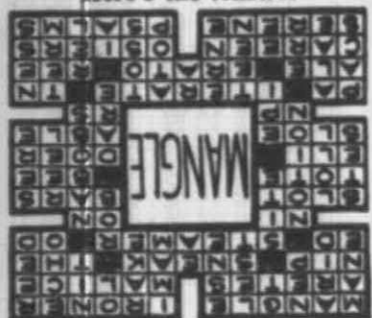

Youngsters get the chair - dental, that is - in PCF plan

Dental drills and impression plaster may not "send" kids like cokes and record hops, but they are playing an important role in one of Plymouth County Fund's personal health services.
The Plymouth Dental Fund — a cooperative effort of some 19 dentists of that community — is providing care to school children of any age; children who come from medically-indigent families unable to pay for needed services.

According to Edward W. Schening, general campaign chairman, the Plymouth Dental Fund served 85 children in 1965, and it is apparent that a large number will receive needed treatments this year.
School Nurse Mrs. Virginia Gibson, 11636 Butternut, starts the child on the road to corrective dental work when she finds cases of need during the course of her daily health work. The 19 participating dentists contribute many hours at special, lowered fee rates.

These same families, and others, Mrs. Gibson explains, are economically deprived, and their names appear on the free textbook and free school rolls as well.
Fund chairman Schening, who is plant manager for the Burroughs Corporation in Plymouth, was interested to learn that last year's Dental Fund referrals were as follows: nine from high school, one from special education, 14 from Junior High West, 17 from Junior High East, and 44 from the elementary schools.
Nurse Gibson sees this as one of the practical programs made possible by citizens contributions to the Community Fund.

'Freeway ignores Twp. master plan'—Rozian

July 31, 1966
Dear Editor:
As a member and past chairman of the Plymouth Township Planning Commission, I would like to make known my views and some past history on the plans for the M-14 Expressway.

First of all, let me make clear that I am not a disinterested party. The route and interchange plan announced at last Thursday's meeting of the Plymouth Area Planning Commission may take some of my property or be immediately adjacent to it. However, that is to me a less important consideration than its effect upon the present residents and future development of Plymouth Township.

I pointed out that it was not yard clearances we were concerned about but the effect of plant location on the future expressway route. I asked Mr. McEwen if building permits had been issued without Planning Commission approval.

meanwhile, every property owner affected is frozen in uncertainty. He cannot build, nor develop, nor put in improvements, and he cannot sell without serious loss. The Township's development plans will also be confused and frustrated.
Furthermore, even the residents in areas of the Township not apparently affected should join the protest, since, if our Master Plan can be so easily ignored through private interest or administrative oversight it will have no force to protect the property rights and future plans of anyone.

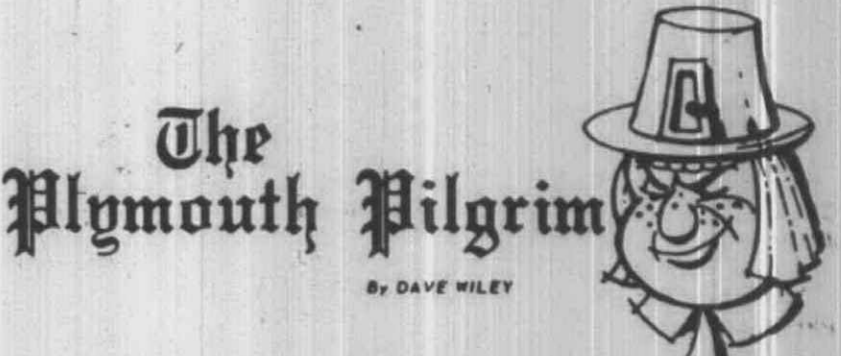

So many conflicting views of the world we inhabit are presented each day, that many of us run around in a kind of mass communication-invoked haze wondering if, in fact, REAL answers exist to the questions that confront us.

Well, actually, it all goes back to the New York mayoralty campaign when Buckley hammered out his impressive victory over former Congressman John Lindsay. It was at that period in time that Buckley discovered that he wasn't really a conservative at all.

Interesting houses

Architect lives in award winning house

"I like anything that's been done with taste and honesty", says Plymouth architect Trivador Balogh.

This description certainly fits his own award winning home. His house at 49800 Joy Road won the annual design award sponsored by "Progressive Architecture" magazine in 1957.

Situated in a beautiful woodland setting the house was designed in 1957 and started in 1959.

It is built mainly of natural wood which fits in to the setting. Large expanses of glass blend the outdoors with the inside of the house.

The Baloghs themselves cleared the land and did much of the work on their house.

According to Balogh he is still working on details such as wood trim around the windows.

Although the house is small the lavish use of windows gives it a feeling of spaciousness.

The livingroom has a ceiling two stories high, and one wall made entirely of glass. Due to the sloping site one looks out the window to see the tops of the trees.

The walls of the room are paneled with western red cedar from the floor to the 16 foot high ceiling. The wood, which does not have the pungent odor as the cedar used for closets, is in its natural finish, a subtle blending of shades of brown.

The kitchen which is set aside from the living dining area by a half wall is a compact and efficient work space. It is not large, but once again there is a feeling of spaciousness due to a floor to ceiling window which seems to bring the woods indoors.

The house was built before the Baloghs two daughters, Melissa and Margaret were born, and what was originally intended for a master bedroom has instead become their playroom. This room has whole walls of storage space.

The new master bedroom is on a balcony overlooking the livingroom. There are two outside balconies reached from this room.

The landscaping outside the house has been kept to a minimum to enhance the natural setting. The only things used are ground cover of myrtle and baltic ivy.

The natural wood finishes require treating every year. Mr. Balogh overcame the problem of reaching two stories high to do this by hiring a hydraulic

machine of the type used to work on power lines and worked in that.

In explaining his philosophy of architecture which he follows in building his and other houses, Mr. Balogh says:

"I don't believe in trickiness, but in valid architecture which considers people's problems, their site, and their budget."

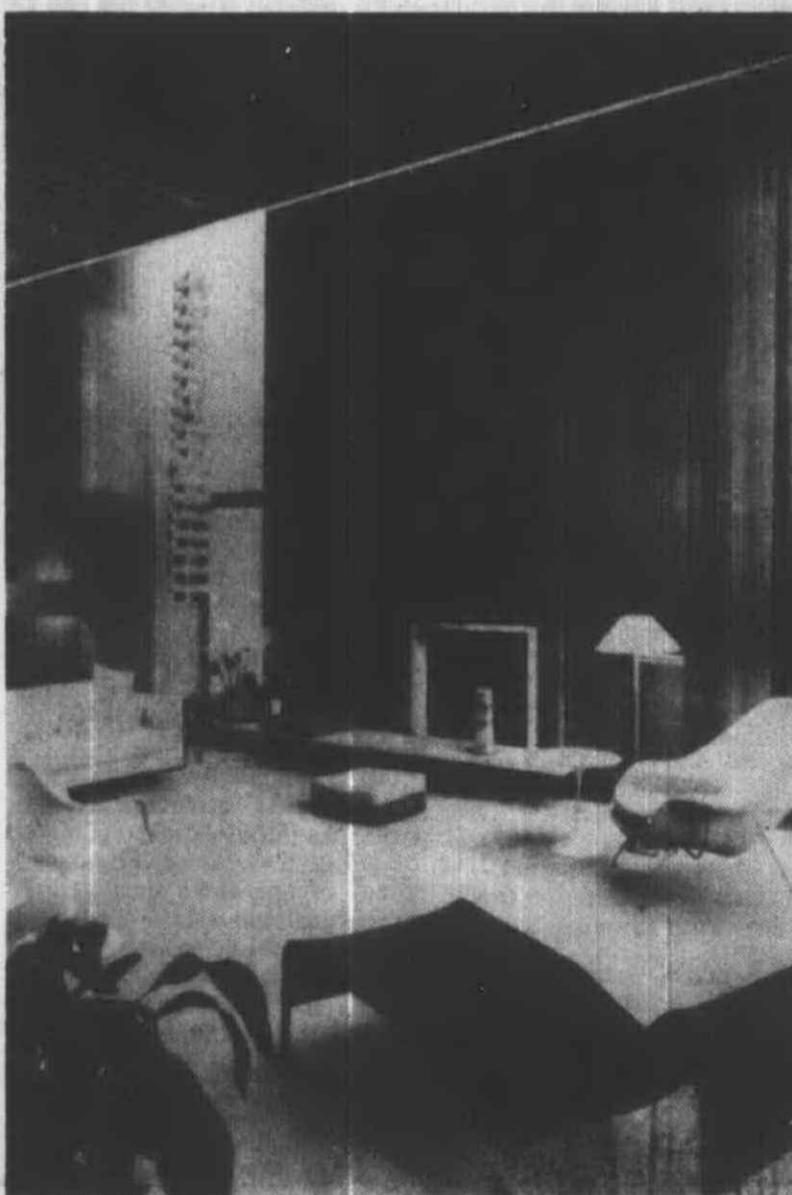

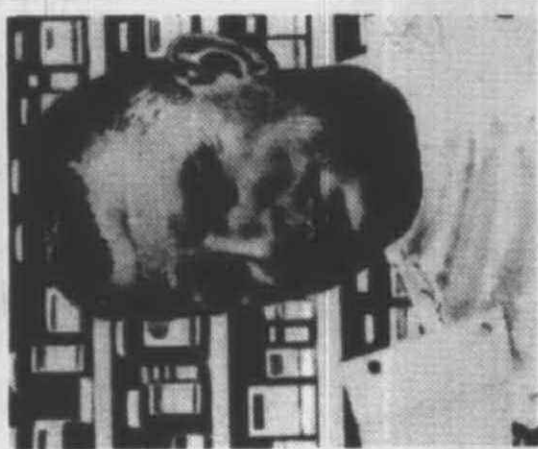

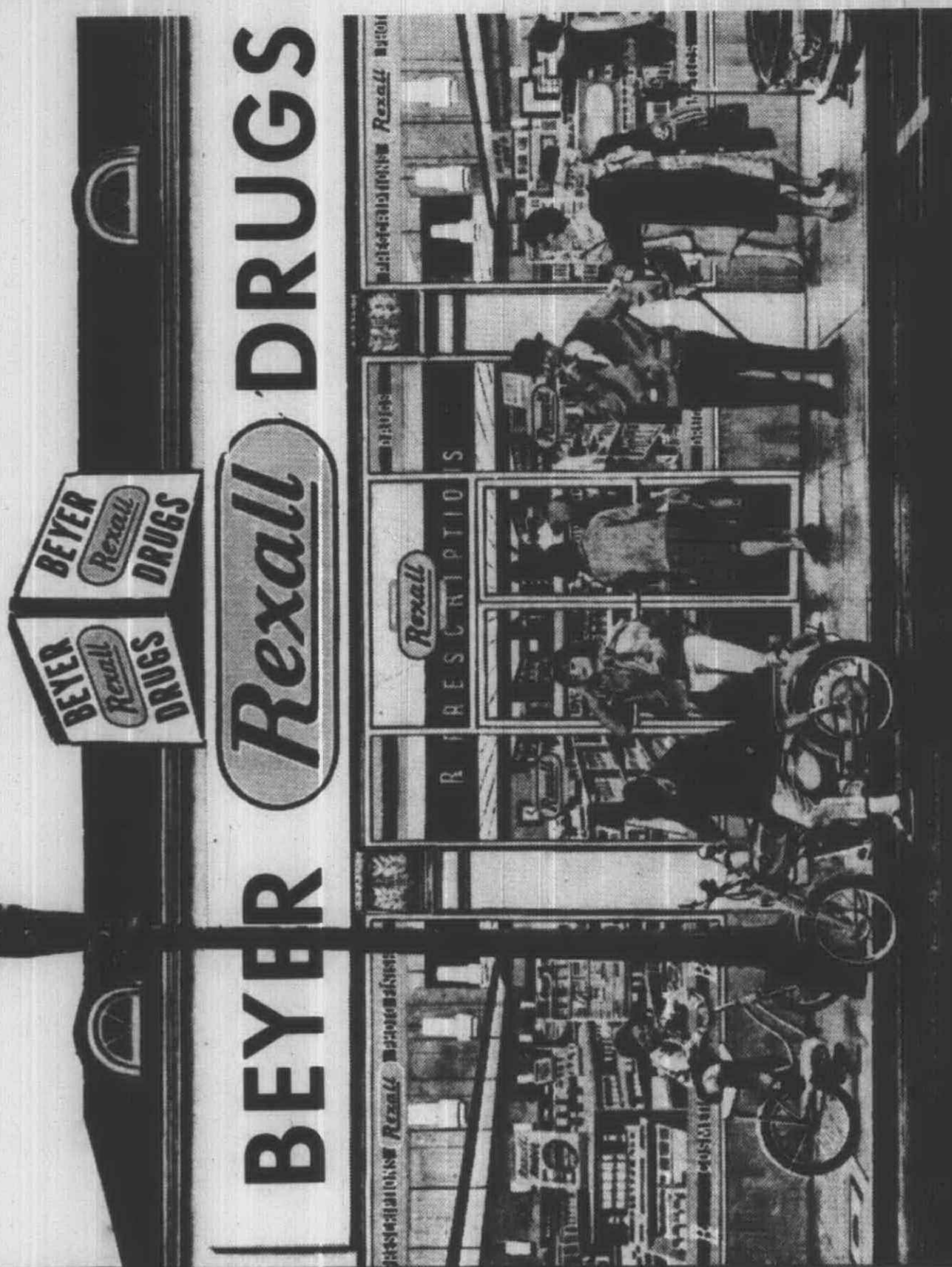

High school enrollments warn College of new boom

Enrollment figures from the seven high schools in the Schoolcraft College district tell an eloquent story of steady growth in the years ahead for the two-year old college. For example, if all of the June 1966, high school graduates in

the district were to enroll at Schoolcraft next month, the Freshman class alone would top out at 2,662 students.

District high school students have first call on Schoolcraft facilities. When Schoolcraft opened its doors in August, 1964, it admitted 2,020 students in day and evening classes. All were freshmen. Last August, the school's total enrollment was 2,504 students.

BUT THE 1966 high school graduating class is only the beginning. On the basis of enrollment figures assembled in a recently completed survey conducted by college officials, district high schools will graduate 3,034 pupils in June, 1967 - all of them eligible for enrollment at Schoolcraft.

And the 1968 graduating class from the seven high schools will be 3,457 pupils.

The survey was conducted by the college to assist in planning

for the future as the college grows and continues to meet the educational and cultural needs of the district. The college now anticipates an enrollment in excess of 5,000 by 1970. High school authorities were asked to provide actual enrollment figures for graduating seniors, 11th graders and 10th graders as of June.

HERE IS the statistical breakdown by school district:

Clarenceville: 149 graduating seniors, 157 11th graders, 193 10th graders.

Garden City: West High - 284 graduates, 335 11th graders, 381 10th graders; East High - 238 graduates, 314 11th graders, 379 10th graders.

Livonia: Bentley High - 696 graduates; Franklin High, 717 graduates; total 11th graders, 1,600; total 10th graders, 1,800.

Northville: 197 graduates, 205 11th graders, 260 10th graders.

Plymouth: 394 graduates, 423 11th graders, 444 10th graders.

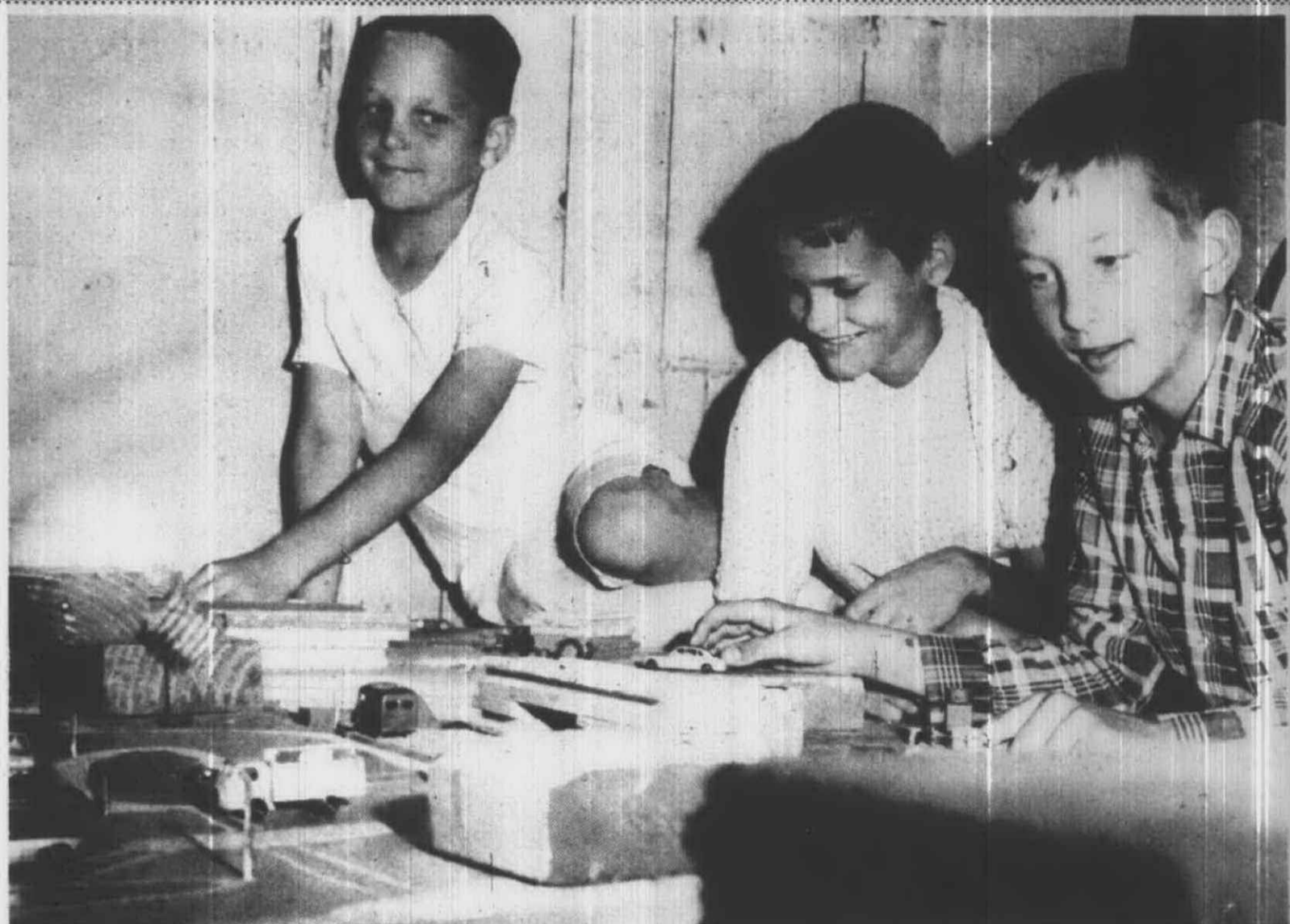
A drug store, a dime store, a bakery, a television store, a car dealership and a furniture store all appear in miniature.

Schoolcraft nurses find jobs aplenty

National survey shows Plymouth family earnings above average

A new area-by-area survey of business activity in the United States stamps Plymouth as a vigorous, expanding market with family earnings and expenditures above average.

This vitality is reflected in the volume of business that was done by local retail stores in the past year.

The figures detailing this are presented by Sales Management in its new "Survey of Buying Power," a copyrighted report that covers every part of the country.

IT SHOWS that residents of Plymouth had a record amount of money at their disposal during the year.

Their net income, after payment of personal taxes, came to \$34,541,000, topping the previous year's \$31,237,000.

It was equivalent to net earnings per household of \$11,142, a figure arrived at by dividing the total income locally by the number of households.

potential, is indicated in the survey by means of a "quality of Market" index. It takes into consideration such factors as per capita income, population, volume of spending and the like.

Plymouth is given an index rating of 169, or 69 percent

above the national average.

Thus far this year, a University of Michigan survey shows, people generally have become somewhat more restrained in their spending. Cited as reasons are inflation, falling stock prices, higher interest rates and the prospect of tax increases.

This was more money than was available to people in most sections of the United States after taking care of their tax obligations. The average was \$7,989 per household. In the State of Michigan it was \$9,068.

With the boom still going strong, the employment situation improving and nothing in sight to cause concern, economically, local residents indulged in large-scale spending for all kinds of goods and services.

They bought more automobiles, more household appliances, more books, fancy foods, clothing and furniture than ever before.

As a result, retail sales were at a high level in the year. Most local merchants were able to post new highs as the overall sales volume reached \$35,792,000.

THE FACT that sales locally were greater than earnings indicates that some of the buying was done by non-resident shoppers.



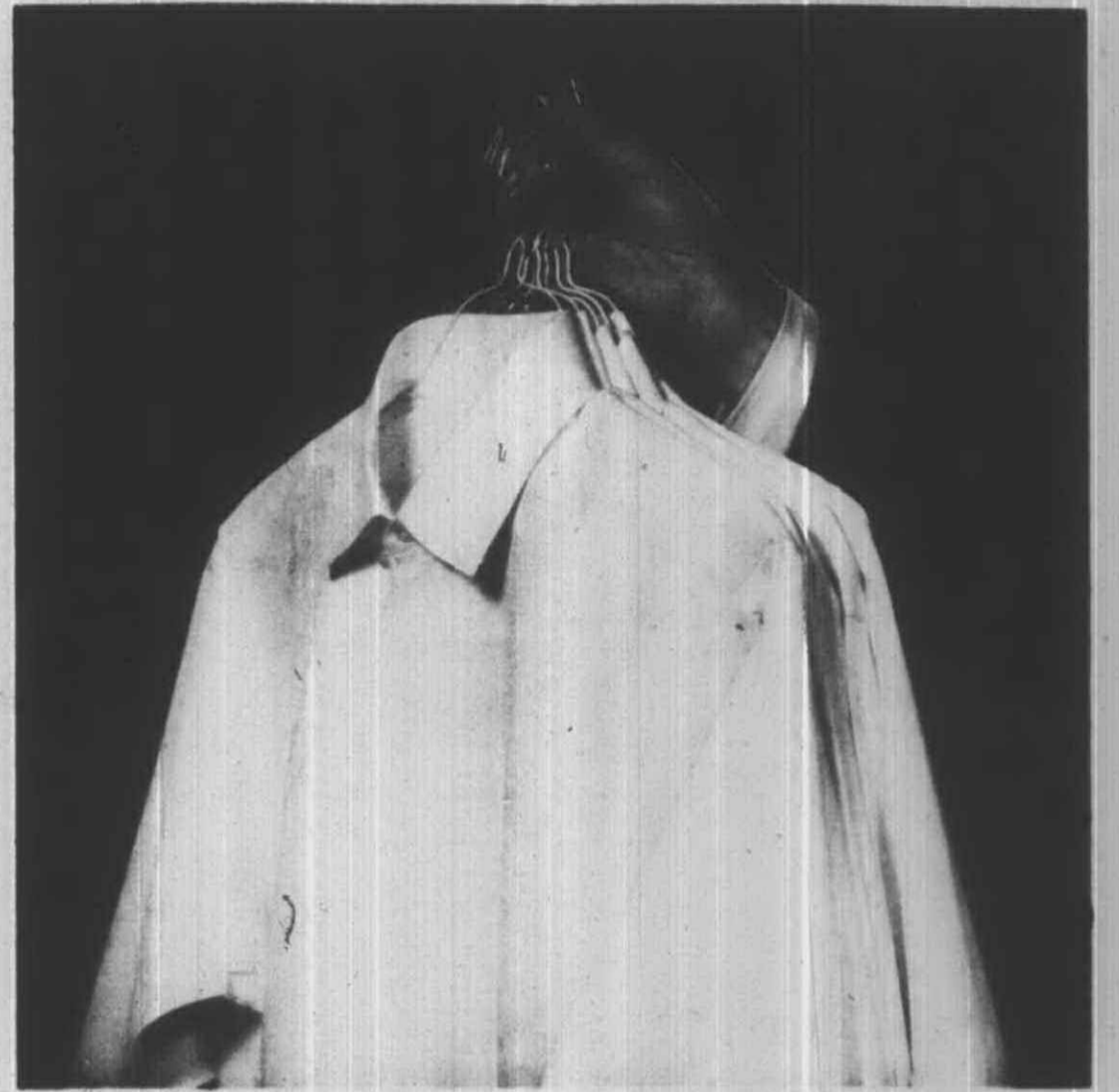

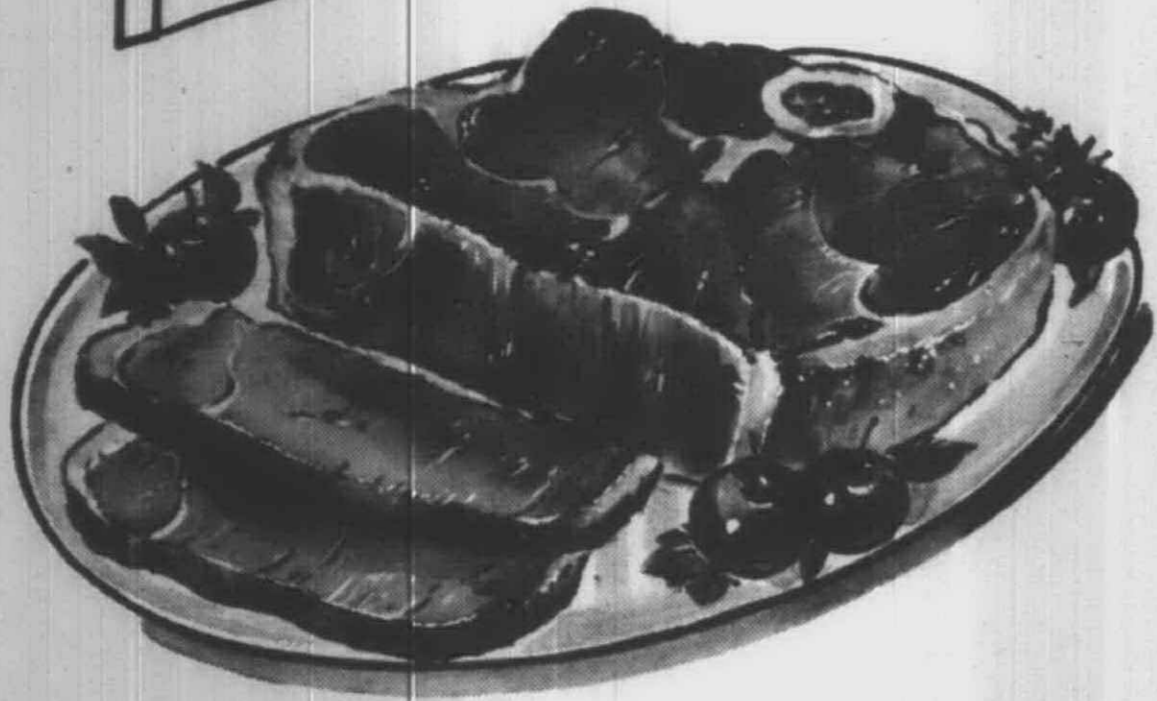

Tips from the STOP & SHOP CHEF Questions & Answers

Sometimes when one mixes together rice and meat for peppers or cabbage leaves, the result is a heavy stuffing. Can this be prevented?
