. FALLEN leaves, branches, pieces of shingle and other debris littered yards, streets and sidewalks. DPW personnel, under the supervision of Joseph Bida, worked until 4 a.m. clearing streets.

Bida estimated the cost to the city at \$775 for the clearing work. He said the cost may range as high as \$4,000 when work is complete.

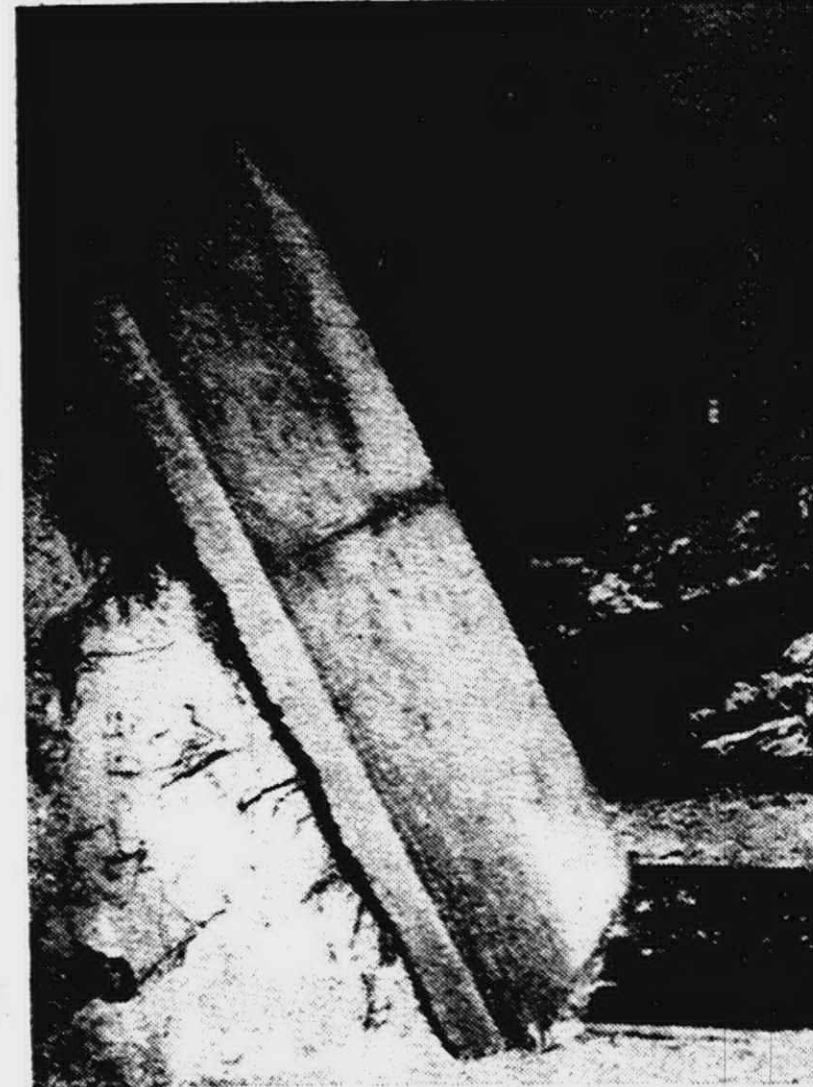

Developer Promises Court Action in Wake Of Township Planning Group's Decision

A court battle seems in the offing for Plymouth Township after developer Sam Stoller of Detroit, last Wednesday evening told the township's planning commission he would not consider changing his request for rezoning from 90-foot lots to 1/2-acre.

Stoller's firm, the J.A.R. Corporation, had requested rezoning of about 45 acres of land located at the northeast corner of Joy and Beck Roads from R-1-E, country estates district, to R-1-S, suburban residential 1 district.

R-1-E zoning limits lots to a minimum of one acre while R-1-S requires lots of one third acre. In between is the R-1-H classification for lots of 1/2-acre.

STOLLER'S request was marked by a heated public hearing held on April 15 at which surrounding property owners vigorously protested the proposed rezoning. In May, the planning commission tabled the matter and gave Stoller a month to consider changing his request to one asking for half-acre lots. Last Wednesday, the Detroit developer told commission members he could not, economically, increase the size of the lots to a half-acre. Speaking in impassioned tones, Stoller said:

"The action of this planning commission is unconstitutional and confiscatory in my mind. I cannot take advantage of your offer to consider half-acre lots. We will have to go to court."

Stoller prefaced his remarks by saying his firm had given serious consideration to the suggestions of the commission. "We have done some heavy, heavy thinking," he commented. The decision was

made, Stoller said, "due to the fact we would have to sell half-acre lots for \$7,500, due to the fact that Woodlore Subdivision (located adjacent to Stoller's property) is selling half-acre lots for \$6,500 and due to the fact that we would

go broke." Stoller cautioned commissioners about possible court action.

"IF THE constitutionality of this ordinance is overthrown," he said, "I want you to know that by your action,

you are opening the whole field in this area as to the size of lots." He lashed out at the commission with the comment:

"No consideration was given by commissioners to the economics. We will turn down

your very fair offer to give us an opportunity for half-acre lots. You have given us a choice of being shot or hanged!"

Establish \$78,560 Budget For '65 Community Fund

After months of careful consideration, a budget of \$78,560 for this year's Plymouth Community Fund drive was established and released by the PCF board.

In making the figures public, Community Fund President Frank Palmer said the budget was weighed carefully before it was approved. Much of the increase over last year's figure comes through special grants to the YMCA's youth development program and the Northwestern Child Guidance Clinic.

Palmer emphasized that the Plymouth YMCA branch is self-supporting and carries on its activities through donations from members.

HOWEVER, he said, a grant of \$6,000 has been designated to permit "Y" officials to continue their youth employment bureau and set up a program of young people of "partner-less parents" — homes where parents are separated, divorced or where one parent has died.

In addition, because of a new state law which will

eliminate migrant labor in the State of Michigan, Palmer said the YMCA is setting up a training program to instruct youth for seasonal work in agricultural areas.

Included will be fruit picking and other harvesting operations normally carried on by out-of-state migrant laborers.

"It was a hard decision for the board to increase the budget this year," Palmer said, "but we feel each of the services were needed. The appropriations include

\$6,000 for boy scouts, \$5,000 for girl scouts, \$5,000 for the American Red Cross, \$2,000 for the Plymouth Dental Fund, \$2,000 for the Plymouth Youth Club and \$2,000 for operation of the Veteran's Memorial Center.

OTHER FUNDS are \$4,500 for the American Red Cross, \$780 for Senior Citizens, \$17,840 for Plymouth's Family Service Agency, \$9,000 for the Salvation Army, \$2,000 for the Plymouth Symphony Society, and \$4,020 for the Michigan (Continued on page 4)

Plymouth Township Minutes

Official Minutes, Township of Plymouth, Tuesday, June 9, 1964. The meeting was called to order at 8:04 by Supervisor Lindsay with all members of the Board being present.

The minutes of the regular meeting of May 12, 1964 were approved as submitted as were the current bills totaling \$15,207.25.

Mr. Samuel Hudson and Mr. George M. Schuder of Evans Products were present to discuss and explain the progress of their company relative to the air pollution problem, and further stated that another month will make it possible to determine if they could convert to gas. Mr. Garber requested a progress report by the second Tuesday in July, Supervisor Lindsay then stated that the subject would be tabled until the next regular meeting of the Board.

A communication from Paul M. Chandler announcing the legal qualifications and rates relative to publishing legal notices and advertisements in the Plymouth Observer were read by Supervisor Lindsay, supported by C. V. Sparks that this communication be accepted for study and consideration. Carried unanimously.

It was moved by Elizabeth Holmstrom that the township Board accept and endorse the amendment Open House Covenant. It read as follows: WE BELIEVE that the inalien-

able rights designated in the bill of Rights should be assured to all Americans; that all persons in America should be entitled to equal opportunities in education, housing, and occupation without restrictions based on race, religion, or national origin. It is important for all persons who believe this to support each other and the legally constituted authorities in keeping such restrictions from our community. While these rights and opportunities are assured by the new Michigan Constitution as administered by the Michigan Civil Rights Commission, to be meaningful they must have the earnest and enduring support of the citizenry. Therefore, if any responsible person of whatever race, religion, or national origin moves to this community, we pledge that this governing body will work with him to build, improve and maintain a community which is good for all. Carried unanimously.

Supervisor Lindsay read a communication from William Sempliner requesting an adjournment until the next meeting of the Board relative to the rezoning of the N.W. corner of Sheldon and Ann Arbor Roads. Accordingly Supervisor Lindsay adjourned this item until the next meeting July 16, 1964.

The appointment of members representing Plymouth Township on the Plymouth Community Planning Commission was announced by the Supervisor as follows: Clark G. Finley, 4121 Wilcox Road C. V. Sparks, 4494 Joy Road John Weisner, 634 Sheldon Road Supervisor Lindsay also tabled the appointments of the members of the Fire and Police Administration Board until the next meeting.

The final approval was given the Hardback of Arbor Village No. 3 subdivision by motion of J. D. McEwen, supported by Dick Lauderbach.

A letter of resignation was received from Arthur Haeske. The Township Board unanimously passed the following resolution:

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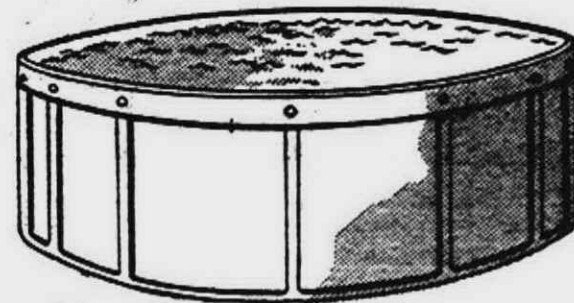

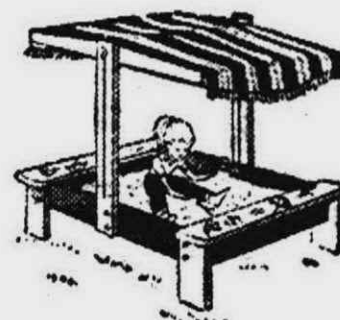

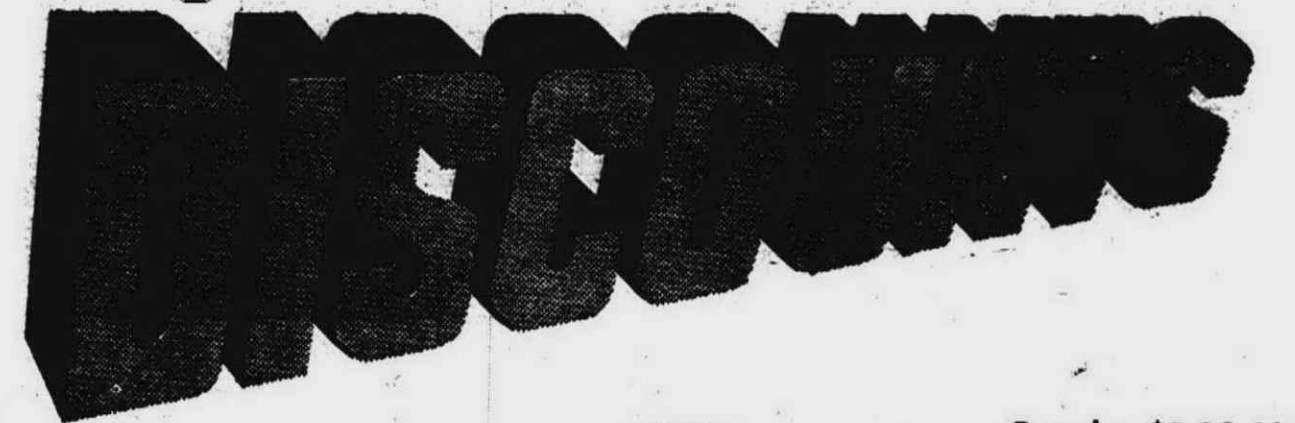

 position was chairman Irving Rozain.
 "In law," he said, "the status quo carries weight. The commissioners feel they have acted in the best interests of the community. It is not incumbent upon us to change zoning at request. The majority of property owners have objected.
 One of the area homeowners, E. D. Mogle of 9355 Beck Rd., promised the commission help.

"I want to assure the commission," he said, "that they will have all the legal counsel they want available." Another, Harold Niemi of 47566 Joy Rd. said Stoller purchased the property after it had been zoned to the one-acre classification.

"If he considers the ordinance confiscatory," he noted, "he purchased the land in full knowledge of the zoning." Commissioner Tivador Balogh moved denial of the original request on the grounds that it constituted spot zoning. His motion was seconded by Carl Hartwick and passed unanimously.

FOLLOWING action on the J.A.P. Corporation proposal, Paul Boatín, representing the Ten Mile Lakes Building Company spoke to commissioners about the firm's proposal to develop 448 acres in the southwest portion of the township.

Boatín noted that his company had temporarily abandoned plans to construct a 120-acre lake at the site. He offered to construct temporary sewer and water facilities at the site at his own cost. Requesting a public hearing by next month, Boatín commented:

"It's not a case of a giant sewer and water system, it is a case of getting this thing off the ground. Chairman Rozain said he had heard some adverse comment about the adequacy and effectiveness of local sewage treatment systems and noted that he would like advice from Township Engineer Herald Hamill and Planning Consultant W. C. Johnson.

Hamill told commissioners Boatín's company had proposed a lagoon system of sewage treatment, consisting of two open ponds three to five feet deep. Asked for his opinion, Township Supervisor Roy R. Lindsay said:

"In my personal opinion, they will start another town out here. I think this whole thing is premature. Do we want a make-do water system, a make-do sewage system? We don't know how long these people will be in business."

COMMISSIONER Balogh said he would like to see more specifics on the proposed development, including a tentative timetable of development. Rozain appointed Balogh to head a subcommittee to study the proposal with Johnson and Hamill. Boatín has requested rezoning from agricultural to R-1-H, half-acre lots; R-3, multiple family dwellings; C-2, commercial; and P-0, professional office.

The group tabled Boatín's application until the next meeting in July with the possibility of enough information becoming available to warrant a public hearing.

In reference to a decision at last month's planning commission meeting, Rozain told commissioners Township attorney Earl Demel had ruled that a tie vote means no action.

Last month, commissioners split, 3-3 on a motion concerning the future of the shopping center. Rozain ruled that the tie defeated the motion.

APPROVED for public hearing next month was the re-

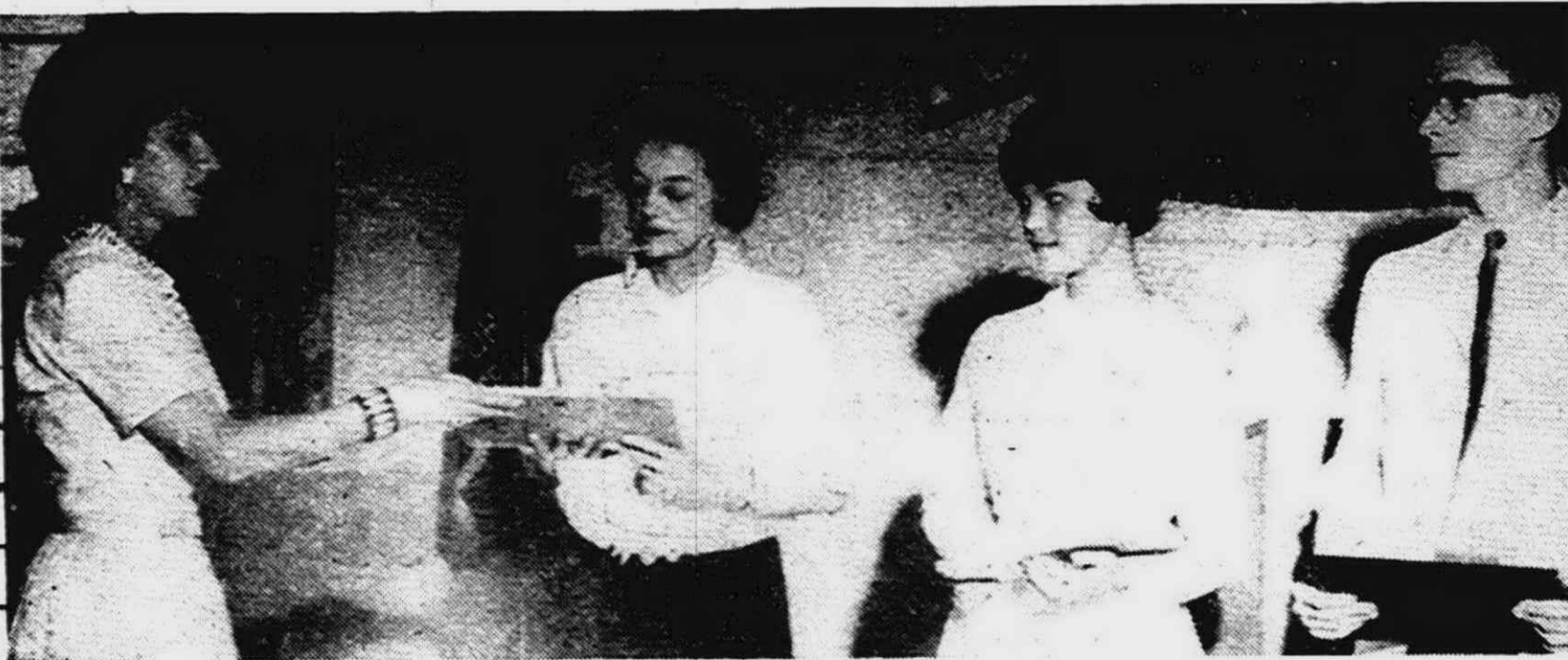

Miss Folkesson explained that in Swedish towns, houses are built practically on the street curbs and there is no room for trees and grass around them.

Miss Folkesson met Mary Jane Gretzinger, last summer when Miss Gretzinger lived in Larv as an exchange student. She arrived in Plymouth June 1 and will leave Aug. 8.

IN SWEDEN all education costs are paid by the state, Miss Folkesson said. She graduated from Realskola.

Swedish children start school when they are seven years old and must attend school for a minimum of seven years. After they pass their Realskola or grey cap exams,

they may either go to work or continue their education in the Gymnasium school (white cap exam). When they pass the white cap exam they then may attend a university.

Miss Folkesson said she may go back to school for secretarial training when she returns to Sweden. Before visiting the United States, she never had eaten pizza or hamburgers or seen Bermuda shorts. Swedish hamburgers are made from ground beef and she explained Swedish girls wear short shorts or slacks for relaxing.

ONE OF THE things most familiar to Miss Folkesson in the United States was American records. She explained American records are played continually in Sweden, and teenagers know all about American singers—she added they listen to the Beatles, too.

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The Grim Pilgrim

In view of the controversy that currently seems to be bugging Birmingham's weekly newspaper, "The Eccentric," it might be well if the difference were explained between a column such as this and the editorials which appear in The Plymouth Mail.

The Birmingham ruckus started after managing editor Ken Weaver rapped out a column in which he employed the word "slum" to refer to a portion of his city.

Since that time, a semantic battle over the meaning of the word and Weaver's use of it has raged. Last week, in an editorial, The Eccentric spelled out the difference between a column and an editorial.

"As is customary," the paper editorialized, "the position of this newspaper on any issue will appear as an editorial."

"As a service to our readers, we also offer columns written by individuals reflecting their personal views. These columns appear... with the author's name appearing at the top of the column."

"What is expressed in these columns of personal comment should not be interpreted as the editorial policy of this paper."

Essentially, The Mail takes the same position. Our editorials reflect newspaper policy; these words are symptomatic of my own prejudices and prejudices.

Slightly more than a week ago, I sat in the steamy recesses of the American Legion Hall on a hot, summery evening and listened to Plymouth's new incumbent in the U.S. House of Representatives, George Meader.

He left me cold. Meader courageously lambasted all those things that he seemed to feel were safe to blast, and stuck up for others as tepidly traditional as American moms and prayer in the schools.

He clobbered what he chose to refer to as "the left wing press," criticized the administration's civil rights bill in distinctly Goldwaterian (now there's an adjective!) terms and allowed as how the threat from within was more ominous than the threat from without.

After the meeting, the congressman gave me a tract published by the Meader for Congress Committee and explained that, while the electorate as a whole couldn't be expected to comprehend the complexities of civil rights legislation, he—as an attorney—was most cognizant of the insidious threat it posed to the Republic.

His literature is a gas. Replete with photographs of "Meader at Vatican, Meader at Versailles" (with Ike), "Meader at White House" (again with Ike), "Meader in Chile" and "Meader on way to Committee Meeting," the pamphlet discloses that Congressman Meader's political philosophy is summed up in his agreement with President Abraham Lincoln's statement:

"Government should do for a people those things which the people cannot so well do for themselves; in all other matters the government ought not to interfere."

"An outstanding investigator," the campaign folder explains modestly, "Meader has combated waste, mismanagement and gross neglect in bureaucratic expenditures, especially those in our foreign aid program."

I'm overwhelmed.

I would suggest that the representative has spent too much of his time since 1951 campaigning in the sticks where his hickiness sticks supreme and the doctrine of non-think is a virtue. Maybe the clodhoppers in Mudville like to be told they are incapable of comprehending legislation.

Maybe they are reassured to know that Mighty

Meader is in the land of the Great White Father understanding things for them, interpreting things for them, representing the unaware.

I may be iggerant, but I prefer not to be told so. Still, I'm glad I got the chance to hear our new legislator. Summing his views up, I would suggest that he is one of Barry's Boys.

By the way, he's got a fight on his hands.

State Senator Stanley Thayer, referred to by the friendly Free Press as the "gray eagle from Wash-tenaw," is making a stab at unseating Meader.

Thayer led Senate moderates in the battle for civil rights, education, minimum wage, constitutional reform and tax reform.

He is running with ex-motor mogul Romney's blessings and I'm anxious to hear him speak.

Communications: Need Improvement

In the dreary evening hours that followed Plymouth's big blow Friday, two Plymouth Mail staffers made the rounds with Superintendent of Public Works Joseph Bida.

Together with Bida, they surveyed wreckage, snapped power lines, broken trees, shattered glass. And, during that time, one thing became apparent.

The City of Plymouth's communications system leaves something to be desired in an emergency.

Commissioner Arch Vallier was one of the first at the City Hall during the storm. Clad in slacks and a plastic raincoat, Vallier — always one to investigate and see how things are done — became disturbed at the communication system's limitations. He said he would bring the matter before the commission.

There is no direct link between Bida's car, DPW trucks and equipment and the City Hall. In an emergency like Friday's when central switchboard personnel could conceivably want to contact the DPW directly, there was little or no means.

Phone lines in the city were either tied up or broken and the only way to pass information from public works

staffers to the City Hall is for them to radio the DPW office and have the message relayed by telephone. For a message to travel in the other direction, the process is reversed.

If Plymouth should become the victim of a serious disaster such as a tornado, heavy DPW equipment would be needed to move debris, cut trees, and help firefighters and police officers rescue trapped citizens. Effective communications with the central offices would be imperative.

Fortunately, the solution is simple and reasonably inexpensive. For about \$200, including antenna, the city could install a transmitter at the City Hall capable of reaching public works workers and equipment.

The Plymouth Mail thinks the expenditure is called for.

We feel the equipment would pay for itself, both in time and effort. If it should prove instrumental in saving a life, it would be worth far more than \$200.

We urge the city commission to seriously consider the improvement of electronic communications between the Department of Public Works and City Hall.

It's a measure that seems overdue.
