





That was the report of Board President Gerald Fischer Monday night in a formal hearing on the proposed budget for the new fiscal year.

Fischer, in analyzing the proposed budget, indicated the Board will receive \$36,-225 more for the coming year in the new state aid formula. The anticipated increased enrollment will add another \$94,600 but a drop in the state equalized valuation clipped \$17,758 from the funds. The school system will receive \$984,280 from the state under the increased formula contrasted to \$948,055 if the state aid formula had not changed. The proposed budget for the new school year includes: \$1,-78,560 for elementary instrucion. an increase of \$118,442 ver last year. \$1,032,385 for secondary instruction, up \$90,851.



That big Bingo game at Shelden Center in Livonia continues on its merry way-three nights a week behind blacked-out windows at \$2,500 to \$3,000 gross per night -and no law enforcement official anywhere yet has indicated concern.

There is a State Law making such games illegal, particularly when conducted by a group of private citizens only technically organized as a "non-profit" corporation.

But officials who will enforce the law are terribly difficult to find. Wayne County Prosecutor Sam Olsen is motionless, and has nothing to say on the subject. The local police forces all bow gallantly to the Prosecutor when it comes to Bingo, and if he condones, they leave quietly. It is thus not only with this large Livonia game, but with smaller ones in Plymouth, Northville, Redford and other places nearby.

As typical of the unjustifiable, crazy-quilt consequences of the recent series of Redistricting maneuvers, all manipulated by cynical Democratic quarterbacks, one might consider the case of Plymouth, Michigan.

For purposes of U.S. Congress, citizens of Plymouth were attached, like a barnacle, to Washtenaw and Jackson counties, to the west.

For purposes of State Senate, citizens of Plymouth were attached, like a barnacle, to Oakland County to the north.

For purposes of State House, citizens of Plymouth were attached, like a barnacle, to Wayne County (Garden City, Nankin Township, etc. heading southward.

He pushed the now-unconscious Curran to the surface where he was pulled out by two men and immediately they began with artificial respiration-one applying the strength and the other the timing.

Although the Township firemen pullmotor responded promptly, the neighbors had already brought John Curran back to life themselves, by keeping their heads-

Aluminum Effective In Repelling Aphids

may become a weapon against disease carrying aphids. Winged aphids move rapidly from one plant to another in search of food. Some of them transmit viruses and other diseases. They are continually a pest on roses, mums and almost all ornamental plants in the garden. They are difficult to control and are aluminum powder and asphalt extremely prolific.

Scientists from the Agricultural Research Service have materials are non-toxic to used aluminum foil sheets to plants and animals. divert aphids from test plots in 1963. Although these matersheets were placed between the sprays. rows and around the plots, the reduction of aphids caught in traps was 96 to 98 per cent.

Scientists do not know as yet why aluminum repels aphids and they still must learn whether other insect vectors of virus are repelled
