Area Continues Operation Cleanup From Effects of Disastrous Winds

Residents of the Plymouth Community didn't care much for the manner in which she did it but Old Mother Nature did a bit of tree pruning last Friday night and the City and Township are still busy with "operation cleanup."

First Ma Nature ordered out a heavy rainstorm, followed by hail about the size of golf balls and then came winds up to 75 miles per hour that whistled through the area ripping out diseased trees, tearing down telephone and power lines and leaving the community to battle sewer clogs and blocked streets with branches and limbs on practically every yard and sidewalk.

It was the worst windstorm to hit the Plymouth community in more than 10 years and found the City's Department of Public Works crew working around the clock Saturday in an effort to clear streets.

DPW Supt. Joseph Bida hired extra crews of tree workers, had his own men working from midnight Friday until late Saturday evening and even then predicted that it would be another week before "operation cleanup" was completed.

Property damage was very little but the tree damage was high although Bida quickly pointed out that most of the

uprooted trees appeared diseased and probably would have had to be removed within another year or so.

Detroit Edison and Michigan Bell ordered as many as 25

repair crews to the area from as far north as Flint and northeast from Port Huron to correct the damage.

Officials at Michigan Bell estimated that as many as 800 of the 8,000 phones in the community were out of order a few hours to as late as Monday evening.

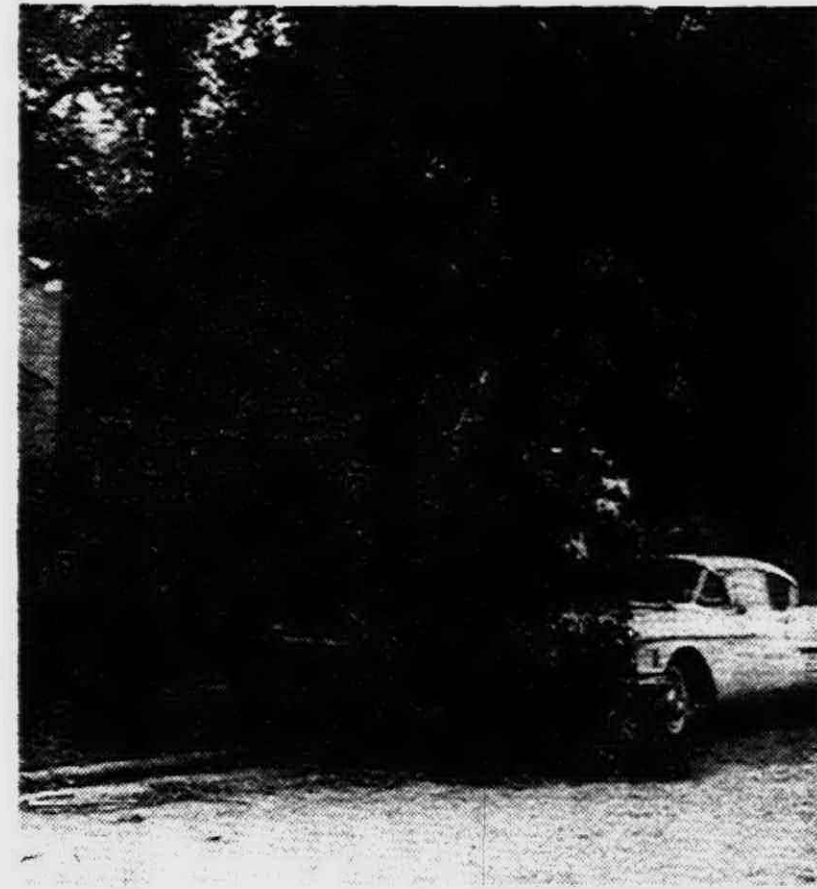
A spokesman for the Company reported 14 cables were disrupted, causing most of the line failure. Service was resumed as quickly as possible and only those phones that were reported out on Sunday and Monday were still inoperative late Monday afternoon.

Edison officials had crews on the scene within hours after the storm hit shortly after 9 p.m. and worked through the night and into late Saturday afternoon before all services were resumed.

Bida started calling his men shortly after 9:35 p.m. when he rushed to City Hall during the peak of the storm and learned that the switchboard was being swamped by incoming calls but couldn't make outgoing calls.

He managed to get in touch with most of his crews before the failure and by 10:30, all

Terms Board Denial 'Confiscatory'

Developer Plans Court Test Of Township Zoning Ordinance

Legality of the Plymouth Township zoning ordinance and decision of the Township zoning commission to deny a petition to rezone 44 acres at the northwest corner of Joy and

Beck Roads from one-acre to 90-foot lots faces a test in Circuit Court.

And Sam Stoller, president of the J. A. R. company which seeks to develop the site, told the Commission that its action "constitutes an unconstitutional act and is confiscatory."

"We have no other step to take but to reject this commission's offer to rezone for half-acre lots," he said. "It isn't economically sound for us to develop on that basis."

"Therefore, we will take the issue to court where there is a strong chance the ordinance will be declared unconstitutional and the entire area thrown wide open for any size lot."

"I wish to emphasize that such a court decision would reflect back to your decision and the responsibility for throwing the area open to any size lot would have to go back to this commission."

Stoller reviewed his previous stand, telling the Commission that he would have to sell half-acre lots in the 44-acre site for \$7,000 to make out whereas lots in the adjoining Woodlore sub are selling for \$6,500.

"Woodlore has the advantage of building as well as developing and can afford to sell for the cheaper price,"

PCF Sets Record Goal Of \$78,560 For 1964

After adding two special grants totaling \$9,400 to the 1964 budget, the Plymouth Community Fund Board of Directors Monday decided to shoot for the moon in the 1964 fund raising campaign with a record goal of \$78,560.

The amount was announced by President Frank Palmer who indicated the Board had held numerous meetings in which it studied the new budget and requests from the various agencies carefully before making the final decision.

"We realize this is the largest goal in history," said Palmer. "But the Board decided to make an all-out effort to reach it due to the requests and the needs for more funds by many agencies. We felt they were legitimate requests and decided to draw up a budget accordingly."

"The \$78,560 goal is \$9,750 more than the record total of \$68,810 raised last fall in the 1963 campaign. I feel certain the residents of the Plymouth Community will get behind this drive wholeheartedly just as they have in the past and push it over the top."

Palmer pointed out that the

Board had approved special grants of \$8,000 for the Y.M.C.A. Youth Development Program and \$1,400 for the Northwest Child Guidance Clinic. He emphasized that a great deal of the \$12,080 increase over the 1963 budget is reflected in the two items.

Actually, the Board made only two major increases in agency allotments over 1963. They were \$5,000 to the Visiting Nurses Association from the \$3,000 of last year and \$2,000 for the Plymouth Youth Club contrasted to \$1,000 in 1963.

Other boosts were: \$25 to the Red Cross, \$340 to the Family Service Bureau; \$500 to the Salvation Army.

The Board sliced \$59 from the \$2,059 for the Veterans Memorial Center which now houses the Family Service Bureau. The last mentioned will operate on a budget of \$17,840 under the new allotments.

Inasmuch as the United Foundation received 15 per cent of the total amount collected, the Board set aside \$9,020 in the budget on the basis of attaining the 1964 goal.

The goal of \$78,560 is 18 per cent higher than the \$66,480 of 1963 and the '64 total is \$9,750 more than the amount collected last fall or slightly more than 13 per cent.

Charles Bruce, president of Alexander Hamilton Insurance Co., is campaign general chairman for the 1964 drive and will be assisted by Robert Stremich,

who guided the successful 1963 effort.

School Board To Vote On Pay Hikes June 24

Fireworks Seen Over Proposals

The Plymouth School District Board of Education will hold one of its most important meetings of the rapidly ending fiscal year Wednesday at 8 p.m. in the administration building when a decision will be made on pay raises for the administrative staff and non-classified personnel.

Also on the agenda of the special meeting is a salary schedule for the recently created position of assistant superintendent of secondary schools. The position was filled by the elevation of William Harding, principal of the junior highs, upon recommendation of Supt. Russell Isbister but no salary was set.

Originally the employe relations committee of the Board started to make salary recommendations in its June meeting for the various classifications but had hardly begun when representatives of the maintenance and custodial workers proposed and indicated they planned to take the matter to the State Mediation Board.

After considerable discussion, the Board decided to make another study of the existing wage scales in adjoining communities before making a final decision.

The custodial and maintenance workers, through Union Representative Robert Ross, contended that Plymouth is not in a competitive position with other school boards of similar size.

Matter of fact, Ross, an international representative of the Union and its business agent, has filed action with the State Mediation Board informing them that a disagreement exists.

FACTS and OPINIONS

Not all the new laws passed by the Michigan Legislature made headlines, but some of those which passed quietly nonetheless have huge significance to those they affect.

For instance, how many of our readers are aware that there now is a law which permits the Court to make assignments on the wages of those who have fallen behind in their alimony payments? It is Public Act 175 of 1964 and went through the Legislature as House Bill 161.

And few realize that as of right now, there is a new fund of \$500,000 for a State of Michigan college scholarship program. It is available to those who can show financial need and it is available up to \$800 per year to public or parochial students for use at the college of their choice. (Application blanks are available from the Michigan Higher Education Assistance Authority, 906 Prudden Building, Lansing.)

P.A. 173 requires a cosmetology student to be at least 16 years of age; for manicurists, at least 17 years of age.

From now on it will take a prescription to obtain paregoric.

Townships and cities now can buy fire equipment on title retaining contracts or chattel mortgages—if the cash isn't available at the time.

Police cars are required to carry specified dry fire extinguishers.

Hereafter there must be at least one voting machine for every 600 registered electors.

All highway-railroad crossings must be marked with reflectorized warning signs.

There is \$30,000 available for experimental pilot programs in three school districts dedicated to special job upgrading for unemployed youth . . . aimed at the school drop-out problem.

The Conservation Commission now has power to set a limited hunting season on elk.

P.A. 270 authorizes two hours per week for public school students to attend classes in religious instruction, off public school property during school hours, upon written consent of parents.

Any vehicle with a capacity of eight or more, used

Zone Bd. Told It Miscued

George Rubin, who sought rezoning of land at the southwest corner of Sheldon and Ann Arbor Roads from single dwelling to commercial for the construction of an enclosed shopping mall, will get another chance to present his case before the Plymouth Township zoning commission.

The commission denied the petition in May when a vote ended in a 3-3 tie. However, Chairman Irving Rozian requested Township Clerk John McEwen to get an opinion from Township Attorney Earl Demel as to the legality of the decision.

Meanwhile, Rubin, who termed the act illegal, made it known that he would take the case to court to test its validity.

Demel, in a communication to McEwen, recommended a rehearing of the matter in view of the results of the vote and the reasons stated for the action.

Demel's letter to McEwen follows: "You have requested this office for an opinion relative to the disposition of a motion when an equal number of members of the Township Planning Commission vote against the motion as vote in favor of the same.

"Since the motion to accept the petition and refer same to the County Coordinating Commission resulted in a tie vote, we are of the opinion, based on the motion presented, that no action resulted for disposition of the petition.

"We do not concur with the suggestion in the minutes that denial of the petition was automatic on a tie vote, since we feel a majority of the quorum is necessary for acceptance or denial.

"Although it may be required to have a majority of the members to exercise a power, a vote of less than a majority of the total membership may defeat a petition for a change of zone where a quorum is present and the vote is a majority of such quorum. (McQuillan, Municipal Corporations, 3rd. Ed. 25.244.)

"We also note questionable adequacy of grounds stated in the minutes on behalf of those opposing. The particular effect on adjacent property owners is not stated, nor is there stated a basis for finding lack of market to justify commercial development.

"We are recommending, therefore, that in view of the results of the vote and the reasons stated, that the petitioner be allowed a rehearing of the matter."

Recurrent reports of land fraud by mail have once again made it necessary to repeat an earlier warning against purchasing of property sight unseen; Paul L. Fisher, president of the Western Wayne-Oakland County Board of Realtors, is said today.

buy up huge tracts of desert or swamp land at negligible cost and then in glowing terms market it as retirement or investment property at which appear to be bargain prices," the board president explained.

3. Contact the real estate commission of the state where the land is located.

Land fraud suits involving huge sums of money have resulted in indictments and convictions recently, particularly in the Western States said Paul L. Fisher.

Often what is left unsaid in the attractive brochures is more misleading than what is claimed. The "beautiful lake" actually is "only a few miles away," but a craggy roadless mountain range lies between the lake and the property for sale; the homesite really would not be a bad place to build, except it is situated atop a mountain and is accessible only by burro; the land really is in a "tropical, wooded setting," but impossible to reach except by helicopter or swamp buggy.

But until stronger protective laws are adopted by all states, the surest way of keeping from being bilked in the land for sale by mail fraud scheme is to inspect the land yourself, or acquire the assistance of a reliable person or agency before signing the sales contract, Mr. Fisher emphasized.

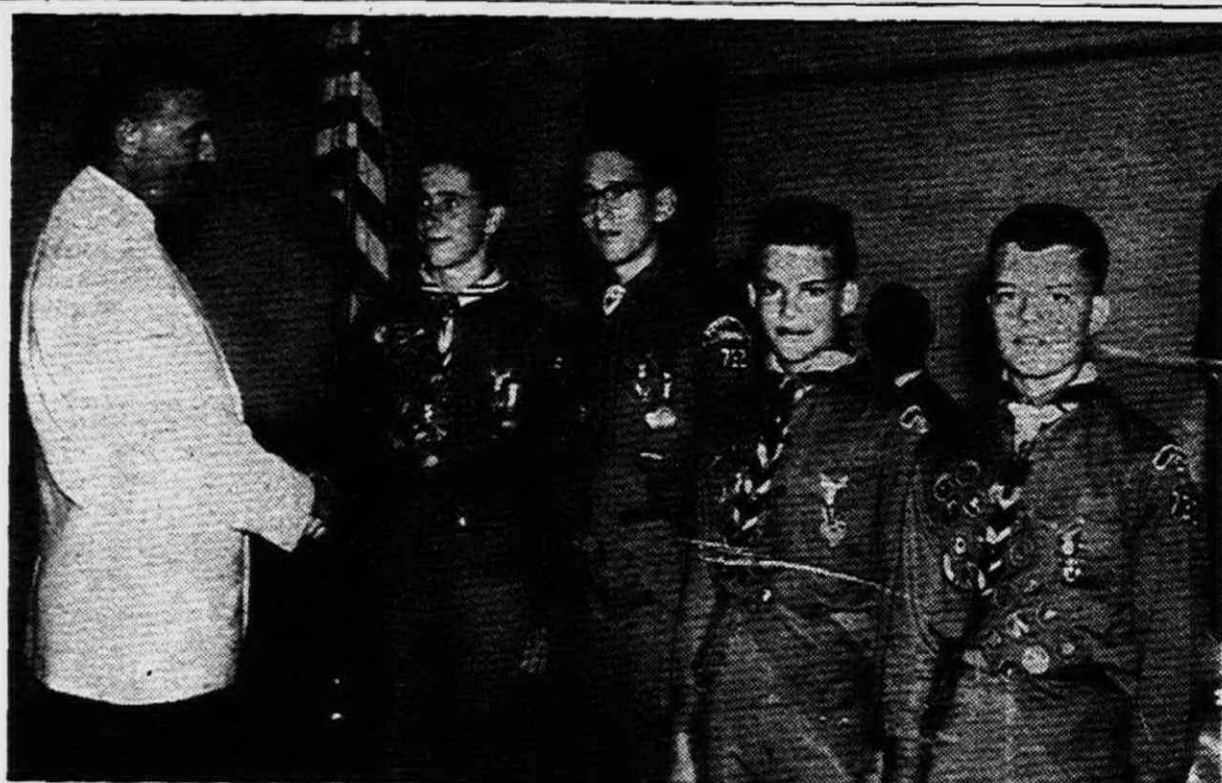

Plymouth Township Electors To Vote on Everything

Although there is still considerable question about the date of the fall primaries and whether the Township offices will be included, Plymouth Township's elected officials plan to start circulating nominating petitions soon in order to meet the late July deadline.

Township Clerk John McEwen, who also is chairman of the Township election board, hasn't received official notification of dates from Wayne County Election Board Chairman Edward Branigan.

"We hear that the primary is scheduled for Sept. 1," McEwen said, "and naturally we're making our plans with that in mind but we haven't received anything official."

Township Supervisor Roy Lindsay and other members of the Township's official family are busy passing petitions asking a statewide referendum on a constitutional amendment to change the present election rule.

Township officials in all parts of the state charge that their offices will be buried and forced off the voting machines if they are ordered to run in the September primary and November election.

All would like a continuance of the spring ballot for two-year terms.

Although no definite word has been given by any of the Plymouth Township officials, it is taken for granted that Lindsay, Treasurer Mrs. Elizabeth Holmes, Clerk McEwen and Trustees Louis Norman and Dick Lauterbach will run for re-election.

There was some talk earlier that Lindsay, who is one of the senior supervisors in the state in age and service, was considering retiring from the post he has held for 11 years.

"Nonsense," he said, when queried about the rumors, "I have no thoughts of retiring and expect to bid for my sixth two-year term. Matter of fact, I'm making plans to start circulating nominating petitions as soon as we receive official word about the primary election date."

Lindsay is one of the leaders in the movement to have the election rules changed by constitutional amendment.

"Here in Plymouth, the voters will be balloting for township, state and national offices as well as for members of the charter commission for the proposed City of Plymouth Heights," he pointed out.

"There probably wouldn't be enough slots on a voting machine to take care of all that and if so, then the Township offices would be down in a corner where few if any would pay any attention. If we had to go to a paper ballot, which is conceivable, then I dread to think of what would happen to votes for the Township posts and the charter commission."

Township officials have been pressing for such a move ever since Attorney General Frank Kelley ruled that all township offices, under the new State Constitution, will have to be on the primary ballot in September and at the election in November.

The petitions, requesting the change, must be filed by July 6 and the Township Associations expect to have more than 300,000 names well before that date.

McEwen, who wears many hats in his dual capacity of Township clerk, head of the petitions have been taken out for charter commission members and anticipates that petitions for the Township Board and Trustees will be in circulation before the end of the week.

"Electors will have more voting to do this fall than at any previous Township election," he emphasized. "Never before have the names of the national, state and local candidates and a charter commission been on the same ballot in this community."

Farnum, a resident of Oakland County, announced his candidacy for the new post last Thursday, stating, "I think the new 19th District should be represented in Congress by a Democrat who can work in harmony with the programs initiated by President Kennedy and carried forward now by President Johnson."

Auditor-General since his appointment in 1961 by former Governor John Swainson, Farnum has been active in the labor movement and has served as advisor to the Office of Price Administration, the War Production Board and as a member of the Michigan State Fair Commission. He was administrative aide to former U.S. Senator Blair Moody and in 1955 was appointed Secretary of State, being elevated two years later to Deputy Secretary of State.

Farnum, whose candidacy will be in a closely-divided district, said he intends to campaign "in every crossroad, neighborhood, hamlet, township, village and city in the district."

Walker Is New PC Chairman

Charles Walker has been named the new chairman of the Livonia Planning Commission, succeeding Ed Milligan, who has left the Commission.

Members of the Commission named Don Heusted as the body's new vice-president.

Milligan, who received messages of tribute from both Mayor Harvey Moelke and the City Council after he declined to accept re-appointment to the body last week, had served on the commission for two years. "He was one of the best Commission members the city has ever had," said Moelke. The Council unanimously passed a resolution thanking him for his "effort, ability and dedication."

Builders Seek Permits For Three New Projects

The mushrooming growth of Plymouth Township, rapidly reaching proportions where it ranks as the greatest in any community in southern Michigan, is headed for new heights with requests for hearings on rezoning petitions for three sites.

The three petitions include: one for a professional office center; one for multiple building with a two-story professional building, and three story apartments including five 16-unit and four 24-unit sections; and the third is for apartments including one of eight-units, four of 16 and two of 10.

The planning commission has set a special meeting to

hear the application of the Plymouth Heritage Apartments on the corner of Sheldon and N. Territorial Roads on July 1.

It approved hearing on applications of Loren Gould for a professional office center on the northeast corner of Haggerty and Ann Arbor Roads and that of Wilfred Bunyea for apartments on the east side of Haggerty Roads between Ann Arbor and Joy Roads for July 15.

Gould, well-known Plymouth builder and developer, plans to construct a seven-building professional office center similar to that he now has on Sheldon Road near N. Territorial Road. He estimates the total cost

at more than \$400,000 and plans to start work as soon as the planning commission gives its approval and the Township Board acts on the recommendation.

Bunyea is seeking permission for a change from single dwelling zoning to that of Garden Apartments for his proposed multi-dwelling, building project. It is his company that proposed to build the professional building and the three-story apartments on Haggerty Road.

The Plymouth Heritage Co. has plans on the drawing board for the seven apartment buildings, including 92-units, at the corner of Sheldon and N. Territorial Roads.

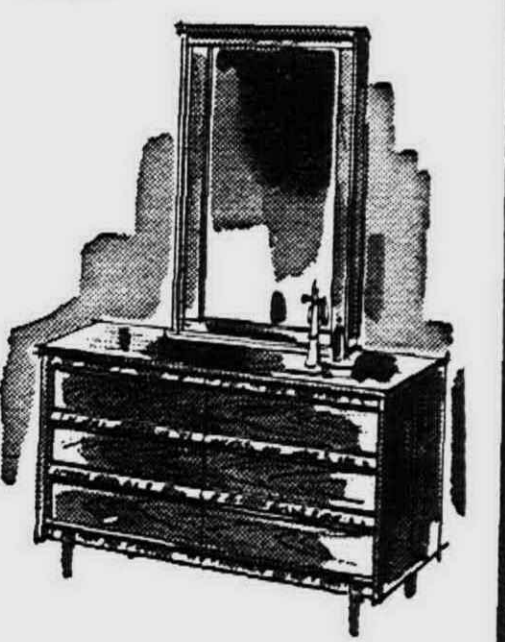

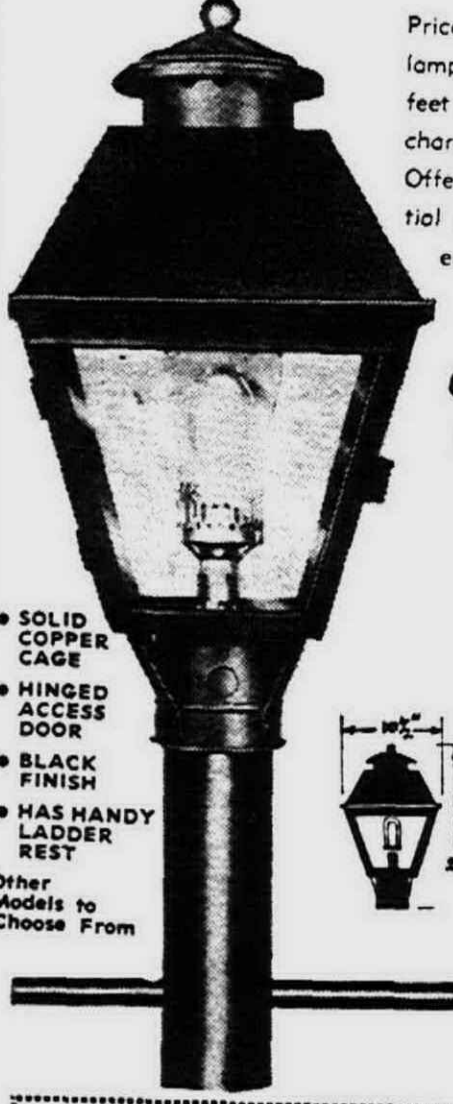

That's Opinion Of Rusty Range's Driver

Nation's Best Race At Northville In HTA Friday

"Even though Overtrick, who I regard as the greatest pacer in harness racing history, probably won't be in the field, Northville Downs customers will be treated to the finest race of the year Friday when the stars of the Harness Tracks of America stake move in for their annual appearance," was the expres-

sion of youthful Willard Niles, a Northville resident, who talks with more than a little authority. Willard was the driver of Rusty Range, the great son of the Michigan sire Russet Hal, who finished second in the HTA spring series last year and won the fall championship. Rusty is owned by William Eggers of Livonia.

There's still an outside chance that Overtrick, the 1963 three-year-old champion, all-time record holder with two miles of 1:57.1 and 1:57.3, and winner of the Little Brown Jug, will put in his appearance. Driver-Trainer Johnny Pat-

erson didn't say he wouldn't bring his great champion to Northville but neither did he say he would. Patterson has been a bit cryptic in handling the pacer, who isn't the soundest in the world, in the HTA. He generally doesn't make his plans known until a few minutes before the deadline for entering.

Naturally Overtrick completely dominates this year's HTA because of his great record and his tremendous speed," said Niles, who has sent Rusty against Overtrick twice. Country Don four times and Meadow Skipper four times.

He finished fourth and eighth behind Overtrick, beat Country Don, who is rated second best to Overtrick in the HTA, three times and Meadow Skipper, one of the three-year-old stars of 1963 who is lame this year, all four times.

"Never have I seen such a pacer," emphasized Niles. "He leaves the gate like a bullet, never eases up and can still come that last quarter in as fast as 26 seconds. We thought we had him once this spring when we were gaining on him down the backstretch. Then he pulled away like Rusty was sitting down and paced his last quarter in just a tick over 27 seconds."

Niles pointed out that none can sell the remainder of this year's HTA eligibles short, since practically all that have started thus far have been in 2:00 or less.

"Naturally it will be a bit of a disappointment not to see Overtrick but folks can be assured that Country Don, Egyptian Pride, Hi Lo's Solar, Fly Fly Byrd, James B. Hanover, Glad Rags and Armbr. Dale don't leave much to your imagination," he pointed out.

"Every single one is capable of winning, with the big guy out of the picture, and any one of the group could shatter Northville's record of 2:00.4 held by Vickie's Jet."

Niles vividly recalls the HTA of last year where Rusty Range was near 2:00 or under most of the year to win the fall championship. He also won \$86,000 for Owner Eggers of Livonia and has added \$65,000 more already this year.

"There isn't any such thing as a breather in the series," he said. "You have to go all out every week or you're far up the track. I feel that last year's series was more competitive than this because we didn't have any such stand-out as Overtrick."

"There were something like 34 pacers that competed in the various legs throughout the season and more than 20 bettered 2:00 at some time during the year."

"Overtrick, at his best, outshines this field. But with Overtrick out, it's an even race between such as Country Don, Hi Lo's Solar, Fly Fly Byrd and Egyptian Pride."

Meantime, Niles is getting ready to ship Rusty, who has been freshening up at the Eggers Farm on Middlebelt Road and at Northville Downs, back to Yonkers Raceway. That's the only track where he can find competition—nothing but \$25,000 invitations and better for him now.

Niles is looking forward to the night when Rusty can take the measure of Cardigan Bay, the spectacular aged Australian star, who Willard tags as the second best pacer in the land—Overtrick first.

He also rates Rusty as the third best with little chance of whipping the other two. He'll be trying to beat Cardigan Bay but doesn't expect to get the job done. He lost his last meeting to the Aussie ace by a long head over the two mile route.

NEARING MILESTONES Billy Bruton, veteran Detroit Tiger outfielder, started 1964 needing seven stolen bases for a lifetime total of 200, 105 runs for a career total of 1,000 and three triples to make it an even 100.

That was a pretty cute ad in Sunset the other month. It showed a pretty girl at the wheel of a car and the headline read, "First time I ever carried fertilizer on the front seat." Maybe you saw it.

The copy went on to say that it wasn't so very long ago when all fertilizer had to ride in the trunk on account of the smell and the dirt. It was heavy to lug around and attracted flies and vermin. And results were uncertain. "One bum steer after another" as one wag put it.

Today, of course, there are quite a few fertilizers that a pretty girl doesn't object to carrying on the front seat. And light enough for her to lift, too. They're free of objectionable smells and free of weed seeds, too. Instead of being by-products they are specifically designed for use on lawns.

Fireworks? Put 'em Away

Fireworks? Keep 'em out of sight.

That's the warning from Livonia's Fire Prevention Bureau this week, as the annual Fourth of July holiday approaches.

"The city has an ordinance prohibiting the sale and use of all forms of fireworks, including sparklers," senior inspector John J. Bunk said this week. "The reason for this law is because many youngsters have been seriously injured and property damage has been caused in the past through the improper handling of fireworks."

Last week, the city fire department reported, youngsters started a grass fire by tossing firecrackers into a field. Last year, an area girl suffered serious burns from sparklers.

"We hope that parents and youngsters will refrain from using fireworks and insure, therefore, a safe holiday," Bunk said.

Local Firm Introduces New Light-Weight Combination Arc Welder and Auxiliary Power Supply

The C. E. Phillips Company has introduced to this area a new, gasoline engine driven, combination arc welder and auxiliary power supply. In announcing the new model he stated, "The Weldanpower 130, manufactured by The Lincoln Electric Company of Cleveland, Ohio, has been designed to answer local industry's need for a light weight, portable welder and electric power plant. This dual purpose machine will make the user electrically independent and will enable him to carry out construction work or make equipment repairs on the spot anywhere. We hope its compact, low cost design will make arc welding as indispensable as the hand drill and wrench for all maintenance and construction work."

The Weldanpower 130 is NEMA rated to produce 130 amps of AC welding current at 25 volts, 20 percent duty cycle or 3500 watts of 115 volt, single phase, 60 cycle AC auxiliary power continuously. A dial type current selector switch provides six settings for the 60-130 ampere welding range. The welder can be used to join mild steel or stainless steel, repair cast iron parts and hardsurface. Maximum recommended electrode diameter is 1/8 inch except for some mild steel types where 5/32 inch may be used.

A one cylinder air cooled Kohler engine is direct coupled to the generator shaft. The engine rating is 9.5 horsepower at 3600 RPM; the operating speed for welding or supplying power. The engine design incorporates a magneto ignition system and rope starting. A lifting lug centered and projecting slightly above the top of the welder for easy attachment will support the entire weight of the unit; 246 pounds. The compact design dimensions 25 inches long, 19 inches high and 24 inches wide.

Optional features include an accessory kit—headshield, lens, electrode holder, ground clamp and welding cables. A two wheeled semi-pneumatic tired running gear is also available for easy movement around the job site.

Laundry Center Saves Steps For Housewife

Home planners seem to think of almost everything when they design houses.

They provide closets, corners and crevices for just about every activity and every bit of equipment used in daily life.

Except one. The laundry. Surveys show that owners of automatic washers and dryers use them at least three times a week. Obviously, doing the wash is a major activity in modern life. But you'd never know it to look at most modern homes. Automatic washers and dryers often are tucked away in a dark basement or drafty garage. And even if they're conveniently located, there's likely to be a shortage of nearby work and storage space.

As a result, Mom finds herself trekking from room to room, collecting soiled laundry,

detergent, bleach and fabric softener. Then over to the washer to put in the clothes. Then back again later to put them in the dryer. Then still another trip to remove the clean clothes, sort and fold them. And then more walking and lugging to put the clean things in the assorted closets and shelves where they are stored.

There's a way to take all this commuting out of cleanliness. The answer is installation of a laundry center in your home — a centralized place for all equipment you need to do the laundry.

Minimum requirements suggested for such a center include: a washer and dryer, or combination washer-dryer; space for soiled garments, preferably at least three bins so clothes can be sorted by type of load (colored, white and wash-and-wear); storage space for detergent, bleach and other laundry aids, and a place for sorting and folding clean clothes.

If space permits, you may want to add any or all of the following: more bins for soiled clothes; a sink for pre-treating extra-soiled collars and cuffs, and starching; a place for ironing and ironing board and sewing equipment, and a place to hang wash-and-wear clothes as they come out of the dryer (a must if they're to remain wrinkle-free).

Location of all this equipment will depend on the design of your home and available space. One handy spot is in or adjacent to the kitchen. A laundry center could be installed at one end of a large kitchen, divided from the food preparation area by an island sink, which then serves both areas.

Or you might install laundry equipment near the main source of soiled laundry — the bedroom-bath area, perhaps in a hallway, the bath itself, or even an extra-large closet. A few other possible locations are breezeways, recreation rooms and alcoves.

So — if you're looking for home improvement ideas — how about a laundry center?

Township Clerk Hires New Aide

Plymouth Township's building boom and expected population growth increased the duties of Township Clerk John McEwen and his Deputy Mrs. Janice Birkelbaw so much that he asked the Board for additional help and received permission to hire another clerk.

McEwen, pressed with meetings night after night and especially lengthy sessions of the planning commission, requested assistance so that he could assign the new clerk to serve as ex officio secretary of several of the commissions and boards.

Nona Cahill, 9320 Lilley Road, who was graduated from Plymouth High School less than two weeks ago, assumed the duties of clerk in McEwen's office a week ago.

She started to work on Monday and received her first test under fire when she recorded the proceedings of last Wednesday's lengthy meeting of the planning commission.

Miss Cahill will spell off McEwen and Mrs. Birkelbaw at numerous meetings of the various boards. McEwen plans to attend most sessions of the planning commission but the matter of recording the activities is now in the hands of Nona—she did an excellent job in her initial test accord-

ing to a report from her new boss.

With the primary elections coming up in September and the election in November and all of the work required in accepting petitions for candidates for the Township offices and for the charter commission for the proposed City of Plymouth Heights, McEwen figured he would be tied up most of the summer and early fall.

Mrs. Birkelbaw is busy with the normal work of the Clerk's office and the ever increasing demand for building permits, requests for zoning hearings before the planning commission and other items that go with a building boom, made it almost impossible for McEwen to handle all the necessary details.

Thus he made the request for help and hired Miss Cahill after considerable screening and upon recommendations of PHS faculty members.

With a field of 22 beauties in the competition for the annual Miss Plymouth contest — one of the features of the July 4 celebration — members of the Plymouth Junior Chamber of Commerce are looking forward to one of their most successful holiday celebrations in years.

- July 5—Carnival and announcement of the winners of the steer and trailer contests.

Incidentally the parade promises to be the largest and best in history with more than 30 floats already entered along with three bands, numerous marching units including the VFW's state championship color guard and women's auxiliary drill team.

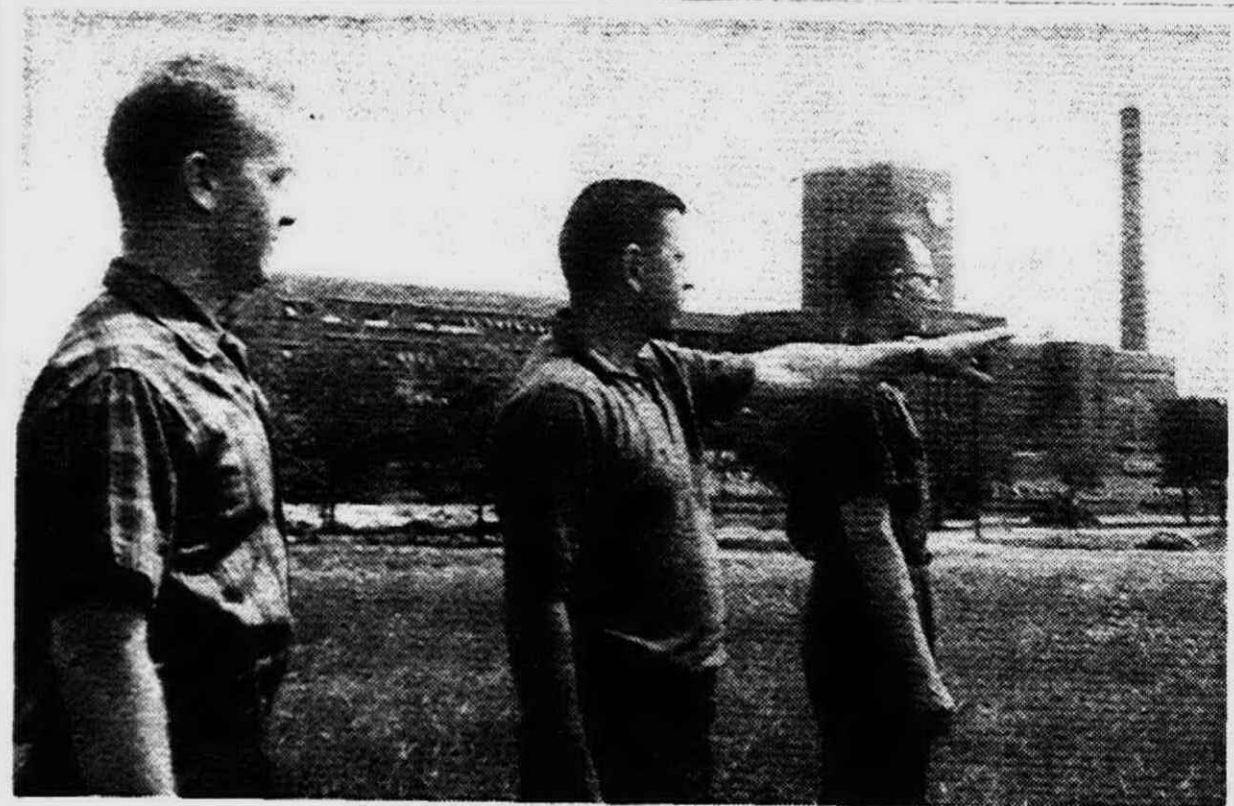
Roy Lindsay. Romney will arrive in Plymouth from Ypsilanti shortly before the start of the procession and indicated he will walk the entire parade route.

Challenges Zone Ordinance

Stoller said, "But we can't, we would go broke if we had to sell half-acre lots for that price. That's why we requested zoning for 90-foot lots."

Stoller told the Commission that he felt "we have no chance of getting favorable action from this board. We have the choice of the Commission shooting us or drowning us."

Chairman Irving Rozian informed Stoller that the Commission believed it was acting in the best interests of adjacent property owners, in terms of the law and in the interest of all people in the community.

After hearing other residents from the area, the Board voted unanimously to deny the petition on the basis that such a change would constitute spot zoning.

Paul Boatman, president of the Ten Mile Lake Company which is petitioning for four changes in zoning of 448 acres at the northwest corner of Ann Arbor and Napier Roads, presented a lengthy and eloquent plea for his petition in a wrangle between Boatman, the Commission and Township Supervisor Roy Lindsay.

After considerable debate and pro and con discussion, the Commission voted to table the matter until the next meeting at which time it will decide to set a time for a hearing or not.

Boatman indicated his company was prepared to pay for the necessary sewer and water improvements needed for the development of the proposed site.

However, under questioning from Rozian, he admitted that Ten Mile was not thinking in terms of spending \$300,000 to extend the water and sewer lines to the subdivision but rather of installing its own water and sewage disposal system.

"We plan on installing our own sewage disposal system if the township lines are not available at the time construction starts," Boatman said. "This system would be tied in with interceptor sewers as soon as available."

"We will drill our own well system supply water for five or six homes. Meanwhile, perhaps the Township water and sewer lines will be extended to that area before we have homes ready for occupancy."

Boatman pointed out that the proposed systems would be built under the code required by the State Board of Health.

Rozian replied that "granted the State Board of Health requirements could take care of the subdivision but never before has a Planning Commission here had a problem of local water and disposal system."

"Therefore," he said, "we will have to study this carefully and we should have talks with Planner W. C. Johnson and Engineer Herald Hamill before further action."

It was brought out in the conversation that the lagoon sewage system is in use now at Fowlerville where presumably it is working satisfactorily.

Supervisor Roy Lindsay, who had sat down in conference with Boatman and Hamill a week earlier, told the Board that it "is my personal opinion that this is all premature."

"These kind of treatment plants have never worked out. I don't feel this Commission should consider any action until public sewers and water are available. That's the time to act, not now when everything is so much in the air. I

repeat this proposal is premature and shouldn't be considered."

Lindsay went on to say that he personally opposed having one petition carry requests for four different kinds of zoning such as this.

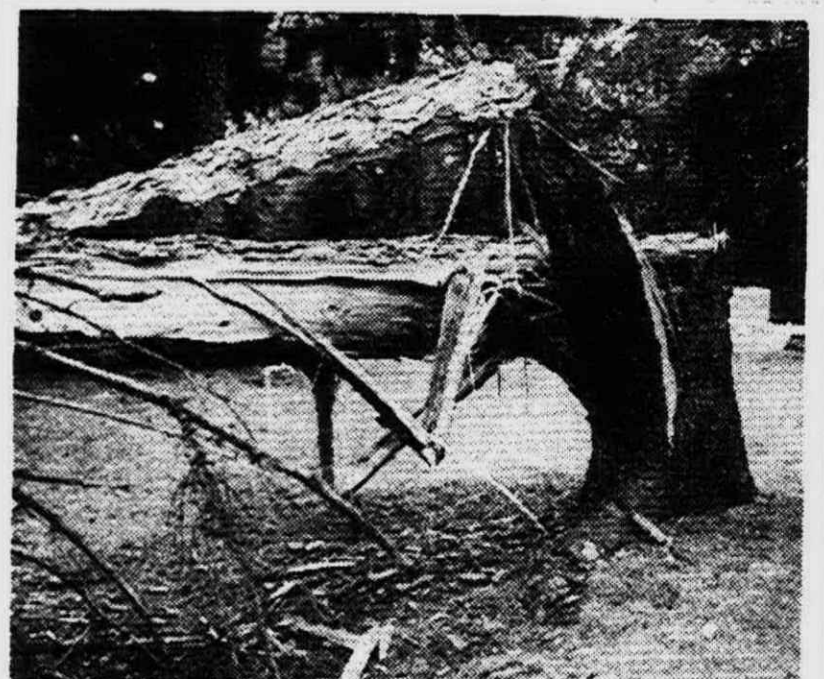
The Ten Mile Road petition asks the Commission to change the zoning from agriculture to single dwelling, apartment, commercial and professional office.

Tivador Balogh, of the Commission, suggested the Board

ask for more detailed specifications and a time table on the development of the proposed subdivision.

After comments by each of the five members in attendance, the Commission voted to table the petition until next meeting.

Secretary Arthur Haeske, who has resigned as a member of the Commission, effective July 1, because he is moving into the City of Plymouth, received a plaque from the Board in appreciation of his services during the past four years.

were busy with the start of the cleanup.

The winds blew so many branches and leaves down that all sewers along Main Street were clogged and water was up to the doors of stores before Bida and his men, working in their bare feet, managed to clear the drains and relieve the pressure.

At that time, phone and power-line service was disrupted in all sections of the city with many power lines down in the Hough Park section.

Telephone lines had snapped in the northeast section around Blunk and Harvey and Sheridan was in a state of turmoil with a huge tree across the street and a power line down.

The Plymouth Police Department ordered all men out for duty and the Plymouth Fire Department and volunteers stepped into the situation.

Sam Gray, 144 E. Pearl, was sitting in the living room with his wife and daughter watching television when there was a bolt of lightning and a crash—it was a huge tree that fell across the front porch.

Residents in the 300 block on Adams Street were scared out of their homes when a bolt struck a tree in front of 311 Adams.

"It struck with such force that I thought this was the end for sure, said a resident, who refused to give his name. "We saw every color of the rainbow and the bolt struck with such force I thought it was going to move my house."

Mrs. Jerry Richards, 853 Church Street, took refuge in the basement when the storm was at its height. And it was just as well for the wind uprooted a tree in the backyard and it toppled on the rear of the house with minor damage.

Frank Terry, 145 N. Union, had two trees in front of his home. One he prized highly as the showpiece of the neighborhood, the other was on its last legs—so the wind blew the prize down and over the street.

DPW workers were busy Saturday morning cutting it up to clear the street.

Riverside Cemetery was hit hard in several places when some of the huge pine trees were swept down and fell among the grave markers and monuments.

The story was much the same in the Township where workers from the Road Commission were busy clearing the streets and residents had to clear the trees on their property themselves.

Trees were down across the road on Schoolcraft at several spots in Plymouth and Livonia and along Five Mile but workers had all routes cleared within hours after the storm.

It was rather costly for the City of Plymouth. Bida estimated that the weekend cost would go as high as \$5,000

Persons who use the telephone to "harass" others are subject to "disorderly person" charges and punishment.
