Far from the din of battle and sound of death, Plymouth families paused Memorial Day to pay homage to America's heroes of the past even as 1967's casualty list was growing in Vietnam and new war clouds gathered in the Middle East.

Plymouth Barber Named In Bar Suit

Plymouth barber John D. Duke today faced charges of obtaining money on false pretenses after allegedly telling a Livonia bar owner he could get him an entertainment license for \$1,000.

It was the latest development in the row over the license for the Shaggy Lion, 39305 Plymouth Road, to use go-go girls. Livonia Councilmen voted April 17 to grant the license and Mayor Harvey W. Moelke vetoed it April 24.

The complaint signed by Alfred L. Rogala, who owns the bar, states that Duke approached him for \$1,000 several times between April 7 and April 28 and that:

Duke "did designedly and falsely represent and pretend that he could obtain an entertainment license for him (Rogala) through his connections."

BOTH ROGALA and Duke's attorney, Marvin R. Stempfen,

refused to discuss the case. Duke was arrested in the Shaggy Lion April 28 after accepting an envelope from Rogala containing \$200 in \$20 bills and 48 pieces of paper cut to the size of currency.

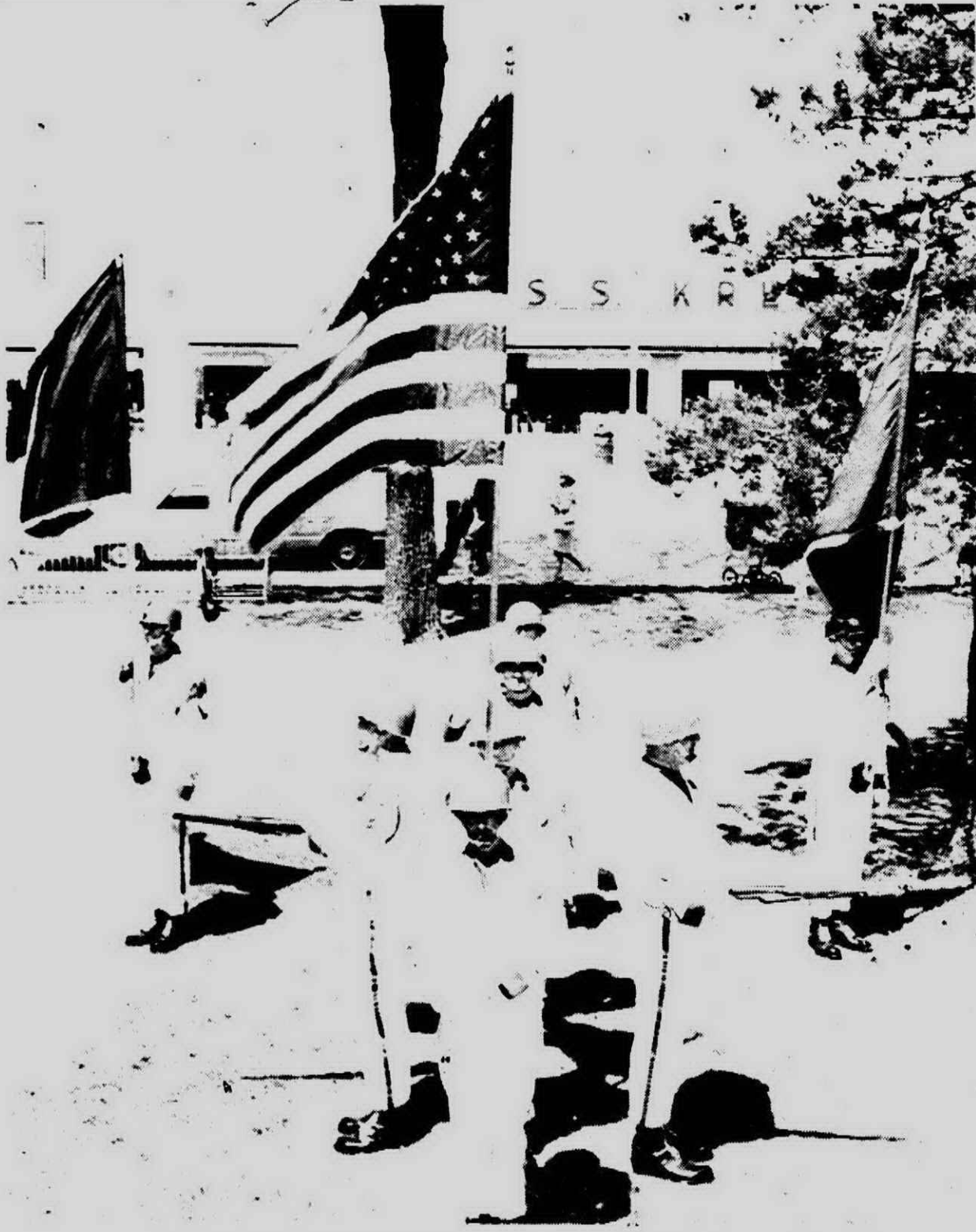

School Candidates Unite On Bond, Millage Issues

If there is organized opposition to the pair of financial proposals up for decision at the June 12 Plymouth School District election it failed to show itself at Thursday night's public forum.

All Board of Education candidates who addressed the 150 persons jamming Plymouth's City Commission chambers jumped aboard the bandwagon favoring their passage as recommended by school officials.

At stake are propositions for an \$8.5 million bond issue to build a second high school, plus extension of the existing five-mill special operating levy for another five years.

An occasional question from the audience indicated there is individual discomfort on the matter in some quarters, but there was no groundswell of opposition presaging a stern campaign.

Led by Board President Gerald Fischer, a six-man panel of experts carefully analyzed the need for adoption of both matters.

Key points stressed were the necessity of expansion caused by an ever-increasing enrollment, and the fact that soaring operational costs cannot be met any way except through the millage extension.

Even the latter, explained Fischer, will not bring about a tax increase at the moment because industrial zoning has led to a life-saving expansion of the tax base, producing new sources of revenue.

Joining Fischer in the presentation of the case for an affirmative vote were Supt. Russell Isbister; Assistant Superintendents Melvin Blunk and William Harding; Assistant Principal John Hoben and Donald Tripp, who served as chairman of the Citizens Committee which earlier studied the need for a second high school.

Calling the five-mill renewal "absolutely essential," Fischer told the meeting that defeat of the proposal would leave the

school system \$550,000 short of minimum operating revenue next year alone.

The forum, moderated by Publisher Philip H. Power of the Mail & Observer, heard directly from 11 of the 12 candidates for the three available openings on the Board of Education. There has been one withdrawal in the race, that of Thomas Hunt, of 609 Herald, and one candidate did not appear for the meeting. That was James Brown, 47111 W. Ann Arbor Trail.

The 11 who did speak, finding they were all backing both financial issues, found no monumental areas of personal difference, and if anything the race appears to resemble a popularity contest.

The only head-to-head confrontation is between incumbent Mrs. Joanne Hulce, 9275 McClumpha Rd., and Mrs. Mary Breen, 41121 Greenbrook Lane, for the three remaining years of the unexpired term of Robert Tripp, who resigned in January.

Offenders Hurry To Make Repairs

The comprehensive housing code enforcement program launched by the City of Plymouth last fall is paying quick dividends.

Since starting a deliberate house-to-house inspection of rented residences in one of the oldest areas of the city, Housing Inspector William Ray has discovered violations in 89 of the first 103 dwellings he has called upon.

Most of the violations have been in connection with faulty or deteriorating electrical wiring, presenting definite fire hazards.

To date, 32 of the violators have made corrections approved as complying with the code and 43 of the others are in the process of complying.

Only 14 are lagging behind the time schedule set by Ray, and he concedes that compliance has been hindered by unavailability of contractors to do the required work.

In two of the cases, violations are so acute that Ray has ordered the buildings "red tagged," meaning they are too hazardous to be occupied until corrections are made.

The area upon which attention has been focused is that lying east of the C & O Railroad and north of Plymouth Rd. Rental dwellings only have been included, because it is felt that these present the most serious instances of code violations.

Although Plymouth has had a housing code on the books since 1961, the policy during the first five years was to inspect only

those dwellings about which complaints were received. Lack of personnel prohibited any wider scope.

Last October, Ray was assigned full time duties as Housing Code Inspector and was instructed to proceed with a block-by-block enforcement program. Ultimately, every dwelling in the city will be given a minute inspection, but it may take several years to accomplish.

City Manager Richard Blodgett commented that for the most part owners whose property has been found in violation of the ordinance have cooperated well by correcting deficiencies without undue delay.

Overloading of electrical circuits through excessive use of modern-day appliances is the principal problem, though also under surveillance are general plumbing, heating, health and fire safety requirements.

While the housing code enforcement program has authority to compel action by owners through the courts, voluntary compliance is sought wherever possible, both Blodgett and Ray explained.

Only one court proceeding has been originated so far under the stepped-up enforcement program, and in that the owner was convicted and fined.

During his talk to the members of the Business Men's Forum last Thursday, Willis Hall, the tax expert and veteran member of the Wayne County Board of Supervisors mentioned Vallier and stated:

"He may be a bit loud and forceful, but he does a great job on the Board of Supervisors. He is a force for good and you always can depend on him to take a stand on any subject that may be discussed.

"In this fashion he is a good representative of the community he represents and is a valuable man for the entire county."

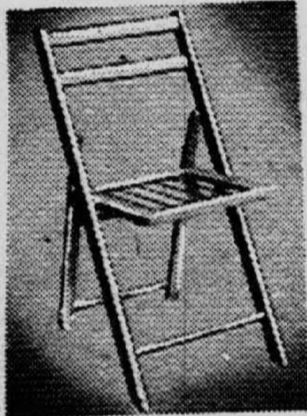

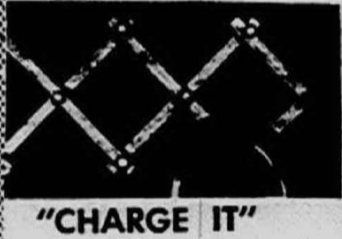

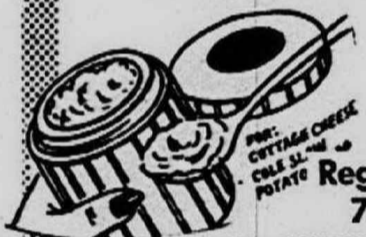

He was arraigned before Municipal Judge James R. McCann May 29 and released on a \$10,000 bond secured by his home at 1341 Sheridan, Plymouth.

Five Livonia police officers were in the Shaggy Lion when the envelope changed hands at an adjoining table.

After the first approach by Duke, the manager of another bar, Floyd Kurkowski notified police of the development, said Det. Capt. Robert J. Turner, Det. Sgts. James Grode and Ronald Butcher later visited the bar and saw a meeting between

Duke and Rogala. Another meeting was set up between Rogala and Duke.

AT THE NEXT MEETING, April 28, Det. Sgts. Lee Grievie, Grode, Butcher, Turner and Policewoman Lillian Heithner were in the bar. Judge McCann was at a nearby table but Turner said the judge told police he did not notice what happened.

After the exchange of the envelope, police said they followed Duke and found the envelope in his waistband.

Duke stood mute on his arraignment and McCann set the examination for Monday. Stempfen has asked for a delay until a later date.

said, "does away with the old practice of becoming friendly with the local assessor to keep your rate down. No longer does the local assessment mean such—except as a measuring point from which to launch the equalization factor."

He cited the City of Plymouth and Plymouth Township as an example. For instance, a piece of residential property valued at \$10,000 is assessed at \$3539 in the City and equalized to \$4768 while in the Township the same piece of property, assessed at \$2541, is equalized at \$4514. He also pointed out that \$10,000 in personal property in the city is assessed at \$4004 and equalized at \$5395, while in the Township it is assessed at \$3000 and equalized at \$5330.

"Another new move that you will notice on your tax bills this year", he stated, "is that your local assessed valuation will not be listed. The only figures on your bill will be the state equalized figure."

"In time" he continued, "we hope to have all the assessments on one roll and have one assessor for the entire county working with computers. That will do away from a lot of work that is most costly at the moment."

"And," he concluded, "some way will be found to bring the County Board of Supervisors into some semblance of a working unit."

"Personally, I would like to see only five supervisors and a manager run the county. But, it may be that we will have to settle for 38 to match our state legislative districts."

## School Student Doubles As A Prize-Winning Artist

At 17, Mary Ellen Bloom, daughter of the Howard Blooms of Turkey Run, already has a collection of prizes for her art work.

Recently she won the Jaycee International Relations trophy, when her drawing was picked as the award to be given to the Jaycee chapter in Michigan which had done the most for international relations.

Last winter, one of her ink drawings won first place in competition with 1,000 entries, in a contest sponsored by Hallmark.

When members of the school board wanted to give a picture to retiring superintendent of schools, Russell Isbister, they asked Mary Ellen to do one of her ink drawings for him. She often has people call and ask her to make a picture for their homes.

In spite of all this, Mary Ellen is an unassuming, brown-haired teenager. She plans to go to the University of Michigan next fall to study art, but that isn't her only interest.

She spent last summer in France as an exchange student, and hopes to pursue her interest in languages.

"I'm interested in being myself," she said. "I don't want to fit into a mold."

"Life is too cut and dried, if you identify yourself with one type--say the hippies. You may find you want to change later on."

"Although I like psychedelic art and other experimental art forms, I don't know how enduring they are. When you look at something like that, and a Greek statue, there is no doubt which is going to last."

Kaleidoscopes are the latest forms that have become popular in the art world.

"They are usually oil paintings, which resemble what children see through kaleidoscopes," Mary Ellen explained. "Artists use bright colors and geometric designs to make these paintings."

"I just sold one which I did with tissue paper. That was unusual, but I like to use tissue paper, because it comes in such bright, pretty colors."

A love of beauty has been one of the guiding instincts in Mary Ellen's life. She has been interested in art as long as she can remember.

"Actually there are better painters in my class, but I enjoy working with all forms of art," she pointed out. "I'd like to learn how to do graphics--printing, lithograph, and silk screening."

Although she has been studying art for years, including lessons at Cranbrook and the Art Institute, many of her prize-winning drawings have been done in a matter of minutes.

"For the Jaycee contest, I had one poster finished, and at the last minute, decided I didn't like it," she explained. "So I did the winning poster in about a half an hour."

"I did the drawing that won the Hallmark contest one day when I didn't have anything else to do."

"We have music playing in the art room, and that day the theme from 'Zorba the Greek' was playing. I made some dancing figures who seemed to go with the music. I hung the painting up to dry, thinking I would throw it out in a few days. But Mrs. Hudson insisted I enter it in the contest."

"I value spontaneity in art work. It makes things expressive and not labored over," she pointed out. "Of course you can't be spontaneous with an oil painting or a sculpture, because they take so long to make."

Why does she think so much of her work has won prizes? "I've been very lucky," she explained modestly.

**BEEF:** This week there are a number of features available--a wide variety of steaks, corned beef, and liver. Some stores are offering a variety of wholesale cuts for freezer storage. In comparing costs, be sure to remember that any freezer ads cover the "untrimmed" weight, and waste must be included in the cost.

**PORK:** Special retail prices this week are scattered--few and far between, but mostly on smoked hams, with occasional mention of loin chops, bacon and roll sausage in the ads. Some markets are suggesting freezer buys of whole loins and shoulders.

**POULTRY:** Fryer prices continue to be about the same as the last few weeks. Some stewing chickens and roasters may be found at lower prices this week.

**FISH:** Supplies of fresh perch, smelt, and ocean fish continue to be plentiful. Whitefish continues to be relatively scarce, though supplies from Western Canada have eased a bit.

**EGGS AND DAIRY:** After a decided drop in price early last week, egg prices have held fairly steady. With a 6-8¢ difference between large and medium sizes of the same grade, there is no doubt that the large eggs are the better value by weight. All eggs are expected to begin their seasonal rise in price this month.

In this first week of Dairy Month, a number of dairy products are also in the ads at fractionally reduced prices.

Add one can crushed pineapple to the filling. Also any kind of prepared pie filling or fresh fruits, such as strawberries or blueberries may be used as the topping.

# Guest Sermon

## Fossils, Fungi and Filaments . . . .

Fossils, those frozen cross sections of our planet's far distant past, fascinate men. Sometimes a lump of amber washes up on the shores of the North Sea, and preserved within is an ancient insect so lifelike that it almost seems about to enjoy the summer breeze again. Sometimes the fossil is an ancient animal, fish, or tree buried by nature in such a fashion that time did not bring decay but instead turned the remains to stone.

Sometimes, when the truth is in, the Church appears to be one of these mysterious artifacts called fossils—an institution out of the past, preserved by an accident of nature. Sometimes, the Church, like the English House of Lords, appears to be a fossil, tolerated good humoredly for tradition's sake.

And then there are the fungi--those flaccid, fraudulent creatures who keep alive by a lifetime of sponging. Did you know that our word fungi comes from the Greek word for sponge? Fungi are plants without chlorophyll and are therefore incapable of photosynthesis and the manufacture of their own nutrition. Instead, they live as parasites.

If we are honest with ourselves, do we not sometimes feel that the Church is something of a parasite on the social body, reflecting our culture rather than shaping it, ab-

sorbing values rather than creating them. This problem is as old as the absorption by the early Church of Jewish apocalypticism and Greek dualism; as recent as the chaplains of World War II walking beneath

their contending banners inscribed piously: "Gott Mit Uns" and "In God We Trust"; and as widespread as the bland racism of "Christian" America. But then there are also filaments. Filaments are used in

electron tubes which, in turn, are used in a variety of devices such as X-Ray machines and household lightbulbs. The filament is a conductor of power, usually from an external source; and as it conducts this

power, it gives off radiation. When this radiation falls within certain frequencies, it can be seen as light. I believe this is something of what the Church, in the providence of God, is meant to be. It is as

a filament and as a conductor of the power and reality of a higher source, a source we label God, that the Church lives and functions and fulfills its calling. The world stumbles along in

darkness and like a blinded Cyclops seems bent only on meaningless destruction; but then, praise God, His power once again flows through His people, the wires glow, and light is given to a waiting world. It

is in that moment, in a mysterious way, that the fossils and the fungi are reborn to become the filaments of the earth. Called to serve God and man and to give hope and light to a dark world.

## Result Same For Rivals In Baseball

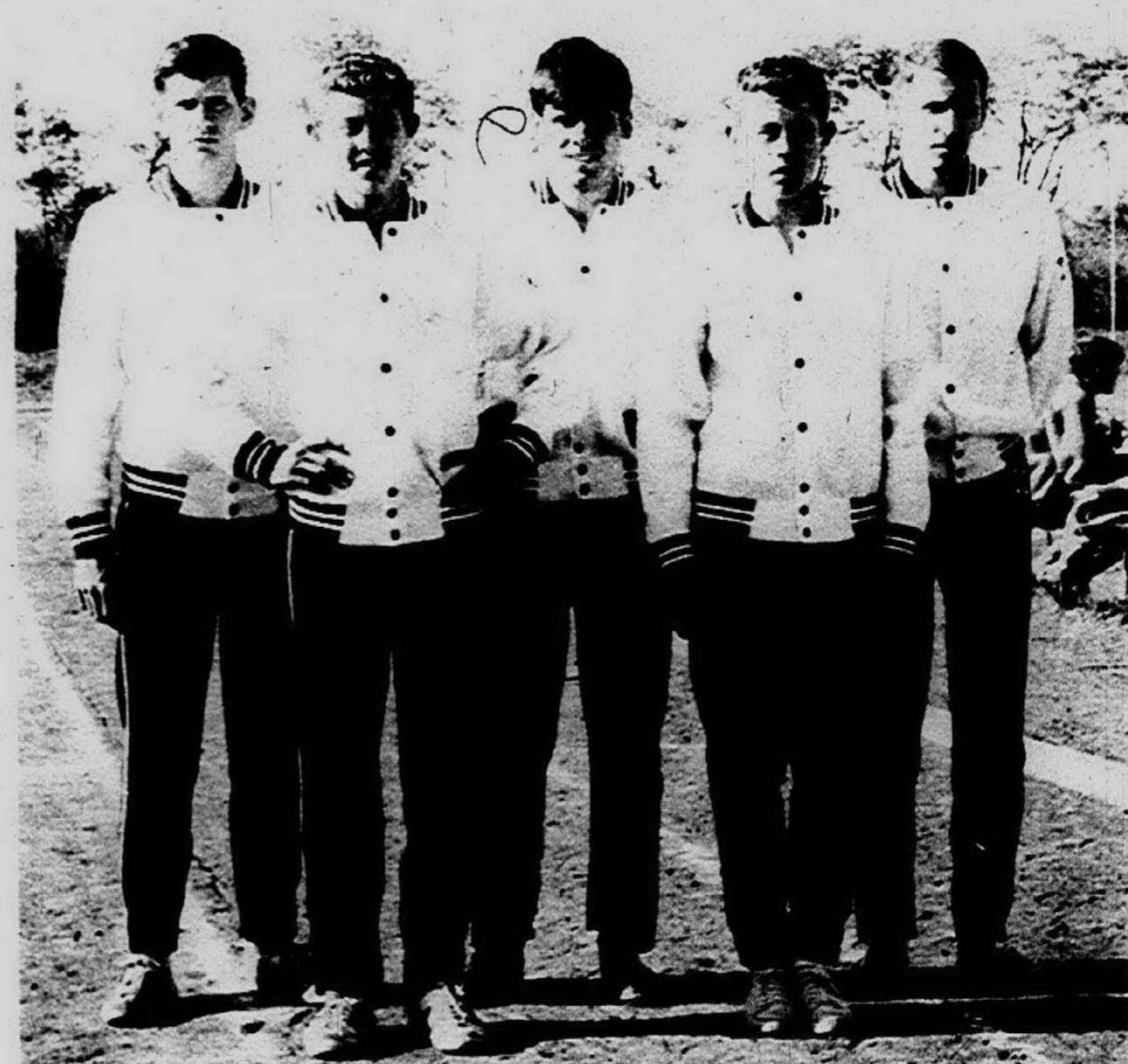
Three-hit pitching by Dan Wolfman enabled Farmington to best North Farmington, 3-1, in the final baseball game of the season for the two teams.

# A 'Wild' Garden Grows -- With Careful Attention

"This used to be a neighborhood dumping spot," said Mrs. F. R. Hoheisel as she pointed out a jack-in-the-pulpit growing in her backyard "wild" garden at 698 S. Evergreen St., Plymouth.

What was once an eyesore has been transformed into an oasis of natural beauty, literally carpeted with flowers in Spring. "We had to spend a lot of time picking up empty bottles and cans, but each year now, more wild flowers seem to come up."

WHEN MR. AND MRS. Hoheisel purchased their wooded lot four years ago, they decided to keep the backyard "wild", reminiscent of the woods of northern Michigan.

There are large beech and maple trees, huge red and white oaks, ash, basswood and elm. It is a remnant of an old forest that once covered much of southern Michigan and is what the botanists term a "beech-maple climax forest"—the end result in a long series of plant communities that successively occupied the area starting perhaps when an ancient glacial lake filled in to become a bog, then a meadow, then a brushy field and finally a hardwood forest with beech and maple trees predominating.

Native plants have been encouraged to grow and spread and the evergreens and ground covers are arranged skillfully so that they blend with the wild plants. Paths, covered with a thick layer of wood chips, wind between the trees, making it easy to get close to the various wild flowers as they come into bloom.

Outstanding are the large white trillium, one of Michigan's most beloved wild flowers. These dramatic beauties, with their three white petals and three bright green leaves, are in bloom for many weeks. Then before they fade away they turn a soft shade of pink. MOST OF THE spring flowers are blue. The first to bloom are the pale blue hepaticas. Next come the violets in pale blue and deep purple as well as yellow and white. These are soon followed by blue wood phlox and orchid toned wild geraniums.

Mrs. Hoheisel had introduced some plants of Virginia blue-bell (mertensia), and these have multiplied successfully and formed large drifts of beautiful sky-blue flowers. The myrtle and ajuga planted as ground cover also have blue flowers.

This melange of blue flowers set against a background of tender spring-green foliage makes a combination that is cool and serene. As the season progresses the greens become rich and deep and there are fewer wild flowers in bloom.

ALL THROUGH the year the garden is enlivened by bird songs—woodpeckers, black-capped chickadees, even a pine vireo. Some are passing visitors, but others are permanent residents. Hoheisel has tucked bird houses and feeders into

nooks and corners. A favorite feeder is a shallow pan attached to the top of an old stump near the back door. On a winter morning dozens of birds flock to this feeder.

Mr. and Mrs. Hoheisel have recognized the unique char-

acter of their lot and have utilized and enhanced the natural features to be found on their site. They have created a "wild", but by no means uncared-for, garden. The result is charming and refreshingly "different".

## 'Convenience' Means Sales Will Soar

They expect 80 per cent of the meat sales in 1980 will be in the convenience or prepared form.

# Suburbia's Bonds Not Bad As Risks

As credit risks, most of the western governmental suburbs rank about "medium."

The investment bankers consider their bonds neither highly protected nor poorly secured; they're good, but not outstanding, investments.

According to Moody's rating service, all the school districts in this area--Farmington, Clarenceville, Livonia and Plymouth--get a "Baa" rating.

Not all the cities and townships have been rated, because they don't have the same borrowing power and haven't gone into the money market the way the schools have.

Neither Plymouth city nor township is rated. Farmington Township, with its vast sewer building programs, is "Baa" on Moody's scale. The City of Farmington is unrated by Moody's, but with Standard & Poor's it stands at "BBB," which is the equivalent.

Northwestern Wayne Community College District, which operates Schoolcraft College, also had a "Baa."

WHAT DO THE RATINGS MEAN?

"Aaa" is the best. Only Lansing and Kalamazoo--both cities and school districts--are "Aaa" in the State of Michigan. Their bonds are the best quality, lowest investment risk, best protection of interest payments, least likelihood of being volatile.

"Aa" is next. These are held by a number of larger out-state cities. They're still considered high grade, but their margins of protection may not be as great as the "Aaa" bonds. Highland Park and Grosse Pointe are the only units in Wayne County with "Aaa" ratings; there is some doubt, however, if Highland Park would still get such a rating because it hasn't issued many bonds recently.

"A" comes next. School districts like River Rouge, Dearborn, Trenton and Grosse Ile have "A" ratings. Their debts are considered higher medium grade.

"Baa"--the classification in which most of the western suburbs fall--is next in line. Detroit has this rating.

"Ba" is considered weak. In Wayne County, only Inkster ranks that low. Bonds with a "Ba" rating can't be purchased by banks.

The State has a "Aa" rating, but it means little because it has few general obligation bonds outstanding. State highway bonds, of which there are con-

siderably more on the market have "A" ratings.

WHAT IS A GOOD CREDIT RATING?

A recent market letter quotes a 3.65 per cent interest rate for a 20-year "Aaa" bond; 3.75 per cent for a "Aa" 3.85 for an "A-plus"; 3.95 for an "A-minus"; 4.05 for a "Baa-plus"; 4.2 for a "Baa"; and 4.30 for a "Baa-minus."

Lots of mathematics are involved in deciding a credit rating, but it's still an art, not a science, say the men in the field.

Biggest underwriter of municipal securities in the state is First of Michigan Corp. It puts together brochures on major bond issues for prospective investors that cover not only finances but also the economy, the population, the neighborhoods, the major tax-paying industries, highway and other transportation facilities.

Joseph M. Mengden, senior vice president of First of Michigan, says investors look first at a number of mathematical factors.

Population is first. Any unit with less than 25,000 population is unlikely to be considered by a big investor, Mengden says.

The state equalized valuation of property in the local unit--that is, the tax base--is a key factor. So are the amounts of existing debts.

Admissions are \$1 for adults and 50 cents for children. Proceeds will be used to sponsor an assault on several world's flying records by a chapter member, Prof. Ed Leshner of Ann Arbor.

Leshner, a University of Michigan professor, will fly the Leshner "Teal" with which he hopes to capture from Europe a number of distance and altitude records for light planes.

President Robert K. Brown, of Garden City, said Sunday's events will include parachute jumps, low-level aerobatics, model flying, high-level aerobatics, fly-bys of homebuilt and antique crafts and a "peanut drop" for the youngsters.

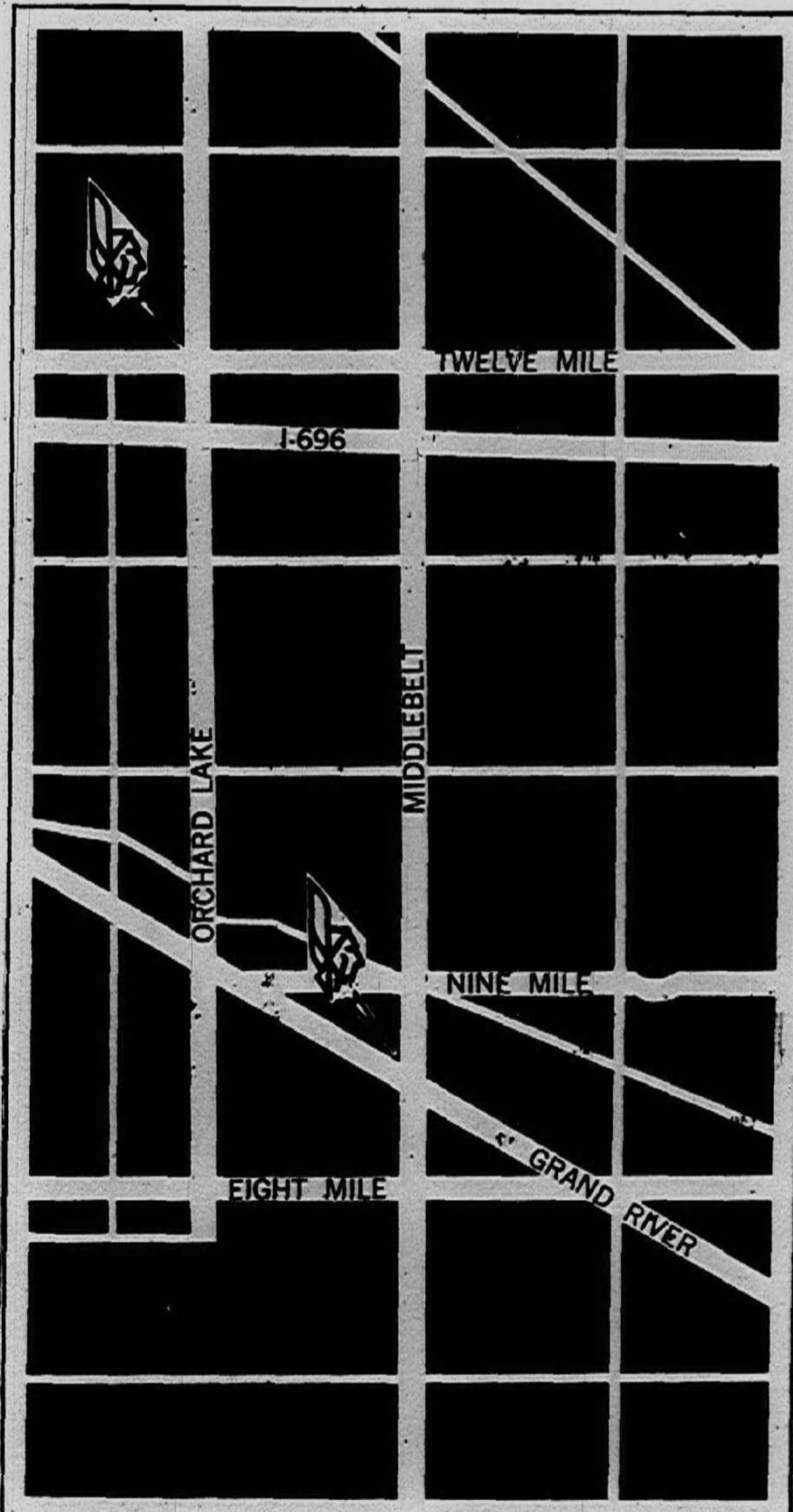

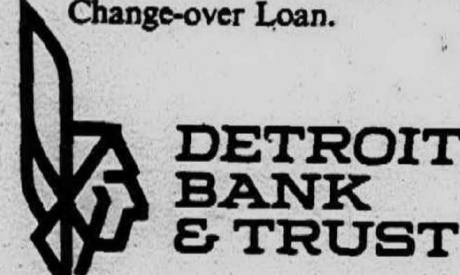
