Smiling Kris Kringle Opens Plymouth Christmas Shopping Season

Hundreds Brave Rain, Cold to Welcome Santa Claus

It rained—it was cold—it was a dreary day—but Plymouth's downtown business section was filled with smiling, wide-eyed youngsters Saturday morning awaiting the arrival of the season's most important person—Santa Claus.

The weather made little difference to the kiddies—they were, under umbrellas, attired in rain coats and capes, wearing boots, galoshes, snow boots and every possible

kind of clothing and footwear to keep them warm. Even anxious parents wondered if their children would come down with colds before the end of the day—finally succumbed to the spirit of the occasion.

All were in a jovial mood when the word finally flashed down Main Street that Santa had arrived at the City Hall, the parade was underway and it

wouldn't be long until smiling Kris Kringle would put in his appearance.

Thanks to the members of the Junior Chamber of Commerce, sponsors of the traditional parade which officially opens the Christmas shopping season in Plymouth, the parade was a colorful affair even though a bit on the short side.

It was shortly after 10 a.m. that JoJo the Clown

and his Storybook-on-Parade Mardi Gras heads with colorful costumes led the procession down Main Street from the City Hall to Kellogg Park, around the park where

Santa climbed out of his motor-driven sleigh to take up residence in the Red Shoe House.

dreds of youngsters greeted their favorite person.

The Jaycee clowns added to the merriment of the occasion, passing out candy to the crowds

halted as over-enthusiastic youngsters ran out in front of the sleigh to grab the hand of the be-whiskered gentleman.

Observer Told of Offer From Service Club

Candlestick Park to Get New Look

A two-year campaign, during which the Plymouth Observer gently chided the Plymouth Board of Education about the poor lighting system at the high school athletic field by referring to it as Candlestick Park, appears destined to have a happy ending.

The Observer has learned that the athletic field will probably have a new lighting system and additional seating capacity come another football season.

Not since the Rotary Club donated funds for the present lighting plant, some 18 years ago, have any improvements of more than a minor nature been made.

As a result, it was common knowledge among football coaches in the area that the Plymouth field was just about the poorest as far as lighting went.

Numerous complaints have been made to members of the athletic staff over the past few years but of course that had no effect on the situation.

However, the matter was brought to the attention of football fans two years ago when the Observer took recognition of the poor lighting and tabbed the field as Candlestick Park.

Details haven't been worked out as yet but will probably be presented to the Board of Education for approval in the near future.

Business Manager Melvin Blunk went to Nela Park in Cleveland a month ago to study lighting systems with

experts there from the General Electric Company. He also is getting estimates on costs of additional bleachers. The Observer learned that a

Plymouth service club has offered to pay half the cost of the improvements if the School Board matches the contribution. The offer reportedly was

made shortly before Blunk was authorized to make the trip to Cleveland.

The School Board meets on

Dec. 14 and there's better than an even chance that Blunk's report will be one of the items on the agenda.

State Rec Association To Honor Woolweaver

Herb Woolweaver, long time Plymouth Director of Recreation and Adult Education, will receive a coveted Fellowship Citation from the Michigan Recreation Association at a noon luncheon on Dec. 4 in Kellogg Center on the Michigan State University campus.

The presentation will be one of the highlights of the Association's annual convention.

The Citation is for Woolweaver's "many years of unselfish service and contributions to further and promote the cause of recreation as a profession and a necessary part of the life of every man, woman and child."

The resolution, accompanying the Citation, reads as follows: "Whereas, Herbert Woolweaver was born in Dundas, O., March 10, 1908, where he was raised on a farm, attended elementary schools in Dundas and was graduated from high school in McArthur, O. in 1926.

"Whereas, Herb worked in coal mines, hunted and trapped fur bearing animals to finance his first year of college at Ohio University. The University pro-

vided Herb with a football and track scholarship after his freshman year.

"Herb was graduated from Ohio University with a B.S. in Education in 1920, with a major in Physical Education and a minor in Industrial Arts and Sciences.

"Herb played end on the 1929 football team which is still honored every five years as one of the outstanding teams in the history of the University. Herb was the wrestling representative in

the 168-pound class in 1927 and 1928. He set college records in the high and low hurdles that have been bettered only in the past few years. He managed the City of Athens, O. swimming pool during the summers of 1930-31-32.

Herb furthered his education attending summer sessions at the following Universities: 1938, West Virginia, physical education and coaching school; University of Maine graduate school, 1939; Western State Col-

Businessmen's Forum To Hear Glassford

Albert Glassford, who ends 16 years' service as Plymouth's City Manager on Dec. 15 to move to a more lucrative challenging post in a similar capacity at Albion, will discuss "Plymouth, the City of Progress" at the monthly businessmen's forum of the Chamber of Commerce Thursday, Dec. 3) at noon in the Hillside Inn.

Glassford tendered his resignation to the Plymouth City Commission three weeks ago, effective Dec. 15, abruptly terminating what is believed to be the longest tenure of any city manager in Michigan.

He will talk on the progress made by Plymouth during his 16 years' administration, the future needs of the city and the unfinished business he is leaving by his sudden departure.

Glassford is expected to give an insight into his final report and recommendations to the City Commission at its regular meeting on Monday, Dec. 7.

He is expected to touch on the controversial Detroit water problem which he feels isn't necessary now that new iron in-

hibitors have been discovered. He has long felt that Plymouth should make a bid for All-American City rating, because of its tremendous improvements and use of federal funds and agencies during the past five years, and will probably

Bits and Pieces today— It appears that some communities (Livonia is one) are planning to abandon formal judging contests for outdoor holiday decorations in residential areas this year.

Other communities never even have had such competition.

Judging the displays is no great chore, and the existence of such a "contest" does provide some incentive, and a little reward, for those citizens who would put out extra effort to brighten up the corner where they are during Christmas season.

Facts and Opinions wonders if the recreation departments and service clubs might not put the subject on the agenda for a new, immediate hearing.

One of the national Education journals offered this wisdom: "As long as there are final exams, there will always be prayers in our schools..."

And a home magazine this one: "... it's not enough for a gardener to love flowers, he must also hate weeds."

Nothing can change the general analysis that November 3 was a day of massacre for the Republican party throughout the United States.

It was much more than the defeat of a presidential candidate, of course. The U.S. Congress saw GOP candidates swamped by Democrats, wholesale. From coast-to-coast, State Legislatures became dominated by the Democratic party, with state house after state house turning over control from one party to the other.

(The winds of change blew hard in Lansing. Some of the most respected legislators there, men and women with experience and known for their ability; not labeled with any particular "liberal" or "conservative" reputation; a host of such are among the missing since the election.)

In the whole sweeping national trend, however, there was an exception. The Republicans actually have one more Governor than did previously, 17 instead of 16.

In each case, the decision went to a so-called "moderate" candidate—John A. Volpe in Massachusetts; Warren P. Knowles in Wisconsin and Daniel J. Evans in Washington, not to mention holdovers John Chaffee in Rhode Island and George Romney in Michigan.

Gov. Robert E. Smylie of Idaho is current chairman of the Association of Republican Governors and recently was interviewed by U.S. News and World Report.

"The election demonstrates that the real strength of the party exists in the statehouse and courthouse level—and in those places the offices are held by people known as moderates..."

"I think we're going to have to move the party's philosophy back toward the center..."

The reader will find no argument here opposing that objective.

Somewhere there is a publisher who, for some reason takes the time to make a complete list—really complete, that is—of "annual events."

A copy of his book usually hits this desk late in November and annually is read with incredulity. While we have known for some time that there are such things as "National Pickle Week" and "National Planned Parenthood Week", never does Facts and Opinion fail to flinch when it reads of such as "Home Sweet Home Month", Sept. 1 through 30. ("To promote use of Soda Bicarbonate in sweetening and refreshing home equipment and major appliances")

Winter Term Opens Next Week

Urge Dropouts to Register for Plymouth Night School

Registrations for the winter term of the high school classes for credit and adult education activities of the Plymouth Community School system are being accepted this week in the offices of Director Herbert Woolweaver at Plymouth Senior High.

Woolweaver is particularly interested in registrations for the night school for credit

classes which are aimed in the direction of dropouts who feel the need of additional studies and also desire to work towards a high school diploma.

Plymouth is one of the few school systems in Michigan to offer these classes free of charge for residents of the school districts but unfortunately the program has not taken hold as well as school officials had hoped.

Woolweaver indicated that seven courses are being offered during the winter term, starting Dec. 15 and continuing through March 2.

The classes include: business machines and shorthand II on Tuesday and Thursdays; Geography, Tuesdays and Thursdays; Basic Math, Tuesdays and Thursdays; Sociology, Monday and Wednesday; Blue Prints, Wednesday; and Welding, Wednesday.

"Students, who dropped out of high school before graduation, are urged to study the courses offered and make every effort to take advantage of the night school for credit," said Woolweaver.

"Our enrollment at the start of the fall term was slightly below expectations but we feel there will be quite an increase once the word gets around of what is being offered."

Persons desiring additional information are requested to contact Woolweaver at his office in the high school or to appear personally to register and set up a schedule of classes.

In addition to the courses for dropouts, Woolweaver pointed to several unusual classes slated

in the adult education program.

These include: golf lessons at Gallimore School; beginners and advanced German at the high school; pewter ware classes at the high school; a special course in gun care slated for Jan. 15 at the high school; beginning and advanced instruction in organ playing at the Smith Music Store; and Yoga classes at Dunning-Hough Library and at Gallimore School for members of the opposite sex.

Registrations for these and more than 90 other classes are now being accepted. If you are interested, get in touch with the adult education office today and complete arrangements for classes you desire to attend.

Famed Race Driver Heads JC Program

Gene Hartley, of Indianapolis, a veteran of 16 years of automobile racing and a competitor in the famed Memorial Day 500-Mile classic, will present the nationally recognized and award-winning Champion Highway safety program Thursday (Dec. 3) at 8:15 p.m. in Plymouth's Junior High West.

The program is sponsored by the Plymouth Junior Chamber of Commerce as the first of a series of Sports-O-Rama series.

Hartley is one of eight Indianapolis veterans who appear in high schools throughout the nation. Since 1954 more than eight million students have heard the safety message which compares controlled speed at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway to its opposite on the highway.

In addition to talk, Hartley will present movies of past Indianapolis races, including the tragic affair of last Memorial Day.

In the 1962 race, Hartley was awarded 27th position after mechanical failure sidelined his car.

His interest in automobile racing was derived from his father who was also a well-

known driver. He introduced his son to the sport in 1947 at a midget car race in Indianapolis.

Three years later Gene competed in his first 500. He continued to distinguish himself in midget car racing and in 1959 captured the national championship in this division.

In addition to this his driving skill earned him a membership in the world's most exclusive club, the Champion 100-mile-an-hour club, reserved for those drivers who complete the 500 miles without relief at an average speed of more than 100 mph.

Plymouth Kiwanians Hear Thailand Story

The story of Thailand, formerly known as Siam, was told to the Plymouth Kiwanis Club by Mrs. Elizabeth Shelton, business manager of the Huron Valley Girl Scout Council Office in Ypsilanti.

Mrs. Shelton used color slides and a lecture in telling of the nation and country where she resided while working with the United States Information Agency of Foreign Service.

Thailand is bounded by Burma, Cambodia and Laos and has a stable government even though surrounded by countries that are currently in the turmoil of riots and disturbances.

Mrs. Shelton told the Kiwanians that Thailand is largely an undeveloped tropical country with temperatures reaching 90 degrees by 8 a.m. and soaring much higher before sunset.

"Lacking a road of any kind," she said, "a visitor to Thailand must use a boat during the rainy season and a Jeep during the dry spells. Small grass houses are built high above the ground on poles because of the danger of floods and high waters.

"Thailand is a collection or grouping of many small villages, communities or family groups. The principal religion is Buddhism but all other religions are accepted."

Mrs. Shelton pointed out that the Royal Family presented the land and money for construction of the Anglican Church where Mrs. Shelton and her husband were married. Each was employed by the U. S. Government at the time.

"Each young man, upon reaching the age of 18, is required to serve a Monk for six months," Mrs. Shelton said. "These Buddhist monks wear bright orange robes, beg for food in the streets and spend most of the day in meditation and prayer. They are allowed one meal a day and live apart from the outer world.

TB Rate Low in Livonia, Redford, Plymouth Despite County Climb

Livonia, Plymouth and Redford Township found themselves on the lower end of the tuberculosis scale last year, despite a general increase of 8.8 per cent in new active cases of TB in Wayne County.

Figures just released by the TB and Health Society showed

a total of 18.6 cases per 100,000 in Livonia, while Plymouth recorded a percentage of 10.7 new active cases on the 100,000 scale.

Redford Township and other outlying townships in the county were lumped together with 14.8 cases per 100,000.

Nearby Northville showed the highest percentage in the area—32.2 cases per 100,000.

New active cases in all of Wayne County during 1963 totaled 1,429. There were 183 deaths.

The overall case rate in Wayne County increased from

50.3 per 100,000 new active cases in 1962 to 53.7 per 100,000 last year.

The statistical data was released through the TB and Health Society by the Michigan Department of Health.

Four cities in Wayne County have an active case rate of

higher than 70 per 100,000. These are: River Rouge, 78.5; Highland Park, 73.5; Wayne, 72.7; Hamtramck, 72.5 and Detroit, 70.1. Inkster with a rate of 58.5, is the only other Wayne County community with a higher case rate than the county as a whole, Reinstein said.

Four other cities with as high or higher case rates than the state of Michigan as a whole (30.3) but lower than Wayne County, are: Flat Rock, 41.6; Ecorse, 39.7; Northville, 32.2; and Southgate, 30.3.

All other Wayne County communities had case rates well below the Michigan and national average (U.S. rate is 28.7 per 100,000).

Three Wayne County cities—Grosse Pointe Park, Grosse Pointe Woods and Riverview—had no new active cases of TB in 1963.

of our country has been the dramatic progress made against tuberculosis. America's number one killer at the turn of the century," the TB and Health Society said.

"But the battle isn't over. A number of cities including Detroit have reported increases in the rate of new TB cases between 1962 and 1963.

"There are a number of reasons for this serious comeback of a disease once known as the 'White Plague.' Public apathy has too often resulted in dangerous delays in proper diagnosis, as that infection spreads before it can be

brought under control.

"The cost of X-ray has risen, while—in many areas—funds available to public health departments for TB control have been reduced. Another problem is the tendency of tuberculosis germs to develop newer, tougher strains more resistant to the new, high-powered drugs.

"More than 610,000 Americans at present are known to be either present or recent active TB patients, or 'high risk' contacts of people who recently came down with the active disease. In other words, it is going to take a lot more work, education and expense before tuberculosis can be considered 'under control' in our country.

"The TB and Health Society is now conducting its annual campaign for Christmas Seal funds. There is no better way of 'sharing the health' than by responding to your Christmas Seal letter. Russell Dister of Plymouth; and James Dotseth, assistant dean of Instruction-Technical Education at Schoolcraft College, met prior to last week's meeting in Dearborn called by the State Department of Public Instruction.

The Michigan State Plan for Vocational Education was reviewed in keeping with the Federal Government's Vocational Act of 1963.

"We are ready to put into effect, courses, such as, office and distributive education in addition to our nursing, drafting and manufacturing processes programs."

Dotseth indicated the Vocational Education funds will provide for the construction of facilities, research and experimental projects, personnel, studies, guidance and instructional costs, in addition to instructional equipment.

Thurston Swimming Coach Back from Worldwide Tour

Romantic names like Taipei, Hong Kong, Monto Carlo and Cairo are part of the daily conversation around the Thurston High School pool as synchronized swimmers talk with their coach, Miss Joyce Lindemann, about her experiences on her recently completed round-the-world tour with an American team of 15 star aquatic performers.

The 3½-month tour was climaxed with an exhibition at the Olympics with the same billing as the finalists in regular swim events. The Japanese synchronized swim team also performed with great skill, Miss Lindemann said.

Coach of Thurston's synchronized swim squad since its inception, Miss Lindemann was selected as a coach for the tour along with mentors from Washington and Georgia. All told, the group performed for 60,000 people in 36 shows in 20 countries. Most spectators saw synchronized swimming for the first time. Many viewed the show on nation-wide television both alive and taped.

Good will as well as synchronized swimming was promoted on the trip since the participants often stayed in homes of people rather than hotels. They were housed this way in England, many cities in Germany, Egypt, and India.

"Very successful in the eyes of the state department and the American Athletic Union," Miss Lindemann stated, "the tour may result in synchronized swimming being officially recognized as well as being added to competitive events in the next Olympics.

Countries visited included England, France, Germany, Switzerland, Italy, Turkey, Greece, Egypt, Syria, Jordan, Israel, India, Thailand, Taipei, Singapore, Hong Kong, Malaysia, and Japan.

Under the new act, Michigan will receive \$4.2 million; in addition, \$3.7 million will continue from previous Vocational Education Acts. The Federal funds are distributed on the basis of population by age groups and per capita income in the State.

Vocational education is training under public supervision and control and must be a part of a program designed to fit individuals for gainful employment in recognized fields.

Dotseth indicated the area schools survey of vocational training needs was completed last May. He stated "this survey will aid in determining the extent of facilities needed."

"Many people are surprised to learn of the scope of the existing facilities at Schoolcraft College to handle vocational training," he said, "We have \$150,000 in manufacturing processes equipment, \$8,000 in drafting equipment and \$35,000 invested in an electro-mechanical laboratory.

"We are using the facilities of Bentley High in Livonia. The new act will aid the college greatly since one-third of the funds must be spent in community college. We are fortunate to have advisory committees in all our training areas.

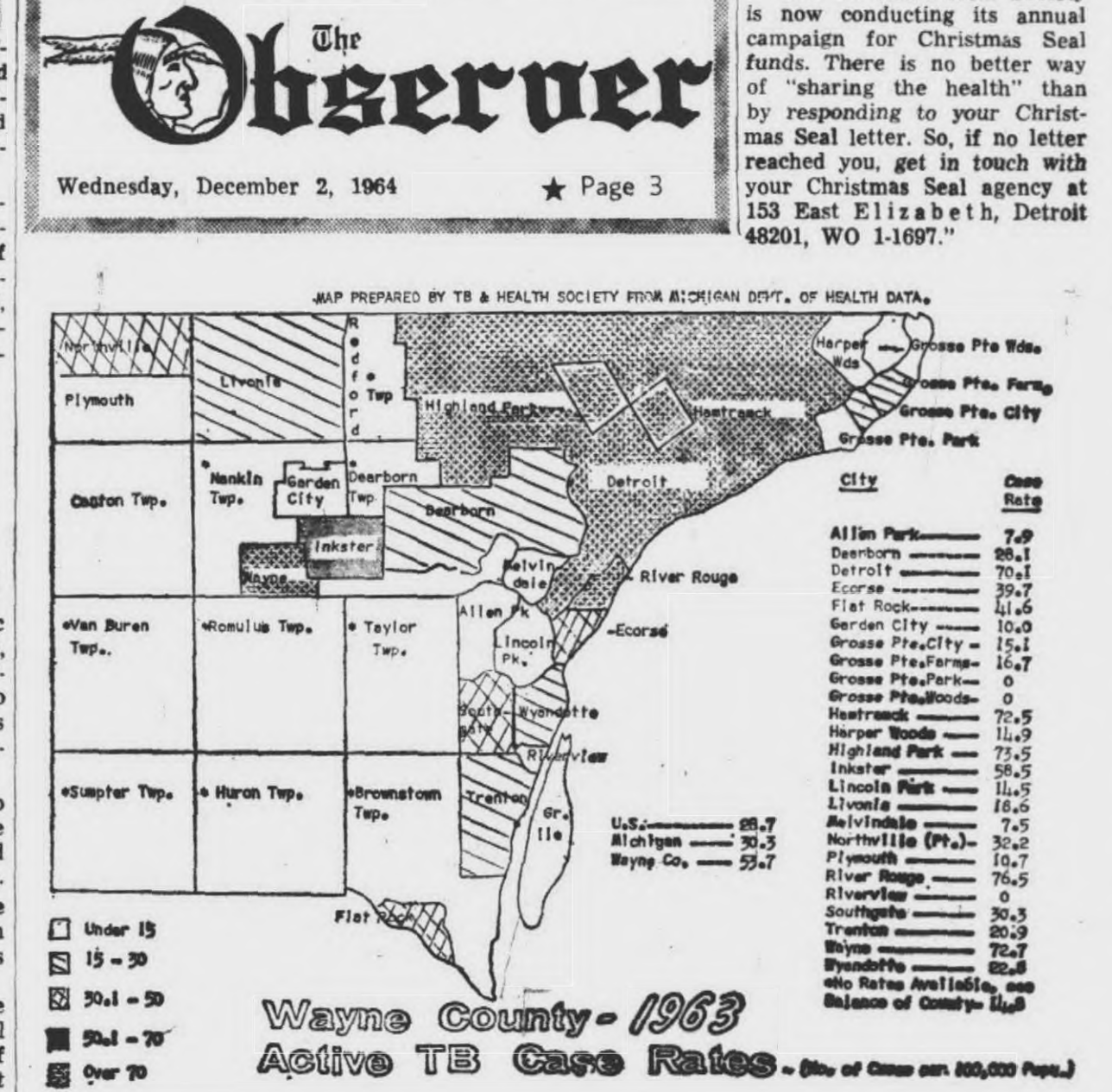
Detective Sgt. George Kraft, of the Michigan State Police who is an expert in the field of bad checks and bad check writers, will be one of the speakers.

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U-M Prof. Sees Automation Bringing Leisure In Ed.

ANN ARBOR — The great opportunity of tomorrow's schools and their primary obligation will spring from the growing wealth of leisure made possible by automation, according to John S. Diekhoff, University of Michigan professor of higher education.

"I am concerned not with education for leisure but with leisure for education," says

Diekhoff in The Journal of General Education, published by The Pennsylvania State University Press.

"Most Americans unfortunately think work is good in itself and we have guilty consciences when we are not working. We think of the occupations of leisure as mere pastimes, self-indulgences," Diekhoff says. "The occupa-

tions of leisure, however, include not only play, but also worship, the duties of a citizen, a neighbor, and a parent, enjoyment of the arts, and study.

"There are lucky men, of course, who love their work above all other occupations, but for most people work is dull, boring, almost beneath human dignity," he says.

"Americans may not be unique in their fear of boredom (football, whiskey and 'the telly' are also British), but we spend an enormous amount of money and energy seeking escape from it. We seek pastimes with peculiar avidity.

"The new leisure class," he notes, "will be made up of those who in the past have been regarded as the 'work-

ing class.' There will be no sudden leisure for professionals or for what we call professional-level management.

"On the contrary," says Diekhoff, "those who will continue to find their major satisfactions in work will be called on by society and by their own compulsions for more and more work.

"With this reservation, at

last we have the power to create what we have falsely boasted for a long time — a one-class society. In it, everyone will belong to the leisure class.

"If we learn that leisure need not be the hibernating time but can be the growing time of the human spirit, we may be at the beginning of a new Renaissance and on the verge of a

civilization rich beyond our dreams in spiritual as in material values.

"For our future society, then, the first function of our schools and colleges will be to provide the kind of education that makes a person. Vocational education, important as it must remain, will be relegated to secondary importance in our educational programs. For the oc-

cupations of leisure will be more important than work in the lives of most of us."

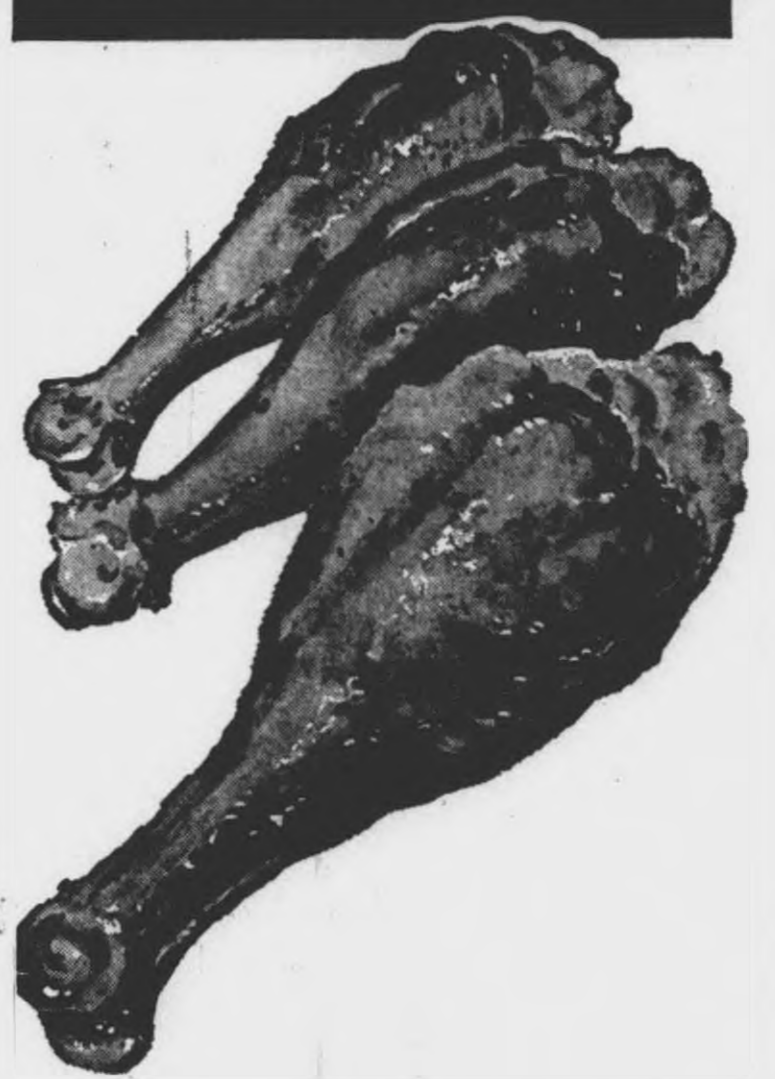

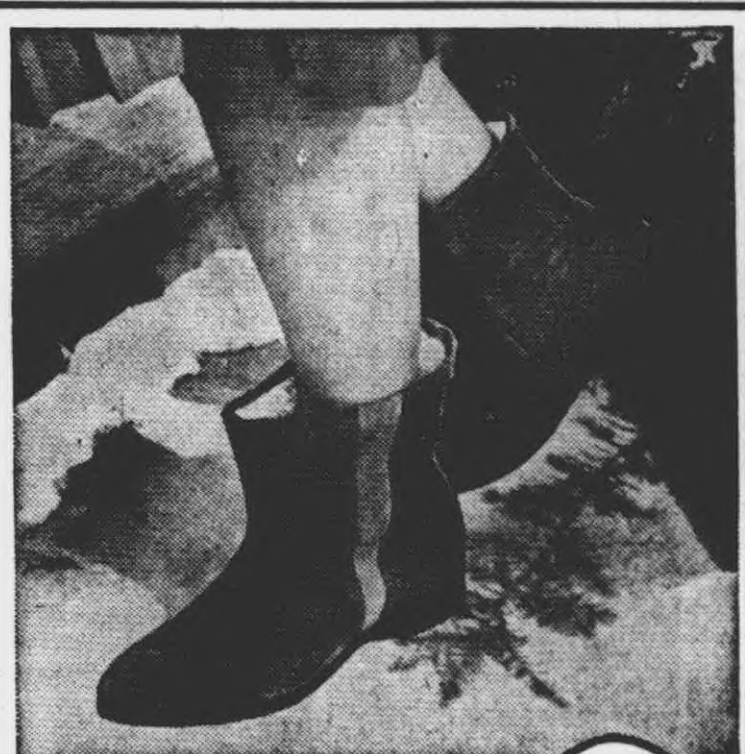

Holiday of Chanukah Being Celebrated

 On Nov. 29 the Jewish Festival of Lights or Chanukah (sometimes spelled Hanukkah) began.

This eight day holiday has been observed by Jews all over the world for two thousand years. The events which Chanukah commemorates are factual.

Its origins are closely linked with the history of the Greek Near Eastern Empire, which under Alexander the Great extended from Western Asia to Northern Africa. Following Alexander's death the kingdom was split into four parts.

During a portion of this time Palestine was a battlefield with both the Syrian and Egyptian armies battling for control. Syria finally established its rule over the country.

In 175 B.C. Antiochus Epiphanes came to the throne to rule Persia. In 165 B.C. in an attempt to fuse his realm into a homogenous kingdom, Antiochus demanded total political and religious loyalty to Greek culture from all the national and religious groups under his dominion.

Jews were forbidden to observe any of the precepts of Judaism under penalty of death. They defied Antiochus, and from this rebellion emerged the first martyrs for freedom of conscience in recorded history.

Chanukah thus celebrates the victory of the army of the Maccabees, led by Judah Maccabee and his brothers, over the Syrian army.

After the recapture of the Temple in Jerusalem, which had been looted and defiled by the Syrians, it was cleansed and rededicated to God. According to legend, a curse of oil which contained only enough fuel to light the Menorah (candelabrum) of the newly-recovered Temple for one night, lasted for eight days.

Thus comes the name "Festival of Lights." Jews everywhere commemorate the Maccabees' victory by lighting candles for eight days.

Candles are lit every night of the holiday, beginning with one on the first night, two on the second, and so on; until on the

Blank from the Livonia Jewish Congregation look on.

On each day of Chanukah, the children receive presents or Chanukah "gelt" (coins or money) from parents and relatives. All eat potato pancakes, called "latkes."

As the Hebrew word Chanukah means rededication, Jews everywhere rededicate themselves to the struggle for religious freedom during this period.

On Dec. 6 the Temple will hold a Chanukah Fun Carnival at the Grandview Elementary School, 19814 Louise, of Middlebelt, Clarenceville. The Carnival, which will feature booths and serving of lunch, will be from 12 noon to 3 p.m.

The conservative Livonia Jewish Congregation will meet for an evening of celebration on Dec. 5 at St. Matthew's Church in Livonia. This church is to be the congregation's new building. The singing of both Hebrew and English songs and the lighting of the Menorah will be highlights of the evening.

In addition to the services in the synagogues Chanukah

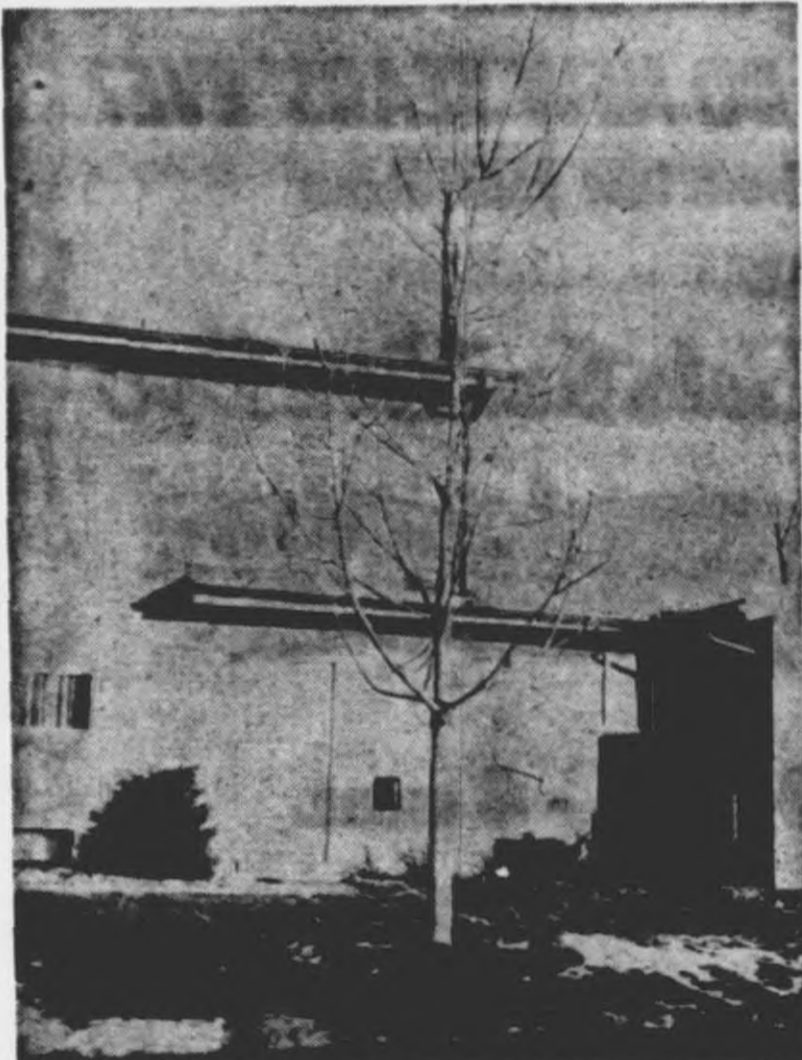
is celebrated in all Jewish homes.

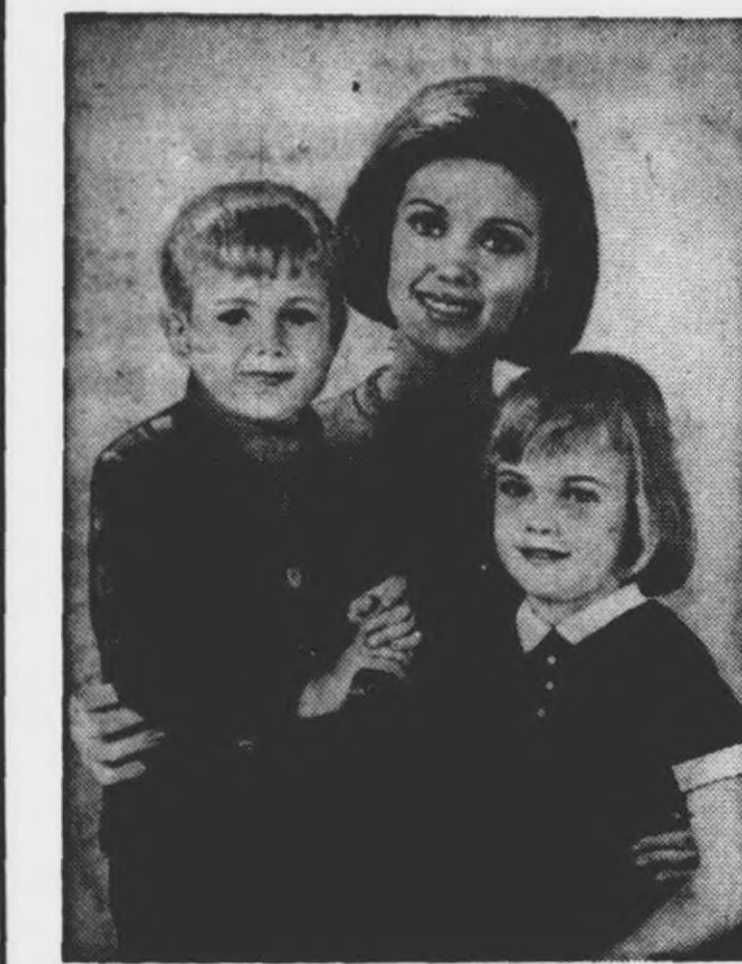

Farmington Methodist Church To Celebrate 135th Anniversary

Sunday, December 6, marks a milestone for Methodism in Farmington. Bishop Dwight E. Loder will speak at both morning services, 9:15 a.m. and 10:40 a.m. at the Farmington Methodist Church.

At 12:30, immediately following the second service, a church wide Anniversary Dinner will be served in the Farmington Junior High School. At 2:30 p.m., the Bishop will officiate in the ceremony burning church's mortgage for the educational trust. The Reverend Dr. Russell Sursaw will be the speaker at the special 7:30 p.m. Sunday Evening Service.

Methodism began its work in Farmington 135 years ago when Rev. J. A. Baughman, a circuit rider, stopped at a small group of houses on Grand River Avenue, about 18 miles West of Detroit, to speak to the neighbors in the community. At that time Farmington was a small village in the beginning of its development and among its earliest institutions was the Methodist Church.

At first its meetings were held in the homes of the people, and later, in 1840, a frame

church was built at the corner of Shiawassee and Warner. After a disastrous fire in 1920, a new church was built at its present site, Grand River and Warner. This building was dedicated in 1922.

Under the pastorate of Russell W. Sursaw, plans for a new Educational Unit and for a new parsonage were completed. The old parsonage was razed and a new one was built in a newly opened subdivision a short distance from the church. Work on the Educational Unit was completed and the building was consecrated April 13, 1958.

Growth and change have continued during the administration of the present pastor, Richard T. Markham. Mrs. Sidney D. Eva has joined the church staff as Parish Visitor.

Reverend David R. Stone joined the Church as Associate Pastor in July, 1964.

Dropout Study Begun By Wayne County Schools

A Wayne County "Study of the School Dropouts" has been started by three Wayne County Intermediate Board of Education consultants: Lee Goodney, Director of Attendance; Charles Barnett, Director of Child Accounting and Gerald Matthews, Guidance and Counseling Consultant.

A special invitational meeting was held for two representatives each from attendance, counseling, and child accounting departments of Wayne County Intermediate School districts. To insure a good cross-section from the 43 school districts, the following educators were invited: Frank Davis, Robichaud High School, Counselor; Bob Wathen, Heintzen High School, Counselor; Phil Francis, Garden City School District, Attendance Director; Harry Hidenfelter, Belleville High School, Attendance Director; Charles McLaughlin, Taylor Twp. School District, Director of Pupil Personnel; and Ken Kochoer, Wayne School District, Director of Pupil Personnel.

Discussion at this first meeting centered around how information about the school dropouts in Wayne County could be gathered and what type of survey instrument must be fashioned. At the present time, individual districts have done occasional

studies of their dropouts, but no centralized, over-all Wayne County study exists.

A second meeting has been set up at the Board of Education offices in Garden City. Phil Davis, Garden City Attendance Director will host the

meeting at which the newly-formed group will talk with Mr. Henry Lewis, Director of Vocational Education in the Dearborn City schools. His experience with the recent Dearborn Dropout Study will be the main topic for discussion.

Hare Seeks Opinion On Studded Tires

LANSING—Are studded tires which help to keep cars from skidding and sliding in Michigan's rough winters illegal in this state?

Well, most officials including Secretary of State James M. Hare think so. But Hare said he would ask as the attorney general to rule on them to get a "clear-cut decision" on the matter.

Hare, chairman of the Michigan State Safety Commission, said that his offices had received reports of Michigan dealers selling studded tires. "However, Michigan law appears quite specific in the matter," Hare noted, "and on the basis of our law, they may have to be outlawed in the state."

Hare said he personally thought the studded tires were a "definite safety aid" and would be of help in driving on icy and snow-covered roads.

Michigan law prohibits studs or other devices on tires, Hare said. Wires are permitted providing they do not exceed .075 inches in diameter.

The studs in question are made of tungsten carbide and covered with steel or plastic. They are inserted with a pressure gun into holes molded into the tire and cost about \$10 more than the average tire.

One-Car Death Survey Reveals Prior Records

LANSING—A sampling survey done by the Driver Improvement section of the Michigan Department of State revealed that most drivers killed in one-car accidents have prior violation and speeding records.

In releasing the study, Secretary of State James M. Hare said that officials of his department would continue the study in an effort to add data to the findings.

(1) All but five of the 40 drivers studied had previous convictions for speeding ranging from one to 12 infractions and had averaged more than two prior speeding convictions.

(2) Twelve of the 40 drivers had previous reckless driving convictions.

(3) All but three of the drivers had prior traffic conviction records ranging from two to 38 points, with these totals not limited to the past two-year period.

(4) Even with the limitations in receiving accident reports since neither Detroit nor Grand Rapids submits accident reports to the Department of State a total of 27 of the 40 drivers had been involved in prior accidents.

(5) More than half of the vehicles involved were 1960 or older models.

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
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CURTAIN GOING UP

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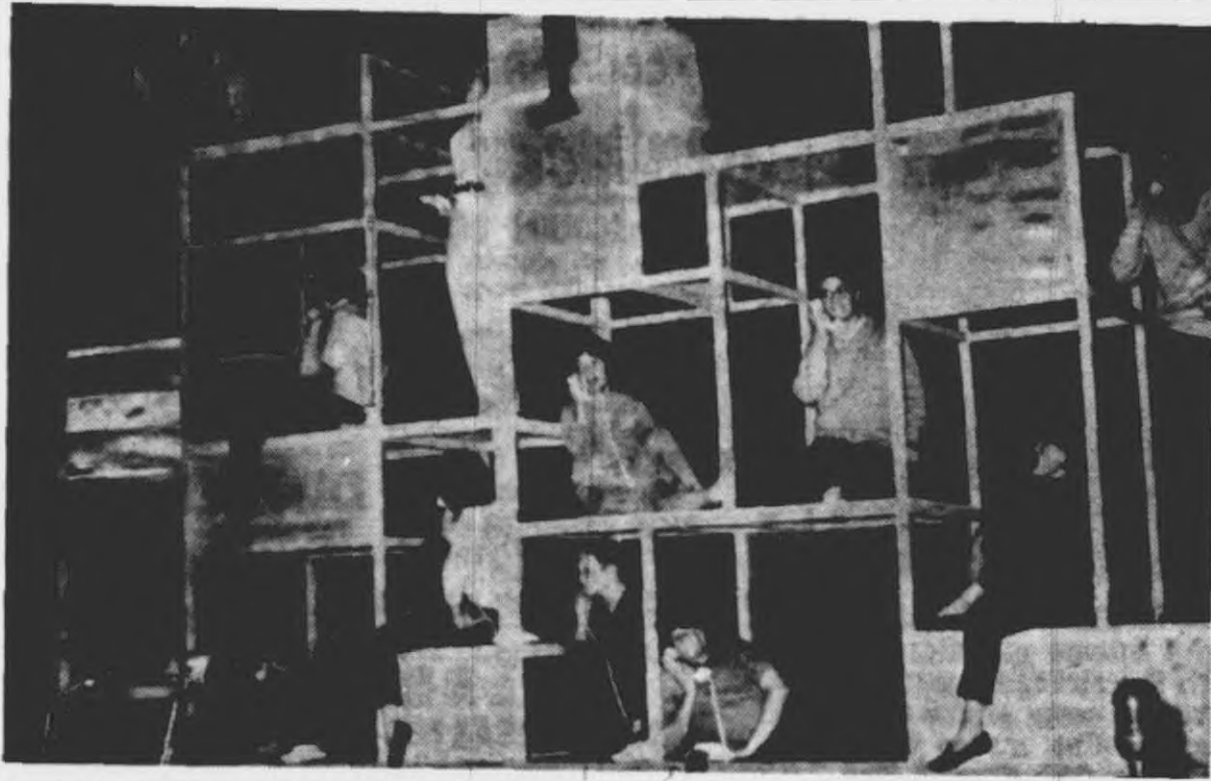
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"Bye Bye Birdie" Leads Praised, Group Scenes Panned By Reviewer

A few weeks ago this reviewer wrote a column in support of the Community Theaters in the area.

Unfortunately, "Bye Bye Birdie", the opening production of the Theater Guild of Livonia-Redford season, has many of the bad aspects of community theater.

The performances of Jim Coburn as Albert Peterson and Beverly Gotch as Rose Alvarez partially helped to save the evening.

However, this reviewer thinks that it is unwise and wrong for community theaters to produce musicals requiring large casts when the director is unable to handle the mass of people and when the mob scenes turn out to be simply that.

An example of this was, what was undoubtedly the low point of the evening, the musical-dance production "101 Ways To Kill A Man Ballet". On the other hand the two best numbers were "Put on a Happy Face" (two people) and "Spanish Rose" (one person).

Mention should also be made of the fine performance turned in by other members of the cast. Kay Seitz as Kim MacAfee and Roxane Haelele as Ursula Merkle were excellent. Mr. and Mrs. MacAfee (in real life Howard Egan and Jean Harrington) did much to help the production. Above average performances were turned in by Helen Thomas and Sylvia Barkley.

The play concerns itself with the impending draft of a teenage rock and roll idol. As the final publicity stunt before he goes to work for Uncle Sam the idol will give one of his admirers "one last kiss". The lucky fan is 15-year-old Kim MacAfee of Sweet Apple, Ohio.

Unlimited possibilities for satire exist in the story line and in the production. However, only the most obvious points utilized. The director even missed one of those, Conrad Birdie, the rock and roll singer, has always been handed a hand mike whenever he sang as the idea that the entertainer has no ability to project his voice. This was ignored in the local production.

"Bye Bye Birdie" will play again at Bentley High School next Friday, Saturday and Sunday. In February the Guild has scheduled a production of the musical "Gigi."

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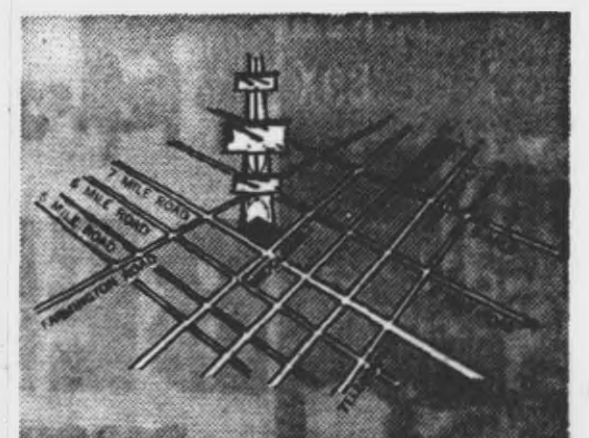
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Local Members Join School Board Ass'n. in Urging New Tax Laws

At the recent 16th annual convention of the Michigan Association of School Boards held in Grand Rapids, the delegate assembly took action on 17 proposed resolutions which will guide the organization toward its goals.

Participants from Farmington, Redford Union, Livonia, Clarenceville, South Redford and Plymouth joined in attending the conference.

If objectives set forth in some of the more important resolutions are obtained, more money will be provided for education with a better system of taxing and allocation. Other goals provide for better functioning of school boards, accreditation of elementary as well as secondary schools and improved methods of fire safety inspection. The association also stated its support of separation of church and state.

Only resolution not to be adopted (Resolution 5) stated that certification of teaching personnel in all kindergarten through 12th grade districts should require an understanding of teaching methods which are an essential and beneficial part of instruction. Similar ideas were referred to the Legislative Committee for recommendation to the Board of Directors.

Resolution 9 — on teacher tenure — which put the Association on record for an increase in the two-year probationary period for teachers mentioned in the Tenure Act, was tabled. Those who offered support for it felt that two years is a short time in which to make decisions concerning teacher tenure.

The following resolutions were passed:

Resolution 1: The Association will work for legislation and administrative rules which will assure that moneys now used for interest payments on money borrowed against anticipated state aid and anticipated taxes for budgeted operation be used for education.

Resolution 2: To assure more efficient functioning of elected school boards, the Association will encourage procedures which would recognize the advantage of newly elected school board members assuming their responsibilities of office at an early date after their election.

Resolution 3: The Association will study problems many districts have experienced in the calling of special elections in school districts and work for the enactment of legislation as the Association feels necessary to facilitate the calling of such elections.

Resolution 4: The goal of the Association is to obtain accreditation of all phases of public schools (the entire system would be accredited instead of just the high schools) and in the interim period, emphasis will be placed on standards of quality in each division of the public school curriculum.

Resolution 6: Local school districts through the intermediate

district shall be encouraged to cooperate with each other to provide coordinated and cooperative programs.

Resolution 7: The Association opposes support of non-public schools through the use of local, state or national public funds in order to safeguard the American tradition of separation of church and state.

Resolution 8: The Association opposes legislation which would place the authority for final policy decisions outside of the elected board of education. (This resolution is designed to counteract recent proposals to resolve disputes within school districts by arbitration by outside persons with authority to make binding decisions. It is felt that such procedures are both illegal and improper.)

Resolution 10: The Association will use its influence with local assessing officers and with the state legislature in attempting to develop a code of uniformity in the assessing of real property for tax purposes. (This would help eliminate the varying practices of assessment which lead to inequities in taxes which cannot be eliminated with the use of the State Equalized Valuation formula.)

Resolution 11: The 1965 Michigan Legislature will be requested to increase substantially state support to the public schools to at least restore state support at its 1952 proportion.

Resolution 12: The Association will conduct a study of the implications of the released-time act which was passed in the last session of the State Legislature (it permits public school students to be released from classes for a maximum of two hours per week for religious instruction) and especially of its possible effects on the impairment of the educational experience of public school children in Michigan.

Resolution 13: The Association requests consideration by the legislature to establish consistent inspection standards of fire safety and designate one body for enforcement whether state, county or local.

Resolutions 14-17: Special appreciation for service was sent to the organization's president, Lester Dankert, the administrative staff headed by Dr. Julius Barbour as executive director and Peter Ellis and E. Thomas Guber, both field secretaries, and Mrs. Helen Field, chairman of the legislative committee. Special thanks also went to the host, the city of Grand Rapids, and all their convention facilities as well as Kent Intermediate Boards of Education, Mrs. Fred Keeler, convention committee chairman, Mrs. Sherman Leppard, of the Grand Rapids Board of Education, and all program participants.

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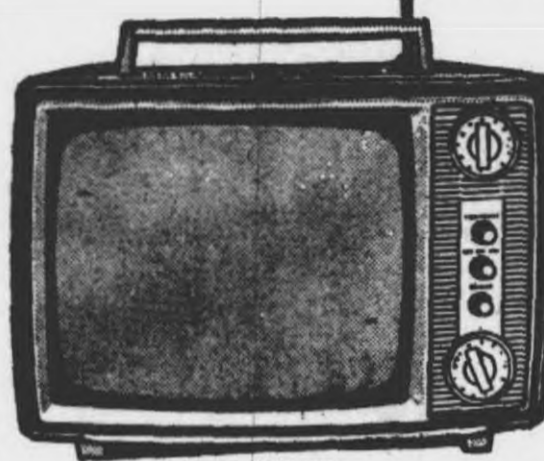
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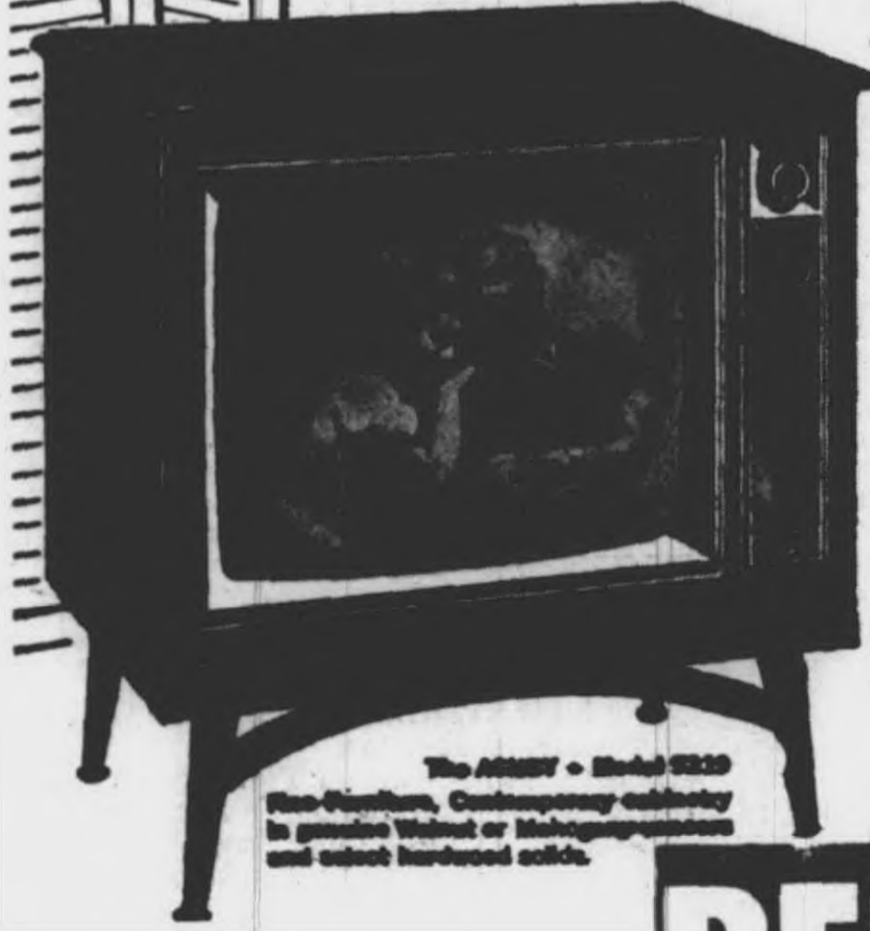
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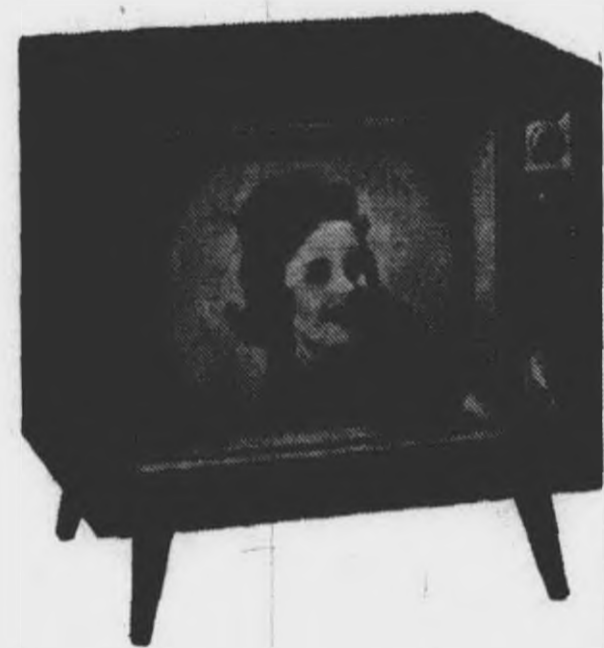
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Bentley, RU Rate One-Two Again

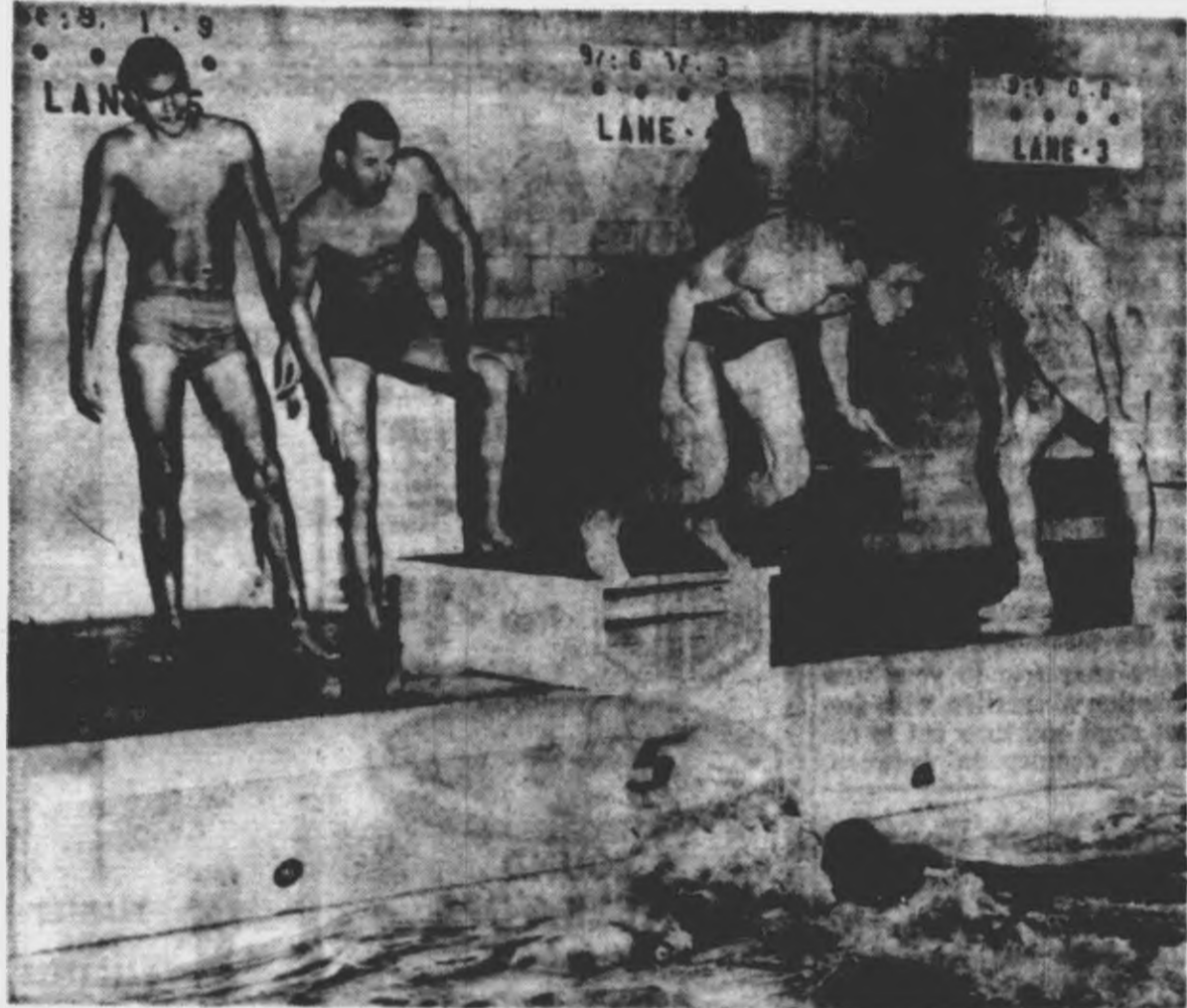

With one-fourth of the schedule played, the Detroit Red Wings are in first place in the National Hockey League by one point over Toronto. After 18 games, the Red Wings have won nine, tied three and lost six for 21 points.

This is a vast improvement from last season when the Wings showed a record of 6-10-2 after the first 18 starts. At the time, they were in fourth place, seven points behind the third-place Maple Leafs and 18 behind Chicago, in first place with a mark of 14-2-4.

Success in road games has accounted for most of Detroit's improvement this year. Last season the Wings got off to their worst start on the road in history, failing to win an away game until their 12th road start, Dec. 11. In the first 11, the mark was 0-9-2.

This season, Sid Abel's crew has compiled an even record of four wins, four losses and three ties in games away from Olympia. At home, the team dropped its first game, then won five straight before losing to New York, 2-1.

Individually, Norm Ullman is the Wings' leader. The 28-year-old center who is in his 10th NHL season is third in scoring in the league with 18 points on eight goals, 10 assists. Four of his goals have come in the last three games after a five-game dry spell.

Ullman leads the league in game-winning goals with four. He has three power-play goals and on five occasions has scored the goal which broke a tie and put Detroit ahead. In the last

seven years, Ullman has 29 game-winners and on the Wings only Gordie Howe has more, 37.

The Detroit Pistons go against the revamped New York Knickerbockers at 9 p.m. in the featured game while Baltimore faces Philadelphia in the opener at 7 p.m.

The Knicks boast four new players this season, led by Willis Reed, a 6-10 center from Grambling College, and Howard Komives from Bowling Green.

The latter was the nation's top scorer last season in the collegiate ranks with a fantastic 36.7-point average.

Saturday's game will be the third of the season between Detroit and New York, so far the teams have split even.

The Philadelphia team will bring to Detroit Center Johnny Kerr, the ironman of the basketball wars. Kerr already has played in 775 consecutive games without a miss since entering the NBA from the University of Illinois.

Former Pistons Don Ohl, Bailey Howell and Bob Ferry perform now for Baltimore whose roster also includes Gus Johnson, who a week ago tore down a backbar in St. Louis while making a basket.

The Pistons also have a home date with Cincinnati this Wednesday night. The Royals, paced by the great Oscar Robertson, also return to Cobo Arena next Wednesday.

New Look Develops In Home Dining Rooms

With many families turning a new look in dining rooms is developing. It might be called a "semi-open" look — a compromise between the mere dining "area" and the completely separate dining room, reports the American Home Improvement Institute, national clearing house for design and building information.

Since many homes built during the last two decades have open dining areas — at one end of the living room or short leg of an "L"-shaped living room — there is a growing trend toward converting these open areas into distinct dining rooms, but without sacrificing the airy, spacious look that presently exists.

This compromise is being achieved in a variety of ways. One basic method is painting or wallpapering the dining area in a color or pattern that contrasts with the living room walls.

A different floor covering also will help set off the dining area. A vinyl or vinyl asbestos tile is advisable since it is easy to keep clean, especially if there are spill-prone children in the family, and comes in a variety of style and colors.

For even greater separation without losing the desired spacious effect, hardboard grille-work room dividers in such styles as granada, venetian, oriental or classic can be used.

These can be obtained already assembled or assembled easily with handy pre-sized grillework panels and pre-grooved moulding and then painted to fit in with the decor.

The ceiling also can be used to achieve separation between the two areas. With a few pieces of lumber, a false beam can be constructed and attached above the room divider.

As another architectural change, a sunken dining room effect can be created easily and without costly rebuilding of the floor simply by arranging a row of plants on the floor around the outer edge of the room.

Bricks and stones can be used to fence them in and, if enough plants are not available a bench can be built into one wall to help give the illusion of a "step."

A complete change in accessories from the living room to the dining area will add distinction. For example, if polished metal and glass objects predominate in the living room, you might use only porcelains in the dining area.

Or, if paintings are used extensively in one area, sculpture or dimensional hangings can be used in the other.

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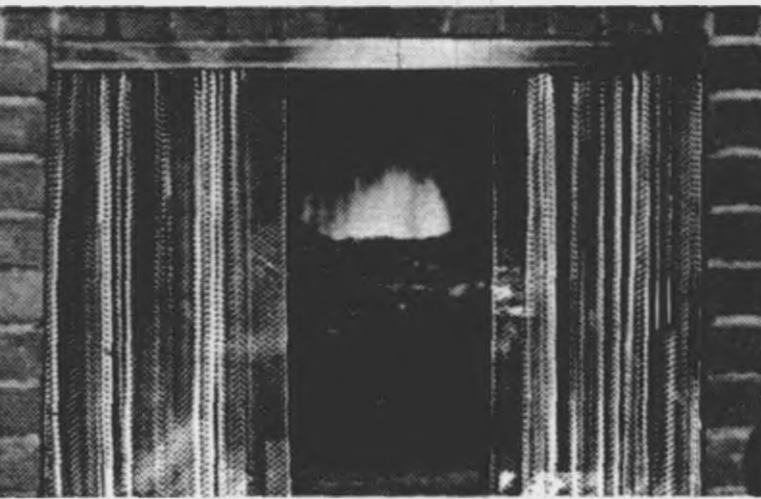
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Don't Allow Basement To Become A Jungle

Open Windows a 'Must' To Guard Against Monoxide

Because of the number of deaths that have occurred, car drivers and passengers are again being reminded by the State Police that fresh air from open windows while driving or parked is a "must" protection against the killing carbon monoxide gas contained in car exhaust.

Already this year the gas is reported as the cause of the deaths of at least 35 persons who were sitting in parked cars with windows closed and engines running. State health department records show that gas claimed the lives of 49 persons in stopped motor vehicles last year in Michigan.

Nine deaths this fall included five members of one family making a roadside stop, a couple watching a drive-in movie, and another couple sitting in a parked car.

State Police point out that the gas can do its lethal damage unsuspectingly because it is odorless and colorless. Drowsiness is one of its first symptoms which may be but is not necessarily followed or accom-

panied by ill feeling, nausea and vomiting.

Precautions against the hazard are: Having the car's exhaust system inspected for winter driving; properly ventilating the car at all times, whether driving or parked; checking the car's firewall, passenger compartment and trunk area for rust holes or other leaks through which fumes may seep; by not running the car's engine in a closed garage; and finally, by not running the engine when sitting for any length of time in a parked vehicle.

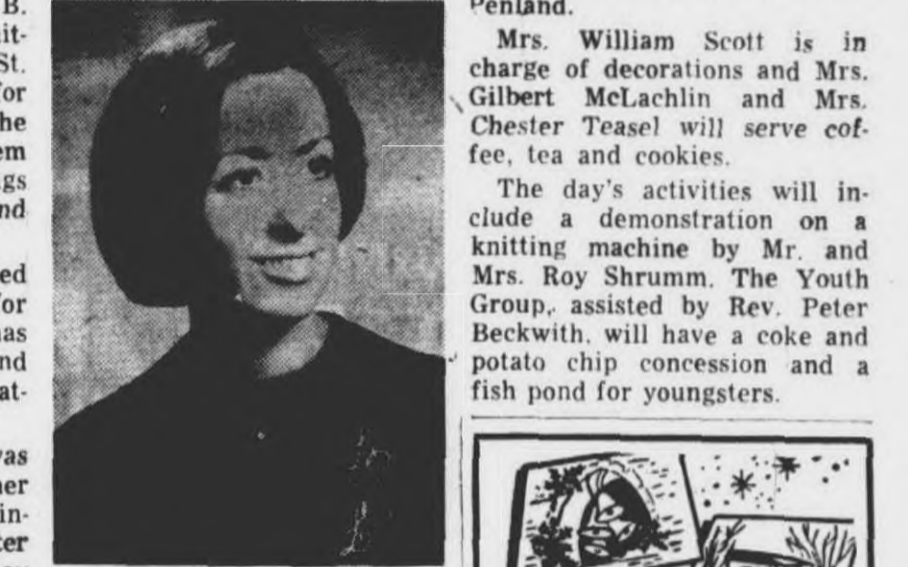

Wayne County Education Advisor Tells How to Ease Homework

E. J. McClendon, Secondary Education consultant for the Wayne County Intermediate School District, listed five ways to alleviate excessive homework assignments in all school district as he was interviewed by WJR's Lee Murray on her "Conversations" broadcast.

"We must have more school time devoted to guided learning with direct teacher aid, especially for the less able student," claimed Mr. McClendon. Presently, many teachers merely assign homework and promptly forget to make the assignment a learning situation.

E. J. McClendon, during his broadcast, mentioned several improvements for the entire provocative area of homework assignments:

- 1) Fewer assignments are needed. Give assignments in more detail. Such practice would allow for more careful teacher appraisal of results and additional time for remedial corrective teacher assistance.
- 2) All homework should be clearly purposeful with students as well as teachers being clear about what the purposes are.
- 3) More individual project or research-type assignments should be given. Eliminate or sharply reduce the mass mechanical or drill-type assignments.
- 4) Cooperative scheduling of homework assignments would reduce the pressure on students and would provide time to do a better job. Coordination between subject areas should be encouraged when possible. Flexible deadlines and reasonable time allowances for homework would build beneficial parent-teacher-child relationships.

5) Whenever possible there should be more student initiative and involvement in determining assignments—type, length and level of difficulty. Creative voluntary projects contribute more to the student's educational development and make homework a pleasure.

Encouragement by teachers and parents should be given to the individual student as he attacks his reading assignments. Best type of encouragement in a most indirect manner is by providing the student with reading on topics of personal interest. Determining the proper individual reading level also increases student interest in his

homework assignment. Homework can create excessive tension in children, especially if the assignments are

excessively long. Parent-child conflicts add to the problem when children can't get the assignment all done due to its

length. When asked about how home study could be most effective, McClendon indicated

that research shows the student needs privacy, freedom from worry, and a quiet place to do his studying. Numerous

distractions do make study more difficult. Clear and meaningful assignments spaced at proper intervals

which are directly related to the subject area can reinforce the school learning pattern. Homework and good teaching in the

classroom are true partners and will stimulate creativity plus perseverance in children if properly applied by educators.

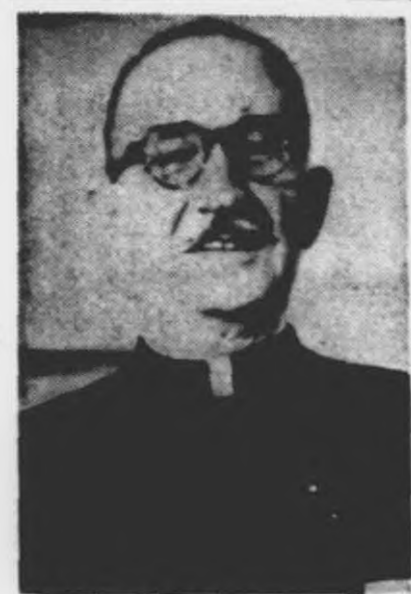

Merchants Urged To Scan Checks Carefully During Holiday Season

Michigan retail merchants could save themselves well more than half a million dollars in the busy December holiday shopping season by vigilant alertness to bogus check pass-

ing attempts, according to a conservative estimate by Det. Sgt. George C. Craft, head of the State Police check section at East Lansing. Sergeant Craft's opinion is

based on his section's experience in December last year when 145 bogus checks totaling \$6,758 were processed. Bad checks submitted to the State Police for examination consti-

tute about one per cent of the state total, he said, and on that basis the frauds last December in Michigan would have approximated \$675,898. Through October this year

the section had examined 1,431 bad check specimens totaling \$87,384, or nearly \$9 million worth on a state basis for 10 months. This is comparable to recent years

in which Michigan businesses have suffered losses averaging \$1 million or more a month. With prospects appearing good for high volume holiday shopping, Sergeant Craft urged merchants and their sales personnel to guard against any relaxation in check cashing practices.

He noted that bad check passers can be quick to take advantage of any weakening of vigilance, particularly in holiday periods when thriving business may overshadow a merchant's concern for the possibility of fraud. Sergeant Craft made these suggestions:

When the check endorser is a stranger, proper identification is a "must" rule to follow to avoid chance of fraud. This identification would include usually reliable evidence such as a driver's license or car license numbers. If still in doubt ask for further identification. Bear in mind that identification offered can be fraudulent too. The identification should be noted on the back of the check for reference if necessary for investigation later.

Michigan's Honors Council Taps 5 in Livonia, Plymouth

The highly-select Honors Council of The University of Michigan has admitted 417 entering freshmen, including several from Livonia and Plymouth, to its program of enriched studies.

Comprising 12 per cent of the incoming freshmen class in the College of Literature, Science and the Arts, these Honor students were invited to join the program on the basis of high school records, scholastic aptitude and achievement scores, and academic promise.

Otto G. Graf, director of the Honors Council, explains that the program offers several types of unique academic opportunities. Among its features are special counseling, interdepartmental honors courses and honors sections of regular courses, opportunities to participate in research projects of faculty members, faculty-student discussion groups, and directed summer reading for credit.

In the junior and senior years students continuing in or joining the program take special core courses in the field on concentration, leading to the honors degree.

The Council was established


in 1957. There are now 1,077 undergraduates participating.

Graf points to the program's success as shown by the achievements of the May graduating class. Almost 70 per cent of the 147 Honors graduates attained honors or high honors for academic achievement and independent work in their fields of concentration.

Over 90 per cent (142) are currently in graduate or professional school, many on one or more of the 126 scholarships and fellowships which were awarded to individuals in support of study here and abroad.

Your Child's Homework

By
DUMONT F. HIXSON, JR.



Because of the new mathematics, the new chemistry, and the new English grammar, many parents feel incapable of checking the quality of their child's homework. These courses appear new, different, and difficult. Nevertheless an excellent parental check can be accomplished quite easily and very rapidly.

Parents can obtain a fairly adequate check of the quality of their child's work by checking the quantity that is produced in the homework effort. For most homework there is a relationship between quantity and quality. Most teachers, for example, notice that the better themes tend to be longer. The poorer themes tend to be abbreviated. Like most rules there are exceptions. But there is value in itself in checking the child's work. It indicates parental interest.

The reason why a quantitative check will usually work is that it takes a little knowledge on the part of the child to write five sentences or more in answering the average question. Moreover if a certain amount of time and effort is required of the child, he will usually attempt to do a good job since he must expend the energy anyway.

To facilitate this method of homework checking, the parent might encourage the child to maintain a separate notebook for each course. Properly done the notebook should be an object of pride and accomplishment. A table of contents can be constructed and expanded as new assignments are completed. A page should be provided so that the class assignments are written down right in the classroom; Parents and children are often surprised at

this visual display of the tangible amount of work that is accomplished during a semester.

Parents might also check the neatness of the child's work. There is a definite relationship between quality and neatness. The poorest work frequently is illegible and characterized by poor handwriting. While good students sometimes possess poor handwriting, this writer has yet to see a poor reader who possesses adequate handwriting. Although there are motor determinants and problems of small muscle coordination that affect handwriting ability, the important fact is that the student who turns in illegible work is advertising himself as a poor student in terms of probability.

There are added values in encouraging neatness and quantity. Three characteristics that identify the poor student on all levels are a short attention span, an inadequate sense of closure, and particularly a lack of persistence. The reverse is true for the good student. When the parent encourages legibility and quantity in homework, he is encouraging the development of attentive qualities, closure, and the quality of persistence—factors that help to identify the gifted child.

Hare Asks for Decision on Tire Studs

LANSING—Are studded tires which help to keep cars from skidding and sliding in Michigan's rough winters illegal here in the state?

Well, most officials including Secretary of State James M. Hare think so. But Hare said he would ask the attorney general to rule on them to get a "clear-cut decision" on the matter.

Hare, chairman of the Michigan State Safety Commission, said that his offices had received reports of Michigan dealers selling studded tires. "However, Michigan law appears quite specific in the matter," Hare noted, "and on the basis of our law, they may have to be outlawed in the state."

Hare said he personally thought the studded tires were a "definite safety aid" and would be of help in driving on icy and snow-covered roads.

Michigan law prohibits studs or other devices on tires, Hare said. Wires are permitted, providing they do not exceed .075 inches in diameter. The studs in question are made of tungsten carbide and covered with steel or plastic. They are inserted with a pressure gun into holes molded into the tire and cost about \$10 more than the average tire.
