### Tree-mendous deal

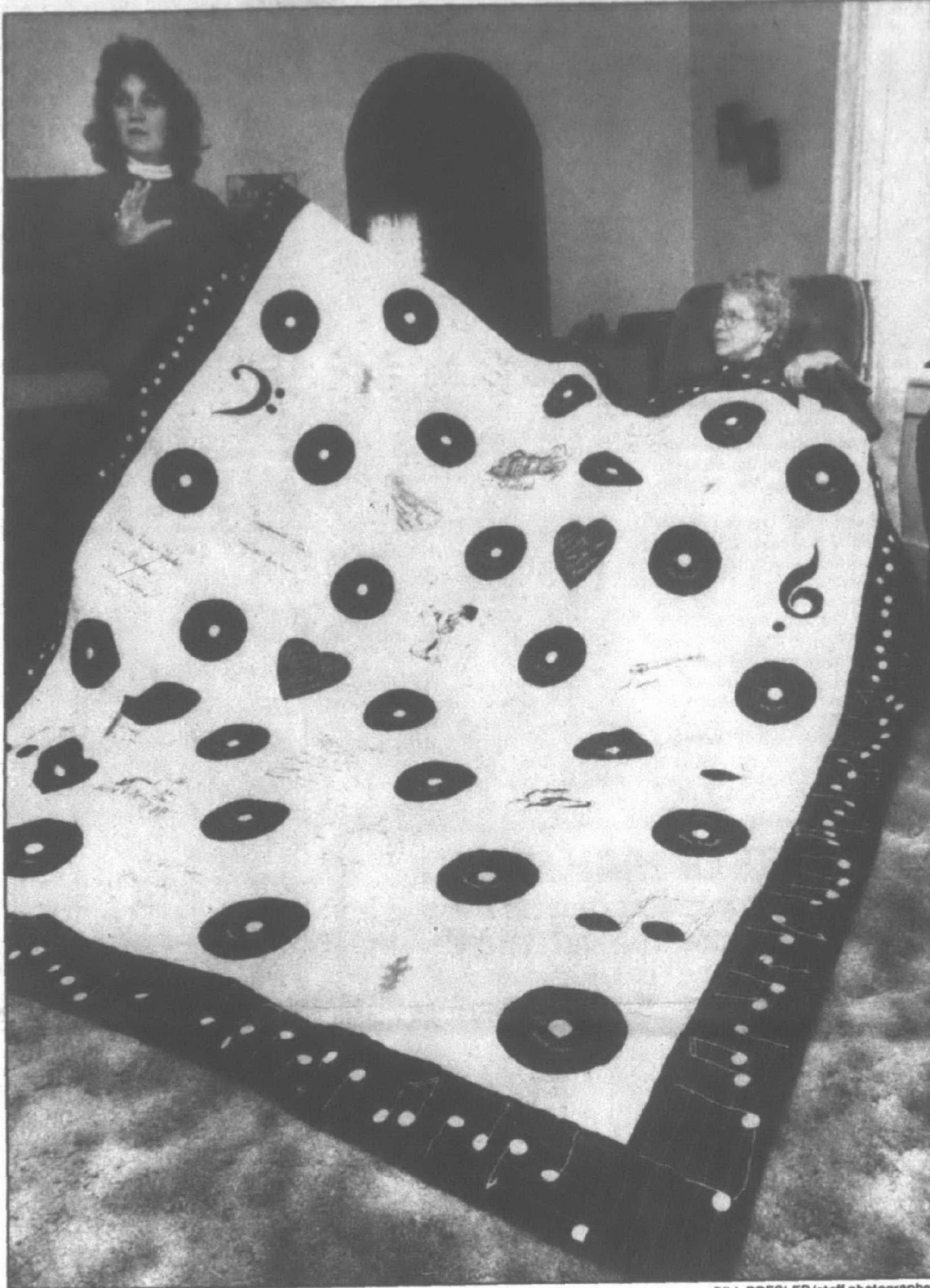

### Park improvements

Night baseball games at Plymouth Township park should be more fun for kids and onlookers next year, as wiring to 24 poles lighting baseball diamonds at the park is to be replaced, at a cost of \$53,000. Trustees approved the work Tuesday, as underground wiring installed more than 15 years ago at the diamonds has deteriorated. "We'll try to get it completed before the start of the season next spring," said Jim Anulewicz, township director of public services.

## Royal effort goes into 'King' quilt

This quilt is big enough for a "King"-sized bed. But it's a surprise, so don't tell Bill Street. His mother Helen of Plymouth and sister-in-law Linda Gerth, knowing Bill's dedication to Elvis Presley, have made a full-sized "Elvis quilt" for him. The quilt is bordered in black with white musical notes to "Are You Lonesome Tonight?"

THAT WAS A big Elvis hit, but you know that — unless you've lived in a cave the last 30-some years.

On several squares of the quilt are reproductions of labels of several of Elvis' hit 45-rpm records, including "Suspicious Minds," "That's All Right," and "Return to Sender."

Other quilt squares depict a pink 1957 Cadillac, Elvis' wedding date and his daughter's birth date, an army cap signifying his time in the army, Graceland mansion, and a square depicting the King himself.

They plan to give him the quilt at a party planned in the next couple of weeks. The code name for the party among friends and family is "EQP," for "Elvis quilt party."

"He's got every record Elvis made," explains his mother Helen Street.

Her son was 11 when he saved his money and bought his first Elvis record in 1954. Asked if he drove his parents to distraction by playing Elvis records, Helen replies, "He used to, believe me."

"Bill's got all the Elvis books, which we bought for birthday presents, Christmas presents," Gerth said.

He also has posters and paintings

of Elvis and has visited Graceland, Elvis' home in Memphis, Tenn.

Work began in August, and the quilt was recently finished. How many hours were spent on it? "Oh, I don't know," Helen said.

Helen speedily embroidered Linda's designs. "She could embroider them as fast as I could draw them," she said.

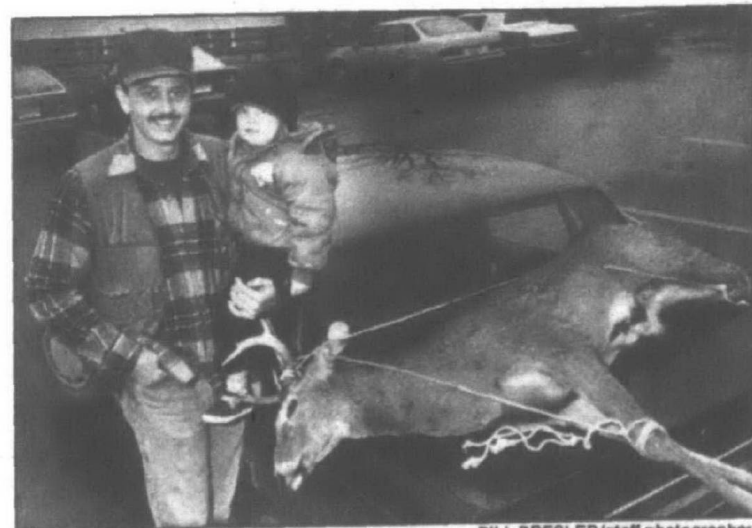
We're hoping that between now and Thanksgiving you'll have some time to warm to the idea.

## Canton man bags buck

After bagging an 8-point buck Friday in Pittsfield Township, David Bragalone of Canton had to run back to town to show off his prize.

"I said, 'C'mon and look,'" said Bragalone, 32, who works at American Yazaki.

"It's not my first one, but it feels like it," said the happy hunter.

ON THE OPENING day of rifle deer season, Bragalone headed out to a private wooded area near Saline at 5 a.m. "I was out with the brother of the guy who owns the property," he said.

He spotted the gray and brown buck at 8 a.m.

"I was sitting down right at the edge of a swamp, and he came run-

## Shock subsides Questions remain after massacre

The initial shock may be over, but disturbing questions remain in the wake of the shooting rampage in the Royal Oak post office that left five dead and seven wounded.

What, if anything, could have stopped 31-year-old Thomas P. McIlvane from shooting 12 people, including himself?

Was Thursday's massacre a "random shooting," or is it associated with the violence at other postal fa-

cilities since 1983 that have killed at least 27 people?

The Royal Oak shootings are "too close to Ridgewood, N.J., not to be a concern," said Anthony M. Frank, U.S. postmaster general, at a press conference Friday in the former downtown Birmingham post office. He was one of several postal executives to arrive in the wake of the shootings.

In Ridgewood, a supervisor and three others were killed on Oct. 10 by another postal worker who had lost his job.

All the incidents are separate, Frank said. But there is enough simi-

larity to warrant "a complete review of all postal personnel records to identify current or former employees who have shown aggressive and violent behavioral tendencies."

ROYAL OAK Postmaster Daniel Presilla will be relieved of his duties, temporarily. Presilla transferred to Michigan after earning a reputation in Indianapolis as a hard-nosed manager.

Presilla's management style can be termed autocratic, said one of his superiors, John Mulligan. "But it's unfair to suggest" he was a cause of

# Questions remain after post office massacre

the problems. Presilla was apparently one of the people McIlvane was looking for when he came into the Royal Oak office 8:48 a.m. Thursday.

A day after his dismissal was upheld, McIlvane walked into the post office through the loading dock and opened fire with a .22 caliber rifle.

Royal Oak Police responded to dozens of frantic 911 calls, said Lt. Donald Nowak. They found bodies and bystanders. McIlvane "was probably still shooting when we got there. But he had already shot him-

self when we found him."

McIlvane didn't find Presilla. He did find others.

## KILLED WERE:

• Keith Ciszewski, 37, of Livonia, a person described as "likeable and fair" who was on temporary assignment in Royal Oak.

Ciszewski was 18 when he began his career with the U.S. Postal Service.

He transferred to Royal Oak last year.

His current assignment called for him to mediate disputes with customers and among employees.

Relatives Friday said they were told by postal service officials that Ciszewski was not involved in McIlvane's firing or arbitration case, contrary to earlier reports.

Ciszewski helped co-worker Gwendolyn Thornton jump through a second-story window to escape McIlvane. Ciszewski was shot while trying to get through the same window.

• Christopher Carlisle, 33, of Rochester Hills. Carlisle moved from Indianapolis to Michigan to work for Presilla. Carlisle signed McIlvane's dismissal notice.

• Mary Ellen Benincasa, 32, of

Mt. Clemens. She was an injury compensation specialist. She reportedly had nothing to do with McIlvane's dismissal.

• Rose Marie Proos, 33, a postal supervisor. Proos disregarded McIlvane's threats, reportedly laughing them off.

• McIlvane, who turned the gun on himself.

ings were:  
• Allen Adams, 47, a former Farmington Hills postal employee on temporary assignment in Royal Oak.

• Clark French, 36, a former letter carrier.

• Sue Johnson, 37, a supervisory trainee.

• Joal Whyte, 46, a supervisor.  
• Vivian Dove, 44, a personnel clerk.

• Gwendolyn Thornton, 36, of Troy, an assistant postal supervisor. She broke an ankle when she jumped from the second-story window to escape McIlvane.

• James West, 55, of Southfield. He suffered hand lacerations.

The weapon McIlvane used, a favorite for small game hunting, was legal when he bought it at the Meijer store on Coolidge in December 1988. But McIlvane sawed off part of the barrel, making it easier to hide.

Frank described McIlvane as a "troubled employee," whose problems with the postal service go back at least 18 months.

Sharon Pepsin, whose daughter attended high school with McIlvane, disagreed. He was "a nice guy who never caused trouble."

**PEPSIN SAID** McIlvane's older sister, Roseann, briefly lived with her when Roseann's mother left and the family was experiencing difficulty.

The boys, Richard and Thomas, were in a foster home. Roseann was on her own. The youngsters seemed pleasant and well adjusted, she said.

McIlvane, like his father, enlisted in the Marine Corps. But it didn't work out.

He reportedly had discipline problems and left the Corps in the 1980s after allegedly using a tank to damage a fellow Marine's civilian car.

Back in the Detroit area, McIlvane continued his hobby of kickboxing and physical conditioning.

In 1988, he enrolled in Oakland

Community College's exercise science program. An associate degree from there could lead to a job at a health club.

"I was really surprised when I heard what happened," said Steve Applebee, who knew and liked McIlvane when they both worked out at Superkick for America in Rochester.

"We used to spar together two or three times a week. He was a quiet guy. And when he opened up, he was a happy guy."

Kerry Roop, who runs the kickboxing school in Rochester, said McIlvane was dedicated and enthusiastic when they met 1983.

**MCLIVANE, APPLEBEE and Roop** were part of the kickboxing match covered by ESPN in 1987. Then Roop told McIlvane he should give up kickboxing. "Tommy had started talking differently. He slurred his speech, like a punch-drunk fighter."

He last saw McIlvane in 1988. McIlvane's problems got more serious in 1990, when a postmaster who worked in Royal Oak and Southfield told police he threatened him.

"He (Postmaster William Kinsley II) was terrified," said Jerry Tobin, Southfield's director of public safety. "He was really scared."

Police filed criminal charges and took McIlvane to trial based on Kinsley's complaint.

"But McIlvane was clever," said Tobin. Even when police were tapping the lines, he avoided incriminating himself. "He was acquitted."

McIlvane wasn't so evasive at his dismissal hearings, co-workers said. "He said he'd make Edmond, Okla. (where a former mail carrier killed 14 people) look like Disneyland," a co-worker said.

## Shooting victim called 'family man'

When Keith Ciszewski was 21, he let his sister, GERALYN, drive his brand new, maroon Chevrolet Camaro on her 16th birthday. Just went and handed her the keys to his most prized possession and let her tool around the family's northwest Detroit neighborhood for the day.

That's the kind of man Ciszewski, of Livonia, was.

And when she brought it back that night with a fresh dent in the door, well, he didn't really buy her explanation about stones in the road.

"But he did forgive me. And with the way Keith felt about cars, especially that car . . ." GERALYN Janssenes, now 32, recalled Friday, while trying to hold back tears.

That, too, is the kind of man Ciszewski was.

**FAMILY CAME** first in Ciszewski's life. Family and a close-knit group of four childhood friends. Then his job with the U.S. Postal Service.

It was at his job that Ciszewski, 37, and three other co-workers were killed Thursday when a former employee went on a shooting rampage in the Royal Oak Post Office before turning the gun on himself.

Funeral services for Ciszewski will be held 11 a.m. today from St. Colette Catholic Church on Newburgh in Livonia with arrangements from Leonard A. Turowski & Son Funeral Home on Middlebelt. Burial will be at Holy Sepulchre Cemetery, Southfield.

Family members and a close friend said Friday that Ciszewski was as devoted to his family as anyone they'd ever known. That meant not only his immediate family — wife, Constance, and three children — but also an extended family including in-laws, six nieces and nephews, friends and neighbors.

"Keith was the best. He was loved by everybody who knew him and he deeply loved his wife and children," said Jim Cambridge, a Livonia neighbor and one of the quartet of friends who grew up together.

**AND CARS.** How Ciszewski loved cars, said his mother, Jacqueline, of Commerce Township.

"He'd go out at least once a week and just look at cars. He bought one for me once and it took him a whole year just to find the right one, the right color, at the right price," she said.

"Then he'd come over and wash my car just so he could spend time with it."

The cars — and other projects, like building a deck on the back of Janssenes' new house — were really just an excuse to spend time with the people he loved, family members said.

Keith used to call Connie at home a couple of times each day with a joke and to hear her voice, Jacqueline Ciszewski said. He spent as much time as possible with son Christopher, 10, and daughters Natalie, 7, and Claire, 2. The two older children attend Hoover Elementary.

Another child, Adam, died shortly after he was born in 1983, Jacqueline Ciszewski said.

Shooting baskets with Chris was a favorite activity.

Keith was outgoing, with a playful

side and was a joy to be around, family and friends said.

But he had a serious, sensitive side too, said Janssenes. "Our father died when I was 13. That really drew us close together," she said.

"He was always looking out for me. Making sure I wasn't getting into trouble and that he was there for me."

Married in 1981, the Ciszewskis moved to Livonia about seven years ago after living briefly in Farmington Hills.

**KEITH CISZEWSKI** was a 1972 Redford Bishop Borgess graduate.

He earned an associate's degree from Henry Ford Community College, going back for a third year after his father's death affected his grades the year before, his mother said.

His postal service career spanned nearly 20 years.

Other hobbies included swimming and bowling. He'd jump into the pool — laughing, cannonball style — at the neighborhood Fairway Farms Swim and Tennis Club to amuse his kids and himself, Janssenes said.

A memorial fund has been set up to benefit the three Ciszewski children. Donations may be made to the Ciszewski Memorial Fund, care of Michigan National Bank, 37276 Six Mile, Livonia 48154.

# Penn celebrates 50th with 30 cent admission

In most towns, the typical movie-going experience today includes a hefty ticket charge and a seat in a cinder-block-box type room called a "theater."  
But Plymouth's real movie house, the Penn Theater, is still going. And on Dec. 4 and 5, the Penn celebrates its 50th birthday.  
The first film shown at the Penn was the musical comedy "Weekend in Havana," starring Carmen Miranda and Cesar Romero. And to celebrate the Penn's birthday, manager and projectionist since 1957 Lloyd Oliver has booked a return showing of the film.

THE DEC. 5, 1941, edition of The Plymouth Mail trumpeted the Penn's opening with a this front page headline:

"Penn Theater, One of Most Modern Amusement Houses in Country Opens to Public on Scheduled Time. New Equipment Works Perfectly. Hundreds of Friends Extend Congratulations to Owner Harry Lush."

The paper reported that when the doors opened, "hundreds of Plymouth citizens saw for the first time the interior of one of Michigan's most beautiful and modern motion picture theaters."

"The acoustics of the theater, due to the special type of construction and materials used, could not be improved upon."

On Wednesday, Dec. 3, Lush had a special screening for construction workers and others who supplied materials to build the theater, prior to the grand opening the next day.

The article praised the lighting scheme at the theater, a change from the typical overhead lighting. The side-wall lighting provided "a soft but clear light throughout the entire big auditorium," the Plymouth Mail reported.

"For the opening, friends have sent large numbers of beautiful baskets of flowers, wishing Mr. Lush well in the conduct of his new and modern theater."

The next edition of the Plymouth Mail on Friday, Dec. 12, reported, "Since its opening last week Thursday evening, Plymouth's beautiful new theater, built and owned by Harry Lush, has been doing a splendid business."

WHILE ATTENDANCE at the Penn varies according to the relative popularity of the picture shown — "The Land Before Time" was a recent hit with local moviegoers — Oliver said, "Our people have always supported the theater."

"They like the large screen. We draw from all over — Ann Arbor, Ypsilanti, Farmington, Livonia."

While the Penn has typically stuck with family-oriented fare, a '50s film featuring Jane Russell in a short costume sparked a letter-writing campaign from several Plymouth pastors to their parishioners, urging them not to see the movie.

Admission for the first showing of "Weekend in Havana" in 1941 was 30 cents for adults, now tickets are \$2.

Refreshments haven't changed much, except for prices. "Popcorn was in 5 and 10 cent bags," Oliver said. "In later years the cold drinks were added."

After Lush, Margaret Wilson bought the Penn in 1965. Bonnie Smith has owned it since 1981.

Besides movies, the Penn has featured "a few stage things," Oliver said.

While film showings almost always go without a hitch, "The film has broke at times, we've gotten in wrong reels, wrong leaders. We've had to stop the film and get it back the way they should be," Oliver recalled.

OVER THE YEARS, several kids have been caught trying to sneak in the back door, he added.

"We try to offer the best entertainment we can get," Oliver said. The theater employs 13 and seats nearly 670.

Once popular matinees lost favor due to the rise of TV and school-related activities and others on Saturdays, Oliver said.

The Penn put in new seats in 1958, and re-padded seat cushions two years ago.

The 50th birthday celebration will also feature vintage cars outside the Penn and banners proclaiming the event.

Gilbert Smith was carrying another "sign" of the times last week in Canton.

Standing at the entrance of the parking lot in front of the Kroger store at Ford and Sheldon roads, Smith held a simple hand written message: "I will work for food to support my family."

While a visitor was talking to Smith, a woman in a motorized wheelchair approached, slowed down, read the sign and said: "I will, too." Then she rode off.

SMITH SAID during the three hours that he had been standing at the spot Thursday afternoon passers-by gave him groceries and "one lady bought me a chicken dinner."

He also collected about \$10 cash. And, best of all, three job offers.

Looking at the phone numbers for the job prospects, Smith said, "I have to call them, yet. That's a start."

Right now Smith said he's living

with friends in Detroit. His wife and four children, two of whom are living at home, are in Bay City.

He emphasized that he's not estranged from his wife.

"I'm just looking for work," Smith said, adding that he sends money to his family.

"There's absolutely no work up there."

He was a self-employed mechanic. But the labor got too hard, Smith, 49, said.

Although he's had odd jobs here and there, Smith said, basically he's been out of work for between nine months and one year.

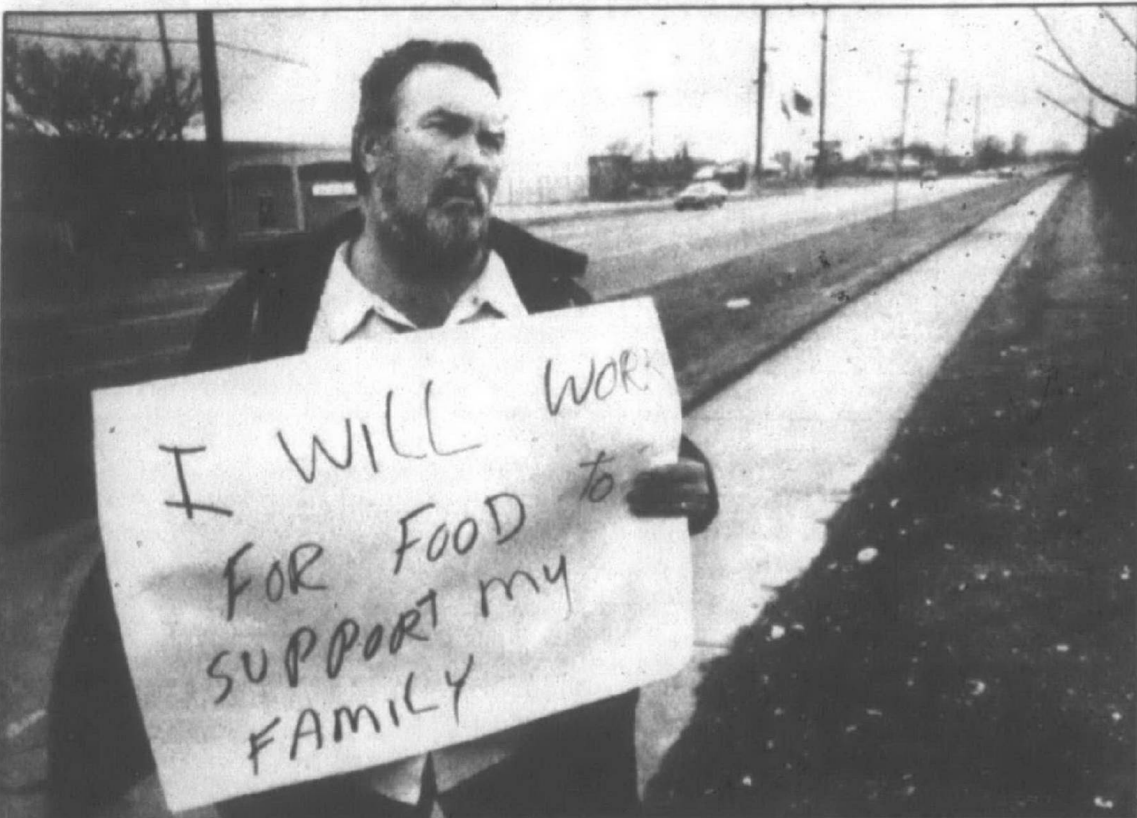
AND NOW, he said, he'd consider

Smith pointed to bad politics while he noted that he's among a growing population of jobless people and others who are financially worse off than they were a couple of years ago.

# Local agency helps families through crisis

Staff at Northwestern Community Services in Canton are ready for anything.

And they have to be. Sometimes calls come from hospital workers with a teen who overdosed. In those cases someone from the non-profit agency is needed to decide how the teen is emotionally, where he should go next and whether a psychiatric hospital is the answer.

Or the call might be a mother who can't control a child who comes and goes as he pleases, slaps his parents around and won't take any orders.

No matter who's asking for help, the goal is always the same: to improve communication in the family and try to keep the child in the house. If the case is extreme, it might mean finding a hospital bed. The agency helps children from infants through 17 years old.

It's the luck of the draw what will happen on a particular day, said Karen Pharr, Northwestern Community Services supervisor.

SOMETIMES THE request is relatively mundane, like a mom who's up in arms because her 2-year-old won't leave things alone. The child was likely going through the terrible twos.

Other parents are calling about children who are assaulting people with weapons, cussing at parents and teachers, threatening siblings and who are totally out of control.

The child might be in a fetal position and quiet. Other youngsters have locked themselves in the fami-

ly's bathroom and won't come out. Suicide attempts or thoughts among young people are highest around this time of year.

"School starts, there's new situations and new friends," Pharr said.

It's common for school social workers to call Northwestern about a child in the office who wrote a suicide note or talked to friends about it.

Sometimes the agency helps children who have experimented with drugs and sex. And last year the agency received a few cases of children involved in devil worshiping.

"YOU NAME it, we've seen out here," Pharr said.

Help must be requested by parents or legal guardians. The agency worker asks whether a team needs to come to the house or the child can be brought to the office. It's always on a voluntary basis. If the family doesn't want help it's not forced on them, Pharr stressed.

Some of the clients are docile and others make it clear they don't want to be there. In those cases, everyone in the agency goes into their "triage" mode and is prepared for outbursts like hair pulling and other attacks or possibly the child trying to run out of the building.

The agency's \$1.8 million budget is from the Michigan Department of Mental Health through the Detroit-Wayne County Community Mental Health Board and the Michigan Department of Social Services.

Fees are calculated on a sliding scale and based on ability to pay. Individuals, foundations and businesses also contribute.

Clients can come from Canton, Plymouth, Livonia, Garden City, Westland, parts of Redford, Wayne, Inkster and Northville.

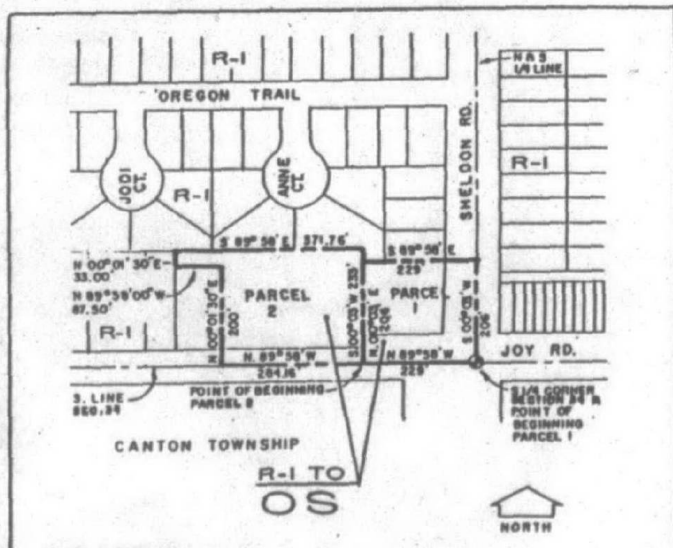

# Students open credit union, learn finances

Fourth- and fifth-grade students from Field Elementary School learned the meaning of debits and credits with the opening of the first school credit union branch, a joint venture between Field and the Community Federal Credit Union.

The first credit union day was held 9-11 a.m. today, with a brief ribbon-cutting ceremony at 9:15 a.m. Credit union days will be held 9-11 a.m. every other Thursday, except on holidays, for the remainder of the school year. Each of the fourth- and fifth-grade classes will have an opportunity to complete transactions during credit union hours.

The credit union program is a result of the business-education partnership between Field and the Community Federal Credit Union, according to Betty Bloch, PCCS Business-Education partnership coordinator.

"This program will give students an opportunity to learn the value of saving money, while teaching them practical job skills," Bloch said. In the program, students will

open savings accounts and will learn how to deposit money. They will receive account statements and will earn dividends. At the end of the school year, students will receive checks for the money they have saved in their accounts.

The credit union branch will be operated by fifth-grade students and will be supervised by teachers, parents and a member of the Community Federal Credit Union. To fill credit union positions, students applied with regular job applications and were interviewed by Community Credit Union personnel before being hired.

Daniel Holland and Brian Ott are the branch managers. Bill Kiesel and Jason Wyatt will work as computer operators. Tellers are Sarah Anderson, Brandon Bomersheim, Robin Ireland, Zeshaan Malhi, Kristen Ratledge, Paul Russette, Aaron Rypkowski and Brooke Schupra.

The credit union program is the most involved Business-Education Partnership activity at the elementary school level, Bloch added.

## Agencies struggling to meet '92 needs

Thanks to seasonal generosity, area food banks should be stocked through the holidays.

After that, the cupboard could be bare.

"There's enough food through Christmas, but for March and April we can't say," said Gene Gonya, president of Gleaners Community Food Bank.

That's why area food banks are asking contributors to be especially generous this year.

Gleaners hopes to stock up on non-perishable items through a special holiday promotion offered in cooperation with area food merchants.

The Buy a Case of Food event provides cases of food — from baby formula, to soup, to canned stew — at wholesale prices. Individuals are encouraged to buy cases of food for donation to Gleaners.

Food banks aren't the only charity

projects looking for more help this year.

Salvation Army volunteers will also be staffing their holiday kettles with an eye toward 1992.

"FROM WHAT we're seeing, I'd say things are going to get worse in the New Year," Salvation Army Major Robert Thomson said.

Already, requests for Christmas assistance are up 8 percent from last year.

The Salvation Army also provides gifts for needy children and helps needy families buy groceries.

It also staffs homeless shelters and soup kitchens.

In addition, the Salvation Army works with area utilities to help needy people retain their electricity.

This is the 100th anniversary of the Salvation Army's familiar holiday bell-and-kettle fund-raising drive. The project began on the docks of San Francisco back in 1891.

Another agency, Future Force Temporary Employment Services, is

conducting a first-ever food drive of its own this holiday season.

"WE'RE REALLY on the front lines in terms of seeing the people who come to us after losing their jobs," district manager Kamela Torvinen said.

Future Force seeks to collect 100,000 cans of food at sites throughout Wayne and Oakland Counties.

While Future Force sees an increasing number of jobless white collar workers, Gleaners and the Salvation Army are bracing for an influx of former general assistance recipients.

"It's starting and we expect to see more former GA people next year," Thomson said.

Both agencies said they're spending an increasing amount of time with the working poor — people still employed but with low pay and no medical benefits.

"The agencies we deal with tell us they're seeing more and more of these kinds of people," Gonya said.

"In the 1980s a lot of people still had benefit packages, health care and the like. Now, those are gone."

## Cold weather 'ruff' for pets, MHS says

The Michigan Humane Society reminds pet owners that cold weather and pets don't mix. Weather forecasters estimate unseasonably cold weather throughout the winter, which means extra care needs to be taken to protect all pets.

The indoor dog requires only a few precautions when traveling outdoors for short periods of time. If the indoor dog is a short-haired breed and goes for a walk be sure to protect him from the cold with a coat or sweater. Always keep a towel on hand to dry his coat, including his feet, when he enters the house. Slush and salt deposits from sidewalks and streets can cause paw and skin irritation.

The Michigan Humane Society discourages pet owners from keeping dogs outdoors, especially during the winter months. If a dog is kept outdoors he needs special attention during the winter months. Following are some common sense approaches to caring for the outdoor dog in winter.

- Be sure the dog's house is in good repair. Fix any leads or gaps that might let moisture or wind enter.
- Elevate the dog house so that it is 4-6 inches from the ground. Any moisture that does enter the dog's house will be able to dry if the house is elevated.
- Place a flap over the door of the dog house to prevent drafts.
- Place the house so that it faces southeast and away from prevailing winds.
- Use clean straw as an insulating and bedding material. When straw becomes wet it loses its insulating properties, so be sure to change the straw frequently.
- Increase the intake of food to help maintain the animal's body temperature.
- Keep fresh food and water available for the animal at all times, and replace if either becomes frozen.
- When the temperature or wind chill falls below 0 degrees Fahrenheit consider bringing the pet indoors into warm surroundings. A basement or a heat porch will help to maintain the animal's body temperature. Do not house the outdoor dog in a warm portion of the house, because extremes in temperatures can be harmful.

## Senate bill relaxes rules on gun safety information

A bill to correct one of last year's gun control laws won a lopsided 33-3 approval in the state Senate earlier this month week despite spirited opposition.

Senate Bill 528 eliminates the need for gun dealers to distribute pamphlets on gun safety and training classes.

"One gets information and safety pamphlets from the manufacturer," said sponsor Chris Dingell, D-Trenton. "I doubt they (buyers) are going to read a third pamphlet."

He added that some State Police posts are failing to make available lists of gun safety classes, putting gun dealers in a "Catch-22" situation.

Sen. Jack Faxon, D-Farmington Hills, the only area member to vote no, said the bill "reduces the miniscule protections that are currently in law that would ensure the purchaser of a gun at least have some basic understanding of how to use the thing. We require more tests to use an au-

tomobile than we do to use a firearm."

Added Sen. Lana Pollack, D-Ann Arbor: "The provision repealed was for a basic pistol safety brochure . . . A licensed dealer would (also) post in a conspicuous place information relating to the availability of local voluntary pistol safety programs."

"I don't think we should be removing the availability of needed information. I don't see any rationale for relaxing the laws."

# GOP bill would 'open' primaries, unseat Dems

Michigan Democrats may have to find another way to send delegates to their national convention if a Republican-backed change in the presidential primary becomes law.

"It looks like a change to zap the Democrats," said Sen. John Cherry, D-Clio, minority floor leader.

The Senate Thursday approved 21-11 an amendment that effectively wipes out the new requirement that voters in next March 17's presidential primary declare a party preference 30 days before entering the voting booth.

SENATE BILL 469 would allow voters to declare party preference the day of the primary and then cancel it on leaving, said sponsor Nick Smith, R-Addison.

It effectively keeps their choice secret from the political parties and amounts to an "open" primary.

Republicans Mike Bouchard of Birmingham, Mat Dunaskiss of Oxford, Robert Geake of Northville and David Honigman of West Bloomfield voted yes.

Democrats Jack Faxon of Farmington Hills and George Z. Hart of Dearborn voted no. Bill Faust, D-Westland, had an excused absence.

Altogether, 18 Republicans and

three Democrats voted yes; all 11 no voters were Democrats.

The bill goes to the House where Democrats have a majority, although many Democrats are sympathetic to an "open" primary.

Corridor gossip is that the compromise will be same-day registration of party preference.

DEMOCRATIC PARTY national rules require that any delegation must be chosen in a same-year "closed" system, with only declared Democrats participating.

"Democratic Party rules are out of sync with public sentiment," said Republican majority floor leader

Phil Arthurhult of Whitehall. "People say, 'We want to pick the party of our choice as well as the candidate of our choice.' Talk to the man or woman on the street."

Democrat John Kelly of Grosse Pointe said the current party affiliation rule doesn't invade the privacy of the voting booth. "This bill disenfranchises (Michigan) Democrats from the national convention," he said.

IN 1988 both parties held caucuses where a person declared a party preference. They were poorly attended, except for a massive outpouring of Jesse Jackson supporters in the Democratic caucuses.

In 1976 Michigan had an "open"

primary for president, but Democrats boycotted their because of the national rules and used local conventions instead. It was widely believed that Ronald Reagan's strong showing against incumbent President Gerald Ford in Ford's home state was due to mischievous Democrats crossing over.

In 1972 President Richard Nixon was a shoo-in for renomination, and Republicans crossed over to back Alabama's segregationist Gov. George Wallace in the Democratic primary, to the acute embarrassment of the party's liberal leadership. That led to the Democrats' rule change.

MAVERICK DEMOCRAT Gil DiNello of East Detroit voted with the

GOP for the nearly open primary because.

"Most people who talked to their clerks have objected strenuously to signing that white (party preference) card. I'm surprised at the Democratic national party that they're not listening to the people."

DiNello bitterly attacked the 1984-88 caucuses because of their union domination.

"The Democratic Party is happy with the caucus system," countered Chris Dingell, D-Trenton. He chuckled as he recounted how, in an "open" congressional primary in the 15th district several years ago, Republicans got their comeuppance when a white supremacist was nominated.

## Senate — Employers can't stop workers from smoking

Bosses couldn't require workers to quit using tobacco off the job, under a Senate-passed bill headed for the House.

In a war of words that ranged from the bitter to the grotesque, the Senate passed smoker Fred Dillingham's bill on a 26-6 vote.

"When we argue employers have a right to patrol employees 24 hours a day and pigeonhole an employee for legal behavior — absurd!" said Dillingham, R-Fowlerville, presenting his bill as a civil rights measure.

"Absurd! Ridiculous!" replied anti-smoking Jack Faxon, D-Farmington Hills. "I guess you want to go back to the good ol' days when men were men and could spit where they want."

Faxon threw the chamber and galleries into hysterics with his oral picture of tobacco chewers "drooling pus, brown, stinking, horrible stuff, like an abscess."

VOTING YES were Michael Bouchard, R-Birmingham, Mat Dunask-

iss, R-Oxford, George Hart, D-Dearborn, and David Honigman, R-West Bloomfield.

Opposed were Faxon and Robert Geake, R-Northville. William Faust, D-Westland, had an excused absence.

Non-smoker Honigman guided the bill through his Labor Committee, though he admitted he requires his own mother to smoke in the garage when she visits.

If an employer were to prohibit all smoking because it's dangerous, Honigman said, he could also prohibit skiing and parachuting because they too are dangerous.

Bouchard, though backing the bill, said smokers should be charged more for health insurance "if they want to take that risk."

DILLINGHAM said half his mail was unsigned because smokers fear retaliation for supporting his bill.

"There is an absolute push to control a person's behavior beyond the workplace. There are help-wanted ads that say, 'If you smoke, don't bother to apply,'" said Dillingham.

That refusal to hire "falls basically on those most in need of a job — the poorly educated, blacks and

women," he said.

If it becomes law, Dillingham's bill would:

- Prohibit employers from requiring that employees and applicants refrain from using tobacco outside the workplace.

- Prohibit employers from discriminating against tobacco users in compensation or promotion.


- Limit no-tobacco rules to the workplace — defined as "an area owned or operated by an employer or serving as a place of work for employees."

- Allow employers to have a life and health insurance policy "charges tobacco users more or otherwise makes distinctions among employees regarding the type of coverage or the cost of coverage based upon the employees' use of tobacco products."

WITH THE Senate nearly half-empty, anti-smokers restricted the Senate smoking area making the parties' caucus rooms off-limits for cigarette breaks.


The rule passed 11-3 with 24 members absent or excused.

# A look at life in a 'healthocracy'

NEWS ITEM: WASHINGTON — The Food and Drug Administration is proposing strict food labeling regulations that would allow consumers to tell at a glance the level of fat, sodium, calories, cholesterol and fiber in a product.

The proposals are the FDA's answer to the requirement that it find a way to enforce the Nutrition Labeling and Education Act passed by Congress last year.

The labels, which will be required on about 90 percent of all food sold in grocery stores, could revolutionize the way Americans eat by making them more aware.

The regulations are expected to fill more than 300 pages of tiny print in the Federal Register, the government's daily publication of new and proposed rules for enforcing federal statutes.

The Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms has even gotten into the act, announcing that it will consider a petition to require nutrition labels on all alcoholic beverages.

Patricia McGrath Morris of the consumer advocacy group Public Voice for Food and Health Policy called it a "good first step to transforming the way people eat."

NEWS ITEM: Federal Food and Drug agents today raided a food processing plant in Skokie, Ill., and seized thousands of cases of canned asparagus with labels that allegedly misrepresented the amount of fiber contained in the product.

Health Minister Louis Sullivan called the raid the "largest one yet in the government's continuing crackdown on unhealthy diets."

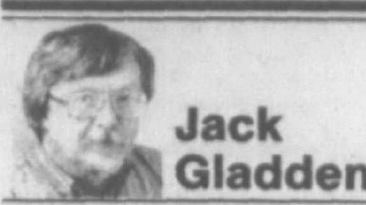

"Rioting broke out in New York's Attica State Prison this evening after a prison trusty was placed in solitary confinement for violating health regulations. Prison officials said the trusty, who was working as a cook's assistant, was locked up after guards discovered he had been cooking french fries in lard and smuggling them to other prisoners.

"More than 2,000 convicts barricaded themselves in the kitchen area. A prison spokesman said they were chanting 'No more tofu, no more soy, we want Mounds and Almond Joy!'"

NEWS ITEM: MONTGOMERY, ALA. — The Alabama Supreme Court today upheld an appellate court ruling removing two children, ages 10 and 12, from the custody of their parents and making them wards of the state.

In a unanimous decision, the justices ruled that the lower court was correct in taking the children away from the parents, who had been convicted of serving them ham, eggs and red-eye gravy for breakfast over a period of four years.

The court also upheld a decision in a similar case in which the parents were convicted of allowing their children to consume whole milk, buttered biscuits, salted potato chips and charbroiled hamburgers.

In Washington, Food Czar C. Everett Koop praised the ruling as "one more positive step in our goal of achieving a death-free America." And he issued a warning to other parents who might subject their children to similar dietary abuses.

"It's unbelievable to me," he said, "that practices like this still go on in a healthocracy such as ours. But we will continue to prosecute such outrages. We will not stop until every American achieves eternal life through proper eating habits."

## Don't limit auto health care benefits

To the editor: This week in Lansing legislators are debating changes to the present No-Fault law in Michigan. Proposed changes will substantially reduce the medical benefits provided by your automobile insurance policies. The vote will be before Nov. 15.

Presently, if you are injured in an automobile accident in Michigan you are entitled to all medical and rehabilitation services deemed reasonable and necessary for the remainder of your life. Rehabilitation can turn tax burdens into tax payers.

Hospital bills alone after a serious accident can be as much as \$250,000 or more. Under proposed changes, ceilings on medical expenses would be instituted in order to reduce your premium. If you select a ceiling of \$250,000, minimal, or no, funds would remain to provide for your rehabilitation and care that may be needed for the rest of your life. Can you count on the public welfare system to take care of you? Would your family be able to bear the burden?

THE FACT IS the savings to you on your automobile policy would only be approximately \$42 per year if you select the above limit rather than lifetime medical coverage. Our youth and underprivileged populations, those most likely to choose the least expensive option, are those in the highest risk group for catastrophic injury.

"Across the nation Michigan No-

Fault is often cited as one of the best auto insurance systems in the country... 17th in average premiums nationally... only 42nd in rate increases in the last five years... compared to (rate increases of) 21 percent in California, 31.5 percent in New Jersey, and 36.2 percent in Massachusetts (over the last five years)," said Patrick Templeton of the Automobile Club of Michigan at a January 1990 Cost Containment Conference at Rainbor Rehabilitation Centers in Ypsilanti.

# Piano teachers help win Lansing skirmish

Piano teachers and child care providers applauded each others' testimonies before a state Senate panel last Tuesday as they sought to remain in business.

And the Senate Local Government Committee advanced bills to keep cities from shutting them down in residential neighborhoods.

"Music teachers don't have lobbyists," said Jerome Stasson, husband of West Bloomfield Township piano teacher Betty Stasson, who once was told by an ordinance officer not to give lessons at home.

"The last place you want government is sticking its nose in your home," agreed committee chair David Honigman, R-West Bloomfield, sponsor of two of the bills to clip local governments' wings. Protesting the bills were lobbyists for the Michigan Municipal League and Michigan Townships Association.

### THE COMMITTEE sent to the Senate floor:

• Three bills preventing municipalities, townships and counties from prohibiting music lessons and other tutoring in a private residence. Honigman said local units still may restrict noise, signs and traffic.

• A bill preventing cities from zoning out licensed "family day care" (up to six children) and licensed "group day care" (7-12 children) from residential areas. Sponsor is Jack Faxon, D-Farmington Hills.

Faxon's 1990 bills covering townships and counties became law, but his cities bill lost when a couple of senators weren't on the floor on the closing day of session. The music teachers and child-

care providers applauded each others' speeches on behalf of home occupations. The mood was broken by mirth when a gray mouse, barely 1 1/2 inches long, scurried from behind the senators' table, under audience chairs and out a door in the ornate fourth floor meeting room in the State Capitol.

BEN MARKS, Farmington Hills councilman representing the Municipal League, drew fire from Honigman and Sen. Jim Berryman, D-Adrian, for his and MML's opposition.

"The existence of community is sacred. Numbers are what count in local government," said Marks. "When people buy in a residential neighborhood, they don't expect a business."

"What's next?" demanded Berryman, a former mayor of Adrian. "My grandmother can't sew dresses for money?"

"We don't oppose piano teachers in homes," said Gene Thornton, lobbyist for the Michigan Townships Association. "This bill is much too broad and needs to be narrowed down. I'm not certain, with this language, that we can restrict parking, employment and signs."

"As it's written, the Michigan State University band could play in a senior citizens' apartment complex."

Honigman said he would offer floor amendments clarifying local units' right to restrict traffic, employment and signs.

THE ISSUE was raised by Betty Stasson, a 40-year veteran of teaching and the concert stage, who got national attention when her township shut her down several years ago.

# 'Frosty' moon signals winter

Mercury is officially at its maximum elongation (greatest apparent distance) from the sun on the evening of Nov. 18th. Unlike Venus, which was 47 degrees west of the sun on Nov. 2, Mercury never gets far from the sun; it is only 23 degrees east (left) of the sun for this elongation. This is a very poor separation and very difficult to see. A better shot at Mercury comes in the morning sky late in December.

Full Moon is at 5:56 p.m. on Nov. 21. The moon is fully lighted by the sun and rises in the northeast as the sun sets in the southwest. It will be visible all night and set at sunrise.

The full moon of September is known as the Harvest Moon, that of October is the Hunter's Moon. November's full moon is known as the Frosty Moon and the Beaver Moon, perhaps because Indians noticed great activity on the part of beavers as they prepared for winter.

Located directly above the full moon on the 21st is the Pleiades (PLEE a dees) star cluster in Taurus. The Pleiades will be difficult to see with the bright moon so close.

LOOK FOR the moon in the east-northeast after 8:30 p.m. on Nov. 23. The bright reddish star 16 degrees below and to the right of the moon is called Betelgeuse (BEE tel juice). The name of this star means "Armpit of the Giant," and refers to Orion the Hunter. Orion is the brightest of all the constellations.

Betelgeuse is a red supergiant star. Red stars are old; they are nearing the end of their life cycle. Red stars are also fairly cool, as far as stellar temperatures go. Red supergiants are big; if placed where the sun is, Betelgeuse would extend out to the orbit of Jupiter.

Betelgeuse is about 520 light years away, which means the light we see tonight left the star 520 years ago. It is the 11th brightest star in the sky. To appear so bright from that kind of distance, a star has to be very intense. Indeed, Betelgeuse has a luminosity of about 14,000 of our suns. It doesn't look like it because it is so far away.

Look for Rigel (RYE gel), a bright

blue-white star 18 degrees to the right of Betelgeuse. This is a blue supergiant; it is very hot and fairly young. Believed to be around 900 light years away, Rigel has a luminosity 57,000 times that of the sun. Rigel marks Orion's left foot and is the 7th brightest star in the sky.

By going from Betelgeuse to Rigel, you passed through three stars forming a vertical line. These three form Orion's belt. Above the belt, also above and to the right of Betelgeuse, is Bellatrix (BELL a tricks). This is Orion's left shoulder. Orion is rising at an angle and his right foot, a star named Saiph (safe), hasn't quite cleared the horizon yet. Orion is one of the most easily identifiable of all the constellations.

THE BRIGHT STAR above and to

the right of the moon on the morning of the 26th is Regulus (REG u lus), the "heart" of Leo the lion. Above and to the left of the moon is Jupiter.

The moon is at last quarter phase at 10:21 a.m. on Nov. 28. The moon is beginning the last quarter of its orbit around the earth. It has passed Jupiter on the morning of the 29th.

Venus passes four degrees to the north of Spica on the morning of the 30th. Watch the two during the next few months. Venus will be lower in the sky each morning. Spica will be higher.

An excellent aid for learning constellations and keeping up to date with the sky is the monthly Sky Calendar. A one year subscription is \$6 and is available from Abrams Planetarium, Michigan State University, East Lansing, 48824.

# Social Security benefits will increase Jan. 1

Social Security and Supplemental Security Income recipients will see a 3.7 percent cost of living increase in payments beginning in January.

The average Social Security benefit for retired workers will rise from \$607 to \$629 monthly. The maximum

federal SSI monthly payments to individuals will rise to \$422 from \$407, and for couples to \$633 from \$610.

The increases are part of an annual automatic cost-of-living adjustment based on the consumer price

index for urban wage earners.

On average, an aged couple receiving social security benefits would see their check increase to \$1,067 from \$1,029, and an elderly widow or widower would see her or

his benefits increase to \$584 from \$563.

Last year's increase was 5.4 percent.

It's also the first time a girls basketball team has gone through the WLAA campaign unbeaten since Dena Head, now a starting point guard for defending NCAA champion University of Tennessee, led the Rocks to perfect league seasons in 1986 and '87.

"To go through this league unbeaten and through the tourney undefeated is a tremendous accomplishment for these kids," Salem coach Fred Thomann said. "It's a tribute to our players to step out and weather the challenge we faced tonight, and not to forget that we also had to get through a tough game Tuesday against Dawn Warner and Livonia Franklin (a 61-58 win)."

IT WAS A defensive battle during the first half as Salem forged ahead to a 21-13 advantage against the second-seeded Chiefs.

Canton's woes were magnified in the shooting department. The Chiefs connected on only four of 32 shots from the floor for a measly 12 percent.

Giuliani, a 6-foot senior, then picked up her fourth personal early in the third quarter, and the 6-1 Miller went to the bench late in the period with her fourth.

That opened the door for the Chiefs, who suddenly found themselves on the offensive end.

Junior center Stephanie Gray led a 17-12 Canton third-quarter charge by scoring six of her team-high 17 points, including a bank shot with 29 seconds remaining in the period to pull her team to within one, 31-30.

Platter countered with a clutch basket at the buzzer to give Salem a 33-30 advantage, but the Chiefs kept coming in the final period, taking the lead for the first time on a pair of free throws by Amy Westerhold with 6:07 remaining.

The Chiefs gained a four-point advantage, 37-33, with 5:17 to play on a basket by Kelly Holmes (who later fouled out).

"It was looking pretty good with five minutes to go," Canton coach Bob Blohm said, "but we could have taken care of the ball better and done some other things down the stretch."

IT WAS 39-ALL with just over three minutes to play when the Rocks scored eight unanswered points. Platter put Salem ahead for keeps, 41-39, with 2:40 remaining. Miller added another basket to increase the lead to four.

Giuliani and Christy Parimucha

then put it out of reach with two free throws apiece.

"I thought we played better against them than we did the last time (a 51-47 defeat)," Blohm said. "We played through some rough spots in the first half and hung in there defensively. We also rebounded pretty well, but Salem finished off more plays when it counted and that's where teams win championship games. They're a solid team."

Salem was able to overcome the foul problems by getting contributions off the bench from guard Kelly Austin, who is back in the lineup after a long absence because of a knee injury, along with Martha Bol.

"Austin gave us a big lift with that triple (three-point) she hit (in the second quarter); she gave us some outstanding minutes," Thomann said. "And Giuliani did a great job. She's been sick — dehydrated. She went to the hospital Friday. Bol came in for her and did an outstand-

ing job. She really made a nice contribution."

Both Salem and Canton will take 16-4 overall records into the state tournament, which begins tonight when Salem travels to Northville (starting time is 7).

IN OTHER WLAA action during the four-game extravaganza Saturday at Salem, Livonia Franklin clinched third place with a 64-62 overtime victory over city rival Stevenson as Dawn Warner scored a career-high 42 points.

Patty Shea tallied the game-winning basket with only four seconds left for the 15-5 Patriots.

Stevenson (14-6) had four players in double figures with Mo Drabicki and Lori Shingledecker notching 12 apiece. Teresa Sarno and Karen Groulx each added 11.

Northville (15-5), behind Kara McNeil's 24 points, garnered fifth place with 62-47 win over Walled Lake Central.

## Shamrocks bury Trojans in second half, 38-8

None of Redford Catholic Central's linemen made the All-Catholic League first team, but they all made an impression Saturday on Detroit Henry Ford coach Mike Marshall.

After a sluggish first half, CC dominated the line of scrimmage in the second half and rolled to a 38-8 win over Ford in a Class AA quarterfinal game. The Shamrocks led 10-8 at halftime and capped all four of its second-half possessions with touchdowns in a devastating performance at Livonia Clarenceville.

CC scored on drives of 70, 61, 30 and 34 yards in the second half and ran 31 offensive plays after halftime compared to Ford's 15. Marshall was leery about CC's All-Catholic wide receiver Frank Yoakam prior to the game but came away just as impressed with

the Shamrocks' line and the senior backfield of Jeff Tibaldi and Dan Gusoff.

"They wore us down and were stronger in the trenches," Marshall said. "When you know what's going to happen and you can't stop it, you know that's what it is."

"(YOAKAM) WASN'T the problem. The problem was their offensive line and they have big backs who run strong. We need to regroup, get in the weight room and get stronger."

CC, which had 348 yards and 21 first downs, limited Ford to 95 total yards and seven first downs — six of which came before halftime. Ford's dangerous quarterback, Orlando Fortunato, didn't complete a pass until 10:25 remaining in the game, and several of his passes were knocked down at the line by CC's linemen.

Jason Krueger sacked Fortunato once, while Dan Kelly, Paul Nemzek and David

Bruhowski combined for another CC sack. Yoakam had a fumble recovery and John Ivezic had an interception.

Tibaldi, also left off the Detroit Free Press' All-Catholic League first team despite gaining 1,005 yards prior to Saturday, finished with 119 yards on 21 carries and a second-half TD.

"I think I proved that I was an All-Catholic back," Tibaldi said. "I don't want to sound cocky but, yeah, I think I deserved it."

CC, 9-1 overall, will meet Detroit Martin Luther King in a Class AA semifinal game to be played Saturday at Chippewa Valley High School. CC beat King in last year's Class AA championship game and earlier this season routed the Crusaders, 24-6.

KING BEAT Utica Ford, 27-12, in the other Region III game played Saturday.

Henry Ford took an 8-3 first half lead after a 1-yard run by Leon Merritt and a two-

point conversion pass, but the Shamrocks gained momentum for the second half with an 80-yard TD drive just before halftime.

Quarterback Chris Barbara, who completed five of 12 passes for 64 yards, kept the drive alive with an 8-yard pass to Yoakam on third down and goal from the Ford nine. Gusoff, who finished with 62 yards on 16 carries, scored on the next play and Kerry Zavagnin kicked the extra point for a 10-8 halftime lead.

Zavagnin earlier in the half got CC on the board with a 42-yard field goal, his longest of the year.

"I think the drive right before halftime was great to set the momentum for the second half," CC coach Tom Mach said. "It was a two-minute drill and we worked it very well to get us a TD and give us the spark we needed. Tibaldi and Gusoff ran real hard."

CC took the opening kickoff of the second half and drove 70 yards for a score and a 17-

8 lead. Gusoff, following a block by Gary Stegall, scored from a yard out on third down to cap the drive.

AFTER CC's defense held on Ford's next possession, the Shamrocks drove another 61 yards for a TD, finishing the drive with a 6-yard run by Tibaldi. Zavagnin's extra point made the score 24-8 with 11:24 remaining in the game.

Yoakam made the score 31-8 with a 16-yard counter run with 6:21 left, and the Shamrocks finished the scoring with 1:42 left on an 8-yard run by Nemzek.

"We weren't really sure what they were doing in the first half and had problems blocking their middle linebackers," CC senior lineman Dan Cretu said. "But we made adjustments and went back to straight-on helmet-to-helmet blocking instead of doubling at the point of attack."

"I wanted us to win the medley relay so we would start off right," he said. "If we lose that, it's a 12-point turnaround."

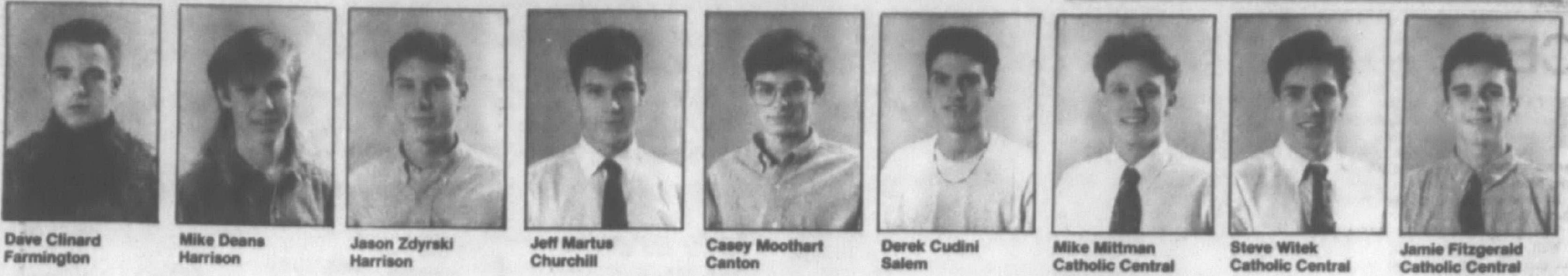

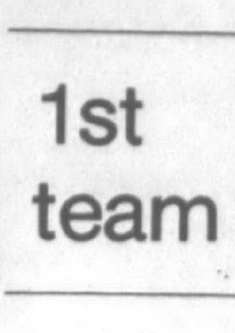

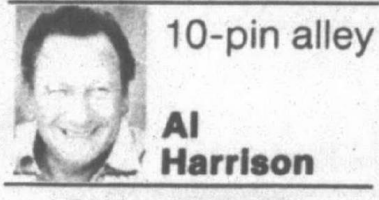
**Westland's Oak Lanes** will also have an adult-youth tournament. For more details, call the center at 422-7420.

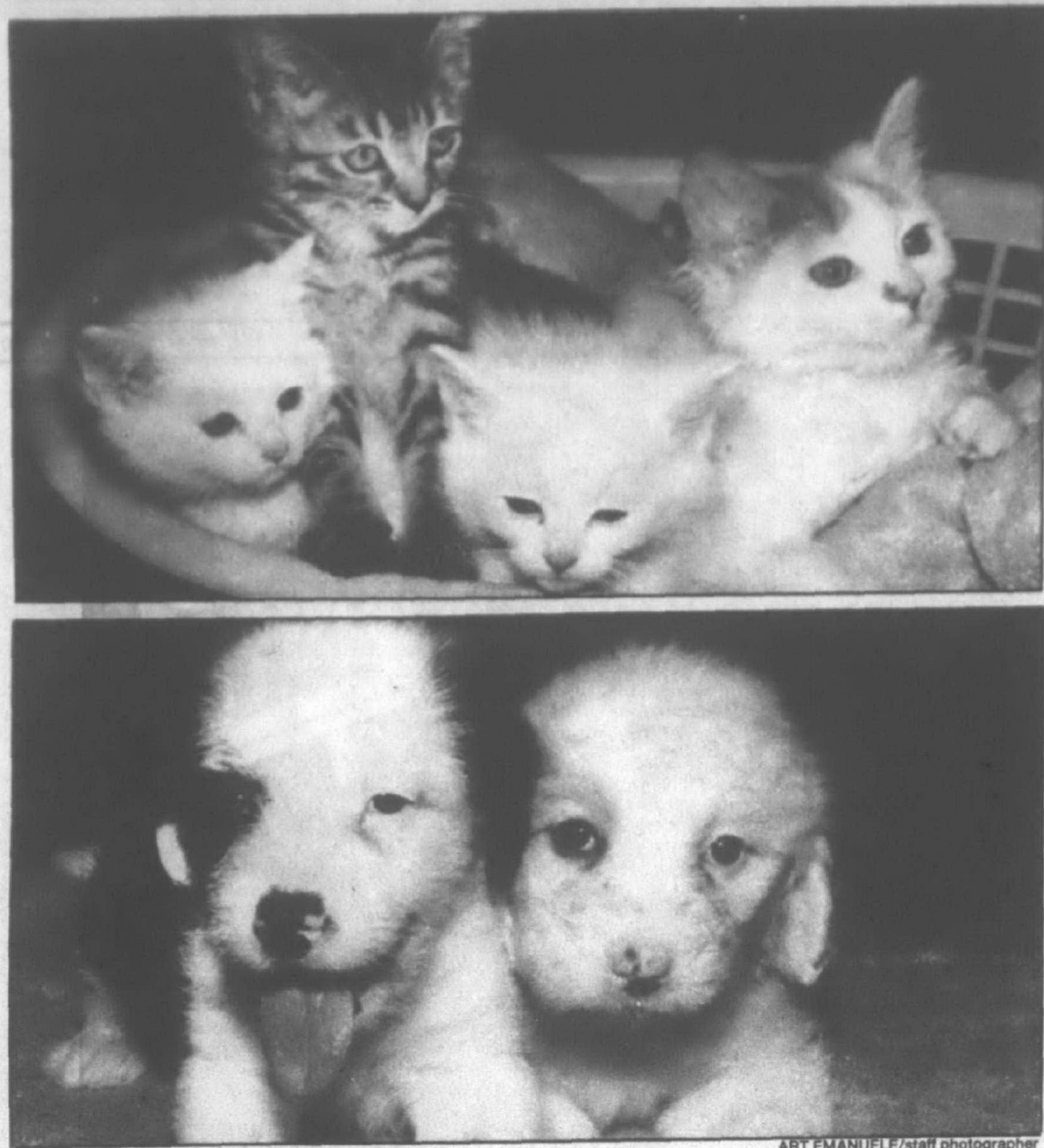

#### WAITING FOR THE DOCTOR

When you come to a rheumatologist for a scheduled appointment, you may be faced at times, with an inordinate wait. The doctor is not trying to assert his importance, rather, the delay is a result of a scheduling problem faced by every rheumatologist in daily practice. First is the unpredictable nature of joint pain and immobility. Second is that the schedule must make room for elderly persons who live alone, and who cannot drive. The office, almost daily, receives a call from a hurried elderly person, living alone, who suddenly cannot walk, but must do so to continue self care and independent living. Furthermore, the person must see the doctor immediately, as now is the only time a friend or relative can volunteer to drive the patient.

A home visit later in the day is not practical. X-rays and a joint aspiration may be needed and require an office or hospital setting. The alternative of going to an agency room is expensive, and likely will take up a volunteer helper's complete day. A crisis exists for the caller; the office must see that person now. Scheduled people will have to wait.

Most individuals with arthritis, can imagine themselves as needing such attention at a future date, and accept the delay in their appointment with grace.

## Compact impact CD to benefit Native Americans

Chris Staels went on a camping trip and ended up pitching a compact disc.

"Dream Catchers, Volume One" is a 14-song compilation CD featuring a brimming array of this area's musical talent.

More so, the release is the culmination of several phone calls and tireless fund raising in what has become a unilateral effort from this area's music community — all to help the Tribal Bay Mills Community College of Michigan.

Staels initiated things. He made a Fourth of July excursion through the Bay Mills Reservation in the Upper Peninsula en route to a camp site. What he found was a rather depressing atmosphere in the Chippewa community.

"I was a bit disappointed in what I saw," said Staels, a 1979 graduate of Bloomfield Hills Lahser High School. "The kind of living conditions... They just seemed to need some help."

Instead of just sending a check, the chief engineer of Paradise Post studio in Farmington Hills asked bands to contribute a song to a CD to sell.

The numbers vary from folk to an anti-drug heavy metal song. Most of them center on Native Americans or the environment.

The goal is to raise \$12,000 for the state's only Tribally Chartered Community College, which provides career oriented programs for Native Americans and residents of their neighboring communities. The money is matched by the federal government \$2 for every dollar contributed.

PART OF the money will come from the sale of 1,000 CDs at \$10 each — all proceeds go to the reservation. "Dream Catchers, Volume One" is available at area record outlets.

Other funds will come by way of live shows, such as the one Saturday, Nov. 23, at Alvin's.

Native American artist Richard Cyr will perform along with other bands who contributed

songs to the compact disc — Dropping Names, Billy Brandt, John D. Lamb & the Wild Blue, Cafe Zero, Red C, Deep Blue Lake, The Hope Orchestra, Barb Barton, The Pedestrians, The Waykools, Spiral Dance, The Lovelings and Four Winds.

Each act will perform 15-minute sets. The show starts at 8:30 p.m. with admission \$5 at the door.

To get that many bands on one stage is a remarkable feat in itself. Part of the reason organizers say the effort has been largely devoid of egos, mainly everyone is more than happy to help out.

"I think people are more open to this because the other (benefits) were so political," said Asta Jurgutis of Farmington Hills and lead vocalist for The Hope Orchestra. "This one is different... A lot of us are getting more into the problem than just, 'Ya, we'll play.'"

Jurgutis typifies the depth in which many people have become involved.

She's made a couple of pilgrimages to the Bay Mills Reservation to meet officials in order to convey the group's sincerity in the project. She's also helped organize publicity for the CD and the upcoming benefit show at Alvin's.

Then there is Mary McGuire of Dropping Names, who went around to businesses asking for donations and raised \$2,300, not to mention awareness to the plight of Native Americans.

Not all contributions have been monetary. Security personnel and stage technicians at The Palace of Auburn Hills are providing their services at Saturday's show.

Other acts are lending drum kits, amplifiers and even helping arrange limousine transportation to Saturday's show for officials of the Bay Mills Reservation.

All of which hasn't gone unnoticed by people like John Lufkins, who is tribal administrator for the Bay Mills community college.

"You get a bunch of people calling, 'What can we do to help out?'" Lufkins said. "They usually

send a bunch of clothes to sell at a garage sale... or they send a check.

"THEIR EAGERNESS and dedication to do something was most impressive. You hear from people who will say, 'Yes, we'll do this,' but it never comes to fruit. These young people got together and worked hard at it and brought it to life."

Lufkins said the money will go toward a trust fund, part of an overall plan to raise \$1 million during a 10-year period. The money would then be invested, with the interest used to pay for school operations.

Initially, there was wariness when Lufkins received the first call from Staels when he proposed the idea of a compact disc.

Then two weeks later, Jurgutis went to the reservation to meet with Lufkins.

Periodically, Staels called to keep Lufkins updated on the progress of the project.

First, Lufkins said Staels told him "Dream Catchers, Volume One" could raise \$8,000. Then, a month later, Staels upgraded the figure to \$10,000 and then recently to \$12,000.

"I said, 'Wow, I'm getting so I like to hear from you more and more,'" said Lufkins with a laugh.

Though the project has been the dream of Staels, he's rather low key by the early success of the effort. This is only the first part of what he sees as an ongoing quest to help Native Americans.

"The '90s especially, I think, is going to generate some awareness and provide some justice," Staels said. "I think they deserve it. I think they're owed."

## Accidental tourists on pop front?

Amid the buzz from the frontal guitar attack, Happy Accidents' lead singer Paul Einhaus realizes he's not being heard.

He doesn't stomp his feet or throw a fit. Instead, he calmly removes the hair from his eyes and cordially asks the sound man to give his microphone a boost.

And Einhaus says thank you, not once but twice.

But don't confuse politeness for pop passivity. Happy Accidents will floss your teeth with their steel guitar strings, tearing through a gauntlet of ripe songs with unequivocal zeal on this night at Lili's 21.

"I think when you're playing live you play things faster because your adrenalin is pumping," said Einhaus, who lives in Farmington.

Happy Accidents curvy contradiction. On the one hand, there is this pop band with a lead singer whose voice cracks with vulnerability as he tackles the universal postpubescent pop themes about teachers hated and mythical girls fancied.

Then there is this band — guitarist Mike Crimmins, bassist Steve Presti, drummer Jim Faulkner and Einhaus

— with the sonic crunch of punk without the sneer or the posturing.

Listen to the outfit's seven-song compact disc, "Mouthful of the Sun," (Permanent Records, Box 173, Farmington 48332), and call them purveyors of infectious pop melodies. They won't mind.

BUT THEIR hooks won't merely sway you to their melancholia, angst-ridden world view. They pierce the sensibilities and offer no bandages for the wounds.

"I think what's missing in music today is that songwriters are afraid to embarrass themselves a little bit," Einhaus said. "I think you should expose yourself a little bit."

Undoubtedly, Einhaus does that as the front man for the Happy Accidents willing to drape his soul over the microphone while stabbing away at his guitar on stage.

Einhaus doesn't immediately

strike you as someone who had a career history of playground pugilism. Rather, he comes across as someone who felt alienated during the whole process of growing up and is just feeling the need to strike back.

Or, at least that's what songs such as "All My Teachers Were Failures" would suggest.

"I'm in my mid-20s and I think I would've gotten over that by now," said Einhaus, 1982 graduate of Farmington High School. "I did hate high school, but that's beside the point. It was a good title for a song."

TEENAGE REBELLION, though, did serve Static Alphabet, Einhaus' previous band that also included Crimmins for all of a few weeks. That group was laden with punk-inspired humor, not to mention a bit of the sloppiness associated with the late-'70s sound.

Happy Accidents was formed with

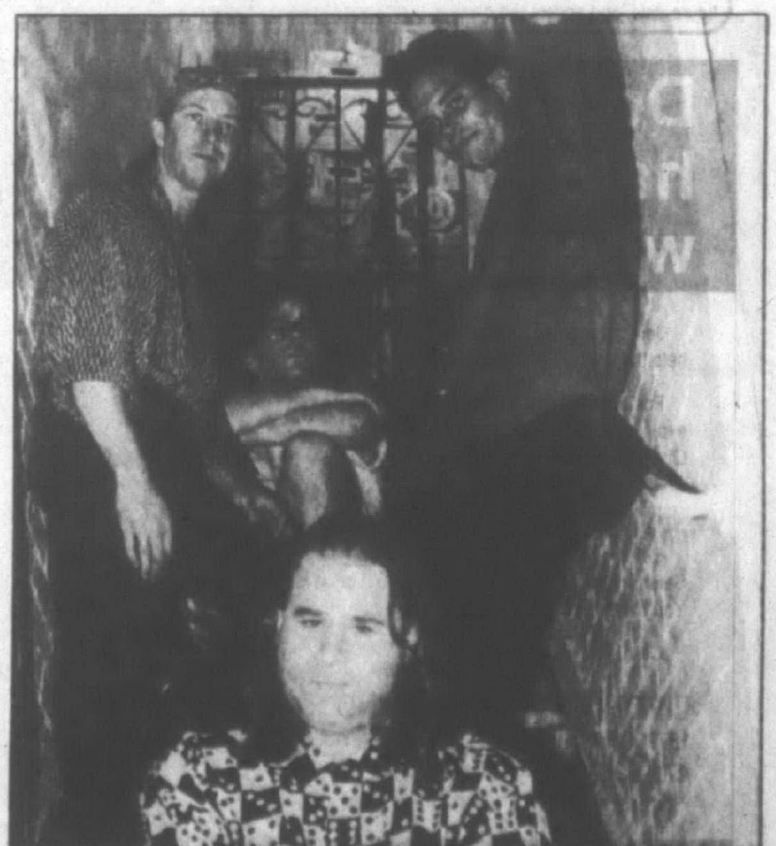
an intent to mold a brash '80s sound and '60s pop musings into a combustible form. Einhaus rejoined Crimmins and added Faulkner — both of whom were members of the Dancing Smoothies. Presti joined in April from Standing Shadows, replacing Steve Carlson who was on bass for the recording of "Mouthful of Sun."

The band has sought to find "the marriage" of pop and punk stylings on the stage at clubs such as Lili's, 3-D, Finney's Pub and Paycheck's. The four-man outfit has had brief tours of the Midwest. A record deal would be fine, but not the sole catalyst in performing.

Initially, one might be taken in by the group's keen pop sensibilities but the ungilded passion in their performances wins people over in the long haul.

"We're not the most talented musicians. I think we're pretty good, though," Einhaus said. "It's a commitment thing and a sheer love of what you're doing."

# Scorsese goes off deep end in 'Cape Fear'

The camera never stands still. It careens wildly around rooms, zooms in dramatically on characters' faces during key scenes, even tips upside down on occasion. Psychedelic-colored yellow, orange, and purple storm clouds gather over the homes of potential victims.

It's no surprise that "Cape Fear" looks more like a Ken Russell movie than the work of Martin Scorsese. The director of "Taxi Driver" and "Goodfellas" wasn't originally taken with the idea of remaking the 1962 thriller but decided to have some fun and not treat too seriously the revenge tale he inherited.

The result is a visually inspired but still nasty little nail-biter that

adds an even greater psycho-sexual slant to an already sicko story.

The credits lead off with bizarre widescreen images, shot in black and white negative, of wild staring eyes, storm clouds, and birds of prey sweeping down for the kill. "The only thing to fear on those enchanted nights," remembers the young girl whose narration opens and closes the film, "is that reality would come crashing in."

That reality arrives in the cigar-puffing form of parolee Max Cady (Robert DeNiro), recently released from a 14-year stretch for rape. He has a score to settle with attorney Jack Bowden (Nick Nolte), who defended his case but withheld evidence that may have resulted in a lighter sentence.

Cady, illiterate upon entering prison, not only learned to read but devoured countless law books and the Bible. Craving emotional compensation from Bowden, he threatens to rape and torture both the lawyer's wife (Jessica Lange) and his 15-year-old daughter (Juliette Lewis).

THIS PSYCHO is smart. He knows how to manipulate the law, staying just this side of breaking any rules.

Among other things, "Cape Fear" is about the injustice of the legal system and how past sins, even for the sanest of reasons, can return to haunt you.

DeNiro is brilliant, as usual. Here he's covered from head to toe with tattoos, primitively executed symbols of Truth and Justice and a broken heart bearing the name Loretta. He tries desperately to manipulate the frazzled emotions of the Bowden

women, and has some success with the daughter Danielle.

By posing as a drama teacher in an Isid sweater, Cady lures the high schooler to a secluded auditorium, where the set recalls a cottage scene from Little Red Riding Hood. Cady wins her confidences by "connecting with" her like an adult, offering her marijuana and coaxing a nervous kiss.

He tries to get at Bowden's wife, who suspects that her husband is having another affair. As played by the talented Lange, she's vulnerable but not stupid. Scorsese has enough sense to not have her fall for Cady's Big Bad Wolf jive too.

The 1962 "Cape Fear," which the film follows in most respects, was pretty nasty stuff for the time. It's not much prettier today, as Scorsese

adds trademark pools of blood and a graphic torture scene.

Scorsese offers original stars Robert Mitchum and Gregory Peck minor roles, but really pays homage to film history with the soundtrack and camera. He actually resurrects the full 1962 Bernard Hermann score (conducted here by Elmer Bernstein). He also employs veteran cinematographer Freddie Francis, a master of unnatural colors and moving cameras.

IF "CAPE FEAR" isn't a major Scorsese film, it's fascinating from a purely visual angle. The man called "America's best director" may finally get the box office recognition he deserves. Too bad he has to finally achieve it with such crass subject matter.

## A telling story of fascism's rise

Seriously wounded in battle, Austrian soldier Klaus Schneider spends the rest of World War I recuperating. In the hospital, he becomes friends with the doctor who runs the clinic, a psychiatrist who treats him with hypnosis. Schneider, played by Klaus Maria Brandauer, becomes adept at hypnosis and hones his natural skills as a clairvoyant.

Soon the former soldier has transformed himself into Eric Jan Hanussen, the clairvoyant who amazes audiences in the former Austro-Hungarian empire then becomes the toast of Berlin during the late 1920s and early 1930s.

The 1988 film, now video, "Hanussen" looks at the forces that led to Hitler's rise in Germany and the cost of letting others control your future, even under the pretext of being non-political.

The film opens with imperial soldiers poised in trenches, awaiting a signal that will send them charging across a cemetery to be cut down by enemy machine gun fire. The camera follows the serpentine trench looking at the frightened men as one

soldier can be heard reciting the Lord's Prayer.

AT THE army hospital, the emperor is coming for an inspection of the wounded troops. One aide in the advance party agrees that the severely wounded and amputee soldiers are symbols of loyalty but complains "there are too many of them" as he directs some out of the military formation. Quite the benevolent monarchy.

While at the hospital, Schneider tells the doctor that he feels there is a deep dark void, which he fears falling in. It's an expansion of that feeling of foreboding which recurs throughout the film as Hanussen's accurate predictions — this is based

on a true story — become increasingly more specific.

Defending himself on in court on charges of being a charlatan, Hanussen says he reads the question on everyone's mind. "What will happen to us?" In the political turmoil and severe economic depression the shattered countries of the former empire, everyone is at loose ends. "A void is created. People fill it with the only thing left, hatred," he says.

Hanussen himself is startled as even his off-handed remarks prove to be accurate predictions. Political parties seek to use him for propaganda purposes although he remains independent until his abilities are publicly challenged.

HANUSSEN'S fate becomes in-

tertwined with Hitler, who shares the same birth date, as the Nazis grab control, offering structure and order to a beleaguered and often paralyzed society.

The film doesn't make excuses for the Nazi horror. Hungarian director-writer Istvan Szabo captures panic and helplessness that many Germans and other middle Europeans felt when their social structure and economy collapsed after the first world war. Too many were willing to lay blame on scapegoats and overlook the devastating dark side of the Nazi party.

Brandauer, who always seems more animated in his German language roles, is very good as Hanussen, growing confident in his abilities but trying to watch his step in tumultuous Berlin.

Brandauer was brilliant as another Nazi era performer in the outstanding 1981 film "Mephisto," winner of an academy award as best foreign language film. "Mephisto" and a lesser film featuring Brandauer, "Colonel Redl" were both written and directed by Szabo.

## Time for teens to think spring

Around the World Travel has scheduled three Easter week packages for high school students and others.

A seven-night package to Cancun, Mexico, April 18-25 costs \$704 a person for three people and \$774 a person for two people. The price includes roundtrip air, transfers, the Calinda Viva Hotel, plus taxes and gratuities.

A seven-night package for the same dates to the Radisson Hotel and Resort in South Padre Island costs \$569 per person for four people in a room, \$661 per person for three people in a room.

The price for the seven-night cruise April 19-26 is \$1,095 per person for four people in a cabin, \$1,193 per person for three people in a cabin. The cruise goes to Grand Cayman, Jamaica, Cozumel and Labadee.

## A merry old English inn in Michigan

Dusty's English Inn is about treed lawns and English gardens wrapped around a tudor mansion on a grassy knoll near Eaton Rapids, Mich., but most of all it's about people.

It's about the auto magnate whose family frolicked down the sweep of lawn to the Grand River. It's about the local diners who were once groundskeepers and ladies maids on the property. It's about Dusty Rhodes, who was in the radio and newspaper business in Michigan for many years before he moved to Britain and fell in love with English country life.

Ask Dusty to show you the old photographs taken when the house was being built by Irving J. Reuter, president of Oldsmobile, especially the photo dated August 1927. Dusty was born Clarence Rhodes on Aug. 8, 1927, son of a Flint assembly worker. He was destined to be called Dusty Rhodes and he was destined to own this inn.

When I turned off M-99 13 miles south of Lansing I saw at once why this 23-room Tudor mansion, that looks like a little sister of Meadowbrook Hall in Rochester, is called an "English inn." The two-story brick mansion, with the sloping slate roofs, is straight from the midlands of England.

In England, boaters might punt along the Grand River and enter the inn from the river side, climbing uphill past the colonnaded swimming pool and the gazebo, through the stepped gardens to the house. I entered along the slate path from the parking lot.

Inn worker Jane Kuderko, born and raised in Howell, welcomed me into the large open hall, which has full views left to the Devonshire Room, right to the Midford Room and up the staircase with its hunter green carpet to the second floor.

Jane led me upstairs, past rooms with names like Windsor and Avon to the end of the hall. "You're in the bathroom." At least that is what I thought she said. I had asked for their least expensive room, but I didn't expect to have to sleep in the bathtub.

It was, of course, the Bath Room, a huge green-tiled bathroom that led into a smaller 10-by-12-foot bedroom, with a four-poster bed and leaded windows that opened front and side. A bit of Dusty Rhodes whimsy. Dusty has a second home in Bath, England, so you will find small references to Bath all over the inn.

Dusty was still a television news executive when he moved to London with his wife and five children in the 1970s. He fell in love with English country life and spent his weekends exploring inns, pubs and bed-and-breakfast places. He came home to Michigan, quit the news business, opened a bakery and later a wine bar and pub in Okemos.

Dusty knows how to answer when opportunity knocks. In 1989 he heard about this mansion from the author of



a bed-and-breakfast guide book. He saw the initial "R" carved for auto magnate Irving Reuter on the fireplace mantle and knew he was home.

Reuter had sold the place to the Catholic Diocese of Lansing in 1940; the bishop's chapel is now the Charles Dickens Pub. The diocese sold the house to Mr. and Mrs. C.J. Sumner in 1962. The Sumners sold it to Dusty on condition that their granddaughter could be married there the next summer.

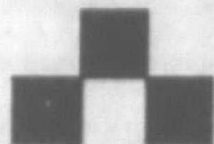
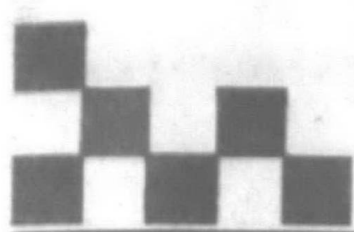

## ABC's of turkey cookery

Anyone in the food business has heard all there is to hear about the tragedies involved with preparing the traditional holiday turkey. The stories of cooking the bird with the bag of giblets and neck intact abound.

Today, this space will be devoted to the simple basics of turkey cookery. If you need recipes for "caper-basted turkey with lingonberry stuffing" look elsewhere.

During this time of year, turkeys are available two ways: frozen and fresh. If you're just starting out, you'll probably be buying a frozen bird because they are the least expensive. Be prepared to pay from 69 cents to upwards of \$1.39 per pound for a basic frozen turkey. Prices start at \$1.59 per pound for a fresh turkey, and the more organic and naturally fed, the higher in price they are.

**BEFORE COOKING**, you will have to defrost a frozen turkey. The safest way to defrost a frozen bird is to remove it from the freezer 3 days before cooking and allow it to defrost slowly in the bottom of the refrigerator.

Countertop or sink defrosting is not recommended because bacteria loves room-temperature food. Contrary to popular belief, microwave defrosting is not defrosting but actually "cooking" at a lower power, so last-minute nuking is not advised.

After the turkey has been defrosted, remove it from the package. This is a feat in itself, especially when trying to wrestle with a 30 pound dead-weight bird. Using your best ingenuity, remove that metal bracket that holds the leg tips close to the body cavity. It's very difficult but should be done. Now reach inside the cavity and search the crevice as far as you can reach, looking for a plastic or paper baggie filled with the giblets and neck. Remove this bag and rinse the bird under cold running water.

Now check the entire skin on the outside of the bird, looking for misplucked pinfeathers. Remove them with a knife or tweezers if necessary. If the bird is to be stuffed, it does not need to be seasoned before roasting. If you wish to cook an unstuffed bird, lightly salt and pepper the inside of the cavity. Do not stuff the bird until ready to roast.

If the bird is to be stuffed, pack the stuffing loosely into the bird, as the stuffing will expand during roasting.

When it comes to roasting the bird, momma always recommends placing the bird on a rack in a roasting pan. You can purchase poultry racks, but I have found that a cheap stainless steel cake rack works just as well.

**PLACE THE** bird breast side up on the rack and brush with butter, margarine, vegetable oil or shortening or a combination of any and all. Do not add water and most of all, do not cover. This is a highly debatable point, as momma covers and I don't. I think the bird tastes "steamy" rather than "roasty" when covered. Roast the bird in a 325-degree oven. You can, if desired, place a tent of foil over the bird when it begins to turn golden to keep from over-browning it.

After about one hour of cooking, baste the bird with the pan drippings or continue to brush with fat mixture or a very rich chicken broth. Continue basting bird every 30 minutes until cooked.

The most accurate method for doneness is checking with a meat thermometer inserted in the most meaty part of the bird, away from a bone. When it reaches 185 degrees, the turkey is done. Cooking times are: 6-8 pounds, 3-3 1/2 hours; 8-12 pounds, 3 1/2-4 1/2 hours; 12-16 pounds, 4 1/2-5 1/2 hours; 16-20 pounds, 5 1/2-6 1/2 hours; 20-24 pounds, 6 1/2-7 hours; 24-28 pounds, 7 1/2-8 hours. Subtract 30-45 minutes for unstuffed birds.

## Maltese relish home-cooked, varied cuisine

**T**HE CUISINE of Malta is as varied, adventurous and colorful as the history of the Mediterranean nation itself.



Like the people of Malta, Maltese food is straightforward and inviting.

Since the sixth century, the archipelago 58 miles south of Sicily has been occupied by the Phoenicians; Romans; Arabs; a military order of the Roman Catholic Church; the French; and from 1814 to 1964, the British.

**MALTESE COOKS** have capitalized on the best of each culture, excelling with the most plentiful foodstuffs — dishes such as rabbit, octopus and fish.

Mainstays include homemade soups; vegetables like stuffed artichoke and eggplant; pastas; meat pies; pastry; and desserts made with cheeses, custard, dates and macaroons.

An accomplished cook, Livonia's Michelle Pisani lived in Malta from the age of 5 until she moved back to the United States with her family a few years ago at the age of 20.

In a recent interview, she didn't disagree with a reporter who opined that Maltese food is delicious.

"That's why everyone in Malta is overweight," said Pisani with a laugh. "The Maltese love to eat. I've been on a diet most of my life."

It's no accident that the Maltese relish their cuisine, and spend a large amount of time preparing three home-cooked meals a day. Food wasn't always as bountiful as it is now.

"During the war (World War II), people had to eat dogs and cats, or they would have starved," said Pisani, adding that Malta was one of the most heavily bombed targets in the war. "Our sugar, flour and eggs were rationed until 1975 when the English finally left."

Years ago the Maltese weren't as

concerned about their sugar or cholesterol intake.

"A lot of people my dad's age are experiencing heart trouble. There were years they didn't eat balanced meals. People now are getting to be more conscientious about healthful eating," said Pisani, who in Malta worked as a secretary for the man who is currently prime minister.

Pisani now buys her octopus and rabbit at Kroger or Meijer. In Malta, it was much simpler.

"My brother would fish for octopus, knock it against a stone, clean it and barbecue it. We would add tomato sauce, bay leaf, and red wine. You can't get any fresher than that," said Pisani, whose Maltese-born parents met in Detroit.

Pisani learned not to name or play with the rabbits and chickens her dad raised in the backyard. "My brother-in-law would come over, kill them and skin them, and we wouldn't talk to him for a week," she said, admitting that rabbit is more

tender and flavorful than chicken.

At John Hancock in Farmington Hills where she works, Pisani's Maltese "timpana" is a hit on ethnic food days.

"They always want that, and pastizzis," Pisani said of her co-workers

at Hancock. Timpana is baked macaroni (see accompanying recipe) covered with a layer of pastry crust.

#### Recipes

##### SPINACH LASAGNE

This is a tasty, meatless dinner that can be made in advance and only takes minutes to assemble as the noodles do not have to be pre-cooked.

This recipe makes about 12 pieces with about 7.5 grams of fat per piece, 5 grams if non-fat cottage cheese is used.

- 15 ounces low-fat ricotta cheese or non-fat cottage cheese
- 2 cups shredded mozzarella cheese, divided
- 1 egg
- 1 package frozen, chopped spinach, thawed and drained, 10-ounce size
- 1 teaspoon oregano
- salt and pepper to taste
- 1 package lasagne noodles, uncooked, 16-ounce size
- 1 cup water
- 1 jar spaghetti sauce, 28-ounce size (Ragu Fine Italian Sauce has a lower fat content than others)

In a large bowl, mix the ricotta and 1 cup mozzarella cheese, egg, spinach, salt, pepper and oregano. In a 13-by-9-by-2-inch greased baking dish, layer 1/2 cup of the sauce, a layer of the noodles and 1/2 of the cheese mixture.

Repeat and top with noodles and sauce and the remaining mozzarella to make three layers.

Pour the water around the edges. Cover tightly with foil and bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour 15 minutes. Let stand for 15 minutes before serving.

##### TOSSED SALAD

- 1/2 head iceberg lettuce

- 1 head red leaf lettuce
- 1/4 pound mushrooms
- 1 green pepper, cut into thin strips
- 1 tomato, cut into wedges
- 1 red onion, cut into rings

Wash and drain lettuce. Cut up mushrooms, green pepper, onion and tomato, mix with lettuce.

Red lettuce adds color to the salad. You also might want to try radicchio or grated red cabbage.

##### ITALIAN DRESSING

- 1/2 cup oil
- 1/4 cup red wine vinegar, or part lemon juice
- 1/2 teaspoon Dijon mustard
- 1 small clove garlic, finely minced
- 1 scallion, minced
- 1/2 teaspoon oregano
- salt and pepper to taste

Place all ingredients in a jar with tight-fitting lid, or salad dressing cruet. Shake well before serving. Makes 1 cup.

For variety, try olive oil or different flavors of vinegar like white wine vinegar or balsamic vinegar. Different kinds of mustard, and seasonings like red pepper flakes, also add zip.

##### SWEDISH CREME WITH RASPBERRIES (or your favorite fruit)

Totally fat free, this easy dessert can be whipped up in minutes.

- 1 small package sugar free vanilla pudding
- 1 cup skim milk
- 1 cup non-fat sour cream substitute
- 1 cup non-fat plain yogurt
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Combine all ingredients and beat at high speed for 2 minutes.

Chill for 3-4 hours and serve with fresh fruit sprinkled on top.



# Cooks share baked macaroni, other family favorites

## BAKED MACARONI Inquarrun Fii Foru

This recipe is delicious served with beef vegetable soup.

2 pounds ground chuck  
8 finely minced garlic cloves  
29 oz. can of tomatoes chopped in a Cuisinart or cut up  
2 12-oz. cans of tomato paste  
1 8-oz. can tomato sauce  
salt and pepper  
2 pounds mostaccioli or ziti  
8 eggs  
1/2 cup grated parmesan cheese

Brown the ground chuck, drain off all fat, and set aside. Sauté minced garlic in a small amount of light olive oil. When yellow, add the meat to the garlic. Add chopped tomatoes, tomato paste, the tomato sauce, and salt and pepper to taste.

Simmer, stirring often, for 45 minutes to an hour. Put aside and let cool. Yield is 3 to 3 1/2 quarts. Use 7 cups for baked macaroni recipe, freeze remainder and use for any pasta.

Prepare a 9 x 13 2-inch deep pan with Crisco on bottom and sides. Then dust with flour.

Cook two pounds of pasta. After macaroni is cooked, rinse with cold water to avoid sticking. Mix the sauce and the macaroni together in an eight-quart pot. Whip eggs and parmesan cheese. Add mixture into sauce and pasta.

Pour into prepared pan and bake at 400 degrees for 35 minutes, or until slightly brown on top.

Low fat version: Prepare the sauce the same way. Spray the pan with Pam instead of Crisco.

Instead of eggs, use two cartons of thawed Egg Beaters. Decrease grated parmesan cheese to 1 1/2 cup. Bake the same way.

## FISH SOUP (Aljotta)

2 pounds fish, cut up (any kind can be used)  
1 medium onion or 1 small leek  
1 clove crushed garlic or 1 1/2 teaspoons garlic powder  
2 tablespoons olive oil  
1 bay leaf  
1 1/2 teaspoons mint  
4 tomatoes or 2 tablespoons tomato paste  
salt and pepper  
3 pints of water

Slice onions and fry in oil with crushed garlic. Add tomatoes or tomato paste, bay leaf, mint, salt and

pepper. Add fish and cover with water. Bring to a boil. Cook slowly until the fish is done.

1 1/4 cup rice may be added, if desired.

Potato, celery and carrots may be cooked in salt water and put into soup.

## RIKOTTA PASTIZZI

Filling:  
1 pound of Ricotta cheese  
1 egg  
1 tablespoon grated cheese  
dash of salt and pepper

Mix the filling ingredients together. Set aside.

Cut pastizzi dough roll (recipe below) into one and one half inch sections. Lay each piece on its side so that the circles are facing up. Spread each circle out carefully so as not to disturb circles. Now put approximately one tablespoon of filling in the middle. Fold both sides over the filling. Press each end down.

Place on an ungreased cookie sheet 1 1/2 inches apart. Bake at 350 degrees fahrenheit for one hour or until brown.

## Pastizzi Dough

3 cups shortening  
5 cups flour  
2 cups cold water  
dash of salt

Put the flour, water and salt in an electric mixer with a dough hook. Mix the same as you would for

bread, approximately 15 minutes or knead together by hand for approximately 20 minutes. It should feel slightly moist and as soft as a baby's behind. Cover and let stand for one hour. Cut about one eighth of the dough. Open like pizza dough on a table that has been slightly greased. Pull and spread in all directions a little at a time until dough is very thin. Spread a generous amount of shortening all over the top of the dough. Start at one end of dough and roll, pulling back and up as you roll. Repeat this process adding each layer to the same roll until the roll is about 1 1/2 inch thick. Cut to about 8 to 10 inches in length. Refrigerate or freeze until ready to use.

When ready to roll out, cut the dough roll into one and one half inch sections. Lay each piece on its side so that the circles are facing up. Spread each circle out carefully so as not to disturb circles. Now put approximately one tablespoon of filling in the middle. Fold both sides over the filling. Press each end down.

Place on an ungreased cookie sheet 1 1/2 inches apart. Bake 1 hour at 375 degrees. The pastizzis should be lightly browned.

## RIKOTTA CANNOLI

Filling:  
1 pound ricotta  
1/2 cup powder sugar  
1 teaspoon vanilla

1/4 teaspoon almond extract  
1/2 cup small pieces of chocolate  
1/2 cup almonds slivers

Mix together ricotta and sugar until smooth. Add all other ingredients. Put in the refrigerator. Keep cool.

Fill into shells (recipe below). Roll in powdered sugar and dip ends into chopped nuts or chocolate pieces.

Fill shells the same day you are going to serve them.

## Cannoli Shells:

2 cups flour  
2 tablespoons butter  
1/2 cup wine water

In a small bowl, mix flour and butter with fork until butter is mixed well. Add wine and water. Mix with hands. Knead until dough is smooth. Mix dough into a ball. Cover. Let stand for one hour.

Special molds are needed to make shells. They are called cylinders. They are made of tin and are about 4 inches long and 3/4 inch in diameter and open at both ends.

Cut a small piece of dough about 1/2 inch square. Roll very thin. Place each piece of pastry over cylinder, wet ends and press together. Fry in deep hot oil, only about 30 seconds. Do not burn or overcook.

Use tongs, hold shells in oil for a few seconds, so they do not open.

Drain on a paper towel. Remove tins. Cool and fill when ready to use. Do not cover or refrigerate.

## Maltese relish home-cooked food

Mary Ann Alcalá, baked macaroni is a treat her Maltese-Mexican family look forward to on Sundays and holidays.

Alcalá's husband, sons, daughters-in-law and grandchildren "love Maltese food, especially baked macaroni. It's a favorite," said Alcalá of Farmington Hills.

Alcalá's baked macaroni recipe (see recipe this page) was difficult to put on paper, because she learned it not from a cookbook, but at her mother's side. It was a recipe Josephine Cassar knew by heart from the time she was a girl growing up in Malta.

Alcalá has changed the recipe a

little. "It's derived from my mom's recipe, but everyone when they cook puts a little bit of themselves into it. I don't put pork in, and I add tomato sauce. But it's basically my mother's recipe," she said.

In the Cassar household in Corktown where Alcalá spent her childhood, home-cooked family meals were a high priority. Homemade red wine and bread baked by her father were served, and Alcalá was in heaven when her mom made her favorite — baked rice. That dish is made with long grain rice, milk, pork, beef, bacon, ricotta cheese, eggs, tomato sauce and seasoning.

"We always ate at home. We rarely went out to eat," said Alcalá, adding that it was the same in most

Maltese households in Corktown.

"On Sundays, my mom went to early Mass, then got dinner ready. We had dinner at 1 p.m. In the afternoon, we'd go for a ride, to Belle Isle or Elizabeth Park. In the evening, my mother would warm up whatever she had if we were hungry. Then I'd do my homework, or listen to the Lux Radio Theater with my family."

In Malta, the family, Catholicism, education, and family meals still occupy center stage. "Malta just recently got diet Coke. We had no junk food whatsoever," said Pisani. "And we didn't have color TV until five years ago. People take a lot of things for granted in this country."

# Trivia, tips, cider-glazed turkey breast recipe

Thank you readers for making our Turkey Tale essay contest a success. We received many entries and our sides are still sore from laughing. Look for the winners, and their essays in next week's Taste.

**Turkey trivia** - Domesticated turkeys cannot fly. Wild turkeys can fly for short distances up to 55 miles an hour and can run 24 miles an hour.

According to the National Turkey Federation, in 1991, about 300 million turkeys were raised. They "guesstimate" that 45 million of those turkeys were eaten at Thanksgivings, 23 million at Christmas and 19 million at Easter.

FOR THOSE of you headed to the

store to buy the big bird, allow at least a pound of uncooked turkey per person when buying a whole turkey.

As far as feasts go, Thanksgiving is one of the most economical. The American Farm Bureau Federation reported that the traditional Thanksgiving meal cost \$28.85 to serve 10 people in 1990. The menu included turkey, stuffing, sweet potatoes, peas, rolls, cranberries, a relish dish, beverages and pumpkin pie with whipped cream.

If you have a small family, hate dark meat, or are counting calories, here's a wonderful recipe Lynne Loren of West Bloomfield sent in. Made with apple cider, and two kinds of apples, this turkey breast recipe is sure to please. The recipe is from Elwin's Tu-Go in Royal Oak.

## CIDER-GLAZED ESCALLOPES OF TURKEY BREAST

Yield: 6 to 8 servings

- 1 small or one-half of large fresh turkey breast, skin removed
- 1/4 cup smooth Dijon mustard
- 1/4 cup canola oil
- coarse-ground black pepper
- 1 bay leaf
- 1/4 cup apple cider
- 3/4 cup de-fatted chicken stock

8 delicious apples (4 red & 4 yellow), cored & cut into rings or wedges

Preheat oven to 475 degrees. Combine the mustard and canola oil and smear all over the turkey breast half. Shake the pepper evenly all over (amount of pepper; your choice). Place the turkey on a roasting rack on a baking sheet or shallow baking pan. On the bottom of the baking sheet, place the bay leaf, cider and chicken stock.

Place in the oven and roast for about 20 minutes. Reduce heat to 325 degrees and cook for approximately 45 minutes (check for doneness), basting periodically with pan liquids. Ten minutes before it is completely cooked, add the apple pieces to the bottom of the pan to cook. When done, remove turkey and cut into an equal number of scallops with a serrated knife. Place them on a warmed platter. Remove the cooked apples and garnish turkey with them. Remove bay leaf from pan juices, place juices in gravy boat and serve with turkey.

Make chicken stock using chicken pieces that have been skinned and have had all fat removed.

TALK WITH your children during dinner, and they just might grow up

to be scholars. A survey of National Merit Scholars found that these outstanding children come from homes where conversation is the heart of the daily dinner hour. Positive conversation, not just eating should be the focus of the meal.

Tip of the week, compliments of Betty Crocker. Thanksgiving turkey will taste best if roasted on Thanksgiving Day. If you're trying to save time, mix all dry ingredients - bread crumbs and spices for stuffing and have them ready to mix with remaining ingredients just before stuffing the turkey on Thanksgiving Day.

# What it means when the label says reserve wine

Value-laden descriptors adorn the modern-day, domestic wine label. The consumer is faced with Reserve, Proprietor's Reserve, Private Reserve, Special Selection, Cellar Selection, and Special Selection to name a few. If vineyard designations and proprietary names are added, the array of descriptive words borders on bewildering.

Do the host of wines bearing such designations merit the mark of distinction they confer? Are these loaded terms persuasive marketing devices for the uninitiated wine drinker?

Italy has particular laws governing the use of the descriptors riserva and riserva speciale on the label. Riserva wines are aged in wood one year longer than a non-reserve wine. Riserva speciale wines receive two to three years' additional aging in wood before bottling.

DOMESTIC WINE laws do not regulate the use of reserve label des-

ignations and only a few wineries employing them make an effort to inform consumers of their meaning. Are these phrases a guarantee of high quality or merely a sales gimmick?

Sonoma County's Simi Winery looked to Webster's to define their focus. "Reserve means to set apart or to hold for the future," says president Zelma Long. "This clearly expresses our intention - to create wines of exceptional quality that will age well."

"The concept of a reserve wine is always relative to the producer's regular line of wines," says Jim Clendenen, winemaker at Au Bon Climat Winery, Los Olivos, Calif. "It means nothing in relation to products produced by other wineries. The only thing a well-intentioned winery can guarantee is that their reserve wine will be closer to an optimal expression of their stylistic intentions than will any of their regular bottlings."

"Private Reserve has traditionally designated our best wine," comments Beringer Vineyard's winemaker Ed Sbragia. "We want to be able to put our best lots of wine into a blend in order to make the best wine possible in a particular style."

"Developing reserve wines gives us a chance to take small quantities of the very best wines we produce and craft them into special wines with no compromises," says winemaker Paul Dolan of Fetzer Vineyards. "Instead of just disappearing into our regular wine program, they provide us with a challenge and enhance our image as a winery producing a super-premium product."

tool, successful or not, depending upon the public's gullibility.

Certainly, the term reserve has been degraded by some wineries seeking to justify a higher price rather than greater quality.

Special designations have been overused on wine labels, and the public has been misled in certain cases. How about Reserve White Zinfandel or Reserve White Grenache? Give us a break!

"Let the consumer beware!" says one winemaker. "The consumer paying \$5 a bottle for a reserve wine is having delusions of grandeur. The customer paying \$20 plus buys by the reputation of the individual product."

Understanding of what reserve wines mean has been lost in large volume, inexpensive wines that use the same designations. If they haven't been lost, they've been de-

## Basic turkey stuffing, gravy

- BASIC BREAD STUFFING**
- 1 1/2 cups chopped celery, with leaves
  - 3/4 cup finely chopped onion
  - 3/4 cup butter or margarine
  - 9 cups soft bread cubes or dry stuffing mix
  - 1 teaspoon salt
  - 1/2 teaspoon ground sage
  - 1/2 teaspoon dried thyme
  - 1/4 teaspoon pepper

Saute onion and celery in 2 tablespoons of butter or margarine until tender, about 4 minutes. Melt remaining butter or margarine. Combine all ingredients in a large bowl and mix well. Makes 5 cups stuffing, enough for an 8-10 pound bird.

For a different stuffing:

- a) Try cornbread chunks instead of bread for a cornbread stuffing.
- b) Add 3 cups chopped apples and 1/4 cup raisins that were soaked in water, wine or liquor for 1 hour for an apple-raisin stuffing.
- c) Stuffing can be cooked in a lightly greased casserole. (Cover and bake at 325 degrees for 1 hour.)
- d) Giblet stuffing is very tasty. Simmer the heart, gizzard and neck from turkey in water or white wine for 2 hours at a slow simmer. Drain. Remove neck. Chop giblets and add to any stuffing mixture.
- e) For a sausage stuffing, crumble and brown 1 pound sausage and drain before mixing with any bread stuffing.

**TURKEY PAN GRAVY**

2 tablespoons turkey drippings  
2 tablespoons all purpose flour  
1/2 cup liquid (turkey juices, broth, water)  
1/2 cup milk, room temperature

Place turkey drippings in a pan and stir in flour. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly until mixture is smooth and bubbly; remove from

# CBS offers another really big Sullivan special

## Series archives virtual treasure trove

To paraphrase George Orwell's axiom from his "1984," who controls the syndication rights to television of the past controls television of the future.

Network television occasionally produces a series that shines like a gem among the dull stones of its bleak wasteland, and these exceptions are granted an indefinite afterlife in syndicated reruns, sometimes earning a sad reunion special or even an anniversary resurrection.

In late November 1991, CBS falls back on its brighter moments for a three-day Classic Weekend, offering "Bob Newhart" and "M\*A\*S\*H" anniversaries, plus "The Very Best of The Ed Sullivan Show II," which airs Sunday, Nov. 24.

Ed Sullivan's "very best" was the best of television in general. For the 23-year run of his show, between 1948 and 1971, Sullivan owned Sunday night. His was the definitive variety show, a cornucopia of acts which brought the family together by providing entertainment for all tastes and ages.

Although Sullivan's wooden

mannerisms and awkward delivery make him the antithesis of the modern television host, he was the greatest showman since P.T. Barnum. He introduced American audiences to foreign performers they otherwise would not have seen. And many a Hollywood star took his or her first televised bow on Sullivan's stage: Bob Hope, Walt Disney, Dinah Shore, Eddie Fisher, and the meteoric comedy team of Dean Martin and Jerry Lewis.

Elvis Presley had appeared on television before, but it was his Sullivan appearance (shot from his waist up for reasons of propriety) that opened the door for superstardom and cult worship. And there is an entire generation that vividly remembers where they were on the night of Feb. 9, 1964 — tuned in to the Sullivan show for the TV debut of The Beatles.

"The Very Best of The Ed Sullivan Show II" was produced by one of the industry's best guides for archival journeys, Andrew Solt, whose impressive list of credits includes "Imagine: John Lennon," "Remembering Marilyn," "This Is Elvis" and "It Came From Hollywood," as well as many of the Jacques Cousteau specials.

Solt's involvement with the Sullivan special goes far beyond that of producer/director, for he has purchased the entire Sullivan library for an undisclosed amount of money. The volume of material in

the collection is staggering: around 1,100 hours of footage specially housed in a climate-controlled environment. Solt says there is more than enough to make up a third and fourth highlights special, but he plans to precede that with a syndicated release of the show in a re-edited, half-hour format.

In the Nov. 24 special, about 65 performers are featured in clips averaging one minute in length. Besides a few headliners like The Beatles, The Rolling Stones and Presley, who appeared in the first special, this edition carries an "all-new" lineup.

Enjoy once again musical greats Nat King Cole, Johnny Mathis, The Fifth Dimension, The Byrds, Lovin' Spoonful, Credence Clearwater Revival, Roy Orbison and Jackie Wilson; comedians such as Jack Benny and Phyllis Diller; and specialty acts including animal trainer Clyde Beatty, whose loss of control over his big cats drove Sullivan into the audience.

Solt believes "people remember some of the oddest stuff best, like the plate spinner, or Senor Wences... and Topo Gigio." He attributes the popularity of Sullivan's show to its diversity. "Parents watched for one reason, the kids for another, teenagers for another, everybody liked the comedy. It was a very interesting evolution of vaudeville that he had."

### 'Tiny Toons' airs script by teen trio

With what has to be the most dramatically conceived cartoon in history, Warner Bros. has managed to create a half-hour of publicity thinly disguised as a *Tiny Toons* episode.

In "Buster and Babs Go Hawaiian," the pint-sized spinoffs of favorite *Looney Tunes* characters follow a scenario penned by a trio of eighth-graders from Waynesboro, Va. Advance publicity indicates the handwritten script "miraculously" made its way into the hands of *Toons* executive producer Steven Spielberg, who decided to buy it. While it must be immensely pleasing to the girls from

Virginia, the fruit of their efforts lacks the luster that usually rubs off on Spielberg productions.

The girls and the famous producer appear as caricatures in the cartoon, and the banter they exchange with Buster and Babs Bunnys is designed to let viewers in on the story behind the story. However, these scenes were written *after* the girls' visit with Spielberg, and the result is an in-joke with no punch line. It would be a stretch, at best, to expect someone watching the show without a press kit to grasp the only real story here: the incredible luck of three young girls.

As one might expect, the animation is terrific, but the story, while pretty good for three eighth-grade girls, says more for having faith in the postal service than it does for big-budget cartoons.

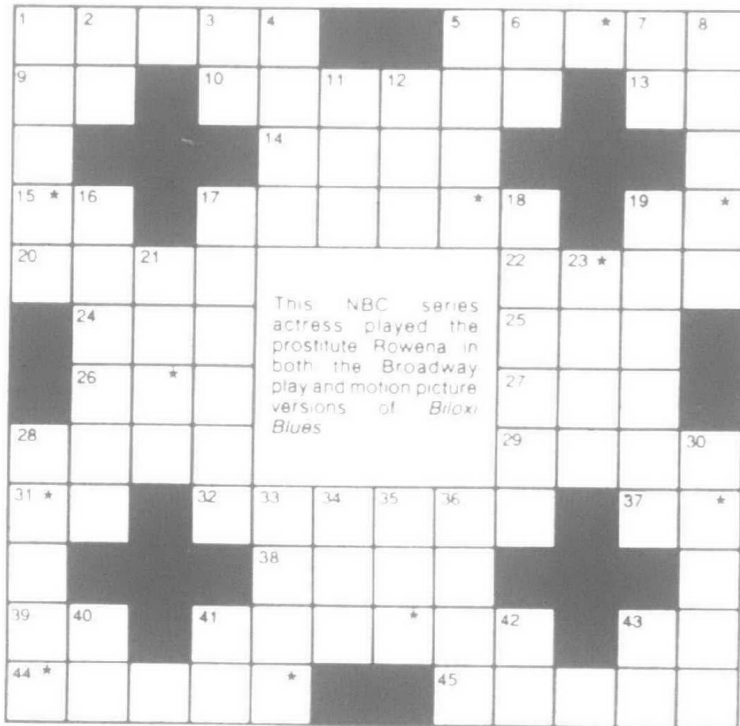

Knight allows that the transition was "challenging" in that such a long collaboration was "like being married. For 39 years you just get used to a certain sound and having those guys on your right or your left."



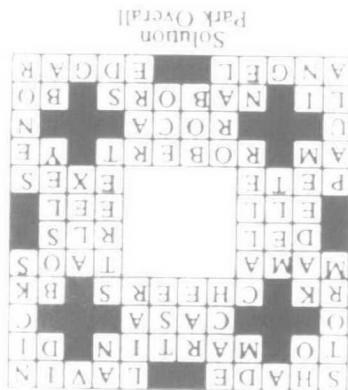

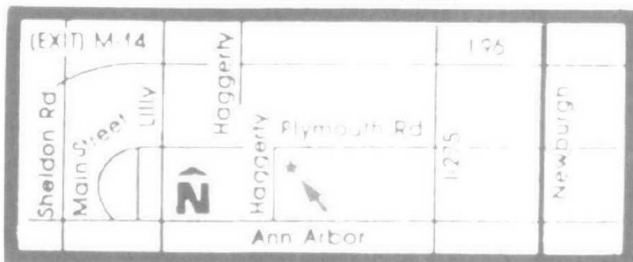
