Tungate Will Face Lindsay In Supervisor's Race

Roy Lindsay, veteran Plymouth Township supervisor, is assured of a battle for a sixth two-year term in the general election in November.

Lindsay, who heads the Republican ticket in his quest for re-election, learned of the opposition when Orville Tungate, 9433 Brookline, prominent Township Democrat, filed his pe-

tion for supervisor shortly before last Tuesday's deadline.

Tungate had a two-fold purpose when he filed the petitions with Clerk John McEwen—he wanted to keep the Democratic party alive in the Township and on the ballot and he honestly feels he has a chance of unseating Lindsay.

Other than that, all Republi-

can incumbents filed for re-election and each is assured of holding the post for two more years because of lack of opposition.

Tungate was the only Democrat to file even though all Township posts, including two Trustees, were up for grabs.

The biggest news came when McEwen reported re-

ceipt of 11 petitions for election to the charter commission for the proposed City of Plymouth Heights.

McEwen personally delivered and filed the petitions at the Wayne County election board offices in the City-County Building in downtown Detroit.

The 11 petitioners were: Maurice Breen, 41121 Greenbrook

Lane; Daniel Evans Jr., 41037 Russet Lane; Wilfred Gignac, 42410 Parkhurst; Harlan Hickerson, Sr., 9595 Gold Arbor; Ed Good, 40000 Ann Arbor Road; Robert Richardson, 9110 Morrison Street.

Others include: Martin Schomberger, 40810 E. Ann Arbor Trail; John Murawski, 41020 Greenbriar Lane; Wil-

liam Green, Jr., 42033 Brentwood Street; Orville Tungate, 9433 Brookline; and Francis Ross, 39919 E. Ann Arbor Trail.

McEwen, who resides at 44475 Governor Bradford, filed for his second term as Clerk.

Mrs. Elizabeth Holmes, 9280 Lilley Road, will seek her sixth

term as Treasurer.

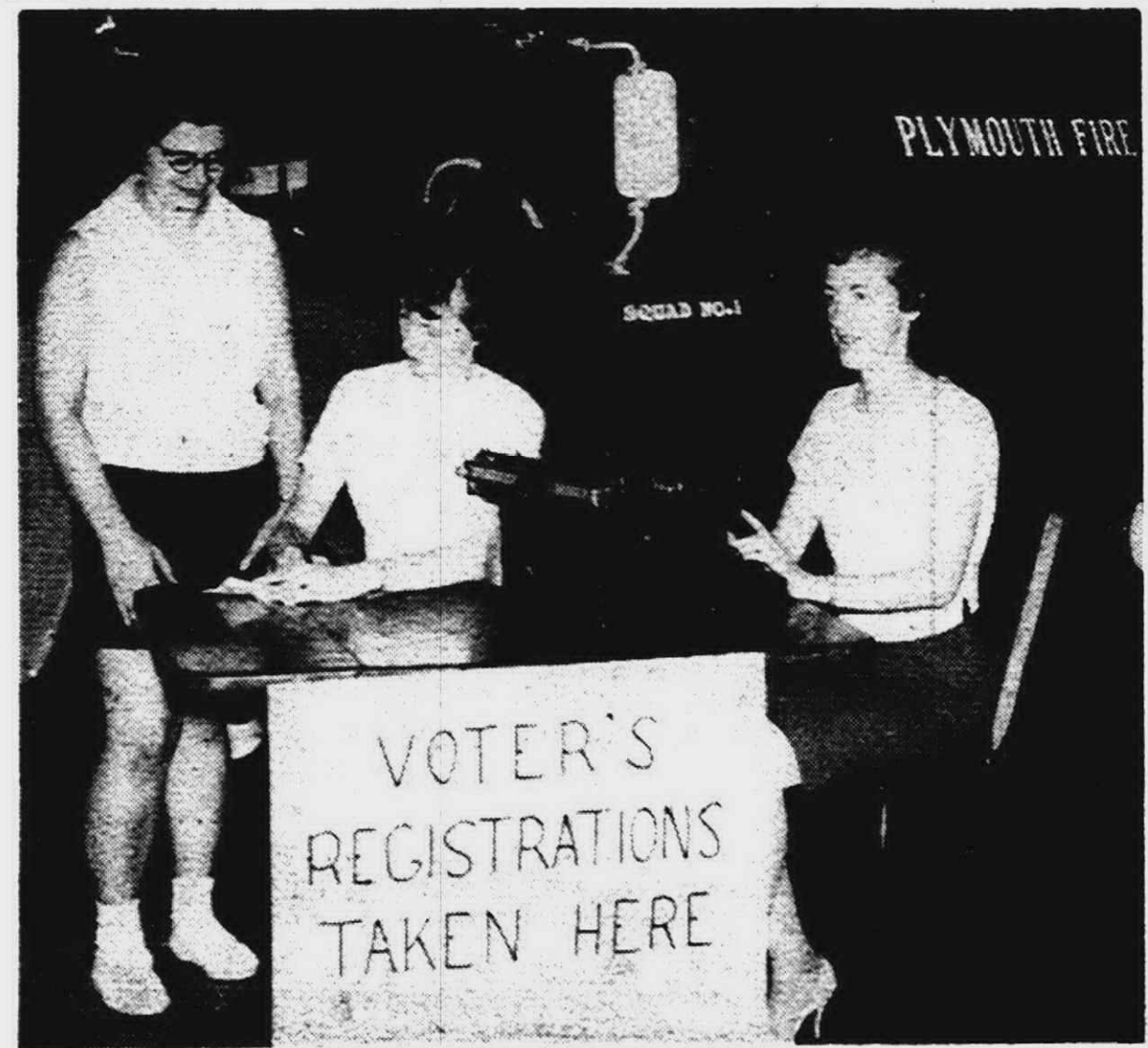

Three entered the race for Constable including: Donald King, 41151 Micol Drive; Louis

Justice of Peace Martin Schomberger, 40810 E. Ann Arbor Trail, filed petitions for the Republican nomination for that post.

The primary is slated for Sept. 1 and then comes the big general election in November.

Ballots Jammed By State Hopefuls

Campaign battles are shaping up in western Wayne County's two Congressional and seven Legislative districts, following a last-minute scurry of filing by candidates before last Tuesday's deadline.

Three Republicans and two Democrats are in the race for the new 19th District Congressional seat, which involves Livonia and Redford Township, and the same number will battle it out in the Second District, which includes the Plymouth area.

On a statewide level, meanwhile, top Democratic candidates Neil Staebler and Philip A. Hart face no primary opposition in their quest for the gubernatorial and senate nominations. But a three-way race is in the offing for the Republican Senate nomination, while Governor George Romney faces primary opposition from George Higgins.

Except for Redford Township's new self-contained seat in the state House of Representatives, all of the other local contests will find challengers from adjacent communities. New district plans lump together a number of Wayne, Oakland and Washtenaw County municipalities in Congressional, State Senate and State House districts.

Rotary Makes Plans For Biggest Festival

Plymouth expects to almost double its population on Sunday, September 13. That's the day the Rotary Club puts on its annual chicken and corn barbecue. The event will be held between noon and 6 p.m. in Kellogg Park as it has for the past several years.

Local business and professional men who are members of the Rotary Club, and non-members who have been recruited to give a hand on the big day, will begin seasoning, buttering, and barbecuing the first of 15,000 chicken halves early in the morning of September 13.

Redford Township and Livonia are joined in the 19th District Congressional Seat, but new districting plans give Redford its own State Representative while attaching it to Dearborn Heights for a State Senate seat. And four precincts in southern Livonia are swallowed up by a Nankin-centered seat for State House, while the rest of the city is joined to Northville for a House seat.

The Festival had its inception in a modest way seven years ago as a chicken barbecue sponsored by the Plymouth Rotary Club as a means of raising funds for various civic projects.

It has grown to a point where last year the barbecue alone attracted 10,000 visitors and the Rotary Club, which is again spearheading the event, is planning to accommodate 15,000 visitors this year.

Both City Clerk Richard Shafer and Township Clerk John McEwen urge all to make sure they are eligible—just call the offices and check if you are in doubt.

Each has offered to send a registration clerk to the homes of aged, ailing or invalids who are unable to make the necessary personal appearance at the Boards to register. Call Shafer's office if you live in the City and McEwen at the Township Hall.

Here is a complete breakdown of the time schedule for the registration drive in the city and township during the final four days. Check the times and fit the schedule into your program.

Both clerks warn that you have until Aug. 3 at 8 p.m. to register if you now are ineligible. Each is doing his best to give all an opportunity to sign up and each hopes that every elector in the area has his name on file before the deadline.

Register Now! Vote Sept. 1

If you haven't voted in a primary or general election for two years, then you must register again to become eligible to go to the polls for the Sept. 1 primary.

Plymouth City and Township Election Boards have set up schedules to accept registrations before the Aug. 3 deadline.

The Festival, now become an annual community event, has grown far beyond the original concept of a charcoal-broiled chicken dinner. The Rotary Club will again serve chicken and corn-on-the-cob dinners out-of-doors in the park as one of the major attractions of the Festival, but other events of a cultural and entertainment nature are also scheduled.

Various arts, musical, historical, and horticultural organizations have teamed up with the Rotary Club to make the Fall Festival and Plymouth Community's biggest outdoor event of the year.

Last year the Festival was enlivened by exhibits or performances by the Three Cities Arts Club, Marion Sober's Studio, the Plymouth Theatre Guild, the Plymouth Community Band, the Plymouth Historical Society and the Plymouth Garden Club, and it is expected that these and other groups will participate in the Festival again this year.

General chairmen of the Rotary portion this year are Kal Jabara, Loren Gould, and Bob Stremich. The committee in charge of publicizing the affair is headed by City Manager Al Glassford, who has announced special prizes for children to be awarded to holders of the winning chicken dinner

Developer Is Asked, "Where's Playfield?"

Builder and developer Fred Greenspan, who has been the key figure behind the huge Lakepointe subdivision, learned last week that some members of the Plymouth Township planning commission have long memories.

Ten years ago, Greenspan presented his original plans for the entire Lakepointe sub., including space for a school (now Farrand School) and for a playground.

The school was built and currently is being expanded for the umpteenth time to take care of the rapidly growing area. Matter of fact the growth has been so big that the school board is thinking in terms of another school in the area in the not too distant future.

Township Engineer Herald Hamill last week presented plans for Lakepointe Subdivisions 8 and 9 to the planning commission and things were going along rather smoothly—until one of the

Board recalled that the original plat included a playground.

So Builder Greenspan was informed that the commission has tabled the requests for the two new subdivisions until he definitely locates the play site.

Preliminary plans for the proposed Cambridge Village subdivision, which would be constructed on what is the expansion of Eckels Road between Joy and Warren, were approved with a decision on a public hearing to be made at the commission's regular August meeting.

The Cambridge Village sub will include 200 lots.

Proposal of Loren Gould for a 22-home subdivision on N. Territorial Road were accepted pending additional information on plans to relocate Tonquish Creek which flows through the acreage.

The commissioners asked for additional data on the topography.

Photofinishing Firm Plans Expansion

Consolidation of Detroit Color Laboratories, Inc. and its subsidiary firms, Robison-Phillips Corp., Detroit, and Enterline Photo Service, Inc., Plymouth, under Gold Seal Photo Service, Inc., is announced by Head, President of Gold Seal Photo Service.

This centralization will enable Gold Seal Photo Service to expand its promotional activities and increase the range of its service to drug stores and camera shops throughout southern Michigan and northern Ohio.

Other officers of the new corporation are John Banks, Vice President and production manager; Frank Kierdorf, sales manager; Harold Keenan, Detroit plant manager; Harold Evans, Plymouth plant manager; and

William Luke, manager of sales promotion.

Detroit Color Laboratories, which was founded in 1945, acquired in 1958 the assets of Robison-Phillips Corp., a firm with 50 years' experience in photofinishing. During the next two years, Detroit Color Laboratories also purchased Kluge Photo Service and Saunders Photo Service, both of Detroit.

By 1963 the company had further expanded its facilities through the acquisition of Ohio Photo Service, Toledo, and Enterline Photo Service.

Head indicated that the increased facilities have enabled Gold Seal Photo Service to boost the sales volume of its more than 300 dealers approximately 375 percent in the past five years. Today the firm has facilities to process over five million rolls of film annually. Plans are now underway for a new Gold Seal Photo Service plant in Plymouth.

AGED TRIO SUFFOCATE IN CLOSET

Livonia Police are seeking a diabolic robber-killer who locked three elderly doctors—two sisters and a brother—in a small clothes closet on the second floor of their home at 11040 Melrose and left them there to die in the steaming, searing heat of last week.

The badly decomposed bodies of the trio were found by investigating officers Sunday afternoon when they answered a call from neighbors who reported they hadn't seen any of the three for several days.

Patrolman W. Cryak made the initial investigation after Charles Bowdlear, 11026 Melrose, called police to check since he hadn't seen any of the trio for several days and thought there might be a sick person in the home.

Patrolman Cryak entered the home with Paul Drumm, 34765 Standish, a friend of the family, and they discovered the bodies in the closet.

Dr. William Parsons, 70. Crayk immediately dispatched a call to the Livonia Police headquarters and officers from the vice detective bureau under the supervision of Capt. Michael Vorgitch and Lieut. Robert Turner were on the scene in minutes.

Turner told reporters they found the house in shambles where the robber or robbers apparently ransacked the dwelling from the roof to the basement. Police theorize the killer or killers were in search of a cache of money which Dr. William

Parsons supposedly had hidden. Dr. William Parsons was released from the Jackson State Prison on July 15 after serving 18 months of a two to four years term for abortion. He was sent up from Detroit after an arrest there by police officers on the charge.

The bodies were removed from the home as quickly as possible, considering their condition, by Wayne County Morgue workers and autopsies Monday showed that all three had died of suffocation.

Lt. Turner, who viewed in the

autopsy, indicated that incomplete examinations showed no bruises or bodily injury to any of the three.

"On the basis of the information from the coroner's office, which is still incomplete, we are certain that this is definitely a case of homicide," he said.

"The initial reports shows that all three of the victims died of suffocation after being locked in the small, hot clothes closet."

Clarenceville Joins 14 Oakland Districts in Reader Study

Clarenceville Schools will join with 14 Oakland County School districts in a study of reading methods in the first grade. The project will be financed with \$30,000 in Federal funds.

In response to a nationwide invitation from the United States Office of Education for research proposals designed to learn more about first grade reading instruction, Dr. Harry Hahn, Director of Instruction for Oakland County School, submitted a proposal.

It concerned "A study of

the relative effectiveness of three methods of teaching reading in Grade One." Oakland County will be one of 27 research centers involved in the study.

The three methods studied locally are language arts, initial teaching alphabet, and basic reader approaches.

The language arts approach introduces pupils to reading through a variety of media such as writing and speaking, painting, and pupil-prepared materials. Thus reading instruction is started with children's ex-

periences through the use of charts and stories.

The initial teaching alphabet introduces children to beginning reading instruction through the use of a simplified or augmented alphabet which provides 44 distinct symbols or letters to represent the 44 sounds in the English language. Transition to books using the traditional alphabet begins after the new alphabet has been firmly established in pupils' experience.

The basal reader approach in-

roduces children to reading instruction with a carefully controlled vocabulary in a basic reading text.

Beginning Aug. 24, all

teachers participating in the study will meet for one week for an intensive in-service training program conducted by Dr. Hahn and his assistant,

Philip Hilaire who supervised teacher training for Initial Teaching Alphabet program in Bethlehem, Pa. Schools.

Following a general session to brief the entire group on the nature of this research program, teachers for each of the approaches will meet separately to receive instruction in the procedures which will be used to plan an effective program together.

During the first three months of the school year, teacher meetings will be scheduled every two weeks to provide

guidance and opportunities to share promising practices. Monthly meetings from December on will be continued until the close of school.

Consultants will also be invited to participate in the program periodically to discuss specific practices and assist in evaluating procedures being used. The State Department of Public Instruction will also provide the County with assistance.

Katherine Wolfarth, Linda Aldrich and Mrs. Ruth House are the teachers who will be involved in the project.

The money from the Federal grant will be used for teachers salaries during the week of in-service training, salaries of substitutes providing released time for teachers, consultant services, providing test materials and test scoring services.

Other districts participating are: Farmington, Pontiac, Waterford, Walled Lake, Oak Park, Hazel Park, Troy, Royal Oak, Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills, Rochester, Ferndale, and Lamphere.

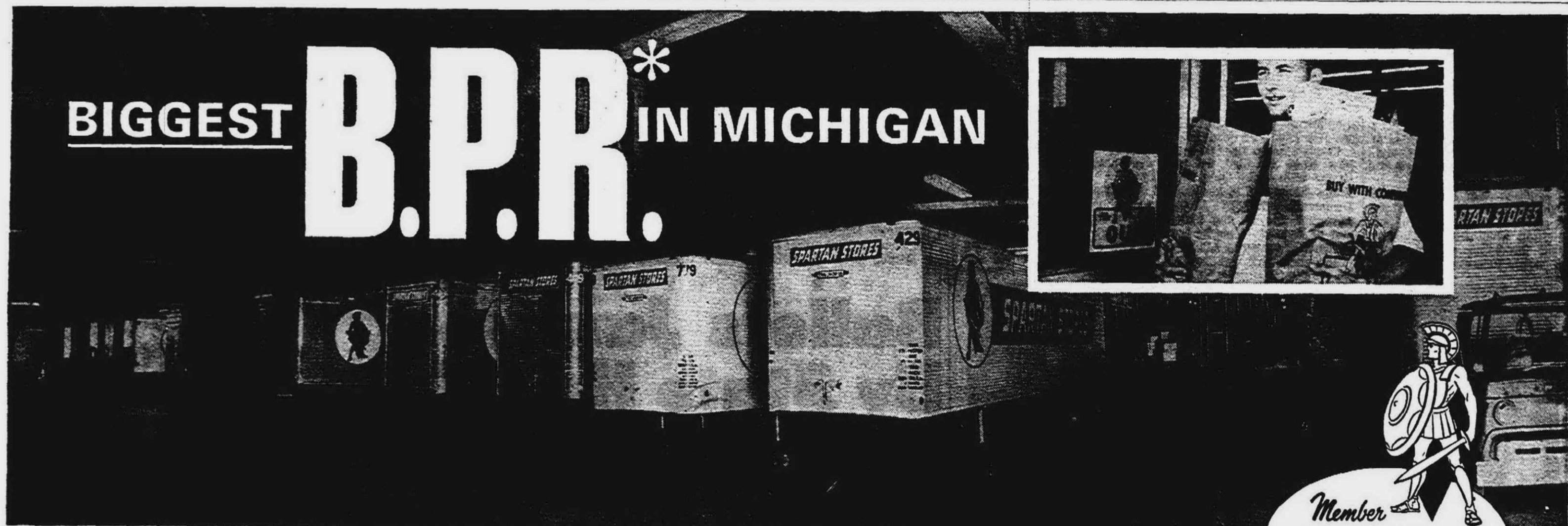
Plan Dem Convention

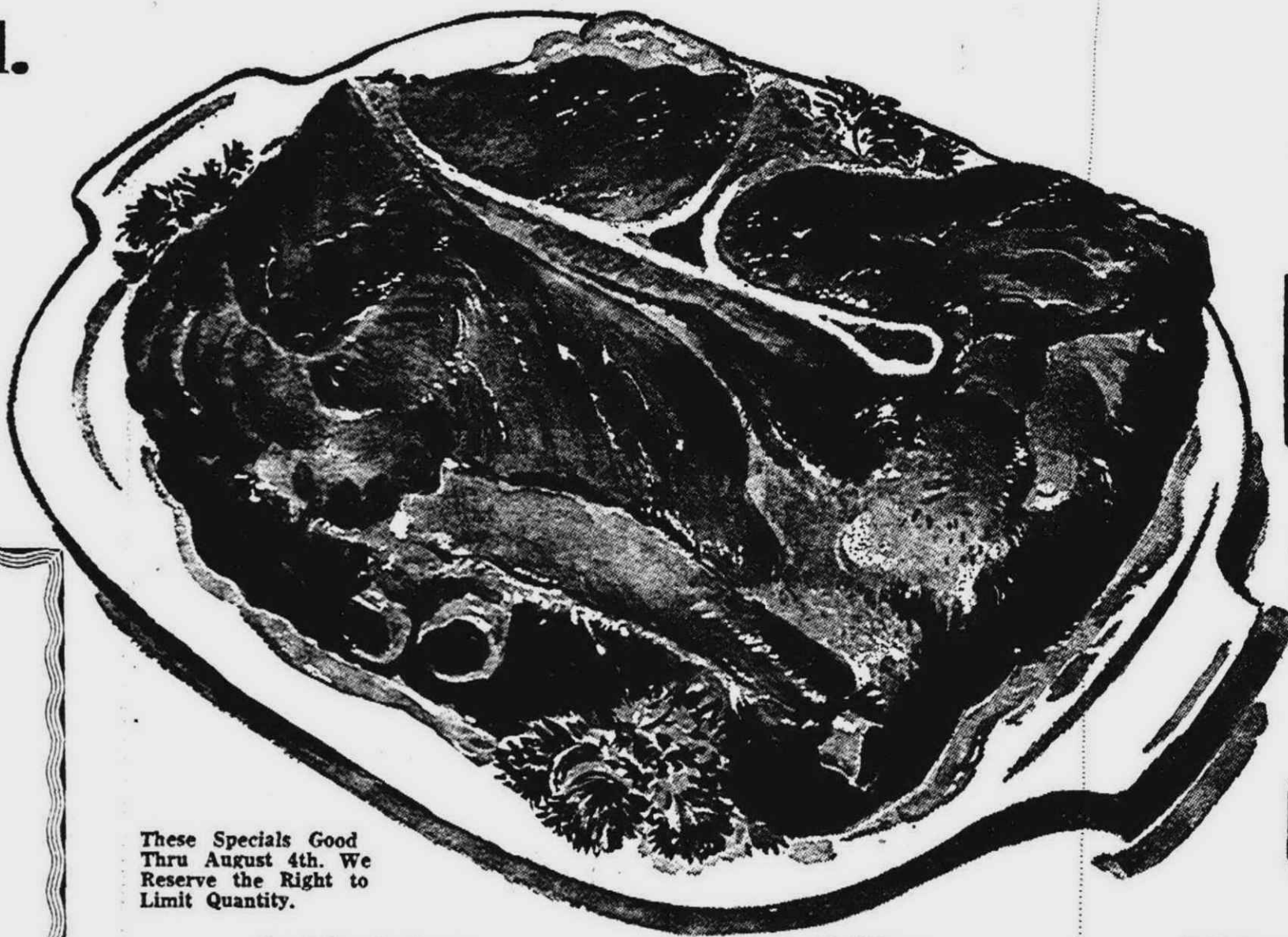

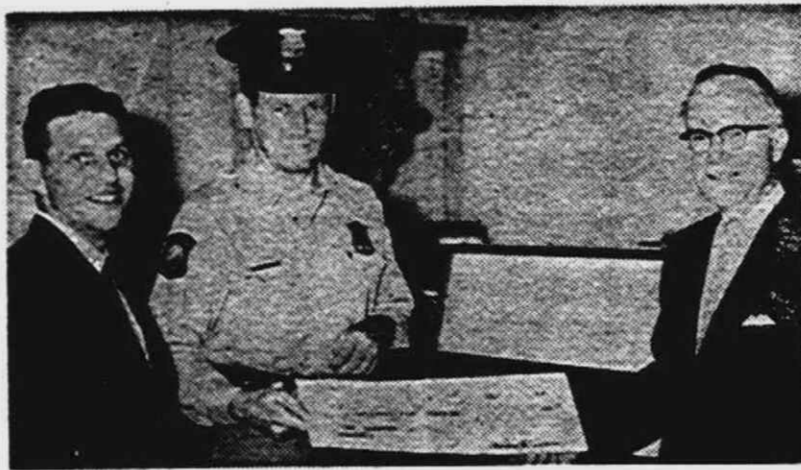
Auxiliary Police Classes to Begin in September

Do two wrongs make a right? Was it the correct thing to grab Al Capone for his income tax, when it was his murders that bothered the nation?

Since Facts and Opinions recent stay in the hospital, he has discovered several products previously utterly unknown. For instance, there is in the supermarket salt which tastes that way, but isn't salt . . . and sugar, like-wise, in a shaker . . . and "bread" without salt, fat or sugar . . . and canned fruits without sugar, either bogus or real . . . and chocolate which never saw a cocoa bean or any calorie-type sweetener . . . and more.

Modern living has produced such things, but until this particular experience, we thought most of the syn-thetic approach to life was confined to the female side of existence . . . styrofoam figures, for instance . . . or complexions poured from a series of bottles, not to mention chemical fragrance, and mechanical marceles.

Anyhow, one of the most delicious paragraphs we have encountered lately cropped up in Newsweek magazine.

"For breakfast he has non-caffeine coffee, meatless sausage, and the day's first nicotine-free cigarette. At the office he sits behind a non-working desk—a drawer-less, paper-free form intended to look like a coffee table. At home his wife has her wig, her false eyelashes and fingernails. After class his daughter practices the current non-dance, an over-all tremor requiring no movement of the feet. This is today's surrogate world, where a man can have his cake substitute (no butter) and eat it too."

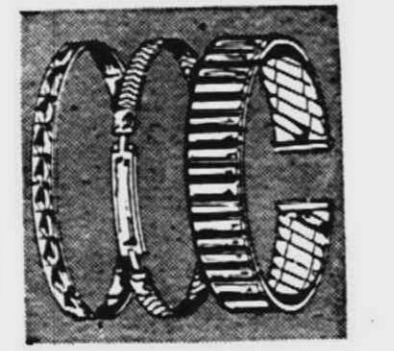

Six Scouts Describe Adventures in West

Half-a-dozen Livonia Boy Scouts, who started off on a 23-day ramble through the western United States last week, filed the first of their "dispatches" for local residents today.

With the national Boy Scout ranch at Philmont, New Mexico, their destination, the boys—Steve Leggat, 9690 Seltzer; Alan Jacquemotte, 8936 Merriman; Jerry Rabin, 31120 Westfield; Kent Eber, 9928 Cavell; Henry Levine, 10015 Camden, and Scott Baldwin—have visited an Air Force Base, the Wells Fargo Building in Kansas and other historical places.

Their collective letters—summarized by their parents for Livonian readers—follow:

"The actual departure of the local expedition was Sunday morning at 7: by afternoon they

had reached the Air Force Base at Peoria, Ill. An Air Force officer met them at the gate and gave them a "Cook's Tour" of the installation, after which they received a welcome invitation to supper and a night's lodging.

"The second day was a real test as our group had to arise, eat breakfast, and leave once again the well-established conveniences of civilization and exchange them for the uncertainty of the future, something every adventurer and explorer must do if he is to see and visit new and exciting areas.

"Upon reaching the Mississippi River, four energy-packed scouts walked across the great boundary between the East and West, the jumping off point of so many previous adventures. A short stop at the mythi-

cal home of Tom Sawyer and the famous cave was enjoyed, then back on the trail. The next rest stop chosen was Marysville, Kansas, where they once again came face to face with the spirits of the Old West when they toured the Wells Fargo Stage Building and Historical Site on the Pony Express and Oregon Trails.

"The second night was a real trail campout as our group pulled their modern wagon up into a circle in the Brown Atate Park, just west of Highland, Kansas, as a defense against the local mosquitos. The fishermen in the group tried their luck at fishing and reported their luck was good.

"The third day was a quiet day on the trail. However, the boys were excited as they realized they were striking out

across the span of the Great Plains. On the evening of the third day our little group of pioneers camped out in the City of Flagler, Colorado, just 100 miles out from the Air Force Academy.

The following morning they were accepted as official guests of the Academy and spent the balance of the day and evening touring the campus. On Thursday, July 16, the small group of Livonia adventurers checked in at the Philmont Scout Ranch near Cimarron, New Mexico. The afternoon was spent with the experts who aided our group in a final inspection of their equipment.

"Friday morning the great outdoor adventure for which they planned since March began. Two burros were saddled and the actual mountain climbing began. One burro, Jack, was a newcomer to the trail, too, and he bolted with 350 pounds of Boy Scouts hanging on with a relentless grip. They finally quieted him and led him the rest of the day. Burros are rather stubborn and when they refused to cross the bridges the only way was to ford the creek alongside a perfectly good bridge. (I wonder how they decided who would get their feet wet leading the burro.)

"On the second morning of the Scout Ranch Trail the

young burro bolted and this time the boys could not get him to return, so the camper ranger, who was returning to Headquarters, took the burro with him. Steve Leggat, Henry Levine, and Kent Eber dropped their packs beside the trail and swiftly hiked on to the Ponil Camp and returned with a replacement burro by noon. After lunch they started up the Dean Trail, a straight-up climb.

Much of the climbing was done in a mountain rain storm. Our boys are beginning to prove themselves as real young men. Their second mountain camp was at an altitude of 8,000 feet.

"The last note as of this date states that our small band is ready to tackle the Harlan Trail, a seven hour ordeal, but the boys, in all confidence, are starting out. The burros will be left behind upon reaching the Harlan Outpost Camp. Deer and wildlife are everywhere. However, no snakes have been spotted as yet."

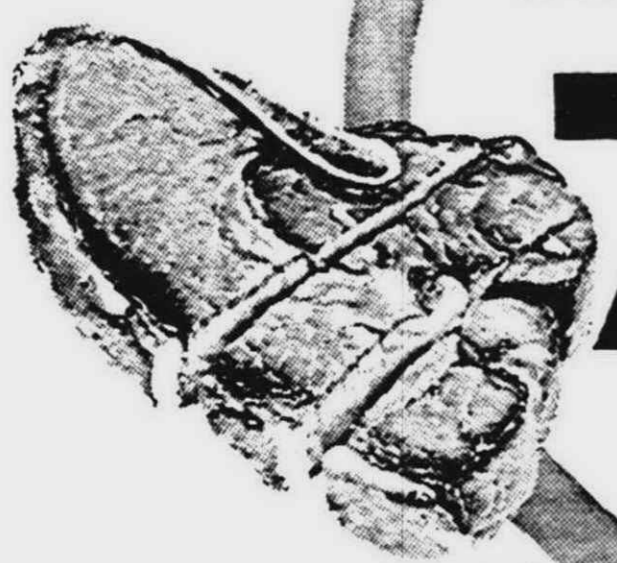

The Western Golf and Country Club pool in Redford Township has a full sized

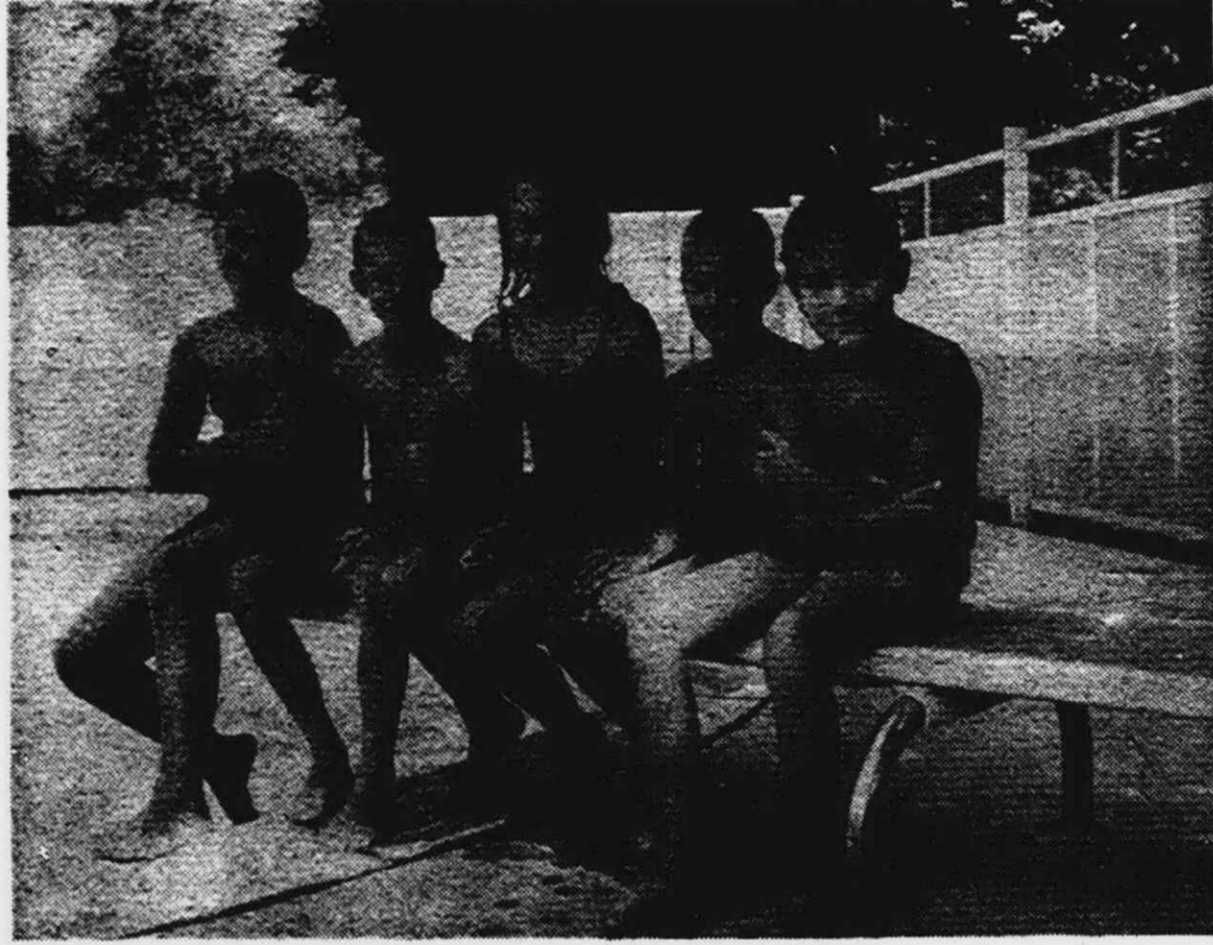

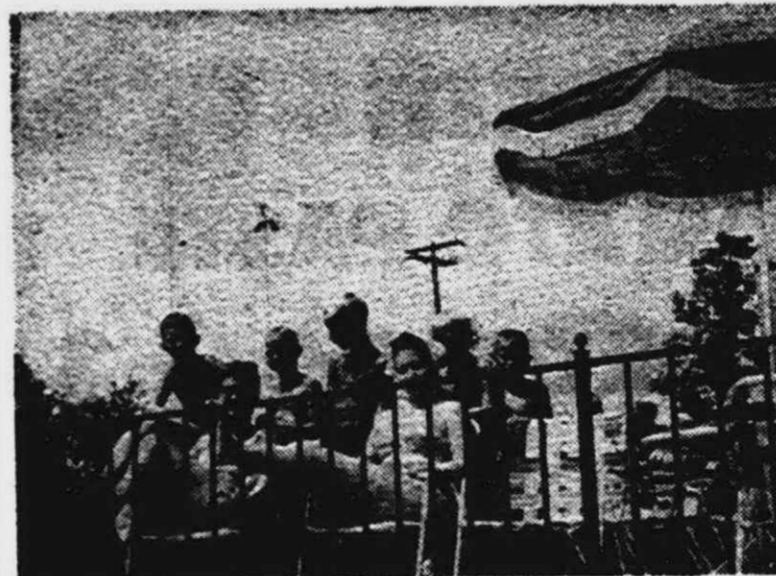

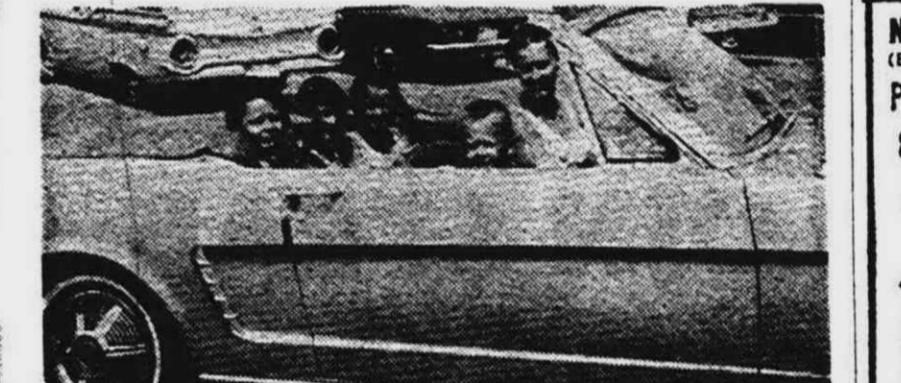

New Pastor Installed Sunday At Good Shepherd Lutheran Church

On Sunday, July 19, Reverend H. Jack Baer was formally installed as the new permanent pastor of Good Shepherd Evangelical Lutheran Church, West Six Mile Road at Kinloch, Redford Township. Reverend Howard Christensen, Assistant to the President of the Michigan Synod, Lutheran Church in America, conducted the installation ceremony at the regular 11 o'clock worship service.

Married and the father of two teenage daughters, Reverend Baer is somewhat of a rarity among clergymen. For it was not until the relatively late age of thirty that he made his decision to enter the ministry. Prior to that time he had well-established himself in the business world.

For more than five years he had been employed at the North Electric Company in Gallison, Ohio, rising through the ranks to responsible supervisory positions in the firm. At the time of his resignation to assume theological studies, his work involved supervising production of highly technical guidance control systems and equipment for the Atlas intercontinental and Thor intermediate range ballistic missiles.

"All this time," Reverend Baer recalls, "the lack of spiritual fulfillment in the people around me, their indifference to authority of any kind—even the divine, their insensitivity to the plight of fellow men, and their constant striving for amusement, diversion and self-gratification became increasingly more evident. It got to the point," he continues, "where I felt compelled to do something about it. So finally, in the face of a new promotion and all it would entail, my wife and I decided to make the big move. And I've never regretted it."

Pastor Baer, in accepting the call to the ministry, discarded a well-established and lucrative career and a substantial five-figure salary to rechart his course in life.

Embarking on an accelerated schedule, he graduated from Wittenberg University in 1963 and Hamma Divinity School in May, 1964. He was ordained into the ministry on June 1.

Called to Good Shepherd in January, Reverend Baer assumed his parish duties at the beginning of July, following graduation and ordination. He and his wife, Margery, and their daughters, Peggy, 15, and

Kathy, 13, reside at the church parsonage, 16380 Delaware, Redford Township.

Livonian's Impression Of New York

Fine Place to Live, Not Visit

(Suzanne M. Shaughnessy, former writer for University of Detroit, went to the big town, New York, New York, to work. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Shaughnessy of Berwick Avenue in Livonia. Herewith are her impressions of life as a working woman in New York.)

"New York is a fine place to visit, but I'd never want to live there" is the familiar statement of many people after a trip to New York City. However, here is one transplanted native of Michigan who disagrees with the statement. After 15 months of battling the subways, coping with a New York landlord, and dealing with the problems of day to day living in the City, I have reached exactly the opposite conclusion—New York is a fine place to live, but I wouldn't like to visit it.

Why do I feel this way? To understand this you must first understand my impressions of New York prior to becoming one of its eight million residents. Before I moved to the "Big City" I had visited Manhattan on a number of occasions. Each time I left with the impression that New York consisted primarily of the Times Square area with a few fashionable Fifth Avenue shops thrown in for variety; that all New Yorkers were unfriendly; and that the cost of living was too high.

I readily admitted that these were generalizations, but somehow I believed that if any generalizations were ever true these were. Experience has taught me that these were most erroneous.

The first point I would like to make for visitors to the City is that Manhattan is not New York. New York City is composed of five boroughs: Manhattan, the Bronx, Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond (usually known as Staten Island). Each one of the five is unique in its own way. There is as much difference between them as there is between Detroit's Woodward Avenue, Livonia, Huntington Woods and Mount Clemens.

Did you know that sections of Brooklyn, Queens and the Bronx are completely residential and consist of one and two family homes on tree lined streets? This too is true, for not ALL New Yorkers live in apartment houses. Inhabitants of these areas tend their lawns, have outdoor barbecues in the summertimes, and engage in neighborhood activities just as each one of you. These people are as friendly or as unfriendly as your neighbors and are as concerned with raising their children and protecting their property investment as you are. In other words, they are much like people who live in any other section of the country.

Did you know that areas of Manhattan have their own political clubs along with P.T.A.'s and neighborhood associations? They do, and these activities are widely supported. Residents of Manhattan range from the very rich to the very poor; from the highly educated to the illiterate. What sets Manhattan apart from other communities in population patterns is the almost complete absence of the middle class family. In its place are thousands of young single people live on the island.

A native New Yorker once told me that New York City is nothing but a collection of very small towns separated by blocks and streets rather than miles. This is true throughout the City, but especially in Manhattan. Manhattan has many residential areas ranging from the "silk stocking" district on the upper East Side to the famous Greenwich Village.

Did you know that sections of Brooklyn, Queens and the Bronx are completely residential and consist of one and two family homes on tree lined streets? This too is true, for not ALL New Yorkers live in apartment houses. Inhabitants of these areas tend their lawns, have outdoor barbecues in the summertimes, and engage in neighborhood activities just as each one of you. These people are as friendly or as unfriendly as your neighbors and are as concerned with raising their children and protecting their property investment as you are. In other words, they are much like people who live in any other section of the country.

When I first moved to the City, I lived in a residence hotel which is located at the edge of one of the old Irish sections of Manhattan and at the very beginning of Yorkville or the old-time German section. Upon renting an apartment I moved 15 blocks south and right into the heart of the old center for the Czech and Hungarian population. Each ethnic group maintains its national customs so to visit Yorkville is in a certain sense to be dropped down into an actual German town for a time.

If this variety of neighborhoods is not reason enough to find New York stimulating there are the people of New York. New Yorkers are always in a hurry due to the fact that they were usually due at some distant spot five minutes ago. However, they are also friendly and willing and eager to help someone who seems to be lost. I am quite certain that I would still be hopelessly lost in the subway system if it were not for the countless kind "natives" who helped me during my first months here.

Added to this is the fact that the people are genuinely interested in you as a person. Many of them don't really care what kind of a position you hold or who you know, but rather in your own abilities and achievements and aspirations as an individual. They are always willing to help you move from one apartment to another, to obtain theater tickets, if at all possible, and to tell you about the nicest little restaurant they have just discovered where the food and service is excellent, the atmosphere quiet and the prices reasonable! They are, in short, alert, interesting and interested people who do care about others.

I will be among the first to admit that the cost of living is high in New York. Housing is probably the outstanding example and this is merely the age old law of supply and demand. However, there are compensations. The careful shopper can find quality merchandise at excellent prices plus the advantage of having a vast selection for choice. I don't shop in the fashionable Fifth Avenue stores, but the things I purchase are just as fashionable and as well made as you find in the "high rent" districts.

Why do I like living in New York? Because after 15 months of exploring the City I know that I haven't even begun to discover all its delights. Every time someone visits me I discover something new as I show them around the City. Perhaps this is the real reason why I like living in New York rather than just visiting it. So—in the light of this any of you who visit New York—please don't leave with the wrong impression. While you are here be sure to visit some of the New Yorker's spots as well as the world famous attractions. By all means take in a Broadway show, Rockefeller Center, Lincoln Center and the Statue of Liberty. However, include an evening ride on the Staten Island Ferry; the commercial area of the Lower East Side of Manhattan on a Sunday afternoon; a visit to Washington Square in the Village; an afternoon at the Cloisters high above the Hudson River; and an evening at one of the "Brauhauses" on East 86th Street on your itinerary.

If you do all these things, I can assure you that your impressions of New York will be much different than mine were. When you leave the City you might still think that "it's a fine place to visit" but you will also be able to understand why so many people love living in New York City.

Festival's Fourth Play, 'The Country Wife' Opens

With three plays and an operetta already successfully launched, full focus backstage at the Stratford Festival this week has been turned on preparations for the opening of "The Country Wife." William Wycherley's Restoration comedy, directed by Michael Langham, designed by Desmond Heeley, with music by Godfrey Ridout and with Helen Burns in the title role, had its first performance at 7:30 p.m. on Monday, July 27. It joins a repertory in the Festival Theatre which now includes Shakespeare's "Richard II" and "King Lear" and Moliere's "The Bourgeois Gentleman." Wycherley's satire, written in 1672, neglected (or bowdlerized) for several generations, then revived in this century, concerns Margery Pinchwife, a country girl who, because she is so carefully guarded by her husband, is driven to have an affair with an eligible bachelor, Mr. Horner — the Don Juan of 17th century London — played by John Colicos. Described by Mr. Langham as "a robustly satirical treatise on how to commit adultery without really trying," "The Country Wife" makes full use of one of the strongest companies ever assembled by the Festival: William Hutt as Sparkish, Eric House as Sir Jasper Fidget, Frances Hyland as Mistress Dainty Fidget, Amelia Hall as Mistress Alitheia, Martha Henry as Mistress Squeamish, and Mary Savidge, Joseph Shaw, Eric Christmas, Heath Lamberts and Suzanne Grossmann in other roles. Edwin Stephenson will play the harridan, Old Lady Squeamish — a role that was, at one time, traditionally played by a man.

spare so delights in. Add a Falstaffian character like Sir Toby Belch plus a couple of weird nuts like Sir Andrew Aguecheek and Malvolio and you have a combination certain to produce a few laughs.

The audience at "Twelfth Night" did laugh and enjoy themselves at the antics of Hal Brown as Fabian, Dennis Lake as Sir Andrew, and Maraman Gossenger as the tipsy Sir Toby. Dale Bellaire's Malvolio produced the greatest share of the humor during the evening. His characterization was well thought-out and implemented excellently.

Old Wally couldn't help thinking about a modern dress version of this romantic comedy of the Bard's. Why couldn't someone do a production of "Twelfth Night" doing Malvolio as Ed Sullivan. Sir Toby and Jackie Gleason are similar. Frank Fontaine with his Crazy Guggenheim could be Sir Andrew. And the fool Feste? Why Jerry Lewis, of course. An up-to-date version with these current comics in mind might fracture an audience, but what they would do to the lyricism inherent in the script of "Twelfth Night" is anybody's guess.

The Quirk Amphitheater version was traditional and at times a bit too staid for old Wally. Too often the characters stood stock-still and did their scenes almost as readings. "Twelfth Night" calls for great fun and sweeping movements. Of course, staging the play in the amphitheater, no doubt, might have restricted Director Goussuff.

In defense of our director I will have to hastily say that many times during the evening comic bits of business gave the audience a real lift. The fight scene between Sir Andrew and Viola was unique. The piggyback approach to this scene was new and refreshing. Pelting Malvolio with bits of bun showed imag-

the catchy opening number, and the hauntingly lovely, "Wedding Dance."

Jerome Robbins of "West Side Story" fame directed and choreographed the entire production.

The stagecraft was extremely successful, although the production suffered the usual pre-Broadway kinks. At one point, some of the scenery arrived on stage after the actors.

Although Zero Mostel did a wonderful job as Tevye, the dairyman, he did not steal the show, for he was well supported by an enthusiastic and talented cast. Beatrice Arthur as Yente, the matchmaker, especially amused the audience.

Police Seek Clues To Triple Slaying

(Continued from Page 1) theorized that the robber or robbers were known to the victims. They base this on the fact that the home was guarded by a vicious German Shepherd dog who was known throughout the neighborhood as one to beware.

Both Turner and Capt. Vorgitch know of the dog from experience. The savage animal was locked in the cellar prior to the murders and couldn't be approached by anyone Sunday. After several unsuccessful attempts to do the dog, the police officers gave up and finally had to destroy him in order to continue the preliminary investigation in the basement.

Turner, who was the first on the scene after the call from Crayk, told reporters the house had been completely ransacked with articles tossed in all directions, all drawers opened and contents dumped on the floor—indicating the killer or killers had searched everywhere possible for the cash.

The coroner's office didn't place a probable time of death on any of the victims during the Monday examination.

However, police investigators believe the three victims were locked in the closet Thursday afternoon, probably between the hours of 4:30 and 6:30 p.m.

Neighbors reported the family always were early diners, usually having dinner around 5 p.m.

This was attested to by the fact that the table had been set with three places, the salads were still there and a skillet on the stove containing six pieces of fish.

During the investigation, police received a report from a friend of the family that he had tried several times to call by phone, beginning around 6:30 p.m. Thursday.

Thus police conjecture is that the killer or killers made the visit between the hours of 4:30 and 6:30 p.m.

Police also believe that the person or persons were known to the family since the dog had

been tied up in the basement. It was common knowledge in the neighborhood that none stepped into the fenced-in rear yard if the dog was on the loose.

Although reluctant to discuss clues, Capt. Vorgitch stated that police believe word may have filtered through Jackson Prison during the time Dr. Parsons was there that he had a sizeable amount of money around the house.

Vorgitch indicated that the investigation officers believe someone that Dr. Parsons met in Jackson may have followed him home, locked the three in the closet while he searched the house and then fled without going back to open the door.

From the position of the bodies, it is believed that Dr. William Parsons tried repeatedly to break down the door but failed. There were marks on the inside that showed he had used some sort of instrument by hammering against the door.

The bodies of the two sisters were on the floor, covered with clothes and the brother's body was seated on top.

Dr. Watson had maintained offices in the Michigan Theater Building for years while the sisters operated a small clinic in the basement of the home.

Paul Salo, area parole officer for the state, made a routine visit to the home Friday morning but couldn't get an answer.

He told Livonia police he found the front door locked but noticed the back door was open and also tried there, after carefully making sure the dog was tied up. He didn't get an answer at either place and left.

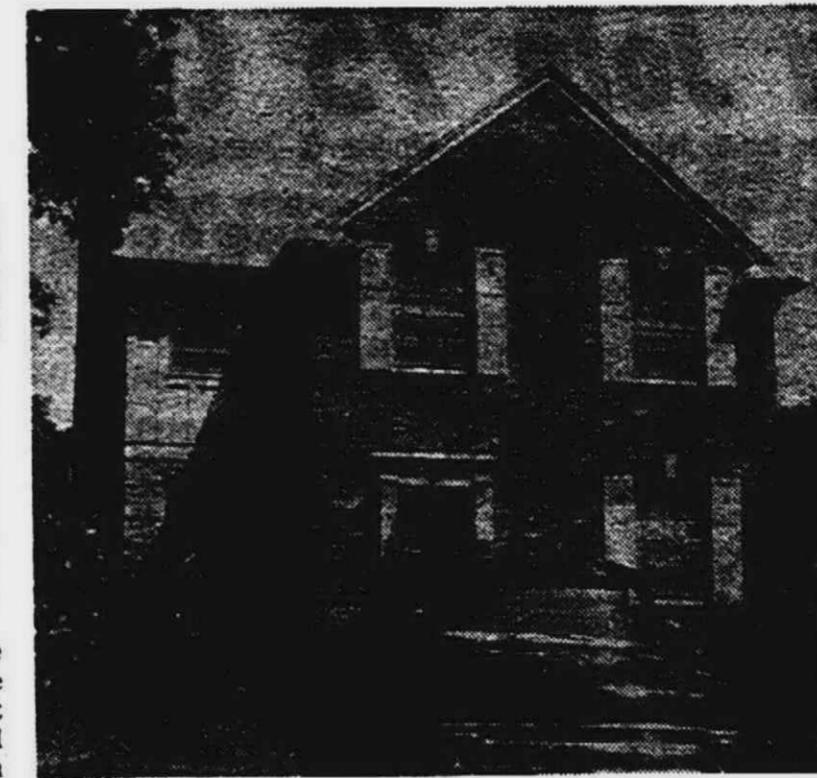
Meanwhile, Lt. Turner has assigned every member of the detective bureau to the case and had a squad searching every inch of the residence for clues.

"We feel this is a case of homicide," he said. "The place definitely was robbed and ransacked. We believe the robber knew what he was doing when he locked the three victims in that small closet in this sweltering heat. It just has to be murder. We hope to come up with the answers in a short time."

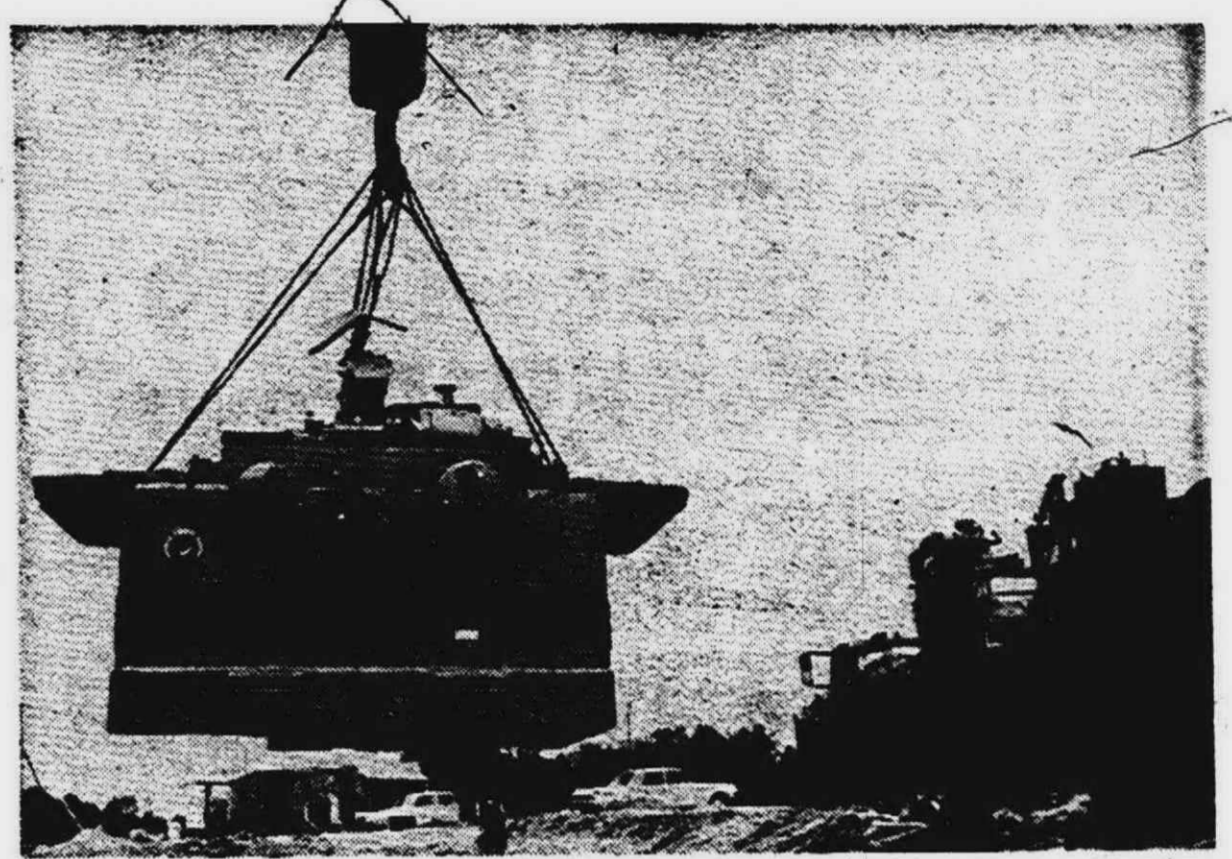

Redford Board Slates Decision On Graham Sewer

A decision on the construction of a proposed Graham Road sanitary sewer will be made next Monday night at a special meeting of the Redford Township Board.

The proposed construction involves 82 homes along Graham Rd. between Telegraph and Sarasota. Estimated cost of the drain is \$88,000 — and spread over a ten-year period, would cost each homeowner approximately \$1,500, including interest. They would have to pay extra for tap-ins.

35 residents were present at a public hearing Monday to voice comments—most of them objections—to the proposed sewer. Harold Kulka, 15098 Lenore, presented a petition signed by 57 residents who objected to the construction.

Many of those present at the meeting agreed with the residents who said, "Sure I'd like the sewer, but the cost is just too high. We've got families with six and eight children on our block, and they just can't afford that \$1,500."

Asked Rhys Lewis, Township Trustee, "If one of those kids came down with hepatitis, due to faulty sewers, would it be worth it?"

Supervisor Jack McDonald said, "If the state does not

condemn the present setup, it's all right with me if the sewer is not built. But if it is hazardous, I'll do everything to see that it is constructed."

"If the township wants us to have the sewer, why doesn't it pay for it?" McDonald answered, "The Township money belongs to all the residents, but the sewer only concerns 82 residents."

McDonald also pointed out, "This is the driest spell we've had in two or three years. This is helping to decrease problems, but with more rain, we could have a serious situation."

Some of the residents suggested immediate action on the stench caused by stagnant water. McDonald promised an "immediate" study by George Jerome, of the Wayne County Drain Commission. "The whole river should be cleared," was one comment.

Another resident said, "If our septic tanks are in good shape, let's leave them. Why can't Redford plumbing inspectors see that violations in this area are corrected?"

"We need the sewer; let's get it in and get it over with," objected another resident.

The objections will be studied again next week. If the Township finds that 20 per cent of the residents "object" officially to the sewer proposal, it will take a Township-sponsored survey. If more than half of the residents affected then veto the sewer idea, the Township will drop the plan.

High School while she lived in Livonia.

The flight was arranged by the American Field Service for 134 Japanese high school students whom the AFS selected to live for 11 months in the homes of American families while attending local high schools. The group arrived in the United States on August 24, 1963.

Scholarships for foreign students to visit the U.S. are arranged each year by the AFS, a private non-profit educational organization which promotes international good will.

AFS has selection boards in 60 countries and also arranges for American high school students to live abroad.

Each student is selected because of scholastic, psychological, physical, and language abilities.

AFS officials desire that the 2,814 students visiting the U. S. during 1964 will impart their native cultures to local communities and return home with true impressions of American culture.

Two Brashears Try This Time For Public Jobs

In Massachusetts for some time the political gag has been, "Vote for the Kennedy of your choice, but vote." Now Livonia has a similar thing going, "Vote for the Brashear of your choice."

William W. Brashear, defeated the last two times in quest of the Livonia Mayor's office, filed last week to run for U.S. Congress. Brother Lonnie Brashear at the same time announced he would try for the State House of Representatives. He now is a member of the board of education.

The "Brashear Ticket" has some other names for the Sept. 1 primary. A political pal of Brashear's since the Livonia Township days, Carl Wagen-schutz, filed for State Senate. He now is City Treasurer.

Brashear's one-time private secretary, Alice Johnson, found herself a slot in nearby Redford Township and is running for State Senate there.

All of the foregoing decided to run as Republicans. But down in southern Livonia four precincts have been attached to Nankin Township for one House seat, and in that one the political edge appears Democratic. Ron Nisum, a political worker for Brashear in the unsuccessful mayor's chase last spring, filed there for the State House, as a Democrat.

In every instance, strong opposition faces the "Brashear slate."

DRC Plans Richer Stakes and Introduces Many New Innovations

An expanded stake program, new riding challengers to oppose established favorites and innovations designed to multiply the pleasure of racing fans highlight the 72-day Detroit Race Course program which opens Friday.

Post time on opening day post time thereafter will be only will be 3 p.m. The daily 3:30 p.m. On Saturdays and holidays, it will be at 2 p.m.

Dale Schaffer, President of the Detroit Race Course, has strengthened the stakes program with a major increase in the famed Michigan Mile and the addition of new events, including The Hat Trick Handicap with a purse of \$25,000.

The Michigan Mile, won a year ago in record time by Crimson Satan from the stable of Detroit industrialist Peter

Salmen, will have an added value of \$62,500 this year. The event is the richest in Michigan racing. It will be contested on Saturday, Sept. 19.

Ronnie Campbell, jockey champion at the DRC for the past two years, will have considerable competition from rivals he has faced previously as well as some newcomers.

Campbell took the 1962 riding title with 82 winners and won last season with 60. Among his consistent rivals back for another crack at him will be Howard Craig, Tommy Lattauro and Don Holmes.

The list of newcomers in the Detroit riding colony will be topped by Bob Mudrof and Dick Lawless, who had considerable success on the Chicago circuit earlier in the season and Larry Kunitake, a star of the recent Ak-Sar-Ben meeting at Omaha. The list of innovations at DRC is topped by the fabulous Twin Double, which has proved a tremendous hit with racing fans in all parts of the nation.

The DRC is the first Michigan track to inaugurate the Twin Double. Approval for its use was given by Racing Commissioner Barry Beaman early last week. The Twin Double will operate on the fifth, sixth, eighth and ninth races daily. Selections are made initially only on the first half of the Twin Double, the fifth and sixth events. Then the fans who couple winners of those races have a "live" ticket which is exchanged for their choices on the eighth and ninth races.

During the past racing season in Florida, where the Twin Double was used for the first time, both Tropical Park and Gulfstream Park and phenomenal response from the fans.

Gulfstream had payoffs of \$84,692 and \$81,181 as its tops. These were on \$2 wagers.

The all-time Twin Double payoff occurred last April at New York's Roosevelt Raceway, when a \$2 ticket returned \$132,232.80 to the lucky holder. The DRC retains the Daily Double on the first and second races.

There will be a nine race program Monday through Friday and 10 races on Saturday.

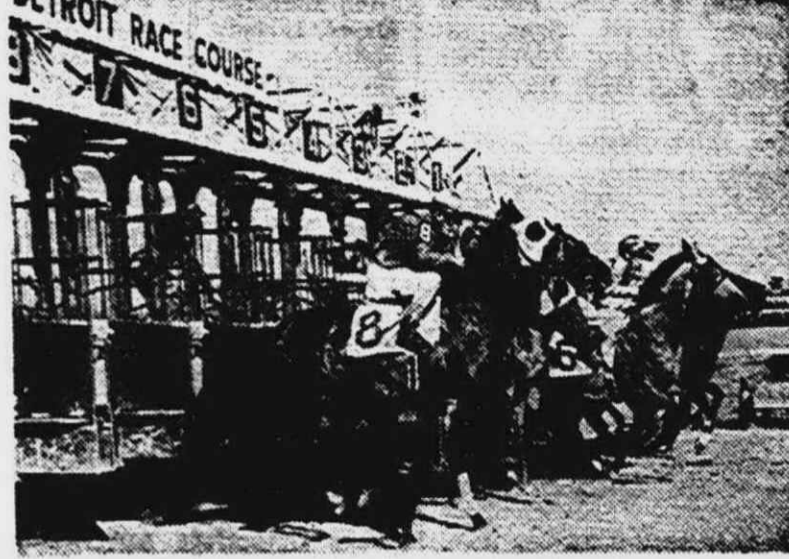

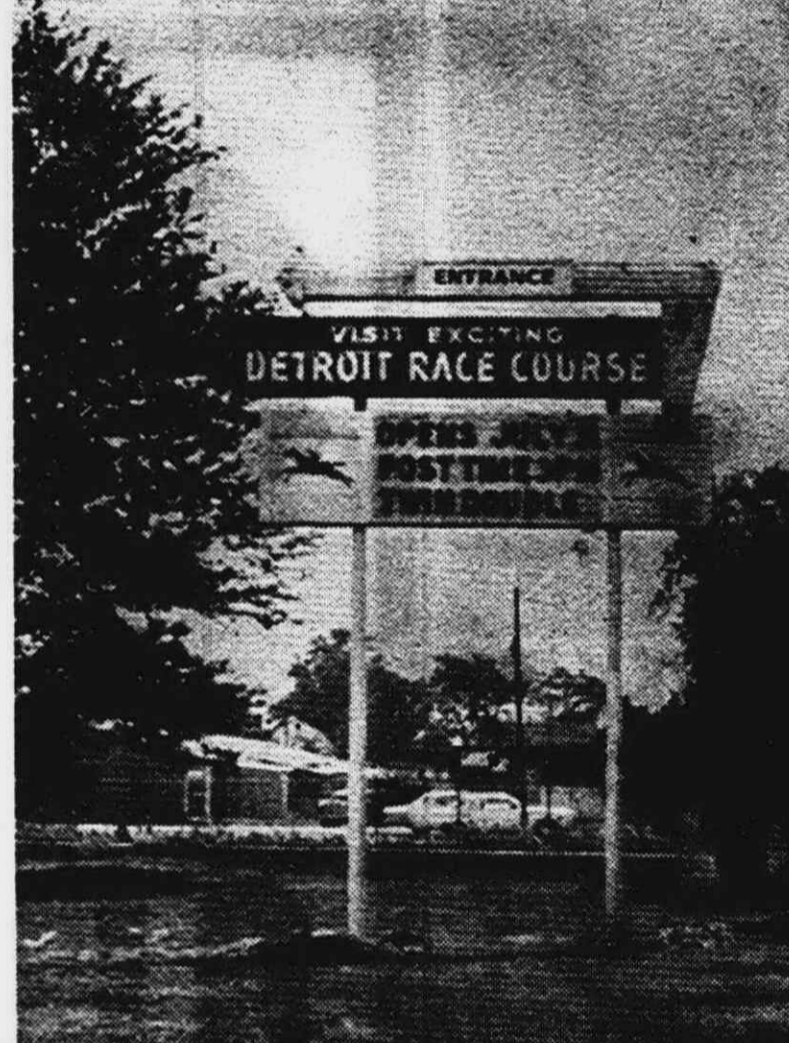

Women Are Polled on 'Ideal Home'

What do women want in a home? A national survey brings out some mighty interesting facts which should be a guideline for house builders and architects.

First, they want homes with basements. You should hear the complaints of the ladies who cuss out the slab floors as hard on their feet.

They want good neighborhood planning with curved streets, distance between homes, better landscaping.

They want three entrances: front, back and from garage. They want a full garage with plenty of storage space, not a carport. They want a big kitchen, which is the most lived in room in the house.

They want a separate dining room which could seat 12 or more. And they want this room designed with concealed built-ins and wood paneled walls. They want a pantry, showing the need for additional storage. They want bigger bedrooms with extra emphasis on size in the master bedroom. They want lots of windows all over the house.

High on the list of wants is outdoor living space, with a majority favoring decks. Wood decks seem to be the most popular because they are inexpensive, easy to keep clean, cool in the summer and a handsome addition to most homes.

These are what the ladies are demanding and the little woman generally gets her way.

Patio Idea Is Popular

Did you ever long for a tiny hide-away where you could get away from the hustle and bustle of a busy family, and yet be at home.

Some architects are giving the heads of the family just such a retreat in the form of a small, screened wood-decked patio opening off the master bedroom.

The floor deck needn't be very large, just enough for a couple of easy chairs or maybe a chaise lounge for dad and mom. It needn't cost much because wood decks are simple and easily built.

To insure maximum privacy, a high wooden screen can be installed around the sides of the deck exposed to the street or to activity in the family yard.

How do you build the deck? Use a sturdy lumber like Douglas fir which will last for years when exposed to the weather. The frame should be of small timbers and the deck can be of 2x4s spaced slightly to permit runoff.

The screening fence can be any pattern desired, but a louvered pattern will give good circulation and yet provide privacy. You can use western red cedar, a lightweight wood which will last for many years.

The deck and screen need not be painted or stained, but can be allowed to weather to a soft silvery color. However, these woods will take any paint or stain with ease in case color is desired.

Wind Baffles

One of the slickest attachments to a fence top to make more comfort is a wind baffle. Place an 18-inch baffle at an angle of 45 to 60 degrees pointed inward to the yard. This causes the wind to arc upwards and protects the yard for one and a half times the height of the fence.

Dining Rooms Back In Style

When the family eats three meals a day off a counter in a combined kitchen-family room, table manners become something less than desirable.

Under such conditions there is small chance for training the younger members of the family in basic table manners.

This is one reason why thinking parents are coming back to the idea of a more formal dining room for the home. This doesn't mean that every meal necessarily must be eaten in the dining room, but it does mean that dinner is generally served here, as well as meals when there are guests.

The dining room need not be elaborate, but it should have definitive boundaries, and it can open off the kitchen. One way to achieve character and distinction in such a room is to use inexpensive wood paneling.

The walls can be paneled in one of the lighter, more cheerful softwoods like Douglas fir or west coast hemlock, and these woods can be finished in clear varnish or plastic to retain their warm coloring and grain.

Another advantage which one gets from using wood paneling on the walls is the chance to conceal china and linen storage units in the walls behind carefully fitted doors which are a part of the paneling. These wall-hidden storage units save valuable floor space and make it possible to have a full sized dining room without robbing other rooms.

Livonia Teachers Get Study Grant

A \$58,300 National Science Foundation grant is enabling 70 high school science teachers, including two Livonians, to spend six weeks at the University of Detroit maintaining and improving their competence in biology, physics and chemistry. Livonians attending the University are Sr. Mary Deanna Sprague and Sr. Mary Imaldine Baronn, both teachers at Ladywood High School.

The grant is supporting a Summer Institute for Secondary School Teachers of Science under the direction of Dr. E. L. Henderson, professor and chairman of the chemistry department, through July 31, 1964. The program carries six credits applicable to a graduate degree. In addition to tuition and fees, the Foundation grant also provides stipends (\$450 for residents, \$400 for non-residents), travel allowance up to \$80, and an allowance of \$90 per dependent up to four dependents. The prime objectives of the Institute are to help these science teachers maintain and improve their competence in their chosen specialties. The Institute is concerned with the content of science courses, new information and developments, rather than teaching methods. Of particular importance are the many opportunities the Institute provides for the cultivation of a closer understanding between high school and college science faculties, solution to their mutual problems, and elevation of standards at both levels.

Dell Named to Traffic Commission

Mayor Harvey Moelke has announced the appointment of William E. Dell to the Livonia Traffic Commission. Dell was born in the City of Detroit and attended the Detroit Public Schools. 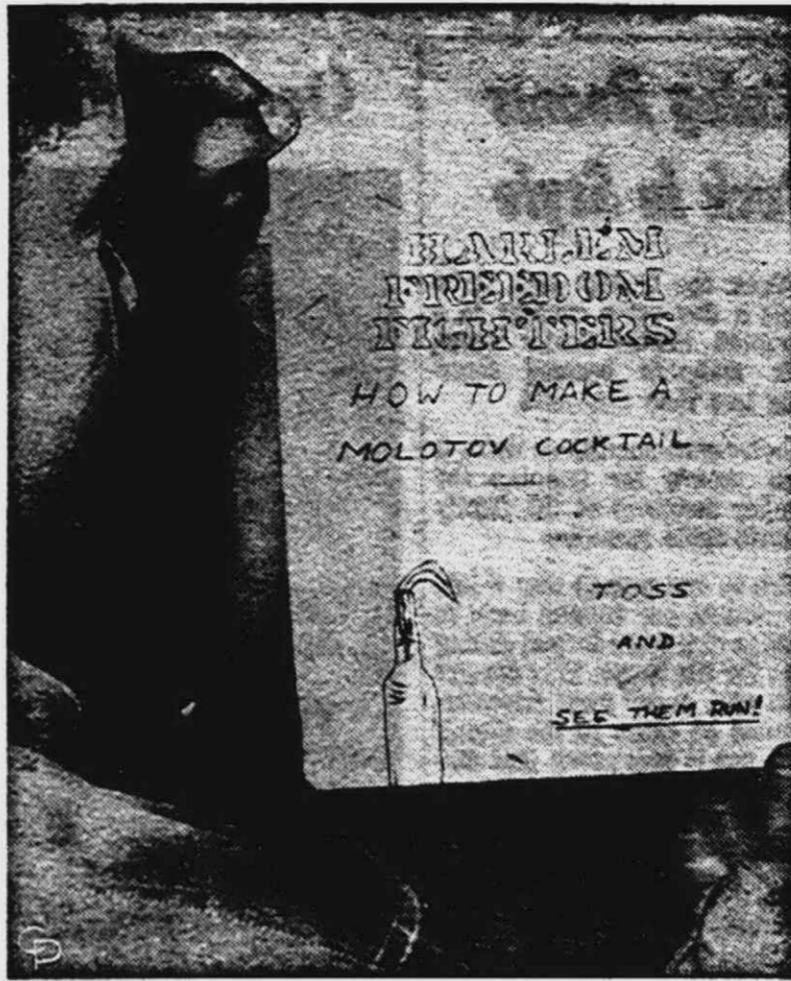

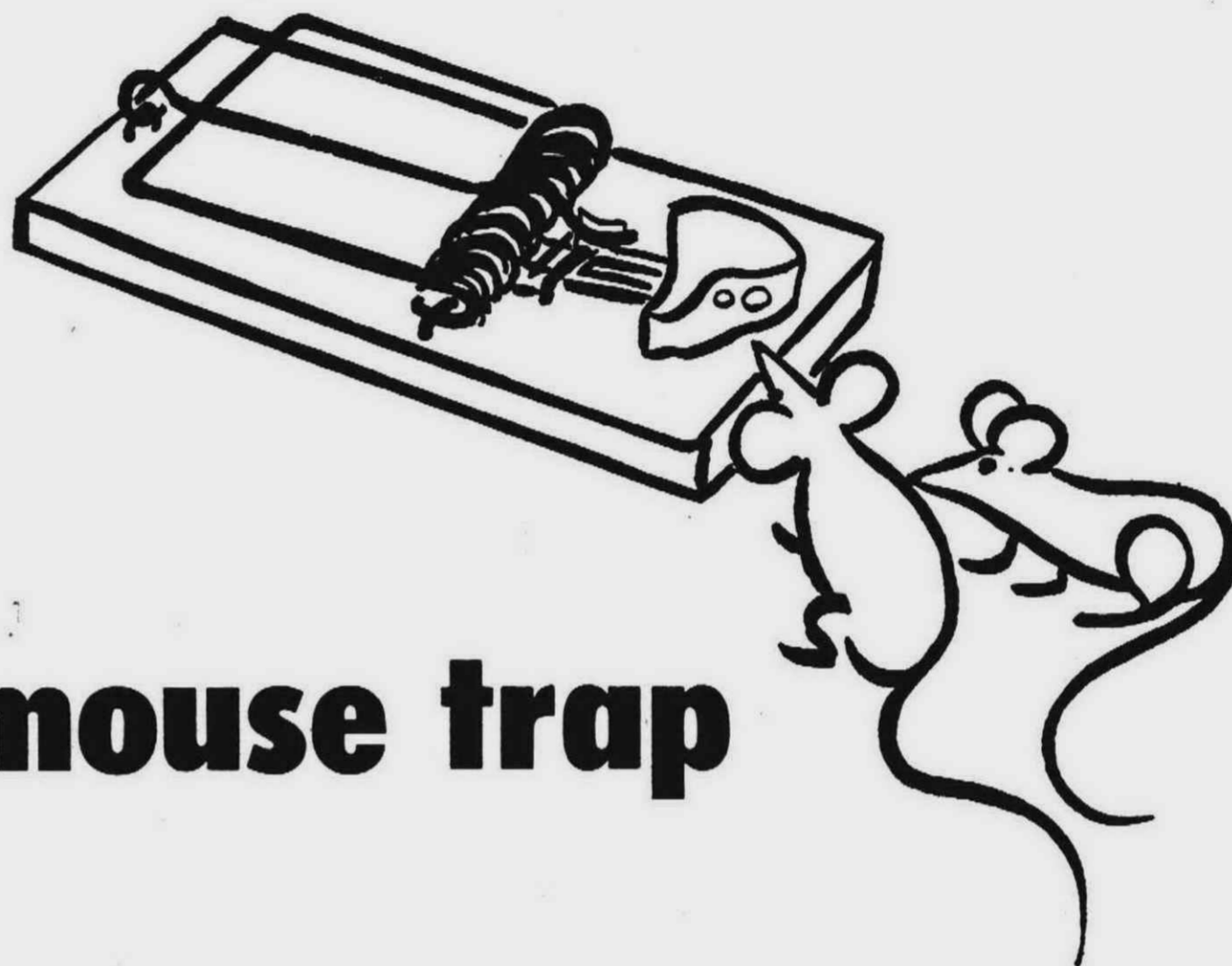

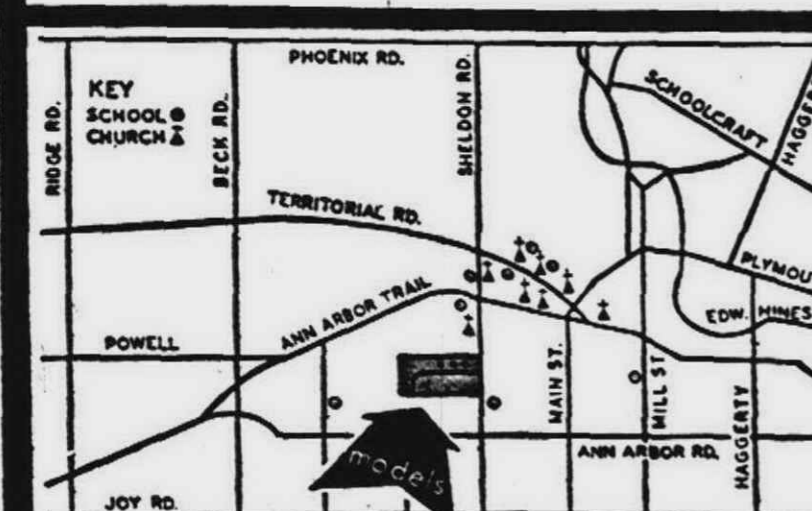

Devon-Aire Protests New 'District'

Residents of Devon-Aire Woods are expressing high indignation over being "left out" of Livonia in the new districting of the Michigan House of Representatives. Complaint by the residents was expressed on the front page of the association's newspaper, Shirley Gerrish is editor of the paper; Leo Barretta is president of the civic association.

Devon-Aire was included among the four precincts which were yanked out of Livonia (which has a total of 40 precincts) and attached to a southern house district. "Residents of the Devon-Aire area have been absolutely outraged by the recent districting for the Michigan House of Representatives. The very least we should do is to register our loudest possible protest by petition, sending it to the Supreme Court, the State Legislature, the Governor and the newspapers.

"What has happened is this: (1) Our area has been completely separated from all the rest of Livonia in the matter of our State Representative. Where the rest of the city will vote for one man, and be serviced by him; our little area will vote for someone entirely different, and will have to turn to him for service. We will share our State Representative with Dearborn Heights and people of other communities to the south.

(2) When we go into the polls, our ballots will have different names on them than will ballots anywhere else in Livonia!

(3) When we want help in Lansing, most of us won't even know the name of our State Representative. We will all assume—in error—that we have the same Representative as other citizens of Livonia.

(4) Cutting us away from our districts is all the more senseless, because after cutting us away, they added Northville to the Livonia district — substituting Northville for Devon-Aire in the Livonia district, in effect.

(5) It relegates us to something like second-rate Livonia citizens, reducing civic pride and the pride of belonging to the community.

"We should register our protest, loudly and without delay!"
