Spice CABINET

SCALLOPED POTATOES
3 medium-sized potatoes, pared and sliced
1 tablespoon flour
1 teaspoon salt
Pepper to taste
1 cup hot milk
1 tablespoon margarine

Put a layer of potatoes in a greased baking dish and sprinkle with some of the flour, salt, and pepper. Repeat until all the potatoes are used. Pour milk over potatoes and dot with the fat. Cover and bake at 325-degrees (slow oven) for 30 minutes. Remove cover and continue baking until potatoes are tender—about 30 minutes. If potatoes are not brown enough on top, place the uncovered dish under the broiler for 3 to 5 minutes.

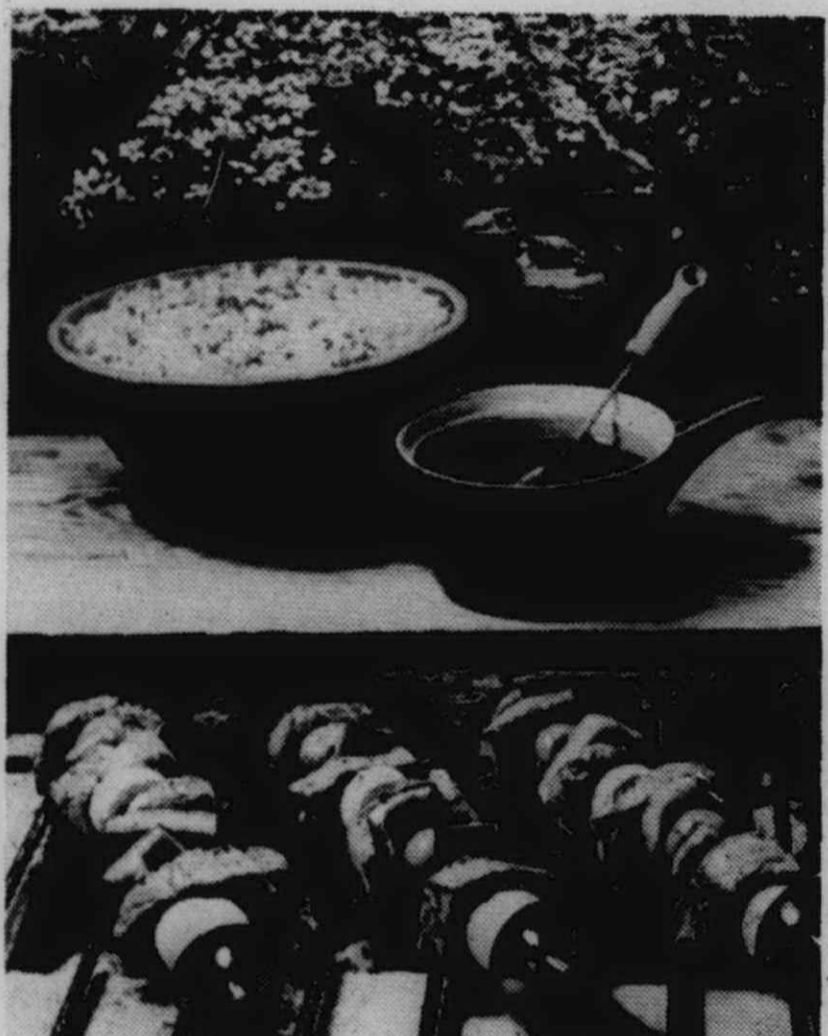
SODA BREAD
4 cups sifted flour
3 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon soda
1 cup raisins
1 tablespoon caraway seeds
1 3/4 cups buttermilk
1/4 cup cooking oil

Resift flour with baking powder, salt and soda. Toss in raisins and caraway seeds. Add buttermilk and cooking oil. Mix just enough to moisten dry ingredients. Shape dough into two mounds on greased baking sheet. Cut deep cross in top of each loaf with sharp knife. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) 50 minutes. Makes 2 loaves.

INTERESTING OLD HOUSES

Vallier home: one house out of two

What used to be one of the large farms of the area is now right in the heart of town. The house on the corner of Penniman and Evergreen is now owned by the A. E. Valliers and still has a barn in the back yard. The lot is almost an acre. The back part of the lot is used as a playground by the children of the area. Mrs. Vallier says that she is sure many children live nearby and play on this lot for years without ever realizing it isn't a public playground. The house, probably built around 1865, has an intriguing mystery connected with it. From the construction it is possible to see that it was once two houses. The ceilings in one half of the house are even a different height than those in the other half. No one, however, seems to know when the two houses were moved together. Nor is there any record in official documents of when this took place. The original deed for the land was filed by an Eli C. Mathews in 1825. Ebenezer J. Penniman owned it in 1845. Since then it has changed hands many times.

Daniel Myers, who owned it in 1865, was probably the builder of the house that stands today. With the coming of more people to Plymouth the days of the farm were numbered. A Miller family who owned it in the early part of the century began to slowly subdivide it. In 1936 Thomas Moss, the same architect who did the Moehle house, remodeled the house for some people named Bolton. The wiped pine woodwork that Mr. Moss installed is in perfect keeping with the style of the house. Most of the antiques Mrs. Vallier uses were originally in her family. One of these is a chest owned by Johanna Ahr, her great-grandmother, which was built in 1850. Wall paper is used extensively throughout the house. The

paper in the den is adorned with pineapple an early symbol for hospitality. In redoing the upstairs Mr. Moss compensated for the different size ceilings with a jog in the stairs. The Valliers have since added on to the house. As Mrs. Vallier explains an old house always seems to have little corners to build on to. They live with their two daughters in this comfortable shaded house. Their older daughter June goes to Smith College, and 17 year old Mary is visiting friends in Germany this summer. Mrs. Vallier is very active in community affairs, being on the board for the Northwest Child Guidance Clinic, a member of AAUW and the Plymouth Panhellenic Association.

Swingers on the court from tennis anyone to tennis everyone

The loudspeaker calls out a name.

A girl nervously grips her tennis racquet and starts for the court. She is one of many girls who are playing in tennis tournaments throughout the country, such as the Michigan State JayCee tournament recently held in Plymouth. These tournaments are held all summer long, and there are so many of them that they have to be scheduled by the U.S. Lawn Tennis Association in order to have as few conflicts as possible. Some of the girls at the JayCee tournament came to Plymouth on Friday, after finishing a tournament in Ohio on Thursday. They were then planning to start a new tournament on Sunday, another on Tuesday and so on through the summer. All this is a far cry from the early times when tennis was strictly a sport for royalty. Modern tennis was first introduced in Wales by a Major Wingfield, at a garden party in 1873.

Women quickly became involved in the game, both for fun and for contests. Women like Alice Marble, Helen Wills, and Maureen Connolly became well known. Today the girls are starting younger and working harder. Some of the girls who were in Plymouth for the tournament were coached by Mr. and Mrs. Hoxie in Hamtramck. Hamtramck and Detroit where the Hoxies' work is becoming one of the best known tennis areas in the world. People have come from as far away as Israel and Venezuela to work at the Hoxie Tennis House in Detroit.

Emily Fisher, one of the winners in the JayCee tournament, lives in Bloomfield Hills and studies with the Hoxies. She practices every day from early spring until late fall in Hamtramck Park. Fourteen-year-old Emily has been playing tennis for five years and began tournament play after one year of regular playing. Emily, the daughter of the Herbert Fishers, goes to Kingswood School Cranbrook. She plans to play in tournaments all summer long and hopes when she is older to be able to play at Wimbledon or Forest Hills.

Plums Bartkowitz, younger sister of the well known Peaches Bartkowitz, is only eleven years old. However, she has been playing tennis since she was five. The day before coming to the JayCee tournament, Plums, along with Emily, was a member of the Southeastern Michigan team which won first place at the Whiteman Cup Tournament in Middletown, Ohio.

Another member of the team was Gloria Novitsky also of Hamtramck. Seventeen-year-old Gloria has been playing tennis since she was seven. Because her birthday falls in August this is the last year Gloria can play in the eighteen and under group. So she feels it will probably be her last year for tournament tennis. Explaining why she didn't want to go on to play in the women's events, she said: "You've got to do other things — go to school, get a job. There just isn't time for tournament tennis. Oh sure, maybe you go out and swing your racquet for fun, but that's all." All the girls who worked under the Hoxies felt they wouldn't be such dedicated tennis players if it weren't for their coaches.

A different type of tennis player than advocated by the hard driving Hoxies and closer to a picture of the average tennis player is Melaine Morrison of East Lansing. Although Melaine loves tennis she doesn't plan to enter too many tournaments this summer. She is too busy teaching tennis to younger children at school recreation program in East Lansing. Her parents were the first to encourage Melaine to take an interest in the game. However, they are more interested in following Melaine than the sport itself. Now seventeen, Melaine has been playing since she was 11 or 12. Melaine entered her first tournament after she had only been playing a few weeks because her coach thought it would be good experience. Much to her surprise she won. From then she was hooked and has played in matches ever since. She enjoys the excitement of going to tournaments away from home. Participants in these events always come with a chaperon from home. Housing is also arranged for the girls. This was the first time Melaine stayed with someone she didn't know, but the importance of the match overshadowed any feeling of strangeness she might have otherwise have had. Melaine won her match on Thursday, but lost on Friday. However, she didn't leave for home, because as she put it: "I enjoy coming to state tournaments because of the high caliber of play. So even though I didn't win I want to stay through the finals."
