## Rally held for troops serving in Middle East

A Vietnam veteran talked about the importance of showing troops that the people back home care.

Tears were in the eyes of a mother whose son is serving in the gulf war.

A wife of a serviceman looked for other military wives.

And a father recited lyrics from a ballad written for allied troops and dedicated to his son.

THE FOUR people are Canton residents who were among 190 supporters to attend a Desert Storm rally on Sunday sponsored by the Canton Community Foundation at Fellows Creek Golf Course, Canton. The purpose was to show support for service people in the gulf.

Sue Reed became pen pals with a 25-year-old Ohio serviceman after she sent packages to troops. The letters from her new pen pal, she said, often stress how much he appreciated the overwhelming support from people back home.

Her husband, Larry Reed, a Vietnam veteran, remembers a different reception.

"I spent two years in Vietnam and no one sent me anything," Reed said. "The first thing that I remember on returning from Vietnam is the pro-

testers and that says it all. It wasn't that they were protesting war. They were protesting (U.S. troops). I think it's important that everyone show, even if they are against the war, that they support the troops."

Mary Hayes paused occasionally to compose herself as she explained that her son Kenneth P. Hayes, 22, a 1987 Plymouth-Salem High School graduate, is serving in an Army chemical recovery unit.

"I've had a really hard time dealing with this," Hayes said. "There are days that all I do is cry. I hold a lot of it in and I get to a point that you need someone to talk to. You

## Recall hovers over 5 city commissioners

The recall campaign against five Plymouth city commissioners could get serious Tuesday.

That's when the Wayne County Elections Commission meets to review language submitted on five petitions that seek to recall Mayor Dennis Bila, Mayor Pro-Tem Ralph (Jack) Kenyon, and commissioners John Vos, James Jabara and Ron Loiselle.

The group Plymouth Concerned

Citizens is seeking the recall of the five, saying they voted against the public's wishes last month when they approved creation of a joint governing board with Plymouth Township to run Mettetal Airport.

The elections commission is scheduled to meet to review the petitions at 9:15 a.m. in Room 203 of the city-county building in Detroit.

"What the elections commission is supposed to look at is the clarity of the language on the petitions," said Marya Sieminski, chief deputy election clerk.

She said those gathering petition signatures must collect a number equalling at least 25 percent of the total number of votes cast in the last governor's election.

That means that in Plymouth, 827 signatures are required on each of the five separate petitions, she said.

Collected signatures are filed with the county clerk, then sent to the Plymouth city clerk who compares each signature with those on voter registration cards.

## Cops honor slain former co-worker

Steven Reuther showed "a lot of sensitivity toward people" during his 3½ years as a part-time police officer in Plymouth Township.

And Friday, 25 former co-workers from the Plymouth Township Police Department paid their respects by attending Reuther's funeral in Tecumseh, after his shooting death Feb. 4 in Milan.

Reuther, 32, a full-time Milan police officer, was shot and killed

while walking into work for the 5 p.m. shift by a man armed with an assault rifle, said a Michigan State Police investigator.

Charged in the slaying is Vito J. Trupiano, 39, of Taylor. Police say they suspect Trupiano in a series of shootings that began on Detroit area freeways three years ago.

REUTHER "WAS an excellent officer," Plymouth Township police Chief Carl Berry said. Reuther served as a patrol officer on the night shift.

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## Apparel shop to move down the street

Me and Mr. Jones, the women's apparel shop that has occupied the corner store in the Mayflower Hotel for more than 12 years, will move down the street to 924 Ann Arbor Trail March 8.

"It'll give us more space, nicer space, large sitting rooms and the opportunity to be next door to our petite store," said owner Fred Hill, who leased the store's current site and owns its new one, in addition to Fred Hill Haberdashers at 336 S. Main.

What about "location, location location?"

We carry nice quality merchandise, and nice quality merchandise should be presented rather than shown. You need to have enough room to present merchandise rather than hang it on rods."

The new store, vacated by Alvin's last summer, has twice the space, Hill said.

"As time goes by, you'll see some new categories that we haven't been able to carry before," he added.

Hill isn't saying yet what types of items will be added.

March 8 seemed like as good a day as any, because it's the anniversary of the petite store and

the Fred Hill store, Hill said. "Anyone who wants to come help us move is welcome to do so. You think I'm kidding?"

As for the reason behind Alvin's departure, Hill said, "I'd theorize this wasn't the only store they closed. Willow Tree closed a lot of stores; it's kind of the same thing.

"I don't know, really. Sometimes it's easier to get out of a small town commitment than a commitment at a Taubman mall.

Creon Smith, general manager of the Mayflower Hotel, said a decision on Me and Mr. Jones' successor is imminent.

"We have had a lot of strong interest in the location, and people from many areas have come inquiring about the space," said Smith.

"We're very close on the decision we are going to make. At this point, it is not final and I can't disclose it. You can trust that whoever it is will be an asset to the town, because it's a very strong corner for the Mayflower and for the city."

Lee Jakolski sat at Hayes's table during the rally. By coincidence, Jakolski picked Kenneth Hayes's name off a bulletin board to become pen pals. Jakolski said she's frustrated by the war "even though I don't have a family member there."

Deborah Vachon brushed back a strand of hair from her 3-year-old daughter's face as she explained that she and her husband, Stephen E. Vachon, were thinking about having another child when he was sent to the Persian Gulf as part of the Army special forces. Her husband expects to be promoted to captain next week, she added.

Deborah Vachon attended the support rally "hoping to find someone who has a husband over there."

When asked where her father is and what he is doing, Jessica, 3, said: "Saudi Arabia. Beating up." Whose that had man? Deborah Vachon prompted her daughter? "Saddam Hussein," Jessica answered.

Larry Kaneeshaw is producing a song, "Desert Strength" with a friend and Canton resident, Eric Weber. The song is dedicated to Kaneeshaw's son, Scott, who is in the 86th Airborne.

Some of the lyrics are: "The sun is

going down in the desert sky. Bullets are flying, soldiers are fighting. Stand behind the flags that you represent. Let it be your desert shield. Moving through the sand like a Desert Storm. Hearts of fury, minds of glory. Moving through the air like a screaming arrow."

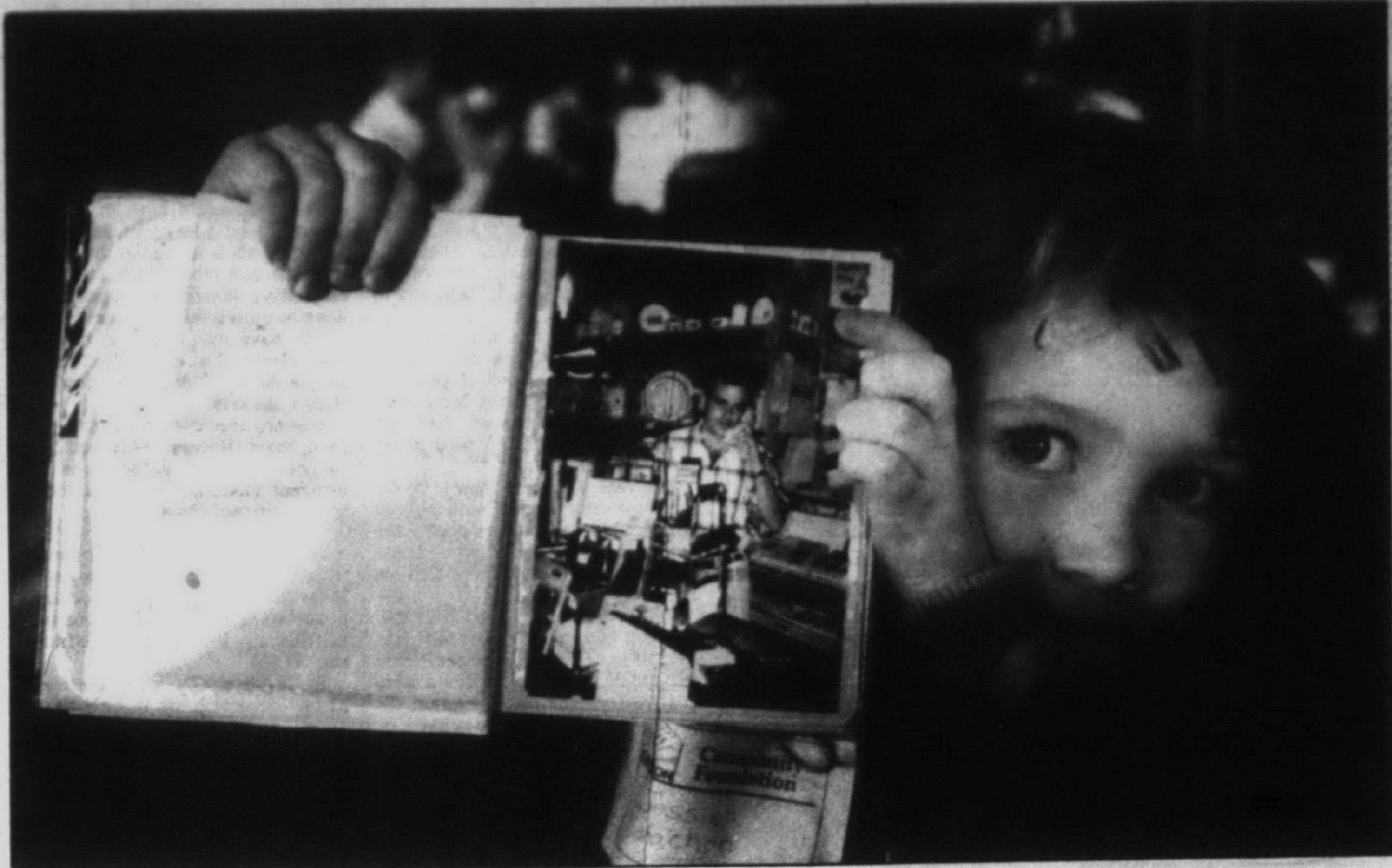

"WE JUST wanted to get together to wish you the best of luck and tell you both we very much support what you are doing and we care," said Paul Janshego, plant manager. "Harry has a little presentation for you."

Executive vice president Harry Hasuko handed the Oliviers a check for \$1,000.

"Maybe that will help you get over the hump a bit, or at least in the immediate future," Janshego said. "Whatever we can do to help, just let us know."

"All the team members support what you are doing. Hopefully this (the Persian Gulf War) will be over quickly and you will be back with us soon."

"THANK YOU. I appreciate it," said Oliver, a member of the Marine Corps from 1983-87. "I'll send you postcards."

Oliver's unit is more fortunate than some others that received just 72 hours notice of their departure, he said.

"I found out this past weekend. Leaving the family is the toughest part. The military part I can handle."

Oliver played trombone in the Marine band. He'll drive military vehicles for the Air Force, and may play in a band as part of his Air Force duties, "or just to pass the time."

"It's going to be hard with him being gone," Kelli Oliver said. "The kids sure are going to miss him. We've never been apart. There'll be a lot of changes."

"It's not Saudi Arabia. So I'm real grateful for that. I'm lucky in that aspect of it."

## THE GULF WAR Hitting Home

OLIVER IS well respected at ProCoil, a joint venture firm formed in 1988 by National Steel and the Marubeni and Mitsubishi corporations to cut steel for the automotive industry.

"Fred is one of the best staff at ProCoil and we are losing him," Hasuko said.

"The check is something small, but we wish to help him more. We wish to do more for him. We are looking forward to working together again as soon as possible. That's my word to him; that's a promise."

Oliver was among the first to be hired at ProCoil, said Bob Brown,

production, planning and control manager.

"He's been with us right from the beginning. He's an exemplary employee. He will be missed," Brown said.

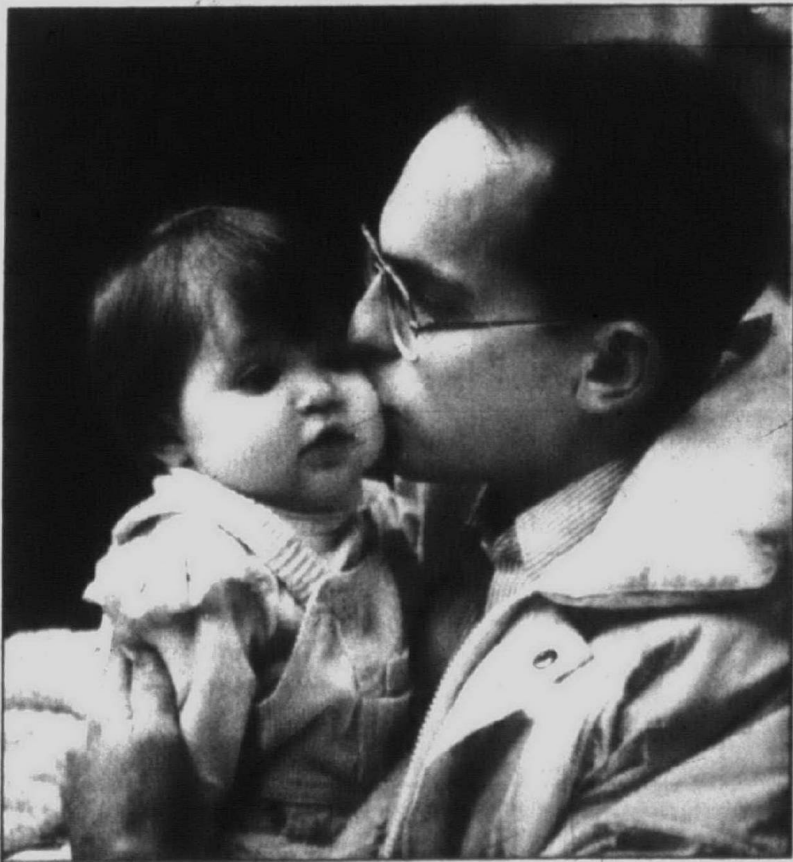
"We're sorry to see him go, but we're pledging our support to him and looking forward to having him back."

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# Child care cuts shock providers

Plans to eliminate child care licensing have sent shock waves through area nurseries and day care centers, with operators stunned such a move was even being considered.

"I'm not saying a license is the only reason a center is good, but I can't understand why you wouldn't want to have licensing," said Carol Tresik, of Learning Tree Child Care Center, Livonia.

That would happen by March 16, however, as part of a 9.2 percent cut in the state's Social Services budget. As of that date, Michigan would be alone among the 50 states in eliminating licensing.

"This would be devastating," said Tresik, one of a number of center operators who recently discussed the issue with state Social Services Director Gerald Miller.

"I can't imagine any insurance company giving insurance to an unlicensed facility and without insurance you can't even operate."

While removal of licensing could increase the number of centers, area center operators say competition worries them far less than what they believe will be a decline in quality of child care.

"IT OPENS the door for any individual to hang out a shingle," said Geri Angel, district manager for Children's World Learning Centers, which operates child care facilities in Canton, Farmington Hills, Livonia, Redford and Southfield, among other communities.

Beyond that, Angel said, state regulators often provide helpful information to center operators.

"They're our first source," she said. "We'll call upon them, for their expertise."

"The bottom line is what's best for the children," said Sheila Niehaus, district manager for Kinder Care Learning Centers, which operates child care facilities in Farmington Hills, Westland, Plymouth Township

and Canton, among other communities.

Though cuts appear driven by economics, not philosophy, some political conservatives have long questioned licensing. Some believe licenses tax business without protecting the consumer.

Child care providers, however, say that's not the way it is in their businesses.

"Our inspector was very thorough," Tresik said. "We welcome the inspection."

"THIS IS an industry that wants to be licensed," said state Rep. Lyn Bankes, R-Livonia. "These are people who'd even pay a fee to keep licensing going."

Bankes, a member of the House Republican Task Force on Child Care, said she been working for years to increase the number of state regulators.

"In Ingham County right now, there's a six month wait to open a center just to get the regulator there," Bankes said.

The GOP task force is meeting Feb. 19 to discuss the proposal as well as alternative changes in state regulations.

One plan, Bankes said, would set up regional regulating bodies, though she noted that proposal hasn't received strong support from center operators.

Despite the fact that state regulators have received pink slips, Bankes said she was optimistic licensing would continue.

Without it, she said, the state would stand to lose more than \$20 million in federal money.

Beyond that, Bankes quoted Gov. John Engler's campaign pledge to make education and children a top state priority.

"I know that in Gov. Engler's executive order, he held licensing and regulations harmless (from cuts) and he's holding education harmless," she said. "He cares about children and he's shown this."

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# Lawmakers study auto injury catastrophic claims

In 1980 you hardly noticed the \$3 item in your auto insurance bill. By 1986 the item was \$16 per vehicle. Last year it cost \$67, this year \$101, and by 2000 state lawmakers fear it could soar to \$350.

The drain on the Michigan Catastrophic Claims Association is getting a hard study by Sen. Doug Cruce, R-Troy, and his Commerce Committee. Under state law, insurers set up a non-profit group in Livonia to pay auto injury claims of

more than \$250,000, mostly for brain and spinal cord injuries.

"There's an ominous chance of unlimited benefits," MCCA head Edward M. Machowski told the panel last week.

COMMITTEE member Paul Wartner, R-Portage, asked, "In summary, we're out of control — right?" "I would say so," Machowski answered.

"MCCA distributes unlimited losses so no one insurer suffers a catastrophic loss. The cost is passed on to policyholders," Machowski explained. "The insurer bears the loss

of the first \$250,000, and MCCA bears the loss beyond that amount."

Michigan's no-fault insurance law requires insurers to pay benefits for "all reasonable charges incurred for reasonably necessary products, services and accommodations for an injured person's care, recovery or rehabilitation." There are no annual or lifetime limits.

Claims have escalated: \$2 million in 1982, \$9 million in '84, \$24 million in '86, \$55 million in '88, and about \$100 million last year.

MICHIGAN law is the most generous in the nation, MCCA said.

Cruce put it another way: "The state has imposed a cost on people who own autos that the state is not willing to bear. The state has shifted the burden to auto insurance carriers and imposed a higher level of care."

Machowski said insurers have no control over the costs, nor have they any incentive to challenge big claims. "The charges tend to be as heavy as the traffic will bear," he said.

Gregory Hayward, a State Farm actuary who works with MCCA, said early premiums were "grossly inadequate" because the rate-making

committee had no experience from which to estimate future costs.

"Rising costs are not due to more claims but utilization of technology and rising costs," Hayward said.

CRUCE SAID there is no bill before the Legislature, but he indicated several directions in which lawmakers would look:

- Charge more for motorcycles.
- Cylinders pay 4 percent of total assessments but suffer 8.5 percent of the catastrophic injuries.
- Cap medical care charges.
- Limit coverage to (say) \$1 million.
- Base premiums on the number

of drivers rather than the number of vehicles. A person with three vehicles pays three times.

- Look at risk factors. Young drivers have a higher injury rate, and the elderly will live fewer years and receive fewer benefits.
- Consider geographic area, as is done with regular auto insurance.

Cruce, who gave up his Appropriations Committee seat for the Commerce chair, said his panel would continue its study at its 3 p.m. Tuesday meetings into March. Excused from the first session was Sen. William Faust, D-Westland, who was out of the state.

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
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


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# Tax checkoff aids children

The current recession means hard times for Michigan's children, says one of the state's top child abuse prevention experts.

According to Joe Crump, chairman of the board of the Children's Trust Fund for the Prevention of Child Abuse, "It's a vicious circle."

"One of the tragic outcomes of tough economic times is the increase in family stress, which in turn produces a sad increase in child abuse. And all this is happening at the same time there is a decrease in the amount of money available to provide child abuse prevention services," said Crump.

Crump said the Children's Trust Fund itself is the victim of the current economic downturn.

"Less than 3 percent, only 121,260 Michigan taxpayers, were concerned enough about child abuse last year to

check off the CTF line of their income tax form," he said.

"The funds collected through the income tax check-off are vital to child abuse prevention efforts in this state. In the past eight years these donations have made possible the funding of hundreds of programs which have provided help to more than 300,000 Michigan children and families.

"We're hoping Michigan taxpayers will be generous with their contributions this year. Last year we had to reduce our support because of dwindling donations and cuts in a federal matching grant. This year, programs offering child abuse prevention services are depending on us more than ever because there is less money available from other sources. You can be sure that state budget reductions will hit these programs hard," Crump said.

This year's tax form includes a new CTF logo which Crump hopes will draw more taxpayers' attention to the check-off. The new logo includes the words "Stop Child Abuse," is a child-like print with an octagon stop-sign shape and the word "Before Another Child is Hurt" underneath.

The trust fund is an independent, non-profit agency established in 1982 as a permanent source of funding for local programs throughout the state to prevent child abuse and neglect. Currently more than 100 programs and local child abuse prevention councils receive funding in 76 of Michigan's 83 counties.

"It's important we all recognize that child abuse is everyone's problem. We either pay now to prevent child abuse or we pay a much higher price later," said Crump.



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


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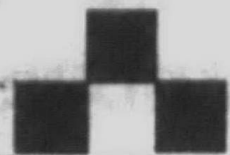
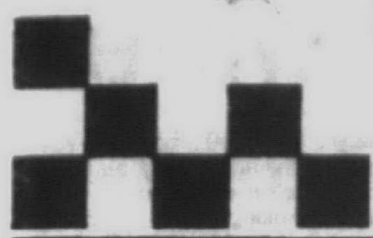

## With Love: Desserts and Wine

DOES ANYONE KNOW who St. Valentine was? No one seems to know for sure. A number of legends describe the patron of lovers. Author Edna Barth explains in "Hearts, Cupids and Red Roses" that early church records list a number of martyrs with the name St. Valentine, and they all shared the same feast day, Feb. 14, during the third century.

In spite of its obscure origins, the celebration of love has survived through the centuries. What better way to celebrate the holiday than with hearts, the symbol of love: chocolate cheesecake hearts, pastry hearts filled with custard and fresh fruits, genoise layer-cake hearts layered with buttercream, custard cream and strawberries; or frozen chocolate ice cream hearts filled with lingonberry sauce and topped with bittersweet chocolate.

A Valentine dessert party is an easy way to entertain because all the desserts can be made ahead or purchased from a number of talented local chefs or bakers. Complement the desserts by adding four or five fine dessert wines, to create a majestic dessert, wine-tasting party.

If you have never attempted a tasting party before, there are some things you need to know. Decide on the number of guests, then select a few sumptuous recipes and a few appropriate dessert wines. Not sure where to begin? To help out, we have consulted experts in the field of fine food and wine.

AFTER ESTABLISHING the guest list, develop the menu. Elwin Greenwald of Elwin's Tu-Go in Royal Oak and David Auer of Baking by the Auers in Southfield returned our challenge with three fabulous heart-shaped delights. For a party of 10, the experts agreed five desserts is a workable number to generously accommodate the group.

Greenwald suggested the menu have at least one chocolate dessert. He decided to prepare Espresso Way Tu Your Heart, individual chocolate cheesecakes served with a passion fruit sauce and a pas-

try heart filled with custard and topped with honeydew, cantaloupe and watermelon balls.

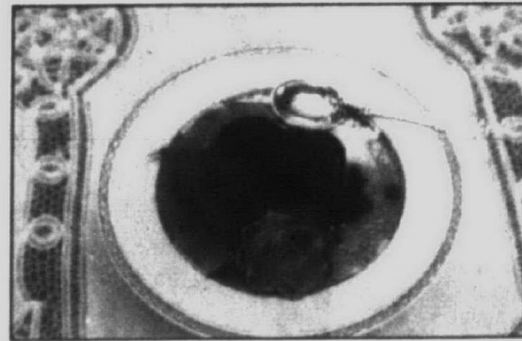
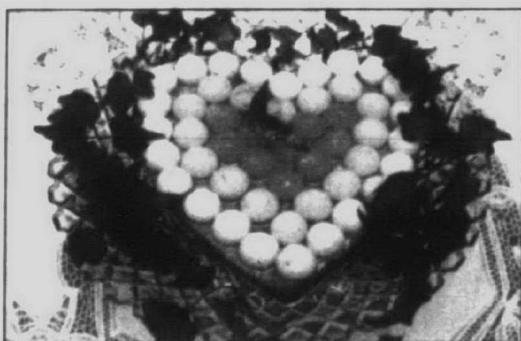
One of Auer's most spectacular recipes is for a Bagatelle Torte. This French genoise cake is layered with pastry cream, buttercream and fresh strawberries covered with a layer of pink-tinted marzipan and topped with a hand-shaped fondant rose, at our request.

To round out the menu, we added an apple-cranberry crisp and a 10-inch chocolate ice cream heart, filled with lingonberry sauce and topped

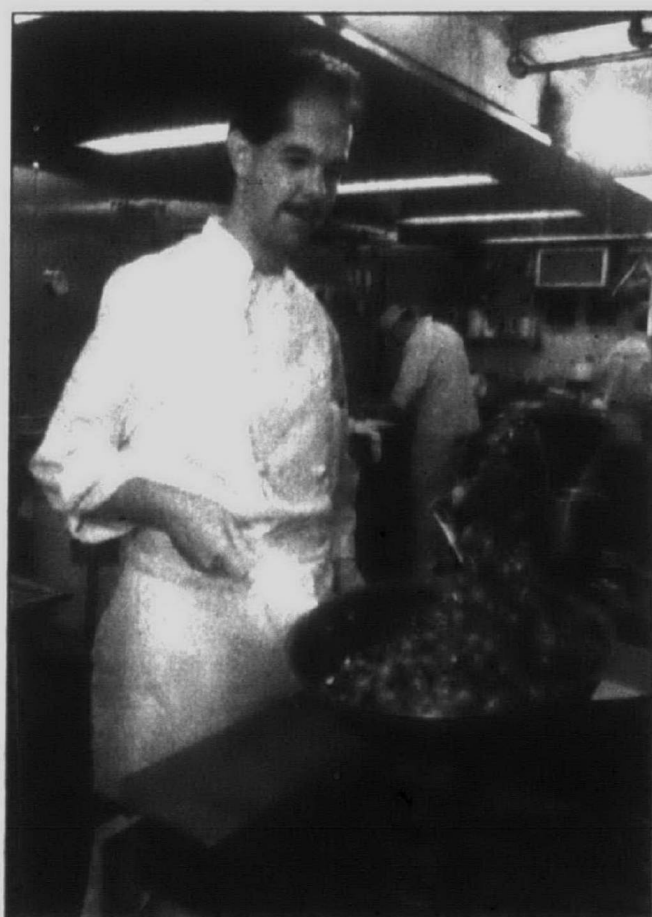
with melted bittersweet chocolate.

Five desserts for 10 guests may seem extravagant but is essential for a dessert-tasting party when dinner is not being served. One guideline to keep in mind is that the desserts should be distinctly different from each other — a few very light and one or two of them very rich. For a larger party with 20 guests, five or six courses are certainly ample, just double the recipe.

## Chef is in the know

Gary Danko knows food. Gary Danko knows wine. Many chefs know food but not many know wine. Gary Danko knows wine because for the last several years he has been the chef/manager for The Restaurant at Chateau Souverain Winery in Sonoma County, Calif.

During his tenure at Chateau Souverain, the Restaurant received a four-star rating from the Wine Spectator magazine, and Chef Danko was honored as one of the Top 10 New Chefs of 1989 by Food and Wine magazine.

Danko recently demonstrated his skills of matching wine and food, at Detroit's London Chop House, where he participated in the Great Chefs program. "First and foremost," Danko said, "freshness is the hallmark of my cuisine."

Beginning with a coupe of Maison Deutz California Brut Cuvee, Danko explained that the Deutz had a French taste because the limestone-chalk soils at Deutz are very much like the soils of Champagne, France. "Salty, fried, spicy and Thai foods go best with sparkling wine," Danko suggested. "The bubbles lift the food and refresh the palate. I prefer this wine when it is served very cold."

WITH THE 1989 Beringer Napa Valley Sauvignon Blanc, Danko prepared Pan Steamed Fresh and Smoked Salmon with Fennel, Leeks and Spinach. Pinwheels of fresh and smoked salmon were quickly sauteed to leave a center of delicate pink flesh. "Salmon is a medium fatty fish," Danko said. "It matches well with dry, high acid wines like sauvignon blanc. The wine's acidity

cuts through the fatty character of the fish just like lemon."

Grilled Marinated Quail was presented with Polenta Croutons, Cranberry Onion Compote and three vintages (1984, '85, and '86) of Beringer Reserve Cabernet Sauvignon. The small game birds matched with the cabernets because the cranberries tied the dish to the wine. The tannin in the cranberries heightened the fruit character of the wines and acted as the tie that binds.

The same three wines accompanied the third course of Lamb Medallions, Tarragon Lamb Essence, and Celery Root-Garlic Puree. A completely different phenomenon carried off this combination. The puree of celery root, with its earthy flavors, played against the natural herbal qualities of the cabernets, highlighting a completely different wine personality.

"Serve the best wines early in the meal," Danko advises. "before the palate tires or dessert arrives. I serve a 'savory course' following the

- 4 cups fresh spinach
- 1 can mandarin oranges, drained, 8-ounce size

#### FORTUNE COOKIES AND SORBET

Fun to make, these fortune cookies will delight your family. Serve them with a dish of your favorite fruit-flavored sorbet.

- ¼ cup flour
- 2-3 tablespoons sugar
- 1 tablespoon cornstarch
- 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
- 1 egg white
- 1-2 tablespoons water
- 8 small strips of paper with fortunes written on them

Mix flour, sugar and cornstarch. Add oil and egg white and stir until smooth. Add water and mix well. Pour 1 tablespoon of batter on a small skillet that has been sprayed with a non-stick spray. Spread the batter out thinly in a 3-to-4-inch circle. Cook over very low heat for about 4 minutes or until lightly browned. Turn the cookie over with a spatula and cook for 1 more minute. Remove the cookie from the pan and fold in half, placing the fortune in the middle. Fold cookie again over the edge of a bowl. Place in a muffin tin to cool. Repeat the process with the remaining batter.

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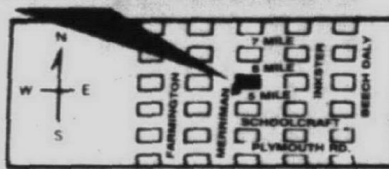

Place finished roll on a well-greased cookie sheet.

If you are not ready to bake your roast at this time, refrigerate it, so that the pastry won't rise.

When you are ready, place the roast in a 425 degree oven and bake an additional 20 minutes or so, until crust is a beautiful golden brown.

To serve, slice crosswise and cover each slice with gravy made from the pan drippings, or with fresh sauteed mushrooms.

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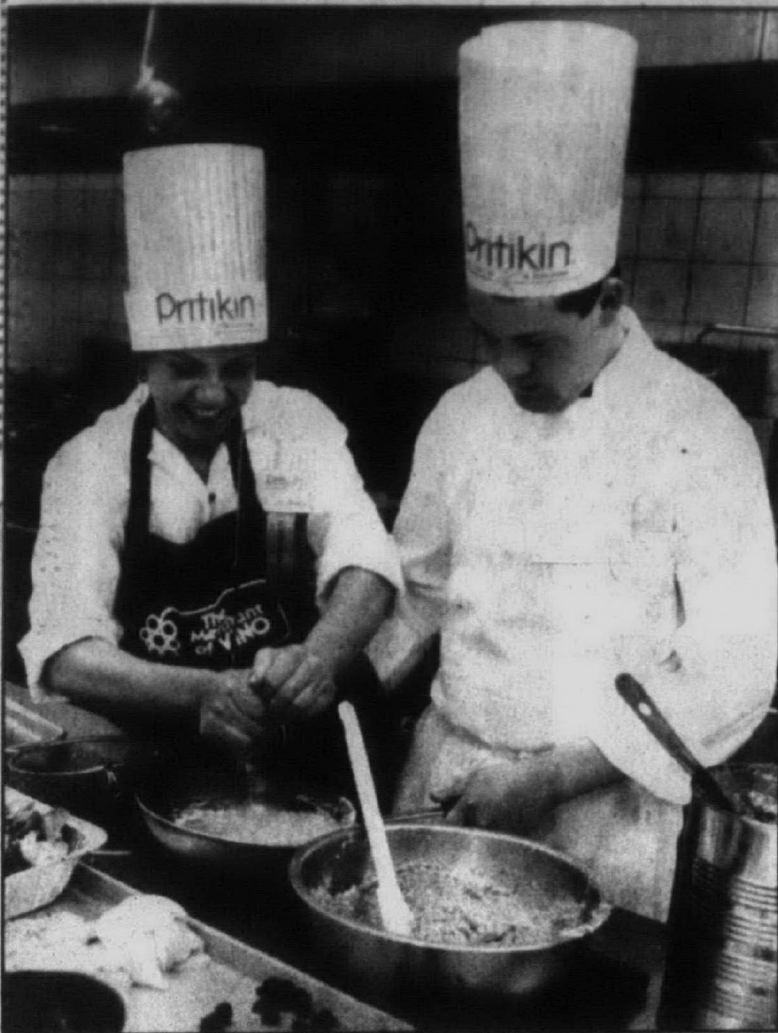

## MIXED EMOTIONS

### Students swap flag burning for flag waving to support troops

Don't bother lecturing Lori Grady of Canton about the unpleasantness of war. Don't tell her about United States casualties or the mounting cost of the endeavor to get Saddam Hussein and Iraq out of Kuwait.

She understands all that. And though Grady was a mere infant, she's well versed in the history of U.S. involvement in Vietnam. A lesson was learned from the protests of that war, she said.

"That wasn't a positive thing," said Grady, 21, a 1988 graduate of Plymouth Salem High School. "It hindered the troops."

"Here they (U.S. soldiers) were over there and back home here we had riots at Kent State and people burning draft cards. What do the soldiers think? They're wondering 'Why are we here?'"

Wednesday, Jan. 16, Grady saw history repeating itself.

After initial reports of the bombing of Baghdad, Iraq, came on television, Grady and her friends heard an anti-war demonstration out-

side the window of her dorm room at Eastern Michigan University. Then they saw the United States flag being hung upside down.

She became infuriated. It's one thing to be upset. It's quite another to spend time organizing a group of students to have a counter rally. Grady decided to act.

GRADY AND six other students at EMU formed United Students for the United States. The group has organized several rallies at the campus, designed to show U.S. troops that unlike during the Vietnam War, many students support them.

Some of the organizers have family members fighting in Operation Desert Storm. One person, amiably called "G.I. Joe," fought in the Vietnam War.

Then there are others like Grady. She only knows that Americans her age are fighting and dying for a cause they believe in.

"I think a lot of people are confused on this," said Grady, who estimates 75 percent of the students support U.S. efforts in the Persian Gulf. "A lot of people are afraid to support the troops because they believe it's supporting war."

For her efforts, Grady and her fellow students have been called "war mongers" by some.

Their first rally in the center of the EMU campus was marred by a scuffle, which Grady said didn't involve members of her organization. Eastern Michigan University's Department of Public Safety reported a car damaged during the gathering.

A veteran political activist would say it's part of the territory. Not for Grady.

THE WOMAN with red hair standing in Goddard Hall resembles the average college junior dressed in blue jeans and a sweat shirt clutching a Bart Simpson key chain. She describes herself and the other students involved as "conservative."

Radical or malcontent is not the first words that come to mind.

Grady is not involved in student government or any political causes. She majors in special education, not political science or any applicable field of study one would associate for a rally organizer.

She's lived a typical white, middle class "Beaver Cleaver" existence. Her personality is more suited to be a spectator than the leader of the pack.

Yet something happened at the first gathering, attended by 800 students.

### Anti-war activists state case with words and phrases

Before going into battle, the anti-war protester first needs to check his uniform.

The olive green Army-issued coat with punk band names such as The Clash, Angry Red Planet and the Blanks scrawled in black marker on the back is put over his frame. He notices the right sleeve is torn.

"I got roughed up at the last demo," said the activist inspecting the shredded material. "I wonder if the police will pay for that."

A couple of buttons are strewn on the table, one is a peace sign. He strategically affixes them to his coat and then places a baseball cap atop his disheveled mane of brown hair.

Bill Boyer, 29, is ready to protest.

In his arsenal are a slew of catchy phrases, ones that lend themselves to sound bites on the 11 o'clock news. Every once in awhile, he tries them out.

"Wargasm, how's that for a word?"  
"We don't want people to be casual about casualties. How's that for a quote?"

Today's demonstration won't call for those, however. Boyer and a group calling itself Bread, Not Bombs will stage a silent protest against United States involvement in the Persian Gulf War at the Patrick A. McNamara Federal Building in Detroit.

TWELVE PROTESTERS will sit silent in the lobby of the government site at 4 p.m.

The idea is for workers of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Internal Revenue Service, Social Security Administration and Government Purchasing Office Book Store to take heed and perhaps re-evaluate U.S. participation in the war against Iraq.

If they get arrested, well, it's the price to get the point across. "I'd rather them show pictures of casualties than get my picture in the paper," Boyer said. "We want to alert people to the realities of the war."

Before his departure, Boyer checks his pockets once more. He pulls out some blood capsules.

Visual effects, he said. Despite the slogans and the props, one wouldn't have pegged Boyer to be one of the vocal discontented. Where he was raised, where he went to school . . . those places don't breed anti-establishment types. And Boyer was the model suburbanite in his youth.

The 1979 graduate of Birmingham Seaholm High School has surprised them, though.

"My dad and I had an argument earlier today," said Boyer wearily. "He told me I was too emotional about the war."

**BOYER'S IS** not the rhetoric of a limousine liberal, a person whose radicalism stops when he plops into his BMW and rushes off to shop for a new fur coat for his paramour. He lives what he preaches.

His residence is the Cass Corridor, an area considered the epicenter for prostitution and poverty. He gets by on \$70 a week, giving music lessons to inner-city youths.

"I guess it was moving down here and experiencing real community," said Boyer, explaining his choice of alternative lifestyle. "In the suburbs, community is lending your lawn mower to your neighbor."

"Underneath the violence and poverty, you have a real network of friends. I guess partly out of necessity, but mainly because people try to practice what they believe in."

Boyer's political activism stretches to a wide-array of causes. His most visible campaign has been with the Evergreen Alliance, which fought (and still fights) the incinerator in Detroit.

He's been involved in more than 100 protest rallies and has been arrested three times before this day.

The activist is also an artist. He's guitarist and founder of The Blanks, a raucous neo-political rock'n'roll outfit with a new album "If This Had Been an Actual Emergency . . ."

**BOYER IS** also a playwright, recently debuting "Deer Crossing" at the Trumbull Theater in Detroit.

He pulls out a frayed copy of Arthur Miller's "Death of a Salesman" before leaving for the sit-in.

Something to read in jail, he said. Boyer, if anything, exemplifies the '90s anti-war protester who is perhaps more educated, media savvy and, unlike their '60s compatriots, less likely to call U.S. soldiers "baby killers."

"People say we don't support the troops," Boyer said. "We do support the troops. We want them home."

Even if it means sitting crossed-legged of the floor in the Federal Building for 1 1/2 hours.

A member of the building security informs demonstrators they can sit until 5:30 p.m. when the building closes. If they refuse to move then, they'll be arrested.

Another member of security walks by with a handful of plastic handcuffs.

"We're not going to beat them over the head or anything," said a smirking security staff member to a newspaper photographer looking obsequiously hip in tennis shoes and jeans.

A few people stare. For the most part, though, those leaving the building as work lets out seem indifferent.

As the deadline nears, Boyer gets a little antsy. He stands up and walks around, defying security orders. He also changes the plastic lettering on the cafeteria felt menu to spell "peace."

Boyer turns and puts up two fingers to people protesting outside the building. It's not the peace sign, just the number of minutes until the building closes and they'll be arrested.

A few minutes after 5:30 p.m., the sitters are handcuffed and led away down the corridor away from photographers. Outside the group sings choruses of "We Shall Not Be Moved," which caps off a rather anticlimactic conclusion to the protest.

For his efforts, Boyer was held by police for three hours and released. He was ticketed for disobeying a lawful order. Boyer said he'll probably plead guilty.

"I thought it was successful," he said. "We reached a lot of people in the building who are only exposed to one side of the war."

Security scurries about and clears the rear entrance of media. No one is allowed to enter the building.

"It was the most incredible thing," Grady said. "I wrote a speech. I put a lot of heart into it."

"I just got up there and got so full of this confidence and I read it with all this emotion I didn't know I had."

As the rally neared, Grady emerged as more than a mere participant.

Her immaculate dorm room is an enclave of activity. The phone continually rings as she checks out the final details.

"Is G.I. Joe out there with the flag?" she asks Kevin Glazer of Bay City, another organizer for United Students for United States.

A FEW MINUTES before 10 p.m., Grady braces against the near-zero night air in a long overcoat with a red, white and blue ribbon tied around her arm and a yellow bow on the label and trudges out to the rally site.

Only a few students have arrived at the kiosk, which has been painted red, white and blue for the event. A small blond woman goes around with a tape recorder, asking people to say some words of encouragement to be sent to the troops.

"Don't print any of the obscene chants you might hear," Grady asks.

As evening classes let out of Pray-Harold, the crowd begins to assemble. Many are jumping around, trying to stay warm.

Grady coordinates the confusion with a bullhorn in hand.

"So your brother and his platoon are on the front line of Saudi Arabia and you're coordinating letters to be sent to them? Sweet," Grady says to one of the scheduled speakers.

As the rally proceeds, Grady stirs up the crowd with some Arsenio Hall-style arm thrusts. The students, some dressed in fatigues and some in fraternity jackets, begin to chant "U.S.A., U.S.A."

Grady puts her hand covered by a white mitten over her heart during the Pledge of Allegiance. A TV crew from WKBD-TV Channel 50 arrives and she commands the throng not to mob the cameras.

**THE PATRIOTIC** display is complete with heartfelt renditions of "The Star-Spangled Banner" and "God Bless America."

Speakers each take their turn, including the girl asking for people to write to the soldiers in the desert. She holds up a tape recorder so the troops can hear the cheering.

Grady grasps a small U.S. flag and listens intently.

The rally proceeds in a march around campus. Several students wave large American flags while one supporter carries an Iraqi flag with a cardboard skeleton pinned on it.

Some students poke their heads out of their dorm windows and yell encouragement to the rally. A couple question Saddam Hussein's parentage.

"We have total control tonight," Grady says, beaming as the parade snakes around the dorm halls. "Last time, we lost control."

"These are the true supporters. This is going great."

Part of that credit goes to Grady herself. In an authoritative voice belying her personality, she commands that there be no alcohol. When the line strays onto the lawn, she yells for them to get back.

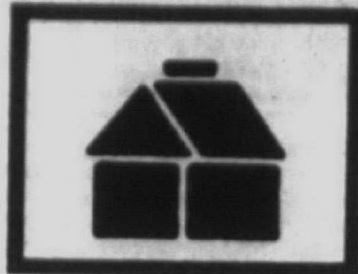
If anything, the event confirms her belief that many students support the troops in the Persian Gulf. She doesn't hold any malice toward those who don't agree with her and hold anti-war rallies.

"I think they really do care, and they do support the troops in their own way," she said, "... but they're going about in the wrong way."

## Art flowers in poster competition

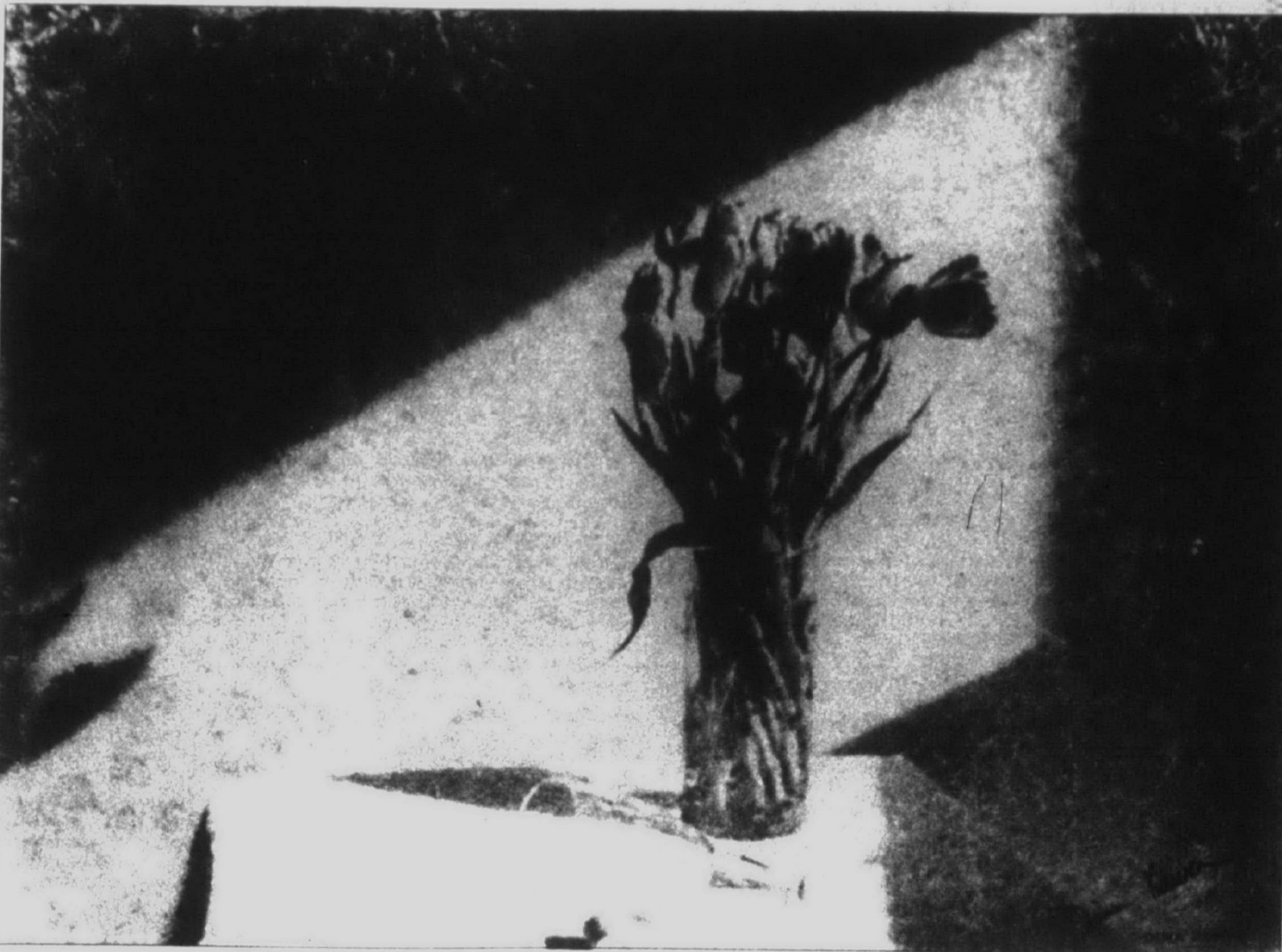
Kawer has said that even when she working on her degree in fine arts at Wayne State, she was inter-

# Carl Reiner hosts 'Sunday Best'

## New NBC program looks at television past, present

Comedy legend Carl Reiner has been humoring television audiences through five decades ever since he was a regular on 1949's "The 54th Street Revue."

He's at it again as host of NBC's new series "Sunday Best," which looks at funny broadcasting moments since the beginning of television through the present.

While he got his start on television as the photographer in a 1948 series called "Fashion Story," he gained fame for two other roles: his regular spot on the 1950's variety program "Your Show of Shows" and his writing and producing role on "The Dick Van Dyke Show." In fact, the tall, balding Reiner looks the same as he did when he played on the latter show as Alan Brady from 1961 to 1966.

The '60s brought another claim to fame for the comedian. His comedy routine, "The 2,000 Year Old Man" with Mel Brooks, had several incarnations on television and on records.

In the early 1970s he worked for a

while on "The New Dick Van Dyke Show," and in 1976 he played Mr. Angel in the short-lived series "Good Heavens." Later in that decade he took his talents to feature films, directing movies like "Oh God" and "The Jerk."

He got his chance to play drama in the 1981 TV movie "Skokie." But he has also continued creating comedy vehicles for others as a writer, producer and director.

As host of NBC's "Sunday Best," Reiner will be guiding viewers through events in television history.

"He's really the father figure who guides you through, and he really is strictly the host. He may do an occasional comedy bit, but we will have other comedy bits on the show," explained Garth R. Ancier, executive producer of "Sunday Best."

Those other comedy bits are provided by an eclectic group of television aficionados including syndicated columnist and TV satirist Linda Ellerbee, actor/comedian (and original Eddie Haskell) Harry Shearer, co-creator of David Letterman's

"Late Night" Merrill Markoe and comedian Jeff Cesario. Executives on "Sunday Best" include former CNN managing editor Cissy Baker and former "SPY Magazine" features editor Bruce Handy.

On the premiere episode of "Sunday Best," the contributors paid tribute to Reiner through a segment of clips of his classic shows, including his toupee run on "The Dick Van Dyke Show," "The 2,000 Year Old Man" and skits from "Your Show of Shows."

Each week "Sunday Best" will be divided into various segments, from a look at the previous week in television to highlights excerpted from a week at some other point in television's history. There's a theme segment, a viewer video mail segment, and lots and lots of miscellaneous clips.

"It continues to be molded and shaped. That's the nature of a show like this. It's never been done before, so the whole thing keeps molding as we go along," Ancier said. "We're just having fun with it."

TV comedy king Carl Reiner hosts NBC's new weekly series "Sunday Best." The series takes a look at humorous broadcasting moments from the beginning of television up to the most recent week's shows. "Sunday Best" is broadcast, appropriately, on Sundays.

The Razorbacks were the pre-season favorites to take the national title before UNLV returned to the picture.

# SOAP TALK

## Role more important than recognition

By Candace Havens

Almost every weekday you can see John Aprea portraying Lucas on *Another World*. His character has gone through a transformation over the past year, beginning as a bit of a hoodlum who could do no right and becoming a man simply trying to prove himself.

"When my character was younger I was supposedly a bit of a scoundrel who was driven out of town. Now I've come back to try to clean up my act," said Aprea in a recent interview.

"I've actually played a lot of characters of ill repute," said Aprea. One such character, Manny Vasquez on *Knots Landing*, brought him more recognition than he could have ever imagined. "I didn't realize the power of that show. Manny wasn't a part where they call you up and give you a contract. He just started and then ended up going through an entire season. He was a recognizable character, but I didn't feel like a real part of the show. But it turned out that more people knew me during that period than all of the other stuff I've done put together."

After the role on *Knots* ended, Aprea moved his family, wife Ninon and 2-year-old daughter Nicole, to New York to work on *Another World*. The flashy show business arena of L.A. became a distant memory. "*Another World* has been around for 26 years, and there is a real feeling of family there," Aprea explained. "We shoot in Brooklyn, and the crew is a very neighborhood kind of people. It's not at all 'show business' there."

He believes the soaps are a great place to perfect the craft of acting. "I've seen some of the people on our show do scenes that were just magnificent, and they didn't have near the time to prepare for it that someone in the movies or theater would have had."

His advice to would-be actors is hard but true. "Don't go into acting, and if you do, know that the only thing that matters is the work itself. You have to know that there is going to be rejection and work is difficult to find. There are a lot of very dedicated people out there who can't make a living. It's a tough business and you've got to love it."

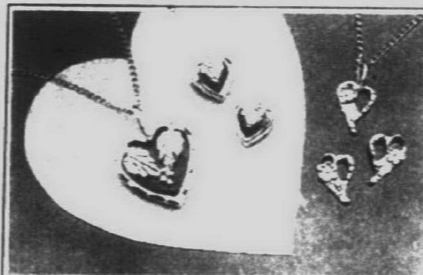

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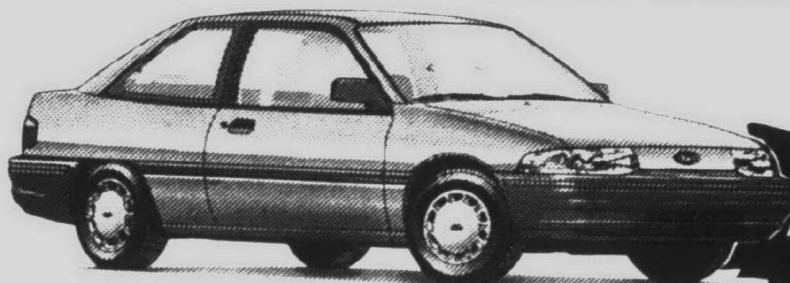
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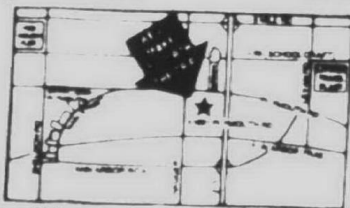
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
