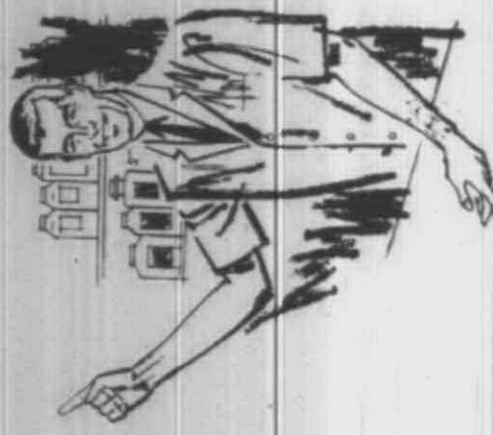

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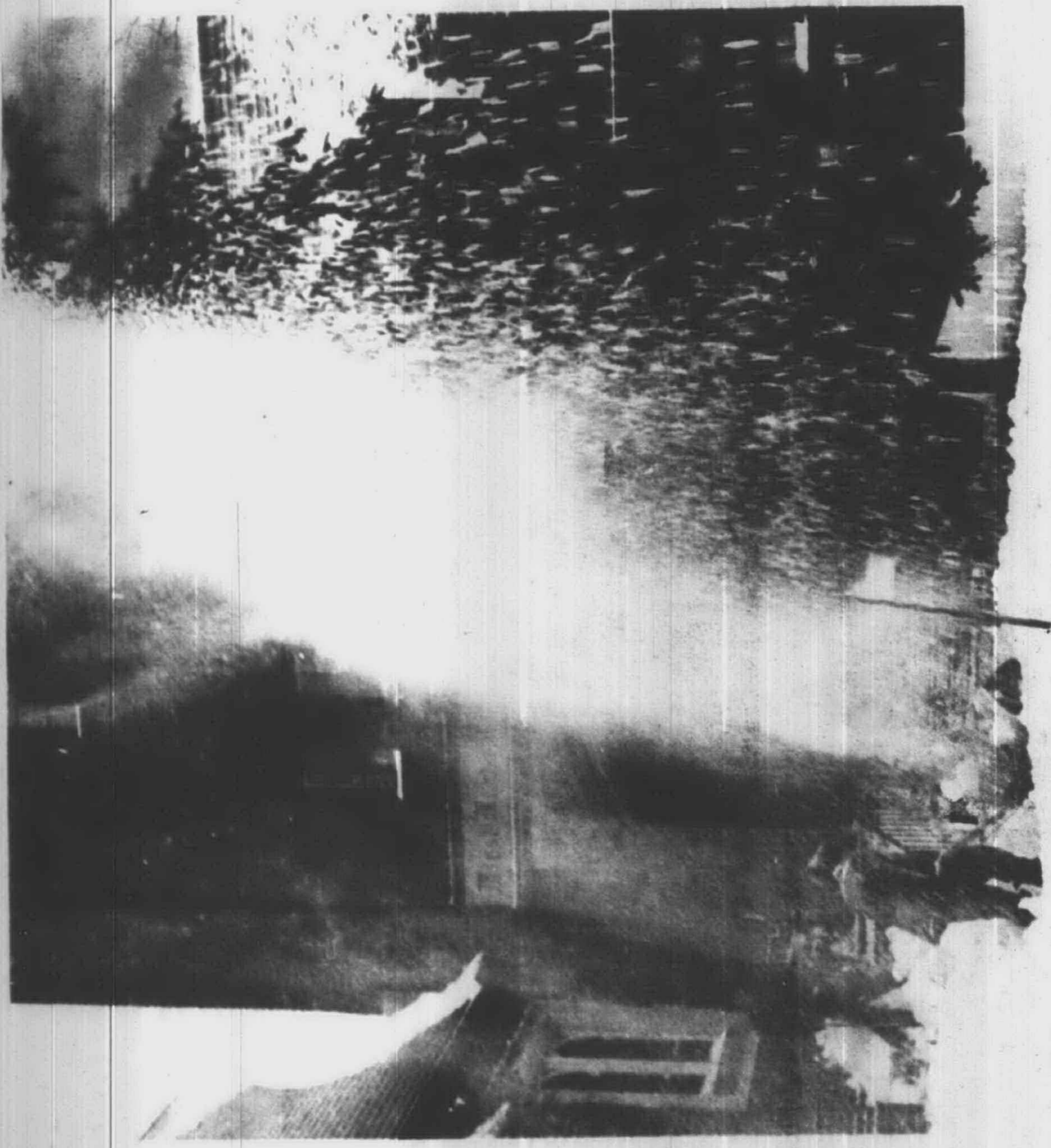

# Schoolcraft College Launches Annual Business Seminar

The second annual Schoolcraft College Small Business Management Seminar for owners and managers will begin Monday night, Fred Stefanski, director of the evening college, has announced.

Seminar sessions will be held weekly from 7 to 9:30 p.m. on Mondays in the faculty dining room in the Waterman Campus Center. Fee for the 10-week course is \$40.

The seminar is offered by Schoolcraft College in cooperation with the Small Business Administration, and chambers of commerce of Garden City, Livonia, Northville and Plymouth.

## Fund Pays 740 Auto Claims

LANSING -- A total of 740 claims amounting to nearly \$310,000 were paid out of the state's Motor Vehicle Accident Claims Fund during its first year of operation, Secretary of State James M. Hare has disclosed.

In addition, Hare said, 1,267 claims had been closed for varying reasons which did not involve payments out of the Fund, bringing to 2,000 the number of claims closed which were handled by Fund officials.

Hare reported a "healthy reserve which totaled \$2,175,000 at the end of the year, covering all unpaid claims which are now on file. Of the more than \$300,000 already paid out ... more than two thirds ... was for property damage settlements, with nearly \$99,000 going for bodily injury claims.

Hare explained that personal injury claims were "by far

the most expensive, but that it generally took much longer to process these claims than for those involving property damage. It's certain that bodily injury claims would pass property damage settlements before too long.

A breakdown of the 1,267 claims which had been closed for other reasons was listed by Hare.

They included 158 claims settled between motorists; 386 claims in which the claimant recovered damages from his insurance company; 202, found to have uninsured motorist coverage through private policies; 220, which had less than the \$200 in property damage necessary to qualify to claim against the Fund; 36 drivers who could not collect because of contributory negligence in the accident; 124, whose claims were denied; and 141, closed for other reasons.

Claims settled outside the Fund totaled nearly \$557,000, Hare said.

## Insurance Firm Adds Five Additional States

Alexander Hamilton Life Insurance Company of America has been granted a license to do business in five additional states. This brings to 23 the total number of states in which the 32-month old Plymouth, company has been granted a certificate of authority to do business.

New states in order of licensing are Mississippi, Massachusetts, Iowa, Ohio, and Vermont.

At present the company operates sales offices in only the states of Michigan and Indiana.

E. Keith Owens, Chairman of the Board, announced that the company's marketing department was now finalizing plans to begin immediate insurance sales operations in two neighboring states, with additional states being opened throughout the balance of the year.

The Fund operation is a large administrative setup, Hare said. "Our people must handle thousands of phone inquiries, answer a like number of letters and other correspondence, and handle and file countless papers, several for each active file."

Strong Come-Back Pays Off Again

Rocks Again Show Improvement

After having Friday's home game with Allen Park delayed by the year's heaviest snowfall, Plymouth High's much improved basketballers made it two straight victories when they whipped Farmington, 61-57, in a Saturday afternoon contest at Farmington.

It was the first daylight game of the season for Plymouth. Matter of fact it was a test of daylight games by Farmington officials. It didn't work out so well due to the effects of Thursday's blizzard.

Farmington, originally, was slated to battle strong Pontiac Northern Friday night but that game, like 80 per cent of those in the Lower Peninsula, was postponed because of road conditions.

Thus most Farmington fans figured the Plymouth game would be delayed. The fact that it was played and Farmington lost, probably will shock a good many fans from that place.

Likewise, Plymouth's boosters were noticeable by their absence--either they weren't interested in a Saturday afternoon game or they thought the Rocks would be idle for the entire weekend due to the heavy snow.

The handful of spectators, from both cities, who appeared were treated to a thriller that found the Rocks piling up a four point advantage in the final three minutes and holding it to the final whistle.

The victory gave Plymouth a record of four and four and enabled the Blue to end the first semester in the same style they

started the season--with a pair of victories.

Plymouth beat Walled Lake and Stevenson in its first two games, then lost four in a row, and came back to win twice in succession over Redford Union and Farmington.

Plymouth faces its stiffest home assignment of the season Friday when it entertains the league leading Bentley quintet. The program opens at 6:45 p.m. in a meeting of the junior varsity teams.

The swimmers will travel to Livonia Thursday evening for a 7 o'clock duel with Bentley.

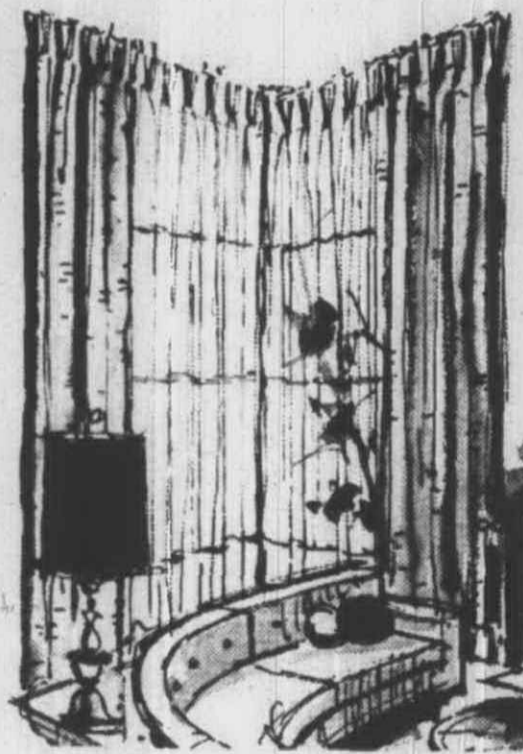

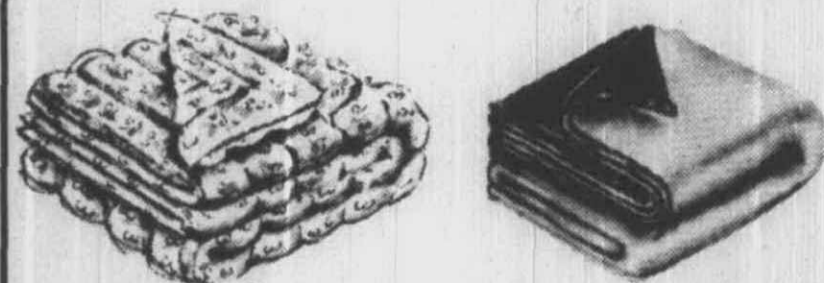

It wasn't the condition of the highways that caused the postponement of the Allen Park-Plymouth basketball game in Plymouth Friday and the swim meet between the same schools at Allen Park.

John Sandmann, Plymouth's director of athletics, contacted Allen Park officials early Friday morning and told them Plymouth was prepared to fulfill both engagements.

"The roads in this section are clear, traffic is moving at a near normal rate and the streets in the City of Plymouth are wide open," he told the Allen Park officials.

But the Allen Park Board of Education has a rule that makes it mandatory that no school activities will go on if the schools are closed. It was impossible to get students to classes, the buildings were closed and all sports events had to be postponed.

It was a bitter blow to Coach Dick Bearup and his cagers who appear ready to tackle anything in the Suburban Six League right now. The Rocks had ambitions of recording their second league triumph.

However, they continued to show improvement in Saturday's game against Farmington in a trial afternoon contest.

making sure of their shots and had Bentley on the ropes for a while. Then came the blowup and the resultant one-sided defeat.

Industrial Factors Important To Area

What attracts a company to a suburban community? Many things, according to State Representative James Tierney, who served last year as Chairman of the House Economic Development Committee.
A former two-term mayor of Garden City, Tierney's district in the House of Representatives includes Garden City, Plymouth, and most of the north half of Westland.
The factors which attract industry to a community are:
1. A favorable tax rate. This is best shown in the difference between Garden City, which has 95 per cent of its tax base in single-family homes, and Livonia, which has half of its base in industrial plants, not to mention a \$500,000 annual income from the Detroit Race Course.
2. A full-time administrator, either a mayor or city manager.
3. Good management on the part of the general administration of city operations.
4. Fiscal reform on the state level to relieve the tax burden in suburban school districts.



In Garden City's local circumstances, Tierney pointed out that a revised or new city charter is needed to obtain a full-time mayor. On the plus side of the picture, Garden City is closer to its saturation point in development than most other cities. The city has an estimated 42,000 residents with the ultimate figure to be 45,000. In addition, the public school enrollment increases in Garden City are expected to gradually decline after 1988 while other districts will be experiencing increases. A full-time mayor or city manager would also be able to go out and seek industrialists to the city and represent the community in seeking any state and federal funds. Tierney pointed out that his Economic Development Committee in the House sponsored a bill which enables cities to use the Revenue Bond Act to finance machinery and equipment for new plants. Canadians Leading Users of Telephones

There were 195.3 million telephones in the world on the first of this year, the American Telephone and Telegraph Company reported. The world's 200 millionth telephone went into service sometime in the middle of this year.

The increase during 1965 was 12.8 million, the largest gain ever recorded in a single year. As world-wide growth in telephones continues, the use of telephones for overseas calling is climbing dramatically. There were 8.1 million calls between the U.S. and overseas points during the year ending January 1, 1966, a total of 26 per cent greater than the previous year's. The growth is attributed to the rapid expansion of high-quality facilities in the decade since the first transatlantic telephone cable was laid in 1956, and to new convenience and speed in making overseas calls. Operator dialing greatly reduces calling time for many calls, and even faster connections are just over the horizon. In 1966 for the first time customers could dial their own overseas calls to the Virgin Islands. Customer dialing of calls to Europe was demonstrated earlier this year. The introduction of direct overseas dialing on a regular basis between points in the U.S. and Europe is expected to begin in 1970. The figures are from "The World's Telephones 1966," a collection of world-wide telephone statistics released by AT&T. All data is as of January 1, 1966, since it takes almost a year to compile the figures from telephone administrations and operating companies around the world. "The World's Telephones" reveals that Canadians retain their title as the people who do the most talking on the telephone, averaging 635.6 conversations per person. The United States is challenging Canada for the title. The new figures show 620 conversations for every person in the U.S., up from 591 a year earlier and nosing out the Virgin Islands for second place. The United States, with 93.7 million telephones, has just under 48 per cent of the world total. Second place is held by Japan, with 14 million telephones, followed by the United Kingdom.

In a similar survey a year ago 64 percent were bullish about 1966, while only 7 percent were pessimistic. Last April a survey showed 84 percent optimistic. The rate of improvement this year will be more laborious and at a slower rate than 1966 and the "rosy glow" will tend to fade as this year wears on, the purchasing executives said. They believe, however, that inflationary pressures should ease this year but profit margins will be slimmer. Capital investment growth will slow sharply in 1967, according to the survey. Members who reported expansion spending for next year slipped to 34 percent from 66 percent in the last survey. Those predicting a smaller outlay this year rose to 36 percent from 16 percent a year earlier. Rising price trends will continue in the first half of this year, members said.

LANSING---The 1967 Official Michigan Highway Map will be off the press soon, the State Highway Commission reported. It will be ready for distribution about mid-February. The cover of this year's map honors the University of Michigan on its 150th anniversary and the Mackinac Bridge on its 10th anniversary. A photo of the University of Michigan's Burton Carillon Tower appears on the front cover of the map while a night-time picture of "Big Mac" appears on the back cover. CYO Cage Loop Hits Record of 463 Team

The Catholic Youth Organization's interscholastic basketball program stands at an all-time high with an enrollment of 463 teams in five leagues---three for girls and two for boys. In addition, the CYO conducts a teen club league comprising seven (7) parishes, bringing the total to 470. These leagues have shown a total increase of 26 teams this winter over the previous all-time high, which was attained last season. The grade school boys basketball league is the biggest interscholastic circuit in Michigan-- and one of the biggest in the nation-- with 174 teams active in 22 divisions.

The girls cage program is also tops in the state with 193 teams, in its three leagues. The high school girls loop has 33 teams, the junior varsity circuit has 46 and the grade school girls league has 94 schools. The sixth grade boys league has 96 teams, an increase of 14 clubs from last year. Athletic Director, Frank Connolly, estimates that the league has more than 10,000 boys and girls under contract. The grade school and sixth grade boys leagues began competition early in December. The girls leagues opened early in January. Connolly estimates that more than 2,500 basketball games will be played in CYO league competition this season.

Extend Time To Apply For Tech Training

LANSING---The deadline for applying to take an examination for the State Highway Commission's Student Technician Training Program has been extended two weeks to Feb. 8. Any high school graduate under 41 years of age including those who will graduate this June may apply to take the exam which will be given February 25. Applications are available from any high school counselor, County Clerks, offices of the Michigan Employment Security Commission, the Michigan Civil Service Commission in Lansing and all Highway Department District and Project offices as well as Travel Information Centers.

GM to Hold '67 Detroit Meeting

The 1967 annual meeting of General Motors stockholders will be held at 2 p.m. on Friday, May 19, at Cobo Hall, Detroit, the corporation's board of directors announced today. The 1967 session will be the 59th annual meeting of GM shareholders, and will be the third consecutive year that the GM shareholder meeting will have been held in Detroit. More than 1,800 shareholders and their guests attended the meeting last year in Detroit. Detroit is one of General Motors' principal centers of operation. More than 9 per cent of GM's 1,400,000 holders of approximately 285,000,000 shares of outstanding common stock live in Michigan.

Uncertainty To Hurt Michigan's Economy

EAST LANSING---Consumers are hardening their attitudes against buying because of current economic uncertainty, and this will hurt Michigan's economy in 1967, predicts the director of Michigan State University's Bureau of Business and Economic Research. Dr. Leo Erickson says there is a growing consumer refusal to buy durable goods such as autos, appliances and furniture, all of which are vital to the state's economy. The present consumer attitude against buying is because of a low level of confidence in the Johnson administration, he says. Writing in the Michigan State Economic Record, Dr. Erickson notes: "A part of the explanation for pessimism by the consumer is that even though he knows he has taken home more dollars, he can buy less with them; so he's not much better off."

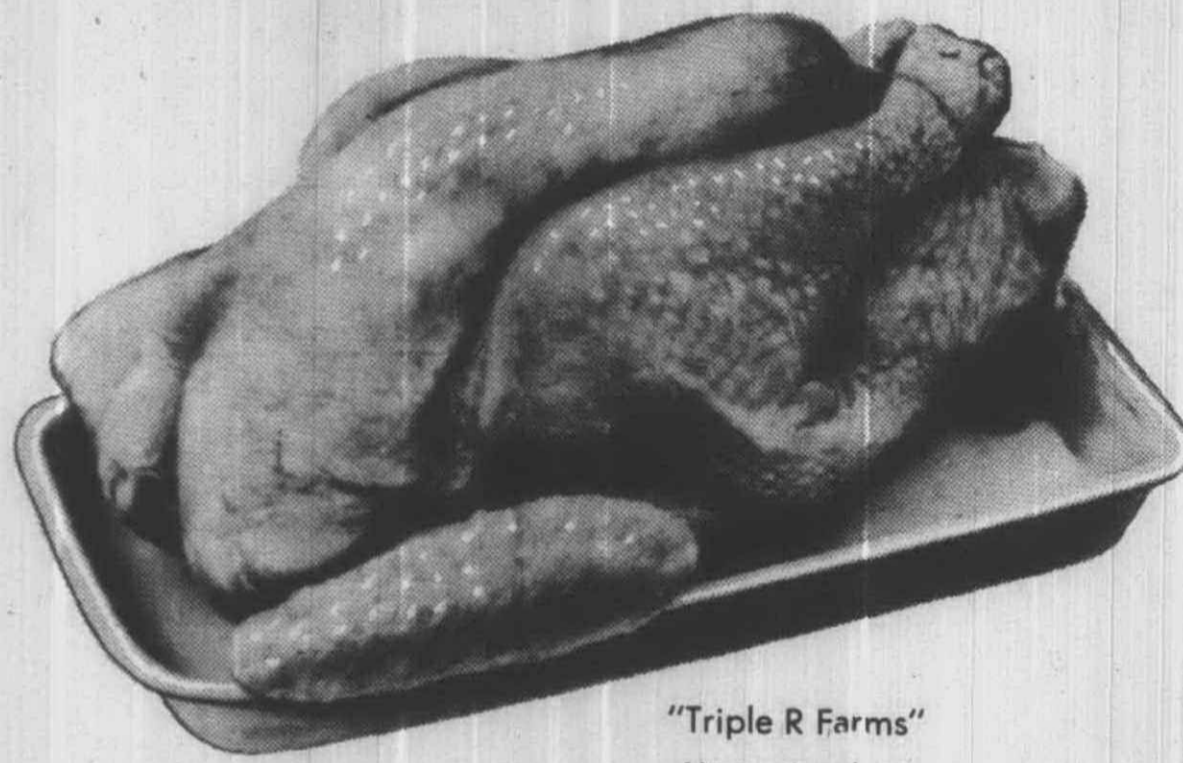

Tips from the STOP & SHOP CHEF Questions & Answers

What causes potatoes occasionally to turn green? Are potatoes that have become discolored in that way inedible?

Potatoes may turn green if they are stored in a place that is too brightly lighted. Such discoloration does not necessarily make the potatoes inedible, but it may indicate a loss of flavor.
