In order to keep the amount of inconvenience to a minimum, the following procedure shall take immediate effect upon the effective date of the ordinance. It should be noted that under State Law, the ordinance cannot be made eifective until signs are erected announcing the ban. It will take approximately one month to receive and install the necessary signs at all entrances to the

The Plymouth Police Department shall issue warning tickets for a one-month period. These tickets shall explain the follow-

1. That the City has adopted the ordinance.

2. That persons unable to comply with the ordinance may contact the police department for a free parking permit.

When a person applies for a permit, the police department shall determine whether or not sufficient land is available to permit a driveway or rear parking area. If land is available, then a six-month's permit shall be granted to the vehicle owner. If land is not available, this fact shall be noted and an an-



But there is a group in the western side of the Township, where the greatest growth and development is expected in future years, who feel the plans for a Township civic center in that section is all out of line.

At least that was the impression gained in the five-hour public hearing at which the Planning Commission went through every detail of the proposed plans.

Then at the end of the five hours, Chairman Irv Rozian called a recess until Saturday, Jan. 15 when the Commission will resume the hearing after having made a thorough study of the transcript of the hearing.

"We are extremely pleased with the outcome of the hearing," said Rozian and Township Supervisor John McEwen, "We wanted the residents to come in and comment on the proposed plans. We are very happy that as many appeared as did. It definitely shows that Township residents are interested in an orderly development in the future

"We will make a complete study of the transcript, check over the comments of all in attendance and then resume the talks in the meeting on Jan. 15. We hope that there will be as many and perhaps more show up at that time.

"After all, it is the citizens of the community who should have a hand in determining the future growth of Plymouth Township. What better place to express their feelings than at a public hearing?"

The Planners and the Commission, in the report, pointed out that the present Township Hall facilities are becoming crowded and it will be necessary to make a move in the not too distant future since there isn't enough room for the needed expansion at the present site on Ann Arbor Road.

The development plan recommends a centralized civic center on the North Territorial Road site (the Cunningham

property has been proposed). The plan calls for an Administration building to provide space for the various departments of the Township government. It points out that if the Township form of government is retained, more area for government facilities will be needed to care for an

expanding population. Cultural uses for the civic center would include an auditorium for the holding of art exhibits, lectures, theatrical and music performances, and group or class participation in the arts. An outdoor theater where the Plymouth Symphony Orchestra and school bands could present their concerts.

A chill man pours small samplings of molten iron which he chills quickly, breaks and examines for quality. A dipper dips sand cores into a liquid core coating substance to improve texture and provide smooth-surfaced castings.

The word "chipper," unrelated to an employe's well being, is the name applied to a man who uses a vibrating tool with a chisel on one end to take off metal casting projections called "gates" and "fins."

A de-finner removes the fins sand cores. A core blower operates a machine that blows sand into a core box pattern with an air-pressure force of 125 pounds per square inch.



There's a current spell of what some people call "civic pride" floating around Livonia. You'll find it manifested mostly in buildings. Today, you can enter a brand new post office on Merriman. Ground will be broken

Friday for a new library. Last week, a new high school opened. Senior citizen housing is on deck; plans for a "downtown Livonia" are making the

rounds; and they're starting to talk about a high-rise city hall. Anyone trying to "sell" the "Livonia image"

But what do these grandiose buildings and plans stand for? Are they symbolic of a community with strong moral convictions? Or are they simply hollow monuments?

The answer is complex. Livonia has had its "Goals Conference." The Chamber of Commerce is in the midst of a grass-roots program to define and solve community problems. We have pioneered a Youth Employment Service. The schools have taken a reasonably strong position against book censorship. And in the area of planning for the future, no community matches the zeal with which our Planning Department moves toward its goal of a balanced, cosmopolitan city.

But is our moral growth keeping pace with our physical growth? Too often new buildings create the kind of shiny, provincial pride that keeps us insulated from the problems of our neighbors in nearby Detroit.

It can't be forgotten why many people moved here: to escape the racial integration that is coming to Detroit.

It can't be forgotten because it wells up time and again. You heard its echoes when an Army Training Center came to town. You heard its echoes again when the Parks bond issue was defeated. And you heard it two weeks ago when residents

warned of the "undesirables" it would bring. All of these, the whispers went, would

bring Negroes to Livonia. Well, we've got news: they are coming. And Livonia had better be prepared.

The City Council today has a proposal before it to establish a Human Relations Commission as an official arm of the city. This 15-member board's one duty would be to promote harmonious relationships among all groups in the city, of all races and religions.

And it would have the city's strength to back it up.

It could stop the rumors. It could, when incidents like the recent letters describing anti-Semitic vandalism happen, step in and investigate. It could work to halt violence when minority groups move here.

Its existence might give the cautious members of the Board of Education enough courage to integrate the teaching staff to bring our children in contact with people of all minority groups.

But more, it could match the city's physical growth and pride of civic accomplishments with something deeper.

It could put Livonia on the map as a suburb which says, "We aren't another Dearborn." Already, Plymouth, both city and Township, have done this. Last week, the people of Farmington met to start the ball rolling for an official commission.

Human Rights Week, which marks during the coming seven days both the anniversary of the signing of the Bill of Rights and the Declaration of Human Rights, can be appropriately observed with deeds as well as words citizens in Livonia. in Livonia.

The Council and the Mayor can do what is right, not what is politically expedient, with a unanimous "yes" on the issue before

(The following are excerpts from a talk given by John Herb to the Plymouth Rotary Club at its weekly luncheon-meeting.)

In recent years, probably no other subject has had so much copy written about it, nor been the basis of so much discussion than has this matter of racial equality. As is true of any subject to which has been devoted so much time, energy and words, this subject of racial equality has become enshrouded in a fog of uncertainty, contradiction and bewilderment. The result has been that, to many, the issues are not as clearly defined today as they were several years ago.

It seems to me that if we are to avoid losing completely, in an orgy of blood and hate, those basic goals which, until recently, were so crystal clear, then we must attempt to bring back into focus the major problem areas. I believe there are three, and, as is true of any movement which has gotten out of hand, not all of these problems are

The first problem is the disregard for law and order which has become all too prevalent among the Negro and his supporters. This attitude has, in turn, created a backlash in other areas of our society and created a condition which, unless decisively checked, can have far reaching results, the consequences of which are not pleasant to envision.

Secondly, there is still some prevalence of the doctrine of white supremacy. I say "some," because it is my conviction that this philosophy is not as pronounced today as has been the case in years past. I think a gradual erosion in the foundation of this philosophy has taken place, an erosion brought about by the overwhelming weight of evidence against such a belief.

Finally, and I think in many respects this is the major problem, is the reluctance on the part of all too many to take a decisive stand on the basic issue of equality. Too many of us are still trying to hedge, insisting that other problems be solved first. When, in reality, the solution of these problems is impossible until there is an agreement on the basic issue.

Lie number one then becomes the rationalization that violence is a permissable means to achieve a laudable end. I say that violence, whenever it occurs and however commendable its objectives, if indeed it is possible for violence to have commendable objectives, must be dealt with swiftly and decisively. And, I think it is time we raised our voices in protest against those who tolerate such lawlessness. Failure to do so brings us frightfully closer to mob rule and its inevitable consequences.

I can immediately hear the cry of the minority that I advocate a double standard: deploring, on one hand, the violence of the Negro and his supporters, while condoning violence by the white. To which I would reply that violence by any group should not be tolerated. While both types of violence are to be condemned, violence by the white is even more deplorable because it has its origin in the second and more insidious big lie: the myth of white supremacy.

This one has been with us for a long, long time. So long, in fact, that it is amazing how much of a "factor of credibility" it has achieved. Because it has been with us for so long and has assumed so many shapes, it is admittedly a difficult myth to dispel. On one hand, we have those who unequivocally accept it. While I believe this group is a vociferous minority, I think we must realistically recognize that, in all probability, the most we can hope to achieve, as far as they are concerned, is sullen compliance. And, only death can put an end to their cancerous hate.

In the opposite camp, we have those who profess varying degrees of acceptance. And, the mightiest division in this army are those who profess to believe in equality; but, whose rationalization as to why equality should not come now, gives one grounds to wonder. Or, to paraphrase Hamlet: "methinks they doth protest too much." For it is this group who say: "I believe the Negro should have every chance, but . . . " This simple conjunction "but" has become, for many of us, the iron door to the mind's prison.

I think much of the confusion which exists today is due to the way such terms as "love," "brotherhood," "equality" and similar terms have been tossed about with reckless abandonment. I do not believe, for example, that all men are created equal in the context so many

people erroneously attach to it. No more than I believe that all of us in this room are equal. There are financial, social, intellectual -to name but a few-differences between all and freedom from discrimina- deadline delivery. This has hap- other shopping center further of us. "Equality of rights" is, I believe, the key phrase. If we accept that as a basis upon which to start, then I think each of us can formulate a statement of principles which will follow, essentially, the same pattern. My own statement is quite simple. I believe every human being is a creature of God and is entitled to an equality of opportunity which will allow them to progress as far as their abilities permit. Any means we use to thwart this opportunity is morally indefensible. The atheist, if indeed there is such a creature, can eliminate the first portion of that statement and still have a declaration of human rights which will insure, as Thomas Paine said, an "equality of rights,"

Fine, you say, I will accept your statement, but . . . and then begins the process of trying to rationalize postponement of a thing we profess to believe in. Let's take a look at some of these "buts."

But, you say, how can a people who, less than 100 years ago were slaves, be expected to take their place along side of me in today's society. I don't. However, going back to my original statement, I do believe they deserve the unfettered opportunity to progress as swiftly as their abilities permit. And, I also recognize that among their people are many For Town Meeting who are superior to me in many respects.

But, you say, they have had this opportunity and look where they are today. The important issue remains, I believe, the reluctance of most of us to take a definite stand. We fear the condemnation of our friends and neighbors, who, in turn, remain silent for the same reason. We continue to juggle the scales of justice, putting first on one side and then the other, those pitiful pieces of distorted logic by which we hope, vainly, to achieve a balance. In so doing, we become as ludicrous as he who continues to saw the legs of the table only to find, at the end of each round, that the table still wobbles. to any touchy problem? I think

What is needed is courage—courage to throw off the chains of prejudice which have enslaved us for so many years. Courage to raise our voices in protest against the actions of those who make a mockery of democracy. Through such united action, we thwart the rabble-rousers who seek to profit through our indecision. And we can proudly take our place with others who have exhibited similar courage.

Removed as you may be at this moment from immediate involvement in this battle of human rights, your hour of decision will come. I do not know at what precise moment of history you will be faced with this decision -but faced you will be.

Perhaps, and God forbid, it will be when a howling mob gathers outside of a home someone dared to move into. Or, perhaps it will be in the quiet of your living room as you sicken at the sight of people being trampled in the streets, because, they had the courage to ask for that which you did not have the courage to give.

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

(On this, the eve of the anniversary of the death of Paul M. Chandler, Dec. 12, 1964, The Observer reprints the last column he wrote, for the special 1964 Goodfellow edition in Livonia.)

Nobody talks about it much, but it is a fact nonetheless that in recent years it has become increasingly difficult for Goodfellows to meet their money quotas in the sale of special newspapers.

It also has become more difficult to recruit "Old Newsboys," or "Goodfellows," or whatever title you prefer to assign to these doughty spirits. The ranks ; have been thinning of those who go out on the street corners (usually on what seems to be the coldest day of the year) and shiver, holding aloft their newspapers, making change with numb fingers, and all of that.

Despite the decreasing enthusiasm of "Old Newsboys" and the slippage in total collections - and also the loss through death of some of the most ardent Goodfellows who toiled in the original years - each year at this time the public still sees a group of devoted and dedicated men on the streets during the holiday season. After the funds are turned in, they are used to buy

a mountain of clothes, food and toys. Canned hams and meat, bags of Christmas candy, dolls, stuffed animals, canned fruits . . . all the things which bring creature comfort to some of God's children who for one reason or another would not have the chance to experience the Nor does it end on Christmas Eve. In the treasury

of the Goodfellows there remain funds for use throughout the year in extraordinary situations where a few fast dollars can avert human suffering of one kind or another. There are families with chronic, uncurable illness who sometimes reach the point of not knowing how to make the payments to keep a roof over their heads.

Or it could be a struggling, young family with low income and many mouths to feed, struck with a fire which has ruined their home and furnishings.

Not too much of these reaches the public view, because in most cases quiet, anonymous help is what is needed. But the Goodfellows do their good deeds not for publicity or for something else . . . because the job is there to be done.

Americans basically are a queer breed of folks. Most of the time they subscribe to the idea that the object of life is to accumulate goods. The "harder one works" and the "more talent he shows" are meant to "pay off" in more wealth . . . larger homes, bigger cars, lusher living room furniture, more electrical appliances, better fitting frocks, fur coats . . . Yet, most on Sunday, they take a day off and

hear the mystics warn and advise, "Happiness is not to be found in fur coats and colored television sets. Real joy, real contentment, mental stability and a sense of fulfillment come, instead, from doing for others, from giving, from helping those less fortunate than yourself."

Americans endure this advice for an hour or two, shrug on their overcoats, and then go out and renew their striving to accumulate more material things for themselves: to become "successful."

The Goodfellow endeavor, short in duration as it is, is a wholesome move in the other direction. It is the fervent wish of Facts and Opinions that

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

There is more to making one of the wreaths than appears but the wheat suggests the bounty hours of practice before she felt strength of faith and virtue. she was doing an excellent job.

State Police Report Dip In Fatals

November traffic deaths in Michigan, totalling 156, were 22 or 12 per cent less than 178 in the same month a year ago, according to State Police provisional figures.

The month's average was 158 for the five years of 1960-64, while the record high was 219 in 1941 and the record low was 87 in 1942.

The November count brought the 11-month total to 1,862 which was 68 or 3.5 per cent less than 1,930 killed in the same period last year. Delayed death reports will increase somewhat the November and accumulated totals.

More complete figures for October showed 195 killed and 14,785 injured in 27,995 accidents. This was a reduction of two per cent in deaths but injuries and accidents both increased 18 per cent over the same month last year, Injuries have been up for 46 successive months compared with the same month a year earlier, while accidents have increased in 44 of the last 46 months.

Accumulated figures for the first 10 months were 1,693 killed and 123,920 injured in 247,925 accidents. This was a three per cent decrease in deaths but a nine per cent rise in injured and a 12 per cent increase in accidents compared with 1,752 killed and 114,057 injured in 222,109 accidents in the same period in 1964.

The 10-month statistics this year are already higher than for the whole year of 1962 when 1,574 were killed and 108,143 injured in 233,078 accidents.

Estimated vehicle mileage for the first nine months, the latest information available, was 29.8 billions, an increase of six per cent over the same period in 1964, while the death rate of 5.1 per 100 million vehicle miles was down seven per cent from 5.5 on the same comparison basis.

State Troopers Arrest 17,065 In October

Michigan State Police officers made 17,065 arrests in October, 15,335 for traffic offenses and 1,730 on criminal complaints, according to the department's monthly activity re-

In addition, 546 juvenile traffic offenders were arrested and 592 delinquent and two wayward minors apprehended.

Troopers assisted 4,852 motrists, investigated 8,910 cars, issued 22,154 oral warnings to drivers, and made 16,462 property and 2,606 liquor inspec-

Department vehicles traveled 1,805,477 miles, of which 1,012,228 were on traffic patrol and 739,249 to investigate criminal and other offenses.

The identification bureau received 14,271 sets of fingerprints, of which 7,600 were criminal and 6,671 noncriminal. Four wanted persons were identified.

Of 3,394 applicants for permits to carry concealed weapons, 427 were identified with criminal records, through their fingerprints. Two unknown dead were identified by the same means.

The scientific crime laboratory conducted 893 examinations, of which 599 were on questioned documents, 158 on firemarms, 54 microscopic, 21 potanical, 18 on tool markings, 17 on glass, 10 on explosives and 16 miscellaneous.
