Plymouth-Canton calls Engler on state aid cuts

Plymouth-Canton school trustee Roland Thomas says "it's time to take the gloves off."

Thomas is calling for a meeting with Gov. John Engler and the state lawmakers who represent this area to have them explain how school districts are to educate students given the financial blows the state is dealing to public schools.

THOMAS MADE THE suggestion after Superintendent John Hoben explained at a recent meeting that the district faces a shortfall next year of between \$4.3 and \$7 million. That range depends on which proposals currently being proposed are enacted. This year's budget is about \$72 million.

"Let's ask them to sit down with us, and eye-to-eye, tell us how we are going to fund public education," Thomas said.

School trustees are concerned about several issues, including the effects of this year's property tax freeze on the 1992-93 school year; a proposed cap on state-paid employee social security payments; and the tax-base sharing plan that currently has frozen \$750,000 in district funds.

Lansing also is "recapturing" some categorical state aid for transportation and special programs.

Engler is proposing that beginning next year, districts pick up all retirement costs for their employees — a move that would increase Plymouth-Canton's revenue shortfall to about \$7 million.

Hoben supported Thomas' idea,

and suggested that local government officials be invited, as they're suffering some of the same effects.

"We are being penalized for being fiscally responsible in the past in terms of the government's state aid act," Hoben said.

Trustee Dean Swartzwelder suggested making the meeting a public forum, "inviting the whole community."

PLYMOUTH TOWNSHIP SUPERVISOR Gerald Law, a former state legislator, welcomed a meeting, as did Canton Supervisor Thomas Yack and Plymouth City Manager Steve Walters.

The schools have a valid gripe with the state, Law said. The state

magically comes up with these great rules for school districts after the districts do their budgets. They don't give them any phase-in time. That's the argument I always had when I was in Lansing, Law said.

The state paints out-of-formula school districts like Plymouth-Canton as affluent. "Their whole approach is to say all out-of-formula districts are wealthy like Birmingham, which is a flat-out lie," he said.

There are a very few districts at the top and a very few at the bottom. Most of them are in the middle. Detroit gets 80 percent state aid, and Plymouth-Canton gets nothing.

Parents want to quiz lawmakers

Plymouth-Canton school officials aren't the only ones who want answers out of Lansing.

The Plymouth-Canton Community School Council, a parent advocate group, has invited local legislators including state Sen. Robert Geake, R-Northville, state Rep. Georgina Goss, R-Northville, and state Rep. James Kosteva, D-Canton, to its monthly meeting Monday, March 23. The session will be from 9:30 a.m. to

noon at the Canton Little Theater at Canton High School.

Council president Dennis Williams said the meeting has been in the works for nearly three months. On the council are parent representatives from each of the district's 20 elementary, middle and high schools. It was established by the school board 10 years ago.

"WE'VE BEEN WANTING to meet with our legislators to talk about several different issues re-

Blaze destroys home under construction, workers escape

A fire swiftly destroyed a house under construction Tuesday in Plymouth Township, as wind whipped up flames that consumed open lumber.

Township fire fighters got a call at 2:27 p.m. that flames were coming through the roof of a house at Pine Ridge subdivision, a half-mile north of Ann Arbor Road and west of Ridge Road in west Plymouth Township.

Fifteen workers were in the house when the fire broke out, but all escaped injury, said Fire Chief Larry Groth.

"BEFORE WE GOT there we saw the black smoke in the sky and knew we had a working fire," Groth said. Damage to the 5,000 square-foot house was estimated at \$70,000.

Groth described the house as "not close to being completed."

While a third fire station was recently completed to serve the west end, it won't be operational until June when a pumper truck is scheduled to arrive.

"In this particular case, it

wouldn't have mattered if it were a block away," Groth said, as 15 mph winds easily whipped up flames consuming open lumber.

"Once that got going there was no stopping it," Groth said.

Five fire trucks and 12 fire fighters responded to the call.

"We have not determined a cause," Groth said, adding the fire is under investigation.

Two houses nearby are nearly complete, he said, adding the house destroyed by fire had already been sold.

Heart attack kills dad of hit-and-run victim

The father of a Canton girl killed in a hit-and-run accident on Ford Road died Monday night of a massive heart attack.

Joseph Chisholm, yard manager at Canton Waste Recycling, was on medical leave after suffering a heart attack Oct. 15, 1991.

The family believes the fatal heart attack Monday was brought on by the grief and stress surrounding the girl's death.

"We all think this just pushed him over the edge," Lillian Johnson, Debbie Chisholm's mother, said of her son-in-law Joseph Chisholm.

"We believe the heart attack was brought on by all this aggravation and stress," Johnson said. "It made him worse and worse."

"Debbie has said she's at the end of her rope — she just couldn't take it anymore — and it was the same with him," Johnson said.

Melissa Chisholm, 14, died after she was struck by a car at Ford and Lilley roads May 14, 1990.

An ex-neighbor, Joseph Donald Ryan, 39, was sentenced last November to probation for leaving the scene of an injury accident.

Debbie and Joseph Chisholm were in the process of filing a civil suit against Ryan, a GM executive, and his wife, Mary, a homemaker, at the time of Joseph Chisholm's death.

"JOE JUST HELD all this inside," Johnson continued. "We couldn't get him to talk. He wouldn't express himself. I think that was very bad for him and very deteriorating to his condition. He was so limited because of his health; he could hardly do anything."

Chisholm, who had his first heart attack in 1989, was to go back to work April 1.

"I think in his mind, he just pretended it (Melissa's death) didn't happen," she said. "He pretended his

Everybody has an opinion about downtown Plymouth and now there's a forum to air those opinions.

The Plymouth Downtown Development Authority will conduct a town meeting 7:30-9 p.m. Thursday, March 12, at the Plymouth Cultural Center, 525 Farmer.

The formal plan is called "The Retail Market Assessment and Economic Enhancement Strategy for Downtown Plymouth."

It's quite a mouth full. But if you're interested in taking a look at it before the meeting, the study will be available at the Plymouth District Library, 223 S. Main, on Monday.

The meeting itself will be moderated by Hyett Palma Inc., a Washington, D.C., consulting firm whose staffers prepared the plan.

The first part of the meeting will be devoted to explaining the plan. The second portion will be used for answering questions from the public.

his daughter was gone on vacation somewhere, that's how he dealt with it. But you have to bring these things out. You can't go on like that.

JOHNSON SAID her daughter, who turns 40 on Saturday, thought her husband was sleeping when she first walked in and saw him in the chair.

Debbie Chisholm had called her husband at home shortly after 7 p.m. before leaving the doctor's office where she works.

When she arrived home 45 minutes later, she found her husband unconscious in a chair.

When she went up to him, she could see something had fallen out of his hand, and she knew there was something wrong.

She called a neighbor across the street, and he came over. But between the two of them, they could

hardly get him out of the chair and onto the floor.

They tried CPR but the doctor at the hospital told her even if she'd been right there in the room, he didn't think she could have saved him.

Chisholm was taken to Oakwood Canton Health Center where he was dead on arrival. Cause of death was a massive heart attack.

"The heart attack was massive. He must have died quickly. It looked like he'd suffered no discomfort or pain. It looked like

he was sleeping," Johnson said.

RYAN IS BEING charged with wrongful death and his wife with conspiracy to cover up a crime, said Plymouth attorney John Vos III, who is representing the Chisholms. Witnesses have indicated Ryan was driving without his lights on when the accident occurred at 10 p.m., Vos said.

Vos said he was to meet with Debbie Chisholm Monday evening, but the meeting was re-scheduled.

Joseph Chisholm formerly owned the Donut Scene on Lilley Road in Canton and served in the U.S. Navy.

Visitation will be from 1 p.m. - 9 p.m. today at Vermeulen Trust 100 Funeral Home at 46401 Ann Arbor Road in Plymouth Township. A funeral Mass is scheduled for 10 a.m. Friday at St. John Neumann Catholic Church in Canton with the Rev. Matthew Ellis officiating.

Burial will be at Holy Sepulchre Cemetery in Southfield.

Born March 15, 1940, in Detroit, Chisholm is survived by sons William, Joseph, James, John and Duane; daughter Amy; sister Mary Gillhott of Southfield and brothers Robert of Livonia and Charles of Detroit in addition to his wife.

Shortening the lines

State could ease long waits for court time by adding 3rd judge

It's a good bet that most of the people who filled the benches in a hallway outside a local courtroom Thursday didn't want to be there.

But just after 9 a.m. on a recent Thursday, about 50 people waited their turn before substitute District Judge John McCartney at Plymouth's 35th District Court.

The wait for people who line the walls awaiting court dates — and those who line up afterward to fill out paperwork — will be reduced if the state Legislature acts to create a third judgeship at the courthouse on Plymouth Road.

That request for a third judgeship has been approved by the five communities served by the court — Plymouth and Northville cities and townships and Canton — and by the state supreme court.

Court officials hope to get approval by May, to give candidates time to file petitions and qualify for an August primary.

That would narrow the field running in a November election to select a new judge to begin work Jan. 1, 1993.

When a visitor points out the number of folks waiting in the hallway, court administrator Marion Belding comments, "It's really not too bad today."

Mondays and Thursdays are devoted to cases involv-

ing charges filed in the townships of Plymouth, Canton or Northville. Northville and Plymouth city cases go on Tuesdays, civil cases in the five communities on Wednesdays, and state offenses including felonies on Fridays.

As Belding speaks, a clerk behind a counter helps a defendant with paperwork. He looks to be in his 20s, as do many with business in the court on this Thursday morning.

Inside the courtroom, Judge McCartney is passing sentence on a man who stiffly faces the judge. The man's attorney stands alongside.

After pleading guilty of driving impaired with a suspended license, the defendant is assessed \$1,005 in fines. McCartney suspends the man's license for 90 days, assigns him to three days on county work detail, orders the man to undergo alcohol abuse treatment, and tells him, "Stay out of bars."

Of crowding, Belding said the last few months she's sometimes noticed lines of people "all down the hallway."

The third courtroom, if approved, will be built on the ground level of the south end of the building. Parking will also be extended around the nearby baseball field to meet demand.

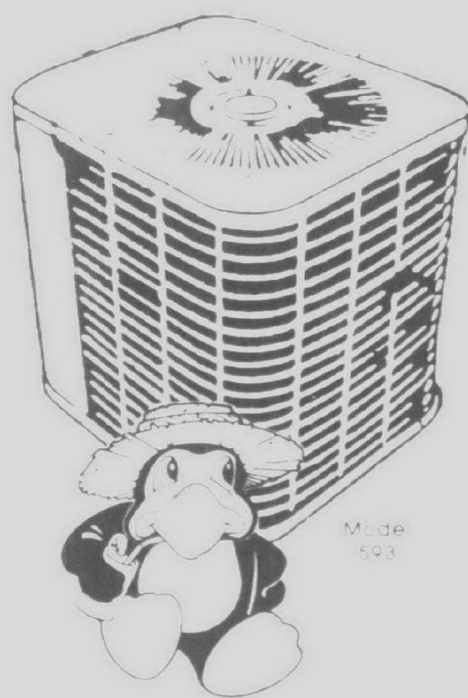

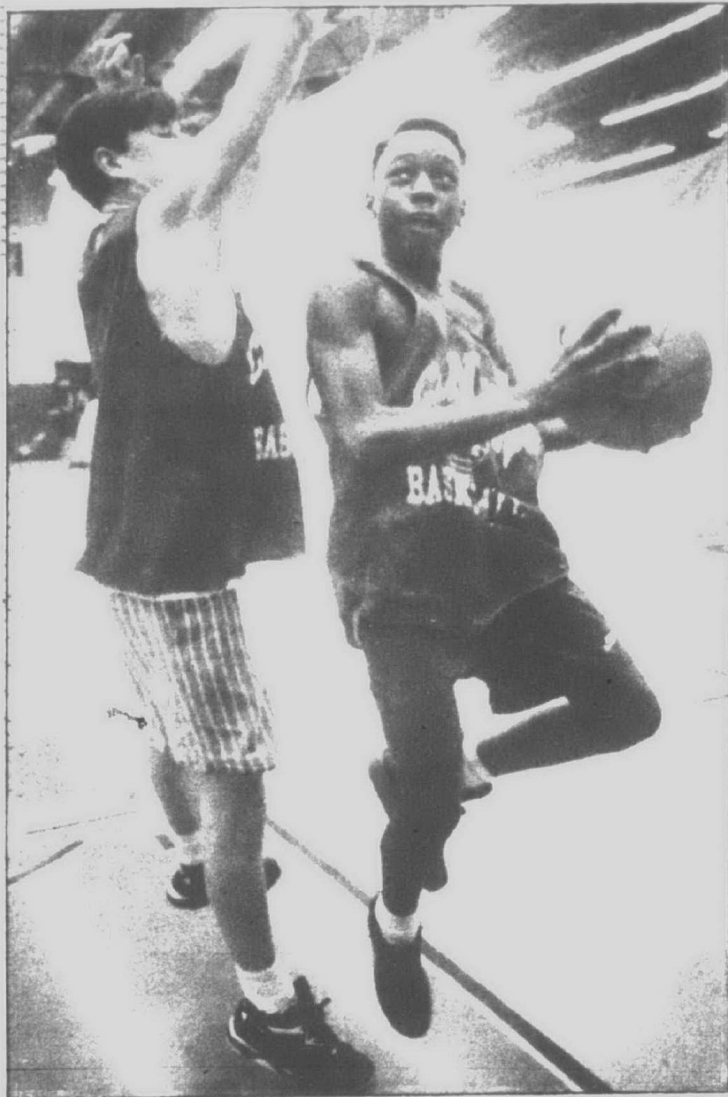

The goal in Lansing is to balance the budget on the backs of local communities, Law added. "I was there eight years and I heard it all."

Law said he'd attend the meeting. "We have a similar problem," he said. "We'd like to know what the state is doing with our revenue sharing. Revenue sharing helps pay for a good portion of the police and fire personnel we put on the roads. It's the same for every local community."

"As far as we are concerned, the same gimmick will be played for us as with school districts. It's unconscionable, it really is. I'd be happy to go to any meeting, any time if the school system wants to set it up. We have a few questions of our own. This all comes down to human beings doing their jobs. We can't pass it on to someone else. The service we get will depend on revenues."

Law suggested that local officials tell lawmakers in advance what in-

formation they'd like so that they can come to the meeting armed with specific fiscal information.

WALTERS ALSO EMPATHIZES with the schools, and said the city shares their plight.

"The problem is severe," he said. "Because the school district's budget is so much larger than the city's, what Plymouth is losing in revenue sharing may not sound like much."

But, he said, "The city of Plymouth is being impacted negatively

because state-shared revenues are being withheld, and because of the property tax freeze. Proposed modifications to the property tax system would adversely affect the Downtown Development Authority program," Walters added.

"The city of Plymouth is being hit in a similar way. I'd be interested in attending a meeting, and I know our city commission or its representatives would. We'll keep the calendar open."

Trucking deregulation bill nets powerful tug-of-war

State elected officials are scrambling to retain businesses in the wake of the announced closing of the General Motors Willow Run assembly plant.

But the furor over one proposed business retention strategy — a trucking deregulation bill — indicates just how difficult it could be to change Michigan's business climate.

Interstate trucking has been deregulated since the early 1980s, but state Sen. David Honigman, R-West Bloomfield, seeks to deregulate intrastate trucking — shipping from city-to-city within Michigan.

Supporters say deregulation will save millions of dollars for Michigan businesses. State businesses would save a collective \$45 million according to one 1998 study. Another study indicated savings could be twice that much.

"STUDY AFTER study has indicated there would be tremendous savings," said Thomas Shull of the Heartland Institute, a Detroit-based think tank.

Honigman's bill, however, has been tied up in committee for nearly a year in a tug-of-war between powerful, conflicting interests.

On one side are the automotive Big Three, smaller businesses and some trucking firms.

Gov. John Engler is also boosting deregulation as part of his "Build Michigan" strategy. "Our staff is lobbying very hard for it," said Gov. Engler's press secretary, John Truscott.

On the other side are a large number of trucking firms and the Teamsters Union.

"Deregulation means you replace drivers making \$15 an hour with those making \$5 an hour," said Larry Knapp, executive director of Michigan Citizens Allied for Responsible Transportation Safety, a trade group claiming 200 trucking firms as members. "These guys are going to have to drive more hours to make more money and how safe can that be?"

On one side are the automotive Big Three, smaller businesses and some trucking firms. On the other side are a large number of trucking firms and the Teamsters Union.

The battle has been heated. Even though Honigman chairs the five-senator committee reviewing the bill, he's one vote short of bringing the issue before the full Senate.

Sen. George Hart, D-Deerborn, a member of Honigman's committee, said he wouldn't be that vote.

He's very skeptical about the benefits of deregulation," said David Wygonik, a spokesman for Hart, whose district includes Garden City.

Backers and detractors base their arguments on a variety of issues ranging from free trade to roadway safety, but the issue boils down to jobs whose will be saved and whose could be lost?

Already, small shipping companies are considering expanding their business.

"I don't currently operate intrastate, if it were deregulated I probably would," said Harry Brandt of Sharco Express, a 20-truck shipping company based in Livonia.

Businesses say deregulation would lower raw materials costs, boosting profits and — theoretically — saving jobs.

"LAST YEAR, due to regulation we had to run four and a half miles empty, this would let us fill up those empty miles," said Ron Thompson of Spartan Stores. The Grand Rapids-based food chain ships to stores in Oakland and Wayne counties from its Plymouth distribution center.

In-state trucking is currently regulated through the Michigan Public Service Commission.

"It's a cost issue," said Steve Arwood, of the National Federation In-

dependent Businesses of Michigan a trade group of more than 23,000 small businesses.

"You don't need public service commission approval if you ship eight miles but you need it if you ship eight and a quarter miles."

Detractors say there would be more jobs lost than saved.

"It's going to hurt Michigan business. Most of the major trucking lines have already pulled out," Knapp said.

Trucking lines would move into nearby states to reap the advantages of deregulation while avoiding Michigan taxes, he predicted.

"ONCE AGAIN, you're taking jobs away from hard working middle class people," said Mark Gaffney of Teamsters Joint Council 43. "Sure, GM, Ford and Chrysler are all for it, but they're taking their own jobs out of Michigan and putting them in other countries."

Deregulation's record in other fields, such as the airline industry, has been spotty.

"I know there were three companies at the airport that we used to deal with and they're all gone. The reason they seemed to give was deregulation," said Westland Councilwoman Terri Reighard Johnson, whose family long operated a Farmington Hills trucking company.

The Teamsters' Gaffney is more blunt: "If you want to know about deregulation, all you have to do is look at what happened in the savings and loan industry."

Boosters, though, point to studies that indicate the number of nationwide trucking firms has increased 150 percent since interstate trucking deregulation began.

They say if Michigan doesn't deregulate, other states soon will.

Back when Willow Run was still locked in a survival battle with GM's Arlington, Texas, plant, the pro-deregulation Heartland Institute received a letter of interest from an Arlington Chamber of Commerce official.

"Texas is regulated just like Michigan," Shull said. "So, that shows you what they're thinking."

Senate OKs inheritance tax cut

Even if only a few well-off retirees keep Michigan as their legal residences, the state would be better off, say senators who want to cut the inheritance tax.

The Senate Wednesday approved 32-6 a bill to pare inheritance tax rates beginning Oct. 1, 1994. The bill goes to the House.

"We pay taxes when we earn the money. We pay on the investment income. As it is now, we tax it when you want to hand it to someone," said Sen. Michael Bouchard, R-Birmingham, a solid yes vote.

"For crying out loud, we take two bites now. How many times do we tax the same apple?"

Bouchard said many retirees split their time between Michigan and Florida but maintain their legal residence in Florida, which has no inheritance tax.

"They take everything — incomes, car registrations — to Florida," he said.

THE VOTE was a victory for the sponsor, Sen. Nick Smith, R-Addison, and Gov. John Engler.

Engler wants to keep retirees as legal residents to shore up the economy, particularly in the northern part of the state.

Voting yes were Republicans, Bouchard, Mat Dunaskiss of Lake Orion, Robert Geake of Northville and David Honigman of West Bloomfield, and Democrats William Faust of Westland, Jack Faxon of Farmington Hills and George Z. Hart of Dearborn.

But Faxon's yes vote was less than enthusiastic. He said that undertakers support the bill and scoffed, "the funeral directors say 'Do it (die) in Michigan, we represent you'."

A HANDFUL of Democrats saw it as a class war issue — an \$86 million windfall for the rich beginning in 1997.

"I have many older relatives, but not one who left the state for Florida because of the inheritance tax, but because it was warm," said Sen. John Cherry of Clio, Democratic floor leader.

"Call the CPAs and estate planners in your district," Smith replied, "and ask them if they advise people to leave Michigan because of the inheritance tax."

In a gibe at Bouchard Sen. Virgil Smith, D-Detroit, said Bouchard "comes from one of the richest counties in the state. My constituents don't have inherited wealth. I wonder why."

Replied Bouchard "Oakland is first in paying taxes but 80th, out of 83, in getting state money back."

SENATE BILL 1, which Nick Smith has introduced for three terms, would:

- Exempt \$100,000 of an inheritance on Oct. 1, 1994, and \$200,000 in 1995 from the tax. Currently the exemption is \$10,000, and rates escalate to 17 percent.

- Speed up, in the short term, the collection date from nine months to two months after death, in return for a 10 percent tax reduction.

"It's a gimmick," Smith said of the speedup, "but it's a small price to pay (to House Democrats) for getting

rid of the inheritance tax." This feature is expected to pump \$63 million into the state treasury.

THE SENATE rejected a substitute by Debbie Stabenow, D-Lansing, to favor family-operated businesses and farms. The unrecorded vote was 9 for, 20 against.

"This (substitute) exempts those (heirs) who are committed to a family business or family farm," said Stabenow.

She charged Smith's bill would

benefit heirs living in other states, cost the Michigan treasury \$85 million, and deprive senior citizens here of \$65 million in state services.

But Sen. Joanne Emmons, R-Big Rapids, said Stabenow's bill would benefit male heirs who will run the business or farm, and hurt women who inherit taxable paper assets such as stocks, bonds and cash.

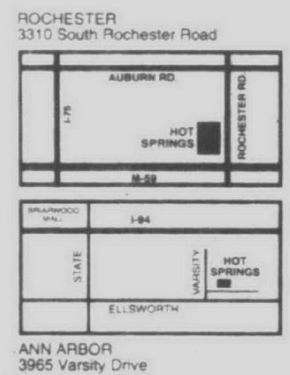



Caller ID now available in some western suburbs

More than one million Michigan Bell customers in parts of the metropolitan area now are eligible for Call ID, a service which allows a customer to see who's calling before they pick up the phone.

The service displays the telephone number of an incoming call on a device that's either attached to or part of the telephone.

In western Wayne, the service is available to those with the telephone prefixes 261, 421, 422, 425, 427, 458, 522, 937, 326, 467, 595, 721, 722, 728, 729.

Caller ID works only when the phone lines of both the caller and the called party are equipped for the service. Cost for the service is \$6.50 per month and the price includes the display of 300 telephone numbers. More numbers will cost two cents each. A \$7.50 start-up charge will be

waived for the first 30 days the service is available in a given area.

The charge for start up modular unit ranged from \$40 to \$135.

There is no charge no charge for the display of codes indicated the number has been blocked or is from outside the area equipped for Caller ID service.

Customers will be able to prevent their phone numbers from being displayed when they call. Customers do not have to order this per-call blocking feature. It can be activated by dialing a blocking code.

Caller ID is the first all-new service Michigan Bell has introduced since Michigan's new telecommunication law was passed, according to Laird Spencer, Michigan Bell's senior director of marketing and business development.



Face lift

The appearance of the southwest corner of Ann Arbor Trail and Harvey changed drastically with the demolition of two homes, making way for the recent expansion of the Plymouth-Canton Community Schools' administration building.

It will change again if Realtor Robert Bake's plans to construct a new building are approved. Bake, whose business is located in a converted home on the corner, wants to build a one-story office building next to his current office. It would face Ann Arbor Trail.

Bake cleared an initial hurdle recently when the school board granted him an easement for green space between his property and the board office parking lot off Ann Arbor Trail.

"In my estimation, it is in our interest to have that granted from the standpoint of aesthetics of the property," Superintendent John Hoben told the board. I don't see where we would necessarily be using that for any type of building."

Bake said his plans call for construction of a building that "will play to the emotional senses of Plymouth as far as aesthetics." The building would be larger than Bake's existing offices, enabling him to expand his staff and lease his current site. The project needs city approval.

He hopes to begin construction Aug. 1 with a completion date of February or March.

Monday afternoon, two tables of competitors went at it after lunch.

One of the players was second grader Brian Rambo, who confessed that, "I usually like to play on computers where you kill guys; they disappear."

His challenger, fellow second grader Ryan Fleming, said, "I like chess because you can get the kings and checkmate, and you have lots of pieces to play with. You can move them lots of spaces and everything. That's what I like about it."

Fourth grader Nick Lariviere refereed the game. The winner of his grade-level competition as a first grader, Nick said he likes playing and refereeing chess because "it's fun and it's challenging."

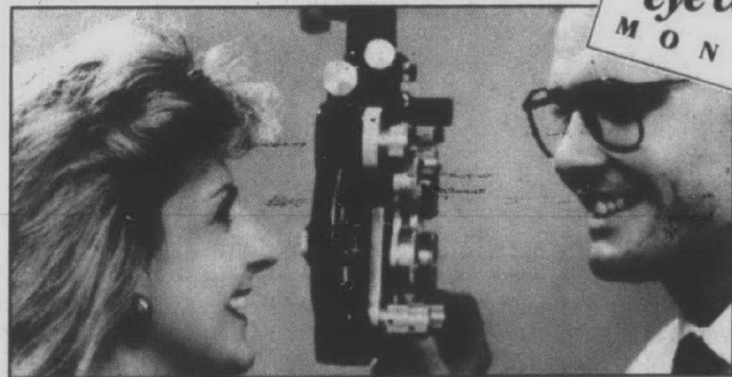

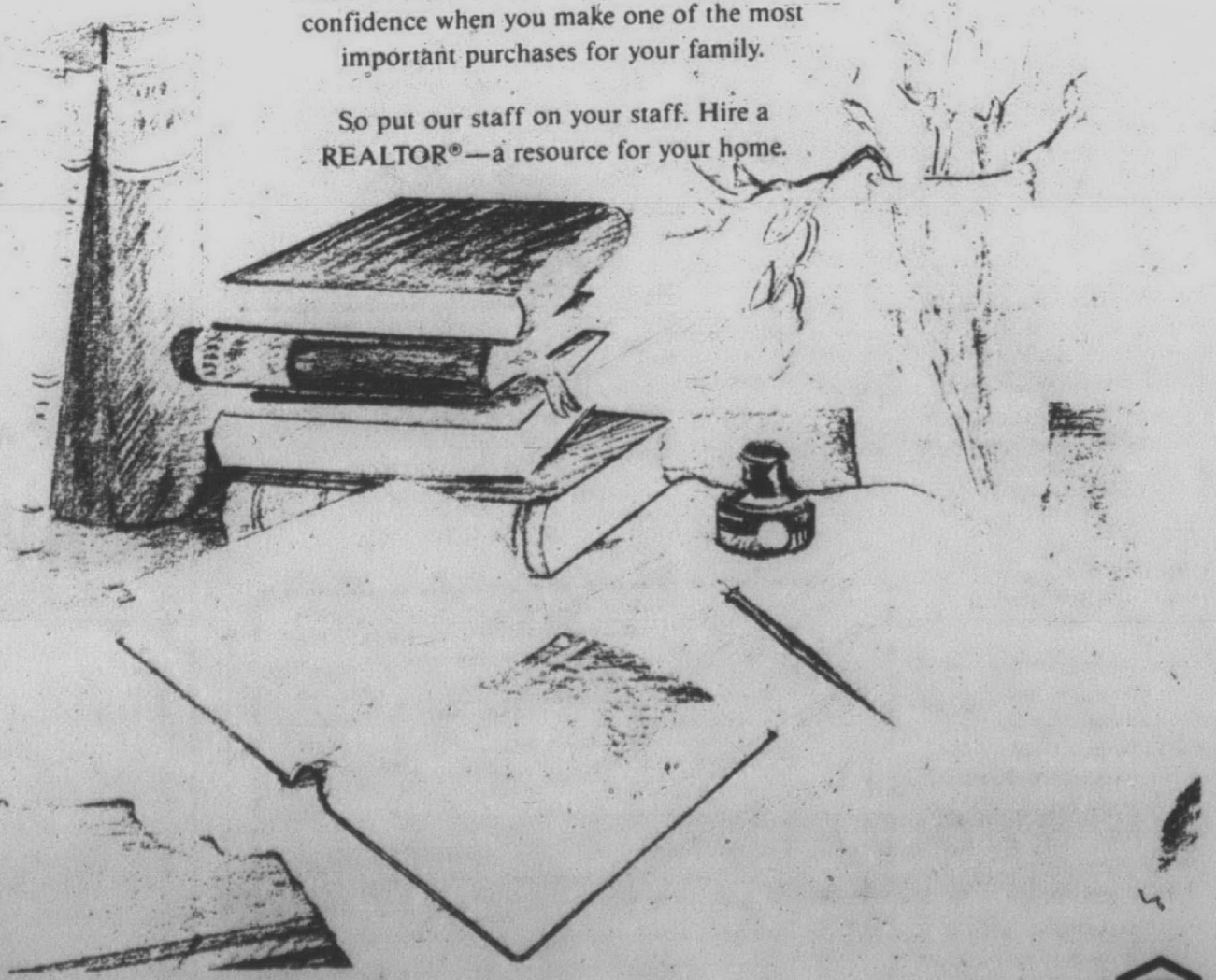

There was a sense of finality, solemnity and sadness and a flood of memories as Franciscan Friars and 1,000 worshippers observed the last Mass Sunday in St. Anthony Chapel of the 61-year-old Duns Scotus Catholic Friary.

"I hope I die before I see it go," said Kay Hesano, 67, who lives on Evergreen near the Friary and has been attending daily services there for 27 years.

"They're selling the land for money — for 30 pieces of silver," she said tearfully. "They're closing our little Assisi, but I'm not the judge. I leave it to the Lord."

From the balcony, Jean Hansen, a Troy attorney representing Friends of Duns Scotus said, "In behalf of your faithful supporters, we are requesting a dialogue to explore the option of continued worship in this chapel pending completion of this sale."

"Will you grant this reasonable request from those who have supported you and this chapel?"

Piano music drowned out most of Hansen's words. The Most Rev. Moses Anderson, bishop of the southern region of the Catholic Archdiocese of Detroit responded, "May I ask respectfully that we go on with the celebration in God's house?"

SO BEGAN THE last Mass at the 116-acre Friary on Evergreen and Nine Mile. The Southfield landmark is being sold to LoPatin & Co. which proposes to transform the wooded property into a business conference center and golf course.

But, according to Hansen, LoPatin has paid only \$25,000 toward the purchase price of \$10 million and may not have the financial resources to complete the project.

Some worshippers said a Christian group is interested in buying the Friary for a shrine. But the Rev. Daniel Havron of the Duns Scotus communi-

ty said there have been many offers. None of them are substantial, he said, except the LoPatin proposal which is backed by the city.

Despite the sorrow and the protests, the Franciscan Friars — describing the final service as a special Mass of Thanksgiving "for all that has been, in expectation of all that shall be" — conveyed the message that the closing of the chapel isn't an ending but a change and a new beginning.

"Jesus is turning our hearts into

something wonderfully good," said the Rev. Paul Desch, former professor at Duns Scotus and main minister to the worshippers. "Our hearts are the home of God."

"The good news is that God will go on making his home in our hearts long after this building is closed. That is what we have to hold on to in this last Mass of all Masses celebrated here. We walk out with tears but with hope."

"It's so sad," said Gloria Kennedy of Southfield. "I wish I had won the

\$6 million lottery so I could donate it to Duns Scotus."

The reason for the closing, said the Rev. John Bok who heads the Franciscan province headquartered in Cincinnati, is lack of staffing.

"It's a matter of numbers," he said to the congregation. "Thirteen parishes were forced to be given back to the Diocese because we can't staff them."

In 1965, he said, there were 650 Friars in St. John the Baptist Province. There are now 370 men in two provinces, 270 in the province that includes Duns Scotus.

"Things don't end," he said. "They change, but they go on. The view of the Friars will always remain close."

The Friars are committed to staying in the area, Bok said. Their new ministries are at St. Michael's Catholic Church in Southfield and St. Aloysius in Detroit.

But Kay Hesano, who said she goes to the chapel each day to "get relief from confession and God," commented that St. Michael's won't be open from 6:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. as was Duns Scotus.

SUE HESSI OF Rochester said she has been going to Duns Scotus since the age of five. "We have received many favors for our family — many miracles," she said.

The Friars' way of life gives them the courage to assume a new ministry, Bishop Anderson said, adding that the sadness of leaving is part of the life of Christ.

Brother Francis Williams, who has been at Duns Scotus for 13 years, said, "I feel like a baseball player. My contract is running out."

He was embraced by a tearful Rev. Jack Maynard of the Diocese of Columbus, Ohio, who said, "I was part of the chapel ministry. Tears go with you but so does happiness. Thank God the Friars will be close."

Doug Pryor of Wyandotte came to the services on his motorcycle. He graduated from Duns Scotus Seminary in 1974 and is now a drug abuse therapist.

"This is a very special place," he said. "I understand why they (the Friars) are doing it. They are good men in a holy place. I hope whoever gets it treats it as lovingly. This place has a way of getting to you."

Protesters: Keep chapel open pending sale

Some worshippers and supporters of the now-former Duns Scotus Friary agree with protesters who want the chapel to remain open pending completion of the sale of the friary. Others are offended by the opposition.

"We need more people to protest," said Lillian Chick of Southfield. "We shouldn't take the closing of this beautiful edifice with apathy."

Others worshippers at Sunday's final Mass objected to the protest of Jean Hansen, attorney for Friends of Duns Scotus, saying it took away from the dignity of the ceremonies.

Hansen, speaking from the balcony before the Mass began, said "This place of worship has faithfully served its community for 61 years.

Many here have expended great time and effort to nourish this chapel and the Franciscan ministry.

They understand and sympathize with the needs of the friars. However, they are concerned that this chapel will be boarded up and of use to no one, pending a sale which may not take place for an extended period of time, if at all."

Hansen was referring to a proposed sale of the 116-acre friary for a reported \$10 million to LoPatin & Co. Developers have proposed to convert the facility into a business conference center and nine-hole golf course.

HANSEN ASKED for a dialogue to explore the option of continued worship in the chapel pending completion of the sale. She also requested a delay in its dismantling until such dialogue can be started.

The St. Anthony Chapel was scheduled for dismantling on Monday.

In a letter to Pope John Paul II and the Rev. Hermann Schaluck, Franciscan minister general in Rome, Hansen said the transaction with LoPatin is likely to fall through.

"We know that in the past four years, at least \$200,000 has been contributed by the community for the purpose of making capital improvements to the chapel," Hansen said.

This, according to Hansen, includes stained glass windows, lighting, two confessionals, bell tower, courtyards, kneelers, statues and attic insulation.

Contributions were made in anticipation that the chapel would continue to serve the community, she said.

LoPatin, she said, admits developers lack the financing for the project in the tight economic climate.

"Should the eventual consummation of the LoPatin purchase fail, the premature dismantling of St. Anthony Chapel will drastically reduce the value of this real estate and the benefits to the Franciscan order, the community and any alternate purchasers," the letter reads.

The dismantling prevents the use of Duns Scotus for the benefit of others in the community who invested in preservation of the friary, Hansen said. Many developers and religious orders would be interested in paying full value for the chapel if kept intact, Hansen said.

"There is far more than emotional issues involved here," Hansen said. "We need to examine the commitments of the Franciscans and the Duns Scotus community and the financial and legal repercussions before the dismantling of the Duns Scotus Chapel."

Sewer stink Public deserves a hearing

A PUBLIC meeting is needed to clear the air surrounding the \$94.5 million Western Townships Utilities Authority sewer project in the wake of allegations of overspending and cronyism.

Such a hearing for residents of Plymouth and Canton townships is especially needed following a possible violation of the state's Open Meeting Act by the Plymouth Township Board.

Supervisor Gerald Law and board members won't let Plymouth Township residents ask questions about allegations against the project during a township board meeting.

"The rates are not going to double, they're not going to go up at all," Law told about 20 residents who attended the meeting. And that was all Law said. He told members of the public he was willing to talk to them after the meeting.

THE ALLEGATIONS were contained in a Detroit Free Press story that contended that the area's 98,000 residents will pay \$94.5 million for a sewer but could have joined the Wayne County Sewer Project for \$25.5 million.

The story also alleged that \$30 million is being spent on non-construction costs and that \$11.5 million is going to contracts with people who have connections with local officials.

A state House investigation of the project was requested by State Rep. James Kosteva, D-Canton. That probe, to be conducted by state House staff members, was to start this week.

The results could be turned over to the state Attorney General's office for possible action, or they could be used to change state laws under which sewer authorities operate.

A state House investigation is a welcome development. It could do much to dispel the cloud over the sewer project.

resources, the lakes.

Cleaning them up is well worth the cost.

Also on an environmental note, the plant in Ypsilanti to which sewage will be sent from Plymouth and Canton complies with federal Environmental Protection Agency treatment guidelines. The Detroit plant doesn't. At some point it will have to, and sewer rates will have to go up to pay for improvements.

Also, the Super Sewer project, that is supposedly cheaper, dumps untreated sewage into the Rouge River when it rains because there isn't enough capacity to handle rain and sewage water.

That's something else that will have to be fixed, and residents using it will end up paying the bill.

BUT ENOUGH of sludge. The real tragedy of the Western Wayne County project is that it will forever be smudged with charges of nepotism and cronyism. That's because of the names involved. They are Robert Law, the brother of Gerald Law; Abe Munfakh, Plymouth Township trustee; and John Breen, the brother of Maurice Breen, former Plymouth Township supervisor and now a Wayne County commissioner.

Law belongs to a law firm that represents Canton and Plymouth townships and gives legal advice about the sewer project; John Breen, an attorney, was a land acquisition specialist in the sewer project; and Abe Munfakh works for an Ann Arbor firm which received the contract to design the project.

No matter what is explained in a public meeting or what comes out of a state House investigation, there will still be a cloud over the contracts because of the names involved.

It's too bad that such a clean project produced such a stink.

Bill intrudes on relationship

GOV. JOHN Engler should heed the advice of the state senator he most admires and veto the so-called "informed consent" abortion bill, if it is passed by the Legislature.

Like Engler, Sen. John Schwarz, R-Battle Creek, is Catholic and pro-life. Like Engler, Schwarz supported ending state-paid abortions and requiring parental consent for minors to obtain an abortion.

Then Schwarz wisely drew a line. He called the "informed consent" bill a "Big Brother" intrusive regulation on patients and doctors. "Big Brother" was the character in George Orwell's novel 1984 who ran a police state, peering with a TV camera into every room to watch your every move.

Engler, most Republicans and many Democrats say there's too much government regulation of people's lives. "Get the government out of our pockets and off our backs," they say.

Well, then, Engler should veto the "informed consent" abortion bill to keep Big Brother's snout out of the consulting room. Whether one is pro-life or pro-choice, the bill is too nosy.

AT THIS writing, the Michigan House is gearing up to pass a bill today that already has passed the Senate to require a one-day waiting period before a woman can have an abortion.

The waiting period is just government hassle. By the time a woman has gone to see a doctor, she already has made up her mind, whether other folks like it or not. No useful purpose is served by Big Brother's requiring a one-day waiting period.

The bill then goes on to require the doctor to inform the woman in writing about:

- Such possible complications as "retained fetal tissue, damage to the cervix, hemorrhage, infection, perforation of the uterus, sterility, increased risk of complications in subsequent pregnancies, death, live birth."

- Possible psychological effects such as "depression, feelings of guilt, sleep disturbance, loss of interest in work or sex, and anger."

- Available services to assist her during pregnancy and after birth if she chooses to bear.

- Adoption services.
- Available psychological services if she elects abortion.

- "A copy of a medically accurate photograph and description of a fetus . . . at the gestational age nearest the probable gestational age of the patient's fetus."

- An oral description of "the probable gestational age of the fetus she is carrying."

Governor Engler should veto the 'informed consent' abortion bill to keep Big Brother's snout out of the consulting room. Whether one is pro-life or pro-choice, the bill is too nosy.

- An oral description of the risks based on her particular medical condition and history.

- "What to do and whom to contact should medical complications arise from the abortion."

- "How to obtain pregnancy prevention information through the Department of Public Health."

Then there's the doctor's paperwork.

That's not "informed consent." It's heavy-handed bureaucracy. It's hassle, hassle, hassle. Nuts.

SCHWARZ SUGGESTED a compromise: no waiting period and a shorter list of possible results. The Senate shot down his amendment.

Two U.S. Supreme Court opinions have struck down Big Brother consent laws in other states. In a 1982 Ohio case it said,

"(M)uch of the information required is designed not to inform the woman's consent but rather to persuade her to withhold it altogether

"And subsection 5, that begins with the dubious statement that abortion is a major surgical procedure and proceeds to describe numerous possible physical and psychological complications of abortion, is a parade of horrors intended to suggest that abortion is a particularly dangerous procedure . . .

"We find that Akron has failed to demonstrate that any legitimate state interest is furthered by an arbitrary and inflexible waiting period."

In a 1985 case the high court said, "The states are not free, under the guise of protecting maternal health or potential life, to intimidate women into continuing their pregnancies . . .

"The printed materials required (are) an outright attempt to wedge the Commonwealth's message discouraging abortion into the privacy of the informed consent dialogue between the woman and her physician."

The Michigan bill, as written, faces the same objections. It would be too bad if patients, doctors and taxpayers had to waste a lot of time and money challenging it.

Engler should veto the Big Brother bill.

Michigan, at least, our state Legislature needs to take yet another hard look.

The proposal is a simple one: Any person who is convicted in a drunken driving accident where another person is killed must be made to pay child support for children of the person killed.

Certainly, no amount of money can make up for the loss of a parent. And this proposal really has nothing to do with punishment. This has to do with obligation and justice — an obligation by individuals who kill other's parents and justice for little children who deserve an equal chance in life.

The process is simple. Until the child is 18-years-old, the convicted drunken driver must pay a designated amount of support each week — just like in a divorce case.

In this way, all the little Savannas will have an even break even though Mom isn't around to help out.

SAVANNA IS A pretty little girl with a pretty name who loves all the things that a typical 2-year-old finds so fascinating.

I've only met Savanna twice, but sometime in your life you will meet someone like her. And you will feel the same kind of sadness and anger that I felt after learning that this beautiful child was robbed of an important part of her youth.

The last time I saw Savanna was at a recent birthday party. It was a time to celebrate life, a young life, a tradition which never loses its appeal in our culture.

Somehow Savanna and I are vaguely related through marriage. Coming from a small family, and marrying into a large one, I've never been very good at figuring out these connections. But I know some type of label is appropriate.

WE BOTH arrived to celebrate the birthday of my nephew. But while walking through my brother-in-law's house, I couldn't help but notice an uncharacteristic somberness for such an occasion.

The expected laughter and smiles were replaced by hushed tones and mournful glances. The contrast of brightly colored balloons with the looks of sorrow was striking.

The tragic story is all too common, too disgusting.

April Dawn Gibson, Savanna's 19-year-old mother, was driving on Milford Road on Jan. 31 when her car was struck by another. The person in the other car, suspected of drunken

driving, was whisked away with minor injuries. April Gibson early on the morning of Feb. 1 died from injuries sustained in the accident.

Lisa Cash described April as "the perfect friend." Now family and friends have been cheated of that perfect friend. And like the thousands who fall victim to the drunken driving malady of American society, April Gibson will never be able to show society her full potential of love and caring.

And the biggest victim of all is little Savanna who never really will know her mother.

IT'S ABOUT time that our society insists on much more accountability from those who cause such tragedies.

Certainly Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD) has done a lot to heighten awareness and make our legal system more responsive. But in

Now, in judging Invent America!, you have to remember that it's the idea that counts. First-graders might not be able to build what they imagine, but they can draw it, research it,

describe its usefulness.

That's just what they did at Wooddale. Youthful problems got youthful solutions.

For example, Christyn Chadwick won the first-grade title with a simple holder for her Barbie Doll clothes. Third-grader Matt Lullove, another winner, was so upset when someone stole his mom's purse that he invented a chair with a hidden drawer under the seat.

Adam Henderson, tired of torn and dirty American flags, painted Old Glory on a window shade and finished first in the fourth-grade. Suzy Brand won in the fifth grade with her specially-designed snow boots.

THE WINNERS will advance to state or regional competition in April. If their ideas survive there, they'll be advanced to the national tournament in Washington, D.C., in July.

How good are the best of the young ideas? Well, it may be just program hype, but Invent America! officials claim that foreign-looking folks can be always found snapping photos of the inventions at the national competition.

"Six months later, they (the ideas) are on the market," said Joanna Ratanatharathorn, a parent who leads the Wooddale Invent America! program.

Now the young inventors are required to keep log books stating the why, how, where, what time and how much of their creations. Such record keeping may be legally worthless, but it's part of the fun.

Who knows? Maybe some inventive youngster will come up with a useful, practical one-person submarine in which he/she can plumb the murky depths of the Erie Canal. I'd be happy to light a candle if it'd help.

 I have been employed by Ford Motor Co. for 15 years. I am not lazy, uneducated, or stupid. I also do not consume alcohol, nor have I ever used drugs.

 I strongly object to deleting the public comment section at any meeting. I believe this provides the opportunity for an individual to step forward and direct a question or make a comment to the board. If there is apprehension on someone talking too long this situation can be controlled by limiting the time an individual can talk or have the floor.
 I also strongly disagree with the suggestion made by Mr. Law at an earlier meeting that I was welcome to come to his office to discuss affairs. The practice of office meetings might be proper for an individual problem but, in my opinion, not the way to conduct discussions on general issues. When I come to Board meetings I would like all the board members to hear my questions, and likewise, I would like both the board members and those in attendance to hear any response.
 Mr. Law's decision at the February 25th meeting did not keep within

the spirit of our townships motto, People — Our Priority.

Sewer project spending is questioned

To the editor:
 After reading the Free Press sewer article it would seem that in order to minimize the possibility of future costly fiascos, Plymouth Township should enact legislation to provide for a referendum for large-cost items above a certain level. When a small group votes on a major project there may be one or two voters on ego trips and a few others who are motivated by self-interest. With a referendum the prime motivation is obtaining the best value and ego tripping, self-interest and empire building are eliminated.
 In addition to the many fascinating items included in the Free Press article, answers to the following may be interesting:
 • What is the estimated cost of the potential expansion at the Ypsilanti plant?
 • Is the land acquisition cost comparable to the original estimate?
 • A cost estimating miss of this magnitude (\$17 million original vs. \$94.5 million current) could lead some to believe that the original omissions, underestimates, galloping decimals, etc. were intentional to

justify going it alone rather than joining with the super sewer.

• Are stringent cost controls in place at WTUA?

• Canton Township and Northville Township have found less painful methods for collecting money. Is there anything available at Plymouth Township to ease the pain?

• It would be interesting to see the arithmetic and assumptions used in developing the \$15.69 per quarter rate used by Plymouth Township.

• I know nothing about sewer system costs, however, \$9.8 million for engineering sounds like a lot of engineering. It would be interesting to know what the original engineering cost estimate was and also the projected engineering cost for the Super Sewer. And whether this cost approaches 10.5 percent of total project cost for the WTUA sewer.

• Couldn't the WTUA law firm find an underwriter as part of the \$900,000 that it received from the bond transactions? Was it so difficult to find an underwriter that a \$75,000 finders fee had to be paid to an acquaintance of a WTUA law firm partner? I recently purchased Ford and GM preferred stock and there were 91 underwriters handling the Ford issue and 45 handling the GM issue so it wouldn't seem to be too difficult to find underwriters.

• Is the 1/2 percent bond transaction fee paid to the WTUA lawyers a standard fee for whatever the lawyers did or something negotiated between the WTUA and the lawyers? How many hours were devoted to earning the \$900,000?

• What sort of public relations work is involved in sewer construction and doesn't \$89,000 seem a tad high for such work?

• Who are the government affairs consulting group lobbying? If it's some D.C. politicians, couldn't the \$20,000 per month D.C. lobbying firm handle the lobbying?

• Has a comparison between the original and current cost estimates been prepared?

• What is the estimated annual cost after startup divided between operating and non-operating cost? After adjustment for economics and any condition changes what would be the annual cost estimate after five, 10, 20 and 30 years?

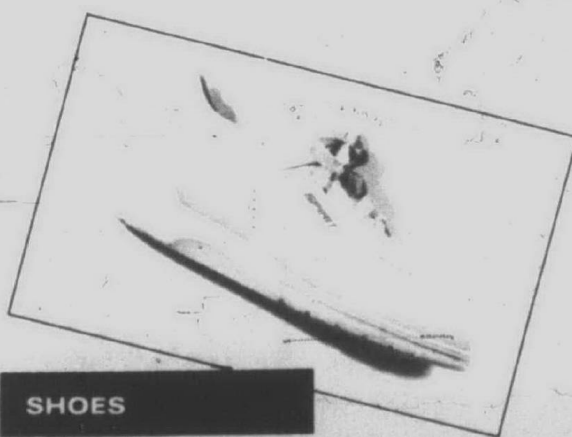

Salem upsets Canton 58-57 in hoop semi

"This time I didn't miss," said Plymouth Salem junior Mike Slone after his clutch shooting enabled the Rocks to upset No. 1-seeded Plymouth Canton in a Western Lakes Activities Association semifinal basketball game Tuesday, 58-57.

Slone, who missed a three-point shot at the buzzer three weeks ago when the Chiefs beat Salem 67-64, made not one but two important triples in the rematch.

The first one sent the game into overtime tied at 48, and the second won it in the final seconds, evoking a vociferous response from the host Salem fans.

"I wasn't surprised (that he was wide open on the right side) because we flowed into our offense, and it's hard to guard a team that flows into it real quick," Slone said. "Coach (Bob Brodie) tells us to flow into our offense and the shot will come. I felt the shot going in; it was good."

The victory sends defending champion Salem (13-6) into the WLAA final for the sixth consecutive year at 7 p.m. Saturday against Walled Lake Central at Northville High School.

"I TOLD THE kids we haven't won the league yet," Brodie said. "We still have one more game."

The Chiefs (15-4), who won the regular-season title with an 11-0 record and saw their 13-game winning streak end, will face Farmington Hills Harrison in the consolation game at 5 p.m. Saturday in the Northville gym.

"We're disappointed but we have other games left in the season," Can-

ton coach Dave Van Wagoner said, adding he remains proud of his team and its accomplishments. "And the season is not over yet. We have some basketball left in us this year."

The win was a tremendous boost for the Rocks, who were the No. 4 seed in the tournament after losing to Canton, Central and Harrison.

"It does a lot for our confidence," Salem senior Mike Abraham said. "It was a tough loss (to Canton) last year in the district. We know we'll probably face them again, but we needed a win to get our confidence."

"We'll be the underdogs (Saturday). They'll probably look at the paper, see Canton lost and think they'll probably beat us, but we'll be ready."

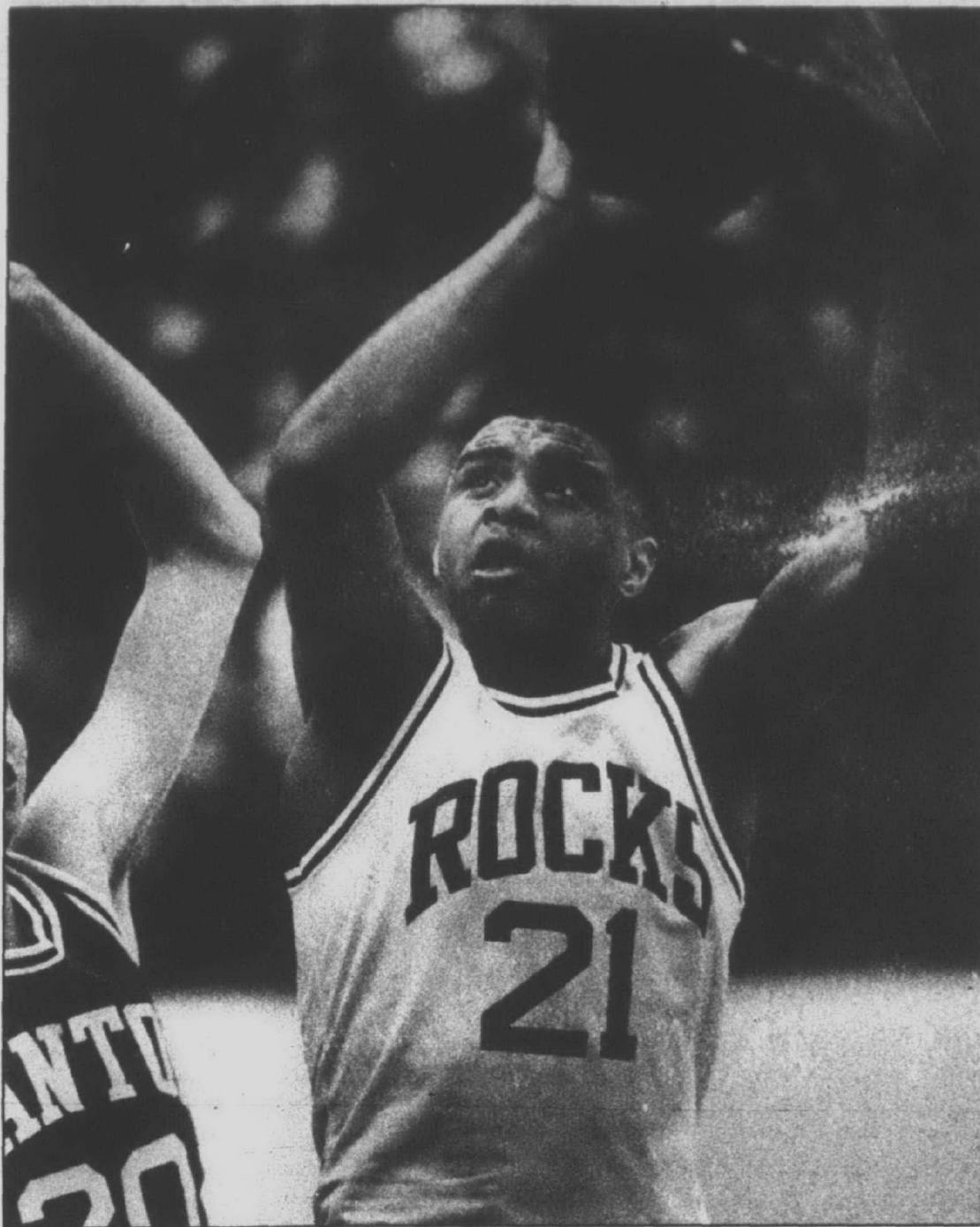
Good mental preparation helped put the Rocks in a state of readiness Tuesday, according to Salem senior Eric Stemmer, who said the seniors were motivated by playing their last home game.

BUT IT WAS a pair of underclassmen who carried the scoring load for the Rocks. Sophomore James Head played an inspired game and had a game-high 19 points, and junior Bob Schneider made four triples during a 16-point effort. Slone added eight and Brandon Slone seven.

Senior Hal Heard led the Chiefs with 14 points. Seniors Derrick McDonald, Jon Paupore and Tony Coshatt scored 12, 11 and eight, respectively.

"One of our goals was to keep them off the offensive glass," Brodie said. "Tony, Owen (Crosby) and Hal hurt us with seconds shots in the first game. We did a better job of putting

CEP has pair of champs, sends foursome to state

For two weeks, Salem and Canton high schools will put their rivalry aside, at least where the sport of wrestling is concerned.

The two will function as one in preparation for the state championships Friday and Saturday, March 13-14, at Kellogg Arena in Battle Creek.

"It could be the CEP team going to state," Canton junior Nick Spano said Saturday after he became one of four Centennial Educational Park wrestlers to qualify in the Class A individual regional tournament at Salem.

Salem senior Dan Bonnett (125) and Canton senior George Young (171) earned regional titles, Salem senior Scott Martin (119) finished second and Spano (130) placed third.

"I feel good for me, for Scott, for George and especially Dan. He's worked his fanny off all year," said Spano, who will practice with Bonnett and Martin.

"I COULDN'T do anything like this without Dan Bonnett helping me out, because we had nobody else left at Canton. We'll get a good three-way going and try to beat the mess out of each other."

Together, the CEP foursome did that to plenty of opposing wrestlers in the regional.

Bonnett (42-1) advanced to the final against long-standing rival Mike Scully of Romulus after beating Brian McNally of Adrian 4-2 and Jon Duff of Farmington 14-1.

Bonnett was in control of his bout with Scully for much of the time, leading 5-2 and 6-4 after the first and second periods and eventually winning 9-7.

The win had special significance for Bonnett, who lost three times to Scully last year, including once in

the regional which prevented him from going to state. Bonnett has won two of three bouts from Scully this year and is going to the state meet for the first time.

"I was basically pumped and ready to wrestle," Bonnett said. "Last year I wasn't charged up and ready to go. This time I was ready."

"I COULD HEAR the crowd echoing; it was just awesome, knowing this was the last time I'd be wrestling here. I'm glad I could go out with a win."

Young dominated his weight class, pinning Temperance Bedford's Jamie Brescol (3:50) in the first round and Belleville's Mike Komaromi (3:43) in the final and defeating Ryan Adams of Farmington 15-3 in the semifinals.

But he got a scare when Komaromi, an opponent he has beaten several times, got Young in a cradle hold and nearly pinned him.

"That's what woke me up," Young

Vikings edge Hawks to reach WLAA final

The Farmington Hills Harrison basketball team found out Tuesday that miracles are hard to come by but not impossible.

The Hawks needed a miracle to send their Western Lakes Activities Association semifinal game into overtime at Walled Lake Central — and they got it.

But the second miracle, needed to win the game, fell off the front of the rim as the host Vikings moved one step away from capturing the WLAA crown by escaping with a thrilling, 76-75 overtime victory.

Central (14-3) will play Plymouth Salem at 7 p.m. Saturday at Northville for the league title. The Rocks upset top-seeded Plymouth Canton in overtime Tuesday, 58-57. Central beat Salem earlier this season, 76-63.

Harrison (14-5) will play Canton in the consolation game at 5 p.m. Saturday, also at Northville.

TRAILING 75-74, junior center Chris McFarlane grabbed a missed shot and laid in the winning basket with just six seconds remaining in overtime. The Hawks' Dan Hight drove the length of the floor, but his eight-foot banker rolled off the rim as time expired.

"I saw Hight make that same shot against Northville last week," said Central coach Steve Emert.

Eric Leaf led the Central attack with 19 points. McFarlane (17), Mike Gluski (13), Ron Thompson (12) and Christian Emert (10) also reached double figures for the Vikings.

"Some guys stepped up for us tonight," Emert said. "I thought Gluski did a great job coming off the bench."

Andy Fitzpatrick, who scored 25 points for the second straight game, paced Harrison. Mike Pesci and Paul Gilvydis added 18 and 15 points, respectively, for the Hawks. Pesci also had 11 rebounds.

Foul trouble hurt the Hawks all night and the problem peaked when Fitzpatrick fouled out with 1:25 left.

HARRISON LED most of the second half but found itself trailing 66-61 with just 1:15 remaining. After Gilvydis con-

verted two free throws, Gluski responded with two free throws to extend the Central lead back to five with :53 left.

Two consecutive layups by Gilvydis closed the margin to 68-67, but Gluski again hit both ends of a one-and-one opportunity to give Central a 70-67 lead.

Harrison almost tied it with three seconds to play as Gilvydis was fouled on a layup attempt. The layup bounced off the rim, but Gilvydis was given two foul shots.

Hawks coach Mike Teachman planned to have Gilvydis make the first foul shot and intentionally miss the second, giving his team a chance to recover the offensive rebound.

Gilvydis and Pesci worked the plan to perfection. Gilvydis made the first shot, missed the second and Pesci snuck between two Vikings to pick up the rebound and lay it in as time expired.

"I felt bad about the play that sent the game into overtime. It was my fault," McFarlane said.

THE HAWKS struck first in overtime as Hight fed Duante Anderson for a layup. After a Gilvydis free throw gave the Hawks a three-point lead, Ron Thompson closed the margin to 73-72 with a steal and a layup.

After Hight and Anderson missed layups, Anderson was whistled for a foul after going for the rebound. He then was called for a technical foul for arguing the call.

Gluski nailed both foul shots to give Central a one-point lead. Two free throws by Hight gave Harrison the lead back with just :43 remaining.

But the Vikings were dominating the offensive boards, getting six in just the extra three-minute period. The last offensive board was the killer for Harrison, as McFarlane put in the winner.

"It was the most exciting shot I ever made," McFarlane said. "I just happened to be in the right place at the right time."

Even though the Vikings were smaller on their front line, each team had 38 rebounds.

"The offensive rebounds hurt us and, if you think about it, that should be our strength," Teachman said. "Lack of completion hurt us. We had the game won and then we lost our composure."

Ford has better idea against SC

Schoolcraft College ended its men's basketball season Wednesday, but not without a fight.

The Ocelots were eliminated from the NJCAA Region 12 tourney by state champion Henry Ford CC, 84-73.

The victorious Hawks, now 24-6 overall and fresh from winning the Michigan Community College Athletic Association tourney, continued their dream season under interim coach Dan Henry by outscoring turnover-plagued SC 42-33 in the second half.

The Ocelots (14-18), ironically proved to be more than a worthy opponent this season against the champion Hawks even though they missed the state playoffs after finishing at the bottom of the Eastern Conference.

"Since they beat us the last time we were mentally ready to play," said Henry, who was named state Coach of the Year after filling in this season for Jim Armitage, who was on medical leave. "I thought we played a super second half. We played hard."

Schoolcraft, with only eight available players, held tough in the first half, trailing by only two, 42-40, while shooting 53 percent from the field (17 of 32).

BBUT THE OCELOTS could not maintain their pace in the final 20 minutes, winding up with a total 27 fouls (to Ford's 13) coupled with 32 turnovers (to Ford's 18).

"Every time it seemed we got on a roll, we'd either foul or turn it over," SC coach Dave Bogataj said. "You can't keep playing good defense and then turn it over."

"But we played hard and that's why we were able to stay in games this year, even without a definitive point-guard."

Henry Ford made a seven-point run to open the second half and SC could not get any closer.

The Ocelots pulled to within seven, 74-67, with 4:05 remaining on a three-pointer by Tony Rumble (Wayne Memorial) but Ford was

able to weather the run.

Larnell Tidwell, who makes his living working along the baseline, paced the victorious Hawks with 22 points. Pat Osborne added 20 points and nine rebounds. Jeff Riggs and state Player of the Year Chad Shilliday contributed 12 and 10, respectively. (Livonia Stevenson product Glenn Szeman, a 6-foot-9 sophomore, contributed six off the bench.)

FRESHMAN Jarvis Murray led Schoolcraft with a game-high 25 points to go along with 15 rebounds and six blocked shots.

The 6-5 center, a second-team All-Conference pick from Detroit Cody carried the Ocelots for much of the first half.

"Our whole staff talked about Murray all season and he can be unstoppable at times," Henry said. "I thought Pat Osborne, for giving up what he had in size and pounds, did a tremendous job for a number two guard playing against a post-up player."

"And I thought Shilliday came on in the second half against (Scott) Meredith and gave us a lift."

Meredith, SC's 6-7 sophomore center from Northville and third-team All-Conference pick, was plagued by foul trouble, but still finished with 15 points and 10 rebounds.

"Scott's really come a long way and he'll play somewhere," Bogataj said. "People don't realize all the things he had to do for us this season. And Murray had a helluva year, too. He's only 18."

The only other SC player in double figures was freshman Chris Habitz of Lutheran High Westland. He finished with 12, while Jermaine Burden contributed eight off the bench.

Henry Ford, meanwhile, advances to today's quarterfinal against Lansing CC.

"No matter what happens from here on out I'm glad I took the job," said Henry, who last season filled in for Brother Chuck at Wayne High. "I don't know a lot about college basketball, but we've been consistent all year on the defensive end, and that's helped us because we're not as skilled a team offensively."

Roeper runs past Eagles

Bloomfield Hills Roeper built a big first-quarter lead Tuesday and coasted to a 68-57 basketball victory over Plymouth Christian at Lowell Middle School.

The Roughriders jumped in front 33-10 and then led 41-28 and 51-42 at the end of the next two quarters.

Plymouth Christian's Jason Neil scored a game-high 22 points and grabbed seven rebounds. Jon Citrin and Hassan Jihad had 21 points apiece for Roeper.

The loss snapped a three-game winning streak by the host Eagles, who are 1-5 in the Michigan Independent Athletic Conference and 4-15 overall. Roeper is 4-1 and 10-7.

REDFORD CC 97, OLSM 73: In a fast-paced game Tuesday at Orchard Lake St. Mary's, Redford Catholic Central's high-powered scoring tandem of Bob Kummer and Chad Varga dominated.

Kummer blistered the Eaglets for 34 points and Varga added 32 in the lopsided win, which improved the Shamrocks' record to 14-4.

Still, it wasn't a blowout until the final quarter. CC led 55-39 at the half and was ahead 78-69 in the fourth period before closing the game with a 19-4 run.

St. Mary's got 25 points from Gary Morris, including six three-pointers. The Eaglets dipped to 7-12.

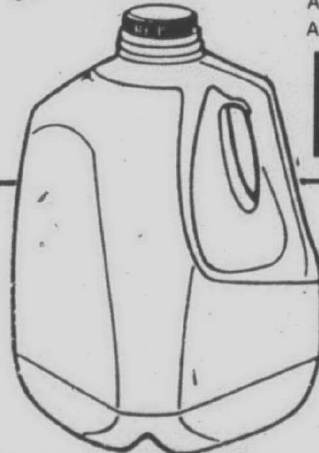

Chargers repeat as WLAA champs

The Western Lakes Activities Association volleyball tournament held true to form with one major exception.

Number two seed and host Livonia Churchill turned the tables on top seed Walled Lake Central with a 15-7, 11-15, 15-6 upset victory in the championship match.

It was the second consecutive WLAA crown for the Chargers, now 33-7 overall.

Central went through the WLAA's regular season at 11-0, including a five-game win Feb. 19 against the Chargers, who wound up 10-1. Central also handled Churchill a week earlier on the Temperance-Bedford Invitational.

"The last time they beat us on a lot of tips and rolls, the short stuff off our blocks," said Churchill's Mike Hughes, coach of the defending state Class A champs. "But Central hits the ball awfully well, too. This time we moved our kids up and rotated behind their blocks. And even though we don't have a lot of quickness, we covered most of them."

"We also played good defense and that's mostly because of desire," Churchill's blue collar work ethic paid off once again.

THE CHARGERS never let Central get into any kind of consistent rhythm with the exception of the second game when Central's 5-foot-11 junior Bridget Norris began finding the range.

"The second game took a lot of energy from us," said Central coach Mike Lindstrom, whose team is 31-8 overall. "Churchill played well."

"They served well and we had too many serve errors. That was a problem all day. It just didn't seem like we were focused. We played well on and off. We were inconsistent."

Churchill was able to hold Central's two other big threats, All-Conference pick Shannon Capstick and Tracia Clendenen, in check most of the match.

Meanwhile, the Chargers were led by three unsung players — sophomore setter Aimee Cousino, junior Chrissy Daly and back-row serving and defensive specialist Vicki Lucas, a senior.

Cousino has picked up the slack for All-Conference pick Kristi Szymanski, who was injured two weeks ago and lost for the season (knee surgery).

"Aimee just did a great job," Hughes said. "The tournaments we've been in and the play she was able to get has helped us."

"She's very quick defensively and she covered a lot of the short stuff."

DALY CONTINUED her consistent all-around play, complementing the hitting of seniors Julie Campau and Ellen Lessig.

"She really doesn't have a volleyball weakness, that's why she's an All-Division player," said the Churchill coach. "Chrissy is one of the two genuinely quick kids we have. She's outstanding because she passes the ball and serves it, too."

"And Vicki Lucas gave us a lift in both matches. She played tough defense and made some tough serves."

Churchill rallied again to beat city rival Stevenson in the semifinals, 16-14, 15-13.

It was a re-run of when the two teams met Feb. 8 at the Schoolcraft Invitational when Churchill came from way back to win. The Chargers made a similar comeback on Feb. 3 to beat Stevenson.

"It was a very difficult match, a match where we needed all six kids to play and they did," said Hughes, who also singled out the efforts of Krista Laidlaw, Andrea Zawislak and Rachel Hackman. "Our middle kids blocked well in the first ballgame. We gave up something in the middle because they're so good on the outside."

"The most difficult thing is to beat somebody three times. Maybe that was our advantage against Central."

STEVENSON COACH Lee Cagle watched his team squander a lead of 14-12 in the first game and a 13-11 advantage in the second.

"We made too many unforced errors and I thought we played poor defense in terms of reading their hitters and seeing what their hitters were going to do," said Cagle, whose team is 35-14-6 overall. "Churchill dinked to our left side all match and we never picked it up. It seemed like we were frozen physically."

"And we served exceptionally poor, but you can't miss serves like that (five) and expect to win against a team like Churchill."

Julie Martin and Teresa Sarno had eight and six kills, respectively, for Stevenson, but the Chargers were able to out-fox the taller Spartans at the net, despite some outstanding sets by junior All-Conference pick Patty Diamond.

"Campau (Churchill's senior starter) played so smart at the net," Cagle said. "She hit left, she hit right and also pounded the ball... whereas we don't play intelligently at the net."

"Nobody else for us put the ball away, either down the line or with a hard angle. We got into a mind set of tip, tip, tip, then we'd hit the ball hard. We never mixed it up."

Churchill also may have a psychological hex on the Spartans.

"Whenever Churchill makes a run, we lay back and play fear ball," Cagle said. "We're afraid it's going to happen and it will happen."

PLYMOUTH SALEM also reached the semifinals, losing to Central in three games, 15-6, 9-15, 15-6.

"Walled Lake just does the little things better and they have that mental toughness where they can reach back and make a play," Salem coach Brian Gilles said.

The Rocks finished 4-2 in pool play, losing twice to Lakes Division nemesis Stevenson, 15-8, 15-3. The Rocks, however, advanced to the elimination round by beating Westland John Glenn (15-9, 15-12) and Farmington Harrison (15-7, 15-12).

In the elimination round, Salem rallied from a game point, down 14-12, to beat Farmington, 16-14, 15-3.

The Rocks (32-11-9 overall) also started slow against Central in the semifinals before getting untracked in the second game.

"You can't send free balls to Churchill, Stevenson or Central and expect to win," Gilles said. "We passed the ball better, attacked more often and played harder (in the second game) against Central. And the momentum started to go our way. We had more confidence, but you can be Dr. Jekyll or Mr. Hyde in volleyball."

said. "I was riding him just to waste time, and he turned me and got me on my back. The coaches were all over me. I had to wake up."

Canton coach Ray Givens said a wrestler can let himself lapse into a false sense of security when he knows he can beat the opponent, but that consequently opens the door for mistakes.

"I wrestled pretty smart and was real intense the first two matches," Young said. "I broke down mentally in the final. But when I got back to being intense it was over."

"When I'm intense, it's almost impossible to score on me and when I'm not I have those breakdowns."

YOUNG (36-3) will compete in the state meet for the first time, having just missed last year when a penalty point was the difference in the elimination bout. Young and Spano are the first Canton wrestlers to qualify in five years.

Young is confident he can win the state title but expects his toughest competition to come from fellow Plymouth resident Dan Kelly of Redford Catholic Central, who defeated Young 13-7 in the final of the Observerland tournament in early February and also won a regional crown Saturday in Troy.

"We're friends but when it comes down to the mats it's not going to be friendly," Young said. "This is my job this year."

Martin reached the final by pinning two opponents to whom he had previously lost — Adrian's Mike Dusseau (2:40) and South Lyon's Cam Grahl (4:28).

"I felt I could have done better, but I lost to a good guy," said Martin of his 10-1 loss to Bedford's Fred Schumacher in the final. "I would have liked to make it even more successful, but I felt I had a really good day."

The win over Dusseau was especially pleasing to Martin since it was Dusseau who eliminated Martin from the regional last year and stopped him from going to state.

Martin (38-8) has competed in three regional tournaments but will get his first experience in state competition.

"THIS IS MY last year and I really wanted to do that," he said. "That was my main goal, to get to state. Today I was working on getting there and now I want to work on placing."

Bonnett was pleased as much for his teammate and friend Martin as he was his own self Saturday.

I'm happy Scott is going to state, too," he said. "He was the most valu-

able wrestler of this tournament, the way he beat those two guys."

Spano (30-6) has competed in a state meet once previously, as a freshman when he lived in Missouri. This is his first year at Canton.

"I think he has a good chance, because he has that tournament sense, which is something you can't get unless you've been there," Givens said.

Spano, who had a broken collarbone last year, pinned his first opponent, Adrian's Casey Wilber (4:26), but lost by pin (3:43) to regional champ Louie Tibai of Bedford in the semis. Spano defeated Jason Drouillard of Romulus 12-8 and won by injury default over Howell's Ryan Lane in the consolation final.

"I knew Tibai would be my toughest match," Spano said. "I was hoping to be seeded with the Ann Arbor Pioneer kid (Drew Pullen, who also was pinned by Tibai), because I thought I could have beaten him and gone to the final with Tibai."

Salem's Dan Phillips (130) and Phil Haynes (189) also competed in the regional. Other area champions were Garden City heavyweight Jason Peterson and Mike Reeves (152) of Westland John Glenn. Livonia Franklin's Aaron Shakarian (189), Garden City's Chris Gorak (136) and Glenn's Tom Pace (103) also qualified for state.

CC's Krueger, Kelly mat champs

Host Troy had the most qualifiers entering Saturday's Class A individual regional wrestling championships, but it was league rival Hazel Park which came away the big winner.

The top four in each of the 13 weight divisions at the regional qualified for state.

CC, Birmingham Brother Rice, Roseville and Warren Lincoln each had two individual champions.

Catholic Central left the regional

with a pair of championships and a pair of seconds.

Co-captains Jason Krueger (160) and Dan Kelly (171) logged titles for CC in different manners.

Krueger, a junior, stopped Romeo's Jim Migliano, 11-2, while Kelly won his match by default over Gary Nilson of Anchor Bay.

Dan Rieple (152) and Mario Scieluna (112) lost their title matches.

CC struggles but wins hockey game

They say "practice makes perfect," — but not on the day of a game.

Redford Catholic hockey coach Jack Gumbleton held a practice Monday afternoon and it seemed to make the Shamrocks sluggish that night in a 10-3 Class A regional playoff win over Southfield-Lathrup.

CC, by far the superior team, trailed 1-0 three minutes into the game and led only 2-1 after the first period. But Gumbleton, who doesn't usually hold practices the day of games, didn't think the afternoon's ice time had a negative effect.

The Shamrocks (16-4-2) got over their early funk to lead 6-2 after two periods.

"The ice was there, so let's use it," Gumbleton said. "We practiced our power play, forechecking, we didn't do any hard skating. Even if we hadn't practiced, we still would have looked this poor. I think we were just overconfident."

You can bet the Shamrocks won't have any pre-game skate prior to tonight's 5:30 p.m. regional semifinal game against Livonia Stevenson. The Spartans, ranked No. 1 in Class A earlier this year, met CC twice in the regular season, losing 4-0 and tying 0-0.

"IF WE PLAY like this we might as well pack it in for the season," Gumbleton said. "Stevenson is going to be tough."

The Shamrocks got three goals and an assist from junior forward Joe Blaznek and two goals each from junior center Bill Baaki and senior forward Pat Casey. After the slow start, the Shamrocks bombarded Lathrup freshman goalie Robert Ice with 31 shots in the second period and enjoyed a 56-16 shots-on-goal advantage. Mike Brusseau was the CC goalie two periods and Jamie Ronayne finished up.

The teams combined for only 10 minutes in penalties in two periods but the third period got ugly. A total of

14 minor penalties were called in the final 15 minutes, including 11 in the last 1:54.

The worst scene came with 58 seconds remaining when CC's Mike Giordano received a charging penalty and a game misconduct, while Lathrup's Rich Elizabeth and CC's Carey White each received double minors for roughing.

Lathrup finished the season at 12-9-1 overall and coach Ken Berke wasn't pleased with the way his best player, senior forward Aaron Titus, was treated.

TITUS, WHO scored two of the Chargers' three goals, was the recipient of a high stick in the third period and a high elbow in CC's end as time expired in the final period.

"I thought they took three cheap shots at my kids," Berke said. "For two periods we played as well as we've played. In the third, we got tired, that's all."

"We're a team that can score on anybody. We've played five of the top 10 teams in Class A and have scored on all of them, but just not enough. I think Stevenson can beat 'em (CC)."

CC senior forward Pat Casey defended his team's play.

"We don't try to go out and be like goons," said Casey, CC's leading scorer. "When a game gets out of reach (for the other team) it tends to get chippy."

Lathrup played without senior forward Matt Berke, who was serving a one-game suspension.

After pulling to within 5-2 on Titus' second goal of the game at 9:29 of the second period, CC scored three unanswered goals to pull away.

Mike Kasper scored unassisted at 12:23 of the second period to give the Shamrocks a 6-2 lead and Casey and Baaki scored consecutive goals 39 seconds apart near the start of the third period for an 8-2 lead.

David Stone scored for Lathrup, with assists going to Elizabeth and T.J. Kelley to make the score 8-3, but CC scored unassisted goals in the last two minutes by Jeff Wollschlager and Steve Sienkiewicz for the final margin.

said. "I was riding him just to waste time, and he turned me and got me on my back. The coaches were all over me. I had to wake up."

Canton coach Ray Givens said a wrestler can let himself lapse into a false sense of security when he knows he can beat the opponent, but that consequently opens the door for mistakes.

"I wrestled pretty smart and was real intense the first two matches," Young said. "I broke down mentally in the final. But when I got back to being intense it was over."

"When I'm intense, it's almost impossible to score on me and when I'm not I have those breakdowns."

YOUNG (36-3) will compete in the state meet for the first time, having just missed last year when a penalty point was the difference in the elimination bout. Young and Spano are the first Canton wrestlers to qualify in five years.

Young is confident he can win the state title but expects his toughest competition to come from fellow Plymouth resident Dan Kelly of Redford Catholic Central, who defeated Young 13-7 in the final of the Observerland tournament in early February and also won a regional crown Saturday in Troy.

"We're friends but when it comes down to the mats it's not going to be friendly," Young said. "This is my job this year."

Martin reached the final by pinning two opponents to whom he had previously lost — Adrian's Mike Dusseau (2:40) and South Lyon's Cam Grahl (4:28).

"I felt I could have done better, but I lost to a good guy," said Martin of his 10-1 loss to Bedford's Fred Schumacher in the final. "I would have liked to make it even more successful, but I felt I had a really good day."

The win over Dusseau was especially pleasing to Martin since it was Dusseau who eliminated Martin from the regional last year and stopped him from going to state.

Martin (38-8) has competed in three regional tournaments but will get his first experience in state competition.

"THIS IS MY last year and I really wanted to do that," he said. "That was my main goal, to get to state. Today I was working on getting there and now I want to work on placing."

Bonnett was pleased as much for his teammate and friend Martin as he was his own self Saturday.

I'm happy Scott is going to state, too," he said. "He was the most valu-

able wrestler of this tournament, the way he beat those two guys."

Spano (30-6) has competed in a state meet once previously, as a freshman when he lived in Missouri. This is his first year at Canton.

"I think he has a good chance, because he has that tournament sense, which is something you can't get unless you've been there," Givens said.

Spano, who had a broken collarbone last year, pinned his first opponent, Adrian's Casey Wilber (4:26), but lost by pin (3:43) to regional champ Louie Tibai of Bedford in the semis. Spano defeated Jason Drouillard of Romulus 12-8 and won by injury default over Howell's Ryan Lane in the consolation final.

"I knew Tibai would be my toughest match," Spano said. "I was hoping to be seeded with the Ann Arbor Pioneer kid (Drew Pullen, who also was pinned by Tibai), because I thought I could have beaten him and gone to the final with Tibai."

Salem's Dan Phillips (130) and Phil Haynes (189) also competed in the regional. Other area champions were Garden City heavyweight Jason Peterson and Mike Reeves (152) of Westland John Glenn. Livonia Franklin's Aaron Shakarian (189), Garden City's Chris Gorak (136) and Glenn's Tom Pace (103) also qualified for state.

CC struggles but wins hockey game

They say "practice makes perfect," — but not on the day of a game.

Redford Catholic hockey coach Jack Gumbleton held a practice Monday afternoon and it seemed to make the Shamrocks sluggish that night in a 10-3 Class A regional playoff win over Southfield-Lathrup.

CC, by far the superior team, trailed 1-0 three minutes into the game and led only 2-1 after the first period. But Gumbleton, who doesn't usually hold practices the day of games, didn't think the afternoon's ice time had a negative effect.

The Shamrocks (16-4-2) got over their early funk to lead 6-2 after two periods.

"The ice was there, so let's use it," Gumbleton said. "We practiced our power play, forechecking, we didn't do any hard skating. Even if we hadn't practiced, we still would have looked this poor. I think we were just overconfident."

You can bet the Shamrocks won't have any pre-game skate prior to tonight's 5:30 p.m. regional semifinal game against Livonia Stevenson. The Spartans, ranked No. 1 in Class A earlier this year, met CC twice in the regular season, losing 4-0 and tying 0-0.

"IF WE PLAY like this we might as well pack it in for the season," Gumbleton said. "Stevenson is going to be tough."

The Shamrocks got three goals and an assist from junior forward Joe Blaznek and two goals each from junior center Bill Baaki and senior forward Pat Casey. After the slow start, the Shamrocks bombarded Lathrup freshman goalie Robert Ice with 31 shots in the second period and enjoyed a 56-16 shots-on-goal advantage. Mike Brusseau was the CC goalie two periods and Jamie Ronayne finished up.

The teams combined for only 10 minutes in penalties in two periods but the third period got ugly. A total of

14 minor penalties were called in the final 15 minutes, including 11 in the last 1:34.

The worst scene came with 58 seconds remaining when CC's Mike Giordano received a charging penalty and a game misconduct, while Lathrup's Rich Elizabeth and CC's Carey White each received double minors for roughing.

"We're a team that can score on anybody. We've played five of the top 10 teams in Class A and have scored on all of them, but just not enough. I think Stevenson can beat 'em (CC)."

CC senior forward Pat Casey defended his team's play.

"We don't try to go out and be like goons," said Casey, CC's leading scorer. "When a game gets out of reach (for the other team) it tends to get chippy."

Lathrup played without senior forward Matt Berke, who was serving a one-game suspension.

After pulling to within 5-2 on Titus' second goal of the game at 9:29 of the second period, CC scored three unanswered goals to pull away.

Mike Kasper scored unassisted at 12:23 of the second period to give the Shamrocks a 6-2 lead and Casey and Baaki scored consecutive goals 39 seconds apart near the start of the third period for an 8-2 lead.

David Stone scored for Lathrup, with assists going to Elizabeth and T.J. Kelley to make the score 8-3, but CC scored unassisted goals in the last two minutes by Jeff Wollschlager and Steve Sienkiewicz for the final margin.

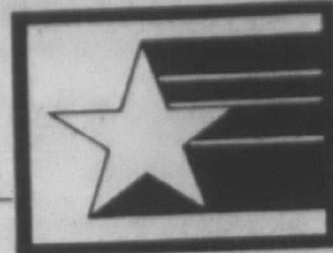

Five-star treat Don't miss Trinity's 'Tartuffe'

Performances of the Trinity House Theatre production of "Tartuffe" continue through March 21 at Trinity House, 38840 West Six Mile, Livonia. For ticket information call 464-6302.

If you like your entertainment zany, energetic and fast-moving, don't miss Trinity House Theatre's current production of Moliere's "Tartuffe."

The comedy, sparked by performances that range from good to marvelous, is a five-star treat.

THE CARTOONISH romp, written (in verse) by Moliere more than 300 years ago, centers around the avaricious hypocrite, Tartuffe, who, posing as piety personified, suckers the gullible gentleman, Orgon, into promising him his wife, daughter and home. How Tartuffe is finally found out and then meets with his comeuppance makes for some of the liveliest scenes in theater.

Phillip Matora imbues the bumbling Orgon with just the right touch of blissfully stubborn ignorance, and as his better half, Elmire (Mary L. Pettit) shows a fine gift for comedy. Her big scene, in which she lures the amorous Tartuffe to declare his intentions (as her unbelieving husband

hides beneath a table, listening in) is alone worth the price of admission.

THE CENTERPIECE for all the fun, of course, is the dastardly villain Tartuffe, played splendidly here by David W. Reilly. From the moment Reilly utters his first line, primly-coiffed, properly rouged, and costumed in bilious olive, it is clear that Director Jeff Hedeon has scored a direct hit, casting-wise.

By turns endearing and abhorrent, any time Reilly is onstage the liveliness of this already-lively production picks up a notch. Picture a kind of oily Ichabod Crane, with a little Roger Chillingworth thrown in, and you'll begin to get a picture of Reilly's Tartuffe.

A large part of his appeal, by the way, lies in the fact that he appears to be having so much genuine fun with the role. His enthusiasm is definitely contagious, absolutely impossible to resist.

GARY BRDA does a good job in the role of the wise (albeit speechifying) Cleante, as does Gayle Glowacki, playing the loquacious, high-spirited maid, Dorine.

R. Edward Anderson as the self-satisfied bailiff, M. Loyal, and Michael Kowalski as a bat-blind police officer have their moments too.

Kurt Fretwell, Angella Kobane, Tamar Schoenberg, and Victor Walbridge round out an able cast that's always a pleasure to watch.

Costumes by Barbara Reynolds and her staff deserve special mention here. Good-looking, colorful, and always apropos, they definitely add to the success of this well-put-together production.

Shakespeare classic features local talent

There's a lot of local talent in the cast of "The Merchant of Venice," William Shakespeare's classic romance opening March 6 at the Bonstelle Theatre on the campus of Wayne State University in Detroit.

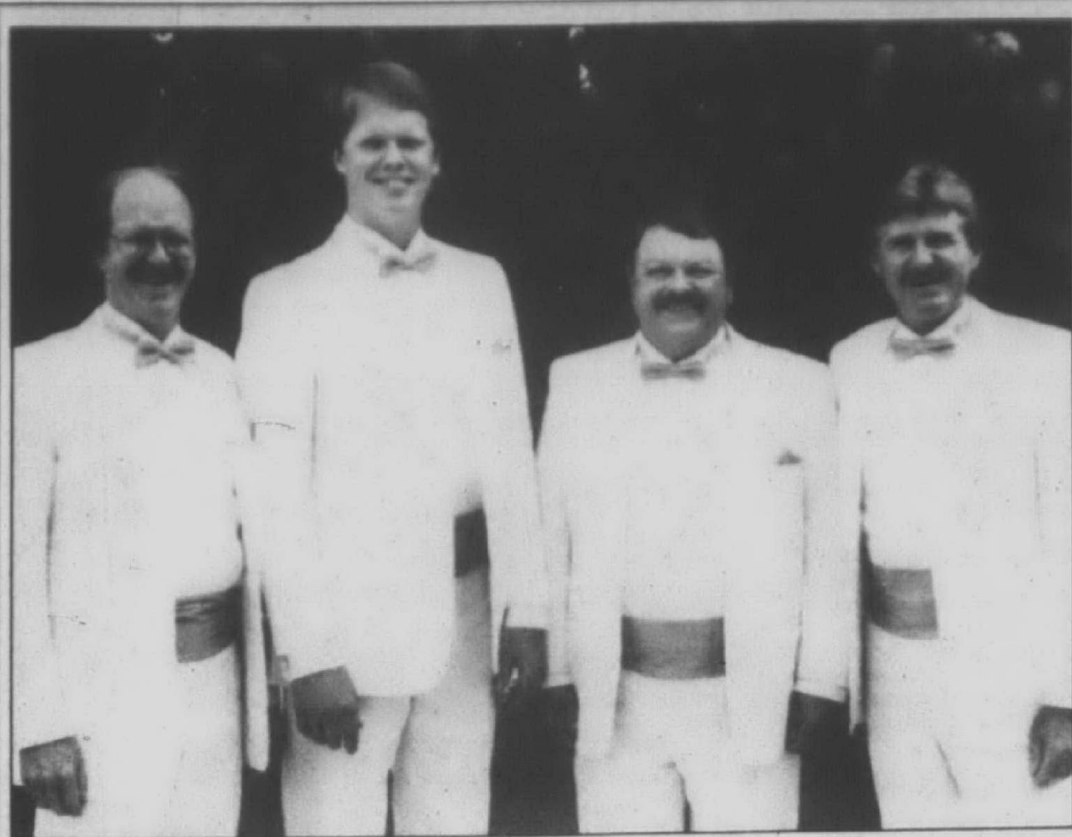

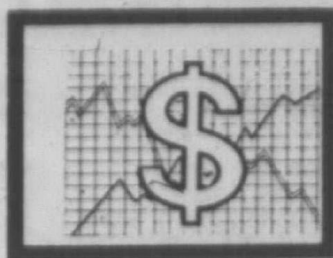

Hospital executive reaps accolades for leadership

Botsford General Hospital in Farmington Hills has never sustained a net operating financial loss since Gerson I. Cooper, president and chief executive officer, took administrative charge in 1978, Cooper said.

Last year, the hospital and its major subsidiaries — Community Emergency Medical Services, an ambulance company, and Farmington Nursing Home — reported revenue in excess of expenditures of \$7.4 million, he said. The figure was \$7.3 million in 1990.

Since 1988, Botsford has opened a geriatric psychiatric unit, a cardiac catheterization laboratory, an inpatient rehabilitation unit, a kidney dialysis center and a family service center for outpatient substance abuse and psychological counseling.

Several other projects are either under construction or on the drawing board.

They include integration of outpatient surgery with an endoscopy unit, expanded cardiology services, an expanded professional center, classrooms/meeting rooms, emergency department, inpatient surgical department and a remodeling of obstetrics.

COOPER IS a big reason that Botsford is growing while other hospitals are stagnating or even folding. For his achievements, Cooper recently was selected Executive of the Year by the fledgling Oakland Executives Association. The award was based on business leadership, financial performance and community contribution.

"It's his leadership," said Edward N. Hodges III, chairman of the Botsford Hospital Board of Directors.

"A great deal of success is due not only to his expertise, energy and creativity, but he has built an excellent management team to work with him. He has no problem with delegating authority. He gives people responsibility, encourages them," Hodges said.

Cooper, in turn cited several reasons for Botsford's success, none revolving directly around him.

"There's a constancy of staff," the 58-year-old West Bloomfield resident said. "I grew up with most of this staff. We have a full complement of technical and professional people. Nursing vacancies in southeast Michigan probably average 13 percent. We had — at the end of January — 1.8 percent.

"OUR STAFF, on balance is a very loyal one," Cooper said. "They've all had a hand in the success of the organization. They all take pride in it."

Location also plays a role in Botsford's success, Cooper said. There aren't any full-service hospitals within easy driving distance west and north of Farmington Hills where much growth has occurred.

Community outreach also has been a major factor, he added.

"In 1978, we made a decision. It had been proposed that we spend money on (TV) advertising but we plowed it into community programs — health fairs, immunization clinics, diabetes classes, weight reduction, stop smoking.

"We were the first hospital to start an infant car seat rental program," he said. "It didn't make money, but responded to the community."

The ElderMed program now has 15,000 members and 250,000 calendars of upcoming events are periodically mailed. Some 6,000 children and parents visited the hospital for

special fun activities on Halloween.

Good community relations pay off. Where will mom decide to take the kids when a medical need arises if she's had pleasant outreach experiences with the hospital, Cooper asked with a nod and knowing smile.

RESPONDING TO shifting service demands besides inpatient care has enabled Botsford to grow, he said.

"We discovered that we had 285 consultations one year on kidney problems," Cooper said. "We figured about 60 percent would end up on permanent dialysis and asked, 'Where would they go?' The answer was 'Everywhere.'"

Botsford responded by opening its own dialysis center.

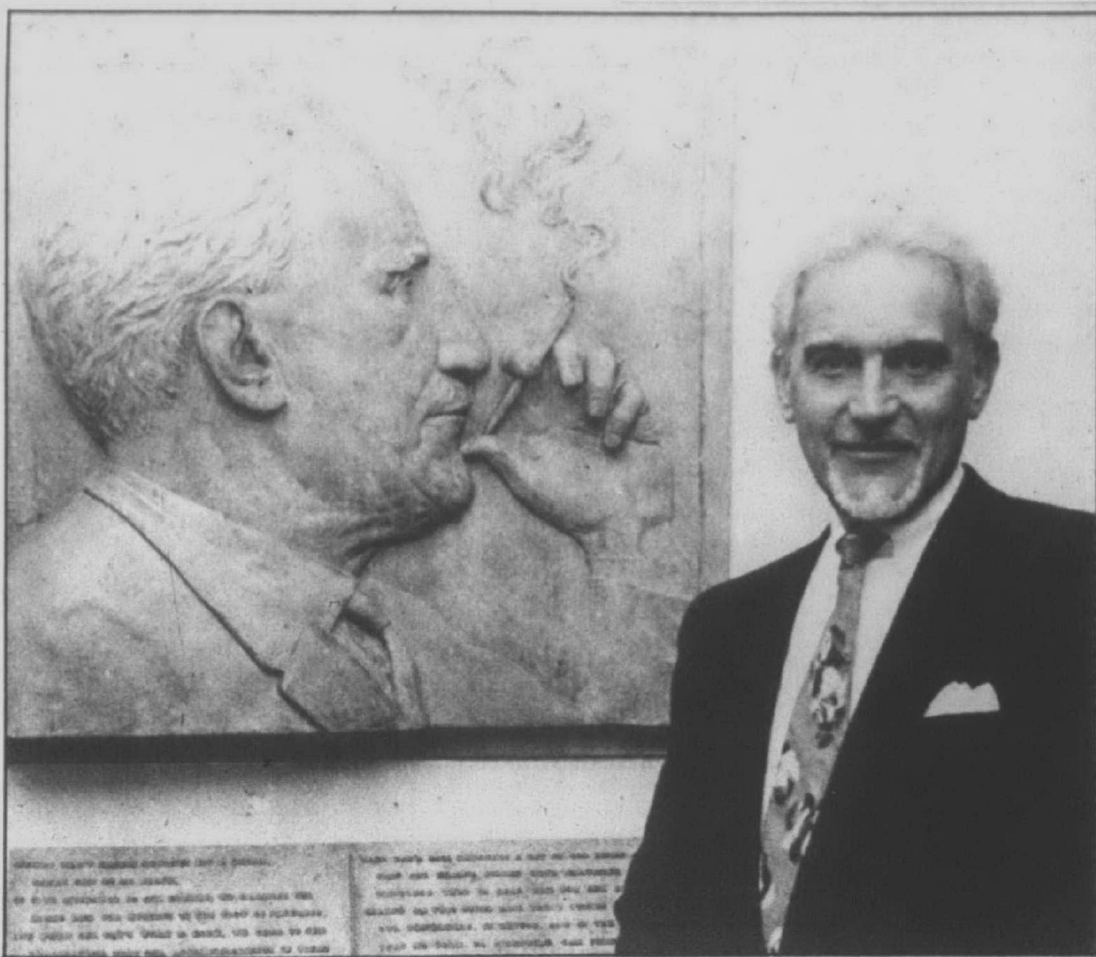
Cooper, who had earned a business administration degree from Wayne State University, broke into the health-care field by working as business manager for Zieger Hospital in Detroit.

Its founder, Dr. Allen Zieger, was Cooper's father-in-law and a Botsford founder. Cooper admitted to getting some criticism at first for his family connections. But that stopped when he proved he could do the job.

"I simply learned by broad, broad exposure," he said. "I was always enthusiastic about what I was doing. If you get involved in professional associations and keep up with government agencies, you will be on the cutting edge."

Chuck Hammond, executive director of the Detroit Zoological Society, nominated Cooper for the award sponsored by the Oakland Executives Association.

"IN THIS DAY and age, when you find so many hospitals in the financial throes, here's one that constantly turns a profit," Hammond said. "I found Mr. Cooper was an ex-

cellent manager in a complex environment. I was impressed with the outreach program of Botsford Hospital."

Joseph Champagne, president of Crittenton Corp., parent of the Crittenton Hospital in Rochester, served on the award selection committee.

"The thing that just impressed me was the way he (Cooper) dealt with Botsford, the success they've had. They've responded into a variety of

areas and remained financially sound."

Not all of Cooper's decisions have been easy. The excitement of new ventures in the late 1980s was preceded by some turmoil.

"Probably the most difficult was the decision in 1987 for the first time in the history of our organization to downsize, lay off people," he said. "That was sheer agony. We were torn apart. It was a terrible time. It

took a long time for that to heal." All in all, Cooper looks back on his stewardship with fond memories.

"Not in my wildest imagination did I envision a career in health care," he said. "Each year brought something new. You'll see my involvements in associations and other activities, it's like getting sucked in voluntarily. Now, I can't view myself doing anything else."

Auto suppliers consider different growth options

Diversification.

That's the game plan for some automotive suppliers, especially smaller ones, who intend to thrive while the Big Three and other manufacturers constrict their operations.

The larger suppliers, automotive divisions of international conglomerates, will survive and grow by developing new technologies or acquiring some of their competitors.

Those are some conclusions drawn from conversations with several suppliers in the Observer & Eccentric coverage area.

Listen to Steven C. Doman, president of Empire Electronics in Troy. He's been chief executive officer of that privately-owned company for two years. Empire, which employs 70, makes wire harnesses for electronic applications.

"I saw a need to diversify," Doman said. "I felt we should get into the computer industry. We went out and hired an independent sales rep. That's a cheap way to do it. You don't pay for his services until you get paid by customers."

FINDING NEW customers among computer manufacturers and consumer electronics manufacturers like Zenith has enabled Empire, founded in 1981, to avoid layoffs this year, Doman said.

Automotive-related work once accounted for 85 percent of Empire's business, he said. Now it's down to about 55 percent with a target of 40 to 50 percent.

"I've been with companies whose work was 80-90 percent automotive, Doman said. "It runs on a cycle. When things go great, everyone's happy. When it drops off, it drops off. I want to reduce the dropoff."

Empire continued its automotive work while diversifying, winning a Q-1 designation from Ford.

"You never drop out of the automotive business," Doman said. "If you get a call from Ford to bid, you bid. You can't turn away. You won't get to quote again."

Doman anticipates that upwards of 80 percent of Empire's future income growth will come from non-automotive business. The company had sales last year of \$4 million.

FACUNDO BRAVO, president of Uni-Boring Co. in Livonia, also is

looking to diversify.

"Part of my business now is military. I'd like to expand, but that takes time. I'm not rushing into it. The military is, cutting, too, but there's some work out there and always will be."

Nearly 98 percent of the components precision machined by Uni-Boring, a privately-owned company, go for power trains, engines and transmissions in the auto industry, Bravo said. Effective use of personnel and equipment give him an edge, Bravo said.

"I think we can compete better than the UAW and give more quality work for the money," he said. "We try to utilize our equipment more wisely. We provide a lot of good service seven days a week, 24 hours a day. We keep modern equipment, update all the time."

Last year was a profitable one with sales of \$14 million, Bravo said, declining to elaborate.

Now listen to Robert Gualdoni, director of planning for Allied-Signal Automotive Sector headquartered in Southfield.

"What we see here in terms of supplier opportunities becoming fewer is going to continue," he said. "We look for concentration to continue. As other suppliers see business dissipate, they will leave or sell off to survivors."

ALLIED-SIGNAL, a publicly-owned and traded corporation, also has aerospace and engineered materials sectors. Its automotive division makes brake products, sparkplugs, airbags, turbochargers and filters.

The company has technical centers for research and development in Troy and Sterling Heights, but no manufacturing facilities here.

"We intend to continue to be an outstanding supplier. We're committed to being one that survives," Gualdoni said. "We set ongoing productivity targets. We're very stringent on reducing errors and defects."

Technological advances and new foreign markets also will determine survival, he said.

"We're looking at new products, new regions, which, in the long run, would include eastern Europe, Latin America, the Far East," Gualdoni said. He mentioned air bags as one area open for technological advances and stiff competition.

Allied-Signal's Automotive Sector employs some 35,600 in nearly 200 factories around the world. Fewer than half of those plants are in the U.S.

The automotive sector reported a profit of \$31 million on sales of \$4.1 billion last year, said Barrett Kalellis, communications director.

LISTEN TO Timothy A. Hernden, vice president of marketing and sales for Douglas & Lomason Co., headquartered in Farmington Hills.

"We've been in that mode — cost reduction, inventory reduction, capacity consolidation — for a while. We're improving the processes so we can wring out all costs we can to operate as efficiently as we can. If you can't raise prices, you have to wring out costs."

Major auto manufacturers circling the wagons and cutting back their own operations have presented some great opportunities for suppliers, Hernden said.

"All are looking to suppliers to do basic engineering and product development," he said. "We've tripled our engineering group in the last five years."

"Automotive is our core. Any time we can go to non-automotive with the same products and technology, we'll consider that, but 90 percent of our business is automotive."

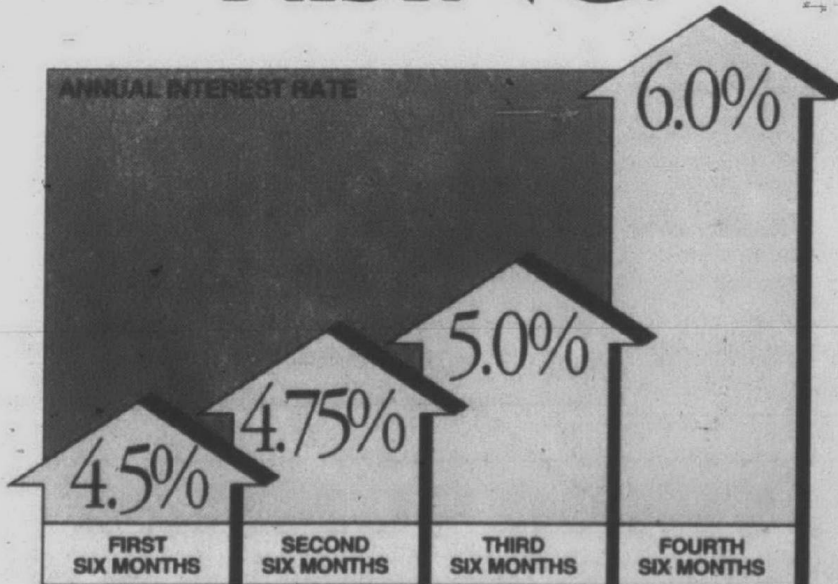
Douglas & Lomason, whose stock is traded on over-the-counter markets, has carved niches in seating and exterior decorative trim.

"We are doing a complete seating package for a client — design, prototype, testing — at which time we'll take it right through to manufacturing," Hernden said. "We did the exterior decorative design for Roadmaster and Caprice."

"We've been emphasizing reducing lead time to bring new products to market. "Where it may have taken four years, we're trying to get it down to two."

The company, which employs 5,000 in 19 facilities, posted a profit last year of \$7.2 million on sales of \$376 million, Hernden said. Only the headquarters is in this area.

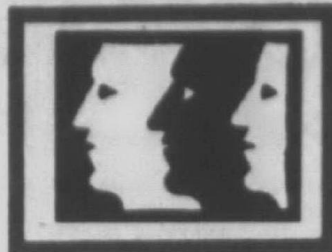

Observance lets people discover women's history

To this day, Liz Giese remembers her high school history textbook. It had a single page of material on the women's movement with one picture of women's rights pioneer Susan B. Anthony.

Giese is education director of the Michigan Women's Historical Center and Hall of Fame. She believes that National Women's History Month, celebrated in March, offers a wonderful vehicle for involving people in learning about women's history.

"We do a lot of public speaking during the month of March." Many people are interested in learning about the contributions women have made in a variety of fields, she said.

Women's History Month began as Women's History Week, and Giese remembers some skeptics who didn't believe there was sufficient material for even a one-week celebration.

"It wasn't too long after that that they decided to have it be a Women's History Month. It's really expanding."

MUCH OF THE work done on women's history is primary research, in which researchers are digging out information for the first time.

"There are diaries and letters. There are old photos that we're unearthing." Newspaper articles from days gone by also are used by researchers, Giese said.

Some materials have been lost, but much remains and is added to the body of information, she said. Information's available on such sub-

jects as the suffrage movement in Michigan.

Giese used to be more charitable in describing ways in which women's history is covered in textbooks and other materials; she believed that some historians simply had other interests. She isn't so charitable these days, and finds it hard to understand how historians could ignore women's contributions.

"It really shows to me a poor sense of history, poor judgment." In the past decade, more books have been written on women's history, and some presses specialize in such material.

That doesn't mean there's no work to be done. A visit to a typical school library reveals that biographies on men outnumber those on women by a considerable margin, she said.

"You'll see that children are still getting an uneven view of women's contributions in history."

THE STORIES of women in Michigan and elsewhere are often inspiring ones. Each year at the Women's Hall of Fame awards ceremony, many men are proud of the recognition their own mothers or other loved ones are receiving.

"I think there are men who are just as delighted as I am with the recovering of women's history," said Giese, who has taught social studies.

She's a member of the Michigan Women's Studies Association, which is celebrating its 20th anniversary this year. Giese and others know that people of all ages, including children, need to understand just how much women have done.

Local lore has women's touch

Helen Farrand died in 1977 at age 84, but her contributions to the community remain strong to this day.

Farrand taught school for many years and retired in 1958. Farrand Elementary School in Plymouth Township is named for the longtime Plymouth resident.

Farrand, who was born in 1892, graduated from Plymouth High School. Her 45-year teaching career included time at Plymouth's Central and Starkweather schools.

When Farrand started teaching in Plymouth in the late 1920s, her salary was \$120 per month. A look through the archives at the Plymouth Historical Museum reveals such facts from the past.

The role of women in the everyday life of the community is evident from looking through those archives. There's the story of Phoebe Patterson of Plymouth, born Phoebe Ely in Superior Township in 1857.

SHE MARRIED Melvin A. Patterson and moved to Plymouth. The Pattersons had three children, including twins, and for many years Phoebe Patterson was involved in caring for her family.

She assumed a more public role at age 62 when she was elected justice of the peace in Plymouth Township. Patterson was the first woman in Michigan to hold that office, according to the late Dr. Sam Hudson's "The Story of Plymouth, Michigan: A Midwest Microcosm" (1976).

Patterson, who was active in the Woman's Christian Temperance Union and the League of Women Voters, found that not everyone believed a woman should assume such a role. A legal challenge ensued, with the case tried before Judge Henry A. Mandell of the Wayne

County Circuit Court. The verdict in 1920 was in Patterson's favor and she continued to hold office until her death 11 years later.

In 1940, Ruth Huston Whipple was elected Plymouth's first woman mayor. She was born in 1896 in Plymouth, and graduated from Plymouth High School.

She taught at Plymouth High School and then at Detroit's Northwestern High School, leading debating teams at both schools to victory before retiring from teaching in 1931. Whipple and her husband had two children.

She'd served as Plymouth's mayor pro tem in 1936-37 and then as mayor in 1940-42. In 1950, Whipple retired from political life.

STRONG WOMEN also lived and worked in the community in the earlier part of the 20th century. That strength is revealed by the role women played in aiding victims of the July 20, 1907, train wreck at the Van Sickle Cut.

That day, a passenger train and a freight train collided head-on, causing 33 deaths and some 100 injuries.

Doctors rushed to the scene to help, and were assisted by several women, according to Hudson's account of the tragedy.

Women had significant roles to play in the community's religious life as well. Hudson's "150th Anni-

versary History: First Presbyterian Church, Plymouth" (1985) includes information on women's roles within that congregation.

Margaret Daniel was the first woman elected a church elder. When she took on that responsibility in 1953, she paved the way for other women to assume such leadership roles. Daniel had also served as president of the church Women's Association in 1942-44 and again in 1957.

Women's organizations from the First Presbyterian Church had been involved in community work from the congregation's earliest day. Members of the Ladies Aid Society were active in fund-raising efforts.

The Women's Auxiliary was formed in January 1909 to assist in material, social and spiritual work of the congregation. Members saved newspapers and magazines for the Monroe Binder Co., and the money raised went into church projects.

LOOKING THROUGH the archives can serve as a reminder that life wasn't always easy for women of bygone days.

"When I look into the faces of those women, I'm particularly impressed with the hard work they had to do every day of their lives," said Donna Keough of Canton, exhibits chairwoman for the Plymouth Historical Museum.

Strenuous labor was a constant re-

ality for those women, she said. Even getting a load of laundry done required a great deal of effort.

Preparing three main meals each day took considerable time and effort, and those women didn't have an opportunity to relax by taking their families to a restaurant. The closest thing would have been going to visit family members or friends, Keough said.

"Oftentimes, it would be a day's journey for them." Even bathing was a major project in that era, she said, and housework kept those women busy.

"I think there needs to be some encouraging of libraries to buy those kinds of books." Some books are available through the Michigan Women's Historical Center and Hall of Fame, 213 W. Main, Lansing 48933.

Giese also suggested taking students to places where they can see and appreciate women's history. A visit to Louisa May Alcott's Massachusetts home is a possibility, as is a trip to Seneca Falls, N.Y., site of the National Women's Hall of Fame, founded in 1968.

TV programs on women's history can help students learn, and it's helpful for parents to show their own personal interest, she said. It's not only girls who need to know about all that women have done and been. Boys too need that knowledge, Giese said.

MATERIAL AT the center in Lansing doesn't focus only on women's more public activities in the workplace and elsewhere. Such a narrow view ignores the activities of homemakers, and "has been really unfair and given a mistaken view about what women's contributions have been," she said.

Homemakers have worked together to establish such things as ambulance services, hospitals and libraries, "so many things that make a community's quality of life what it is."

Working class women too have made significant contributions, and staffers at the center try to acknowledge those as well. This is the fourth year the center's been open.

A current exhibit on "High Flying Women" tells the story of women in the U.S. Air Force. An upcoming exhibit will focus on women bowlers.

"So we're covering quite a range of activities," Giese said. The center also exhibits the work of women artists and photographers.

Center staffers hope to publish a book on the pictorial history of Michigan women. Giese has seen photos of women from the past who worked as miners or in the lumber industry. Some photos are of women deer hunters from the turn of the century.

Center staffers would like to have the book published by 1995. Much of the material they'd like to use remains in people's attics, although some is available through historical societies, Giese said.

"Once this is done, we'll have a wonderful resource."

"I don't think we have it quite as bad." Women of the past had a great deal of work to do. They were home caring for their children, and those children had more responsibility than most do today, Keough said.

"Our children have leisure, our children have activities."

Family life of that era did have its pluses, however, she said. Families stayed together, and women's contributions in terms of raising children were valued.

Keough is concerned about the dissolution of the family unit in this era. In many cases, family members rarely get together for a daily meal or for other activities.

"I really think that's a problem."

ES workers prepared for '92 telethon

These are tough economic times, but Easter Seal Telethon organizers are confident metro Detroiters will come through and display their usual generosity.

"More people are feeling the pinch than did last year," said Rosemary Ging, executive director of the Easter Seal Society of Oakland County. "It just puts that much more of a burden on us."

The 1992 Easter Seal Telethon will be 11:30 p.m. Saturday, March 7, through 8 p.m. Sunday, March 8. It will be broadcast locally on WDIV-TV Channel 4 and hosted by Mort Crim and Chuck Gaidica. This is the 20th year for the local telethon and the 13th year it has been shown on WDIV.

"I hope it's our lucky number," Ging said. "I hope we break all the records."

GING, A Birmingham resident, took over as executive director in September, so this is the first telethon she's supervised.

"Everything is falling into place. We have a wonderful committee and lots of expertise to help us, so that has been really great."

Last year's telethon raised \$43 million nationally and \$11 million locally. Organizers of this year's local event hope at least to match that amount. Detroit in recent years has consistently been in the top 10 markets in telethon fund raising, Ging said.

The state of the economy has increased the demand for Easter Seal Society services, she said. Those who have lost jobs and no longer have health insurance often rely on those services, and cutbacks in state funding have increased the number of clients needing help.

"We really need to keep those fund-raising dollars up," Ging said.

Hard-working volunteers help keep the telethon going year after year. Betty Kizer of Farmington Hills is general chairwoman for the Tri-County Telethon Committee.

Kizer, a saleswoman for Avis Ford in Southfield, has been involved with the Easter Seal Telethon for 13 years. She was originally involved in activities of the Easter Seal Society, Muscular Dystrophy Association and Special Olympics.

WDIV ANCHORMAN Mort Crim asked Kizer why she didn't concentrate her efforts, focusing on one organization. The first year that the Easter Seal event was broadcast on Channel 4, Kizer, who was then in the florist business, was asked to provide blooming plants to spruce up the studio.

"From that point on, I was hooked. I enjoy working with Easter Seals. I meet a lot of wonderful people. It gives you a nice satisfied feeling."

Kizer serves on the Easter Seal Society board for Oakland County and for the state. She hasn't used Easter Seal services, but knows how valuable those are. Kizer's daughter was, in her younger days, seriously injured in an accident and spent considerable time in the hospital,

in a wheelchair and later on crutches.

These days at Avis Ford, Kizer works with many customers who need wheelchair lifts in their vans.

"The Easter Seal Society helps any person with any disability," said Kizer, who also donates food and clothing collected from friends and customers to homeless people in Detroit.

The Easter Seal Society provides many services to help disabled people of all ages achieve maximum independence. Services include physical therapy, support groups for the disabled, a VIP (Visually Impaired Persons) program and recreational activities for those of all ages.

THE SOCIETY sponsors disability prevention projects, including a lending program for infant and toddler car seats and a screening program for scoliosis (curvature of the spine). Wheelchairs, canes and other items needed by those with temporary or long-term disabilities are available.

Keeping those programs going strong depends in large part on the annual telethon, which is being led this year by honorary chairmen Rick and Joyce Inatome of Inacom Computer Centers. 

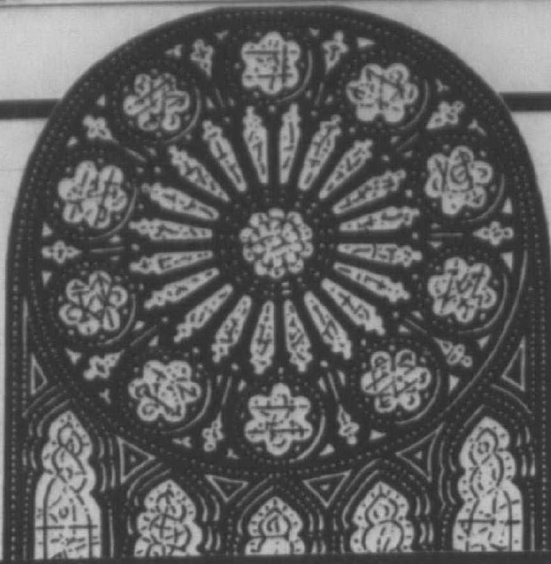

Church reaches out to its neighbors with 'Love'

If God listens to the congregation of Augsburg Lutheran Church, the next six weeks will see the church filled for the Sunday worship service. That's what members have been praying for as part of a Lenten program that starts Sunday, March 8.

The Redford Township church is starting a six week series, "Love on the Cross," aimed at helping people increase their faith and at reaching out to "neighbors" looking for a place to worship.

Pastor Paul Kopka happened on the program after reading about a similar one done by a church in another state. He took

the idea to the church's worship committee and "it popped in in time for Lent," Kopka said.

"The entire 40 days of Lent is a very meaningful time for Christians," Kopka said. "And this offers people an opportunity to grow in their love of God."

And presenting it has become a congregational effort. Some members are praying for the increased attendance. Some are working on crucifixes and stickers that will be distributed throughout the six weeks. And others are building an eight-foot-high crucifix that will be erected in front of the church during the Lenten season.

"People aren't bashful about doing work for their church," Kopka said.

The program will be part of the church's 10 a.m. worship service.

THE FIRST week those attending will receive 5- by 3-inch crucifixes. And each week symbols in the form of stickers will be given out to placed on the crucifixes. Similar symbols also will be hung on the outdoor crucifix.

Six of the stickers are being drawn by members of the congregation on ¼-inch circles. Each one is making 100 such stickers. The only purchased one is the

heart which will be passed out on Sunday.

The heart sticker goes along with the week's theme of "Love shows the way" — how God's love and Jesus shows the way to God.

In the following week's, churchgoers will get a cross sticker for the second week's "Love calls to follow" theme and a crown of thorns sticker for the third week's "Love rejected" — a look at how Jesus' teachings were rejected by the people and the religious hierarchy.

The fourth week's sticker will be a royal crown for "Love must rule" — the kingship God seeks to rule us, while the fifth week is a chalice and broken loaf of bread, representing communion, for "Love gave the life," calling attention to Passion Sunday.

On Palm Sunday, the sticker will feature a palm frond for "Love was exalted." As part of the service — weather permitting — churchgoers will march around the block and sing hymns, Kopka said.

CAPPING OFF the Lenten program will be the Easter Sunday observance of "Love lives." Participants will again receive heart stickers with the words "Love lives" printed on them. The

Easter heart also will be hung outside and will cover the wooden cross, Kopka said.

The church will continue its practice of Sunday School for all ages prior to the morning service and a fellowship hour after the service.

The service is open to all people and Kopka is confident that God will answer the congregation's prayers. And he may be on track. This Sunday the church will add 11 new members, increasing its membership by 10 percent.

"A lot of young families are flocking to this area and we've seen people just pouring into church," Kopka said. "It's part of the post-yuppy era that they're coming back to church."

Tunnel network protects small animals

Those sunny, warm days we had last week provided a great opportunity to explore the meadows. A sunny day in late winter foretells of spring's arrival, which is always welcome.

While walking through the meadow, there was no sign of the big snow fall we had in January. The warm rays that melted the snow in the open meadows exposed some of the activity that was occurring beneath the snow, and out of sight, during the last several weeks.

Most obvious among the tussocks of grass were the many vole tunnels. Voles are small mouse-like animals that are one of the most common mammals in a meadow. Their one-inch round holes marked the passage ways of the vole's tunnel network. Following some of these tunnels may lead to their nest site, an enlarged area with grasses forming a bedding. Some tunnels will lead to defecation sites.

Shrews and mice also take advantage of these tunnels to make their way around. It's much easier

walking through an existing tunnel than excavating a new one each time they travel.

A blanket of snow above the tunnels provided the voles, shrews and mice a protective insulation from cold temperatures. Tempera-

tures under the snow are noticeably warmer than on the surface. Snow cover also helps to hide small mammals from potential predators.

A snow cover only helps keep them from predators through. Red fox listen carefully to the movement of animals under the snow and pounce with remarkable accuracy to capture a vole or mouse that it cannot see. Some species of owl can hear a rodent under two feet of snow. Though they can be heard, it would be difficult for an owl to actually capture one.

Now that the snow has melted,

predators have a better chance at finding a meal. This was evident when I found an owl pellet below a bluebird box. A screech owl must have used the box as a perch while it searched for another meal. Pellets are indigestible material compacted in the throat and eventually voided through the mouth. Inside the pellet was the complete skull of a meadow vole cushioned by gray fur and a few other bones.

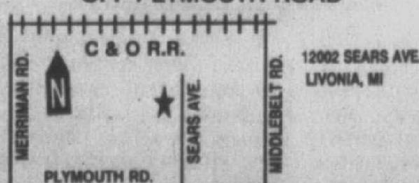

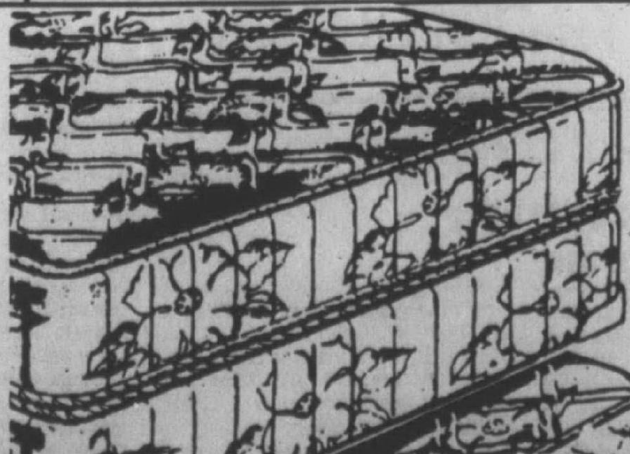

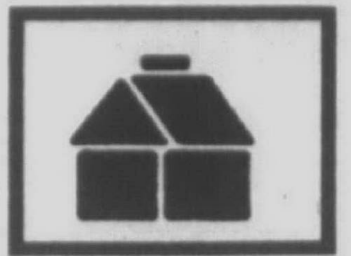

Look for a May ribbon cutting to mark the opening of the Geer bungalow at Livonia's Greenmead Historical Village. "We still have the furnishings to pull together. They're stored in four different places right now," said Sue Daniel, commission chairwoman.

The four-room, 1½-story house dates back to 1913. For a short time, it was home to A.J. Geer, who ran a general store next to it at Ann Arbor Trail and Newburgh. Many turn-of-the-century buildings from that intersection have been moved to Greenmead.

The bungalow will contain period furnishings from 1910 to 1930, including items from Daniel's grandparents' homes. "That'll make it kind of fun for me," she said.

Restoration of the white clapboard house will cost \$56,000. Restoration work continues on four other historic sites moved to Greenmead: Alexander Blue House, Alexander Blue Office, Quaker Meeting House and Detroit United Railway-Eight Mile Waiting Room.

An optimistic timetable calls for all to be restored within five years. The costliest projects are the Alexander Blue House (\$200,000) and the Quaker Meeting House (\$180,000), Daniel said.

At Eight Mile and Newburgh, Greenmead boasts 14 historic buildings in the village and 11 in the Simmons/Hill farm complex.

Surprise followed Livonia artist Barb Demgen's revelation that she uses an inexpensive tin set of watercolors often used by children when she addressed the Garden City Fine Arts Association Feb. 5 at Maplewood Community Center.

It's not the price of the watercolors but rather the quality of the paper and brushes that most influences her paintings, explained Demgen, who plans to return to a GCFAA meeting to demonstrate her watercolor technique.

Artsy ideas

Signup continues for Plymouth Community Arts Council (PCAC) arts and crafts classes for children, teens and adults of all skill levels. Classes start the week of March 16.

Youth classes include expressive drawing, fashion fabrication, multimedia collage, oil painting, origami, photography/darkroom, pottery, preschool fine art, sculpture, weaving and watercolor painting.

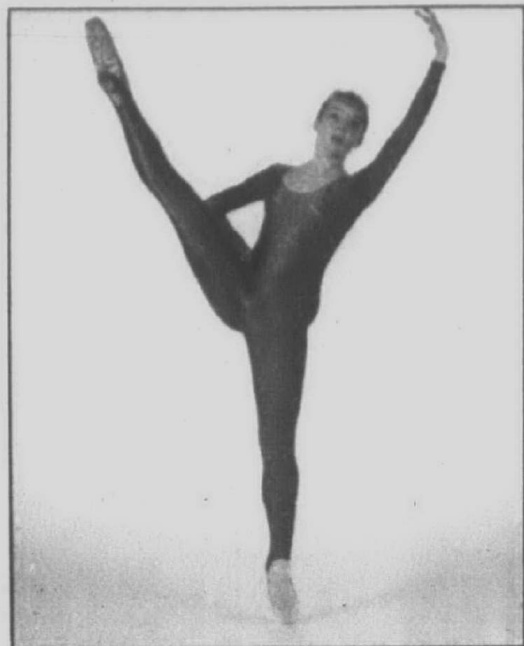

A family affair — learn finer points of world of ballet

Like to learn more about spending an evening at the ballet but didn't know who to ask?

Plymouth-Canton Ballet Company will present "An Introduction to the Ballet," featuring three classical and modern dances, Saturday-Sunday, March 14-15, at the Plymouth-Canton Little Theatre, 8415 N. Canton Center, Canton.

"If you really don't understand ballet and would like to get a flair for the different types, there's a variety of performances," said Dawn Greene, ballet company artistic director.

Selected dance numbers include Serge Prokofiev's "Peter and the Wolf," "Les Sylphides," a ballet set to the haunting music of Frederic Chopin, and the premiere performance of "Symphonic Colors," a modern ballet choreographed for the company by Denis Adams of Dallas. "They kind of complement one another. This gives them a chance to see a story ballet, a very classical ballet, and a modern," Greene said.

FEATURED ARTISTS for the introduction to the ballet are Dawnell Dryja, Junior Miss Dance of America 1992, and Michael Finegan, professional dancer/actor/singer.

"Peter and the Wolf" is a fun ballet and appeals to the kid in all of us," Greene said.

A story ballet, "Peter and the Wolf" introduces instruments of the orchestra.

"Peter (played by Sara Steffani of Plymouth) is the strings, the bird (Tiffany Clemons of Westland) is a flute, the duck (Laura Dysarczyk of Canton) is an oboe, the cat (Mary Farris of Westland) is a clarinet and the wolf represents three horns," Greene said.

Tim Smola of Canton is the big, bad wolf who comes out of the forest looking for something to eat.

"The wolf is looking around at the bird and the duck. Everyone wants to get the wolf because he's bad," said Smola, who works as a physical therapist at Westland Medical Center.

"Peter's trying to catch the wolf. He finally lassos my tail and he's pulling me by my tail. The hunters that were following me come out of the woods and Peter shouts, 'Don't shoot the wolf.' Then there's a big parade and they take me to the zoo."

IN HIS first year with the company, Smola played another bad guy, the Mouse King, when the company gave three sold-out performances of "The Nutcracker" with the Plymouth Symphony Orchestra last December.

After the classic tale of Peter and his triumph over the nasty wolf, lead company dancers Dryja and Finegan take the stage in "Les Sylphides." A white ballet from the 1900s, "Les Sylphides" spotlights dancers clad in white costumes.

"A white ballet doesn't have a story line," Finegan said. "It's done for the beauty. It's a pretty ballet, but very demanding. It's a stronger person's ballet because the dancers are on toe much of the time."

For the last 12 years, Finegan has danced, sung and hoofed his way through musical comedies, commercials and stage productions in the area. He danced three years with the Livonia Civic Ballet before joining the Plymouth-Canton Ballet when it formed three years ago.

Deena Renaud of Livonia, Rodney Julvezan of Dearborn Heights, Dylann Stoked, Storme Sundberg and Tina Bancho of Westland will alternate roles with Dryja and Finegan in "Les Sylphides." Stokes took the title of Junior Miss Dance of Michigan in November. Last year, Dryja held the Michigan title.

Art club striving to create, showcase original local art

ORIGINALITY IS their byword. "We try to raise the consciousness of the community to show there really is quality original fine art created right here in Michigan," says Yolanda Menchaca, a 15-year member of the 3 Cities Art Club.

From eight members in Plymouth, Northville and Livonia in 1956, the club has grown to 40 members throughout Observerland.

Quick to speak her mind, Menchaca rips the term "starving artists." "That puts out a bad image," the Canton resident said. "It connotes an image of need. How many of us really want to identify with that? It does a disservice to the originality and creativity of artists."

"For example, Michigan has a lot of artists who can capture, in an original way, the beauty of landscape — a snowscape, an ocean scene, a sunset, a child's smile, even a basket of fruit.

"There's so much original beauty for artists to enjoy and be inspired

by. We produce from beauty and brushes. Capturing timeless moments of life through art is like extending a lifeline. It's life giving, not life depriving."

AN EYE for art is as much inherent as it is acquired. "I'm a believer that artists are somewhat different, more sensitive to color, design, shape," Menchaca said. "They notice how branches stretch out, how a pear is shaped, how sunlight snakes through trees."

Jim DeArmand, 3 Cities Art Club president and a local art instructor, says there's a difference between good art and a pretty picture.

"To be good art, a picture has to show the artist's energy, emotion and feeling. And the person viewing it must feel that energy, emotion and feeling. It's not superficial. It's a gut feeling," said the Plymouth resident, a retired automotive engineer.

"That's what I try to portray and

get across: don't just paint a pretty picture, put your heart, your feelings, into it."

3 CITIES Art Club members are busy planning their biggest event of the year, their spring visual arts show May 1-9 at The Frameworks in Plymouth. The judged exhibition showcases their work in three categories: watercolor, oil and mixed media. Prices range from \$40 to \$600.

"Themes are quite varied — landscapes, still lifes, florals, some portraits, occasionally a seascape," said Plymouth Township resident

Andrea DeZell, club vice president and show chairwoman.

Longtime artist and instructor Alice Nichols of Farmington will judge the show. Gift certificates from local merchants as well as ribbons are awarded for Best of Show, first, second and third place, and honorable mention. The Grumbacher Award honors Best Use of Color. There's also a People's Choice Award.

Demonstrations by artists at work are an event favorite.

"It's wonderful to see children in awe by artists putting in a tree or putting up a sky," said Menchaca, Grumbacher Award winner in 1989 and 1990. "The artist gets a feeling of accomplishment and inspiration by the appreciation shown by these children watching."

Other demonstrations focus on marketing artwork. "Unfortunately, artists wear a creative hat more than a business hat," Menchaca said.

In the past, show proceeds have gone toward student art scholar-

ships, community cultural projects and local charitable groups.

THE CLUB also hosts a membership art exhibition at the Plymouth Fall Festival in Kellogg Park.

Club members meet the first Monday of each month at the Dunning-Hough Library in downtown Plymouth.

Meetings typically feature demonstration of an artistic technique, either by an artist or by a video. Guest speakers include Visual Art Association of Livonia faculty.

Meetings also may feature special programs, like this month's flea-market sale of artist's tools. Dues is \$15 a year.

Works of the membership adorn the Canton Township Library, where exhibits change every two months.

The only membership requirements, Menchaca says, are "a love for art and attendance at three

meetings before you can exhibit."

AN ARTIST for 20 years, Menchaca works in oil, acrylic and watercolor. She studied and taught in California before coming to Michigan. Here, she has taught at David Messing's Art Store and More in Livonia.

Menchaca recently took up fabric painting — artistry on denim, dresses and other clothing.

"The result's as original as if you're working on canvas, except you're wearing it," she said. "It's something no one else will have."

There's a new adventure to discover wherever an artist visits. "When I come upon ethnic groups," Menchaca said, "I find myself looking at skin tones, costumes and facial features — and gauging noses to forehead. All the while I try not to be rude. It's exciting to say the least."

"My early dreams, plans and expectations of love and marriage did not once consider the prospect that I would end up scouring toilet bowls and scraping hardened Jello from kitchen carpeting," she pined a few years back.

There were times raising two boys wasn't the stuff of dreams, either.

"Mom, where did Daddy go?"

"He went to work."

"Oh, Mom, where did daddy go?"

"He went to work."

"Oh, Mom, did Daddy go to work?"

"Yes."

"Oh."

"I've always suffered the misapprehension that children ask questions in order to learn things," Smith wrote. "Silly me. The only thing that my child has learned is approximately how many questions it takes before Mommy gets irritable."

NOW THAT she's 40-something and Jim and Jason are 15 and 17, it's time for Nancy.

"Two years ago, I decided to take an art class at the high school," said Smith, who concentrates on pencil

sketches of movie stars.

Aside from a class or two at Highland Park High School, it was the only formal training she'd had.

Smith then took a class at D & M Art Studio and Gallery in Plymouth's Old Village, getting grounded in the fundamentals, including still life, an art form she's not fond of.

"Faces intrigue me," she said. "Talking to people is more fun than talking to a chair. I guess I'm people-oriented."

Step into Smith's studio, which doubles as the family room, and that's immediately obvious.

Prominently displayed on a massive wooden desk are autographed cards and photographs from stars, including Woody Allen, Ann-Margret, Elliot Gould, Jimmy Stewart, Barbra Streisand, Bob Hope and Scott Bakula of the TV show "Quantum Leap."

SMITH HAS drawn graphite likenesses of John Wayne, Elvis, Ann-Margret, Marilyn Monroe and Leroy Jones. Newsletters dedicated to Frank Sinatra and David Janssen fans carry ads for portraits Smith has done of the stars.

"No collection is complete without

this," read the ads for postcards and 18 x 20's.

The Janssen sketch elicited a complimentary phone call from Janssen's mother, Bernice. "Bernice is an extra on Cheers," offers Smith, a member of the Plymouth Community Arts Council and the Three Cities Art Club.

Smith says she's marketing her rendering of John Wayne, a piece she considers her best to date, to a John Wayne fan club of 300 men in Ohio.

"I'm trying to do mail order, but I'm starting at a bad time. No one has any money," she laments.

Smith, who at a Wayne State University professor's request once illustrated a skeleton for a textbook, is making her mark on the local art scene.

JIM DeARMOND, of the Three Cities Art Club and an accomplished multi-media artist, says his club will display Smith's work in an upcoming spring show.

"Drawing is a trying medium for a lot of people," he said. "Nancy is taking off and is doing darn good. There's a heck of a lot of improvement in her late work. If she keeps it up, she'll be damn good."

Sharon Dillenbeck, owner of D & M, displays several of Smith's prints and plans to showcase the artist's work in a one-person show sometime this spring in the studio, at 710 N. Mill in Plymouth's Old Village. Her portraits also will be viewed at the Canton Liberty Fest in June.

Smith achieves "a dynamite likeness, but it's not a photographic rendering," Dillenbeck said. "You can tell her feelings are in there. For instance, her John Wayne is very, very good, but it has a little life in it. It's not like looking at a photograph."

"It takes a lot of talent and a lot of expertise to develop a skill to just draw straight from the eye," she added. "Nancy has come a long way in the short time she's been drawing."

James Dean. A lightly drawn "rough draft" of his face and a stack of Dean photographs sit atop her Office Max easel. Recent days have found Smith studying the photos and listening to '50s tunes like "Naughty Lady of Shady Lane," "Sugar Time" and "Sixteen Tons" to help create a mood.

"I don't copy anything. That would be the artistic equivalent of plagiarism," says Smith, who composes lyrics and poetry and plans to eventually tackle color in her artwork.

"I'm doing a composite. I want James Dean to look intense, brooding and desperate. I want him to look really sad because it was very tragic."

"What I do is get all the photos I can of a particular person and go through them, I stare at their faces for a long time, looking for the feature that is most distinctive. I research their lives too. That's why my Elvis looks so sad."

Smith, who still lives on Kaiser with her husband Dan, two sons, call-

co cat Bacardi, and cocker spaniel Sparky, can tell she's improving. And there's no doubt she's enjoying her new avocation.

"I'm getting better," she said. "Drawing itself is very gratifying. It's so much fun."

"I'm proud of this one," she says of her John Wayne, kept dangerously close to the couch.

Jim, Jason and their friends had better not accidentally sit on that portrait. Their mom would be off the walls.

Dry writing mars 'Self-Defeating Behaviors'

"Self-Defeating Behaviors," by Milton R. Cudney and Robert E. Hardy (248 pp., Harper San Francisco, \$18.95).

Authored by a professional counselor at Western Michigan University (Cudney) and a consulting psychologist with the Golden Valley Health Center in Minneapolis (Hardy), this book has some very important things going for it.

Its subject is something virtually all of us practice at one time or another, and so its appeal is widespread. It's thorough, too. And clearly organized. Upbeat.

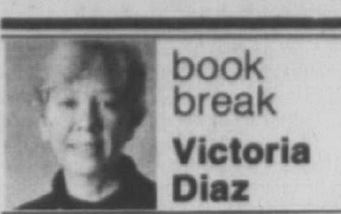
Happily, you'll find almost none of that insufferable "we're-the-doctors-you're-the-one-with-the-problem" tone here.

Plus, it's practical, offering

healthy dollops of nuts-and-bolts advice on how to wipe out those self-defeating behaviors that often keep us from getting that promotion, making new friends, losing weight or doing whatever it is we want to do to improve our life.

Too bad that in order to get to the core of some valid and valuable information, readers will often have to work through writing that is dry as bone, and a mind-numbing tendency on the part of the counselors to repeat themselves repeatedly.

THOUGH THESE flaws might not particularly discourage readers with a special or professional interest in human psychology and behavior, it definitely limits the appeal of the book for the general audience it seems directed at.

Cudney and Hardy contend that self-defeating behaviors are actions or attitudes we once resorted to in dealing with a painful experience. The behaviors worked initially in helping to relieve that pain, they tell us.

But if practiced habitually, they lead to self-defeat: "When an individual manages to cope successfully with a threat, the behavior... used will become imprinted within

that person's memory... as an effective means of dealing with other threatening situations... But because new situations often bear only faint... resemblances to the original... experience, the behavior... will almost always be inappropriate."

For example, one of their clients once fled, as an adolescent, from friends she felt had betrayed and humiliated her. Thereafter, though she yearned for companionship, she withdrew from society in general in order to avoid the pain of rejection, she found herself in a kind of permanent state of rejection, thereby creating the very situation she wished to avoid.

"Self-Defeating Behaviors" is most readable when Cudney and Hardy discuss specific clients: Ra-

chel, who withdrew from men completely, so that she'd never again experience the pain she'd felt on being labeled "ugly" by a boy in high school; Eva, who believed smoking made her socially acceptable, since, at a party earlier in her life, smoking had appeared to stave off rejection; Ted, a Vietnam veteran wrongly diagnosed by doctors as "dysfunctional," who began to act out the misdiagnosis, causing others to avoid him.

THE BOOK, complete with illustrations, charts, and self-tests, offers chapters on how self-defeating behaviors are started, perpetuated and practiced. Finally, it looks at how these behaviors can be replaced with healthier, more productive actions and attitudes. Unfortunately, in the

meantime, readers may have nodded off.

Ironic that the authors' logy, redundant writing style ultimately defeats a significant part of "Self-Defeating Behaviors."

LAST WORDS: For kids 6 and up, look for Gail Gibbons' "The Great St. Lawrence Seaway," out from Morrow this month. Engaging illustrations (by Gibbons) and text make this one of the liveliest books around on the history and function of the awesome Seaway. For much of her research, Gibbons, who lives in Vermont, traveled with the crew of the freighter, "Senneville," on an upbound journey through the world's largest inland waterway.

THE FINAL number "Symphonic Colors," a modern ballet choreographed "specially for our company last summer by Denisil, is set to the music of Benjamin Britten's 'A Young Person's Guide to the Orchestra,'" Greene said.

Originally titled "Flying Colors," the ballet makes its world premiere in Canton with dancers dressed in unitards carrying large pieces of brightly colored chiffon.

"Denisil's is a unique ballet. It's fresh and catches your attention right away," Finegan said. "It's an abstract piece and visually stimulating because the colors are bright and some really unexpected things happen. It'll make you sit up and take notice."

Dryja, an honor student at Plymouth-Canton High School, outdanced 62 finalists in a Las Vegas competition held by the Dance Masters of America to win the title Junior Miss Dance of America 1992. To fulfill her duties as the reigning top dancer, she's performed in Arizona, Michigan, Toronto and New York.

Place financial reality ahead of dreams

If you're shopping for that starter home and don't have a plan, you may just be spinning your wheels. That's the theme of a booklet, "Your First Step Toward Home Ownership" written by three principals of Village Mortgage Co. in Lathrup Village.

The 26-page booklet is written in plain English with several worksheets to help prospective buyers discover for themselves exactly where they stand in that search for a house.

"It's geared for the first-time buyer, somebody renting, living with their parents still or transferring to the area and looking for their first house," said Bob Waun, a vice president and loan officer at Village Mortgage and one of three authors.

"It's a workbook more than a text . . . and real powerfully brings out a plan to help people set goals," he said. "It makes people answer difficult questions."

- Chapters include:
- Identifying dreams and goals.
 - Developing a savings plan toward ownership.
 - Timing the purchase — hot and cold markets.
- The booklet touches on selecting a Realtor, preparing a

budget, various mortgage plans including low-cost FHA financing, and closing costs.

"MOST PEOPLE aren't financially organized," Walt Griffin, president of Village Mortgage and a co-author, said of first-time buyers. "They don't have a financial plan or it's kind of haphazard."

"If people want to buy a \$100,000 house, they're going to have to have \$9,500. People don't know that. We offer some budget ideas. We walk them through the process."

"We assumed people wanted something they currently don't have," Waun said. "In order to get what they want, they need a plan. We assumed the reader was a goal-oriented person."

Hopes, dreams and wants often clash with financial reality for first-time buyers. It's difficult to have it all, advisers say. A ranking of priorities often can indicate a willingness to meet the obligations of home ownership.

Right up front on Page 4 of Village Mortgage's booklet, readers are asked to identify what they feel is the most important first step in buying that first home.

The choices — purchasing a new car, charging credit cards to the limit, saving 15 percent of income before paying bills and moving to a larger apartment.

THE CORRECT answer is save for the downpayment and closing costs, Waun said.

"We suggest that people don't go out and shop (houses) first," Waun said. "It's more time effective and for the emotions to find out what you qualify for (financially). We push pre-approvals from lenders."

"We find time and time again people drive on a Sunday afternoon, go to an open house, love the house, have their heart set on it for \$80,000, get into a legally binding (purchase) agreement and they can only afford \$70,000."

They have to back out of the deal in embarrassment, then are gun-shy about looking again, Waun said.

"Sometimes, I think hopes and wishes are there before they know if they can afford it," said Kathleen Long, a vice president and co-author. "A lot of first-time buyers don't understand the lingo, the language regarding mortgages."

"They're in fear of the market," Waun said. "They're asking themselves, 'Is this a good time to buy?' The book kind of keys on some financial ideas in simple terms — appreciation, leverage, tax deductions."

Withholding of assessments not permitted

I have a problem with my condo that has resulted in a roof leak for nearly a year and a half. The association has attempted to correct the problem on several occasions but has not been able to do so. I want to withhold my assessments because I am fed up with this problem. Can I do so to get the association's attention? The developer is long gone, so it is the association's responsibility to fix the roofs according to the documents.

The condominium statute specifically provides that you may not withhold payment of your assessments because of the alleged failure on the part of the association to provide you with services or proper management. You may have recourse against the association for failure to maintain the roofs in a proper fashion, but that is an independent cause of action that you must pursue assuming you cannot re-

solve the matter amicably.

You may wish to arrange a meeting with the board of directors to discuss the matter in person as to why it has not been able to properly correct the roof problem. I am assuming that the developer is no longer legally responsible for the roofs, and that the association therefore has that

direct responsibility. If recourse through amicable means with the association does not succeed, you may be forced to seek injunctive relief to force the association to repair your roof.

VA raises rates

(AP) — The Veterans Affairs Department announced Friday it was raising the maximum interest rate on VA mortgages to 8.5 percent, a one-half percentage point increase.

In its announcement, the VA said it was making the change because of recent increases in interest rates in financial markets.

Conventional mortgage rates, loans not backed by a government agency, have been rising since they hit a 19-year low of 8.23 percent in early January.

The VA said in addition to the increase for home mortgages, its other rates were also being boosted by one-half percentage point effective on Monday.

That change will mean that graduated payment mortgages will rise to 8.75 percent, home improvement loans to 10 percent and loans for mobile homes to 11 percent.

The VA said that during the 12 months ending last September, it guaranteed more than 181,000 home loans with a total value of more than \$15.4 billion. In the first four months of the current fiscal year, which started Oct. 1, it has guaranteed more than 70,000 loans totaling more than \$6 billion with the average loan amounting to \$86,249.

VA home loans may be used by qualified veterans, members of the service and surviving spouses to purchase, improve or refinance a house, condominium or mobile home.

Cooperation of the developer, reputation of fellow builders in the same development, local building ordinances, — even quality of schools — influence the smaller builder in lot selection.

For builders, there's more to lot selection than just its location

People buy houses in developments for various reasons — investment good schools, affinity for the area, proximity to work, right price.

But what about builders — especially small builders who operate on small margins and whose fortunes can turn on each house they build?

For a builder, buying a lot in a development is more than just buying a house — it's a business. A bad decision on which development to buy in could be the difference between becoming a success and ending up a failure.

We asked several builders what made them buy lots in the Forest Bay Development on the northern shore of Cass Lake.

JOHN HAGEN, president of Michigan Renovation in Rochester Hills, is just starting out as a new house builder so when he set out looking for that first lot he said he was being careful — especially in these uncertain economic times.

"I wanted something where the quality of the development would pull us through."

Hagen said he decided he wouldn't build a house in a community he wouldn't want to live in — so that's what he did.

His solution was to buy two lots. On one, he is building a house he will sell. On the other, he is building a house for himself.

"I looked around for a while, and the reason I picked this development is basically that I liked the area," he said. "Land with lake access is becoming increasingly rare, and one of the big attractions of this particular development was a boat slip with each lot."

Another ingredient that was important to him was the developer. Fewer developments are opened to the small or new builder. Many large developments consist of houses built by either the developer himself, or by a small group of long-established builders.

For his first project, Hagen said it was important to find a developer who would be willing to work with the individual builders a bit more. Before buying his two lots, he spoke to other builders in the development and looked at previous developments.

ALEX AMCHESLAVASKY, president of A.A. and Sons Construction in West Bloomfield, said the answer to what a builder looks for in a development is both deceptively complex and simple.

"I'm looking for whatever the market is looking for."

In recent years, house buyers have gravitated to natural developments with more trees and rolling landscapes — "the high quality developments."

He also noted the obvious effort by the developer — the Forest Bay Development Co. — to preserve trees. Rolling landscapes and tree preservation makes the builder's job more difficult, but that makes the property more appealing to buyers.

"What's best for the builder isn't always what the buyer is looking for."

At the same time, Amcheshlavsky points out, he is also a businessman so he must be concerned with an affordable price. Since land has become a larger part of a house's end price, he can't afford to buy property that is going to put the house out of reach of his target market.

Not having the luxury of economies of scale, he must be careful in lot purchases by trying to get the

best bang for his buck. He said he weighs all the amenities offered by a site and judges whether the site with a house will give a profit margin.

Amcheshlavsky said many small builders prefer to be hired by a person to build a custom house because there is less of a risk. Still, someone with a good product can still make it in a speculative market.

BERNARDO CAMPICCHIONI, president of Camelot houses in West Bloomfield, reiterated Hagen's assertion that lakefront sells. A builder who can find a good deal on property with lake access is quick to snap it up.

"With me, what was number one (with Forest Bay) was Cass Lake and the marina."

Campicchioni said he tries to stick with what he calls the "upper echelon developments because there is less of a risk associated with them." Developments with all the amenities and upscale houses command higher prices and generally sell well.

"The developer of a development is important. I try to find out if he's on the up and up and if he's willing to work with the builders." That could mean selling lots with less money down, being more lenient on financing lot sales, or working out other deals.

"Some of these guys are just greedy and want their money out of a development quick," he said. A small builder needs a developer who is going to be a stable influence over the life of a development, he said.

Another Campicchioni consideration when buying a site in a development is one of the most important features homeowners look for — schools.

"Schools are a big issue when you get into this type of development."

A school district can make or break a house sale, he said, so a builder would be foolish to build a house in an area served by poor schools.

He noted that private schools with a good reputation can offset the image of a poor school district if the development is one that will cater to higher-income families that are likely to use those schools.

"A builder has to know who his buyer is," he said. Not only are schools important, but the type of development dictates the type of buyer.

Campicchioni also considers another variable — the other builders in a development. People don't differentiate from one builder to another in a development, so the small builder in a multi-builder development wants to be certain other builders are respectable and put a premium on quality.

If one homeowner in a development is upset with his house, word gets around that the development is lacking, he said.

"There's nothing worse than being bad-mouthed. In our business, reputation is everything."

In that respect, Campicchioni said he likes building in developments with builders who are small enough to supervise every phase of the construction and — because they are small — stake their reputation on every house.

"Smaller builders who are not production-oriented are less likely to let the quality suffer," he said. "I personally take great pride in what I do, and (I look) for other builders who feel the same way."

Campicchioni said a builder must also be concerned with the community's zoning and building ordinances. He sees some restrictions as so harsh that building becomes too difficult for the builder to make a profit.

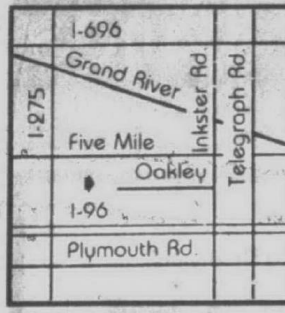
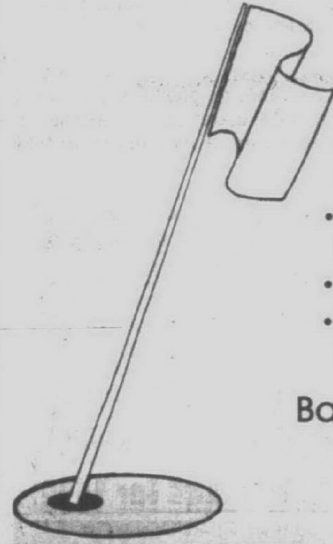

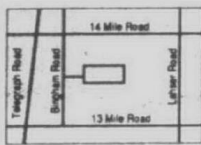

House of tomorrow places premium on versatility

(AP) What kind of house will the affluent suburban American family live in in the 21st century — or 20 years from today?

One answer is up and running in Shorewood, Minn., outside Minneapolis. It's also for sale — for \$595,000.

It doesn't look all that different from any other upscale American home, newly built. But rooms usually found in luxury quarters, such as a formal dining room, have been eliminated in favor of an open floor plan. Others, like the master bedroom, have been downsized.

There are plenty of amenities to make life easier. Liquid crystals in the bathroom window eliminate the need for a shade. And virtually everything that can be computerized or electronically run is. Clothes can be plucked from carousels in the bedroom closets. Lighting and music can be set for "party" or "romantic evening" or "gone for the weekend."

The difference is that there's a lot of house packed into 4,400 square feet. To make better use of land, it's built on an 80-by-80 plot instead of the more usual 120-by-80 suburban tract. The floor plan is drawn ac-

ording to how families actually live, not how they perceive themselves as living, according to Dean Johnson.

Johnson is president of Hometime, a production company in Chaska, Minn., which is behind the public television show of the same name. Hometime invested \$600,000 to build the house.

"BUILDERS TEND to build what customers say they want," he said, "and customers want what they've seen. It's kind of like watching an animal evolve. We're just jumping 20 to 30 years in the evolutionary process."

On the main floor is an open two-story living and dining area with kitchen at one end. Off each corner of the main room are the master bedroom and bath; garage; home laundry, workshop and hobby area; and, with separate entrance, a suite with kitchenette and bath either for guests or business.

A balcony rims the main living area. Other upstairs space includes two bedrooms and a shared bath, an exercise area and storage space.

Architect Jerry Messman says he believes homeowners would be willing to give up formal spaces and large sleeping quarters in return for more informal living space with multiple uses.

Architect Jerry Messman, with Bloodgood Sharp Snider of Des Moines, Iowa, said he believes homeowners would be willing to give up formal spaces and large sleeping quarters in return for more informal living space with multiple uses.

Such multiple uses abound here. "I designed the dining table on casters for flexibility in seating a large or small group," said decorator Tamara Weik of Interior Design

Partners of Edina, Minn., another Minneapolis suburb.

A counter-height partition between the dining and living areas is wide enough to serve as a buffet. Sectionals in the living area can be regrouped, and two ottomans are covered in waterproof fabric so they can double as cocktail tables.

IN PLACE OF THE usual monster refrigerator-freezer, several

small units are strategically placed and offer a choice of temperatures. A freezer, for example, is near the microwave oven.

Three metal tables in the hobby room have laminate tops for easy-to-clean work surfaces. The tables can be ganged together to form one big table. Lighting in the room can be angled exactly where it's needed.

But what's a house of the future without something completely different?

Fiber-optics impart a glittery appearance to carpeting in the main room. The same technology creates a glow from colored lights that subtly change from red to blue to lavender to green to yellow on steps leading to the swimming pool and in the pool itself.

In the bathroom, double-paned windows over the tub are filled with liquid crystal. They can be frosted or clear with the flip of a wall switch. At about \$200 a square foot, the ap-

plication is too expensive for most homes, Weik said. But expense was hardly spared here. Johnson said the house cost about \$900,000, including manufacturers' contributions.

"The reason costs were so high is because we are using cutting-edge products that right now are very expensive," he said. "In 20 years, these products will be widely available at moderate prices."

THE DESIGNER and architect worried that the open floor plan would lead to excessive noise, especially on the balcony. But it hasn't been a problem, according to Weik. The curved partitions and the sound-absorbing qualities of textiles and carpet seem to have solved the problem.

"There were thousands of people going through the house, and it was quiet," she said.

One problem they didn't solve: "A lot could go wrong if the electricity went off."

Weather the storm until the sun returns

AP — Our homes are never more vulnerable than during a natural disturbance. Here are some quick stopgap measures that you can take to limit damage until permanent repairs can be arranged.

Damaged roof: If your house has an open, unfinished attic, you can often temporarily patch a leak from the inside:

- If the hole is small, let it dry. Then, fill it with roof cement or caulking compound. Coat the surrounding area as well.

- Cut a board to fit snugly between the rafters. Position it over the patch and drive nails through it at an angle into the rafters.

If there are missing or damaged shingles:

- Cover the damaged area with plastic sheeting. Double the edges and staple the sheeting to the roof. Then caulk around the edges of the sheeting.

- If high winds may return, tack wood strips along the edges of the plastic and at intervals in between. Let the roof dry before making permanent repairs.

BROKEN WINDOW: If you can't shutter or board over windows before a storm, tape large panes to reinforce them and prevent shattering. Use cloth-backed tape, such as duct tape, and make an X on the inside of each pane.

- If a window cracks, put duct tape over the crack to prevent it from spreading and producing a larger break.

- If a window breaks, wear heavy gloves to avoid cuts, and use a sturdy container to dispose of the pieces. Remove all loose pieces by working from the top down. After removing the broken glass, staple or tape polyethylene sheeting or a heavy-duty plastic trash bag over the window, doubling the edges.

- If it's windy, back up the plastic by tacking a sheet of cardboard or a couple of boards over the stapled sheeting.

FLOOD DAMAGE: Enter a house only if you're

sure it is structurally sound and the gas and electricity are off. Shovel and hose out the mud and silt before they dry, and scrub and disinfect the floors and woodwork. Afterwards, open windows to speed drying. If a window is stuck, remove the inside stop and push in the sash from the outside.

- Rid the basement of water with a gasoline-driven pump. To prevent cave-ins, lower the water level by only two feet a day.

- If a wall is waterlogged, remove the plasterboard and insulation to well above the waterline. Trim the edges of the plasterboard with a handsaw. Before replacing wall coverings and insulation, let the house dry thoroughly. This may take months.

- Unplug and dry all appliances. Spray them with moisture-displacing lubricant. Have a repairman check the appliances before using them.

FROZEN AND leaky pipes: The fastest way to thaw an exposed metal pipe is by using a propane torch with a flame spreader head. Heat the frozen pipe by constantly moving the flame. Open a faucet and work from it toward the frozen area.

Caution: Take care not to let the metal pipe get so hot that you can't touch it with a bare hand. Never use a propane torch on plastic pipe, near a gas line or flammable material, or without a flame-proof back sheet; use a hair dryer or heat lamp instead.
