## Voters turn out in record numbers



Plymouth voters bucked the national Clinton trend and went for Bush in the largest turnout in recent history. More than 70 percent of the voters flocked to the polls.

It was likely the biggest voter turnout ever in greater Plymouth, as this usual Republican stronghold stayed true to George Bush in Tuesday's election.

While Bush won only 38 percent of

the popular vote nationwide, here he won 51 percent, to Bill Clinton's 31 percent and 17 percent for Ross Perot.

Elections officials said it was the biggest voter turnout in at least 10 years, and probably ever.

In Plymouth Township, 14,131 or 79 percent of registered voters voted.

"It's the biggest election I've ever had," said township Clerk Esther Hulsing. "I'm delighted that so many people care."

In the city, 5,261 or 71 percent of registered voters voted. "It's an overwhelming turnout," said Clerk Linda Langmesser.

Langmesser had predicted around a 40 percent turnout, and Hulsing about 2,000 less than the number that actually cast ballots.

The big turnout was encouraging to clerks but a bit frustrating for some voters. Both Hulsing and Langmesser

reported some complaints from voters about long lines during peak voting hours.

"We didn't anticipate it was going to be this bad," Langmesser said, adding, people were cooperative, despite some minor problems with voting machines.

Voters at the seventh precinct at the new fire station at North Territorial and Beck lamented the fact they waited nearly two hours to vote when just up the road at Bird School, there were no lines at all.

## Ford's eager to join Bill Clinton

"I'm in the right place with the right president," said a smiling Congressman William D. Ford, after winning his 15th two-year term Tuesday to the U.S. House of Representatives.

The veteran lawmaker said he's excited about returning to Washington, D.C., under the new Clinton Administration and he pledged to "help Bill Clinton write a page in his history."

Ford, who is chairman of the House Committee on Labor and Education — the right place he referred to — described the president-elect as "smart and worldly, yet someone who's got a real feel for the people I represent."

Ford's praise was much like that of a proud father when he said: "Michigan was turned on to this young man; he worked hard here."

Clinton made 16 campaign trips to Michigan; President George Bush came here 13 times.

With 91 percent of Wayne County precincts reporting late Wednesday, Ford, 65, was the expected winner in the newly drawn 13th District (which includes Ypsilanti and Ann Arbor in Washtenaw County) with 126,597 votes. Robert Geake received 104,644 votes. Other candidates included: independent Randall Roe with 8,531 votes; Tisch ticket candidate Paul S. Jensen, 3,310, and Larry Roberts of the Workers League with 1,149 votes.

Vote totals from Inkster were incomplete, although Ford is expected to do well there.

Geake, 56, carried the western Wayne County Republican strongholds of Livonia, Plymouth and Northville and the townships of Plymouth, Canton and Northville.

Ford was the top vote-getter in Garden City and Westland along with the Ann Arbor and Ypsilanti areas.

Although he lost the election, Geake's not unemployed. He's serving the second year of a six-year term in the state Senate. He'll return to the state Senate, where he is vice chair of the appropriations committee, after he undergoes back surgery.

In the early hours of Wednesday

morning, Geake was still analyzing vote totals and was undecided about whether to go home and rest or head straight to the hospital where he was scheduled to undergo surgery this week for a herniated disc.

Although both candidates campaigned vigorously throughout the new district, Ford spent most of the time telling about his accomplishments over the years. He reminded voters of the higher education bills he helped write and pass, the new post office buildings he helped to win for several western Wayne County communities, his efforts in securing grants for the Rouge River Demonstration Project and his pro-choice stance on the abortion issue.

Geake, in the meantime, criticized Ford as a "tax and spend liberal" who only recently moved into the new 13th District. Ford had previously represented the 15th District, which included Taylor, where he maintained an apartment. He moved to Ypsilanti earlier this year.

Geake also blasted Ford's policy of flying first-class from Detroit to Washington and criticized what he called Ford's "flagrant abuse of the franking privileges" and the "excess of his top aide at public expense."

Ford, who early in the campaign said "attack ads" weren't part of his strategy managed to hurl one final zinger at Geake before retiring for the evening.

"He's the consummate mud-slinger not a campaigner and it backfired."

"I have never seen so many volunteers who have worked for so long a period time. We had people pouring in," said Ford.

The new district includes 25 communities and more than 501,000 people

Keen McCarthy, a former associate administrator at Oakwood Hospital, said, "It feels very good to have the race done with."

"I'm looking forward to getting

started and working together with the new board."

Keen McCarthy won a hard fought Republican primary in August, defeating township building director Charles McElhargue by 21 votes. In that race, township trustee John Stewart finished third and attorney Stephen Boak came in fourth.

Edwards, a self-employed accountant, stressed during his campaign

## Plymouth mourns

### Mayflower owner dies of heart failure at 82

The Plymouth community is mourning the loss of Ralph G. Lorenz, 82, who died Nov. 2 at Sarasota Memorial Hospital in Bradenton, Fla. of congestive heart failure.

The longtime owner of the Mayflower Hotel, Lorenz was widely admired as a local visionary, en-

trepreneur and civic leader whose ideas and hard work helped the Plymouth community thrive.

"For over 50 years, Lorenz stood at the helm of the Mayflower Hotel in Plymouth and charted a course filled with innovative ideas and a wealth of excellent food, warm hospitality and superb service," said his daughter Sheila Lorenz Osann.

"In 1939 he came back to Plymouth after attending Eastern Michigan University to manage the financially troubled Mayflower for its stockholders. He brought it out of receivership, saving not only

the brick and mortar but creating a hotel with a national reputation in the process," she said.

At age 11, Lorenz escaped with his family during World War I from Austria-Hungary, where he was born. The family moved to Plymouth after Lorenz's father found employment with Daisy Air Rifle.

It didn't take long for entrepreneurship to emerge in Lorenz. As a kid, he trapped muskrats on Forest Avenue and sold the pelts for 75 cents each to glovemakers.

# Appeals court orders 2nd trial for Tyburski

Leonard Tyburski, who was convicted of killing his wife and storing her body in a freezer in their Canton house, won a retrial Tuesday on his second degree murder conviction.

Dorothy Tyburski's family is outraged by a 2-1 Michigan Court of Appeals decision earlier this week that declared a mistrial. A new trial has not been scheduled.

The appeals court ruled that since the case received worldwide media attention, Recorder's Court Judge Richard Hathaway improperly examined prospective jurors in a routine manner instead of a "probing inquiry."

"Personally I think it's a shame that the judicial system is like it is in the state of Michigan - it's a waste of taxpayers' money to have a retrial on this," according to Ray Sutton, Dorothy Tyburski's brother-in-law.

Tyburski has been serving a 20-40 year sentence that began July 1989 at Southern Michigan State Prison in Jackson. He would have been eligible for parole after 16.8 years.

Tyburski was dean of students at Mackenzie High School in Detroit when his wife's body was found in their Avon Street basement.

The bizarre murder came to light when the couple's 20-year-old daughter, Kelly, questioned her father's story that her mother took the freezer key when she abruptly walked out on the family.

Nightmares about the freezer haunted her and she finally opened it Jan. 2, 1989.

Tyburski, 50, testified he beat his wife's head against a basement beam and put her body into

the freezer in September 1985 after an argument about an affair she had with their daughter's 18-year-old boyfriend.

He became enraged and rained his wife's head 11 times against a basement beam out of passion when she taunted him with names like "wimp" and "punk," according to court testimony.

His trial attorney, Carole Stanyar, said in court that Tyburski's wife, who was 37 when she died, "confessed to adultery."

For a brief moment in time the man totally lost control. She taunts him, emasculates him and asks him to leave his own home."

Stanyar argued that Hathaway was wrong to question jurors as a group instead of individually.

Hathaway, who will likely preside over the new trial, declined comment about the reversal.

Meanwhile, the Sears Coldspot freezer that Dorothy Tyburski's body was stored in will remain in the Canton Township police property room until all appeals are exhausted.

The freezer remains plugged in since meat had been in the freezer when Dorothy Tyburski's body was found.

# Canton follows beat of Republican drummer

Republican-heavy Canton Township followed its own drummer Tuesday giving thumbs up to outgoing President George Bush, despite Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton's early landslide.

Regardless of the race, Canton


voters — all 26,603 or 80 percent of the 33,219 registered voters — overwhelmingly cast Republican ballots from the presidential to state representative and all the way down to township races.

Canton, however, followed the nation's lead in the excited rush to the polls this presidential elec-

tion brought.

Canton resident David Butler, for example, was home only a half hour after a long trip from Paris Tuesday night when he got in the car and headed to the polls — to wait. "Without a doubt the presidential election brought me out. That's all I heard in Europe," Butler said.

Michelle Newton, 18, wasn't too pleased when she left the polls after 7 p.m., Tuesday. Like Butler, she was ready to cast her ballot — her first presidential race — and was turned away. A registered Canton voter, Newton had recently moved to Detroit and thought she could still vote in the township.

# Last hurrah Clerk goes out on record election

It was a pleasure for Esther Hulsing that voters turned out heavily for her last election as Plymouth Township clerk.

After all, her feeling when voters didn't turn out was, "I gave a party and no one came."

Hulsing said her thoughts upon driving to work for her last election were, "I just hope the equipment functions as it should."

There had been some problem with equipment during the August primary. That sparked her call for a new Op Tech computer vote scan system, to avoid delays in vote counting.

The township didn't opt for the system, citing a tight budget.

After 30 years as a Girl Scout leader and 12 years on the Plymouth Board of Education, Hulsing

won election to the clerk post in 1978.

On changes she's noticed in elections over 14 years, she said the popularity of voting absentee is most striking.

"I think that's because we're encouraging it," she said. "We send them out to all voters over 60."

"Some of them are insulted. They are perfectly capable of getting to the polls, thank you."

On what she likes best about the job, Hulsing said, "I like meeting the public. The people are great, there are a few of them that aren't."

"People are fun who have a zest for living and voting is part of it. But it's more important to me than to John Q and Suzie Q public."

"It's a lot of fun to watch peo-

ple develop and change, some of them grow and develop on their job."

To help make a smooth transition for her long-time assistant Marilyn Massengill, who won election to the post, she plans to make a list.

Her advice: "Do the best job as clerk you can, get them registered and get them ready to vote."

On what she'll do upon leaving the job Nov. 20, "I don't have it worked out," Hulsing said, adding, "As little as possible."

While she and husband Ken have traveled to England, Kenya and the Galapagos Islands, she doubts they'll travel more. "I don't know if Ken and I are physically able," she explained.

"I always wanted to see the cities on the tops of the mountains in Peru and the Pyramids. I just have never seen them."



By 6:30 a.m. at the Plymouth Cultural Center — one half hour before the polls opened — long lines of voters had already formed.

The crowds continued throughout the day. At about 7 p.m., Daniel Aro of Plymouth finally voted after an hour and 50-minute wait. "I voted for Perot," he said. "We're due for a change." Aro added that he tends to vote more in presidential elections than local elections.

Maggie Lamb, also voting at the cultural center at about 7 p.m., said she chose Bush. "I trust him and I'm a Republican, but it was a tough choice."

Lamb said she drove by the cultural center to vote earlier in the day, but decided to come back later when she saw the lines.

Earlier at 4 p.m., nearly 30 waited in line to vote at the township clerk's office at Ann Arbor and Lilley roads.

Gary Risbridger said he voted a straight Democratic ticket. "I'm a union man," he said.

Dave Desandre, who also voted

at the clerk's office, chose Perot. "I agree with a lot of what he stands for," Desandre said, including Perot's pro-choice stance. "I'm not big on Republicans pushing morality on people."

Desandre said he voted against term limits for elected officials. "It's not a good idea for the state, why take power away from the state?" he said.

In the presidential race, township voters cast 4,131 votes for Clinton, 7,340 for Bush and 2,449 for Perot.

City voters cast 1,875 votes for Clinton, 2,457 for Bush and 868 for Perot.

Dolores Browning, seventh precinct chairman, said she expected the last of the voters to be finished at 9:45 p.m. Cars were parked on both sides of the road, half a mile down North Territorial.

"We haven't had a lull all day," said Browning. "We've had a lot of teenagers and voters of college age who never voted before. I think it's the economy. They have to think of the future of their

country. It's quite a concern to all of us."

Voter Linda Wells of Plymouth Township agreed. "A lot more younger people are voting. The economy is probably the biggie."

Cyndi Barnett of Plymouth Township said the presidential race was her primary reason for voting. A Perot supporter and former GM employee, she said "I think we need a change. I know his business strategies. He is honest and he does what he says."

Becky Haycox, with 19-month-old daughter Katie in tow, waited nearly two hours to vote at the fire hall. "I need to be a part of whoever is leading the country," said Haycox, who supported Bush and his pro-life stance.

"When I think about it, I've waited this long for a ride at an amusement park."

Richard Greenleaf, a Detroit steelworker, wanted to see "Bush out of office. I work in the city of Detroit, and I've seen a lot of people out on the streets, out of work and out of unemployment. I don't think the economy is as good as

# McCotter wins commission seat

Thaddeus McCotter became a father Tuesday.

And he met rock superstar Bob Seger.

And, oh yeah, he also won the job he's been fighting for since last spring — a seat on the Wayne County Commission.

The Livonia Republican wrapped up his triple play day by easily defeating Democrat Michael Caffery for the 10th District seat held by Maurice Breen, former Plymouth Township supervisor.

McCotter had beaten Breen last August in a hotly contested primary in the heavily Republican District that includes most of Livonia, Plymouth, Plymouth Township, Northville and Northville Township.

District-wide McCotter won with 40,778 votes to 22,725 for Caffery. In partial returns, McCotter had 29,986 votes to 16,813 for Caffery.

He won 40 of 41 precincts in his hometown, losing only a small, split precinct by 11 votes. McCotter rolled up a nearly 2-1 margin among Livonia absentee voters.

"We worked very hard," an ebullient and unusually talkative McCotter said as the numbers were posted early Wednesday.

"We knew we couldn't reach voters other than through a grass roots campaign and so that's what we did. Going door to door, work-

ing the phones, stuffing flyers in newspapers.

McCotter retorted Caffery's claim that money bought the race.

McCotter said he spent only about \$5,000 on the general election, compared to \$3,000 by his opponent.

He sent out a single mailing to absentee voters — and reused signs left over from the primary, McCotter said.

He spent a lot more money. He played the game on top of the table while I was underneath," Caffery said.

Caffery added that Democrat Bill Clinton's win at the top of the ticket probably helped, but couldn't make up for the financial discrepancy.

The suburban Republican views his role on the county commission — which is dominated by Detroit Democrats — as that of an "underdog."

"But if Richner out of Grosse Pointe won then at least I have a second and he has a second."

McCotter, a 27-year-old attorney, will resign his seat on the Schoolcraft College Board of Trustees to assume the full-time commissioner's job.

Of course all that will take a back seat over the next few days to other events in the McCotter household.

McCotter's wife, Rita, gave birth to the couple's first child at 1:48 p.m. in Sinai Hospital, Detroit.

Bush says it is."



## County tax hike fails; charter change approved

A Wayne County ballot proposal that was widely expected to fail passed by a narrow margin Tuesday, but that was the only surprise as incumbents in county-wide offices all made mincemeat of their challengers.

The ballot proposition, which requires the county executive to submit an executive department reorganization plan for the county commission's approval within 90 days of his or her re-election, passed by a margin of 321,694 to 305,696 with all but about 5 percent of the vote counted.

This means that if current Wayne County Executive Edward McNamara gets re-elected in 1994 and wants to change the organiza-

tion of the executive branch of county government, he has to get commission permission.

Before the election, deputy executive Michael Duggan called the proposal crazy and added, "If this passes, then the legislative/executive bickering could shut down county government."

Commissioner Bryan Amann, D-Compton, is glad the proposal passed, but "it's not revolutionary," he said. "It's a slight modification of the charter."

As to Duggan's charge that the new rule could exacerbate the conflict between McNamara and the commission, Amann said "there's tremendous potential for that" because the majority of the

# Women take the bench

## Canton lawyer, SC board chair win seats

It was a clean sweep Tuesday for women in judicial races in Wayne County.

Cathie B. Maher, a 42-year-old mother of two from Canton Township, beat Nancy Diehl for a six-year term for Wayne County probate judge.

"Surprised isn't the word. I'm pleasantly elated," said Maher on Wednesday, with 94 percent of the votes counted. She had 53.6 percent of the votes.

"I've been watching the numbers all night and it's pretty much a done deal," she said. "I think both camps ran fairly clean campaigns. We both worked very hard. I saw more of my opponent in the last six months than my husband."

"I worked particularly hard in Detroit, Dearborn and Livonia. I had a core of super supporters, over 100 poll workers — all volunteers."

Maher, an attorney in private practice, concentrates on estate planning and related issues. Her husband, Martin Maher, is a probate judge specializing in trust and estate cases.

Maher will take the seat being vacated by retiring Judge Gladys Barsamian. She will handle child abuse, neglect and abandonment, and juvenile delinquency cases.

Her opponent, 37-year-old Nancy Diehl of Detroit, is an assistant prosecuting attorney for Wayne County. She is nationally known for her work in child abuse cases. Diehl has co-authored two books on how children should be assisted in courtroom situations. Salary for probate judges is \$93,817.

### Circuit court

A half dozen candidates vied for three seats in this court race, with the three women candidates victorious over their male opponents.

Diane M. Hathaway, Denise

Page Hood and Jeanne Stempien won seats in this court, which has jurisdiction in all civil cases over \$10,000, criminal cases involving felony, serious misdemeanors, and domestic relations including divorce and paternity.

They beat out Joseph V. Brennan, John W. Callahan and Records Court Judge Robert Ziolkowski.

Hathaway, 38, an assistant Macomb County prosecutor who lives in Grosse Pointe Park, was the top vote-getter with 94 percent of the votes counted. Less than 200 votes behind her was Denise Page Hood of Detroit. Hood, 40, is a Detroit Recorder's Court judge. She has also served as a district court judge.

Jeanne Stempien of Northville Township clinched the third judicial seat. Stempien, 46, a trial attorney, is chairwoman of the Schoolcraft College Board of Trustees. A second Schoolcraft trustee, Thaddeus McCotter of Livonia, was elected to the Wayne

County Commission Tuesday. The Schoolcraft College board has two open seats now. A third trustee, Harry Greenleaf, made an unsuccessful bid for a seat on the state board of education.

"I worked really hard, but I didn't know how it would go until the last minute," said Stempien. She began her day Tuesday before



commissioners are hostile to McNamara.

"They would reject the second coming if McNamara was holding Jesus' hand," Amann said.

"We just made a political deal," said Duggan, adding that of all four proposals submitted, the one McNamara let stand had the least chance of being approved by voters.

A second county proposal on Tuesday's ballot asked voters to tax themselves half a mill for 10 years to subsidize the hospitalization cost of poor people.

Voters first shot down this proposal in August. The county commission put it back on the ballot, claiming that voters didn't understand the proposal well enough in August.

But the proposal was rejected again by a margin of 425,785 to 233,172.

The third county ballot proposal failed by a narrow margin (332,668 to 311,623), but nothing

would be different if it had passed.

The proposal concerned a 10-year, 1-mill tax voters approved in 1988. One-tenth of that money was supposed to pay for construction and operation of a building to lock up juveniles in. But that hasn't been done, and most of the money collected hasn't been spent.

Asked by the executive to render a decision, county attorneys said the money (\$7 million to date and \$2.5 million a year through 1997) could be spent on juvenile programs and still fulfill the terms of the 1988 ballot proposal.

So the proposal asked voters to allow the money raised with that 0.1 mills to be given back to Wayne County cities and townships to pay for local youth programs if McNamara doesn't spend it within a year of collection.

However, McNamara cut a deal with the state last week to spend

most of the money on a plan to develop alternatives to locking up juvenile delinquents. The rest of the money, Duggan said, will be given to 12 local juvenile programs in the county.

For county-wide offices, voters re-elected four Democrat incumbents for treasurer, register of deeds, sheriff and prosecutor, and elected Democrat Teola Hunter to the clerk's office.

With 468,668 votes, Hunter beat Republican John Reilly (249,918) and Tisch candidate Renrick Hume (15,777).

Treasurer Raymond Wojtowicz beat Republican opponent Elatne Tuttle, 519,317 to 215,599.

Register of Deeds Forest Youngblood beat Republican challenger Evin Lowery Fobbs, 534,809 to 189,913.

Sheriff Robert Ficano, with 551,566 votes, beat Republican Dennis Malin (193,017) and Tisch candidate Dan Tackett (21,254).

the polls opened at 7 a.m. shaking hands at the Ford Motor Co. plant on Michigan Avenue in Wayne.

"I tried to touch base with every community," she said. "I concentrated on Detroit, downriver, and western Wayne County. I was in Sumpter Township Saturday night. I've got more miles on my car in the past six months than I normally put on in a year."

Stempien said the backbone of her campaign was her large extended family and many friends.

"My retired uncles built my (campaign) signs. My son was my campaign manager. My daughter was my assistant manager."

Stempien has served on the Schoolcraft board since November 1986.

"My heart is at the school. I can't hold an elected post there now. But I will stay with the school through volunteer efforts. I will continue my affiliation."

Stempien said she will spend

the next two months winding down her private law practice before donning her judicial robes in January. Annual salary for circuit judges is \$98,081. The three winners will replace three retiring judges.

**Court of appeals**

Helene Nita White was the top vote-getter in the August primary, and she continued her winning ways Tuesday, handily overcoming her opponent Cynthia Diane Stephens for a six-year term on the court of appeals, first district.

The first district includes Wayne, Washtenaw, Jackson, Lenawee, Monroe and Livingston counties. White, 37, took the majority of votes in each county by wide margins.

White of Detroit has served on the bench for a decade as a judge with the 36th District Court. Her opponent, Stephens, 42, also of

Detroit, served as a district court judge in 1982. She has also been an associate general counsel to the Michigan Senate.

The Court of Appeals hears civil and criminal cases. Three judge panels hear cases in Lansing, Detroit, Grand Rapids and Marquette.

The decision of a panel in the court of appeals is final except in those cases in which a decision is reviewed by the Supreme Court.

The salary for an appeals court judge is set by the state Legislature. The annual salary is currently \$102,346 per year. Judges also receive an automobile.







In the race for state Board of Education incumbent Republican Dorothy Beardmore of Rochester Hills was re-elected.

The top vote-getter in the race was Kathleen Straus, a Democrat from Detroit. Harry Greenleaf of Livonia, a Republican, finished third in balloting for the state board seats.

Early returns had Beardmore losing to Democrat Roman Bohenek of Detroit because numbers were apparently transposed.

Straus, 68, is a resident of Detroit. She has a bachelor's degree in economics from Hunter College. Straus is a retired education administrator and former president of Center for Creative Studies. She served as associate director of Michigan Association of School Boards, staff director of Michigan State Education Committee, president of League of Women Voters of Detroit. She also served as chairman of the State Board for Public Community Colleges.

Republican Dorothy Beardmore, 65, of Rochester, is currently president of the State Board of Education. She is a graduate of Cornell University. Before being elected to the state board, she served on local and intermediate

Deitch, 45, holds a law degree from the U-M and is an attorney in private practice specializing in corporate and real estate matters. He is married and has three children. Deitch serves on the Michigan Civil Service Commission, the Birmingham Community House Board of Directors, the Michigan Cancer Foundation Board of Directors and the Greater Detroit Interfaith Roundtable of Christians, Jews and Muslims.

McGowan, 44, has a bachelor's

degree in government from Lake Forest College and is manager of governmental affairs for Industrial Technology Institute. She is married and has one child. She formerly served as an aide to Vice President Walter Mondale and as legislative assistant to U.S. Sens. Adlai Stevenson and Frank Church.

### MSU Board

Incumbents Dean Pridgeon and Melanie Reinhold were defeated by Democrats Dorothy Gonzeles and Bob Traxler.

Gonzeles, 49, is a resident of East Lansing. She has a master's degree in business/personnel from Central Michigan University. She also has a bachelor's degree in social work. # Senator hits state for anti-parent bias

A state Senate committee chair has joined critics of the so-called Michigan Model for health education, attacking state officials as being anti-parent.

Sen. Gil DiNello, D-Clinton Township, called for scrapping the State Board of Education, selling the publishing rights to the Michigan Model, and passing bills protecting parental rights.

"The social engineers in the Michigan Department of Education are trying to make public schools surrogate parents," said DiNello, "and our kids are paying the prices for this ideological foray."

But the report and far-reaching recommendations are far from final, said Sen. Robert Geake, R-Northville, a member of the four-man panel.

"I haven't had time to study it.

We agreed that it's not the final report," said Geake, who is in the final days of a congressional campaign.

"It's supposed to be circulated to the membership. What I saw was a very rough draft marked 'preliminary, not for release.' It somehow got out, so he (DiNello) released it so no one would say he was playing favorites," Geake said.

The report was circulated to the Capitol press corps and marked "preliminary." It was also accompanied by a two-page news release from DiNello. A maverick who frequently supports Republicans, DiNello is the only Democrat who chairs a committee in the GOP-run Senate.

DiNello's panel held public hearings in Plymouth, Rochester and seven other cities around the state. Other members are Doug Carl, a conservative Republican

from Utica running for Congress, and Jim Berryman, a moderate Democrat from Adrian. DiNello's preliminary report and news release did not suggest the other three had signed or agreed.

The hearings were dominated by a handful of critics such as R. Kraft Bell of Northville and the DADS Foundation of Kalamazoo.

Defenders of the Michigan Model say 95 percent of local districts have adopted it without controversy, calling critics a handful of right-wing religious zealots.

A Department of Education spokesman said a State Board committee is working on revisions to satisfy some of the critics.

But a DADS Foundation leader called the Michigan Model "so tainted and contaminated, it can't be modified."

Thrust of the Michigan Model, according to the department

spokesman, is to teach students how to make choices — to go beyond telling them to listen to their parents and church and help them understand why parents and church gave their advice.

DiNello advocates a law that mandates schools to teach "abstinence from pre-marital sexual activity." Critics want "moral absolutes" to be taught rather than "personal choice."

DiNello and the critics also want children to be taught that parents — not school personnel or peers — are the first, and chief, source of information on sex, alcohol, drugs, AIDS, birth control, pregnancy and other stressful situations.

DiNello called for a U.S. Justice Department probe of the state Education and Public Health departments, charging officials held training sessions on "how to discredit Michigan Model opponents."

# MADD seeks court OK of sobriety checks

Mothers Against Drunk Driving is hoping the state Supreme Court will approve the constitutionality of sobriety checkpoints on Michigan roads.

The state's highest court announced last week it will review the Michigan Court of Appeals decision.

"We're very pleased that the

Michigan Supreme Court has agreed to hear the arguments on sobriety checkpoints," said Bethany Goodman, executive director of MADD Michigan.

The attorney general's office will file briefs by Dec. 24. Depending on the court's schedule, the high court may hear oral arguments in spring. The court tries

to decide cases within a year of oral arguments.

The Court of Appeals ruled that use of roadway stops used to detect alcohol-impaired drivers violated the Michigan Constitution. The case came from a 1986 state police sobriety checkpoint in Saginaw County.

The U.S. Supreme Court upheld sobriety checkpoints under the U.S. Constitution. But it's up to state courts to determine if the practice met state constitutionality requirements.

Currently, 38 states use sobriety checkpoints as a tool in deterring drunk driving, Goodman said.

# Companies want to shop for electric power

A business group is proposing that the Michigan Public Service Commission allow companies to shop for competitive electric prices.

The proposal was submitted by the Association of Businesses Advocating Tariff Equity. If approved, it would apply to customers of Consumers Power Co. and

Detroit Edison Co.

It would allow experimental "wheeling" — in which a utility customer could purchase power from a third party and use the utility's transmission lines to transport it to their facility for a fee.

"Transmission was thought to be a monopoly just a few years

ago," said Joseph Dudak, ABATE chairman. "Now Michigan is on the cutting edge of opening it up to competition."

"This will allow utilities to add capacity less expensively, keeping rates down for all customers. It also provides cost benefits to help Michigan industry compete."

"Retail wheeling could elimi-

nate the need for a rate increase by allowing a customer to leave the system, thus making more existing capacity available for remaining customers."

"This is designed as an experiment to show that less expensive power is available for purchase and that wheeling is feasible," said Dudak.


Moscow visit

Lorenz remembered as community-minded

Ralph G. Lorenz, who died Nov. 2 at the age of 82 in Sarasota, Fla., will be remembered for his many years of hard work and the numerous accomplishments he realized for the Plymouth community.

Longtime friend Frank Palmer recalled that when Lorenz was hired as manager of the Mayflower Hotel in 1939, it was mice-infested and bankrupt. "When he took it over, they had no money; nothing but debt. Ralph talked to the people the hotel owed money to and said, 'We will pay cash now, and as soon as we have the money, we'll pay the bills,'" said Palmer.

"One of the meat men from Detroit came out and said, 'I trust you, I be-

lieve in you,' and wrote Ralph a check to pay all the other debtors. He took on the whole debt."

Lorenz and his wife Mabel eventually were able to pay it off. "I believe that yet today, the hotel buys all its meat from that company. Ralph wouldn't even consider going to someone else," said Palmer. "It was quite a thing." Lorenz also was instrumental in re-opening the First National Bank of Plymouth during the Depression, he said.

Lorenz bought the hotel from the city stockholders who built it and owned it until 1986, when he sold it to sons Scott and Randy and family friend and associate Creon Smith, who continue to operate the facility.




Meeting: Lorenz, center, meets with other business leaders in Plymouth in 1949.

# Skills of speech

## Schools mainstream hearing impaired

Mainstreaming hearing impaired youngsters, and teaching them to get along in the hearing world, are the goals of Redford Union School District's oral program for the hearing impaired.

"We believe in giving students the skills of speech" so they can communicate with hearing people, said Sandy North, program director. She feels oral education best trains the hearing impaired students to be independent and less isolated.

"If they choose as adults to learn to sign, then they can decide which world they want to be a part of (hearing or hearing impaired)."

Established 35 years ago, the Redford Union program currently serves 220 students from 86 schools in 12 school districts, including Redford Union, South Redford, Livonia, Plymouth-Canton, Garden City, and Wayne-Westland. The school houses the center-based program of the Wayne Regional Educational Services Agency.

Designed to meet the individual needs of all students and to ed-

ucate them to their fullest potential, the Redford Union program has three teaching tracks for differing levels of hearing loss.

Training begins as soon as a hearing problem is detected. It starts in the home and continues through high school graduation.

All students are taught to utilize the hearing they have. At age five, each student is re-evaluated. If additional needs are determined, the student may be enrolled in the visual-oral track.

If a student has no oral speech abilities, he/she is taught with a computerized speechboard that produces oral speech.

To keep the students a part of the hearing world, all students are mainstreamed for non-academic classes, such as art, gym and music. And when ready, the student is mainstreamed into academic classes.

Some students are able to return to their home district, with a teacher consultant working with them and their classroom teacher.

Hearing impaired students participate in sports, school plays, clubs, pom pon, and student newspapers — virtually every extra curricular activity — and

are never totally removed from the hearing world.

North said the program teaches speech skills as early as possible, in order to get the fullest use of what speech the student has. All students are taught lip reading as a method of receiving language.

"Teaching an adult to speak who has never used hearing or speech is a very difficult process," said North. "It's hard to understand the vowel difference between cap and cop, cape and cope."

North said 95 percent of hearing impaired children are born to hearing parents, and most have hearing children. If the rest of the family has no hearing loss, she believes utilizing oral speech is the best way to make the child feel he/she is a part of the family.

"Our philosophy is you're always part of the hearing world, so you don't have to be put back in it. You're never removed," said North.

She also believes students in the oral program have more opportunities open to them in employment and socially, and because they don't have to bring an interpreter, they're more independent.

The Redford Union oral program for the hearing impaired was recognized as the National Hearing Impaired Program of the Year, from the American Organization for the Education of the Hearing Impaired in 1975.

In 1987, it was named State Program of the Year by the Michigan Speech and Hearing Association.

# Ralph Lorenz

## Hotelier gave much to our area

**P**lymouth won't be the same with the passing of Ralph Lorenz, who purchased the Mayflower Hotel during the midst of the depression and through sheer grit and determination made a go of it.

Lorenz, who died Monday at the age of 82, embodied the American dream. Born in Austria, he and his family survived World War I by hiding in the woods.

Then later, after coming to America, he sold vegetables off a truck to help support his family. There was college, too. He graduated from Eastern Michigan University, where he was a member of the golf team.

Mr. Lorenz was an occasional visitor to our office. Those stops were a joy. When we saw the white Cadillac pull into our parking lot, we knew we were in for an hour of storytelling by the portly gentleman with the string tie.

And we were all ears, as Ross Perot now says. Mr. Lorenz talked about public figures, wars, downtown business and education. He made events of 50 or 60 years ago as vivid as yesterday's presidential debates on TV.

One of our favorite stories was about Bette Davis, the actress, when she was staying at the Mayflower. It seems that she and her husband at the time weren't getting along too well and were throwing things at each other.

Mr. Lorenz jumped into action and calmed the actress down.

But everything wasn't Hollywood glitz. Mr. Lorenz was a businessman who did it the old fashioned way. We remember him saying: "I told my kids you've got to be on the restaurant floor and watch what's going on."

But there was another side to the practical businessman. He was interested in education and followed the plight of the Detroit and Plymouth-Canton schools. He was worried about the skills being taught to young people.

He also possessed the humor that comes from the understanding and acceptance of people. One night at the Mayflower Hotel after an election, Mr. Lorenz told us the tale of how Plymouth got liquor by the glass.

The town was dry through the 1950s and Mr. Lorenz was trying to obtain a liquor license for the hotel. But every time it came up for a vote, it was turned down.

Well, as it turned out, a local lady with roots in the temperance movement, was also an election worker who hid the wet votes so as not to be counted.

There's no telling how much business Mr. Lorenz lost because the town remained dry until the early 1960s. But more than 30 years later, Mr. Lorenz had the ability to laugh about it.

And that's how we want to remember him.

# Obscenity rules not state's job

**A**nother awkward attempt to censor reading material and movies will be taken up in Michigan's House of Representatives when it reconvenes.

This time, self-appointed moralists are hiding behind Senate Bill 1044, which they hope will accomplish what they themselves have found impossible: the regulation of sexually explicit material.

The Legislature needs to be reminded again that it is not the state's job to determine what children should or should not see — that is the job of a mother and father. When the child attains the age of majority, it's the child's own responsibility — and right.

Senate Bill 1044 already has passed the Senate. The bill, seemingly written to be purposely obtuse and confusing, basically would prohibit the distribution of any sexually explicit book, magazine, newspaper, movie or video within 1,000 feet of an area frequented by minors.

That doesn't sound too bad, on its surface. What could be wrong with prohibiting adult bookstores from popping up next to elementary schools and pinball arcades?

Simple. The bill doesn't define "sexually explicit." Local communities would be given the authority to make that decision.

That means each community could have different standards for what is and is not "obscene," a word that has defied definition for several decades by the best minds in our country.

If this bill is allowed to become law, it would

be possible to rent a video that passes standards in Birmingham, drive home to Troy and be found in violation of Troy's obscenity statute.

The bill also doesn't define "areas frequented by minors." That, too, is left to local communities.

Multiplex movie theaters would become war zones. "The Care Bears go to Venus" might be showing in Cinema One, but "Fatal Attraction" could be showing in Cinema Six, right across the hall. That could mean you're frequenting an adult movie house if you bought tickets for "Fatal Attraction."


The Little Professor bookstore in downtown Plymouth, which sells comic books and magazines such as Vanity Fair (which recently did an in-depth report on Madonna's new book), could be defined as an area frequented by minors as well. That could force the bookstore either to go underground or pull its copies of anything deemed "obscene" by local standards.

The bill could scramble signals on television programming. You could be able to watch a steamy miniseries on CBS based on a national bestseller if you live in Garden City, but not in Redford, if community standards wouldn't allow that sort of material inside the township.

The lesson once again is simple: One cannot legislate morality, and one should not ask the Legislature to step in and do the job of a parent.

In this trendy age of getting government off the backs of citizens, it seems only in keeping to ask parents to step in and shoulder their responsibility, instead of hoping politicians will do their jobs for them.

### Abortion issue

**R**egarding your editorial of Oct. 8, "Board Member Voices Racism," I would like to respond to your statement, "Planned Parenthood is a group that promotes responsible birth control: There's nothing wrong with that."

Ironically, Planned Parenthood was founded by Margaret Sanger, a racist if there ever was one. As early as 1914 she was promoting abortion, not for white middle class women, but against "inferior races" — black people, poor people, Slavs, Latins and Hebrews were "human weeds." (Remember that Hitler's extermination of six million Jews began with sterilization and abortion for "socially undesirable.")

As evidence of how Planned Parenthood has changed over the years, consider this: In 1963 a P.P. pamphlet stated, "An abortion kills the life of a baby after it has begun. It is dangerous to your life and health. It may make you sterile so that when you want a child you cannot have it." Today P.P. is the largest promoter and provider of abortions. Their report for 1991 lists abortions in their facilities at 129,000 and included in their income of \$406,300,000 was \$124,000,000 from our taxes. (Their Fund Bal-

ance of \$207,700,000 — "money in the bank")

The 1973 Supreme Court decision (Roe v. Wade) made abortion legal for the full 9 months of pregnancy. Think of it: At only 24 days after conception the heart of this tiny human being has regular beats or pulsations (a legal sign of life), and this life may be snuffed out right until the day of birth. Being an unwanted baby is a capital offense punishable by death.

# Voters unable to change system

**I**t's tempting to sit back, now that the election is over, secure in the assumption that the angry voters once and for all have fixed what ails our politics.

Not! Our political system is still very deeply flawed regardless of the outcome of Tuesday's voting.

We still suffer in Michigan from a political system which sustains a class of careerist politicians who consider their life's work to seek and hold office. That system is still infested by political action committees and lobbyists who dominate contributions to obscenely expensive campaigns, mostly on behalf of incumbents.

This combination — careerist politicians and rich single interests — has created a politics of corruption (through vote buying, thinly disguised as "access") and of gridlock (through the blocking veto power held by any one single interest).

What this election proves, if anything, is that we still need to create in Michigan a serious political reform movement.

Such a movement would have a short but far-reaching agenda:

We have too many careerist politicians. Term limitation might cure by amputation some of the worst abuses. But we have done nothing about making most legislative jobs part-time. And we have done little to encourage citizen politicians who consider running for office an important, but secondary, civic obligation.

Our campaigns are becoming ludicrously expensive, thereby inviting campaign contribution abuses. We did nothing on Tuesday to consider public financing for political campaigns. Nor did we do anything to explore whether the companies which own radio and television stations should be required to donate some air time in equal amounts to incumbent and challenger.

Our lawmaking, particularly in Lansing, is

infested with lobbyists who represent single interests wielding the business end of a checkbook. Tuesday's results did nothing to put teeth in our campaign finance disclosure law or on the officeholder expense accounts which offer such a convenient receptacle for lobbyist generosity.

Our government is ineffective, concerned mainly with top-down regulatory micromanagement and blocked by the veto power of interest groups from serious, coherent policy making. Tuesday's vote did nothing to force a serious rethinking of the ways in which government operates.

Voters were justifiably angry during this campaign season. But very little that was decided on Tuesday will address the root causes of that anger.

Here lies a great opening for a coalition of serious people in Michigan — Republicans, Democrats, independents, Libertarians, Perotites — to come together to remake our politics.

# Parents, schools send strong messages on drugs

**B**ooze and tobacco have poisoned millions of Americans, including members of my own family. My father, John "Scotty" Telford, was a wild alcoholic who puffed four packs of Lucky Strikes a day.

I have many vivid memories of him waking up and sitting on the side of his bed at 6 a.m., hacking and coughing — and lighting up. And brawling in bars. And coming home drunk and passing out on the living room floor or in his big upholstered chair.

One time he passed out in the chair with a lighted cigarette, setting himself and the house on fire. Despite his profane vigorous resistance, the firemen hauled him straight to the hospital, where he spent the next eight months getting dozens of skin grafts.

Lung cancer eventually killed him. I began smoking at age 11, smoked throughout all my years as a world-ranked sprinter and finally quit to set an example for my athletes when I started coaching. During my high

school and college days, I drank often with friends whose drinking ultimately destroyed their lives.

Later in my own life, a serious relationship with a brilliant and beautiful young woman never progressed as far as it would have without the nefarious — and precarious — influence of alcohol.

Several Oct. 5 editions of the Observer & Eccentric contained this troubling quotation from Penny Norton, the coordinator of the Mid-State Substance Abuse Commission: "The number of people addicted to alcohol dwarfs the number of those addicted to all other drugs combined."

And Albert Zack, my principal during the glory days when I coached undefeated track teams at Pershing High, recently sent me a clipping from his hometown Farmington Observer, reporting his plea to the school board there to ban smoking in school buildings. A fan of my column, Zack asked me to dedicate one to this topic which,

as a lifelong educator, he feels so strongly about.

He was unaware how strong an aversion I, too, feel toward substance abuse, having been raised by an abuser, been an abuser and been viscerally close enough to many other abusers to mourn their fates.

Sixty-five Michigan school districts, including my home district of Rochester, have already adopted tobacco-free policies. The most recent additions are Walled Lake Schools and — thanks to citizen Zack's efforts — Farmington Schools. Both districts expect to begin policy implementation on July 1, 1993.

"Tobacco-free schools send a message to everyone who enters a school building," said Zack, who retired as a Livonia principal and is now a member of the newly formed group, Advocates for Excellence in Education.

Messages like this clearly challenge adults to set the example for children. As Norton said, "The kids are watch-

ing us, and they don't miss a trick." Like it or not, we are our children's models.

When I was a youngster growing up on 16th Street and McGraw in central Detroit, I idolized my father. An prizefighter, he kept the local hooligans in line and — drunk or sober — protected the entire (including his own two shapely sisters who often were somewhat less-than-eager to be protected) neighborhood. I was a younger image of him and copied all his behaviors indiscriminately without a second thought.

This is why we have to clean up our acts — both individually and as a society — because the role of model for a child is a sacred role indeed.

# Social messes fester as civil court suits multiply

**A** policeman and a fireman are injured in the line of duty. We honor them for risking their lives.

Now, how shall we reimburse them? Worker's comp? Help from the municipal exchequer? A crime victim's claim? Let them sue the bad guys responsible for their injuries? So far, so good.

How about you paying through your homeowner's insurance premiums? No way, say you!

Maybe, say some justices of the Michigan Supreme Court, some of the time.

Officers Don Czopek and Herdis Petty spotted Arthur Smith staggering down the middle of Gudith Road in Woodhaven late New Year's Eve in 1983. Smith, 18, had consumed six beers in less than an hour, topping it with a liberal dose of peppermint schnapps.

The officers tried to handcuff the

plastered youth to take him home. He resisted violently. It took an hour to subdue him. Czopek suffered frostbite on one hand. Petty suffered broken ribs from Smith's kicks and a bite on his hand.

Smith didn't remember a thing. Charged with assault and battery, he was fined \$250.

The officers sued Smith's parents. Somehow their home insurer, Group Insurance Co. of Michigan (GICOM) was pulled into the case.

Five Supreme Court justices let GICOM off the hook. Justice Conrad Mallett Jr. wrote that Smith's actions were intentional, even though he was intoxicated, and there was no "occurrence" as defined in the insurance policy. The policy didn't cover "bodily injury or property damage which is either expected or intended from the standpoint of the insured."

Thank goodness for some common

sense — but wait! Justice Charles Levin dissents. He wanted the case to go to trial to determine whether the injuries were "expected or intended" by the insured.

It was too bad GICOM had to bear the expense of going to the Supreme Court to get their premium payers off the hook, but it was scary when one justice voted to go after the deep pockets. The kid should pay for his sins,

but not with our homeowner's insurance dollars.

Charles Piccard tried to make it look like an accident, but later he told Grand Rapids arson investigators he deliberately set fire in 1984 to his Towne & Country Music Store.

Firefighter Thomas Deane, on the roof of a neighboring store, was blinded by smoke, stepped off the roof, injured his knee and was permanently disabled.

The Supreme Court said Piccard couldn't collect from his insurer, Frankenmuth Mutual. "Society, however, will not allow an individual to shift the economic responsibility to an insurer for conduct that it seeks to discourage and deter," wrote Justice Dorothy Comstock Riley.

But a 4-3 majority said the insurer had to defend Piccard in firefighter Deane's suit. Riley said there was no "accident" from store owner Piccard's

point of view, but there was from the injured fireman's point of view.

Dissenting, Chief Justice Michael Cavanagh said, "Defining the fireman's fall as 'accidental' cannot convert the fire, the basis of the injury, into an 'accident.'" He wanted to let Frankenmuth Mutual off both hooks entirely.

I detect the sharp, inward curving teeth of the trial lawyers association in these cases.

Not content with letting government punish wrongdoers, people are filing civil damage suits these days, much like they did prior to the time of England's King Henry II.

But dragging insurers into these cases? I have qualms. We've watched two social messes fester in the medical malpractice and auto insurance areas in the last decade. Will home and business insurance be next?

The hotel truly was a family business; the six Lorenz children got their first jobs at the hotel and participated in its management over the years.

Lorenz often said, "They don't put statues in the park for critics," recalled his daughter Sheila Lorenz Osann. "My dad had an incredible sense of community and of how important it was for everybody to be active in the community. He believed that if something is wrong, there's a solution, and the only way to find the solution is to work together. You can't just complain about something and do nothing. You have to be part of the solution."

"My parents were both active in the community. It was such a good example for me to see how

they lived, because certainly the values have been passed on to me, and it is the way I try to lead my life today. You only get out of it as much as you put into it; and there's a whole lot to get out of it. I've tried to instill that in my children. They haven't quite got the message yet."

As a collegian, Lorenz was Ypsilanti Normal's (Eastern Michigan University's) golf captain. He pursued the sport in Detroit district play, where he carried a handicap of two. He won the city championship in 1954.

Lorenz refined his talent in the culinary arts during World War II in the Navy. He served as a lieutenant and supply officer in the Pacific theater.

At the Mayflower, Lorenz

served as host to governors, celebrities and movie stars. But many who've stayed at or worked at the Mayflower aren't people whose names people would recognize. They've been older people with drinking problems, troubled young people and down-and-outers in need of money.

Lorenz once said he helped them in an effort to give something back. "I've had a lot of breaks in my life, and it's very difficult to repay," he said shortly before his 79th birthday. "I find myself quite often giving people money or hiring a guy who constantly gets drunk, because you can never pay people back in kind."

Lorenz lost his first wife Mabel, and married Theresa Lorenz in

1985. Ralph; Theresa; Lorenz's son Rick; and daughter-in-law Tammy formed RTL, a building firm that developed a 21-unit condominium complex on the family homestead in Plymouth.

A member of the City of Plymouth Hall of Fame, Lorenz was a past president and life member of the Plymouth Rotary Club and served as president of the Plymouth Chamber of Commerce and president of the Michigan Hotel Association. He was a member of the board of directors of the Michigan Chamber of Commerce. He was an original trustee of St. Andrews Episcopal Church in Livonia, and a two-time delegate to the White House Conference on Small Businesses.

## Runners qualify for state finals



Plymouth-Canton will send a five-runner contingent to the state finals in cross country this weekend. Salem failed to qualify as a team in the girls regional race, however. Leah Retherford had the best individual finish in the Class A girls meet.

Each of the five cross country teams in the Plymouth-Canton area will have one runner competing this weekend in the state finals.

In the girls Class A regional at Marshbank Park, Plymouth-Canton sophomore Kathleen Landelius and Plymouth Salem freshman Leah Retherford earned a trip to the state meet Saturday.

The girls and boys championship events will take place Saturday at Flint Kearsley High School. The top 20 runners in each race qualified for the finals.

Retherford was 12th with a 20:34 time and Landelius 14th with a 20:43 time.

"She was about 10 seconds off what she could run, but considering the competition she did fine," Salem coach Mike Krafchak said. "I think she'll represent the school and team very well."

"We'll use her first year up there as a learning experience. The stress level is higher, and the race has a tendency to be run differently than a lot of kids are used to seeing."

The Westerr. Lakes Activities Association made a strong showing in the girls regional, but Salem and Livonia Stevenson were nonetheless disappointed by the results.

Both have state-ranked teams but failed to qualify for the team competition, finishing fourth and fifth, respectively. Only the top three teams go to state.

"We thought we would do very well in the meet," Krafchak said. "It never

entered my mind that we wouldn't qualify."

"For the first mile and a half, we were in great shape. By two and a half, we were in terrible shape. It went that fast."

"We had our first bad race of the year, and it happened on the day of the regional. No excuses; we just didn't do the job. On the positive side, this was the best season a Salem girls cross country team ever had."

WLAA champ Walled Lake Western was first with 95 points, followed by Ann Arbor Huron (121), West Bloomfield (125), Stevenson (135), Salem (146), North Farmington (146), Ann Arbor Pioneer (229), Farmington (234), Canton (247) and Mercy (257).

"I think our conference is one of the better ones in the state this year," Canton coach George Przygodski said. "It hurts us having our conference championships on Wednesday before the regional. It takes the edge off, having the kids come back on Saturday to run another big race."

Another Canton sophomore, Laura McWilliams, just missed going to state. She was 23rd in 21:13. Karina Kilpelainen was 52nd (22:23), Lara Antczak 76th (23:05) and Melissa Bastine 82nd (23:24) for the Chiefs.

## CC gridders to play Mumford

The Detroit Mumford football team has a 360-pound tackle on one side of its offensive line and a 340-pound tackle on the other side.

"It's hard to get by them (seniors Lasceno Franklin and Brian Ferguson)," Mumford interim coach Brian Newton said. "That's one reason we pass so well."

Of course it also helps to have a pair of big-play receivers, including senior Derrick Mason, who has 37 catches for 765 yards and seven touchdowns.

Mason will lead Mumford, 8-1 overall, against undefeated Redford Catholic Central in a Class AA Region III first-round playoff game at 1:30 p.m. Saturday at Pontiac's Wisner Stadium.

Mason, who ran a 4.39 40-yard dash time at Michigan's Camp over the summer, has returned a punt 80 yards and a kickoff 85 yards for scores. Another threat is 5-7, 151-pound receiver Dion

Patterson, who has 14 catches for 300 yards and four TDs.

CC, which has some of the strongest line play in the state, has outscored opponents 249-69 and allowed only 51.4 passing yards per game. The Shamrocks have 11 interceptions, including three by Brady Pankow, and seven fumble recoveries.

"Mason is the guy they should be looking for, but they've got nothing to be afraid of — I'm not afraid of them," Newton said. "They're a good team and you want to play the best."

CC defeated Mumford 20-6 in the second game of the regular-season last year. The Shamrocks' running game figures to be stronger than the last two weeks with tailback Freddie Taylor and fullback Jason Krueger both in the starting lineup.

Taylor leads the Shamrocks with 666 yards on 106 carries (6.3 average) and Krueger, who has missed the last two weeks on offense with an ankle injury, has

490 yards (5.4 average).

"We're going to try to shut down their running game and try to make them pass," Newton said. "When they pass, they fake the power handoff and pass to the fullback in the flat. At least that's what they were doing the times I watched them."

CC quarterback Chris Barbara has completed 27-of-60 passes for 443 yards and five TDs but three of his passes were dropped in last week's 17-6 win over Detroit St. Martin DePorres in the Catholic League championship. Steve Borke leads CC with only six catches for a 15.8 yard average.

"It was just one of those games where you have drops," Mach said. "We've been making some big plays on offense. The kids have done a good job in key situations."

Mumford's quarterback is Darrell Whaley, who quartered the lineup two weeks ago against Pontiac

# Lady Ocelots face obstacles on court

Injuries can ruin a team's season. Everyone knows that.

At Schoolcraft College, academic losses have ruined basketball seasons before they're half over — men's basketball seasons, that is.

But it's rare for a team to lose as much as SC's women's team has before a season even gets started (SC opens Saturday).

If that sounds like a built-in, ready-made excuse for mediocrity, it should be noted that Lady Ocelot coach Jack Grenan isn't ready to call off the season — even though five players who committed to play at SC last spring changed their minds and went elsewhere, nearly wrecking what had seemed a promising recruiting class.

Add to that the loss of Sis Guth, the team's top rebounder and second-best scorer a year ago, to academic problems, and the struggle ahead for SC seems all uphill.

Still, Grenan is optimistic. The Eastern Conference's defending champion, St. Clair CC, was built on quickness and defense, he noted. The Lady Ocelots will have the same qualities.

Not that Grenan wouldn't mind another big post player or two. This is the smallest team he's had, both in numbers and size. There are currently just eight players on the squad; a ninth, Jamie Alex, will join the team after she finishes playing for SC's soccer team.

Alex will be a welcome addition. She's nearly 6-foot, but her addition still gives Grenan just two players over 5-9. The only one he has now is 5-11 freshman Alisa Wechter, who helped New Boston Huron reach the Class B finals a year ago, averaging 16½ points a game.

"We're the smurfs," the SC coach said, not entirely joking.

team (just 4-10 in the conference) are its three best players: Guth; guard Donna Galli, who led the conference in scoring with a 22-point average; and center Nicole Dapprich, who average 12 points and eight boards.

That leaves major holes to fill. And yet, Grenan insists "we will be better than last year." Why? "After Donna, there was a lack of consistency (in scoring). This year, no one will average more than 16 points, but we could easily have three or four in double figures."

The team's weaknesses are plainly evident: rebounding and post defense. Grenan hopes the strengths will be just as evident: quickness and defense.

"We have five players who played point guard in high school, so our passing and court awareness are enormously better," he said. "We know we'll have to pressure the ball full court, but they like doing that anyway."

The 30-second shot clock, Grenan hopes, will work to his team's advantage. If the Ocelots can force their opponents to waste most of the clock working the ball upcourt, their half-court defense won't be pressured as much.

The lack of players, however, could hurt a hard-nosed defense. The four returnees — 5-9 forward Dana Hudson (Birmingham Marian), who averaged 14 points a game the last half of the season; 5-6 point guard Jen Audet (Livonia Stevenson), an 11-point scorer; 5-6 guard Lori Murphy; and 5-6 forward Michelle Ernst (Wayne Memorial) — must improve over last year.

And the newcomers — Wechter; 5-7 shooting guard Becky Piotruckowski; 5-6 guard Angie Cerne; and 5-4 point guard Dawn James — will be expected to contribute significantly at once.

Piotruckowski has been im-

pressive thus far. A strong three-point shooter, she set the St. Clair Shores South Lake HS scoring record and, according to Grenan, "is the best defensive player coming in among the freshmen."

"Still, even after Alex arrives and gets into playing shape, there won't be many options open to Grenan should foul problems arise. "My substitutions won't take a lot of thought," he said. "The second half (of games) will be the key. Can we stay out of foul trouble until then and still press?"

It'll be a challenge, for sure. Grenan is making just one promise: "We'll be entertaining." We'll see.

# Offensive attack key to SC's hopes

Van Dimitriou hopes the expedition lasts more than one day as his Schoolcraft College men's soccer team takes on Lewis & Clark in Inter-Regional play beginning Saturday.

The Ocelots, sporting an overall record of 12-1-1 and a No. 5 ranking in the National Junior College Athletic Association, own a win and two ties during their last three meetings against Lewis & Clark, located in the small town of Godfrey in downstate Illinois.

The first semifinal pits College of DuPage (Ill.), now 16-1 overall, against Bethany (Minn.), beginning at noon (CST). The Schoolcraft-Lewis & Clark match follows at 2 p.m.

Both matches will be played at College of Lake County in Grayslake, Ill.

The championship will be noon Sunday (CST) with the winner advancing to the eight-team NJCAA tourney, Nov. 18-21 at Mercer CC in Trenton, N.J.

"We're ready and there's a mood of confidence," said Dimitriou, whose team is making its fourth straight Inter-Regional appearance and the seventh for SC in the past nine years. "The captains are driving everybody hard and the guys are serious."

"But we know that Lewis & Clark doesn't put out weak teams. They play in a competitive league."

Lewis & Clark has been rated as high as No. 2 nationally, so Dimitriou has been exploring ways to get his offensive attack cranked up. It's been back to the basics for the Ocelots during their two-week layoff.

"If we were finishing a little better I could see us in that top ten, but right now I'm convinced we don't belong that high," said the Schoolcraft coach, who last led the Ocelots to the NJCAAs in

Second-year player Andy Cosenza (Plymouth Salem High) leads SC in scoring with 34 points on 11 goals and 12 assists. Dominic Vella (Livonia Churchill) is second with 32 points on 14 goals and four assists.

Matt Lividini, Brian Hauman and Jeff Cardinal are next in line with 14 points apiece.

Lividini, from Riverview Gabriel Richard, could be the key to Schoolcraft's hopes this weekend, but he has been nagged by the injury bug.

"He will beat people on through balls, but hasn't been able to do that because his injuries," Dimitriou said.

The Ocelots have scored a total of 59 goals this year, while allowing just six. They gave up only three in nine region matches.

First-year goalie Matt Stabile (Livonia Stevenson) posted seven shutouts in nine region matches.

"I really feel that Lewis & Clark is the team that will decide the whole thing," Dimitriou said. "If we win that match, I think we can win the whole thing."

Pilut was named District 23 Player of the Week for the week of Oct. 25-Oct. 31. In 22 games she tallied 278 assists and had a 96 percent serving proficiency.

# S'craft aims for Region 12 repeat

Tom Teeters is hoping it's all behind his Schoolcraft College volleyball team now.

Shannon Capstick and Jennifer Damphousse recorded 32 and 29 kills, respectively. Nancy Ehlert led with 43 assists and Tracia Clendenen added 33.

Despite their previous successes, Teeters isn't overly optimistic. "I'd say our chances are less than 50-50," he estimated, even though SC is the No. 2 seed. "But one thing we always seem to do is come back. A team can't relax against us."

"And it's hard to play a best three-of-five match against us because of our defense and our adjustments."

SC opens the defense of its region title at 6 tonight against Muskegon Community College. Kellogg CC, the top seed, gets a first-round bye and plays at 7:30 tonight.

The other five seeds are Kalamazoo Valley CC, No. 3; Mott CC, No. 4; Clark State (Ohio), No. 5; Delta CC, No. 6; and Southwest-ern CC, No. 7.

The remainder of the field includes Sinclair (Ohio), Glen Oaks, Henry Ford, Lake Michi-

gan, Muskegon, Oakland CC, Lakeland (Ohio) and Lansing CC.

Play continues Friday, beginning at 9 a.m. with the day's last matches starting at 7 p.m. Until Saturday, all matches are best-of-three games; play starts at 10 a.m. Saturday, with all matches best of five. The semifinals are at noon; the finals follow at 2 p.m. and, if necessary, 4 p.m.

The regional champion advances to the NJCAA Tournament Nov. 21-27 in Phoenix.

# Wayne line leads way into playoffs

Wayne Memorial High has a good offensive line, just ask Bruce Calhoun.

The 6-foot-1, 190-pound senior tailback, who has amassed 1,225 yards this season, and rushed for 167 yards in 30 carries in the Zebras' season-ending 35-7 victory Friday over city rival Westland John Glenn, told reporters afterwards: "I'm not anything without them."

Wayne coach Chuck Howton can't remember the last time his team rolled up over 300 yards on the ground, but it's something Howell (8-1) will have to contend with Friday as the Zebras (7-2) make their first-ever state football playoff appearance in Class A-Region II. (Game time

is 7:30 p.m. at Howell.)

"We started to jell about the third game," said Howton, whose team opened the season with losses to Adrian and Monroe before beating Trenton, 35-27. "They started to get some confidence, and success breeds success."

Things looked bleak, however, when the team's top offensive lineman, 5-10, 220-pound senior guard Derek Reeves went down with a serious knee injury in an 18-6 loss to Monroe.

"He was a guy who knocked people on their back, but all the sudden he's out for the season," recalls Howton.

But the others picked up the slack, led by left guard Anthony McGill, 6-1, 190-pound junior,

and right tackle Ramzy Saleh, a 5-10, 260-pound senior.

Also emerging up front has been center Jacob Rathburn, a 6-foot, 220-pound junior, along with left tackle Mike Ramsey, a 6-foot, 230-pound senior.

"McGill has been one of our finer blockers," Howton said. "We've been blocking extremely well with that trio to the left side."

Right guard Kier Cook, a 5-6, 215-pound senior, has also reclaimed a starting job from a year ago. He joins tight end Jason Overton, a 6-4, 200-pound junior with pass catching ability, and wideout Jeremy Treppa, a 5-10, 160-pound senior, as blockers.

In the win over Glenn, quarterback Tim Mate added 59

yards, while fullbacks Reginald McCarthy and Murdank Forrest added 48 and 41, respectively. The week before in a 32-18 win over Southgate, Johnny Ballard rushed for 117 yards.

"It's says something about your offensive line when two or three people run the ball well," Howton said.

Howton credits offensive line coach Doug Mac, a former Wayne High and Saginaw Valley State player, with the team's development up front.

"Doug was our defensive coordinator, but he stepped aside when we brought in Denny Healy," Howton said. "He's done a terrific job with those guys. He has fine rapport with those kids."

# Steelers win grid pair; Lions notch JV victory

Andy Kocoloski ran 40 and 38 yards for touchdowns as the freshmen defeated the Lions 19-0.

# Krueger helps CC win league crown

It's hard keeping Redford Catholic Central football player Jason Krueger out of the end zone. Even when he's on defense.

Krueger, still recovering from an ankle sprain, didn't play offense Saturday night but he scored a touchdown anyway as CC beat Detroit St. Martin DePorres 17-6 for the Catholic League championship at the Silverdome.

Krueger, playing defensive end, recovered a DePorres fumble in the end zone on the first play of the second half to give the Shamrocks a commanding 16-0 lead.

Paul Nemzek caused the fumble

and lineman Joe Lopez bobbled the ball before Krueger corralled it in the back of the end zone.

"I yelled out, 'It's mine, it's mine,' got wide eyes and jumped on it," said Krueger, who has scored nine times as a fullback. "It was one of the more exciting ones (TDs). It's so rare to score a defensive touchdown."

Krueger suffered an ankle injury Oct. 17 against the University of Detroit-Jesuit and didn't even dress the following week in a 49-16 win over Harper Woods Notre Dame. CC coach Tom Mach decided to leave Krueger out of the offense Saturday for fear of get-

ting the ankle twisted or grabbed but Krueger was one of the Shamrocks' more effective defensive linemen.

Krueger is expected to go both ways when the Shamrocks, 9-0 overall, host a Class AA playoff game this weekend, possibly at Livonia Clarenceville.

"We didn't want him (Krueger) to get hurt again on the ankle," said Mach, explaining his reason to leave Krueger off the offense. "We're happy to have him back and he'll probably be ready to go next week."

De Porres (7-2) beat CC 16-15 last year for the Catholic League championship but the Shamrocks' defense and special teams dominated Saturday. CC recovered two DePorres fumbles and defensive back Ken Rys had an interception that stopped a potential Eagle scoring drive.

Punter Steve Gusfa averaged 40 yards per punt and place kicker Adam Borchert made two extra points and a 32-yard field goal. DePorres gained 136 yards in total offense compared to CC's 140 but the Eagles were only 1-for-10

on third-down conversions.

The Eagles' starting quarterback Maurice King left the game in the first half after breaking a leg.

"The difference is amazing between last year and this year, to go into the playoffs on a winning note," Mach said. "I thought our defense, overall, was excellent. It put us in good position, stopped long drives and gave us the ball back. Our offense was adequate but we won two out of three areas — the defense and kicking game and that usually wins games."

CC went ahead 7-0 after taking the opening kickoff and driving 60 yards in eight plays for a TD. Tailback Freddie Taylor, who finished with 98 yards, gained 26 yards to bring the ball to the DePorres' 2 and quarterback Chris Barbara scored on the next play.

DePorres gave up the ball to CC after being stopped at its own 29 on fourth down and one in the second quarter. The Shamrocks failed to reach the end zone but with 9 minutes left in the half Borchert's field goal gave the Shamrocks a 10-0 lead.

# Jackpots attract league bowlers

Jackpots are to bowling what pretzels are to beer.

Some bowlers enter specific leagues mainly because of the jackpot money available. While there are plenty of bowlers who are out to bowl for fun and the social scene,

most leagues thrive on their jackpots.

The October/November issue of Bowling Magazine, an official publication of the American Bowling Congress (ABC), has an insightful article on side pots, and how they add to the excitement of league play.

The article also addresses another side of the coin — the legality of jackpots, as most pots are considered mini-tournaments based upon skill.

Jackpots are conducted concurrently with normal league play and do not affect the league competition in any way. Mandatory high games or series jackpots (where all league members must participate) are acceptable only if adopted as part of league rules.

Games, jackpots or related activities which call for a bowler to perform at less than his or her best are not acceptable. Activities such as random drawings and lottery-type lucky number games violate ABC rule 15 which prohibits gambling schemes and could

violate local gambling laws. Last year, a ladies' league in California was raided by the sheriff's department and several bowlers were arrested. This drew nationwide attention, even though the girls were released and charges were not filed.

Bowlers Poker, where playing cards are awarded based on strikes, spares or splits, combines skill and luck of the draw. It is accepted, but not condoned, by ABC as long as the game is played among teammates and does not violate local gaming laws.

Where did this all start? Originally, teams would set up a "kitty" based on missed spares or making several strikes in a row. At the end of the season the kitty bank would be opened up and the money divided among team members.

There were many variations, but usually the amount of money collected would hardly pay for that trip to Hawaii.

Many variations have developed over the years such as clean pots, lucky 13, random doubles. The most popular have been high game with or without handicap or over average.

The mystery games have become popular with variations like one number progressive which can rollover and build a large payout. The same applies to a super strike, in which the lucky ticket holder has to roll a strike to win all the money.

Any of these jackpot variations can make your league more cre-

ative and stimulate more interest. Congratulations to Farmington Hills' Clara Knight rolled a 203 at Country Lanes in the Senior Wing Dingers league. She recently celebrated her 90th birthday and has been bowling for 23 years. Knight averages a 131 on her team, the high and low. Her 14 grandchildren and 24 great-grandchildren should be mighty proud of their bowling granny.

You won't see any fancy costumes or sets in A.R. Gurney's "Love Letters," which opens 7:30 p.m. Tuesday, Nov. 17, at the

George Burns Theatre for Performing Arts in Livonia. But you will see some wonderful, talented actors — Richard Kiley and Lauren Bacall.

"It's a very simple format," said Kiley. "It's deceptively simple. The quality of writing weaves a spell. The readers will have to use their imaginations."

"Love Letters" is performed by two actors — Kiley and Bacall — in this presentation, seated at a table, reading directly from their scripts. It chronicles the lifelong relationship of Andrew Makepeace Ladd and Melissa Gardner solely through letters they write to each other. The play takes them from second grade to adolescence, young adulthood and into middle age.

Like radio, Kiley said "Love Letters" relies on the "magic of the voice," to get its point across. But unlike radio, the audience gets to see the actor's facial expressions which helps.

"It's beautifully written," said Kiley. "A.R. Gurney is a skillful writer. He writes about kind of life. The

characters come from privileged families. They're very well off.

"You learn about people, who on the face of things, should have it made. But they're victims of life's problems too."

Kiley, who has done the show before opposite Bacall, Joanne Woodward and Julie Harris, said it will appeal to all everyone because the themes are timeless, and everyone will see a bit of themselves in it.

"The things that survive are those

that touch humanity," he said.

Another reason to see the show is Bacall. "She's wonderful, I've known her a long time," said Kiley. "Some film people are marvelous in front of the camera, but fade on stage. She has a kind of intelligence that makes this kind of play work."

Kiley has appeared at the Fisher Theatre before, but this is his first visit to Metro Detroit's western suburbs. "I've never heard of Livonia before," he said. "I hope it's nice."

Strong acting in funny, true to life 'Mass Appeal'

Catholics will be very familiar with the conflict at the center of Bill C. Davis' popular two-person comedy "Mass Appeal."

Father Tim Farley is a common figure to Catholics. He's that comfortable parish priest who is more public relations man than holy man. He likes his easy life of pat and amusing Sunday homilies, inane but reassuring counseling and smoozing with his big contributing parishoners. Oh, yes, and he drinks a little more than he should.

Father Farley has become an institution at the solidly middle class St. Francis Church when he invites the challenge of an idealistic young seminarian into his increasingly more vapid life.

The jogging, social activist Mark Dolson is everything Father Farley planned on being before he became too complacent. But the father thinks he can still teach the young man a thing or two while he learns something himself.

This is strong material, subject matter that in stronger hands has been the theme of several plays on the life of Saint Joan and Brian Moore's lacerating "Catholics."

Davis has something else in mind. He wants to be like his Father Farley and amuse us into thinking about

these matters, he wants us to be comfortable but mindful of this ungoing conflict.

It doesn't quite work. There are many amusing lines and Catholics will be especially impressed with Davis' grasp of parish politics. But when the play has to finally take that plunge into the cold water of spiritual betrayal, Davis has failed to prepare us or offer strong enough motivation to make us care.

The Meadowbrook production directed by artistic director Terence Kilburn is all that one could hope to wrench from Davis' play. It is funny, true to life and well acted.

Veteran actor Arthur J. Beer is wonderful as Farley, the kind of warm, overly obliging parish father that every Catholic has known. He even brings some depth of emotion to

Davis' weakly written serious turns. But it is in the snappy comebacks, garrulous instructions and tipsy enthusiasms that he and the character come most to life.

Lance A. Retallick is a little less assured in the somewhat vaguely defined Mark Dolson role. At times he seems to be reciting instead of being this overly intense young seminarian. But Retallick finds his way and his best moments when he must ponder the realities of church politics versus his inner spirit.

"Mass Appeal" has had just that since it opened Off-Broadway in 1980. It certainly has a ring of truth for Catholics. But like Father Farley's sermons and counsel, it tries to gently amuse us about something that demands more depth and passion.

# LSO to spotlight classics, jazz

The Livonia Symphony Orchestra presents an evening of music from classical to jazz with guest trumpeter Armando Ghitalla in the second concert of the orchestra's 19th season 8 p.m. Saturday, Nov. 14, at Churchill High School Auditorium, 8900 Newburgh Road, Livonia.

As an added attraction an original composition written in honor of the late President John F. Kennedy by LSO violist Christopher Tew, *Elegy for Strings*- November 1963, will make its Michigan debut.

Tickets are \$10, seniors/students \$6, children 15 and under \$3, available at Livonia Civic Center Library, Farmington Road and Five Mile, Madonna University, Schoolcraft and Levan, Hammell Music 15630 Middlebelt and at the door before the concert. For information call the symphony hotline 458-6575, or office noon to 4 p.m. Monday and Wednesday 421-1111.

"The November concert gives people a taste of different kinds of sounds," said Livonia Symphony Society president, Kenneth Kelsey of Farmington Hills.

"What makes a live orchestra so special over listening to a CD is being able to watch the different instruments. A novice can watch and see what makes the deep throaty tone to start learning that's the sound of the bassoon."

Along with Tew's elegy other selections on the program include Mikhail Glinka's, *Overture to*

Russlan and Ludmilla, Antonin Dvorak's, *Symphony in E minor, Op. 95: From the New World*, and Harold Farberman's, *Double Concerto for Trumpet and Orchestra* spotlighting Ghitalla who premiered the piece with the Boston Pops under Arthur Fiedler.

"It's very unusual that you would hear jazz and classical in one concerto for one trumpet," said LSO conductor, Francesco DiBlasi.

"Armando Ghitalla is a top notch trumpeter who played first trumpet for 20 out of the more than 25 years he was with the Boston Symphony."

Ghitalla, who studied at Illinois Wesleyan University, New York University and The Juilliard School, gave the first complete trumpet recital in the history of New York's Town Hall in 1958. He has played first trumpet with the New York City Opera, Band of America under Radio City Music Hall director, Paul LeValle, Houston Symphony Orchestra, Boston Pops, and as a soloist from England to Japan.

Teaching positions include Boston's Berkeley Music School, Boston University, University of Hartford, New England Conservatory of Music, and Tanglewood Institute. Currently he is professor of music at the University of Michigan, participating regularly in symposia, festivals and master classes.

Ghitalla has premiered concerti by many leading American composers. He has recorded for Cambridge Records, Deutsche Gram-

mophon, and Opus Records to name a few.

After intermission Tew leaves his chair in the viola section to take the conducting reins for his elegy.

"I started writing melodies the night before President Kennedy was assassinated. The melodies were sad and melancholy. It was fitting they be used in the elegy," said Tew.

"A lot of what people felt that weekend besides sadness was anger and shock. Each section ascends to moments of anger, and

contains all or part of the initial melody."

Tew wrote the composition for strings he said, "because they can sing without breaking the melody."

"It is a melodic work. Everything that people don't like about modern music isn't in there. It's a natural free flowing melody using basic harmonies."

Tew has played viola for more than 25 years in community orchestras. He studied music theory and composition under Dr. Harold Luce and M. Thomas Cousins at the University of North Carolina at Greensboro.

# Nonstop laughs in fun-filled 'California Suite'

Neil Simon, hotel suites and hilarious comedy are almost always a sure bet. Perhaps that's why the Farmington Players have the winning trifecta ticket for their production of "California Suite."

Director Judie Rosati has fashioned a fun-filled evening, consisting of four playlets about visitors to Hollywood's famous Beverly Hills Hotel.

For openers, there is a marvelous pair of rooms. Pastel walls, tasteful decorations and French doors overlooking a lush California garden — provide a posh, soothing environment that is

counterpoint to the frantic crisis each guest experiences.

First, we meet a "Visitor from New York." That would be Hannah Warren, played by Karen Southworth. She has come to California to settle a dispute with her ex-husband, Billy Warren, played by B.J. Alpern, over the future of their daughter.

The humor in this piece depends almost entirely on the rivalry between New Yorkers and Angelenos. Alpern has the look and style of a laidback, over-the-hill California surfer.

Southworth, looks the part, but doesn't come across as an in your face New Yorker. Her smart-mouthed repartee seems artificial. A more hostile, superior attitude would do wonders for her character.

Next up is a "Visitor from Philadelphia." Carl Orsini is a scream from his first gargle, as Marvin Michaels, who has come to Cali-

formia to celebrate his nephew's bar mitzvah. The fun begins when he awakes to find he has spent the night with a hooker — a "gift" from his brother — and his wife (who has just arrived) is knocking on the door.

Well, as you might guess, the wife discovers the drunken lady of the evening — and that is major trouble for poor Marvin. Maggie Savage scores as the betrayed wife who coolly decides not to get mad, just get even. Besides, it was his first sin — and one of omission, rather than commission.

The next guests are, "Visitors from London," who arrive for the Academy Awards. Linda Bodnar turns in a sparkling performance as an English movie maven who is not only concerned with a "hump" in her dress and winning the Best Actress award — but with winning back the love of her bisexual husband.

Ralph Rosati gives a balanced

reading to a difficult role — that of a man walking the tightrope of complicated human relationships. Slowly and expertly, Rosati reveals his true nature as the story unfolds to a warm and tender ending.

Finally, we meet the, "Visitors from Chicago," an all-out farce about two couples on vacation together. Jim Cave and Kathy Booker combine with Ralph Rosati and Linda Bodnar to give us non-stop laughs. A tennis game leads to a sprained ankle — a struggle in the bedroom, cut fingers, wounded egos, mock fights — and a wild finish in which all swear they had a good time and are still friends.



"Night Rivers" is a symphony in one movement. Its central focus is the evolving flow of a few basic musical gestures from dreamlike states of calm equilibrium to torrential passages of intense fury back to refined repose.

The composition derives all of its thematic, textural, and timbral material from the first seven bars of music. These opening sound shapes and interval patterns are recycled in many forms throughout the work to evoke and ultimately to fuse two distinct images borrowed from the poetry of Walt Whitman: "night" as used by Whitman in the poem "The Sleepers," and "river," a vivid

metaphor from "Whispers of Heavenly Death," and "Crossing

Brooklyn Ferry." Iannaccone studied at the Manhattan School of Music and the Eastman School of Music.







## Businesses fill health care gaps

After years of working in a hospital setting, nurse Sandra Huppenbauer decided to use her expertise in a more creative way.

With nurse Cathy Connelly, she formed Mental Health Perspectives in Plymouth — a business dedicated to community education on health issues.

"There is a definite need for health education and more support for health care professionals, caregivers, teachers and parents," said Huppenbauer.

By day she is coordinator of Sinai Hospital's day hospitalization program for psychiatric patients. Connelly, of Novi, is a colleague.

Last May they presented their first program, a seminar at the Botsford Inn on psychiatric emergencies for mental health professionals.

"We expected 30 to 50 participants. We had 52," Huppenbauer said.

Next spring a seminar is planned on women's health issues. A class on parenting adolescents is under way at Plymouth/Canton High School. She envisions offering similar courses at

Schoolcraft College.

"Response has been good. People are very receptive. We would like to expand with an ultimate goal of doing this full time," she said.

"I see community outreach as a definite trend to reducing health care costs. Everyone is looking to community-based care to reduce costs.

"Nurses are very cost efficient. And delivering health care outside a hospital setting is the way to go. It's more cost efficient."

Lois Gerber and Jean Argue are two RNs who are working in a different direction. The duo has launched Community Connections Inc. based in Birmingham, although they plan to service the tri-county area.

Gerber and Argue were concerned that there weren't enough community resources to help families keep their loved ones out of nursing homes. As part of their business they visit a client's home and develop a plan of care with the family, helping them to decide what kinds of in-home services are needed.

"It's the sandwich generation we're often dealing with," said Gerber. "Many women are pressured between

caring for young adult children and aging parents."

"We have three clients right now. I envision slow, steady growth."

Gerber and Argue don't hire aides; rather they pre-screen applicants and let the aides work out their own fees with a client.

"Certainly the number of elderly people is increasing," said Gerber,

who teaches community health nursing. "It's hard for families to research the fragmented services. Families are very caring but they don't know where to go."

"Generally, physicians are supportive of efforts to keep people out of nursing homes. The medical establishment takes care of health care needs; we pick up the slack."

## Survey aims to pinpoint patient discontent

With rising health care costs and consumer demand for quality increasing, people are starting to comparison shop for health care. A doctor can no longer just hang out a shingle and wait for patients.

Medical care providers are aware of this trend, and some are taking steps to reach out to patients. A major goal of this outreach focuses on meeting patient needs. How does a health care professional know when patient are satisfied? By asking them.

A company called MedPulse allows

doctors, clinics, any medical facility to get feedback through the use of an in-depth patient satisfaction survey. Consumers can voice their opinions anonymously on health care-related issues, including physician and nursing staff, laboratory services, appointment scheduling, wait time, billing and insurance related issues, as well as the facility itself.

MedPulse is the brainchild of Carol Hay, president of Universal Software Solutions in Canton Township.

"Competition within the health care field is more intense than ever, as doctors and medical facilities compete for the consumer's loyalty. The answer to earning this trust is to tune into a patient's needs and feelings," Hay said.

Many health care organizations already conduct patient satisfaction surveys. But often resources are lacking that would turn the raw data into usable information, she said.

MedPulse is a full-service operation that includes design and produc-

tion of the survey instrument, customized to meet the health care facility's needs; distribution of the survey to the patient base; collection and tabulation of data; and results reporting. These services can be tailored to any medical specialty.

"The patient has an opportunity to express herself, and the health care provider gets solid information on the service they provide. MedPulse allows health care providers to see themselves as their patients see them," said Hay.

## Banks rethink branch design

Welcome to the bank of the future, where customers can call up their account by computer, make an appointment before or after regular business hours and cut the time spent waiting in line by as much as 30 percent.

Sound impossible? Not at four area branches of the National Bank of Detroit, as recent renovations incorporate amenities long used successfully by retail mall outlets — an abundance of skylights, plants, chairs and soothing color schemes — all designed to relax people before they go about their business.

Each of the locations, which NBD has dubbed "Branch 2000," is equipped with the latest in banking technology — cash dispatch machines that allow tellers at interior and drive-up windows to cash checks faster than their automated rivals spit out withdrawals.

"I've never been to a bank where you can call up your state-

ment on a computer and then print it out," said Nancy Gordan, a Southfield resident, during a recent visit to the latest Branch 2000 site at Northwestern and 12 Mile in Southfield.

Through a spacious lobby furnished with arm chairs and end tables, customers can inquire into loan or interest rates at an oval information desk, punch up an account on a computer, use one of several large-faced calculators or stride up to one of nine teller windows.

"To be honest, most of our branches were designed to move documents from one area to another in the most expedient way possible. What we're trying to do now is become more customer-orientated," said Lorie Dietz, vice president and regional manager for NBD's South Oakland Regional Banking Center in Bloomfield Hills.

"We're operating in a very competitive environment now. Players like Sears, American Express and even mutual funds are less bur-

dened with daily transactions than we are, so they can place more of an emphasis on the customer. That's the trend we're seeing, and responding to."

The Southfield site is equipped with two cash dispatch machines. When a teller receives a withdrawal request, she types the amount into a calculator-type device and waits three seconds for the cabinet-sized machine to gather the respective bills and release them through a slot.

Completed in August, the Southfield branch was expanded from 4,300 to 19,500 square feet, which includes space for a commercial loan center and personal trust center, activities previously located in separate facilities nearby. Dietz said the consolidation of services saves time for individual and business clients, while saving money for the bank by cutting down on logistic activities.

Other Branch 2000 sites are located at 15 Mile and Telegraph in

## Reduced coverage may be risky

Three hurricanes, an earthquake and a major industrial mishap in the last three years will cost the insurance industry well over \$10 billion, setting the stage for another round of rate hikes.

While some businesses have no alternative than to pay such increases, others are turning to less expensive offerings from merchants' associations and self-insurance, a practice where companies form wholly-owned subsidiaries to insure against misfortune and help limit the scale of potential losses.

"More and more companies are becoming self-insured in an effort to cut costs and control litigation, but there are dangers out there, which shouldn't be overlooked," said Alan Kaufman, founder and senior partner of Kaufman & Payton in Farmington Hills, which has 15 attorneys on staff and specializes in insurance matters.

"If a self-insured company has the bad misfortune of being hit

with a sizable personal injury claim, it may not have the solvency to pay it off. In that case, they're penny wise and pound foolish. No one wants to lose their company because they tried to save \$1,000 on their insurance policy."

Because the economic slowdown has forced companies to slash costs where they can, some are choosing to take a larger deductible on their insurance policy, said Kaufman. For example, a business may raise its deductible from \$5,000 to \$100,000 in an effort to save a few thousand dollars.

While such frugality may spell disaster, companies can also get into trouble by sitting on their hands. For a firm that uses overseas suppliers, if coverage isn't reshaped to reflect changing production patterns, heavy losses could result. Consider a company that has parts made in Taiwan and shipped to the United States for assembly into a product sent to France. If the chain is inter-

rupted anywhere along the line, the shutdown can stifle production everywhere. And as management scrambles to fix the problem, employees may be laid off and competitors will likely grab up market share.

"When companies look at saving money on their insurance policies, they really need to go over everything with a fine-tooth comb," said Kaufman, a Bloomfield Hills resident.

"For instance, do you have enough cash on reserve if the entire production cycle is shut down for three months due to a fire? It's those type of things you have to look at realistically."

To be sure, as more and more companies, especially auto manufacturers and their suppliers, turn to just-in-time delivery, where parts are shipped to an assembly plant as needed, one kink in the system, such as a strike, can jeopardize the whole system.

There is something more than an artful congruence in a new generation taking over the Oval Office and General Motors more or less at the same time.

In the same week, anyway. And I suspect that in the short run the palace revolt that dumped GM's top management last week will likely have a stronger effect on the local sense of well-being than the changing of the guard.

GM management is often accused of being "clubby," whether in the literal sense of membership in the likes of the Birmingham Athletic Club or the more significant notion that the upper echelon's of GM tend to share both neighborhoods and cloned attitudes.

Now GM's new chairman,

John G. Smale, leads a tight coalition of East Coast financiers and investment bankers accustomed to managing liquid assets and businesses — a far different crowd than the old board that tended to function as an honorarium.

They have empowered a new group of executives that are notable both for their youth and the fact that they quietly mounted their revolt from the New York base of GM's treasurer's office.

So far, it has all the makings of a bad movie, where the good guys come riding up after the dog goes out from the fort to get help. In fact, it seems as if we have seen this one before, starring Chairman Lee.

But this time, it's different. GM hasn't been scrambling for investment capital for a couple of hot cars, as Chrysler did. In fact, GM spent more in the past decade on new plants and new cars than any other auto company in history. This positions them with their back against the wall, with the primary investment in plant and equipment

already made.

The anticipated layoffs, as staggering as they may end up (One report is somewhere around 20 percent of the entire North American work force.) will only cut operating costs somewhat, not bring in new revenue. That is the job for some hot new products — but that means being twice as successful as Ford and Chrysler combined for several years.

One scans the list of GM's young turks lower on the organizational chart to detect something that doesn't look like part of the New York fire sale crowd.

Bob Stempel is retained as a "technical adviser," but is formally retired. Arvin F. Mueller is now vice president of engineering and design operations. Mueller, who led a taught design team that developed innovative engines not so long ago, now appears to have the daunting task of welding advanced research and contemporary car engineering together.

Likewise Donald L. Runkel, who has mainly been tinkering with advanced concept cars,

takes over systems engineering and engineering support, another effort to bringing advanced research to the market. Bridging the old and new guard is J. Michael Losh, now head of GM sales and marketing in North America.

Losh and William E. Hoglund both like to remember their days at Pontiac, which is the true mark of the old GM management club. The new guys like to forget their days at Pontiac.

Hoglund is the odd man out, the survivor who stepped aside, then moved up and now shares a board seat with the New York crowd. Now an executive vice president heading the corporate staffs and NAO support staffs, he's seen as a tenuous link to the retail network, a finance guy, and a lingering car guy.

Then there is Jack Smith, now running the whole show with the board scrutinizing his every move. Is this any way to run a car company? Time will tell, but it's obviously the end of locker-room management style at GM.

For example, consider prior to Labor Day, 2,300 members of the United Auto Workers in Lordsburg, Ohio, where the General Motors Corp. operates a complex of plants, walked off the job to protest the elimination of 240 tool-and-die-making jobs as the work was being shifted to an outside supplier.

Called an Apache raid, as the strike at a small plant is intended to cause larger problems that will steadily affect more and more operations, the raid put thousands of workers temporarily out of work and caused some slowdowns at locally-based suppliers.

"The downside of just-in-time supply is that one plug in the system will likely disrupt everything," said Michael Michniak, vice president of UAW Local 417 in Troy, which has 2,100 members. "That's why when there's a strike, a company like General Motors will try to settle quickly. They can't afford to be out of commission for days and days."

Because of these trends, the insurance industry has been changing rapidly, not only to meet the evolving needs of its customers, but also to meet the complex demands on its own balance sheets.

On another front, health insurance can also be a major problem.

"Most major companies are reporting that their psychiatric and substance abuse claim expenses are 15 to 20 percent of their total health costs, and that doesn't include potential litigation," said Richard Kunnes, CEO of U.S. Behavioral Health, a subsidiary of the Traveler's Corp., which has offices in Southfield.

While Kunnes said such rising health costs can be met through managed care specialty networks, if for instance a company isn't careful how it handles workers suspected of drug use, it could be liable for such acts as improper termination or a failure to keep the matter private.

Meanwhile, if property and casualty premiums do jump over the next few years, many companies may feel a sense of deja vu. In the early '80s, insurers slashed premiums to meet the needs of recession-strapped businesses, and to gain market share. But when losses mounted, insurers reversed course by negotiating higher prices and eliminating coverage on everything from day-care centers to county jails.

Bloomfield Hills; on 14 Mile, between Halstead and Haggerty, in Farmington Hills; and on Greenfield, north of 10 Mile in Southfield. Asked if the Branch 2000 concept would be expanded to other NBD sites, which total 150 in metro Detroit, Dietz said no plans were in the works.

"We want to evaluate what we do here first, and expand certain components to other branches next year."

She declined to reveal the cost of bringing the new branches up

to speed.

Not to be out done, Comerica Bank and Standard Federal Bank are also moving toward more personal service. Following its merger with Manufacturers National Bank earlier this year, Detroit-based Comerica announced in July it would spend more than \$5 million on renovations to 30 branches.

"Renovations will include expanding the number of drive-up and teller windows, adding more automated teller machines

(ATMs), increasing the amount of parking space available and providing easier access for handicapped customers," said Kathy Pitton, Comerica spokeswoman.

The bank also announced it would consolidate 55 branches over the next 18 months due to multiple locations in some neighborhoods. The merger makes Comerica the largest player in metro Detroit, with 191 locations.

For its part, Standard Federal Bank recently moved an existing branch to more spacious quarters in Garden City. The new site incorporates more ATMs, teller windows and parking spaces.

"We will continue to update branch sites as circumstances warrant, and for the industry as a whole, customers can expect to see more computerization, more personal service and more consolidation," said William Yaw, senior vice president and director of marketing for Standard Federal Bank in Troy.

"As ATM use continues to catch on with customers, it will allow us to use our employees as a better resource. Banking is becoming more and more complicated, and people are telling us they would like more help in getting the greatest return for their investments."

# Dog is all ears for hearing-impaired woman

It's been said that a man's best friend is his dog, but to Lauri Ponikiewicz, 29, her dog Winston is more than a best friend — he is her ears.

A hearing dog provided by Paws with a Cause, a United Way funded agency, Winston accompanies Ponikiewicz when she goes out, alerting her to people approaching from behind and noises she cannot hear.

Ponikiewicz's parents learned her hearing was impaired when

she was 2 years old. "She was probably born that way," said her mother Henrietta Ponikiewicz. "Years ago they didn't test babies" for hearing loss.

Her daughter has an 80 percent decibel loss in the right ear, and no hearing in the left ear. To communicate she reads lips.

By the time Ponikiewicz was 2½, she had her first hearing aid. At age three she was entered in a special school for hearing impaired children. She graduated from Redford Union School District in the hearing impaired pro-

gram at Ashcroft Center in Redford Township.

Graduation for Ponikiewicz and other hearing impaired students is an even greater milestone than for most students. Not only was she leaving the comfort zone of high school, she was entering the hearing world, something that would always be foreign to her.

She continued her education, earning an associate's degree from Macomb County Community College, and a bachelor of science in Engineering Technology in 1991 at Lawrence Technological University, Southfield. She is employed at General Motors.

Ponikiewicz learned about hearing dogs five years ago from deaf friends. She attended a deaf awareness display at Meadowbrook Mall last October, where she filled out an application with Paws with a Cause.

In May, she was teamed up with Winston, a golden retriever.

Her mother believes her daughter and Winston were destined to be a team. He was donated to Paws with a Cause and was originally trained to be a service dog for a wheelchair-bound person. But Winston wouldn't fetch.

So he was retrained as a hearing dog. The minute Ponikiewicz and her mother picked up Win-

ston, they both say he knew who he was to serve.

Winston has made a tremendous difference in the Ponikiewicz household. "I feel more independent, more safe," said Ponikiewicz. "I don't have to worry about break-ins, a night fire in the house because he'd hear the alarm. He hears my alarm clock and jumps on the bed and gets me up."

Her parents had even greater worries than most parents when their daughter went out. Now they are more at ease when she goes out. They know Winston will alert her if someone is approaching from behind, or if sirens are ringing, etc.

"A lot of people don't understand hearing impaired problems," said Ponikiewicz, who said living in the hearing impaired world can be very lonely and frustrating.

Winston has helped her make

the transition and feel more comfortable in a world she'll never experience fully.

Like a seeing eye dog or any working dog, Winston can accompany Ponikiewicz anywhere she goes. Although she doesn't take him to work because she feels it would be too hard for him to lay around for eight hours, she takes him everywhere else she goes.

She has been stopped a few times with her dog. But the orange scarf and collar, and tags Winston wears, clearly identifies him as a hearing dog. She hasn't had many problems taking Winston with her, but she carries a copy of the state law allowing these dogs in anywhere, just in case.

The only problem she has when out with Winston is people coming up and petting him. Working dogs are not supposed to be petted. For more information on Paws with a Cause, call 693-9789.





# Folk tale provides romantic description of autumn

Nature's intermission approaches, but during the last stanza before the curtain, a lone peeper pipes up to pronounce his passage to the spring season. Insects accompany the soloist amid a background of color

rivaling few natural phenomena. In the final moments before the curtain falls, the background is resplendent with color and seems to send us off with fond memories of what we saw and what we can expect next year. Residents of southeastern Michigan are fortunate to be able to enjoy the curtain call of fall. Some areas of the country do not have the change of seasons as we do. Though their day lengths change, causing trees to initiate

the process of preparing for winter, they may not have the correct types of trees, or their trees may be adapted to growing even during winter months.

Green colored chlorophyll dies and allows other colors to show up that had always been there. Or, warm days and cold nights cause sugars to form and produce the striking reds that catch our eye.

Though a biological approach

to the leaves changing color provides a little information to the mysteries of nature, sometimes the less scientific approaches to describing and explaining nature are just as enlightening.

Such as the Native American story that describes why the leaves turn color. It starts with a bear that was hunted by many braves for many years, but no hunter had been able to get close enough to shoot the bear. Until

one day, three hunters pursued the bear for such a long time that the bear went up into the sky to escape pursuit.

Well, the hunters were turned into birds so they could follow the bear, and eventually one hunter got close enough to shoot the bear with an arrow. When the arrow struck the bear blood flowed from the wound and dripped down to earth causing the leaves to turn red.

As the hunters prepared the meat by boiling it in a pot, fat from the meat overflowed from the kettle and fell to earth causing the leaves to turn yellow.

Though far from scientific, it is as romantic as the poets' metaphors of autumn.




## Livonia's symphony boosts young artists

How attuned are the Livonia Symphony Orchestra's Young Artist Competition judges? They offer an upbeat tempo if the quality of winners over the past 14 years is any indicator.

Past winners include such keynoters as Susan Synnesvedt, in the Chicago Symphony first violin section; Cynthia Phelps, Minnesota Symphony first chair violist; David Everson, in the Kansas City Philharmonic french horn section; Jeffrey Zook, Detroit Symphony piccoloist and flutist; Therese Fedea, a Chicago Lyric Opera Company singer; and Tomoko Mack-Brozowski and Howard Watkins, accomplished pianists who've performed overseas. Mack-Brozowski teaches piano at Schoolcraft College in Livonia.

Contestants come from diverse musical backgrounds: Oberlin, Grinnell, Curtis, Julliard, Cleveland Institute of Music, Peabody, Wayne State, MSU.

"Our competition gives me more pleasure generally than anything else we do — except perhaps for our new Saturday children's concerts," said LSO music director-conductor Francesco DiBlasi, a professional musician for 46 years.

Chairwoman Marcy Trudeau of Plymouth says the January competition "provides an opportunity not only to have professionals critique your work but also showcase your skills. It's a way to keep young musicians motivated and inspired."

Time and money have sapped many similar tests of nerves.

But the Livonia Symphony is committed to its version of this annual showcase of talented music students eyeing professional music careers. Last year, 38 vocalists and instrumentalists from three states came to Madonna University in Livonia.

"So few competitions are left for the really talented to get some experience and exposure," said DiBlasi, a Young Artist Competition judge. "It's essential we keep it going."

"It's not even a question of competing. The idea is to be able to get in front of people and get yourself straightened out mentally so you can play as well as you do in your own home."

### Michigan thrust

The competition is open to all Michigan instrumental, piano and vocal students who are younger than 25 and oriented toward a classical music career but who aren't generally considered seasoned soloists.

As they perform compositions from a symphonic program, contestants are graded on musicianship, technique and stature as a possible performing artist.

Vocalists typically sing two or three arias or a light classical score. Instrumentalists often play a movement of two of a concerto.

Winners will appear as LSO soloists during the season. Call the LSO hotline for a nominating application: 458-6575.

Prize money, \$1,000 to each top winner and \$500 to each runner-up in the instrumental and vocal categories, must be used for music study.

### Judge's perspective

When judging, DiBlasi looks for performers "with a finished style. Musicianship is of first importance but you must have good stage presence, too."

DiBlasi urges contestants to play in public before competing. "If you're performing at home, your mental edge might be real good. But you might lose that edge in public," he said.

"By performing under real conditions, you find out where your weaknesses are mentally and you're more comfortable working to overcome them."

One reason young people are more apt to be drawn to jazz or rock music is because of limited opportunities to hear symphonic sounds.

"Music just doesn't happen," DiBlasi said. "Whatever kind gets to young people first is probably what they're going to wind up later in life liking. So we as a symphony must do our part to educate young people about our music."

DiBlasi envisions school concerts where students are bused to the George Burns Center for the Performing Arts in Livonia.

"But you can't just play a concert," he said. "You have to have a narrator, or the conductor must talk and explain what's happening."


"You also have to dissect the orchestra — to have the first chairs play something on their instrument."

"And you can't just do big orchestra sounds. Do some chamber sounds so the kids can hear different instruments."

In short, toss out the formality, be creative and appeal to younger listeners during their most impressionable years, he seems to be saying.

That's as upbeat of a pitch I've heard for the Livonia Symphony Society and Livonia Public Schools to team up to pull off a regular "Symphony in the Schools" festival.

## Beijing painter captures Forbidden City mystery

The Lotus Gallery and Chinese American Educational and Cultural Center present a one-man exhibition of 30 contemporary Chinese paintings by Beijing artist Li Kai through Nov. 21.

Li Kai focuses on China's "Mysterious Forbidden City" in his first American solo show at the gallery, 207 E. Washington, Ann Arbor.

"He's an incredible painter, from stark realism to pointillism, a schooled artist out of Beijing doing oil paintings of the Forbidden City," said Les Werbel, gallery owner.

Li Kai's paintings bring to life a rare view of the Imperial Palace and grounds of the Forbidden City kept

under lock and key, hidden away for centuries from the outside world.

"Even the Chinese couldn't get in, only the Royal Family, servants, concubines, soldiers and whoever guarded them," said Pi-ping Savage, gallery assistant.

"Since Li Kai worked there, he saw the damaged door, the empty room, the history of the Chinese, the Ch'ing Dynasty till now. There's four or five



hundred years.

"He's our eyes to see the damaged door, inside the empty room, all the kids born there, all that died there. You feel the souls still there, even the concubines and servants. Once they entered, they never went out. You feel they're still there, but then the door is still there."

The palace was originally built in 1627 by the Ming dynasty, rebuilt in 1697 and restored in 1765 by the Ch'ing dynasty.

There is a story behind each of the paintings.

"I wanted to give them an opportunity to see what it was like, all the glories and all the victories. Everything was great, but behind there was a lot of sad. Through the damage, you can still see the beauty. I capture this moment. It's like an author, he write a story. I write a story with my painting. This way, people will remember," said Li Kai through interpreter Pi-ping.

Spanning a decade, Li Kai's paintings are at once rich and desolate, capturing a range of scenes and seasons, from the breathtaking beauty and magnificence of a more prosperous time to the modern day when nature grows over the abandoned, terraced streets.

Li Kai instills mystery and loneliness into the city once the home of emperors. Ivy now binds the doors of the palace gate. Tarnished by time, gold-gilded roofs barely reflect a glimmer of light in the noon sun. Stone lions sit silent for eternity.

The 1991 painting, "Shower over Deserted Palace" is reminiscent of Monet with broken blocks of color, impressionistic brush work and a warm palette filled with light. Van Gogh-like brush strokes color barren trees in the 1982 oil, "Old Scholartree," evoking solitude and a respect for time.

"I admire Seurat, Monet, Sisley, the three generations of Wy-

eth. There is a lot of influence from Seurat in 'Morning in Forbidden City,'" Li Kai said.

In the early 1960s, Li Kai studied at the middle school attached to the Central Academy of Fine Arts in Beijing. It was at this time that he first sketched the palace's grand architecture.

The cultural revolution interrupted his studies and life. Li Kai was sent to the wilderness, beyond the Great Wall, where he spent the next five years living by the Huli River.

When the revolution ended, Li Kai was permitted to return to his art studies. He graduated in 1967.

Afterwards, Li Kai lived in a one-story house at the foot of the high wall of the abandoned Imperial Palace. Here, he studied its massive architecture while learning to restore and mount ancient Chinese paintings and replicate classic forms.

"I gradually built a relationship with that environment. It's a part of my life now, all the history, all the stories behind it, making the place so interesting," Li Kai said.

"Slowly, I found out the buildings have a life. The buildings tell little stories. They tell me you have the responsibility to tell the story."

Over the last 10 years, Li Kai has exhibited in France, Australia, Japan, Singapore, Hong Kong, the Mexican Embassy in China and in a 1988 U.S. group show, "Chinese Modern Oil Painting Exhibition."

Li Kai's paintings reveal proficient examples of draughtsmanship and perspective. His attention to architectural detail in his works of realism lead the viewer to conjectures about the once golden opulence.

# It's not out-of-season to think gardens

I winterized my garden this week. For me, this annual chore has come to feel something like a ritual. There I am, on my knees, pulling up all my frost-bitten flowers and vegetables once again, cleaning out leftover weeds, sharing my thoughts one last time with the sleepy-eyed toad.

As I do this, I always reflect on gardens past, and I see myself in the future, working on what artist-writer SARK calls "impossible gardens." These gardens don't exist anywhere except inside my heart and head, of course.

But, for the gardener, there's nothing like the future.

If you've put your own garden to rest recently, and feel in need of an antidote for its absence, here are some literary pick-me-ups that will get you looking forward to next year's miracles today:

■ "Gardening With Friends," by George Schenk (218 pp., Houghton Mifflin, \$19.95). This is a gardening book with a difference, a gardener who marches to a different drum.

George Schenk, a former Seattle nursery owner, has no property of his own now but each year travels the world tending other people's gardens in exchange for companionship, meals and a roof over his head. These are his memoirs

as he journeys from the American and Canadian Pacific Northwest to the Philippines to exotic New Zealand. Most of his clients are personal friends, themselves non-gardeners.

Schenk is nothing if not candid. From the start, he frankly admits, "How intermingled are people and plants in the life of a gardener, or so I find it. I could not, if I tried, place one or the other first in my world."

Though that may sound rather strange, I found this to be one of the warmest, friendliest, most insightful journals I've come across in a long time.

■ "Invitation to the Garden: A Literary and Photographic Celebration," edited by Ferris Cook (239 pp., Stewart Tabori and Chang, \$45). For the holidays, give this book to a gardener you love. Or a book lover you love. Or just about anybody you love. (Or, by all means, put it on your own Wish List.) It's a little pricey but Christmas comes but once a year and this is an absolutely splendid creation, worth treasuring for always.

It's not just a large collection of pretty pictures of pretty flowers and plants. Every colorful photo has been shot by specialists in garden photography, and each garden image is accompanied and enhanced on the page opposite by a related literary work.

If you've never read Hawthorne's comments on squash in "The Old Manse," you simply haven't yet appreciated squash properly. And the same goes for onions if you don't know Pablo Neruda's "Ode to an Onion." Other stand-outs here include H.G. Wells' short story, "The Flowering of the Strange Orchid," Colette's "The Ways of Wistaria" and Alice's spirited exchange with the flowers in Lewis Carroll's "Through the Looking Glass."

Photos were shot in gardens throughout the world.

■ "C.Z. Guest's 5 Seasons of Gardening," by C.Z. Guest with photos by Elvin McDonald (176 pp., Bulfinch Press, \$29.95).

"I've always felt having a garden is like having a good and loyal friend," writes award-winning gardener Guest. "All the love and tender care you put into it will be returned."

Okay, so you don't own a great estate like Guest's Templeton in Old Westbury, Long Island. So you're a little shorter on acreage than she is. So you can't pay any professional gardeners to help you dig in the dirt. This delectable book is still bursting with great ideas you can adapt to your own lifestyle. Guest's contagious en-

thusiasm for "getting the job done" is delightfully motivating.

The fifth season of gardening, by the way, is the holiday season, a time of year when Guest fills her home with flowers from her own garden and greenhouses. The secret to it all, she contends, is in organization. "Ceezie" runs a tight ship.

Dazzling photos of Templeton and the gardens are all in color.

■ "One Man's Garden," by Henry Mitchell (262 pp., Houghton Mifflin, \$21.95). On the other side of the fence in regard to this highly organized, well-assisted gardening thing is Washington Post columnist Henry Mitchell. "Because we have no hired help, and because I am sloppy . . . the garden usually looks terrible . . ." he writes.

Maybe. Maybe not. (The book contains no photos.) But Mitchell's love for his "routine town garden" is obvious here. Even better, he has great fun with it, and great fun telling us about it on these pages.

"Like youth, horse manure goes all too quickly," he says, reflecting on a treasured gift some generous friend once gave him at Christmas. "Before you've got started good, it's gone and you wonder how it went so fast."

The same could be said for gardens.

As Agar loads the paint into a jar screwed underneath the airbrush, she warns visitors to prepare for the harsh sound of the air compressor's engine.

"This turquoise-teal I made myself. It's one of my favorite colors. It seems to be very popular," said Agar.

Over the loud chugging that emanates from the compressor, Agar's hissing airbrush emits a tornado-like line. "I haven't been doing contemporary," she said. "It's a new world I'm venturing into."

Agar is forever in search of new worlds. In the past, she has painted murals, signage and logos on offshore racing boats and hydroplanes as well as cars.

"I've done inside and outside murals and glass etchings all over Michigan," she said, "including R.J.'s Saloon in New Baltimore and the Rusty Nail on the east side of Detroit. People see my work and say, 'Who did that artwork?'"

Agar's latest abstract acrylic paintings use a palette of mauve, purple, turquoise and black accented with dashes of gold. Energy bursts from Agar onto the painting surfaces in these new works.

"Wild Lily" employs splash and drip techniques reminiscent of Jackson Pollock, one of the major artists in abstract expressionism, or New York school. In the

late 1940s, Pollock created large paintings inundated with illusions of movement by using splash, drip and later, pouring techniques. Action painting was the term coined for this method of laying down paint.

Against a neutral background, Agar splashes line to create a lyrical wild lily that flows over the upper edge of the painting.

In three of Agar's latest paintings, lines with stala-like qualities literally shoot off if the artwork creating an explosion of energy much like Pollock's. Another work incorporating jagged pieces from a broken mirror throws light and sharp cutting lines into a triptych.

"It's 'me,'" Agar said, referring to the triptych. "It consists of a whole bunch of me. I have a fascination with lights. My husband broke my mirror so I decided to recycle it into this piece."

Agar graduated from Stevenson High School in Livonia. It was there she first piqued her interest.

"I was noticed by the schools when I was very young for my artistic ability. I was noticed by scouts from Center for Creative Studies but couldn't afford the tuition so I decided to study art at Macomb Community College for three years instead."

Working in the art field in a wide range of media for the last 17 years, Agar has freelanced her artwork since age 16.

"Since I was little, I couldn't do one thing. I do every media. I keep adding dimensions to my works. I'm getting into neon next," Agar said.

Recycling plays a major role in Agar's artwork. "For me, it's finding objects to turn into art like the dryer lint and broken mirror. I've never used plastic yet, but I look for any kind of texture that fascinates me."

Agar builds up flowers in the diptych "Calla Lillies" with dryer lint to give the works three-dimensional appeal.

Also unusual for an artist is the fact she creates many diptychs and triptychs. "They're so versatile because you can take them and put them on a corner, or on different planes on the same wall."

When Agar begins an artwork, she pictures the rooms that they'll be in. "Most artists do their interpretation of what they like to do. I do what the customer wants me to do," Agar said. "If you want to make a living, you have to compromise. I compromise and do coloring that will sell."

An admirer of surrealism master Salvador Dali, Agar says, "To me, there's no such thing as can't. I have to challenge it. I have to conquer it. I want to do it all. I want to learn it all."

She is doing it all. Besides her artwork, Agar is mother to 6-month-old Peter and 2-year-old Adelia, a full-time job in itself.



# DIA will rechristen 2 upgraded Italian galleries

The Detroit Institute of Arts has reopened two of its world renowned Italian galleries, after a successful fund-raising effort led by metropolitan Detroit's Italian-American community in cooperation with the Consulate of Italy in Detroit.

Public programs related to the

opening of the newly renovated galleries include a lecture by British art historian and consultant Charles Avery 2 p.m. Sunday, Nov. 15. The lecture, "The Magnificent Medici: Patrons and Collectors of Art, 1400-1492," is sponsored by the Visiting Committee for European Sculpture

and Decorative Arts.

Henry Hawley of the Cleveland Museum of Art will discuss "Bugatti: Italian Pioneer of Modern Decorative Arts and Design" at 2 p.m. Sunday, Jan. 24. Both programs are free with museum admission. Recommended admis-

sion is \$4 for adults, \$1 for children, free for members.

Attainment of the \$100,000 funding goal has enabled the restoration of the DIA's grand Gothic Hall and the adjacent early medieval gallery. Much of the museum's Italian sculpture collection, considered among the best in the western hemisphere, is housed in these two galleries.

Among many noteworthy objects are marble sculptures by Nino Pisano, Giovanni di Baldaccio and Tino di Camaino. The collection also features a 14th century marble tomb effigy of a knight and an actual 16th-century Gothic chapel made of limestone and originally part of a French chateau.

A particular highlight of the collection is the recent acquisi-

tion of a rare early Renaissance sculpture by Bartolomeo Bellano, protege of the great 15th century sculptor Donatello. The bronze "Head of a Youth" was produced in the humanist center of Padua around 1460, the decade of Columbus' birth.

"Its acquisition represents a fitting tribute to the Italian-American community's efforts as well as an impressive addition to the museum's Italian collection," said Alan Darr, project director and curator of European sculpture and decorative arts.

Renovation of the two galleries, the first in 45 years, included cleaning, painting, installing new lighting, and the design and fabrication of new pedestals, platforms and didactic labels for the works of art.

In addition, a portion of the money raised will be used to support new educational programs for adults and children focusing on art at the DIA in the age of Columbus.

Giuseppe Mistretta, Consul of Italy in Detroit, described the fund-raising project as "likely the first opportunity for the whole Italian community to act as one entity for the benefit of a major cultural institution."

Individuals from metro Detroit's Italian-American community collaborated with such corporate contributors as PNA Services (a company of the Pininfarina Group), Fiat Motors, Jacobson Stores Inc., Alitalia, Comau and Tek-Sid to make the project possible.

Prices rising; sales mixed in real estate markets

The real estate market continues to perform well here in some submarkets in terms of units sold and selling prices, according to figures compiled by realty boards and multiple listing services. The number of houses and condominiums sold through the first nine months of this year jumped by 8 percent in the jurisdiction of the Rochester Board of Realtors and 4 percent in the area covered by the Western Wayne Oakland County Association of Realtors. But home sales declined by 11 1/2 percent in the area served by the South Oakland County Board of Realtors. Selling prices increased in all

three of those submarkets. "Consumer confidence really has been a problem. Interest rates have offset that," said Mary Moore, president of the Rochester Board of Realtors. "The whole Rochester area has a quality of life that is still very desirable for a lot of people," she added. "There's still some rural areas available. What we're seeing is a lot of local upgrading. People choose a newer, larger home and still stay in the same community." Through September of this year, 2,052 houses and condos had sold compared to 1,893 through the first nine months of 1991 in the Rochester jurisdiction. The average sales price this year is

\$141,402 compared to \$135,358 last. Some 245 units sold this September at an average price of \$143,450 compared to nearly 200 during September 1991 at an average price of \$135,500. The Rochester Board primarily serves Rochester, Rochester Hills, Oakland Township and Armada.

Ruth Clevers, president of the Western Wayne Oakland County Association of Realtors, expects that her local market will remain strong through the rest of the year due to favorable borrowing costs. "Mortgage interest rates are near a 20-year low, there is plenty of financing available and a good assortment of housing in all price ranges and in most preferred locations," Clevers said. "The rise in price remains close to the level of inflation." A total of 11,234 units was sold through September at a median (half above, half below) price of \$88,000 in the area serviced by the Western Wayne Oakland County board. Comparable figures for last year were 10,752 sales at a median

price of \$84,000. For September, 1,209 units sold this year at a median price of \$87,950 compared to 1,090 last year at a median price of \$83,950. Prices continued to rise in territory covered by the South Oakland County Board of Realtors even though number of houses sold declined significantly. "Other than first-time buyers... I think, are buying the majority of houses," said Gil Holliday, board president. "I don't think there's reason to be concerned. The market is still active. "I appreciate it more," Holliday added. "We have to use our expertise more in marketing. Houses aren't selling as quickly. More often than not, it's taking 60, 90,

closer to 120 days to sell. There's no real reason why they're not selling." The South Oakland board reported sales of 3,823 units at a median price of \$81,250 through the first nine months of this year compared to 4,320 units at a median price of \$80,000 last year. For September only, 422 units sold in its jurisdiction at a median price of \$83,000 compared to 481 in September of 1991 at \$79,800. South Oakland covers Troy, Southfield, Lathrup Village, Franklin and Beverly Hills. The Birmingham-Bloomfield Board of Realtors, citing computer problems, was unable to reveal sales figures.

Failure to update bylaws points to potential difficulties

**CONDO QUERIES**

Our condominium is approximately 19 years old, and we have never amended the condominium bylaws. The documents provide that we are to have association bylaws, but we never got them from the

developer. Our articles of incorporation, we are told, are out of date, but I am having a problem getting the board to understand the need to amend the documents. Can you give me any suggestions? Not amending your articles of incorporation to take advantage of changes in the corporate law to insulate directors from potential liability may be akin to legal suicide. Having an outdated set of documents is like having an out-

dated will, the consequences being unpredictable and potentially disastrous. To the extent that associations do not have condominium documents, it prohibits the ability of the board of that association to implement and enforce reasonable restrictions, rules and regulations, including the collection of assessments. To the extent that the board is inhibited in these activities, the value of the condominium units

may well decline proportionately. Therefore, it is incumbent upon the board to proceed to update the condominium documents as soon as possible. We are doing a parking lot condominium near a football stadium. Are you aware of any instances where this has been successful? There are parking lot condominiums throughout the country, particularly on college campuses.

They can be successful if properly designed with the appropriate documentation. As is the case with any other condominium, the successful operation of the condominium depends upon proper management, an enlightened board of directors, and the willingness on the part of the board to spend necessary funds to insure that the condominium is run properly. Boat slips and parking lot condominiums can be a desirable investment in recreational areas.

## Rossetti brings home architects' gold

■ The ballots have been counted, and a jury of architects has singled out a Birmingham firm for honors because of its accomplishments over the last 10 years.

Rossetti Associates Architects of Birmingham was honored last week by the American Institute of Architects at the first Design and Construction Expo 92.

The AIA presented its prestigious Architecture Firm Award Friday at the Hyatt Regency Dearborn. A celebration of design talent within the profession, the festivities closed out the first expo where AIA Michigan, the American Society of Interior Designers and other related groups join together as design professionals representing the built environment.

"It's a great honor for us," said Matthew Rossetti, firm associate and son of company founder Louis (Gino) Rossetti. Matthew's grandfather, the

Also on the boards is a national tennis center in Flushing Meadows, New York. Due for completion in 1994, it will host the largest tennis events in the world.







# 'Distressed' properties glut market

■ 'There's probably no way to achieve the rentals we saw in the 1980s.'

Maybe it's in a bad location. Maybe it's a bad mix of tenants. Maybe it's bad advertising. Heck, maybe it's just the wrong color of brick. But when the economy is in the doldrums and commercial real estate vacancies are way up, property managers face the situation of trying to lease distressed properties.

Tom Garrity, president of Garrity & Associates Inc. in Livonia defined distressed properties as commercial strip centers and office buildings that have been returned to the bank in foreclosure or properties that are dangerously close to slipping into foreclosure.

"That includes a lot of property today. Property management of distressed properties is coming up with an ingenious ways to keep all the plates spinning," he said.

Properties become distressed for a number of reasons, Garrity said. Lack of tenants is the most obvious, he said, but sometimes that's merely a symptom of the real problem.

Building problems, location and the types of tenants can go a long way to explaining distressed properties, he said.

Garrity said turning a property around requires a hands-on approach. "All of the leasing space signs in the world aren't going to help."

Rule number one in turning a distressed property? "You have to be very cost conscious."

Building maintenance must be performed and mortgage payments made (if the property has not already been foreclosed on). "There's

no room for waste." James C. Straith, executive vice president at Schenck/Straith Group in Bloomfield Hills, said distressed properties are becoming the norm. That (turning around distressed properties) is primarily what we're doing these days." The huge number of distressed office and retail space is a result of the overbuilding of the 1980s, he said. "Properties built in the 1980s are all competing against each other for fewer tenants."

The problem was exacerbated by the recession, he explained. Too much space is bad enough, but with companies cutting employees there's even less demand for space.

A third factor is the way office and retail construction was financed in the 1980s. Many of these buildings were built with the understanding that future leasing would be used to pay off the building loans.

With shrinking demand and increased competition, the leases in many buildings aren't enough to cover the debt. "There's probably no way to achieve the rentals we saw in the 1980s."

Straith said what the property manager does with a particular building depends largely on the property. Property that has been foreclosed on is more appealing from the property manager's point of view because there is less threat of debt hanging over his head. "There is no debt; increasing the income becomes the goal."

A bank or lending institution also has more money available to get a property back up to snuff than a mortgage holder who has a payment to make.

Which isn't to say a foreclosed property is an easy turn-around, he said. "Very often, the property (maintenance) was neglected."

After a property is brought up to snuff, Straith said the property manager has to aggressively market the property — that often means reduced lease costs.

"Anything to get the occupancy up," he said. "If you've got a building half to three-quarters





empty it gets a bad reputation." Continued service and checking up on the new tenants is also critical because in a down market — and in a distressed property — one can ill afford bad news.

"Long before the that lease is due, we are making contacts to find out how he's doing," he said.

Managers of distressed property are more likely to assist tenants who get into trouble — sometimes even rewriting leases.

"A paying tenant at a reduced rate is preferable to no tenant at all."

Johnathan D. Brateman of Johnathan D. Brateman Properties in Novi said the key to turning distressed properties is realizing that a building evolves just as a community evolves.

"The watchword in real estate is to find the highest and best use of property — but that use may change," he said.

"What might have been a good place for a children's clothing store 10 years ago may not be the right use today," he said.

The task facing the property manager is to discover what the new need is, he said. "You may not get the Fortune 500 company in your office — you may not want it."

"You have to adapt your ideas of what use is," he said. "I have a school in one of my buildings and they're a terrific tenant," he said, add-

ing that conventional wisdom would have suggested looking for the traditional office tenant.

Brateman said it's even sometimes necessary to mothball a building, meaning leave it empty or nearly empty and not attempt to fill it with new tenants. "You may need to mothball it with a tenant in it."

While mothballing a building runs against the philosophy that any tenant is better than no tenant, Brateman said that just isn't always the case. "Many landlords are reluctant to enter into that kind of relationship."

The 'any-tenant' philosophy leads to extremely low lease rates, he said. That can lead to situations where income is so low that not only is it impossible to make mortgage payments, but income fails to cover expenses.

"Some distressed properties are not workable," he said.

Garrity of Garrity Associates said often the solution to a distressed property is tenant mix.

Competing services in the same complex — or even in nearby complexes — is unhealthy, he explained. The property manager must be willing to say no to a potential tenant who is not in the best interest in of the property.

But related-services should be cultivated and, if necessary, sought out. A manager of a distressed property should not be averse to actively seeking out tenants, he said.

### How to ready preschoolers for the big 'K'

It is a necessity that every parent with young children enrolled in a preschool program be an educated astute consumer. As an effective parent, you have a responsibility to know what it is your child is being taught.

By involving yourself in the day-to-day operation, support and learning process, you, as the parent, will develop a working knowledge of exactly how you may become a resource to your child first, as well as the overall program, director and staff.

A quality preschool program provides a strong foundation for which your child will build skills necessary to enter kindergarten and be successful. Parent coalitions or groups working with early childhood educators is one proven measure that leads to well balanced preschool programs being developed and implemented.

There are numerous exciting opportunities awaiting the interested and energetic parent.

Ready? . . . Set? . . . Grow.

Parents, here are just a few suggestions to help prepare your child, as well as educate yourself early, on kindergarten readiness.

- (1) Visit the school and kindergarten classroom your preschooler will attend.
- (2) Ask the teacher for tips you as a parent can use to help your child's transition be one of ease.
- (3) Talk to your child about how he or she may feel about starting school or about riding the bus. Usually, if a bus ride is involved this makes it even more exciting.
- (4) Find out about joining the Parent-Teacher Association.

There are skills and knowledge a child needs in order to begin kindergarten. Involved parents can be instrumental in this process as well as the early childhood educator and the preschooler themselves.

**Size** — Does the child understand big and little, long and short? Can he or she match shapes or objects based on size?

**Numbers** — Can the child count orally through 10 and count objects in one-to-one correspondence. Does he or she understand empty and full, more and less?

**Position and Direction** — Does the child understand up and down and front and back?

**Time** — Does the child understand day and night? Does he or she know his or her age and birthday?

**Colors and Shapes** — Recognizes and names primary colors; matches shapes or objects based on shapes.

**Reading Readiness** — Knows what a letter is; Looks at books or magazines; has own books; has been read to frequently; looks at pictures and can tell a story.

**Motor Skills** — Does the child build with blocks? Is he or she able to alternate feet walking downstairs, complete simple puzzles, control pencil and crayon and handles scissors well?

**Social and Emotional Development** — Can the child be away from parents for two-three hours without being upset? Does he or she know his or her parents' names, his or her telephone number and home address? Does he or she play with other children?



I have a determined opinion that the fair damsels of duplicate play this game immeasurably better than we men give them credit for. They are far more tolerant of us than we are of them and their partnership behavior is especially commendable. True, there are few with the brilliance of Dorothy Hayden Truscott, Mary Jane Farrell, Jacqui Mitchell, Emma Jean Hawes and a handful or so more, but on average our good women players make superb partners and have the aptitude and desire to win and do so consistently.

Two of the best hands I've seen played in a long time were by women, and nothing the men have shown me recently can match that. The first was Audrey Melander's four-spade contract that Ira Rubin classed as one of the best he had ever seen, and today's presentation which required an exceptional bit of wizardry.

Classic hands are fun to commemorate, but the declarer who successfully solves such devilish pastboard problems is the genuine celebrity. Today's hand by Joyce Krout of Southfield, who many consider to be 'the first lady' of our suburban duplicate game, is a masterpiece. For years, she has been directing the many weekly games at the Southfield Civic Center, and that alone is demanding. Add to that her current presidency of the Southeastern Michigan Bridge Association. Yet she still finds time to show dogs all over the world with her wonderful husband.

Last winter I had the pleasure of teaming with her in one of our sectional pair games, and if I had matched her aptitude, we would have finished in the money. Today's exhibition is from that contest. You can see I was the heathen, placing her in a most uncertain contract. Moysen fits are certainly not the easiest everyday fare. Witness with wonder her marvelous artistry on this one.

assume that I had raised hearts with four.

When the dummy came into play, she didn't show a smidgeon of pique, even though I knew there was a modicum of chagrin. Immediately Joyce recognized that trumps had to behave or the contract was in jeopardy. She won the diamond in her hand and played a small heart to the ten, knowing full well that a diamond ruff would follow east's assumed trick two win. At trick four, east got out with a small spade won in dummy. Now a heart to her queen and a club toward dummy, winning east queen with the ace. At trick 7, she made the exceptionally fine play of the club jack, smothering east's ten, and won by west's king. At trick eight, west played his spade king, and dummy's trump ace won. At trick nine, dummy's good club nine ruffed by east and over ruffed by Joyce. She then played her last trump and won the last three high diamonds in dummy.

Not only was this a marvelous example of declarer execution, her effort won an absolute top. Those in game went down in 3 no trump and five diamonds, but most never got above the 3 or 4 diamond level.

# He puts his faith to work for God

Wayne Vann is a man of strong faith. He trusts in the Lord that he will provide for him and his family and the Lord has not left him wanting.

The Livonia resident is doing Brotherhood work for the Southern Baptist church in Michigan. He helps churches involve men and boys in missions work throughout the state and country. He receives no pay; his financial support comes through donations and monthly pledges.

"It's still scary, but my faith continues to grow," said Vann of the two years he has been doing the work. "I see God working in some unique ways to help meet our financial needs."

At one time, he worked for the National Federation of Independent Businesses, the largest small business organization in the United States. He was a successful marketing representative, winning the company's highest award for the highest sales.

He got involved in the Baptist Church 15 years ago and was approached to serve as the Brotherhood director. He didn't know what that was so the minister got him a book to read. He read the book and went on to organize Brotherhood groups at three churches. Five years ago, he was approached to be the Detroit area director and worked with 41 churches.

But two years ago, he felt there was a need for someone to do the job at the state level. The church agreed, but there were no openings for such a position.

**'Home work'**

Vann decided to put his faith to work for God. He left his job, went to Atlanta, Ga., for orientation for home missionary work and came back as a mission service corps volunteer. He also came back to the proposition of raising 100 percent of his financial support.

"I developed a theme when I went into it," Vann said. "Let the men of the church reach out because you can be assured that if the men reach out, the rest of the church will follow."

When Vann married his wife Pam 12½ years ago, he shared with her his feelings that he someday would be in a ministry, probably a Brotherhood ministry. When he decided to follow that dream, Pam was "a little hesitant; her faith wasn't as strong as mine."

"The first Christmas, men we didn't know showed up with a fruit basket and an envelope with \$500 in it," Vann said. "My wife's response was 'God's really going to meet our needs.'"

And Vann admits it hasn't been easy. He's able to raise \$460 a month in committed support, not nearly enough to cover the family's \$600 a month mortgage payment. Other money has come from honorariums and love offerings when he has served as a support minister, filling in for vacationing pastors even though he has had no formal ministerial training.

He has also organized a century club, asking 100 men to give \$100 a year to support his ministry. That has generated \$4,200 for the Vanns.

**God's unique ways**

Then there are God's unique

ways. One night 14 mission workers from Tennessee showed up on his doorstep at 1 a.m. to deliver an envelope containing \$691, traveling money not used during their stay in the Detroit area. Then there was a \$300 donation from the Royal Ambassadors Boys Camp in Alabama.

"God meets our needs but it's been a humbling experience," Vann said. "Here is a man who was a success as a salesman on straight commission found standing in food lines. The first 1½ years, St. Vincent de Paul provided us with food. Only five-six months ago, we stopped going to the Rice Bowl."

Now, Vann works with 300 churches, organizing mission work. His latest work was coordinating relief efforts for the victims of Hurricane Albert. Vann coordinated contributions from 30 drop-off points in the state and organized relief teams that went to Florida to help serve meals to the homeless.

Vann himself made several trips to Florida. He worked with relief teams that provided 8,000 meals to the storm's victims and with another team that put a new roof on a damaged Baptist church.

**Growing ministry**

And his ministry continues to grow. Six months ago, he was invited to preach at an independent fundamentalist Baptist Church in Van Buren Township by the pastor of the Palmer Road Baptist Church in Westland, Jim Severance.

The church had only two families and the pastor had resigned. Vann used the visit to talk to the members about becoming Southern Baptists. One family felt God was leading them in another direction, the other had wanted to join the Southern Baptist church for years.

The end result was that the members gave Vann the deed to the church, the \$1,600 in the bank account and the mission to organize a Southern Baptist church. The church had been there for 111 years, but Vann took it back to a mission status, sponsored by the Palmer Road Church.

Each month attendance has increased. In September, 17 people attended the service, and by doing things like an Apple Cider Music Fest, Vann has drawn attention to and interest in the church.

He calls it a Brotherhood project so men from other churches can get involved. And they

have, hauling in 25 tons of gravel to do the parking lot and helped clean up the church property. Volunteers from Tennessee also showed up to help paint the church.

Vann operates out of a bedroom in his home. With the help of a donated computer and his wife Pam, he is able to produce a newsletter that he mails to 700 people. At one time, Pam watched children in their home to help with finances. But now that her young charges are in school full-time, she is helping her husband with his work.

Through his efforts, Vann has increased Brotherhood membership from 1,200 to 2,000 men with more than 30 chapters.

"I believe men want to be challenged today," Vann said. "The days of meeting, eating and burping is over. It's time to get into mission work, it's time to get involved."

And Vann hopes that some of that involvement is helping him continue his work as state Brotherhood coordinator. Donations can be sent to Vann at 9854 E. Clements Circle, Livonia 48150. ## Giving — with no strings attached

A custodian in an inner city church modeled a valuable lesson on the high moral behavior of generosity.

I was involved in an afterschool tutoring program with my good friend, the Rev. Sandra Edwards. She was the pastor of a struggling congregation in West Detroit and director of the mission center there. One Wednesday afternoon, as the kids settled themselves around the table, I noticed the custodian (let's call him Andrew) peer into the classroom. He stuck his cigar into his mouth, took a long puff, squinted one eye and surveyed the situation in one overall glance. Suddenly he disappeared.

In about 10 minutes he returned with an arm full of snacks and refreshments. He bought them from the corner store. He didn't say anything, just walked in and put the sack on the table, chomped on his stogie and sorta

smiled at Sandra. He asked if we wanted coffee. Then he left, leaving tutors and children to enjoy the treats he provided.

Giving with no strings attached. Giving just because it's needed. Giving with no hidden agendas. Giving that even involves some sacrifice (What do you suppose a custodian earns in an inner-city church?). Yet giving with no big deal in mind.

But Andrew released a great deal in my own mind. How often have we been conditioned to give in exchange for something? For public recognition? For job enhancement? As an investment? For good "business" reasons? Out of guilt or an uneasy sense of obligation?

How often do we give just for the act of giving, for the fun of it, like Andrew did? His example set in motion all kinds of positive energies. Because he gave in such an enthusiastic, selfless way, I was reminded that these kids and their well-being were of utmost importance.

They deserve a safe place to be. They should have a supportive,

caring environment, and a place that would nurture the best in them. It needs teamwork from a lot of caring adults.

And each contribution is significant because it says to the children, "You're important. I want to invest myself in you and with you. Together we can help make this a better place for all of us to live and grow."

Andrew's caring, selfless act became a catalyst for others to build bridges of care and hope.

There's something that is positively contagious when people give with no strings attached! Generosity is a positive corrective to a culture infested with dehumanizing greed.

Many people in the inner city of Detroit can teach a lot about the art of selfless giving. There's a church officer at this same location who has chosen to forego her own education in business administration for this semester. Why? So that she can devote her full attention to this struggling church and community center that must keep its doors open — for the kids in the neighborhood and for the community around it.

Giving — with no strings attached. Giving — because she sees the needs and freely offers her own resources. Giving — knowing the cost, yet willing to postpone her own agenda in order to serve God who calls forth hope and beauty and love and joy and strength and nobility from everyday people in everyday situations.

Mother Theresa of Calcutta once said, "No person alone can do great things. But every person can do small things with great love."

There's much to learn from many of our brothers and sisters in Detroit about the art of building a beloved community here in our midst. They have a positive spirit of Detroit that we can discover and celebrate as we build bridges between our urban and suburban settings.
