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## Schools will ask for tax increase

### 4 new mills sought for 2-year period

Voters in the Plymouth-Canton school district will be asked to approve 4 new mills for two years and renew 8 mills in the upcoming June election. The proposal is intended to stave off what district officials predict will be a loss of more than \$10 million in revenue next year.

For the owner of a \$100,000 home, that means a tax increase of \$200 for each of two years.

School board members decided to

ask for new millage rather than for a waiver of the Headlee Amendment. Plymouth-Canton voters have turned down four millage requests in the last two years. The last Headlee defeat led to \$4 million in cutbacks in educational programs.

Waiving Headlee would allow the district to levy the full millage authorized by voters.

The amendment takes effect when the increase in assessed property values exceeds the rate of inflation. It mandates taxing units to roll back the tax rate to offset the difference.

Board members supported a proposal by Trustee Roland Thomas.

"I think the 8-mill renewal and 4 mills for two years is the appropriate way to go because it looks to the public like we're being conservative and judicious," said Thomas.

"Because it's short-term, it gives us time to see what the state is going to do (in the area of school finance reform). It also gives us time to assess the impact of going out of formula."

In-formula districts receive financial aid from the state. Districts go out of formula, losing all state aid, when local property values and tax revenue exceed a set level. Plymouth-Canton expects to go out of formula next year.

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### Opinions are mixed on millage package

While school board members favored the millage package, administrators favored seeking the millage renewal and a Headlee rollback.

Ray Hoedel, associate superintendent for business, said after the workshop, "We'll go along with the wisdom of the board. But strictly financially speaking, the Headlee waiver would've been a real advantage to the schools, in that it's for a one-year period only. What's good

about the decision is that it's 7-0. There's 100 percent support."

Superintendent John Hoben said, "I'd like to see Headlee, but I understand what the problems are and what the climate is in our community."

Wearing his "taxpayer and parent hat," Michael Homes, assistant superintendent for instruction, said he doesn't "relish the prospect of my child being cheated out of an hour (of instruction) because we can't come to an agreement. I have a hard time understanding selling 4 mills rather

than going after Headlee, which will bring us back to what's authorized. Sure as shooting . . . someone's going to ask, 'Why should I pay more to get less?' I'll have a tough time selling it to the coffee drinkers in my neighborhood."

Norm Kee, assistant superintendent for employee relations, agreed the 4 mills will be a tough sell. He said people in his neighborhood wouldn't approve 4 more mills.

Richard Egli, administrative assistant for community relations, supported seeking the Headlee waiver and said he believes it could pass.

He equated the district's financial situation with the sinking of the Titanic.

## Bomb threat empties banks

Four banks in Canton and Westland were evacuated Tuesday after a telephone caller demanded \$5,000 and said he would bomb the buildings unless the money was handed over.

Police and fire units and agents from the Federal Bureau of Investigation searched the banks, but no bombs were found and no one arrived to collect the money, officials said.

Police identified the targeted banks as: Security Bank & Trust at Warren and Canton Center, First of America at Ford and Haggerty, both in Canton; and the Manufacturers banks at Wayne and Warren and at Wayne and Canyon in Westland.

The calls began about 2:20 p.m. and were made "almost back to back," said John Anthony, special agent in the Detroit FBI office. In each instance, the caller was a male and "indicated that he would be by the drive up window in 15

minutes" to pick up the \$5,000, Anthony said.

The caller said if the money was not there "a bomb would go off in the bank," Anthony said.

"We don't know if it was the same person all the time, but the message was pretty much the same," he said.

No one showed up to pick up the money at any of the banks, officials said.

"I believe this is the first thing of this nature so far this year for us," said Canton police detective Keith

Lazar. "I don't recall any last year."

Bank employees told officials the caller was a man who sounded as if he was in his late 20s, Lazar said. He said investigators are not considering the incident a child's prank.

Said Anthony: "We're treating them as real. Anyone who would resort to a bomb threat, we treat it as legitimate."

Bank officials refused to comment, and Westland police referred inquiries to the FBI.

## Tyburski able to stand trial

Leonard Tyburski, the Canton man accused of murdering his wife and keeping her body in a basement freezer for three years, has been deemed competent to stand trial.

Judge James Garber, 35th District Court in Plymouth, said he received the psychiatric evaluation Wednesday. A competency hearing and preliminary examination was scheduled for 2 p.m. Thursday, Feb. 16.

After his arrest on an open murder charge Jan. 2, Tyburski hired Dearborn attorney John L. McWilliams. But Tyburski replaced McWilliams with Carol Stanyer of Detroit.

"I agreed that I would step aside

so that a person who practices exclusively in the area of criminal law and a person that Mr. Tyburski would feel more comfortable with" could take the case, he said.

STANYER SAID she didn't know what caused Tyburski to change counsel. She refused to discuss the case, saying she had not been notified of the results of the competency testing.

"I'm going to look at the report before I have any comment on anything," Stanyer said.

Tyburski, 45, was arrested after his 20-year-old daughter found the body of Dorothy Tyburski in a chest-

Hearts are special to Geneva Guenther.

"It's a very simple form of art. It's the art of little people," she said.

About 35 years ago, Guenther got into hearts in a big way.

Her son, Peter, then 9, healthy by all outward appearances, developed a brain tumor. The doctors advised her that he probably wouldn't live more than 18 months, even with surgery.

But Peter persevered. So did Guenther, her husband, Harold, and three other sons.

She found that Peter and other children who were sick responded to

the shape of a heart and the color red. Their emotions seemed to perk.

Peter, buoyed by his family's devotion, fought for life. The months turned into years.

## Extension cord is blamed in fire

A fire that caused an estimated \$10,000 damage last Saturday to a unit at the Mayflower Townhouse Cooperative Apartments on Plymouth Road resulted from an overloaded extension cord, according to Al Matthews, fire chief in the city of Plymouth.

The fire was reported about 8:50 a.m. Four people were in the unit at the time. No one was injured, Matthews said.

The fire originated in the base-

ment and worked its way up to the first floor through the cold air duct system, Matthews said.

Structural damage was estimated at \$5,000, loss of contents also at \$5,000.

Firefighters brought the blaze under control in about 20 minutes and remained on the scene for a couple of hours, mopping up and investigating.

Twenty-two firefighters responded to the alarm.

# Schools seek tax increase

District officials expect to lose 43.3 million in state aid when it goes out of formula. The district would lose another \$7.6 million due to a Headlee rollback if voters don't approve additional millage.

Renewing 8 mills and levying 4 mills would raise \$66.5 million — enough to restore some of the budget cuts now in place. Excess revenues would total \$3.3 million.

The 8-mill renewal and a one-year Headlee waiver would reap \$67.8 million and excess revenues of \$4.7 million.

School officials say that if voters elect only to renew 8 mills, \$3.3 million more in cuts will be needed in 1989-90.

Trustee Dean Swartzwelder had proposed a one-year additional millage, saying that would buy the district some time to see what action the state takes in revamping school finance.

"If the consensus is two years, it's OK with me, because chances are, the state won't get their act together in a year, anyway," said Swartzwelder.

Trustees E.J. McClendon, Marilyn Schwinn, Jeanette Wines, David Artley and Barbara Graham all were supportive of the plan. Most said voters have indicated they won't support a Headlee waiver.

The school board is expected to vote on the agreement at its meeting Monday night.

"People aboard the ship heard the alarm and said, 'It doesn't count. Let's continue partying. (When that statement drew laughter, Egli said, 'Strike that part of it.') Anyway, you sounded the alarm, and the people ignored it. They said, 'This is Plymouth-Canton, and that can't happen.' This year they're feeling water around their ankles."

REPRESENTATIVES FROM several employee unions said their members are ready to help push a millage. Marguerite Vollrath, head of the teachers union, said members "have been working on this for three months, attending millage seminars and public relations workshops. This must be community-led and staff supported. This time the community is ready to support a millage, and the staff is behind it. The climate has changed."

DEBBIE DRINKHAHN, a Plymouth resident and a parent of two school-age children, gave an impassioned plea to board members that drew applause from the audience.

"One of the biggest reasons Headlee failed is because people didn't understand it," she said. "All we saw were negative things in the schools and from the faculty."

"I see teachers and administrators so frustrated it seems like they're drowning. There's no enthusiasm in our schools. The apathetic attitude is absolutely the pits."

"Parents are starting to get together, but there are too many groups all chopped up. You can't sit back there and give us a list of numbers," added Drinkhahn. "We don't know what that means."

"When I have a daughter who, in two classes, can't get books that makes me angry. We have to turn it around."

"Get us together. Educate us about how the money works, and I think we can pass it."

# Tyburski able to stand trial

type freezer in the basement of their Avon Street home.

Dorothy Tyburski, who was 37 at the time of her death, had been reported missing in the fall of 1985. Tyburski told his two daughters and their neighbors that Dorothy abandoned the family. He filed a missing person report with Canton police at the time.

AFTER HIS arrest, Tyburski told investigators he killed his wife by striking her head against a beam in the basement as the two argued. He

said the argument involved an affair Dorothy was having with her daughter's boyfriend, the court papers said. The boyfriend was identified as Craig Albright of Westland.

Dorothy Tyburski died as a result of blows to the head, an autopsy reported. She was unconscious before her body locked in the freezer, according to the Wayne County medical examiner's office.

TYBURSKI TOLD investigators that after he hit his wife's head against the post, she "got kind of groggy, so he pushed her," the court

report said. She then fell back into the freezer, and Tyburski went upstairs to change his bloodied clothes. He told police he returned to the basement about a half hour later and tried to talk to his wife, but she didn't answer. At that time, he closed and locked the freezer, the report said.

The daughter, a Michigan State University sophomore, told police she began having nightmares about her mother being stuck in an enclosed place. The dreams started after Thanksgiving when the young woman, on a visit home, realized

that the key to the freezer was missing.

ON JAN. 2, the day she was supposed to return to school after the holiday break, she decided to pry open the freezer, police said. After finding the body, she and her 16-year-old sister went to Canton police headquarters. The younger daughter is a student at Plymouth-Salem High School.

Tyburski was the attendance center department head at Detroit's Mackenzie High School. He was hired there to teach science in 1984.

Neighbors described Tyburski as a "nice guy" who kept his ranch-style house extremely neat and became more outgoing after his wife disappeared.

Tyburski, who has been in the Wayne County jail for the last six weeks, faces a life sentence if convicted on the murder charge.

Peter died in 1985 at the age of 41. But Guenther continues to collect knick-knacks having to do with hearts because they cheer her so. And they remind her to accept people unconditionally, even if it isn't always easy.

"You live one day at a time," she said. "You can't look back. You can't look forward. You have to make this day the very best."

Guenther has become a big proponent of imagery over the years. She wears red clothing because she finds it brightens her outlook.

"My whole house is red and white because it's cheerful, not because it's tasteful," Guenther said with a smile. "I hope you can feel the love when you come in."

GUENTHER SAID she's never counted the many heart-related

objects she's collected or received from friends. That's because she holds onto things for sentimental reasons, not to build a collection.

Some of the more unusual objects are a heart-shaped wreath, a washboard, a tea kettle and a rock. She has heart-shaped jewelry and mirrors. Refrigerator magnets, too.

Next Tuesday — Feb. 14 — will be a special day, Guenther conceded. "I have wonderful friends who send me Valentines and tell me they love me. That's pretty nice."

Plus Valentine's Day always falls on the day after Peter's birthday.

Guenther, 75, has worked as a secretary for the Plymouth Community Council on Aging since her son's death.

"AFTER HE was gone, I was in shock," she said. "I knew I had to do something for someone else. I didn't

think I had anything to offer. "One day I got a telephone call. Would you work for the council on aging? I didn't want to come. I felt God was saying, 'Look!'"

"I just pray to be a channel," she said. "When people call or are in trouble or just have a need, hopefully, I can fill it by finding someone who can do something about it."

"People in this building are marvelous," Guenther said of her colleagues.

Sharon Thomas, housing director in Plymouth, said Guenther's personality is perfectly suited to the job.

"She can understand, relate to these people," Thomas said. "She's successful. We have nothing but good feedback."

Guenther, a Plymouth resident for 43 years, says she's cultivated a taste for the simpler things in life. Things like murder mysteries and antiques.

"People are very nice to me," Guenther said. "Nobody said life was fair. I've had a very easy life. If you have love, that's all that's necessary."

## Noteworthy Halls are alive with music for festival

**M**ORE THAN 1,500 high school musicians from more than 35 high schools in western Wayne County competed Saturday in the Michigan School Band and Orchestra Association District 12 Solo and Ensemble Festival.

All participants earning a Division I (highest) rating Saturday at Livonia Franklin High are eligible to compete at the MSBOA State Solo and Ensemble Festival in

March at Eastern Michigan University.

Among the senior high schools competing Saturday were: the Plymouth Centennial Educational Park music department and Plymouth Christian Academy, from the Plymouth-Canton community; John Glenn High School, Westland Lutheran High and Wayne Memorial High, from Wayne-Westland; Thurston High, Redford Union High, Catholic Central and Bishop

Borgess, from Redford; Franklin High, Clarenceville High, Stevenson High, Churchill High and the CAPA Program, from Livonia.

One of the judges, Jean Moorehead, is a 1973 graduate of the Plymouth High School Band. She performed there under band director James Griffith. She now is a professor of trumpet at Oberlin Conservatory of Music in Oberlin, Ohio.

At the state competition, Division I winners from all 36 districts again will perform for a rating before MSBOA-selected adjudicators. In addition to their major performance piece, state festival participants also will be judged on sight-reading performance and proficiency-level technique, and basic skills such as scales.

This is the 11th year that district competition has been hosted by Livonia Franklin High, assisted by the Livonia All-City Orchestra, which is housed at Franklin.

## Arrest charge conviction ends legal saga quickly

A nine-month legal saga for Cecile T. Jean ended Wednesday with her conviction in 35th District Court during a jury trial on a misdemeanor charge, of interfering with a police officer.

Jean, 45, of Canton, was arrested and ticketed for trespassing and interfering with a police officer on May 9 in the rectory of Our Lady of Good Counsel Catholic Church in Plymouth, of which is a long-time member.

The incident started when she was told by her pastor that she couldn't attend a parish meeting in the rectory that night and refused to leave when ordered by the priest and police.

The jury reached a decision on the interfering charge after about 10 minutes of deliberations.

"THAT'S THE quickest verdict I've ever seen," said Robert Roether,

Jean's lawyer.

The six jurors refused to comment on the case.

"I'm definitely surprised by the verdict," said Jean, adding that she'll continue to maintain membership in the parish in spite of the verdict. "It's my church."

A report will be prepared on Jean by the court's probation department before she is sentenced. She could receive up to 90 days in jail and/or a fine up to \$500, said Ron Lowe, who prosecuted the case.

JEAN TESTIFIED she fell to her knees and went rigid to make it easy for police to carry her from the rectory after she was told by police she would be charged with resisting if she had to be physically removed.

Lowe said in his closing argument that the act of falling to her knees was to hinder police.

Roether argued that Jean never verbally or physically abused officers and didn't do anything to disrupt the arrest and booking procedure other than fail to walk out of the rectory.

Judge James Garber told the jury that while an individual may resist an illegal arrest, an arrest is still valid if police make a reasonable and honest mistake.

THE TRESPASSING charge was dismissed by Garber last October.

He ruled then that Jean had a right to attend the meetings because she was a parishioner, and that other parishioners could attend the meetings. Also, he ruled that she didn't create a disturbance other than refuse to leave and she had no criminal intent.

Jean said she wasn't given a reason for her exclusion from the meetings.

The Rev. Timothy Hogan, associate pastor at Good Counsel at the time, said she was excluded because confidential salary issues were to be discussed and it wasn't certain she could be trusted to keep the information confidential.

## Student rep issue tabled

It looks like it'll be a while before a designated high school student representative begins attending Plymouth-Canton school board meetings. The board tabled a measure that would have named a representative, citing the need for ground rules to be set up.

Trustee Roland Thomas said, "I have concerns regarding the selection process. Is there equal representation from the middle school level? Where do we draw the lines? Would both high schools be represented?"

Trustee E.J. McClendon agreed, saying "I'd want to be sure that equity was followed, that roles and goals were established and that there was access for all schools."

### Comparison study

A citizens education committee is studying neighboring districts to see how Plymouth-Canton Community Schools stack up in areas including communication, finance, discipline, class size and curriculum.

Representatives from the Community Researching Educational Workings Committee presented an interim report to the school board Monday night. A final report is due in May.

Their findings show that among 12 neighboring districts, Plymouth-Canton is the only one that allows smoking on school property. Other findings:

- Plymouth-Canton is among the leaders in combating substance abuse.
- Attendance is a problem in the wake of the attendance office closing — a budget-cutting measure taken in the wake of a millage defeat.
- Curriculum concerns include classes in music and art; foreign language at the elementary level; Advanced Placement classes, and the Talented and Gifted program.

The committee plans to look at test scores, expenses per student and per capita income.

Ray Buckman, finance chairman, recommended that the board adopt a strategy that's helped districts in three other states pass millages. Called "I Care," the campaign employs several methods including the use of a public relations firm and enlisting the help of senior citizens and clergy.

Before he was cut off by Artley, Brookside spokesman Tim Kryska said he was "disgusted by the way in which parents had to find out" about the proposed transfer. (No official communication was sent to parents about the matter.)

"Hiding behind procedures isn't going to solve this. Giving us 20 minutes certainly would diffuse this situation and keep parents voting favorably. People will remember this meeting. They will remember it very well."

"I would like to hear each member of the board say individually that he or she refuses to hear us out," added Kryska.

"If we're going to pass a millage, you better confront the parents here. You can't avoid it forever."

Said Artley, "No matter how much I want to listen, the board can't do it in this workshop. I'm genuinely sorry that we can't. It's unfortunate, but it's not our choice."

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# Gov's speech gets high marks; plans don't

Wayne County Executive Edward McNamara and Sheriff Robert Ficano have had their disagreements, but both men agreed Gov. James Blanchard's State of the State address Tuesday was a winner.

Blanchard's annual address drew praise from both fellow Democrats. "I thought he did an excellent job. I give him an A plus on delivery," McNamara said. "Even the Republicans found it difficult to criticize him."

Ficano, invited to attend the speech as part of an anti-crime delegation, was equally enthusiastic.

"The anti-crime measures he proposed are very good," the sheriff said. "I also liked the tone of his speech — looking toward the future while other states are still struggling with their past."

The governor announced major proposals regarding crime, education and home buying as part of his annual message.

But while county and local leaders almost universally praised the speech, they are divided on whether Blanchard's recommendations will ever take shape.

"I THINK it was a very well-delivered speech," Livonia Mayor Robert Bennett said. "But, like everybody else, I'm left wondering where he's going to come up with the money for all he wants to do."

Area business leaders were equally skeptical. "It's quite a wish list," Livonia Chamber of Commerce president John White said. White added, however, that he generally

supported Blanchard. "He's got a good track record."

On the crime proposals, Ficano said he strongly favored the anti-drug trafficking aspects of Blanchard's crime package. The governor pledged to appoint a state drug czar to oversee 11 state anti-narcotics agencies, as well as to support for other measures, including increased use of court-supervised telephone wire tapping, to halt the narcotics trade.

"Wire tapping is controversial, but the key is that it's going to be court-supervised," Ficano said. "We have to realize that we're dealing with a different kind of criminal. The drug trade is so lucrative it's drawing in even professional people — doctors and lawyers. Frequently, these people do their business over the phone."

Redford Township Supervisor James Kelley congratulated the governor for "taking a strong stand against crime."

"I delivered my state of the township address a few weeks ago, and crime was my number-one priority," Kelley said. "We're hiring a new drug officer ourselves."

McNamara, however, said he believes even tougher measures should be enacted to cut crime.

"I STILL don't get the feeling we're not coming to grips with the fact it's a war out there," he said. "This isn't a criticism of the governor's speech, but I still think there's more we could do."

School property taxes and inequality in per-student spending among Michigan public school districts are

perhaps the state's major issue this year.

But while area school officials supported Blanchard's call for innovative programs and tougher student standards, they generally believed the governor ducked the thorny school finance issue.

"I'm happy that he emphasized education, but I'm not happy with what he said," said Kenneth Erickson, superintendent of Redford Union Schools. "He's talking about planning future strategies for education, and that's fine, but for a lot of us next year's budget is our problem. Many of us won't survive."

RU is an in-formula district that relies heavily on state aid and has been battling declining revenue for the last several years.

Carole Samples, acting superintendent of Livonia Public Schools,

said Blanchard's message contained little good news for out-of-formula districts as well.

"Unfortunately he didn't hit on what plagues schools that are in or out of formula, and that's financial stability," she said. "In-formula schools can't plan anything from one year to the next, and out-of-formula districts are always under the threat of what's going to happen to their funding sources."

Michael Shibley, superintendent of Clarenceville Public Schools, said his district has already followed many of the governor's recommendations for improve school curriculum.

"I'm all for striving for excellence, but we've been doing many of the things he mentioned in this district for the last several years. We have core curriculum, we have competency testing. If he's going to revamp education and redesign what's going on in the classroom, I'd like to know more about it."

Garden City Superintendent Michael Wilmot called the governor's proposals, "a lot of glitz."

"THERE ARE about 120 school districts projected to be in deficit this year, and the governor is talking of new programs without new dollars," Wilmot said. "It's like buying deck chairs for the Titanic."

Community leaders were also divided on whether the Michigan Home Ownership Savings Trust (HOST), a guarantee loan program for home buyers, would benefit their

communities. Westland Mayor Charles Griffin was enthusiastic about the plan.

"WE HAVE a lot of starter homes in our community, and we like to see turnover. The new people spruce them up. It's good for the city and good for the schools."

"My next-door neighbor is a guy who just got out of college, and he was asking the same thing just a few days ago, 'Why doesn't somebody do something to help home buyers?'"

Plymouth Township Supervisor Maurice Breen, however, said he didn't expect the program to affect Plymouth Township.

"Most of the people we have are previous home owners. Plus, the way I understand it, this thing could take two to three years to go into effect. It's really hard at this point to say whether it will have any impact."

The governor's environmental proposals, using the State Superfund to clean toxic waste sites and demanding triple damages from polluters, met with support from Canton Supervisor Thomas Yack.

"We're very interested in environmental issues," Yack said. "I believe we have a community that's progressive and well educated. We want to see these sites cleaned up."

The governor's pledge of cooperation with new President George Bush also drew praise.

"It was a good thing to do," Redford's Kelley said. "It's the kind of thing we're doing here, putting politics aside to work together."

## Annual address is considered a 'smorgasbord'

Gov. James J. Blanchard flooded the 1989 Michigan Legislature with new proposals, most calling for little new money in a tight budget.

"A smorgasbord," said House Republican leader Paul Hillemonds of Holland.

"An English garden — not a formal French garden — full of variety and chages, a little chaotic," said Sen. Jack Faxon, D-Farmington Hills.

Lawmakers liked the sound of the educational proposals in Blanchard's seventh State of the State address Tuesday, but many were repelled by an investment plan to aid first-time homebuyers.

Republicans were pleased that the Democratic governor copped several of their ideas.

A CHILD CARE plan Blanchard offered small business appeared to have been taken directly from a House Republican Task Force headed by Rep. Lyn Bankes, R-Livonia.

"I talked to the governor's staff person and asked, 'Can we work together on this?' He said 'we want to work together on this,'" Bankes said.

Under the Blanchard-GOP plan, working parents would authorize deductions from their wages up to \$5,000 a year for child care expenses. That amount would not be subject to federal income or social security taxes.

Bankes said such large companies as Textron of Walled Lake and Plante & Moran of Southfield have done this.

Blanchard proposed going a step further. "The treasury will act as care accountant for small businesses," said state Treasurer Robert Bowman.

Blanchard said the state would begin the child-care deduction plan this month for state employees.

Philosophically, the plan is close to what President George Bush proposed — a system of tax breaks for working parents rather than direct governmental child care payments.

REP. JOHN BENNETT, D-Redford, was more interested in something Blanchard hardly touched on — financing K-12 education.

"The state must take over a larger share of financing K-12 education. We need to earmark a larger share of the budget to K-12, to at least stabilize local property tax bills," said Bennett, in his third decade in the House.

Bennett had no comment on the Blanchard plan to aid first-time home buyers by setting up investment funds so they can afford down payments in five years. But he expressed great confidence in the plan's architect — the treasurer. "Bob Bowman is one of the smartest financial men in the country," Bennett said.

REP. JAMES KOSTEVA, D-Canton, was pleased with Blanchard's "commitment to education and commitment to the environment."

Kosteva underscored the administration's desire to attack toxic waste dumps with a new state bond issue and to end reliance on landfills for solid waste.

David Hales, director of natural resources, also told a news briefing the state not only wants to protect wetlands but increase them. Michigan's acreage in wetlands fell from 11 million to three million in this century. "We seek an increase. Our target is 500,000 acres of wetlands re-created," he said.

Hales said an immediate target is to close 88 unauthorized landfills.

"JOB START," a Blanchard proposal to take young people off welfare, "is very close to what Republicans want," said Sen. R. Robert Geake, R-Northville.

Geake won Senate passage of his bill to end the general assistance portion of welfare, but it was opposed by the administration and died in the House.

Blanchard proposes to reduce from 21,000 to 12,000 in three years the number of persons aged 18-25 on general assistance. By paying them \$200 a month and medical benefits, he would require they get into one of four programs — high school completion, intensive job training, a job search program or community service work.

Said Geake: "The governor's staff tries to pick up innovative proposals, regardless of the source."

Geake, a member of the Senate Appropriations Committee, was less enthused about expanding Head Start programs for pre-schoolers. "The benefit is very short term. With the exception of one Ypsilanti program, there's practically no evidence of long-term benefits."

ON ANOTHER proposal, Geake said Blanchard's plan to spend \$50 million to put a computer in every classroom "is only worth while if we can train teachers to train students to use them."

"The governor loves technology," said Faxon, who watchdogs education programs. "He has a deep and abiding respect for the best new gadget on the block. But at what expense? What are the alternatives?"

"Many of us believe reading requires books. Adequate texts. An investment in libraries can be cost effective."

"It seems to me the governor looks at schools too much in terms of a work force," said Faxon, emphasizing his own values of a liberal education and citizen participation.

"I ask employers what they need, and they say honesty — integrity — reliability — dependability. I haven't heard up front about the ability to use a machine."



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# Pursell, Levin reject pay raise, Ford lends support

Area Congressmen split their votes Tuesday on the controversial pay raise issue.

Bowing to public pressure, members of Congress overwhelmingly rejected a pay raise for themselves and other federal office holders. Reps. Carl Pursell, R-Plymouth and Sander Levin, D-Southfield, voted against the pay raise. Rep. William Ford, D-Taylor, supported the increase.

Pursell's district includes northern Livonia, Plymouth and Plymouth Township. Ford's district includes southern Livonia, Westland, Garden City and Canton Township. Levin's district includes Redford Township.

Overall, U.S. House members voted 380-48 to reject the controversial 51 percent pay increase Tuesday afternoon. The matter was subsequently rejected, 94-6, in the Senate.

Sens. Carl Levin, D-Detroit and Donald Riegle, D-Flint also voted against the increase. President George Bush approved the action. The president indicated, however, that he might support a lesser increase for federal judges and senior government officials.

**THE INCREASE** would have raised Congressional salaries from \$89,500 to \$135,000. It would also have increased salaries for judges and government officials.

Michigan's House delegation rejected the pay raise, 15-3. Reps. George Crockett, D-Detroit, Ford and John Dingell, D-Dearborn, supported the increase.

The measure initially had bi-partisan support, including support from Bush and former President Ronald Reagan. A storm of grass roots protest, however, changed the Congressional minds.

Many area residents sent tea bags to Senators and House members in a symbolic protest of the increase. A

The increase was initially recommended by a federal salary review panel.

Pursell, a critic of the increase from the outset, voted earlier this week against postponing a pay raise vote until today. Such a move would have allowed the pay increase to automatically go into effect.

Speaker of the House James Wright, D-Texas, and key Republican leaders said such a move would have allowed House members to cut the increase at a later time. It was rejected, 238-88.

Ford voted with the minority, favoring adjournment.

A WEEKEND poll of Congress members found Pursell and Levin opposed to the pay raise. Ford was

the only member of Michigan's Congressional delegation who failed to respond to the survey.

In a speech Monday before the House, Ford criticized Congress for failing to consider how rejection would affect federal cancer and AIDS researchers, among other positions that would share in the increase.

IN AN Observer article published earlier this year, Ford indicated support for the increase. Levin, in that same article, said he believed the increase was necessary but should be scaled back.

Also laid to rest, at least for the time being, were movements to limit Congressional speech fees and the grandfather clause that allows some veteran members of Congress to convert unspent campaign contributions into a personal retirement account.

Riegle has a campaign account balance of \$906,892. Carl Levin's is \$31,831.

Rep. William Broomfield, R-Birmingham, has the largest campaign balance among Michigan's House delegation, \$582,189. Pursell has a balance of \$116,774.

## Fire sale

### Collector purchases old Garden City fire truck

Old fire trucks never die, they are sold to collectors.

Garden City this week sold a 37-year-old pumper, which had fought many a fire, to a Taylor-based fire truck collector. The vehicle had been stored in a city garage since 1984, when it was retired by a newer model.

The just-sold truck has a GMC chassis and is equipped by American Fire Apparatus Co. It had a 750-gallon per minute pumping capability and a 125-gallon tank, capacities the newer trucks exceed.

"In its time, that was one of the biggest," said Robert F. Cox, who bought the vehicle with a \$1,500 bid.

The truck was built in 1952 and originally equipped for Civil Defense efforts. The city bought it for \$13,000. Between 1962 and 1984 it was the fire department's second- or third-string fire truck.

"The fact is they don't even make parts for that particular apparatus anymore so you had to scrounge around for them, depending on what you needed," said Garden City Deputy Fire Chief Frank Felts.

STILL, THE vehicle responded to many fires in its day, Felts said, including a large blaze during the 1967 Detroit riots.

At that time, Garden City and other area fire departments were on alert, backups for the Detroit Fire Department.

Felts, four other Garden City firefighters, and the 1952 GMC were summoned to an area near downtown Detroit, Felts said.

"We had a block of buildings on fire. We fought that fire all night and into the next day. That truck pumped and pumped. It did a heck of a job."

The truck was exceptionally long, he said, too long to turn around some courts in the city. It wasn't designed as a municipal fire truck, Felts said.

Cox, who owns R.F. Cox Vintage Fire Apparatus Co. in Taylor, said he is a collector, seller, broker and appraiser of fire trucks. He said he would preserve the Garden City truck and keep it in the area.

"That truck, for a 1952, was in very, very, very good shape," Cox said.

Garden City now has three pumpers, including a 1984 Grumman, the first line truck, with a 1,500 gallon per minute capacity. The GMC was retired when that truck was delivered.

The other two are a 1968 Mack diesel second line, 1,000 gpm, and a 1962 American LaFrance third line, 1,000 gpm.

#### CITY OF PLYMOUTH ORDINANCE NO. 89-1

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 98 OF TITLE VIII-BUILDING REGULATIONS OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH BY ADDING A NEW ARTICLE AND SECTIONS, NEW ARTICLE AND SECTIONS SHALL BE DESIGNATED AS ARTICLE XIV SECTIONS 14.1 AND 14.2 OF SAID CODE.

THE CITY OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:  
Section 1. Chapter 98, is hereby amended to include the following:

ARTICLE XIV

Section 14.1. Adoption of Existing Structures Code By Reference.  
That a certain document, copies of which are on file in the office of the Building Department of the City of Plymouth being marked and designated as "The BOCA National Existing Structures Code, Second Edition, 1987" as published by The Building Officials and Code Administrators International, Inc. be and is hereby adopted as the Existing Structures Code of the City of Plymouth in the State of Michigan; for the control of buildings and structures as herein provided; and each and all of the regulations, provisions, penalties, conditions and terms of said BOCA National Existing Structures Code, are hereby referred to, adopted and made part hereof as if fully set out in this Ordinance, with the addition, insertions, deletions and changes, if any, prescribed in Section 14.2 of this Ordinance.

Section 14.2. National Existing Structures Code. Additions, Insertions and Changes.

That the BOCA National Existing Structures Code is amended and revised in the following respects:

Section ES-100.1. Title: These regulations shall be known as the Existing Structures Code of the City of Plymouth hereinafter referred to as the existing structures code or "this code."

Section ES-110.2. Violation Penalties: Any person, firm or corporation who shall violate any provisions of this code shall, upon conviction thereof, be subject to a fine of not less than one Hundred (\$100.00) dollars or more than five hundred (\$500.00) dollars or imprisonment for a term not to exceed 90 days, or both, at the discretion of the court. Each day that a violation continues after due notice has been served, in accordance with the terms and provisions hereof, shall be deemed a separate offense.

Section ES-111.4. Anyone affected by any such order shall within ten (10) days after service of such order apply to a court of record for an order restraining the code official from razing and removing such structure or parts thereof. The court shall determine whether the order of the code official is reasonable, and if found not reasonable, the court shall continue the restraining order or modify it as the circumstances may require.

Section 2. Inconsistent Ordinances Repealed:  
That all other ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 3. Saving Clause:  
That nothing in this Ordinance or in the Existing Structures Code hereby adopted shall be construed to affect any suit or proceeding pending in any court, or any rights acquired, or liability incurred, or any cause or causes of action acquired or existing, under any act or ordinance hereby repealed as cited in Section 2 of this Ordinance; nor shall any just or legal right or remedy of any character be lost, impaired or affected by this Ordinance.

Section 4. Date of Effect: February 27, 1989  
That the City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this Ordinance and cause the same to be published as required by law; and this Ordinance shall take full force and effect twenty one (21) days after this date of final passage and approval and publication.



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# Home trades wonder over radon's potential threat

Home building and selling professionals acknowledge that radon is a problem, but aren't sure just how big a problem.

Representatives of the home building and real estate industries said they encourage individual contractors and agents to learn as much as they can about radon, but they aren't convinced radon exposure is enough of a problem to warrant new

state or federal laws. Though radon exposure is considered an explanation for the rise in lung cancer among non-smokers, professionals in both industries said they weren't sure new laws were necessary.

"LEGISLATION generally comes after there's been a public health problem identified and I don't believe that's been the case, at least not at this time," said Lynn Egbert, executive vice president for govern-

ment affairs of the Michigan Association of Home Builders.

Radon, he said, is a problem best handled locally.

"Right now, it's a local issue. You may see some changes in local building codes," he said. "What we are doing is getting as much information as we can to our members."

The organization represents 7,000 home builders, including more than 2,500 in Wayne and Oakland counties.

Radon has also posed a problem

for the home selling industry, with real estate agents and independent sellers wrangling over whether homes should be tested — and who should conduct the tests.

"It's a complicated issue and we've heard very conflicting news about it," said Marta St. James of the Western Wayne/Oakland County Board of Realtors. "We're encouraging our members to learn as much as they can about it."

Radon tests are encouraged for home sellers in doubt, she added.

"We do encourage testing, people have a right to know," St. James said. "But it's up to the individual."

TEST KITS are available from the American Lung Association, as well as at area hardware stores and from companies specializing in the kits.

Radon, a radioactive gas formed during the breakdown of uranium, comes from the ground. It seeps into homes through cracks in basement walls and foundations, as well as from openings for sump pumps and drains.

Several states, including New Jersey and Florida, have passed new construction laws in the wake of publicity concerning radon's potential danger. Currently there is no radon-related legislation in Michigan.

The federal Environmental Protection Agency considers every home in the United States at risk for radon exposure.

It isn't the first time home-related environmental problems have surfaced as a national issue.

"About eight years ago there was a great concern over polyurethane foam," St. James said, "but when the government reviewed the problem, they found it wasn't as big a threat as they thought."

This Valentine's Day  
there are some who need more  
than their hearts warmed.

When a person gets a pet, he takes on a responsibility. He promises to provide food, water, shelter and love. In return, he gets the animal's unwavering loyalty and devotion. It's like an unwritten contract between man and animal. Seeing this contract broken is the saddest part of the work we do.

Sometime around the first of the year, somebody broke his contract with Murphy. On the night of January 3rd, one of the coldest nights of the winter, a Michigan Humane Society (MHS) rescue driver, responding to a call from a concerned Detroit woman, picked up a cold, hungry and frightened 3-year-old shepherd mix we named Murphy. Had the woman not called — had the MHS not responded — no doubt Murphy would have starved or frozen to death.

Helping animals like Murphy is the very heart of the Michigan Humane Society. But for every Murphy, there's a Ginger and a Pete and thousands of others just like them. # Cameras in court: Local judges say OK

Cameras in the courtroom are OK, local judges said, so long as courtroom don't turn into a real life "LA Law."

"I don't have any problems, as long as decorum is maintained," said Judge John Dillon of the 17th District Court, Redford Township. "One of the fears we have is that people might be intimidated or turn into actors."

Pooling television camera coverage among television stations could help restore court decorum, judges said.

"You obviously don't want to see a circus," 35th District Judge John MacDonald, whose court serves Plymouth, Plymouth Township and Canton Township.

Some judges, however, were concerned whether television and still camera coverage of trials would damage defendants' chances of receiving a fair trial.

"THE PUBLIC certainly has a right to know, but when people see the pictures, they automatically presume guilt, especially in the

more sensational cases," said 16th District Judge James McCann of Livonia. "I could see where defense attorneys wouldn't want the cameras in the courtroom."

The Michigan Supreme Court recently opened state courts to cameras and tape recorders.

The court unanimously voted to adopt guidelines for all state and appellate courts similar to those in effect on an experimental basis in five counties, including Oakland, since June.

Judge Gail McKnight of the 18th District Court, Westland, said there was a consensus among judges and media representatives that previous guidelines weren't working.

"WE CAME to the conclusion that the current rules just weren't workable," said McKnight, who reviewed guidelines as a member of the Michigan District Judges' government liaison committee.

An experiment involving courts in Grand Traverse, Ingham, Marquette, Oakland and Wexford demonstrated that tape recorders and television and newspaper cameras could be used in courtrooms without disrupting the proceedings.

Administrative orders adopted by the high court apply to 241 trial courts in all 83 counties, the appellate courts and the juvenile division of probate courts.

The orders say news organizations wanting to use television or still cameras or tape recorders in the courtrooms must request permission from the judge three days in advance, but the judge may approve a request that comes in later.

A judge may reject a request or limit film or electronic coverage to ensure a fair trial, under the orders. A judge may also exclude coverage of certain witnesses, including victims of sex crimes, police informants, undercover agents and relocated witnesses.

Coverage of jurors or jury selection is not allowed by the orders.

The court's action follows recommendations made Nov. 22 by its Cameras in the Courtroom Committee.

THE HIGH court initiated a one-year experiment Feb. 1, 1988 in all state courts, but the rules allowed either party in civil and criminal cases to block coverage by filing an objection with the judge. Only about a third of the requests for expanded media coverage were allowed under those rules, and the court later modified the experiment in the five counties.

Supreme Court spokesman Thomas Farrell said 43 states allow the use of still cameras, television cameras or tape recorders in at least some of their courtrooms.

Michigan was the 24th state to allow expanded media coverage in all state courts when it began the experiment last February, he said.

"I think the time could be coming when you see one of those little mini-cameras in every courtroom," McKnight said.

## Millage decision Schools need to reach out

**T**HE PLYMOUTH-CANTON school board this week unveiled its solution to the financial problems facing it and at the same time alienated a group of prospective voters.

At a work session, the board came to the consensus that it will seek the renewal of 8 mills and approval of 4 additional mills for two years. Voter approval of the proposals in June would alleviate the \$10 million budget deficit facing the district.

However, as board members were discussing the financial issues, the issue of transferring about 200 students from Fiegel Elementary to Tanger Elementary came up.

Parents of those students showed up at the meeting, expecting to express their concerns. They had three questions: Where in the decision-making process is this particular issue? Can the community enter the loop and have input before a board decision is made? If so, when, where and how?

But it didn't happen.

The nearly 100 parents were told by school board president David Artley that the issue wasn't on the agenda and couldn't be brought up.

One parent summed up the situation, when he told the board: "Giving us 20 minutes would diffuse this situation and keep parents voting favorably."

The saga of the Fiegel Elementary School transfers started last week when parents in Brookside Village subdivisions learned their children may be moved five miles to another elementary school next fall.

The transfer recommendation was made seven weeks ago by the district's housing/attendance steering committee as part of a long-range plan to relieve overcrowding, balance enrollment and establish attendance continuity into the 1990s.

Enraged parents met informally with school officials on Friday and were told that it's possible the move won't take place at all.

However, Artley said the board could make a final decision on the transfers at its Monday meeting.

That impending decision made it even more crucial that the concerned parents be allowed to speak at this week's work session.

The board's disregard for those parents' concerns comes at a time when the district is talking about a property tax increase. It's a time when the district will need all the support it can get to push through a tax increase following the defeat of four millage requests during the past two years.

Those defeats led to \$4 million in cuts to educational programs.

But apart from the cuts, the district faces losing \$10 million next year. Of that, \$3.3 million in state aid will be lost because the district is going out of formula and another \$7.6 million will be lost to a tax rollback.

Projections show state equalized valuation will increase by \$259 million next year, according to school officials. If that happens, a rollback of 4.76 mills would result in the \$7.6 million loss.

The school board had been considering asking voters to approve waiving the Headlee Amendment, which would have allowed the district to collect more property taxes.

But the board decided against seeking voter approval for overriding of Headlee, calling Headlee a four-letter word.

With those massive budget problems facing the school district, we think the board should look for all the allies that it can find.

Those allies are in the audience at public meetings and they should be listened to.

### Protest helped defeat pay raise

**R**EJECTION OF the hotly debated Congressional pay increase is a good step, one that helps return the U.S. House of Representatives to its rightful place as the "people's branch" of the federal government.

We heard all the stories — of congressmen having to live together in crumbling Washington town houses, of the raise being "just a drop in the bucket" compared with the massive federal budget and that the raise was initially been recommended by a federal review panel and had bipartisan support.

Quite frankly, we weren't moved. We all have house payments or rent to struggle with every month.

**HOUSE MEMBERS** rejected the increase 380-48 Tuesday afternoon. The matter was similarly rejected in the Senate. The matter will now be delivered to President George Bush, who should put it to rest for good. The raise would have also benefited federal judges and top government officials.

Perhaps some increase is necessary, just to ward off inflation. Nonetheless, 51 percent is too large a windfall by anyone's standards.

While the increase would have benefited those other groups, its chief support appeared to come from the House and that worries us.

It worries us that a House seat has increasingly become lifetime employment — and lucrative employment at that, once speech fees are also taken into account.

It worries us that our congressmen are increasingly becoming isolated from the cares and concerns of their constituents — that they even considered such a whopping raise is indication enough.

Looking back, it wasn't meant to be that way. If the U.S. Senate is, essentially, a "millionaire's club," so be it. The House was designed to be an institution closer to the people.

By giving House members mere two-year terms, the framers of our Constitution clearly intended to provide for a volatile, shifting body. They wanted a body that could immediately react to public demands, compared with the relative security they provided with Senators' six-year terms. Remember, too, that House membership was initially the only federal office directly elected by the people.

While some degree of carry-over is necessary, we believe the framers would be shocked that

some legislators are now making a career out of Congress.

While the ever shrinking pool of pay raise supporters argued the increase was necessary to keep "good people" in government, their arguments didn't hold water. Even without the increase, members of Congress still earn \$89,500 a year. That salary exceeds those of most of their constituents. The proposed \$135,000 salary was simply too much to take.

Somehow the notion of a "people's House" got lost over the years. Until now.

Acceding to the will of more than 80 percent of the general public, at least according to public opinion polls, House members heavily rejected the pay increase in Tuesday's vote.

It was an issue that simply wouldn't go away. Some area residents mailed tea bags to their representatives in a symbolic protest. Others wrote a song about the pay raise fiasco.

**THE STORM** of grass roots protest surrounding the pay increase forced members of Congress to twice change their minds. They didn't approve the increase, nor did they take the coward's way out, by putting off a vote until after the pay raise was scheduled to go into effect.

But it shouldn't end there. Limits should be placed on honorariums, speech fees paid by political allies. Campaign financing also needs to be re-examined, especially when some long term area Congressmen are sitting on as much as \$500,000 in unspent campaign contributions that they can convert into retirement accounts.

Rejection of the pay raise, however, is still a good first step. It's a sign that the House is still the people's branch — even if we the people occasionally have to shake the tree.

## Teacher shares concerns about state of education

A FEW WEEKS back, this column stirred a local teacher into penning a letter to the editor. With all this talk out of Washington and Lansing, I think it's important you see up close how a teacher in the trenches feels about education U.S.A. style.

Plying his craft in one of the more prosperous districts in our area, you may very well be surprised at his assessment.

Although usually reluctant to grant anonymity, I think the message is so important it was worth the request.

**HERE ARE** excerpts.

"The most knowledgeable, best trained, highest paid teacher, in the most modern classroom with the latest text cannot teach anyone anything if they do not wish to learn.

"Too many students today have the attitude that, if something is difficult and/or not fun, then they are not interested. School is a place to go to socialize and classes are inconvenient interruptions.

"Unfortunately, the quest for fun in education was an idea many people promoted for many years. This included teachers. Most of us now realize that when students make education 'interesting,' what they are really saying is make it 'fun' or put another way, 'entertain me.'

"Do we really want to send out into the world 18-year-olds who have spent 12 years in an educational system which has endeavored to make every day interesting, fun and easy?"

What kind of citizens would they be?

"CAN WE change attitudes? Of course.

"Will we? We must, but I do not see it happening. One of the problems is that the central administrators run the schools and in large districts, they are so far removed from the real, everyday world of the classroom that they have no concept of the problems there.

"They do not hear the foul language, see the litter. Their cars aren't vandalized and they aren't threatened with physical attack.

"Get the administrators back into the classroom, at least part time, so they can administrate intelligently.

"We must also put discipline back into the schools. Any student can tell you there is very little consequence for their actions. Too many school administrators and teachers have given up because they know a crackdown will not be supported by central administration. They are too busy trying to get more money out of

the citizens and government and making sure the district looks good on paper.

"It is also essential that we 'wake up' the majority of the good students and the concerned parents. They must demand that the boards of education and the central administrators give them and their teachers the support they need to turn education in our schools around.

"There are a few basic changes that must be made if our educational systems are to operate at the level of efficiency needed to turn mediocrity into excellence.

"It can be done but we must first recognize the real problems and then have the intestinal fortitude to attack them. The teachers are ready and willing but their 'leaders' are still playing politics."

### Grade points not true test

To the editor:

We very often hear the lament that American education is falling behind that of the other nations of the world. As a nation surely we don't want to see our students less prepared to venture into the world than their counterparts. This doesn't necessarily have to be the case but we are doing something terribly wrong with our brightest students.

A number of years ago a big push was made to single out our most talented children and offer them the best possible training so that they would be able to compete in the world successfully not only for their benefit but for the benefit of our country. Many studies were done and much money has been spent in implementing special programs, training teachers and buying equipment for these so called "gifted students." Our child was singled out as one of these students way back in the fifth grade. He is now graduating high school and finding out that taking the most difficult course of study is going to hinder his ability to compete at the highest level at Michigan State University.

Michigan State it seems "looks strictly at numbers. Although he has been accepted at both the University of Michigan and MSU, our son is interested in veterinary medicine and would like to attend MSU. His ACT scores are high enough to warrant

acceptance into the Honors Program but his grade-point average is two-tenths of a percent below the requirement.

Nobody seems to be interested in the fact that throughout his high school years this student was one of only a handful to take the highly competitive International Baccalaureate program at Southfield Lathrup High School. This program makes it impossible to choose electives as the requirements are the same as that of European high schools. In this instance the student is indeed taking the same course of study that his foreign counterparts are taking. In fact, at the end of each course of study there are examinations that come out of Europe that must be passed which are given to all IB students.

Our son has passed all these tests and is one of only three or four students still taking the IB curriculum. When we tried to point out that if the student had taken a normal course of study and had a chance to take electives which would not have been as difficult he probably would have had a much higher grade-point average they were not interested.

The thing that worries me the most is that I am learning through speaking to educators that it somehow is not always smart to have the brighter student challenge himself to the full extent. I was told by someone in the administration of the Southfield school system that taking a highly challenging program is a "double-edged sword;" on the one hand one gets the best possible education but on the other hand grades are apt to be lower.

A person at the veterinary college at MSU told our son to take an easy course of study at whatever college he goes to because you need a high grade-point average to get into the vet school.

How are we ever going to keep up with the rest of the world? Our brightest students are getting the simple message that it is foolish to challenge yourself. The answer is not more money spent but in recognizing the fact that the system we have now discriminates against the student who challenges himself to the fullest extent. Something is dreadfully wrong with this.


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# Homeless vigil marks our heartfelt concerns

YOU KIND OF hope the Oakland County Young Republicans will sign up for an hour. And maybe the Birmingham Bloomfield Board of Realtors. Perhaps area chambers of commerce can take a turn.

I'm talking about Monday's all-night vigil in Birmingham — a Valentine's Day Eve attempt to publicize the plight of the homeless and the hungry.

It's a problem that affects all Detroit suburbs, even those in wealthy Oakland County, home of some of the most affluent addresses in the country.

"We've had people from Birmingham call and ask about getting food," said Patti Gillis, who represents St. Vincent DePaul Food Deposits.

To hear that food and shelter are lacking in a land of plenty is surprising and should be shocking. Yet it is the very affluence that worsens the problem.

"The basic problem is housing costs," said Gillis. Shelter costs are eating up 50 percent and more of the budgets of moderate and low income people, she says.

TO KEEP A roof over their heads, people cut back on food. Department of Social Services estimates indicate that 50,000 Oakland County residents

those who have gotten jobs," she said. "Those who haven't gotten jobs are worse off than ever."

HEALTHY CROWDS are expected when Monday's vigil starts at 7:30 p.m. with music and obligatory remarks from politicians at the First Baptist Church of Birmingham. A good turnout is anticipated for the half-mile walk through town and for the beginning of the all-night vigil in Shain Park.

But Gillis said the sign-up for one-hour shifts 2-6 a.m. is sparse. The task force is hoping for at least 20 people at the vigil at all times. Volunteers are welcome to just show up, but groups are encouraged (Are you listening, Young Republicans?). Groups should call Nancy McQuillan at 858-1621 or Marye Tisdale at 583-8809 to schedule an hour.

Nearby St. James Episcopal Church is opening its doors to offer refreshment and warmth. But the real warmth could come from spending a chilly Valentine's Day morning in Birmingham to find out that your heart is in the right place.

One, food needs for pregnant women and children should be guaranteed; two, the scarcity of affordable housing must be addressed.

Task force members cast a skeptical eye at the so-called safety net that catches the truly needy. Payments to welfare recipients declined by 8 1/2 percent in 1981 forcing many into financially strapped corners.

Gillis said that only one of four of the nation's homeless fits the stereotype of being mentally ill, an alcoholic or a skid row bum. The rest are without shelter because they can't afford housing.

# Paying for new programs: They've got the right idea

his own twists.

Blanchard is asking a small amount of new state money — from growth in the tax base, I presume — to finance a new program of \$50,000 grants to individual schools that do the most to improve instruction.

At most it will cost a few million bucks in a state budget near the \$7 billion mark — veritable chicken feed. The point is that it will use incremental dollars to make a marginal improvement, and it will be inspiring to all 1,200 school districts.

THERE'S A NEAT twist to this proposal, at least in the version his staff leaked to a Detroit newspaper last week.

The program will be called GAIN — for Governor's Achievement Incentive.

Very interesting. We have a State Board of Education, but the program won't be named for it. We have a superintendent of public instruction, but the program won't be named for him. It will be named for the governor.

Blanchard has been doing that increasingly during his six years in office.

For example, the well-publicized grants for job training come from programs with his office's name on them rather than the names of Labor or Education departments.

LAST MONTH Blanchard toured several major cities of the state with

the fruits of his 1988 efforts — the Neighborhood Alliance.

It was a bunch of grants, averaging \$55,000 apiece, to groups working on beautification, community buildings, youth projects and the like.

They sounded enormous to the vocally appreciative groups on the receiving end. Actually, they totaled just \$7.3 million statewide. In most Oakland and Wayne suburbs, they amounted to pennies per person.


Blanchard's trick was to make state police, courts, natural resources, mental health, regulatory agencies and the rest bite the bullet while focusing a small amount of new dollars on an important program.

It's effective. And it avoids bloody brows over redistributing existing funds.

# Start teaching geography early

Q: I am concerned by the lack of basic knowledge of today's high school graduates in the area of both world and state geography. Why are children so lacking in this area?

A: Children are sometimes taught geography by being told to color in states or countries on a blank map. Often they follow this format with little in-depth understanding of the particular area. Furthermore, geography has tended to be approached by a few teachers as a memorization and regurgitation of isolated facts which children soon forget. Anyone who has a basic understanding of the "loss of learning" theory realizes that there is a 40 to 60 percent loss of memorized facts after the first two or three days (with the exception of a person who has a photographic mind).

The most proven and successful manner, in my opinion, of teaching geography is to sequence the experience from early elementary through high school. At the elementary level, it is critical that geography explores the immediate environment in which a child operates. Approached appropriately, a child in kindergarten or first grade studies the geographics of his own home, classroom or school building. As a child's world grows, geography can be expanded to the study of his neighborhood and

Middle East is a much sounder and more interesting approach for students than a pure regurgitation of facts. Young adults need deeper issues to deal with than just the memorization of demographics; however, it must be recognized that basic facts have to be part and parcel of their geographic education.

Parents can further enhance their children's geographic knowledge while on trips by studying a map with them and discussing that particular city or state's climate, products and other information germane to that area. This type of immediate association will put each location into a more meaningful context for the children.


"It's a really wonderful organization full of a lot of great people."

Her students must sing in front of the class if they're auditioning for a solo, but can do their testing for

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

# Camps await crowds

PLYMOUTH-CANTON children and teenagers aren't heading for summer camp just yet, but many are starting to make such summertime plans.

"It's never too soon, really, to start looking for camps," said Jim LeMonn, spokesman for the American Camping Association.

The ACA, founded in 1910, is an educational organization; its activities include accrediting camps. This year, the ACA will accredit some 2,000 camps, representing about one-fourth of all camps in the country, LeMonn said.

In accrediting camps, ACA officials look at several areas, including programs, administration, staff, site, health and safety. Evaluations are done while a camp is operating.

LeMonn and other camp officials have some practical advice for parents searching for that just-right camping experience for their children.

IT'S BEST for families to visit a camp while it's operating, LeMonn said. It may even be possible to visit a camp during a family vacation the year before a child is to go to camp.

Such a visit is an excellent introduction to the camp for a child. It also helps parents learn more about camping opportunities.

Accreditation by the ACA is a good sign, said Kathy Treiber, camp administrator for the Huron Valley Girl Scout Council. Some good camps aren't necessarily accredited by the ACA, she said, but such accreditation is something to look for.

Treiber recommended that people look at camp programming "and see if that matches the needs of the family or the wants of that family."

"It's a good idea to form an alliance with the camp director," LeMonn said.

"You need to be comfortable with the camp director," he said. Often, choosing a camp isn't a matter of right or wrong; "it's finding the right match."

Parents can ask the camp director for names of families who've had children at that camp, LeMonn and Treiber said. Those families can be a good source of information.

"Most camp directors are going to be very open about sharing information," LeMonn said.

It's important to check on the qualifications of camp staff members, Treiber said. Those include such areas as age, background, certifications and the ratio of staffers to campers.

THE PERCENTAGE of returning staffers can help give parents an idea of what a camp has to offer. The ACA has no specific standard on that, LeMonn said, but 50 percent or so is a good sign.

It's important to check on price, Treiber said. Parents should check

on what that price covers. Some camps may charge extra for such things as crafts supplies.

Generally, an agency-operated camp will cost between \$1 and \$35 per day, LeMonn said.

"It's still a pretty good bargain." A private camp will cost between \$35 and \$65 per day. LeMonn recommended that parents check on a camp's refund policy. Some camps provide financial assistance.

Treiber suggested that parents check the size of the group a child will live in. If that group's too large, a child may not benefit as much from attending camp.

Generally, children much younger than 8 or so don't attend resident camps, LeMonn said. Day camps are often a good option for younger children, helping them get used to being at camp.

"I think that's been one of the appeals of day camps."

PARENTS SHOULD include their children in the process of choosing a camp, he said.

"Get them enthusiastic about camp."

# Camping's still popular

Plenty of kids still go to summer camp each year.

There's been an increase of between 15,000 and 30,000 in attendance at accredited camps per year for the last several years. This summer's camp population could be as much as 4.5 million, said Jim LeMonn, spokesman for the American Camping Association.

Exact figures are hard to come by, he said. Some groups use the "camp" name, but in fact provide more of a clinic or workshop experience. Even so, camping has remained popular with the younger set over the years.

Camping's popular with local families, said Kathy Treiber, camp administrator for the Huron Valley Girl Scout Council, which serves the Plymouth-Canton area.

"I think it's as popular as it was before," she said. The challenge is to be creative in programming, providing programs that interest children and teenagers.

The Huron Valley Girl Scout Council provides troop camping during

the school year, along with day camp and resident camp programs during the summer.

THE COUNCIL offers family camping opportunities on Labor Day and Memorial Day weekends.

"That has just grown by leaps and bounds."

Changes in family life have affected camp programs. These days, many families don't have the time to spend together that they once did; there are more two-income families and more single-parent families.

The Girl Scouts offer "Mom and Me" and "Dad and Daughter" weekend camping programs. Families enjoy spending their time together at camp.

"They just have a wonderful time together. Watching it happen at camp has been really fun," Treiber said. "They really enjoy that."

Children these days have more choices and encounter more adult-type situations, she said. They don't necessarily have the skills needed to make those choices.

Girl Scout staffers and volunteers try to help girls develop skills needed to deal with various situations.

"They need hugs and they need for people to understand that they're still kids."

ATTENDING A summer camp can help a child become more self-reliant, she's found. Children learn to make their own decisions; they improve their communication skills.

Children also can learn such new skills as horseback riding or swimming.

Camping isn't a new experience in the U.S., according to the ACA's Jim LeMonn. His organization, which accredits a number of camps nationwide, was founded in 1910. Its predecessor was the New England Camp Directors Association.

Organized camping started in the U.S. in 1861 in Connecticut. The owner/director of a coeducational private school started a summer camp program there.

Positive impressions that adults have of camping help make it a popular summertime option.

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
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


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
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

the countryside, searching for that just-right camp. The ACA publishes an annual guide to camps in the U.S.

"The Guide to Accredited Camps" for 1989 is available by sending a check for \$9.95 (payable to the ACA) to ACA Guide, 100 Bradford Woods, 5000 State Road 67 North, Martinsville, Ind. 46151.

The guide may be ordered, using Visa or MasterCard, by calling 1-800-428-CAMP.

Other suggestions from Treiber and LeMonn include:

- Some camps make videotapes available, and some camp directors travel throughout the U.S., visiting camp fairs. Those options can help parents look for a camp.
- Some camps may be able to

make arrangements for children on restricted diets, or for those who take medication regularly. It's important to check in advance.

- It's a good idea to check on rainy-day activities at camp. Are plans made for such days?

- Some camps provide transportation to and from camp.

- Camps are available for children with disabilities. The ACA guide includes information on such camps.

- Many camps can make arrangements for children of different faiths to attend religious services. Again, it's a good idea to check on such arrangements in advance.

"We're more than willing to accommodate," Treiber said. "I think most people would be willing to accommodate."

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# Bennett says schools need better teachers

William Bennett and his vision for reviving American education drew raves like "terrific" and "right on" from listeners in an enthusiastic crowd at Cranbrook Sunday.

About 450 people showed up at the Bloomfield Hills school's open house to hear Bennett, the former U.S. Secretary of Education from 1985-1988 and currently President George Bush's nominee for drug czar in charge of the Office of National Drug Control Policy.

In his frank, amusing style, Bennett weaved tales of some of the 104 schools he visited and people he met during his term as head of the nation's education department. "I learned one very important thing in those outings — the American child can be educated," he said.

American high school seniors score at or near the bottom of 14 other industrial nations in every subject matter. One reason is they need better teachers and more of the basics or "subjects that tend to build mental muscle, mental tissue," Bennett said. After all, he said, "There's not a lot of math, physics, biology and chemistry on MTV."

EDUCATORS MUST aim high, Bennett said. The best teacher he has ever seen, he said, was Jaime Escalante, a high school teacher depicted in the film "Stand and Deliver." Escalante battled the odds and his peers' resistance to teach calculus to inner-city students in Los Angeles. Bennett described him as

"a cross between Mother Teresa and Mike Ditka."

"I'm confident we are getting better," Bennett said. "In 10 or 15 years we can get to where we want to be, not through some grand scheme. It will be through people like Escalante."

Bennett's speech was scheduled in October long before he was nominated for drug czar, so the main focus was education. Yet, Bennett told the audience he had spent 2½ hours Sunday with the Detroit police to get an upclose view of the city's drug problem. And, when he arrived at Cranbrook after the tour, Bennett said, "I felt like I was going to get the bends."

"I hoped he would speak more on drugs," said Don Schining after the speech. "I agree with him we need to have a voucher system and incentives for teachers."

Another listener, though, liked Bennett's decision to focus on education. "I wasn't disappointed — he stayed on education because I think education is very basic to our future," said Ann Hansen.

"BECAUSE I am a principal," said Kingswood principal Arlyce Seibert, "I focused on how faculty and administration can really set a tone for the school. It reaffirmed what our own personal and professional success has been. That's what our philosophy is."

Larry Leib called the speech "terrific," calling Bennett's philosophy of content, character and choice "an excellent way of teaching."

In response to a question from

Leib, Bennett outlined his hope that each state could set its own curriculum of study. "The state of Michigan should say, before we give (a top) diploma to John or Mary, John or Mary should be able to do certain things," he said. How to teach them to do those things should be left to individual principals and teachers.

Asked about corporate responsibility, Bennett said industry shouldn't just write checks or donate computers. "They should attach strings to them," he said, to make the schools accountable.

Bennett blamed teachers' unions for protecting bad teachers. Both teachers and parents could help weed out the bad teachers and


reward the good ones. "I frankly think that high salaries will not cost you more, they will cost you less," Bennett said.

THE CONTROVERSIAL PROPOSAL for a voucher system, to give people a choice of public or private schools, will be tried out in a major city within five or 10 years, Bennett predicted.

"It's not anti-public schools. It's anti-bad schools," he said.

Some inner-city private or parochial schools are actually producing good students, but closing because they aren't free, Bennett said. "I don't care if they wear habits or cloaks or capes or rabbits. You don't want these schools closing down."

# Marriage is a spiritual foundation to build on

Having recently marked the milestone of a 35th wedding anniversary, I share with the readers of this column some personal observations on marriage.

In an age when so many marriages are so fragile and undergo so much stress and sometimes dissolution, it is appropriate to consider the wisdom of the sages of old who reflected on the union of man and woman. They believed that marriages were arranged by divine guidance.

The following dialogue, recorded in the Talmud, expresses this view:

A Roman matron asked a revered sage, "What has God been doing ever since he completed the work of creation?"

"The Almighty," the sage answered, "has been sitting in heaven arranging marriages."

But a very wise man has said that matches are made in heaven, but

marriages are made on earth.

Andre Maurois once described how important it is that a husband and wife resolve their marriage is going to be a success. It's only in fairy tales that we encounter the phrase, "and they were married and lived happily ever after." On behalf of all who are happily married, I offer testimony that a successful marriage is created, sustained, nurtured, worked for.

According to the teachings of religion, marriage is something more than a biological union, an economic partnership, a social institution, a legal entity, or even a psychological association. Marriage is a consecration, a sanctification of life. Its purpose is to hallow the relationship of husband and wife.

IT IS for this reason that marriage involves a commitment to both past and future. Each wedding ceremony

connects the new couple with their heritage of faith, with their spiritual roots. This commitment to the long-term conflicts with the "now" orientation of modern society. We live in a sensate, pleasure-oriented culture focused on the present; a culture of instant coffee, instant friendship, instant love.

Several years ago, a book called "The Temporary Society" challenged our traditional values. The author believed that we need to find new social forms that are consonant with the transient quality of our society. Manufacturers are developing

clothes that are disposable. You wear them once and you throw them away.

Similarly, the author said, we ought to design social structures that allow us to discard them when they are no longer useful. He talks about non-permanent relationships, unrootedness, mobility, unparalleled social change.

"What do we do in the face of this? Our task then is to help people learn to develop intense and deep human relations quickly. Learn how to let go, learn how to get love and learn how to lose love, learn how to enter

groups and to leave them."

The author is wrong both conceptually and morally. He is wrong from a scientific point of view because no society can endure without the nurturing and supportive functions of a family.

But he is equally wrong from a moral perspective.

LIFE BECOMES debased, cheapened and trivialized without commitments that endure, without loyalties that persist, without friendship, love and trust that grow and blossom with the passage of time.

After having been married for 35 years, my wife and I have a precious gift that we didn't have on the day of our wedding — a sense of a shared history. It's like an anchor in the turbulent sea of life. It holds us steady in the face of life's storms and high winds.

The richness of joint memory cre-

ates for us special tenderness in relationships. To spend a day of your life with a person you love is the most precious gift you can give. To spend a lifetime with another human being is an incredible thing to contemplate.

Intermingling our energies and our experiences over 35 years gives both of us a living history that pervades our time together with the fragrance and the essence of our past. We remember dreams that were cherished, sorrows overcome, joys experienced, hopes fulfilled.

This common stream of life increases the richness of the present and the promise of the future for both of us, an experience we share with all couples who have been granted this blessing.

# Area Sisters of Mercy looking for volunteers

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

## Seized goods make for bargain opportunities

Property seized by public officials and sold at auction or by sealed bid translates into opportunity for discerning buyers interested in bargains.

Automobiles and jewelry seized by U.S. Customs or the Internal Revenue Service, boats and land confiscated by the Drug Enforcement Agency or furniture and houses forfeited to state or local police are often sold at prices lower than fair market value.

"We don't just give the stuff away. We try and get as much as we can. But bargains can be had. It depends on how shrewd a buyer you are," said Lt. Douglas Smith of the Livonia police.

As head of the department's intelligence section, Smith processes all "property and profits acquired from drug traffickers." A Lincoln Continental Mark VII in good condition that sold for \$7,000 less than Blue Book value was among confiscated property.

Consumer interest often determines a bargain, according to Elicy Maccani of the Internal Revenue Service in Detroit. IRS agents seize property "reluctantly, only as a last resort" in lieu of tax payments, she said. Seized goods are then sold at public auction.

"BIDDING SETS price. When

there's high interest, bidding is heavier and prices get pushed up," she said.

Diamond rings and fur coats normally elicit strong interest.

Twelve-foot rowboats and Browning shotguns were popular at a police auction in West Bloomfield, generating higher prices than other comparable items, according to Sgt. Roy Clark of the township's police force.

"There were tremendous buys," said Clark, citing such examples as a woman's Omega watch appraised at \$500 that sold for \$140 and a \$400 racing bike that sold for \$80. In all, \$8,000 was raised.

More than 200 items were auctioned, including jewelry, bicycles and office furniture recovered by West Bloomfield police, who were unable to locate the owners to return the merchandise. Other items were forfeited to police in Circuit Court. Under state law, any real or personal property acquired by profits from drug trafficking is subject to seizure.

MOST AREA police departments hold annual auctions to dispose of recovered and forfeited property, advertising sales in area newspapers. Larger items like autos and other vehicles are often sold at commercial auctions; real estate property is contracted with area real estate agents or sold directly by city governments in sealed bidding.

"Three-bedroom colonial style

home in Livonia's Compton Park. Drapes, carpeted, good condition. Fully landscaped," read the notice advertising a house for sale.

The home was forfeited to Livonia police in 1986 by a 45-year-old female owner arrested and convicted on charges of possession with intent to deliver 650 grams of cocaine.

Later that year, the home sold in sealed bidding during a thriving real estate market for \$79,500, nearly \$4,000 less than appraisal, according to Smith. Prior to the start of bidding, the Livonia City Council established a minimum bid.

In other council action two years ago, members approved a commercial auto auction in Romulus to dispose of all vehicles acquired by Livonia police through forfeiture. The move is aimed at securing the highest possible prices, Smith said.

Still, bargains are available. The Lincoln Continental, for example, a luxury auto owned by a convicted Livonia drug dealer now serving 10 years in state prison, sold at auction for \$17,000. It had been appraised at \$24,000.

Proceeds from the sale of such goods are deposited into city and township general budgets. If more than one enforcement agency is involved in a seizure, each receives a portion of proceeds, based on the amount of effort and manpower supplied by each agency. If federal agents are involved, money is processed through the National Forfeiture and Seized Assets fund maintained by the U.S. Department of Justice.

"1988 CORVETTE convertible. Mint condition. Loaded," said the auctioneer at Midway Auto Auction in Redford Township. The car, one of seven offered recently "by the feds" during a recent weekly auction held Fridays at Midway, sold for \$24,750. It is valued at \$32,000.

"There are drawbacks (buying from the government)," said George Badeen of Midway. "It's kind of a hassle because transactions must be paid for in cash, completed in front of deputy marshals at the federal court house in downtown Detroit, and it takes up to six weeks to receive title."

The vehicles Badeen auctions for the government have been seized by agents for the FBI and the Drug Enforcement Agency. Last year, agents seized an estimated \$30 million in assets in the eastern judicial district

## Cars-for-cash deals draw DEA interest

Audis, Saabs, BMWs, Jeeps and Jeep-type all-wheel drive vehicles, Mercedes Benz cars and Bronco-type cars have more in common than being modes of transportation.

They're the vehicles of choice for Detroit-area crack and cocaine dealers, according to William Counce, special agent in charge of the Drug Enforcement Agency for Michigan, Ohio and Kentucky.

Counce would like area car dealers who sell these vehicles to call his agency when they suspect they may be completing a transaction, cash or otherwise, with a drug dealer. He said he's not interested in interfering with their business or their right to make a sale; he just needs the lead.

But opinion was mixed among Observer & Eccentric-area car dealers regarding whether they should act as an adjunct arm of the agency.

"In this division in 1988, we seized 127 cars, passenger cars, and that would include Broncos, vans and trucks, which had a seizure value of \$1.4 million," Counce said.

Until recently, drug dealers tended to pay for these cars in cash, largely to avoid filling out credit applications that invite background checks.

But three things recently have happened to discourage individuals from entering the cash-for-car market, although Counce said some young drug dealers still try to make outright cash purchases, usually to show off.

FIRST, FORMS have come into the picture. If anyone walks into any car dealership and plunks down \$10,000 cash for more for a car, a dealership is legally obligated to file Form 8300 with the Internal Revenue Service. That form shows the transaction took place and includes the buyer's name, driver's license

and Social Security numbers, Counce said.

Second, when the dealership deposits \$10,000 or more in its bank account, the bank must file Form 4789 with the IRS, which lists the amount and where the money came from. Observer & Eccentric-area dealers were aware of these requirements and all indicated strict adherence to the law.

Third, the DEA recently has been empowered with seizure laws. If a car (or home, boat or almost anything else) is used, even remotely, in connection with the illegal sale of drugs, it can be confiscated by the law enforcement agency.

"We would like to be able to go in and say: 'Listen, I know you have to file this form, and the banks have to file that form. We don't want to interfere with your business. We want you to be able to sell all the cars you want. But when that guy comes in dripping with gold and tennis shoes and has no job and can't fill out a form and whips out \$20,000, \$30,000 or drops \$10,000 on you and says I'll bring back 15 next week, give us a call,'" Counce said.

GEORGE DAVIS, who has been the Audi sales manager for 15 years at Fred Lavery Porsche Audi Co. in Birmingham, said he hasn't seen many cash sales, but doesn't think Counce has such a bad idea.

This same scenario was presented to all car dealers interviewed: a male, approximately 20 years old, with blond hair sticking straight up, wearing several earrings, having a beeper on his belt, and carrying a briefcase full of \$50s and \$100s, tries to buy a car.

Given that hypothetical situation, Davis said he would be inclined to call the DEA.

"Without a doubt, I would want to know more about that person," Davis said.

But Don Massey, headquartered in

Plymouth and the area's largest dealer of Cadillac, British Sterling and Rolls Royce cars, said he didn't think much of car dealers acting as pseudo-police officers.

"If this happened, we'd sell the car," Massey said, giving the above scenario of a man trying to buy a car with cash. "If he brought the cash we'd take it in a room and count it with him and deliver the car. If he's of legal age and has a driver's license, I guess we can't police where the money came from, and we could be very wrong, being inexperienced (in the area of police work)."

"We could make an accusation about a person that could be totally incorrect and wind up being litigated," Massey said. "The amount of cash that we handle — currency — is 1.6 percent of our revenue, a small amount that includes all incoming cash, such as car service and repairs, he said.

"I DON'T BLAME him. I absolutely don't blame him," Counce said when told of Massey's comments.

Counce said he was discussing this issue with a colleague.

"What would I do in that particular situation where you have a business? And, of course, it's difficult to remove myself from my position, and what I think is all citizens' responsibility. That (Massey's concern about unjust accusation) would be my position if I was a businessman in that case," Counce said.

But Counce qualified his statement by saying he thinks there is no such thing as "recreational drug use" anymore, that people now are starting to realize how dangerous drugs are and the impact they have on people.

"There's nothing unconstitutional; it doesn't violate that individual's rights, to drop a telephone call on the DEA, customs, FBI or IRS.

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# Cars-for-cash deals draw DEA suspicion

They're (car dealers) human beings, they're citizens, they know just as well as I do that there's something wrong with that transaction. Now not criminally wrong, but there's something wrong. People don't carry that kind of money around," Coonce said.

FRANK LOPEZ, sales manager for the Jeep-Eagle division of Bob Saks in Farmington Hills, said he agreed with Massey.

"First of all, it's against the law to accept any cash transaction over \$10,000 without reporting it," Lopez said.

"Second, I cannot tell (if a person is suspicious) or pass judgment on that particular individual, so we have no particular policy (about what to do under such circumstances).

"That particular segment of the market (cash buyers fitting the

above description) doesn't seem to come into the Farmington Hills area," Lopez said.

CHARLES GHESQUIERE, owner of Estate Motors in Birmingham, which sells Mercedes Benz cars, said he hasn't seen someone produce cash for a car in a long time.

"This used to happen to us years ago. It's virtually gone away. It's disappeared. We used to see it on the odd occasion."

But one of Ghesquiere's employees, who asked not to be named, raised another point about cash transactions.

Given the same scenario of the cash car buyer, he said, "it really isn't up to us to determine where the money comes from. Hell, he could be a professional entertainer, he could be a businessman."

Ghesquiere, citing the IRS reporting laws, said a car sale would be risky if an individual chose to re-

main anonymous but wanted to pay in cash.

"For us to fulfill our obligation, we go for the Social Security and driver's license numbers," he said.

That would normally close down any shady deal, he said.

COONCE SAID that if tips are received, cases are built independently to guard the dealerships because he knows if a dealer gets a reputation for "ratting off," his business would decline.

The only solution he sees is participation from all car dealers, so no dealership could be singled out.

"We do have a couple of dealers who are cooperating with us. Of course, I'm not going to identify who they are. But, quite frankly, it's not management. It's one or two salesmen in those places and they're doing it at a tremendous risk because they feel that as a citizen, they would let us know."

according to U.S. Marshal of the region, Anthony Bertoni. Oakland and Wayne counties are part of the district.

The U.S. Marshal Service, a federal police force, is "custodian" of "all seized property and money," Bertoni said.

IN 1988, assets included a 21-unit apartment building in Wayne County and three drug stores and a condominium development east of Rochester in Oakland County.

"Thirty million is what's been seized," Bertoni said.

Not all has been legally forfeited and that which is "will not necessarily sell for full value. It's a rough figure," Bertoni said.

Proceeds are "pumped back" into federal agencies and local governments for use in the continuing fight against drugs.

ZERO TOLERANCE, launched last April by U.S. Customs, has netted 732 autos seized at Michigan-Canadian border crossings for "transporting user-amounts of narcotics," according to Michael Jordan, chief inspector for the Port of Detroit.

The confiscated vehicles are sold at public auctions conducted nationwide by Northrop Worldwide, an Ok-

lahoma-based subsidiary of Northrop Corp. In an ironic twist, former owners are given first opportunity to repurchase their confiscated vehicles.

Not all seized items are drug-related. Northrop held 210 auctions in 1988, disposing of goods seized under 450 laws that customs agents enforce for an estimated 40 government agencies, including the departments of Transportation, Interior and Agriculture, Immigration and the Environmental Protection Agency.

A shipment of counterfeit Pony dolls was seized last Christmas for allegedly violating trademark laws, and four foreign trucks were recently seized because they allegedly violated emission standards. Many items are seized because they are not declared — "people trying to cheat by not paying customs," Jordan said.

Many items that are seized never see the auctioneer's block. The Pony dolls were donated to charity, and individual bottles of liquor are donated to non-profit organizations.

BARGAINS ARE not automatic when buying seized goods. Buyers must be discerning, according to Farmington Hills police Sgt. John Kohls, who is in charge of the department's property.

"Sure, some fantastic deals are

available but buyers beware," he said.

Hills police sell accumulated goods once a year at a department-sponsored auction. Kohls "authenticates" all items in the sale but does not "guarantee quality." Jewelry, for example, is not appraised. Quality may be excellent or poor.

The buyer of the Compton Park house in Livonia is still awaiting title to the home. In good condition when sold two years ago, it has been rented in the interim and is beginning to show wear and tear, Smith said.

The sale price on the 1988 Corvette sold in auction by Badeen was particularly attractive because the auto's odometer registered 4,000 miles. But the U.S. government will not certify mileage because "they don't have any way of knowing where the car has actually been," Badeen said. Actual mileage may be substantially more than 4,000 miles.

"We are not trying to give anyone a bargain," Maccani said. "We are just trying to receive as full a payment as possible on a tax liability."

Come Saturday, Feb. 18, the discerning buyer has an opportunity for bargains. A shipment of swimming trunks, another of toy boats, an assortment of jewelry and 35 vehicles will be sold in auction by U.S. Customs at Quality Storage, 6060 Rivard, Detroit. Viewing is at 9 a.m. and the action begins at 10 a.m.

## Research business before making plan

Financial projections can represent a major source of frustration to small business owners. Used primarily by investors to evaluate a company before committing themselves financially, their preparation requires much more than just "throwing some numbers together."

When presented as part of a company's business plan, financial projections are expected to extend five years from the date of investment, present monthly estimates over the first two years and quarterly estimates over the remaining three. Balance sheet projections may be presented on a quarterly basis during the first two years and semiannually after that.

Financial projections should be the result of the owners' strategic planning effort. As such, management must decide where they want to be as a company before any projections can be calculated and put into written form.

To help determine the future direction of the company in the areas of customer service, profitability and company life cycle, extensive marketing research is usually necessary.

RESEARCH WILL help uncover relevant facts and figures concerning company and industry trends as well as competitive strategies and activities. Industry trends data are available through several sources and include Robert Morris Associates' "Annual Statement Studies."

This report represents "averaged" financial statements data for companies from a variety of industries. Equally important is the need to analyze your own company

resources (people, capital and production) to estimate what will be needed over each of the next five years.

Financial projections that are overly optimistic or grossly understated often do more harm than good. Because they are used as a basis to negotiate the percentage return on investment, they must be as realistic as possible.

For investment deals that are designed to reward or penalize management when the company exceeds or fails to meet its projections, preparing pro forma financials are recommended.

Financial projections should include the company's income statement, showing sales, gross margin, expenses and income or loss. The cash flow forecast presents receipts and disbursements over time, and the expected real time requirements for cash.

THE BALANCE SHEET presents assets and liabilities, and the break-even analysis shows when total sales and costs become equal, after which the business will generate profits.

Keep in mind that financial projections must conform in presentation and in the scope of sales and expenses to other companies within the same industry, and with generally accepted accounting principles and formats.

Next week, we will discuss how a company may go about conducting its own competitive data search.

## Automakers pave way for Korea

Lately it's been fashionable to prepare for a Korean onslaught as "another Japan," which is to say once again we are going to have to struggle to compete with a country that educates its children, works hard and reinvests its capital in productive industry.

Sometimes I think Americans wishing for "another Japan" are secretly hoping that if that happens, Japan will go away like every other bad issue on the nightly news. Fat chance.

Chrysler, which announced a deal with Korea's Hyundai to build cars in Canada and sell them in the United States, is the latest joint venture between U.S. and Korean auto companies. Chairman Lee, rebuffed by the Korean government a few years ago in his effort to get Korea's Samsung into the auto business, now has a Korean affiliate to match Ford's joint venture with Kia and GM's affiliation with Daewoo.

IRONICALLY, CHRYSLER already builds the lowest-priced four-door economy car on sale in the United States — its Omni/Horizon subcompact. That car becomes even more cost competitive as U.S. wages

continue to slide against Japan's.

Why then the deal with Hyundai? Anyone now searching auto parts stores for brake linings for his Chrysler Simca or Cricket, or maybe his Ford Cortina or GM Opel by Isuzu knows there is nothing much new in domestic auto companies acting as importers and selling foreign cars in their dealerships.

The irony is that in the old days, such cars came mainly from hard-pressed European manufacturers with both a low labor base compared to the United States and surplus production capacity.

Today's "captive" imports are being sourced in countries with relatively low production capacity and virtually no local markets for their cars.

The result is that the new Korean ventures are taking a lot of hand-

holding just to get started. Hyundai, for example, leaned heavily on Ford Motor Co., British Leyland and Mitsubishi for a decade before being able to export in any quantity. It had a couple of good years in Canada, then sales suddenly dropped nearly 50 percent, by which time it had promised the Canadians it would build a local assembly plant to keep them from slapping on import quotas.

That's the plant expected to supply cars to Chrysler.

NONE OF the Korean imports have proven to be great retail bargains, likely a reflection of the real cost of production in a labor-intensive facility several thousands of miles away from its market eating up the advantage of low labor cost.

Likewise, political instability has

frequently shut down Korean auto plants, and its record as a reliable source of new cars isn't much better than Brazil's.

So why set up yet further deals with Korean manufacturers?

Apparently, domestic automakers are increasingly unwilling to make further investments in production capacity or new manufacturing technology themselves, and see Korea's struggling industry as a way of getting cars to sell in the low end of the market without risking serious investment.

Is this a clever strategy? Or another way of liquidating U.S. production capacity, paving the way for a larger share of wholly Korean-owned auto business in the United States?

I would bet on the latter. Kia, for example, is already laying the groundwork for an independent U.S. distributorship, in addition to its deal with Ford. It ought to be up and running by the time Chrysler gets its deal with Hyundai off the ground in the early 1990s.

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

## Good company

### Talents from near and far study in unique program

**U**NIQUE MAY BE an overused word in our hyperbole-happy society, but the Hilberry Theatre, now in its 26th season, deserves the adjective.

Because the Hilberry offers a unique program, it draws members from across the country. Some, like Anita Barone who grew up in Birmingham, Tod Barker of Plymouth and Andree Chipp of Westland, were lucky enough to find what they wanted on home turf.

Ask the 44 members of the repertory company why they joined, and sandwiched between praises for the Hilberry, members invariably mention that almost nowhere else in the country can they combine the invaluable experience of working in a repertory company with a program that also grants a master of fine arts or doctorate degree.

The Hilberry Theatre, a graduate-level program of Wayne State University in Detroit, presents plays five days a week from October through May. Each season it produces seven plays, which run three at a time in rotating repertory.

**FEBRUARY'S PRODUCTIONS** include Shakespeare's tragic love story, "Romeo and Juliet;" "Wild Honey," a comedy based on Anton Chekov's rambling epic; and the dashing adventure "The Scarlet Pimpernel," set during the French Revolution. For tickets and schedules of current and upcoming productions, call 577-2972.

Anita Barone, who plays Juliet in the current production of Shakespeare's tragedy, went to high school in Birmingham and earned her bachelor of fine arts at the University of Detroit before joining the Hilberry. She had "slews of responses" to her

auditions and looked at companies across the country, but none of them offered the unique combination of repertory and a degree.

She says, "I didn't join specifically for the degree. I wanted to get repertory experience, play to full houses and work with older actors." Her professors from the University of Detroit swayed her decision to join the Hilberry because many of them are enthusiastic Hilberry graduates.

To develop her current role as Juliet, Barone says she used her own experience. Juliet is 14 in the play, and Barone says, "I remember being 14. I was impatient. I wanted everything now."

Barone also was 14 when she first saw the Zeffirelli film version of "Romeo and Juliet." She says, "I remember holding hands through the whole movie with Randy." She draws on such memories to recreate Juliet's youthful passion.

**PLAYING JULIET** may consume her attention on one night, but the next night she must switch gears for her small role in "Wild Honey" and then shift again to work as stage crew and move furniture in "The Scarlet Pimpernel." Experience in all aspects of theater and with a variety of roles challenges members of a repertory company.

Barone says, "Repertory forces you to do a number of things. You have to make roles different. You're forced to find the contrast and play the difference."

Barone will complete her three-year program this spring and plans to spend the summer with the Colorado Snow Mass/Aspen Repertory Theatre. Then the coast calls — Los Angeles, the mecca of film. "I'll be so close," Barone says, "I might as well check it out."

Besides an impressive list of roles, including Helen Keller in the Attic Theatre's "Monday After the Mira-

cle" and Agnes in "Agnes of God," Barone also had a part in the locally filmed movie, "The Rosary Murders." She says her overriding objective is, "To be a working actor," and she includes film, television and radio as potential ways to make a living using her considerable skills.

Also a member of the 1988-89 Hilberry Company is Andree Chipp of Westland. She could not be reached for comment.

**ALTHOUGH TOD BARKER** was often behind the footlights during his years at Plymouth High School, at the Hilberry he is a stage manager and director. The stage manager manages split-second timing as he gives cues to lighting and sound technicians and to stagehands during each performance, and he keeps records of all script changes and blocking patterns in case someone has to step into a role at the last minute.

Before joining the Hilberry company last year as a doctoral candidate, Barker earned a master of arts from Eastern Michigan University in oral interpretation and worked in theater in New York and California. He developed and performed a program designed to broaden student awareness of AIDS, and he continues to study the way performance interacts with society.

He delights in people's reactions when they hear that he served, ironically, as a dresser in the Broadway "nude musical" "Oh, Calcutta!" Barker's theater credits also include works as a costume designer and scenic artist.

He says of the repertory schedule, "I've never done theater at this pace. If we're not in performance, we're in rehearsal." Because he is intrigued by oral histories, he looks forward with particular enthusiasm to the Hilberry's spring production of "Working," a play adapted from Studs

Terkel's book of the colorful stories Americans tell about their work lives.

Margaret Spear, promotion director for the theater, says the Hilberry chooses plays that will be good experience for the company. "If you can do classics, you can do most anything," she says of the Hilberry's tradition of grounding its education program in the time-tested plays of great theater.

**EVERY SEASON** the company also features a few outstanding modern works. The Hilberry chooses plays aimed to please audiences, but it doesn't shy away from controversy. Spear says, "If you can get the audience arguing out in the lobby, you know you have a stimulating show."

Applicants to the Hilberry go through a strenuous selection process which includes auditions held in Los Angeles, New York, Detroit, Chicago and Atlanta, by the University Resident Theatre Association. Hilberry members are all graduate students in Wayne State's three-year master of fine arts program, and a few are working toward doctorate degrees. Spear says current company members come from 15 states as well as Canada and Mexico, and they hold 52 degrees from 34 different colleges and universities.

Most college and university productions must contend with an overabundance of players just out of adolescence. The Hilberry is different. Nearly all Hilberry members sport "bios" sprinkled with credits from top regional and university theaters,

from summer-stock, off-Broadway productions, or from film. They're not star-struck whippersnappers banking on chutzpah and high hopes, but people who bring to the company a broad range of theatrical experiences.

Many already belong to Equity Actors Association, the Screen Actors Guild and sundry professional organizations. Their seasoning and the fact that many are older than the average graduate student enriches the Hilberry's productions.

Members of the Hilberry Company work long, hard hours. Spear explains how strenuous the program is. "Six days a week, they're busy going to classes and working on matinee and evening performances — too

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
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
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Phil Marcus Esser's "Somerset Strut" is a sophisticated, powerful, beautifully crafted, surprising blend of songs. Esser's new musical revue follows dinner at Sebastian's Restaurant in Somerset Mall, and the excellent dinner is as beautifully executed as the show.

Voices like Esser's, Barbara Bredius and Charlie Latimer's come along all too rarely. In the downstairs theater at the mall, diners were seated at reserved tables, and drinks were on hand when the lights went out, and suddenly the three singers were out in the audience doing a raucous rendition of "You're the Top."

Esser has rewritten the lyrics — using local references — several times. This time around, his references are more amusing than ever. Then the show moved onto the stage, where, in this reviewer's opinion, shows belong.

In a tux, Esser did a rich, romantic version of "I Concentrate on You." Then, in a display of the tremendous range Esser, Bredius and Latimer have, the threesome moved into Brel's "Brussels" and went on to do numbers as diverse as Elton John's "I Guess That's Why They Call It the Blues" and Bob Dylan's "Shelter from the Storm."

BREDIUS, A powerhouse of talent, came out in black silk and knocked everyone's socks off singing Judith Viorst's monologue, "Leave

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the bare stage. He has enormous control, a great voice and presence. Real talent that he is, he seems to be holding back reserves he could pull out at a moment's notice.

Bob Foster and Barbara Carbary do wonders on the keyboard. Paul Perich, percussionist, manages unusual sound effects in a show that is structured to surprise the listener. Susan and Eric Esser do lights in the right places against the silver and red backdrop.

LOTS OF expertise and lots of care have gone into the Maxfield Parrish ambience at Sebastian's. It shows in the overhead lights that look like pink seashells, the spotless white linen tablecloths and napery, the extensive wine list and the menu. A bread basket filled with warm

cinnamon rounds, flaky stollen, miniature croissants, pumpkinnickel made by a baker who understands real pumpkinnickel — in short, the best bread basket in town — appeared out of nowhere, along with water glasses that were always filled, long-stemmed wine glasses, real flowers and an experienced waiter named Mick.

Sensing that I was hesitating between the five delectable choices on the dinner theater menu, Mick unhesitatingly recommended sauteed Lake Michigan Perch to me and the Beef Wellington to my dining partner.

The fresh perch, on an oversized platter, came with herbed butter, exquisite dauphine potatoes, crunchy vegetables and a salad with an apple vinaigrette dressing that seemed made of air. The Beef Wellington was, as an aunt of mine used to say, "like butter." The crust was flaky, and a hearty red wine sauce added zing.

Crepe Brulee with perfectly crystallized glaze arrived after coffee.

While we ate, Marty Cozins played effortless piano. Couples got up and danced. Women wearing hats out of "The Great Gatsby," and busboys carrying pitchers and brushing crumbs away between courses while Cozins sang a bit added to the heady air.

# Kids spellbound by production

Performers who can hold an audience of youngsters spellbound for 75 minutes with hardly a squirm or whisper are obviously doing something right.

Actually, Detroit's Peanut Butter Players does just about everything right. First off, it chose a 1985 musical adaptation of Kenneth Grahame's marvelous 1908 children's classic, "The Wind in the Willows" for its current luncheon theater production.

Next, director Jo Anne Lamun cast some of the area's best young professional performers and taught them British accents (which they do rather well for the most part). Then, the production staff costumed them with quite stunning outfits (especially some of the animals) and created ingenious scenery to set the mood. Musical director C. J. Nodus adds the final touch with his keyboard artistry and special effects.

The story is about animals of an English meadow with many of our human traits and frailties. At the center of it all are the antics of a wealthy Mr. Toad — a charming but incorrigible rogue with a weakness for motorcars (which he is

constantly wrecking). Chris McKenna plays Mr. Toad with the aplomb and comic panache of a Monty Python skit. McKenna is the perfect loveable rascal.

MR. TOAD loves the good life — and cares little for the lower classes (represented by the weasels, ferrets and field mice of the nearby wildwood forest). Of course, they don't care much for him, as we learn in perhaps the best number of the show, "Down with the Toad."

Mr. Toad resents society's "rules" and rebels against authority. He even mistreats his best friends. Leigh Jonatis (as the Mole) and Danny Gurwin (as the Rat) are very good as exasperated friends trying to get Mr. Toad to see the error of his ways. Ian Kesler (as the Badger) also scored as the wise old geezer others come to for advice.

Eventually, Mr. Toad learns (the hard way) after a stint in jail and other indignities, the value of friendship, responsible behavior and the need for law and order.

Other standouts of the Sunday cast of 13, each of whom played several roles, are Courtney Bell, Celia Keenan-Bolger, Anne Marie McKenna and Eddie Sugarman. A second cast performs Saturdays.





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

## CC heavyweight prevails

### Rocks qualify 7 for mat regional

Just as in boxing, the heavyweights of high school wrestling attract the most attention.

Few will argue that division of the Class A individual district tournament at Plymouth Salem offered the state's best show Saturday.

Lee Krueger of Redford Catholic Central emerged as the winner of the highly competitive bracket, defeating North Farmington's Zaim Cummulaj on a 4-2 decision in the final.

While his battle with the Western Lakes Activities Association champ was a major contest, Krueger had to overcome a big obstacle — literally and figuratively — in the semifinals.

In that bout, he tangled with Michigan's No. 1-ranked heavyweight, 6-foot-7, 280-pound Helios Tenaglia of Berkley, who was undefeated. The 220-pound Krueger, who was unranked, won on points 4-1.

"IT WAS NO surprise to me," CC coach Mike Rodriguez said. "I knew he was going to win it."

"If (those doing the rankings) had seen the size of some of the kids he wrestled in Ohio, they would've rated him No. 1, because he tore the hell out of people down in Ohio."

In the prestigious Medina Tournament last December, Krueger defeated a two-time state champion from West Virginia and the defending Ohio state champ from Lakewood (Ohio) St. Edward.

That Krueger was unranked until this week was rather puzzling. He won the Class A crown at 189 last year and has compiled a 39-2-1 record as a heavyweight. If he wasn't before, his district victory makes him a bonafide contender, if not the favorite, for another state title.

"Lee knows what he's doing," Rodriguez said. "He doesn't care if he's ranked or not. He'll just go in and win it."

"(The St. Edward coach) made the statement he's probably the best heavyweight he's seen in the country."

"HE ASKED ME: 'Is he rated in the state?' I said: 'They don't even know who he is, but that doesn't

make any difference.'"

The heavyweight division will offer more top-notch wrestling and should be even tougher in the Salem regional this Saturday.

Krueger, who faces Mike Mayville (37-5) of Gibraltar Carlson in the first round, would have to wrestle either Tenaglia (36-1) or Tony Ruehle (35-4) of Lincoln Park in the semis.

The other bracket has Cummulaj (31-2) wrestling Bedford's Roman Rimmer (46-4) and Westland John Glenn's Joe Williams (22-10) opposing the Lincoln Park district winner, Paul Nowicki (26-0) of Romulus.

In addition to Krueger, the Shamrocks had five district champions and qualified nine for the individual regional. The top four wrestlers in each weight class move on.

The WLAAs team champion Rocks, with three individual winners and seven regional qualifiers, were right behind Temperance Bedford, which has eight wrestlers going to the next round.

DEMONSTRATING its usual prowess, CC's other champions were Mike Gentile (119), Matt Helm (130), Jay Helm (140) Brian Tulley (145) and Chris Rodriguez (152).

"It's getting to the point the stiff competition we had in December is starting to pay off at tournament time," Rodriguez said.

"I don't know how typical it is, but at this stage of the game the kids are ready for all this."


"They don't go through all they do to get to this point and start worrying about who they have to wrestle and who's No. 1."

Rodriguez added Tulley is wrestling with the confidence he needs at this time, and Gentile, who won all three bouts by decision, doesn't overwhelm his position but simply wins, he said. The Helm brothers and Chris Rodriguez have been consistent performers all season.

The Shamrocks should get at least eight of their nine qualifiers through the regional phase and into the state finals, Rodriguez said.

"THE DISTRICTS are going to knock out a lot of young and inexperienced people," he said. "We're pretty solid with what we have here."

## Krueger plans dual role

Cincinnati Bengals noseguard Tim Krumrie and Lee Krueger of Plymouth have more in common than the position they play in football.

Krueger hopes to follow in Krumrie's footsteps as a two-sport athlete at the University of Wisconsin.

The Redford Catholic Central senior intends to play football and wrestle — the same sports in which all-pro Krumrie excelled — when he enrolls at the Madison campus next fall.

"I'm pretty confident of playing both sports and doing well," said Krueger, who accepted a full-ride wrestling scholarship last week.

"I'm sure it will be (demanding). It'll be a lot of work, but it's something I want to do."

"IT GOES ON in college. I know of some heavyweights who do both," he added.

Krueger said his first priority was to play football. He had visited the Naval Academy, Central Michigan and Bowling Green and was nearing a decision on a football offer from those schools when the Badgers entered the

picture with their dual offer.

Wisconsin wrestling coach Andy Rein attended Krueger's predistrict match on Feb. 1 and visited with the family afterward. Krueger's father is Ron Krueger, the wrestling coach at Plymouth Salem.

"(Rein) said he'd really like me to go there," Krueger said. "He wondered what my thoughts were. I said: 'I have to make a decision quick.' That put the ball in his court."


"He said: 'I'll offer you a full-ride to Wisconsin. I guess that leaves it up to you.' I said: 'I accept it.'"

Wednesday was the official date for high school football players signing letters of intent, which necessitated a quick decision by Krueger. Since he has given the Badgers a verbal commitment in wrestling, he won't make it official until he signs on April 12.

KRUEGER, A CLASS A all-stater on defense last fall, will attempt to make the Wisconsin football team as a walk-on. While his scholarship is for wrestling, it is with the understanding he can play football, too.

That was something other schools wouldn't agree to. Krueger said he turned down offers from Penn State,

Their fate was in their own hands, and Schoolcraft College's Lady Ocelots let it slip away.

Not figuratively, mind you. Quite literally, SC hosted Highland Park CC Wednesday. A victory and SC would be guaranteed a tie for the Eastern Conference women's basketball title. Consider all factors — what was at stake, the home-court advantage and SC's 21 wins in 22 previous games — and a Lady Ocelot win would seem likely.

Sorry, SC played more like it belonged in the conference basement instead of the penthouse, committing a ghastly 35 turnovers and, except for a brief spurt to start the second half, showing little life in losing 71-61.

The win tightened up the conference race considerably. SC and Oakland CC are now both 10-2; Highland Park improved to 8-3. The Lady Panthers are 17-6 overall.

**SC PLAYS** at OCC at 6 p.m. Saturday. A victory would give the Lady Ocelots the title outright; a loss would mean SC would have to win its final game at Mott CC, and even then the conference would likely end up in a three-way tie.

"Missed opportunities," was how SC coach Jack Grenan summed up the disappointing defeat. He was right. The Lady Ocelots played lethargically throughout the first half and actually were fortunate to be trailing by just 37-27 at the intermission.

SC committed 20 first-half turnovers; Highland Park had 14. The Lady Ocelots could not handle the full-court zone press. Except for center Barb Krug (from Plymouth Salem), who hit four consecutive shots and scored eight points in the first half, no one played well.

It was a different story for Highland Park. Janice Cooper got loose and poured in 19 first-half points and Gwen Maiten added nine. Cooper finished the game with 33; Maiten and Jessica McCarty got 11 apiece.

"She was the best player in the state last year," said Lady Panther coach Nikita Merchant of Cooper. "She didn't become eligible until January, and she's just now getting into shape."

**THE LADY OCELOTS** looked like they were getting into game shape at the start of the second half. A three-point play by Lisa DePlanche and two baskets by Krug pulled them to within five. Cooper scored Highland Park's next six points to keep the Lady Panthers ahead, 45-38.

That's when Tracy Osborne caught fire. She hit a jumper just inside the three-point line, then two more outside of it to notch eight-straight points. And just like that, SC's troubles seemed to be history; the Lady Ocelots were ahead 46-45 with 13:15 left.

Two baskets by Darlene Bazner and another Osborne triple gave SC a 53-49 lead with 10:07 to play. But the tide turned again.

The Lady Ocelots had scored 26 points in the first 10 minutes of the second half, nearly matching their entire first-half total. But as quickly as the offense materialized, it disappeared.

Highland Park scored 10-straight points to recapture the lead. SC, in the meantime, went nearly five minutes without a point. In a nine-minute stretch, the Lady Ocelots scored just four points.

**THE OUTCOME** was decided by the time Krug scored with 1:08 left to get SC to within 68-59.

Turnovers ruined the Lady Ocelots' comeback chances. After making just five in the first 10 minutes of the second half, they committed 10 miscues in the final 10 minutes.

"We spent two days working on ballhandling," said Grenan. "Nobody would've known it. We beat ourselves tonight. That's the disappointing thing."

Krug led SC with 18 points and nine rebounds (the Lady Ocelots allowed Highland Park to pull down 25 offensive rebounds). Osborne had 17 points and DePlanche scored 11.

"NOW WE KNOW we can compete with the top teams. It gives them confidence."


Other strong performers for North were Kim Heller and Kristin Szutarski, who finished with 34.80 and 33.45, respectively, in the all-around.

The 5-foot-4 Estey, a three-time member of the all-Observer team who was No. 8 in the Miss Basketball voting, will play for former Central Michigan coach Laura Golden, who is in her fifth year at Illinois.

The Illini have a young team with only one senior. The current point guard is junior Kristen Haynes, a three-year starter.

"She'll graduate by the time I'm a sophomore," Estey said. "Hopefully,

I can work my way into a starting position. But I have to keep working because they're going to keep bringing in good players."

In the two years Estey played alongside Dena Head at Salem, she scored in double figures but was a point guard first. As the team leader last fall, she became more of a scorer, averaging 16 points. At the collegiate level, she anticipates reverting to her previous role.

"They're looking at me as a point guard," Estey said, "and that's really what I am. I'm looking to be a passer and playmaker; scoring won't be my first priority."

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


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
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# Thurston player surprise recruit

What is blowing in the football recruiting winds?  
The answer, my friends, is not much when it comes to Observerland players. That's despite the fact that two area schools, Farmington Harrison in Class B and Redford Catholic Central in Class A, played last fall in state championship games, and another school, Westland John Glenn, also qualified for the state playoffs.

Last year 11 area players signed with NCAA Division I-A or I-AA schools, but that number is significantly down this year for various reasons.

Wednesday was the first day schools could sign high school football players to national letters-of-intent.

As of Tuesday, only six Observerland players have been tendered football scholarships to Division I schools.

Among those who signed on Wednesday: Dorian Marshall, a 6-foot-2, 260-pound tackle from Redford Bishop Borgess (Indiana); Bryant Satterlee, 6-2, 210-pound linebacker/fullback from John Glenn (Central Michigan); Dale Katz, 6-6, 232-pound tackle from Farmington Harrison (Cincinnati); Bryan Wauldron, 6-2, 170-pound wide receiver/defensive back from Harrison (Eastern Michigan); Mike Boyle, 6-5, 220-pound tackle from Redford St. Agatha (EMU); and Tim Wojcik, 6-0, 205-pound fullback/linebacker from Redford Thurston (CMU).

**WOJCIK IS PROBABLY** the biggest surprise. A second-team All-Area pick, the Thurston griddier reportedly is one of 13 players to be offered scholarships by Central Michigan.

Wojcik played on a team that went 0-9 and finished dead last in the Tri-River League. He finished the season at quarterback.  
"This just proves that a player can be discovered, even in a program that is not going well," said Thurston coach Bob Snell. "Tim is a strong kid who can take punishment. With us, he had to earn every yard this season."

"Central is thin at fullback. He has the type of frame where he could easily go up to 230 pounds." Ironically, several players from the more heralded Redford CC team are wondering if anyone is going to call.

The team's most publicized player during the season, linebacker/fullback Lee Krueger, is headed for Wisconsin on a wrestling scholarship with the option of walking on the football team.

CC All-Area defensive back Chris Johnston was being pursued up until the signing date by the Naval Academy, but was also seriously considering Hillsdale, a top-ranked NAIA school.

**AMONG THE OTHER** All-Area players from CC awaiting offers are: tackle Jack Dankert, who is considering Holy Cross (where his brother Pete plays), Hillsdale and Penn; quarterback Scott Hauncher, a merit scholar who has had talks with officials from Hillsdale, Holy Cross and the Ivy League; tight end Lou Yeager, leaning toward the Air Force Academy; center/linebacker Pat McHale, Division III Albion or Dayton; and kicker/punter Pete Elezovic, Central Michigan (partial grant-in-aid) or Michigan (walk-on).

"I don't know what happened, it's been a strange year," said CC coach Tom Mach. "A lot of these guys will be going somewhere because of

their good academics and maybe that's better because they won't be tied down to football. Holy Cross, for instance, has done away with football scholarships and that makes it tough."

Coaches from Division II schools, particularly those in the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference, are waiting for Division I schools to provide their lists before making any moves.

But several players signed with Division II schools Wednesday, including Livonia Franklin quarterback Craig Allard (Hillsdale); Wayne Memorial tight/end linebacker Scott Koczyk (Saginaw Valley State); and Livonia Stevenson tackle Erik Ruth (Wayne State). (Ruth has also been named to the Michigan High School Coaches All-Star team.) Two others have committed to GLIAC schools, including CC tackle Rod Vernier (Ferris State) and Thurston tackle Chris Kies (WSU).

**ALLARD IS ANOTHER** surprise, considering he is only 5-10 1/2, 160 pounds. He finished the year at running back for the Patriots, who finished with a 6-3 record.

"He's an option quarterback and they (Hillsdale) like his quick feet and his ability to pitch the ball," said Franklin coach Armand Vigna.

Franklin All-Area defensive back Joe Ransley, along with Glenn wide receiver Greg Anderson and Redford Union punter/flanker Joe Delfgaw, are also looking.

The lack of interest in Delfgaw is one of the biggest mysteries.

The 5-11, 180-pound senior averaged 42 yards per punt and caught a school-record 65 passes for the Panthers.

"He can be a big-time punter for somebody," said RU coach Jim Gibbons. "His grades are good enough. I can't understand what's happening."

"I've played linebacker before," Krueger said. "At practice, when I was done at noseguard, they'd put me at linebacker."

CC returns to action at 5 p.m. Friday at Toledo (Ohio) St. Francis.

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

## Many styles, 'keepers' mix for new look

A 3,600-square-foot condo residence in West Bloomfield quickly became interior designer Lillianne Solomon's hardest, most-challenging and most-enjoyable commission.

Solomon is a staff designer at Gorman's Troy and many of her clients are coming back to her for the second or third time. This condo, for an empty nester couple, who both work full time — she's a psychologist and he's a sociologist — was her second residence for them.

She said she looked forward to it, knowing she would have a lot of laughs and a few confrontations, husband and wife are both strong-willed with positive likes and dislikes.

They didn't even think about being design purists. While her clients expressed a preference for contemporary, Solomon said, "I think we have about all styles — oriental, French, contemporary, art deco, even southwest and high tech.

**SOLOMON POINTED OUT** that the previous owners had left beautiful carpeting and an assortment of wall coverings, all in neutral pale champagne tones, simply too good to discard.

"As you know, I love to recycle," said Solomon, pointing out that she might do better financially if she didn't, but she just hates to throw good things out if they will fit in. In this instance they did.

So, before she even started, there were considerations. There were favorites pieces from the other residence to blend into the new environment — an armless slipper chair that had been a grandmother's favorite, two regal looking arm chairs from a European castle brought to the U.S. by another grandmother, an oriental chinoiserie china cabinet and works of art.

"They told me they wanted the house to be very contemporary, but 'here's what we're keeping'."

The great room in the condo is a large, high-ceiling one with no barriers, a fireplace and glass door walls to the deck. The areas are defined by the furniture. The oriental/contemporary combination in the dining area is arresting in its coordination of line and color.

The black and gold china cabinet with the glass doors is a good foil for a contemporary glass dining table with an acrylic base and handsome black art deco-inspired chairs. These sleek lined high back chairs set up a line that stretches to the two regal European antique chairs by the door walls.

Against the back wall is contemporary style cabinet designed for this room and finished in faux black and red travertine. Hanging over it are two large oriental portraits on black plaques.

**THE SAME CRAFTSMAN** who did the cabinet gave what was an ordinary fireplace a faux marble finish that coordinates with the carpet. She

chose two large matching sectionals upholstered in an off-white — one curved and one L-shaped.

Together they provide a lot of seating for guests. The current owners had entertained 80 people plus a harpist in one corner and the room was comfortable and the imposing, regal chairs had lots of use.


A favorite bronze sculpture by Aharon Bezalel of Israel is on a pedestal beside the fireplace. Over the fireplace is an abstract painting by Dhat, a Vietnamese artist.

The kitchen and breakfast room with neutrals come alive with strong touches of black and splashes of vibrant colors. The contemporary style breakfast room chairs are black leather on black frames.

Like many of the lighting fixtures, the high-tech one over the breakfast table is a strong, pleasant contemporary element. A colorful painting by Johanna Haas on the dinette wall gives the area a warm, inviting atmosphere.

The master suite, like the other parts of the home, had the soft neutral carpeting and honey/beige wall coverings that were kept. Solomon used black and brilliant accent colors such as pink and green to add drama to the large room.

"The room is large enough not to be overwhelmed by these colors," she said. The black of the channel-quilted bedspread is the background color in the comfortable grouping in front of the fireplace. The pinks and greens in a painting in the master

bedroom are repeated in the glamorous throw pillows on the bed and in the pattern of the upholstery fabric.

## Funny things happen on way to concert halls

**DAY 6, THURSDAY, JAN. 26** — Geneva is the sister city of Zurich. Both cities are major banking and trade centers; only the language is different. Our hotel is within walking distance to the big greenish-blue lake in the center of town.

I had forgotten the hall here, and, indeed, it has been remodeled considerably, particularly the backstage area. It is quite garish inside with two balconies and ornate decor everywhere. The sound of the hall is pretty good, but the orchestra's performance is a bit erratic. Sections of the concert are very well played, but gremlins are working here and there. The audience is responsive, but the spark of the Zurich and Bern concerts wasn't there. The orchestra is tired and several players are ill.

Illness is always a danger on these tours. We travel and work in such close quarters that viruses spread like wildfire. We've heard stories of considerable illness during a recent Cleveland Orchestra tour. Fortunately, Dr. Max Wisgerhot of Grosse Pointe is traveling as our tour physician. He and his wife,

Mary, are getting to know us personally.

Debbie Fayroian, cellist of Troy, is traveling with her daughter, Adrienne. She and her husband, Wes Jacobs, our tubist, had a story to share about Geneva. Debbie had stepped from the shower just in time to hear her daughter finish a sentence on the telephone with the words "and milk."

By the time she had extracted an explanation from the 7-year old, room service had arrived. She had ordered chicken with mustard sauce, a potato, fruit flan and milk. The U.S. dollar isn't exactly king in Switzerland. Wes estimated the lunch cost at least \$35. "It was very good," he said, "and she did eat it."

### Destination Vienna

**DAY 7, FRIDAY, JAN. 27** — Travel day, no concert, our destination is Vienna. Everyone is happy to have extra time to rest.

The flight is beautiful. We are above the sea of clouds, and to our

right are the Swiss Alps just through and far above the cloud line. The view of these awesome mountains is breathtaking, and the captain decides to give us a close up. He alters our course to move closer to the mountain range. We can actually make out small ski villages. One of the Swiss stewardesses tells me she had never seen the mountains this close or well in all her years of flying.

We land in a gray, overcast Vienna. The orchestra has been invited to tour a General Motors plant in the suburbs and go to dinner and entertainment at a wine restaurant nearby (called a "heurigen"). Nearly everyone attends.

The modern factory is impressive. Engines and transmissions are built, and much of the work is automated. I found the robots fascinating.

After our tour we are whisked off to a nearby Austrian village to relax and party. There's a lot of singing, eating and drinking.

The new wine, served in large pitchers, goes down as easily as lemonade. Long wooden benches are set up. The modern bathroom facilities

are positioned outdoors, just as they were years ago. Partygoers don't seem to mind the walk in the cool, fresh air.

Several General Motors executives are in attendance, and Martin Pfundher, the Austrian public relations representative for the company, is all smiles. After a wee bit of rowdiness and merrymaking by all, Deborah Borda, our executive director, gives a rousing thank-you speech and we depart for our hotel. Tomorrow is entirely free — no travel, no concert. Thank goodness.

**DAY 8, SATURDAY, JAN. 28** — Vienna is a wonderful city full of concert halls, theaters, museums and fine restaurants. In many ways it can be compared to New York in that everything can be found there, and people come from all over Europe to take in the opera, plays and concerts. It is also similar to the Big Apple in that it is very, very expensive.

My wife, Susan, went shopping with Peggy Tundo, violinist of Troy. They thought they had found an easy way to convert the local prices in Austrian shillings to U.S. dollars — by moving the decimal point over twice. After gathering armloads of bargains, they spoke to the friendly saleswoman at the cash register. She explained to them how they could get the tax (some 15 percent) refunded when they left the country.

"Anytime you purchase over \$500," she said.

They had moved the decimal once too far. It was easy to persuade each other to wait until arriving in Ham-

burg for a shopping spree, where prices are reported to be cheaper. This writer is praying for a snowstorm.

It is our first really big city on the tour.

The hall is very, very live. The sound seems to leap out of the instruments. Playing here will require a lot of attention to balance. We are disappointed to learn that the live radio broadcast has been canceled. Later we learn that our soloist, Gidon Kremer, was afraid to broadcast the Shostakovich concerto without more rehearsal. As fate would have it, the entire concert went very well and should have been aired. We are scheduled for three encores, but play all four for the responsive audience.

**DAY 10, MONDAY JAN. 30** — We leave Vienna by train for the industrial city of Linz. Susan and I walk to the center of the city with Jeff Zook, flutist of Detroit, and enjoy authentic wiener schnitzel in a busy little hof. Jeff and I both are coughing a lot so I recommend gluhwein, a heated, spiced wine indigenous to Austria. After lunch it's back to the hotel and a

long nap, something which I have learned to do on concert days.

## Sick list grows

Several people are unable to play the concert. Don Baker, principal oboist of Detroit, is practicing on stage when I arrive. He will have to play a part his assistant, Brian Ventura of Southfield, normally plays. Brian is sick. The list is growing and now everyone has encountered some illness — but the show must go on.

**DAY 11, TUESDAY JAN. 31** — Today we go through customs. The large instruments have to go separately in their specially designed trunks. Our stage crew has been fantastic. They work very hard every day, moving our heavy wardrobe trunks and expensive instruments. Truly, they are experts. Some of our violinists still worry when packing their \$100,000-plus violins in the specially designed trunks. This is the way torts are done; there is no alternative.

This hall is a modern beautiful structure. The acoustics are strange, however. There are many articles on the board in the musicians' lounge about the controversial sound here. Apparently a great deal of experimentation has already been done to improve the acoustics. The problems don't seem to affect us in any way. The orchestra plays what may be our best concert of the tour. Following the concert many musicians meet friends from the Bavarian Radio Orchestra in a reception room at the hall.

After much beer drinking the bartender brings out a mysterious unmarked bottle and begins pouring rounds of this homemade brew (some kind of schnapps). It tasted great but definitely was dangerous. Fortunately the next day was free.

**DAY 12, WEDNESDAY, FEB. 1** — Every town has surprises for someone. Barbara Hassan, cellist of Livonia, has long been involved in harness racing and trains horses at Hazel Park. After looking through the Munich newspapers, she called the local track and was referred to the track owner. He spoke excellent English and invited her to visit the track on our day off.

"It was a great tour of a German race track, although the employees didn't know much English," she said. "They even offered to suit me and let me take a horse around the track."

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# Resonance is missing ingredient

**T**HE SHORT story is alive and kicking, getting stronger every year, proving once again that class wins. Quality will out.

There was time, not so long ago, when mentioning the words "short story" was like shouting "liberal Democrat" in Houston. It was thumbs down all the way. Short stories, gasp and gag! Not in this regime — not in this lifetime.

I say blame The New Yorker, but that's just me. The New Yorker, the supposed vanguard of literary fiction, gave up clarity and coherence for awhile there and went with bits and pieces, lunky language games and "poor me" ennui instead.

I SAY BLAME THE women's magazines for giving up quality commercial fiction and going instead for the mindless, giddy, cliché-ridden romance stories. What an insult to women everywhere. Give us back Ruymer Godden, Phyllis Whitney and Mary Augusta Rodgers (who, by the way, lives in Birmingham. I was stunned when I found that out a few years ago. I had read her stories for years and decided that nobody that good could be earthbound and live a life like everyone else.)

I say blame Gordon Lish and his silly Columbia School of "write like me and you'll be a star — if I let you." But that may be giving Lish too much credit. Even he isn't capable of creating an entire literary movement — is he?

Still, I want to blame someone. Somebody had to publish all the stupid stories we were forced to endure for so long — stories where wired with-it people (young) sit around in their underwear and while away a couple of hours snorting cocaine, detesting their rich and drunken parents and having the most boring conversations in the world about

what they did or didn't do, should or shouldn't have done. Write it in present tense, throw in a few brand names ("Adrian spends long minutes carefully tearing back the wrapper of the Hershey with Almonds. . .") A Lish trademark: Don't just tell us what it is — tell us what it is, don't forget the drugs and you have the classic short story of the '80s.

But I'm getting needlessly cranky. As I said before, things change. Already "liberal Democrat" has lost its nerdy edge and we LDs have been invited — even encouraged — to come out of the swamps and get back to the business at hand. Namely, changing things.

And what does that have to do with short stories? Not a thing. So let's go on.

A lot of us were growing up when some of the greatest short story writers ever to grace this planet were still alive and plugging away at their craft: Hemingway, Faulkner, the O'Connors — Flannery and Frank — Steinbeck, Thurber, Dorothy Parker, Somerset Maugham, Katherine Anne Porter, E. B. White.

Their works were exquisite, wicked, joyous, cautionary — and as dazzling clear as a mountain river. Some of the best are still with us: Eudora Welty, Peter Taylor, Joyce Carol Oates. And some of the currently good are only getting better: Bobby Ann Mason, Ellen Gilchrist, Louis Erdrich, Max Apple, Mona Simpson — and our own Michigan writers, Charles Baxter, Stuart Dybek, Janet Kauffman and Gloria Whelan.

A former Detroit, Gloria Whelan now writes at her home in the north woods east of Grand Traverse Bay. Some of her best stories reflect that setting, while others take place in far away, exotic locales. Her characters might be considered pretty ordinary but for the way they reckon

with the world around them. Fourteen of her stories, including the O. Henry award-winning "The Dogs in Renoir's Garden," appear in "Playing with Shadows" (hardbound, \$11.95), a collection recently published by the Illinois University Press.

In a recent discussion with other writers, Whelan told about Keats viewing a huge, historical tableau painted by the American painter Benjamin West. Keats looked at it for a long time, then remarked, "It's very good, it's very well done, but there nothing in it to be intense about."

"The intensity is there in all of Whelan's stories. She draws us in and

keeps us there by giving us something to care about. A dull, self-centered man believes his middle-aged, overweight wife has taken a lover. He follows her, spies on her and discovers the pathetic reason for the new sparkle in her eye — she has become a shoplifter.

A woman walking near her home in the woods spots a passenger pigeon, a breed thought to be 70 years extinct. She recognizes, with great sadness, that this is a secret she must keep from her biologist husband, who spends his days gathering and killing creatures for study.

"In a good short story," Whelan says, "there is the feeling that down

underneath there is a resonance, a reverberation that stays with us long after the story is ended."

It's the resonance that good story writers strive for. "No tricks," Raymond Carver said. The trick stories

are mind candy — fun while they last, but forgotten when they're gone. And if there is a short story resurgence, let it be because there are stories to be told — and worth telling well.

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## Ways to glamorize dullish baths

If you've visited any model homes, you've probably noticed how glamorous bathrooms have become. Then you return home and wish yours was more appealing.

If you don't want to invest in wallpaper, posters or pictures can be a fine substitute. A bowl filled with colored soaps and towels and some live plants can achieve a "look."

When shopping for wallpaper, select one with a matching fabric. If you have a shower and tub, use the matching fabric for tied-back draperies. A window should be dressed with the same fabric as well.

When the bathroom or powder room is small, use mirrors. These are areas where the use of mirrors is limitless. I have mirrored the ceiling in powder rooms for greater dimension.

When redecorating an old bathroom, existing tile can be a problem.

Removing tile is costly so the best way to handle it is with color. The combination of jade green and black tile often found in older homes looks wonderful with walls done in a softer or deeper green. A black tile floor would look sensational with these combinations. Mica cabinets in matte finish or lacquer in bone or almond complete the look. Orchid tiles were favorites in older homes. Mauve and celery make orchid tiles a plus.

If you have a free standing sink in your bath and need more space, surround it with a countertop. If your commode is on the same wall, extend your top to go over it.

Bathrooms demand good lighting — not only for vision and safety, but also for decorative enhancement. In new construction, an inexpensive way to supply good lighting is to have a soffit over the vanity and use

high wattage fluorescent bulbs. A popular innovation in bathroom lighting is theatrical lighting — framing the mirror on two, three or four sides with 25 watt incandescent bulbs. I like good lighting, but not the amount of heat thrown off by all those bulbs.

When decorating the master bathroom or guest powder room, the quest for luxury and glamor should be paramount. Everyone treasures the privacy of the bathroom and this privacy should be a pleasant experience.

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
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

# WRITE IT AND REAP!

Writing a classified ad that gets results—whether it be for real estate, employment, the personals, transportation, or merchandise—is easy if you follow the guidelines below.



**1. Give the reader specific information.** Pretend you are someone reading the classifieds. What would you like to know about the item, service or job you are advertising? Be sure to add details such as color, size, condition, brand name, age, features and benefits. Be accurate! Don't embellish your ad with misleading information. Stick to the facts and reap the rewards!

**2. Include the price.** Don't waste your time or a potential buyer's time. If you advertise the price of the item or service you offer, the people who respond to your ad will be those who are genuinely interested. Surveys show that readers are more interested in those items and services they know are within their price range.

**3. Avoid abbreviations.** Don't make a potential customer work too hard! Although you may be tempted to cut down on the cost of your ad by using abbreviations, surveys indicate that many people don't understand such abbreviations as EIK (eat-in kitchen) or WSW (white side wall) tires and won't take the time to figure them out. A confused reader is a disinterested reader. Get the most for your money and use complete words.

**4. Include phone number and specify hours.** Be sure to let potential customers know when and where to call. Surveys show that even if a person is very interested in your item or service, he or she will not call back after the first attempt. Stay near the phone during the hours you indicate you will be available. Don't risk missing a sale!

**5. Run on consecutive days.** Your ad will not get results if people don't see it! Therefore, it is important to set up a consistent and consecutive ad schedule with your telephone salesperson or outside sales representative.

## Attendant fashions are easy and elegant

**T**HE BRIDE is center stage, but what the attendants wear is equally important — the colors, styles and formality of their attire create the backdrop of a picture-perfect occasion. Happily, manufacturers of attendants' attire supply a huge selection of gowns at moderate prices. You can find cocktail dresses with discreet cover-ups, tiered skirts that can be worn short or long, camisoles and tunics.

While it's hard to please everyone, a smart bride will try this approach: At first, take only your maid or matron of honor with you shopping and narrow down the choices to three or so styles.

Pick a style that will flatter your attendants' varied figures. For instance, blouson tops and full skirts look good on almost anyone. The styles your maids will most likely be able to wear again are two piece and shorter (rather than floor length).

Chances are you'll be able to buy one style in whatever color you desire, or find your favorite color in many styles. Ask, too, if there is a youthful rendition of the same outfit for your junior bridesmaids and flower girls.

ONCE YOU'VE MADE your preliminary selections, schedule a time when the rest of the maids can visit the bridal shop to vote on the final decision.

Wedding attendants are looking lovelier than ever. No longer are

bridesmaids' dresses frumpy, garish and destined to post-ceremony oblivion. The new look is feminine, fashionable and versatile.

Usually, lighter colors are worn in spring and summer, more vibrant colors in fall and winter.

You might want to go with a monochromatic scheme of differing hues of the same color. The overall look is not only wedding-album lovely, it also offers shade variations suitable for every person.

Following the fashion of today's bridal gowns, the shoulders of bridesmaid dresses are bare.

Necklines are scoop or sweetheart and are best accessorized with one or several strands of pearls.

Sleeves are lacy or made of soft, sheer fabric, often gathered or shirred.

Depending on the formality of the wedding, skirt length can be anywhere from knee to ankle. Super-short is out.

Fabrics include satin, silk, taffeta and velvet. Look for new economical fabrics that mimic silk so well that even the wearer can't tell the difference. The big news is prints — chintzlike florals are blooming (with matching broad-brimmed hats), and the look is soft and old-fashioned.

WAISTS ARE TAPERED and have graceful peplums or wide sashes. Fabric forms soft rosettes and graceful bows.

# Bridal fashions: As you like it

**W**HEN IT comes to bridal fashions, the word is options.

A bride can choose a ball gown, a country dress, a sheath or a tailored suit, say designers and editors who work in the bridal field. There are no rules, only guidelines.

She can look demure, like Cinderella at the ball or — in a departure from tradition — alluring in a strapless or off-the-shoulder dress with a low-cut neckline. Dresses with jackets and

detachable trains also make it easier to go from religious service to post-ceremony party with maximum comfort.

Holly McMunn of Bridal Originals says there are more choices in fabrics, style and color for brides than at any other time in the recent past. She sees several strong directions.

"One type of bride wants a simple dress in a classic silhouette, a princess, empire or sheath style. Another type chooses an elaborate dress," she says.

THERE IS also a demand for the fashion statement dress — particularly by older brides who may be remarrying — that reflects silhouettes currently in style, she says. While white and ivory remain the colors chosen by the overwhelming number of brides, soft tinges of color are becoming more popular, agree Modern Bride and Bride's magazine fashion editors.

One new tinge is ice-blue on satin dresses, which imparts a silvery sheen to white.

Still popular are color-themed weddings, in which a particular color scheme is carried through in flowers and decorations, wedding party attire, table linen, plates, even party favors.

SOME FAVORED schemes include black and white, and white and a deep tone such as hot pink, coral or strong turquoise. For spring and summer, pastels such as mint and lemon yellow are popular.

Cindy Rose, fashion director for Vogue-Butterick Patterns, says the latest styles are available in sew-it-yourself patterns. Some examples

include dresses with bows at the shoulder or waist, ruffles, leg-o-mutton sleeves and even modified bustles.

According to Rose, "Bridal dresses are frankly not as innocent as they used to be — with bustles and low necklines, they do call attention to a woman's figure. Many brides want to look like a sexy woman so the dresses they select have more style."

An advantage to having a home-sewn dress is the opportunity to customize it with, for example, a detachable train, snap-off sleeves or a coat, jacket or bolero.

IN KEEPING WITH the variety of bridal dresses, accessories are similarly wide-ranging, according to fashion reports by Bride's and Modern Bride.

Modern Bride notes the popularity of hats, sprays of flowers for the hair and bows worn at the back of the head. Bride's says jewelry for the bride has become more dramatic than it used to be. Seen on more brides are drop earrings, charm bracelets and antique pins and earrings.

Gloves are everywhere. They're lacy and delicate, made of fine netting and decorated with wrist ruffles and tiny satin rosettes.

As a courtesy to the parents of your flower girl, select a dress for her that is lovely and lacy but not wedding-gown fancy. She should be able to wear it to one or two other dressy occasions, including church, before she outgrows it.

It's nice, (but not mandatory) to distinguish your maid or matron of honor. You can do this with flowers and accessories or with a different shade of dress — for example, light blue for the maid of honor, deeper blue for the other maids.

It used to be that the bride's mother selected her outfit for the big day first. Then she informed the mother of the groom so the latter could make a suitable selection as to the color and length.

Today the rules are more relaxed. Bridal experts advise the mothers

should agree on the degree of formality, but each should have her own prerogative as to style and color.

Besides, according to Joyce Cohen, fashion and beauty director of Bride's Magazine, matching isn't unthinkable anymore. She says she likes to see "an overall feeling of harmony in the colors of the wedding — say, the bridesmaids in pink, the mothers in dove gray."

In the 1950s, the typical mother of the bride wore a dress in a muddy pastel color or a print that looked like a combination of upholstery and window curtains. Dusty blue brocade seen through floaty panels of blue lace, for example. Or whooshy ashes-of-roses chiffon with butterfly sleeves and an underskirt of paler satin.

No more. Today's mothers of the bride refuse to dress like grandmas-in-waiting. They're not satisfied with less than something from Carolina Herrera, Oscar de la Renta or Bill Blass.

The key is elegance and mature beauty — as long as Mom doesn't steal the show from her daughter.



## Old-fashioned trends returning

**W**EDDING traditions that once were thought old-hat are back.

"Bridal couples are getting pleasure by doing things the old-fashioned way," according to Barbara Tober, editor of Bride's magazine.

For example, she says, "calligraphy once again is in fashion for invitations and people are thinking of toasts in advance and caring about the fact that someone should say something at the

reception."

"Couples are embracing the idea of dressing up, sending out invitations in advance, putting announcements in the newspaper."

"They have music, they carry flowers, they say their vows. Brides are wearing attendants, throwing bouquets, wearing a garter and cutting the cake," she says.

The once-overlooked personal letter of thanks to friends and family for wedding gifts is again in favor. Though pre-printed thank-you cards are available, etiquette experts agree that the sincere and courteous way of expressing thanks is with a hand-written note.

AS THE ARBITER of the '80s, Judith "Miss Manners" Martin, put it: "The only time a handwritten thank-you note is not necessary is when no wedding present has been received."

According to the Bride's Book of Etiquette, another exception to the requirement for a note is acknowledging gifts from parents or a spouse.

However, it's also duly noted that parents and spouse will appreciate a special letter of thanks.

For all other thank-yous, the first requirement is to keep a thorough and reliable gift record.

Keep track of gifts in a wedding

journal, a notebook, index cards or even on a computer. Record the gift along with the name and mailing address of the giver so it will be simpler to get the thank-you note on its way quickly. Indicate when you've mailed it, so you won't overlook any.



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### Bridal flowers getting brighter

A Bride's magazine survey of florists across the country found several new trends in wedding flowers.

The most significant trend in bridal flowers is toward bright, hot colors.

according to a New York floral designer. Bright blue delphinium and corn flowers are becoming popular. Other colors: deep crimson pink, purple, jewel tones. The all-white bouquet is also popular, especially

when the color scheme is white and black. Other flower trends: more hand-tied, loose and airy bouquets, Victorian style flowers, lots of laces and ribboned tablecloths, more tulle and netting in bouquets.

### Tips for selecting gifts for attendants

Attendants and ushers do a lot for you before and during the wedding. They help run errands, coordinate parties and offer much-needed support.

It is nice to thank them with a keepsake.

Shop for gifts for attendants and ushers when you are registering.

The maid or matron of honor and the best man usually get something a little more extravagant to recognize the special duties and support they give.

The bride should give all the bridesmaids identical gifts and the groom should do the same for ushers. Engraving is nice touch (make sure to allow enough time for this.)

GIFTS TRADITIONALLY are given at the rehearsal dinner.

Some ideas for bridesmaids' gifts culled from "The Tiffany Wedding" (Doubleday) include silver or gold ear-

rings or pins, a silver powder compact or picture frame, a cut-crystal powder box or perfume atomizer and hand-painted porcelain box.

Other ideas include heart-shaped key rings and bookmarks.

The groom might give his usher cuff links, a tie bar, belt buckle or money clip. Other favorites include an elegant pocket flask, a paperweight, pens, silver bar knives or a decanter.

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
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
