National Bank Considering Shifting Of Major Activities

The National Bank of Detroit is considering a substantial shifting of its operations in the Plymouth area that will center around the construction of a new building at Sheldon and North Territorial Road, it has been learned by the Mail & Observer.

The new building, in the planning stage for some time, is expected to be completed during the year and with the completion will come the general shift.

According to the rumors -- and no one in an official capacity would deny it -- the in-

stallation operations which employ 30 persons will be transferred from Penniman Avenue to the new location. The Trust Division also may be located in the new site.

Now, according to the information, keen competition among the other banks in the Township and fringe areas, is causing a hastening of the plan.

It was pointed out that the Bank, in its present site, was not in a good competitive position due to the lack of parking and drive-in deposit accommodations. These are available at the banks in the outskirts.

One bank official, who wished to remain anonymous for obvious reasons, pointed out that the bank, which has been on the corner of Main St. and Penniman Avenue for years, would remain as the core of the operation regardless of what shifts are made.

FOR SOME time it has been known that the bank was considering some changes. This first came to light with the building of the temporary branch on Sheldon Road. Nothing further than a bare announcement was made at that time.

School Chief Sounds Warning

James Rossman, superintendent of the Plymouth Community School District, has peered into the future and predicted "financial chaos for the school district" unless Canton Township's "elected officials and citizens will look seriously at the future and consider some re-zoning."

The superintendent laid future financial school district problems squarely on the shoulders of Canton unless something is done to relieve the burden.

Rossman, speaking before the Western Homeowners Association Wednesday night, said that predictions indicate an estimated doubling of population in the next five or six years.

"THERE IS a potential of at least eight times the present population in the Plymouth School District or a population of 240,000 with more than 60,000 school age youth," he said.

"Let us assume," he continued, "that 10,000 homes will be constructed in Canton Township during the next 10 or 12 years."

The outspoken superintendent stated that current trends indicate an average of 1.3 school age children per home and all of these would be enrolled in Plymouth schools. This would yield 13,000 children.

"Current tax rates applied to present valuations on production homes would produce annually \$2 million for operation and \$730,000 for building and debt.

"At least \$320 million in new industry and business would be needed to keep an adequate tax base to provide for educational services."

Selfridge Squadron Called Up

Only one Michigan unit has been affected by the U.S. reserves callup in the new Korean crisis.

It is the 305th Air Reserve Rescue Squadron, headquartered at Selfridge Air Force Base near Mt. Clemens.

UNAFFECTED by the callup was the 127th Tactical Reconnaissance Wing, an Air National Guard unit headquartered at Detroit Metropolitan Airport and at Battle Creek's Kellogg Field, according to Air Force and state spokesmen.

The Pentagon source could give no immediate indication last week as to where the Selfridge air reservists might be sent.

President Johnson Thursday called up 14,000 air reservists and guardsmen and 600 naval

City Sells Water Mains To Township

After hanging in the balance for three years, the City of Plymouth finally agreed to sell to the Township the water mains in the Plymouth Colony Subdivision, Sheldon and Ann Arbor Roads, and mains on Sheldon Rd. between Joy and Ann Arbor Rd.

The Board of Trustees approved a check for \$20,000 for the purchase of the mains at its Tuesday night meeting.

ROSSMAN, mincing no words, flatly stated that so far Canton Township has all of its industrial zoning in the Wayne School District in the southern portion of the township and none in the Plymouth District.

"Where will \$320 million in industry locate in the Plymouth School District portion of Canton Township? Where will additional industry locate to balance future residential growth beyond 10,000 homes," he asked.

Rossman said that other units of government have cooperated but "Canton creates a unique problem because its industrial zoned property is in one school district and its residentially zoned property in another.

"Future school financial problems will be serious unless major changes occur in Canton zoning in the Plymouth School District area," he concluded.

Radio To The Rescue 'Hams' Aid Mothers' March

Something new--and different--is being added to the annual Mothers' March in Plymouth.

When the Mothers' make their visit to the homes in the Plymouth Community on Tuesday evening they will be aided, and guided, by the radio "hams" of the area.

"It is all very simple," Mrs. Velma Wee, chairman of the March explained, "but it should be most helpful."

Under the plan the "hams" will establish headquarters in Plymouth City Hall where a chief operator will be on duty throughout the evening.

The other "hams" will patrol the streets in marked cars and drive slowly. They will be available for any help that may be needed.

"SOME of our marchers do not have transportation," Mrs. Wee pointed out, "and in these cases the marcher will contact a marked car and a radio message will be sent to City Hall. In this way the marchers will be protected, too."

Mrs. Wee also explained that the same method would be employed to have the money taken to City Hall. Any of the marchers who desire help in this area of the activity will call a radio car, the message will be sent, and the help will be sent.

"We used a few of the radio people last year," Mrs. Wee went on, "but little was known about it. It was an experiment that worked well enough to make it a major part of the program this year."

MORE than 300 women are expected to join in the march on Tuesday evening.

They have been divided into groups in order that all of the 6,000 homes can be visited.

Last year the March attracted \$3,100 in contributions on one of the worst nights of the year from the standpoint of weather.

Dump Action Delayed By Battle Of Words

For lack of agreement between Plymouth Township Trustees and the owner, the life expectancy of the Township dump hangs in the balance.

The Board of Trustees, Tuesday night, rejected an offer by the owner to charge a dumping fee to township residents.

The board did not object to the proposed new fees, but felt that the manner in which the new offer was worded, the dump might be closed in a year even if its capacity was not reached.

The previous agreement stated that the dump would be operated for 10 years or until the dump was filled and township residents could use it without charge.

The Board indicated a belief that because the dump is not filled the first agreement is still in force.

However, the owner, Joseph Szalay, argued that the first 10 years of the dump's operation have passed and he now wants to assess a dumping fee.

He said that if the board agrees to allow him to charge the fee his offer would then be an addendum to the original agreement made ten years ago and the new agreement would be renewable on a yearly basis.

The Board objected to the insertion of the renewable clause in the new agreement because it felt that Szalay could close the dump at the end of the year.

Two More High Schools May Be Needed

In the last five years, the Plymouth school district has gained the unprecedented number of 3,000 students and predictions show that this growth will become more intense in the next four years.

In 1962, there were 5,304 students enrolled in all grade levels throughout the district and that number increased tremendously to 8,450 as of December, 1967.

Five years ago the district built new facilities valued at \$4,325,367, but the five year span to 1967 saw that value figure jump to six times that amount to \$25,103,033.

However, instead of simply repeating itself along the same lines the number of enrollments in the next four years is expected to double that of present count.

Predictions indicate that by 1971 there will be 14,055 students which would require two more high schools, three more middle schools and six more elementary schools.

The 1967 portion of the split school year saw 24 new classrooms added throughout the district. This represented an increased capacity of 780 students over the year before.

Already scheduled for completion next fall is one new middle school and one new elementary school which will expand the present enrollment capacity to nearly 1,720 spaces for students.

The 24 new additions are expected to cost approximately \$829,049 and prices for construction and equipment are expected to raise the cost of school building considerably in the next four years.

IT WAS emphasized that the present location was "home" and that it would remain as such.

While no plans have been announced for the old building, it is known that, several years ago, elaborate plans for the exterior, calling for additional office space and a balcony, were rejected because the estimated cost of \$300,000.

It was known, too, that among the plans considered in past years was the purchase of property beside and behind the present building for such things as parking and drive-in banking. None of these plans ever went beyond the planning stage.

Meanwhile, several other large Detroit banks have built branches in the Township and outlying areas. With each of these the Plymouth bank lost some of the monopoly it had enjoyed for years.

UNDER STATE law, it was pointed out, no other bank is permitted to establish a branch within the Plymouth City limits. An independent bank, however, could be established, though there is little likelihood of that with all the banking facilities now available. The present bank had its start as an independent and was known as the Plymouth United Savings Bank.

Among the other changes that will be made at "the old stand" in the next several months will be replacement of Floyd Kehrl, who has served as president for years. He is retiring in May and will be succeeded by Robert Barbour.

This shift, however, is the only one that will be substantiated at this time.

Taxpayers Given Break

Performing a yearly resolution, the Township Board of Trustees has resolved to waive the four per cent penalty on the 1967 property taxes.

The waiver covers both real and personal taxes from Feb. 15 through Feb. 29, 1968 inclusive.

What About Future? It Will Belong To Those Who Prepare For It Now

Now that all of the rosy forecasts for 1968 have been made by the seers and beautiful word pictures have been painted by the civic and business leaders, we are faced with the moment of truth—that the problems also are on the increase in every community.

One of the major problems, of course, concerns taxes and the claim that the homemaker has been burdened to the limit. It is evident that some new avenue other than a levy against real estate must be found to provide the services to which most of us have grown accustomed.

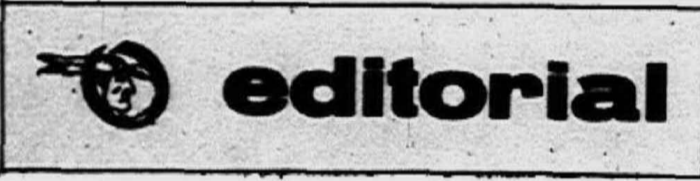
As a result, the race is on to attract a broader tax base. This can be done under our present system only by the luring of business and industry into the area of the problem.

Ofttimes, much of the problem is overlooked by the average citizen, but each new home in an area is an added cost burden despite the amount of taxes paid for real estate.

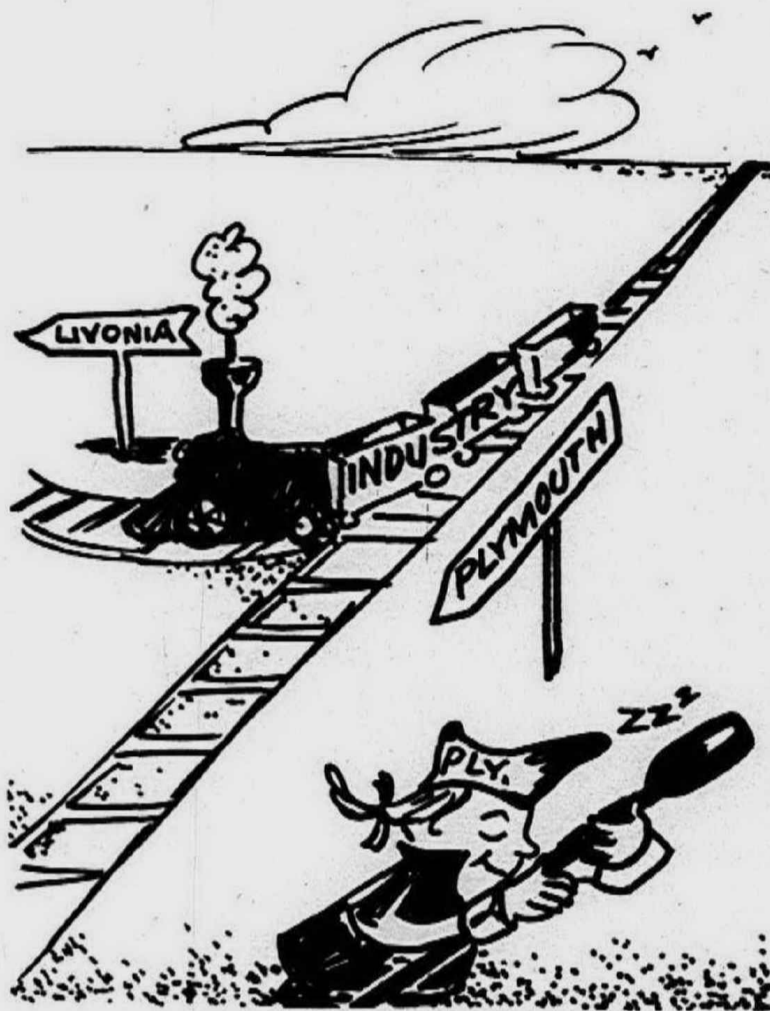
In the Plymouth area, for example, it has been estimated by school officials that for each new home costing \$24,000, the school district alone needs \$32,000 in new business and industry just to stay even.

This is a fact that is the most often overlooked, but a new residential area adds nothing but problems in return for the beautification of the area.

Each new community must have water and sewer; a drainage system; sidewalks and roads; police and fire protection; and, most important — schools and the personnel to provide education for the children. This adds up to a pretty bill.



ASLEEP AT THE SWITCH



The more progressive areas are aware of the need and are preparing to meet the challenge.

Drive along the highways in many sections and you will see the development of the latest fad — the industrial park.

It used to be that communities attempted to attract a single industry. Many were delighted

with a single new plant. But under the pressure of today's economy and the area's needs a single plant no longer is the solution.

Thus has evolved the industrial park — to attract industry in clusters.

In these parks the community develops the acreage by constructing roads, installing water and sewers and handling most of the zoning. In return, after an industry chooses one of these sites, the services are then paid for in special assessments.

This plan has worked well in many areas. The best example is the neighboring city of Livonia, where at least two of these larger industrial parks are now being filled. More than that, Livonia has more land being held in abeyance in the hope that it, too, can be used for large type industries.

In contrast, the City of Plymouth has only a bit of land — one and one-half acres — available for such development. As a result any growth in the city must be high rise. The City of Plymouth must build up — not out.

Just the opposite is the case in the Township where there is plenty of land available... but little being done by the government to develop it.

Most of the industry that has been attracted to the area came because the land was available and the services were added later.

This won't always be the case. There is little likelihood of industry being attracted to a community that doesn't make it inviting.

As a result, unless conditions change, the Plymouth area, and this includes Canton Township, may be left at the post in the wild scramble for a broader tax base during the coming year.

There is nothing new in the system of making an area attractive. But the time is here when an area must seek what it wants.

There was a time, so it was said, that if you built a better mouse trap the world would beat a path to your door. Those days are gone — perhaps forever.

It is much better to put faith in the old adage that "The Future Belongs To Those Who Plan For It."

Thus far, the Plymouth area has done little planning to attract industry and business.

It is about time to start.

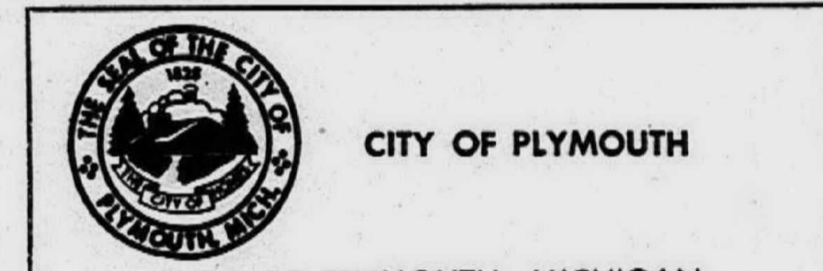

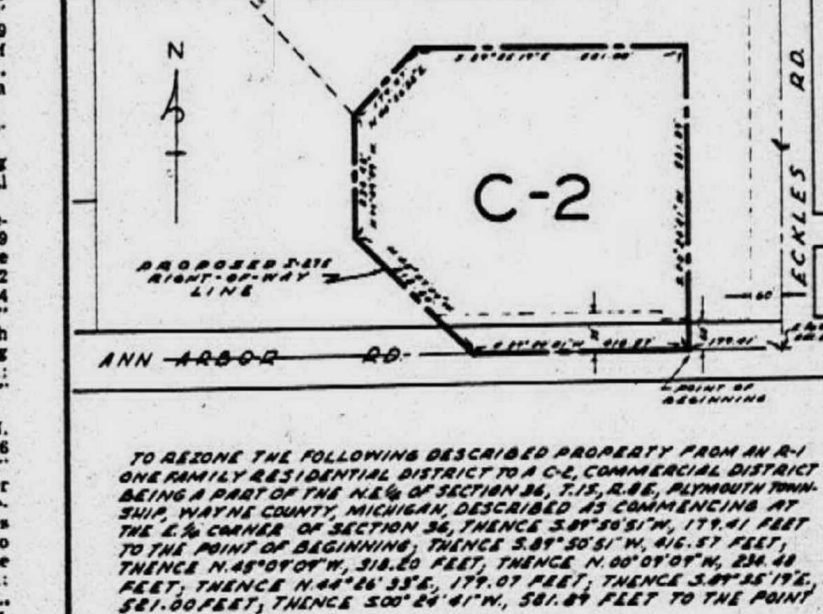
ORDINANCE NO. 14.01 '68 AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE ZONING ORDINANCE OF THE TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH BY AMENDING THE ZONING MAP.

THE TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

PART I. That the Township Zoning Ordinance is hereby amended by amending the Zoning Map, by changing those areas indicated on the Amending Zoning Map, No. 44, attached hereto and made a part of this Ordinance. But God isn't in the second balcony. The lonely, dejected look turns to one of disappointment. It all makes me wonder if even God can help a lousy actress.

Yes, that's it: "Valley of the Dolls" is what life looks like when God is utterly and totally absent.

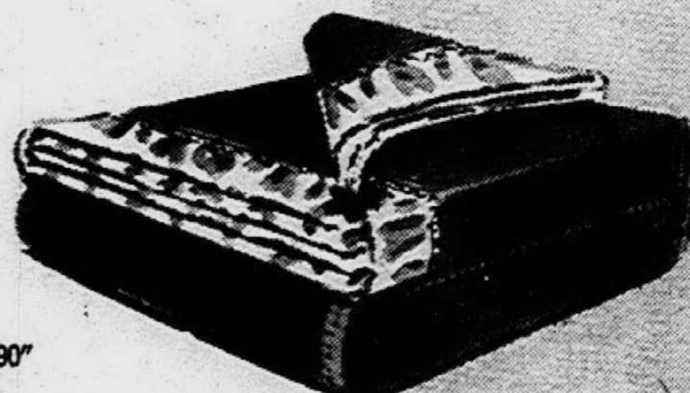

NBA Expands To 14 Teams For '69 Play

The National Basketball Association will expand to 14 teams next season.

Newest members will be Milwaukee and Arizona as the NBA strives to become an 18-team or 20-team circuit by 1970. Milwaukee will join Detroit, Cincinnati, Boston, Baltimore, New York and Philadelphia in the Eastern Division. Phoenix enters the West with Chicago, Los Angeles, St. Louis, San Diego, San Francisco and Seattle.

The indications also are the NBA schedule next season will swell by at least two games from 82 to 84.

Meantime, a move by the NBA to strip the Pistons of their first draft choice next season appears to have run into a snag.

A SPECIAL committee voted the Pistons would have to give up their initial choice to Los Angeles to finalize a missed-trade last year in which the Lakers swapped Rudy LaRusso to Detroit, but LaRusso refused to join the Pistons.

Subsequently the league voted the Pistons were entitled to the Lakers' first draft choice and it turned out to be Sonny Dove.

Last summer, the Pistons sold the rights to LaRusso to San Francisco, precipitating a new scream by Los Angeles. The committee voted 3-2 to force the Pistons to surrender their first '68 pick, but owner Fred Zollner of Detroit protested.

He is in the process of filing an appeal. To do so, it is necessary to get the support of three members of the Board of Governors. He has the names of eight, prompting one league official to say:

"ZOLLNER has the matter of getting his first draft choice back in the bag."

The Pistons, meantime, this week recalled Dove from the Pontiac Tomahawks of the North American League in hopes that one of their two first picks of 1967 now is ready to make himself a valuable addition to the team.

A Saturday night game with Los Angeles at Cobo Arena

wraps the Pistons' current home stand. They play Cincinnati at New York Tuesday, invade Baltimore Wednesday and Philadelphia Friday before returning home on Sunday, Feb. 4, for a matinee game with Baltimore.

A pygmy chimp who lived no more than five million years ago seems to have been the common ancestor of both man and the African apes.

The previous idea that humans, gorillas and chimps

had a common ancestor as far back as 30 million years ago was contradicted in a recent magazine article.

The magazine is Science Today, and the authors are Vincent M. Sarich and Allen C. Wilson of the University of California at Berkeley. ACCORDING TO the findings reported by Sarich and Wilson, this relatively modern progenitor of apes and man resembled a pygmy chimp who had acquired the vital ability to travel through the forests of his time in search of food by swinging from branch to branch.

The "evolutionary clock" on which the authors based their conclusions is serum albumin, a common protein constituent of

State Home, Hospital Await Budgets

Officials of two state mental health institutions here were still waiting for their proposed budget figures late last week after Gov. Romney on Wednesday proposed a total general fund budget of \$1,334 billion.

Both the Mental Health Department and the Bureau of the Budget were unable late in the week to tell what would be recommended for Northville State Hospital and Plymouth State Home and Training School.

Northville State Hospital had requested \$9.5 million for the fiscal year that begins next July 1. Its current appropriation is \$7.3 million.

Plymouth State Home requested nearly \$8.3 million compared to its current ap-

propriation of \$6.7 million.

ROMNEY'S BUDGET message proposed general fund spending of \$1,334 billion, a 16.4 per cent increase over the current year.

Expenditures would be \$27.2 million less than revenues of \$1,361.3 million.

For schools, Romney proposed that the state aid formula be raised for financial class A schools from the current \$294.50 to \$315 and for B schools from the current \$427 to \$457.

ROMNEY ASKED \$200,000 in planning funds for the proposed Wayne County Community College. He asked another \$400,000 increase in community college vocational funds.

Altogether, education would receive more than half the general fund appropriations (see chart).

The University of Michigan would get \$64.7 million com-

pared to its current \$59.1 million. The U. of M. had asked for \$75.5 million.

Michigan State University would get \$62.3 million compared to its current \$56.7 mil-

lion. MSU had asked for \$70 million.

ONE OF THE biggest increases, in percentage terms, would go to the state Civil Rights Commission. Romney proposes to double its budget from the current \$1.39 million to \$2.77 million.

The state police would get a total of \$29.4 million, up 23 per cent from its current level. The department had asked for \$40.1 million.

ROMNEY ASKED the Legislature to put two bond issues

on the November ballot.

One bond issue of \$335 million would be for water purification, most notably to keep Lake Michigan from becoming a "dead lake," in Romney's words.

The other, of \$100 million, would go for state park land acquisitions, recreation and fish planting.

Cost of the combined issues would be \$24.4 million a year, the governor said.

A unique part of the recreation proposal would be \$30 million for local governments for pools, athletic fields and parks.

Sen. Kuhn Offers 2 Anti-Riot Bills

State Sen. George W. Kuhn, (R-West Bloomfield) has introduced two bills, which he said, are designed to help law enforcement officers in their fight against crime, especially of a riotous nature.

One of the bills would tighten the present law governing explosive devices, commonly known as "Molotov cocktails," by making possession of such a device prima facie evidence of the possessor's intent to use the device unlawfully against a person or property.

At present, law enforcement officials have difficulty getting convictions unless they actually see the explosive being used, said Sen. Kuhn.

"Criminal intent is the only reason a person would have such a device in his possession, and I feel we should strengthen this law to prevent destruction," said Kuhn.

THE SECOND bill would provide a mayor or other top municipal officer with emergency powers in cases of riots.

"Under this bill, such a civic official would be given immediate emergency powers to ban

possession of firearms, ammunition, alcohol and gasoline-- items frequently used in riots," said Kuhn.

"By giving a civic official such emergency power, it would permit him to get anti-riot control measures into high gear quickly and give the governor time to call the National Guard or state police into action if the situation further warranted.

"I HAVE introduced these measures as part of an overall anti-crime package as a result of Gov. Romney's State of the State message in which he called for stronger laws with which to combat riots and similar emergency conditions. "These bills have the support of the governor and bi-partisan backing in the Legislature."

"With constant threats being made by militant groups that they intend to 'burn' next summer, we must lose no time in providing law enforcement officials with effective tools to do their job."

The Controversial Snowmobile: The Legislature Takes A Look

Michigan legislators, state police, conservation, highway and licensing officials will meet in Lansing this week with a group that doesn't want to be hemmed in—the Michigan Snowmobile Association.

Their purpose: To draft a regulatory bill satisfactory to everyone. One legislator says they aren't far apart.

It's the old problem of a technological innovation—the motor sled—that has grown in popularity faster than society's ability to cope with it.

The problems fall into several categories: Registration, regulation of how they'll be used, and the provision of space where they may be used.

"There were 50,000 of these snowmobiles at the beginning of last year, and the way they're selling, there may be 75,000 now," says a spokesman for the lawmakers.

"Some of these wild characters tear up yards, knock down shrubs and damage property, but there's no way of identifying them. So the association agrees there ought to be a bill to register snowmobiles.

"Another reason for a registration law is that if a machine is stolen, there will be some way to identify it," he added.

ANOTHER QUESTION brought up in the state officials' meeting with the snowmobilers is a minimum age for operators.

State police officials favor a minimum age, especially after hearing dealers boast that some souped-up models can attain speeds up to 100 mph. Others point out that the souped-up models are a rarity and that there's no age rule on the operation of motorboats.

An Observerland survey, taken by Livonia snowmobile enthusiasts Gary and Tom Tokar, showed that 51 per cent of the respondents favored an age of 16 or more, 13 per cent favored an age of 12 to 14 and 13 per cent favored some kind of unspecified minimum age.

A question of concern in the northern part of the state is whether snowmobiles should be used on roads.

The industry's position is that, if snowmobilers are prevented from even crossing roads, cross-country safaris would be hampered.

State police see the snowmobile as a motor vehicle but not intended for roads. If they were to be driven on roads, they would have to be equipped with such things as emergency brakes, turn signals, windshield wipers and so on.

So far, the state police rule-of-thumb is that snowmobilers may use trail-type roads that are impassable for autos in winter.

Those regulation problems are essentially a state matter.

THE PROBLEM OF where to let snowmobiles run is both state and local. It's this problem that can get emotional.

Snowmobile dealers are hoping that money left from registration fees will be used to develop snowmobile trails.

One suggestion, according to the legislative source, was that the state charge registration fees of \$3 for three years.

The Conservation Department spokesman shot down that idea. Such a fee, if applied to 50,000 machines, would bring in only \$150,000. After administrative and policing

costs have been deducted, there wouldn't be much left for trail development.

Locally, some snowmobilers are upset that Wayne County parks are closed to them. The Tokars' survey showed that three-fifths of their respondents felt snowmobiles should be allowed in county parks, and another one-third favored opening them "with restrictions."

As the snowmobilers see it, large areas of parks are too flat for sleds and toboggans, and no one goes on picnics in the winter; why, then, not open them to snowmobiles?

William A. Lay, a Redford snowmobile dealer, writes in a letter to the editor that "we and many others are enjoying our cabins in the winter months because we can get to them" by snowmobile.

Lay provides a page from the Michigan Snowmobiler, a monthly published in East Jordan, which helps to explain why snowmobiles are more controversial in southeastern Michigan than elsewhere: "There is much less confusion about the wonderful world of snowmobiling in the Upper Peninsula than the Lower. That's because folks there have been at it for a number of years now, and it isn't new to them." (Other, unmentioned reasons: More people and less space in southeastern Michigan.)

The same paper also reports that there is so far no single map showing all snowmobile trails in the state, although one manufacturer is preparing one.

THE PEOPLE AT Jonimo, Inc., a Livonia snowmobile dealer, point out that snowmobiles "are not banned from state parks," and another letter writer to this newspaper points to Michigan's "many thousands of acres of state land"

In a mathematical sense, that is correct, and yet the matter is not so simple.

In the first place, not all state parks are open to snowmobiles.

In the second place, any map of state-owned land shows that a large portion of those "thousands of acres" are not close to these suburbs, although western Oakland, southeastern Livingston and northwestern Washtenaw Counties have some acreage.

In the third place, even when snowmobilers do stick to state-owned land, there are problems. The Lansing State Journal, in a

recent article headlined "Snowmobiles Become Fast-Growing Headache," reported:

"Most complaints in Livingston County, however, involved trespassing violations. Many of the snowmobile operators come from nearby metropolitan areas" — an outstate euphemism for Detroit and these suburbs — "and start out in their snowmobiles from a state park or lake lot.

"The county is growing so fast that there are very few places left where snowmobiles have a wide range area, and very soon the operators find themselves traveling on private property . . .

"State Police report snowmobile operators are very apt to ignore property lines, and many complaints have come from property owners who resent the intrusion of the noisy little vehicles on their lakefront lots and across their pastures," the State Journal reported.

MOREOVER, THERE IS confusion in many minds over "state park" and "state land."

A park is a well-developed, intensively used area which commonly has picnic tables, a beach and bathhouse, ball diamonds and campgrounds. Hunting is banned. They are lightly used in winter.

Other classes of "state land" include "recreation areas" and "forests." These are less developed, if at all. Hunting and target shooting are frequently permitted. Some species may be hunted in winter.

The safety issue thus comes into focus. Snowmobiling in an unused picnic ground and ball diamond is one thing; snowmobiling around hunters is another. So far, the state hasn't made an issue of this.

THE GOLF COURSE question is one that splits even the snowmobilers.

James E. Northmore Jr., of Farmington, who with his sons owns three snowmobiles, argues in a letter to the editor that snowmobiles "would rip up the fairways when the snow gets thin." And at least one private golf course in the area has banned them after suffering costly green damage.

Yet Rouge Park Golf Course in Detroit allows them, and Redford Township police, in a stern warning to snowmobilers to stay off the streets, point to that golf course as a safe and the closest local place to use them.

ARE FROZEN LAKES a good place for snowmobiles?

Yes, say the snowmobilers. Careful, say conservation officers, pointing out that the operator of a moving vehicle can't always be sure of the ice ahead.

Jerry Chiapetta, a television outdoors commentator, reported recently that hundreds of ice fishermen at a Lake St. Clair contest were highly annoyed by the snowmobiles buzzing around. The fishermen went so far as to blame the poor catches that day on the snowmobile racket.

While public officials try to resolve the issue of what lands and lakes should or shouldn't be open to snowmobiles, some private owners are seeing an opportunity. Rising Star Farm near Milford and Crystal Valley Horse Farms in Farmington advertise their acreage for snowmobile use.

THAT THERE IS some feeling about snowmobiles is demonstrated by the Tokar brothers' survey of 116 persons at shopping centers and the Schoolcraft College campus.

Asked if they had ever been "bothered" by snowmobiles, only two per cent of the 116 surveyed answered "yes." That seems small. But if it's assumed that the sample is representative, and if it's remembered that the population of this edition's circulation area is 250,000 or more, it follows that something like 5,200 persons have been bothered.

Snowmobilers—the people who sell them and buy them—are sensitive on this point.

One letter writer asks for "the facts" about snowmobiles, such as "the last issue of Newsweek showing Vice President Humphrey riding a snowmobile."

A dealer claims that "95 per cent of the snowmobile owners are family men. Thus, an outing for them keeps the family doing something together." Not only do snowmobiles strengthen family life, but "the jobs this new industry will create . . . alone give the snowmobile a 'place' in society," he says.

In the trade publications, the tone is a bit different. An editorial in the December Michigan Snowmobiler charges that a tiny number of "maniac mikes" are giving snowmobiling a "bad image" and says: "Let's drive them out of our sport now, before it is too late."

The "maniac mikes" are to be "driven out" through "policing fellow riders, reporting those who refuse to accept all the responsibilities of ownership. We cannot expect state laws to stop 'maniac mikes,'" says the editorial.

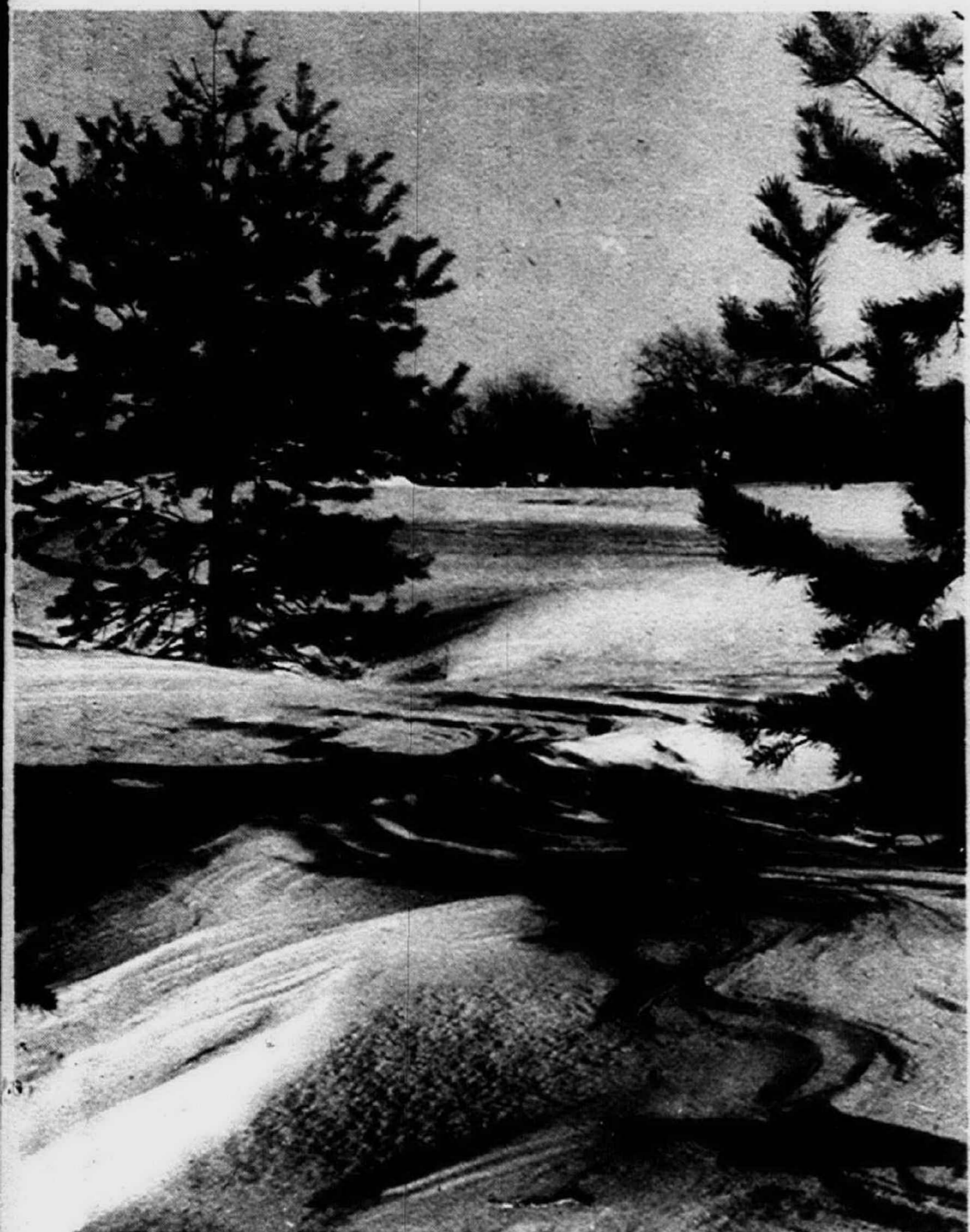
Will snowmobilers police themselves? The Michigan Legislature isn't waiting around to find out.

Newsstand Price Will Rise Feb. 4

Beginning with the Sunday issues of Feb. 4 and the Wednesday issues of Feb. 7, the newsstand price of all Observer newspapers will be increased to 15 cents.

The price increase is necessary, Observer Circulation Director Fred J. Wright explained, because of the continuing rise in the cost of printing and distributing a newspaper.

He emphasized that the increase would apply only to papers sold from newsstands, stores and Observer offices. Rates for carrier subscription plans will remain 40 cents a month.

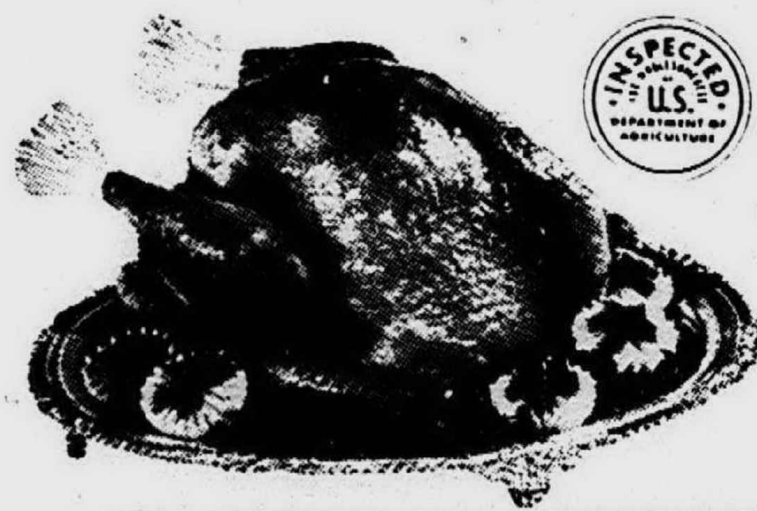

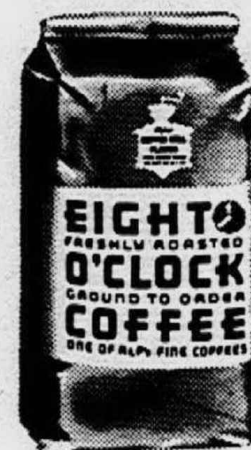

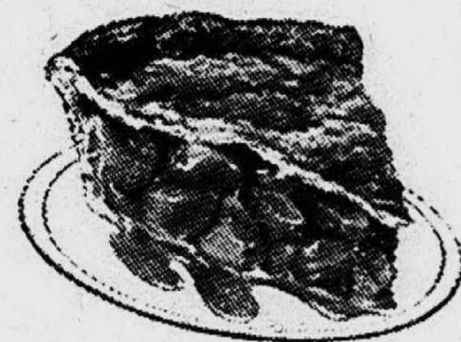

Workmen had just finished "repairing" what Bank President Elvin D. Dougherty at the time described as "a small leak . . . in the beginning."

Police say Wright was driving north on Merriman at an excessive rate of speed. Mrs. Smith was southbound. There were no passengers in the Smith car.

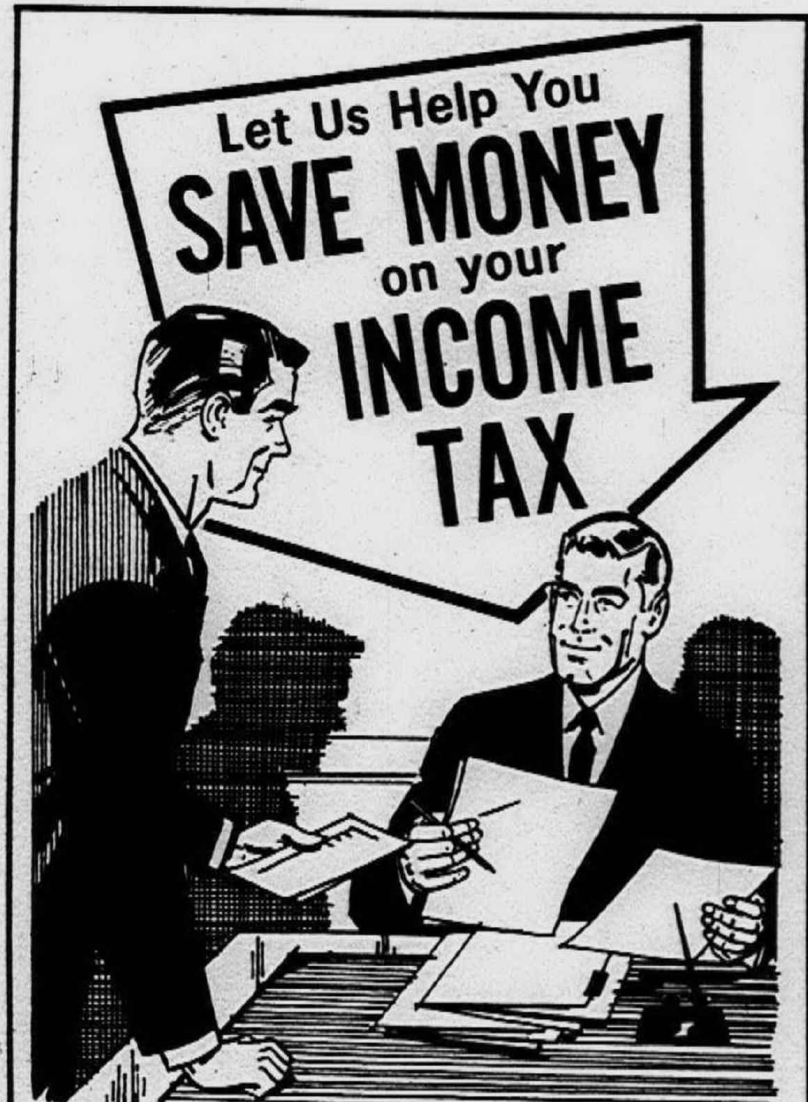
LIVONIA traffic officials, in marking the first 1968 fatality, reported that the first 21 days of the New Year have brought an increase of 33.4 per cent more accidents than the first three weeks of 1967.

As of Monday, Livonia had tallied 55 accidents.

Lieut. Robert Thorne, head of the traffic division, attributed the increase to "greater traffic volume and more severe weather conditions."

Thorne added that the in-

crease in the number of injuries sustained in traffic accidents was only 11 per cent and that injuries, over all, were less serious than those in the early days of '67.

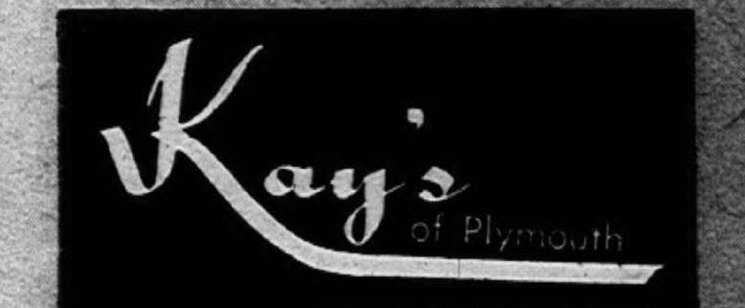

Money Troubles Loom For Seniors' Tower

Livonia's tentative tower for senior citizens with low income is leaning.

It is \$180,000 out of balance. To build it, architect and bidder must cut that amount out of the program for the eight-story structure, or the City may have to pick up that much of cost.

The Livonia Housing Commission said the Federal Government, through the Housing and Urban Development agency, will allow \$1,360,000 for the 81-unit tower, at the rate of \$1,699 per unit architect's fees, site, inspection and other items, however reduced the estimate for construction to \$1,200,000.

WHEN SIX BIDS were opened this week by Charles L. Cook, secretary director for the commission, the lowest bid offered for the job was a flat \$1,300,000 by A.J. Anderson, of Harper Woods.

That the estimate was too low for rising labor and material costs was indicated by the other bids—two just slightly above the Anderson minimum.

They were Utley-James, Inc. Pontiac, \$1,307,600, and R.E. Dailey Co., Southfield, \$1,308,000. Holtzman and Silverman, Detroit, bid \$1,360,000; Hyatt Construction Co. of Wayne, \$1,389,000 and A. J. Etkin Construction Co., of Oak Park, \$1,407,575. Five others withdrew and two failed to appear at the deadline.

David L. Jones, assistant director of the Department of Public Works and president of the Housing Commission, said the bidders anticipate even higher labor costs and material prices even before the work on the structure could start.

The Housing and Urban Development regional office in Chicago, however, said Washington is making no allowances for the increases already made.

The Livonia housing program for senior citizens has been underway four years, and the commission is attempting to obtain twin towers, each with 81 units and for retirees with low income, at full government cost.

A garden type housing program, with 215 units for the elderly with better but limited income and assets, either at federal cost or through private enterprise, also is in the planning stage.

LAND for the total project—8.8 acres at Purlingbrook and St. Martins, has been purchased and is being rezoned for the residences.

Just how the commission can save the building program, Jones said, is under study. Before the bids are forwarded to Chicago for consideration, Jones said, the architect—Joseph St. Cyr, and the contractor will see what can be done to reduce construction

costs.

Simplified forms for concrete walls, rather than made to give the building a few frills to avert a factory-front appearance, may be substituted.

But, said Jones, if the Housing Commission will recommend that the city council pick up such bills as paving, walks, landscaping, and inspection, which could be done by DPW crews, the bidder could reduce his figure by that amount and federal approval probably would be given.

these years of planning," Jones said. "Livonia has to do something for its retirees—those with low and modest incomes. They need respectable housing in their own city. Dearborn picked up additional expenses in a project, to take care of its elderly with some comfort features. Perhaps Mayor Harvey W. Moelke and the Council can find the money, someplace, to fill the gap. We want to keep faith with the citizens."

But if the city fails to come to the rescue, Jones said alternate plans may be submitted to the regional housing office. They could provide the "turnkey" type construction, whereby a contractor would put up the building without benefit of certain features, and at specified cost, and turn the key over to the commission when finished. That type eliminates government inspectors and other costs.

OR, SAID JONES, the government might provide low-rise housing of concrete slab construction—usually two stories high and built at low cost, and with few niceties.

Jones said the bids for Tower No. 1 were higher than anticipated because of architectural fee up 12 per cent, plumbing and heating up 20 per cent, and electrical up 11 per cent.

The contractor's bid was 16

per cent above the architect's estimate, Jones said, while labor costs are up 20 per cent.

Building costs have soared since the city started its housing program for the senior citizens, Jones said.

Also, the Federal government has cut, rather than increased, the allowed cost per unit in considering new projects. Now, he said, the figure is about \$1,500 per apartment unit instead of \$1,700. Much of the federal mon-

ey is being diverted to replacement of slums in major cities, and to rebuilding riot-torn residence sections.

WHAT WILL happen to Tower No. 2, now in the planning stage, and to the garden type dwelling program, the Livonia Commission would like to know. There are lists of qualified citizens waiting for Washington to fulfill its promises for housing within their means.

News Round Up

Operation Under Heavy Barrage Saves GI's Life

A SPECTACULAR OPERATION, which took only five or ten minutes but had to be performed under the beams of four flashlights, while heavy mortar shells were being dropped nearby, saved the life of Pfc. Robert Mussari, 19. Mussari had a live shell protruding from his abdomen and the doctor, Lt. Edward Feldman, 26, said "I could hardly believe my eyes when they brought him in." Mussari was badly wounded and was later evacuated from the Khe Sanh battle zone near the DMZ zone in South Vietnam.

U.S. OFFICIALS have announced that the Viet Cong has released two American prisoners, Marine Cpl. Jose Agosto Santos, who was taken prisoner May 14, 1967 and Army Pfc. Luis Ortiz-Rivera, a captive since Dec. 21, 1966. The spokesman said the pair were freed on Jan. 23 but he did not have the ages or home towns of the two men, nor could he give any details concerning the circumstances of their release.

SOUTH VIETNAM President Nguyen Van Thieu said the bombing of North Vietnam can be stopped only after the North Vietnamese halt "all their aggressive activities." Thieu said the bombing is "the response to the whole apparatus of Communist aggressive activities, including Communist infiltration across the borders as well as guerilla attacks, subversion, sabotage and terrorism..."

STRIKES BY THE United Auto workers against General Motors in the United States and Canada left 50,000 workers idle, 21,200 of them on strike and the rest laid off by resulting parts shortage. No new negotiations have been scheduled between the UAW and Chrysler Canada Ltd. whose 10,000 hourly rated workers struck Wednesday over a new national contract.

THE NORTH KOREAN seizure of the Pueblo has raised a freedom of the seas issue which through American history has meant crises -- sometimes to the point of war. Violation of the right was a major factor in bringing on the War of 1812. The sinking of the battleship Maine was a decisive event in bringing on the Spanish-American War. While, the submarine torpedoing of the British liner Lusitania helped sway American public opinion against the Germans prior to U.S. entry into World War I.

AN 89-TON Japanese fishing vessel sank and its crew of 12 was missing after a collision off Kyushu, southwestern Japan, with the 7,638-ton American freighter Beatrice Victory Thursday. The American ship appeared undamaged and remained in the area to search for the missing crewmen.

NORTH KOREAN'S capture of the USS Pueblo dominated the front pages and editorial columns of Europe's newspapers for the second day Thursday. Most papers advised the United States to proceed with caution.

U.S. NUCLEAR scientists in Greenland assume that one or more of four missing hydrogen bombs ruptured in last Sunday's B52 crash, strewing uranium or plutonium over an icy bay, sources report. The report followed official disclosure that pieces of at least one of the weapons had been found at the crash site seven miles southwest of Thule Air Force Base.

THE FATE OF THE captain, Lt. Commander Bucher, and the 82 man crew of the pirated U.S. intelligence ship Pueblo still hangs in the balance as President Johnson tries every diplomatic means to solve the situation with the North Koreans. The ship was captured by the North Koreans in the Sea of Japan on Monday because they claimed it was violating their 12 mile water boundary.
