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

## Post office restores services



To get service cuts restored to the downtown post office, city officials have been bending the ear of a U.S. congressman running for reelection. Their strategy worked. But city officials say customers can help by continuing to use the downtown facility.

If Plymouth folks don't use the downtown post office, they could lose it.

That's the message from city manager Steve Walters, who with city commissioner Bill McAninch recently won some service restoration for

the Penniman Avenue post office.

"We're extremely pleased," McAninch said. "It will have an immediate impact on traffic in the business area."

Walters and other commissioners said they feared that service cutbacks in recent months at the downtown post office could give the postal ser-

vice a reason to close it.

That's because service cuts could force postal customers to go to the new facility in Plymouth Township. And reduced use could be pointed to as a reason to close the downtown post office.

Those service cutbacks included the closing of the post office from 1:30-2:30 p.m. each weekday and removal of some equipment to serve customers.

McAninch and Walters have talked in recent weeks to U.S. Rep. William Ford, D-Taylor, about restoring ser-

vice, saying a post office on Penniman helps downtown businesses and is convenient for residents.


Ford is running for reelection to the House, in a new district that includes Plymouth.

McAninch said on Tuesday that the meetings with Ford — and the congressman's subsequent contact with U.S. Postal Service officials — have produced some results.

A Oct. 21 letter from the postal service listed several actions to restore service at the downtown post office:

## Band parents say pay-to-play has struck sour note

Yellow-jacketed Plymouth Canton Music Boosters balked en masse at Monday's school board meeting at the newly-enacted "pay for play" requirement.

In addition to making cuts and pink-slipping employees, the board of education launched a pay-for-play policy, charging \$60 per high school student per sport or extra-curricular activity in an attempt to save money.

With a standing-room-only crowd of boosters supporting him, band parent Jim Vassallo protested the policy, reading from a statement by Pat Liljestrand, who heads the boosters.

"We feel that the band program has a unique history of always paying for play in areas which should be paid for by the schools," said Vassallo. Many band parents have received notices from the schools, reminding them they have not yet paid the fees. The band boosters' fees would net the district a total of \$12,000.

The booster organization's records show that the boosters have paid more than \$14,000 this year for uniforms; a sound system; percussion equipment; repair and maintenance fees; drum major training; and uniform cleaning.

Parents have paid \$1,985 in competition fees and \$2,531 for props and non-musical equipment repairs.

Not included in listed expenses are color guard uniforms and props; a computer and copy machine purchased with the choral music boosters as well as marching and sectional instructors.

"The board does pay for a part of the director's salary and \$4,500 for instruction, from which we pay our assistant director and part of the percussion staff," said Vassallo.

Parents also pay \$200 per child for band camp, and \$195 per child for buses, food and lodging at regional, state and national competitions.

The Fiesta Bowl trip, for which

band members have been raising money, is expected to cost each family \$868.

Parents also pay for uniform clean-

ing, marching shoes and gloves, and a uniform deposit.

"I think the intent of all band parents is to raise the issue of equity. Let's look at it across the board. Are we talking fairness?" asked band parent Bill Myers.

Instruments are another cost assumed by parents. Trumpets can cost up to \$3,000, and "our son's trombone, even though we paid only \$1,000, lists for twice that," said Myers. "Prices of those instruments are just astronomical."

Many schools the band competes against have their entry fees paid by the district. "That never happens with us. We raise the entrance fees. Boosters pay them for any competition we want to go to. We've been paying to play for a long time," added Myers. "There are just some people who are questioning the \$60 figure. How do you come up with \$60? All we are interested in is a question of equity."

The pay-to-play policy came as the latest in a string of disappointments for the two-time national championship marching band.

"When we approached the administration on paying for the additional uniforms because of the increased size of the band, we were refused," said Vassallo.

"When we asked for approval to accept an invitation to perform at the Hula Bowl, we were told that 'It wouldn't look good' for the band to go to Hawaii at a time when the district has financial problems, even though no district funds would have been used."

## City, township expect record voter turnout

The rock 'em sock 'em presidential race should draw a record number of residents to voting places in Plymouth and Plymouth Township, say government clerks.

"I think the voter turnout is going to be sort of impressive," said Plymouth Township Clerk Esther Hulsing.

While Hulsing said voter turnout for a presiden-

tial election is always low, there have been 2,000 requests for absentee ballots this time around. "That's more than half again as many as the last time," she said.

Hulsing predicts a turnout of 14,000 voters. "The most we've ever had is over 12,000."

Plymouth City Clerk Linda Langnesser predicted "about a 40 percent turnout. I'm basing this on the high number of absentee ballots that have been issued."

By Monday afternoon, more than 1,200 had been issued, compared to around 800 by this time in the 1988 election.

A band sponsored drug education program was shot down by administration because "the band takes too much money from the community," added Vassallo.

"Our daytime program has been cut from two positions to one. This is appalling for a high school program of our size."

Band parents and members have supported mullage and election campaigns and have taken part in letter writing campaigns regarding state funding of schools.

We have also brought many factors for achievement to the district and you proudly list them in the yearly achievement reports," said Vassallo. "We ask that you recognize that the Plymouth Canton Music Boosters have exceeded the assessed amount of pay for 1993."

Trustee Dean Swartzwelder was the only school official to respond. He asked administration to look into equity in all extra-curricular athletics and activities.

# Cops stop man from abducting woman

# Charges loom against crash victim's brother

The 21-year-old injured brother of a Plymouth man killed in a one-car accident Friday, Oct. 23, the day before his wedding, may face felony charges as the driver of the car, according to Canton police.

"The paperwork will be presented to the prosecutor," said Det. Davey LeBlanc of the Canton police.

Thomas Tustian could be charged under a relatively new law, operating a vehicle while intoxicated causing death, which is a 10-year felony, LeBlanc said. Tustian remains hospitalized following the early Friday morning accident.

Tustian's brother, William, 20, died after the 1985 Dodge convertible, driven by Thomas, left the roadway and rolled over on Warren Road, just east

of Lilley where the road curves at approximately 3:50 a.m. Police believe the convertible top was closed at the time of the accident.

Police believe alcohol was involved in the accident, which occurred apparently after the brothers were at a bachelor party, in honor of William Tustian's impending wedding. The brothers were not wearing seatbelts.

Initial studies the morning of the accident showed the car was traveling an estimated 64 mph but further speed studies will be conducted as the investigation continues, LeBlanc said.

The post office will no longer be closed weekdays from 1:30-2:30 p.m.

Postage meter settings have resumed.

Certified and other mail can be picked up, beginning Nov. 2.

Counter service and access to the lobby will be available on Saturdays from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

A survey will be started to ask customers what hours the post office should be open.

Also, resumption of bulk mail service is under study and another large stamp vending machine is on order.

"It helps to contact somebody with clout," Walters said, on his and McAninch's calls and meetings with Ford.

Walters, on behalf of the city's downtown development authority, has also been talking with the postal service about buying the downtown post office, put up for sale by postal officials.

Walters said his last contact with postal officials on the matter a tentative sale price had been negotiated was "two to three weeks ago."

"They're not in a position to take any action until November," Walters said, as the postal service is undergoing an administrative reorganization.

To impress the postal service that a post office should be maintained downtown, Walters encourages residents to use it.

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
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
**Cleaning:** Jerry Mitchell cleans the cross.

The new steeple is 28 feet tall and replaces an old wood one that had to be removed from


the 130-year-old structure, he said.

## Plymouth man is state's Pharmacist of the Year

Michigan Pharmacist of the Year Jesse Vivian of Plymouth says it's an exciting time to teach pharmacy.

"The profession of pharmacy is almost in a revolutionary change," said Vivian, 40.

Vivian is associate chairman of the department of pharmacy at Wayne State University, where he also teaches.

Nowadays, pharmacists don't just stand behind a counter shoveling pills into bottles, he explains.

Pharmacists are sort of in a unique situation in health care practice because they tend to gather a great deal of information about patients," Vivian said.

"That raises issues of confidentiality and patient autonomy in terms of what patients want or need in terms of drug therapy. They're caught between obligation to society and obligation to the patient."

Take the example of a bus driver given medication for diabetes which could affect his driving performance.

"Do you say something to parents, the doctor, or the school board when the situation otherwise would be absolutely confidential?"

"This is a real problem because traditionally we have only considered patient pharmacist relationships to be strictly private," Vivian said.

He has served as chairman of

the Ethics and Practice Commission of the MPA. "That particular issue is the kind we are looking at."

Vivian currently serves on the Code of Ethics Revision Committee for the American Pharmaceutical Association.

"We're looking at updating that code (of ethics). The feeling of most of the members of the committee is the pharmacist's position should be recognized."

Some have determined there may be an appropriate time to breach confidentiality, when a patient's behavior can pose a risk to others, Vivian said.

"Many health care practition-

ers by law are required to report child abuse and common diseases," he explained.

In pursuing a career in pharmacy, Vivian follows his father. His wife, now a dentist, was also a pharmacist.

Besides teaching at WSU and being involved in several professional organizations, Vivian also holds a Wayne State law degree and works with the law firm Cummings, McClorey, Davis & Aho of Livonia.

He also serves as general counsel to the MPA and writes a monthly column on legal and ethical trends in Drug Topics magazine.

The pharmacy profession is touched by another controversy, over the alleged slow federal approval process for various drugs.

While Vivian sides with the government, "A lot of times we have patients who are not able to get the approved drug into drug study programs to get access to drugs otherwise not available."

Pharmacology students there are 350 in Wayne State's undergraduate program — upon graduation earn starting salaries of around \$45,000, Vivian said.

"We're just praying that it's going to be a pleasant day and everybody will keep their cool, it seems like it's going to be a busy day," Langmesser said.

"The best time to vote would probably be the first thing in the morning, it will probably be more crowded when they get off work," she said.

Hulsing said that if township voters want to avoid lines, they should vote sometime between 9:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m.

### Absentee ballot deadlines

The deadline for picking up absentee ballots in the city is Monday, the drop-off deadline for absentee ballots is 8 p.m. election day.

In the township, voters can pick up absentee ballots until 2 p.m. Saturday or vote in the clerk's office on Monday by absentee ballot.

While Hulsing urges absentee voters to return ballots by Monday, those ballots will be accepted until the polls close at 8 p.m. Tuesday.

The polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. Tuesday.

### Local races

While the presidential contest is the most exciting race to be decided by voters on Tuesday, it's not the only one.

In Plymouth Township, voters will choose a new township supervisor, and cast ballots for four township trustees and a township clerk.

In the city of Plymouth, voters will decide on three proposals to amend the city charter.

Local voters will also help determine the outcome of several

county races: non-partisan judge ships, and four state ballot proposals.

Several local races are unopposed.

In Plymouth Township, survivors of the August Republican primary race for township trustee are Kay Arnold, Charles Cirina, Ron Griffith and K.C. Mueller. They are unopposed in their bids for four seats on the Plymouth Township board.

In other local races where Republican candidates face no opposition, Mary Brooks is running for re-election as township treasurer, Marilyn Massengill is running for township clerk, and Jerry Vorva is running for the 20th District state House seat.

Kathleen Keen McCarthy, survivor of the August Republican primary race for Plymouth Town-

ship supervisor, is running against independent candidate Ron Edwards.

### City charter proposals

City of Plymouth voters will also determine the fate of three proposals that would amend the city charter.

Proposal No. 1 seeks to increase pay for city commissioners from \$10 to \$50 per meeting and from \$10 to \$60 per meeting for the mayor. The pay increase is intended to allow commissioners and the mayor to meet expenses associated with the offices, and not prohibit candidates from seeking office due to financial concerns.

No current commissioner or the mayor would benefit from the pay increase.

Proposal No. 2 would change a


charter deadline for adopting a city budget from May to the second regular meeting in June, to allow officials to incorporate information from the state and county on revenue into the budget.

Proposal No. 3 would eliminate residency requirements for all department heads, to allow the city to pick from a broad cross-section

of eligible candidates for those jobs.

In the 13th U.S. House District including greater Plymouth, incumbent Democrat William Ford faces a challenge from Republican Robert Geake. Other candidates in this race are Tisch party candidate Paul Jensen, Workers League candidate Larry Roberts and independent Randall Roe.

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# Riley-Kelly: Low-key race for high court

If Justice Dorothy Comstock Riley doesn't see a philosophical pattern to her Supreme Court opinions, challenger Marilyn Kelly can.

"One thing Dorothy Riley did that inflamed the legal community was the case of Rowe vs. Montgomery Ward," said Kelly, a Court of Appeals judge who is challenging Riley in the Nov. 3 nonpartisan election.

"She has a distrust of juries. She has not much sympathy or empathy for employees," said Kelly. The case involved discharge of a worker who believed he could be discharged only for cause.

"She starts off saying we can't trust juries to interpret employment contracts," Kelly said. "It (Riley's opinion) stands for big business, big money and big power, and that's where her campaign

comes from."

Kelly, 54, of Bloomfield Hills is the Democratic Party's nominee to take on Riley, 67, of Grosse Pointe, seeking a second eight-year term as a Republican nominee.

"I like to take each case individually, look at the law and apply the facts to the law," said Riley. "I didn't write the law. The people wrote the law."

Riley declined to characterize her own philosophy other than taking "one case at a time."

## Crossing lines

Justices on the state's highest court are nominated by parties. In labor and insurance cases, party lines often are clear.

But in criminal cases, the justices cross party lines. Justices Riley and Patricia Boyle, tapped by the Democrats, have teamed up in tough-on-crime dissenting opinions.

Take the 1990 case of Kevin Milbourn, who ripped up his ex-girlfriend's apartment and terrorized her. The 5-2 male majority said the Eaton County circuit judge's 10-15-year sentence of Milbourn violated the state's sentencing guidelines, which called for 18 to 24 months.

Riley, Boyle and Conrad Mallett Jr. (seeking re-election Nov. 3 to a two-year term) were on the short end of a 4-3 decision in which the Supreme Court struck down Michigan's life-without-parole law for drug dealers as unconstitutional.

"It's very important," said Riley, "to distinguish between judging and legislating. The distinction has been blurred — a dangerous blurring. It's important no branch of government overstep its bounds."

In the Milbourn case, Riley said the high court stepped on the circuit court's discretion; in the

drug lifer case, on the Michigan Legislature's interpretation of the people's will.

"I'm not saying I disagree with the ultimate result they were trying to achieve, but that's not our role. Let the legislators play their role," said Riley, a former Court of Appeals and Wayne circuit judge.

On that point Kelly agreed. "I'd come down with her. Mandatory sentences in the drug law are not cruel or unusual. That's delivery, not use."

"I'm very concerned at the effect of the drug culture," said Kelly, a former Grosse Pointe school teacher, Albion College and Eastern Michigan University professor and 16-year State Board of Education member.

tracted the same attention as the rock-'em, sock-'em race for the two-year term between Mallett and GOP nominee Michael Talbot.

District secretaries will be offered classes in computer software. Other in-services will deal with outcome-based education, conflict resolution and negotiating with children, self esteem and school improvement plans.



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
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


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





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# Halloween happenings

Their advertising images are austere and judicial.

A major issue has been a Detroit College of Law Review article by professor Maurice Kelman of Wayne State University. Kelman last spring charged the Michigan Supreme Court:

■ Has been near bottom in the country in the number of cases it takes and opinions it issues (68 to 79 a year in 1988-90 versus 120 by California's and 157 by Minnesota's).

■ Ignores worthy cases by declining to take them.

■ Should adopt a rule by which three of the seven justices can decide that a case should be taken up.

Riley was chief justice in 1987-90, the years covered by the study.

Said Kelly: "It's an indictment of her because she's been chief justice. What make her think that at age 67 she will show more vigor than in the last eight years?"

"The Supreme Court is not doing its job," said Kelly. She points to State Bar president George Googasian's complaint that it takes too many years for cases to wend its way through Michigan's appellate system.

(Ironically, the GOP's Talbot uses the same article in his campaign to unseat Mallett.)

Replied Riley: "Not documented. Just a broadside. A numbers game."

"Can you find a question the

court did not address? The check-point case (vehicle check lanes to catch drunk drivers) is the only one they can come up with — and I voted to take that case.

"This court reviews 2,300 applications (for leave to appeal) a year — an average of 200 a month. That takes a lot of time. We have administrative duties that other courts may not have.

"I've never heard anyone (other justices) say, 'We don't want to take this case because of our workload.' And the rule of three would be a disaster — it's easy to get the fourth vote (to take a case)."

Riley agrees with one Kelman observation, however: "There are too many multi-opinion (three or more) decisions." That practice fails to provide guidance for lower courts and the public, she said.


### Love computers

Despite those differences, the candidates share a respect for technology.

"We computerized three years ago," Riley said. It means that she and three others justices in the Comerica Building in downtown Detroit can communicate on-line with Chief Justice Michael Cavanagh in Lansing and Justices James Brickley and Robert Griffin in Traverse City.

"Before that, we had to communicate by phone and mail," Riley said.

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# Circuit judges vie for appeals court seat

A new judge will take her place on the Michigan Court of Appeals (First District) after the November election.

Vying for the six-year term are Cynthia D. Stephens and Helene N. White, both of Detroit.

The district covers Wayne, Washtenaw, Jackson, Lenawee, Monroe and Livingston counties. Both candidates for the first district seat currently serve on the Wayne County Circuit Court.

Stephens, 42, received her bachelor's degree from the University of Michigan and her juris doctor from Emory University in Georgia. She teaches at the University of Detroit Law School, the Wayne State University Law

School and the Wayne County Community College.

She served as 36th District Court Judge in 1982 and she was associate general counsel to the Michigan Senate in 1979.

White, 37, attended Barnard College and Columbia University. She earned her law degree from the University of Pennsylvania. She served as law clerk for a Michigan Supreme Court Justice and was a member of the Circuit Court Executive Committee and Docket Review Committee.

She was elected to the 36th District/Common Pleas Court in 1981.

In terms of experience for the position, Stephens cites her 10

years on the bench and White claims more than 11 years of service on the bench.

Neither candidate categorizes herself as a strict constructionist nor a judicial activist.

Stephens said she approaches "each case with a clear understanding that I am bound to resolve disputes efficiently and compassionately based upon the public policy as circulated by the public laws and case precedent of our state not to make public policy."

White suggests that a proper balance is called for recognizing that the "framers intended/expected judicial interpretation/ex-trapolation; process should be

guided by framers' intent, not judge's personal social policy views."

The court of appeals hears civil and criminal cases. Three-judge panels hear cases in Lansing, Detroit, Grand Rapids and Marquette. The panels are rotated to encourage statewide uniformity in rulings.

The decision of a panel of the court of appeals is final except in those cases in which a decision is reviewed by the Supreme Court.

The salary for an appeals court judge is set by the state Legislature. The annual salary is currently \$102,346 per year. Judges also receive an automobile.

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# Tips for a safe Halloween

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# Register keeps county records up-to-date

Two candidates have tossed their hats into the ring for a rather obscure Wayne County office. Democratic incumbent Forest E. Youngblood and Republican Ervin L. Fobbs will appear as candidates for Register of Deeds on the Nov. 3 ballot.

The register of deeds is responsible for keeping up-to-date records on all parcels of property in Wayne County — one of the largest counties in the country. All property purchases, mort-

gages, transactions and deeds are monitored and stored under this individual's supervision. More than 26 million records are involved, according to the current officeholder.

The register of deeds serves a four-year term and supervises 90 employees and a \$3 million annual budget. Approximately \$7 million is collected annually by the department in fees, Youngblood said.

The register of deeds receives

an annual salary of \$77,000.

Youngblood, a Dearborn Heights resident, has served as register of deeds in Wayne County since 1973. He has been a county employee since 1949, working as a sheriff's deputy before his election to office.

As the register of deeds, Youngblood considers his greatest accomplishment to be the introduction of computers in the department in 1986. New computers being put in place now, Young-

blood said, will allow title companies to access records from the computer rather than having to come into the office. These firms will then be assessed fees based on computer time used, he said. This, he argues, will make the office operate even more efficiently.

Fobbs is running as a Republican for the office of register of deeds. He lives in Detroit and could not be reached for comment.

# Republican faces uphill battle in clerk's race

The treasurer of Grosse Ile Township and the deputy director of the Wayne County Department of Health and Human Services will face off in the November general election for the position of Wayne County Clerk.

It is the clerk's job to keep track of birth, death and marriage records in the county, as well as coordinate elections. The clerk is paid \$77,000 annually.

Longtime county clerk James R. Killeen will retire at the end of this year.

Teola Hunter is the Democratic nominee while John P. Reilly will represent the Republicans. The

clerk's term is four years.

Hunter was appointed to the Wayne County Department of Health and Human Services in 1992. She served in the Michigan House of Representatives from 1981 to 1992.

"I thought this was the perfect opportunity for a qualified African-American female to seek elective post in Wayne County government," Hunter said.

Hunter has a master's degree in education, elementary guidance and counseling from Wayne State University. She has been employed as a teacher in the Detroit Public Schools and was the

founder and owner of a group of nursery schools called Buttons & Bows.

If elected, Hunter said she would make use of her education background to propose a curriculum in the schools that addresses the importance of being a good citizen and voting in all elections.

"I think this is a good way to address voter apathy," she said.

Hunter also said she would study the dates selected for elections and determine if other dates may attract more people to the polls. She also will evaluate the accessibility of vital statistics records and consider alternatives

for bringing that system up-to-date.

Reilly, 45, is an attorney and has served as Grosse Ile Township treasurer for the past eight years. He received his bachelor's degree from Canisius College and his juris doctor from the University of Detroit.

He is president of the Wayne County Treasurer's Association.

After dealing with the county clerk's office for 15 years, Reilly decided that because of Killeen's retirement this was the time to seek the office.

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# Feds pressure area for clean air plan

A clean air program for the metropolitan region is coming down to a matter of costs.

"It's imperative that we proceed quickly," said Milton Mack, who chairs the air quality task force of the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments.

Mack told SEMCOG delegates last week that the seven-county region can be punished if it fails to reduce emissions by 15 percent. The federal government can withhold highway money and industrial permits, and it can design the region's cleanup act.

"Has anyone done a cost-benefit analysis?" asked Jack Olsen, a conservative Oakland County

commissioner. "Are we going to pay \$1 billion to get a 0.0001 percent improvement?"

SEMCOG must come up with a plan by 1993 under the federal Clean Air Act reducing emissions by 15 percent from 1990 levels. That means, said Mack, the goal may be even higher when the program kicks in in the mid-1990s.

Here is what Mack, a Wayne County probate judge from the city of Wayne, says drivers and consumers can expect:

- Vapor recovery devices at the gasoline pumps — 4-percent reduction.
- Centralized vehicle emis-

sions tests rather than the current tests at the neighborhood service station — 7-percent reduction. No one knows how centralized that will become.

■ Reformulated fuels — possibly a 7.5-percent reduction. This is not the same as alternative fuels such as ethanol. Nine regions of the U.S. must begin using reformulated fuels. Estimated cost: 7 to 11 cents a gallon.

But public transit is out as an air-pollution control device. "The draft proposal suggests we will not be able to rely on transportation control measures to achieve the short range 15-percent reduction," said Mack. "If we were to double the use of public transit by 1996, there would be only a 1-

percent reduction." Olsen, R-Huntington Woods, raised questions about the cost in an Oakland County caucus.

Told the new emissions tests would cost \$17 every two years (versus \$10 annually for current tests), Olsen said, "It's not the \$17 that clears the air. It's the \$17 plus what it takes to fix them. The \$17 is only gonna identify the problem."

Mack's task force includes state natural resources and transportation officials, Big Three auto engineers and chemical company leaders. He intends to have a plan ready for SEMCOG approval early next year. Deadline for any state enabling legislation is November 1993.

# Lawmaker chalks up wins on tax cut plan

John E. Olsen chalked up two victories in one day over property tax cuts.

The Republican from Huntington Woods won 18-9 approval in the Oakland County Board of Commissioners of a resolution endorsing Proposal C, "Cut & Cap" Thursday morning.

That afternoon Olsen won 18-

14 in his effort to table (kill) a resolution opposing Proposal C in the Southeast Michigan Council of Governments.

"The problem is that this is a political resolution and, in some cases, a partisan one," Olsen told SEMCOG. Passing a political resolution is fine for general units of government, he argued, but not

for a regional planning agency like SEMCOG.

Pushed by Gov. John Engler and the Michigan State Chamber of Commerce, Proposal C, if approved by voters, would cap assessment increases at 3 percent annually and cut school property taxes by 30 percent over five years, requiring the state to reimburse local schools for the loss.

The anti-C resolution was

pushed onto the SEMCOG agenda by its Education Advisory Council.

"The EAC felt we would be sabotaging education if this (C) passes," said David Hackett, chair of the Oakland Community College board.

SEMCOG's action means it neither supports nor opposes C. Supporting Olsen was Richard Skarritt, R-Milford, also an Oakland County commissioner.



# Kids will find tough sledding

It may be awhile before the first snowflake flies, but Plymouth Township Trustees are already concerned about sleds flying down one local hill.

Township trustees voted recently to "substantially comply" with guidelines set by the township insurance company with regards to the sledding hill in Plymouth Township Park.

A safety report issued by the township's insurance company, Michigan Municipal Risk Management Authority, indicated that under existing circumstances sledding on the hill posed a threat to children and to the township coffers in terms of liability.

In his report, Terrence R. Van Doren stated that the man-made sledding hill at the Plymouth Township Park required a higher standard of care in order to provide a safe environment. The area at the bottom of the hill, he stated, is not adequate for stopping the sleds without colliding with bales of straw or metal/wood posts at the bottom of the hill.

The insurer recommended eliminating use of the hill altogether, but offered some modifications that might make the site safer.

Attorneys for the township suggested that the township comply with modifications of the insurance company or discontinue sledding at the park to protect the township from potential liability should an accident occur.

Under most circumstances the township could not be held liable, but because the insurance company outlined the potential problems the township could be found negligent if they did nothing to correct the problem.

Director of Public Services James D. Anulewicz presented trustees with three possible options in dealing with the situation and their cost implications. The

options ranged from eliminating sledding at a cost of about \$200 for signs to grading a new sledding hill at a cost of \$22,000.

Trustees voted for a measure somewhere in between calling for improvements to the sledding hill and operation of the hill, not to exceed \$2,500. The motion was presented by Trustee John Stewart.

The allocation will be used by Anulewicz to post signs regarding rules for sledding at the park, snow fencing to designate a path for sledders to walk to the top of the hill, bales of straw to cushion stops and some supervisory personnel at the hill.

Several residents attended the meeting encouraging trustees not to close the hill, citing the great recreational asset during a dismal time of year, but also understood that there are hazards involved in sledding at the township park.

"I have seen children trying to climb back up the hill as others are coming down on their sleds which causes obvious problems," one resident said. "Designating paths would probably help that situation."

Anulewicz said he questioned his counterparts in other communities where sledding is successful and hopes to put some of their practices to use. He hopes to supervise the sledding hill with public service employees already on duty so that no additional personnel would be needed.

"The most difficult thing is that when you establish policy you have to be prepared to enforce it," Anulewicz said.

Some of the regulations to be posted at the sledding hill before the first snowfall include: use designated returns, maximum of two people per sled, horse play prohibited, appropriate sleds only, skiing and snowboarding prohibited and sled at your own risk. Hours will be set for sledding as well.

# Tax proposals rapped

Among Wayne County school district officials, it's tough to find anyone who will say a nice word about two of the proposals on the Nov. 3 ballot, Proposals A and C.

School officials from districts as diverse as tiny Riverview to a goliath like Detroit all railed against the two property tax-cutting proposals Tuesday at a joint press conference held in the Livonia Public Schools' board room.

Observerland school districts that have united to oppose Proposals A and C are Livonia, Redford Union, South Redford, Garden City, Plymouth-Canton, and Wayne-Westland.

The uniting of big and small districts as well as in-formula and out-of-formula districts in Wayne County into a lobbying effort against the two proposals shows just how fearful K-12 educators are that at least one proposal might get a majority of votes Tuesday.

If both A and C should pass, the one with the most votes will go into effect.

The purpose of Tuesday's press conference was to tell voters just what to expect if either A or C should pass.

Murray Tobin, chairman of the South Redford School District's citizen finance committee, said the controversy over Proposals A and C reminded him of a statement President George Bush made about challenger Bill Clinton during one of the recent presidential debates.

"He said that if a politician says we'll cut taxes, and he doesn't know where the extra money will come from, but that we should trust him, then, well, we should grab our wallet."

Both A and C would limit the amount of growth in property tax assessments. Proposal C also would cut property taxes levied for school operations by 30 percent by 1997.

The state would be required by the Michigan Constitution to make up the money districts would lose under Proposal C's 30 percent cut.

There is no requirement to make up the revenue that will be lost due to the 5 percent assessment cap in Proposal A or the 3 percent assessment cap in Proposal C.

Several school officials Tuesday questioned the state's ability to follow through on its promise to reimburse.

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

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

## For U.S. Congress Ford best for Plymouth district

**W**hen it comes to politicians, U.S. Rep. William D. Ford isn't perfect. He can appear arrogant and pompous at times. We disagreed with Ford and criticized him soundly for voting in favor of the Congressional pay raise.

In spite of that criticism, Ford is an intelligent, highly skilled lawmaker attuned to the needs of the district. When examining the candidates for this race, we posed this question: Who is a leader; who has been effective or can be effective in Washington? The answer: Bill Ford.

The Michigan Congressional delegation has been criticized for not "delivering" federal largesse to the state. Ford, however, has been effective in areas that count in western Wayne County, such as the new post offices in Livonia, Garden City and Westland.

Ford, along with his state Congressional colleagues, has taken the lead in providing money for the clean-up of the Rouge River.

Last year, Ford, along with other western Wayne Congressional lawmakers, was able to get \$46 million for the continuation of the Rouge River Demonstration Project.

At the request of local elected officials in Canton, Plymouth and Northville townships, Ford pushed for authorization for federal aid for the Western Townships Utilities Authority, an environmental water project that will treat waste water before it goes into the Rouge.

As chairman of the House Committee on Ed-

ucation and Labor, Ford was responsible for Congress' recent authorization of the Higher Education Act, which will channel billions of dollars of aid to students — including those from middle- and upper-income families — planning on attending college and workers seeking retraining or better training for the job market.

Ford expresses some very real concerns about the North American Free Trade Act's effect on jobs.

Ford faces four opponents on Nov. 3 — Republican state Sen. R. Robert Geake, Randall Roe, an independent from Ypsilanti, Paul S. Jensen, a self-described Republican running on the Tisch ticket, and Larry Roberts of the Workers League.

Ford was unopposed in the Democratic primary, and we supported Geake in the Republican race. Geake is a conscientious state Senator and has a superb record of attendance in Lansing. However, after examining the candidates' stands on the issues that matter in this race, we believe Geake can best serve his constituents in Lansing — not Washington.

If you swallow the GOP rhetoric about "cleaning the House," you better have something better to offer. The field of challengers just doesn't offer anyone better for the newly drawn 13th District.

We recommend **William D. Ford** to voters in Livonia, Plymouth, Canton, Westland and Garden City on Nov. 3.

## McCotter best for commission

**I**n the race for the Wayne County Board of Commissioners in the 10th District, **Thaddeus McCotter** is clearly the best candidate in a two-man race.

An attorney, McCotter is a Schoolcraft College trustee. The Livonia resident has performed capably in that role and we believe will work hard to represent his Livonia and Plymouth area constituents on the county board.

A graduate of the University of Detroit Law School, McCotter, 26, is honest, open and accountable, just as his literature touts.

There's no doubt about his commitment to public service and personal integrity.

He's young, intelligent, energetic and will work hard for his constituents in the 10th District. Voters in the district can cast a ballot for McCotter on the Republican ticket Nov. 3.

## Elect Keen-McCarthy supervisor

**A**ll but one race in Plymouth Township was settled in August, so voters will be asked to decide only on a new township supervisor on Tuesday.

We recommend **Kathleen Keen-McCarthy**, the winner of the Republican primary in her contest against Ron Edwards, who is on the ballot as an independent.

As the winner of a crowded primary, Keen-McCarthy has stood the test of time and has received voter approval. Edwards faced no opposition in the primary.

Keen-McCarthy is qualified to serve as supervisor. Her background as a hospital administrator will help her deal with the role of supervisor. Also, she's a political newcomer, an advantage in a year where there is discontent with incumbents.

She has broad support in the community, is a hard worker and will take the job of township supervisor seriously.

We urge Plymouth Township voters to cast their ballots for Kathleen Keen-McCarthy on Tuesday, Nov. 3.

## Don't forget county proposals

**L**ocal voters will decide three ballot proposals on Nov. 3.

We recommend a No vote on Proposals 1 and 3, and a Yes vote on Proposal 2.

Proposal 1 is essentially a disagreement between the county commission and county executive on their interpretations of the charter.

The proposal, a charter amendment calling for the county commission's approval of the executive's reorganization plan at least once each four years, is nothing more than the legislative branch's attempt to exert more control over the executive branch. The legislative branch should stop interfering and get on with its own duties.

We recommend a No vote on Proposal 1. Proposal 2 calls for Wayne County to return all money collected from the one-tenth mill for Model Youth Services System and not spent within one year to local governments for the purpose of providing local youth programs.

On Aug. 2, 1988, Wayne County voters approved a 1-mill jail tax for 10 years to build and/or operate a jail and to use at least one-

tenth of a mill to operate a juvenile work/training facility.

The new jail has been completed, but the county has not used the money to acquire a new juvenile facility. About \$6.9 million from the one-tenth mill remained unspent as of July 31, 1992. The county could have returned the one-tenth mill to the taxpayers by not levying the tax but it did not.

We recommend a Yes vote on Proposal 2.

Proposal 3 seeks a 0.5-mill tax increase (50 cents per \$1,000 of state equalized valuation) to support health services and mental health services to Wayne County's neediest residents.

Voters turned down the same proposal in the August primary by 137,240 to 94,868.

But voters didn't know enough about the issue then, its proponents say, and they're going to be asked again Nov. 3 for the same tax.

We believe they knew enough about the plan to defeat it then. Given Wayne County's already high tax burden and the vague and poorly defined proposal, we recommend a No vote on Proposal 3.

## Dems best for top county jobs

**V**oters interested in county office elections will wade through a lot of names on the Nov. 3 ballot before they reach the races for county sheriff, county clerk, county treasurer and register of deeds.

Although all of the incumbents face opposition in the races mentioned here, none of the challengers has presented a clear and convincing argument for change. In fact, most have done nothing more than place their name on the ballot.

### Sheriff

In the race for sheriff, Democrat **Robert Ficano**, the two-term incumbent from Livonia, is clearly the best choice. The challengers appear unprepared to deal with the administrative and political requirements of the job.

### Clerk

Former state Rep. **Teola Hunter** is headed for the Wayne County Clerk's office. An intelligent, capable administrator, Hunter's first priority is making sure the public is served by the clerk's office.

She has the administrative skills and political savvy to do the job.

### Treasurer

The race for county treasurer pits former Livonia city treasurer **Elaine Tuttle** against longtime incumbent **Raymond Wojtowicz**. Tuttle levels charges that the county treasurer's off-

ice hasn't computerized to the extent it should and subsequently has caused delays and expenses to local government.

Tuttle's tenure as Livonia treasurer was often marked by controversy. She sued the city several times and lost. It cost the city time and money. Although we believe that Tuttle has learned how to work in the system, county government can't afford to risk her election. Wojtowicz runs an efficient operation under current budget restrictions. Voters should let **Raymond Wojtowicz** continue as county treasurer on Nov. 3.

### Register of deeds

**Forest Youngblood**, a Democrat, is seeking his sixth term as register of deeds. The register of deeds is responsible for keeping up-to-date records on all parcels of property in Wayne County — one of the largest counties in the country.

Youngblood supervises 90 employees and a \$3 million annual budget. Approximately \$7 million is collected annually by the department in fees. Youngblood runs an efficient office and merits re-election.

## Our choices for judicial races

**S**ome of the best and brightest candidates this election has to offer can be found under the non-partisan designation of the election ballot.

Western Wayne County voters will elect a judge to the Michigan Court of Appeals First District, Wayne County Circuit Court and Probate Court.

### Court of appeals

In the appeals court race, we recommend **Cynthia Stephens**.

Stephens, a Wayne County Circuit Court Judge since 1985, gets high marks from her peers in the area of scholarship and fairness.

Although they sound like tax cuts, the effects of proposals A and C will mean higher taxes and less efficient government. The way to fix the problems of government is to elect good people who have the interests of the citizens at heart. Cutting funding will only drive good people out of government and result in a government which is incapable of serving anyone.

What we really need is a fundamental change in taxation structure in this state. We rely far too much on property taxes, which causes large inequities in what people pay for and get from local units of government.

What I propose here consists of basically two parts:

The first part would consist of allowing a school district, by majority vote of its citizens, to remove all property taxes for schools from residential property and substitute an income tax on the residents of that district. The percentage income tax rate would initially be set to one-tenth of the present millage. For example, if a school district was

levying 32 mills, the school income tax would be 3.2 percent.

This school income tax would be collected by the state, at the same time and using the same forms as the state income tax. All school income tax collected from the residents of a school district would be turned over to that school district; the state of Michigan would have no authority over the money.

The second part would be to impose a statewide uniform school property tax on all non-residential property. The rate would initially be set to the statewide average school property tax millage rate (about 30 mills). No tax abatements would be allowed for school property taxes. One-third of the state income tax (1.5 percent) would be added to the money collected from the statewide uniform school property tax. All profits from the lottery would also be added to this statewide educational fund.

## Salem, CC meet again in regional

Plymouth Salem survived some tense moments Wednesday against underdog Dearborn to reach the final of its own regional soccer tournament.

Senior forward Joe Perron scored all three goals as the heavily favored Rocks started fast and then held off the Pioneers for a 3-1 victory.

In a rematch of the 1989 final won by Salem, the Rocks (16-2-2) will play Redford Catholic Central for the championship 3 p.m. Saturday at Centennial Educational Park.

Though the teams have scrimmaged annually, it will be their first game since the Rocks won 5-1 three years ago and were the eventual Class A runners-up. CC coach Phil LaJoy

was the Salem junior varsity coach at that time.

"They've been playing well toward the end of the season, but we've got all 11 starters back," said Perron, who scored his second hat trick of the season and leads Salem with 18 goals. "We know what we have to do to beat them."

Perron scored two goals in the first 10 minutes against Dearborn (15-5-2), and it looked as if the Rocks were on their way to an easy victory.

But the game was anything but that until Perron scored with 9:16 remaining to give Salem a two-goal advantage.

"We came out real strong like we did Saturday (against South Lyon in the district final), but we got kinda lackadaisical and thought the game

was over," Perron said. "We played lazy the rest of the half."

The Pioneers capitalized on a Salem defensive mistake to score their goal late in the first half.

Salem goalkeeper Paul Dood slipped trying to cover a risky back pass, leaving Dearborn's Manny Haratsaris with an easy angle.

The fired-up Pioneers then dominated the rest of the first half, and their momentum continued for much of the second as well. Dood made three key saves to protect the Salem lead.

"We can't play any worse and win," Salem coach Ken Johnson said. "They had speed but it was like they were nervous (at the start). That goal gave them confidence. When they scored and saw we had relaxed, they thought they could get back in the game."

Johnson, who had scouted Dearborn in the district, said he wasn't surprised the Pioneers played so well but thought Salem's edge in experience would be a decisive factor.

"When you get to the regional, it's a different ballgame," he said. "They think 'We've played well enough to get this far. Let's go a little farther.'"

Salem all-stater Tom Baker didn't play in the first half but started the second — an indication of the urgent situation the Rocks faced.

Baker reinjured the ankle that kept him out several weeks last Thursday and didn't play in the 4-1 win over South Lyon. The plan was to rest him again in anticipation of the regional final, but Baker convinced Johnson to let him play at halftime.

Baker left the game after Perron scored his third goal on a give-and-go from Mark MacInnis, who had two assists. Ryan Phipps had one.

"If you lose tonight, there's no tomorrow," Johnson said. "There's no sense being healthy for a game you're not going to play."

"He had a couple key headers and settled them down a bit. It might have helped. He got by without being injured and he got some timing back."

## Welchans sparks Chiefs past Rocks

## Only pride at stake in CEP grid finale

For the first time in four years, a playoff berth won't be riding on the outcome of the annual Salem-Canton football game Friday night.

That shouldn't dampen the players' enthusiasm or their desire to beat their arch rival.

"Any time the two teams play, there's a lot at stake," Salem coach Tom Moshimer said. "They call it the 'Pride of the Park.'"

"When you have two schools on the same campus playing each other, it's a pretty intense thing."

Both teams are having average years, judging by their overall records. The Rocks are 4-4, the Chiefs 3-5.

But the parity should increase the competitiveness between the teams, according to Canton coach Bob Khoenle, who sees irony in this year's game when compared to the last two.

"They had a good team, beat us and went to the playoffs last year," he said. "We had a good team, beat them and went to the playoffs two years ago."

"Neither one is going anywhere in the playoffs this year, and it's probably going to be a better game than the previous two."

Canton had never beaten Salem until 1988 when

it won 21-14, and the teams have split the last four games.

The Rocks won 25-6 in 1989 but just missed the playoffs. The Chiefs thumped Salem 34-0 two years ago and later made their first post-season appearance. The Rocks avenged that loss 43-6 last year and qualified for the Class AA playoffs.

"Unless some unexpected things happen, I don't see a blowout here," Khoenle said. "I think we're pretty evenly matched, and it will depend on a break here or there."

"I think they're stronger at some positions and we're stronger at others," Moshimer said. "The game will come down to who makes less mistakes and plays with the greater enthusiasm."

The Rocks had won two straight before losing Saturday to playoff hopeful Livonia Franklin, 32-6. Salem lost to Farmington Hills Harrison (22-0) in the second week of the season while the Chiefs got their first win against Harrison (23-15).

After an 0-4 start, Canton has won three of its last four games. The Chiefs lost a close game to Class A playoff contender Northville (20-13) but then turned their season around.

Canton upset Harrison, lost to Franklin 28-0, blanked winless Livonia Churchill 18-0 and

whipped Livonia Stevenson 41-0.

"We really had a tough schedule the first six games," Khoenle said. "All of that helped us. The kids are getting the feel of it and coming into their own. We could easily be 4-4 or 5-3 up to this point."

"Our team is young and because we won those games it raised our confidence. Winning is a great cure-all for everything."

Canton senior tailback Neil Haremski rushed for 143 yards and three touchdowns last week, pushing his respective season totals to 750 and eight. Beginning with the Harrison game, sophomore Brett Elledge has started at quarterback.

Salem senior linebacker Andy Szydowski returned to action for Salem in the Franklin game after missing the last three with an injury. But senior two-way end Scott Helmstadter is doubtful because of a sprained knee.

Junior upback Rob Shepley had a big game (107 yards and two TDs) two weeks ago in Salem's 29-7 win over Stevenson and will play a key role if the Rocks are to be successful running the triple-option offense.

"We have to make that go," Moshimer said. "If they can shut down our option game, that would be a big plus for them."

The Shamrocks had chance after chance after chance, but they couldn't score. Rich Walos, who seemed to be everywhere at once, set up a couple in the first half. But Matt Kopmeyer missed the net, and Jamie Heitert's header off Walos' corner kick was grabbed by Pioneer keeper Scott Johnson.

The second half was a magnification of the first, only this time it was Walos who was turned away. First, his drive after a pass from Anthony Verrino was deflected over the net; next, his direct kick went just wide; and then, when he finally put a shot behind Johnson, it was cleared by Pioneer sweeper Craig Coleman.

With 1:30 left in regulation, it happened again — a shot got past Johnson and was headed into the Pioneer net, until Coleman interceded. Who could have blamed the Shamrocks if they began to doubt that victory was in the cards for them?

It didn't take long to supply an answer. With 3:53 of the first 15-minute overtime elapsed, a Walos corner was knocked out toward midfield. Walos retrieved it, heading it back toward the Pioneer net. Kopmeyer got off a shot that was stopped, but the rebound went to Heitert, and the junior forward put this one in.

"We had a lot of opportunities," said CC coach Phil LaJoy,

whose team improved to 15-2-2. "That's been the story all year. We just haven't been able to capitalize."

"I thought we got out of our style a little bit. The emotion of the game had something to do with that. We're an outside-inside team, but we got out of our pace. We'd like to have a few more touches (passes) before the shot. "At least we finally found a way to put one in."

Despite the Shamrocks' overall dominance, their failure to put one in the net threatened to reverse the polarity of their performance, with their frustration becoming a positive force for Pioneer. Heitert's game-winner ended that.

"I was very pleased with our team's effort," said Pioneer coach Bill Browning, whose team finished 12-7-3. "I thought we had the best scoring chance of the first half (Sean Seyferth's corner kick was headed by Dan Reed over the bar), but in the second half (CC) could have easily had three or four goals."

Browning didn't particularly like the Monday scheduling ("We just played a game every bit as intense as this on Saturday (a 2-1 win over Ann Arbor Huron). We had no break"), but he singled out Johnson and Coleman for their efforts.

Which weren't quite enough to beat CC.

# Payne delivers message to heavyweights

Craig "The Tiger" Payne's prey didn't have a prayer Tuesday at Budweiser's Fight Night at the Palace of Auburn Hills.

And for Westland's Steve Darnell, his prayer was answered from the judge's decision in his bout for the State Super Middleweight Championship.

Payne, fighting out of the Livonia Boxing Club, won after his opponent quit at 2:06 of the second round with a broken jaw, while Darnell earned a hard-fought and controversial 10-round draw in the card's main event.

Payne, sporting a new nickname and tattoo of a tiger on his upper back, improved to 7-1-1 since his return after a long layoff after a successful amateur career.

"I am the tiger, they are the meat — come in the ring with Tiger, you will be beat," chanted the always-colorful Payne after the fight.

"Everybody talks about my weight," added Payne, who weighed in at 286. "I used to be 372 and I'm 271 now. But forget about my weight. I came here tonight to deliver a message to all the heavyweights in the state. I am going to beat all of the

heavyweights in Michigan and then the world."

Payne pummeled Detroit's Arthel Lawhorn (21-16-2) from the opening bell, using left hand jabs to set up his powerful right hooks. Payne, who knocked out Lawhorn's mouth piece in the first round, repeated the feat in the second round. As Lawhorn's mouth bled profusely, he turned away from Payne resembling Roberto Duran's famous "no mas" plea.

After the fight, Payne jokingly challenged Thomas Hearn, a ringside observer, to a future fight. Hearn declined with a laugh.

Payne was supposed to face Buster Mathis Jr., but the two might square off next month for the State Heavyweight Championship. If that falls through, Payne has his sights on a battle in North Carolina with Pinklon Thomas, the International Boxing Organization heavyweight champion.

Darnell (26-2-2) had his hands full with Detroit's Dorrell Van Horn (11-4-1). Darnell, one of Detroit's top rising boxers in 1986, is attempting a comeback at the age of 28.

In this season of ghosts and eerie sightings, what a joy it is to behold one "other side" in the form of Elvira. She is the first wife, seven years removed, who comes back to hassle and haunt her husband in Noel Coward's classic comedy, "Blithe Spirit."

Jerri Doll is marvelous as Elvira in this splendid production by Schoolcraft College. She floats about the

stage, sometimes as fresh and wholesome as springtime air, but more often as a lovely, alluring, mischievous first wife out to bring the husband into her spirit world.

Jeanne Slasor is a howl as Madame Arcati, an eccentric medium with the ability to conjure up spirits from the great beyond, but unable to send them back. Maybe it's because she eats no red meat before working. Maybe it's her outlandish costumes. Maybe it's all part of the plot.

Which brings us to the poor soul at the center of this story, one Charles Condomine, played wonderfully by John McPhail. All he wanted was to learn about the occult.

Unfortunately for him — fortunately for us — the seance brings forth riotous scenes of him talking to his unseen first wife, as his confused sec-

ond wife, Ruth, ties to cope with a man seemingly having delusions, while vases of flowers move around the room by themselves.

McPhail has the mannerisms and speech of an upper class English gentleman down pat. His performance was especially impressive, because he stepped into the role with only five days notice due to an illness.

Faye Driscoll was god as the befuddled second wife Ruth. Her more stable character was rice counterpoint to the flighty Elvira. Perhaps Driscoll's best moments were after an automobile accident (planned for the husband) unexpectedly catapults her into the great beyond — and the poor man who just wants to get away from it all, now has to deal with two spirits.

Also appearing are newcomers to the Schoolcraft stage, Garry Cook as

the butler together with Dawn Maze and William Meyer as friends of the family. Though obviously less experienced, they created interesting characters that contributed to a fun-filled evening of theater.

Director James Hartman's setting, costumes and lighting were all first rate, as was the music (though a bit loud). One minor quibble were the bar scenes. For some reason, cast members drank martinis from whisky glasses and sipped brandy that was as clear as water.

For those wishing to make a complete evening of it, a savory dinner theater option is available for the Nov. 6, 7 and 14 performances only.

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
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

# Shared costs seen as partial answer to health care woes

■ A panel of those seeking answers to spiraling health-care costs suggests we need to rethink our positions on medical treatment, including how our society views death.

■ Higher co-pays and deductibles for users of medical services.

■ Higher "sin" taxes on alcoholic beverages and tobacco products with revenue dedicated to basic health care services.

■ Medical liability reform.

■ A national consensus on where we're going with health care.

Those were some recommendations from a panel including a legislative aide, a service provider, a labor leader and a benefits analyst during a recent symposium on health-care reform at Crittenton Hospital in Rochester.

"How do we get to the consumer in the most effective way and the cheapest way? It's a very spiraling process, almost a vicious circle of events," said Joseph E. Champagne, president and CEO at Crittenton.

Start with a big dose of reality, several panelists responded.

"Pay for use," said Michael Keogh, a benefits consultant in the private sector. "As unpopular as that may be, it will put us on the right track."

When someone pays very little or nothing for health care through insurance plans, there's a tendency to not worry about costs, he said.

### 'It can't be free'

"One problem is the relative insulation of the user from actual costs," Keogh said. "You need to be responsible financially each and every time you use health care. You're getting something incredibly valuable. It

can't be free."

Some 20 percent of all health care dollars spent annually in the U.S. goes to paperwork compliance and an additional 20-30 percent goes to defensive medicine practices of questionable value, said David Seaman, senior vice president of the Michigan Hospital Association.

"We need regulatory reform. We need to deal with issues like anti-trust. We need medical liability reform in this country," he said.

"Finally, and most importantly, is medicalization of social problems," Seaman said. "American people are a relatively selfish breed. We want it when we want it. We don't want to ration."


Consumers and providers share the blame, he added.

"We ought to be ashamed we spend so much money on invasive treatment at the end of a terminal illness. Americans can't believe death is a natural end of life."

Health maintenance organizations would be one way for business to control costs, suggested Elizabeth Gertz, an aide to U.S. Senator Donald W. Riegle.

"Consumers have to take more responsibility not only for services and costs associated with health care, but also lifestyles," she said. "We need to have preventative care. We need to have primary care."

Gertz called for a sharing of costs and an imposition of reimbursement caps by government if prices can't be negotiated.



### Insure everyone now?

"Twenty-five percent of health-care dollars go to wasteful or inappropriate procedures," said Edgar A. Scribner, president of the Metropolitan Detroit AFL-CIO. He wants to see a national health plan that covers everyone now, then works out the rough spots as we go along.

Scribner said he couldn't understand how malpractice premiums could be so much lower in Chicago and Cleveland than in Detroit. The fastest growth in insurance premiums has come for managed, out-patient

care services that originally were encouraged to cap costs, he added.

Health care was the major issue in 83 percent of all collective bargaining negotiations nationally in 1990, Scribner said.

"These problems can be addressed through a national health care system," he said.

Jan Vermeulen, a benefits administrator for FANUC Robotics North America in Auburn Hills, who attended the symposium, has encouraged her clients to not pay charges

# 3rd generation takes reins to battle itchy bitsy spider

Considering the Detroit Tigers' dismal late-season performance, visitors to Tiger Stadium may have been more interested in the beach-ball sized balloons hanging from the rafters than what was happening on the field.

The balloons are part of an elaborate bird-management system developed by the Rose Exterminator Co. in Troy. The balloons discourage birds from nesting on support beams and releasing their droppings on patrons.

"The balloons have large circles painted on them to mimic the eye of a predator, such as an owl," said H. Russell Ives, 39.

He was recently named president of Rose Extermination, after his father, H. William, and his grandfather, Harlem, held the position.

"We also installed netting in some areas, utilize some audible techniques and periodically switch the 175 balloons we've put in place. The program saves the

stadium quite a bit of money, as they don't have to wash the seats before every game."

The bird management system is one of many the company has developed in recent years to rid clients of pests while sparing, when possible, the lives of the animals involved.

"The extermination business

has changed more in the last five years, than in the last 20," said Ives, a Birmingham resident.

"Where before a field representative would show up at a home with a 20-gallon tank, today they're equipped with utility belts and sophisticated techniques."

When the Troy Historical Museum recently hired Rose to rid the institution of wood-infesting beetles, the company didn't spray by hand. Rather a large tarp was installed over the structure and a pesticide was introduced to the building for a period of 48 hours.

The company recently handled the fumigation of a tapestry for the Detroit Institute of Arts. Other accounts include grocery stores, retail outlets and homes, the latter making up 20 percent of the company's clients.

With 240 employees and 16 branches spread throughout Michigan, Indiana and Ohio, the company's services include pest management, termite control, in-

# JA shifts gears, broadens focus

Why should a child struggle through math if he or she doesn't see a relationship between school-work and how products are priced, research projects are funded or accounts receivable calculated?

An organization that has undergone major changes in the last few years but is still encouraging business-to-student relationships is Junior Achievement (JA).

"When you get in a classroom and students start competing in groups, with each group trying to maximize the success of a common company, it gets very exciting," said Jeff Bergeron, a partner with the Big Six accounting firm of Arthur Andersen in Detroit, and a West Bloomfield resident.

Bergeron, recently elected chairman of the JA chapter of southeastern Michigan, a two-year term that concentrates on fund-raising and administration, said the organization has recently expanded from its original concept of teaching high school students to run miniature companies.

The group's focus now includes applied economic

programs for middle and high school-aged students, a pilot program for potential dropouts as well as additional effort in recruiting young people from disadvantaged areas.

"The kids who get involved in JA want to get a jump start on college or the job market, either by their own initiative or their parents'," said Bergeron. "Some of the courses are what a student would face in college, so it gives those kids an advantage."

The JA chapter of southeastern Michigan has more than 40,000 students, most of whom come from metro Detroit. Thanks to financial support from 24,000 companies, teachers can use JA programs at no cost to their schools. The middle school curriculum teaches basic concepts of business and economics to students while high school students start their own small companies.

"Once students are given the opportunity to see business success in motion, they begin to see a light at the end of the tunnel. If they stay in school and





# Squirrel has great memory when it comes to nuts

Do you know what the most photographed wild animal in America is? According to a 1985 federal government survey, it's the squirrel. If you have them in your backyard, you know they are very photogenic and that they can do some pretty amazing

things. Their "tightrope" walking ability across telephone lines, their ability to jump from twig to twig, and their persistence in foiling our anti-squirrel devices are evidence enough that we are dealing with an amazing mammal. Fall is the time when we often think about these industrious neighbors because they are busy storing nuts for the winter season. Searching a lawn will often reveal several little holes where a squirrel has deposited a nut. Several

months later, when fresh food supplies are scarce, they will dig up a nut and use it for energy. This is a procedure we are all familiar with, but let's look at this procedure a little closer. How do they find those nuts that they buried? They don't find all of them, because we have young oak trees sprouting every year, but they do find most of them. For many years squirrels were thought to find their food by their sense of smell. Mammals have a

keen sense of smell, and since they buried the nut, they could leave an odor that would be detectable at a later date. It makes sense, but according to two separate studies, it's not the way they find their buried nuts. They find them by remembering where they buried them. It may seem hard for us to believe that such a small little animal could remember where all those nuts were buried, but that is exactly what the studies showed. They memorize the location of the buried nut in relation to local landmarks. If those landmarks are moved, or covered with snow, their retrieval rate is reduced. That is one reason why we

see some young oak sprouts in our yard. This could be a hard winter for squirrels. Last year was a big mast or acorn crop which occurs about every three years. That means this year and next year, every acorn a squirrel buries will be essential for its survival. Backyard feeding stations could be very helpful for these furry friends during the next two years. Providing cracked corn, whole corn, or sunflower seeds will help them survive through the cold winter season.

## Livonia gallery plans to celebrate local art

With her livelihood at stake, she's not about to wait for the economy to spring back and bring in more patrons.

A believer in creating opportunities, Nelson's Gallery director Laura Hardy is planning her most ambitious promotional effort yet: "Art As Gift," a three-week celebration of the arts from a local perspective.

Hardy's intent is not only to capture the winds of artistry in an exciting new way, but also boost interest in the 5-year-old gallery, 16376 Middlebelt, between Five and Six Mile, in Terrence Corners.

The gallery offers fine art, posters, prints and custom picture framing. A typical month features the artwork of four artists, including an artist of the month.

Hardy has invited seven emerging metro artists to showcase up to a dozen pieces each Nov. 7-30 and to demonstrate their skills the first three Saturdays of November.

Their palettes span the artistic spectrum:  
■ Nov. 7 — noon to 2 p.m., Tom Dyer of Waterford, pencil portraits; 3-5 p.m., Janel Agar of Livonia, airbrushing.

■ Nov. 14 — noon to 2 p.m., Jacqui Sulesky of Milford, watercolor; 2:30-4:30 p.m., Christine Wong of Livonia, Chinese brush painting.

■ Nov. 21 — noon to 5 p.m., Greg Aylesworth of Royal Oak, mixed media; Gwen Dietrich of Canton, pastel; John Shannon of Wayne, hand-painted furniture art.

### Wide-ranging quality

"Some of the artists are graduates of fine art schools, some are self-taught. But the quality is there for all," Hardy said. "I'm really excited. I can't wait. It's going to be a nice change — something a little different."

It won't be high-brow. Says Hardy: "We don't want it to be stuffy. We want people to feel at ease, to relax with cider and doughnuts, and to enjoy watching the artists work."

Dietrich, artist of the month in March 1991, looks forward to the camaraderie, exposure and personalized format.

"People can look over our shoulder to see how we create a piece of artwork. And that's important," she said. "It means more when you know what goes into making a piece of art."

She sees the artists working together not only to exhibit affordable original artwork in time for the holiday season, but also spark interest in the gallery.

A graduate of Parsons School of Design in New York, Dietrich likes to interact — even with folks whose knowledge of art is casual. "In terms of technique and subject matter, all feedback is valuable," she said.

The idea for a group exhibition came from some of the artists themselves.

"In talking, we thought it'd be really interesting for them to come back to the gallery to show their newer pieces and let the public watch them at work," Hardy said. "I've tried for probably a good year to see how I could put something like this together."

Hardy decided which artists to ultimately invite to assure a diversity of art forms.

### 'It's been tough'

Over the past two years, strong competition from higher-end art galleries, a lagging economy and road construction on Middlebelt have combined against Hardy to deliver a triple whammy.

"It's been tough," Hardy said. "So we really do need to try some unique things to draw attention to us. I'm trying to let people know you don't always have to pay \$5,000 for a piece of nice artwork. Who knows: A lot of our artists might be famous in 20 years. It doesn't hurt to check us out."

Fine art shown at Nelson's ranges in price from \$100 to \$1,200.

"I can't say business is up but it's definitely picking up," Hardy said. "The artist of the month is catching on, the mailing list is getting larger, more magazines are listing our shows. And people invited to shows by artists who are their friends now come back for other shows. It's taking time but we're catching on — we really are."

The November exhibition also will feature a variety of artists specially invited by Hardy: "My hope is to give them a little bit of recognition. Each will have at least five pieces."

These artists include Dan Collins of Canton, who sketches in pencil. "His work is very beautiful," Hardy said. "He has a unique style — vivid colors, great detail. When you see his work, it makes you happy. That's how I can best describe it."

The spotlight also will turn to the photography of Mary Gilardone of Milford and Randy Lentz of Redford, the automotive gouache of Roger Hardnock of Westland and the oils on canvas of Diane Mitchell of Canton. Sheri Nudell of Farmington Hills will show fused-glass plates plus decorated mirrors and handmade jewelry with fused-glass accents.

## Woodworker cuts way into art world

Up to now, woodworker Jerry Jordan of Livonia hasn't considered himself an artist.

It all started last spring when his wife, Lenore, spotted a notice in the Livonia city newsletter asking hobbyists to display their work at the library's Civic Center branch.

"I thought of Jerry's woodworking right away. Not many people can put wood together and make it look so pretty," she said. "I called the library and the first display opening was in August. That's Jerry's birthday, so I thought, 'What a great present.'"

The display last summer was a pleasant surprise for Jerry Jordan (whose family escorted him to the library on his birthday) and a treat for library visitors, who rarely left the display without mentioning the fine woodwork.

"People often comment on the showcases on their way out of the building," said Donna Grodeski,


Civic Center Branch librarian. "So many remarked on the craftsmanship and quality of the woodworking. It was a beautiful exhibit."

Jordan's work, including detailed boxes, bowls, jewelry and accessories, made of exotic and hard woods, is on display again through November in the main floor showcases of the Civic Center Branch of the Livonia Public Library. The display of more than 40 pieces includes some new work made after the summer exhibit.

"(Woodworking) is relaxing for me. It's what I like to do," Jordan said. "It feels good to share it at the library."

Jordan, 45, started woodworking in his grandfather's workshop at age 12, about the time he got his first toolbox. The two did rough carpentry work for years, making boxes and shelves from wooden grocery store crates.

## Artist's pastel portrait paces VAAL show

Artist Regina Dunn was in disbelief when told she won Best of Show for "The Chief," a pastel portrait, in the Visual Arts Association of Livonia's fall art show at Livonia City Hall.

The opening reception for the 104-piece show, sponsored by the city of Livonia and the Livonia Arts Commission, will be 2-4 p.m. Sunday, Nov. 1, in the city hall lobby, Farm-

ington Road and Five Mile. The show runs to Nov. 13.

"I had never entered anything before. I was surprised and happy," said Dunn in an interview at her Livonia home.

Bill Borden of Dearborn, a Cleveland Institute of Arts graduate, Ford Motor Co. industrial designer and nationally acclaimed watercolorist, judged the show in which Dunn took top honors along with first place in mixed media for another pastel portrait, "The Redhead."

About Dunn's Best of Show, he said, "All the elements of professional presentation are there: high quality of design, composition and color."

Born in Cuba, Dunn left in the mid-1940s to study fine art in the U.S. The pragmatic aunt with whom she lived suggested commercial art

would ensure a stable income, so Dunn compromised her dream studying commercial art/retail at the Society of Arts and Crafts (now known as Center for Creative Studies) in Detroit. One of her professors there was the legendary Sarkis Sarkisian.

"I never figured out why, in those days, they separated the boys and girls enrolled in commercial art. The boys studied automotive, the girls, retail," Dunn said.

At the beginning of her fourth year at CCS, she accepted an offer of an illustrator position at J.L. Hudson's in downtown Detroit. After 15 years, Dunn shelved her advertising career to raise four children.

When the children reached age 4 or 5, Dunn began to free lance. For the

Today, he uses oak, walnut, cherry, birch, beech and curly maple, plus exotic woods such as padouk, purple heart, teak and rosewood to make small chests and accessories with the look and finish of fine furniture.

Since his workshop isn't roomy enough for a lathe, Jordan does most of his cutting with a scroll saw. He sands by hand to shape bowls and other round objects.

For Jordan, part-owner of a Livonia company that designs parts for materials handling equipment, woodworking is just a hobby. But since the recognition from the library exhibit, he has started to think about selling a limited-edition piece or two through a gift store or gallery.

"Right now, I don't sell anything. I'm too slow and too darned fussy. It would take the fun out of it (woodworking) if I knew I had to produce something to fill an order," he said.

For now, the self-taught artist likes to experiment by combining two or three exotic woods in a piece and alternating the grain. He spends countless hours in the finishing stage, wet sanding and oiling each piece until it glistens.

After drawing a plan and selecting the wood for a project, Jordan cuts out the pieces and does a "test assembly."

After adjusting for a perfect fit, he sands the pieces and assembles with glue or pegs. He prefers an oil finish to stain or lacquer.

In addition to boxes and chests with bevels, moldings, dovetail joints and gracefully turned feet, Jordan makes combs and mirrors, bowls, baskets, pens, clipboards and carved jewelry.

He uses oak, walnut or cherry to make a shapely comb with a large, turned handle; the "teeth" are made of padouk, an African wood. The pieces are glued together and sanded "until they fit like a cork in a bottle," said Lenore Jordan. A matching mirror is made of small squares of wood cut the same size and set in diagonally.

A covered chess board is made by alternating squares of oak and another hard wood. His small clam-shaped jewelry box opens and closes on a wood hinge.

The woodworker also likes to decorate surfaces with an inlay (a design set in a recessed area). He once used dental amalgam for stars in the top of a small box.

He also decorates boxes with a rounded, raised pattern called intarsia. Each piece of wood that makes up the pattern is cut, rounded off on top by fine-sanding and glued down. The look is the reverse of an inlay.

Jordan, a former South Lyon High School teacher, designs many of his projects. Other ideas come from woodworking magazines or from the stores that sell exotic woods: Wood Craft, Redford Township; Shopsmith, Canton; Woodworker's Store, Royal Oak; and Armstrong Millworks, Highland.

If he had more space, Jordan probably would make furniture and other big pieces.

The Livonia Public Library Civic Center Branch is at Five Mile and Farmington roads. Hours are 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. Monday-Thursday and 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Friday-Saturday.

next 20 years, she rendered illustrations for J.L. Hudson's, Jacobson's, Hughes & Hatcher, Himelhoch's and Ross Roy.

Dunn retired in 1985 to follow her dream of creating fine art. She returned to Center for Creative

Studies in 1987. "At that point I had to decide, do I want to get my degree or enjoy my artwork," she said.

Dunn decided in favor of the latter. Today, she continues to create art and study at the Bir-

mingham Bloomfield Art Association with Karen Wydra, Leslie Masters, Marie Larson and Mary Aro.

"I love pastel and watercolor. They're quicker and there's less mess to clean," she said. "Pastel came easier for me because of the drawing I did for years in advertising. I like anything with drawing, with line. Drawing is everything to me."

Dunn sketches from life every day, either outdoors or from still life set up inside. "I love to draw. I'm always sketching, even the dog. When I travel, I always take it with me. When I go to Florida, I take watercolors to sketch."

Dunn first lays down the dark colors, leaving lighter ones till the end. "I like working with warm colors. Dark color impress me and I like things with (a sense of) light."

For flesh tones, she uses a greenish-yellow undertone.

Problems that she encounters work their way out. "I'm always unhappy with my work. You always learn by finishing up," Dunn said.

It seems, she says, she's "always stopping something like cooking dinner to sketch." William, her husband of more than 30 years, and their four children provide plenty of support.

When asked why she continues to sketch and draw with pastel after all these years, Dunn replied, "because I love it. I can't imagine living without it. It's part of me."

Toni Stevens of Plymouth received the Livonia Arts Commission Award of \$200 for "Petunias IV," a watercolor. In his juror's comments, Borden stated, "This painting directs the viewer through strong composition, to see the delicacy of line in color in a way reminiscent of Georgia O'Keefe."

The Grumbacher Award for Best Use of Color went to Beverly Johnston of Livonia for "Red Objects," a mixed media work.

Whether you're an art collector, animal lover or history aficionado, or simply would like to learn more about investing in the carousel art phenomena, come ride the merry-go-round. Grab your chance to catch the brass ring.

Majestic white steeds in medieval armor, a zebra, a cat and goats take center stage at the second annual carousel art auction hosted by collector Jon Abbott and partner Gordon Riewe 11 a.m. Saturday, Oct. 31, at the Holiday Inn of Farmington Hills, 10 Mile and Grand River. A preview will take place 5-9 p.m. Friday, Oct. 30. There is a \$5 admission charge.

"You have a lot of interest because it's an art form at the turn of the century," Abbott said in an interview at his Clarkston home.

Carousel art collector Joseph Orlando of Livonia attended last year's auction. He has collected 10 horses over the last 10 years, including a Herschell-Spillman, Dentzel and Dare.

"I think of it as a big sculpture, a big piece of artwork. A lot of people think it's funny when they see one in someone's kitchen but it's like a painting, you can put it anywhere," Orlando said.

The Livonia teacher said he originally bought a pair because he "always wanted one and I can't think of a better investment."

Carousel animals up for auction from the Abbott collection and others around the country were primarily carved by masters Marcus Illions, Gustav Dentzel, Daniel and Alfred Muller and Charles Carmel.

Abbott and his wife, Barbara, bought the first carousel horse in their collection, a Loeff outside row stander, in 1974.

"We bought it as a sculpture. There are a lot of people buying them as a sculpture," Abbott said.

Abbott's genuine love for the colorful carvings shines through on a tour of the family home and grounds. At least one or more carousel animals live in each room of the Abbott home, including the kitchen. A butting ram carved by Daniel Muller, similar to a figure in the auction, stands against a living room wall opposite a Muller deer, near exact to one some lucky bidder will take home. Expressive, sensitive eyes hallmark Muller's animals, the horses assuming poses of classic equestrian statuary.

"The ram's one of only five left. Muller is top of the line as a carver. His figures are proportioned and very well done."

On the upstairs landing, a cat jumps with joy over a fish he has caught. The sassy feline is a 1910 Dentzel, created by Salvatore Cernigliaro. Originally, there were 36. Eighteen remain.

"Some of the carousel animals are prettier than others. It's like a painting: The beauty is in the eye of the beholder."

The tour continues to the barn, where an outside row stander covered with more than

150 jewels by Illions reflects a thorough knowledge of Greek and Roman sculpture. Illions' artworks began with lifesize sketches after he studied the movements and mannerisms of horses at nearby racetracks. His lifelike poses and manes blowing wild in the wind are legendary in the world of carousel art collectors.

The Illions Coney Island style horse waits alongside a 1913 Dentzel topknot jumper horse, and a horse and a goat from the Boblo merry-go-round.

"They get smaller and plainer as they go in. This one was from the third row," Abbott said, pointing to the topknot.

The largest outside row animals, elaborately carved and decorated, off park machines command the highest prices, while smaller figures off portable country fair machines exact less.

As Abbott opens one last door, a garage full of carousel animals come to life. A proud rooster in a trot catches a glimpse of visitors out of the corner of his glass eye. A cute little German horse fools the outsider into thinking that his mane moved, whisked by the wind.

The golden age of the carousel dates from 1890 to 1925, when a handful of European woodcarvers migrated to America in search of their dreams. Unable to find work in the furniture or architectural industry, they joined the lucrative amusement business, carving carousels.

The average carousel horse consists of about 40 basswood and poplar pieces crafted in one of three styles: Coney Island, flamboyant with New York glitz; Philadelphia, realistic; and Country or County Fair, smaller and portable.

The idea behind the 19th century American carousel wasn't new. In A.D. 500, Spanish crusaders played a similar game on their way across Europe. By the 1700s, the French invented "carousel," a competition where knights on wooden horses threw lances through golden rings.

At the turn of this century, 2,500 to 6,000 carousels whirled to the music of the band organ; approximately 130 remain after fire, floods and neglect took their toll. Even fewer carousels survive in Michigan. They are at the Henry Ford Museum at Greenfield Village in Dearborn, Historical Crossroads Village in Flint, the Grand Rapids Museum and Auto World in Lansing.

"A respectable indicator of their art value is that museums are starting to take an interest in them."

The fact that prominent art auction houses have gotten into the picture in the last three years serves as yet another indicator of the artistic and historical value of carousel art. While enthusiasts argue about whether figures are fine art or folk art, Sotheby's and Christie's East in New York have placed carousel animals on the auction block.

"Many authorities in the field consider them works of art, and they are rare, so it's a golden opportunity for investors," said auc-

tion publicist Rose Szwed of Southfield.

People from all walks of life fall for the sound and magic of the carousel. Abbott sold one horse to the late singer/actor Rick Nelson, and two horses to actor Charles Bronson.

"A female mail carrier buys one like clockwork every 18 to 24 months and a female draftsman, one a year. One fellow had a house built to showcase 40 carousel horses and there are plenty of stories I could tell about the eccentrics, too," Abbott said.

"I think a lot of women buy them for nostalgia. The men buy them as a sculpture and because they're a heck of an investment."

Many carousel art collectors decorate their homes with the animals.

## Builders seeking housing president

■ While builder associations realize there will be no miracle cure for the housing industry, they believe that staying the course with President Bush is more prudent than gambling on either Bill Clinton or H. Ross Perot.

Forget the polls, think about the economy.

If the home building and construction industry has its way, it's President George Bush who will win the White House come Nov. 3, not Governor Bill Clinton or independent H. Ross Perot.

Lynn Egbert, executive vice president for government affairs of the Michigan Association of Home Builders, said MAHB endorses Bush because the association feels he will get the country moving again.

"What's good for the economy is good for builders," he said.

"We believe he believes the private sector, the business sector, will provide jobs and get the economy moving again.

"The other candidates have not shown that," he said.

This year's election features a fundamental difference, he said. Bush's philosophy is that if left to its own, the private sector will drive the economy.

Clinton's philosophy is that government can drive the economy forward through legislation, he said. The biggest knock against Clinton is his proposal to raise taxes. Any tax increase, Egbert said, is contrary to the building industry's best interests.

As for the independent candidate, Egbert said Perot's proposals are too drastic and not likely to encourage any building.

"There probably are a lot of builders who are leaning toward Perot," he said, but added such an inclination is based more on dissatisfaction with the current economy than any real proposals favoring the building industry.

Bush wins on every criteria the MAHB uses to evaluate a candidate, Egbert continued. It is an economy under Bush that will boost housing starts and sales, ease the credit crunch, help first-buyers, encourage the multi-housing industry, balance jobs against the environment and protect the mortgage interest deduction.

The Construction Association of Michigan, likewise, has endorsed George Bush.

Fred Gee, CAM government affairs committee chairman, said after 10 months of evaluating legislative issues, it was determined Bush and the Republican Party best serve the industry interests.

"It's been a policy of the association to basically support those candidates that have a record of support for business in general or the construction industry in particular," he said.

"The safest bet is Bush," Gee said.

"Whatever taxes or encumbrances are placed on the economy is eventually bad for the industry," he said. "George Bush best represents that philosophy."

Gee said while some of Clinton's proposals show promise — plans to rebuild the infrastructure, for example — the candidate has been short on details.

"Clinton does a lot of talking, but he hasn't come out with any real plans to do it," he said.

Perot was not selected for the same reason, he said.

Egbert of MAHB said the home builders endorsement has nothing to do with party affiliation. "Builders are conservative; George Bush is conservative."

Even in those instances where Bush and Clinton share views favorable to the building industry, Egbert said the president is the better choice.


"(Bush) was the first one out of the block."

Egbert points to Bush proposal earlier this year allowing a \$5,000 tax credit for first-time homebuyers. Bush also pushed for a law allowing people to tap into Individual Retirement Accounts (either the buyers themselves or a buyer's parents) to make down payments.

Those proposals, which were never approved by the U.S. Congress, would have been a big help to the industry, Egbert said.

## 'Sense of presence' marks winners

Architectural firms here snapped up four of the six Honorary Awards announced this year by the American Institute of Architects Michigan, a professional association.

Luckenbach/Ziegelman and Partners of Birmingham was selected for the Chester Street parking structure in that community. Giffels Associates of Southfield was cited for an Amoco research and development facility in Alpharetta, Ga.

"Each jury is different based upon personalities and background," said Art Smith, a Southfield architect and design award chairman.

"Typically, for any award program they're looking for architecture with a sense of presence, responsiveness to its

surroundings and program that seems to meet the client's needs and objectives.

"It's a fairly prestigious honor," Smith added. "It's received with a lot of admiration, I believe, within the profession. If you win an award, it's an opportunity to boast a little bit."

The winners:

■ Merrill Park Townhomes — Seven attached single-family residences create the atmosphere of a street of row houses.

■ Resurrection Cemetery — The project consists of three mausoleum buildings containing 5,000 crypts, a covered circulation gallery incorporating 1,000 wall niches and a chapel.

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
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


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# What's hot, what's not in home design



**Lighten up:** Vaulted ceilings and large windows transform an ordinary room into one that's inviting.

(AP) — Debating whether to add an additional bathroom or fireplace to your house? Here are some suggestions from Home Plan Ideas magazine of popular amenities that add lasting value to a house.

■ **Some house features, such as skylights and cathedral ceilings, can raise a house's building price. But many of these features will pay off in your enjoyment of the house now and in its resale value in the future.**

■ **Architecture for timeless appeal.** Exterior appeal is important. Traditional architecture offers the best bet if you anticipate selling your house in the future. Egbert also said many of Clinton's proposals for Federal Housing Administration reform have already been proposed by Housing and Urban Development secretary Jack Kemp, who was appointed by George Bush.

## Similarities

According to the candidates' election committees, both candidates oppose changes to the mortgage interest deduction allowing homeowner tax deductions.

Both candidates also support efforts to encourage lenders to make financing more accessible and ease regulatory bias against real estate loans.

Clinton has proposed a network of development banks to lend in depressed areas.

Both candidates also favor easing passive loss rules for real estate professionals.

On Federal Housing Administration loans, Bush favors reforms to strengthen FHA's financial strength and expand loan underwriting to the multi-housing industry; Clinton has proposed raising FHA mortgage insurance cap to 95 percent of an area's median price.

Both candidates have also stressed a need to balance economic growth with environmental concerns.


Gee of CAM said the industry is not deluding itself into thinking that a Bush win would mean a quick return to prosperity.

## Parents need fair hand for disciplining

As a child I can still remember the firm voices of both my parents Ethel and Major Carter, saying to me after I did something inappropriate, "Now you'll have to be punished." The word punish scared me more than the actual punishment. Feeling sorry for myself, not necessarily for my actions, I would imagine myself being locked in a basement with not a bag of cookies to call my own. Then I would think about how thirsty I would get.

However, as a child my ability to overdramatize a situation, as most young children often do, certainly didn't result in my loving parents actually doing such a horrible thing to me or my four sisters.

Usually, the punishment was a swift spanking during my early years, and later during adolescence throughout my teens withholding of privileges. This would also be accompanied by consistently long, long lectures, which at this age defined punishment.

Parents today through parent education, TV, radio, newspaper media, publications and hands-on experience should recognize that spanking is considered an appropriate self-servicing method of discipline. Spanking does indeed temporarily stop the undesirable behavior, but what does it teach the child? To be physically subjected to adult temperament and control?

## All dressed up: Exhibit focuses on first ladies

■ When it comes to style, some of the most closely scrutinized are the country's first ladies. Often what they wear is noticed more than what they do while living at 1600 Pennsylvania Ave. Now, there's an exhibit of what they wore for those all important inaugural balls.

Presidents have come and gone through the years, and the same can be said of fashions.

That's evident from looking at the new Plymouth Historical Museum exhibit, "The First Ladies of Fashion." The exhibit, which will continue through late January, includes 14 reproductions of inaugural ballgowns commissioned by the Republican Party in the early 1970s.

"It's a wonderful exhibit," said Donna Keough, exhibits chairwoman for the Plymouth Historical Society, which operates the museum. "We're very lucky to have it."

The gowns were commissioned by the GOP, but wives of Democratic presidents are represented along with their Republican counterparts.

"We're doing our best to stay above it all," Keough said of partisan politics. The ballgown collection belongs to the Frankenthum Historical Museum's Joan Deer Collection. Fabrics and designs were selected to be as close to the originals as possible, and are based on the original gowns at the Smithsonian Institution.

local exhibit are: Martha Washington; Dolly Madison; Louisa Adams; Sarah Polk; Abigail Fillmore; Julia Grant; Helen Taft; Florence Harding; Grace Coolidge; Lou Hoover; Eleanor Roosevelt; Lady Bird Johnson; Patricia Nixon; and Rosalyn Carter. The exhibit's gowns cover the time span from 1789 to 1980.

Dr. Weldon Petz, a retired educator and supporter of the Plymouth Historical Museum, and his wife are friends of the two men who coordinated design and research for the project. Petz had mentioned that the gowns were available for an exhibit.

"We thought it would be very appropriate. They're just wonderful," Keough said. She's found it interesting "to see the change in fashion over all these years. It gives you an idea of the progression of fashion."

The two Frankenthum men who coordinated the project did a great deal of sketching at the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, D.C.; photography of the original First Ladies gowns there wasn't allowed, so they had to rely on such sketches, Keough said.

## Canoeists pursue dream on 21,000-mile journey

If a husband ever wanted to give his new wife a honeymoon to remember, Verleen Kruger hit the jackpot. Two months after they married, the couple set off on the trip of a lifetime — from the top to the bottom of the western hemisphere in a canoe.

Labeled "canoe-lyweds" by journalists covering their trip, the Krugers started their trek in May 1986 at Tuktoyaktuk on the edge of the Beaufort Sea in Canada's Northwest Territories and ended two years and nine months later in March 1989 at Cape Horn Island at the tip of South America.

"There was never a time I wanted to quit," Valerie said. "There were times I wanted it to end and times I didn't think I could go on, but I never wanted to quit."

"I had gone on this trip to push my horizons; I had gone to have the courage to face change, so it was more than an adventure or a canoe trip."

The Krugers opened the 29th season of Livonia Town Hall Oct. 21 with a two-hour presentation on the two-continent canoe expedition, entertaining the audience with stories and slides of their trip. But the presentation went beyond the standard travelogue, since much of the tale evolved from the squares of quilt made with material Valerie collected during the trip.

Colorful expression

"One of the difficult portions of this trip was leaving home," Valerie said. "I was leaving so much

behind that I wondered how I would express myself, so I began collecting fabric."

With the help of a quilting group, Valerie fashioned three quilts, one depicting a map of the western hemisphere and the route the canoeists took. The second is made of bright colored fabric from Caribbean countries and so named the Caribbean quilt. The third is the story quilt, fashioned from tradition quilt squares, each depicting a portion of the trip.

The bear claw square in the upper right corner reminds the Krugers of their encounter with a bear along the Mackenzie River. Valerie had decided to put an apple in her sleeping bag for a late night snack, but a bear decided he wanted it, too. Her screaming sent the bear running, pursued by Verleen who wanted a photograph.

"It was bare chasing bear," Valerie quipped. "Verleen was so excited about getting a picture, he didn't bother to put his pants on."

And rest assured the "bare" got a picture of the bear, which he proudly displayed during the slide presentation.

While Valerie kept journals, 37 in all, of the trip, Verleen documented it on film. His slide collection numbers 35,000 of which Town Hall guests saw a mere 280.

Residents of Lansing, the Krugers were designated citizen ambassadors for the state by then Gov. James Blanchard, did water quality tests for their



## St. Maurice concert attracts contemporary singing groups

Johanne Hepp and the members of her singing ensemble want audiences to "feel the music inside."

Hepp, a Canton resident, is co-director of the contemporary ensemble at St. Ives Catholic Church in Southfield.

On Sunday, the St. Ives group will be one of several contemporary church groups performing in concert at St. Maurice Catholic Church in Livonia.

"We want people to tap into their own personal feelings," said Hepp, 25, a middle school teacher. "It can be whatever you want it to be."

Eight contemporary music groups will be represented at the concert, which begins at 3 p.m. St. Maurice is at 32765 Lyndon, north of the I-96 freeway service drive and east of Farmington Road.

Tickets, available at the door, are \$3 each or \$6 per family.

The St. Maurice contemporary ensemble is hosting the concert. The other participating groups include the Good News Singers of St. Sebastian Church, Dearborn; Restore the Glory, St. Isadore, Clinton Township; St. Cyril Folk Group, Taylor; Contemporary Singers of St. Mary of Redford Church, Detroit.

Others are the Psalm 150 Ensemble Jazz Instrumental Group, and the Levitical Singers of Rosedale Park Baptist, Detroit.

"We really believe in contemporary music," said Joe Podorsek of Livonia, director of the St. Maurice ensemble. "We believe music is an important part of the liturgy."

Co-sponsoring the concert is the Association of Contemporary Liturgical Musicians. The Royal Oak-based group promotes the use of contemporary religious music.

This style of music often uses less traditional instrumentation, such as guitars, vibraphones, drums and synthesizers. Lyrics are presented with a fresh interpretation.

The concert hopes to "turn people on to unusual music," said Podorsek, owner of a Redford vacuum cleaner shop. "It promotes inspiration and family values."

Each group will present at least three songs, one of which is to have a Christmas or Advent theme.

The St. Maurice ensemble, which numbers around 20 people, will present a rock-and-roll, bluesy song, the likes of which are "not often heard in a Catholic church," Podorsek said.

At St. Ives, Hepp shares directorial duties with Dawn Cibor of Southfield. During the concert, the 12-member group will sing a contemporary interpretation of "Silent Night," Hepp said.

"It's very simple and serene, something you can really feel inside," Hepp said.

Hepp, band director at Levey Middle School in Southfield, has belonged to the St. Ives contemporary group for around six years and has been its leader for more than three years. She plays the flute.

Hepp's husband Chris, a designer for a computer company, is a bass player and also belongs to the ensemble.

Other selections will include a bright, upbeat piece called "Lift Up Your Hearts," and a song about forgiveness, called "Change Our Hearts." The flute will be prominently featured during a piece called "Sing, Sing a New Song."

Smithsonian officials have put away many of the original gowns, out of concern about fabric deterioration, she said. The reproductions are very close to the originals, and visitors can see them at the Plymouth Historical Museum, 155 S. Main, rather than having to travel to the nation's capital. (Museum hours are 1-4 p.m. Wednesday, Thursday and Saturday, 2-5 p.m. Sunday.)

Gowns include a red velvet style, representative of one worn by Grace Coolidge in the 1920s. A beaded gown, representative of one made in the Philippines for Helen Taft, is also featured.

The political theme at the museum will continue through the holiday season, with members of the Trailwood Garden Club planning to decorate Christmas trees with items based on different eras. Presidencies of George Washington, Millard Fillmore, Ulysses S. Grant, Warren G. Harding and Franklin Delano Roosevelt will be highlighted.

Political memorabilia displayed isn't limited to those presidencies, but represents many eras, Keough said. Other museum mannequins are dressed in a variety of period clothing styles. Several antique coverlets are displayed,

along with dolls dressed in miniature reproductions of the inaugural gowns.

Fashion lovers will particularly enjoy the exhibit, but car buffs will also find something to their liking, she said. In addition to the museum's own Alter car, manufactured in Plymouth in 1915, a 1931 Ford Victoria, on loan from a Plymouth resident, is exhibited.

## PIs 'watch' with aid of computers

If Harold Sneath Jr. comes looking for you, he's not necessarily bringing bad news — or seeking it.

Sneath and Kathy Harvie, both Canton residents, are partners in Information Plus Inc., based in Plymouth.

"We do a lot of things," said Sneath, 46, a former Detroit police officer. "We track down people for law firms and for individual companies." They locate witnesses, do background investigations on prospective employees, and even help to track down parents who haven't been making child support payments.

"It's a national operation," he said of their business, which includes work done for major employers and for smaller firms. They don't really identify with TV shows or movies that glamorize the life of investigators.

"It's not like 'Magnum P.I.' or anything like that," he said. "You'd starve to death."


Sneath considers "The Rockford Files" the most accurate portrayal of private investigators. Jim Rockford, the main character, lived in a trailer, did his tax audits out of a shoe box — and got beat up regularly, something he and Harvie don't have to worry about.

"They'll never be able to create that image again," he said of the show.

Harvie's found some people are surprised that women work in her field. "They think it's great." Some friends and relatives do, however, worry about access via computer to personal information that could be put to detrimental uses.

### Professionalism matters

"We try very hard to maintain a good level of integrity here," Sneath said. Their research — which includes extensive computer use and some 500-600 long distance calls per month — involves mostly information available through public sources.

"We research data that's out there legally under the Freedom of Information Act. We do legitimate searches for beneficial reasons."

One case involved a major investigation of actor Brian Keith, who played Buffy's uncle on the "Family Affair" TV show. Keith was being investigated by a major sponsor of the Super Bowl, and research revealed nothing but good things about him.

That story took an interesting twist. The sponsor ended up not using Keith and instead went with a rock group which later had high-profile drug abuse problems.

The roots of Information Plus (416-1306) go back many years. "Kathy started working for me a long time ago." After leaving the Detroit Police Department in 1981, Sneath got into investigative work and didn't really like it.

He had a guard company for a while, and then got into computer research, taking some courses to

are also handled for private par become more proficient on the computer. "We're learning every day on how to gain sources."

They're required to adhere to strict licensing standards and to agreements with credit bureaus. Sneath turns down just about every personal private caller, instead working primarily with established companies, licensed agencies, law firms, rental agencies and others "that have true, obvious reasons to conduct searches."

"I can generally judge." In some cases, he does assist private callers, including some who are doing adoption searches.

"Credit reports, I question every one of them. We have to have a signed release for every consumer credit report."

ties; he began working several months ago with two women from the Association for Children for Enforcement of Support (ACES).

They were looking for their former husbands, and hadn't had much luck through the Friend of the Court system. Heavy case-loads and lack of resources impede the work of the Friend of the Court, Sneath said. He has access to credit data banks, helping him to track non-payers.

Sneath and Harvie have found some information sources aren't entirely accurate. Some collection agencies are rather fly by night; they don't always adhere to the highest standards when it comes to accuracy and tend to favor the subscriber over the individual, he said.

"It's the credit reporting that makes the information wrong." Government agencies, such as the IRS, can also be sources of inaccurate information.

Does the work they do make them think less of humanity? "I think I'm more sensitive to people's feelings than I was" as a police officer, he said. That work demanded that he not respond personally, although that was difficult to do in child abuse cases.

"I think there's good in everybody."

There's scant interest in the activities of most everyday individuals, he said. An acquaintance might, for example, be envious of nice clothes you wear, but isn't likely to spend \$1,000 to find out where that apparel was bought.

Standards are, however, quite different for public figures, whether they're politicians or television evangelists, he believes. "If you live in a glass house, you shouldn't put stones in your flower bed. It's life in the '90s and it's going to be life in the 2000s."

Some data, such as sex crimes information compiled by the Michigan State Police, is put to beneficial uses, he added. Privacy concerns are legitimate, but must be balanced with other considerations.

sponsor, General Motors, and acid rain tests for Michigan State University.

Since their journey started during the state's sesquicentennial, the Krugers were asked, and did, paddle the shape of the state during October, November and December of 1986.

The trip was a cold one, so much so that while crossing Keweenaw Bay, the couple were frozen into their 17-foot canoes, which Verleen had designed. The canoes were "ultimate high tech," designed so that they could be hooked together like a catamaran.

They became home for the adventure that included breaking the British Royal Air Force record for paddling from the headwaters to the end of the Mississippi River in 19 days, no small feat considering Valerie is 40 and Verleen is 70.

"We had a living room with wide open space and a kitchen that changed with every meal," Valerie said. "We also had the spirit."

Verleen estimates that they each did 16 million paddle strokes during the trip. Their longest crossing came while island hopping in the Caribbean. It took 55 hours to paddle 90 miles. The most memorable part of the trip for Valerie also happened in the Caribbean at Black River Harbor.

### Pilgrim's journey

"The best part was finding land and seeing it take shape," Valerie said. "As we got closer, I saw a native woman, waving to us. And as we got even closer, she waded out and pulled us in. She didn't know who we were; she hadn't listened to WJR, hadn't read a newspaper, but she told us 'You're on a pilgrim's journey.'"

And the "pilgrims" experienced a lot. While traversing the South American continent, Verleen was attacked by killer bees, an episode that was written up in a February 1990 edition of the National Enquirer.

"I pinched one in my shirt and killed it and they swarmed all over me," he told the audience. "By the time I got into the tent, I had a half dozen stings."

Verleen's canoe design proved a Godsend when they hit the worst flooding in 100 years in Paraguay. They arrived in Asuncion the day

before the flood arrived and ended up eating, sleeping and living in the canoes for 14 days and nights because they couldn't find the edge of the river.

There was even a close brush with tragedy when Valerie's canoe capsized in the surf and she hit her head. A CAT scan showed no adverse effects and the Krugers continued on, saving the worse for last, where the Pacific and Atlantic oceans come together.

### Land's end

"Our last campsite was on the windswept islands before we made the six-mile crossing to Cape Horn Island," Verleen said. "Cape Horn isn't that impressive unless you've paddle 21,000 miles to get there."

"As soon as we made it to Cape Horn, the wind died down," Valerie added. "We made it the last five miles and the wind changed to a gale force wind."

And on March 1, 1989, the Michigan flag flew over Cape Horn Island.

The trip was more than an adventure for the Krugers. Verleen found that "all things are possible with the help of God."

"Sometimes I didn't think it was possible and we needed a miracle," he said. "Now, I look back and think the best is yet to come."

For Valerie it was a learning experience.

"We had gone to meet our friends and we met them in so many places," she said. "And with it, I learned I had more determination than what I thought I had; I learned from the encouragement of people all along the way."

"I learned from the grace of God. When it seemed like I couldn't go on, I found I could go on. Each of us has a Cape Horn; each of us has a purpose to get fired up about. And each one of us has the courage to grab it and go for it."

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

God 'opens doors' for her to work

Mary Coram doesn't find her faith weakened by her visits to the Plymouth Court nursing center. In fact, spending time with the nursing home residents strengthens her faith.

"They teach me a lot," said Coram, 29, of Plymouth. "They still know and trust in him, through everything they've been through. No matter what you go through, God is always going to be there for you."

"They're a blessing to me. When you see their faith and their testimonies," it's tremendously rewarding.

She's a member of Praise Chapel Church of God in Plymouth, and has led Bible study sessions at Plymouth Court each Wednesday morning since December 1991. Coram also leads a Friday Bible study each week at West Trail Nursing Home in Plymouth.

She's been leading Bible study at that nursing home for some time, and decided to look into volunteering at Plymouth Court as well. A woman from her church works at Plymouth Court, so Coram knew something about the facility's needs.

"The Holy Spirit said 'Go.' The Holy Spirit gave me the conviction to come and do the Lord's work in any way I can." She heard that message one day when she was at home washing dishes.

"I just got the kids, put their coats on and

came here. Every door was open. God opened every door."

Wednesday morning sessions typically include eight to 15 worshipers, with some spouses of Plymouth Court residents participating. Group members sing hymns, listen to Bible readings and enjoy fellowship.

"If it's out of tune, it doesn't matter," she said of the singing. Praising God is what counts.

Coram's children often accompany her on her visits. Son Raymond Charles is 19 months old. Daughter Angela Rose, almost 5, recently began kindergarten at Smith Elementary School in Plymouth; she comes to Plymouth Court when she's not in school.

"It's neat," Coram said of the interaction between the youngsters and the residents. "It brings back memories, their grandchildren, their upbringing. They watch over them."

Coram, a homemaker and former floral designer for Hudson's, hasn't found her age an obstacle in working with older people. "When you're doing God's work, there is no age difference. He'll guide and teach you."

She's continued the weekly Bible study at West Trail in Plymouth and also finds that rewarding. About the same number of residents participate there as do at Plymouth Court.

Others at Coram's church are also involved

in a variety of outreach efforts, geared toward those of all ages. "There's so much that is going on in the church. You're ministering to other people and you see these people doing God's work."

Barb Alchalabi, activities director at Plymouth Court, appreciates Coram's contributions. "Mary is wonderful," she said. "She always has a positive inspirational word to give to the residents. We have so many residents who request to come down every Wednesday for this."

Coram's children also help to cheer up residents, Alchalabi said. "They're very friendly. The residents just love them. When they see children, they just brighten up."

Other area churches also have volunteers who visit the center regularly. Congregations involved include: St. Kenneth's Catholic Church in Plymouth Township; Our Lady of Good Counsel Catholic Church in Plymouth; a Seventh-day Adventist group; St. Michael Lutheran Church of Canton; Risen Christ Lutheran Church of Plymouth Township.

Faith has been an important part of life for many residents throughout their lives, Alchalabi said, and worship means a great deal to them. Residents appreciate the contributions of Coram and other volunteers.

"I think it makes the residents feel the community is thinking of them," Alchalabi said.

Our world is changing at such a pace that the old forms often do not fit the new realities.

The church I serve which has a structure designed to maintain the past. No matter how much we strive for new directions, the past structures of committees, rules and procedures drag us back.

These rules and procedures are not without purpose.

Remember what a wonder the assembly line was in the days of Henry Ford? I worked on the assembly line and I marveled at the way it produced cars. Parts dropped down from the ceiling. People worked from below, above and on the floor.

Even then, we workers knew that all was not right when it came to quality. If you didn't get the screw or bolt all the way in, who cared, it was good enough.

Times have changed and so has the way cars are most effectively made.

I realize that in my own work life, if we do not revise the structure of the church we will fail to attract and hold new ideas and new people. It seems at times that we hardly can get anything done that addresses the future needs.

In a recent book, "The End of the Cold War," by Michael Hagan, an essay by Harvard University history professor Ernest May makes my spine shiver.

May takes us to Washington to view the buildings that house the government. Look at where all the people in our government are working and you will understand what has happened to Washington.

Dominating force

The Pentagon is a huge building with 25,000 thousand people working in it. Even larger is the CIA building just outside town with more office floor space than the Pentagon. Even larger are the buildings that house the National Security Agency. Add to this the Department of Energy which is primarily managing the nuclear weapons of our nation.

These huge complexes dominate our nation's government and effectively block progress on domestic needs.

Our nation's defense agencies employ almost two-thirds of all federal workers. This is the structure in which the President of the United States works.

According to May, the President has little influence over this huge body of people in all these massive buildings.

May describes a government which is oriented toward one theme: the Cold War. It has so dominated our government's attention for so long May believes our national government is a product of that singular focus.

My spine tingles. How can anyone change this massive structure touching every aspect of our nation?

I compare it with the question of how we in a local church can change our structure to be relevant to our goals and visions.

There are rules, laws, books of procedure. There are committees and persons convinced that they are doing what is best for the organization.

Probably the dinosaurs considered their direction of evolution — just get bigger — as the best bet for progress.

Will our dominance vanish just as theirs vanished?

The amazing thing about Professor May's essay is he believes that as damaging as this focus has been for more than 40 years to

our national priorities, it was probably necessary to stabilize the Cold War uncertainties.

His argument is that while we risked nuclear war, it was necessary to win the cold war.

I cannot agree with this logic particularly as I remember the war in Vietnam. Whether we agree or not, the issue is how we will address this dominant emphasis in our federal government.

Will to change

Unless we as a nation have the will to change we will flounder in our problems and troubles.

Unfortunately, our presidential candidates will hardly dare to address this issue. For so long a time "the serious hours of presidents were mostly occupied with issues brought to them through the National Security Council," according to May.

The issue that we face is not only the personalities and the philosophies of our candidates for national leadership. We face the question of how we will structure our common life.

Often it is not apparent that a structure such as an assembly line is outmoded until someone does it better.

The new Japanese designed plants for auto production shake us up and force us to evaluate our traditional systems. The structure flows from a new approach to work at the floor level and at the management level.

Ross Perot talks of Washington "gridlock." He also talks about

In many cases this often results in abusive behavior on the part of the adult, and later the child through negative role modeling. Does it teach a child self-control or simply to obey out of fear?

### A few questions

In order to promote as well as practice positive methods of guidance and discipline, adults must recognize that promoting positive self-esteem in children is key. Adults must examine themselves first. Ask yourself these questions:

- Do I have good self esteem?
- Do I feel good about myself as well as trust my decision-making ability?
- Do I exhibited confidence and know why people like/respect me?

Self-esteem is developed through or closely related to a person's assessment of how he/she measures up to what other people expect. Adults should examine their expectations of young children and youth in such a way that is developmentally age appropriate.

If adult expectations are unrealistic and not age/stage appropriate, it is easy for a child to feel like they can't measure up. On the other hand, realistic expectations help a child to feel good about themselves and experience success.

According to Family Focus, a series of bulletins through Cooperative Extension Services of Michigan State University, run a check on your current expectations. Ask yourself these questions:

- Why do I have this expectation?
- Where did it come from?
- Is it based on my wishes or my child's needs?
- Does it realistically fit this particular child — at this age — with his or her temperament and background?
- What purpose does it serve anyway?

Next, you should check your expectations for fairness. Revise your expectations as needed. Example: an eight-year-old child keeping his or her room clean AT ALL TIMES, with everything in place. Result: the child often hides clothes under the bed, in the closet, makes an untidy bed as well as leaves candy wrappers hidden throughout the room. The child gets scolded and privileges withheld often.

Most 8-year-olds are energetic and afraid that they'll miss something if they are bogged down cleaning and putting everything in perfect order. Children at this age are more interested in making

friends, special clubs, secret code words and handshakes. They still need gentle reminders and praise whenever they do clean their room to the best of their ability.

### Be realistic

Roadblocks to realistic expectations sometimes prevent us from being fair when disciplining or guiding children. We as adults may want our children to be that someone we want to be, living out our unfulfilled dreams and ambitions. Perhaps because you

couldn't spend the night over a friend's house as a child, you feel it is an unnecessary experience.

We have to look at each child as a unique individual as it relates to promoting good self-esteem and discipline. Children should be given attention and praised when they do make strides and accomplishments. Children need reassurance and support not constant criticism, shame or ridicule.

If a child's behavior is inappropriate, a positive disciplinary strategy would be to directly tell

the child the appropriate behavior expected and assist in helping them to find alternative methods to responding in a more appropriate positive way.

### Get point across

Guidance and discipline is teaching and helping children to develop self-control and good self-esteem. In addition, we must remember to promote keeping the self-esteem intact. What good is getting your point across, or even simply succeeding in getting a

child to obey, if the result is a child feeling inadequate, silly, stupid or afraid to explore, more-over destroying that inner strength to try and make choices?

Positive guidance/discipline also includes avoiding the judgment pitfall. Example: a child five years old runs out in street to get ball and the adult starts to yell and scream at the child, using words such as you and stupid. First, name calling can do irreparable harm to a child's self-esteem. Secondly, avoid using "you" mes-

sages as it points a finger and implies judgment. "I" messages are more appropriate. It directs the response to the behavior only not to the person. Example: "I'm so very angry. I've told you about the danger of running into the street."

Parents, remember guidance and discipline are long term. Strategies used should be consistent, developmental and again fair. Show love and support. After disciplining move on, show forgiveness not repetition or prolonged punishment or dissatisfaction.

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
