Plymouth City Commission Bans On-Street Parking

On-street parking will be banned on the City of Plymouth streets following action of the City Commission Monday when it passed to third reading and adopted an amended traffic ordinance.

At the same time, the Commission passed a resolution banning parking on one side of Maple Street in the area north of Harvey and indicated it would ask the owner of a property at the corner of Maple and Harvey, adjacent to the Michigan Bell offices, to make the land available for parking for employees of the utility.

Pressed by residents of the area to do something about the parking situation which has become acute to the fact that employees of Michigan Bell have been parking on Maple Street

due to the closing of a lot at the corner of Ann Arbor Trail and Harvey. A building is being constructed on the lot.

After receiving numerous complaints, the Commission decided to ban parking on one side of Maple and then ask Michigan Bell to find other places for their workers—preferable the lot on the corner.

The amended traffic ordinance, which forbids on-street parking between the hours of 2 and 6 a.m., is expected to go into effect in about a month. The Commission adopted the revised ordinance and

administrative procedures for enforcing it at the same time. City Manager Richard Blodgett pointed out that the purpose of the ordinance is to clear the streets of the City of parked cars in order to facilitate snow removal, street sweeping, locating of abandoned cars and the reduction of accidents involving parked cars.

Naturally, when an ordinance of this type is put into effect, some inconvenience will be experienced. In order to keep the amount of inconvenience to a minimum, the following procedure shall take immediate effect upon the effective date of the ordinance. It should be noted that under State Law, the ordinance cannot be made effective until signs are erected announcing the ban. It will take approximately one month to receive and install the necessary signs at all entrances to the city.

The Plymouth Police Department shall issue warning tickets for a one-month period. These tickets shall explain the following:

1. That the City has adopted the ordinance.
2. That persons unable to comply with the ordinance may contact the police department for a free parking permit.

When a person applies for a permit, the police department shall determine whether or not sufficient land is available to permit a driveway or rear parking area. If land is available, then a six-month's permit shall be granted to the vehicle owner. If land is not available, this fact shall be noted and an-

Township Residents Hit Proposed Civic Center

The Plymouth Township planning Commission learned Saturday that most residents are satisfied with the new comprehensive report and development plan proposed by Planners Waring and Johnson with the co-operation of the Township Board and the Commission.

But there is a group in the western side of the Township, where the greatest growth and development is expected in future years, who feel the plans for a Township civic center in that section is all out of line.

At least that was the impression gained in the five-hour public hearing at which the Planning Commission went through every detail of the proposed plans.

Then at the end of the five hours, Chairman Irv Rozian called a recess until Saturday, Jan. 15 when the Commission will resume the hearing after having made a thorough study of the transcript of the hearing.

"We are extremely pleased with the outcome of the hearing," said Rozian and Township Supervisor John McEwen. "We wanted the residents to come in and comment on the proposed plans. We are very happy that as many appeared as did. It definitely shows that Township residents are interested in an orderly development in the future."

"We will make a complete study of the transcript, check over the comments of all in attendance and then resume the talks in the meeting on Jan. 15. We hope that there will be as many and perhaps more show up at that time."

"After all, it is the citizens of the community who should have a hand in determining the future growth of Plymouth Township. What better place to express their feelings than at a public hearing?"

The Planners and the Commission, in the report, pointed out that the present Township Hall facilities are becoming crowded and it will be necessary to make a move in the not too distant future since there isn't enough room for the needed expansion at the present site on Ann Arbor Road.

The development plan recommends a centralized civic center on the North Territorial Road site (the Cunningham property has been proposed). The plan calls for an Administration building to provide space for the various departments of the Township government. It points out that if the Township form of government is retained, more area for government facilities will be needed to care for an expanding population.

Cultural uses for the civic center would include an auditorium for the holding of art exhibits, lectures, theatrical and music performances, and group or class participation in the arts. An outdoor theater where the Plymouth Symphony Orchestra and school bands could present their concerts.

A library in co-operation

with the Wayne County Library for the Plymouth Community.

A recreation building for the holding of dances, parties

Livonia Bank Lists New Charge Plan

(Picture, P. 10-B)
An all-purpose charge plan, operating in nine key Michigan market areas, was announced Monday, by Elvin D. Dougherty, president of Livonia National Bank.

Called "Michigan Bankard," the plan will be inaugurated in early 1966 under the initial auspices of nine participating banks, according to Dougherty.

The charge plan will be available to a wide variety of merchants and to every "credit-worthy Michigan resident"

whether a participating bank customer or not.

It is expected that more than 4,000 businesses and some 200,000 card-users will be enrolled in the Michigan Bankard plan when it begins operations, according to Frank Shumway of Michigan National Bank, general manager of the plan.

"We believe that Michigan Bankard offers outstanding benefits to the merchant and to the user," Shumway said, "the merchants will have the advantages

of a charge plan, without its burdens, and the users will have a convenient means of charging and budgeting their purchases."

For the merchant, the Michigan Bankard plan offers several benefits, Shumway explained. By receiving immediate cash credit for every Michigan Bankard sale, the merchant has access to working capital that would otherwise be tied up in accounts receivable.

Record keeping, credit checking, charge card issuance, billing and collecting all handled by the Michigan Bankard Center, relieving the merchant of these burdens and protecting him against credit risks.

Within specified limits, customer purchases with the Bankard can be handled without authorization and charges above the limit are quickly cleared by direct-line phone contact with the Bankard center.

The Michigan Bankard user will find that the plan offers several advantages, Shumway continued. "No membership will be charged and with the card, the user has an established line of credit."

By using his Bankard for purchases, the user avoids the annoying surge of month-end bills. He receives a single statement covering all his purchases and makes only one payment.

If the user pays his account in full within 25 days of receiving his statement, there is no service charge. He may, however, elect to pay the balance on an extended payment plan, for which there is a small service fee, Shumway said.

The nine banks initially participating in the Michigan Bankard Plan have a total of 56 offices, extending from Detroit and Port Huron in the east to Grand Rapids in the west.

In the greater Detroit area, participating banks include: Michigan Bank, N.A. (24 offices), Livonia National Bank (four offices), Troy National Bank (two offices), and Oakland National Bank in Southfield.

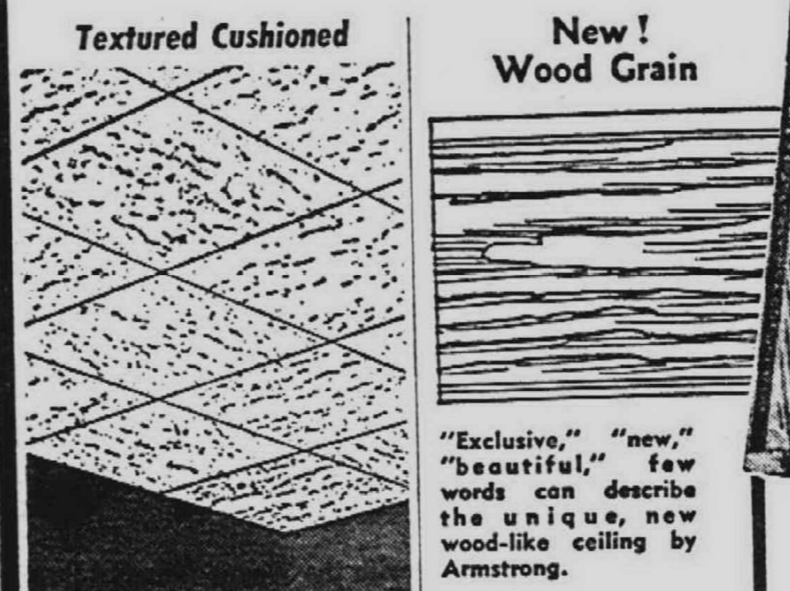

20 Foreign Exchange Students Hear Pleas for Understanding, Peace

Twenty foreign exchange students representing 15 nations from around the globe sat down for a Thanksgiving Dinner together last Thursday.

All of them students at western Wayne and Oakland county's high schools and colleges, the youths and their American host families were the guests of

honor at the annual banquet for exchange students sponsored by The Observer Newspapers and Burroughs Corp.

The youngsters were greeted by Congressman Weston Vivian, dined on a replica of the Pilgrims' first Thanksgiving feast, and heard an address by Dr. Albert B. Burke, star of the "Probe" TV show.

Burke, speaking on the theme of "Men and Ideas," warned the students not to judge America only by the people and areas with which they came in contact during their year here. "You are here," he said, "because America wants you to know our feelings... but remember, there are many people, many areas of our land."

Burke drew a contrast be-

tween what he termed the "Community of Free Will" in America and other western democracies and the "Community of Obedience" in the eastern European countries. He said despite the fact that he saw an anti-democratic trend in the world, the universal truth of "man's ability to think rationally for himself, made the western Community of Free Will the force in the world which eventually prevail."

Dr. Burke, long a scholar and historian of the American Indian, credited much of America's democratic traditions to Indian practices. "Our 'decision-making,' the universal suffrage, our confederation form of government had no parallel in Europe," he said. They were based upon custom and tradition of the American Indian.

Congressman Vivian told the young people that more exchanges between students, teachers and other groups were necessary to preserve world peace. He noted the many national backgrounds represented among U.S. Congressmen (he was born in Canada, for example), and said he would continue efforts in Congress to expand exchange programs, especially among teachers. We have much to learn from each other," he said.

Words of greeting were given by Myra L. Chandler, president of The Observer Newspapers, who said, "It is inspiring to have so many nations represented here this evening." She paid tribute to her husband, Paul M. Chandler, who first conceived the idea of an annual banquet honoring local exchange students. This was the second such affair planned by The Observer staff since his death last Dec. 12.

Edward W. Schening, general manager of Burroughs' Plymouth plant, was master of ceremonies for the evening. He urged the students to promote the important cause of world peace. "All of us extend the hand of friendship. I speak for all Americans in stating that we will do all we can to promote world peace."

Skip Rosenthal, Livonia city librarian, performed folk songs on his banjo, and led singing in English, Norwegian, French, German, Spanish and other languages.

(Continued from Page 1) nual permit provided. In any case, an inspection of the premises is in order.

The police department shall designate certain blocks where permit parking is allowed. If more than two cars are involved, signs shall be posted in the block to provide switch parking (one side of the street on Monday, Wednesday and Friday, the other on Tuesday and Thursday). On weekends, they can have their choice. The streets designated shall be near-by local streets.

Presently there is no ordinance requiring curb cut permits, but should one be adopted, and if a curb cut is necessary

for the installation of a drive under this ordinance, there shall be no charge for this curb cut permit. This only applies to lots with dwellings presently erected on them.

The Commission: Approved a request from the Salvation Army to have Christmas Kettles on the streets.

Approved transfer of funds involving \$7,065 from the unappropriated reserve and \$20,444 from the budget contingency to meet anticipated expenditures.

Approved a request from retiring Municipal Judge Harry Deyo for an additional clerk for the month of December to clear up a backlog of work and also \$160 for purchase of a painting for the Municipal Court room.

Approved a contract for Keystone Fence Co. on its bid of \$10,404 for fencing at the old cemetery, the Department of Public Works garage and the new reservoir on Beck Road.

Authorized the City Manager to accept an offer of \$2,000 for a dozer with the thought of having the buyer operate the Salem Refuse dump.

Approved a request from the Plymouth Hockey Association for the sale of candy on two days during December.

Approved a request from the Michigan Christian Youth Camp for a candy sale in the city on Dec. 11 and Dec. 18.

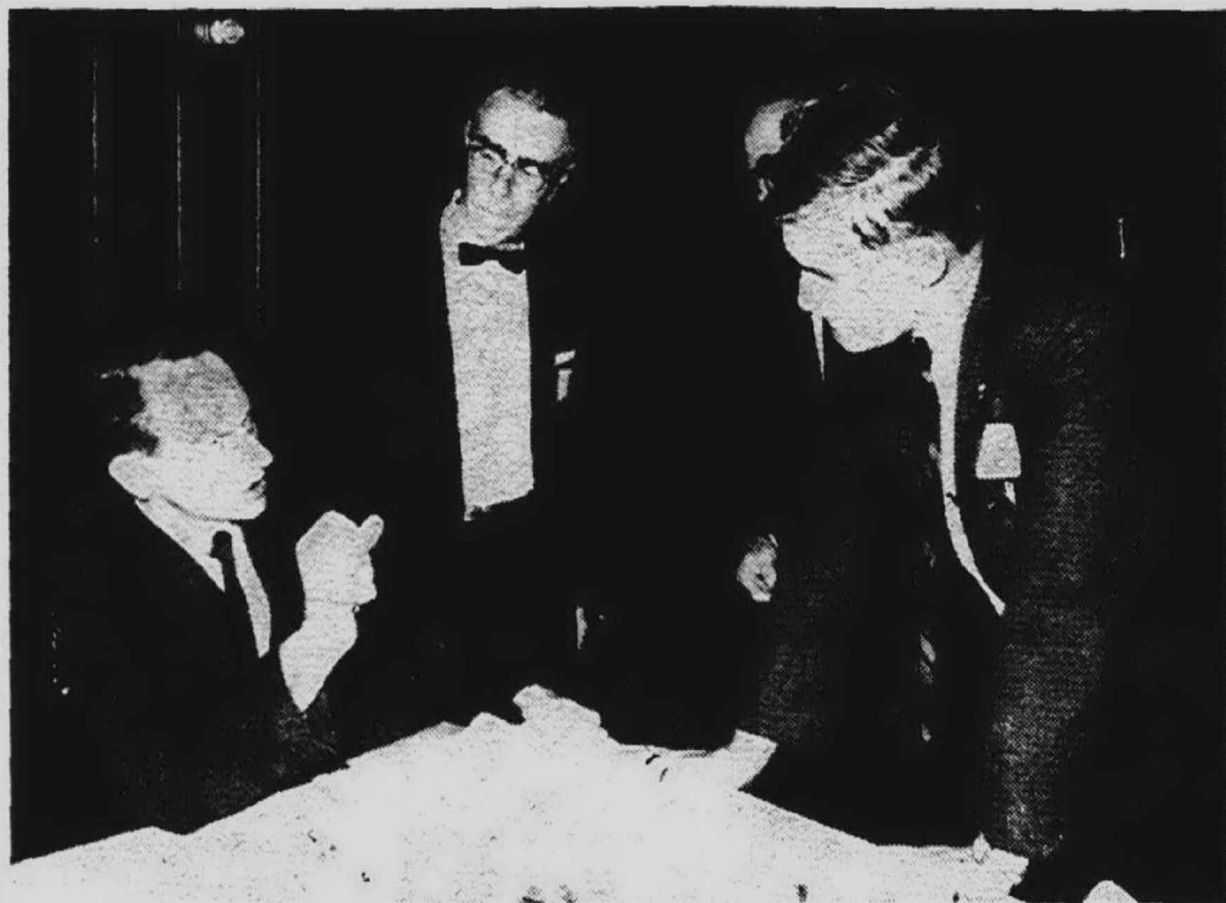
Approved a request from the Plymouth Lions for street sale of candy canes on Dec. 17 from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m.

Vivian Sees Big Chance For Area Atomic Plant

The Plymouth-Ann Arbor area has an excellent chance of becoming the site of the proposed multi-million Atomic Reactor plant, currently being studied by the Atomic Energy Commission. It is one of the five or six sites that have no major disadvantages and few minor disadvantages.

That was the statement of Congressman Wes Vivian in a talk to members of the Plymouth Businessmen's Forum following a discussion of the nation's space program.

"The proposed facility would have a construction cost of almost three-quarters of a billion dollars and the operation would cost from 60 to 70 million annually," Vivian said.

"However, there are other sites in Cleveland, St. Louis, Indianapolis and in Illinois that are just as advantageous as the one in this area. It doesn't necessarily mean that we will win this facility but I feel the Michigan site will be among those considered as a final choice.

"The members of the Michi-

gan delegation in the House and Senate are prepared for a battle royal when the AEC committee nears a final choice. We plan on doing everything possible to get this facility for Michigan. Of course, you realize that the site in this area and one in Battle Creek are being considered but my heart is right here at home and I plan to do everything possible to get this plant for my district."

Vivian told of the enormous costs of the space program and indicated there is a feeling in some quarters in Washington that the budget should be raised to \$5 or \$6 billions in the future.

"There isn't any program on the books that will cost that much but there is a belief that the program needs several billion annually. I personally believe it could be trimmed in some phases but then that will all come out in the next session of Congress."

Vivian discussed the possibility of the United States shifting to the metric system

of measurement instead of the hodge-podge used today.

He pointed out that the United States is the only large nation still using other systems. Great Britain has shifted and there is pressure for the United States to make the shift so that all will be in conformity.

"The metric system is much better from an engineering viewpoint," he said. "It could be complex from a practicable standpoint but better in the long run. I predict there will be a long hassle in Congress over a change."

Nicknames Have Different Meanings in Ford Plants

Essaysist William Hazlitt once said that a nickname is the heaviest stone the devil can throw at a man.

Foundrymen disagree. At Ford Motor Company foundries, nicknames, all banded about without malice, come in handy as short cuts in pinpointing what a man does. A glossary of their terms makes strange reading for the layman.

Working in foundry harmony are "gunners," "strippers," "shakeout men" and "knock-out" and "shotblast men."

Other job classifications call for the "slurry man," "mud mixer," "clammer," "drop and chip man," "merry-go-round operator," "blowout man," "bucket dumper," "chill man," "dipper," "chipper," "de-finner," "c o r e

blower" and "sandman."

In the day-to-day casting of thousands of engine blocks and other automotive parts, the nicknames are used routinely by the 8,500 employees of Ford's three huge foundries—two in Dearborn, Mich., and another in Cleveland.

Gunners use air tools that tighten together sand cores. Foundry strippers peel freshly formed cylinder block castings from sand-filled boxes. Shakeout men then shake off the clinging sand on vibrating steel platforms.

Knockout men do not specialize in fistcuffs, but instead excel at removing extraneous metal, as well as sand, from internal passages of castings. Shotblast men, quite unarmed, direct castings into a cabinet that cleans with a stream of shot or grit.

A slurry man mixes clay, cereal, binder, water and finely ground coal used in preparing mold sand. A mud mixer prepares a black plastic refractory material for making minor repairs to cupolas (foundry furnaces) and hot-metal pouring ladles.

A clamper joins the top and bottom halves of the frame in which a sand mold is formed. A drop and chip man doesn't make

cookies. He cleans a cupola at the end of a week's operation by chipping out adhering slag and coke.

The term merry-go-round operator has nothing to do with an amusement park ride. Instead, he's the man who operates a large rotating unit that lifts the upper half of molds from the lower half and moves them into position on a shakeout machine for further processing.

A blowout man obviously doesn't fix tires in Ford foundries. He blows loose sand from mold cavities. A bucket dumper is a workman who mechanically inverts large bucket-type containers that unload castings on a sorting conveyor.

A chill man pours small samplings of molten iron which he chills quickly, breaks and examines for quality. A dipper dips sand cores into a liquid core coating substance to improve texture and provide smooth-surfaced castings.

The word "chipper," unrelated to an employee's well being, is the name applied to a man who uses a vibrating tool with a chisel on one end to take off metal casting projections called "gates" and "fins."

A de-finner removes the fins that form at the joints of baked sand cores. A core blower operates a machine that blows sand into a core box pattern with an air-pressure force of 125 pounds per square inch.

Finally, there's the Ford foundry sandman, not the fantasy of sleepy children, who makes huge batches of sand in mulling and mixing machines for cores and molds.

No Hollow Monuments

There's a current spell of what some people call "civic pride" floating around Livonia. You'll find it manifested mostly in buildings.

Senior citizen housing is on deck; plans for a "downtown Livonia" are making the rounds; and they're starting to talk about a high-rise city hall.

Anyone trying to "sell" the "Livonia image" would have little difficulty with all this at his fingertips.

But what do these grandiose buildings and plans stand for? Are they symbolic of a community with strong moral convictions? Or are they simply hollow monuments?

The answer is complex. Livonia has had its "Goals Conference." The Chamber of Commerce is in the midst of a grass-roots program to define and solve community problems.

But is our moral growth keeping pace with our physical growth? Too often new buildings create the kind of shiny, provincial pride that keeps us insulated from the problems of our neighbors in nearby Detroit.

It can't be forgotten why many people moved here: to escape the racial integration that is coming to Detroit.

It can't be forgotten because it wells up time and again. You heard its echoes when an Army Training Center came to town. You heard its echoes again when the Parks bond issue was defeated. And you heard it two weeks ago when residents

protesting an auto wash on Plymouth Rd. warned of the "undesirables" it would bring. All of these, the whispers went, would bring Negroes to Livonia.

Well, we've got news: they are coming. And Livonia had better be prepared.

The City Council today has a proposal before it to establish a Human Relations Commission as an official arm of the city. This 15-member board's one duty would be to promote harmonious relationships among all groups in the city, of all races and religions.

And it would have the city's strength to back it up.

It could stop the rumors. It could, when incidents like the recent letters describing anti-Semitic vandalism happen, step in and investigate. It could work to halt violence when minority groups move here.

Its existence might give the cautious members of the Board of Education enough courage to integrate the teaching staff to bring our children in contact with people of all minority groups.

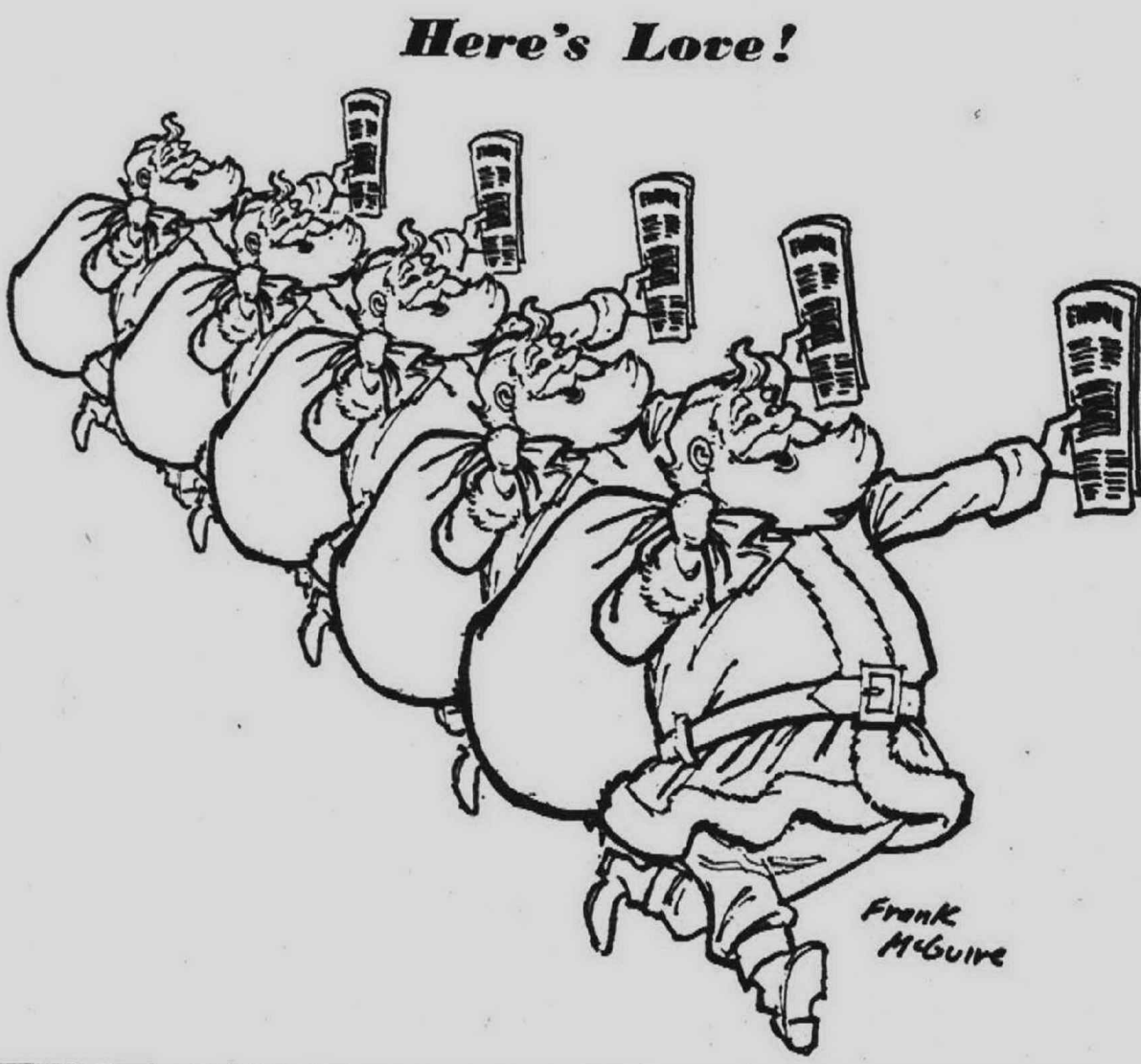
But more, it could match the city's physical growth and pride of civic accomplishments with something deeper.

It could put Livonia on the map as a suburb which says, "We aren't another Dearborn." Already, Plymouth, both city and Township, have done this. Last week, the people of Farmington met to start the ball rolling for an official commission.

Human Rights Week, which marks during the coming seven days both the anniversary of the signing of the Bill of Rights and the Declaration of Human Rights, can be appropriately observed with deeds as well as words in Livonia.

The Council and the Mayor can do what is right, not what is politically expedient, with a unanimous "yes" on the issue before them today.

Our church applauds the expressed intention of responsible officials of Livonia to perform their duty to investigate these incidents and to enforce the law. It is also our hope that the voiced concern of many citizens will bring about a greater recognition of the rights of all people of our community so that such behavior will not occur in the future.

Facts and Opinions By PAUL M. CHANDLER

(On this, the eve of the anniversary of the death of Paul M. Chandler, Dec. 12, 1964, The Observer reprints the last column he wrote, for the special 1964 Goodfellow edition in Livonia.)

Nobody talks about it much, but it is a fact nonetheless that in recent years it has become increasingly difficult for Goodfellows to meet their money quotas in the sale of special newspapers.

It also has become more difficult to recruit "Old Newsboys," or "Goodfellows," or whatever title you prefer to assign to these doctory spirits. The ranks have been thinning of those who go out on the street corners (usually on what seems to be the coldest day of the year) and shiver, holding aloft their newspapers, making change with numb fingers, and all of that.

Despite the decreasing enthusiasm of "Old Newsboys" and the slippage in total collections—and also the loss through death of some of the most ardent Goodfellows who toiled in the original years—each year at this time the public still sees a group of devoted and dedicated men on the streets during the holiday season.

After the funds are turned in, they are used to buy a mountain of clothes, food and toys. Canned hams and meat, bags of Christmas candy, dolls, stuffed animals, canned fruits . . . all the things which bring creature comfort to some of God's children who for one reason or another would not have the chance to experience the sensations.

Nor does it end on Christmas Eve. In the treasury of the Goodfellows there remain funds for use throughout the year in extraordinary situations where a few fast dollars can avert human suffering of one kind or another. There are families with chronic, incurable illness who sometimes reach the point of not knowing how to make the payments to keep a roof over their heads.

Or it could be a struggling, young family with low income and many mouths to feed, struck with a fire which has ruined their home and furnishings.

Not too much of these reaches the public view, because in most cases quiet, anonymous help is what is needed. But the Goodfellows do their good deeds not for publicity or for something else . . . because the job is there to be done.

Americans basically are a queer breed of folks. Most of the time they subscribe to the idea that the object of life is to accumulate goods. The "harder one works" and the "more talent he shows" are meant to "pay off" in more wealth . . . larger homes, bigger cars, lusher living room furniture, more electrical appliances, better fitting frocks, fur coats . . .

Yet, most on Sunday, they take a day off and hear the mystics warn and advise, "Happiness is not to be found in fur coats and colored television sets. Real joy, real contentment, mental stability and a sense of fulfillment come, instead, from doing for others, from giving, from helping those less fortunate than yourself."

Americans endure this advice for an hour or two, shrug on their overcoats, and then go out and renew their striving to accumulate more material things for themselves: to become "successful."

The Goodfellow endeavor, short in duration as it is, is a wholesome move in the other direction.

It is the fervent wish of Facts and Opinions that the appeal for funds will raise more money than any before in history.

It is our dream that the ranks of those willing to volunteer for Goodfellow work will double, and triple, and quadruple over the next two, three and four years.

It is our wish today, not just for the children and homes which will benefit from the gifts, but for the peace and pleasure it will bring the volunteers, once they understand the real meaning of life . . . and Christmas.

Students at Bentley have the chance to bring more meaning into the Christmas of the soldiers from Michigan fighting in Vietnam. They can do so by bringing Christmas cards

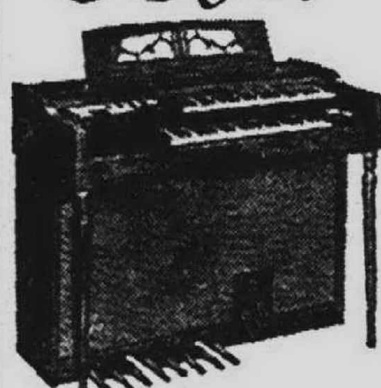

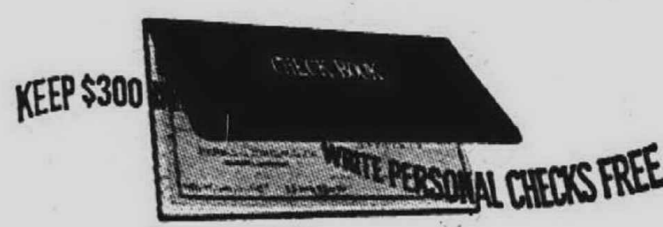

'W. W.' Tells Of New Post Office

As you drive down Merriman Road these days you'll notice a fine looking one-story building on your left just before you reach Plymouth Road. If you are like most folks you'll look at it and, with some pardonable pride, you will say to your companions, "That's our new Post Office."

If you have been a long-time resident of the area you'll beam and look upon the building as another jewel in the crown of Livonia—another symbol that we are fast becoming a big city.

If you are one of those persons who has battled traffic and parking problems trying to reach the inadequate quarters on Plymouth Road for the past decade you may look at the new building and mutter, "It's about time."

But to a hardy little band of "pioneers" who helped fight the battle of organizing the City of Livonia—back in 1949, the new post office stands as a monument and a reminder of one of the first big "political" victories won by the young city.

In these modern times when money is handed out in Washington for almost anything it is most difficult to believe that back in those days you had to fight—not only on the local beachheads—but we had to stage a "March on Washington" to be heard and it was only a defiant demand by our Senator Homer Ferguson that Livonia got a post office of its own.

It all came about in this fashion.

Early in 1949 a group of the "pioneers" got together one Sunday afternoon in the old Township Hall on Five Mile Road. (It is a city-owned building now that houses the Civil Service Commission.)

The purpose of the meeting was to organize a Chamber of Commerce and get the businessmen of the city to unite in a solid front and fight for the things that were needed in the area.

It was a blustery, winter afternoon, but more than 90 persons attended the meeting. At the finish they had formed a temporary organization and had listed these items as the most important needs of the area at that moment:

- 1—A post office to serve the entire city.
- 2—A hospital to care for the sick, wounded and suffering in the area.
- 3—A bank of our own.

Why was the Post Office given the top rating?

Well, in those days Livonia didn't have anything that resembled a post office. Therefore the residents had no Livonia mailing address, even though they lived in Livonia. We were served by post offices in six other areas. For instance, if you lived on the north side of Myrna Road in the center of the city your mail came from Farmington and you had a Farmington address.

If you lived on the south side of Myrna your address was Plymouth. It was so confusing that the pastors of our churches could not send mail to their parishioners. Even the J. L. Hudson Company refused to mail bills to the area.

So we wrote to Mr. Jesse Donaldson, then the Postmaster General of the United States, and asked for our own post

office. Just at that time the word leaked out that we were to be a branch of the Plymouth post office.

It so happened that the Postmaster in Plymouth was a resident of Livonia. He was Dr. George Timpona, a chiropractor with offices on Plymouth Road. And he was a staunch member of the Democratic Party.

In those days the postmaster's salary was figured on the gross receipts of the office and he didn't have to be a resident of the area he served. After all, while he lived in Livonia, he had a Plymouth mailing address.

One didn't have to be too smart to figure that the good doctor was fixing up something nice for himself. If Livonia was made a branch of the Plymouth post office he would be Postmaster in two cities. And that's a good trick—if you can do it.

It was then that the hardy little band of "Pioneers" planned its "March on Washington."

Our Congressman in those days was George Dondero, of Royal Oak, one of the most respected members of Congress. He agreed to meet us in Washington in the morning.

Sure enough, Congressman Dondero was at the railroad station in Washington and he got a chuckle out of our placards which carried messages such as "Livonia is not a branch of anything"—"Mr. Donaldson, you're not going to let the tail wag the dog," etc.

With Congressman Dondero in the lead we headed for the Post Office building and right into the office of the Postmaster General. He listened. But promised nothing.

We let all the members of Congress know our plight. Then, off to the Senate to meet our senator, Homer Ferguson. He listened, too. Then he acted.

Grabbing the telephone in his office he called the Postmaster General. We sat there and listened.

"Jesse," he almost barked into the phone, "these folks are my constituents. They want a post office. They deserve it. And I want them to have it."

His confidence brought a ray of hope to our group that aside from myself, included Les French, Don Roach, the late Clyde Bentley, and the owner of the Shell gas station at the corner of Schoolcraft and Farmington Road, who was known only as "Herbie," Clarence Jahn, and a fellow who later was to become our city attorney and mayor.

Then one day, a month or two later, Senator Ferguson sent the word. He told us that we would have to be a branch of something for a start—but that we wouldn't be a branch of Plymouth.

Later, we learned that we were to be a branch of the Detroit Post Office. That was not what we wanted, but being a branch of a big city wouldn't be too bad.

Finally, we got the word. Livonia was to be a branch of the Detroit office—but the Detroit postmaster didn't really want us. He had enough headaches without Livonia. He had to take us—but only for a short time.

He soon asked for relief. And so, Livonia got its own post office. At last we had a home town mailing address and we weren't a branch of anything.



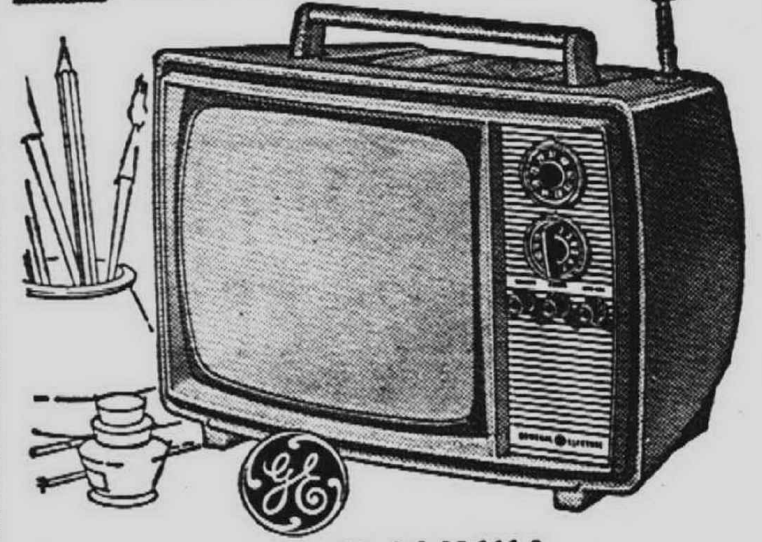

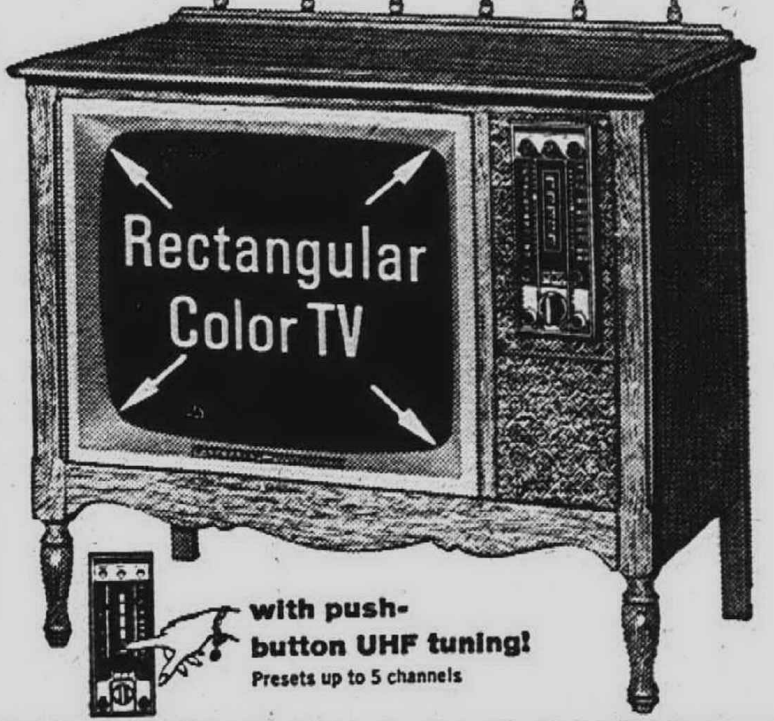
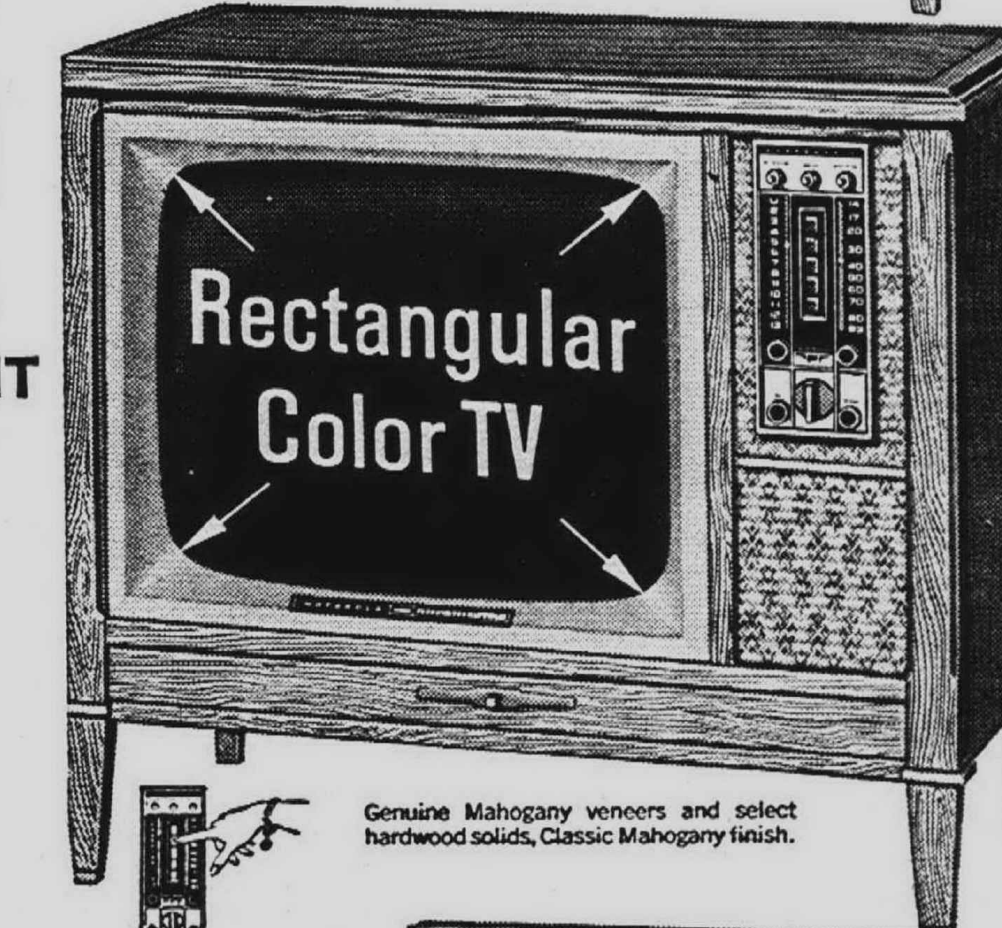

Bearup was impressed with his team's final period comeback in which they outscored Walled Lake, 24-13 as Mike Stakus and Jim Scharmen led the way.

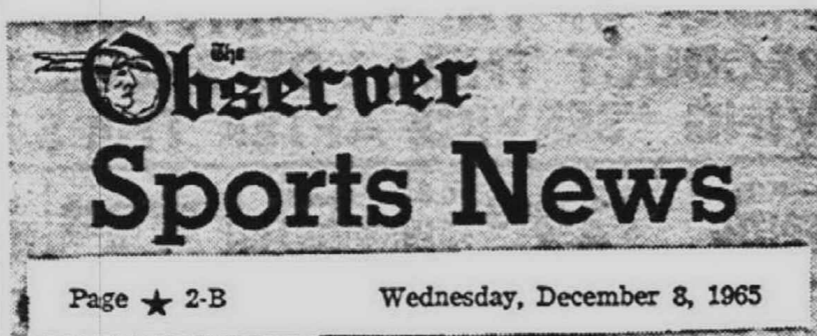
The clock, when a Scharmen basket tied the score at 69-69 and forced the proceedings into an extra three-minute session.

The Livonian's had no trouble winning the battle of the field goals. Franklin held a 23-20 advantage in this department.

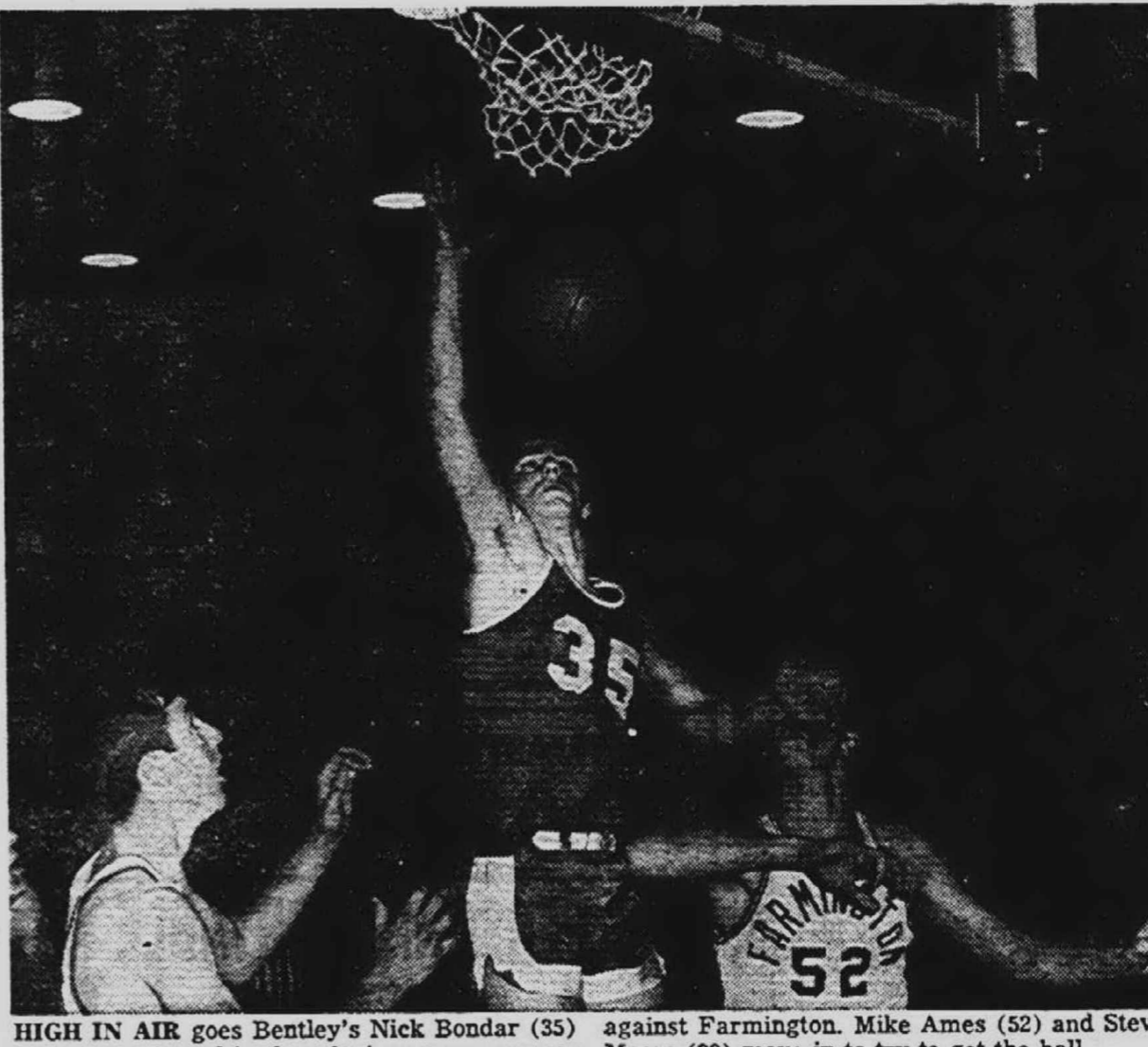
But matters were much different in the free-throw department.

A good ceiling treatment for the entrance hall, bi-fold louvered doors for closets, food files for the kitchen, simple cove or cornice moldings for all rooms and corner guards for doorways are other possibilities. Beautifying the home with something more than temporary decorations is a great and satisfying way to celebrate the holidays.

Plymouthite Tells How To Make Della Robbia

Interested in making one of those colorful Della Robbia wreaths that make such a pretty picture when on the wall or as an outdoor decoration on the door or window during the holiday season? Then take a few tips from Mrs. Peggy Spayth, 9050 Morrison, Plymouth, who has become an expert in the art of making the wreaths after years of work.

There is more to making one of the wreaths than appears but Mrs. Spayth believes one can do the job in creditable style by following her instructions. Her knowledge came the hard way with long hours of instructions and probably twice as many hours of practice before she felt she was doing an excellent job.

There is a long history behind the Della Robbia wreaths, one that goes back long before the Italian Renaissance, when garlands of flowers, fruits and foliage were used to decorate the temples of the Egyptians.

The terra-cotta garlands of the Florentine Sculptor Lucia Della Robbia (1400 to 1482) and his nephew Andrea Della Robbia (1434-1525) were widely copied for holiday decorations.

Andrea followed in the footsteps of his uncle and gained fame throughout Italy, Spain and France. It is from the sculptured fruits and foliage of Andrea that the term "Della Robbia" became associated with the garlands and wreaths of today.

The "Della Robbia" also has a special meaning. The evergreen wreath symbolizes everlasting life; the grapes are a symbol of the blood of Christ;

the wheat suggests the bounty of the earth; the apples the fruit of salvation; and the Pomegranate the emblem of fruitfulness. The Laurel Magnolia leaves represent triumph or eternity; and the oak the strength of faith and virtue.

Here are the instructions of Mrs. Spayth.

First the materials needed include an 18-inch styrofoam ring or fresh evergreen wreath, approximately 18 artificial red and green apples; nine each of the following: peaches, oranges, lemons, pears, grapes, and plums and three dozen cedar picks.

Then follow these instructions: wrap the styrofoam ring with a floral tape; cluster fruits in groups of three on wire T-picks which may be purchased from your local floral shop; arrange fruit in design around the ring and insert T-picks with fruit in the styrofoam; fill in edges and bare spots with artificial cedar picks; nuts, wheat, pine cones, magnolia and oak leaves may be added if desired; a two and half yard strip of velvet ribbon tied into a perky bow will add a professional touch.

State Police Report Dip In Fatais

November traffic deaths in Michigan, totalling 156, were 22 or 12 per cent less than 178 in the same month a year ago, according to State Police provisional figures.

The month's average was 158 for the five years of 1960-64, while the record high was 219 in 1941 and the record low was 87 in 1942.

More complete figures for October showed 195 killed and 14,765 injured in 27,995 accidents. This was a reduction of two per cent in deaths but injuries and accidents both increased 16 per cent over the same month last year.

Accumulated figures for the first 10 months were 1,693 killed and 122,920 injured in 247,925 accidents. This was a three per cent decrease in deaths but a nine per cent rise in injured and a 12 per cent increase in accidents compared with 1,752 killed and 114,057 injured in 222,109 accidents in the same period in 1964.

The 10-month statistics this year are already higher than for the whole year of 1962 when 1,574 were killed and 108,143 injured in 233,078 accidents.

Estimated vehicle mileage for the first nine months, the latest information available, was 29.8 billions, an increase of six per cent over the same period in 1964, while the death rate of 5.1 per 100 million vehicle miles was down seven per cent from 5.5 on the same comparison basis.

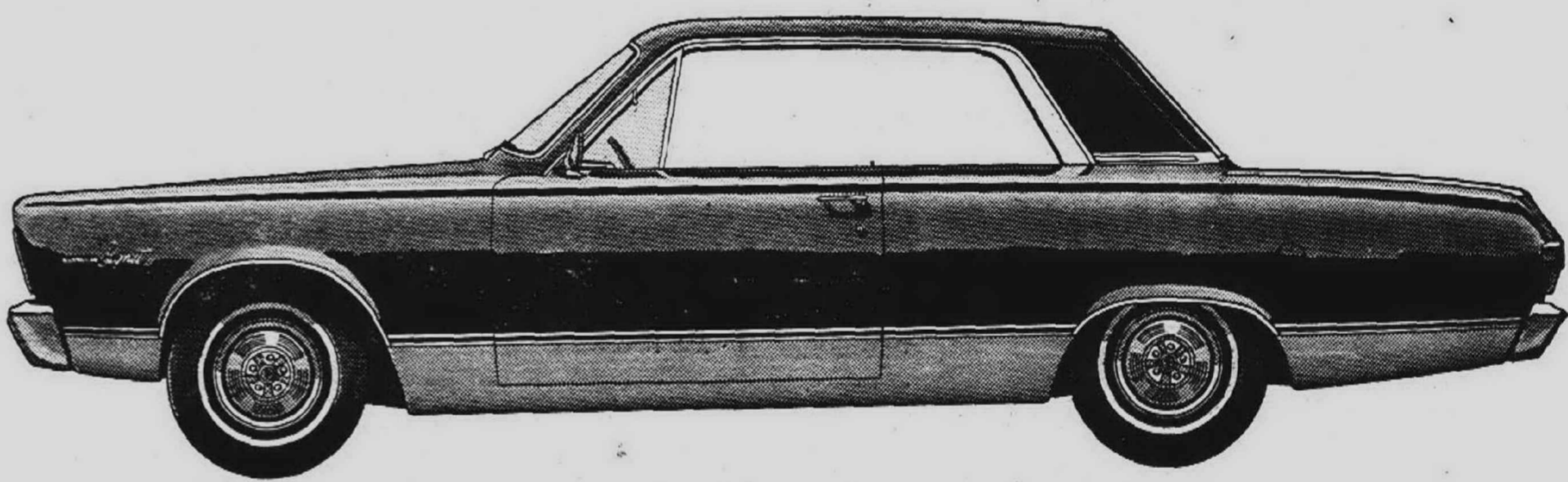
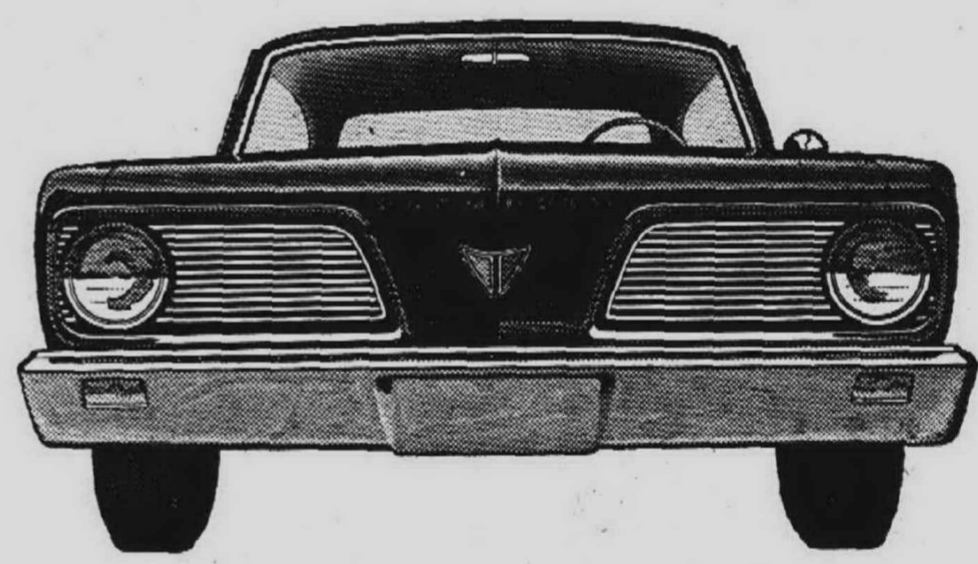

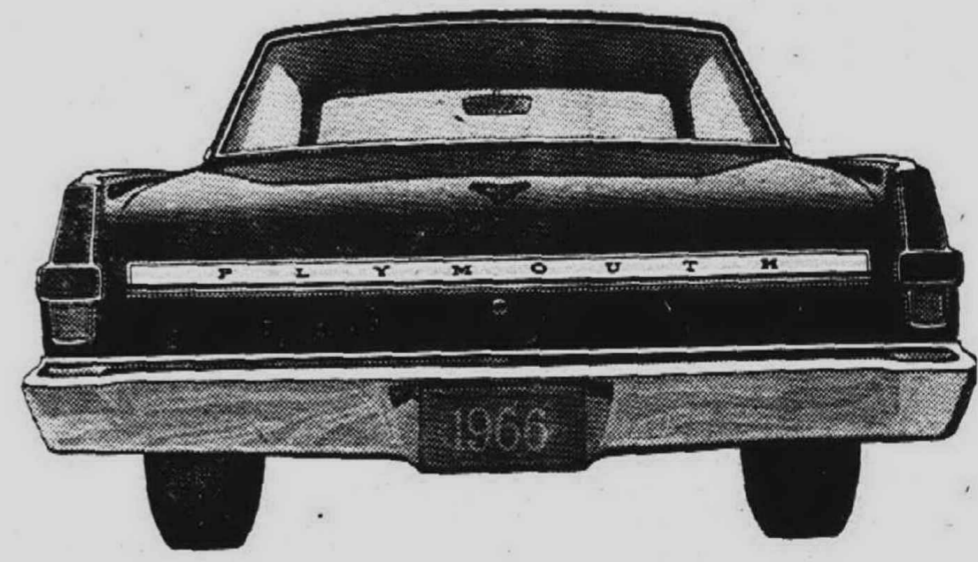

Symphony Plays Annual Yule Concert Sunday

Highlighted by the appearance of the Ann Arbor Cantata Singers and Record Society, the Plymouth Symphony Orchestra will present its traditional Christmas concert Sunday afternoon at 4 in the Plymouth High auditorium.

The concert, third of the Symphony's 20th season, stacks up as the best of the current series and is expected to attract a capacity attendance.

Conductor Wayne Dunlap has arranged an unusual program for the Christmas presentation, featuring the visitors from Ann Arbor and the orchestra's brass choir.

The Cantata Singers, a group of 30 voices under the direction of Richard Crawford, a member of the University of Michigan faculty, is considered one of the most outstanding ensembles of its kind in Michigan and are

much sought for concerts. Conductor Dunlap was fortunate to arrange for the appearance here.

The Ann Arbor Record Society was formed in 1954 to provide an opportunity for ensembles to play ancient instruments in the traditional chamber or drawing-room setting. It is now affiliated with the Ann Arbor Department of Parks and Recreation and in 1962 became a chapter of the National Recorder Society.

It has a membership of more than 30, all interested in reviewing the chamber instruments.

These include: the recorder, an end-blown wooden flute with a fipple (wood mouthpiece). It is in six sizes ranging from soprano, soprano, alto, tenor, bass and great bass with each having a two octave range.

Other instruments are: the Viol de Gambe, Krumphorn and the Harpsichord.

Most members of the Society play several instruments and often play the same composition, using varying instrumentation—as was the practice during the 15th and 16th centuries.

The complete program includes:

Ceremonial tower music with the brass choir and the Cantata Singers.

Selection of Christmas music from the 16th and 17th centuries by the Recorder Society and Singers.

Selections from the "Messiah" by the Singers.

Santa Claus Symphony, fourth movement.

Chorale, Prelude on Plain-song: "Veni, Sancte Spiritus."

Selections from the "Nutcracker Suite" by the orchestra.

And if you have children, members of Girl Scout Troop 253, under the leadership of Mrs. Clifford Wilkin and Mrs. William Baumgartner, will furnish a free babysitting service in room 106 at the high school.

The concerts are open to the public and all are invited to attend.

Plymouth Dept. Public Works

Inasmuch as the City budget doesn't include a provision for snow removal this winter, neither myself nor the Department of Public Works has any information at this time about snow removal from city sidewalks.

The Fulkerson firm, which had a contract for the work a year ago with the City, has indicated it has discontinued this type of work. The DPW is not aware of any other contractor handling this kind of work but a study is being made for a report in the near future.

Negligence on the part of the contractor, who had charge of installing instruments in the Mill Street water station, forced a DPW crew to work four hours on a Sunday to repair a 10-inch pipe that had worked loose in the basement of the pumping station.

The basement was entirely flooded and workers had to pump out the water before they could make the necessary repairs.

The department wishes to emphasize again that the new unit, which arrived recently, is used to pick up leaves but was not purchased for this sole purpose. It is primarily a catch basin cleaner but does have an attachment for leaf collection. The latter is just a secondary function.

During the past week, the Department built a gate well on Sheldon Road, repaired a broken six-inch water main on Harding, repaired a curb stop on Church St. and replaced a fire hydrant on Union St. that had been damaged in an auto accident.

Refuse work was continued at the Salem Refuse site. Christmas decorations were installed in Kellogg Park, including Santa's House, the Nativity Scene and lights all around the park.

Leaves were picked up for the final time of the year. The Department handled one funeral in Riverside Cemetery.

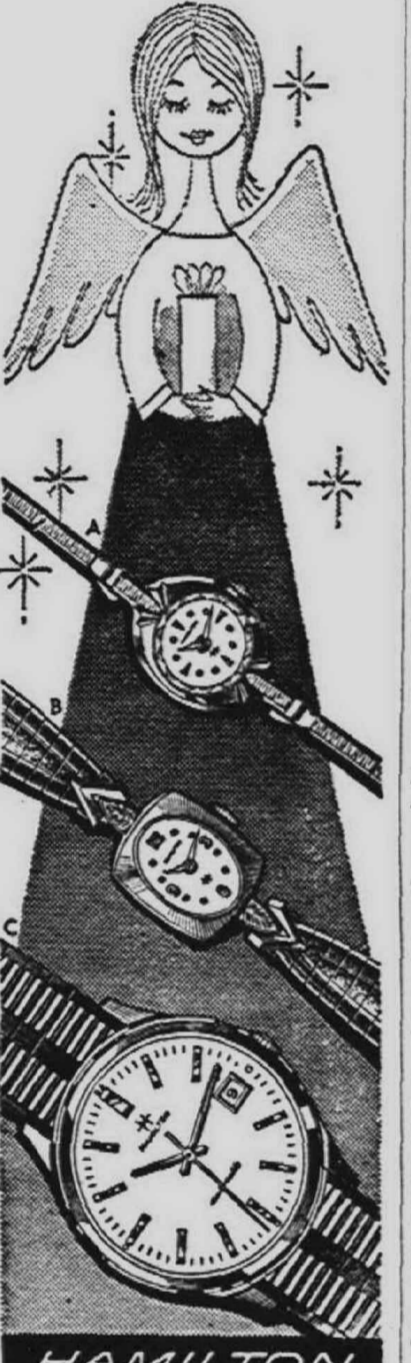

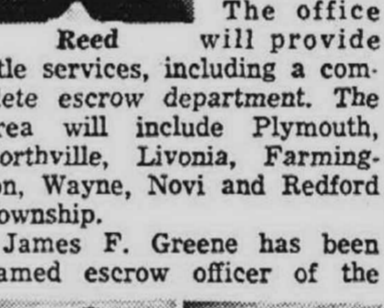

Schoolcraft To Resume Horse Course

With plans underway for registration of students for the winter semester, Schoolcraft College officials Monday announced that by popular request, the course in Horse Care and Farm Management will be offered for the second time during a winter session.

Students planning to register for the winter period, for both day and night classes, are being counseled now by personnel in the Office of Student Affairs.

Final registration for the semester, which runs from Jan. 6 through May 3, will be held on the campus during the days and evenings of Jan. 3, 4 and 5, according to Del Reed, director of the Evening College.

Classes are still open in most areas of instruction. In addition to the course on Horse Care, the classes in Accounting, Art, Business, Drafting, Electricity and Manufacturing Technology can accommodate additional students.

A large number of advanced classes in Mathematics, Science, English, Political Science and History are being offered for the first time at Schoolcraft Students who meet the necessary prerequisites and have been fully admitted to the college may still register for these classes.

Those planning to enroll for the winter term, who have not yet planned their schedule with a counselor, are requested to do so during the next few weeks. The deadline for counseling students is Dec. 23.

More than 2,500 were enrolled at Schoolcraft in day and evening classes during the Fall semester. It is anticipated an equal number will register for the winter term. Additional information is available in the office of Student Affairs at the college.

State Troopers Arrest 17,065 In October

Michigan State Police officers made 17,065 arrests in October, 15,335 for traffic offenses and 1,730 on criminal complaints, according to the department's monthly activity report.

In addition, 546 juvenile traffic offenders were arrested and 592 delinquent and two wayward minors apprehended.

Troopers assisted 4,852 motorists, investigated 8,910 cars, issued 22,154 oral warnings to drivers, and made 16,462 property and 2,606 liquor inspections.

Department vehicles traveled 1,905,477 miles, of which 1,012,228 were on traffic patrol and 739,249 to investigate criminal and other offenses.

The identification bureau received 14,271 sets of fingerprints, of which 7,600 were criminal and 6,671 noncriminal. Four wanted persons were identified.

Of 3,394 applicants for permits to carry concealed weapons, 427 were identified with criminal records, through their fingerprints. Two unknown dead were identified by the same means.

The scientific crime laboratory conducted 893 examinations, of which 599 were on questioned documents, 158 on firearms, 54 microscopic, 21 botanical, 18 on tool markings, 17 on glass, 10 on explosives and 16 miscellaneous.
