## Plymouth braces for seasonal cruising

In Plymouth, western Wayne's World headquarters for cruising, police are ready.

So party on, western Wayne County. And you too, Garth.

But to keep cruising problems to a minimum, police are asking local parents to keep teens home during the cruise-in.

And because it had some success last summer, police again plan to close off some Main Street traffic lanes when cruisers return this year.

"My objectives this summer are to reduce

the negative effects that our city has been subjected to as a result of cruising," said Police Chief Robert Scoggins, "and to control access to residential areas so the streets are more safe and quiet."

Scoggins said the emphasis on controlling cruising has shifted away from ticket-writing "because it doesn't work."

As county sheriff's deputies have closed off Hines Park at night to teens during warm weather, Plymouth has been the way-cool place in western Wayne County to hang out.

IN THE mid-80s, teens and older cruisers in their early 20s tended to hang out in Kel-

logg Park. But in the last few years, the focus of the cruise has shifted to Main Street, between Wing and Ann Arbor Trail.

To control the noise and traffic that follow, "We've taken a different approach, a different philosophy," Scoggins said.

Last August, police came up with a strategy to reduce the four traffic lanes on Main in that section to just two — one for northbound traffic and one for southbound, with an emergency lane in the middle.

"It seems to pre-empt bad behavior," Scoggins said, as it allows officers to see what's going on in all cars.

As part of the plan, at 9 p.m. on nights that

cruisers flock to town, "I will also close residential street access to all streets north of Ann Arbor Road from Main Street to Linden," Scoggins wrote in a letter to residents and business owners.

"Forest Avenue will also be closed from Wing," Scoggins said, adding South Harvey is the recommended alternate route for residents west of Main.

"POLICE PERSONNEL will assist residents into their residential street if it becomes necessary," he said, adding, "I suggest alternate routes to avoid the heavy congestion."

At a meeting April 1 with police, business owners and residents on cruising, "Anything that's ever been said about cruising was said," Scoggins reported.

"I think the issue with cruising is we all want it to be solved, but there are different definitions of solved."

While residents kept awake at night by loud cruisers have complained that the city doesn't do enough, the local courts have been strong protectors of the rights of local teens.

While cruising is most prevalent during summer vacation, police notice some activity after the weather warms in the spring.

## Officials size up tornado damage; homes destroyed

Plymouth Township officials were expected to release a tornado damage estimate today as all but a handful of Plymouth Hills Mobile Court residents returned to their homes this weekend.

About 15 trailer park families were staying at local hotels, left

homeless by a tornado that struck hard, fast and without warning Thursday afternoon.

"The thing we can be most thankful for is that there were no fatalities and no more serious injuries," said Joe Ruggirello, Plymouth Hills' owner.

Moments after the tornado cut its destructive swath through the mobile home park, Rob Minehart found two-year-old Jamie Wilson pinned under a washing machine near the door of his family's trailer.

Minehart lifted the washer, freed Jamie and handed him outside to a neighbor. The boy's father, Jerry Wilson, was thrown out a window and cut by flying glass.

MINEHART WAS ONE of many heroes who followed the funnel cloud. The final count included three injuries, six mobile homes destroyed and about 100 others damaged.

Grant Drive was hardest hit. "My roof started to lift up and it was like the walls were breathing," said Bill Schultz, a Grant resident. He ran across the street and helped bandage Wilson's leg after his trailer was toppled. Wilson was kept overnight at St. Mary Hospital.

Bill Rupp got a call at work about the tornado from his son's babysitter. He found his trailer ruined.

## Kids 'hit the ditch' as twister hits

A bus driver dropped off about 30 Farrand Elementary School students within minutes of a tornado touching down at Plymouth Hills Mobile Court about 4 p.m. Thursday.

Billy Fysh, 6, and his sister Courtney Fysh, 10, got off the bus when "someone yelled, 'Hit the ditch,'" said their dad, Bill Fysh.

"They started screaming and running for the ditch. When they got home they were soaked. I mean you could wring them out."

A neighbor, a high school student, was waiting at the bus stop for her sister "when the wind lifted her and threw her right into a car," said Fysh, who lives on Pine a few streets

away from the heaviest damage. She wasn't seriously hurt.

"ALL THIS STUFF was flying around," he said.

"One lady offered to pick the kids up in her car, but they made a bee line for home."

Ed Burney, official-in-charge at Metro Airport for the National Weather Service, said the children did the right thing by getting off the bus and refusing a ride in a car.

"If children were on that bus and it took a direct hit, the tornado would demolish that bus and any-

thing that's in it," said Burney. "They'd have a slim chance of surviving."

BURNEY OFFERED this advice: "If you are in a bus or a car and you

## Tornado hit golf course first

Doug Mily of Fox Hills Country Club in Salem Township was working in the cart maintenance barn Thursday afternoon when he spotted a funnel cloud "just like what you see down in Texas on TV."

"It looked just like a tornado. It was a blackish-grey

funnel cloud coming out of the southwest part of the golf course. You could see paper and debris swirling around inside it about 200-300 feet up. It sounded like a turbine was running," said Mily, who estimated the funnel cloud's width to be a couple hundred feet.

"I went out the door, and the tornado was going right

## Attorney to run for commission

Calling himself a reform candidate, attorney Thaddeus McCotter of Livonia is challenging incumbent county commissioner Maurice Breen, R-Plymouth Township, for the GOP 10th District nomination.

Breen, a former Plymouth Township supervisor, is one of several area officials involved in controversy for allegedly awarding contracts related to a Plymouth/Canton/Northville area sewer project to friends, relatives and political supporters.

"It's a question of public interest," said McCotter, a Schoolcraft College trustee. "I'm not saying these people are criminals, but you do expect more from your public officials." McCotter also said he wouldn't seek PAC contributions.

Breen was unavailable for comment, though involved parties have publicly denied the allegations. Allegations stemmed from a Detroit Free Press investigation earlier this year.

The commission district includes Plymouth, Northville, Plymouth and Northville townships and Livonia, west of Middlebelt.

WHILE THE 10th District race promises to be spirited, challengers so far are few in other area districts.

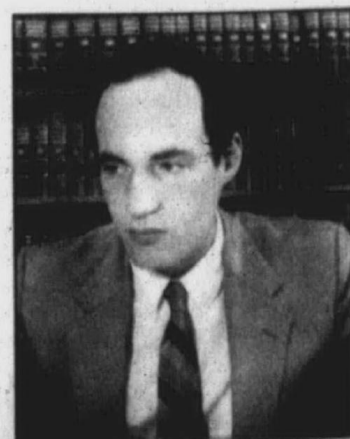
No candidates have filed for the new Redford/Dearborn Heights 9th District seat. The 9th District is represented by Kevin Kelley, D-Redford, who is leaving the commission to challenge incumbent Robert Ficano in the Democratic primary for county sheriff. The district also includes Livonia neighborhoods east of Middlebelt.

Incumbents Bryan Amann, D-Wayne, and Kay Beard, D-Westland, are the only candidates thus far to file in the 11th and 12th Districts. The 11th includes Canton. Garden City is part of the 12th.

Candidates have until 4 p.m. Tuesday, May 12, to file.

MCCOTTER HAS been a Schoolcraft trustee since 1989.

# Damage figures expected today

Luckily, no one was home when the twister struck.

"I've got a sense of humor," he said, shaking his head. "I can laugh about it now I won't be laughing about it later." On Friday afternoon, he was picking through his toppled trailer.

Bob McPherson's arm was cut by flying glass when a window in his trailer blew out.

"It just happened all of a sudden," said his wife, Gail McPherson.

Jim Maahs said he was cooking dinner about 3 p.m. watching the dark clouds come in from Ann Arbor. He heard a loud crash and looked outside to see "stuff flying everywhere."

"You almost felt like it was in the Wizard of Oz or something," said Maahs.

Newspapers and other debris was strewn throughout the park. The porch from one unit was flung several hundred feet into a pond.

When the funnel cloud touched down, the area was under a severe thunderstorm watch, meaning no tornado had been spotted. For Plymouth Hills residents, there was no warning and nowhere to hide.

"ALL OF A SUDDEN it developed and it hit. We got no warning," said Police Chief Carl Berry.

Somehow, Mark Caruso's Grant Drive mobile home escaped major damage. Neighbors' on both sides were destroyed. Caruso's tool shed, which sat beside his trailer, was

picked up and tossed into scrub brush 50 feet away. He was not home at the time.

"It's a good thing this didn't happen at midnight when everybody was in bed," he said.

On Friday, insurance adjusters were inspecting the damage. Utility company crews were restoring power where possible. Berry said that Thursday afternoon crews capped three gas leaks and an electrical short caused by the tornado.

Ruggirello picked up the tab for families forced to stay at the Red Roof Inn.

"We had about 15 adults and children. They started coming in between 10 p.m. and midnight," said inn manager Patty Rivard. "Some of them were pretty distressed. One man came in who told us he was picking his granddaughter up from the school bus stop near the park when the wind lifted the whole bus up."

"He was terrified. He could see it lift up off the ground. He was quite upset. Our desk clerk sat him down and gave him a cup of coffee. We had coffee brewing all night. Another guy said the floor of his trailer split in half, lifted up and fell back down," she said, adding that employees are making up care packages for the residents.

"We'll probably have some of them back tonight," she said Friday.

SOME RESIDENTS were upset that while the tornado touched down about 4 p.m., no siren sounded until 4:30 p.m.

Ed Burney of the National Weather Service said that during tornado season, April through September, residents shouldn't depend on sirens for tornado warnings.

They can't be predicted, he said. It's also not possible to pinpoint where they will touch down.

"Yesterday, our radar didn't show anything that indicated a tornado," he said. "For one thing, it was too close into us and it just didn't show anything. We do not try to predict when a tornado is going to touch down."

"We pick a general area, usually about 140 miles wide by 210 miles long, and we'll tell you that anywhere in that area, tornadoes or severe thunderstorms may form." The weather service issued a severe thunderstorm watch at 1:57 p.m. which was never upgraded.

Burney said people should "use a little human instinct in trying to protect themselves. Residents should not sit and wait for a siren," he said.

"If it doesn't work, you won't hear it anyway."

"If you know a watch is in effect, if you see weather conditions deteriorating, the sky getting dark and clouds rolling, that is when you should take the necessary precautions and head for shelter."

"Normally when the siren sounds it means a tornado is already on the ground."

The Red Cross served more than 100 families Thursday and Friday at a command center set up at the trailer park.

The twister knocked three under-construction trailers off their cinder blocks in a new section of the park. At least two buildings along North Territorial in Salem Township, including a metal barn, were collapsed by the winds.

Canton Police reported no serious damage in the storm, and Michigan State Police said they had no reports that the tornado touched down anywhere besides Plymouth Township.

# Witnesses describe storm's fury

Douglas Moody was in his tan Corvette, heading toward his driveway when he saw a huge whirling cloud coming directly at him.

"You could see it swirling around," Moody said. "It looked to be about 50 feet wide; it was just a big mess of skirting (from mobile homes) and shingles. It was definitely a tornado. I turned right around and took off the other way. I didn't want to get my car wrecked up."

Moody could smell gas leaking from ruptured lines. "The police asked me to help stop cars from coming in. It was exciting. At least no one got hurt really bad."

John Skachenko — who lives a few trailers away from the Grant Avenue mobile homes that were flipped over — bandaged the arm of an injured resident.

"I WAS ON MY PORCH, when all of a sudden the wind came up violently," he said. "Recycling bins that were full were flying all over the place. Everything was flying in every direction."

"Water lines were busted and gas lines were busted. I'd say it was two minutes max. It was here and it was gone."

When he realized a neighbor's home had been hit, Skachenko quickly went down the street. "I bandaged one guy's arm that was kind of gouged," he said.

"The experience was terrifying. I couldn't believe what was happening, really. Don't ever be in one of these."

Plymouth Hills resident Richard Sienkiewicz described the sound as "a big pop."

"I was sitting there when a big gust of wind came up. I heard a big pop like a gunshot. It was like a wall just popped."

"I ran around the house to see if I

had all my walls up. There was a plastic glass sitting on the sink and that landed on the floor. I could smell gas too."

Jane Thomas, who lives 100 feet from one of the demolished trailers, said she saw a column of gray approaching eastward from a green sky.

"All I heard was a real big bang, like thunder," she said, holding her trembling miniature chihuahua.

"My dogs were going nuts. Skirting and papers were flying all over. It was blowing real hard." No sirens sounded until 4:30 p.m., the Jackson Drive resident added. Her mobile home received minor damage.

Thomas said she ran out of her trailer and saw "totaled-out trailers. They were tipped over. The chains just snapped off cement bunkers like toys."

A 20-year-old woman who requested anonymity said "my heart stopped when I heard about it" at work at Twelve Oaks Mall.

"I COULDN'T GET here fast enough. I was going 85 on I-275; there were so many accidents," she said, dragging on a cigarette and walking as fast as she could toward her mobile home.

"It would be so sad to lose my house and everything I own, but I don't even care, as long as my mom and cat are OK."

When she got home, the woman found everything was fine, aside from the fact that her cat was cowering and the phone was out. Her mother wasn't home yet.

Betty Tanguay, whose trailer escaped severe damage, described the sound she heard as "a big roar. Everyone was screaming when they realized a tornado struck down. Four or five trailers were flipped over. All the garbage cans were blowing around and the electricity was going on and off. It was scary."

was just like pulling candles out of a birthday cake. We saw a couple dozen trees uprooted right before our eyes."

The ordeal lasted just two or three minutes, Mily said. "The tornado was moving eastward real fast. After it passed the trees, it dissipated. Then it picked up, went over the tree line and hit again near Godfredson Road."

There were no reported injuries. Cornstalks from a farm a quarter-mile away on Curtis Road were strewn about the course. So were green shingles. "We haven't figured out where they came from," said Mily.

"We think they came off a barn that was ripped up on Curtis a half mile away." Being so close to a tornado "is

probably a once-in-a-lifetime deal," said Mily. "I was afraid someone would get hurt. I haven't been worried like that in a long time. It's an experience I don't want to go through again."

Mily's wife Sandy, co-owner of the course, said she'd like to speak with the meteorologists who doubt that what hit was a tornado.

feel the tornado is awfully close, get out of the vehicle and get away from it. If a tornado can flip a mobile home, imagine what it can do to a bus or a car."

The reason shelter should be sought in a low area such as a ditch is because of airborne debris.

"Most of the people killed by tornadoes are killed by flying debris," said Burney. "If you are in a low area, it will shoot right over you, lessening your chance of getting hit."

If you are in a regular home during a tornado watch, the basement is the safest place. "If you don't have a basement, then go to a small, interior room. A bathroom or a closet is your safest place," he said.

"If you are in a trailer, the safest place is into a structure — a tornado

structure, a regular constructed home or a building."

FARRAND PRINCIPAL Ann Kuhn said students have been taught about what to do in case of a severe storm.

She was told a parent at the park

helped kids into the ditch. "You certainly would not want to be on a bus in a situation like that," she said. "Luckily, we have been doing tornado safety kinds of things. A year ago we had that big storm, and kids had to be under cover for quite awhile. So we've taken precautions."

## Meetings to be on cable

Live from Plymouth Township, it's Tuesday Night Live!

That introduction would be as appropriate as any other April 28, when the live or taped televising of township board meetings should begin, a candidate for township trustee said.

At the board meeting April 14, candidate K.C. Mueller asked township board members if they'd accept the televising of board meetings on local cable TV.

Most said they approved, and another candidate for township office, Kathleen Keen-McCarthy who's running for supervisor, met with an Omnicom representative last week.

Mueller said Keen-McCarthy's husband David has offered to learn how to operate a TV camera. "We're trying to find out if anyone from Plymouth Concerned Citizens would like to do it," Mueller added.

In February, when the township held a public hearing on cable TV service, Omnicom management said all that needs to happen to televise meetings is for someone interested to learn how to operate a camera, as equipment will be provided free.

THEN, SUPERVISOR Gerald Law said, "It's worth checking with residents to see if anybody's interested in watching the thing," possibly by soliciting opinions through the township newsletter.

The issue had not come back up for discussion among board members, until Mueller brought it up Tuesday.

She was scheduled to meet with township trustee Abe Munfakh at 4:30 p.m. today at the township office to talk about televising board meetings.

"I'm going to meet with Abe Munfakh as per (clerk) Esther Hulsing's suggestion," Mueller said.

"I would like the blessing of the board," she said, adding, "They can say no but we can do it anyway."

Keen-McCarthy said Omnicom told her they'd provide training, and all that was needed was a volunteer to pick up a camera and tripod and return it after the meeting.

"I think it makes the governmental process available to more people in the community," she said. "Many people can't get to a board meeting because they have other activities. It doesn't cost the taxpayers anything, it's been used successfully in other communities."

The Canton board has televised meetings for several years, while the city of Plymouth and the Plymouth-Canton schools do not televise meetings.

"I think it would be great," said school board president David Artley. "We used to do it on WSDP radio. It would give people access, especially some of the shut-ins, people who can't get to the meetings."

Artley said board members "have talked about it very informally."

Plymouth Mayor Robert Jones said the city commission is "giving it some very serious consideration," adding all that's needed is for a volunteer to step forward to pick up and run the camera.

Despite battling polio and its complications for the 42 years she lived, she was a cheerful, loving and devoted daughter, sister, aunt and employee, said her family and co-workers.

Sagar died April 2 at her parents' home in Canton of post-polio syndrome.

She was buried from Pawlus Funeral Home in Canton April 4 and buried at Knollwood Cemetery.

"HER HOSPITALIZATIONS, all told put back to back would have been measured in years. In the midst of all this suffering, she could have chosen bitterness. She could have soured on life," said the Rev. Bill Myers of Faith Moravian Community Church, who officiated at her funeral.

"I know from my experiences as a children's hospital chaplain that many of these children become spoiled and incredible manipulators.

Not her. She put all this stuff behind her. Her choice instead was to be warm.

"She experienced so much adversity, yet she was not selfish. She was generous and loving."

A 1968 graduate of Plymouth High School, Sagar was office manager at McMahon Helicopter in Canton.

Her co-worker, Mary Nachtweih, said Sagar made such a good impression she was hired the minute she walked in the door 6½ years ago.

"Sandy was totally devoted to her job. It meant a lot to her. She was more worried about her job and whether she was here than whether she stayed home when she was sick. You couldn't have gotten a more loyal employee."

"She learned a lot here and grew with the company. We miss her very

much; I miss her a lot. She was terrific."

Sagar was a March of Dimes poster girl for three years in La-Crosse, Wis., 1954-56.

She was Miss Sparkle for the United Foundation in Plymouth in 1966.

As an expression of her faith, Sagar often quoted the poem "Footprints in the Sand," said Myers. "That was the way she viewed God as helping her through her life."

Sagar lived in Florida for 12 years and worked as a girl Friday for a cable franchise. "She mastered all the technical ramifications of the cable operation, and became pretty much of a computer whiz at work," said Myers.

"At home, she was an avid lover of music. She had tapes and CD's all over the place.

"She was collecting crystal, and she was kind of a fragile person. I just wonder what sort of symbolism there was in the crystal."

Her sister, Vonnie Bench, said Sagar had a special relationship with her children. "She was able to relate to them like no other person on earth," she said.

### Senate OKs anti-stalking bill

An anti-stalking bill passed by the state Senate can't be used against newspeople who track news sources. "A prosecutor wouldn't touch it" if a reporter followed a township official to see if she actually resided in the township or elsewhere. "We've taken care of it two ways," said an aide to Sen. R. Robert Geake, R-Northville, sponsor of SB 719. "First there are constitutionally protected activities, such as reporting, protected by the First Amendment. Second, harrasing must have an illegitimate purpose."

Geake's bill provides for up to five years in prison and a \$10,000 fine. It was sent to the House Judiciary Committee. Most stalkers are male and most victims female, Geake said. Often stalking is a result of domestic violence. Geake said the bill, if enacted, would put teeth into court injunctions and restraining orders designed to keep stalkers away from their prey. "SB 719 will put teeth into what today are almost useless temporary restraining orders," Geake told the Senate. "The bill's passage will make Michigan the second state to give law enforcement officials this important tool to protect victims of stalkers."

**MY BACK HURTS. WHY DOES THE DOCTOR EXAMINE MY KNEE?**

Strain occupies a major role in the pain of arthritis. If you have a joint condition and come to your physician complaining of back pain, he may spend scant attention to it. Rather, he may conduct an examination of your knees and even take x-rays of them and not your lumbar spine. Back pain often results from knee arthritis. The doctor is correct when he examines places other than where you are aching. He is responding both to what you have just experienced and what he has learned from past training.

# Seminary still for sale

No matter how a court case is decided on the former St. John Seminary in Plymouth, the Archdiocese of Detroit plans to sell it.

"It's the intention of the Archdiocese to sell the property pending the resolution of the case," said church spokesman Richard Laskos. His comment followed U.S. District Judge Avern Cohen's action April 8, to continue a hearing on a dispute over the property.

Judge Cohen is expected to rule in the dispute as early as next month. In October 1990, the archdiocese terminated a \$5.5 million purchase agreement signed with Retirement and Health Services Corp. of Baltimore, Md., to convert the buildings into senior citizen housing.

**THE BALTIMORE FIRM** sued the church, charging it broke the purchase agreement, while the Archdiocese maintains it can legally end the agreement.

Shortly after the agreement was terminated, church officials said a new buyer had been identified. But during the past year, church officials say they haven't identified a potential buyer.

There has been speculation that Livonia's Ward Presbyterian Church was interested, as church officials toured the seminary in 1991.

And because Detroit Tigers owner Tom Monaghan is a high profile Catholic, there has been speculation he might seek to locate a new Tiger stadium on the property, near M-14 and I-275 and therefore accessible to metro Detroit motorists.

But former township supervisor Maurice Breen and the township board passed a resolution proclaiming no Tiger Stadium would be built there, to end speculation. "It's not the type of facility we encourage in Plymouth Township," he said then.

Does Retirement and Health Services Corp. still plan a facility there if they win the case? "I certainly would like to take a look at it again," said John Erickson, president of the firm.

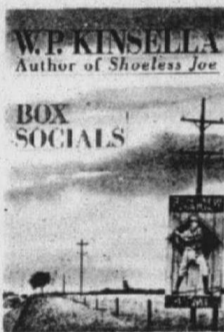
"I haven't talked to township officials for more than a year, I want to make sure where they would be on it," he said.

The 40-year-old seminary was closed in June 1988. The land is zoned residential, for one-acre or larger lots. Township officials have said a buyer could seek another use for the property, as it's not likely to go to a house builder.

Township officials last year assessed the site including buildings — 175 acres at Sheldon near Five Mile Road — at about \$3 million. Because the land is church-owned and tax exempt, sale to a private owner could mean around \$170,000 annually in new tax revenue for the township.

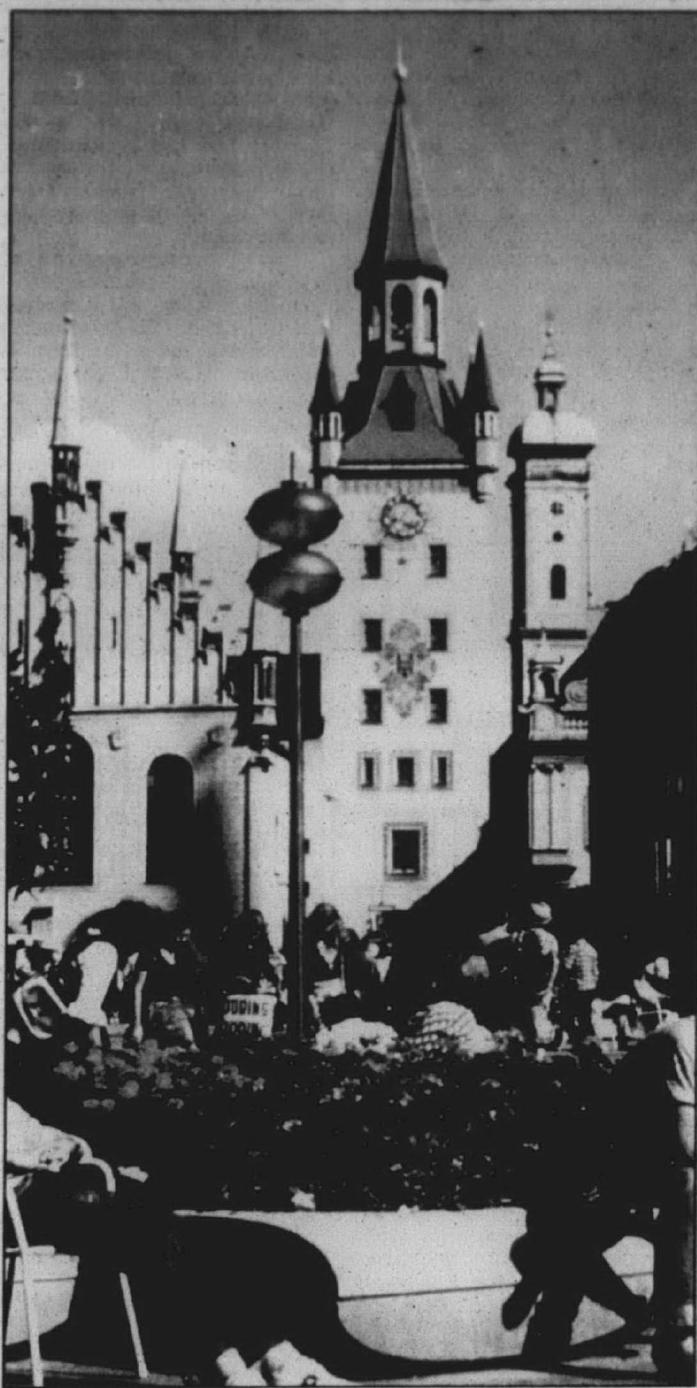

## CITY OF Superlatives

Art stretches her scepter over Munich and smiles

**M**unich is a paradox these days, one-and-a-half years after German reunification.

Long regarded as Germany's "secret capital" because it offers the most and best of nearly everything and, with a majority of Germans, according to surveys, wanting to live there if they could, the city and its burghers seem steeped in self-doubt now that a "real capital" — Berlin — is in the making.

Its inhabitants worry about reverting to the rather provincial image Munich had in the 1920s when Berlin was the cultural, scientific, commercial and political focal point of Germany, if not all Europe.

They fear being regarded as just a beautiful city, of which Thomas Mann wrote, "Art blooms, art reigns, art stretches her rose-clad scepter over this city and smiles." Indeed, art exhibitions, concerts and opera, always plentiful, seem to reach their peak during the spring.

Munich is clearly a city of superlatives: more culture, glitter, fashion, chic and conspicuous consumption, more restaurants per capita (one per 240 inhabitants), fine-food shops and open-air markets than any other city in Germany. Even its new airport, scheduled to open on May 17, is being hailed as the world's most efficient and convenient.

On the other hand, Munich also has the highest rents, the most exorbitant real-estate prices and Germany's densest and most choking traffic jams.

Despite, and maybe because of,

all this, Munich draws more visitors than any other German city. This year more than 3.2 million people are expected to visit.

### MUSEUMS AND ART

Only Berlin, with 32, has more major museums than Munich, and no other German city has as many commercial galleries — about 230.

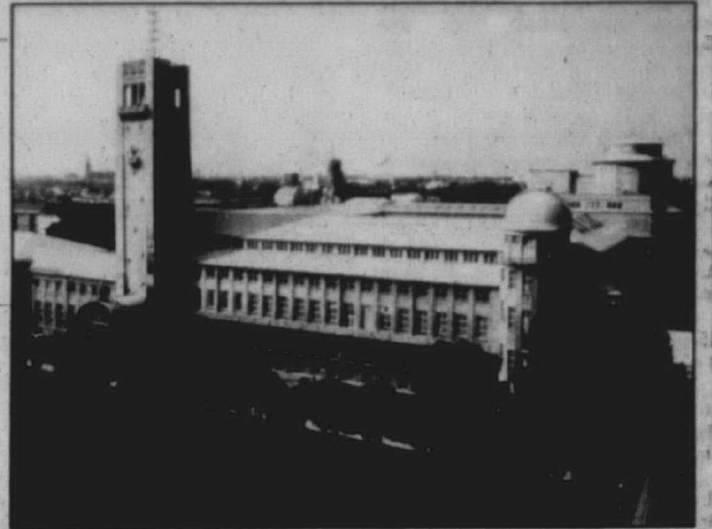
The newest museum is ZAM — Zentrum für Aussergewöhnliche Museen, which translates as Center for Unusual Museums, at 26 Westendstrasse. Unusual they certainly are: the world's first Pedal Car, Chamberpot, Bourdalou and Corkscrew museums, are among the seven under one roof.

Through next Jan. 10, ZAM has a special show, "The Wonderful World of Metal Toys," a collection of mechanical trains, cars, merry-go-rounds and animals from 1850 to 1950.

In May the Deutsches Museum, one of the world's largest science and technology museums, at Auf der Isarinsel, will open its new astronomy section. In a 10,000-square-foot area it will have exhibits on astronomical science from the earliest times to the latest research.

The Deutsches Museum is open daily from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Admission is \$5.30; \$1 for the planetarium. For more information call 21791.

The small, privately funded Jewish Museum, at 36 Maximilianstrasse, has a special documentary exhibition running to Aug. 27 on Raoul Wallenberg, the Swedish diplomat who saved the lives of tens of thousands of Hungarian Jews in 1944, when he was arrested by the Russians and disappeared in captivity.

The Jewish Museum is open Tuesday and Wednesday from 2 p.m. to 6 p.m.; Thursday from 2 p.m. to 8 p.m. Admission is free. For more information call 297453.

Munich's municipal gallery, the Städtische Galerie im Lenbachhaus, at 33 Luisenstrasse, will show 23 Multiples by Claes Oldenburg, dating from 1964 to 1990, until May 10. This will be followed from May 20 to July 5 by an exhibition of work by the American Catherine Lee.

MUSIC  
Mishaps continue to plague Munich's National Theater, which will be closed from July 31 to repair six miles of piping in the stage's new hydraulic system. Even some of the performances during the July 6 to 31 opera festival will be concert versions.

This spring's most exciting production will be Antonin Dvorak's "Dimitrij," directed by Tony Palmer, which had its Munich premiere recently and will continue as part of the repertory through April and May.

Concerts of note: New York Chamber Symphony, Gerard Schwarz conducting, Gil Shaham as violin soloist, on May 4; Bavarian Broadcasting Symphony Orchestra, Sir Colin Davis conducting, on May 8 and 9; Staatskapelle Berlin, David Zinman conducting, Sharon Sweet as soprano soloist, on May 14.

The Third Munich Biennale of New Music, an international festival founded by and under the direction of Hans Werner Henze, will be from April 29 to May 30. Ensembles taking part will be the Amsterdam Opera, Bremen Theater, Babarian State Ballet, Stuttgart State Theater and the Teatro Comunale di Florence.

Opera performances, concerts, discussions with avant-grade composers and exhibitions will be held all over the city, including the Gasteig Philharmonic Hall, Carl Orff Hall and Block Box Theater, the Theater am Gartnerplatz and Theater im Marstall.

Opera-festival tickets — very hard to obtain and best bought in the United States through a travel agent — range from \$15 for standing room under the roof to \$175. In Munich one either stands in line at the ticket office, at 11 Maximilianstrasse, or tries the hotel concierge.

## Ride back in history on the Orient-Express

The freckle-faced porter at our London hotel had already spotted the gleaming blue Orient-Express tags on our luggage.

As he tucked us into the cab headed for Victoria Station, he said wistfully:

"It's a trip that's really half in the mind, isn't it? I mean, that was the only way to travel back then, wasn't it? And all the grand people did it, didn't they?"

Indeed, for mature travelers the original Venice Simplon-Orient-Express provides a trip into the not-too-distant past, into the world of Edward VIII and Mrs. Simpson, F. Scott Fitzgerald, Lillie Langtry, Enrico Caruso, Harry Houdini, Mata Hari and Agatha Christie and her constant companion, the dandy Hercule Poirot.

Where travelers go on the Orient-Express is not as important as getting there. The trip itself provides the joy.

Since its inaugural run in 1883, the Orient-Express has been ballyhooed as "the train of kings and the king of trains."

This year, celebrating the 10th anniversary of its restored service, it again offers one of the world's greatest train rides.

The basic journey on the Orient-Express is in three sections: a two-

hour rail trip from London to the English channel port of Folkestone, a channel crossing and a grand rail journey southeast across Europe from Boulogne, France to Venice, Italy.

Out of London's Victoria Station, passengers may occupy reserved seats at luncheon tables on chocolate-and-cream color Pullman cars. These cars were built in the decades before World War II.

Perhaps travelers will ride in what was once Charles de Gaulle's private car or the one that carried the body of Winston Churchill in 1965. Restored now, the cars are a thick-carpeted realm of polished wood and shiny brass.

At Folkestone, passengers board the Sea Cat, a giant catamaran, for a 90-minute crossing of the Strait of Dover to Boulogne.

Waiting there, drawn up near the docks, are elegant blue-and-gold coaches — the sleepers, diners, bar car and crew cars — that make up the continental section of the Orient-Express.

These cars are the originals, restored to gleaming life. A plaque in each car gives its heritage.

The car we rode in was built in 1929 and served on the classy Train Bleu to the Riviera, on the Rome Express and on the crack Nord Express to Riga, Latvia. After serving as a hotel car for the German army in World War II, it resumed service on the Orient-Express.

The first-class accommodations consist of private compartments that turn into sleepers. The train has

space for 168 passengers. It's possible to get a good night's rest — the cars are comfortable and quiet — as long as passengers aren't afraid of upper berths and crawling up ladders.

Only a few compartments are outfitted as doubles; travelers must book well in advance to get them. The upper berths are warm at night. Our car had no air conditioning.

Interiors in the diners, as in the other cars, are inlaid wood and brass, with partitions in Lalique crystal.

Southbound, the train rolls through Dijon, France, and the vineyards of Burgundy by night. To see the fields, travelers must take the Orient-Express north. In that direction the train passes through the Alps by dark.

At dawn on the southbound trip, travelers can catch a glimpse of the Alps and taste a freshly baked croissant.

The train no longer goes through the historic Simplon Tunnel into Italy. Rather, it takes the more scenic Arlberg route to the north, through Zurich and Innsbruck, then dips south into Italy through the Brenner Pass.

From February through November, the Orient-Express leaves London for Venice at 11 a.m., usually twice a week. Arrival in Venice is approximately 7 p.m., the next night.

The northbound trip departs Venice at 10:50 the next morning.

The one-way fare is \$1,525 per person, based on double occupancy. Passengers may also book journeys to other points on the route — Paris, Zurich and Innsbruck.

Travelers age 60-plus and their companions age 50-plus can get 10 percent discounts on Orient-Express fares — as well as on airfare, stays in London and Venice and other tours — by joining British Airways' "Privileged Traveller" program for \$10 a year.

# We women must champion own causes

SOME PEOPLE, including some women, were ticked off that the Race for the Cure April 11 at the Detroit Zoo — a run/walk to fund breast cancer research — was limited to female participants.

I thought it was perfectly fine. It's high time women stepped up and took charge of their own issues. Sometimes there is a need to exclude men, if only for the publicity surrounding it.

That race, which drew 3,400 metro Detroit area women and raised close to \$78,000, is symbolic of a second wave of the Women's Liberation Movement, which now is hitting our suburbs.

The gains women made in the '60s and '70s have been absorbed, and many feel the status quo must be rattled once again.

Women can wait no longer for the

male establishment to get the message — particularly about women's issues. Women must create the changes themselves.

The issues are all around us — from abortion rights to potty parity, from child care at the work place to the routine coverage of mammography by all insurance companies.

RIGHT NOW the local spotlight is on potty parity — a bill introduced by state Rep. Jan Dolan, R-Farming-

ton Hills, and passed Tuesday by the House.

Now, the long lines at women's rest rooms are known to both men and women, but although men overwhelmingly outnumber women in the Michigan Legislature somehow it took a woman to provoke action.

"The lack of adequate commodes to accommodate women's needs results in long lines, physical distress and rightful annoyance," Dolan said.

The bill requires the installation of enough toilets to ensure equal speed of access to public restrooms for men and women in new or renovated theaters, galleries, restaurants, libraries, stadiums, amusement parks and passenger terminals.

If the nearly all-male Senate fails to OK it, just guess who will have voted against it.

THE KEY IS getting more women into the power structure.

Women wield the power in a number of our Observer & Eccentric communities. Three western Wayne County women represent residents in the state House. They are Lyn Bankes, R-Livonia; Justine Barns, D-Westland; and Georgina Goss, R-Northville.

In Oakland County: Billie Ireland is mayor of Rochester Hills; Sandra Draur, supervisor of West Bloomfield Township; Jean Stine just won election as mayor in Troy; and Penny Crissman, mayor of Rochester, has just announced she will seek the state House nomination from that area.

Women recently have won the top jobs at Oakland University and Oakland Community College, and female superintendents run the sizeable De-

troit, Pontiac and Southfield school districts.

Female members of the state House from Oakland County include Dolan, Maxine Berman, D-Southfield, Barbara Dobb, R-West Bloomfield, and Shirley Johnson, R-Royal Oak.

There are only three women in the state Senate, and both U.S. senators from Michigan and all U.S. representatives from Wayne and Oakland counties are male.

WHAT TO DO?

Join the local chapter of WAND. I know, you thought it stood for Women's Action for Nuclear Disarmament — and so it did. But then Desert Storm showed how obsolete war is and communism got sick and died.

WAND expanded to Women's Action for New Directions — focusing

on increasing women's political power and redirecting national priorities away from war and toward human and environmental needs.

WAND holds its annual Mother's Day brunch from 9 a.m. to noon Thursday, May 7, at The Community House in Birmingham, featuring national president Bobbie Wrenn Banks. Call 626-4332 for information and reservations.

Although women have come a long way from being identified only as mothers, that is still central to WAND's vision: "Children ask the world of us." Powerful women are needed to make that vision come true.

# House Dems charged with 'voodoo bookkeeping'

Local governments will get \$35 million in state aid a month later this fall amid some Republican charges of "voodoo bookkeeping."

The House of Representatives voted 65-30 to delay paying local units their cut of single business taxes. They'll be paid in October, the first month of fiscal 1993, instead of September, the last month of fiscal 1992.

"The compromise we worked out in committee will allow the state to bring its books for this year closer into balance," said Rep. Dominic Jacobetti, D-Negaunee, chair of the House Appropriations Committee.

"SMOKE AND mirrors," replied maverick Republican Rep. David Jaye of Utica. "It's like extending the fiscal year in the Milliken era."

"It's happened before," warned Rep. Tom Mathieu, D-Grand Rapids, a protector of community college

funding. "We deferred payments to the colleges, and the colleges never got it."

But Jacobetti insisted that "the local governments will be assured of their fall revenue sharing payments."

Jacobetti's panel rejected Gov. John Engler's proposal — to cut more than \$34 million from fiscal 1992 revenue sharing.

"We didn't think it was right to try and balance the state budget at the expense of the operating funds the

local governments rely on.

"The inconvenience of waiting a month for the money is small in comparison to the damage that would have been done to local services if the payments were eliminated altogether," he said.

## SC sponsors honors recital for students

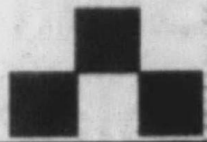
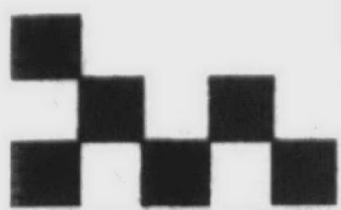

## Dip into bucket of tasty smelt

I long for these wonderful spring days. Gorgeous warm days sprinkled with the rays of the sun and cool nights, just right for a long, hearty after dinner stroll.

I also love this time of year because days like these beacon the proliferous smelt, long a delicacy of any Michigan sportsman.

In addition to being a tasty dish that can be prepared in a multitude of ways, smelt are also a major budget stretcher. They can allow the cook to prepare a meal for a large family and still have enough money left over for those delayed payment options now appearing from Christmas past. Expect to pay about \$1.50 per pound for fresh smelt.

**ANYWHERE ALONG** the Great Lakes in the metro area where you can find a beach, you can expect to see smelt dippers. Our weather this year has been nothing short of perfect. Department of Natural Resources spokespeople say if the weather holds out, this should be another bumper crop for the tiny delicacies.

Smelt are already appearing on many local grocers and fishmongers shelves, but in this sportsman's eye, a bucket just dipped from the still frigid waters, cleaned in the morning and fried in the evening, can't be beat.

Catching a few pounds of fresh smelt at your local grocery store will never beat the excitement of netting your own. Smelt dipping does not necessitate the experience and investment that regular fishing incurs.

**WATERPROOF WADERS** and a fine seine net, coupled with the ability to withstand a spring night chill are all that's needed to guarantee a good catch. Granted, Mother Nature does have something to say about weather conditions, but when the word gets out that "the smelt are running," a net and waders are all that's required. No boats, no poles, no bait, no lines, no lures.

Whereas a flashlight and/or lantern are optional equipment, you won't be alone. If the night is right, and the moon shines full, expect to fill those buckets with minor effort.

When it comes to preparation, smelt are just about as easy to prepare as they are to catch. A bucket can easily be cleaned in no longer than the time it takes to cook them. Simply remove the head behind the gills and slit the belly removing the entrails, rinse and cook. Of course, smelt purchased from your local market will probably have the first two tasks taken care of.

James Beard once said he preferred his smelt deboned, but to any Great Lakes angler, the bones are so tiny that it seldom necessitates deboning.

**SMELT FREEZES** well and to this day I remember milk cartons drunk of their contents and filled with smelt and water, and then frozen for many a Friday smelt fry.

Smelt are, in my opinion, best when coated with fine cracker crumbs and lightly fried for a few minutes in hot oil. For the more health conscious, they can be baked or broiled with minimal effort.

Anyone who considers themselves a smelt aficionado knows about the tasty smelt fries available at the legendary Bluebird Inn in Leland. There, the smelt is dipped in a lighter-than-air batter and fried until golden. With the recipes inside, you, too, can make a delectable pan fried or batter fried smelt, again, keeping costs down and efforts minimal.

Look for smelt fries now being offered at various churches and restaurants. A little closer to home, and a personal favorite of mine, is Frank's Bar in Wyandotte which also specializes in a wonderful pan fried perch. It's a shot and beer joint, and they only serve on Fridays. It's well worth the wait.

## Stretch wine dollars with values

True, many wines are too expensive. What historically was the common man's beverage, wine has taken on value-laden terms like "premium" — credited to the California wine industry. Once every cork-finished bottling acquired the name premium, the "super-premiums" became the sought-after pours.

Today, there are so many super-premiums, that the chic 1990s term is "ultra-premium." Are these terms a guarantee of high quality or merely a sales gimmick? Are these loaded sales terms persuasive marketing devices for the uninitiated wine drinker?

**OUR ANSWER** is "yes" because with each succeeding tier of supposed quality, the price rises significantly. A \$40 chardonnay? That's ultra-premium pricing that is frequently not backed by ultra-premium taste.

What has happened to an everyday wine — the stuff we used to call jug wine? First of all "jug" is a wine reference that makes us sound cheap. As Americans, we don't want to pay a lot, but we don't want to appear cheap!

Today's premium wines are yesterday's jug wines. They are cork finished and the good news is that there's a host of good ones available locally. In today's tough economic times, it is still possible to please

both palate and purse.

High-quality \$5 bottles of wine are few and far between, so we're looking at palate pleasure all under \$10 in our recommendations. We've placed the real winners as Wine Selections of the Week.

To heighten your spirits, we're starting off with two Latvian bubblys, produced like the best French champagnes and California sparklers from grapes grown in the Crimes. Riga Brut and Riga Bravo (both \$9) are not only tasty sparkling pours, but the Riga Brut still has the old "Cobetckoe" label. Now that the Soviet Union is dissolved and Latvia has regained independence, the bottle is a collector's item!

**WHILE WE** champion the "buy American" sentiments, we have to lay some of the blame for the high price of domestic wines squarely on

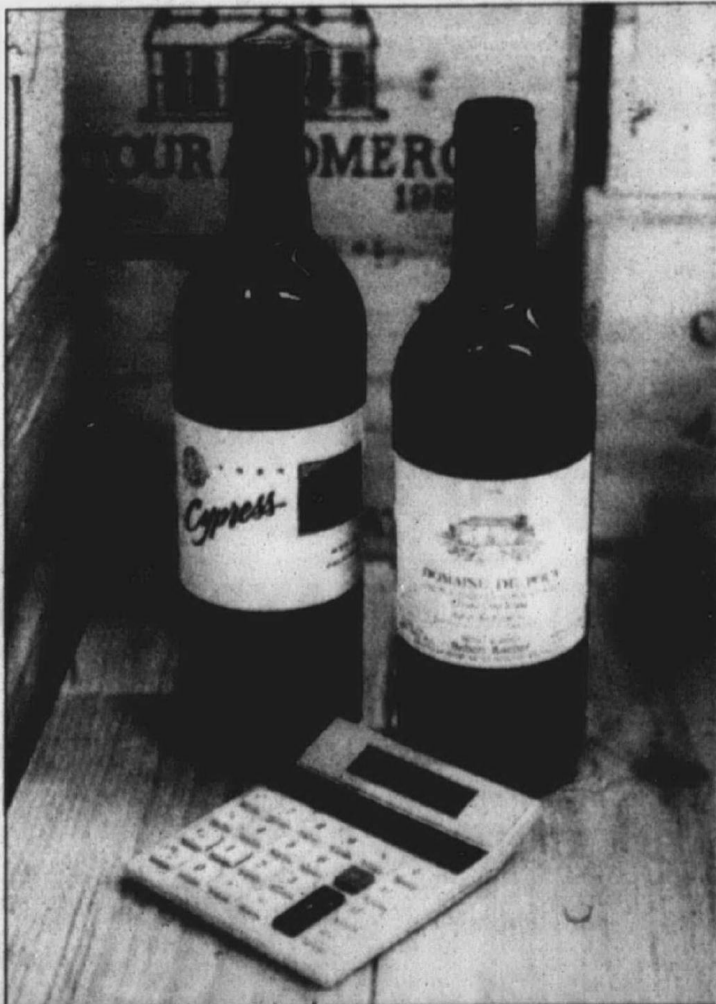
the shoulders of California producers and their myopic view of wine purchasers. The majority of North Coast wine producers have generally ignored the segment of the market seeking wines under \$10 per bottle.

This is not true of The Monterey Vineyard. Here sights are focused on this majority section of wine drinkers. The Classic White and Classic Red wines are flavorful and generous for around \$6.50. The Monterey Vineyard vintually labeled bottlings can be purchased for around \$9 and represent true expressions of the grape variety.

The same can be said of Bel Arbors wines, Fetzer Vineyard's second label. The reds in the Bel Arbors line are the best buys. Equally quality-price conscious are the offerings from Foppiano Vineyards bottled under its second label Riverside Farms.

French country wines or "Vin de Pays" are some of the best values available. They originate principally in the region known as the Languedoc-Roussillon and carry the following major viticultural regions on the label — Coteaux du Languedoc, Cotes du Roussillon, Vin de Pays d'Oc, Corbieres and Minervois. The 1989 and 1990 bottlings from these regions are very tasty buys.

White wines (1990 vintage) from the Cotes de Gascogne (Gascony region of France) are crisp and delicious. Drink these wines young because they quickly lose their freshness.

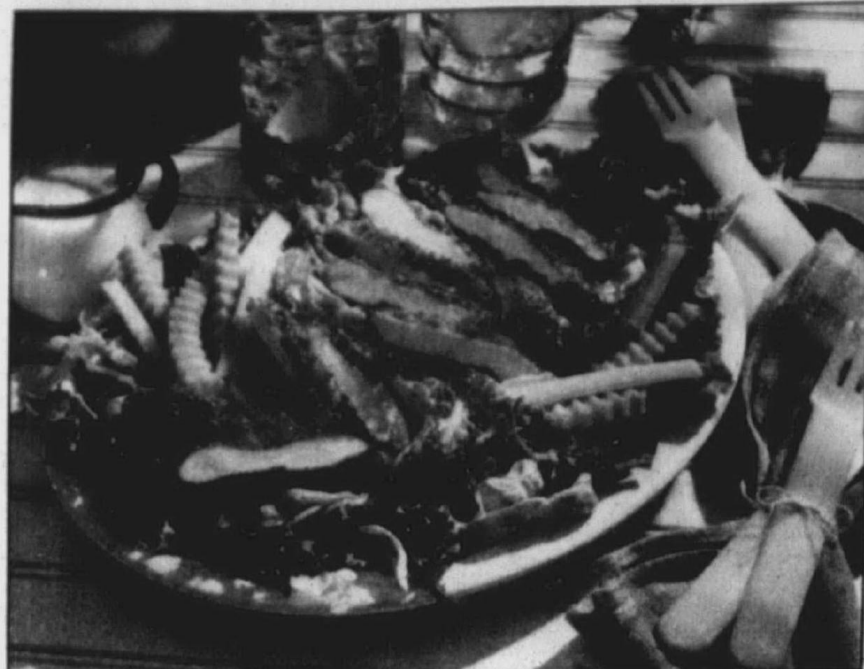

ness in cosmetics. Other members of her household are her daughter Madeline Worscheck, 38, an accountant; Madeline's husband Rick, 40, who is starting a lawn-care service; and the two Worscheck daughters, Monique, 7, and Misty, 17.

"With the size of our household, it doesn't take long to go through (groceries)," said Barnes, a widow.

THE HUGE store resembles a typical utilitarian warehouse, with rows of tall shelves, filled with merchandise. Hi-lo drivers, beeping horns and flashing lights, regularly arrive with more stock.

Barnes is armed with shopping list and pencil to calculate prices.

A 12-roll package of Bounty paper towels, at \$9.90 averages 82 cents a roll. A twin-pack of Cheerios, 35 ounces, is priced at around \$5.65.

Boneless chicken breast, \$9.49 for

a 4-pound package, breaks down to around \$2.35 per pound.

Potential warehouse shoppers must be approved for membership and are issued an I.D. card. Business members receive certain perks, such as special shopping times.

PACE charges all members an annual \$25 fee, and everyone pays the wholesale prices posted in the stores.

At Warehouse Club, business members pay a \$25 annual membership fee and shop at the posted

wholesale price.

People who belong to a qualifying group pay no membership fee; they pay 5 percent above the wholesale price. These groups include certain large companies, labor unions, banks and credit union members.

GROUP MEMBERS of Warehouse Club can upgrade to paid membership. People over age 55, or members of American Association of Retired Persons, pay a \$15 membership fee.

# Flip over pancakes for breakfast, lunch or dinner

A pancake should be more than a sponge to soak up butter and syrup. A pancake should be tender, slightly moist and moderately dense. A bad pancake tastes like raw dough or cardboard and has a texture that's gummy, tough and chewy.

Pancakes lend themselves to many occasions, as an hors d'oeuvre, for breakfast, lunch or dinner, or to glamorize leftovers. Pancakes are very versatile, you can stuff, roll or glaze them.

Making pancake batter yourself is just as easy as a mix, besides homemade tastes better. If you are interested in lower fat, calories, cholesterol and sodium, make your own batter and leave out the egg yolk, salt, sugar and some of the fat. Use skim milk as the liquid.

Buttermilk gives the pancake a little tang and makes them extra tender. Making these changes will make the batter a little thinner but then you will be, too.

No matter what name you use,

blintzes, crepes, flapjacks, johnny-cake, griddlecakes or batter cakes, they are all made with a thin mixture called a "pour batter." This means that the liquid and dry ingredients are about equal and they are just wet enough to be pourable.

Pour batters are usually classified as a quick bread because they do not use yeast as the leavening agent. The exception is the popular Russian blini which is a yeast-risen buckwheat pancake. These are usually made in a smaller size and are topped with sour cream and chutney, sour cream and herring, smoked trout or with butter and caviar.

There are three very important things to have to make the perfect pancake.

First, the consistency of the batter is important. Dry ingredients such as flour, baking powder or soda, salt, sugar and other spices are blended together, mix the liquid ingredients together, and quickly add into the dry ingredients. Then just give it a

few quick strokes to moisten the dry ingredients. A batter bowl which is a large liquid measuring cup is a very convenient way to make pancake batter, as it can be easily poured from this on the griddle.

Forget about the lumps, do not overbeat! For just a basic pancake recipe, for best results mix the dough and then let it rest, covered and refrigerated the night before. If the batter gets too thick, dilute with a little water, if too thin add a little flour. For a very light and delicate finished product separate the eggs. Beat the yolk with other liquids and beat the egg whites to fold into the batter as the last step.

**THE SECOND** important item to remember is the surface of the griddle or pan you're using. If you have a new griddle or pan it may need to be seasoned before using. If the pan you are using isn't reserved just for pancakes and it isn't seasoned, you'll have to add a little oil during preheating.

The third important point is the evenness of the heat. Always pre-heat the griddle. Test the griddle by dropping a few drops of cold water, the water should bounce and sputter. If the water sits there and boils the griddle is not hot enough. A pour batter will spread in a widening circle until set by heat. When the bub-

bles appear on the upper surface, the cake is ready to turn over. If it is bubbling only in one area of the pancake, the heat is not evenly distributed, check your heat source.

Pancakes are turned over once. Serve them at once but if this is not possible put a towel on a cookie sheet and make sure the pancakes are separated. Place in a 200 degree oven until ready to serve. Don't stack them on top of each other without a cloth between or the steam they produce will make them all flabby.

**FRENCH PANCAKES** or Crepes are served as a snack, for lunch, a supper dish or a dessert depending on the flavoring. Mixtures for crepes include chopped tomatoes and onions, sausage and cheese, grated cheese and crumbled bacon, asparagus or thin sliced smoked ham or turkey, or spread with just plain jelly and butter.

A crepe needs to be beaten until smooth, rest the batter for at least

one hour, reblend batter and cook until set, turn over cook until done. Do not stack until completely cooled. After they are completely cooled, stack, wrap in foil refrigerate or freeze for later. Frozen crepes should be thawed in a cool oven.

Blintzes are a more lengthy process, however they can be made a day ahead and when you're ready to serve, brown quickly and serve hot. They are also higher in calories since they are browned on one side, filled and fried again to brown the outside.

The batter can be seasoned or add chopped nuts, candied fruits, wheat germ or flaked bran. Let the cereal or fruit rest in the liquid for about half an hour before cooking for best results. A lower calorie batter is very easy to do, and also cut down on the butter and syrup when eating. No matter, whenever you eat pancakes make sure they are perfect and a real taste treat, something different for dinner.

## Pan-fried smelt springtime treat

**BEER BATTER FOR SMELT**  
2 1/4 cups flour  
1 teaspoon baking powder  
1 small clove garlic, finely minced  
black pepper  
about 1 cup beer

Sift together the flour and the baking powder. Add garlic and a twist of the peppermill, about 1/4 teaspoon. Add just enough beer to make a batter, whisking with a wire whisk until smooth.

To cook smelt: Heat oil in fryer to about 375 degrees. (An electric skillet or deep-fat fryer works best, as will an electric wok). Dip smelt in batter and drop into hot oil. Cook, stirring occasionally until golden brown, about two minutes. Drain on

paper towels and serve immediately.

### CRACKER COATING FOR PAN FRYING

Chef's note: Momma always used Drake's batter mix both in it's dry form and as a wonderful ready-to-make batter, but this recipe is just as easy.

2 cups saltine cracker crumbs, finely crushed  
2 eggs, beaten  
1/4 teaspoon freshly ground pepper  
2 tablespoons butter or margarine  
2 tablespoons peanut or olive oil

Combine the cracker crumbs with the pepper and mix well. Dip the smelt in the egg wash, roll in crumb mixture, gently dip in egg wash again and re-roll in crumbs. Set coated smelt on waxed paper lined plate until ready to pan-fry.

To pan-fry, heat butter or margarine in a heavy skillet until butter begins to sizzle. Stir in oil and add

coated smelt, being careful not to crowd the skillet. Cover over medium high heat for 2 minutes. Turn smelt over and continue to cook for 2 more minutes. Drain on paper towels and serve immediately.

For a wonderful addition, add 1/4 cup slivered almonds to the skillet while cooking the smelt.

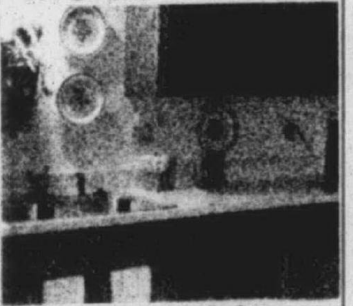

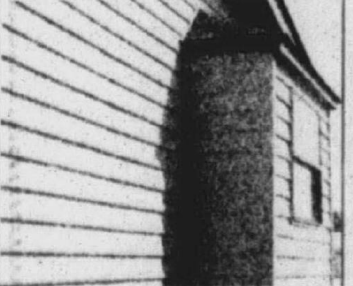

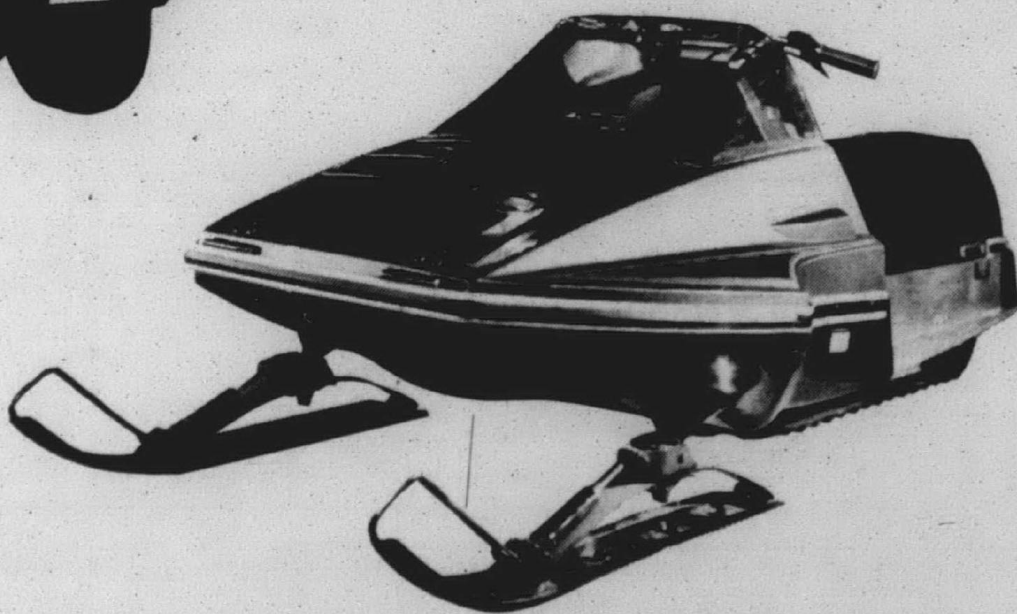

## No Hazy days in L.A.

### Band chooses to stay home in Detroit

Their bags were packed and ready to go, L.A. was outside their door. But Grady Hazy was smarter than that.

They could see through the smog, peer beyond the pretension and realized broken dreams and psychic fallout was what Los Angeles was all about. Grady Hazy came to their senses and stayed put in Detroit.

"The whole L.A. scene turned us off," said Alexander Scott, the band's guitarist and vocalist who was one of the leading proponents for the group to head west only a year ago.

Oh, there were other factors that turned the minds of Grady Hazy from California-dreaming into Midwest realism.

For one, the band didn't have the money to fulfill their destiny. Also, Scott said they got a good deal to record at The Disc in Detroit.

And, yes, Scott is quick to add, he got a good job here after receiving his degree in industrial design from the Center of Creative Studies.

THINGS HAVEN'T been so bad in the less surreal, more subdued Detroit area, really.

Grady Hazy has a new bass player, an accomplished musician from Germany named Svez (replacing Alan Wigley). Club owners are calling them for bookings and they've just released a self-titled four-song EP.

Four-song releases are usually to be mentioned in passing, often an interim project produced as a hint of things to come from a soon to be released all-encompassing major studio effort.

Grady Hazy is holding up their EP as a testament to their quest of mixing the most divergent styles — from reggae to thrash to pop — into four separate containers of virulent, evocative musical statements.

On "Grady Hazy" (Chaos Network), guitarist Terry Trout, drummer Mick Stone and Scott build solid structures using some of the aforementioned styles only to reveal in their subsequent self-immolation within the base of the song.

Normally this would lend itself to a discordant, wholly fractured sound. Grady Hazy has mastered subtlety in their two-year existence, playing the tautness between a deliberate reggae-like pulse and the impulsiveness of a thrash guitar solo as in a number like "Lost Space" to ear-rendering extremes.

As a result, a semblance of a melody swaggers forward or an engaging lyric protrudes through the fray. There's nothing homogeneous here, no "Grady Hazy" sound per se.

At the very least Grady Hazy's songs ferment in their diversity, laying vulnerable to a complete re-interpretation at the whims of their creators. Band members, who all contribute in the songwriting effort, like it that way.

THE PROCESS of composing such material is obviously very painstaking, though.

"Maybe that emphasis (on completely different songs) is why we're only coming up with one

new song a month," said Scott, providing insight to why the band released four-song EP. "To come up with substantive ideas, we scrap a lot of stuff. We're very critical of ourselves.

"There's a lot of pulling and tugging, but it's worth it."

A solid recording project should auger well with an established stage presence. Grady Hazy has long been lauded for their frenzied live shows in this area.

The band kicks off a series of shows in the area, starting Friday,

April 24, at Blondie's in Detroit in support of the new EP.

"We get really wild onstage," Scott said. "We don't smash our instruments. Even if we could afford to buy new ones, we wouldn't smash them."

L.A. can wait.

While I find it horrid that we, as a society, chastise our own friends, family and neighbors who may be gay (as this causes needless suffering and helps nobody), I wonder whether homosexuality is a product of low self-esteem or neuroses based in childhood (as Ellis hypothesized).

What do you think? How would one, especially a virgin such as myself, "learn" to become heterosexual? I'm anxiously awaiting your answer!

P.S. I'm not religious and do not suffer from homophobia as far as friends are considered. I just fear the way society treats homosexuals and want to have the benefits of a "straight" relationship and marriage (including children).

I can't tell you in words how much agony this problem has caused me.

Yours is another courageous letter; I am honored to have received many in the past year.

Books have been written on the topic of homosexuality and its causes. Most recently a theory was developed by Simon LeVay, a biologist at San Diego's Salk Institute. He found that a small section of the brain in the gay men he studied was like the same section in women, and different from straight men's. He concludes from this research (it is very controversial) that homosexuality is genetically predetermined.

This position (not necessarily the research) is the official position of P-FLAG (Parents and Friends of Lesbians and Gays). They cite such statistics as the historically constant

percentage of homosexual men in the population as proof.

A different viewpoint has been put forth by various psychotherapists, most notably Charles Socarrides in New York. He says that he has successfully treated men like you who were highly motivated to be straight.

My own opinion is that the complicated nature/nurture equation is at work here as it is in most other aspects of human development. The relative impact of inheritance and environment is not measurable and is probably different for each of us. Often, motivation accounts for the difference.

At present, your anxiety is blocking you from any real enjoyment in life, whether as a gay person or a straight person. Some people have gotten stuck in this position. It is painful and scary to begin the journey of self-knowledge, but it also offers the possibility of eventual relief. You will need a guide on this journey and so I recommend that you begin seeing a therapist.

In your letter, you stress that you are highly motivated to be heterosexual and live a conventional lifestyle. Your high motivation may put you in that group for which intensive psychotherapy has resulted in a heterosexual rather than homosexual orientation.

In most responses, I would say that the therapist should be unbiased. In your instance, I am sensitive to your goal and therefore recommend someone who truly believes it is possible to achieve it. The attitude of the therapist contributes greatly to the outcome.

# 'The Babe' goes down swinging

After all these years, Hollywood still hasn't learned how to make movies about America's favorite pastime. "The Babe," the new biography of slugger George Herman Ruth, strikes out despite the best efforts of star John Goodman.

The amazingly versatile actor has the size, good nature, and depth to play a convincing Bambino. Unfortunately, he is saddled with a script so full of standard baseball clichés that "The Babe" never makes good on its promise.

The movie opens with sweeping aerial shots of Yankee Stadium, often called "the house that Ruth built." Cinematographer Haskell Wexler lovingly careers over the seats and around the bases.

We are then thrust into grainy, sooty images of Ruth's early years at a Baltimore correctional facility for boys. The other kids mercilessly tease the ox-like Ruth until he picks up a bat and slugs a ball squarely through a church window.

THE REST of the film covers the basic periods of Ruth's up-and-down career, from record-breaking seasons with the Red Sox and Yankees to his waning years with the Braves. When he applies to be manager, his reputation as "incorrigible" catches up with him.

The movie has all the psychological answers: Rejection as a child, especially from his mother, fuels the problems that make Ruth nothing more than a grown-up baby. He wants to give children the love he missed. Dressed in a long fur

coat, he piles kids into his expensive car and buys them new shoes. One little girl asks if he's Santa Claus.

And of course, there's the legendary story where Babe hits two homers for a dying boy, handled here in the schmaltziest manner possible.

At home, Babe's taste for the high life in the city costs him his country-loving first wife (Trini Alvarado). He finds a more understanding mate in a former Ziegfeld showgirl (Kelly McGillis.)

Aside from the superb "Eight Men Out," baseball movies rarely let the sport speak for itself. Much of Ruth's time on the field is depicted in faked newsreel clips, slightly sped up, showing his lumbering skip around the bases. It would have been more interesting to run actual footage of Ruth, since we're seeing him basically from the stands anyway.

DIRECTOR ARTHUR Hiller delivers more corny scenes at the plate. We watch Babe swing in slow motion, hear the crack of the bat, then take in the awed expression of the fans, including fresh-faced rookie Lou Gehrig who says, "he really is a God." Give us a break.

"The Babe" didn't necessarily have to rewrite the book on baseball movies, but it should give us a brighter picture of the golden days of the game. This image of the Babe is no different than that found on any baseball card — two-dimensional and very flat.

# Looking the image helps make a band

Lucy's Alibi deems itself an alternative band, but a lot of their material comes across in the spirit and style of the late '60s.

They are a band that is just beginning to make its way onto Detroit and Canada's alternative sector.

"There are so many variables that go into choosing for your band members, it's not how well that they play. That is a real small factor, even though they should play well," said Keith Walsh, bassist and vocalist and founder of the local band.

"They have to look the image, have their own resources and be dependable. That is a real hard trait to find among musicians."

The look Walsh speaks of is visible in Lucy's Alibi's latest video, which is running on the Livonia Access Channel 13's "Half Hour Bower Hour." The video show features four of the band's songs: "Looking for Lucy," "A 100,000 Volts of Donna's Love," "Carol Ann" and "To the Bone."

All four songs are from the band's demo tape, "Where Were You When," which has led to some local gigs at places like Jamie's on 7, Walsh said.

THEIR SOUND is an exotic conglomerate of the new and old. At times, they sound like the Kinks, the Knack, the Smiths and the Clash all loosely rolled into one.

This comes out, in part, because of

the multiple talents of each member. Ken Talbot, lead guitarist, believes in a direct approach to the instrument, citing Adrian Belew, Robert Fripp and Joe Satriani as influences. Robbie Vince, keyboardist, has a background playing Top-40 music and started out in the band playing guitar.

Tony Mitchell, who handles drums and back-up vocals, is the most seasoned musician in Lucy's Alibi having performed in a number of blues bands including Code Blue and Allisha and Allies.

Although they concentrate a considerable amount of their efforts on original material, they also rework their cover repertoire to give it their own trademark.

For instance, they do a reggae version of Jimi Hendrix's song "Fire," also a New York Dolls' version of the Beatles' "I Saw Her Standing There."

Considering the divergent nature of these remakes they come across — for the most part — with a new enhanced flair.

Whether it's the hard driving "jungle beat" derived from Mitchell's syncopated drumming, the direct and permeating guitar of Talbot, the lambent keyboards of Vince, or the structural bass of Walsh, Lucy's Alibi has put together a broad approach to alternative music.

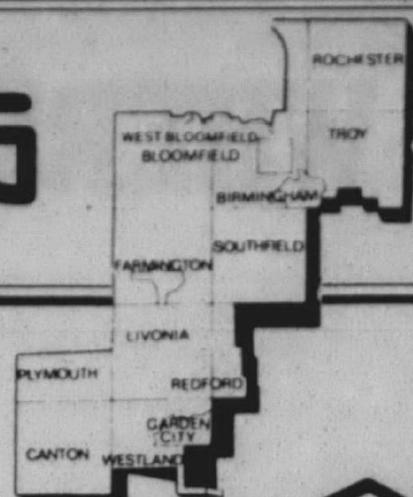

**Bowlers plan for banquet season**

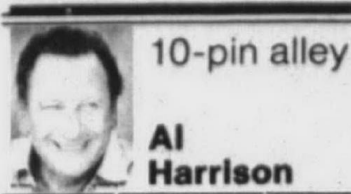

# Dual worlds collide for 'Miss Rose White'

## Divided family clashes on reunion

Rose White arranged her life to fit the postwar American dream, complete with an advancing career at Macy's and the New York nightlife with the boy next door. But a family reunion shatters her illusions and returns her heritage. The Hallmark Hall of Fame presentation "Miss Rose White" airs Sunday, April 26, on NBC.

During the week, Rose (Kyra Sedgwick) climbs the Manhattan ladder alongside her Midwestern beau (D.B. Sweeney) and her fashionable friends. Every Friday night, however, Rose White reverts to Rayzel Weiss and goes to Brooklyn to share the Sabbath with her Polish Jewish family. She has kept her dual worlds separate, her stern haberdasher father, Mordechai (Maximilian Schell), never visits her apartment and knows nothing of her Americanized identity. Rose enjoys practicing the Old World rituals with her loving aunt and uncle (Maureen Stapleton and Milton Selzer), but she is equally comfortable in her workaday ethnic denial.

Then Mordechai announces that Rose's long-lost sister Lusia (Amanda Plummer) has been rescued from a concentration camp and is coming to America, where she will live in Rose's apartment. Sketchy memories are triggered in Rose's mind of the separation from her now-deceased mother when she was 4 years old, and anxiety arises from the feeling that the Yiddish-speaking Lusia has no place in the world of career girl Rose White.

Lusia brings with her the answers to matters Rose had never questioned. Why did Mordechai leave his wife and Lusia behind when he and Rose immigrated to America, and more importantly,

what were their fates in Poland? The exposure of family secrets and shame that left heartbreaking chasms between father and daughters creates an intense drama that will leave no viewer unmoved.

Barbara Lebow's play "A Shayna Maidel" (A Pretty Maiden) was the source material for the teleplay, which was penned by Anna Sandor. According to executive producer Marian Rees, Sandor, whose mother narrowly escaped her Nazi captors while en route to a death camp, brought a "sense of integrity" to the project.

Rees chose Richmond, Va., for the settings of Manhattan, Brooklyn and Poland because of its varied ethnic base and its suitable architecture. (An old tobacco warehouse was used for an Ellis Island-type immigration center.) She gives credit to the detail-minded costumers and art department, and especially cites the artful composition of director Joseph Sargent, who worked wonders with the limitations of the locales. "We had a great opportunity to create not only the look but the authentic sense of people and place," Rees says.

Kyra Sedgwick ("Born on the Fourth of July," "Mr. and Mrs. Bridge") creates a believable Rose whose guarded assimilation into American society transforms into a fervent desire to reclaim her past. She learns forgiveness, acceptance and that her father was wrong when he claimed all he could give her was his name. Maximilian Schell ("The Man in the Glass Booth") constructs an intense man who's sealed years of unspoken grief and pain within a hard exterior. But Amanda Plummer, the acclaimed actress of stage ("Agnes of God"), screen ("The Fisher King") and television ("L.A. Law"), is most memorable as the catalyst Lusia whose abandonment and suffering have not stifled her compassion. For as Lusia tells her sister, despite the years and miles, "Love never dies."

### Carlin back on HBO for live performance

Counterculture comedian George Carlin, who in the 1960s created stand-up characters such as the "Hippy-Dippy Weatherman," says his material is "absolutely not" relaxing into mainstream humor. "If anything has happened," he says, "the mainstream has come to me."

*George Carlin Live at the Paramount*, which will air live from the Madison Square Garden theater on Saturday, April 25, is Carlin's eighth HBO special since 1977. He reports that among the topics touched on will be "man's psychosexual need to prove his potency by fighting wars, and golf courses for the homeless, which is an attack on the upper class."

The former radio disc jockey began his stand-up career in 1960, developing his style in folk clubs and coffeehouses. The late '60s brought much exposure on TV, and the first of many successful comedy albums. His ultimate goal of acting was best realized with his role in *Bill & Ted's Excellent Adventure* and its sequel, and then a fine turn in *Prince of Tides*.

Carlin derives his humor largely from the redundancies and oversimplifications of language. The social commentator strikes out against censorship and is amused by politics.

"I look on politics as a blood sport and high theater, and I enjoy it the same way I enjoy watching auto racing," Carlin says. "I'm in it for the accidents."

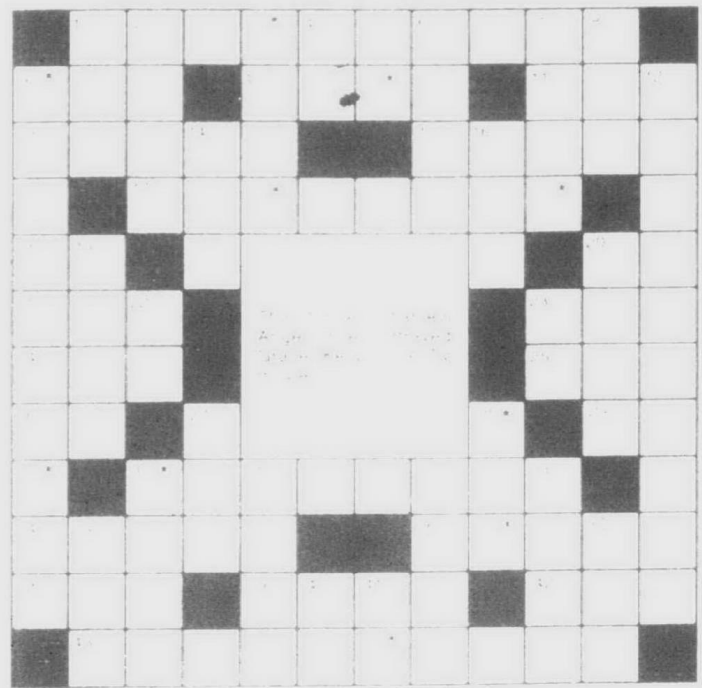

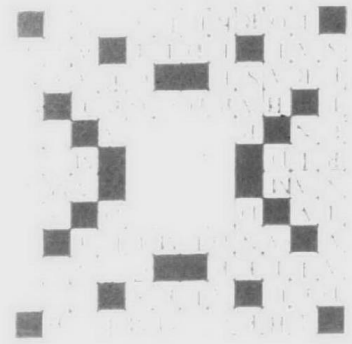

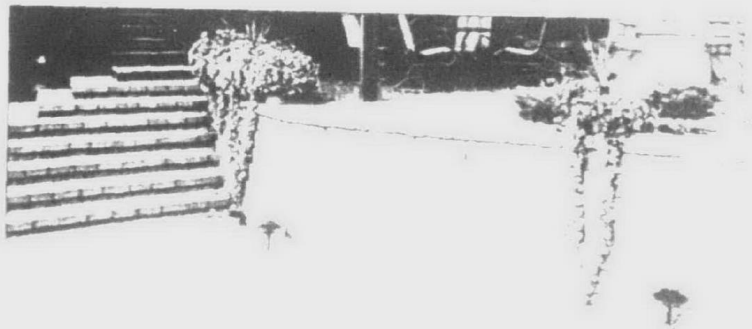
