State Representative Candidates Take to Campaign Trails in Area

until the final election, in November, The Observer will welcome statements on issues by rival candidates for various public offices. We'll edit them, as to length, and will attempt to give the same amount of space, each week, in the same story, to opponents.)

Candidates for State Representative from two new districts in Livonia hit the campaign trail this week, with less than a month before the September 1 primary that will knock some of them out of the running.


Most activity centered in the new 35th District. which includes Livonia and Northville, where a dozen candidates are seeking Democratic and Republican nominations for the post.

Gerald K. O'Brien, a Wayne County Road Commission employee, and a Democratic candidate for the post, said, "Once and for all, the issue of equal population representation has been settled, supporting the Livonia and Northville district as an area of large potential growth," in a statement to voters. A U.S. Navy veteran, O'Brien is a graduate of Hillsdale College and has lived in Livonia since 1959.

Also a five-year resident of the city, Milton Lebenbom, an employee of the Federal Department Store in Wonderland, is seeking the same post on the same ticket. Appealing for support from local voters, Lebenbom said, "Too many candidates are sent to Lansing by pressure groups, and thus are unable to vote their conscience when important legislation requires it. This is the reason for the stalemate in Lansing today." Lebenbom is presently chairman of the Livonia Board of Canvassers.

One of the biggest issues in the campaign, according to Marvin R. Stempien, another Democratic candidate for the same post, is "the appalling death rate on Michigan highways." Stempien, a 31-year-old attorney. called for an "all-out assault" on the traffic death problem and said he intends to lead the attack, if elected. "Michigan highways are jammed with dangerously defective automobiles and irresponsible drivers," Stempien said. "A large percentage of this menace can, and must, be removed. We can follow the example of other states by requiring periodic vehicle inspection. Every motor vehicle should be thoroughly checked for defects before it is licensed." The only candidate in the race to receive endorsement of the AFL-CIO's Committee on Political Action, Edward Dymek told voters this week: "Our state today finds itself in the midst of a modern revolution. The yoke of a few mid-century Republican legislatures will be cast aside and the Democratic progress of the will of man will at last be the dominant factor in the actions of our state. My decision to be the Democratic Representative for this area is based on the premise that the citizens of our community not only want a Democratic reflection in the legislature, but also that the need is for someone to extend spirit and heart into our laws. I believe I can honestly and faithfully extend these ingredients into the office." Lonnie H. Brashear, member of the Livonia Board of Education, and a candidate for the Republican nomination for the 35th District State Representative post, told voters in a statement: "The office of Representative is most important to the people in this District. It is the area of state government where they must have a voice in order
