PC schools' election set for March 22

The Plymouth Canton Board of Education last week set a special school election for March 22.

Exactly how much money voters will be asked to vote on and in what form will be determined at the regular school board meeting on Jan. 11.

The Board of Education will most likely be asking for the right to levy the full authorized millage, along with some consideration being given to a request for additional operating millage, in order to maintain our present educational program and services in the school district in the upcoming school years," said Raymond K. Hoedel, associate superintendent for business, in a district newsletter mailed yesterday.

HOEDEL MAINTAINS that without additional property tax revenues and or improvement in the state revenues, the school district would be in a deficit position by June 30.

"The cost of operations is rising faster than the increases in the district's revenues." said Hoedel.

He projects that the current school vear (1987-88) would have excess expenditures of about \$516,000. This would be compounded to more than \$1.8 million excess expenditures in 1988-90 and to more than \$3 million

Reportedly, the district is receiving more than \$2 million less in state aid this year than last year

Unless the state of Michigan

changes its current funding of public school, officials project the loss in state aid will continue. In addition, a Headlee rollback re-

sulted in another \$1.1 million loss in potential property tax revenues. The bottom line, according to

Hoedel, is that revenues during the current school year increased only 1.3 percent (\$681,000) while expenditures are projected to increase about 3.6 percent (\$1,951,000)

SCHOOL OFFICIALS say that this loss of revenue is starting to cause a backlog of delayed replacement of equipment and or furniture

Drug task force sees 'no light at end of tunnel

Seventy percent of high school seniors in the United States drink alcoholic beverages. Of that amount, 46 percent drink regularly, according the Institute for Social Research at the University of Michigan.

The belief that "this area is no different than anywhere in the country" prompted a group of police chiefs, clergy, attorneys, teachers, librarians and parents to form the Plymouth-Canton Community Task

Force on Substance Abuse in 1985. The task force has sponsored educational programs for parents and

DESPITE THE GOOD the group has accomplished, "there's no light at the end of the tunnel," said Jean Sebestyen-Tabor, task force chair-

"There probably will remain a need for the group to continue. While we hope we can have some impact on the problem, I don't think it will be solved once and for all in the fu-

When we start looking at marijuana use, or alcohol use, what I find disconcerting is that it's the norm to use now, not the norm not to use has sent professionals to workshops amongst kids," said Dale Yagiela, a

rector of Growth Works. Growth Works offers alternative education and substance abuse intervention for young adults and their families.

"Also, more kids have had earlier experiences with alcohol and drugs than we would have seen before. Kids are probably using drugs at younger ages than at any other time," said Yagiela.

FUNDING has presented problems for the task force, said Sebestven-Tabor.

The group would like to train area professionals in substance abuse intervention and to "provide education and awareness programs for . . . police, clergy as well as for community members as a whole," she said.

Grace period benefit scofflaws

Scofflaws and shoppers in the Plymouth-Canton community will benefit again this holiday season from temporary policies instituted by the 35th District Court and the Plymouth City Commission, respectively.

No property evictions and no wage garnishment orders will be processed in district court Dec. 14 through Jan. 4.

On-street parking at meters and in metered municipal lots within the city limits will be allowed free through Dec. 31.

THE COURT'S grace period is for evictions and wage garnishments only. Fines and court costs for traffic offenses, misdemeanor criminal violations and ordinance violations must be paid as as-

sessed. Marion Belding, administrator for the 35th District Court that serves Plymouth, Canton and Northville, said many district courts throught the state institute a similar policy for the holidays on

The leniency policy, MacDonald said, "sounds good but in reality not many people are affected, especially in this area. Actually, we don't have many people impacted."

MacDONALD SAID he's heard nothing about a legal challenge to the eviction moratorium in the federal courts.







ONSIDER making this Christmas an environmentally-conscious one. Dean Krauskopf, a horti-

culturalist with the Wayne County Cooperative Extension Service, suggests buying a live Christmas tree that can be planted outdoors immediately after the holiday season.

Dig a hole now, cover it with mulch or straw to keep it from freezing," Krauskopf said. "Don't leave the tree inside the house a long time. Get it in and out as quick as you can. It does put a lot of stress on

Live Christmas trees aren't easy to find and they aren't cheap. Major nursery chains - like

Frank's and English Gardens don't carry them.

Plymouth Nursery, on Ann Arbor Road five miles west of Sheldon Road in Superior Township, has live Austrian Pines and Blue Spruce 3-5 feet tall. Prices range from \$49.95 to

Bordine's on Rochester Road in Rochester carries Colorado Spruce from 2 to 6 feet tall. Their prices range from \$28.98 to \$89.98.

Keep in mind when deciding on apermanent outdoor location that evergreens can grow up to 60 feet.

BY THE WAY, if you're thinking of saving money by chopping your own live tree out of the woods, don't, Krauskopf advised. "It won't work

You lose too many roots." Cut trees traditionally are left curbside for chipping or trash pickup a couple of weeks into the new

mend saving cut trees through the winter. You can use them as windbreaks for hibernating shrubs like rhododendrons. Trees also can provide shelter for birds.

Be careful where you place trees. because they are highly flammable when dried out. Don't lean them against a house or garage. Krauskopf said.

Municipalities will collect Christmas trees disposed in late winter or early spring. Some extra work, however, may be involved for you.

After regular pick-ups, Livonia, Garden City and Westland require residents to cut trees and bundle them into four-foot bundles.

In Redford, cutting and bundling isn't necessary but a phone call to the public works department is to set up an appointment for the chipper





A LACK of money has done nothing to discourage task force members, who see a dire need for the problem of substance abuse to remain in the public eve.


"I get real scared about the way in which this becomes the problem of the month, or the year, and then it kind of dies," said Yagiela. "Issues become hot and sexy for a

time, and then we kind of say it's not important any more. We need to look at it from the standpoint of being in it for the long

"People tend to see the social use of alcohol and drugs as being harmless and benign," Yagiela added.

"As an incidental factor, it may be. But over a period of time, the potential for kids to move through the phases of addiction is pretty good. And they will move more quickly than adults. The costs to them are too severe in terms of what they lose out on.

"If they don't learn about healthy relationships, dealing with feelings and intimacy, it's hard to go back and get that stuff if they've missed it in their early teens."

Last season's biggest spenders were: Detroit with \$5 million, Oakland County with \$4 million, and Wayne County with \$3.5 million.

Michigan's 83 counties spent a total of \$60 million. Its 534 cities and villages accounted for the remaining \$32 million

AL ISOLAR of the Local Service Division of Michigan Department of Transportation said the expenses are a fact of life.

"Winter maintenance is an enormously expensive business, and the costs are here to stay," he said.

Isolar noted the cost for snow and ice removal has little relation to the amount of snowfall.

"Wayne County averages 30 inches of snowfall per year, while Houghton County in the Upper Peninsula averages 290 inches of snow per year and spends a \$1 million on keeping roads open," he said.

Highway snow and ice removal spending is pegged to traffic volume, labor rates and equipment costs, said Isolar.

"Oakland County with the largest county road system in the state spends more money because traffic volumes are large and doing the job is so difficult."

Russ Gronevelt, assistant county executive and director of the Wayne County Department of Public Services, acknowledges that winter highway maintenance is costly and

WAYNE COUNTY has allocated \$5 million for ice and snow removal of county and state roads this winter. Gronevelt said it's always tough to budget for something that's impossible to predict - winter Last year's \$3.5 million price tag was a result of a mild winter In 1985-86. Wayne County spent \$5.6 million on ice and snow removal

Despite the county's budget problems, the wolf isn't at the office of public services' door.

The \$12 million deficit that McNamara has identified is a general fund problem," said Gronevelt, who was director of Livonia's public service department before being named to the county post in January by executive Ed McNamara.

State gasoline and weight taxes go toward maintaining county roads. The county also is paid for maintaining highways and trunkline routes on the state's behalf

Wayne County has a 24-hour, seven-day-a-week operation, according to Gronevelt. A night patrol is dispatched to constantly evaluate road conditions. A separate bridge patrol is out at 6 a.m. (as of Dec. 1) looking for icy condition on area

THE WAYNE County Road Division is responsible for clearing a total of 1,475 miles of pavement. Of these, 490 miles are interstate highways and trunklines.

According to this year's ice and snow removal plan, the county is divided into 128 routes - three more than last year. Road crews work out of 11 work yards strategically located throughout the county.

In western Wayne County, the Norton Yard at Inkster and Granttween Telegraph and Newburgh and Joy and Eight Mile roads

The Phoenix Yard near Phoenix Lake in Northville serves the area from Newburgh west to the county line at Napier Road

The Yost Yard on the Canton and Van Buren border and the Howell Yard in Wayne serve Garden City, Westland, Canton Township, Inkster, Van Buren Township and the northern half of Romulus

In addition to the work yards, seven other salt yards are located throughout the county for easy access to freeways and major roads.

Gronevelt said the county has 60,000 tons of salt in storage and another 15,000 on order for this season.

The plan for maintaining the county's roadways is reminiscent of a military campaign

At the forecast or onslaught of bad weather, the road division crew's salt trucks equipped with scrapers move into action.

CRITICAL ROUTES - the 490 miles of freeways and trunklines (Telegraph and Ford Road for example) - get first attention. Crews then move to primary roads such as Wayne, Farmington, Sheldon, Canton Center, Edward Hines Drive, Merriman, mile roads and Cherry Hill

Local roads (townships roads for which the county is responsible) are last. And Gronevelt said that while they are done he admits "not to the townships' satisfaction." He quickly adds, "We're going to try and do bet-

Driveway holds tons of snow

The Farmer's Almanac predicts record snowfalls for much of the snowbelt this winter.

Four inches of snow on a 50-foot, two-car driveway can weigh as much as four tons. So homeowners should "proceed with caution" when shoveling.

Each year at this time I vividly remember two good friends who died while shoveling snow, one a college professor, the other a physician. I also recall reading that nine men collapsed and died while clearing snow near their homes in one day.

Plymouth officals will initiate a six point action plan following an auditor's review of water loss.

The city's auditing firm of Post Smythe, Lutz and Ziel recently indicated a water loss of 19 percent for 1986-87 up from 14 percent in 1985-

Reinvent wheel?

Use what we know works

NE OF THE most dangerous roads in the Plymouth community, in terms of automobile accidents, is Ann Arbor Road. A recent study demonstrates that more accidents occur on Ann Arbor Road than any other road in Plymouth Township. And the city of Plymouth does not have a thoroughfare that comes close in traffic volume to Ann Arbor Road Particularly dangerous are the intersections at I-275, Haggerty, Main and Sheldon. Two people have been killed on Ann Arbor Road between Lilley and Haggerty in the last few years. A Plymouth Township police officer missed five weeks of work after being hit head-on at Ann Arbor Road and Haggerty while responding to a

THE ANN ARBOR road study was done, at a cost of \$8,700, in response to community-wide

As a result of that study, requests have been made for an additional lane or cloverleaf to accommodate traffic exiting southbound I-275 and turning onto Ann Arbor Road. A left-turn indicator for drivers on westbound Ann Arbor Road turning south onto Haggerty also has been re-

Barton-Aschman Associates, Inc. of Southfield, which prepared the 36-page report, recommends a second right turn lane be added on the north leg of the southbound ramp off I-275. Currently, motorists exiting I-275 wanting to turn right onto Ann Arbor Road have a long wait, more than 60 seconds during afternoon peak hours. More serious than the wait is having traffic back up onto I-275. As an alternative to the second right-turn lane, Barton-Aschman recommends on the southwest corner of the interchange a loop ramp for southbound traffic on I-275 wanting to turn east onto Ann Arbor Road. The alternative would eliminate left-turners from the intersection.

The Michigan Department of Transportation has jurisdiction over Ann Arbor Road, so any improvements must be done with the state's approval. Jim Anulewicz, Plymouth Township planning director, says the most likely alternative to be chosen is the additional right-turn lane. Although the cloverleaf might be appealing,

the cost may be prohibitive.

Of all the dangers along Ann Arbor Road. probably the most benefit could be gained by eliminating the backup onto 1-275 off southbound traffic. If so, then first priority should be given to picking the solution with maximum payoff. And where the chances for success are real, not theo-

Further down the road on I-275 the "second right-turn lane" alternative is in operation. I-275 southbound traffic using the westbound exit onto Ford Road has two lanes for right turns. The two lanes of right-turning traffic executes the movement daily without problems. And traffic never backs up onto I-275, even though a heavy traffic volume exits there during peak hours. The success of the I-275 Ford double right-turn lane should be ample evidence for the state to implement that solution for Ann Arbor

LIKEWISE, evidence already exists to support a left-turn indicator for westbound traffic turning south unto Haggerty.

For years one of the city's most dangerous intersections has been Ann Arbor Road at Main. The problem especially has been turning movements as motorists became impatient trying to turn left and stretched their luck.

After studies were conducted, including traffic counts and accident experiences, the city won its argument for left-turn indicators. Today Ann Arbor Road and Main is a much safer intersection, although probably more busier now than before. In acting on Ann Arbor Road and Haggerty, the state should look at the success demonstrated at Ann Arbor Road and Main.

The Plymouth Observer agrees that action is needed to make Ann Arbor Road a safer thoroughfare. We particulary agree with the consultants recommendations for a double-right lane at 1-275 and for left-turn indicators at Haggerty. We urge the state transportation department to consider the positive experiences at Ford Road in Canton and at Main Street in the city of Plymouth. The study's findings and actual experience should be convincing evidence. We urge the state to put these two solutions into ef-

Schools can provide a solution

S THE SUBURBS become more diverse, it is increasingly evident that the celebration of Christmas belongs in the church and in the home - and not in the schools. On the other hand, school districts should work toward promoting intercultural understanding among its students. Few, if any, suburban school districts conduct classes which teach about different religious and cultural practices.


Hence, our school districts are a microcosm of the cultural discontent which exists in our society. Students sit shoulder to shoulder in class but have little insight into their classmates' lifestyle

So once again we face the December dilemma students who feel isolated from their peers.

As the Rev. James Lyons, director of the Ecumenical Institute for Jewish-Christian Studies in Southfield, says: Neither Christmas nor the false Christmas should be observed in the schools.

"As a clergyman, I believe that what passes as Christmas has very little to do with religion. Santa Claus and reindeer have little to do with the significance of Christmas. Religion in essence belongs in the churches and synagogues and mosques.

A SURVEY OF local school districts shows Livonia, Birmingham, Bloomfield Hills and Farmington schools have formal, written policies regulating holiday observances. Many of the rest rely on "internal understandings.

All school districts should have a written policy prohibiting the in-school observance of religious holidays.

School officials are known for complaining that they are being asked to take over non-educational tasks that the home and religious institutions once performed.

Here is one to give up.

Frosty the Snowman, not Santa, visits preschoolers in the Southfield Public Schools. In the Plymouth-Canton school system, the Breakfast with Santa, which one elementary holds, is scheduled on Saturday, allowing an easier decision on whether or not to attend.

Nearly every local public school holds some event in December commemorating the holiday season. These school celebrations, once reflective of Christian heritage, now attempt to be secular in keeping with court rulings upholding the separation of church and state.

Gone are the Christmas pageants and Nativity scenes common until the '60s. Now holiday concerts generally include songs of other faiths along with the traditional Christmas songs and carols. Holiday parties may include cookies shaped as Christmas trees and Hanukkah dreidels. "Generic" is how one area educator described the nature of December parties, concerts and decorations in the public schools.

STILL. THE non-Christian students know them for what they are: neatly camouflaged celebrations of Christmas, a national holiday, and the birth of Jesus Christ.

Jews, Hindus, Muslims, Buddhists and atheists do not celebrate Christmas. Adding their songs and traditions to a school holiday observance is better than not having them - but it doesn't

For many of these students, these false celebrations add to their December dilemma - a feeling of not belonging and missing out.

One of the issues addressed by the Detroit Strategic Planning Committee is race relations.

When I think about race relations, I ask myself why is there tension and hostility between the races? Do blacks and whites inherently dislike each other? Taking a closer look it occurs to me that there are people of all colors that I either like or dislike. Common sense, therefore, tends to indicate that skin color is not the cause. Considering other possibilities, therefore, seems worthwhile.

Today, society appears hopelessly polarized and paralyzed: black vs. white, labor vs. business, poor vs. others, etc. It looks like this polarity maybe the cause of racism and other problems. A look at why we are polarized may provide some insight on what can be done.

Many people recognize we have become a society that is governed by special interest groups and special interest political parties. I apprehend that it is special interest leadership and political parties that create the problems they claim to be most concerned about solving.

To understand why this happens, a look at why leadership takes such action is helpful. Common sense tends to indicate that if such polarity did not exist there would be no one for these people to lead in their battle against other members of society. With no one to lead the opportunity for self-serving leadership to benefit economically and politically at the expense of others, black and white, disappears.

Most, if not all, political battles today involve one group or another demanding certain rights at the expense of others and the groups on the other side digging in and defending their rights. We seem to be confusing rights with freedom. These arguments over rights and who is entitled to what is destroying individual liberty and therefore the ability of individual citizens, black and white, to have a better and more secure fu-

To solve the racial problem it appears the citizens, black and white, would benefit by recognizing that they are being pitted against each other and used by self-serving leadership of both colors.

Whites originally came to this country because they wanted freedom. Blacks have been fighting for freedom 200 plus years. These facts indicate that the common bond between black and white is the concept of freedom and individual liberty.

That being the case it is difficult to understand why people of all colors are willing to tolerate more government, more regulations and more taxation, etc. Maybe the time will come when black and white band together and start demanding that self-serving leadership and government stop interfering with what both black and white want - freedom.

In the latest edition of "Modern Maturity," AARP's bimonthly magazine which has a circulation of about 16 million copies, the pitch is made that all travel expenses, plus hotel and meals, will be paid for the 10 winners and their companions for three days and four nights.

The 1986 convention at Anaheim, Calif., attracted some 30,000 members and just as many or more are expected next May. There will be renowned experts on a host of subjects, more than 100 product exhibits, superb entertainment and, of course, discussions of subjects that are of vital interest to older Americans.

Instead of California, this next gathering will be held in glamorous Detroit, but I'd like to win the trip anyway. I haven't been there for several days, and never for free.

A MESSAGE from John Denning, outgoing national AARP president, says that almost 600,000 members live within a 50-mile radius of Detroit. There's no question but what many will attend, at least as spectators. If I get there myself, I would like to tag along with E. Alfreda Page, maybe as her caddy.

Mrs. Page, a vivacious Southfield widow of 77, is one of nine persons recommended by the AARP nominating committee to serve on the official Michigan delegation and is the only resident of the Observer & Eccentric circulation area who has that honor.

Not only would serving as a convention aide to Mrs. Page get one into the inner circles of a multimillion-member organization that hopes to have a large voice in the 1988 national presidential election, but her own pace would help get a person into physical condition for the next golf season. By that means, I could combine education and health in one fell swoop.

• Circuit Judge James Thorburn rules the state violated the Headlee amendment to the Michigan Constitution by shoving certain mental health costs onto counties and labeling it "aid to local government." The judge said Lansing improperly classified those expenditures in pumping the required 41 6 percent of the state budget into local aid.

Some local commissioners appeared to agree with McNamara.

Unfortunately, this is only going to confuse things and delay the matter further," said commissioner Milton Mack, D-Wayne. "And every day

budget cuts that we won't be able to restore

Commissioner Richard Manning County's budget could be adopted as D-Redford, said the commission might not be able to implement new cuts until next year.

It could be a matter of waiting to see what the state Legislature does," call a special commission meeting. Manning said. "McNamara has said he was open for suggestions, maybe there could be some negotiations.





Holiday drinking: Mix can be lethal

HESE DAYS, crack cocaine and other drugs get a lot of media-attention. Alcohol, however, remains the No. 1 abused drug in the United States

"It's still by far the largest drug that is abused, period," said David Breeden, director of Plymouth Family Service, a Plymouth Community Fund agency.

That's true in all segments of society, Breeden said. Although athletes with cocaine or heroin problems often attract a great deal of public attention, alcoholics from the world of sports generally don't.

"But it's just more accepted," he said. "They're both drugs and they're both problems.

The holiday season can be a particularly difficult one for those with drinking problems, according to Sue Rubin, chemical dependency therapist at Plymouth Family Ser-

"I think people traditionally tend to drink more during the holidays." she said. It's considered more socially acceptable to drink during the holiday season, she added.

Jim Heady, a chemical dependency therapist at Plymouth Family Service, knows about that. He's a recovering alcoholic/drug addict.

HEADY KNOWS that he can't drink at all. There's a part of him

drinking.

But I've had to accept that fact." Being an alcoholic is in some ways like being a diabetic, he said; just as diabetics can't eat certain foods, alcoholies can't drink.

It took me a long time to believe that." Recognizing that is the key to recovery for alcoholics, Heady said. Those who don't believe, will never make it.

During the holidays, Heady takes Antabuse, a drug that forms a toxin when mixed with alcohol. He's gone through the steps of Alcoholics Anonymous and has learned how to live again and to deal with relationships and stress.

Whatever I'm doing has kept me OK." Heady sees friends from his younger days either in jail or dead; he's grateful he has stopped

abusing drugs In general, the holiday season's a time when there's a license to overindulge, Breeden said.

We buy too much, we eat too much, all those kinds of things."

THERE ARE, however, certain things that can help recovering alcoholics cope with the holiday season. Friends and family members can also help recovering alcoholics

Hosts and hostesses of holiday parties need to be aware of the needs of non-drinkers, Breeden said. It's important to offer a number of non-alcoholic beverages for

At least one-third of the U.S. population doesn't drink because of health conditions, drinking problems or personal preference, he said. There's also a social trend toward more responsible use of al-

A good host or hostess is sensitive to awkwardness for their guest." A host or hostess needs to make it known that non-alcoholic drinks are available; such drinks

should be easy to get to. Having a non-alcoholic punch prominently displayed at a party makes a more comfortable situation for your guests," Breeden said.

It's important not to push drinks on guests. Rubin said. A guest who chooses not to drink can still have fun at a social gathering, hosts and hostesses shouldn't put pressure on those guests to drink

Hosts and hostesses also need to be aware of people who've had too much to drink, Breeden said.

You need to assume some responsibility."

THAT HAS become more and more of a legal concern in recent years, he said. It's important to have plans made ahead of time to deal with those who've had too much to drink, intoxicated guests shouldn't be allowed to drive.

Time alone can be time well-utilized

We most commonly divide our time between "work" and "leisure." The latter is usually associated with recreation, including sports, hobbies and the like

However, all of the classical traditions of civilization have different categories for designating time There was "work." "recreation" and leisure." The category of recreation included what we today call leisure. as mentioned above.

However, the category of 'leisure" as defined by the ancients was different than our modern interpretation Leisure means the time one spends in cultivating one's mind. sharpening one's sensibilities, expanding one's intellectual and spiritual horizons.

In this sense, leisure is different from work and recreation. It is a time of contemplation, for examining and absorbing art, literature. music, and for discussing with others the fundamental issues of life and living - issues that cannot engage us when we are too busy with our jobs, or too stimulated from recreation

SUCH ENDEAVORS often require

It is one of the saddest commentaries on our age that we hate to be alone. The whole concept of "aloneness," which is different, of course, from "loneliness" is almost unknown to the modern American.

Solitude is part of the meditative religions like Buddhism and Hinduism, and has a very special place in Judaism and Christianity However. we cannot bear to be without people for too long. It is most difficult for many to separate themselves from contemporary society for just a few moments a day, in order to be alone with their own minds, and with the inspiration and insight of the minds

We need to appreciate the differ-

tude Loneliness hurts solitude helps. A great sage once said that a human being who does not have an hour for himself each day is not a human being. He was urging his disciples not be lonely, but to develop the ability to value solitude

Thomas Edison once said. The best thinking has been done in soli tude. The worst has been done in tur-

FOR MANY people, this is very difficult. A comtemporary writer has defined "hell" as the time people must spend by themselves with their television sets out of order. And yet if we are not capable of living with ourselves, are we capable of living at all

We all need time to discover our inner strength, to reflect, to examine, to find faith, to be renewed words that are disappearing form our lives

To be able to be alone without feeling lonely is one of life's greatest achievements, and he who has acquired it has gained a priceless possession. It is indispensable to the

goals of leisure. Clarke E Moustakas stated this truth with great eloquence and beauty: "Loneliness is as much a reality of life as night and rain and thunder. and it can be lived creatively as any other experience. So I say, let there be loneliness, for where there is loneliness, there is also sensitivity. and where there is sensitivity, there is awareness and recognition and promise one can find answers to





1. EAT ONLY when hungry.

Ignore the calories. If you eat a food because it's "low-cal," not be cause you want that particular food, you won't be satisfied. So you'll eat something else that will satisfy you

Try to examine what food will satisfy you at that time and eat it without feeling guilty about the calories.

3. PAY ATTENTION to how you

meals and social gatherings, if you're not paying attention to how the food tastes or how much you've

Sit down for all meals, and don't eat alone, if possible. By sitting down in a pleasant atmosphere to enjoy what you're eating, you've given yourself permission to eat. Eating with others makes you aware of how much you're consuming.

At social gatherings, don't eat sitting down. It's much harder to handle a full plate of food while standing, so you tend to choose only what you really want. Also, if you're sitting down, the whole plate or bowl of whatever is handy will disappear into your mouth without your realiz-

Finally, if you're standing, you tend to mingle more and lively disussions make great substitutes for the need to have "something to much



I distinctly remember getting my first VISA card

It was in 1977, about a week after I'd mailed in the application. In answer to the question "Who is your employer?" I'd written The Detroit News, where I used to be an editorial assistant

I was scheduled for the afternoon shift that week, which meant showing up for work around noon. As I climbed the stairs, I could hear a telephone ringing in the newsroom. Everyone was out for lunch. I walked in and answered the phone.

This is VISA calling," the voice said. "We have an application from a Philip Sherman, and we're verifying his employment. Is he an employee in good standing?" I said he certainly was. The voice thanked me for my time and hung up I received my card about a week later.

Ten years later. I am but one of 104 million VISA card holders. That's just for the United States. There also are 80 million Master-Card holders in this country. Those figures are from VISA and Master-Card, respectively.

That means there are, without counting American Express, Diners Club. Carte Blanche and Discover, at

least 184 million credit card holders running around in a country of about 260 million And the holidays are

So here is a primer on credit card lore, best read before venturing out into the gaping maw of temptation.

Q. Who are VISA and Master-

A. They are associations owned by local banks, properly referred to as VISA USA Inc. and MasterCard International VISA is a for-profit asoccution said Dan Brigham media relations manager MasterCard is non-profit, according to Julie Dittman, vice president of public affairs.

Both credit card companies work for their members - the local banks with which we do business. The compames perform services for their members, such as providing them with a globally recognized trademark and approving transactions before they're completed.

Q. So they're the people who issue cards, right?

A Wrong Local banks issue cards, which accounts for the wide span of interest rates. Dittman, for example, said MasterCard rates range nationwide from 10 percent APR (annual percentage rate) at some Connecticut banks to 20 percent. In the Detreit area, the standard rate is 18 percent, according to representatives at National Bank of Detroit, Manufacturers National Bank and Comerica Bank. All three banks of-

fer MasterCard and VISA credit

But not all credit lines are the same. Sharon McMurray, spokeswoman for Manufacturers, said one of its associated banks in Wilmington, Del., is offering a variable interest rate MasterCard, which was hovering at 14.2 percent in mid November. The rate is adjusted quarterly according to the government's six-month treasury bill. The card is available nationwide, McMurray

Q. Then there are there other differences between cards and banks?

A. Absolutely. Check annual renewal fees. That 14.9-percent card mentioned above has no annual renewal fee, but it doesn't have a grace period either. The grace period refers to the the amount of time you have before interest is charged on your outstanding balance. With this card, interest is calculated from the time you make your purchase. Most cards charge an annual renewal fee

but have a grace period of at least 25 days. That means if you pay off the balance when billed, then you are not charged interest. Carrying any part of the balance over to the next month means paying interest on that balance.

The Michigan Association of CPAs, based in Farmington Hills, warns consumers to find out how they're paying interest. APR is the best way, they say, because even small payments decrease the balance, which decreases the amount of card holders do, according to Brig-

interest that can be calculated on that balance. The worst way is called previous balance, which means you get no credit for payments made during the billing period, they add. In that situation you're paying interest on the previous month's balance.

Q. How many people really pay off their cards every month

A Ninety-eight percent of VISA

ham. Dittman at MasterCard said "the majority do" but didn't have figures available. That's nationwide. Local trends don't quite match up McMurray at Manufacturers said two-thirds of its card holders do not pay off balances monthly. Curt Willner, public relations representative at NBD, said "one's washing out the other." meaning outstanding debt and payoffs are about equal

The paying over time trend also is common at Hudson's. Candace Barker, communications manager, said they've seen no major trend in paying off cards this year. Quite the contrary. She said Holiday Money, deferred credit plan at Hudson's that postpones payments on purchases until February, already has increased 35 percent.

Q. Where is all this information available?

A. A lot is included in the Terms and Conditions document that comes with each card; a condensed version of that document usually is printed on the back of each monthly state ment. Neither bank nor credit card company representatives know if anyone really reads those pages of tiny type, but they suspect someone must because that's where their cus-

tomer service numbers are printed. If you've ever called to question a bill, you know those lines are popu-

Q. Is this really big business?

A. Brigham at VISA said the average transaction is \$65. VISA processes 150 million transactions per month worth \$8.2 billion That's not for the year, just for last September

Q. What are the busiest times of the year for both companies?

A. For VISA, it's as you would expect - the holiday season. Dittman at MasterCard said their busiest time is the third week in May, around Mother's Day.

Q. What does it all mean?

A. Lower-interest cards are better for people who intend to carry balances; higher interest are designed for those who pay them off monthly. The national trend of paying off balances means people use the cards as a convenience instead of carrying money, Brigham said Dittman at MasterCard said it also means consumers are paying more attention to interest rates and finance charges.

Local banks won't release information on how many cards they've issued, saying that's competitive information. Happy shopping.

Credit: problem or convenience?

There are those who pay off credit cards every month. And there are those who put friction burns on their cards until they're \$15,000-\$20,000 in the hole.

That's according to Jane McNamara, assistant to the president of Credit Counseling Centers in Southfield. They have 13 offices statewide: McNamara says this is the best year they've

had since '79. Credit Counseling Centers

helps people in dealing with their finances. They generally come to us through referrals,' she says. Their clients range from low income, low skill to high education levels, McNamara adds. All have one thing in common.

Fifty percent want help setting up spending plans and 50 percent want more help - we negotiate terms of repayment with their creditors" when they slide into debt, McNamara says.

McNamara says the typical client is in his or her early 40s, and it's not uncommon for them to carry a debt load of up to \$20,000, not including a mortgage. She sees several reasons for this prob-

"The baby boomers have very high expectation levels. They want things now. Pre-approved credit applications also are a problem because the responsibility for determining how much credit is available has fallen to the consumer instead of the lender," she says.

"I think credit cards offer us convenience but become a problem when we let them manage us through impulse purchases," McNamara adds.

To stry off her client list, McNamara advises planning purchases and spending on a budget. Making spending decisions before snapping down a credit card also will help keep control of accounts, she adds.

But for those in need, McNamara says their offices do not charge for counseling services. If they set up a program for you, fees are based on your ability to pay. "We've never turned anyone away," she adds.

"Our attorneys are looking into an appeal and I'm definitely for that," said Lori Packer, state director of Robertson's campaign. "I'm really surprised that we lost on all counts I think it's appealable and winnable."

OAKLAND'S DICKERSON said the decision would allow 49 party nominees to be local convention delegates, as they had been for decades.

Those people ran for state senator (4), state representative (12), countywide offices (6) and county commissioner (27) in recent elections

"I go to the Republican caucus of the Board of Commissioners," said Dickerson. "I reach out and invite them to party functions. And I invite their feedback

He said the Kemp-Robertson decision to dump nominees as county delegates risked alienating them from the party structure.

Dickerson was a Bush supporter prior to becoming chairman of the state's largest Republican-controlled county this year. He no longer has a position in the Bush organization.

Senate majority leader John Engler, a Bush co-chair in Michigan,

'It's an excellent shot in the arm. and it continues what has been a drumbeat of good news," said Engler of Mount Pleasant. "It puts us further down the path toward winning the most delegates in Michigan."

BOUCHER'S RULING came in a lawsuit filed by establishment Republicans, who mainly support Bush's presidential candidacy and contended the rule change violated state law and national party rules.

There seems to be no question here that state party rules are subordinate to national party rules" under state law, Boucher said. "It is simply unfair to change the rules unilaterally in the middle of the game."

David McKeague, who represented pro-Bush forces, said the committee has no choice but to comply with Boucher's verbal opinion "It's inconceivable that the State Central Committee would refuse to comply with the ruling from Judge Boucher." he said.



OCC offers TV program on cable

HE ONLY TELEVISION program that regularly reviews civic, university and commercial theaters and first-run movies in the Detroit area recently celebrated its second full

'The Arts in Review" reaches a potential audience of more than one million viewers for half an hour each. week over 12 cable television systems in Oakland and adjoining coun-

The program features filmclips, performance or dress rehearsal videos of plays, and conversations with theatrical and movie figures, plus informed dramatic and film criticism

Critics are communication theater faculty and visiting performing arts professionals at the Orchard Ridge Campus of Oakland Community College in Farmington Hills The program is staffed by OCC television production students.

The show serves area theaters and theater audiences while providing hands-on opportunities for our TV students," says Ted Rancont, professor of communications and producer of "Arts in Review."


Rancont's field production students shoot rehearsals and openings, and edit the performance videography. His studio production students shoot and edit the program itself.

AMONG REGULAR reviewers are cinematography professor Dan Greenberg, Smith Theatre manager Jamie Mason, and Rancont. Greenberg, an expert on filmmaking and film history, is also film critic for the Observer & Eccentric Newspapers. Rancont, an award-winning. playwright, has worked in professional theater and is a former drama critic of the Ann Arbor News. Mason has designed, directed and performed in commercial, community and university theaters.

"It seems odd that we're the only program like this in a theatrically active metro area that's also a TV town," says Rancont, "but as long as we are, 'The Arts in Review' probably will stay on the air.'

'Arts in Review' was first cablecast as an experiment Nov. 27, 1985. Positive viewer response has kept it on during the 104 weeks since.

In addition to major motion pictures, the show's critics regularly review productions at the Fisher, Hilberry, Attic, Bonstelle, Meadow Brook, Marquis, Lydia Mendelssohn. Power, DIA, Music Hall, Masonic Temple, Essex Hall, Grand, Stratford Festival and Stratford Avon Theatres. The program also covers

Many of the same students who staff "Arts in Review" also staff and produce 'Oakland County Connection," one of the few entirely student-produced weekly television talk shows in the nation.

"Oakland County Connection" features interesting individuals who live, work or play in Oakland County Each half-hour show, hosted by OCC students, includes 12 to 15 minutes of edited field video showing

what the guest is talking about.

BOTH REGULAR OCC-TV programs are distributed to all cable systems in Oakland County over the college's "bicycle network," with campus AV technicians carrying videotapes physically each week to the various locations.

Rancont estimates that more than 100 OCC television production students and volunteers have been involved in keeping "Arts in Review" on the air during its first two years.





Young organist to give concert

Tony O'Brien explodes the notion that organ music is strictly for weddings or funerals.

The 25-year-old Livonia college student, who began playing the organ at age 7, will perform a Christmas concert at 8 p.m. Saturday at the Redford Theatre in Detroit. He'll play a spright medley of holiday tunes, along with a piece called "Nativity Suite," which he composed about the Christmas story

Every time I play for an audience, it is my No. 1 intent to show that the organ is a very viable instrument and can be enjoyable," said O'Brien, a 1980 graduate of Churchill High School in Livonia.

O'Brien is quick to admit that organ music generally appeals to an older audience. But he's doing his best to win young converts.

Young people don't enjoy it as much," concedes O'Brien, who currently attends Schoolcraft College in Livonia. "I use a synthesizer. That's unusual with the pipe organ. It might even be considered controversial to purists. It gives a little more modern quality.'

O'Brien learned a love of organ music from his father, Raymond, At the age of 7, the younger O'Brien became fascinated by a television performance by famed organist Virgil Fox. He asked to take lessons.


THREE YEARS later, O'Brien played the organ during services at his family's church, St. Michael's Catholic in Livonia He had to stretch his legs to reach the pedals. By age 13, O'Brien was performing in public and had succeeded his teacher as church organist.

The main characteristic of the theater pipe organ, or theater organ. is its "limitless" versatility, O'Brien said. The organ's multi-tiered keyboard, pedals and levers (called stops) can produce the tone of every musical instrument, from the harp to the tuba.

'It was meant to duplicate all the possibilities of the orchestra," he noted. "It was built for entertainment. It was called the 'unit orchestra' - a one-man band '

The organ also has an auto horn and can make other sound effects such as a boat whistle or barking

During Saturday's concert. O'Brien will play the Redford Theatre's ornate, black organ, adorned with fierce-looking gold serpents so typical of the florid 1920s. The instrument was installed in 1928, when the theater opened, to provide music and dramatic accompaniment for si-

Motor City Theatre Organ Society, a non-profit corporation. The society shows old movies and sponsors concerts to showcase the talents of theater organists and raise money for ongoing restoration of the 60-yearold building

O'BRIEN FIRST played for a Redford Theatre movie series in 1978, at the age of 15. He likes to employ magic shows, smoke machines and other flashy techniques to snag people who would not ordinarily be attracted by organ music.

"I don't try to overdo the flashy stuff, but a little bit adds some class," O'Brien said. "I want to give them a show. Concerts attract a certain group. If they leave enjoying what they just heard, the job has been done.

O'Brien is both hopeful and realistic about a career in music. While it is his first choice, the organ doesn't enjoy the widespread popularity of other instruments. National organ competitions are beginning to attract young musicians, which is good for the future of all organists,

O'Brien said. He has played for the Detroit

al Brotherhood of Magicians. O'Brien has performed at the Detroit Institute of Arts and with the Detroit Concert Band and has appeared at the Henry Ford Museum's 1920s Great Escape Weekend. In the spring, he will travel to Australia to perform for a theater organ

Meanwhile, O'Brien teaches organ and piano and studies electronics and computer science at Schoolcraft College. Knowing these electronics skills widens his expertise with synthesized music, and may serve as a career backup if music doesn't pay

It isn't an easy career, but it is possible. That is my ultimate goal. I have stuck with it longer than most (musicians). It's something I will always have.

The law does not apply to credit unions, savings and loans institutions or banks chartered in other states or countries.

"It seems ironic that a bank holding company from Chicago or Columbus or a bank from Tokyo can establish a presence anywhere in the state Yet an East Lansing bank cannot serve its customers by establishing a branch in downtown Lansing.

Kuthy said

With automatic tellers springing up around the state, it no longer makes sense to prevent banks from opening branches wherever they believe they can best serve their customers. Kuthy said.

In one-bank towns, it means a lot more competition." Kuthy said

GRIFFIN SAID he believes consumers will be the beneficiaries of further bank deregulation.

The branch banking bill has the support of Michigan's big bank companies, including Michigan National Corp of Farmington Hills and National Bank of Detroit

But it is also being eyed with apprehension by community bankers. who are afraid the larger banking companies will push them out of

Smaller banks generally disagree with the concept of full statewide banking according to Jerry Towns, chairman of the Michigan Association of Community Banks, a trade association of about 110 small banks

This left intact an eight-months delay, to Sept. 1, 1988, of Environmental Protection Agency enforcement under the current law Congress will use the time to complete work on an updated version of the statute.

The vote defeated an amendment to postpone for 21 months the deadline now set for Dec. 31, an approach that would have given Congress until late 1989 to rewrite the Clean Air

Environmentalists wanted the shorter delay while industrial lobbyists generally favored the 21-month postponement.







Few injuries result from aerobic dancing

Courts get tough with poachers

OU'VE SCOUTED FOR months and finally located a nice trophy buck. You gain access to the area where you know he roams, learn the territory and set up a couple strategically located blinds. You continue to study the habits of the buck, dreaming about that opening day opportunity you're sure to get. Then he mysteriously disappears just a week before the season begins

Could it be all the stories you've heard about deer having a sixth sense are true? Could it be they really do know when the hunting season

C'mon now. Let's be serious for a moment.

True, the Michigan whitetail is an elusive creature. But deer are not that smart. They don't know when the season starts. In fact, I've never seen a deer that can read a road sign let alone a

Sure, if that trophy you've been stalking for months suddenly disappears it's possible he's moved on to greener pastures. But it's also possible he's fallen prey to a poacher.

"IN THE PAST, poaching has been a real serious problem," said Sgt. James Emerson of the Department of Natural Resources' Law Enforcement Division. "There are about as many deer killed illegally in Michigan as there are killed legally Hopefully, with stiffer fines being imposed. the numbers will be down somewhat this year."

These tougher penalties went into effect late last year and dramatically increased the price for poaching. It used to be that anyone caught with an illegal deer faced a \$250 fine, up to five days in jail and up to \$100 restitution. The new penalties include up to \$1,000 in fines, up to 90 days in jail and up to \$1,000 in restitution. Poachers can also lose their gun, car and hunting privileges for up to three years.

"The courts are readily assessing the fines and taking poaching much more seriously," said Emerson. "One case, in southwest Michigan, three men killed a deer illegally and it cost them in the neighborhood of \$4,300

According to Emerson there are two types of poachers, casual poachers and professional poachers. The casual poacher is usually found during the hunting season. They shoot deer for themselves and take the meat home. Many times they are frustrated hunters who haven't had any luck in the field. The professional poacher works year-round. He kills the animals for profit.

"THE PROFESSIONAL poachers kill the most deer," said Emerson. "Big time poaching is a multi-million dollar business. There's a big market for venison sausage and bucks in velvet. There's also a big market for bear. The teeth, claws, gall bladder, meat and hide are all sold individually. A whole bear will sell for \$5,000 in Korea."

The best weapon in the DNR's battle against poaching is citizen participation.

The more eyes and ears we have out there the better we'll be able to do our job," said Emerson. Poachers count on people not to do anything. If they knew people would call everytime they heard a gun go off maybe it would slow them down a little."

THE DNR instituted a (RAP) Report All Peach ing hotline in 1980 in an effort to gain public support in their fight against peaching. The toll free number is 1-800-292-7800 and operates 24 hours a

The RAP line services about 10,000 calls annually, 4,000 of which are complaints which the DNR can do something about Emerson said the

RAP line is responsible for about 1,500 arrests annually. "We need citizen participation," said Emerson

"The RAP line has been successful but it could be more successful with more citizen involvement We need people to call us, give us the information and let us handle it from there. They can call us on the RAP line or call their local conservation officer. We have a conservation officer in every county in the state. If they don't have the number they can call us in Lansing (the DNR Law Enforcement Division phone number is 517-373 1230) and we'll give them the number of their local conservation officer

The DNR, Michigan United Conservation Clubs and the Upper Peninsula Sportsman's Alliance recently announced they are offering a \$4,000 reward for information leading to the conviction of the person or persons responsible for killing a moose around opening day of the firearm deer season. Hunters discovered the body of the moose in Barga County on Nov. 27.

The DNR Law Enforcement Division is especially interested in information about a light green 1972 or 1973 Ford pickup truck with a light green cap and Wisconson license plates.

Anyone with information is urged to call the RAP line or contact Lt. George Rice in the Escanaba office at (906) 786-2351 as soon as possible.



dried flower petals and spices - has graduated from little sachets designed to be tucked between lingerie layers or stored in handkerchief drawers to focal points of decor.

And instead of sprinkling of petals in a small bowl, the new fashion statement is a large bowl filled to the brim with aromatic petals, mixed with pine cones, dried berries, wood, shavings, fruit pits and unshelled nuts, or whatever the fancy dictates as long as it holds a fragrance.

PROPERLY CARED FOR, potpourri is forever. When the ambrosial scent dims, the dried mixture can be placed in a shallow glass baking pan, sprinkled with drops of refresher oil and covered with plastic wrap. After 24 hours, the fragrance is renewed.

There are many ways to freshen a room but none quite so elegantly as with a large bowl of potpourri. I first saw it used this way in the resident castle of the Duke of Northumberland in Alnwick, N. England. My aunt lived nearby and was graciously permitted to take me through the castle.

My first impression was of two liveried footmen standing on either side of a very large reception table which held a huge bowl, heaped with rose petals and lavender. The sole job of the footmen was to stir the potpourri once very 15 minutes to assure that the hall remained filled with the wafting scent.

Later impressions of the castle in-


cluded a sense of wonder at the homeyness of the family rooms. Faded, flowered slipcovered and worn needlepoint foot stools attested to the popularity of the library that was also filled with bowls of garden flowers. And I remember the sitting room occupied the past fortnight by the Queen Mother with her most recent photograph propped up on a table graced by a single fresh rose in a silver vase.

BUT MOST OF ALL I remember the potpourri and I spent much of my time in the north country gathering lit tle bags of lavender and rose petals in an attempt to acquire enough to fill a modicum of a large bowl when I got home. I was never really successful in my quest until several years ago when I discovered large bags of potpourri on Hilton Head Island, called Aromatique that came from Heber Springs, Ark.

It is a pleasure to report that Aromatique is now carried at Bonwit Teller in Somerset Mall; Claire Burke is also packaging potpourri in quantity available at Jacobson's stores, Long's Bath Shop and Peddler's Four in Northville plus a host of other stores, including J.C. Penneys, Hudson's and Crowley's.

Scarborough makes a complete line of home fragrances including light bulb rings and oil, also available at most of the stores that carry potpour-

Life after Trivial Pursuit? You bet

AP - Is there life after Trivial Po

Game manufacturers are trying to persuade consumers this Christmas that there is, indeed, a rejuvenation of the adult game market, stimulated by board games like Trivial Pursuit and Scruples and Pictionary.

These board games and others like them "have had the effect of bringing people together in a social setting and reminding them that games could be a fun way to spend an evening," K mart toy buyer George Colgan recently told Toy and Hobby World magazine.

According to the Toy Manufacturers of America, \$253 million was spent on adult board games last year. Some of this season's entries:

The Dictionary Game comes to the United States through Canada, introduced by Davis-Grabowski Inc., a Miami-based importer of toys and games. Players create definitions to unfamiliar words that seem more believable than the actual dictionary and try to bluff others. The more convinc-

ing the definitions, the more points they gain in a race to reach "genius" on the game board.

• Another Canadian import is Therapy the Game The board game, sold by Pressman Toy Corp., asks players to master the stages of life, from "infancy" to the "cosmos." The first player to move his "couch" across the finish line wins.

• Win, Lose or Draw and Whatzit are among the board games from Milton Bradley. In the former, players try to decipher doodles of some phrase or expression taken from a card in a deck. The latter game plays with words that are turned around, upside down or jumbled. Like: Thingthing. (One thing after another.)

• Pictionary — one million games were produced in its introductory year last year, according to its marketers, the Games Gang — now has a junior version geared to 7-to-ll-year-olds. It's the same charades on paper game, but with different reading levels and includes wipe-off boards and crayons.






