## Rotarians Serve 11,400 on Final Day

# 1965 Fall Festival Best in History

Weary workers of Plymouth civic and service clubs Monday were relaxing for the first time in months as the curtain went down on the most successful Fall Festival in history.

More than the predicted 50,000 poured into the city during the four days with the climax coming Sunday when Rotarians served 11,400 chicken dinners to the more than 25,000 persons who milled around Kellogg Park from early morning until late evening.

Despite threatening weather on Thursday and Friday, the Festival was the greatest ever from the

moment the first customer downed a knackwurst and sauerkraut dinner served by the Business and Professional Women's Club Thursday, to the time the final chicken was devoured Sunday night.

The BPW served more than 1,500, running out of knackwurst and kraut in the early evening and then serving additional hundreds ice cream and cake.

The Lions enjoyed their most successful ice cream social with more than 1,600 moving through the lines until the ice cream, cake and melons vanished.

The Kiwanis Club had its best pancake festival on record, taking care of 2,224 during the 12-hour period. It was 400 more than a year ago.

The Kiwanians served 10,500 pancakes using 100 gallons of milk, 650 pounds of sausage, 405 pounds of flour, 90 pounds of butter, 25 quarts of cream, 28 pounds of sugar and 60 pounds of coffee while wearing out the 90 Kiwanians who worked during the day.

The Junior Chamber of Commerce served 300 rib dinners Saturday night, running out of food well in

advance of the demand.

The story was even more remarkable Sunday when the Rotary Club, which started the Festival eight years ago as a Chicken Bar-B-Que, took care of 11,400 dinners — this compared to the 10,900 of a year ago and made the affair the largest in Michigan.

For that matter, it probably is one of the largest single day events of its type in the United States. It brought thousands into the community during

## School Board Problems Mount; Parents Rap Transportation

The Plymouth Board of Education wrestled with one of its most puzzling problems in some time Monday and still doesn't have answers.

The problem was presented by a group of parents in the Farrand School district who have youngsters in grades three through five that walk to school this year after being transported by bus a year ago.

sters in areas of hazardous traffic," he said, "Why can't Plymouth?"

The Board's policy is to transport all students in grades kindergarten through six who live one mile or more from the school. Exceptions will be granted in grades kindergarten through two for students who are exposed to exceptional traffic hazards and who live less than a mile from the school.

The pupils involved in the controversy are in grades three through five which are not covered in the traffic hazard exceptions.

It was this point that brought the matter to the Board—the parents in the areas feel the policy should be changed to take care of this particular group.

"We have similar problems and complaints from other areas," explained President Gerald Fischer. "And we would like to be able to make whatever changes are necessary but it would mean adding additional busses and drivers and we

The change came about when an easement was installed directly behind Farrand School, opening that area to entrance to the school.

School officials, who carefully measure the distances prior to the start of each school year, found the easement automatically eliminated youngsters in that area west of Schoolcraft road and north of Five Mile from bus transportation.

And that's when the irate parents decided it was time to appear before the Board and seek a change back to the practice of a year ago.

With Robert Tripp as spokesman, the group which included 12 parents, presented petitions with the names of more than 150 residents of the area involved asking for either a change in the Board's policies or a change back to the previous practices.

The result was a lengthy discussion of more than two hours as the harassed Board members tried to work out a solution that would take care of the complaints and also cover all areas in the school district with similar problems.

"We feel conditions at Five Mile and on Schoolcraft warrant the Board making a change and transporting these youngsters," said Tripp.

"These roads have been termed by the Road Patrol and the AAA as ones of high traffic and high accidents. We believe it is better for the Board to act now than to have one of our children struck by a car.

"We feel this is an area of traffic hazards and we don't want our youngsters exposed to them. There aren't any sidewalks along Schoolcraft, the youngsters either have to walk alongside of the highway or on the edge of the high drainage ditches on either side of the road.

"If there were sidewalks, we wouldn't have objections, although we feel our youngsters should have transportation now just as they had a year ago at this same time.

"We have checked with Township Supervisor John McEwen and he indicated he'll do everything possible to have sidewalks installed as soon as possible. However, this takes time and we don't want our youngsters risking their lives regardless of time."

Tripp pointed out that busses going by the areas involved are half-empty and asked the Board to consider having them filled until such time that a decision is made.

## URA Plan Poses Pain To Council

Plymouth's City Commissioners face a big selling job if they hope to get the proposed second Urban Renewal project off the ground.

This became apparent in last week's meeting when a delegation of residents in the Wing, Deer, Maple and S. Main area—which is the site of the new project—presented petitions signed by 51 residents from 31 homes objecting to the proposal.

The petitions read "We the undersigned residents of Plymouth from the southeast section of the central area of the city protest any Urban Renewal plans for that area."

Part of the reason for having a URA project is to rid an area of substandard dwellings and buildings and the residents feel their homes are anything but substandard.

Earlier Mayor James Houk, who wasn't present when the petitions were presented due to a meeting with the Kiwanis Club, had indicated the Commission was studying the area due to the large number of non-conforming buildings in that district.

There wasn't any mention of substandard dwellings although this is more or less implied by the mere mention of Urban Renewal.

Apparently the residents quickly took up the challenge to their homes and indicated their displeasure that the Commission was even thinking of such a project.

The matter is still in the earliest stages but the presentation of the petition is an indication that the Commission has a job ahead and plenty of headaches.

The Commission took official action to declare the open base-ments in the Symar subdivision a menace and a public nuisance and instructed City Manager

## APPOINT ART MULLIGAN Pick School Teacher As New Postmaster

John Arthur Mulligan, of 315 Burroughs, a teacher in the Plymouth School system for the past eight years, will become acting Postmaster of Plymouth within 30 days.

The way was cleared for Mulligan, long a leader in Democratic circles and in activities of the Plymouth Education Association, to accept the appointment when his resignation was accepted by the School Board Monday night.

Congressman Wes Vivian and Robert Dwyer, head of the Plymouth Democratic Party, jointly announced the appointment earlier but Mulligan had to get released from his contract to accept.

He replaces Dr. George Timpona who retired a year ago. Supt. James Grater had been serving as acting postmaster until the appointment was made.

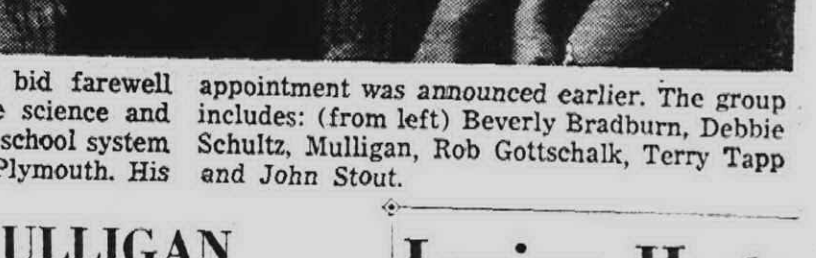
Mail work isn't anything new to Mulligan, who has worked as a part-time employee during the holidays for several years. There is a background of Postal service in his family also.

His mother was Assistant Postmaster at Central Islop, N.Y., a suburb of New York City, for 23 years and his grandmother was postmistress there for several years before that.

Mulligan has been a teacher of science and math at Junior High East for the past eight years and was president of the PEA for one term.

He plans to assume his new duties about October 14.

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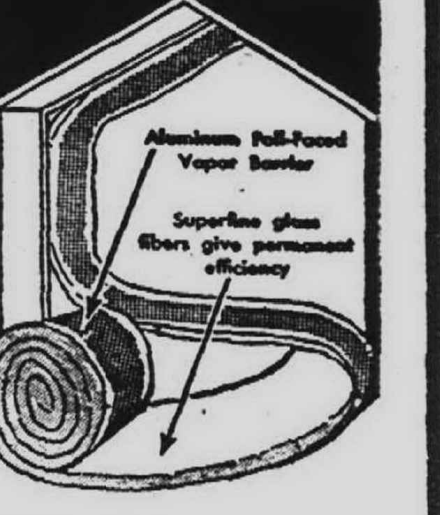
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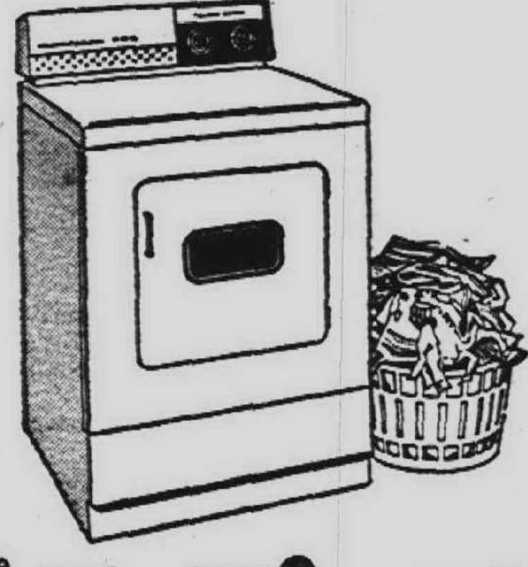
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# Eight Killed in Traffic Accidents in Area

Traffic took its heaviest toll in years with a total of eight deaths recorded in the area since early Thursday morning. The list included four in Livonia, one in Redford Township, and Canton Township and two in Nankin Township.

It was the most deaths of the year in Livonia in such a short period of time and boosted the 1965 total to eight dead in seven fatal accidents. This compares with 12 accidents and 13 killed during the same period a year ago.

However, the accidents continued to spiral at a record pace in Livonia with a total of 2,257 to date contrasted to 1,855 for the same number of days in 1964.

The death list included: **TIM REED**, 16, of 14224 Melvin, Livonia.

**NORBY JENKINS**, 17, of 18338 Huron River Drive, New Boston.

**MAURICE PEGRAM**, 31, of 1922 Benbow, Detroit.

**RICHARD ARBUS**, 25, of 12942 Glastonbury, Detroit.

**MRS. EDITH WARRICK**, 53, of 13510 Riverview, Redford Township.

**MARINO MAZZA**, 31, of 567 S. Waring, Detroit.

**JAMES WATERMAN**, 16, of 42750 Yost Road, Canton Township.

**PRESTON PEYTON**, 19, of Chicago.

Young Reed, a sophomore at Franklin High, was killed instantly Saturday afternoon when his motorcycle collided with a car driven by Mrs. Catherine Tune, 37, of 14820 Hubbard, Livonia, at the intersection of Schoolcraft and Hubbard.

Police reports show that Mrs. Tune, going south on Hubbard, started across Schoolcraft and Reed and was unable to avoid the collision.

He was rushed to St. Mary Hospital where he was pronounced dead on arrival.

George Bushaw, 17, of 19447 Mansfield, Detroit, who was riding on the motorcycle directly behind Tim, suffered serious injuries.

Tim was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Reed. Mrs. Reed is a teacher at Adams School in Livonia. Mr. Reed is a custodian at Roosevelt School.

The Jenkins youth died Sunday morning of injuries suffered in a spectacular accident Saturday night shortly before midnight in front of Livonia Fire Station No. 4 on Middlebelt Road near Plymouth.

Police are still investigating the cause.

First reports indicate that Jenkins was driving south on Middlebelt when his car, in some as yet unexplained manner, collided with that operated by Harold Hug, 23, of Mt. Clemens.

The Jenkins car spun to the right, skidded off the road, hit a utility pole, and flipped over a fence at the Ford plant.

Norby and his brother, Lenny, 21, were thrown clear of the convertible which landed on its top. Both were in critical condition when rushed to St. Mary Hospital and Norby succumbed to the injuries Sunday morning. Lenny is still in the hospital where his condition is now regarded as good.

Meanwhile, the Hug car swerved to the left into the oncoming northbound traffic and crashed head-on with a vehicle operated by Samuel Miller, 56, of 2289 LaSalle, Detroit.

Miller was taken to St. Mary Hospital with severe head and body injuries. Hug was released from the hospital after examination.

Lt. Robert Mitchell, head of the Livonia Police traffic bureau, indicated the investigation is continuing and that Hug will be questioned again along with Lenny Jenkins.

Corp. Richard Erickson, of the Traffic Bureau, who investigated the fatal crash, also is checking the statements of witnesses. Both Erickson and Mitchell hope to have a complete report before the end of the week.

Arbus and Pegram were victims of an unusual accident Thursday morning during a driving rain.

They were riding in a car driven by John Venney, 32, of 14885 Braile, Detroit, along with two others enroute to work at the Western Electric plant in Plymouth.

Police reports show that Venney was going towards Plymouth on Schoolcraft behind a slow car. He attempted to pull out to the right to pass on the two-lane highway but the car skidded, he lost control and it rammed a tree head-on.

Arbus, who was riding in the front seat, apparently was catapulted into the windshield and Pegram, in the center seat in the rear, was thrown forward with terrific force.

Both were pronounced dead on arrival at St. Mary Hospital. Venney is reported in serious condition in the hospital. The other passengers, Ronald Thompson, of 13224 Strathmoor, and Marvin McDonald, of 14153

Westwood, both of Detroit, were less seriously injured but also were taken to the hospital.

Edith Warrick, was killed by a car while crossing

Schoolcraft at Riverview. She was hit by a westbound vehicle driven by John J. Maloney, 17, of Inkster. Maloney was not held.

Mazza was pronounced dead on arrival at Wayne County General Hospital after he lost control of his car on Edward Hines Drive near Ann Arbor

Trail and collided head-on with a car driven by Clifford Bonnell, 35, of 3354 Cindy Road, Livonia. Bonnell was reported in serious condition in St. Mary Hospital.

The accident occurred Thursday morning during the driving rain that caused the accident on Schoolcraft.

Waterman was struck and killed by a car as he drove his bike at Van Born and Lilley Road.

Peyton died Saturday when a car, in which he was a passenger, went out of control on I-94 near Wayne Road in Nankin Township and rolled over, throwing him out, according to Sheriff's Road Patrol reports.

## Local GOP Leaders Meet at Mackinac

Many local Republican leaders were among the 750 that gathered at the Governor's Conference on Mackinac Island last weekend.

The purpose was to hear the report of the 287-man and woman Task Force reporting on their assignments

in establishing a platform on party principles, programs and goals, fiscal reform, urban and local problems, civil rights, crime and delinquency, senior citizens, health, mental health, education, social welfare, labor, job opportunities, agriculture, na-

tural resources and recreation, traffic safety, election laws, party organization.

Although moderates of the party appeared to be in charge under the leadership of Governor Romney there were discussions and challenges by the ultra-conservative members of the party on several issues.

Governor Romney stressed the need in Michigan of a State Income Tax, eliminating the many nuisance taxes now imposed.

He based his stand on projected figures. He also warned against waiting until an emergency existed before precautions were taken to keep the state out of the financial mess it was in when he came into office.

Immediately following the convention the Women's Federation of the fighting 15th District passed a resolution opposing any State Income tax based on a present surplus in the State Treasury.

Reflecting Governor Romney's influence outside his state were the three out-of-state guests who spoke at the Conference: General Lucius Clay, Finance Chairman Republican National Committee; Governor John H. Chafee from Rhode Island and Governor John Love, from Colorado.

Starting on that date, Channel 2 will commence showing, "Mediation: Catalyst to Collective Bargaining," a seven-part series of half-hour television films made recently by the Federal

Mediation and Conciliation Service in cooperation with Oregon State University.

The seventh and final sequence is scheduled for December 24.

The films portray a complete contract negotiation, involving a hypothetical union and company, starting with the preparation of respective positions prior to the beginning of negotiations.

The continuing process is then carried through a month of negotiations prior to expiration of the contract. When a deadlock is reached, a Federal Mediator joins the negotiations and, several meetings later, a final settlement is achieved.

There are no professional actors in these films. All characters are portrayed by Federal Mediators.

## Sgt. Paciorek Is Questioned By Piggins

Witnesses called last week to testify in the Wayne County ticket-fixing investigation included Sgt. Also implicated in the scandal is Paciorek's superior officer, Dan D. Martin, in charge of the road patrol, who was suspended at the same time as Paciorek by Wayne County Sheriff Peter L. Buback.

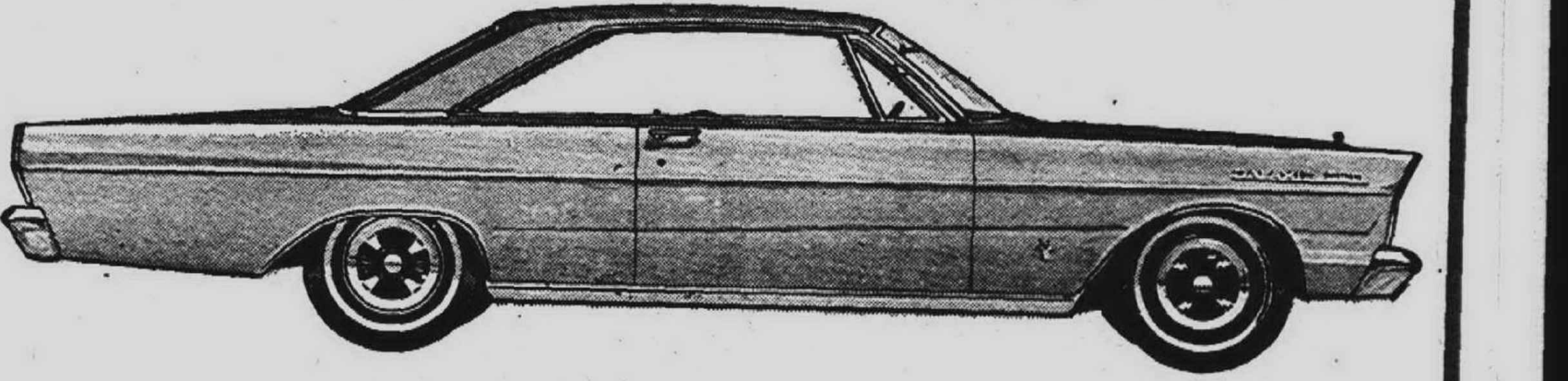

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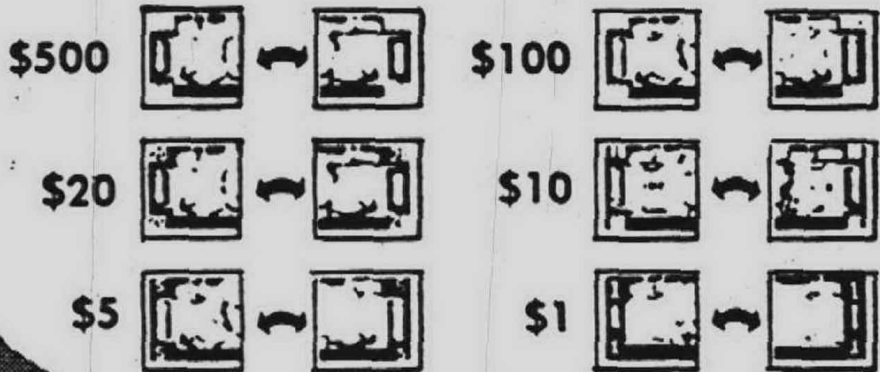

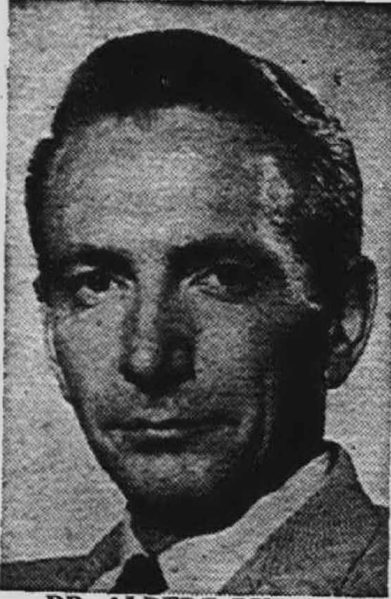

# U-M Professor Sights Student Draft Protests at Colleges

ANN ARBOR—Draft riots may disrupt the nation's college campuses unless Congress moves toward elimination of the draft before it adjourns this fall, a University of Michigan business economist declares.

Associate Professor Ross Wilhelm of the U-M Graduate School of Business Administration says, "The tempers of many college students are high enough over the vicious injustices built into the draft system that there is a potential for violence comparable to the Los Angeles riot on American campuses. The draft is foremost in the minds of most college students."

Wilhelm says left wing student groups are planning demonstrations, including civil disobedience, for this fall over Vietnam and the draft.

"While most students support our country's position in Vietnam, the latent anger over the slave labor aspects of the draft is so strong they probably will follow this left wing leadership," he declares.

The U-M professor believes that "the draft is just one way to get people to perform military duties" and that a better way is to "vastly increase the pay of the military and base it on volunteers who join because they want to." The draft is just a substitute for adequate pay, he says.

Wilhelm reports that the "Students for a Democratic Society," a left wing group, is planning a nationwide student strike over Vietnam during the first ten days of December.

During the strike students will leave their classrooms to stage sit-ins and protests at campus military and research installations. He says also that during October there will be student protests—with local acts of civil disobedience—at 30 to 40 campuses across the country.

"Actions such as these are as dangerous as smoking in an ammunition plant in view of student attitudes toward the draft," Wilhelm suggests.

He points out that student agitators are using the argument that draft-exempt college students have the moral duty to fight against "the coercion of youth into the war machine."

"My own observations lead me to believe that during the past few months almost any effective organizer could have put thousands of college students, on almost any campus, into the streets in a violent demonstration against the draft," Wilhelm says.

"Given a time when students are under pressure as with exams, little more would be needed than a group running through the dorms at night shouting, 'let's riot against the draft.' The students rallying to such a cry wouldn't know, nor care, if the ones at the head of the mob were carrying signs protesting Vietnam.

"We should recognize that the civil rights movement has trained thousands of students across the country in the techniques of mass demonstration. Also in recent years we have seen students demonstrate violently over issues of far less personal importance to them than the draft—Berkeley is an excellent example.

"Further, our country has a history of violent draft riots. Just about 100 years ago, during the Civil War, there were a number of draft riots across the country. In New York a mob took over the city for several days. These riots also took place during a time when there was widespread concern over civil rights and the status of Negroes."

The U-M business economist suggests a flat pay raise of \$300

month across the board for the military, which would give its members a decent wage and

keep them in service. He says such a program would cost about \$9 billion a year which

could be obtained by cutting down on some less important government activities.

"As Rep. Bob Kastenmaier of Wisconsin has pointed out, we have been miserly with pay of

recruits in the military and this is a disgraceful situation," he concludes. "We can clear this

up along with the great social danger represented by the draft with an immediate additional pay increase. Let us not repeat the error of Los Angeles and fail to act until it is too late."

### They Run a Fact Factory

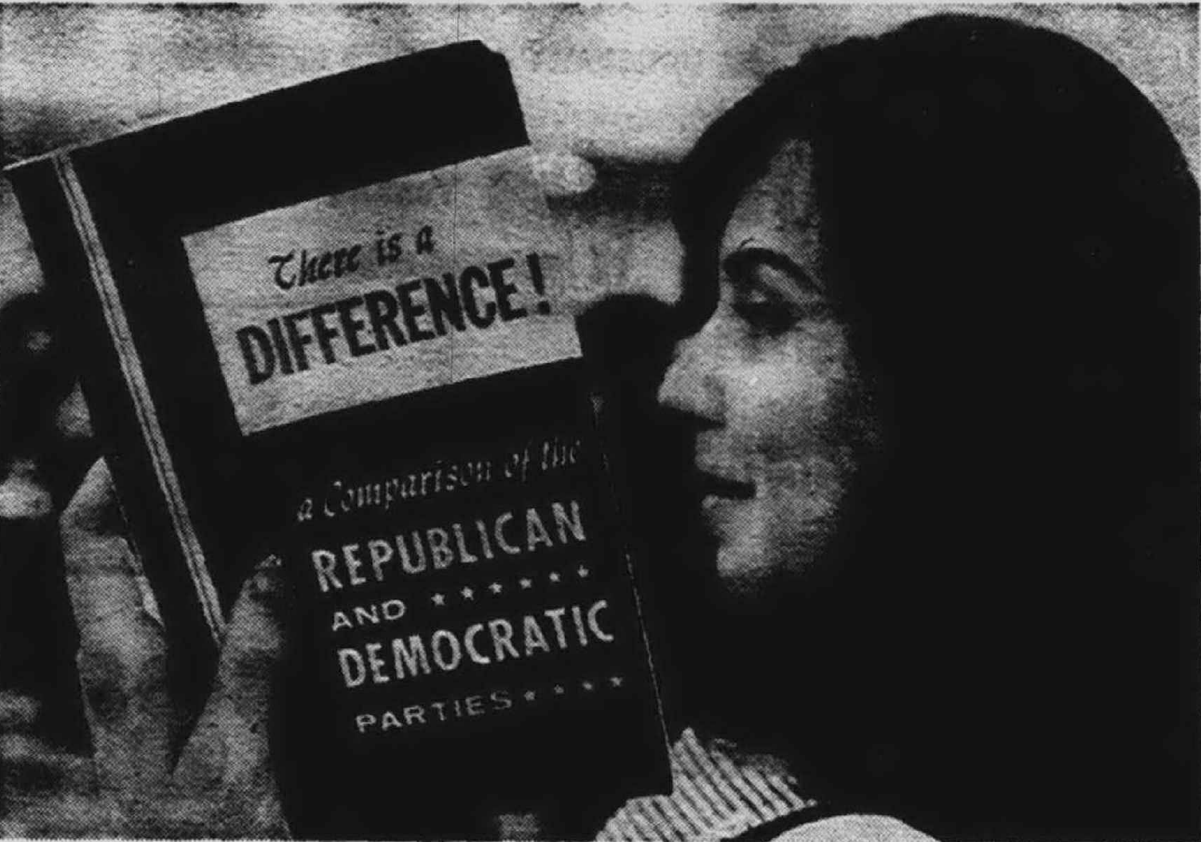

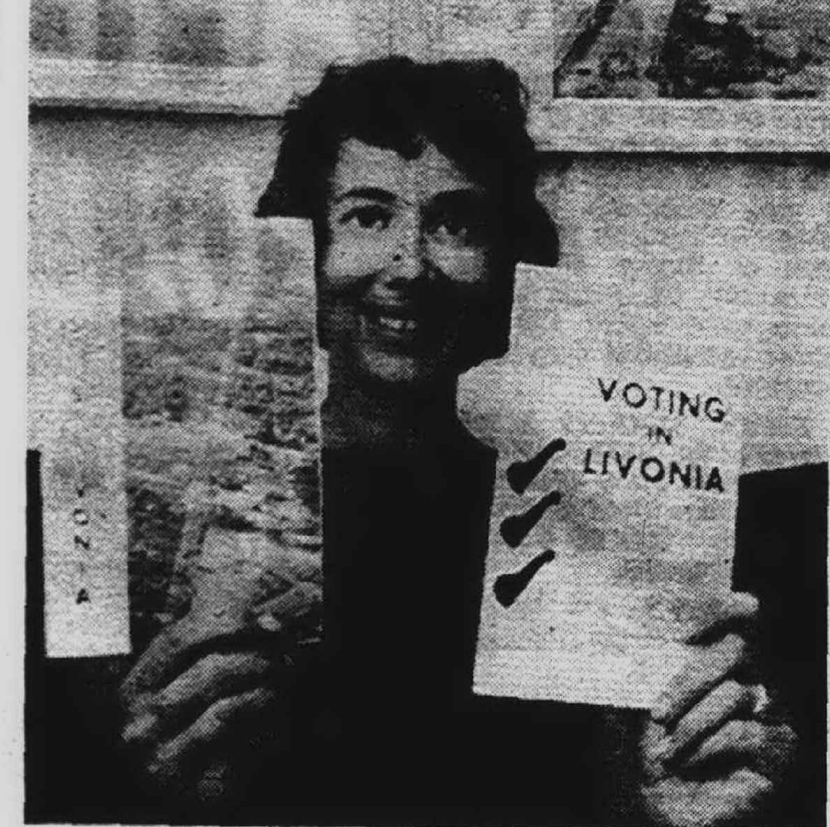

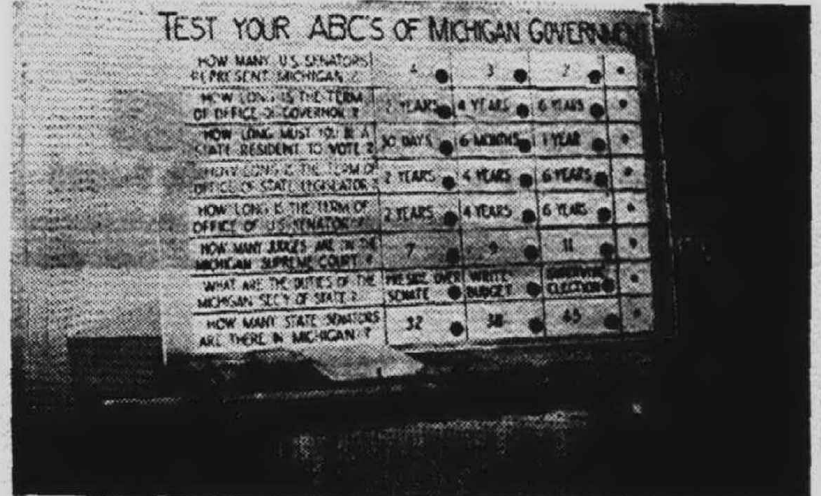

### The MAYOR'S CORNER

**SEEING IS BELIEVING . . .**  
Our family has had the opportunity to see a great deal of our country during the past month. In conjunction with the American Public Works Association Convention in Los Angeles, we took a three-week vacation, seeing many of our country's natural beauties.

We drove some 8,000 miles. Before our trip was over even my youngsters were noticing the bad planning that was prevalent in some cities.

Six thousand public officials from the United States and Canada attended the conference. Detroit was host city two years ago. At that time I was a member of the host committee and met a great many of the people in the public works field.

General Motors and Ford had large displays and several Livonians were there representing their companies.

The Public Works Conference gives public officials the only opportunity available to see the many types of specialized machinery and equipment in actual operation with working demonstrations.

Garbage and refuse disposal equipment was well represented and we came away with some new ideas on handling our dump site. The new method will be ideal for the proposed northwest refuse disposal area and will result in immediate burial of all trash with a three to four foot cover. The area is then ideal for park purposes.

Control of pollution for combined sewer systems was discussed at the conference. It was

a subject of great importance to me. I have issued an order to the Building Department to halt the issuance of all building permits in new sub-divisions which are served by only a combined sanitary and storm system.

Much of Rosedale Gardens suffered from basements flooded with raw sewage in July of this year. Builders were permitted at one time to install a combination system, which is much cheaper for the developer.

The principal speaker at our meeting was Paul Reed of the U.S. Public Health Service. His graphic portrayal of the health hazards resulting from permitting residential development with combined sewer systems, I am sure, made every official present determined to eliminate this acutely dangerous health problem. I have been threatened with a law suit by a builder because of my action.

Another very interesting and informative presentation was made on "The Beautification of Urban Communities." The new Federal program for beautification of roads was discussed.

I am endeavoring to have Farmington Road and Five Mile Road treated as boulevards within the city. We are, however, running into opposition from members of the Wayne County Road Commission which controls our mile roads.

We are presently attempting to determine whether Livonia would be eligible under the Federal program for highway beautification to cover part of the increased cost of this type of roadway. Last spring the Society of Professional Engineers furnished us with a very informative report of advantages and disadvantages of boulevard treatment of main highways.

One interesting fact which we have discovered is that divided roadways are much safer. Schoolcraft and Plymouth Roads were compared. Schoolcraft, with a higher speed limit and three times the daily traffic volume of Plymouth Road, had only one-third the number of accidents.

I was very close to the Watts area of Los Angeles where the rioting took place. It was the consensus of all of the people I talked to that this was not a race riot as such but merely a complete disrespect for law and order and a time when thievery and arson could be passed off as a racial disturbance.

The highlight of our trip was hearing Abraham Lincoln, at a Disneyland exhibit, saying:

"The world has never had a good definition of the word liberty, and the American people, just now, are much in want of one. We all declare for liberty; but in using the same word we do not all mean the same thing."

"At what point shall we expect the approach of danger? By what means shall we fortify against it? Shall we expect some transatlantic military giant to step the ocean and crush us at a blow? Never! At what point then is the approach of danger to be expected? I answer, if it ever reaches us, it must spring up amongst us. It cannot come from abroad. If destruction be our lot, we ourselves must be its author and finisher. As a nation of free men, we must live through all times, or die by suicide."

"Let reverence for the laws be breathed by every American mother to the lisping babe that prattles on her lap — let it be taught in schools, in seminaries, and in colleges — let it be written in primers, spelling books, and in almanacs — let it be preached from the pulpit, proclaimed in legislative halls, and enforced in courts of justice."

"And, in short, let it become the political religion of the nation; and let the old and the young, the rich and the poor, the gay and the grave, of all sexes and tongues, and colors and conditions, sacrifice unceasingly upon its altars."

### OK Pact With Highway Dept.

Livonia will join other communities in the metropolitan areas in joint planning for transportation facilities.

That's the indication following a study meeting of the City Council with representatives of the State Highway Department last Wednesday.

## 200 Back Couple In Adoption Quest

"We feel that it would be a great injustice if Melvin and Pat Evans were not allowed to adopt Tina whom they love very much and which love is returned fully by Tina."

So say over 200 Nankin residents who have signed a petition urging whoever-it-may-concern to aid Mr. and Mrs. Melvin Evans of 33612 Pawnee Dr. in their efforts to adopt a 19-month-old foster child who has been with them since she was one-week old.

Puzzled by the attitude of the Michigan Children's Aid Society, located in Farmington, Mrs. Evans says she hopes the support of her friends will help her and her husband in their battle to adopt the child, Tina, who they say has partial Negro ancestry.

About 11 years ago the Evans' adopted another child, Sandra, 12, who resides with them and are now wondering why the society won't let them adopt Tina. They have two other children of their own, Melva, 14, and Richard, 10.

It is not known whether or not the racial issue is involved but the petition states "the fact that Tina is partially Negro . . . should not cause the child any

future problems. As a matter of fact, Mrs. Evans is partly Indian and her color is far darker than the usual fair skinned Caucasian."

Petitions were circulated among residents, starting Sept. 2, by Mrs. Kenneth A. Fuernstein, a next-door neighbor at 33624 Pawnee Dr.; among members of the Evans' church, the Good Shepherd Church in Nankin, by its pastor, the Rev. Howard E. Davis and among Evans' fellow workers at the Republic Die and Tool, 45094 Van Born Road.

Backed by the support of the community, the Evans' hope to plead their case this week before Wayne County Probate Judge James Lincoln.

They will be supported in their efforts by the law firm of Friedman and Kraft of 10001 Grand River Ave., Detroit.

Meanwhile they have no idea where little Tina, taken from them Aug. 26, is being kept.

Candles, centerpieces for the table and house decorations also will be featured. All sale items will be on display and orders will be taken. Delivery will be three weeks before Christmas.

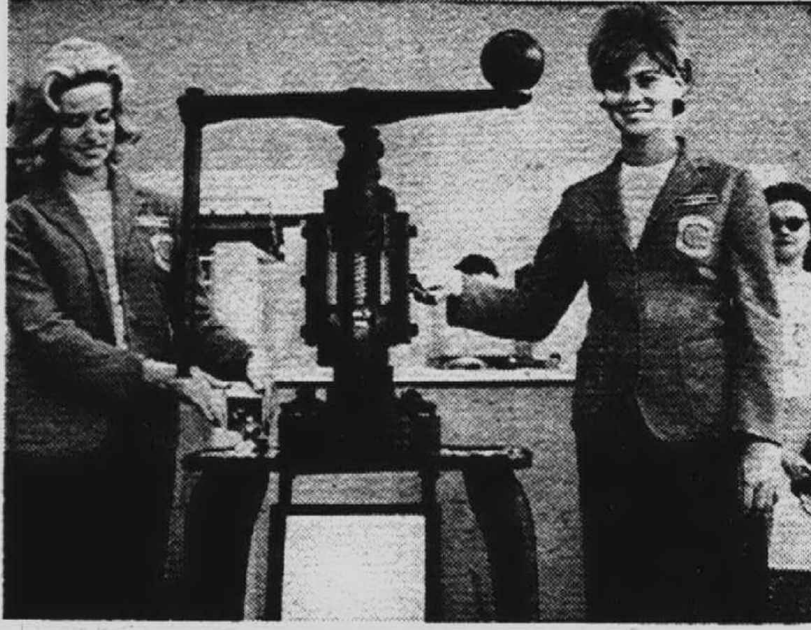

Dr. Harris Is Medical Boss At Training School

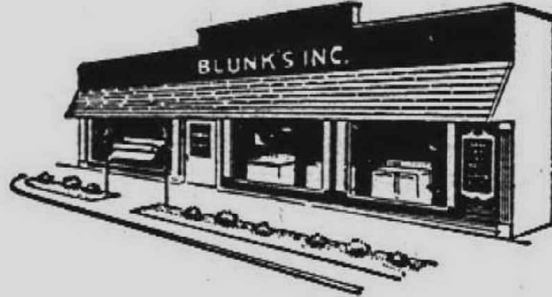

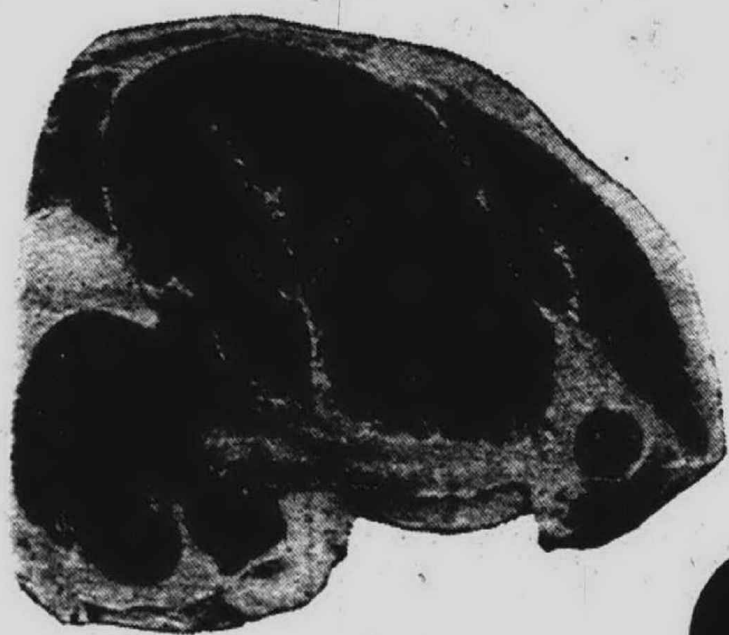

Three members of the Flint Police Department were guests of the Plymouth Kiwanis Club, Sept. 7. Inspector James Rutherford, Detective Marvin Anderson and Officer Donald Burnette presented the various methods used by shoplifters.

Inspector Rutherford pointed out that self-serve merchandising and large crowds have increased shoplifting. Attractive displays, designed to increase impulse buying, also increase impulse stealing.

Five general types of shoplifting were described:

**PROFESSIONAL** — work alone or in a group up to about five people. Shoplift in cities where they are not known. Steal high cost merchandise and dispose of it through a fence or to individuals who have previously placed an order for specific items.

**NOVICE** — Comprise the largest number of shoplifters and includes all age groups. These people constitute the biggest headache to merchants because of the large number.

**IMPULSE SHOPLIFTING** — These people enter stores as an honest customer but steal on an impulse when confronted with temptation and the opportunity.

**DESPERATE THIEF** — Will steal rather than accept welfare or beg.

**NARCOTIC ADDICT** — Steal and sell or trade for narcotics.

The police officers demonstrated several gimmicks shoplifters use for concealing their thefts. They pointed out that well-trained and alert clerks are the best detectives in preventing shoplifting.

The trained clerk is aware that the prospective customer, idling away time in the store, may only be a distraction while an accomplice is stealing. The trained clerk will also know that customers constantly looking up and down the store may be studying the movements of the clerks, the location of mirrors and a convenient shield.

Alert clerks will know that any object carried into the store by a customer such as a coat over their arm, a newspaper or a package may all be used for concealing stolen goods.

Detective Anderson emphasized the effectiveness of the shoplifters methods in displaying the results of a few hours of shoplifting in Plymouth prior to the Kiwanis program.

By prearrangement with the Plymouth Police Department, a plain clothed local officer accompanied the trio on a shoplifting stint in Plymouth.

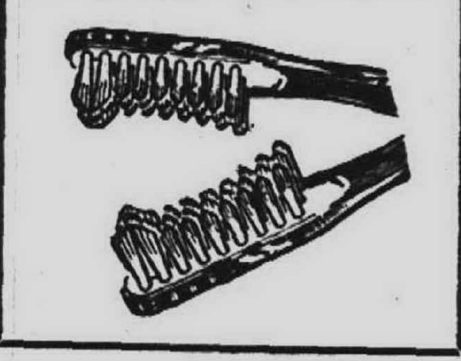
The out-of-town police officers admitted that they were watched so closely in some stores that they did not attempt to steal. However, they displayed merchandise taken from stores where they had an easy time.

Observing the Scene...

MACKINAC ISLAND—President Johnson and Senator McNamara can breathe easier, judging from the climate at the Governor's Conference last week-end...

He will no doubt be the Governor again in '66. This is not so much because he has, at the moment, a strong, united party behind him...

Personally, I think he is ambitious and really ready to move on. He is a man who delights in a challenge—more than Michigan will present him in the next four years...

The Governor's Conference was geared, planned and carried out on togetherness to stress party unity.

"A minority party cannot afford factions" was reiterated by Governor Romney to the leaders, in meetings, in private conversation and to the dissidents...

His most poignant point—or the one that impressed me the most—was his allegory about Republicans not able to afford Crabs in the party.

The point was not that a Republican could not be crabby; rather, he was referring to the character of the crab.

"Individually crabs can climb out of almost anything, but when you place a lot of crabs in a shallow basket or box, none of them will get out. It is not because individually they can't—it's only because, when one tries the others will pull him back down.

"As a party, too many members and too many factions are spending too much time pulling each other down if others don't agree with them completely. Too many Republicans are acting like crabs."

Any "crabs" present at the conference had to come away with a true picture of the determination of this leader to build unity within the party. The welcome mat is out for the "crabs" to join, but the terms are definite—they must be willing to accept:

1—Fiscal Reform (which would eliminate such nuisance taxes as business activity tax which daily throws the small business man out of business since he has to pay a tax on gross receipt instead of profit—sometimes there is no utter relation.)

2—A strong civil rights commitment to translate the ideal of equal opportunity into reality.

3—A pledge to labor to work cooperatively with all segments of society and interested individuals and groups toward the elimination of poverty, deprivation and want.

4—To recognize that Michigan along with the rest of the nation is passing through a period of growth and strain on the citizen, family, neighborhood, community and methods to cope with the many changes, not fight them to remain as the "good ole days."

"The Michigan Republican Party affirms the importance of responsible individualism, stable families, viable neighborhoods, many active religious and private voluntary organizations and affirms the role of government in insuring that social and economic resources are brought to bear on solutions to social problems," was the Governor's strong statement.

There were other task force points, but even the "crabs" in the party would concur in their innocuous conclusions on Crime and Delinquency, Senior Citizens, Mental Health, Education, Traffic Safety. There were 18 in all.

It is over the four knotty problems mentioned above that moderates and radicals meet head-on. Therefore, whether the dissidents in the party feel it is better to be right than win is the question involved. Having basked in the glow of the many my bet is on him.

A Call for Fiscal Reform

(Editor's note: A growing number of Democratic Party officials and local spokesmen are showing dissatisfaction with their party's official attitude toward state fiscal reform.

Here, from the official newsletter of the 17th District Democratic Party—with which Livonia and Redford Township were affiliated up to a year ago—is another strong criticism of local Democratic leaders. It is written by Ben Bailey, an attorney and member of the Party's Newsletter Committee.

We do not reprint it for the sake of showing "dissension" in Democratic ranks, but to point out that there is a strong, bi-partisan move in Michigan for fiscal reform.)

The reluctance of Democratic legislative leaders in the Michigan House and Senate to support either of the two proposals for tax reform advanced from the Mackinac Island Conference, or to tender a proposal of their own, is dismaying to an increasing number of the members of the 17th District Democratic Organization.

Speaker Joseph Kowalski, after making a prediction that the conference members would accomplish nothing, did not attend. Senate Majority Leader Raymond Dzendzel did attend, and although he did not participate in the discussions, he let it be known that he is not in sympathy with either of the plans which the consensus of the conference had developed.

Neither has advanced any alternative. Both have indicated that they do not expect the fall session of the Legislature to take affirmative action on any fiscal proposal whatever.

Both of these legislators are members of the 17th District Organization, which has repeatedly endorsed immediate tax reform with a State income tax as the fairest vehicle for achieving it. Yet both these leaders are not only reluctant to lead in this vital area, but are actually applying brakes to prevent action until a later date. We wonder what they are waiting for.

Are they waiting until the present surplus in the State's general fund is wiped out, an event predictable to be as early as 1967, based on the current rate of expenditures?

Are they hopefully awaiting the election of the Democratic Governor in 1966 to bear the onus of increased taxation or payless paydays for State employees?

Are they awaiting the 1966 elections to four-year terms for State Senators, and the incoming Governor so as to insure themselves politically against a possible voters' reaction against a tax overhaul which will give Michigan the revenue it needs for the very services voters need, and want?

Have they lost faith, or do they disagree with the firm declarations subscribing to the principle of fiscal reform adopted by the 1964 State Democratic Convention, and many previous Conventions? If so, why have they not said that they were not standing on the Democratic Platform, or at least opposed the fiscal reform plank at the various conventions?

Senator Dzendzel's position that the Mackinac Island proposals for reform are merely a disguise for increasing State revenues, begs the question. For Democrats have long agreed that there is need both for erasing the inequities of Michigan's patchwork tax structure, as well as for elevating revenues.

While there might be debatable merit in delaying an increase of revenues until the present surplus is exhausted, there can be no reasonable excuse for postponing the overhaul. The time is now—or yesterday.

Although less vocal in recent weeks, Speaker Kowalski has been persistent in placing the responsibility for a reform program in the Governor's Office, while, at the same time indicating that no proposal is likely to get his support or effective action in the House.

To those in the 17th who have loyally supported both the principle of Tax Reform, as well as these gentlemen's political fortunes in Michigan, their performance in the face of fire seems like a fiddlers' duet.

We are fearful that only a crisis reminiscent of 1959 can create an atmosphere in which these gentlemen will act. We also fear that the repercussions will bode no good for the Democratic Party. We cannot afford to wait any longer. Gentlemen, do your duty!

## THE MAN WHO COUNTS CALORIES FOR HORSES

Ray Hopton is a Calorie Counter... for other people and for horses.

He worries about everybody's weight but his own. The lean, six-foot-two Hopton is the Detroit Race Course's Racing Secretary.

It is a job which requires a unique knowledge of thoroughbred performances, a skill of blending proving factors with potential, and a touch of luck.

There's a race track adage which says: "Weight brings all horses together." That is what Hopton attempts to do with his assignments in events such as the famed \$75,000-added Michigan Mile, to be raced at the DRC Saturday, Sept. 18.

The Mile is Michigan's richest race. It is a Showcase of the Stars.

A year ago, Hopton achieved a Racing Secretary's dream when Tibaldo and Going Abroad finished in a dead heat in The Mile. Going Abroad carried 120 pounds and Tibaldo 112 pounds.

Racing Secretaries and Handicappers point to the late John B. Campbell for the "perfect" assignment of weights in a top stakes event.

In the 1944 Carter Handicap, Brownie, Wait A Bit, and Bossuet finished in a rare Triple Dead Heat. Brownie carried 115 pounds, Wait A Bit 118 pounds and Bossuet 127 pounds.

How important is a POUND in a horse race? Mighty important. By a Racing Secretary's calculation, a spread of two pounds is equal to one length in a mile race.

Owners and trainers watch the assignment of weights and their horses intently. They argue violently if they feel the weights favor a rival. The weights often determine whether

a turf star will start in The Mile or look elsewhere for an engagement.

You may wonder, and with good reason, why The Michigan Mile is raced at a mile and one-eighth. Originally—and hence its name—The Mile was contested at that distance.

Then, it was raced at a mile and one-sixteenth. This year, in response to repeated requests by horsemen, we made the distance a mile and one-eighth. At this time of the year, owners and trainers prefer the longer route for their Handicap stars. They feel it makes for a better race. It enables us to get more big name horses.

Our probable starters Saturday include Malicious, which defeated the great Kelso in the \$100,000 Aqueduct Handicap on Labor Day; Pluck, which finished second in the Aqueduct; Take Over, winner of the \$113,000 Washington Park Handicap; Pia Star, co-holder of the American record for the mile with a clocking of 1:33-1/5; the California star, Native Diver, winner of six stakes this season; Roman Brother, who won the New Hampshire Sweepstakes in 1964; and old rivals, Going Abroad and Tibaldo.

**R. U. Schools Going Into Red**

Redford Union School District's revenue is up more than seven percent over last year, but it will cost more than 12 percent more to operate the schools than it did last session. In other words, according to District estimates, the schools will close its books next June 30 with a \$241,468.95 deficit.

The Board of Education approved a \$6 million operational budget for the coming year at its regular meeting last Monday night.

Estimated revenue for the coming year is placed at \$5,803,330, as compared to last year's income of \$5,414,806. Of this a total of \$2,141,237 will come from tax revenues, while \$2,720,772 from the state and \$41,320 from the federal government.

The cost of operating the schools for the coming year is placed at \$6,044,799 by the Redford Union administration. Last year the actual costs of the District operation was \$5,376,244.73.

Of this a total of \$3,887,852.53 will be spent for elementary and secondary education. This includes salaries, instructional materials, and the costs of the special education, summer school and adult education programs.

Redford Union Superintendent of Schools Russel Hilbert told the Board that 9,014 students attended the Redford Union Schools last Monday. He cited the accuracy of the administration's prediction of 9,000 students in computing the expected state aid in this matter.

How much State Aid the District would receive was a point of discussion during the summer when the Board negotiated new contracts with the teachers. Both the Redford Union Education Association and the Redford Union Federation of Teachers contended that the administration's estimate of 9,000 students was too low and thus the District's projection on revenue from the state was off.

# Suburbs Are Becoming 'Ugly', Developer Warns

Real estate developers are making the same mistakes in the suburbs that have made inner cities monuments of ugliness and squalor, a prominent Detroit-area builder has charged.

Craig Smith, president of Sullivan-Smith Realty Company, Dearborn, in a speech at the first fall meeting of the Western Wayne-Oakland County Board

of Realtors at Cregar's Restaurant last Thursday, blamed the situation on public apathy, bad community planning and inadequate zoning laws.

"I think all of you understand what I mean by the blight that exists outside our core cities," Smith said. "Just take a quick look at the hodgepodge of gas stations, beer parlors, used-car lots and

other commercial outcroppings that dot long stretches of highway throughout your own areas in western Wayne and Oakland counties."

But it isn't just the roads leading to the suburbs that are ugly, said Smith.

"Natural beauty," he charged, "is nearly always the first casualty of suburban development. For instance, the topsoil and

trees are yanked out in the construction of new homes. And then up come the telephone poles and wires. Suburbia's monotonous eyesores come within a stroke of equaling the appalling blight we thought we were leaving behind when we fled the cities."

Suburbs consistently make inadequate preparation of sewage disposal and garbage collection,

he said, with the first leading to pollution of streams; the second, to polluted air.

Another landmark on the road to suburban slums, Smith said, is the consistent failure of smaller communities to provide adequate parks and playgrounds for their own residents.

Smith leveled his biggest guns on zoning laws in his broadside at the failures of real estate development in the suburbs.

"Inadequate, non-existent and unenforced zoning laws are the greatest enemy of small communities," Smith said. "Frequently we find industrial and residential areas jumbled together in a way that makes it impossible to tell where one leaves off and another begins.

"Some rural areas don't real-

ize there is any need to plan ahead for the day 20 years from now when they will have become urbanized. Little towns can't visualize from a large city's vantage point the zoning complexities that accompany urbanization."

Despite the fact that slums threaten the suburbs, Smith

agrees that the nation's growth will continue to be in suburbia.

"We must set minimum standards of zoning and adhere to them," he continued.

"Local governments should try to implement the goals they say they want. Officials must plan them and then re-

fect them, otherwise their

work is self-defeating." Outlying areas of Wayne and Oakland counties will attract settlers like a magnet, Smith predicted.

"The state's population shift has been primarily from the core regions like Detroit to the suburbs," he pointed out. "It's estimated that by 1970 Detroit will have lost more than 670,000 of its 1960 population. While Detroit is shrinking, outlying Wayne County will have gained 700,000 people.

"The five-county metropolitan area including Wayne, Oakland, Macomb, Monroe and Washtenaw will require 15 percent more dwelling units in 1970 than were required in 1960," Smith continued.

McLaughlin told The Observer of GOP plans to increase YR membership in the state to 20,000 by next spring.

"We will build the YR's with or without the present leadership," he asserted, and pointed to the recent Teen Age Republicans Conference as evidence of the senior party's increased interest in

and work with youth.

The Young Republican Clubs are open to anyone between the ages of 18 to 35. They are set up as an educational program and a training ground in politics.

The first 10,000 arriving for the Tigers' game with the Cleveland Indians that night will receive:

1—A free copy of a special souvenir edition of The Sporting News, baseball's weekly newspaper.

2—A souvenir metal lapel badge proclaiming: "I Was There."

Special pre-game ceremonies also are planned to mark the historic occasion as the Tigers become the first team in the American League to play its 10,000th game, including ties and replays. A recent audit disclosed the Tigers entered the season with eight more games under their belts than their closest rivals—the Indians.

The special issue of The Sporting News will feature both historical and up-to-date information on the Tigers, with a front-page spread on the 1901 Tiger team which brought major league baseball to Detroit. ## Former U-M Ace Heads Medical Corps in South Viet Nam

ANN ARBOR—Capt. Eugene Derricotte, who was appointed as the Second Air Division Dental Surgeon in South East Asia last May, is now responsible for Air Force dental facilities and personnel in South Viet Nam and Thailand.

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
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# Stake Climax to Big Week

# See 13 in \$100,000 Mile Saturday

Livonia becomes the site of one of the nation's richest in the Midwest. Just to make Michigan Mile Week one that will long be remembered by area racing fans.

DRC officials have three rich stakes for Thursday, Friday and Saturday. Michigan Mile Week opens Thursday with the renewal of the \$25,000 added Sweet Pa-

tootle handicap for mares and fillies over a distance of a mile and a sixteenth. The \$20,000 added Michigan Futurity headlines Friday's program—a two-year-old Michigan-bred race over a distance of six furlongs. Then comes the one event racing enthusiasts have been awaiting since the start of the DRC campaign — the Michigan Mile which actually

is over a mile and an eighth this year for the first time. It started as a Michigan Mile, then was stretched a sixteenth because of the short distance into the first turn and now an additional sixteenth has been added for the benefit of the older horses. "We had 37 nominations for The Mile and the list included every top handicap horse in the nation with the

exception of Kelso," said DRC President Dale Shaffer. "From the nominations it is certain we will have 13 starters. By every standard this looks like one of the finest fields in Michigan Mile history." The probable starters include: MALICIOUS: The Greentree Stable star who won the \$100,000 Aqueduct Handicap on

Labor Day at New York. Kelso was fourth in the race. GOING ABROAD: The Edward and Harry Seltzer color-bearer from Chicago which finished in a dead heat with Tibaldo in the 1964 Michigan Mile. Going Abroad came to the DRC 10 days in advance so

trainer Joe Pierce Jr. could give him a race over the track before The Mile. TIBALDO: Trainer Tommy Kelly is returning Tibaldo to renew the rivalry with Going Abroad and to bid for an unprecedented second straight Mile victory.

PIA STAR: Co-holder of the American record for the mile with a clocking of 1:33 2/5. ROMAN BROTHER: The great and durable ace of the stable of financier Louis Wolfson. Winner of the \$250,000 New Hampshire Sweepstakes in 1964. VIKING SPIRIT: A West Coast star who has been one of the turf's most consistent performers for the past two years. He won seven of 13 starts this season and been in the money in four other events. NATIVE DIVER: Another top California entry. The winner of six major West Coast stakes. TRONADO: An Argentine bred five-year-old owned by Chicago sportsman Herbert Herff and trained by Arnold Winick. TAKE OVER: Winner of the \$113,000 Washington Park Handicap on Labor Day at Chicago. Owned by Michigan sportsman Montell Stewart. LEMON TWIST: Detroit's T. D. Buhl's contender. The secondary feature of Michigan Mile Week will be the Sweet Patootie. This race is named for a filly which ran in the colors of Shaffer. The probable starters include Jalousie II; Liz; Swoonalong; Fairway Fun; Secret Vell; Star Maggie; Yes Please; Tune Swept; Dungen and Rae-Lynn. Fairway Fun and Secret Vell each won a division of the Rose Leaf Stake earlier in the DRC meeting. As part of Michigan Mile Week, the DRC will have its new twin double wagering formula.

## Rash of Injuries May Hurt 'West'

A rash of injuries has coach Harold Burkholder of Garden City West high school worried as the season's football opener against John Glenn High at Wayne Friday night fast approaches. "We might be missing three or four of our regulars," says Burkholder who has virtually all of his 1964 team back.

Garden City West had no senior students last year. The school's first graduating class will take the long stroll for diplomas next June. One of the West casualties is Ron Garland, a first-string tackle who fell off a motorcycle he was riding. "I keep telling my kids not to ride such contraptions. I'm even worried when they drive cars," declares the coach.

Dan Shannon, a back, is suffering from a broken toe and Ashton Hawkins, a lineman, from blood blisters. It's 50-50 whether they'll be able to go against Glenn. Not only will West high be fielding its first senior contingent this fall, but the school also

will be shooting for its first grid crown in the Tri Rivers League.

West doesn't rate as one of the top contenders, but the Garden City team could cause some problems before the season is over.

Crestwood High, formerly known as Dearborn Haston, is touted among the top powers along with Southgate and Riverside.

In a rundown by positions, here's the story at Garden City West:

ENDS—All Area back George Domanski, who scales 190 pounds, has been shifted to a tight end post. Terry Thompson, a senior, will play the split end. Jim Hopkins and Bob Gamache are two fine back-up ends.

TACKLES—Names like Mike Adler, Ken Broom, Joe Kuciembra and John Santomauro stand out.

GUARDS—Gary Kalen and Steve Furray are two of the key performers.

CENTER—Bob Worthy draws the praises of his coach. Worthy could be one of the greats. But the big center has an infection in his knees which could slow him down—at least at the outset.

BACKS—Charles Dodds is back to direct the team at quarterback. He's only a junior, but Dodds did a fine job in 1964 as a sophomore.

Mike Taft, a 6-1, 195 pounder and the second fastest man on the team (Shannon rates No. 1), is called by Burkholder "the key" to our attack.

The coach explains: "If Mike can get those two and three yards up the middle, he'll keep the defense honest and make it possible for our two halfbacks, Ardel and Bennie Schoemaker, to sweep the ends."

"Mike also is a very excellent blocker and a great player to have around."

Defensively, the two mighty performers in the West lineup shape up as Larry Sullivan, a 255-pound middle guard, and Bret Feighner, a linebacker. Burkholder calls Feighner "West's Joe Schmidt."

That's because Feighner calls the defensive signals and does a great job. He also is an excellent performer when it comes to nailing an opposition.

DeBusschere won't stand for any nonsense. Seldom have we seen a gent mature as much as Dave has between last March and a week ago.

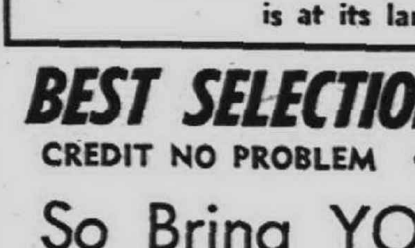

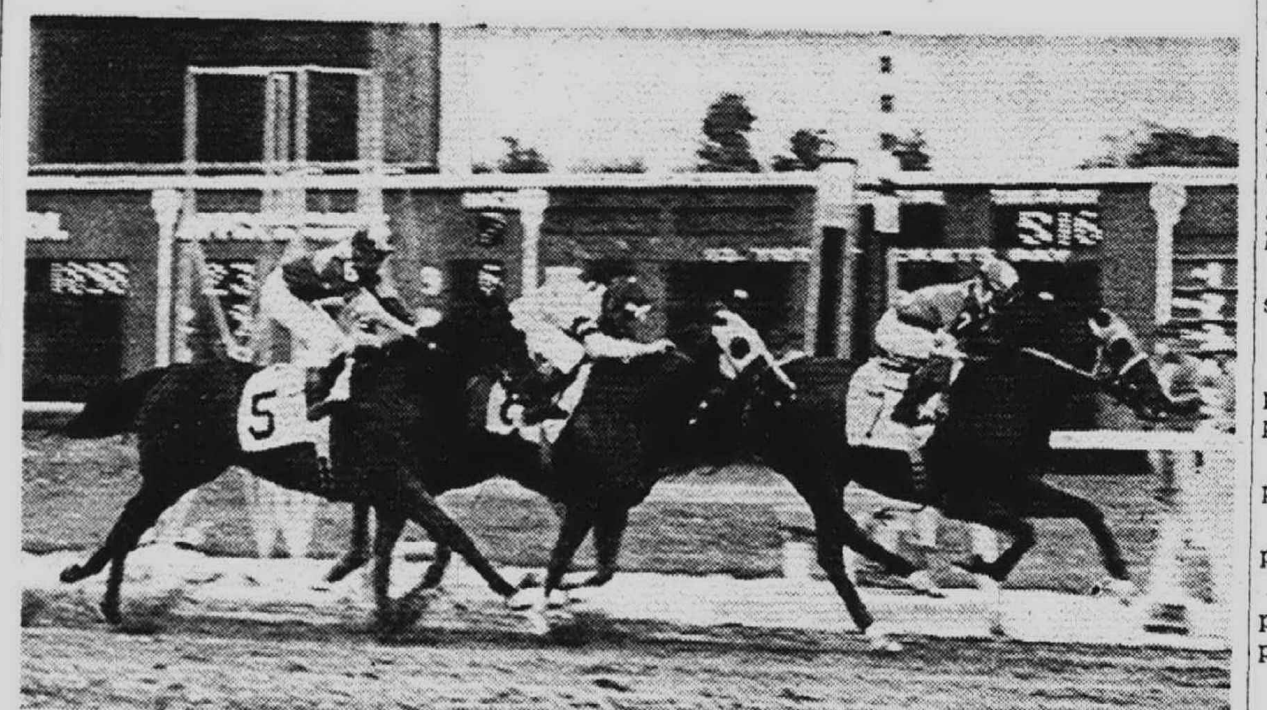

## Bench Unites Yard Shapes

A paved patio and a lawn make awkward partners unless they're joined gracefully. What's needed is a change of pace at the edge of the paving so that masonry and grass don't meet head-on.  
Simple but effective is to build an L-shaped bench in one corner of the patio. The bench will provide a change of elevation, giving a bit of height in one spot.  
The bench seat can be built of Douglas fir or white fir 2x3-inch lumber on edge, leaving an eighth-inch spacing between. For legs and cross supports, cut fence posts to the desired height and length.  
Then, to finish the project, work a mounded planting bed along another edge of the patio. Perhaps you could use a pair of garden screens in the bed as a backdrop for plantings. The screens will also serve as a means of introducing vertical lines to break the flat junction of lawn and paving.

## Basic Fences Easy to Vary

The basic board fence and the board-on-board fence are essentially the same construction. For the board fence, 1x6s or 1x8s are nailed on the same side of the rails either with edges butted together or with a narrow spacing left between.  
For the board-on-board style, the fence boards alternate sides—one front, one back, one front, and so forth. Edges overlap one inch or slightly more.  
Both styles make excellent privacy screens, but the board-on-board pattern allows the best air circulation.  
For a finishing touch, use a cap board or a decorative crown. The Douglas fir or western red cedar fence may be painted, stained, or allowed to weather naturally, whichever is preferred.

## Traffic On Path Aided By A Screen

Are both the main entrance door and the utility door located at the front of your house, and do both share a walk?

If so, you probably have the problem of visitors often coming to the utility door.  
To eliminate that awkward situation, build a new, separate front walk, emphasizing it with border plants, and an edging of brick. Then partially conceal the utility door behind a simple screen of Douglas fir 1x4s built on the outside of the old walk.  
Add a shrub or two in front of the new screen, and you'll find your guests coming to the front door—just as you intended.

## Easy-to-Build Windscreens Extend Sun-Basking In Fall

In some sun-blessed areas of the country, outdoor living is a year-around thing.  
But in most states, the terrace or deck can be enjoyed to the fullest only during the short summer months.  
It is possible, however, to extend that summer period by several weeks with patio weather-conditioners.  
Nippy breezes are the biggest enemy of outdoor lounging. To foil them, windscreens can be installed, and best by far are those that can be removed or opened to encourage breezes during the summer, while blocking them in the early spring or fall.

Effective windscreens can also be built on a deck or terrace with frames of 4x4s and a roller shade of heavy canvas installed in each frame. When wind threatens, the shade is pulled down and its lower edge lashed through screw eyes in the bottom member of the frame.  
Adjustable louvers also make a fine windscreen and are particularly good in cool weather climates. Here, windscreens are built fence style, but louvers are mounted on dowels top and bottom so that they can be turned by hand to an open or closed position.  
Weather-conditioning an extra-large terrace or deck is a more difficult problem. Generally it's best to design windscreens for only a section of it, converting that area to a suntrap for spring and autumn use. Or a roof could be added which, together with perimeter wind-

creens, will effectively block unwelcome breezes. Usually partial roofing will do the job.  
For late season use, you may also want to "warm up" wicker or metal and plastic webbed lounge furniture with slip covers made of terrycloth or any other easy-care fabric that feels warm to the touch.

## Kid Teams Sell Candy On Friday

That little fellow in the football uniform who is ringing your doorbell is serious, but he doesn't intend to tackle you. He's working out the financing for his own fun.  
Assorted small sizes of little football players will begin ringing doorbells Friday, Sept. 17, as the Western Suburban Junior Football League launches its campaign for funds.  
This is the 10th season for pint-size football in communities in the Detroit area. This year, more than 4,000 boys between nine and 12 year-olds will participate in the three leagues that have developed from the original All American.  
In all, 25 franchised memberships are active in as many communities, with a total of 40 units involved. This is the inaugural season for the Western Suburban, which split from the parent organization in an effort to reduce travel requirements for its four members, who operate nine units.  
A "unit" is three teams, including Freshman, Junior Varsity and Varsity, with a minimum of 25 players per team.  
Freshman teams are usually all newcomers, nine and ten years old, since a league rule prevents more than eight players from returning for a second season on the smallest team.  
They must move up to Junior Varsity, which has nine and ten-year-olds between 65 and 105 pounds and 11-year-olds between 65 and 90 pounds.  
Ten and 11-year-olds who exceed the maximum weights for Junior Varsity and all 12-year-olds are eligible only for Varsity competition. Minimum Varsity weight is 85 pounds, with the maximum set at 120.  
All weights are taken one half hour before game time and include full uniforms, less helmets.  
League officials estimate that it costs approximately \$75 per boy to provide the kind of equipment required by its rules.

appeared to be set.

Rick Volk at left half and either Mike Bass or Dick Wells at right half and Rick Sygar, last year's safety man at his old spot, make up the most likely defensive combination.

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**Water Is a Big Factor**  
**Tips On Keeping Your Lawn Up**

Hot weather means that your lawn has slowed down. But, it doesn't mean that you should forget it. Throughout the North, Midwest, most of California, the Northwest, the Upper South and anywhere else that northern grasses — bluegrasses, fescues and bent — are grown, lawn care is essentially the same, except for timing. First and foremost is watering. To maintain a green carpet sufficient water must be present in the soil. It takes from 1/2 to one inch of rain or its equivalent per week to maintain this level. So, if the water doesn't come naturally, put it on with a sprinkler. The important thing to remember is that daily light sprinkling does more harm than

good — it brings the roots to the top where they can dry out easily. Also, the person hasn't been made who can stand still long enough in one spot with a hose to put enough on. Because you can enjoy your patio the most when in an informal mood, you probably would prefer to locate it away from the prying eyes of passers-by, and where you can play your radio, view television, or entertain friends without the fear of disturbing your neighbors. For these reasons most homeowners prefer to locate the patio in the rear of the house. Convenience to indoors. Since you will probably wish to use your patio for meals and snacks, it should be located near the door from your kitchen or pantry. It will often be necessary to bring patio furniture and outdoor game equipment out of the basement storage area into the patio and yard. Therefore the patio should also be located near your outdoor exit from the basement. You probably will also wish to use your basement recreation area during the summer, so that you and your guests can play such games as ping-pong or darts or view television while others are on the patio. This is another good reason to connect outdoor recreation space with your year 'round recreation space in the basement. The steps from basement to the grade should be covered with a double-leaf steel hatchway so that the basement area can be easily accessible at all times. Shade. If your patio is close to the house, you can be sure of shade at least part of the day, thanks to the shadow of the building. Many homeowners plant a fast-growing tree or two on the edge of the patio, so that they will also have shade when the sun is not blocked off by the house. Low maintenance. Most patio materials will give you freedom from maintenance and repair jobs. Popular materials are concrete blocks, and flagstone and brick laid in sand. **Giant Rose Show at Mall Sept. 25**

Have you ever dreamed of winning blue ribbons with your home-grown roses? You can do just that! For the first time in the history of the Detroit Rose Society, the annual fall rose show will be held outside the city of Detroit. This year's Detroit Rose Show will be held at the Livonia Mall at Middlebelt and Seven Mile Roads. The general public is invited to enter their roses in this annual fall classic. Ribbons, American Rose Society Awards, trophies and many merchandise articles will be awarded. Merchants in the mall have contributed prizes for those who win the rose awards. To enter, pick as many rose specimens as you like to enter from your back yard and bring them to the mall beginning at 7 a.m. on Saturday morning, September 25. Each specimen will be entered in a separate vase and the vases will be furnished by the Detroit Rose Society. Generally speaking, a stem from 8" to 16" is preferred. Do not remove the leaves. The judges award prizes to roses that are 1/2 to 3/4 open. A rose that is full blown will not win, unless it is entered in the one section of the show devoted to full blown roses. All varieties must be entered by name. If you do not know the names of the roses in your yard, bring them anyway and the Detroit Rose Society rose identification committee will tell you the proper name of your rose. There is also a section for Rose Arrangements. If you have a flair for the artistic, you may enter your blooms in a vase or container arranged in a pleasing grouping. In this section of the show, the judges look for symmetry and design. The condition of the rose is not as important. For example, full blown roses are quite acceptable and may be used in the arrangement section. All entries must be in prior to 11 a.m. The general public is invited to view the show until 9 p.m. Saturday evening. Admission is free. The entire mall will literally be filled with hundreds and thousands of roses.

**Remove Roses When Petals Start to Wither**

Old rose blooms always die and usually do so by fading away. Michigan State University horticulture specialists recommend removing old faded rose blooms from flowering bushes soon after flower petals begin to wither. Studies show that these old blooms have a bearing on the size of younger flowers produced during the blooming period. If an old flower is snipped off just under the flower head, the stem will branch from small buds near the upper end of the shoot, giving many small, and sometimes mis-shaped flowers. Every gardener strives for large, well-formed flowers. A good rule to remember is to remove the shoot just above a strong five-leaflet leaf, not a three-leaflet one. The bud in the axil of this large leaf is usually the one which will produce the superior bloom. When an old flower has been removed in this way, the axillary buds at several large leaves sometimes develop giving stems bearing the large, beautiful flowers everybody wants.
