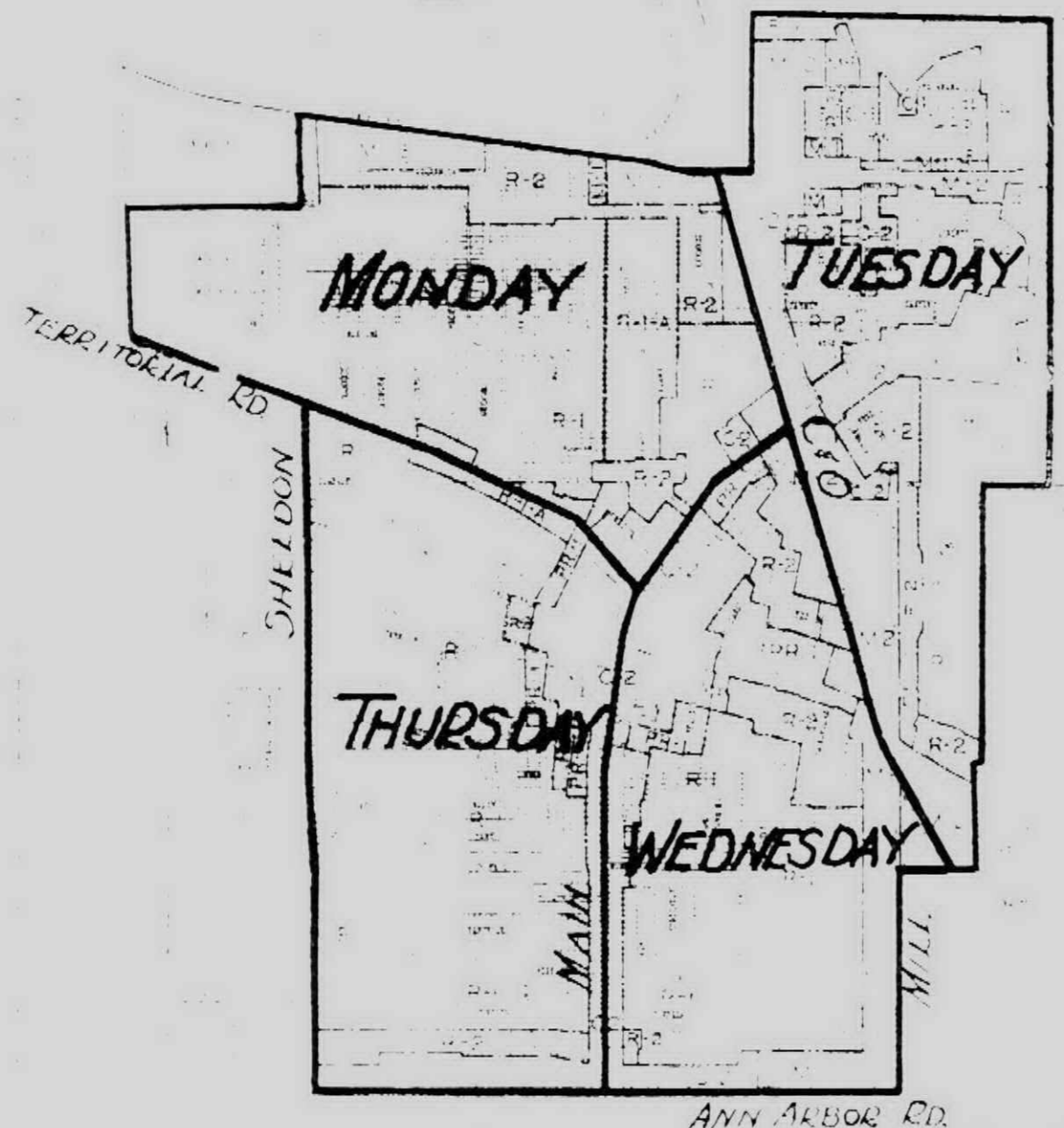

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Moderates in Control of State GOP

A moderate Republican slate led by John F. Cartwright will run party affairs in the 19th Congressional District for the next two years.

The Cartwright group dumped a conservative slate headed by Christian Powell

and unsuccessful congressional primary candidate Richard Kuhn at the Republican State Convention last weekend.

Gov. George Romney undoubtedly appreciated the Cartwright group's support on one key resolution.

The convention's conservative faction, consisting of

the 12th and the 14th Districts under the leadership of Richard Durant, attempted to put through a state-wide referendum on the Governor's fiscal reform package.

The 19th District moderates assisted in voting down the 12th and 14th Districts. Had the conservative-Powell

group been seated the Oakland 19th would have voted with them.

To be seated at the convention in Detroit's Cobo Hall, the moderate group had to survive two tests of political strength—in the credentials committee and the convention floor.

Powell in a hallway interview said he preferred Romney over either California Gov. Ronald Reagan or Barry Goldwater as a presidential candidate—but accused the vigorous Romneyites of trying to "exclude

dependent thought" through ideological conformity.

Kuhn said during the credentials hearing that his group represented "a little more conservative" view.

The credentials committee vote, despite all the legal

arguments and dozens of quotations from Roberts' Rules of Order, still voted along ideological lines.

Among those backing the Cartwright group were Jim Gannon of the 18th District, former State Rep. David

Upton of Berrien County and attorney James Schouder, a former Young Republicans State Chairman. Doing most of the arguing in favor of the conservative Powell-Kuhn group was Durant, also a member of the credentials committee.

The battle actually began at the 19th District-Oakland convention Jan. 31, when delegates were to be elected to the state convention.

A group of proposed delegates, in which the moderates' names figured prominently, had been suggested in a series of legislative district caucuses. At the district convention, however, the conservative group offered its own slate—the Powell-Kuhn group.

Powell, as chairman of the convention, ruled that a standing vote favored his slate, 53-52. When Farmington Township delegate Tom McMillan asked a roll call, Kuhn moved that the convention adjourn.

The convention erupted. Powell ruled the adjournment motion had passed, and the conservatives walked out.

The Cartwright moderates held what they called a "continuation" of the convention and by a vote of 47-0 elected their own slate. (The Powell-Kuhn group called it a "rump" session.)

The Powell-Kuhn conservative slate and the Cartwright moderate slate both appeared at the state convention and carried their battle to the credentials committee of the convention Friday night.

During a four-hour hearing, Cartwright presented a 13 page legal brief and a number of affidavits contending that Powell had run the district improperly and, most importantly, had adjourned too quickly.

Among the affidavits was one which McMillan said he signed accusing Kuhn of voting in the crucial 53-52 vote.

Kuhn and Powell delivered their replies orally. The gist was that McMillan had died for lack of a second and that the Kuhn motion for adjournment was improper.

Saturday morning, the credentials committee debated an hour and a half. First it rejected 9-7 a compromise offer to seat the 49 persons whose names appeared on both slates. Then it voted 13-4 to seat the Cartwright group.

The majority view was that Powell had been hasty in shunting aside the request for a roll call and in adjourning the district during the uproar.

The Durant forces attempted to reverse the credentials committee's report on the full convention floor in a pair of parliamentary maneuvers. Both failed, and the Cartwright group was ordered seated in a voice vote.

The Cartwright group had not only argued its case before the credentials committee; it also sent a flying squad of speakers to other districts' caucuses Friday night to argue their case to those delegations. Mrs. Isabel Haynes of Farmington Township was one of the panel of speakers.

What were the exact differences between the Powell and Cartwright groups?

Both accused each other of dirty dealing at the district convention—and the credentials committee agreed there was a considerable lack of parliamentary neatness in both camps.

Both claimed they represented faithful party workers and that the other camp didn't.

Both claimed to represent an ideological cross-section of the party. But a number of other statements support the view that it was a plain old-fashioned Romneyite vs. conservative brawl.

Items:

•Oakland County Chairman Joe Farnham, vigorously supported the Cartwright slate, declared in a press conference that the Powell-Kuhn group was "attempting to take over the party" and "attempting to embarrass the governor." He called the Powell-Kuhn group's battle part of a pattern of ideological battles in southeastern Michigan.

Experts to Air Pollution Woes In Area Seminar

Interested in the problems of air, water and solid waste pollution?

Then there isn't any better time than Saturday at Livonia Stevenson High School, 33500 Six Mile Road, to get some valuable information.

The Observer Newspaper Group, in cooperation with officials from the City of Livonia, will hold a Seminar Saturday with outstanding national, state and local experts slated to head the morning and afternoon programs.

The registration fee of \$3.50 includes a coffee break in the morning, luncheon in the school cafeteria and attendance at the two sessions.

Ron Linton, chairman, Task Force on Environmental Health and Related Problems, is coming in from Washington, D.C. to discuss all phases of the problems during the noon luncheon. He also will be available for the discussion groups in the morning and afternoon.

Linton, a native of Detroit, has been involved in the Washington scene for years, serving as a member of the personal campaign staff of then Senator John F. Kennedy and also on the staff of the late Senator Patrick McNamara.

As Chairman of Secretary Gardner's Task Force on Environmental Health and Related Problems, Linton heads a six-member group of persons from outside the Federal Government whom the Secretary asked to recommend Departmental goals in the area of environmental and

health protection, priorities for the achievement of goals, a Departmental strategy for attaining recommended goals and a means of creating increased national awareness of the need to solve environmental health problems.

Vernon Goelzer, chief of the Engineering Division of the Detroit District Office of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, also is listed for appearances at both programs.

The Seminar activities will open at 8:30 a.m. with a display of exhibits in the cafeteria including a demonstration by Centri-Spray of Livonia of their new equipment for fighting pollution.

The program will start at 9:30 a.m. with Livonia DPW Chief David Jones discussing "Solid waste in the '60s." Morton Sterling, of Detroit, will tell of "Air Pollution in the Jet Age," and John Stock will talk on "Better Environmental Health and Clean Water."

Following the luncheon from noon to 1:30 p.m. at which Linton will be the principal speaker, the afternoon program will start at 1:45 and continue to 4 p.m.

Speakers will include Robert Bird, of Centri-Spray on "Industrial Science and Air and Water Pollution," Robert Stollwagen on "Role of the Air Scrubber and Incineration," and Fred Kellow on "Progress in State Programs for Solid Waste Disposal."

Reservations will be accepted Saturday morning prior to the start of the program.

That part of the 19th District delegation from Wayne County wasn't directly involved. The Wayne 19th had had its own convention with no such uproar. All but one of the Wayne leaders did, however, support the Cartwright group. The lone dissenter, Martin Setz, Livonia, did not protest beyond his vote.

After the seating of the 19th moderates, business of the convention proceeded with nomination of Elly Peterson as State Chairman, William McLaughlin, vice chairman; Al LaPorte, Secretary; Mrs. Ella Koore, National Committeewoman; John Martin, National Committeeman; Earl Kennedy, vice chairman; Robert Brown, treasurer; Ilmar Heinaru, director of nationalities division.

During the address of Gov. Romney and keynote Senator Charles Percy from Illinois, stalwarts of the Powell-conservative slate guarded a huge sign "The Official 19th District Oakland County Republican Committee," surrounded by empty balcony seats. In the topmost balcony another huge sign looked directly toward the center of the podium with a picture of Barry and the words "In your heart you know he is right."

With the exception of two delegations, 12th and 14th protesting loud and often, apparently the convention did not agree, rather stood solidly behind the Governor.

This does not make the 1967 Spring convention of the Republican party any different than in past years. The biggest cheer, resounding through the arena at Cobo Hall was brought by the words of the Governor, "And I promise you this, we will not spend money in this State that we do not have."

Deficit spending is still a strong party plank.

Schoolcraft to Dedicate Waterman Campus Center

A formal procession of Schoolcraft College administrators and faculty in full academic regalia will open dedicatory ceremonies for the Lois L. Waterman Campus Center at 3 p.m. on Sunday, March 12.

Dr. Ralph Banfield, Ann Arbor, executive secretary of the Mid-West Community College Leadership Program, will deliver the dedicatory address at the ceremony, to which the public is invited. Dr. Banfield is also professor of education at the University of Michigan, Michigan State University and Wayne State University.

The program will include the unveiling of an oil portrait of Miss Waterman who served as the first Dean of Student Affairs. She has remained active on campus as a special consultant in the college's self-study toward accreditation by the North Central Assn. of Colleges and Secondary Schools. Miss Waterman is now Dean Emerita of the college.

Invited guests include presidents of community colleges, state officials, legislators, members of Boards of Education, superintendents and high school principals of public school districts within the college district, mayors and township supervisors, and trustees of the Schoolcraft College Foundation.

A reception honoring Dean Waterman will follow the ceremony in the lower level of the Center. The public is invited to the reception.

The ceremony, in the upper level of the Center, will begin with the formal procession. John H. Brinn, vice-president for instruction, will deliver the invocation, and Dr. Eric J. Bradner, college president, will introduce guests.

Dr. Banfield will be introduced by Edward V. McNally, dean of student affairs.

The ceremony will open with a dedicatory statement by Dr. Bradner, who will unveil the portrait of Dean Waterman. Symbolic presentation of the building will be made by a representative of the project architect, Eberle M. Smith Associates. Acceptances will be by Harold Fischer, chairman of the board of trustees, by Dr. Bradner, and by Richard Snyder.

Recommendations for New School Highway

(Continued from Page One) takes the space suggestions and puts them on paper. Then some sort of cost analysis will be made. It was agreed that many compromises may be made before the public is asked to vote on a bond issue to pay for the new school which will have a capacity of 1,800 students.

No date has been set for the vote, but the Board gave a hint that it may be in May. The target date for the opening of the new school is September, 1969.

Ashton asked if the highway department had a legal opinion that it could or could not take a portion of the land at the Seminary.

Joseph Molnar, one of the four representatives present, said the department had a legal opinion that St. John's was an educational institution and that all possible steps should be taken to avoid it.

"Then," answered Ashton, "St. John's property could legally be condemned. On that basis we believe (Township property owners) that the route should go to the north and avoid the tremendous havoc caused by the present highway department route."

"We have been working on such a project for several years," he stated. "It wasn't until the advent of the Ford Motor Co. plant, which brought water and sewers to the section, that we were able to go on with our plans."

"The present highway route would wipe out a development that would include 23 industrial sites which we hope would add a million to a million and a half square feet to the Township's industrial base."

"We know that the northerly alternate route would be to the best advantage of all of us. We suggest that the Township Board take a consensus vote of the Township voters to see what they think of the routes."

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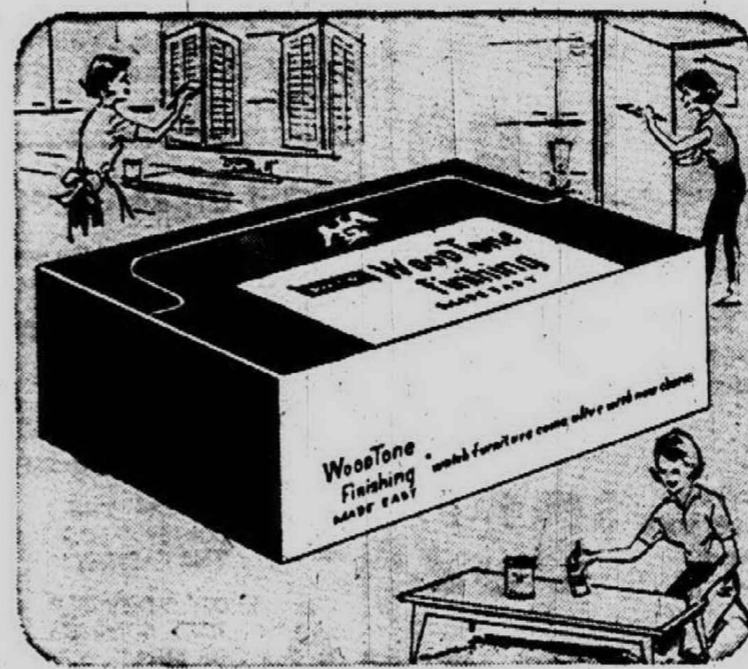

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Strike Question Unanswered

Westland's municipal employees strike was over almost as fast as it began but the issue which prompted it is still unresolved.

Mayor Thomas H. Brown points out that the City Charter gives him the authority and responsibility to administrate all city departments. The union leadership replies that the mayor, illegally, ordered a change in working conditions during current contract negotiations.

The state labor mediation board will receive the question of whether the mayor's order concerning the use of identification cards in privately-owned cars used for city business and the three-day suspensions "were reasonable."

This is all very fine but it evades the key to the whole issue: is the mayor's responsibilities as outlined in the city charter abridged by the state's labor laws.

It seems that the answer is "yes". Fortunately, city services were not affected to any harmful extent by the strike but the city and union leaders should realize that any minor dispute could spark another labor problem in the future.

Another point which was in the background of the short strike was the "illegality" of public employees' strikes.

However, there is no penalty for such a strike and it behooves the state legislature to either drop the strike provision from the state law (there were 21 municipal employees strikes last year, not to mention the numerous public school teachers' strikes) and no one has been reported fired as yet) or put some teeth into the law to make it meaningful.

The next question is one which is answered by making an arbitrary decision. What is the monetary limit which

should be placed on prizes? Should student contestants win dictionaries, encyclopedias, savings bonds, drafting tools, mechanics' tools, \$1,000 scholarships, \$4,000 scholarships?

Or should such prizes be awarded apart from actual school-sponsored events?

Remember, when a student enters such contests, he knows in advance what the prize will be.

In athletic contests, big prizes are forbidden.

Although the athlete may wind up in the big leagues or college as a baseball, football, basketball, or hockey star, this is not guaranteed by his participation in school sports.

Should not the same thinking apply in other areas of scholastic endeavor?

If the reader has any concern about big prizes for school-sponsored contests, speak up! Talk to your board and let the members know how you feel!

REPUBLICANS? Democrats? There ain't no difference between 'em. They're all alike. Lemme tell you about a guy who...

Lines like these, late at night at your friendly tavern or downtown bar, are a great way to get into a fast fight.

Far be it from me to explore, right here, all the differences between the two political parties. For one thing, we don't publish newspapers of unlimited size. For another, it would be nice to keep what few friends I've got.

However, I did have a new experience over the weekend, one which may help shed some light on the differences between Republicans and Democrats.

On Friday and Saturday I attended my first Republican State convention, held in Detroit, having just attended the previous weekend, the Democratic State convention in Grand Rapids.

Now, I like political conventions. They're exciting; they produce lots of news; and the gossip goes around in the hotel corridors is well worth the price of admission.

Going to two different state conventions on two successive weekends is too good an opportunity to miss to add my bit to the continuing debate about the differences between the two political parties. What follows is a (largely unedited) transcript of my notes, taken late Friday night and then again Saturday afternoon.

Republicans are quieter than Democrats. They talk in well modulated tones. When they fight, they don't toss in references to their opponents' ancestry, as some Democrats are prone to do; they just look intense and surly.

Democrats are more spirited than Republicans. When they have a party at a convention, they have

more fun. They drink more, make more noise in the hotel corridors, solve more of the world's problems in debate. In fact, Democratic parties almost always result in an argument, often fierce, which is forgotten almost immediately.

Surprisingly, Democrats get up earlier the morning after than Republicans. (This is possibly because the Democratic convention this year had a lot to fight over, while the Republican convention, by contrast, was a pretty tame affair.)

Republican women in general dress better (mainly because Democrats, on the average, have less to spend on clothes than Republicans do). Republican women dress mainly in tailored suits, tweed-skirts and discreet fur coats; Democrats wear print dresses. Democratic women have a better color sense than their Republican counterparts, while Republican women's clothes mix better in a crowd.

Republican women frost their hair. Democratic women color their hair entirely.

Republican men tend toward iron gray hair, cut short. They are well dressed. They wear coats and ties on the convention floor, and they do not wear white socks. But they also look as though they would do anything to take their ties off and put their feet up.

Democratic men are either somewhat fat or very lean. Most wear ties, and are more obvious than Republicans in looking as though they wish they didn't have to. Democratic professors and educators (there are more of these than in the Republican Party) look serious and dress in tweed sports coats.

In caucuses, on the convention floor, and in the corridors, Democrats chew cigars and really enjoy them. Republicans, in the same situations (except on the floor, where smoking was forbid-

den) smoke cigars and look as though they don't enjoy them very much.

On the convention floor, Republican delegates sit quietly, listen attentively, and don't make it necessary for the chairman to tell them to shut up. Democrats in the same situation rush around wheeling and dealing, generally ignore the dull proceedings, and talk loudly to their neighbors.

Democratic delegations are always disagreeing with themselves, and most rush off the floor at least once during the convention to caucus. Republican delegations (except for the 19th District) look as though they all agreed the night before over a good martini... and remembered it.

Democrats print the convention schedule on inexpensive paper. This usually gets folded up, stuffed in a pocket, and not less than four hours after the convention opens.

Republicans print their convention program in a fancy booklet, which is very fat with advertising. On the cover this year was an engraved medallion with the profile of George Romney and another man, who at first glance I thought was Will Rogers, but who in fact turned out to be Abraham Lincoln. I think the Republican programs cost at least two bits each to print; most people seem to lose their program books after trying unsuccessfully to put them in their pockets.

Students of our two great political parties will, no doubt, be able to add to this list of differences. I hope they will, since the subject is as yet little explored.

Perhaps the most diagnostic difference I noted last weekend was the most simple:

Republicans drink imported Danish beer, by the bottle. Democrats drink Stroh's, by the quart.

OBSERVING the Scene...

"Will the real Oakland-19th District please be seated." And therein lies the only real excitement of the entire Republican Convention last weekend in downtown Detroit.

There they were—two to toe—two separate groups of 54 both wanting to be seated as the Oakland 19th Official Delegation.

The Wayne 19th was united and seated. Delores Kory, chairman, performed with a cool head during the sticky portion on the floor of the convention when the two delegations were trying to be seated. Obviously the majority of the Wayne-19th favored the moderate Cartwright group. Part of the organization work and assistance and liaison between the Livonia-Redford Township 19th Congressional District and the 19th Oakland was accomplished by Robert Riedorf—a shrewd, quiet-spoken man who served as Redford Township Republican chairman in previous years. He was caucus chairman at the Convention.

The old axiom "from all bad comes some good" holds true with the power fight of this weekend.

Although the Wayne 19th supported the Oakland-19th, Cartwright moderate Republicans, it has not always been so "blue skysville." In fact, ever since the district was gerrymandered by Solidarity House Democrats several years ago, there has been plenty of bloodshed.

The gerrymandering was done to get rid of some key legislators—and in some cases the maneuver succeeded for the union Democrats. In the case of my late husband who was then serving as State Representative, it did not work because he moved without informing Solidarity House, therefore was still in his Livonia area instead of being thrown in the Dearborn Democratic area as they planned.

When the smoke settled on the new district map it left two organizations in the same family which had hardly met—namely the 19th District Wayne, (Redford and Livonia) and the 19th District Oakland (Western Oakland). Both were used to running a strong organization. Both were used to electing candidates and both liked it the way it was. Who was to assume leadership? The scraper-leaders like Ruth Davenport of Oakland and Marvin Pridgeon of Livonia both drew from the hip—and for a while the fur flew. But as always, there were peacemakers present and an uneasy truce resulted, but it was not a happy family.

The real cohesive job was accomplished this weekend when the cousins, down the block picked on the cousins next door (in philosophy), and only then did the two put their arms around each other and became blood cousins. There probably will be scraps still, but now that they have a common outside enemy (in philosophy), they have also found a common ground on which to build a strong, unified 19th District. Members of the Redford-Livonia group are Romneyites and the newly-seated Oakland-19th members are Romneyites—although as many as 37 were either delegates or alternates on both the Cartwright-moderates or Powell-conservatives.

Cartwright, the leader of the moderates is a conservative person and so is Powell.

To be conservative is not to be against Romney. Powell group supporters are ultraconservative and include some active Birch members.

For the final record and for the armchair politicians the Republican delegates from Livonia and Redford Township may take credit for teaming up with the moderates from Oakland County portion of the 19th Congressional District and dumping Christian Powell of West Bloomfield Township as chairman and electing John Cartwright also a West Bloomfield man.

Mrs. Mary Dumas of Livonia won an easy victory for the vice-chairmanship, trouncing newcomer Hope Garman in a standup vote. Mrs. Dumas succeeds Mrs. Delores Kory of Redford Township who had moved up to Wayne 19th chairmanship.

Mrs. JoAnn Van Tassel, of Pontiac, a 1966 legislative candidate, was elected secretary and Eldon Funk of Redford Township was unanimously elected treasurer.

The four 19th District members to the State Central Committee, governing body of the party between conventions, are Mrs. Isabel Haynes of Farmington, a Romney supporter from the beginning of her political career; Dale Feet of Waterford Township, Marvin Pridgeon of Livonia and Mrs. Marion Donaldson of Redford Township.

Members of the district committee will include: Redford—Jay Hughes and Robert Riedorf. Livonia—William Duffy, Arthur Hogarth and Jack Reault.

64th State House District—Norman Skeirik and Arthur Hogarth, both of Farmington, and Robert Dupree of West Bloomfield.

61st House District—John McKinley, Gary Duncan and Naomi Griffin.

62nd House District—Roland Folk.

HOW HIGH?

Q—Fifty years ago the Federal government started out with a very small income tax of around one percent. Now, I'd guess, most Livonians pay from 25 to 35 percent in U.S. income tax. What's to keep State officials from doing the same thing? Give 'em an inch and they'll take a mile!

A—It could happen. Many citizens are concerned about this. Some want to peg a constitutional limit on how high any state income tax will go. If you feel strongly about this, write your State Sena-

tor and your state Representative to push legislators limiting the percentage size of any income tax levied in Michigan.

IT IS FAIR

Q—Why do owners of rental properties fix their beady eyes on their tenants and say, "We have to pay the taxes. You renters don't?" We do pay property taxes in our rent. I still think it's as fair a tax as an income tax, and is probably just as steady since incomes can and will go down when auto slowdowns hit Michigan.

A—True enough. You, as tenants, do indirectly help to pay the property tax. But the best authorities still believe a well planned tax on income is the fairest of all taxes since it automatically goes up or down with ability to pay. When times are bad, property taxes go on even if there is no income while, in recession times, wages and profits are taxed on income, high or low, which a person receives.

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Just Chattin'
Governor Romney Shows His "Achilles' Heel" to Nation

If Governor George Romney should lose his bid for the Republican presidential nomination in 1968 (and don't think he isn't running) it wouldn't be stretching the truth to say that his failure was due to an encounter with a woman member of the press corps on his recent trip through the west.

After going gayly on his way for several days—and enjoying the presence of more than 40 members of the press who watched his every move and noted his every word—he encountered a woman member of the press who just wouldn't let him slip out of her trap.

And right there, Governor Romney learned the truth of the old adage "Never underestimate the power of a woman."

Before she was finished asking him questions at a news conference he, allegedly, lost his temper, and showed his "Achilles heel" to the entire world. In those few moments the nation's press, considered by many to be the most difficult group to conquer, learned one of the Governor's shortcomings. And it is this short temper that, eventually could keep him from getting on the right track to the White House.

Until he met up with this group on his recent western tour, which he said was nothing more than an exploratory trip to judge the pulse of the people and should not be considered a bid for the nomination, Governor Romney never had faced such a firing line.

True, he has been a guest on the national TV screens and has been the target for many questions. But in each case he has spent several days with a group of experts "boning up" on the possible questions he would be asked and the answers he would give.

He was utterly unprepared for the catch-as-catch-can role he played against these journalistic marksmen he faced in the west.

When asked for specific information regarding his criticism of the conduct of the war in Vietnam, he fell into the trap his advisors had warned him to avoid.

But "Lonesome" George took on the sharpshooters and came away much the worse for wear. He lost his temper when being pried with question after question by a woman and now the nation's journals are wondering what he would do under the pressure that comes to the man in the White House.

To those of us who know and have worked with "Lonesome" George through the years, the flare-up in the west was no surprise.

The Governor is one of those hard-working individuals found in the rough-and-ready world of automobile industry—and is not accustomed to being crossed.

He has earned a reputation for "getting things done," because he is a driver.

But, as so often happens, he can't stand being driven. He can't be a simple "worker in the vineyards." He is the type of person who must dominate.

It is no secret that, during his early days in the Governor's chair in Lansing, when he was surrounded with a board composed of Democrats, they took great delight in lighting his short fuse.

As a matter of fact the Democrats took turns in "getting his goat," and they looked forward to each meeting with a great degree of anticipation. They always were eager to see how he would react. There were times when he cleared the room of all but the Board members—and those he couldn't chase.

So, you see, he always has had this "Achilles heel"—a short temper. And there are many who claim they wouldn't want a man like that in the White House where one fit of his short temper could throw the world into chaos.

So, if he loses his bid, you can put most of the blame on the woman who upset him at a press conference.

Engineering: How Does One Choose One's Career?

In last week's column we touched on the various fields of engineering and on qualities which make a good engineer. Actually, this by-passed a major question: "Just how do people choose their careers in the first place?" A more important question would be: "How SHOULD they choose their careers?"

Choice of a career is often made on a strictly glamour basis. The student knows and admires someone who has been a success in a major field. Or, he has read exciting stories about the astronauts. Or about new developments in surgery, or in bridge design. Perhaps a relative has been a doctor, lawyer, engineer, teacher. No special thought is given to "Am I qualified to enter this profession?"

Choice of a profession (or vocation) is highly important, is worth the student's very best thought, with all the help he can get. He should study both the professions and his own abilities.

First decision: Just what is his ultimate goal? What does the student want to make (or get) out of life?

Most high school students have never thought of this. Is money his goal — to make a million? Is it honor — power — personal security? Personal contentment, a decent living? Service to his fellow men? Perhaps a combination of several of these.

Want to make a million? Then do not choose any of the "service" professions — teaching, preaching, social work, etc. A chance to serve your fellow men? Some professions are better than others, but all can serve in one way or another.

Which brings us to Engineering, the profession which we are now studying in this column. There are better (quicker) ways to "Make A Million" than via Engineering. Some of the other goals may also be questionable in Engineering. But—for a decent living, for challenging work, for contribution to the wellbeing of mankind—Engineering is right up there with the best of them. One can even find dull, routine spots in Engineering, with guaranteed security, if that is one's goal; it is not the goal of the average engineer.

Even after selecting a profession (assuming suitable ability), a choice of goal must still be made. Each profession has areas or branches conducive to the several goals mentioned above. Here, again, choice of goal will help to choose between the many branches of one's chosen profession. Typical choices: to aim for the \$100,000 job away up on high, or to adopt a lower monetary goal with some of the other satisfying rewards.

Warning Signal Costs Outlined

Are warning devices to prevent vandalism in Livonia schools worth between \$300,000 and \$350,000 in the Livonia School District? They could cost this

much, says Bill Bedell, assistant business administrator, who explained that some such installation might help curb the large glassbreakage and vandalism losses the district incurs yearly.

At present, the board pays rates to some custodians to keep the schools under surveillance but the Board of Education is considering other ways in which to handle the problem.

Bedell presented his ideas to the board recently and also explained that the state's bureau has advised the district that the recent low insurance bidder's quotation does not meet state requirements.

Bedell said the matter needs further clarification which will be sought but the district is covered by insurance until the matter is resolved.

The successful low bidder is the Uhlig-Murphy Agency of Redford Township.

Other matters considered by the board, included:

- Developing a program to provide special education for gifted children.

- Agreeing to co-sponsor a fiscal reform conference to be held in Livonia, March 2.

- Approving expenditures (outlined in a previous report to the board) to purchase key punch and other equipment for the establishing of computer courses in each of the district's three high schools.

- Considering proposals to improve operational efficiency in maintenance and transportation areas, including purchase of a used road grader, new stake truck, radio paging system, and public address systems for buses.

Kinsman of 21739 Albion St., Farmington, was one of 88,000 employes who submitted ideas. A record \$2,836,075 in cash, 174 new cars and several hundred thousand dollars worth of Philco appliances were awarded under the company's Employee Suggestion and Management Proposal Plans.

In the last eight years, Kinsman has received more than \$32,000 in suggestion checks and cars. His three maximum awards were for improvements in car assembly operations. He received his first maximum \$6,000 check award in 1963.

Two secretaries also received maximum awards in 1966.

Mrs. Mary Cholmakjain of 6986 Town Lane, Dearborn Heights, suggested a plan to reduce scrap at the Dearborn Engine Plant. Mrs. Hilda Sanders of 2077 McCartney, Ypsilanti, suggested a change in purchasing insurance on cars rented by employes on company business.

The 1966 cash awards increased to \$17,825,698 the amount paid to employes in the United States since the Ford Employee Suggestion

Plan was introduced in August, 1947.

In 1966, the company presented a new car and a \$6,000 check for each of the 36 maximum awards made under the Suggestion Plan.

About 44 per cent of the eligible employes in both plans submitted at least one idea each in 1966. Approximately 195,000 ideas were considered by the company.

Schoolcraft Aide Named Officer Of New Group

Larry Vandermolen, political science instructor at Schoolcraft College, was elected vice-president of the Michigan Assn. of Political Scientists in an organizational meeting at Wayne State University recently.

The purposes are to coordinate political science programs among Michigan universities and four year colleges and community colleges, to stimulate interest in the profession, and to promote improvement in techniques and methods of teaching political science.

John Merlo Faces Murder Charge

John Merlo was bound over to the Oakland County Circuit Court on a charge of first degree murder Friday following an examination in the Farmington Township Justice Court.

Township Justice of the Peace Byron Walters ordered Merlo to stand trial for the Jan. 6 shooting of his 18-year-old estranged wife, Sharon.

Mrs. Merlo was slain while she was at work at the Crest Beauty Salon at 27432 W. Eight Mile Rd., Farmington Township. The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Kamen of 19340 Gaylord, Redford Township, Mrs. Merlo was seeking a divorce at the time of the shooting.

The couple had a son, Jeff, who is now four months old. During the examination Mrs. Lois Whitaker of 21716 Seminole, Southfield, testified that Merlo stood two feet in front of her and shot his wife over her left shoulder.

Mrs. Whitaker said that she turned her head to see Sharon sliding to the floor and then she ducked.

"I thought he fired three shots," she said, "and then when I ducked I heard more shots. The next thing that I remember is hearing the door to the shop closing and I said 'call the police.'"

Merlo, who was arrested in Philadelphia two weeks after the shooting, seemed to enjoy being the center of attention at the examination. Dressed in a sport shirt and slacks, the 25-year-old youth has grown a heavy black beard since his arrest. At times his attention seemed to wander during the examination and he was more interested in who was in the courtroom.

Sharon's father was present at the examination, but her mother was not.

Mrs. Martha Stanfield, owner of the Crest Beauty Salon, also testified at the examination. She said that Merlo and his wife talked in the back room and she did not hear any of the conversation.

The shop owner said that her back was turned when the shots were fired and she thought that it was a firecracker exploding. She said that she ran to the back room and stayed there. "It was only when I came out of the back room that I saw Sharon on the floor," she recounted.

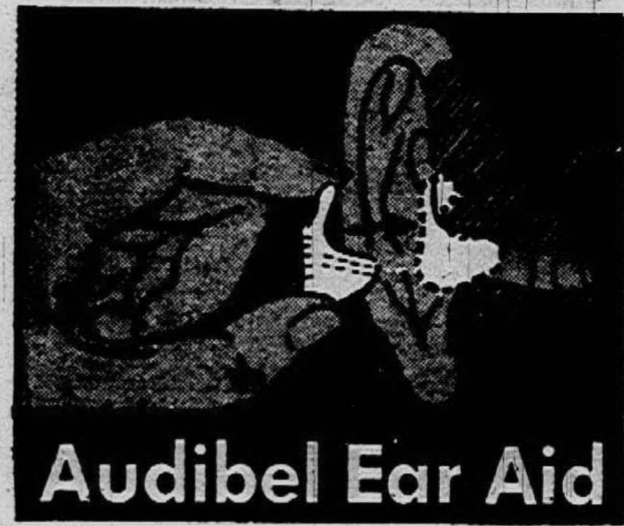

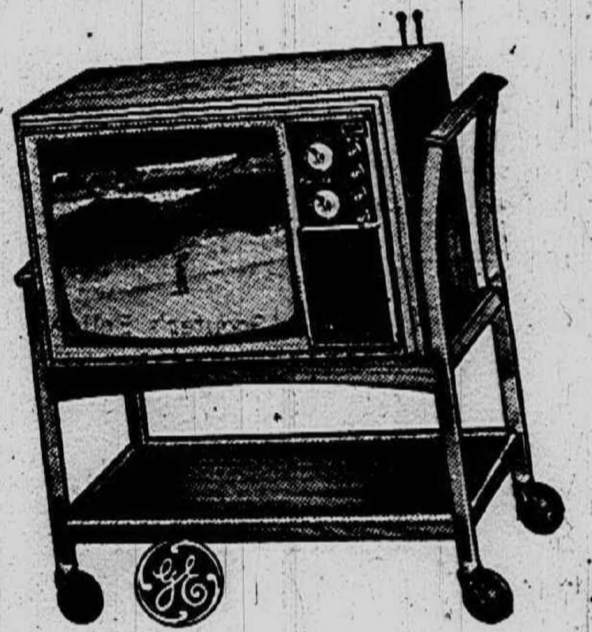
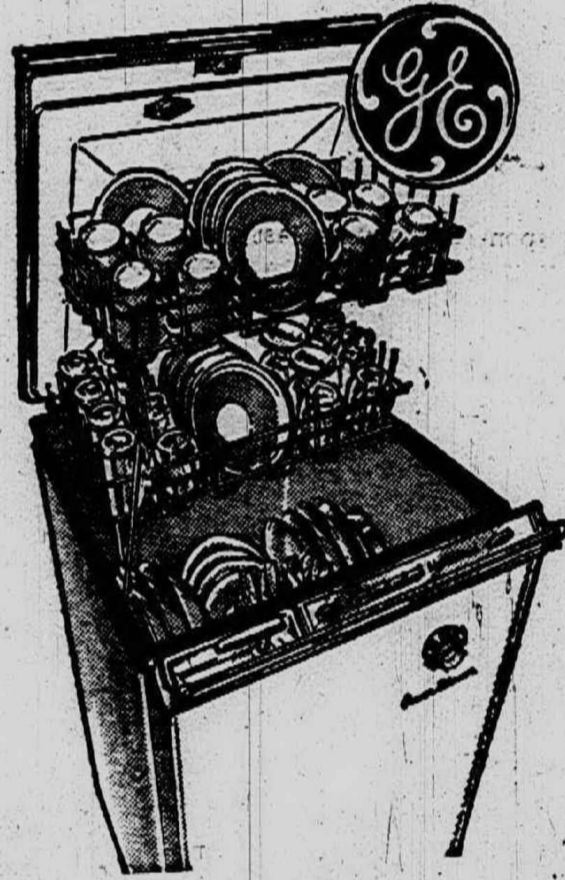

Kindergarten Registration Starts Tuesday

It's kindergarten round-up time again in Garden City, and for the first time since 1961 there is expected to be an increase in their numbers entering school next fall.

Starting in 1952, and for 10 consecutive years, kindergarten enrollment increased from 410 to 1,532 in 1961-62.

Each year since then it has declined slightly, as home-building tapered off.

Now, with the influx of new families coming into the Cherry Pointe subdivision, and other new homes in the city, the projected kindergarten enrollment next fall is 1,360, compared to the 1,304 counted last September.

Each March, to better acquaint parents with the nature and purpose of the kindergarten program, the elementary schools conduct a series of round-ups.

They run this year from next Tuesday, March 7, through March 23.

Any parent having a child who will be five years old on or before next Dec. 1 should plan to attend, said Alex Rudenko, attendance officer. Parents can register their children for school at the end of each round-up program. It is necessary to bring the youngster's birth certificate.

"Do not bring the child to the round-up," the Attendance Office urges. Some schools will have two types of programs — orientation and registration (note O and R in schedule below).

Parents who have children in school and have attended previous round-ups may wish to attend the registration-only session, Rudenko said. Following is the kindergar-

ten round-up schedule, listing the school, telephone number, date of round-up, type of program and time, which parents are urged to clip out and save:

Farmington (GA 2-7220): March 21, O & R, 1:30 p.m., registration only at 10 a.m. March 22.

Lathers (GA 1-6480): March 22, O & R, 1:30 p.m., registration only at 1:30 p.m. March 23.

Dog Licenses Due March 1, Chief Warns

Westland dog owners were reminded by Police Chief Garrison Clayton last week that the license renewal deadline is today (Wednesday).

The chief also cautioned residents that not only must all dogs be licensed, but must be on a leash. Failure to do this "is a common violation which is very distasteful to many neighbors and our efforts will be extended toward correcting this," Clayton said.

Licenses may be bought at the City Clerk's office in the Westland City Hall from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. during the week and until 8 p.m. on Tuesday. Before the March 1 deadline, the cost is \$2 for females and \$1 for males or unsexed dogs. After March 1, the cost doubles.

"All dogs over two months old must have a license. A certificate indicating rabies vaccine shots must be presented at the time of buying the license for all dogs over six months old," Clayton said.

Licenses help in the recovery of a lost or stolen dog, the chief also said.

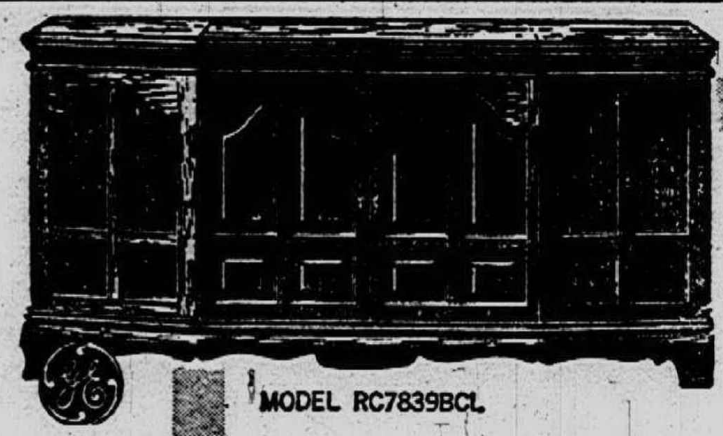

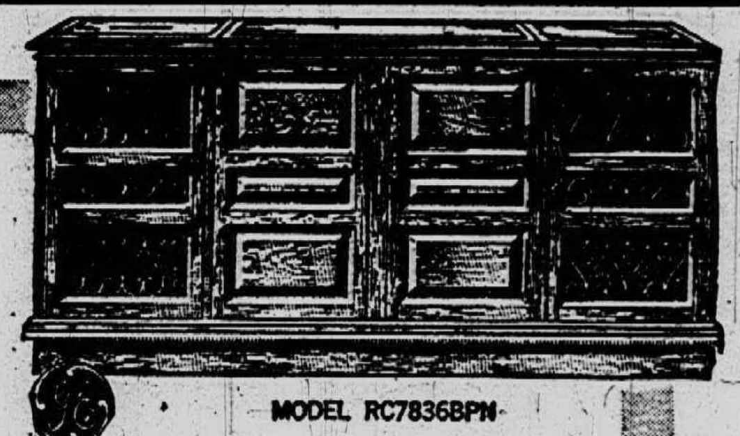

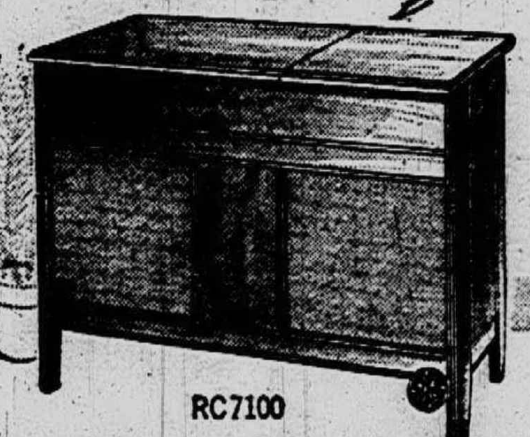

Soil Fertility Hinges On Earth's Friability

Humus is the key to soil fertility. Without it a soil is like the sand of the seashore: loose, lumps body, dries readily and becomes hard. But a soil rich in humus is of good texture, friable and with granular structure. It absorbs water readily, has moisture retentive ability and dries to a loose consistency.

Humus formers are available to gardeners in many materials. Animal manure, leaf mold, peat moss, compost, wood shavings, sawdust, conifer needles, peanut and cocoa bean hulls, hay, straw excelsior, coffee grounds and other all decompose into humus. Well-rotted manure is best, but its not often available to suburban gardeners. Leaf mold is good. But the preparation of large quantities is a big job. Much time is needed to produce rotted compost, but, it's good. Although they decompose slowly, sawdust and wood shavings are good. When

large quantities are used, nitrogen deficiency may show as foliage yellow plants.

Add one cup of nitrogen fertilizer, ammonium nitrate, to each bushel of wood product to relieve the lack.

Vacationers! Check Your Licenses

LANSING — Michigan drivers planning winter vacations or moves to warm climates during the winter, and who have celebrated or are having birthdays while they are away, are urged to check their driver licenses to make sure they don't expire when they are gone.

Secretary of State James M. Hare said, "I would urge every Michigan citizen who plans to be out of Michigan and who has an expiring driver license to go to the nearest driver license exam bureau to get a renewal of the license before leaving."

"Licenses may be renewed any time 90 days prior to the date of expiration at local driver license bureaus," said Hare. He urged persons who were leaving the state for even longer periods to come in and discuss the situation with examining bureau managers.

"Many persons have found renewal of their licenses tricky, laborious, and rife with red-tape as well as very time consuming when the suddenly realize that they are out of Michigan and have an expired driver license. Hare said, "Many states have more expensive licenses than does Michigan, and that's a consideration also."

Police Officials Join In Computer Network

About 100 representatives of local police, sheriff departments and the State Police will be oriented in the operation and responsibilities of the new computer Michigan law enforcement information network at a meeting Wednesday, March 15, in the Marshall street armory in Lansing. Col. Fredrick E. Davids, State Police director, reported.

At present the network, beginning with an initial 35 member locations, is expected to be operational sometime in April. Another 85 member locations are expected to be added during the summer.

In addition to the general orientation session, five schools for Teletypewriter operator instruction will be held at State Police headquarters, March 20-23 and 28. Initial participating departments will each send two trainees to the schools. Instructors will be State Police and Michigan Bell Telephone Company personnel.

Central computer record equipment for LEIN is being installed at State Police headquarters in East Lansing where there also will be network locations in each of the operations and records divisions. The secretary of state office in Lansing also will be a member. Of other initial LEIN locations, 10 will be in State Police posts at Alpena, Bay City, Flint, Jackson, Houghton Lake, Marquette, Paw Paw, Rockford, St. Ignace and Traverse City.

Sheriff department locations at the start will be the counties of Allegan, Berrien, Branch, Genesee, Gratiot, Grand Traverse Huron, Ingham, Jackson, Kalamazoo and Kent.

Participating local police departments at first will include Battle Creek, East Lansing, Flint, Grand Rapids, Holland, Jackson, Kalamazoo, Lansing, Muskegon, Saginaw and Wyoming.

LEIN central records to begin with will include statewide files on wanted persons, wanted autos and revoked, suspended and denied driver licenses. The LEIN program is state financed.

Wayne Bd. Urges Tax Reform, College Dist.

The Wayne Community Board of Education, whose district includes most of Westland adopted resolutions last week urging state fiscal reform and a new community college district which includes Wayne.

On the fiscal reform resolution, the school board pointed out that the Wayne tax rate is now at 37.8 mills (37.60 per \$1,000 of state equalized valuation) and new income must be found to offset the rising inflation costs and the annual pupil increase of 800 to 1,200 per year.

In addition, the board is contracted to pay its teachers the median salary to its staff. The resolution also calls for the state legislators to "support fiscal reform that would include aid to public schools in sufficient quantity to provide quality education for every pupil in the state."

On the community college issue, now before the State Board of Education, Wayne

would be one of 28 public school districts in Western Wayne County to make up the new college district.

The resolution pointed out that a similar college proposal, which included all of Wayne County not part of existing college districts, was defeated last May.

State Police Report 18,414 Dec. Arrests

Michigan State Police officers made 18,414 arrests in December, 16, 621 for traffic offenses and 1,793 on criminal complaints, according to the department's monthly activity report.

In addition, 469 juvenile traffic offenders were arrested and 413 delinquent and three wayward minors were apprehended.

Troopers assisted 6,001 motorists, investigated 11,126 cars, issued 21,594 oral warnings to drivers, and made 17,177 property and 2,397 liquor inspections.

Department vehicles traveled 1,865,913 miles, of which 1,157,378 were on traffic patrol and 708,535 to investigate criminal and other complaints.

The identification section received 12,929 sets of fingerprints, of which 8,399 were criminal and 4,530 noncriminal. Three wanted persons were identified.

Of 1,544 applications for permits to carry concealed weapons, 87 were identified with criminal records through their fingerprints. One unknown dead was identified by the same means.

The scientific crime laboratory conducted 1,127 examinations, including 704 on questioned documents, 184 on firearms, 59 botanical, 58 microscopic, 41 on tool marks, 30 on glass and 51 miscellaneous.

Laboratory assistances numbered 52 for the State Police, 72 for municipal departments, 25 for sheriffs, and 12 for other agencies.

The fraudulent check unit processed 194 bogus checks, identifying 89 of them by name or with previous specimens. Face value of the checks totaled \$16,849.34, an average of \$86.85.

The fire marshal division reported investigations of six explosions, 22 incendiary fires, 24 cases of violations of fire safety laws and regulations, three fires resulting in deaths, and 57 other fire cases. Supplemental investigations and reinvestigations totaled 165.

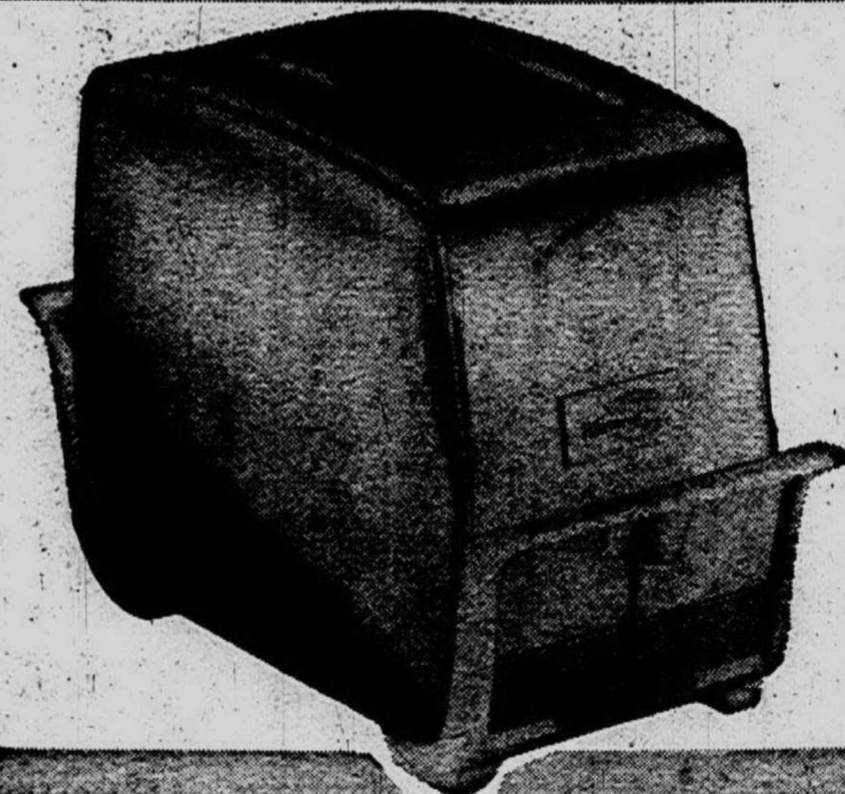

In the same regional, Redford Union's Dave Pike reigned as the 138-pound champ while Larry Qualls, a heavyweight, wound up in third spot.

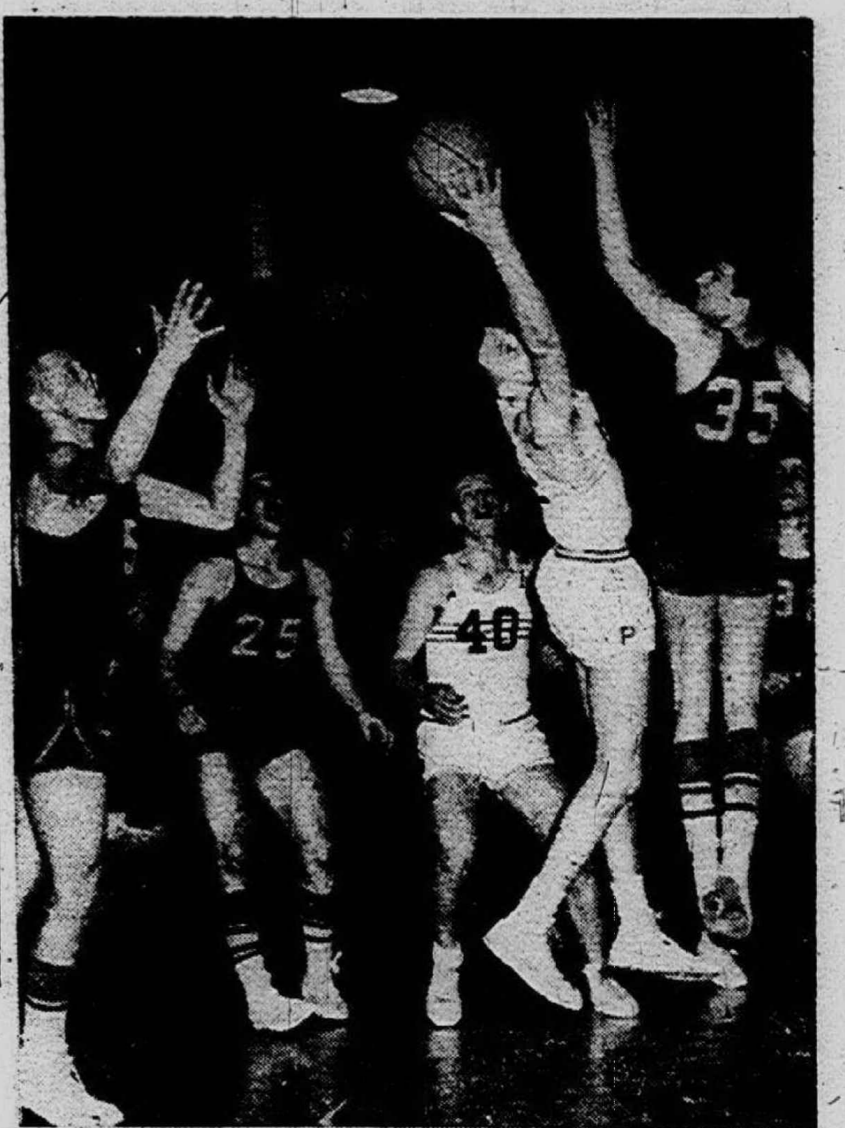

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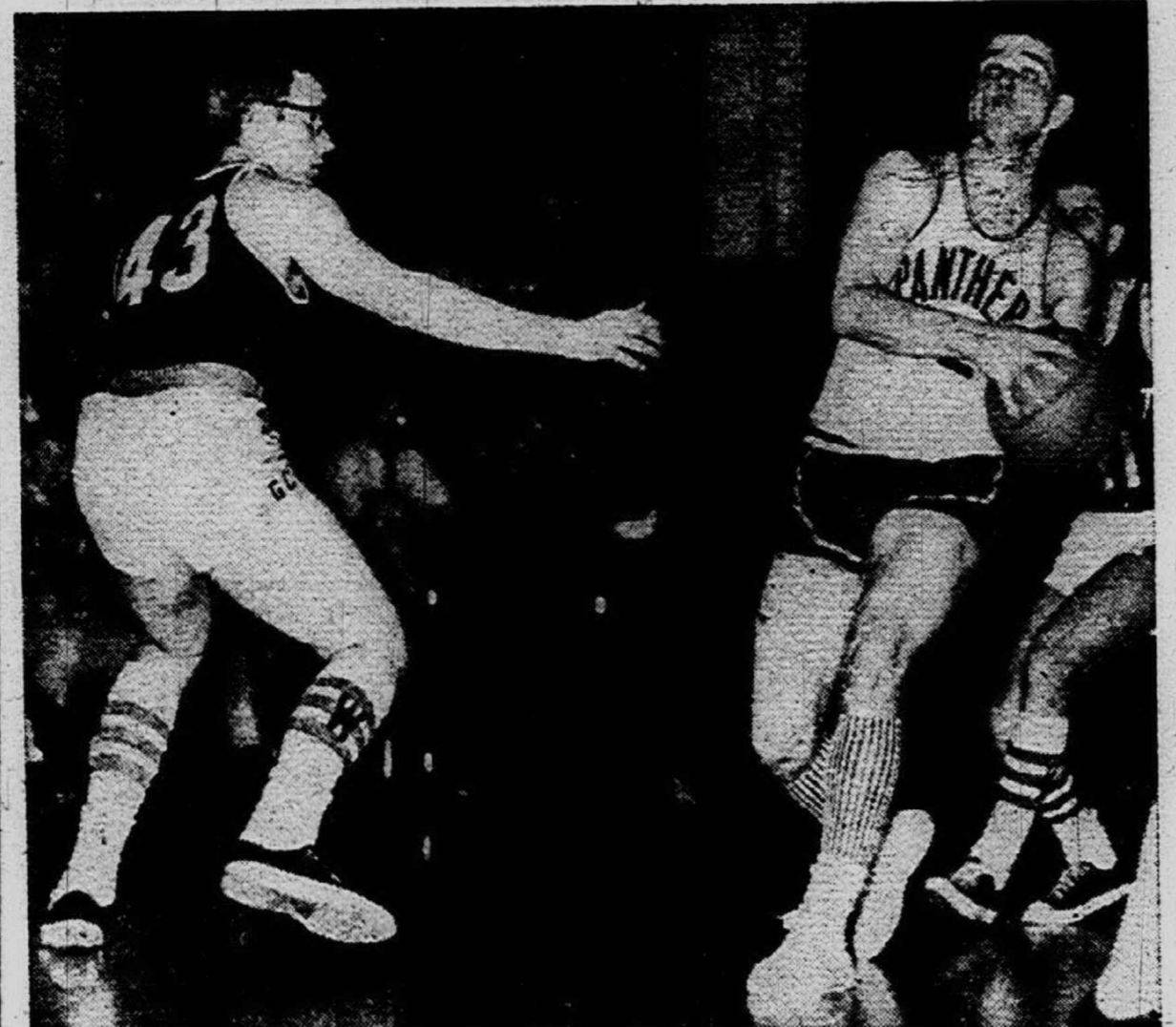

Take a bow, Leland Bjerke. The Redford Union star, who's a certainty to be hailed as "the player-of-the-year" in the Suburban Six League, has written a pair of new scoring records into his school's records.

By finishing with 26 points as he paced RU in a comeback that beat Plymouth, 52-49, in the season's finale, Bjerke:

An interception by Kubik enabled Plymouth to tie the score at 46-46 in the fourth period before Bjerke quickly put Redford Union back on top and Lawrence applied the decisive shot in the fading seconds.

Kubik with 22 points and John Ellison with 12 topped Plymouth which on the Tuesday previous had won under far more dramatic conditions over Allen Park, 60-58.

The Rocks had led the Parkers by four points with 31 seconds on the clock. In the time that remained the Parkers made two baskets, and Plymouth the biggest one of all in the game.

After the Parkers had knotted the score at 58-58, only six seconds remained.

Plymouth quickly fed the ball up to Kubik at midcourt. He took one dribble and let the ball loose.

AN OPEN LETTER

Mr. Charles E. Forsythe, State Director of High School Athletics, Lansing, Mich.

Dear Friend Charlie:

With the opening of the 1967 state high school basketball championships this week, a thought comes to mind.

Why not extend the tournament one more week and decide a TRUE state champ?

The pattern now followed would not have to be discarded. In other words, you still would determine the kings in Classes A, B, C and D.

When that phase is reached, you'd have the four class winners contest the following weekend in a special meet to settle the kingpin of ALL prep cage teams in Michigan.

The idea we think has merit. Besides, a two-day meet between the four class winners would jam even Detroit's 16,000-seat stadium for basketball and command a bundle of extra revenue from television.

We realize that your state association isn't lacking for any more money . . . that the tournament already provides you with enough dollars that you turn a goodly share back each year to the participating schools.

But, what's wrong with kicking back more dollars to the schools or maybe using the special-meet funds for helping needy youngsters, who lack the necessary clothes or other gear, to attend school under happier circumstances?

While on the subject of expanding your tournaments, we still contend that you should do something about setting up a state prep baseball meet for Michigan.

Some of our nearby states have baseball meets and they have the same type of weather in the spring that we do in Michigan. So that weather excuse you often give on why we can't have a state baseball tourney doesn't hold much water.

Most baseball coaches in our area would like to have a baseball tourney. They suggest the ideal approach would be to have all league winners qualify for district play and select deserving independent schools on an at-large basis as the NCAA does for its various tournaments.

By following such a procedure, the number of days required to conduct a tournament would be

Four regulars remained on the bench for one period as Trenton took a 12-11 lead. But when the Bentley first string took over, the score shot up to 27-20 for the Livonians at

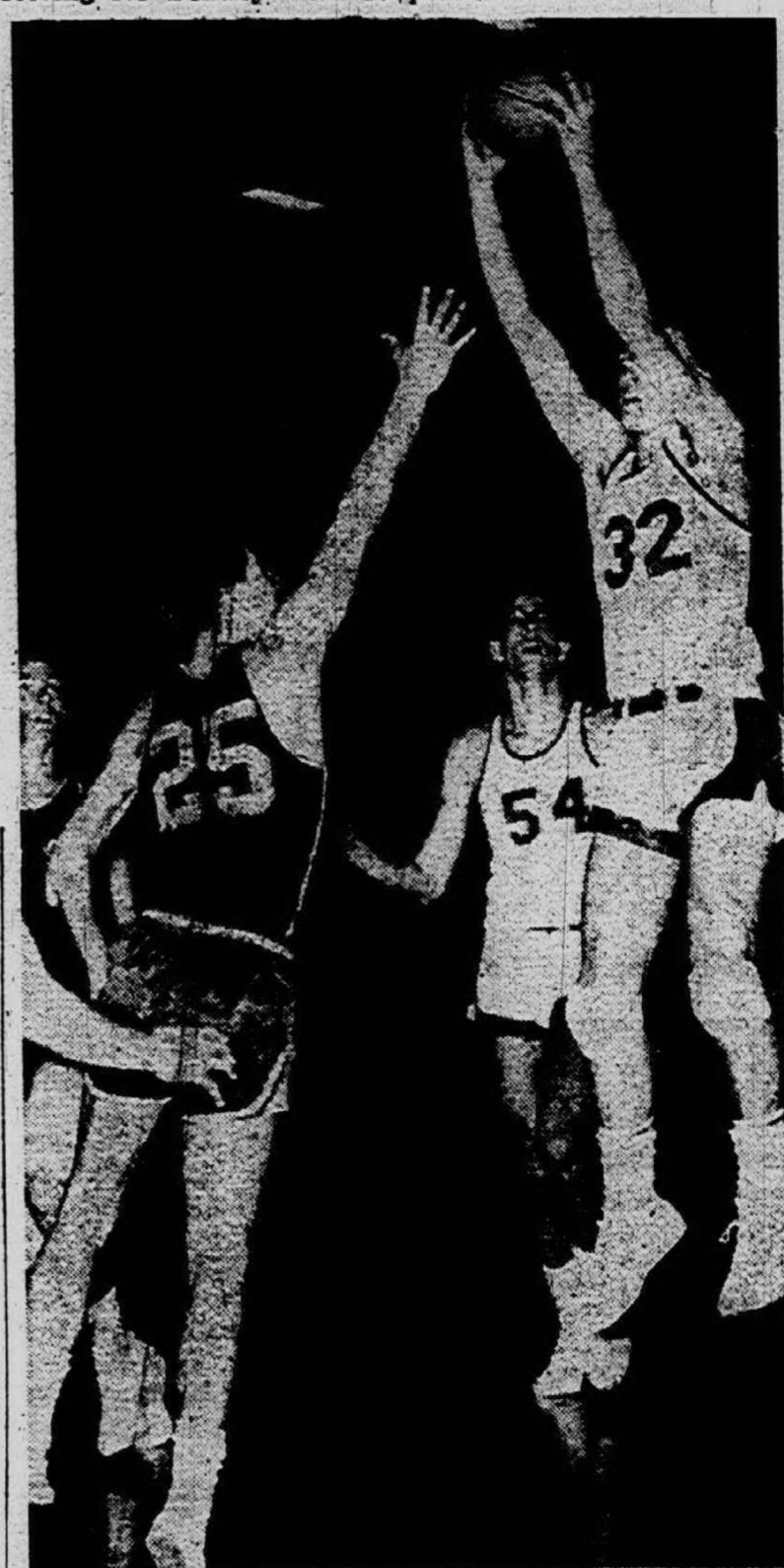
halftime and the rest of the proceedings were pretty much one sided.

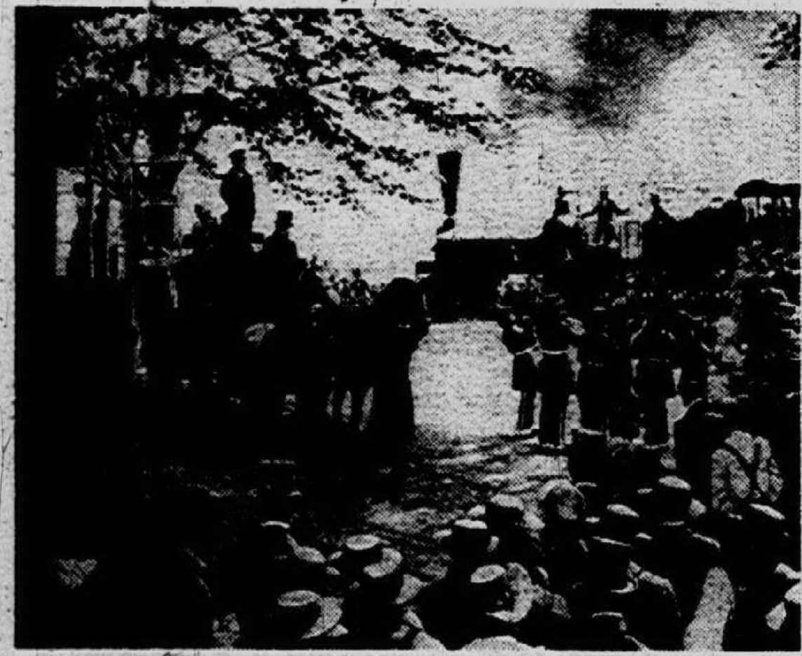

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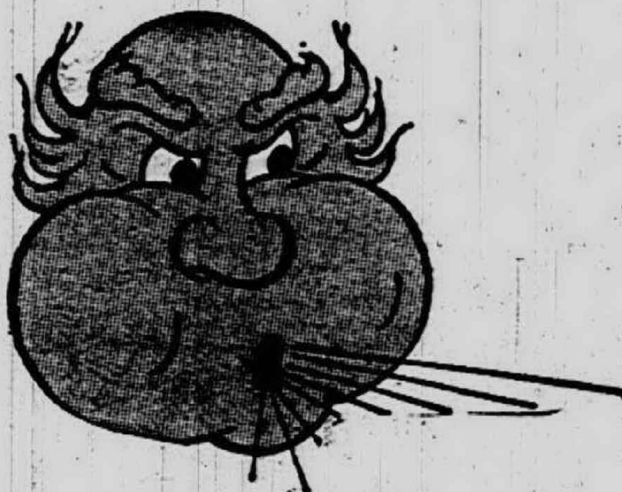
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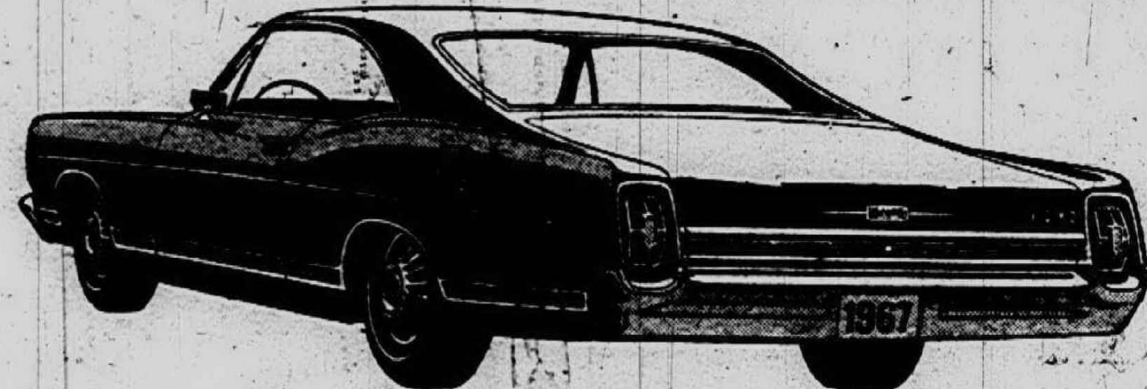

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Women on the GO!

Mrs. Mabel Petersen, who might well be called Livonia's Lady of the Arts, is celebrating a birthday Friday.

She's exercising her feminine prerogative to keep secret the number of candles on the cake.

But there's no question that Mrs. Petersen has filled her years with a great deal of artistic endeavor, community leadership, and just plain enjoyment of life.

The list of cultural contributions she has made to Livonia in the 25 years she's lived here is amazing.

In the years of World War II, when it was Livonia Township instead of a city, she launched a program of Victory Gardens — finding available land, instructing first-time gardeners, organizing and judging produce shows.

Did she know about vegetable gardening because of being raised on a farm?

"Heavens no," Mrs. Petersen laughed. "I read a book-lots of books. I was born on a farm, but we left it when I was eight. I just found out about gardening by study."

She added that she really preferred to raise flowers and has grown some beautiful roses and gladiolas. She founded the Livonia Home Gardeners Club, which meets regularly at Bentley High

School. The widow of realtor A.T.M. Petersen, she has been a teacher and lecturer in the fields of flower arranging, ceramics and china painting.

For the last 13 years, the great interest of her life has been painting.

"Well, to go back a bit, I really painted first when I was 15," Mrs. Petersen said. "But then I liked music better."

So she concentrated on learning piano, organ, trombone, saxophone, and banjo because "when I do a thing, I go at it all the way."

When she took up painting again, she organized the Metropolitan Creative Art Guild, which, now in its 13th year, meets regularly the second Monday of each month in room 116 at Bentley High and draws members from Detroit, Farmington, Redford Township, Plymouth, Dearborn as well as Livonia.

She is proud of the 125 canvases she has done and the teachers under whom she's studied — Professors Guy Palozzola, Fred Victor and George Kamrowski of the University of Michigan, Professor Robert Wilbert of Wayne State University and portrait painter Ben Glicker.

Mrs. Petersen also takes pride in paintings she has sold, the fact that she has exhibited in a New York gallery and given two one-man shows. And she's full of plans for another show this fall.

She feels she does her best work in portraits and figures, and also likes to work in abstract and non-objective subjects. Last on the list comes landscapes. "I don't paint to sell," she says definitely.

Perhaps the best characterization of this exuberant woman is her own statement as she showed off one canvas after another — "I like to try something new — do something crazy — be different."

That's the mark of the artist — however many years young.

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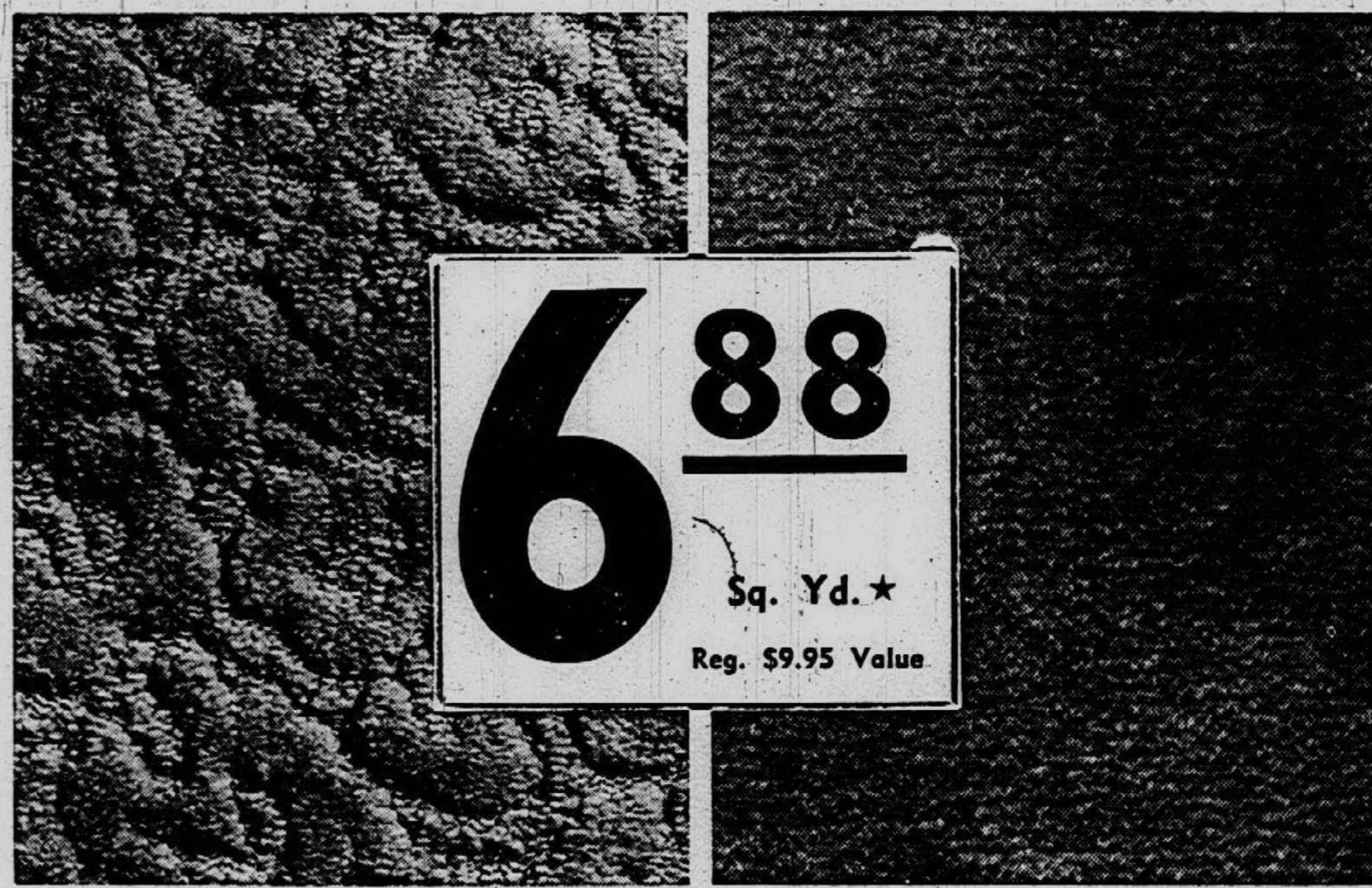

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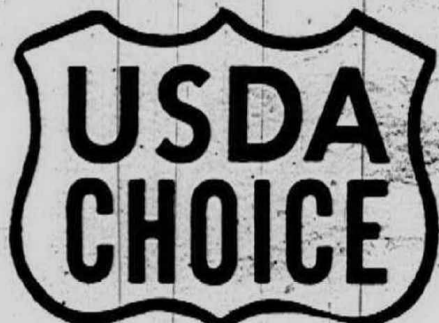

After 13 years of struggling to find their own home, members of the Livonia-Redford Theater Guild finally have a place they can call their very own. The Livonia-Redford Guild headquarters will be located at Five Mile and Beech-Daly in Redford Township.

All construction for their productions and parties will be held in the new building. Money for the building has been raised in a myriad of ways. Profits from the plays, Monte Carlo parties, outright donations, and bake sales have been but a few of the many ways the Livonia-Redford thespians accomplished this almost impossible dream.

Their production "Come Back, Little Sheba" was a fine example of the professional approach the Livonia-Redford thespians found in their presentations. Shirley Hulet was never better in the Shirley Booth leading role.

Now that they have 2600 square feet of their own old Wally suggests they stage all their regular plays right at their headquarters. "Come Back, Little Sheba" would have gained even more impact had it been done in the "open stage" style that the new headquarters could provide. The closeness of the audience for an Inge play creates explosively dramatic atmosphere.

The new headquarters might only be able to seat 100 or 125 people, but the gain in sensitivity, intimacy, and rapport would be well worth the sacrifice of a few seats. Shows could be run for eight performances in the new setting on Beech-Daly and Five Mile to compensate for the loss of extra seats.

At least 12 off-Broadway houses have capacity of 99 seats. The theater housing "The Fantasticks" seats only 185. As a result, this musical's seven year run makes sense. If you put the musical comedy, "Fantasticks" in too large a house it loses much of its charm.

The straight play schedule should be turned over to the new headquarters. Patrons of the Livonia-Redford Theater attractions are as tired of traipsing off to a school auditorium as the actors are. It's time for a change. Let's hope that the Livonia-Redford Guild members heed this plea from Wally. This new bold approach could mean a real "shot in the arm" for the box office.

No doubt many problems associated with such a startling move on their part exists. For 13 years of the Guild's existence they have tackled bigger problems and have conquered them.

The Livonia-Redford Junior Guild is rehearsing "Pied Piper of Hamelin" and "Hansel and Gretel." A veritable double-feature feast of children theater for the youngsters in the area. Bob Gregory, popular stager from the Redford Union High School, is lending his talents to putting these shows in professional shape.

The Farmington Players will be concluding a very successful run of "Death of a Salesman" in their cozy theatrical headquarters out on 12 Mile Rd. They might have a few tickets left for the March 3, 4, or 5 performances.

Food for The Spirit Is Great

No matter what our occupation in life, we all need to feel appreciated.

A little praise feeds the hungry spirit. The approval of our fellow human beings keeps us from withering away. A sense of value is invaluable.

This sense of worth is more easily sustained in some walks of life than in others, it seems to me.

So you can imagine how tickled I was this week when I got a long distance telephone call from Mrs. Don Lester, who lives in Farmington in the summer. In the winter she lives in Florida, where she receives the Farmington Observer by mail.

She had just finished reading the recent Queen of Hearts column about the problems of boots, and she said she enjoyed it so much that she was calling from Florida to tell me so.

Her generous appreciation revived my spirits, and I am grateful.

Her call also brought to my mind a wonderful cook book called Florida Food Fare, which was published by the Entre Nous Club in Bradenton. The mother of my good friend Louise Roth sent it to me, and it is loaded with appealing seafood recipes, among other goodies. This being the Lenten season, you might try these:

HARRY PRATT'S SHRIMP CREOLE

Cut fine, and saute in bacon fat 2 medium onions, 1 green pepper, 2 medium stalks of celery, and 1 clove of garlic.

In a separate pan, simmer 2 large cans of tomatoes, 1 can tomato paste, and 1 tablespoon cooking sherry. Drain onion, etc., of excess grease and add to tomatoes. Add 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce. Simmer for 4 hours and add salt to taste.

Add 2 to 3 pounds cooked, cleaned shrimp, heat 20 minutes, serve over rice.

MRS. CRANE'S FILET OF FLOUNDER IN WHITE WINE

In 2 tablespoons butter, saute 1 small onion thinly sliced and 1 1/2 pounds sliced mushrooms. Add more butter if necessary.

In a shallow buttered baking dish, place enough filets of flounder or other white fish for two to four people. Pour over the onions, mushrooms, and butter. Sprinkle with salt and pepper and 1/4 teaspoon thyme, and tuck in a bay leaf. Sprinkle freely with dry bread crumbs and dot with butter. Pour in one cup white wine. Bake at 350 degrees for 15 minutes, till filets are flaky. Remove bay leaf before serving.
