## Draugelis Eligibility Questioned, Council Asks Ruling

# Smear Campaign Spurs Interest in Plymouth Primary

A primary election, slated for next Monday between the hours of 7 a.m. and 8 p.m., which last week loomed as one of the dearest in Plymouth history, suddenly became one of the

hottest issues in recent years when a question of eligibility crept into the picture over the weekend. The primary, in which three candidates are seeking nomi-

ations for the post of Municipal Judge in the City of Plymouth with one scheduled for elimination and the remaining two battling it out in the April election, developed into a red-hot

battle when it was disclosed that a word of mouth, whispering campaign was being carried on against the eligibility of Edward Draugelis, popular City Attorney and generally consid-

ered as almost a certain finalist. Rumors of the behind the scenes campaign to discredit Draugelis were heard as early as last Friday. The situation broke into the open

Monday afternoon when City Clerk Richard Shafer, head of the city's election board, received a communication from a "Concerned Citizen" asking if Draugelis was eligible for the race since he failed to meet the requirement of five years residence set up in the city charter.

The person or persons behind the letter, which was addressed to the City Commission, did not sign it, neither did it have a letter head.

Monday's primary involves J. Rusling Cutler, 193 N. Main; Clifford Manwaring, 497 Auburn, and Draugelis.

Up to this week's disclosure, each had been campaigning quietly, seeking support of friends, neighbors and groups. At no time was there any indication of the events of Monday.

Each of the candidates was aware of the provision in the City Charter requiring five years residence. Manwaring and Cutler were told by Draugelis that he had carefully checked the state statutes and found this requirement had been removed by action of the state legislature in 1954 and that even though it was in the City Charter, the state act specifically ruled out any such provisions in city charters.

Draugelis, who was shocked by news of the "discrediting" campaign, told the Observer he had carefully checked the provisions of the state law before announcing his candidacy and had been assured that there was not any question of his eligibility.

In a letter to the Observer Monday afternoon, he explained his stand.

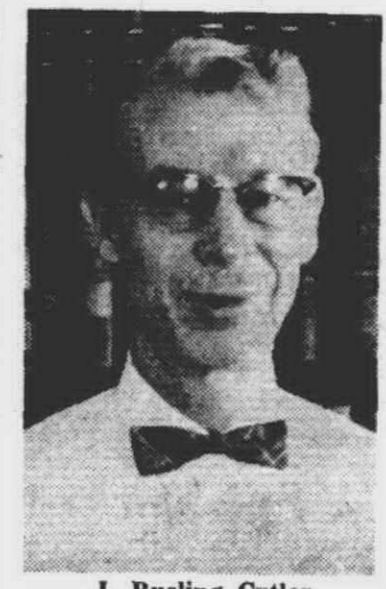
"You recently brought to my attention the fact that a question has arisen as to whether the City Charter provision requiring residency for five years in the City before filing for the office of Municipal Judge would not disqualify me as a candidate for that office.

"I wish to thank you for your kindness in calling my attention to the question.

"Please be advised that the Michigan statutes annotated 5.2107 was the original law requiring candidates for Municipal Judge to be a resident of the City for five years. Our existing City Charter merely adopted the language of this statute.

"The statute was amended, however, in 1954 at which time the State Legislature eliminated the five year requirement. The present qualifications are 'resident elector of the city, under 70

## Nine Candidates Seek Nomination for Senate Post

Nine candidates will face voters in Livonia, Plymouth and Farmington next Monday when the polls open for the primary election in the 14th District State Senate race.

The special primary was called by Governor George Romney to nominate candidates to fill the vacancy in the local Senate seat caused by the death of Paul M. Chandler, Republican State Senator-elect.

Chandler won the seat in last November's general election, but died Dec. 12 before he could assume the post. He had served as State Representative for a term and had been publisher of The Observer Newspapers.

Seeking to fill the vacancy are six Republican and three Democrats. The winners of the two primaries will square off in the general election April 5. On the Republican ballot will be:

George T. Ames, 38, 41008 Mooringside, Novi, a barber and candidate for Congress 11 years ago; Allen C. Ingle, 43, 29320 Grand River, Farmington, an attorney and Justice of the Peace; Paul A. Kern, Jr., 42, 4450 Dow Ridge Road, Orchard Lake, a real estate businessman; Thomas J. McHugh, 32, 1485 Benvenue, Sylvan Lake, an engineer; Fitzhugh Prescott, 32, 3235 Loomis Rd., Farmington, a fertilizer company president; and Farrell E. Roberts, 42, 2486 Lafay Dr., Pontiac, an attorney for 15 years and former State Senator.

One woman and two men are seeking the Democratic nomination. They are:

John H. Burke, 42, 31811 Staman Circle, Farmington, an attorney for 12 years and former congressional candidate; Elsie Gilmore, 49, 30415 Puritan, Livonia, a small businesswoman; and Edward H. McNamara, 37, 17278 Dolores, manager for Michigan Bell Telephone Co.

In their final appearance in the district before voters, the nine will speak and answer questions at a candidates forum Friday, Feb. 12, at Emerson Jr. High School in Livonia.

The meeting, at 8 p.m., is sponsored by the League of Women Voters, and is open to the public.

## Citizen Group Recommends

# School Board Slates Millage Vote Mar. 29

Voters in the Plymouth Community School District will be asked to approve an as-yet undetermined millage increase for operations on March 29.

That was the decision of the school board Monday after receiving a report from the Citizens Advisory Committee for School Finance recommending the millage hike after a study of the future needs of the district for the next five years and development of a program for timely acquisition of sites for future schools.

The committee report was made by Chairman Wendell Smith who detailed the long hours of work, numerous meetings and study devoted to the effort by the members.

The committee included: Mrs. Marshall North, sub group chairman, curriculum and salary; Dr. Ensign Clyde, sub group chairman, facilities; and Robert Jenkins, sub group chairman, population equalization; Doug Blunk, Harold Niemi, Edward Sawusch, Mrs. Harlund Smith, Robert Barbour, George Dean, F. Richard Merriam, John Witte, John Herb, Mrs. Ray Hulce, Wallace Green and Smith.

The committee recommended that increased operating funds in the amount of \$336,000 be provided and that an additional operating millage of sufficient amount be proposed to the community residents for their approval and support.

In regard to operations, it further recommended to the \$336,000 additional requirements for 1965-66, provision be made by the school board for an appropriate amount to be included for salary adjustments for all personnel of the system.

The report read: "After considerable review of many operating data, the committee is in complete agreement with the operating needs of the school district, specifically as to the \$336,000 of increased 1965-66 operating funds now estimated to be required over and above 1964-65 operating budget requirements.

"We found these projected

requirements to result from increased enrollment (\$247,000), desirable program improvements (\$32,500), and normal salary increases required in accordance with the ap-

proved salary schedule (\$56,000). "While we are very much aware of the increasing cost of government at all levels, we are

## Parents Are Told 7-Room Addition to End Problems

"We feel the seven-room addition to the Farrand School will adequately solve all of the undesirable conditions described by your spokesman," said Gerald Fischer, president of the Plymouth School Board, in a meeting with a delegation of more than 50 parents Monday night.

The parents, who earlier expressed dissatisfaction with the conditions at the overcrowded school, attended the regularly February meeting to express their displeasure through medium of spokesman Alex Howell.

Questioned as to the Board's plan for the future, Fischer, who served as spokesman in his capacity of president, told Howell the Board plans to have an additional elementary school in the Lake Pointe subdivision by the start of the 1966-67 school term.

In addition, Fischer explained the Board has advanced plans for two elementary schools and has accelerated the present five-year pay-as-you-go plan into the next two and a half years.

"None can predict the mushrooming growth of the school system," Fischer said. "We have always recognized that a second elementary school system would be needed in your area but the growth was far greater than we could foresee."

Asked whether the pay-as-you-go plan is sufficient to take care of the community's needs, Fischer replied "we have always said that when mushrooming growth comes, the pay-as-you-go can't meet the needs.

"We know that we have saved the community enough in the past six or eight years in interest to more than pay for the construction of two elementary schools. This is the direct result of pay-as-you-go.

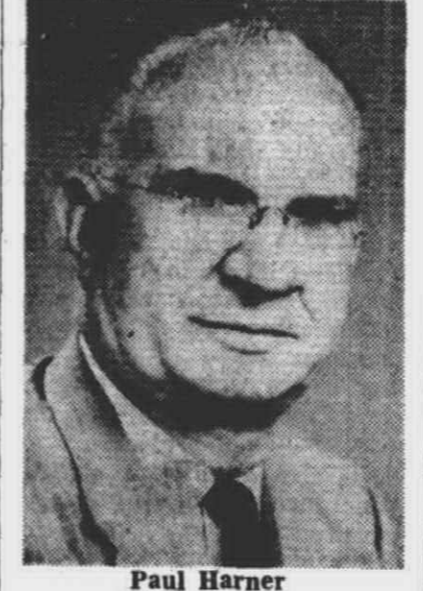
"We have \$500,000 available annually for construction and expansion under pay-as-you-go, when the needs are greater than that, then we will have to turn to long term bonding. We haven't reached that position yet but you can rest assured that when we do, we'll be the first to break the news to the Plymouth community taxpayers."

Howell told the Board his group felt the Farrand School

situation would be just as acute in September as it is now despite the seven-room addition.

(It was the failure of contractors to have the addition ready by Feb. 1 that foment-

## Spanish-American War Veteran Dies At 90

Harry Dobson, 90, of 47485 N. Territorial Road, who was one of Plymouth's four remaining veterans from the Spanish-American War, died Feb. 3 in the Northville Convalescent Home in Northville. Services were held Saturday in the Schrader Funeral Home in charge of Rev. Hugh White.

Despite his 90 years, Mr. Dobson managed to join his three fellow survivors of the Spanish-American War, in the traditional Memorial Day parade in Plymouth and participate in the ceremonies in the bandshell in Kellogg Park.

The four were honored last year, had a leading role in the parade and sat through the services in the bandshell despite the sticky hot weather.

Mr. Dobson was born Nov. 20, 1874 in Massillon, O., a son of George and Laura Metzler Dobson. He moved to the area from Ohio in 1954 and had resided with his daughter, Mrs. Walter Gemperline. He was a retired office manager for a steel corporation in Ohio.

## Teacher Named Head of Reading Program

Miss Katherine Van Hoy, a teacher at 10 Mile elementary school, has been named the new reading resource person for the Farmington School System.

Her primary function will be to work with teachers to strengthen the reading program as well as diagnose difficulties and prescribe a course of study for poor readers. She also will help select material to stimulate the advanced reader.

Miss Van Hoy is presently spending afternoons each day in Pontiac for training under the Oakland County reading program headed by Dr. Harry Hahn. She will assume her duties full time after her training is completed.

When she came to the Farmington system in September of 1956, Miss Van Hoy held a Master of Arts degree in counseling and guidance from the University of Michigan. Her undergraduate work was done at Eastern Michigan University.

She says she has "always had a keen interest in reading research" and has backed up her understanding of children with problems by working a summer at the University of Michigan Fresh Air Camp for boys with emotional problems.

Of Miss Van Hoy's abilities, Mrs. Jean Ralph, principal of 10 Mile school, says, "She is exceptional in ability to meet demands of students in reading." Miss Van Hoy gained her first four years of teaching experience in Ypsilanti and Mt. Clemens before coming to Farmington.

She was selected over five other qualified applicants by a committee comprised of Minnie Zielke, director of elementary education; Doris Lachmann, Woodale principal; Ronald Jackson, Shiawassee principal; M. Van Ameyde, assistant superintendent in charge of instruction; and Superintendent Gerald V. Harrison.

Four appointments to the teaching staff were approved by the Farmington Board of Education at their meeting Monday evening.

Mrs. James W. Cavanaugh, 46, will teach a third grade class at Ten Mile school one-half day next semester. Gretchen A. Kuschna, 23, has been hired as a full time secondary substitute teacher. A 1965 graduate of Michigan State University, she will service five schools specially for extended substitutions.

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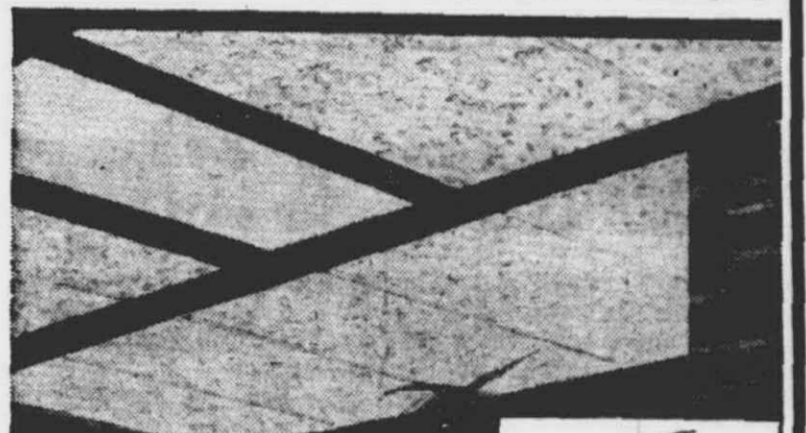
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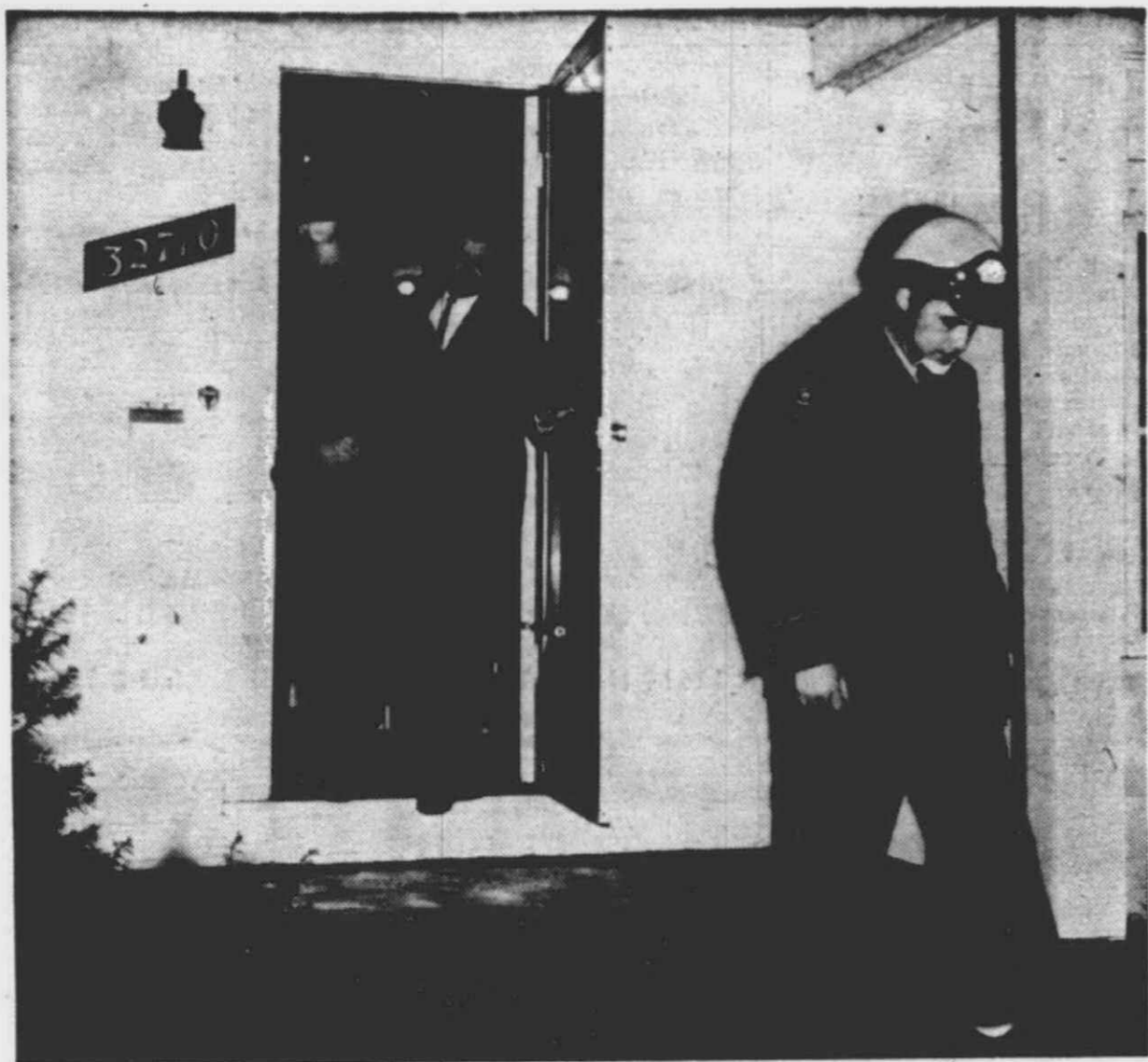


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# State Nazi Chief Is Arrested In Farmington on Libel Charge

Suburban Detroit's lone representative of the "master race" found himself behind bars Monday morning, Feb. 8. Russell Roberts, the local representative of George Lincoln Rockwell's American Nazi Party, was charged with violating the state criminal libel law. Farmington police arrested him at his home, at 32710 Grand River, after an investigation disclosed he had circulated anti-Negro tracts through a 14-year-old boy in the community.

Jaunty and a bit arrogant when police went for him, Roberts said, "I don't deserve all this flattery," as he was led from his home into a police car. He waved to reporters.

But after being fingerprinted, booked and questioned at the City Jail, he grew increasingly testy. "The only reason I'm here is because I'm a white man surrounded by niggers and Jews," he snarled.

Roberts was arraigned before Farmington Municipal Judge Sylvester Pheny on a charge of criminal violation of the state libel act.

According to this act, Roberts "did falsely and maliciously, by writing, attribute and impute to a race of men, to wit: the Negro race, the commission of infamous and degrading acts."

The specific piece of literature, out of Roberts' extensive hate library, upon which the Farmington Police were able to obtain an arrest, was a "Boat Ticket to Africa." It has certain references that border on the obscene.

The police got hold of one of these tickets from an irate mother, whose 14-year-old son had been offered a quarter by Roberts, to distribute them. Farmington Police Chief Maurice Distz, a man with a strong distaste for hate-mongers, turned the material over to the Oakland County Prosecutor's Office — and pressed the matter until the arrest was issued.

That a criminal libel charge can be sustained in this case is, however, far from certain. The Metropolitan Detroit Branch of the American Civil Liberties Union issued a statement to the Observer, shortly after Roberts' arrest.

It conceded that it had not yet had an opportunity to examine the particulars, and had not been asked to intervene. However, it repeated its "well-established position" in such cases:

"The ACLU has consistently opposed criminal libel laws and prosecution for group libel as being unwarranted and unconstitutional infringements upon the first amendment guarantees of expression."

"The expressions allegedly published by Russell Roberts may well be offensive and hateful, still it is better that they be openly expressed and therefore made accessible to challenge and excoriation. In general, a free society in dealing with ideas whatever their merit or lack thereof must put its trust in public wisdom rather than in repressive legislation or criminal prosecution."

The Roberts case may well become a legal cause celebre, but criminal libel is only a misdemeanor. If he is convicted, Roberts faces a penalty of 90

days, and/or a \$100 fine. Det. Sgt. William Garden, of the Farmington Police Dept., traveled to Pontiac at 8:30 a.m.,

Was his wife concerned about the arrest? "How would your wife feel?" he asked in reply. And the reporter was sorry he had raised the question.

Would his arrest cause him to cease his Nazi activities? Definitely not. He vowed to become even more active.

He would not, however, concede that one of his activities has been distributing literature. He will not even discuss the matter. He took this position

even before the arrival of his lawyer, Howard Richards.

Roberts' colleagues are apparently just as loyal to him. The Observer contacted Nazi Headquarters, in Arlington, Va., and told them about the arrest.

Alan Welch, who described himself as a deputy commander, said "This is the most ridiculous charge I've heard since I've been in the battle. They may as well throw it out. Commander Rockwell will be up there to take charge."

In the meantime, Roberts is free on \$100 bond. A trial date has not been set.

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## Schoolcraft Gets OK For Nursing Program

The Michigan Board of Nursing has notified Mrs. Harriett Sattig, Director of Nursing Education, that Schoolcraft College has been granted approval to initiate an Associate Degree Nursing Program to open in the fall of 1965.

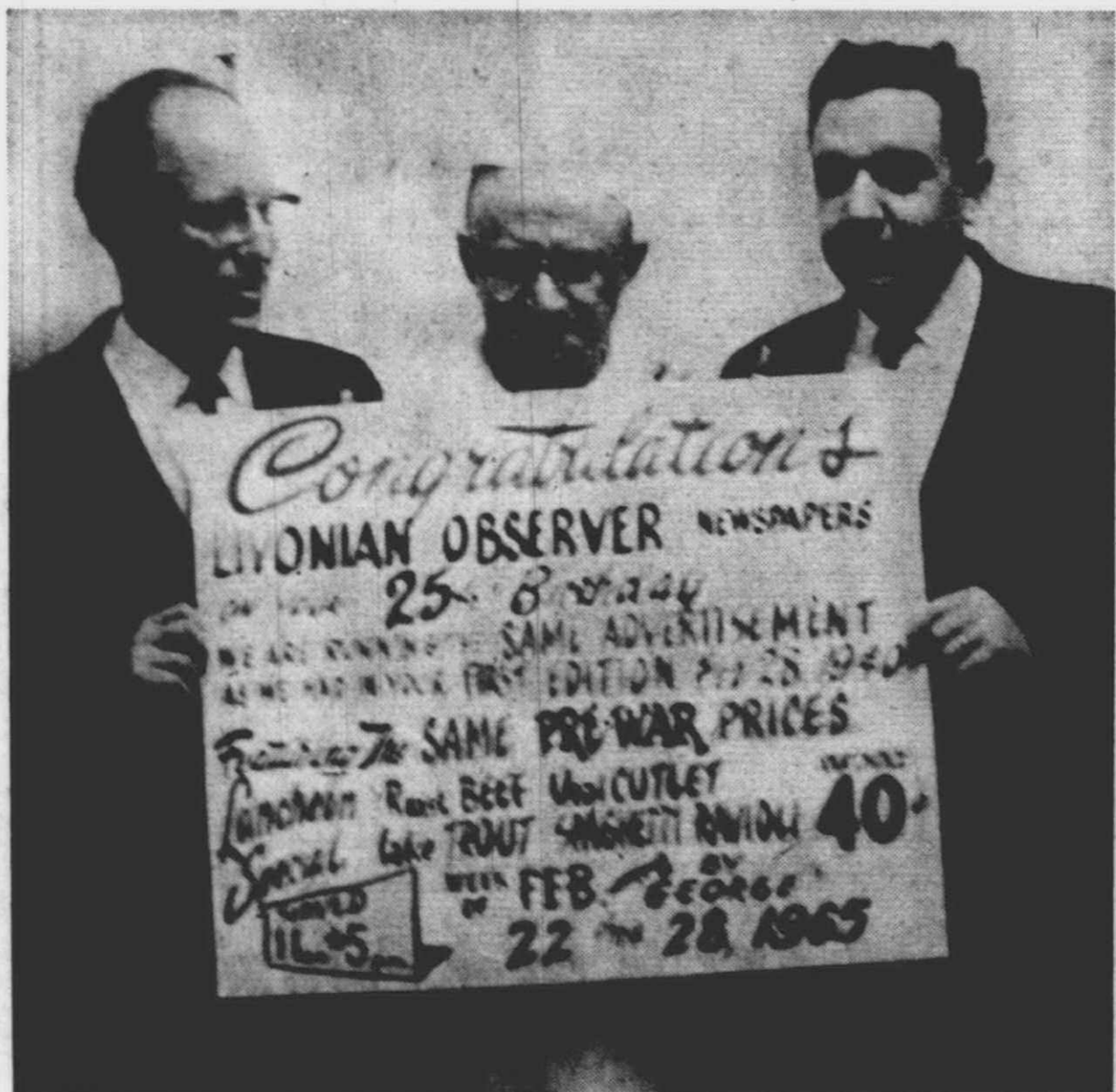
Nine community meetings to explain the March 29 bond and millage election in the Clarenceville School District have been organized by the Board of Education.

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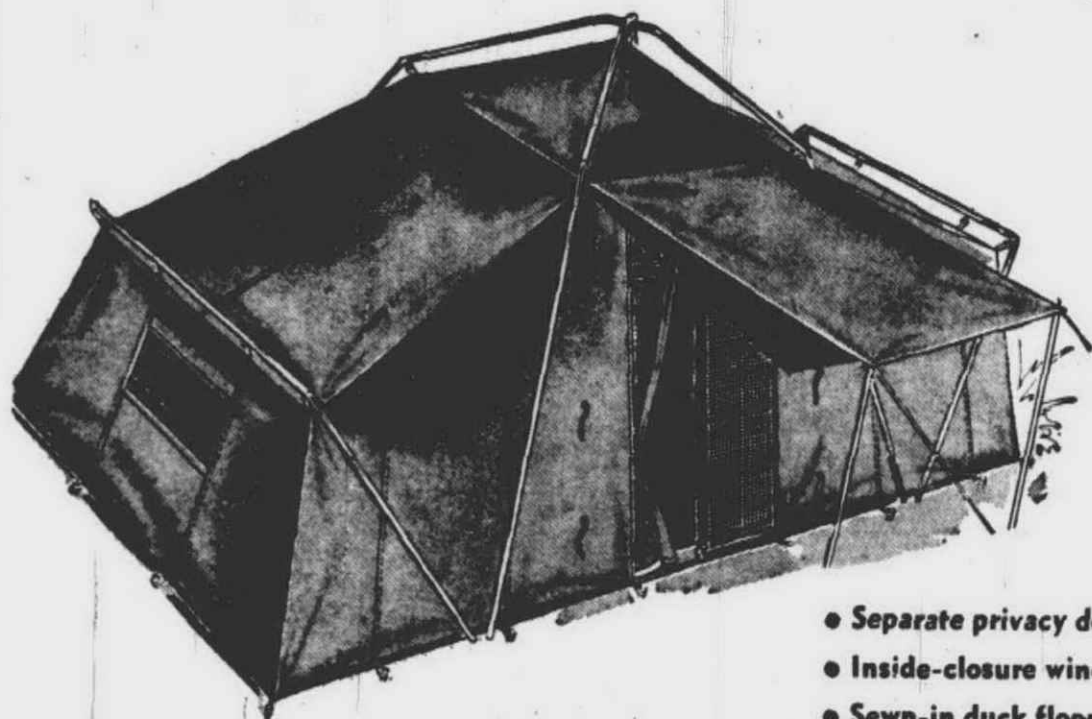
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### AAUW Adds To Its List Of Eligibility

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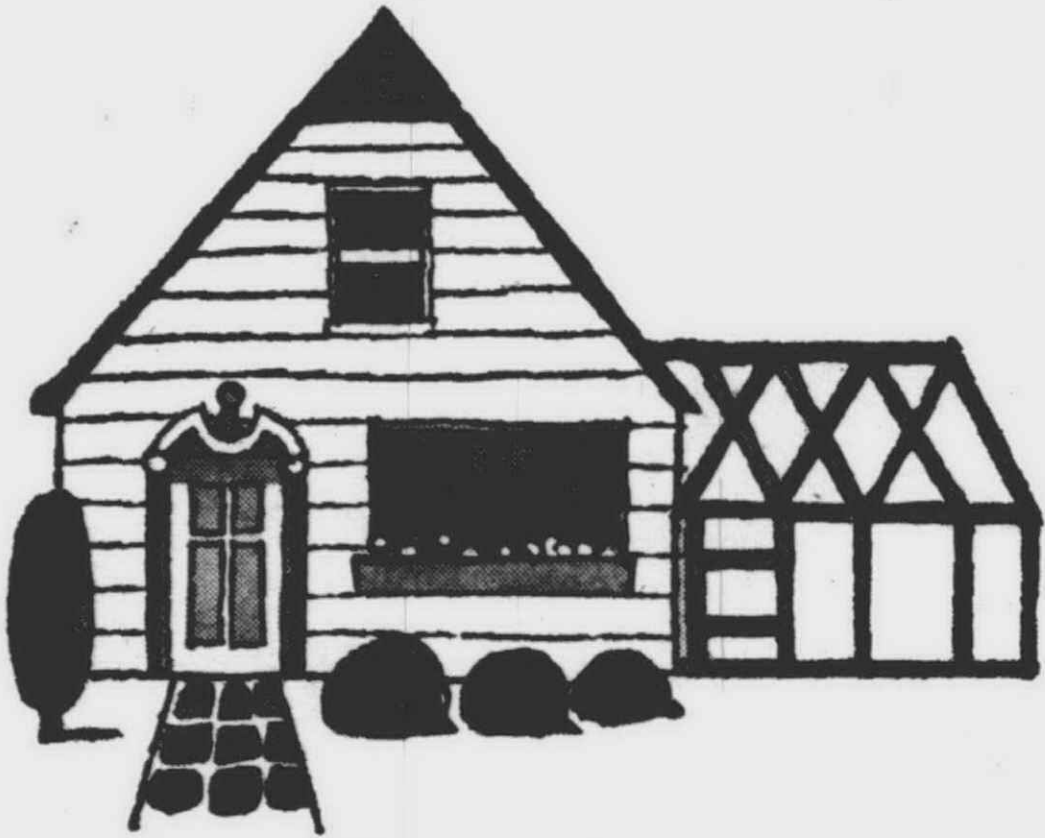
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### DPW News and Notes

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# Farmington Nazi Was Big, Rough, Tough Back in 1943

"He was tough. A former sailor in the merchant marine, he was thick-skinned and bullish, with watery eyes, and florid face. He had a "beer nose" — red-purple in color, spotted, the shape of an elongated potato.

"He swore continually in the presence of his wife. His attacks on Jews were much more vicious than most I had heard during my investigations. . . . He expressed disgust with Americans . . .

"He pulled out a Colt-45 and handled it gingerly. "The bullets from this baby will blow a six-inch hole in you," he said.

"As we talked on, it became apparent that he was an essentially violent man. He loved violence. He spoke continually of it. He cited the instance of beating up a laundry delivery man.

"He was also the type that had to have a scapegoat for his failings. He had to have somebody to bully continually. A world without hating someone was a world intolerable to Roberts.

"He had to humiliate and bully and feel superior in order to live. Then, too, he lived in constant fear of the unknown.

"Roberts had the most perfectly developed fascist mind it was my ill-good fortune to study at close range."

This was John Roy Carlson's impression of Russell Roberts in 1943, when Roberts was the mastermind behind the National Workers League, The NWL was described by Carlson as "not the largest."

"But its influence was far-reaching, and its work of sabotaging the war morale was effective. It struck at the most vulnerable sector of America's war effort—Labor."

Carlson wrote this account in his best-selling expose "Undercover."

Roberts describes the description as a "smear," and says it "caused me to be in ill-repute, in St. Clair Shores, where I was living."

Twenty-two years later, Roberts bears little resemblance to the formidable portrait Carlson painted of him.

He is now white-haired and fat" when David Eisla and I interviewed him at his home at 32710 Grand River, in Farmington, on Monday, Feb. 1. He was even-tempered, and well-mannered, and spoke with quiet sincerity.

I introduced myself as "Allen," leaving it to Roberts to ask — if he wished — what the rest of my name was. He did not.

I asked him what he thought of Jews. He said he had met a couple of good ones—"40 years ago."

Then he asked me if I was Jewish. I said I was, and matter-of-factly asked him what he had against us.

Just as matter-of-factly, he replied that we are a "parasitic race"; that we don't work, but live off the efforts of others.

I said I hoped he would take note of the fact that I was working. He assured me he would; and remained pleasant throughout our interview.

Roberts says he does not hate Negroes, he pities them. "They are definitely inferior, and are being exploited by Jewish civil rights agitators."

"What," I asked "should be done with the Jews?" He replied: "That will be up to our leaders, when we come to power."

A pretty good hint as to what that fate would be is contained in "The Stormtrooper's Manual," which Roberts gave us, and which he said represented his views 100 per cent. On page four, the Manual asks: "Why do we advocate gas chambers for traitors?"

Its answer: "The extent of traitorous conspiracy requires a large scale method of execution. Also the tradition exemplified by gas chambers drives traitors frantic, and helps expose them."

Roberts will not disclose what the movement's strength is in Michigan. Nor will he say what he, personally, is doing for the cause.

However, he attracted the attention of the Farmington Police Dept., on Dec. 12, of last year, when he stopped a 14-year-old boy, and offered him a quarter, to distribute Nazi literature.

The boy's parents called the police, and they began an investigation that led to his arrest.

Roberts has lived in the Farmington area — both in the City and in the Township — since 1951, and claims to have

many friends here. In Farmington, and throughout the nation, he feels more and more people are "unwittingly" becoming Nazis. What does he think of the Farmington community? "I don't know of a better one."

He says he does not hate Catholics or Protestants; though he says he is like his idol Hitler

—"an agnostic." He was born in St. Clair Shores, Mich., and grew up in

Saginaw. He was a fairly successful professional prize fighter.

Insufficient funds forced him to drop out of Carnegie Tech, after two years.

### Evans Gets U.S. Approval Of Device

The Transportation Equipment Division of Evans Products Company in Plymouth, has announced that its DF device has been approved by the Bureau of Explosives, American Association of Railroads, for TOFC and COFC shipments.

The Bureau's approval states that "Evans Products Company, 'DF' belt rail and crossmember method for securing of lading within both van type trailers and van containers is approved by the Bureau of Explosives for TOFC and COFC transportation of explosives, ammunition, and other dangerous articles."

Evans Truck DF device has also been approved by the U. S. Navy for shipment of ammunition and explosives, it was announced by the company.

Evans Truck DF equipment consists of a series of belt rails affixed to each side of a truck trailer, plus a number of movable crossmembers which lock into the belt rails, bracing the lading to prevent it from shifting and from damage.

Use of the device is not confined to ammunition shipments; it has been installed on more than 4,000 vehicles in 90 different fleets for use in restraining lading of all kinds. The crossmembers, in addition to serving a bracing function, permit double decking which, in many cases doubles the payload.

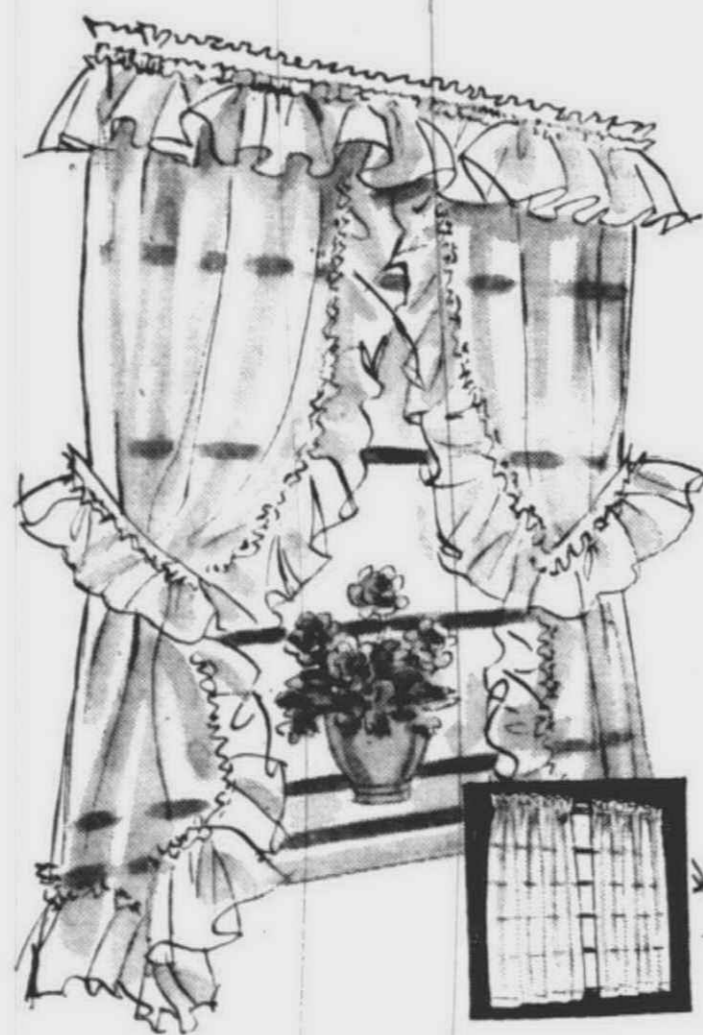

years of age, and admitted to the practice of law in the State of Michigan.  
"Michigan Statutes annotated 5.2116 recite that no provision of any City Charter may conflict with the state law in this area.  
"Prior to filing, I contacted the Attorney General's Office in Lansing and also discussed the matter with two other Municipal Judges. There is no doubt whatsoever that I satisfy all the legal requirements for this office.  
"I have advised both Mr.

Cutler and Mr. Manwaring, my opponents, of this and to their credit as lawyers, they are not the ones who have raised this issue. In addition the affidavit of qualifications filed with the City Clerk eliminated the five-year requirement.  
"Subsequent to filing my affidavit, I was certified as a valid candidate.  
"It certainly is edifying that once the matter was raised, the Observer brought the matter to my attention immediately so that it could be clarified. A conscientious press, seeking out the facts,

always prevails against the town gossip. Again thank you."  
The matter was brought to the attention of the City Commission in a committee of the whole meeting Monday night when the communication was read.  
Although not actually involved, the Commission decided to request the Attorney General's office for an opinion which may not arrive until after the primary.

Cutler, who served eight years as Municipal Judge during the period of 1941-1949, has a lengthy career in public service for the city. He served two two-year terms on the City Commission, eight years on the municipal bench and was assistant City Attorney during the period of 1952-1955.

He has resided in Plymouth 32 years, 18 in the same dwelling on N. Main. He received his grade school education in Detroit, was graduated from Plymouth High School, attended Heidelberg College in Tiffin, O. for a year and then received his law degree from the Detroit College of Law.

Dakota State, Harvard and the University of Michigan where he received a Bachelor's degree. He then transferred to University of Detroit Law School, after serving five years as an Ordnance Officer in the Air Force during World War II, and received his law degree there in 1949.

Manwaring is making his third bid for the Municipal Judgeship. He lost out to Andrew Perlongo in 1954 and 1959.

He and his wife, Dorthea, are the parents of two children: Amicia in Montgomery, Alabama, and Captain Oliver Manwaring, who is taking special training at the Maxwell Air Force Base in Alabama.

also very much aware of the importance of education to our society, and especially for the youth of our community.  
"Also, we are very much aware of the need to continue the high educational standards and program of the community if it is to continue to grow and prosper."  
Smith pointed out that the school board was actually operating under a deficit finance program this year and that the requirements for next school year would be at least 20 additional teachers to take care of the enrollment increase, program enrichment and the additional monies for the normal salary increase.

In its recommendations for facility requirements, the committee told the Board its review indicates the program under the present five-year 1965-69 building and site sinking fund will be adequate if accomplished in the next two years as planned.

It recommended that borrowing capability should be in addition to building funds needed.

"In view of the significant increases in enrollment experienced in 1964 and projected for future years, the Committee recommended to the Board that:

1—Establish a Citizen's Facility Study Committee to examine in more detail the future needs of the district and develop recommendations covering at least the next five-year period.

2—Develop a program for timely acquisition of sites for future schools especially a site for a second high school. This site acquisition should be accomplished within the present building and site fund, if possible."

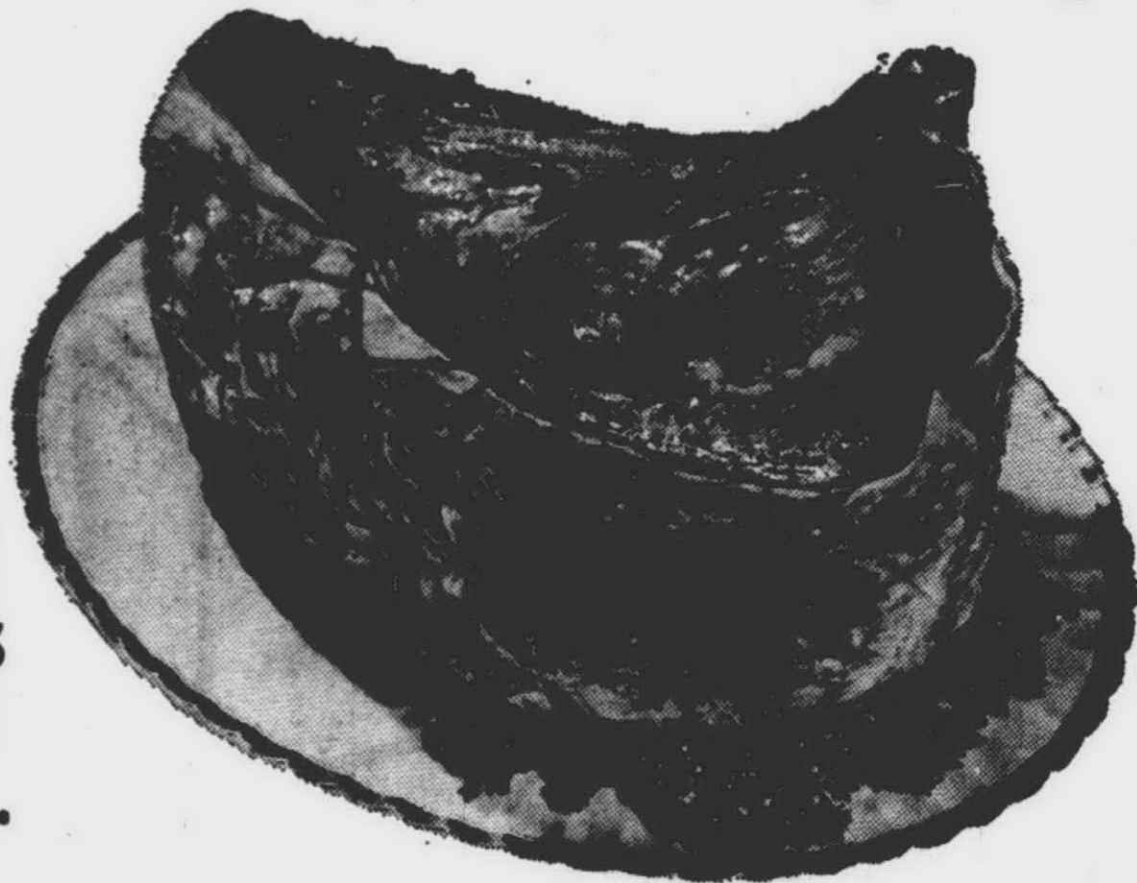

Whenever an off-year election rolls around and we wrack our brains to inspire people to get out and vote, I always wish I could have acquainted everyone with my two grandmothers.

One came to America as a German bride and said she would rather scrub floors in America than go back to Germany. She wanted to stay here where she felt she had a voice (even though it was sometimes broken English). A study in contrasts was the other. She was a D.A.R. who said that because her forefather had taken great risks to sign his name to the Declaration of Independence, she felt she could not do less than keep herself well-informed and vote. Both did until they passed away—and so inspired their children and children's children.

So you are not impressed with my grandmothers? Let's try it from a different angle.

Your neighbor, for instance, likes a single-breasted suit, you like a double; he paints his garage door blue, yours is white; he drives a Buick, you a Ford; he has a television in every bedroom in his house and you banned it from yours—now you're going to let HIM pick out who you want to represent you in making laws? If you don't go and cast your own ballot that's what you will do.

As never before there will be many meaningful changes in laws governing you. At least have the satisfaction of selecting the candidate of your choice and vote Monday, Feb. 15 for the office of State Senator for the 14th District.

"Eternal Vigilance is the price of liberty" is the motto of the Civic Searchlight, a non-partisan organization. I concur with that and also with their recommendations. They give a PREFERRED and well qualified to the Republican Farrell E. Roberts. They rate all three Democrats well qualified, John H. Burke, Elsie Gilmore, and Edward H. McNamara.

Also on the ballot for the citizens of the City of Plymouth will be the task of narrowing a field of three to two for Municipal Judge. Deported by this newspaper is the out-dated slur campaign against one of the favorites, Edward Draugelis, now City Attorney.

In an attempt to discredit Mr. Draugelis, an unsigned letter was sent to the City Clerk doubting Draugelis' eligibility based on his residence of less than five years. True, this was in the Plymouth City Charter, but the State Legislature ruled out any such provision in 1954.

False rumors are often spread against a good candidate who cannot be knocked out of a running by his opponents any other way. Apparently Mr. Draugelis is such a threat. Someone against him knew he couldn't be beaten on issues or qualifications.

By observation I can tell this unsigned letter writer if he is ever found out he will be ostracized because the public takes a dim view on this type of campaigning. The last election proved this to be true.

On the ballot in Farmington Township voters will have to wrest with their conscience. The issue is pay-raises.

Our late publisher Paul Chandler said "Public office must be where the pay is enough to make a man hold his head up and not stick his palm out."

"This newspaper is dedicated to upgrading public office, taking the adjective 'dirty' away from 'politician'—making it a goal, something young people will study for, and aspire to. We want high calibre people, even as you would if you were a stockholder, to run your corporation. In order to draw this type of man or woman we must compensate him adequately.

Farmington Township is a growing, progressive town. Our investment in its future will be better protected if we upgrade the salaries of our officials—thereby attracting and keeping competent and professional people.

**Help Our Libraries Grow**

Two suburbs in The Observer's circulation area today share a common source of strong community pride. The public libraries in Redford Township and Livonia are well equipped, are staffed with competent personnel, and—most important—are the most widely-used libraries in all of Wayne County.

Today, these libraries have something else in common. Both are ready for expansion. With the help of federal grants under a new library construction program, up to one-third of the cost of new facilities will be borne by the national government.

In Redford Township, the possibility for increased facilities has taken the shape of a proposal by the Library Commission for a \$60,000 addition to the present library building.

In Livonia, plans are more concrete—a new south branch on Plymouth Rd. has been approved and is on the drawing boards. But—there's a rub or two.

In Redford, it lies in the difficulty the Library Commission is having in getting the local community's share of the cost—some \$40,000.

In Livonia, it lies in the problem of getting permission to spend a small additional amount of money, an estimated \$67,000, to construct a proposed 300-seat lecture theater as part of the new library.

In both cases, the legislative bodies of the community have up to now decided to hold a tight rein on expenditures for the projects.

The proposals have thus been stalled. The Livonia lecture theater will come before the City Council again tonight. For the third

time, Commission members will try to convince Councilmen that the extra \$67,000 for the lecture hall is a wise expenditure.

Many community groups and scores of individuals have expressed their interest in productively using such a lecture facility. The Livonia-Redford Theater Guild, the Parks and Recreation Department and others have all put their stamp of approval on it. It will cost taxpayers a few cents more a year to pay off the small addition in bonds—but the creative programs it will help stimulate for children and adults will be well worth this small financial sacrifice.

All that remains for the Council is to earmark the piece of land adjacent to the library site—a piece of land which was a gift to the city—for the lecture hall.

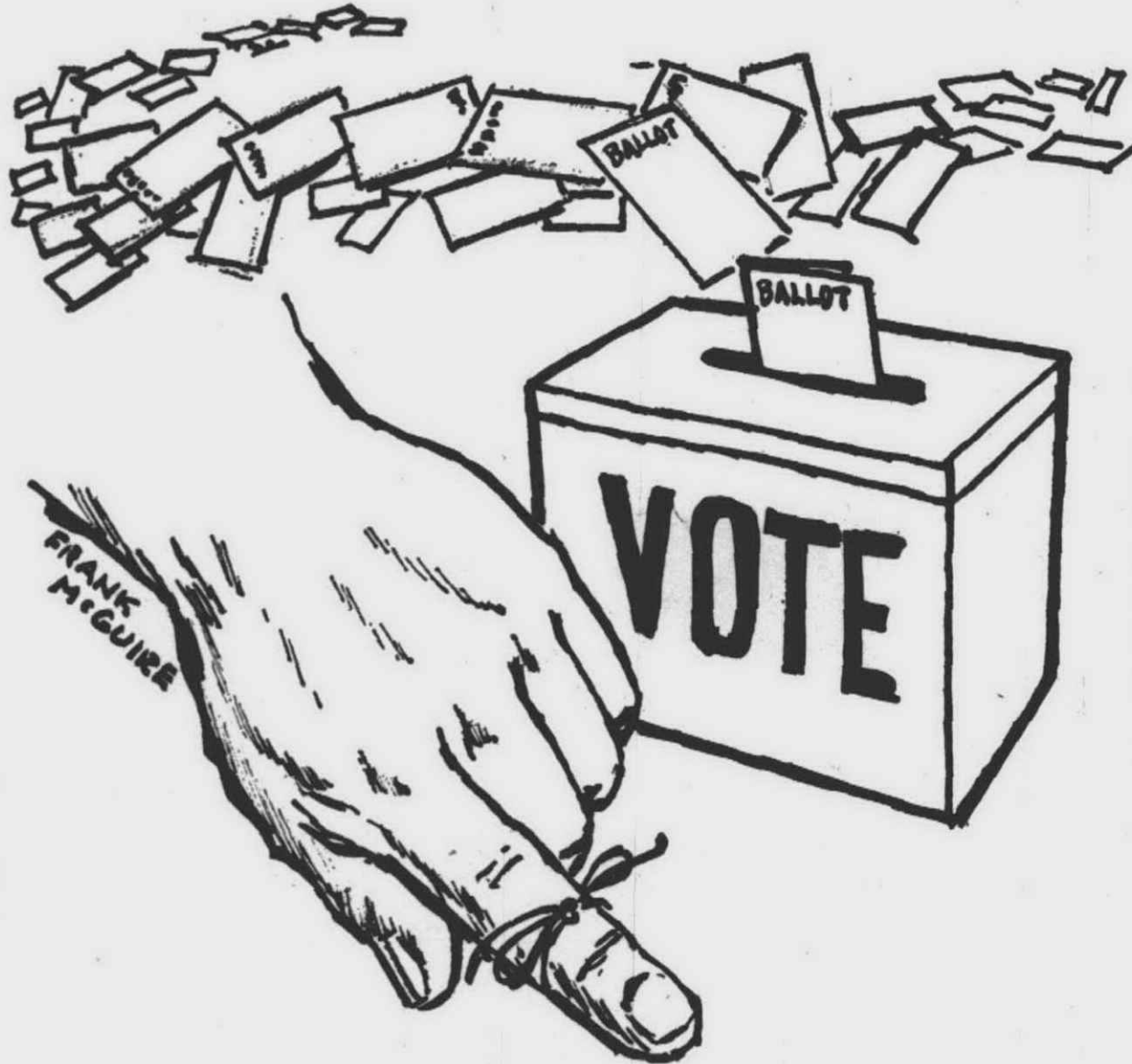
We hope to see a broad representation of citizens at tonight's Council meeting to convince the city's lawmakers that there is an active interest in this facility.

In Redford, meanwhile, the Township Board has assigned its attorney to draw up a ballot proposal to raise \$40,000 through a small millage hike.

It seems ridiculous to have to go to the voters for this small amount, when with a little shaving and scrimping in the current budget and next year's budget, the Township Board could easily earmark the \$40,000 from already-voted funds.

This has already been urged by the Library Commission and, in our opinion, is the proper course for the Board to follow.

**Merge Redford Schools**

Editor:

I was very happy to see that the proposal to "consolidate the school districts" headed the list in your article entitled "What's in Township's Future?" by Dave Elsila. I have lived in Redford for eight years and that is exactly how long I have been trying to get a logical, reasonable and morally sound answer to the question—"Why three separate school districts?" I believe I heard them all—except the truth of the matter which is very simple. There are people in both Redford Union and South Redford school districts who believe, (either thru ignorance, or deceit spawned by people in the school administration) that their own particular school district is better than the others and therefore they do not want to consolidate. To consolidate would mean saving many thousands of tax dollars. We would have ONE School Administration, one clerical staff, one etc., etc., whereas now we have three of each (Clarenceville included). Buses alone would represent a big saving of the tax dollar in that more youngsters could walk to schools within reasonable distance rather than be bused to schools a greater distance from their homes simply because they live closer to one school district border or another. Through ONE efficient school administration we could attain a caliber of schools that could provide our youngsters with the best primary and secondary education available—schools we could be proud of.

Another important consideration is that in consolidating the districts we would all bear the burden of our school tax equally—and this is where our residents fall down morally. I have been told by residents of South Redford that since most of the industry is in the South end and they must "put up" with its physical hardships, they are entitled to lower taxes. No one has as yet been able to define just what these physical hardships are. This type of thinking is but another expression of the moral decay and civic malignancy ("me first") that is spreading throughout our country and will gradually stifle our greatness. How foolish we must appear to outsiders when next door neighbors, living in identical houses, have a property tax difference of over \$150.00 simply because one house is in South Redford and the other in Redford Union school district.

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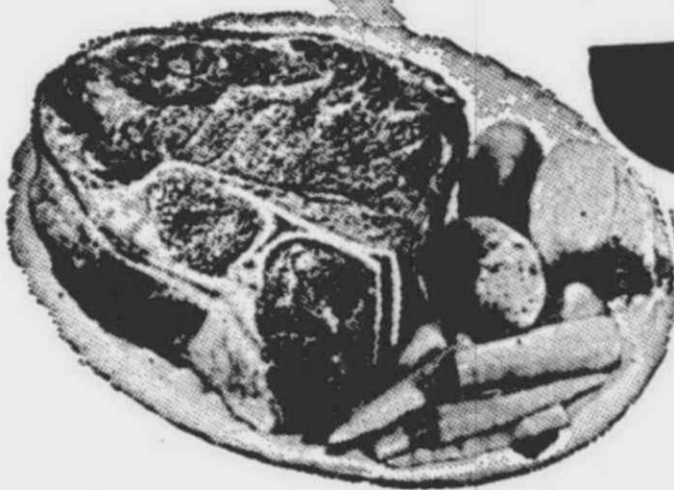
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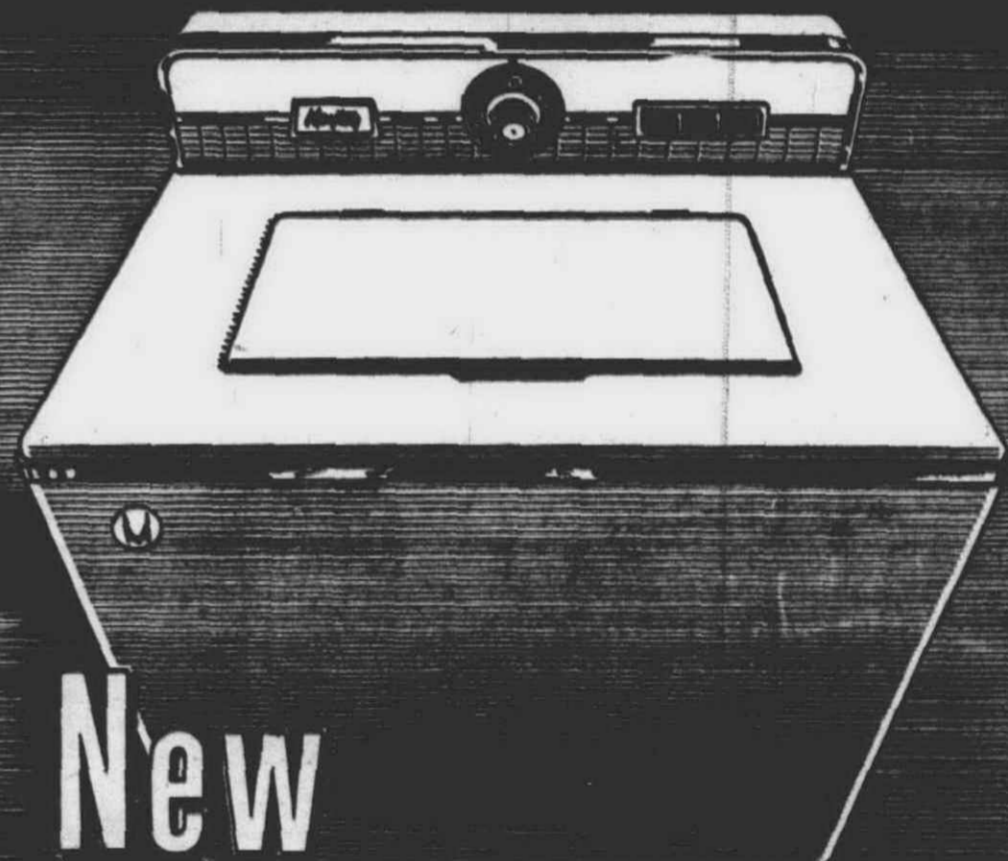
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# Sorrows Ousted in Parish Cage Tourney

This meant that at the intermission, Sorrows led, 31-29.

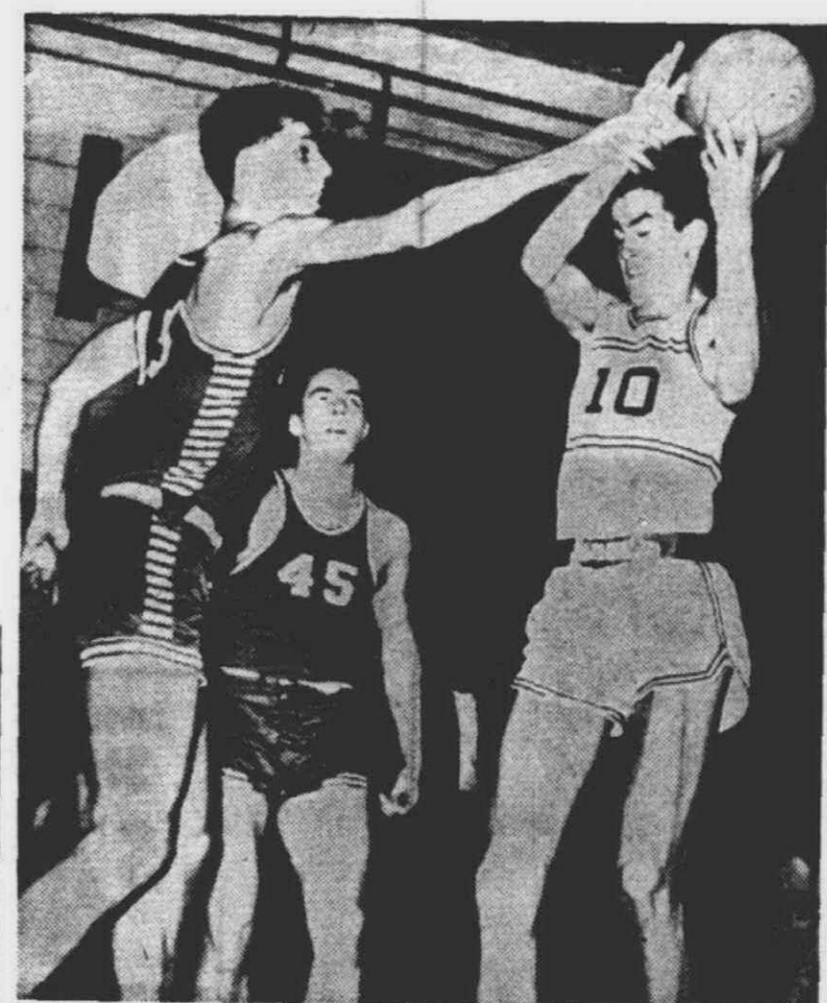

Baskets by Bill Oldershaw and Rick Lorenz cut the differential to one point and paved the way for McDonald to emerge as the evening's biggest hero.

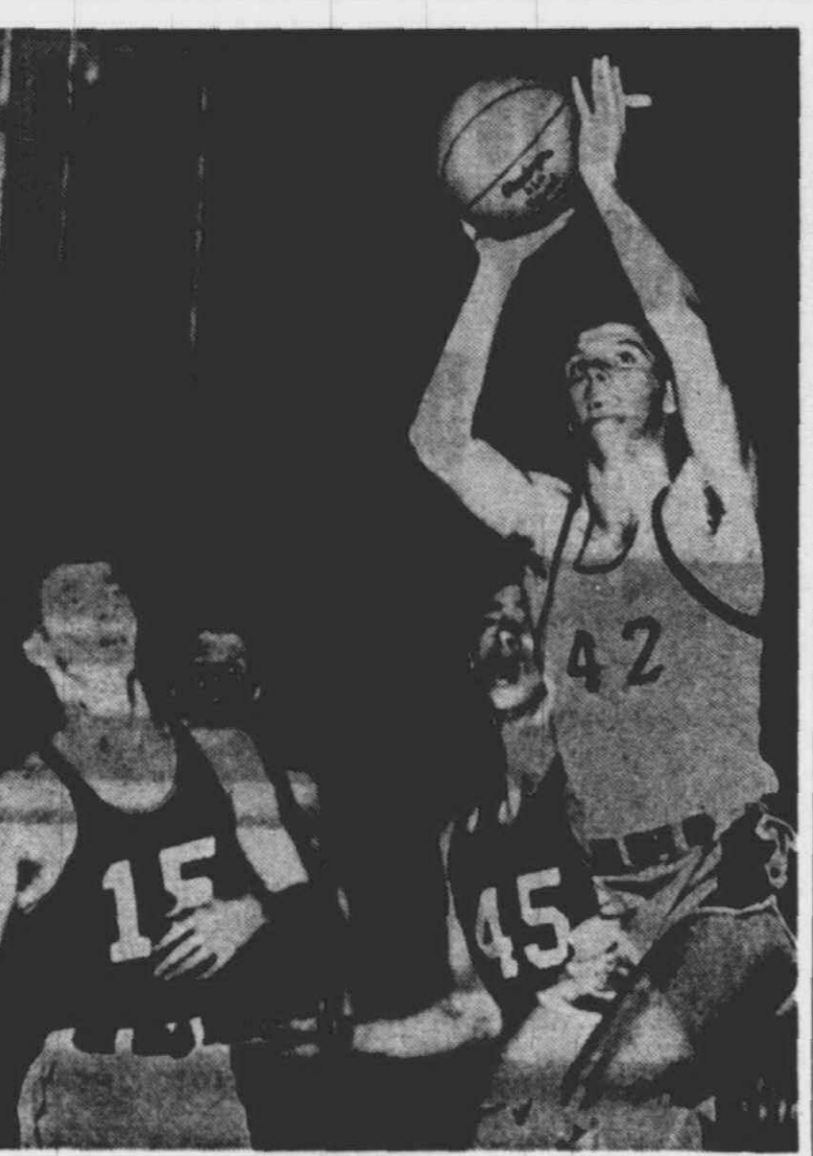
Schultz led the winners with 21 points.

All of which makes the following phone call very appropriate this time.

The caller identified himself and asked if we remembered him.

We did.

"Please keep my name out of this if you say anything," he declared.

We agreed.

"You, Mr. Maskin, have written a lot about how Livonia and other neighboring communities go in so much for little league baseball, yet do almost nothing to help the boys who range in ages from 16-19.

"Well, put yourself in my shoes.

"I and a few others would like to do what you say. We, too, agree that it's far more important to help the boys who are in high school, or just out.

"How are you going to accomplish it?"

THERE WAS a slight pause. Our friend continued.

"Now is the time we should be thinking about a summer baseball program," the caller continued. "You can't wait until March or April.

"But, where can we get help? We try the schools and want to talk to some of the kids... in hopes of being able to sign them up for summer play.

"We're told this is against the rules. What rules? In Detroit, the sandlot managers get to the schoolboys during the winter and sign them... for play, of course, on amateur teams.

"That's just one headache we have. The recreation department (in Livonia) doesn't seem to want to do much for the older boys.

"Then there are the so-called sponsors. You drop in on a merchant or somebody who might have some money to foot the bills... and he tells you:

"Why should I kick out two or three hundred bucks? If I put up \$35 or \$40, I can be a big-shot sponsor of a Little League team."

AS YOU CAN SEE, the caller (a Livonian, incidentally) was hardly in a happy mood.

"We have more problems," the gent added. "The few of us who want to work with the older boys need additional fathers. But, we call meetings and nothing happens. The response is terrible.

"And, finally, Mr. Maskin, there is the attitude of the boys themselves. Time was when hundreds of teenagers wanted to spend the summer playing baseball.

"Now there are too many diversions. They'd rather drive around in an old car with a couple of gals in the front seat.

"Television has hurt. So have drive-in movies.

"Guys like me who want to do something are stymied every time we make a move. Maybe, Mr. Maskin, you can assist us."

ASSIST IS SOMETHING we'd like to do. But, unfortunately, all we can do is to rap away at a typewriter. We have spoken our piece on kids baseball. More than once we have been slapped down.

Some folks have told us why should we care about baseball, when our principal job is with the Detroit Pistons basketball club.

The sport doesn't make any difference.

It's the youngsters we feel count the most. One must experience an unhappy situation, which perhaps stemmed in part from the denial of an opportunity for a teen-ager to engage in sports, before he can attack the present teenage athletic crisis and try to remedy matters.

We know all about television and autos. We have a 17-year-old son, too.

But we also have a 14-year-old who cries for the chance to engage in sports and fortunately there are some who create a place for this boy. It could be the chance to play now may keep him actively engaged in sports when he's 17 or 18.

We hope so... and we also hope that there'll be a team around to accommodate this boy.

It's my thought if we're to have more and better teen-age baseball in Livonia... in Farmington... in Redford Township... in Plymouth... the recreation departments will have to take the original initiative.

If these tax-supported bodies can put forth the necessary dollars, we're certain men, who currently are harassed because of the battle to gain funds, will come forth in greater numbers to help run the teams.

Certainly, the area is jammed with coaches and

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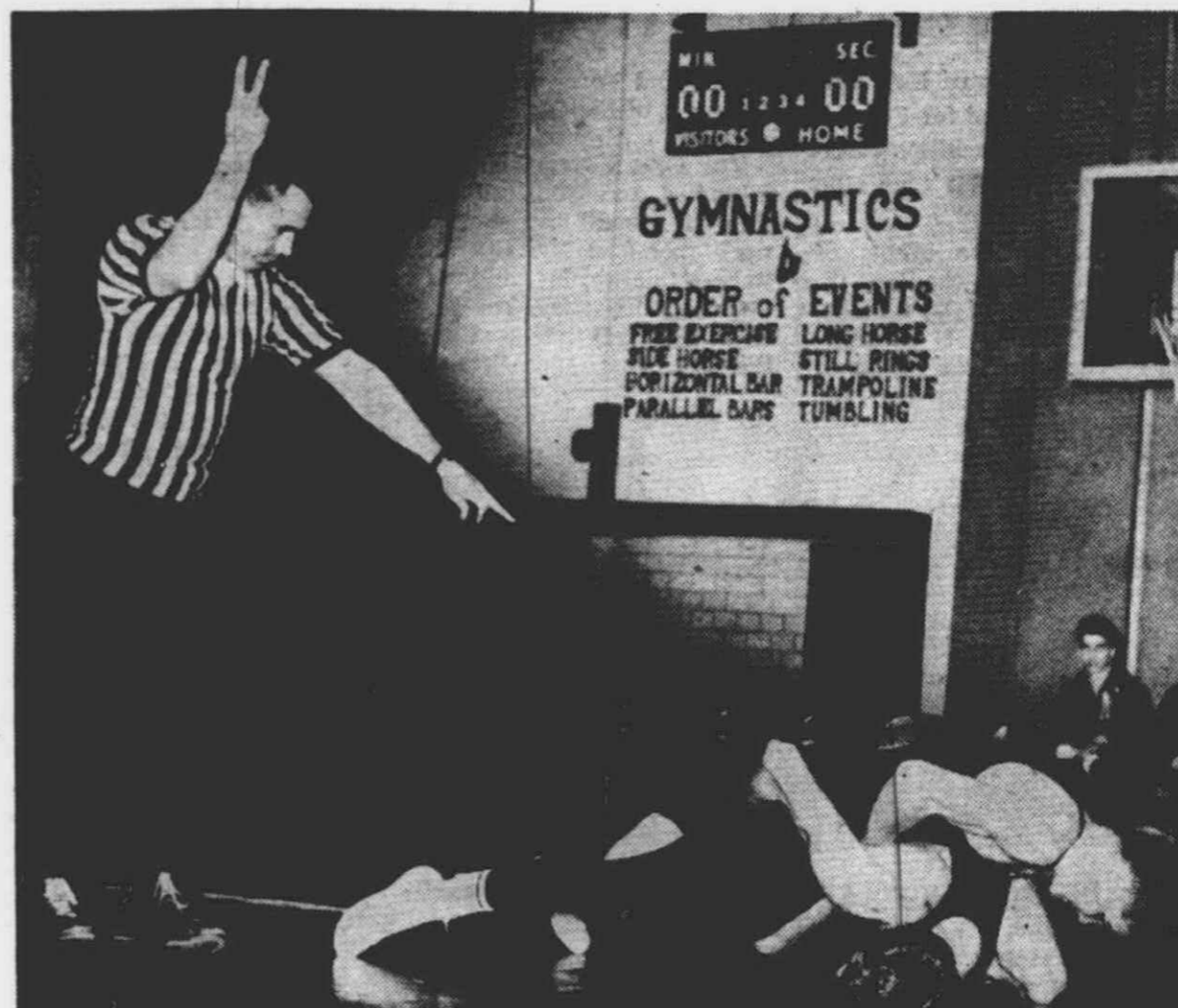

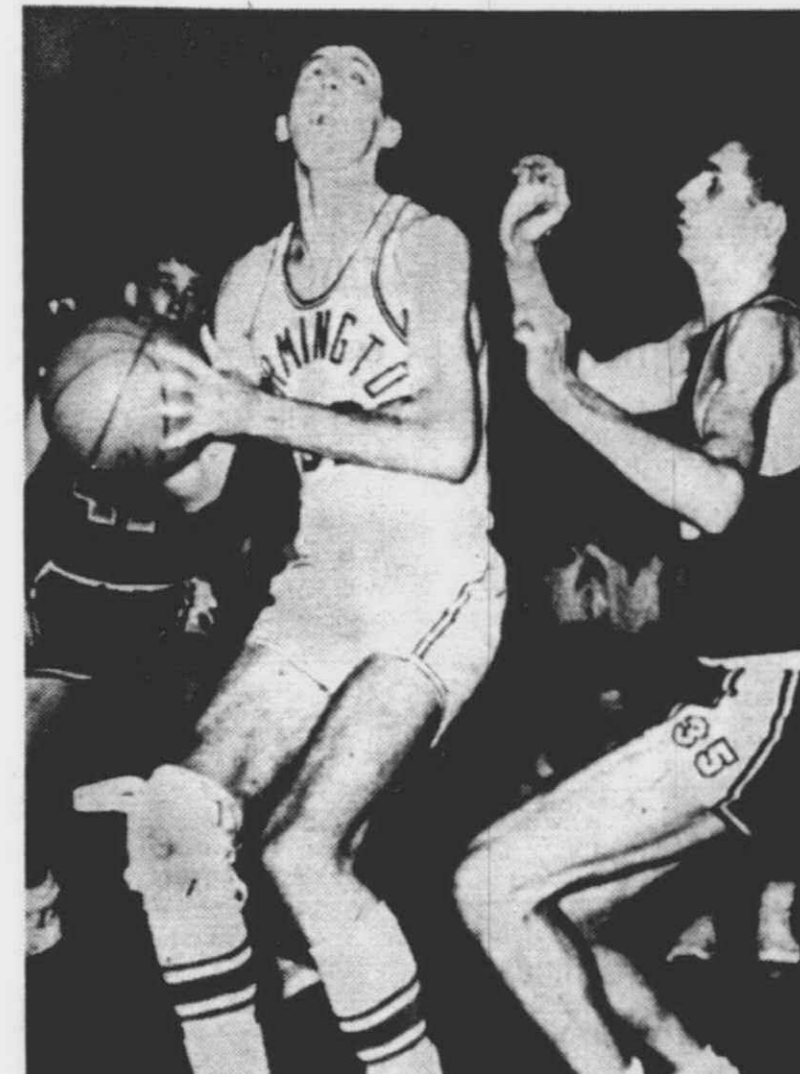

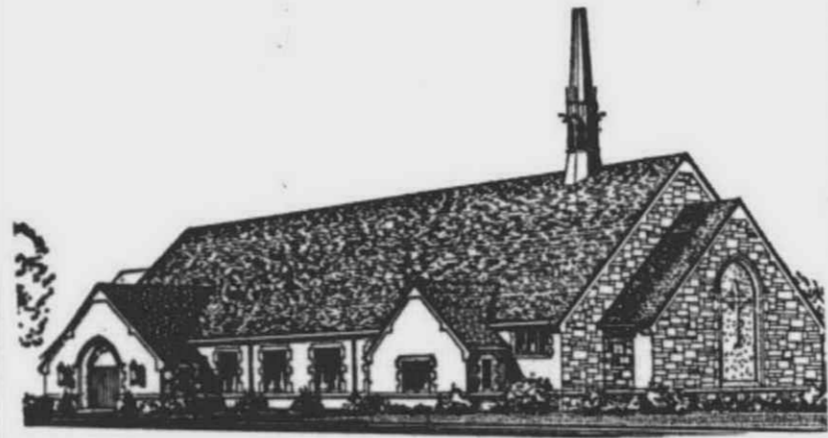

## St. Paul's Presbyterian To Construct Sanctuary

St. Paul Presbyterian Church in Livonia has announced plans to build a new sanctuary seating 700. The plans were approved at the annual meeting of the congregation held late in January.

"The ever-increasing growth of the congregation has made such an addition necessary," said the Rev. W. F. Whittledge, minister of the church.

This new building will be the third built within the church complex constructed during the last 15 years.

Growth and progress have continued at St. Paul's since it began as a Mission Church in 1951. At the end of the first seven years, church membership stood at 860. In the past seven years, membership has jumped to more than 1,900.

The new sanctuary, which will match the architectural style of the present chapel, will cost approximately \$400,000. Construction is scheduled to start this spring with completion in the spring of 1966.

# Warm Comfort of Country Look Recaptures U.S. Homeowner

The country look is back, and America loves it. Homes are being built and remodeled on this new-old theme which combines country comfort with city sophistication. Pattern, color and natural materials are the three principal ingredients in the country look. Pattern is increased to allow its use in delightful fabrics, wallpapers and rugs, and there's much of interest on today's market.

Some of the patterns are new, some are reproductions of older patterns unavailable for many years, and some of the most exciting creations are adaptations of patterns taken from china, embroideries, and the like. In colors, the range favors earth tones and sunset shades but also includes clear pastels, which have been out of the

running in recent years. The house with the country look usually features area rugs set against burnished wood floors in living areas and bedrooms. For entrance halls and kitchens, the flooring may be quarry tile or brick rather than sleek vinyls. Brick and tile also may be found on some countertops in the kitchen, as backsplashes in bath and kitchen, or as an accent wall.

Wood walls are an essential in the home with the country air. For paneling, wide planks are specified and, again, additional pattern is seen. Knotty grades of ponderosa pine and sugar pine are popular. Boards of flat grain western hemlock and Douglas fir also qualify for the warm, friendly country look.

Clear finishes that capture the wood's true coloring remain the most popular, especially when lacquers and plastic varnishes that impart a hand-rubbed look are used. In dens and family rooms, when the earth colors show to special advantage, lumber paneling may be finished with stain to darken natural coloring to nutmeg or butternut. Furniture is likely to be disparate, with no attempt made to match an entire suite of one styling and a single manufacturer.

Victorian marble topped commodes may combine with Italian tables, Spanish chests, Danish chairs, and American Federal pieces to give that delightful feeling of family, heritage and comfort that is the very watchword of the country look.

## Scratched Wall?

Scratched your wood paneling? It can happen, but don't despair. Just use a dab of furniture polish stain applied with a bit of soft rag. Choose the blond polish for light colored woods like hemlock and pine, the dark polish for western red cedar. Rub the polish stain in, then immediately wipe off. Repeat until color is matched.

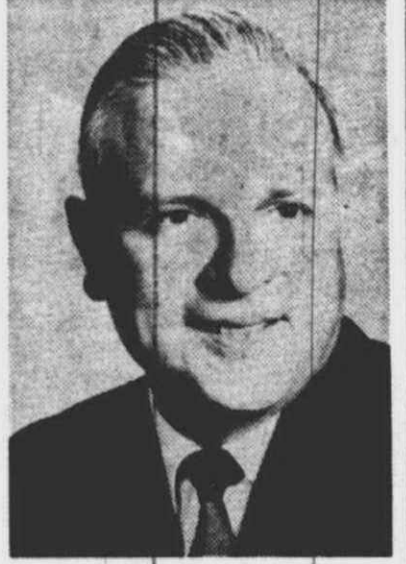

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## WSU 'Shrew' Is Enjoyable Evening

Motorcycles, modern dress, wigs, costumes, and sprightly acting all combine to produce an enjoyable evening of theatre in the Wayne State Classic Theatre's production of "The Taming of the Shrew."

Two things detract from the production, however. The first is length. Two and a half hours is too long for a production of the Shrew. Granted that some of the Bard's work takes that long to do effectively, but this robust comedy is not one of them.

The other is associated with one of the greatest strengths of the production. Director Leonard Leone has effectively staged the "play within a play." This is done by the mixture of modern dress and costumes—and even in the slight updating of the terms during the prologue concerning the "humor" of the lord and Christopher Sly.

The only problem is that it is not carried through at the end of the production. Granted Shakespeare either did not write a formal ending or the text has been lost, but many

endings have been added throughout the years.

Sly must be bought back to the harsh realities of his life to truly present a "play within a play." Unfortunately patrons of the Classic Theatre are not provided with this finishing touch.

The leads, Philip Wilkie-meyer and Marjorie Jean Lerstrom, turn in entirely credible and satisfying performances. Excellent supporting roles are provided by Marshall E. Borden, Philip John Spensley and Fred Cahall.

John Criner, Philip Davidson and Norma Simpson should also be commended for their efforts.

As in all of Shakespeare every role is important to the story line and pacing. The entire cast worked professionally and well together.

This plus the minimum of scenery and the use of the aisles and ramps—thus promoting a kind of "theatre in the round" atmosphere combine to make the evening more than worthwhile. This production should be on the list of "things to see" not only for theatre lovers, but students of Shakespeare as well.

The John Baileys of Farmington journeyed to Cleveland with Shirley and Clifford Johnson last week to attend the mid-winter meeting of the Coast Guard Auxiliary.

While talking to Shirley we began to realize the scope of the work done by the Auxiliary and the dedication with which its members work.

Over 50 men from this area, all boating enthusiasts, made the trip to Cleveland to participate in what amounts to a seminar in boating safety. Designed to stimulate their interest in promoting water safety and to stress the importance of the work they accomplish, the conference returned its members to their homes to conduct safe boating classes, to inspect privately owned boats for safe-boating equipment, and in general to do whatever each might do to keep our Water Wonderland free from tragic, unnecessary, accidents.

Cliff Johnson's flotilla is offering a 10-week course in boating safety at Bentley High School. It will begin this month and be open to adults and to families—kids keep adults in line.

We also learned that upon request auxiliary members will be happy to inspect anyone's boat for safety equipment. If a boat meets the requirements of the C.G.A. its owner receives a decal to put on his boat indicating it has passed inspection.

The Coast Guard Auxiliary was initiated just prior to World War II. Its purpose then was to create a civilian volunteer group to handle local inspections and thus relieve many Coast Guardsmen for active duty elsewhere. The Auxiliary performed its job so well during the war that they continue to work now in close association with the Coast Guard. Its members are all civilians, all volunteers and all devoted to their task.
