finance reform needed

Education reforms vital: legislator

Redistributing the wealth among school districts, raising taxes and assigning more of the state's budget to education will help improve all Michigan schools.

That was the message Friday from state Rep. Paul Hillegonds, R-Holland, minority leader and guest speaker at a joint luncheon of the Plymouth Rotary and Plymouth Community Chamber of Commerce.

BUT DR. JOHN HOBEN, Plymouth-Community School superintendent, isn't holding his breath for state legislators to come up with answers for

the local district's budget problems.

"I didn't hear any solutions," he said. "I'm hearing the same rhetoric."

After a moment, Hoben added: "He gave a pretty candid summary of what's going on. There's nothing definite coming out of Lansing."

With that in mind, the Plymouth-Canton school board decided last week to ask voters in the June election to approve an 8 mill tax renewal and a 4 mill increase.

The district expects to lose \$3.3 million in state aid next year and it won't be able to collect an additional \$7.6 million due to the Headlee Amendment, which requires a rollback in the tax rate to offset increases in property values above the inflation rate. The district needs \$3.3 to keep the

same educational program it has in place.

"I see our programs as deteriorating because we are not going to have the monies to maintain the level of service," Hoben said.

The Plymouth-Canton schools are facing a double-edged sword: The effects of the Headlee rollback and a drop in state aid when the district goes out of formula this year.

A district goes out of formula mostly based on higher property values.

"They (Plymouth-Canton school district) would be OK going out of formula if Headlee wasn't there," said state Rep. Gerald Law, R-Plymouth, who also attended the luncheon.

Author, book creating heat for area stores

Canton and Plymouth bookstores are feeling the heat from "The Satanic Verses," a controversial book that takes a satirical look at the Muslim culture.

Little Professors on the Park in Plymouth had the \$19.95 hard cover on the shelves for more than a month with barely a nibble of interest.

All that changed last week when author Salman Rushdie was placed under guard by British authorities after Iranian clerics put a bounty of up to \$2.6 million on him.

THE MAIN Street bookstore sold out of Rushdie's book and was having a hard time reordering.

"We had two copies sitting around here for 1 1/2 months," said Joanne Hickson, a Little Professors clerk. Employees at the store fielded more than dozen calls from readers searching for copies.

"Every book distributor is out of it," she said Friday.

About two miles away at Metro News Center Joan Bolling, assistant manager, put the copy they had left in the back room.

They were following the lead taken by Waldenbooks, the nation's largest bookseller, which ordered removal of Rushdie's latest novel from shelves. Waldenbooks had given employees the option of selling the book from the stockrooms.

"It's a ridiculous book. It's barely readable for the average person," said Bolling, who said she's not con-

cerned about her own safety in the backlash and other threats linked to the book.

"Maybe in another community there would be more concern," said Bolling explaining that bookstores with a larger Muslim community might see more protest.

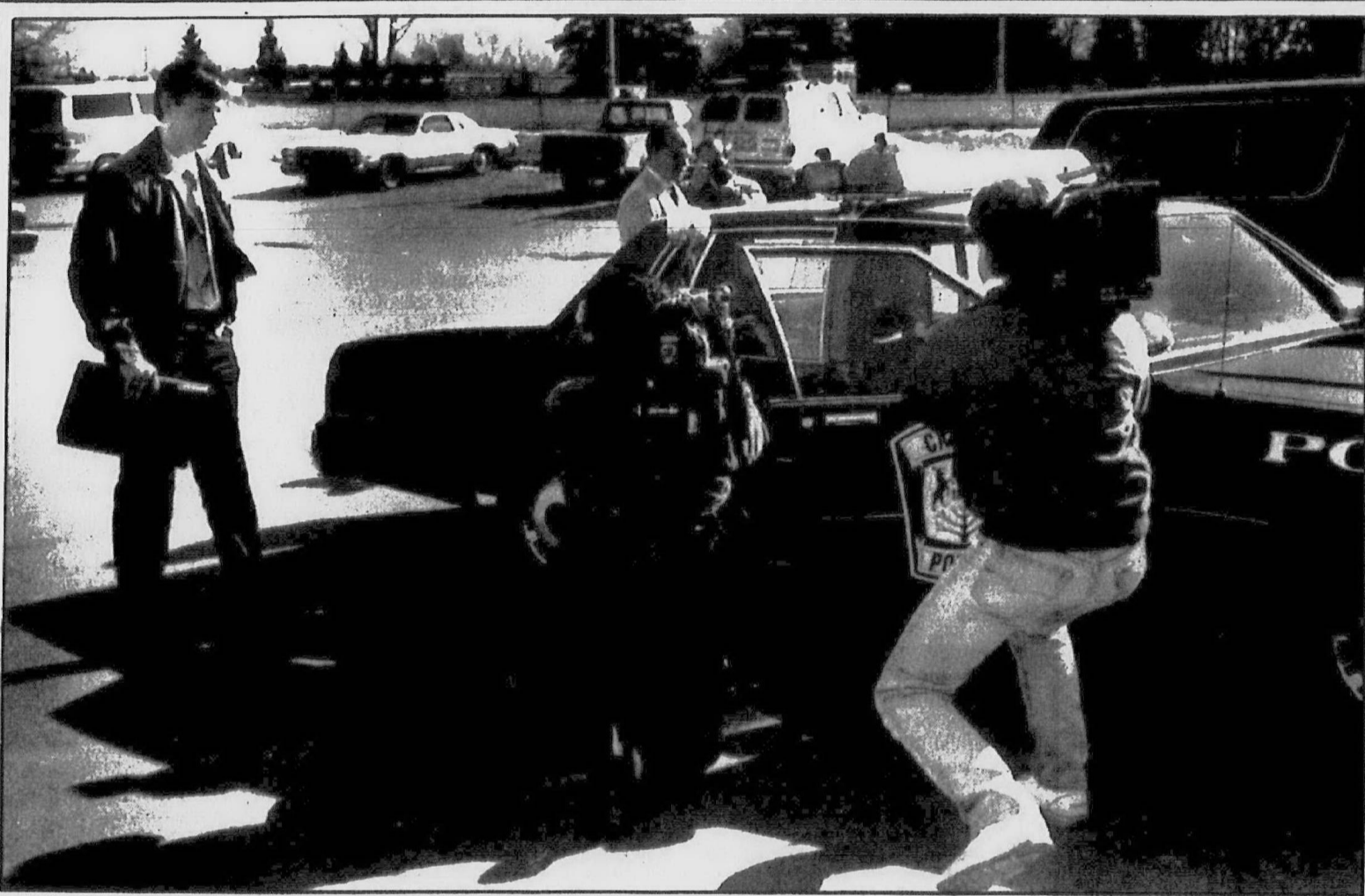
BY FRIDAY morning the Morton Taylor and Joy bookstore in Canton hadn't received calls from people interested in finding "The Satanic Verses." They ordered three copies last month and one copy remained unsold Friday morning. The two copies sold in the last couple of weeks after the assassination threat.

"It's a tempest in a teapot," Bolling said. "And it will all die down."

Store manager, Mary Fraser agreed, but added: "There's just so many weirdos out there you just never know."

"The Satanic Verses" was deemed blasphemous by the Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, Iran's Muslim leader.

Scholars who have studied the book — the third in a trilogy — have reportedly said they feared the assassination attempt would be taken seriously by Muslim zealots.

Owner, Farmer Jack at odds over space

A 18,855-square-foot building with plenty of good parking in the heart of downtown Plymouth continues to remain vacant 11 weeks after Borman Inc. abruptly and unexpectedly closed its Farmer Jack store there Dec. 3.

Borman, the object of a takeover by A&P, has lease options on the Plymouth store for upward of nine more years.

Borman is trying to sublease the

property, which, according to its lease, must be used primarily as a food store.

Meanwhile, Stanley Dixon Jr., owner of the parcel, and a Grosse Pointe lawyer, is trying without much success to buy out Borman's lease options and market the property himself to a wider range of potential tenants.

GILBERT BORMAN, spokesman for Borman, said the company's real estate arm has been somewhat distracted recently by the impending

marriage to A&P.

Borman said he expects the store to be occupied "soon" but declined to elaborate.

"I think a month is probably too optimistic," Dixon said. "I would be very surprised if it went (vacant) four or five months."

Taxes on the property are up to date, said Ken Way, city treasurer.

While Dixon still collects his monthly rent from Borman, he's not happy with the vacancy.

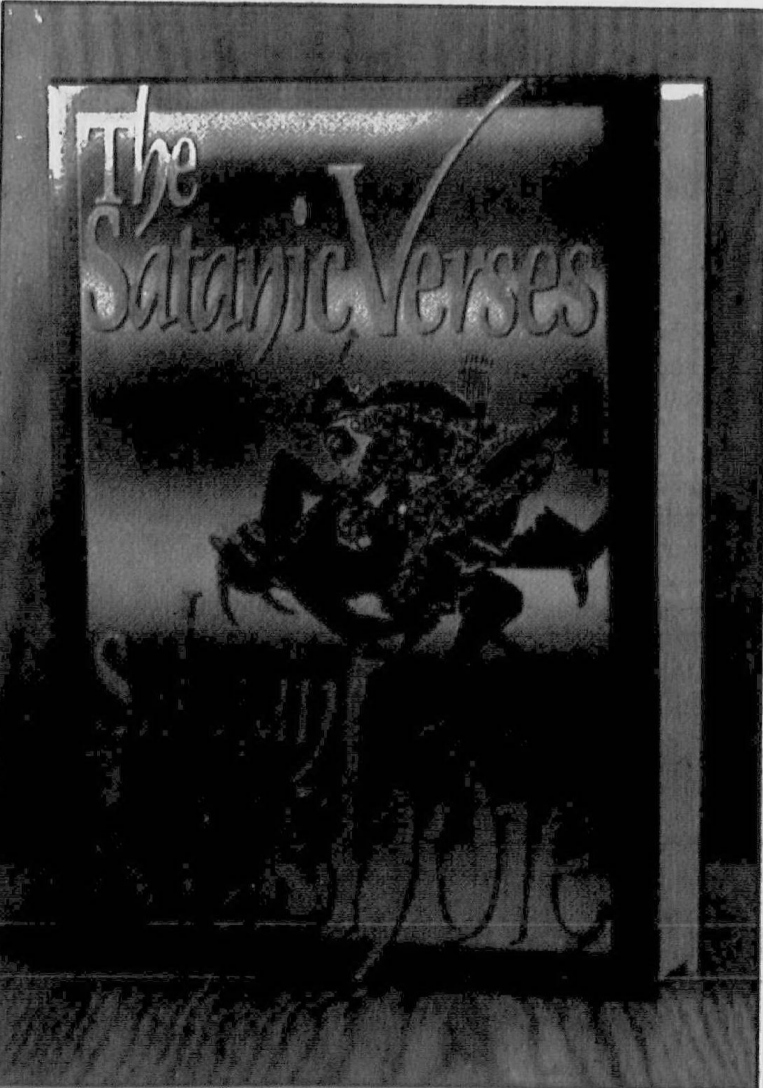
"In my opinion, a vacant building wastes more quickly than when

they're used," he said.

A long-term vacancy at such a large and visible property as the Farmer Jack store can impact a community psychologically if not economically.

"I THINK no one likes to see a vacant storefront, particularly if it was left vacant for long," said Mary Roehr, executive director of the Plymouth Community Chamber of Commerce.

Reprieve to extend noise, odor debate

Howmet Corp., a manufacturer of jet engine parts on Ann Arbor Road, and residential neighbors to the east in the Arbor Village Subdivision will take another month to try to settle their differences.

Points of contention — noise and odors.

Township officials had earlier directed Howmet to respond to complaints and develop an action plan by last Wednesday.

Howmet, however, requested more time and township officials agreed.

James Anulewicz, township planning director, said he wants all cards to be placed on the table before the matter goes back to the township

board March 28.

"The idea is to get from both sides, especially residents, what concerns are," Anulewicz said. "Howmet has requested additional time to come back with programs."

"I want residents' concerns, Howmet's response to that and an implementation plan," Anulewicz said. "We'll take those two and compare. Where there's lack of interest, we'll try to resolve those."

Howmet's plant was built after the subdivision.

Arbor Village Subdivision residents have periodically complained about noise and odors from the plant over the years.

Roehr said she doesn't believe Dixon's property will remain vacant for long.

Neither does Pat Pulikowik, a commercial Realtor, who said she has talked with Dixon and Borman about the property.

Borman's lease buyout offer now on the table was described by Dixon as "outrageously high. That's the tough nut now," he said. "They're extremely tough negotiators."

NEITHER DIXON nor Borman would comment further about their lease arrangement or negotiations.

Dixon said he bought the property several years ago as a long-term investment.

"I'm only 36 years old," he said. "In 10 years, I believe the property will be worth a lot of money."

Pulikowik raves about the property's value now.

"It's a gem," she said. "There's a lot of senior citizens and people who walk to that store."

THE DISTRICT budget dilemma is hard to explain to residents, Law said, because taxpayers are paying more for higher property values and still facing a budget crunch in the district.

But the Headlee Amendment maintains the district won't see all of the extra revenue unless voters give the go ahead.

The kicker comes in, Law said, when the district is no longer eligible for some state aid because of the rollback in millage due to Headlee.

"Taxes are up and revenues to the district are down," he said.

The state currently allocates 7.4 percent of its budget for schools. "We need to put more money to the educational system. Job security de-

pends more on education and less on seniority. Educational reform is our children."

The focus of concern should be on the classroom, said Hillegonds.

Dave Artley, school board president, applauded Hillegonds for recognizing "the priorities . . . and seeing education and finance reform as a real priority. He's speaking for a lot of people."

District honors resident for service to education

The Wayne-Westland school board and district officials recently paid tribute to Norman O. Stockmeyer, 81, of Plymouth for his 42 years of work on behalf of education in the district and throughout Michigan.

Stockmeyer, who lived in Westland for 50 years, retired in December from the state Board of Education.

The district presented Stockmeyer, 81, with a plaque commemorating his years of service.

"On behalf of the millions of students you have made a difference to, we offer our appreciation," Dennis O'Neill, district superintendent, told Stockmeyer.

The longtime school board member pledged continued involvement in the public education process.

STOCKMEYER was appointed to the state board in 1975 by then Gov. William Milliken.

He won election to an eight-year term in 1980 and served as treasurer in 1981-82 and board president in 1985-86.

A real estate investor, Stockmeyer

began his involvement with education policy on a local level, serving with the Wayne Community Board of Education (which included schools in Nankin Township) from 1946-61.

In 1961, he was elected to the board of the Wayne County Intermediate School District, where he served until his 1975 appointment to the state board.

Stockmeyer earned his bachelor's degree from Wayne State University and a master's degree in business at Harvard University.

He was appointed to the WSU Board of Governors in 1964 by then Gov. George Romney and was elected to an eight-year term on that board in 1966. He served as chairman of the WSU board from 1967-71.

Stockmeyer was also a longtime member of the Detroit Institute of Technology, a private business and technology school.

He has served on the Michigan Higher Education Assistance Authority and was a regional chairman for the White House Conference on Education.

Ski Club members get a lift

Who needs Aspen or the Alps when Mt. Brighton is just a bus ride away? Certainly not the Plymouth-Canton Ski Club.

Every Friday and Saturday night, weather permitting, 225 to 250 Plymouth-Canton skiers — five or six busloads — hit the slopes at a Livingston County ski area.

The 1,100-member club is the largest one that skis Mt. Brighton.

On a recent Saturday, more than 200 students from Plymouth-Canton middle schools and high schools enjoyed an evening of skiing and socializing with their school pals.

Mike Wesner, an eighth-grader at West Middle School, reported that the snow was "pretty good — better than usual."

Audrey Wicke, a seventh-grader at Central Middle School, was skiing for the 10th time this season. Because her friends didn't feel like tackling the more challenging hills, she was skiing — without poles — by herself.

"I love skiing. It's a fun sport. I like to jump on the moguls," said Wicke, a veteran skier undaunted by even the steepest slopes.

Skiers board buses at Plymouth-Salem High School at 4:30 or 5 p.m. Fridays and Saturdays, and buy their tickets enroute. For the bargain price of \$10, they receive an all-area lift ticket and a lesson.

Paul Sincock, assistant to the city manager of Plymouth, coordinates the program. Sincock joined the ski club as a student 17 years ago.

Taking a break between runs, Sincock said, "it's very rare" kids get into trouble. "Last night a kid brought a fifth (of liquor) with him. Before he got it opened, we had it."

"Whenever we have trouble, we always contact the parents, and the kids know that. They cooperate," said Sincock.

Sincock receives help from fellow coordinator Bill Heath, a 22-year member of the club, and chaperones Scott Van Der Roest, a 1985 Salem graduate, and Randy Pflugh, also a 1985 Salem graduate.

"This year really hasn't been that good as far as attendance," said Van Der Roest. "In past years, it's been better. We've had as many as 700 kids a night."

Librarian views volcano

Not everyone gets to see an active volcano close up, much less the birth of one. But Alicia Lesko did last month.

Lesko of Plymouth, the young-adult librarian for Livonia's Alfred Noble Library, was visiting her family in Chile when the Lonquimay volcano decided to erupt.

The volcano had been dormant for 100 years when it started to erupt on Dec. 24, Lesko said. And it not only erupted but formed a new crater, down the side of the mountain from its snow-capped, original crater. It was named, suitably, the Navidad ("Christmas" in Spanish) crater.

"We'd seen the volcano smoking from far away," Lesko recalled from her childhood in Temuco, three hours away from the volcano. "But it was never this close."

She and her brother, Patricio Palma, photographer for the Chilean newspaper, El Diario Austral, got within 400 meters of the eruption.

"Everybody wore caps," she said, bringing out photos of the scene.

ONE PHOTOGRAPH showed fiery sparks and smoke billowing from the new crater. It looked like the Detroit Freedom Festival fireworks.

"Those sparks," she said, indicating the red-hot cinders, "would cool before they hit the ground, so they didn't burn when they fell on you."

She brought several of the black, porous chunks back to show her children.

"I didn't see the lava — it flowed back behind the crater."

"Most of the smoke and gasses went toward Argentina," over the Andes and east of Chile's long coastal strip.

Earthquakes and tremors are a way of life to the people of Chile, Lesko said. Chile had had a quake that day that she believes registered a 4.5 on the Richter scale, she said.

"It was enough to scare them but not enough to worry them."

NEVERTHELESS, HER brother's pictures of people packing up and moving from the area made the front pages of papers across South America.

It was a show that drew global interest.

"There's only one phone in the closest village (Malalcahuello)," she said, and they were getting calls from around the world, her family in Plymouth included.

"The president flew in on a helicopter and posed for a picture, then left again."

Tourists from Germany, Israel and Sweden bused or backpacked in. Camera crews from Hollywood were there to record the event.

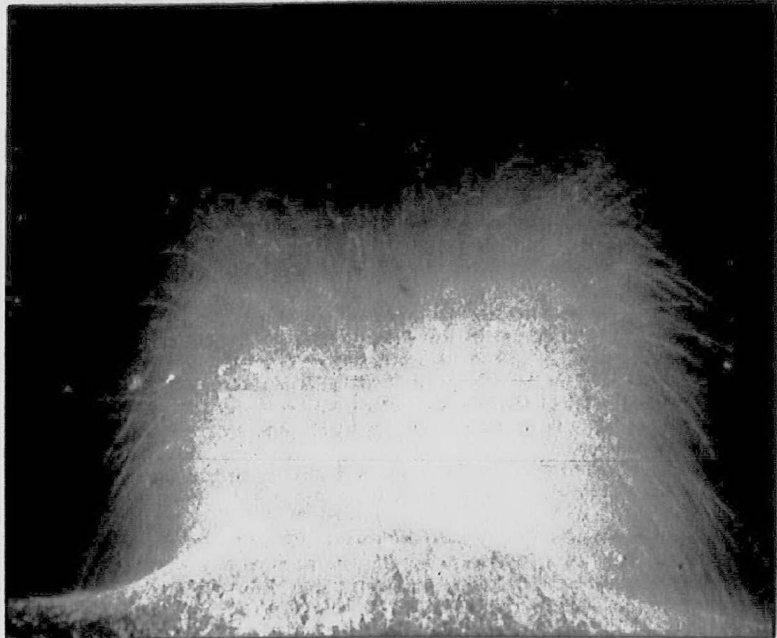
Lesko came to Michigan from Chile 22 years ago, when she married a Peace Corps volunteer she'd met at the University of Concepcion.

While she doesn't miss the tremors and earthquakes, ("They say that Chile will fall into the ocean some day, like California," she said) the Michigan winters make up for them.

"In Chile the weather varies with the location," because Chile is located between two mountain ranges — "there are all kinds of weather." But none of it as severe as a Michigan winter, she said.

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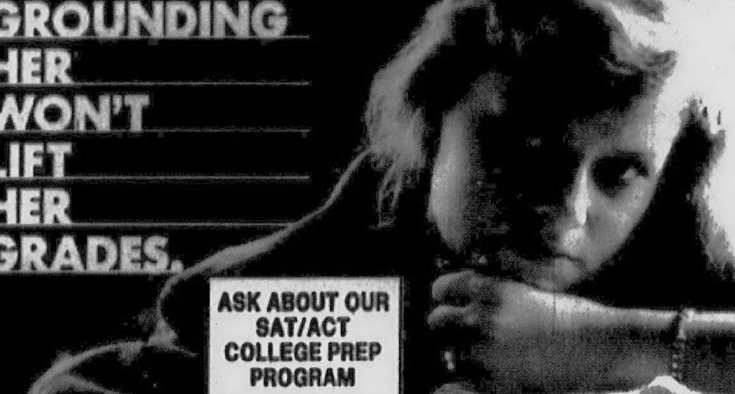

U presidents: Inflation-plus bucks needed

Despite the public's anti-tax sentiment, state university presidents say Lansing needs to hike their appropriations 3-3.5 percent faster than the level of inflation.

Their goal is to restore universities' losses of the 1979-83 recession. "We're fairly pleased with the priority Gov. Blanchard gave higher education in his proposed 1990 budget," said Joseph E. Champagne, president of Oakland University.

"There were rumors we might get a negative appropriation. Many of us made budget cuts in preparation.

"But he proposed an increase of 4.8 percent — a little over 3 percent for operations and 1.8 for capital."

CHAMPAGNE WAS interviewed after presiding last week at the Economic Club of Detroit's annual panel of three university presidents.

Everyone's theme was the same: Michigan needs to increase its "investment" in state universities not just at the rate of inflation, but several percentage points higher.

"The Presidents Council proposed that, to achieve a rating of 15th in the nation (in terms of state appropriations per student), it would take inflation plus 3.5 percent more a year for five years," Champagne said. "It would start this year with 5.5 percent and then inflation plus 3.5 percent in the future.

"We're quite pleased he came out at 4.8 percent for the first year. He couldn't give all of it, but he certainly seemed to respond."

AREND LUBBERS, for 20 years president of Grand Valley State University, told the business audience that the buying power of universities is actually down 4.5 percent in the last decade.

"Currently we rank 31st among

the states in appropriations for public universities as a percent of tax revenue.

"And we rank 26th per student enrolled in public institutions of higher education.

"This is not where Michigan used to be," said Lubbers, who announced the goal of raising Michigan to 15th in five years.

ONE AUDIENCE questioner challenged the notion that university costs had to rise faster than the rate of consumer price inflation.

But University of Michigan presi-

dent James Duderstadt said, "I do not believe costs are out of line." He said higher education costs have increased at the same rate as personal income in the United States — a rate that would include consumer price inflation plus improved productivity.

Michigan State University President John DiBiaggio added, "There was a time when class assignments were heavier."

But he said universities ask more of faculty today — research . . . public service . . . knowledge has exploded. The average faculty mem-

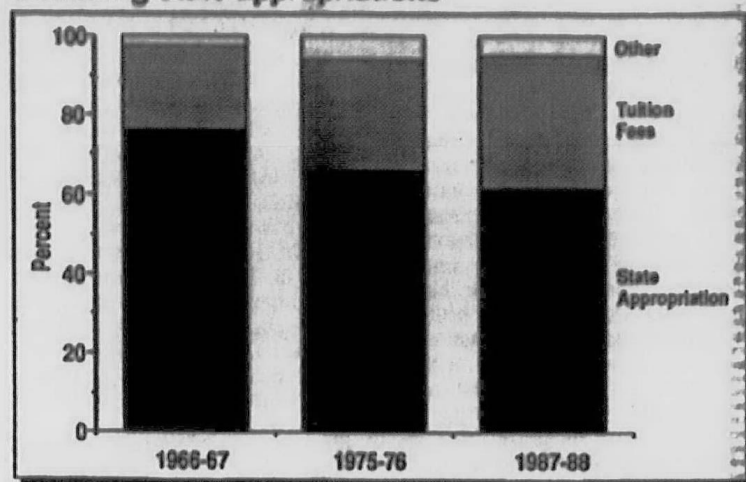
ber puts in 55-60 hours a week in teaching, preparation, grading papers, public service and research."

DUDERSTADT HIT hardest at public attitudes, saying the enemy is "in the mirror."

"Who's to blame? . . . Our own personal priorities. . . not our elected public officials," he said, citing their "Herculean efforts" to be the "education governor, the education party or the education president."

But the former engineering professor who has been at U-M's helm since mid-1988 said public officials

face "formidable constraints: the voters' desire for less crime, more prisons, no cuts in national defense, no cuts in welfare and no more taxes.

"Numerous studies, commissioned by state government and people throughout the state, have suggested that Michigan is seriously underinvesting in its knowledge infrastructure by as much as 30-40 percent relative to other states," Duderstadt said.

But the U-M chief finds the public "paralyzed" in coming to grips with school finance reform.

DIBIAGGIO, a former dentist who has been at MSU's helm since 1985, said business needs to appreciate "the pursuit of science, not just the pursuit of technology."

He quoted former MSU President Walter Adams, an economist, as finding that one effect of a corporate leveraged buyout is that "research and development budgets soon get cut.

"That can be the policy of a given corporation needing instant infusion of technology, but it must not be public science policy."

WSU's Adamany: state budget good

Wayne State University president David Adamany said budget proposals of Gov. James Blanchard will strengthen research and improve Michigan's universities.

"Gov. Blanchard's 1990 budget once again gives a high priority to

higher education, and it will help Michigan to maintain one of the leading university systems in America.

"Some tuition increase will be required by all of our universities next year, but the governor's overall

budget proposal will help avoid tuition increases that are excessive," Adamany said.

He said special provisions in the budget would help research programs and campus physical facilities.

"All universities welcome Gov. Blanchard's increase from \$16 million to \$21 million to help renew classrooms, laboratories and libraries that are seriously deteriorating on many campuses throughout our state."

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I want to bring to your attention a new drug for arthritis: sulfasalazine.
This medication was developed in the 1930's as a medication to deal with chronic inflammation of the intestine, Crohns Disease. As the drug included a form of salicylate, several investigators speculated that the medication could help individuals with rheumatoid arthritis, just as aspirin, acetylsalicylic acid.
Use of sulfasalazine in the treatment of rheumatoid arthritis began in the 1940's. Between the events of W.W. II and the post war evaluations of gold therapy, penicillamine, cytoxan and methotrexate, physicians overlooked the work on sulfasalazine.
When these other compounds proved to be of limited long term value, rheumatologists renewed their interest in sulfasalazine.
The drug has toxicities similar to its predecessors: lowering the white count, a possible dangerous drop in platelets, and intestinal irritation leading to nausea and loss of appetite.
Like the other new drugs for arthritis, sulfasalazine is possibly helpful to some people and potentially dangerous to others: the outcome depends on whether the drug's efficacy outweighs its toxicity.

Other countries have right idea

I have a European background, and before teaching at the college level, I spent a few years working at junior and senior high schools. Now, that everybody pretty much agrees on the sorry mess our public education is in (except for the departments of education of our great universities who are responsible for it in the first place), let me draw a Utopian picture about which my colleagues could dream while correcting awful papers of their youngsters.

In Utopia, after elementary school the professionals, the teachers, decided whether a student has the ability to go for academic laurels or should move on to more practical endeavors. The pros tell them and there is no need for constant counseling. Saves money. Less millage. You don't have students of widely diverse interests and ability in the same schools and classrooms, hampering each other in their progress.

In the different schools, the original classes stay together for many years because they all have the same curriculum. During the school day, the students stay in the same rooms and the teachers come to them from their offices except for lab courses etc. Imagine, no migration between classes. Less littering, socializing, fighting, knife and shooting. Empty hallways! What a dream. And the students don't have to carry around their stuff like mules. There are fewer administrators and more teachers who can keep their individual kind of discipline in their classes without meddling from enlightened principals. Less money needed.

After the required number of years, the students take comprehensive written and oral exams, and

whoever passes them is ready to go on to higher education or to the job market, which eliminates those controversial entrance exams. During the years spent in school, there is a constant lateral movement. The ones who can't make it in the more academic fields cross over to the practical section, and whoever shows the ability moves the other way.

Sounds simple and effective? It is no Utopia. It's the way most of the other countries in the world do it. As for the results? According to our news media, their students regularly beat the heck out of ours in academic competition. What are we going to do about it?

Gun issue addressed

In response to your column of Jan. 19, 1989 entitled "New super weapons endanger innocents."

Contrary to your editorial, 9mm sidearms are no more "lethal" than the six shot .38- and .357-caliber revolvers carried by most police officers today. They simply have a larger ammunition capacity.

Police officers today face a criminal element that is increasingly well-armed and willing to use violence to prevent arrest. We now see criminals wearing body armor and working in teams armed with large capacity semiautomatic handguns, Uzis, M-16s and other various fully automatic assault rifles. To expect an officer to defend him or herself and the public against such odds with a six-shot revolver is unreasonable and reflects outmoded thinking.

The firing of weapons and the use of deadly force by police officers is strictly regulated by state law, court decisions and department rules, regulations, policies and procedures. Our training stresses accuracy and disciplined use of weapons. Our officers are acutely aware that they are legally responsible for every round fired.

This department has issued the Sig-Saur 9mm semiautomatic since April 1988 and is satisfied that our officers are properly equipped and trained and additionally, the qualification scores of our officers have risen with these new weapons. Incidentally, these weapons were purchased with Narcotic Forfeiture Funds at no expense to our taxpayers.

I was outraged by the editorial cartoon which appeared in your paper on Jan. 26, 1989. It depicted a police officer with the face of a skull armed with two large assault rifles and wearing a bandoleer of ammunition. This was tasteless and a very poor representation of police officers.

I understand that the city of Livonia has decided to issue 9mm semiautomatics to the men and women of their police department and I applaud that decision.

Anti-drug lessons should add values

ONCE UPON a time, a little boy who lived in the suburbs grew to young adulthood, and made some big decisions about life without help from his school counselor.

Frank Wolsky learned to be self-sufficient, to make good money, to appreciate the finer things in life. He was clean-cut, didn't use drugs and was known as a "nice guy" around school.

But Frank Wolsky's tale does not have a happy ending.

He's no longer in school, and his choice of career has upset his mother, school officials and some of his classmates.

In his mid-teens, Wolsky had already learned one of the most profitable businesses around — peddling drugs.

The youth, who lives in a suburb of Portland, Ore., was living the high life without doing drugs himself, but making his profit from those who were addicted. He was paying cash for fast cars, carried thousands of dollars in his gym bag and wore expensive watches. He did business from his apartment in a trendy section of the city, and was well-established at 18, when police finally caught up to him.

HIS MOTHER, a probation officer for the state of Oregon, turned her son in at 16 when she believed he was beginning to deal drugs. His case never went to trial.

What kind of messages are young people today getting, when it is more profitable to turn to illegal careers than legal ones? Young people involved in peddling drugs may not live long lives, but many don't seem to care because they make big money.

Students in Frank Wolsky's school knew he was dealing. The school's principal hopes his arrest will help deter similar entrepreneurial pursuits, but is skeptical.

"Unfortunately, the only message they may get is, 'Don't be quite so flamboyant with your proceeds,'" he said.

We can talk and talk about the evils of drugs and the dangerous life associated with them. The current push for "Say No to Drugs" education is good, and will deter some from taking drugs and thus avoiding problems. Efforts like those recently seen at some Farmington middle schools are admirable, and have received much community support.

That may deter the demand for illegal drugs.

BUT WHAT about the demand for money and power, and the competition among young people to have the best of everything?

There's another, underlying, message going out to young people like Frank Wolsky. That selling drugs is still the most profitable career a young person can choose today, when it comes to making money. He was smart enough not to take drugs, but has now ruined his life and others by making a business of them.

We need to take our drug education one step further.

Part of the lesson plan should include judging our values.

"Profit" is not necessarily measured in money, and the bottom line is not the quality and quantity of your possessions, but the quality of your life.

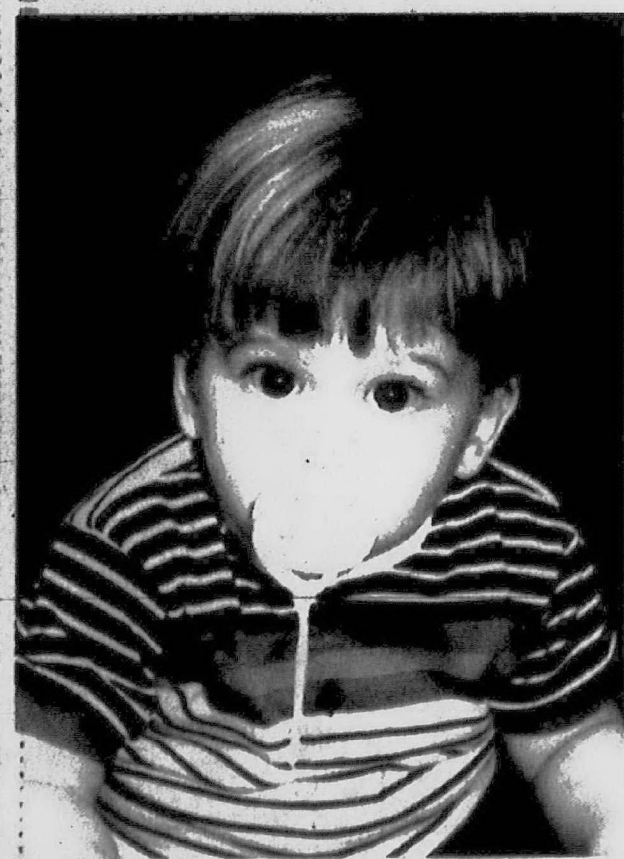

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Jail control not primary issue for area police

Area police say they don't care who runs the Wayne County Jail as long as there is enough jail space for the criminals they catch.

Within one month, the jail could be under new management. Wayne County Executive Edward McNamara was appointed jail receiver Thursday. McNamara will assume control of the jail March 16, unless an appeal by Sheriff Robert Ficano is upheld.

Wrangling over jail control, however, doesn't bother area police as much as lack of space at the county facility.

McNamara was appointed jail receiver in a ruling announced Thursday afternoon by Chief Wayne County Circuit Judge Richard Kaufman. In the 92-page ruling, Kaufman said McNamara's appointment would be the final step toward bringing the jail in compliance with provisions of a 1971 lawsuit filed by county inmates. (For details on the issue's long history, see related story.)

According to the judge, McNamara was chosen because he was familiar with the jail and already held review power over Ficano's jail budget.

"The appointment of Mr. McNamara... will merge most of the fiscal and operational control of the jail," Kaufman wrote.

Because of those circumstances, Kaufman wrote, McNamara appeared more likely to force rapid improvements than would previously-appointed jail monitor Vincent Nathan. Nathan, a Toledo-based jail management expert, was the only other candidate considered for the post.

Though designed to answer why a monitor was appointed and why McNamara was chosen monitor, the Kaufman's ruling also heavily criticized Ficano.

"The sheriff's mismanagement or

Canton Public Safety Director John Santomauro said area police chiefs were more concerned with jail space than who was operating the jail.

Relations between Kaufman and Ficano were strained even before Thursday's ruling. The sheriff sought to have Kaufman and all other county judges removed from the case last year. At the time, he alleged comments Kaufman made in chambers showed the judge had decided to appoint a monitor without fully hearing evidence in the long-running court battle. The state appeals court subsequently denied that motion.

Kaufman later held Ficano in contempt, charging the sheriff was deliberately withholding information from court-appointed monitor Nathan. The judge, however, later withdrew the contempt citation. Ficano said its withdrawal proved his department had been fully cooperating with the jail monitor.

Ficano seeks an immediate stay of execution from the appeals court, blocking McNamara's appointment as receiver. "We want them to stop this action, then take time to review the case," he said.

In contrast, Kaufman and McNamara have enjoyed a more cordial relationship. Both men made a joint appearance at Observer Newspapers offices in Livonia last summer to drum up support for the county's new 1-mill jail tax. Voters approved the jail tax during the August primary.

The county is now in the process of building a new jail. Ficano said he was unsure whether Thursday's ruling would eliminate him from the jail-building process.

"We don't know what that effect would be," he said.

lack of management, has prevented substantial compliance," Kaufman wrote.

"The sheriff has chosen what he considers to be good politics over good government," Kaufman continued. "The result has been substantial and continuous mismanagement of the jail."

The judge declined to take reporters' questions on the ruling.

A visibly angry Ficano promised he would "immediately" appeal the ruling.

"There is no mismanagement at the jail. He (Kaufman) has never set foot inside the jail," the sheriff said, addressing reporters inside the jail's

exercise room. "There is no precedent for this ruling."

Ficano pointed to new exercise equipment as one sign jail conditions had improved. The sheriff, who has led reporters on tours of the jail, also cited elimination of triple-bunking and new stainless steel toilet facilities as evidence inmates were receiving more humane treatment.

Other changes, the sheriff said, include a declining inmate suicide rate and improved mental health coun-

seling.

The judge, however, said both the old and new county jail buildings were "plagued by inadequate maintenance and poor sanitation". In addition, he said the old jail was poorly lighted and featured inadequate heat, ventilation and plumbing and was infested with cockroaches.

Mental health care continues to be inadequate, Kaufman ruled, with inmates requiring psychiatric counseling frequently locked in their cells

round the clock and denied visits from family members.

Kaufman also found fault with standard medical care provided inmates, as well as a far-reaching number of other items ranging from laundering of inmate uniforms and bedding to deficiencies in the way inmates are assigned to certain sections of the jail.

KEEPING PRISONERS IN JAIL. Wayne County is building a new jail to stop the premature release of 2,000 prisoners a year.

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Jail dispute weaves long history

The Wayne County Jail controversy weaved a long, troubled path through the county court system and is expected to now move on to the Michigan Court of Appeals.

The crux of the matter: the county court believes improvements ordered as far back as 1971 still haven't been made.

Chief Wayne County Circuit Judge Tilchard Kaufman included a history of the long-running controversy in Thursday's opinion on the jail. Here are the highlights:

- January 1971 — A class action suit was filed on behalf of six Wayne County Jail inmates alleging their civil rights were violated due to crowded and unsanitary conditions as well as inadequate medical care and absence of protection from attacks by fellow inmates.
- May 1971 — A three-judge panel ruled in favor of inmates and ordered the county to adopt a correction plan within 30 days.
- Aug. 4, 1971 — The Wayne

County Circuit Court appointed a jail monitor to supervise changes. Wayne County Commission, then the chief agency responsible for the jail budget, challenged its loss of control, but the original ruling was ultimately upheld by the Michigan Supreme Court in 1974.

• 1975-76 — Hearings on jail's suicide prevention plans concluded deputies lacked proper training and the jail lacked adequate mental health care staff and programs. The court blocked commissioners' attempt to eliminate 20 jail workers, including three directly related to providing remedies for past problems. Sheriff William Lucas was found in civil contempt as inadequate health care and personal hygiene among prisoners continued to be found at the jail.

• 1980 — Wayne County adopted a new charter, calling for an elected county CEO. Among the executive's duties: reviewing the jail budget.

• 1983 — Robert Ficano was ap-

pointed sheriff, elected one year later and re-elected in 1988.

• 1985 — The county opened a new jail in downtown Detroit in an attempt to ease overcrowding but Oct. 13, inmates filed another motion alleging jail abuses were continuing. Nov. 7, now-County Executive William Lucas claimed in a court filing the problems are caused by mismanagement on the part of his successor — Ficano.

• 1986 — Edward McNamara was elected Wayne County's second executive, replacing Lucas.

• April 9, 1987 — By now, the lawsuit had passed to Kaufman. He became the seventh county judge to hear the case. Kaufman issued a "final judgment" on jail, appointing Toledo-based jail expert Vincent Nathan jail monitor — over McNamara's objection.

• July 10, 1987 — In a preliminary report, Nathan found prisoners lacking adequate recreation. Weight machines, video games were subse-

quently provided.

• Oct. 5, 1987 — Kaufman issued remedial orders for the jail.

• Feb. 16, 1988 — Contempt charges were sought against both McNamara and Ficano by inmates who alleged they weren't moving to implement court-ordered remedies. The issue was subsequently resolved when all parties agreed to a timetable for improvements.

• March 1988 — Nathan's final report on jail found "widespread non-compliance" with Kaufman's April 1987 final judgment.

• Aug. 16, 1988 — Arguing he could do a better job than Ficano, McNamara filed to be appointed jail administrator.

• Sept. 1, 1988 — Inmates filed for a receiver. McNamara withdrew his motion 12 days later.

• Feb. 16, 1989 — Kaufman ruled in favor of inmates and appointed McNamara jail receiver. Ficano immediately announced he would appeal the ruling.

Seats available on S'craft board

There is no filing fee. Schoolcraft board positions are unpaid.

Petitions must be returned to the secretary of the Schoolcraft Community College District, 18600 Haggerty Road, Room A-190, Livonia, by 4 p.m. Tuesday, April 25.

Sheriff vows appeal on jail's loss

As receiver, McNamara will assume control for all jail operations, supervise all jail staff and exercise all other jail duties currently carried

out by the sheriff.

McNamara will receive one year to bring jail into compliance. He must provide Kaufman with quarterly progress reports.

The move doesn't eliminate the need for a sheriff, Kaufman ruled.

"The appointment of a receiver would not 'remove' the sheriff from office (because) the jail is not the sheriff's sole function," the judge said.

In March 1990, Kaufman will review inmate conditions at the existing jail. At that time, he could return the jail system to Ficano's jurisdiction, retain McNamara as receiver

or appoint another receiver.

Charging Ficano wasn't doing enough to improve jail conditions, attorneys representing jail inmates filed for a receiver on Sept. 1. McNamara had earlier filed to be appointed jail administrator but withdrew after the inmates' motion.

The executive continues to seek a county corrections department, assigned to his office, to operate the county jail system.

A. On the morning of the taping, they are picked up at the Omni International Hotel by a VIP limousine. This is used for their travels throughout the day, including a visit to The Whitney restaurant for a special luncheon.

Q. How does the Lottery contact winners to give them instructions for being on the show?

A. Soon after the drawing, a Lottery representative calls the number printed on the entry until contact is made. An Express Mail package containing full details also is mailed on Friday evening to each new contestant.

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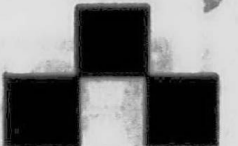
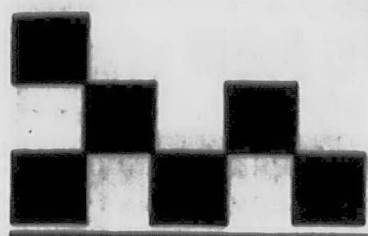
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Already, he dotes on oats

Pick up just about any journal of medicine or health-style magazine nowadays and you will undoubtedly notice much is being touted about the benefit of oats.

New cereals are "sprouting" (excuse the pun) weekly on supermarket shelves, telling the consumers these are toasted, crackled, puffed, flaked, and all really taste great.

Give me a break.
Oats are oats (and dosie doats...)

There isn't much out there, barring the use of tons of sugar, honey and assorted nuts that will make me respect oats anymore.

As far as I'm concerned, oats as in oatmeal is one of those breakfasts you eat on a sub-zero morning when you finally realize you promised to take the kids tobogganing. In all fairness, I must admit that I use oats in other circumstances that really taste good. It's what I mix with them that makes them taste so good.

SUCH AS MY recipe for Corny Banana Oat Muffins. Include in that list meatloaf. (I love meatloaf, especially cold on a sandwich, and when you raid the fridge at 2 a.m. for a sandwich, isn't it great knowing you're eating something healthy?)

In 1980, more than three billion bushels of oats were produced in the world. That's a lot of oats. Oats belong to the grass family. They have a fibrous root and stalk that can grow from two to five feet. At the top of the stalk, there's something called a panicle which contains about 10 to 75 little things called groats (oat kernels).

Interestingly enough, almost 50 percent of the worldwide oat crop is used not for grain but for straw and/or pasture. Now if life wasn't confusing enough, were you aware there are more than six different types of oats? There are common oats, common wild oats, cultivated red oats, large naked oats (hullless), side oats and wild red oats. Remember this at your next trivia convention. Like wheat, common oats (those most produced in North America) are broadly classified into spring and winter types.

The oat kernel itself has a very fibrous hull, which is inedible to humans. The goal in milling oats is to remove the outer hull and any extraneous matter that might affect the flavor in processing. First, when milling, the oat kernels are cleaned, then they are dried and roasted. This process develops flavor, improves quality and facilitates the separation of the hull from the groat.

After roasting, they are cooled before the hulling procedure begins. The hulling machine separates the groat kernel from the hull. The groats, flour and unhulled oats are separated by air aspiration and screening. The choicest and plumpest groats are then used to make packaged rolled oats while the less choice groats make bulk or feed oats. All broken kernels are used for livestock feed.

AFTER THE HULLING process, the groats are then cut which produces uniform granules. After the cut, the granules are then flaked between large steel rollers to produce simple dried oatmeal.

I guess the main reason folks like oatmeal is that it is palatable, can be quite filling and is generally low in calories (it's the brown sugar and honey that make it a killer calorie-laden breakfast) with only about 130 calories per cup. Oats are also loaded with

4 winners give soothing recipes

COMFORT FOODS — those foods that remind you of warm childhood memories and/or sooth you when you're down — inspired a lot of readers of the Taste pages.

Nearly 100 recipes were submitted to our contest for readers' favorite comfort foods, after an article by Larry Janes appeared in Taste, describing his own choices in comfort foods.

The panel of judges decided that because of the great variety of recipes offered, a winner would be chosen in each of four categories: soup, main course, vegetable and dessert. The four winners will be awarded \$20 gift certificates to Kitchen Glamor.

You probably won't want to eat all these comfort foods at the same meal because, if you did, you might not feel too comfortable. But each recipe should tempt you when you, your family and friends need a little pampering. Comfort foods are especially good for these cold winter days when you might be suffering from the midwinter doldrums, otherwise known as the February blahs.

Entries came from the 12 readership areas of the Observer & Eccentric Newspapers. These were the recipes chosen for prizes: Italian Sausage Soup, from Rae Bruder of Redford; Mom's Meat Loaf, from Robin L. Womack of Farmington Hills; Scalloped Potatoes from Katherine M. Pokorny of Plymouth; and the Best Rice Pudding from Marian Bliznik of Farmington Hills.

ALTHOUGH THE readers' comments weren't taken into account in the judging, many of the writers seemed to take great pleasure in recalling early memories, or describing reasons they favor particular comfort foods.

One of the winners, Robin Womack, wrote, "After reading your article on comfort food, I thought of my mom's meat loaf. As a child it seemed as though we had it for dinner about every week. My sister Su-

san and I sort of made it a family joke.

"When I married many moons ago, I swore to my husband I would never make meat loaf. But, a couple of years ago, with two little girls of my own now, I figured what the heck, I'll make some meat loaf for dinner.

"I was so tired of making all the 'latest' trendy foods. It was a bit. And it tasted so good. It brought back a lot of memories... Thank you, Mom!"

Reached by phone, Womack said of the meat loaf, "I had it quite often as a youngster growing up — that and tuna casserole." She hastened to add, "My mom's a good cook. She didn't always make meat loaf."

Womack herself is "a full-time mom." She said she used to teach home economics and that the family moved to the Farmington Hills area from Chicago 2½ years ago.

HUSBAND RICK is a district sales manager for Tektronix in Farmington Hills. Their children are Caroline, 6½, who attends Gill School, and Kelly, 2½, whom she takes to Mom and Tot class at Alameda children's center.

More than one reader submitted a recipe for rice pudding, but the judges and a tasting panel decided that Marian Bliznik's the Best Rice Pudding was indeed the best.

Bliznik wrote that her recipe "is soothing and reminds me of times past. It takes a little bit of nurturing to make — feels good going down and afterwards. Satisfying and comforting!"

ITALIAN SAUSAGE SOUP

- 1 1/2 pounds mild Italian sausage
- 2 cloves garlic
- 2 large onions, chopped
- 1 large can tomatoes
- 1 1/2 cups burgundy
- 1/2 teaspoon basil
- 3 tablespoons parsley
- 1 green pepper, chopped
- 2 or 3 small zucchini
- 5 cups beef broth
- 2 cups uncooked bow-tie or other wide noodles
- Parmesan cheese
- 2 teaspoons sugar

Slice sausage into 1/2 inch slices and cook. Pour off the fat. Add the onions and garlic and saute till wilted. Add tomatoes, wine broth, basil and parsley. Simmer uncovered for 30 minutes. Slice the zucchini into 1/4 inch slices. Add the zucchini and the rest of the ingredients and simmer covered for 30 minutes. Add 2 teaspoons sugar. Salt and pepper to taste. Sprinkle Parmesan cheese on each serving.

MOM'S MEAT LOAF

- 1 1/2 pounds ground round
- 1/2 medium green pepper, chopped
- 1 medium potato skinned and cubed (small cubes)
- 1/4 medium yellow onion, diced
- 1 large egg
- 10 unsalted soda crackers (crumbled)
- 1/2 teaspoon salt (optional)
- 1 16 ounce can stewed tomatoes
- 1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 8 ounces water

Pre-heat oven to 350 degrees. Work all ingredients together and shape into a loaf. Place loaf in a 9x12 inch covered casserole. Pour stewed tomatoes on top. Sprinkle ground pepper over the tomatoes. Pour the water around the loaf. Microwave on high for 8 minutes. Bake in conventional oven for 1 1/4 hours.

SCALLOPED POTATOES

- 8 medium potatoes
- 1 large onion
- 8 green onions
- 1 pint cream
- 8 ounces fresh Parmesan cheese
- 8 ounces Gouda cheese
- 12 ounces bacon
- 1/2 cup salted butter
- salt and pepper to taste

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Cut bacon into 1/4 inch pieces and fry until crisp. Set aside on paper towels. Peel potatoes and thinly slice.

Chop the onion and the green onions. Grate the Parmesan and Gouda cheeses. Cut butter stick into thin pats. In oblong baking dish, layer potato slices, sprinkle with bacon onion, green onion, and grated cheeses. Place 6 - 8 butter pats and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Repeat for layers 2 and 3. Pour the cream over entire baking dish. Bake 1 hour.

THE BEST RICE PUDDING

- 1 quart half and half
- 1 quart water
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup long grain rice
- 1/2 stick butter or margarine
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- cinnamon
- 1/2 to 3/4 cup raisins

Mix the first 6 ingredients together in a 4 quart kettle. Bring to a boil, then simmer, stirring frequently for 40 minutes. Add raisins and remove from heat. Beat the 2 eggs with enough water to make 1 cup. Add to rice mixture and beat in quickly with a spoon. Add the vanilla. Return to the stove and bring to a boil. Refrigerate. Top with cinnamon before serving.

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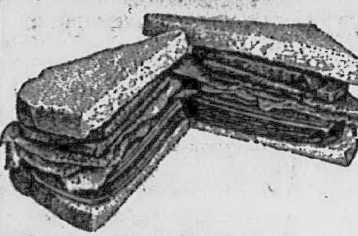

These incredible Midwestern mornings and wind chills certainly deserve something as nurturing and nutritious as good old-fashioned oatmeal. Bon Appetit!

MOMMA'S OATMEAL COOKIES

- 1 1/4 cups butter/margarine
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 egg
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 1/2 cups flour
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- dash salt
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon fresh grated nutmeg
- 1/2 teaspoon cardamom
- 3 cups oatmeal (regular or quick)

Beat butter with both sugars until light and fluffy. Beat in egg and vanilla. Set aside. Sift together all the dry ingredients except the oats. Add to margarine mixture and mix well. Stir in oats. Drop by rounded tablespoonfuls on an ungreased cookie sheet and bake at 350 degrees for about 10 minutes. Store in a tightly covered container for a chewy cookie.

CORNY BANANA OAT MUFFINS

- 4 medium ripe bananas, mashed
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil
- 1/2 cup honey

- 2 eggs
 - 1 cup oatmeal
 - 1 cup whole wheat flour
 - 1/2 cup cornmeal
 - 1/2 cup wheat germ
 - dash salt
 - 1 teaspoon baking powder
 - 1 teaspoon baking soda
 - 1 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
 - 1/2 teaspoon fresh grated nutmeg
- Combine all ingredients and mix well. Pour into muffin cups and bake at 350 degrees for 30-35 minutes.

YOU'D NEVER GUESS YOU WERE EATING TURKEY MEATLOAF

- 2 pounds ground turkey
- 1 cup tomato juice
- 1 cup oatmeal
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 1/2 cup finely chopped onion
- salt and pepper to taste

Combine all ingredients and mix well. Press into a loaf pan and bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour. Allow to stand for 10 minutes or so before slicing.

Hearty muffins healthful

Here's a recipe from an article, "The Weekend House Party Survival Guide," in the February issue of Bon Appetit.

POWER PEAR-OAT MUFFINS

Breakfast for the '80s: satisfying muffins packed with whole grains, fruits and high-fiber yams. The muffins freeze beautifully. Serve with scrambled eggs. Have whole grain cereals, assorted fruit juice and fresh fruit on hand, too.

- 3/4 cup whole wheat flour
- 1/2 cup plus 2 tablespoons firmly packed dark brown sugar
- 1/2 cup finely chopped pitted dates
- 1/2 cup raisins
- 1/4 cup rolled oats
- 1/4 cup sunflower seeds (unsalted), toasted
- 3 tablespoons oat bran (available at natural foods stores. Rolled oats can be substituted.)

- 3 tablespoons toasted wheat germ
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon ground all spice
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil
- 1/2 cup shredded bran cereal (such as All-Bran)
- 2 eggs
- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 1 large pear, peeled, cored and finely chopped
- 1 cup grated peeled yam or sweet potato (about 4 ounces)

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Grease 12 1/2-cup muffin cups. Mix

first 13 ingredients in medium bowl. Combine oil, bran, cereal, eggs and vanilla in large bowl. Let stand until bran absorbs liquid, about 3 minutes. Using electric mixer, beat bran cereal mixture until thick. Beat in pear and yam. Fold in dry ingredients; do not overmix (batter will be thick and lumpy).

Divide batter among prepared muffin cups. Bake until tester inserted in centers comes out clean, about 25 minutes. Serve warm. (Can be prepared ahead. Cool completely on rack. Wrap tightly and refrigerate 3 days, or freezeup to 1 month. Rewarm in 350 degree oven.)

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Recipes for relaxing relationship Polenta offered with vegetables

Recently, I received the following letter in the mail:
 Dear Gundella,
 You keep giving out recipes to seduce men, and put them into a romantic or sexy mood. I don't need any aphrodisiacs. I don't have any trouble getting all the love-making I want.
 What I need is something to make him spend time with me doing other things, like just watching TV together, or playing Scrabble, or working a jigsaw puzzle.
 I want a little friendship, and a relaxed relationship when we aren't making love.
 How about some recipes to make him comfortable, and content just to hang around when there's nothing exciting going on? Do you have any of these?



Well, dear reader, it just so happens that I do.
 Don't ask me why, but desserts made with breakfast cereals will do the trick.
 Here are several recipes for cookies, cakes and pies using both hot and cold cereals.
 The Cream of Wheat cake, the oatmeal cake and the apple crisp pie are my favorites. They really work.
 Caution to mothers: These are great to feed your children and teenagers, and to keep them happy at home. But don't serve them any after they are 18 years of age, or they will never leave and get out on their own.

OATMEAL CAKE
 1/2 cup boiling water
 1/2 cup brown sugar
 1/4 cup shortening (I use butter-flavored Crisco)
 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
 1/4 teaspoon allspice
 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
 2 teaspoons vanilla
 1 cup quick Quaker oats
 1 cup white sugar
 2 eggs
 1/2 cup flour
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1/4 cup raisins

Four boiling water over the oatmeal, and let it stand one-half hour. Add brown sugar, white sugar, shortening, eggs, spices and vanilla. Cream together well. Do this by hand. Do not use an electric beater.
 Add soda, salt, flour and raisins, and mix together well. Do not use beater.
 Pour into a 9-by-13-inch pan that has been greased and dusted with flour. Bake at 350 degrees for 30-40 minutes, or until done.

Frosting
 (I think this cake is great without frosting, but if you want to frost it, use this recipe.)
 1 cup brown sugar
 1 teaspoon vanilla
 1 1/2 to 2 cups powdered sugar
 1/2 cup milk
 2 tablespoons solid shortening

Boil milk and brown sugar together until syrupy. Cool thoroughly, and add vanilla and shortening. Stir in powdered sugar until spreading consistency. Spread on cake after it has cooled.

FLAKE-NUT COOKIES
 1/4 cup shortening
 1 egg
 3/4 cup flour
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 2 cups Wheaties, corn flakes or other flaked cereal
 1/2 cup brown sugar
 2 teaspoon vanilla
 3/4 teaspoon baking powder
 1/2 cup coarsely chopped nut meats

Mix ingredients together in order, and drop by spoonfuls on a lightly greased cookie sheet. Bake at 350 degrees for approximately 10 minutes.

BREAKFAST COOKIES
 (This recipe makes approximately 100 cookies)
 1 cup sugar
 1 cup solid shortening
 1 egg
 1 teaspoon vanilla
 1 teaspoon salt
 1 1/2 cup nut meats
 1 cup Rice Krispies, corn flakes or other crisp cereal
 1 cup chopped dates or raisins (optional)
 1 cup brown sugar
 1 cup vegetable oil
 1 teaspoon baking soda
 1 teaspoon cream of tartar
 3/4 cup flour
 1 cup coconut (flaked or shredded)
 1 cup quick oatmeal (uncooked)

Blend sugar, shortening, oil and egg. Beat well. Add remaining ingredients. Drop by teaspoonfuls onto lightly greased cookie sheet. Bake at 350 degrees for 10-15 minutes.

CREAM OF WHEAT CAKE
 (This cake contains no shortening and no flour)
 1 cup Cream of Wheat
 1/2 cup sugar
 2 teaspoon vanilla
 4 cups milk
 4 eggs
 bread crumbs

Cook Cream of Wheat and milk together until well thickened (approximately 20 minutes). Add sugar. Beat eggs, and add them to the Cream of Wheat mixture, blending well. Add vanilla.

Grease a cake pan (9-by-13), and line it with fresh, soft bread crumbs. I use about two slices of white bread, and crumb them in the blender.
 Bake at 350 degrees until a knife inserted in the center comes out clean. Cool and cut into squares. This cake may be eaten as is, or served with a hot or cold applesauce or lemon topping.

APPLE CRISP PIE
 1 unbaked bottom pie crust
 2 tablespoons lemon juice
 1 teaspoon cinnamon
 1/4 teaspoon ground cardoman (optional)
 sliced apples (enough to fill the pie shell)
 1/2 cup white sugar
 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
 2 tablespoon flour

Toss apples with lemon juice, sugar, flour and spices until all slices are lightly coated. Place in unbaked pie shell, and cover with topping mixture.

TOPPING FOR APPLE PIE CRISP
 1/4 cup quick oats
 1/2 cup flour
 1 teaspoon vanilla
 1/4 cup brown sugar
 1 teaspoon cinnamon
 1/2 cup butter, margarine or butter-flavored shortening

Combine dry ingredients, cut in butter, margarine or shortening, and add vanilla. Sprinkle this mixture over the apples, and bake the pie in a 350-degree oven 45 minutes, or until done. Serve hot or cold, with ice cream or milk.

CREAMY POLENTA WITH GRILLED VEGETABLES
 4 cups chicken broth
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 1 cup yellow cornmeal
 3 tablespoons unsalted butter, cut into pieces
 1/2 cup freshly grated Parmesan
 12 baby carrots, blanched for 2 minutes, drained, and patted dry
 12 baby eggplants, halved lengthwise
 18 scallions, trimmed
 olive oil for brushing the vegetables and the grill pan

In a large heavy saucepan bring the broth and 2 cups water to a boil, add the salt and the cornmeal in a slow stream, whisking constantly, and cook the mixture over moderately low heat, whisking constantly, for 15 minutes. Stir in the butter, the Parmesan and salt and pepper to taste and, if necessary, whisk in enough water to thin the polenta so that it will just fall from a spoon in a continuous stream.
 Keep the polenta warm, its surface covered with a round of wax paper. Brush the carrots, the eggplants and the scallions with the oil and season the vegetables with salt and pepper. Heat a well-seasoned large, ridged grill pan or cast-iron skillet over moderately high heat, brush it with the oil, and in it grill the vegetables, covered, in batches for 5 to 7 minutes, or until they are crisp-tender, transferring them as they are grilled to a plate. Divide the polenta among 6 plates and arrange the vegetables on top of it. Serves 6.

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Bus ridership up in suburbs

More people are riding commuter buses since SEMTA became SMART.

Average weekday bus ridership increased 4.4 percent and weekend ridership a combined 14 percent over the same period one year ago, according to figures recently released by the Suburban Mobility Authority for Regional Transportation.

SMART, serving Wayne, Oakland and Macomb Counties, replaced the former Southeast Michigan Transportation Authority last month.

The highest gains were reported in Oakland County, with Wayne County second. Routes to Northland and Oakland Mall set monthly records for the number of passengers served.

"Weekend service climbed partially because of favorable weather, which made our service to shopping malls very popular," SMART General Manager Albert Martin said. "Also, in the past year, we have continued to shift our service to better meet rider's needs, particularly in the suburbs where employment has increased."

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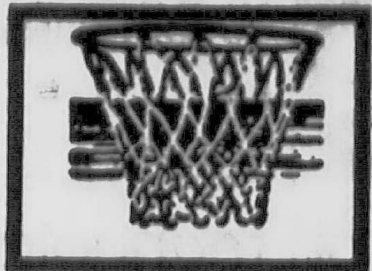
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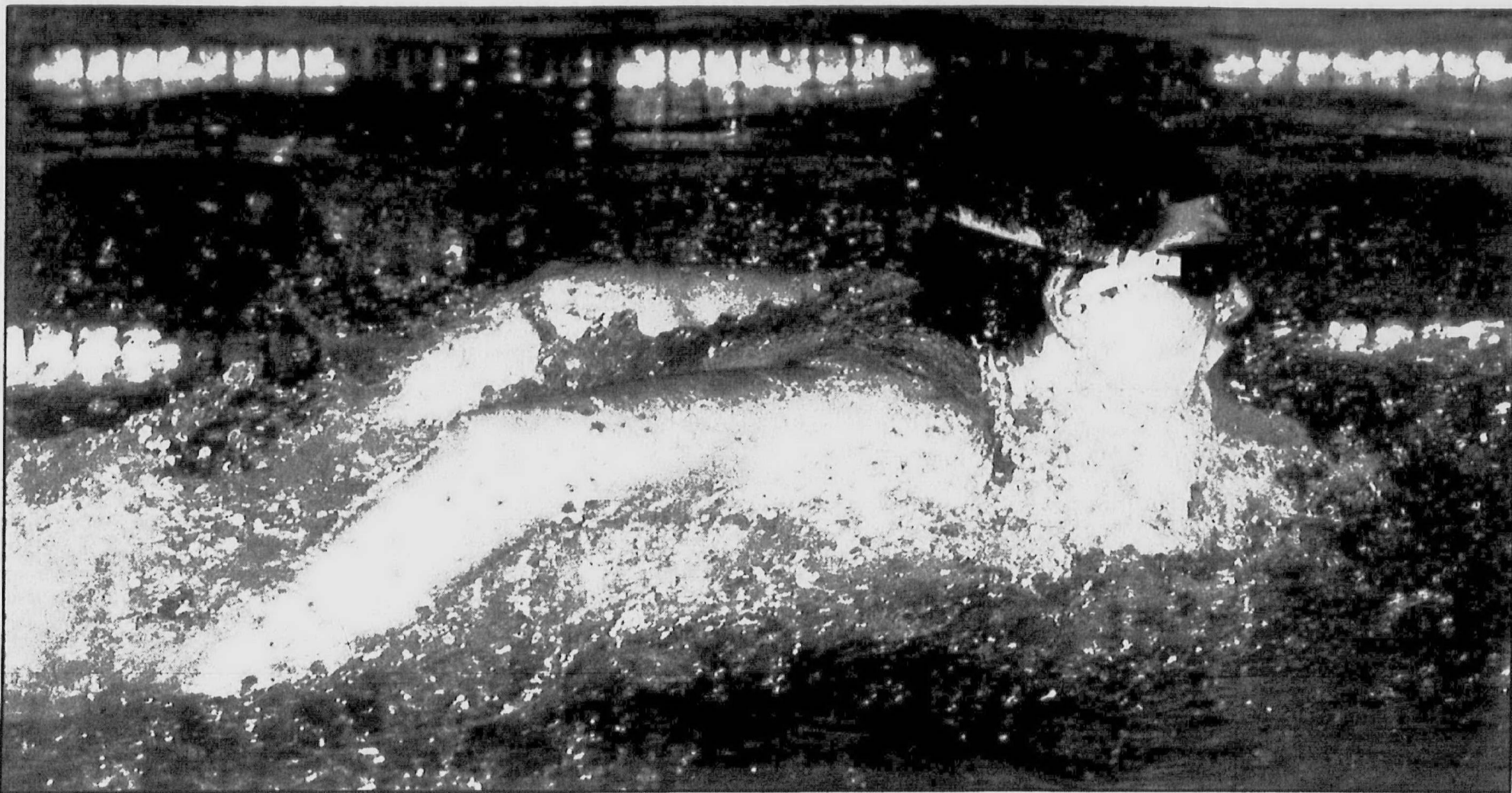

Chargers no match for Rocks

Ron Orris is always looking for a challenge, and his swimming coach, Chuck Olson, is constantly trying to find one for him.

The Plymouth Salem standout's latest test came Thursday night when Olson entered him in back-to-back events, the 500-yard freestyle and 100 backstroke, for the first time this season.

The results were predictable for the individual who has the best Observerland time in seven of eight individual swimming events. Orris won both as the Rocks left visiting Livonia Churchill in their wake, 112-60.

The 6-foot-5, 185-pound junior was disappointed that Churchill's Mark Papierski wasn't in the backstroke, too.

That has been Olson's strategy all season — to put his star against the opponent's best whenever possible — even though the backstroke isn't one of Orris' stronger events.

HE DID HAVE a chance to go head-to-head with Papierski, however. The Chargers pulled a switch and put him in the 500 freestyle, which just happens to be Orris territory.

Orris coasted to first place in that event with a 4:46.39 time. Papierski, who earlier won the 200 individual medley (2:02.9), was a distant second at 5:08.98.

The Salem swimmer turned around and won the backstroke with a personal best of 56.35, which puts him No. 2 in the area. It's the only event in which he doesn't have the top time.

"I wasn't too surprised," Olson said. "A lot of people think if you swim hard you can't come back."

"Four-forty-six, for most high school swimmers in the 500, would be a dream come true."

"It was a good swim for Ron, but it was really kind of a relaxed

Homan and Timberlake also combined with Scott Swartzwelder and Mark Levesque to win the 200 medley relay in 1:46.21.

Canton's individual victories were spread

among four of the relay participants.

Helmstadter went 1:46.21 in the 200 freestyle, Anderson clocked 56.36 in the butterfly, Homan turned in a 5:06.8 in the 500 freestyle and Swartzwelder went 1:01.4 in the backstroke.

Glenn won five events, including the diving in which Joe Bush accumulated 246.8 points. Jeff Pryor won the individual medley (2:13.62), Don Nelligan the 50 freestyle (23.84), Mark Lakatos the 100 freestyle (52.74) and Dave Kolbus the breaststroke (1:08.01).

The Chiefs can finish undefeated in the Western Division with a victory over host Livonia Churchill at 7 p.m. Thursday. Canton, the defending champion, is 4-0.

CC, the defending Class A champion, will wrestle East Detroit at 7 p.m. Wednesday in the quarterfinal match at Harper Woods Notre Dame.

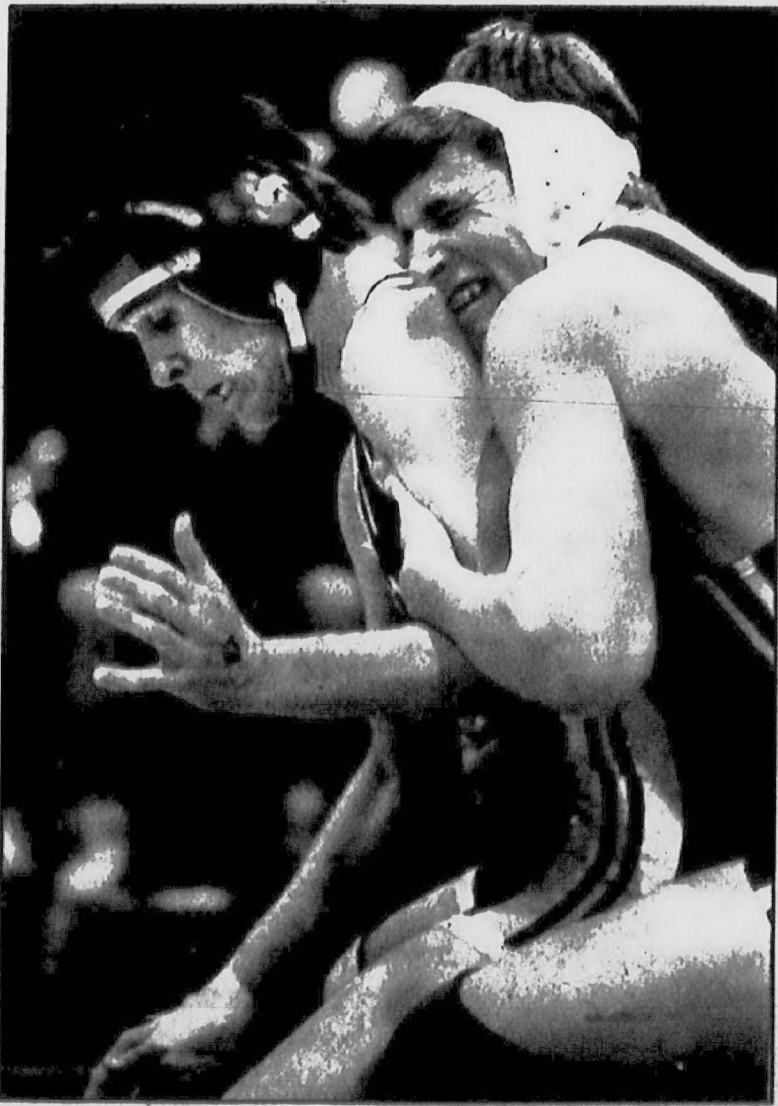

swim," he added. "In the back, I knew he had to work it and hit the turns."

Orris was helped by the fact he had nearly two minutes to rest between events since he finished so quickly. He's accustomed to having only 30 seconds in practice.

DESPIITE A GOOD effort in the backstroke, Orris was still short of Ron Finley's school record of 53.4. It's the only one Orris hasn't broken.

The freestyle events are Orris' strongest events, but he's proved there is nothing he can't do.

"I like the IM and 100 fly, too," Orris said, pausing to add: "I really like them all."

"I just set my goal before each race. The best motivation is to have my best time and get ready for the end of the season."

With the league meet coming up in two weeks and the state meet on Saturday, March 11, the season is nearing its zenith, and an outstanding swimmer like Orris will be a key player in those big events.

The dilemma facing Olson is deciding which state-meet events he wants Orris to swim. He has qualified for every one.

"WHATEVER HE swims (in the Western Lakes Activities Association meet), he will win," Olson said. "In the state meet, we can probably eliminate a few events. He's not going to be in the backstroke."

"I hate the 50. It's a start and a turn. With a kid with his ability, I hate to rely on a start."

"I think he's the fastest kid in the state in the 50," he added, "but I also think he's the fastest in a couple of others."

Orris was fifth in the 100 freestyle last year and sixth in the 200 freestyle. A first-place finish this time

High technology offers helping hand to bowlers

What will bowling be like in the year 2000?

The product is called BowlerVision, the wave of the future. You will have to go to Woodridge, Ill., to try it out, but it soon will be introduced to other sites around the country. The BowlerVision has a console with two videos, one for the game scoring and one to advise the bowlers of the speed of the ball, the angle of impact, and the ball's position at various spots down the lane.

It will give the bowler a chance to make adjustments based on precise information. These machines will work in conjunction with the new plastic coated lanes, another indication of things to come about in the 21st century.

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CC sets date with Southwestern

Bernie Holowicki wants to savor the moment as long as he can. The Redford Catholic Central coach won his sixth Catholic League basketball title Sunday, as his Shamrocks downed Bishop Borgess for the A-B Division title Sunday at the University of Detroit's Callihan Hall, 65-56.

All five CC starters scored in double figures, led by senior center Ray Richards' 16 points. But now awaiting Holowicki and his 12-7 team is Detroit Public School League champion Detroit Southwestern (17-1). The two teams

will meet in Friday's Operation-Friendship final at 7 p.m. Borgess (11-8) will meet PSL runnerup Detroit Cooley (17-1) in first game of the doubleheader at 5 p.m. (Both

games are at Callihan.)

"I'm trying not to think about it (the next game). I want to think about this one," said the CC coach. "But Southwestern is a really good defensive team. They go to the boards with six people. It's every man for himself. They (the PSL) are in another world. They're athletic and talented."

CC SHOWED some athleticism of its own, particularly in the third quarter when they outscored the Spartans 20-8 to take a commanding 48-31 lead.

Borgess then made a fourth-quarter run, cutting the deficit to six, 51-45, on a three-pointer by Shawn

Respert. (The junior guard led all scorers with 23 points.)

But the Shamrocks repelled the charge with six unanswered points to gain their first A-B crown since 1983.

"We stressed all week that we wanted to weather their challenge, because we knew at some point in the game they would do that," said Holowicki, who has never lost a Catholic League final. "Our four seniors played 'senior ball.' They played smart."

Senior point-guard Terry Boykin, who has come on of late, added 12 points, as did captain Scott Hauncher and Jeff Schaner. Sophomore for-

ward Steve Whitlow contributed 11.

THE SPARTANS trailed by only five at the half, 28-23, but something was missing.

Forward Randy White, a 6-4 senior and the team's best defender, sat out the game with a possible fractured foot suffered a week earlier in a game against UD-Jesuit. (Rashawn Sumler, a 6-5 sophomore, started in his place, scoring six points.)

"I don't want to blame it on that (White's absence)," said Borgess coach Mike Resmer. "For the first three quarters I didn't think we had any organization on the floor. We were playing with five guards a lot

of the time and they just didn't mesh right.

"They (CC) looked big and intimidating inside. We made a good effort to get the ball into Rashawn and Carl (Woods), but we just couldn't do it."

Artie Brown, who got hot down the stretch, added 12 points for the Spartans. Charles North chipped in with 10, but was not quite himself with his long-range shooting.

"We're just happy to get here," Fusco said.

And as for Cooley? "That's going to be a tough one," said the Borgess coach. "They were No. 1 in the state (Class A) for how long?"

Hall-led Patriots topple Spartans

Livonia Stevenson had city rival Franklin's number until Thursday night when the Patriots pulled off a mild upset in the first round of the Western Lakes Activities Association basketball playoffs, winning 73-67 in overtime.

The Spartans were at home again after beating the Patriots only two days earlier in their own gym, 59-58.

But senior guard Roy Hall (29 points) keyed the Franklin victory with some clutch baskets down the stretch, including the final six at the end of regulation and six of eight in the overtime.

"Roy is one of our key players and one of our most experienced," said Franklin coach Rod Hanna, whose team will take an 11-7 record at home Tuesday against Lakes Division champ Plymouth Salem. "Good players shine in pressure time. Most every team has a guy like an (Jeff) Elliott from Salem."

Hall's three-pointer with only 1:20 left tied the game at 65-65.

The Patriots then forced a Stevenson turnover with 1:02 left and played for the last shot, but failed to convert.

THE PATRIOTS got rolling in OT when Hall stole the ball and fed Craig Overaitis (14 points), who was fouled going to the basket.

The junior guard converted a pair of free throws and Hall scored the next six, including four straight from the free throw line. Meanwhile, Stevenson managed only one basket in overtime by 4-8 junior Glenn Szeman.

Franklin's John Shea, a 6-2, 145-pound swingman, also contributed heavily to the win, scoring 11 points to go along with 10 rebounds and seven assists.

Forward Mark Donehue added eight points and 12 rebounds.

But it was free throw shooting that proved to be a decisive factor. The Patriots made 23 of 30, while the Spartans were only 11 of 18.

"We had to get to the free throw line because on Tuesday we made only four of seven, but tonight we were able to penetrate and get the ball in," Hanna said. "And the other thing is that we stopped their transition game. Stevenson is well-trained

to get out on the break and score some easy baskets. They're talented and they have some good athletes."

NOTHING CAME EASY for the Spartans on this night.

They trailed 35-25 at the half before rallying in the third quarter, outscoring the Patriots 24-13 as senior forward Chris Nazelli got untracked, tallying 13 of his team-high 19 points.

The Spartans then took the lead with exactly five minutes to play, 57-55, on a basket by Scott Kosikowski (15 points), but they couldn't stand prosperity, even with a three-point lead with 1:48 remaining after a hoop by Eric Schwedt (12 points).

Stevenson coach Jim McIntyre knew going in that it would be tough to beat the Patriots for a third time.

"It took us until halftime to get our kids to relax," said the Stevenson coach, whose team is 12-6 overall. "In the third quarter we came out relaxed and cut into that 10-point lead.

"I think the kids wanted to win as much as Tuesday, but you weigh this differently because it's do-or-die when you should just think of it as another ballgame."

McINTYRE CITED a couple of causes which led to his team's undoing.

"They (Franklin) went right through our first press," said the Stevenson coach. "We didn't press on Tuesday because we wanted to give them a different look. We had been successful with it (the press) against Salem and Farmington (both wins).

"Our guard didn't rotate back on the defensive transition. And our guards were not taking the shots they normally take."

The playoffs, meanwhile, may have sparked the Patriots to a higher level of play. They have to be considered a Cinderella team.

"This is something to shoot for," Hanna said. "We've worked hard to be where we are. This gives us new life."

The Ghoul and other things that go bump?

In most cities, a guy with a fright wig, wearing a pair of sunglasses with one lens poked out and a blue lab coat would draw stares.

In Cleveland, they ask for an autograph. "How about a 'Stay Sick,'" said the man in the get-up, dutifully signing his name for a teenager on Euclid Avenue. "All right, overday."

A crowd swells around the person known as The Ghoul. He has been off the air in his hometown of Cleveland for two years and since 1983 in Detroit.

Yet in his heyday, The Ghoul was synonymous with Saturday night television in Detroit. In the 1970s and early 1980s, he was a horror movie host on UHF stations WKBD-TV Channel 50, WXON-TV Channel 20 and WGPR-TV Channel 62.

His show was pure madcap slapstick. There was no script. His zaniness often stretched the boundaries of acceptable standard television like gooey taffy.

Busting watermelons with a sledgehammer? The Ghoul was blowing up pumpkins (not to mention model cars) with M-80 firecrackers before Gallagher's hairline went south.

And David Letterman's stunts as a human bowl of Rice Krispees? The Ghoul once was a human hamburger — covered with ketchup and mustard (actually red and yellow paint) along with onions — when Letterman was probably still a weatherman in Indianapolis.

AND THAT Mr. Bill character on "Saturday Night Live"? The Ghoul was terrorizing a toy frog named "Froggie" before Chase, Belushi and Ackroyd were making it big on TV.

"Does Johnny Carson grab a bottle of Cheez Whiz and put gobs of it under his arms?" asked Dave Ivey of Ferndale, an art director on The Ghoul's show. "You don't see that everyday on TV."

The Ghoul's stunts reaped in the ratings, but didn't endear him to station managers along the way. He said one station had the show removed after two letters complained he was making fun of Polish people and the mentally retarded.

In light of today's trash TV, Ron Sweed can only laugh at the irony of it all.

Sweed, 40, is a Ghoul without a show. He attends Cleveland State University, finishing his degree in English, TV and film. He does occasional personal appearances and writes a column for an alternative newspaper in Cleveland.

Sweed is busily trying to get The Ghoul back on the air. There is talk of him returning to Cleveland TV by the fall. He hasn't pitched the show in Detroit for awhile.

Even he appears to have some doubts. And this is a person who, during his height in popularity, received three and four bags of mail a day and sold 400 to 500 Ghoul T-shirts and sweat shirts in one week in Detroit alone.

"IT'S BEEN awhile," said Sweed, giuing on his phony beard near a stairwell in a Cleveland shopping arcade. "Many people don't remember."

Apparently, they do. As The Ghoul poses for some photos, shoppers walk by and point to him and whisper to one another. A few people call out his name. A man who looked in his 30s shouts, "Still crazy after all these years."

Cleveland: More than Cheez Whiz, architecture

Cleveland in February? Surely, you jest.

But, hey, would we pull your leg? Don't let that post-Depression architecture fool you. Behind those cold, gray buildings is a happening city.

When we asked The Ghoul to be our Cleveland tour guide, we thought he'd take us to the Cheez Whiz factory.

Then he led us inside The Arcade. Outside it appears to be just another old building. But inside it is an ornate masterpiece of brass and copper, not to mention shops and restaurants.

The Arcade was built in the 1890s and looks as sharp now as it probably did then. Which sums up

present-day Cleveland, making the old look new again.

And this stuff about Cleveland being a mistake on the lake. Well, somebody must've had a big eraser.

"That's ancient history," said Bob Ulas, communications director for the Convention and Visitors

Bureau of Greater Cleveland. "People are shocked when they come here for this first time."

ONE OF the main stops is The Flats, a development area near the Cuyahoga River with 30 riverfront restaurants and lounges. Warehouses have been trans-

formed into a slew of hot nightspots, including the rock and roll venue of Peabody's.

Hey, need a place to eat? Well, The Ghoul himself took us into one of his favorite haunts, Shorty's.

Shorty's is a nostalgia trip. A vintage Coca-Cola machine sits in the corner, a black and white TV broadcasts shows from the 1950s, and the waitresses dress in high school sock hop garb and dance on the tables to the hits of that era. The food, your basic fare of hamburgers and fries, is quite reasonable.

Across the way is Nautica, featuring even more clubs on the west bank (of the Cuyahoga River), such as Shooters, Club Coconuts, Nautica Stage and the Boardwalk.

BUT THE Cleveland agenda is not all eat and drink. This city has culture, 500 square miles of it, in fact. University Circle features both the Cleveland Museum of Art and the Cleveland Museum of Natural History, both highly rated in the country for their exhibits.

Of course, another exhibit hall in the works is the Rock'n'Roll Hall of Fame and Museum.

The decay of his idealism and his cynical pessimism is quite a shock to a recently hired, junior colleague, University of Michigan law school graduate Roger Baron (Robert Downey, Jr.)

His youthful enthusiasm and the injustice done Shu Kai Kim (Yuji Okumoto) reawakens Dodd's liberal

vigor and he undertakes, at no little cost, the defense of Kim.

In the exciting process, Dodd tangles with Manhattan D.A. Robert Reynard (Kurtwood Smith) who bears some resemblance to President Bush — that's what got me going on the William Kunstler versus George Bush track.

The film postulates justice at any price versus law and order at any price — a scary thought but that may be where it's at these days. At least it's well done and entertaining.

Sheryl Lee Ralph was in town promoting "The Mighty Quinn" (C-), (R) 90 minutes, which would be a lot better movie, if she were more evident and if someone had troubled to write a decent script.

Ralph has an exciting presence that isn't apparent — except for two songs — in this slow, cliched story of Xavier Quinn (Denzel Washington), police chief of a remote Caribbean island and his friend, Maubee (Robert Townsend). Murder, money and spies are jumbled up and don't help much.

Scenery, music track and Ralph are terrific, but Quinn ain't so mighty.

"The Burbs" (D) (PG) 95 minutes — are blobs in this absurd, slow and misplaced attempt to satirize horror films.

They use it all up in the first 20 minutes with some pretty decent slapstick, introducing Mr. and Mrs. Ray Peterson (Tom Hanks and Carrie Fisher) who live on Mayfield Place in suburbia USA.

Neighbor Mark Rumsfeld (Bruce Dern) is a Vietnam vet whose head is still in the jungle. Peterson, Rumsfeld and a third neighbor, Art Wein-

gartner (Rick Ducommun), are suspicious of new neighbors, the Klopiks, who live in an "Adams Family" type of house.

Even if you stick with this one, you probably won't care what's in the Klopiks' basement. Bruce Dern and Corey Feldman turn in credible performances, but Hanks seems uptight. Reviewed by Kim Brown.

"Bill & Ted's Excellent Adventure" (B-) (PG) — Bill and Ted face a problem. They must earn an A+ on their final history report.

No problem, dudes, just create a time-traveling extravaganza, featuring eight legendary historical figures. Along the way, we see Genghis Khan trade his club for a baseball bat and Napoleon in his skivvies.

Alex Winter's Bill and Keanu Reeves' Ted plan the most awesome band of all time except they don't know how to play any instruments. Well, don't let reality get in the way. This is a movie about good times, big dreams and rock'n'roll.

Winter and Reeves acquit themselves nicely, even if the "valley boy" talk gets old much too soon. George Carlin in a cameo, leads the boys into their time-traveling phone booth with a certain new wave panache.

The problems in this film will be recognizable only to people under 18, which is fine, because "Bill and Ted's Excellent Adventure" is pitched in their direction. Reviewed by Sue Fichem.

"Never So Few" — a 1962, unrated epic (PG and C+ by today's standards) — runs for 125 minutes and takes its title from Winston Churchill's praise of the RAF during the Battle of Britain. Filmically, we might amend Churchill. Never have so many participated in so much to such minimal effect.

Recently released on video cassette, "Never So Few" doesn't fulfill the promise its star-studded cast suggests, but it's fun nonetheless. Where else can we see how all our aging favorites looked 27 years ago, cavorting behind Japanese lines in early World War II Burma?

Captain Tom Reynolds (Frank Sinatra) — with his good friend, English Captain Danny DeMortimer (Richard Johnson) — leads a band of Kachin guerrillas harassing the Japanese from the jungle. The Kachin leader, Nautaug, is played by then well-known actor Philip Ahn.

Directed by John Sturges, "Never

So Few" resembles many big-budget war movies with star-laden casts. Sinatra's guerrillas include Sergeants John Danforth (Charles Bronson) and Jim Norby (Dean Jones), Corporal Bill Ringa (Steve McQueen) and Captain Grey Travis (Peter Lawford). Brian Donlevy is General Sloan. All essentially play themselves in personal cameos for these under-developed roles.

But the film is only marginally about World War II. It's really about Hollywood's competition with television.

In the former category, Hollywood in the '50s and '60s tried to recapture its media market share from television by doing what television couldn't. That meant wide-screen, color and spectacular images. Television in those days was black and white and, as always, small.

"Never So Few" fits the formula with lush, exotic scenery and a big romance as Sinatra woos the stock

character, "mysterious foreign woman," Carla Vesari (Gina Lollobrigida), with only occasional forays into battle. Carla keeps company with the wealthy, but shadowy Nikko Regas (Paul Henreid).

Surprisingly, the big-screen images translate fairly well to the home screen although nothing beats an 80-foot expanse of Lollobrigida in Burma.

"Never So Few" also represents a happy, plastic moment early in the Kennedy era when Korea was forgotten and Vietnam as yet unknown.

"Never So Few" may not match the quality of Sinatra's other early '60s film, "Manchurian Candidate," but it is interesting and entertaining in its own slow grandeur. After all, hokey lines and corny setups from the old days are fun.

Where else can you hear Sinatra say, "I got the message. I kissed you, lady, and you kissed me back." Nowhere, I hope.

'Bombay': Persuasive expose

The dark side of childhood seems to be a major theme at the Detroit Film Theatre this season. The vice-ridden brat in "Murmur of the Heart," the abused farm boy in "Pelle the Conqueror" and the apartheid-weary South African youths in "Voices of Sarafina" are all touching in their tragically premature knowledge of the rotten ways of the world.

Add to this list "Salaam Bombay!" a sad, affecting portrayal of childhood as it shouldn't be lived — but unfortunately is — on the streets of urban India.

"Salaam Bombay!" is the story of Krishna, a small boy learning to fend for himself in the city after being cruelly cast out of his family home. Like "Pelle the Conqueror," he is handsome, brave and good-hearted. Unlike Pelle, he has no one in the world who cares about him, and no hope for escape into a better life.

Krishna scrapes by selling glasses of tea in the red-light district where he lives. He makes friends with Chillum, a pathetic adolescent dope peddler hooked on his own product, and Manju, the neglected little daughter of a prostitute.

He gets a crush on a pretty little girl recently bought by a local brothel and watches in dismay as she is transformed from a frightened virgin into a compliant whore.

OVER AND OVER, innocence is violated and slimy exploiters profit by it. The film is very tender toward the plight of its young protagonists. You might call it sentimental, if you were heartless enough.

If the incidents and characterizations are a bit melodramatic, even overly familiar, it's all for a good cause. This is a persuasive expose of a social system that allows children to be used and disposed of, like helpless domestic animals, at the whim of adults.

It's an indictment that's disturbingly close to home. The grimy cityscapes inhabited by Krishna and his cohorts look distressingly familiar. There's no exotic Third World aura to distance us; these events could easily be taking place in New York or Los Angeles.

There's outrage expressed in this film, but it's laid on with a gentle hand. Although Krishna's life is unpleasant, it's not made to seem completely unbearable. Director Mira Nair shows glimpses of the things that make street life tolerable — the

gaudy luxuries enjoyed by the young prostitute, and Chillum's joyous hashish binge in a graveyard.

Nair makes effective use of location settings and a cast of mostly non-professional actors, many of whom were actually living the life she depicts. It would be nice to think movie stardom has bettered their lot, but that's apparently not the case. Shafiq Syed, who plays Krishna, has reportedly returned to his previous existence as an ordinary child laborer.

GRITTY REALISM aside, this is a gorgeous film. Sandi Sissel's cinematography recreates a child's-eye view, giving a sense of freshness and wonder to Krishna's world of alleyways and back streets.

What ties it all together is Indian jazz master L. Subramanyam's super raga-funk score, which combines traditional Eastern instrumentation and melodic lines with a rousing back beat that throbs pleasingly against Western eardrums.

Hey, Sensitive Big Guys, let's watch TV. Wanna watch Geraldo? Not sensitive enough?

OK then. We could watch Phil Donahue, or better yet, there's M*A*S*H* reruns with Alan Alda.

"We're into anything Alan Alda is into," said Rob Varney of Livonia, lead singer and songwriter.

Sensitive Big Guys, surrrrree. Their music sounds anything but tender, caring, compassionate.

This stuff is as subtle as a bag of nails thrown into a cement mixer. Dinner music? Sure, if the super happens to be on the beam of a construction site.

Need we say more? Of course, we do.

The Sensitive Big Guys have been in operation for nearly 1 1/2 years, forming in November 1987. The product is strictly Livonia, except for guitarist Bryan Rossell who lives in Westland. "I live right on the border," Rossell said.

He also went to Livonia Franklin High School as did bass player Steve Bauer. Drummer Rob Paul and Varney went to Livonia Bentley where they played in numerous bands, which may be filed under obscurity.

SO, AT a concert awhile back, they all decided to join forces. Their Livonia roots put them into company with other fine area musicians such as Bootsey X, Dave Feeny of Orange Roughies, Chris Richards of Hippodrome, Mike Murphy of the Moonmen, etc.

Yet, like the aforementioned people, Sensitive Big Guys are strangers in their own land.

"Nobody has heard of us around here," Rob Paul said. "We play any-

As a result, the Sensitive Big Guys have sought fame and fortune elsewhere. The four-member band is a regular on the Hamtramck circuit. Also, they have made the outstate tour to Kalamazoo and, most recently, to Mount Pleasant.

Through all this, Sensitive Big Guys have only headlined on a few occasions. Which is all fine and dan-

dy with them. They just like to play. "We liked to get booed just as much as we like to get applause," said Rob Paul, jokingly.

In that sense, the Sensitive Big Guys are quite refreshing. They are one of the few local bands that don't serve you a line about record label interest or bombard you with cosmic debris of the social significance of their music.

A FEW flaws can be found on the

Sensitive Big Guys cassette, "Simply Sensitive." Band members attribute that to the first time being in a recording studio.

Still, there is a certain spark on the nine-song offering that all the studio wizards in the business couldn't hope to reproduce.

"We're a lot better live than we are on tape," Steve Bauer said. Added Rob Paul, "No matter how bad we get. We know we could do worse."

Dreams break out of Athens mold

You can take the band out of Athens, Ga. But you can't take Athens, Ga., out of the band.

Dreams So Real is trying. At least with their music anyway.

The three-member band's latest album, "Rough Night in Jericho," (Arista) is a conscious effort on its part to distance itself from the rest of the Athens bands it grew up with. So, R.E.M., B-52s and dB's, take a hike.

"Personally, I think we're representing our own Athens sound," said Drew Worsham, drummer of Dreams So Real. "We're not going to deny we're from Athens."

Unlike most of those from the Georgia hotbed for alternative music, Dreams So Real went for a big sound on their latest LP.

For that, they opted for the technologically proficient studio setting in Los Angeles instead of some backwoods setup.

They snared themselves a big name producer, Bill Drescher, whose past credits include the Bangles and Jules Shear. And they spent three months in the studio, compared to eight days as with their first LP "Father's House."

The end result is a big, brassy and, dare we say, commercial production.

"WE WANTED something modern

sounding that wouldn't be out of place, say, on AOR radio," Worsham said.

"We could have gotten Mitch Easter or Don Dixon to produce it and gone for a more regional sound," Worsham said. "The record company wanted us to return to our own sound... We wanted a big sound. We wanted the album to rock."

For the most part, Dreams So Real succeeded. The melodic rock quality of "Rough Night in Jericho" deems it appropriate for AOR radio play. Are you listening, Arthur P?

Nonetheless, striking out for an identity of its own is admirable, but could have its drawbacks. For one, the fact the band is from Athens alone sparks a curiosity.

With that, though, comes the endless comparisons.

Dreams So Real was open season for comparative analysis, especially after R.E.M.'s Peter Dinklage produced the band's first single "Everywhere Girl"/"Whirl" (Coyote/Twin-Tone). The psychedelic pop offering quickly became a best-selling single.

Buck was also at the controls of the band's first album, "Father's House." That, too, received critical acclaim.

After pounding the college alternative musical highway, Dreams So Real signed with Arista Records. Suddenly, a dream the band had when it first formed after meeting in a record store was real.

INTENT TO make the most of it, the group wanted to do things differently production-wise.

"He (Buck) pretty much knew we were going for a big production on this album," said Worsham, who added that Buck likes the band's latest album. "He knew he wouldn't be appropriate this time."

If things go according to plan, Dreams So Real will be added to the long list of names who have made it big from Athens. Creativity must flow in the water in the relatively

small college town.

A film documentary was done, "Athens Inside/Out," which focused on the phenomenon of the music scene there. Worsham is even at a loss to explain it.

"It's weird," he said. "Somehow, cosmically, it all comes together."

SPIKE — Elvis Costello



The verbal gymnast is back. Elvis Costello's latest offering, "Spike," (Warner) has more twists, turns, flips and flops than a mackerel out of water. Coming on the heels of last month's release by Lou Reed, "Spike" gives fans of tremendous lyrics another reason to push up the volume and pull out the lyric sheet.

Backed by an all-star cast with a wide variety of instruments, Costello shines on "Spike." The music ranges from folk to funk to pop to ballads. The connecting yarn is Costello's ability to weave intricate tales while making keen observations like "They say that travel broadens the mind/til you can't get your head out of doors."

Great Britain's political woes are one of Costello's favorite targets. "Any King's Shilling," a traditional Celtic folk song, paints the Irish struggle in a portrait of a friendship between two opposing combatants. "Tramp the Dirt Down" recalls Bob Dylan's "Masters of War" with its spiteful graveyard scene and rough

anti-establishment rhetoric, "When England was the whore of the world/Margaret was her madam."

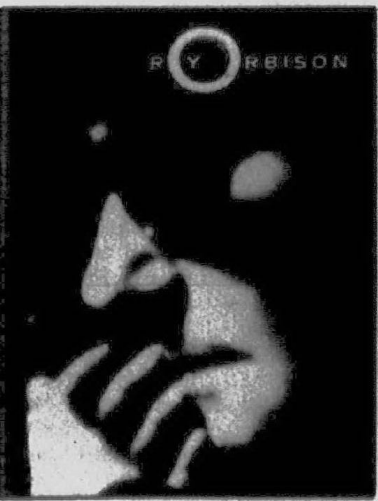
Costello co-wrote two tracks with guest bassist Paul McCartney. The toe-tapping "Veronica" is a well-crafted piece of pop that, surprisingly enough, sounds like a mix between the late-70s Attractions and mid-60s Beatles. The other, "Pads, Paws and Claws," pales in comparison.

The album's crown jewel is the hilarious "God's Comic," the story of a corrupt priest who has died and fears his final reward. Costello presents a satirical image of God on a waterbed "drinking a cola of a mystery brand," saying, "I've been wading through all this unbelievable junk and wondering if I should have given the world to the monkeys."

With the exception of a couple weak spots, namely "Deep Dark Truthful Mirror" and "Baby Plays Around," "Spike" is solid stuff — another winner to add to a superb track record.

MYSTERY GIRL — Roy Orbison



Roy Orbison's untimely passing ensures this album will become a best seller. The good news is that "Mystery Girl" (Virgin Records) deserves whatever success comes its way.

Here, Orbison succeeds where most other rock legends have failed — creating a new body of work that not only matches past glories, but builds upon them.

Of the 10 songs, only "You Got It," the first single, clings self-consciously to the past. The rest shows Orbison completely at home in the 1980s.

There's a fair share of help from notable friends. Fellow Wilburys Jeff Lynne and Tom Petty each contribute songs, while Lynne and Mike Campbell, one of Petty's Heartbreakers, handle most production duties.

But the spotlight belongs to Orbison alone. Even to the end, his magnificent, soaring voice remained one of pop music's treasures.

The difference between Orbison and other rock vocalists is never more apparent than on "She's a Mystery to Me," Bono's contribution to this bill of fare. While the U2 leader has delivered similar material with man-falling-off-the-cliff despair, Orbison's singing is at once powerful yet beautifully controlled. Despite the desperation and heartbreak al-

ways evident in his work, Orbison, the singer, always had clear indication of where he wanted a song to go. Thus, singer and audience don't wallow in their heartbreak — they transcend it.

"The Only One," written by his son, is another example of Orbison's skill with ballads. "In the Real World" and "California Blue" provide further illustration. ("All I Can Do Is) Dream of You," written by T-Bone Burnett, not only makes cunning reference to past Orbison themes, but shows the singer lost none of his early rockabilly touch.

Even without the sad circumstances surrounding its release, "Mystery Girl" is more than just a comeback. It's a crowning glory from one of rock's most reluctant kings.

I'm sure that at this stage most everybody knows the history of New Order, i.e. the three remaining members from the breathtakingly powerful Joy Division continue after the suicide of their frightening and sad lead singer, Ian Curtis, in May 1980.

That band created a phenomenal legacy, which I'm sure is still paying a lot of bills for New Order.

New Order, on the other hand, is experiencing a different kind of phenomenon — that of a hugely successful dance band, popular with swinging "MTV-ites." They are having large record sales worldwide and are slowly being acknowledged/absorbed by the music mainstream.

I mean, they are having records mixed by the same people responsible for Madonna and Pet Shop Boy hits and even "Blue Monday '88" was mixed by Quincy Jones. I can't wait to hear Michael Jackson's version of it.

Anyway, this album is essentially their first new recording since 1986

and it starts off on extremely thin ice with their single, "Fine Time." This is utterly devoid of any redeeming qualities as it is simply comprised of repetitive computer dance rhythms. I had hoped for better, and thankfully, I was not let down over the rest of the LP.

While the other songs maintain a certain dance quality, they are solid songs. Nonetheless, they feature New Order's most attractive aspects — vocalist/guitarist Bernard Albrecht's vulnerable vocals and Peter Hook's thundering bass lines.

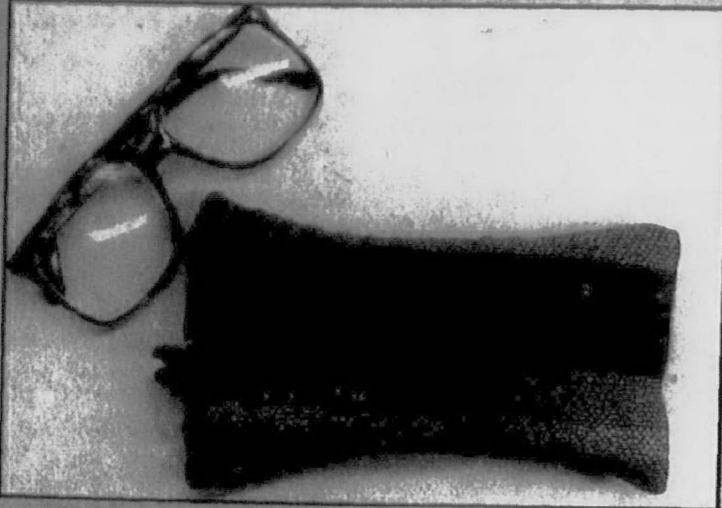
Don't be put off by the lead off track and give the rest of them a few listens. They're worth it.

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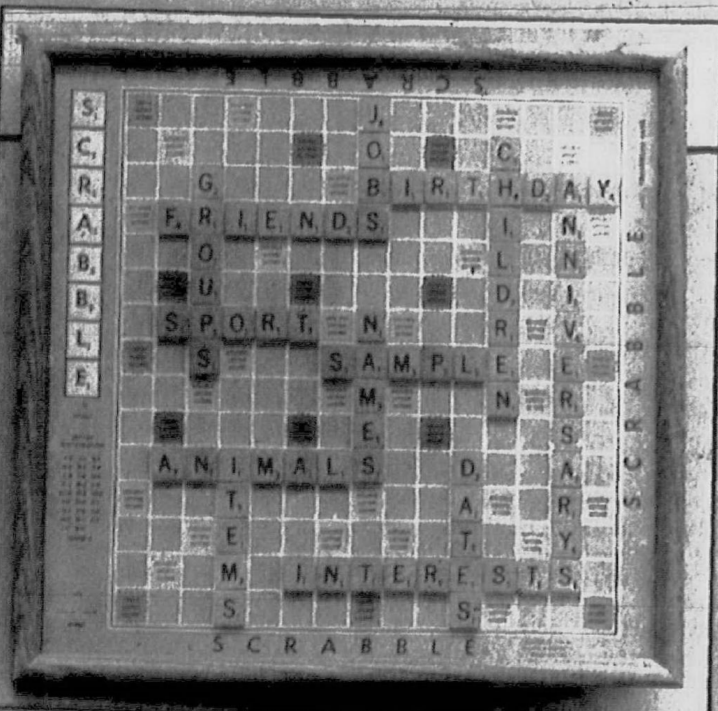
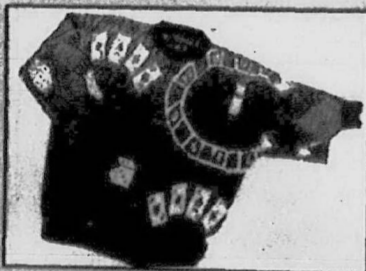

Dear Barbara,

Could you please describe behavior signs, or warning symptoms of eating disorders (such as bulimia or anorexia). I suspect my teenage daughter may be using the purge part of bulimia to control her weight. Teenage girls seem to have an obsession for thin, thin, thin bodies.

Concerned in Birmingham

Dear Concerned in Birmingham,

How true. The quest for "thin, thin, thin bodies" has become a teenage obsession. However, while it seems that teenagers with eating disorders are solely troubled by an obsession with thinness, that is generally not the case. It may begin that way, but for both bulimics and anorexics, their preoccupation becomes their only method of dealing with emotions and conflict.

Bulimia is a syndrome in which the person eats (usually large quantities of food) and then purges herself

of the calories by vomiting and/or using laxatives or diuretics. Bulimics may also use excessive exercise and fasting to keep their weight at a normal level.

Anorexics starve themselves (sometimes to death) in the pursuit of thinness. Because anorexia is a state of starvation, anorexics often binge and purge. However, they won't eat in between and therefore their bodies are not maintained at a normal weight.

Anorexia is generally easier to spot than bulimia. You'll be able to see the inappropriate loss of weight, coupled with the obsession with weight and food. An anorexic often thinks of nothing else. In some cases there is a concurrent avoidance of maturation into womanhood.

The weight loss aids in the goal of keeping the young woman looking like a little girl, arresting her reproductive faculties and retarding breast development.

AN ANOREXIC sometimes takes to wearing baggy clothing and to taking part in strange eating rituals,

such as eating only alone or cutting the food into tiny pieces.

Bulimia is more difficult to detect. Bulimics are usually of normal weight and they carry out behavior in secret, so unless the physical symptoms become serious, they can hide it.

If your daughter is running to the bathroom after every meal, you've reason to worry. Other signs that should cause concern are rising grocery bills and food that disappears from the cupboard. Finding emetics, diuretics or laxatives in your daughter's room are more warning signs.

Bulimics can seem very successful in their daily pursuits, but they suffer excessive guilt especially about their bulimia, which leaves little energy for continuing emotional maturation. Many have difficulty with impulse control and are intensely preoccupied with their appearance.

Sometimes there is teeth deterioration and/or swelling of the salivary glands, which creates a "moon" face.

I hope this information helps you with your daughter.

The Ghoul raises a triumphant fist and said, "You got that right. (Believing like Fat Albert) Hey, hey, hey!" When he jumps down from the pole, he rips his jeans.

From there, The Ghoul leads the entourage out into the blustery January air. He's only wearing his thin lab coat, but the recognition from passersby makes him immuned from the chill.

A group of teenagers asks for autographs. He soon runs out of pictures and begins using a reporter's notebook.

A woman pulls her two small children up to The Ghoul. "Plunk your magic what!?" said the mother, puzzled by this character, but nonetheless doesn't want her kids to be left out.

"Do you know who The Ghoul is?" he asked the kid too young to remember him as the 1970s anti-hero of late night TV. "Well, hold onto this because someday soon it's going to be worth something."

A LOT OF Ron Sweed is in The Ghoul.

Sweed as a youth started a rumor in his neighborhood in Euclid, Ohio, that the Beatles' Ringo Starr was going to visit. He bought a Beatle wig and hired a chauffeur.

"The whole neighborhood was lined up because they were so gullible," said Sweed in amazement. "They believed Ringo was actually coming."

Another childhood stunt indirectly led him to TV. Sweed wore a stolen gorilla suit to an appearance by Cleveland horror movie host, Ghoulardi.

Ernie Anderson, who was Ghoulardi, was so impressed by Sweed's moxie he hired the teenager to work as his gofer. Before long, Sweed was Anderson's understudy.

Enough so that Sweed asked the management at WKBF-TV Channel 61, if he could do his own show. In 1971, "The Ghoul" premiered.

In the beginning, Sweed did an exact imitation of Ghoulardi. (He asked Anderson to return, but Anderson, an announcer for ABC-TV, declined). Then Sweed began putting his own touches on the show.

He would cut into the movies and provide sound effects. For instance, if a couple were kissing, he would slip in a heart-resounding belch.

He also held high regard for the films he hosted. "Boy, this movie is really stinkeroo," he would say, spraying air freshener.

THE GHOUL was as kind to the concerned mothers who wrote in complaining about his antics. "Hey madam, why don't you put your false teeth on backwards and bite your throat."

People ate it up. Ratings soared instantly. Soon, The Ghoul was syndicated to other Kaiser Broadcasting affiliates in Boston, San Francisco, Chicago and Philadelphia.

Along with Cleveland, the height of The Ghoul's popularity reached epidemic proportions in Detroit. He recalls being mobbed at an appearance during halftime of a Harlem Globetrotters game at Cobo Arena.

Then things took a nose dive into, as The Ghoul would say, the porcelain receptacle.

Sweed said The Ghoul was set to move to CKLW-TV Channel 9 (now CBET-TV), but Kaiser Broadcasting said it owned the rights to The Ghoul character. A bitter lawsuit ensued that took 1½ years to settle.

After returning to Channel 50 for awhile, The Ghoul started channel hopping. He went to Channel 20. He went to Channel 62 and then back on Channel 20.

Ratings, compared to the cost of producing the show, are some reasons The Ghoul was eventually dropped from the WXON-TV lineup, according to vice-president and general manager Doug Johnson.

"The Ghoul was a following for a certain group of people," Johnson said. "We had him hosting a movie. A couple of times when we just had

the movie, there was no significant slippage in the ratings. So that told me most people just wanted to watch the movie."

MANAGEMENT didn't understand The Ghoul, Sweed said. But he admits he had a role in it.

"I became really arrogant for awhile," Sweed said. "I burned a lot of bridges. I'd say, 'Ah screw you.

I'm The Ghoul. I'll be on forever.' Well, you find out, No. 1, you're not on forever and just because you made a lot of money then doesn't mean you're going to be making it later."

Sweed still thinks The Ghoul could fly today, if given the chance.

He still has a number of fans in the Detroit area, receiving letters from them. Recently, there was a "Bring Back the Ghoul" exhibit at a

science fiction convention at the Southfield Hilton.

Selling the concept of The Ghoul isn't easy, though. Sweed is paying the price for his rebellion.

"Why do it?," he said. "I've always been rebellious. If some station said, 'We'll put you on as The Ghoul,' but it was a total whitewash where I was a shadow of myself. I could not sell myself out like that."

Elstner clowns his way to top

Many comedians say they were class clowns. But Chas Elstner can boast of being a real clown.

In fact, the Chicago-raised comedian attended Ringling Brothers and Barnum Bailey's Clown School for three months in Venice, Fla. He even toured with the "Greatest Show on Earth" for awhile before moving on to the comedy stage.

And if P.T. Barnum himself said there was a sucker born every minute, the same might be said for sore feet: The 16-hour, six-day a week gruel was a hearty introduction to the world of show business.

"I'm out on the road now, and I hear guys being on the road two months at a time and complaining," said Elstner, who will appear Wednesday through Saturday, Feb. 22-25, at Joey's Comedy Club in Livonia. "I say, 'This is peanuts.'"

After 11 years of doing stand-up comedy, things are starting to crack open for Elstner. He's appeared on the Arts & Entertainment Network's "Good Time Cafe," the syndicated "An Evening at the Improv" and Showtime's "Comedy Network."

ON THE DAY of the interview, Elstner was preparing for an audition on "The Tonight Show" with Johnny Carson. It would be the third

or fourth time he's tried out for the show. But, he added, some of today's better known jokesters needed seven or eight tryouts before they were discovered on what is the comedic equivalent to the corner drugstore.

Elstner, 30, refuses to quit. That's not to say he hasn't thought about it. But there's always been someone there to give him a push. "In this business you're always

asking, 'Why am I doing this to myself?'" said Elstner, who lives in Los Angeles. "This is so hard. Not so much being on stage, but the business of it."

Frequently, Elstner would give himself a month. If things didn't get better, he'd give up comedy.

Then after one show, a person came up to him and told him to stick with it. The person was George Carlin.

Again three years ago, when Elstner was about to call it quits, he received a phone call. Apparently, some hotshot comedian was going to be a regular on "Saturday Night Live." The Improv in Los Angeles asked Elstner to replace Dana ("The Church Lady") Carvey, who left for "Saturday Night Live."

Since then, Elstner hasn't looked back.

DOUBTS HAVE been replaced by determination. He's following through on a goal he's had from the first time he walked into The Improv in New York.

Instead of learning other comedians' styles, Elstner studied the profession. He found that Bill Cosby learned psychology, Steve Martin delved into philosophy and Charlie Chaplin practiced ballet.

Elstner took courses in those subjects at the University of Hawaii and a business class for good measure.

"I noticed most of them make it between the age of 30 and 32," said Elstner, who is at that age. "At 18, I said I have a lot of time to learn and to make mistakes."

Belzer joins media in sizing up Bush

A presidential honeymoon period observed by comedians? Sure, especially if you're Richard Belzer.

And the politically observant humorist, somewhat like the media and Congress, is sizing up the Bush presidency in its infancy to see what it will bring in terms of material. As a source of laughs, President Bush has a tough act to follow.

"I think Reagan was easier to do jokes about than Bush will be," said Belzer, who will perform Wednesday through Saturday at Chaplin's in Fraser. "Everything is in limbo right now. Every one is trying to be nice and not face up to the reality of the mess Reagan left the country in."

"Quayle is one of the funniest creations in God's creation. He's a big, slow moving target."

"Bush is a hard one to figure out. He's gone through so many personality changes. He went from being a wimp to Superman. I was hard on him during the campaign. I guess people have short memories."

What's that saying on never talking about politics and religion? Belzer violates that with regularity. Those who make news are targets for his barbs — political, religious or otherwise.

The headliner's material is what he gleans from the headlines. Belzer reads five newspapers a day, including the New York Times, Washington Post and USA Today ("Not for intellectual stimulation," he said of the latter.).

I'm still alive," he said.

Nonetheless, he's patented a sarcastic brand of humor that has earned him accolades from the top comedians of our time. Said the late John Belushi, "The best I've ever seen working directly with an audience." Added Robin Williams, "Wonderful when he's on the edge. The Marquis de Sade as a gameshow host."

Part of the Belzer success is said to be his spontaneity. He's been noted as one of the few comedians whose routine changes night to night.

Often preferring the quaint setting of small clubs, audiences have been known to become involved. Sometimes Belzer is considered harsh, although reports lately have him mellowing a bit.

"I've been accused of being easier on the audience, but I think that's not necessarily true," Belzer said. "Perhaps I haven't been concentrating on the audience as much because I've had more on my mind. I still talk to

the audience quite a bit."

The 'King': His memory lives on . . .

Elvis may have "left the building," but the fans weren't leaving their seats.

Judging from the numbers who visited "Elvis: A Musical Celebration" last month at the Fox Theatre, "Elvis Lives!" or at least the legend of the King lives on, perpetuated by Kalamazoo sightings and Graceland birthday parties.

Mingling with the opening night hordes at the Fox were people costumed in everything from sequined cocktail dresses and tuxedos to jeans and flannel shirts. They arrived in stretch limousines, luxury cars, pickup trucks and the city of Taylor senior citizen bus. More than one over-the-hill Elvis impersonator were among the faithful.

We asked a handful of them, "What qualifies you as a true blue, radical, fanatical Elvis follower?" and got varied responses.

JUDY ROCK and her 23-year-old daughter, Jodee Riley, came with two less fanatical friends. Rock had seen Elvis in person nine or 10 times, the last time at Olympia Arena in April 1977 just months before his death. She caught the traditional thrown scarf.

"How did he look then?" we asked.
"Fat," both friends answered.
"A little heavy," Rock contradicted, "but he was precious."

RILEY RECALLED the time she was 9 and a novice Elvis fan.

"My mother dragged me with her to Los Angeles to his home."

"Imagine," her mother said, "I was hanging on the gate waiting for him to come out. His car started coming and Aunt Jan said get out the way, he's not going to stop, but I knew he would."

"He tried to get Jodee to come to the car and I said, 'How about me?' but he wanted the little girl. She went up and touched his hand, but she wouldn't kiss him. I jumped on the hood of the car and got a picture of his chest and the gold chains."

That picture and dozens of others photos, plaques, plates and other memorabilia are on display in the Rock home in Warren.

Riley, newly married, said husband Steve won't let her bring it to their home.
"He's kind of jealous."

SKIP CHAMPAGNE, 38, of Inkster was accompanied by her husband, Bill. Skip, whose brother "gives tributes" (not impersonations) of Elvis, was dressed in a pink satin jacket with burgundy letters that spelled out "Elvis."

"I've got to be part of this," Skip said. "I went to Graceland on his 50th birthday."

While her 50ish husband, Tom, shook his head, Jane Smithson of Troy was one of the few interviewed who admitted she owned a blue velvet painting of the King. Tom accompanied her and his sister, Mary Denmark, who first saw the Elvis movie "Love Me Tender" at the Fox Theatre in 1956.

Francis Wolaitis of Detroit sported a pompadour and sideburns in the manner of his hero. He went all the way to Las Vegas to see the Elvismania show, but it was sold out. When tickets went on sale for the Detroit show, he was in line early.

"Elvis is all he talks about," his stepson and brother-in-law said.

POLICE OFFICER Erich Laubert of St. Clair Shores likes Elvis so much, "he imitates him every year at our spring dance in a rented costume," his wife said.

"He does the whole bit with the '2001' opening and the scarves."

"The women screamed," Erich said, a grin on his face.

Jeff Dombrowski of Dearborn has 20 hours of news tapes of the day Elvis died.

"I would have had the whole 24 hours, but I ran out of reel," he said.

Two months after Elvis' death, Dombrowski went to Graceland "to stop by and take a look at the real radicals, the ones crying at the fence," he said.

"Am I a fan?" superfan Carol Campanella repeated. "When Elvis died I got sympathy cards. My boss gave me a day off to attend the funeral, but my boyfriend took my credit card. I only got as far as Woodhaven."

"I LIVE FOR Elvis and he lives for me," said Tanya Church, 25, of Royal Oak.

She went to Kalamazoo when she heard he was sighted at a fast food restaurant, "but I lived in Battle Creek at the time," she said. "It wasn't much of a trip."

Pat Nowasielski, 57, has dedicated one room of her Dearborn home to Elvis, but the memorabilia have spilled over into other rooms, including the bathroom in which a portrait of E.P. dominates. Friends have given her scarves, books, pictures and clocks.

A makeup artist, she saw Elvis at Olympia in '77 and at least 40 impersonators since. She does the makeup for many of them.

Sylvan Lake's John Dent, 26, has an Elvis record collection in the 1957 Wurlitzer jukebox he keeps in the kitchen.

"I try to emulate Elvis," the tall, handsome copywriter said, "especially when I dance. Except Elvis sneered and I like to smile."

NOT ALL members of the audience were pro-Elvis. Jill McCoy, 11, and sister Julie, 10, of Livonia were there with their mother and her best friend. The friend brought her daughters, Jodi and Amy Schwab of Milford.

"Our mothers wanted us to see what they did in the '60s," Amy said. "But we'd rather be at a hockey game."

Pat Patterson of Redford and a dozen other members of the Friends for Elvis Fan Club were at the Fox opening night. The newly formed sanctioned fan club generally meets on the 16th of the month at the Metro Hall, Plymouth and Beech Daly roads in Redford, to hear music and talk about their idol.

They recently held a party for Elvis' birthday (Jan. 8) and hired a local impersonator. Their next big event is a country-western night.

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It's Europe 'a la mode' or doing it your way

Q: We've already done a group tour to Europe. This time we want to go on our own. Please give us some tips on getting around and tell us how you meet local people.

A: In France, it was a school teacher who invited us to tour her father's vineyard in the Loire Valley. In Italy, it was the signora who fed us garlic shrimp and wine in the coastal village of Manarola. In Spain, it was the housewife who invited us into her home, where we got a magnificent view of the 17th century bridge in Ronda. In Germany, it was the postal worker who invited us to sit down at his table in an oompapa bar.

None of these small travel experiences were on our itinerary, but they are among our most treasured souvenirs of Europe. In each case we got off the beaten track to meet the ordinary people of an area. We traveled "a la mode." No, that doesn't mean "ice cream," it means having things your own way.

In some cases, we were traveling independently in a rental car. In others, we were on a tour and either defected for a day or stayed on after the tour was over. We have had great fun traveling in groups, but that fun is usually associated with other American travelers rather than the Europeans we came to "visit."

If you too treasure the small travel adventures that occur when you step off the main tourist track in Europe, you should follow some basic travel rules. Plan ahead, but wing it as much as you can after you get there. Go where the Europeans travel. Find out about special events, in case you are in the area when they happen. Learn a few words of a foreign language, but don't worry too much if you speak only English. You will do fine in Europe.

IF YOU plan to rent a car, do your

homework in the U.S. Rental prices differ dramatically from country to country because of tax rates. France charges 28 percent tax. Your regular car insurance may include collision insurance on a rental car in North America, but it probably won't cover you overseas.

Collision insurance can add 50 to 75 percent to your rental bill, but there is an alternative. Some credit card companies, especially those that offer "gold" cards, provide free rental car collision insurance overseas to travelers who pay for their

rental car with their credit card. It takes time to qualify so apply early.

If you are looking for the sun, consider southern Europe, especially the destinations that Europeans choose for their annual vacations. You will find the English, German and other European tourists, but practically no Americans, on the southern coast of Portugal and Spain, and in the Balearic Islands of Mallorca and Ibiza.

The only winter "snow" in the Balearic Islands is created by blizzards of almond blossoms; you can see them as early as January, but the group tour season booms in spring and fall. Most Europeans pick up a hotel or apartment for a week or two and do day trips around the islands.

If you are visiting Spain mid-summer, and you like crowds, the Running of the Bulls takes place in Pamplona July 7. It is part of the Festival of San Fermin. Barcelona is the site of the 1992 Olympics, but you won't see any sign of that yet. You will, however, find great summer music festivals in Santander, Granada and San Sebastian.

AS THE sun moves north into Germany, you can celebrate the 800th anniversary of the Port of Hamburg and the 1,000th anniversary of Bonn this year. The passion play at Oberammergau is not scheduled until 1990, but it is not too soon to start planning ahead for that!

Once you have chosen your itinerary, either on a tour or on your own, start digging through guide books

Once you have chosen your itinerary, either on a tour or on your own, start digging through guide books and travel magazines in your local library for those wonderful off-road treasures. That's how we discovered the top-rated country restaurant Auberge de L'ill in Illhaeusern, in Alsace a few miles north of Colmar on the French side of the Rhine River. The wonderful meal we had there would have cost us hundreds of dollars in Paris.

You should also explore your in-Europe transportation. Air fares are high, but trains are both reasonable and comfortable. French National Railroads launched its new fast Atlantic TGV train to Nantes in January. In the fall, it will start service to Brittany and in June 1990 to Tours, Bordeaux and the Spanish border. They should be just as good as the fast TGV trains that already run from Paris to Lyon and south.

French National Railroads offer a rail-car package. Air France offers air-rail-rental car packages. Air France, like several of the international airlines, are good sources of information for the countries they represent. Check the Automobile Club of Michigan or call the travel department off the Detroit Public

Library for tourist office addresses.

That will give you the hard facts. For the real travel experiences, take time to wander around, get lost and meet the people who live there.

WE MET the French school teacher because we stopped her on the street to ask a question in halting high school French. It was an unscheduled train trip into an unknown Italian village that led us to the signora. In Ronda, we stayed overnight instead of taking a day tour. After the tourists had gone, it was easy to slow down and talk to a lady tending her garden.

In Germany, where we wandered into a small bar after dinner, the tables were all occupied, but we were delighted to accept an invitation to join a German group. Just last week we got another post card from Adie, the postal worker we met there. He doesn't speak a word of English and it doesn't matter a bit!

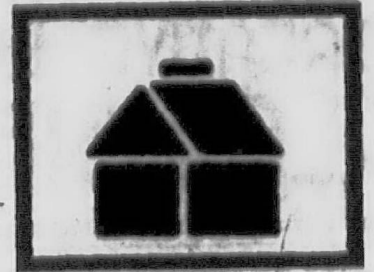

More on mildew

Q: Help! I live in a small cottage in a marshy area with wood paneled closets. Mold, mildew or a sour smell descends on my clothes in my closets if they aren't in zippered plastic bags. Egads, what can I do?

A: It sounds as if a dehumidifier would also be a nice addition to your cottage. Placed close to your closet, it should dry out the air noticeably. Louvered closet doors will allow air circulation, so your clothes won't feel so damp and cold when you put them on.

Finally, silica gels or calcium chloride granules are quite effective in retarding mold and mildew growth. Found in hardware and other stores under various brand names, they have an amazing ability to rid the air of that mildewy smell. Use them in basements in damp spring weather when furnaces no longer dry out the air, cottages, which are closed up for a period of time, or even in your home while you are gone on vacation. Follow instructions carefully.

After some of the above precautions have been taken, wash or have cleaned every article of clothing in your closet and keep only clean items there. Put non-cleanables like shoes in a bright, toasty warm place to air out completely.

When replacing items, make sure they are thoroughly dry and don't pack your clothes too tightly in your closet, so the air can circulate between them. Also remember that synthetic blends tend to retain mildew more than cotton.

By adding dry air and light, you can avoid cold starts in the mornings and your clothes will have a bright future.

Q: Can you help me cut my shopping time? An example: In the middle of other work I'll remember I need a greeting card and when I run out to get it, I end up browsing for other things.

A: Since shopping is usually more fun than work, many people use errands as an excuse to get out of other tasks.

First, consolidate your shopping. This takes planning. Schedule one time to buy all the greeting cards you'll need each month, keeping a few extra cards on hand to avoid emergency trips. If you are young and receive many wedding, baby and shower notices, invest more heavily in those cards. Sad but true, older folks should retain more get well and sympathy cards.

Do weekly meal planning and go to the grocery store only once a week. If you need something in between, add it to your list and adjust your menu, if necessary, instead of making another trip to the store.

Make only a few major clothes shopping trips per year, either when each season's clothes first arrive (when you'll pay premium prices) or during peak sales periods. For odds and ends, shop for specific items but cut browsing time.

One woman used to feel guilty during Christmas shopping forays because she would buy almost as much for herself as for others. Then she realized Fall was her busy period, affording little shopping time. Now she purposely saves winter clothes buying for December without guilt. She found Christmas shopping more fun this year and her time was well utilized by "killing two birds with one stone." Lots of attractive clothes are on sale then, too.

Another shopping tip: Organize your trips by direction. Keep a list of errands, then choose which you will do on a given day according to location. Chart your journey either in a circle or in a straight line. For the straight line, take an expressway to the farthest point, if possible, then work your way back on slower routes. If you run out of time, the unfinished errands will be closest to home.

Finally, schedule errands/shopping for certain days; i.e. always make your trips on Tuesday afternoons and Saturday mornings. When and how much time will vary with individuals, but such a plan will save time and family members will begin to respect that is when, and only when, you will run their errands.

Condo auction rules

Q: I read about an auction on condominiums that is taking place in a "conversion." Are there any legal problems that you can think of regarding the "auction?"

A: Having just attended one of these condominium auctions, I can tell you that the developer requires that a successful bidder sign a purchase agreement immediately as the auction is completed and further requests that the purchaser waive the nine-business-day cooling off period which the condominium statutes gives a purchaser when buying a unit from a developer.

In most situations, the purchaser is best advised not to waive the cooling off period so as to be given an opportunity to thoroughly review the condominium documents, the purchase agreement, the disclosure statement, and to otherwise consult with legal counsel.

In the case of an auction, perhaps, you can review the condominium documents and consult with counsel before the auction if you are serious about bidding on a unit.

Another revelation that was gleaned from the auction was that the purchase price ended up not being significantly lower than the asking price for the condominiums which were being offered by the developer before the auction. This was due, in part, to the marketing skills of the auctioneer in enticing people to come to the auction and bidding in at the auction.

The same problems which are attendant with any purchase of a condominium are applicable at an auction with the additional caveat that the purchaser is presumably under increased pressure because of the auction setting and the lack of an opportunity to have the condominium documents reviewed by legal counsel in order to make an informed decision.

Keep in mind that an auction is generally a marketing device by the developer to liquidate a significant number of units in the condominium project.

Q: I am a prospective purchaser of a "site condominium" and don't understand really what it is all about. I have talked to a so-called condominium specialist who tells me he doesn't know very much about it either. I thought I would go to the authority and hope you can give me some direction.

A: Site condominiums are a hot item which are being promoted by various attorneys in this community on behalf of their developer clients. The idea is to sell either land or a cubical of space, as defined in the condominium documents, to a purchaser even though no improvements are actually sold by the developer to the purchaser, i.e., what the purchaser is really getting is land and air space.

The purchaser then contracts with his own building contractor for the construction of a unit on the "space" which he has purchased from the condominium developer. Obviously, limitations should be placed upon the type of structure that can be constructed by the purchaser.

The problem with the concept is that various municipalities believe it is a subterfuge for getting around the Subdivision Control Act. Currently, the attorney general is in the process of writing an opinion concerning the propriety of site condos.
