Interest in city race outpaces Proposal A

By one indicator, Plymouth voter interest in the June 2 proposal to hike the sales tax to 6 percent and cut property taxes is lukewarm.

But at least among potential candidates, there's interest in the November city commission election.

On Friday, government clerks in the city and township said there hadn't been many people coming in to register for the June election.

The deadline for registering is 5 p.m. today.

"We haven't had a lot of people coming in to get registered for that; that's not to say that (they) won't come Monday (today)," said township clerk Marilyn Massengill.

"Nobody has said anything about it one way or another," said city clerk Linda Langmesser.

As of noon Friday, five candidates had taken out petitions to run for the city commission — and only one of

them currently holds a seat on the commission.

Taking out petitions so far were:

■ Stella Greene, appointed to the city commission in October by Mayor Robert Jones to fill the unexpired term of former commissioner Jerry Vorva, now a state representative.

■ Planning commissioner Tom Prose, who has taken out and returned sufficient petition signatures to appear on the ballot.

■ Michael Caffery, a former Demo-

cratic candidate for the Wayne County Commission.

■ Rosita Smith, who nearly won election to the city commission in 1991. "As a member of the planning commission and the parking study committee I have become increasingly aware of the many important issues confronting the city," Smith said in announcing her candidacy Thursday.

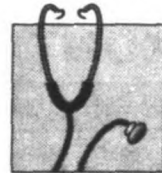

Protest draws crowd

■ About 600 protestors showed up at Unisys in Plymouth Township on Thursday to draw attention to the loss of retirees' medical benefits.

The announced cutoff of Unisys retirees' health benefits drew more than 600 Thursday to the firm's Plymouth Township facility.

Lined along Plymouth Road, the retirees picketed the company and lamented the loss of benefits once promised them by their former employer.

"You give them your whole life and they kick you in the teeth," said Sarah McKenna of Northville. She retired from Unisys in 1987 after 34 years with the company.

She was among scores of age 60-plus retirees, many carrying green and white picket signs reading, "A broken promise — a broken commitment."

"I put in 30-some years — In three more years I don't get no insurance," said Dee Wajda of Westland.

The company in November announced it would phase out post-retirement medical costs over a three-year period beginning this year and ending in 1996. "Without these actions, the long-term viability of the company would be in doubt and put more than 50,000 employees at risk," according to a statement Thursday from the Unisys Corp.

The retirees' protest coincided with the corporation's annual shareholders meeting Thursday at corporate headquarters in Pennsylvania.

Unisys chairman and chief executive officer James Unruh told shareholders Thursday, "This was the most difficult decision I had to make in my business career."

Township OKs sewer, water rate increases

Plymouth Township trustees on Tuesday approved two water and sewer issues.

Trustees gave the go-ahead to a \$116,719 sewer repair project and voted to pass on water and sewer rate increases levied by the city of Detroit, which provides water and sewer services.

Township Supervisor Kathleen Keen-McCarthy said the sewer repair project was sparked by an order from

the state department of natural resources.

A private contractor hired by the township will repair sewer sections where it's been determined that overflows of storm water can get into the township sewer system.

The state DNR is seeking to limit the intermingling of storm runoff and sewer water, to help clean up the Rouge River. The money to pay for the project "will come out of the water

and sewer capital improvement fund," McCarthy said, adding the township is seeking a federal grant to pay for more than half of the project cost.

The repairs are scheduled to take place this summer.

Meanwhile, residents should see a 13-percent increase in water charges and a 24.7-percent increase in sewer charges, sparked by the city of Detroit rate increases.

The township decided to pass on those rate increases to local residents after two water rate increases by the city of Detroit and sewer rate increases from Wayne County.

The city of Detroit raised water rates 9.8 percent in July, but the township did not then pass on the rate increase to township residents.

"We're anticipating at least some increase (from Detroit) in July this year," said finance director Rosemary Harvey earlier this month.

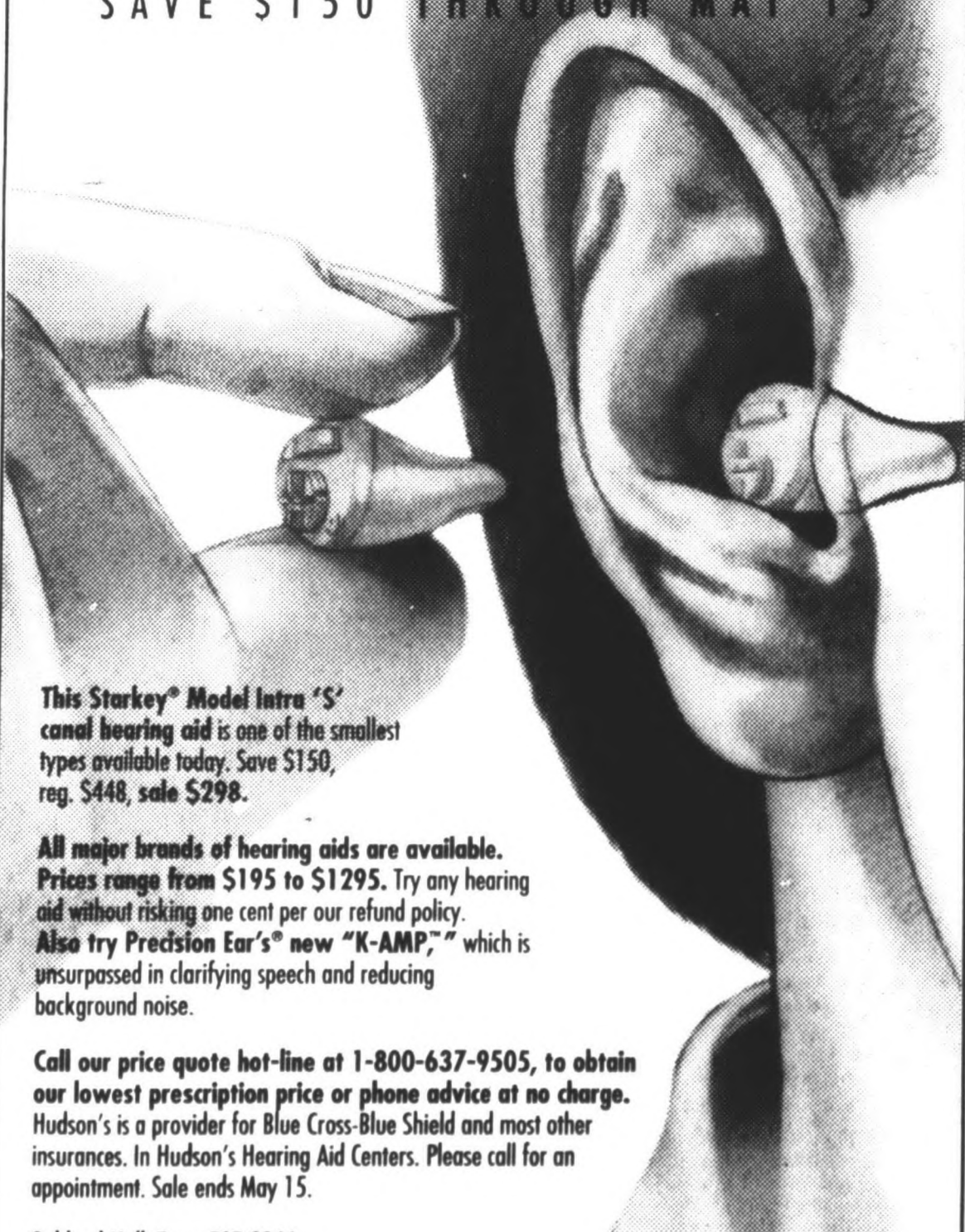

Kids turn on to the idea of turning off TV

Last week, students and staff at Fiegel Elementary went "cold turkey," agreeing not to watch TV for the entire week as part of the "Great TV Turn-Off." Part of the bargain was to give up watching programs on VCRs and playing games, Nintendo included.

The idea was Colleen Brown's, a Fiegel Elementary School PTO board member whose daughter Jonelle is a second grader at Fiegel.

Brown said she was inspired by the book "Unplugging the Plug-in Drug," given to her by her brother, a teacher in Royal Oak.

"I read the book and thought, 'This was something our school could do and the PTO could sponsor,'" she said. Brown presented the idea to the PTO president, Fiegel's principal, the librarian, and teachers, all of whom liked it. Almost 700 people, including staff and students' families, agreed to take part.

During the no-TV period, participants who signed a contract agreeing not to turn on the tube wore "No TV" buttons. They also kept a diary of the changes in their lives that occurred as a result of not watching TV. Families who survived the whole week without watching TV were entered in a drawing for a real cold turkey.

A "pizza and game night" was held at the school Friday evening as a way to reward students for their feat.

Brown said results were noticeable right away. "We've noticed there's less antagonistic play, fighting and bickering," she said. "This wasn't meant as an attack on TV. There is a lot of good TV, but there's also a lot of needless TV. I believe TV should be supervised. Programs that are perfectly fine for high school students or junior high aren't always understood completely by younger kids."

A group of Fiegel students got together Thursday to discuss TV withdrawal.

Bill Johnston, 8, of Canton, usually watches TV three to four hours a day. "It was really hard at first because I hardly had anything to do. But I'm not missing it as much as I thought I was going to," he said. "Mostly, I'm playing soccer and baseball with my friends."

Kristen Dillenbeck, 10, of Canton, said it was hard to give up "Full House" and "Hey Dude." But she managed last week without them.

"I studied more for tests and learned more about myself by

playing piano and drawing," she said.

Sreelatha Ponnaluri, 8, of Canton, loves watching cartoons and the Disney Channel. But going cold turkey for her was "kind of easy," she said. "I've been playing with my sister and reading a lot of books. I enjoy it a lot."

Laura Kelm is a fourth grader from Canton. She said cutting TV out of her life has definitely brought some changes. "I'm riding my new bike and playing games with my friends. Now I'm doing my homework," she added.

"I didn't used to do it."

Sarah Wilkewitz, 9, of Canton said, "If you don't watch that much TV, you can have more time to do other things like studying for certain tests and reading. It isn't boring."

Robert Carron, 10, of Canton, said he's using more energy now that he's not watching TV. "You can use up energy playing baseball. You use up energy you don't use watching TV."

Jessie Wojciak, 8, of Canton, said she's begun playing baseball with her parents. "I'm reading a

lot more to my parents and to my friends. I'm reading Dr. Seuss to my brother, because he likes it a lot."

Vicki Morrison, 8, of Canton, said her mom and dad spent time during the week helping her with her space project. Kristen Fazio, 6, of Canton, said she's writing letters to her aunts and uncles. "My parents are spending a lot of time with me and my brother. They're sitting down and cuddling with each other more, and on Mondays and Fridays we're

going to the chiropractor," she said.

Robert said said his parents are taking him to the park and "we're going fishing a lot more."

Stephanie Tople, 7, said her family is playing more games and "ordering subs from Gino's. Gino's has the best pizza and subs," she said.

Whitetail goes to school, but class not in session

We've all heard about the lamb who followed Mary to school one day, but an especially motivated four-legged creature in Canton can top that.

A white-tailed deer made its way into Carvel Bentley Elementary, a new school on Sheldon Road near Proctor that isn't even finished yet.

Superintendent John Hoben reported at last week's board meeting that sometime the weekend of April 16, a deer jumped into the school through a window. "If someone cared to look around,

they'd probably find some venison not too far away," Hoben said.

A construction worker named Jim Schultz was making a routine inspection of the construction site April 17 when he noticed a broken exterior window. When he entered the room, he realized a deer had jumped in, and was so startled it jumped through a second window to get out, breaking glass and damaging the window frame.

"He was just as anxious to get out as he was to get in," said Hoben.

Schultz found blood stains, feces and urine left by the deer. He estimated damage at about \$1,000.

Mike Schlenke, project manager for Barton-Malow, which is building the school, informed the district about the incident. Barton-Malow's insurance will cover the damage.

Hoben said he went down to the school to take a look. "They cleaned up very well. Things look to be in pretty good shape."

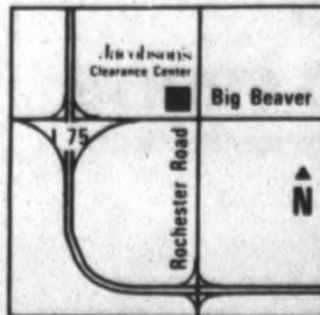

David McDonald, an Army colonel who said he's "not too satisfied with where Plymouth's going."

Richard Arlen, a Plymouth/Canton schools board member from 1976-80 and a professor of accounting at Schoolcraft College. "The spending is too free; it needs to be tightened up."

The open spots are three four-year terms and one two-year term, which goes to the fourth-highest vote-getter.

Mayor pro tem Doug Miller, who is serving that two-year commission term, has said he's undecided about running.

Other commission seats up for grabs in November are held by commissioners John Vos III, Greene and James Jabara.

Vos, who finishes his first four-year term on the commission in November, has said he's considering running for re-election.

Jabara, by the city charter, is ineligible to run, having served nearly two consecutive terms.

"My guiding principle was the need for Unisys to be able in the future to benefit all interested parties, including shareholders, employees and retirees. A balancing of interests was required," he said.

Unruh told shareholders that if the company was to continue paying post-retirement medical benefits as it does now, "we would have had a continuing annual expense approaching \$100 million," adding that costs continue to rise.

As the number of retirees congregating near the plant grew, by 11:30 a.m. Plymouth Township police closed off Plymouth Road from the district court house to Haggerty Road.

Two UAW locals represent unionized employees at the plant, but some retired managers were among the protesters. "We were salary, but we're all together here," said John Button of Livonia.

Some current Unisys workers on their lunch hour joined the picketers. "Some of us younger employees are worried," said one woman in a blue computer-lab coat, who declined to give her

name. "You have to support the UAW," she said.

Addressing the gathering over a loudspeaker system mounted atop a van were some union officials, employees, and Wayne

County Sheriff Robert Ficano, all in support of workers.

One Unisys employee could be spotted on top of the plant filming the demonstration while some

watched the gathering from windows.

The company and retired workers are in court over the announced cut off of medical benefits.

CHONDROCALCINOSIS-WHAT SALT AND PEPPER MEANS

You may have aching knees, but examination reveals little information. Your physician orders x-rays; what can he expect to find not present on physical evaluation?

One discovery is chondrocalcinosis. Chondro means cartilage, and calcinosis refers to the laying down of calcium. The term states that particles of calcium are present in knee cartilage.

The salt and pepper mentioned above describe the appearance on x-ray of the knee in chondrocalcinosis. The white calcium is like salt and the dark areas, which is how cartilage looks on x-rays, remind one of pepper.

If this pattern appears on your knee x-ray, the physician can draw several conclusions. First, you likely had past injury to the knee. Second, you are at risk to develop attacks of arthritis that seem like gout, but really are not. Third, you may have impairments in your thyroid, parathyroid, or insulin producing cells that could explain increasing fatigue and loss of energy previously ascribed to "growing old."

Thus x-rays of normal appearing knees may be revealing about your present health and future wellbeing.

Students sail to stardom in original Columbus show

Fifth graders at Eriksson Elementary School gave their fellow students and parents a taste of Broadway performing their original musical, "In Quest of Columbus," Thursday.

Students took roles as Columbus and the men and boys who sailed on three ships, accompanying him on his journey to the New World. Others played the roles of modern-day young explorers trying to figure out which Caribbean island Columbus landed on first. Their trip was a trying adventure; they had to give up Nintendo.

Students who didn't have speaking parts sang in the choir or worked on the stage crew, helping classroom aides Patti Tomb and Jane Cutler, who created the tropical and nautical scenery.

Tomb said the students' hard work — they began rehearsing right after Christmas break — paid off.

Students who watched the musical "loved the music and the scenery," said Tomb. "We heard from a lot of parents that they were surprised at how well the children did, and how they had the nerve to do some of these things, singing solo and acting. They did marvelously."

The performers themselves, doing the school's first fifth grade musical, "were really excited," she said.

Students learned about the discoverer in the process. "People think he landed right in America. No one's sure exactly where he landed, but kids finally understand it probably was one of the Caribbean islands," she said.

"The experience gave students an idea of the kind of experience and adventure it must have been," said Tomb.

From Columbus' journal, students learned that his 74 sailors and 16 cabin boys were so upset

about not seeing land for so long that they thought about throwing their captain overboard. For Columbus, land was spotted just in time.

They also learned some people in the 1400s thought the world was flat, and that the sailors might fall off the edge.

A song they sang described the people Columbus and his crew met in the West Indies.

"Gentle people, living side by side on these islands in the sea," they sang. "Gentle people, living in peace and harmony. When you saw these strangers arrive from far away, you welcomed them in friendship and in peace."

"In Quest of Columbus" went over well. "It was a definite success," said Tomb. It helped that so many of the fifth graders are hams at heart, she added.

Teachers who helped out include Carol Biro, Jim DeKiere, and Donna Jeziorski.

CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH ORDINANCE NO. C-93-02 WATER AND SEWER SYSTEM

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND PARAGRAPHS A, C, D, AND H OF SECTION 73.040, AND PARAGRAPHS A, B, AND C OF SECTION 73.050 OF CHAPTER 73 OF PART 7 OF THE CODE OF THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH; TO AMEND THE WATER CONSUMPTION RATES, WATER TAP CHARGES, AND THE SEWAGE DISPOSAL RATES FOR THE TOWNSHIP; PROVIDING FOR THE SEVERABILITY OF THIS ORDINANCE; PROVIDING FOR THE REPEAL OF ALL OTHER INCONSISTENT ORDINANCES; PROVIDING FOR THE SAVINGS CLAUSE OF THIS ORDINANCE AND PROVIDING FOR THE PUBLICATION AND EFFECTIVE DATE OF THE ORDINANCE.

THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

Section 1. Amendment to Chapter 73. That Paragraphs A,C,D, and H of Section 73.040, and Paragraphs A,B, and C of Section 73.050 are hereby amended to read as follows:

73.040. Water Rates.

A. Consumption Rates. The consumption rate shall be \$1.31 per 1,000 gallons.

C. Minimum Water Rates. The following Minimum Water Rates shall be charged in addition to the appropriate Service Charge and Capital Charge.

C. Single Residences Unmetered Water. If passed, Proposal A would raise the sales tax to 6 percent, limit property assessment increases to a maximum of 5 percent a year and guarantee school districts at least \$4,800 per student per year.

Dems fall short on property tax freeze debate

Senate Democrats, an often beaten minority, had an hour in the cable television sun last Tuesday to berate Gov. John Engler and his Proposal A school finance plan.

Republicans glowered, but let them talk.

The occasion was cable TV day in Lansing, when local companies descended on the State Capitol Building. Democratic gubernatorial hopeful Debbie Stabenow and her colleagues gave them a show.

"We have people watching today we don't ordinarily have," said a beaming Stabenow.

The irony was that Democrats lost the battle. They attempted to move for a debate on a property tax freeze bill (SB 146) that is supposed to be a companion to Proposal A on the June 2 ballot.

Engler, most Republicans and some Democrats are supporting A because it cuts school property taxes, replaces the lost revenue with a two-cent increase in the sales tax, raises school spending in poorer districts and places a constitutional cap on property assessments.

The full Senate rejected the Democratic attempt to stage a debate on SB 146 with 13 Democrats for and 19 Republicans

against. So for an hour, Democrats asked Lt. Gov. Connie Binsfeld, the presiding officer, for "permission to make a statement."

"Without objection, it is so ordered," Binsfeld replied politely.

Democrats argued that SB 146 should be taken up prior to the June 2 public vote on Proposal A. SB 146 isn't scheduled for a vote until June 3.

SB 146 would freeze assessments this year and next, said the sponsor, Doug Carl, R-Utica. It differs from Proposal A, which would cap assessments at 5 percent or the rate of inflation, whichever is less.

The House passed its version of SB 146 at the same time (March 30) it voted to put Proposal A on the ballot. Senators approved A but not the amended SB 146.

"There's disagreement within the administration," said Democratic floor leader John Cherry of Clio.

"I'm amazed," said gubernatorial candidate Stabenow.

"There's confusion on whether there's a freeze," said Lana Pollack, D-Ann Arbor.

Replied Republican majority leader Dick Posthumus of Alto: "The only confusion is what some are trying to inject. This still is a companion bill. This

will pass. We have the votes here. In the very unfortunate event A fails, this is needed for a taxpayers' bill of rights."

"I forgot!"

If Stabenow was campaigning hard on cable TV, colleague David Hongiman, R-West Bloomfield, wasn't.

"I forgot all about it," said Honigman, who wore faded jeans, track shoes and no tie.

Two casualties

As Democratic senators used the morning to bludgeon Engler, two area lawmakers' bills at the top of the calendar got no action at all.

One was a bill by Sen. Robert Geake, R-Northville, to allow courts to cut awards in traffic injury cases to passengers who failed to wear seat belts.

The other was the House-passed "potty party" bill by Rep. Jan Dolan, R-Farmington Hills. It requires all municipalities to follow the Michigan construction code, rather than other nationally recognized codes, in regulating public buildings. The Michigan code requires more stalls in the women's restrooms than do other codes.

Bryant a maverick

The Republican State Com-

mittee, 104-member governing body of the Grand Old Party between conventions, unanimously endorsed Proposal A last weekend.

That failed to stop state Rep. William Bryant Jr., R-Grosse Pointe, from issuing a series of daily statements knocking Proposal A. Bryant, a former minority leader, represents an area like the western suburbs that will get little property tax relief from the ballot plan.

Bryant calls his bulletins "Bad News of the Day/for Supporters of A." Items:

April 22: "The figures used by the governor for 1993 net property tax cut are inflated by \$94 million." Reason: Even without A, school tax rates will be cut back by the Headlee amendment to the constitution, which requires cutting rates when assessments go up faster than inflation.

April 26: "The governor's figures of claimed property tax relief for 1994 show a cut attributable to passage of House-passed SB 146." Along with Democrats, Bryant notes the Senate has yet to pass SB 146. "No bill, no 'cut' to count," he said.

April 26: It's untrue that districts don't lose local control. Engler's school aid plan still will penalize districts 5 percent

of their state aid if they fail to publish annual reports to the public by Oct. 15, Bryant said.

Big Labor quiet

Good news for Engler is that the state AFL-CIO will sit out the fight over Proposal A.

The union federation's executive council has tabled the plan "after a lengthy discussion," its news release said.

AFL-CIO chief Frank Garrison interpreted that as "denying support to the proposal."

But later in the release, Garrison admitted labor won't oppose it either.

That's exactly what Engler is counting on, said Bill Ballenger, former legislator who publishes the Inside Michigan Politics (IMP) newsletter.

Proposal A at this point has 50 percent support in the polls, 34 percent opposition and 16 percent undecided. But pollsters say a proposal should start out with 65 percent approval in case opponents run a negative campaign late in the game.

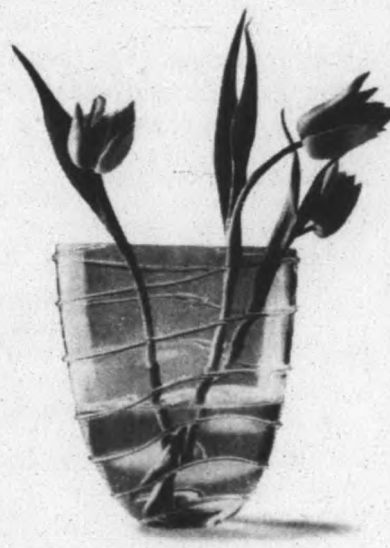
That's why Engler is pleased at the lack of large group opposition to A.

Also sitting this one out: The League of Women Voters, which fringed the group fighting Engler's failed 1992 "Cut & Cap" proposal.

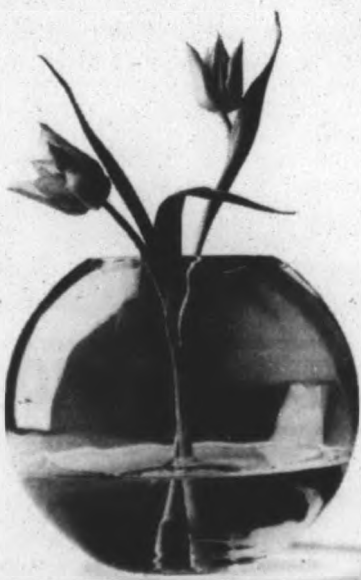

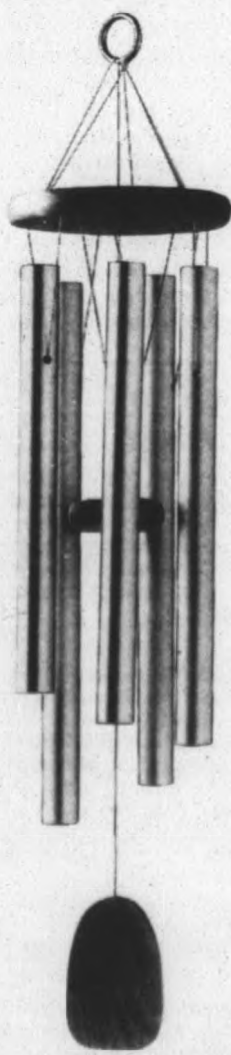

This is the season of the shoe. Anything goes as long as it has the relaxed, casual feeling of spring's newest fashions. POINTS OF VIEW

Here are 'sure fixes' for state's school system

Want to know some sure fire ways to fix Michigan's schools? Since many of them are "politically incorrect" or "economically unfeasible," it's unlikely that anyone from Lansing or universities or school boards will buy them all. Many ordinary taxpayers may shy away from some as well. But for anyone who really wants to fix things, here's how:

1. Teach all kids to read and reason. Competent readers/reasoners can learn anything.
2. Pay for all public schools with income and luxury sales taxes and then fund according to need, with each school getting at least \$7,000 per student, and many with disadvantaged populations getting more. All commu-

- nity colleges become tuition-free, and no private school gets subsidized.
3. Combine education with social services (health, recreation, child care) under one administrative umbrella and house them in the schools.
4. Cut administrative costs by radically reducing the number of school districts, and then establish qualifications for local boards and pay them to serve.
5. Create exchange programs for the best public school and university staff to teach, administrate and do research at each others' levels. Set up similar staff exchange and student exchange programs between more and less socio-economically advantaged districts.
6. Enable teachers to retain their seniority if they transfer from one dis-

trict or institution to another, and standardize inter-district salary scales.

7. Establish cross-district magnet schools to address special interests, such as talented and gifted, alternative education, creative arts, science and

- technical education.
8. Recruit more able teaching and administrative candidates — including minority candidates — and train them longer and better before and after hiring them.
9. Devise career ladders for K-12 teachers which compare favorably with administrative salaries, and require all administrators to teach periodically. Also pay substitute teachers a decent wage.
10. Retain retired educators' teaching, counseling and administrative services on a part-time basis.
11. Decriminalize adult use of drugs and divert those police and prison dollars to beef up education and treatment programs. (Even the mayor of Detroit is saying this now.)

12. Evaluate educators more stringently. Lengthen probationary periods for new teachers and make it legally easier to remove incompetent tenured ones.
- If we do these things, the next generation will flourish. If we don't, it won't, but that's what my solutions will counter just as soon as we muster the moral strength to implement them.

Society, not education, to blame for our woes

QUESTION: You say there will be no support and little sympathy from the public for teachers who strike with people losing their jobs, taxes at an all time high, etc. However, as a teacher, I take great exception when these same people blame public school teachers, administrators and boards of education for everything wrong in our society, from low test scores to drugs in the schools, to encouraging active sexual behavior. Do you support those parental attitudes?

ANSWER: I take great exception to the attitude that it is a failing school system that has caused the problem of supposedly low test scores, drug use and other societal problems. Schools and what goes on in schools is a reflection of the family values students bring with them when they enter the school building each morning. Values are taught and caught at home. We don't teach open sex or violence as the means to solve issues as shown in the movies and on TV, nor drugs as an enhancer for a high or to solve problems. Low test scores and poor student achievement is more a direct fault of the home and those parents who have placed all responsibility for learning on

teachers, administrators and boards of education. We have plenty of evidence to support this position. Dr. Nathan Caplan, University of Michigan professor emeritus (and others) recently completed a major Institute of Social Research study. Dr. Caplan and his colleagues set out to determine why children of Southeast Asian boat people have done so well in our school system. How could children, most non-English speaking when they arrived, out score our own students on standardized tests and in grade point averages? Indeed, I'll always remember the Vietnamese girl at one graduation being introduced as valedictorian, a girl who could not speak English when she arrived in the seventh grade. Without going into detail, Dr. Caplan's study concluded that the U.S. educational crisis is far more a societal problem than a school or academic problem. Consider some of the finds of the Asian student study and compare them with what many teachers are faced with everyday in our liberated society. ■ The Asian parent refugees made education the priority. They endorsed the value of working in a disciplined manner with their child's own energy being

the key factor in learning and in attaining high grades and high test scores. Teachers and administrators have too often become the scapegoat in our present society, a society where parental authority and responsibility have taken a vacation. ■ The family of Asian refugees is the central institution by tradition; parents and children honor a mutual collective obligation to one another. Divorce is rare. Asian parents attended all parent/teacher conferences. But for others, the divorce rate is at an all time high. Teachers daily face numerous children from one parent homes, too often a woman works two jobs. And only 30 percent turnout at high school teacher/parent conferences. ■ High school children of Asian boat

people spent an average of three hours a night on homework; junior high students spent 2 1/4 hours; and grade schools spent two hours. Parents requiring homework in our society, however, are a joke. Probably less than 30 percent are on top of homework. Other factors were evident in Caplan's study such as the Asian parents reading aloud to their young elementary children every night. Children pay attention and follow rules. Caplan points out other examples. Jewish immigrants from Eastern Europe excelled in our school system. A 1961 study by Judith Kramer and Seymour Leventman of the University of Pennsylvania reported that nearly 90 percent of the Eastern European Jewish immigrants' third generation attended college, despite the fact that the first generation had little or no education when they arrived in the United States. The emphasis on family and culture was found to be instrumental in their amazing success. In another study, the Japanese, after World War II, also thrived academically. Their success was attributed to cultural and family values and parental influence. So to what do we attribute our sup-

posedly lower test scores and achievement? Is it the teacher, is it the educational system or is our society going down the drain? We have a society where, according to the Sourcebook of Criminal Justice Statistics, forcible rape has gone up 10.5 percent over the past 20 years; where women are afraid to go to a mall alone at night; where aggravated assault has increased 206 percent; where murder has increased 50 percent; and where violent crimes have increased 145 percent. We have a severe breakdown in family and societal values in this country. History shows every great country held the crown for about 250 years before its decline. We are at year 217 since the Constitution of 1776. Parents, let's get a clue! Take some leadership in the home and quit blaming teachers, administrators and the educational system. Reaction to rape crimes tests our belief systems

Rape is a crime that tests our judicial system, the news media and some of our most basic beliefs about civilized behavior. We have by most accounts regrettably failed all of those tests. A recent workshop for journalists on sexual assault addressed most of the issues reporters and editors face when covering the crime, but a discussion about revealing the victim's name never really materialized. That is a shame, because that question is not only one of journalistic ethics, but one that exposes the problems we all have in dealing with rape and other violent crimes. This particular workshop, sponsored by the University of Michigan Sexual Assault Prevention and Awareness Center, addressed many of the dilemmas journalists face in covering the crime. Although there were representatives of both TV and print media, law enforcement, rape counseling and victims of rape and parents of a rape/murder victim, what was not addressed could shed more light on why sexual assault has not diminished despite tougher laws, more enlightened prosecutors and judges, and many workshops and seminars. Studies show that one of three women and one in 10 men in this country will be sexually abused in his or her lifetime. That should be an alarming statistic. But only when several rapes are reported, or a particularly violent rape occurs, does the crime receive much attention. It often is reported in cycles, leading to greater public awareness for a period of time. Although the names of rape victims are public record, unlike other violent crimes, including murder, they are not treated as such. News organizations, with few exceptions, have treated rape differently, with the aim of protecting the victim from the additional pain of reliving the crime and the public humiliation that would be sure to follow. But recent cases, most notably the highly publicized William Kennedy Smith case in Florida in 1991, have brought forth the issue of whether to identify the woman who brought the charge. In that case, one television network, NBC, identified the woman on the grounds that if Smith was being named although he was presumed innocent, his accuser should also be named. Articles denouncing NBC's decision followed, but surprisingly, many women who had either been raped or had counseled someone who had been raped, said the victim's name should be public. Their reason is quite a different one: In order for rape to be taken seriously, it had to be reported like other crimes — with sensitivity to

the accused and accuser but without kid gloves. Knowing that some newspapers do print victim's names could give a victim second thoughts about reporting the crime. Hopefully, newspapers will print the names of victims who ask to be identified and tell their story, but not those of victims who don't want the publicity. Often, even when newspapers don't identify the victim, other facts of the case point to the victim, or to someone else. And because the rapist is named, he will sometimes get to air his side of the story, while the victim is shrouded in desperate silence. One victim said she read a story where her attacker wanted "to put this all behind him and get on with his life." The stakes are high. Since so few rapes are already reported, the chances are that a rapist will get away with the crime and repeat it. The man whose daughter was raped and then murdered later found out that the killer had attempted the same crime two other times. Once he had been pulled off the victim. The other time the victim survived, but her father sought to keep the crime quiet because he thought the publicity would hurt his community standing. It's not likely that if his daughter had been robbed, injured by a hit-and-run driver, or murdered that the man would have tried to keep it quiet. But somehow, to many people rape implies some complicity by the victim. The terms "date rape" and "acquaintance rape," used to describe the vast majority of sexual assaults where the rapist and victim know each other, trivialize the crime. As one victim at the workshop said, "I knew him, but I wouldn't hardly describe this as a date. All I asked for was for him to stop." Journalists need to try and expose this problem and the underlying hypocrisy that allows rapists to prey on us all. S'craft graduation Geake, Schiller to accept honorary degrees

Schoolcraft College will award degrees to nearly 900 area residents at graduation ceremonies Saturday, May 8, on the Livonia campus.

The college will give honorary degrees to state Sen. Robert Geake, R-Northville, a former Schoolcraft board member, and Robert Schiller, state superintendent of public instruction. Schiller will also deliver the Schoolcraft commencement address.

As state senator, Geake represents the communities of Canton, Livonia, Northville, Plymouth and Redford. Geake is a graduate of the University of Michigan, where he received a bachelor's, master's and doctorate. He's a life member of the National Education Association and a member of the American and Michigan psychological associations. Geake has also been a school psychologist in Greenfield Village Schools

of Dearborn and held three positions at the Plymouth State Home and Training School in Northville. He was chairman of Schoolcraft's board of trustees in 1971 and 1972.

Schiller is a graduate of Upsala College in New Jersey. He also got a master's in English literature from the University of Mississippi, a master's in curriculum and instruction from the University of Pennsylvania and a doctorate in education from Penn. Schiller has served as deputy state superintendent of education for Delaware and Louisiana, as superintendent of three school districts in New Jersey, as an assistant school superintendent, high school principal and a teacher.

Schoolcraft will also pay tribute to two "distinguished alums," — James Key and Raymond Dreyfus.

Key graduated from Schoolcraft in 1979 with degrees in applied

science and culinary arts. Last year he got Schoolcraft degrees in marketing and applied management.

Currently an account manager for Digital Equipment of Novi, Key has also worked for the Digital Services Group, Rupp and Bowman Co. and Airborne Graphics.

Dreyfus graduated from Schoolcraft in 1969 and is now a media executive for Chrysler Corp. He has held a number of marketing and advertising positions with Chrysler over the last nine years, including a three-year stint as marketing manager in California. Dreyfus started his career in the advertising industry and later became vice president of media at the J. Walter Thompson Agency, a Ford division. Dreyfus has a master's in business administra-

tion from the advanced management program at Michigan State University.

Schoolcraft has also singled out two students for special honors. Dawn Powers and Larry Beggs Jr., the president and vice president of Phi Theta Kappa, respectively, will lead graduates in and out of the ceremony.

In other news, the college is incorporating two prayers into the graduation occasion, which is surprising because late last year college officials were thinking about eliminating prayer because the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that prayers are banned from high school graduations.

President Richard McDowell said the college trustees were informally polled and agreed to continue with the prayer part of the ceremony.

Get your nets ready for spring smelt run

It will happen soon. The phone will ring. The time and date will be set. We rendezvous at midnight — sharp! The orgy begins. Before you know it, thousands of folks living in the vicinity of the Great Lakes will begin their yearly ritual — the smelt search. I can still remember the days we visited my folks' summer cottage just off Pointe Pelee in Ontario. We would descend upon the still frigid beaches complete with our Coleman lanterns, Eddie Bauer waders, Mort Neff seine nets and cases of Labatts Blue. It was a private beach just west of the point, but during the smelt run, the bonfires lighted up the blackened sky like klieg lights at a Hollywood premiere.

First pass

We drew straws to see who would be the first to "make a pass." It was always the guy with the deepest waders. The guy with the high galoshes stood on the shore. No one really wanted to make the first pass because if a smelt was netted, the catcher would have the ceremonious duty of biting off and swallowing the head of the doomed creature. God, we were so macho then! I can remember filling 5-gallon garbage bags with just one sweep. We would try and pass them off to customs agents at the border. When we got home we'd begin the relatively easy cleaning process! Only about 5 percent of the catch would make it to the fridge. The remaining 95 percent ended up as garden fertilizer.

Freezing smelt

If you are lucky enough to get some, they do freeze easily. You can freeze them individually on a baking sheet and then drop them into freezer bags. Or you can do what the Janeses do — fill a plastic milk jug with smelts and then top off the jug with water and freeze. For the uninitiated, smelt look like giant minnows. They can be anywhere from 5 to 8 inches long. However, any good smelt fisherman will swear that the smaller ones are the best eating! Smelt found in the Great Lakes region are really immigrants that were originally transplanted here from New England coastal waters. Eastern smelt, as they like to be called, are migrating saltwater fish. The finest smelt in the world are rumored to be had in the Columbia River. This might be true to folks who like saltwater smelt, but yours truly has tried them and compared. There's nothing that beats a fresh mess of beer-battered smelts from Pointe Pelee.

Eastern saltwater smelts are somewhat fatter and have a higher oil content than freshwater Great Lakes smelt. Did you know that Columbia River smelt have an oil content so high, and were so plentiful, that Indians used to dry them in large quantities and then burn them for light?

Good eating

If you're lucky enough to net some of these beauties or must rely on the local fishmonger, figure on about 14 to a pound if they are dressed, and about 11 per pound whole. The smaller smelts can be prepared for cooking by pinching off the heads directly behind the gills and exerting light pressure on the belly cavity to expell a relatively small amount of innards. There is no need to bone them because the bones soften when cooked and can be eaten. Some smelt aficionados swear the removal of the head and innards is a sacrilege and prefer to batter fry them whole. Call me a wimp, but I prefer them headless and gutless, however, I do enjoy the crunchiness of the tail. Get ready folks, all we need is a few more warm days and equally warm rains to make the little suckers swarm, and I do mean swarm. But be prepared, as fast as they come, so they shall leave, never again to appear for another 345 days. Smelt are usually prepared batter or pan fried in a light seasoned bread crumb coating but they also can be baked and broiled for the diet conscious. A splash of lemon or slathering of tartar sauce is all that is needed to enjoy. Bon Appetit!

Home economist pioneer for working moms

Being recognized by your peers is the highest honor anyone can achieve. Even now, two months after she was named Outstanding Home Economist of the Year by the Michigan Home Economists Association, Irene Cameron gets goose bumps talking about it.

"It's one of the most exciting experiences I've had since getting married and having children," said Cameron who serves on the cable commission in Livonia and hosts "In Good Taste," which airs on City Channel 8 in Livonia, 7:30 p.m. Thursdays. "She was totally surprised," said her longtime friend Pat Albright, coordinator adult program for the Dairy Council of Michigan. "I've known Irene for 32 years. She's dynamic, the truest friend I've ever had."

Collecting Cameron's credentials to nominate her for Outstanding Home Economist of the Year was not easy. To be nominated you need three letters of recommendation from members of the Michigan Home Economists Association, and three letters of recommendation from people outside the association. You also have to explain why that person is deserving of the award.

Albright called Cameron's daughter Wendy Gregor who is a dietitian and lives in Omaha with her husband Clark, a dentist, and daughter Hailey, 18 months.

When they visited during Thanksgiving, Wendy asked her mom to write down her work experience so when Hailey grows up she'll know everything her grandma did. Gregor put the information in resume form and sent it to Albright.

"I couldn't believe it. My own daughter was in cahoots with them. Never in my wildest dreams did I think I would get the award," said Cameron. "I wasn't planning to attend the state convention. A friend said you've got to go. I had to change an eye appointment."

Reflecting on her career, Cameron, who moved to Livonia 31 years ago with her husband David, said she remembers being criticized for working outside

the home. Wendy was six months old when the family moved to Livonia. Son Scott, is an emergency medicine doctor in Sacramento.

"I always worked one or two days a week since I graduated from college. Not full time. I never had a job that didn't utilize my skills. I was a pioneer. Now it's accepted. Couples share household tasks, but if the home isn't neat, the blame is laid at the women's feet.

"I strongly think women should work. I don't think children are faring bad because their mothers are working. There are good moms and bad moms. You can be a bad mother whether you spend your day in the home or out."

Cameron said she told both of her children that they must get saleable degrees in college.

Her practical outlook was fostered early when she had to make a career choice that changed her life. She was a member of a synchronized swim team in her teens, and dreamed of being a swimming teacher.

"It was 1946, and I found out there were very few schools with swimming pools. I wasn't interested in other sports. My high school economics teacher suggested home economics. I have never been sorry I got the degree, it's always served me very well."

After graduating from Pennsylvania State University, Cameron went to work as a home economist at Pennsylvania Power Co. in Sharon, Pa. Throughout the years she's used her skills in a variety of ways. She worked for McCall's Pattern Co. and traveled across the state presenting programs to junior and senior high students. Topics included "Creating Line and Design," and "Coordinating Your Wardrobe."

She was a fashion coordinator at Hudson's, freelance food stylist, and managed consumer affairs for all kitchen appliances, and provided demonstrations in Consumer's Power Cooking Schools. She was coordinator of communications and media relations for the Dairy Council of Michigan/United Dairy Industry of Michigan for 20 years.

BUTTER TARTS

- 1/2 cup butter, softened
- 1 cup light brown sugar
- 2 tablespoons heavy cream
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- Pinch salt
- 1/4 cup pecans
- 1/4 cup currants

In electric mixer bowl, cream butter and brown sugar well. Continue beating while you add cream, egg (a little at a time), salt, and vanilla. Stir in nuts and currants. Place spoonfuls in chilled tart shells.

Bake at 450 degrees F. for 8 minutes, reduce heat to 350 degrees F., and bake 3 to 5 minutes more.

HAM-WATERCRESS SANDWICHES

- 2 thin slices white bread, crusts removed
 - 2 tablespoons cream cheese with chives, softened
 - 2 thin slices baked ham
 - 1/2 cup small watercress sprigs, thick stems removed
 - 12 orange sections
 - 2 teaspoons minced red onion
- Spread the slices of bread with the cream cheese. Trim the ham to fit the slices of bread. Layer the ham and watercress on the bread. Using a serrated knife, cut the sandwich in half diagonally.

Garnish the sandwiches with orange sections and sprinkle with red onion. Yield 12 small sandwiches.

STRAWBERRY TEA

- 2 quarts water
- 8 teaspoons strawberry tea (available in specialty

- shops, natural-food stores)
- 1/2 cup sugar
- Juice of 1 lemon
- About 4 strawberries, sliced

In a large saucepan, bring the water to a full boil. Add the tea and sugar, cover, and let stand for 5 minutes.

Strain the tea into a large pot or pan. Stir in the lemon juice, and let the tea cool to room temperature.

Serve the tea over ice, garnished with the sliced strawberries. Yield 6 to 8 servings.

ORANGE-SPICE TEA

- 2 quarts water
- 8 teaspoons loose orange-peko tea
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 stick cinnamon
- 1 pod star anise
- 6 to 8 quartered orange slices

In a large saucepan, bring the water to a full boil. Add the tea, sugar,

cinnamon, and star anise. Cover and let the tea stand for 5 minutes.

Strain and cool to room temperature.

Serve the tea over ice, garnished with the orange slices. Yield 6 to 8 servings.

ORANGE-CLOVE TEA

- 3 to 4 teaspoons orange-peko tea

- 1 quart boiling water
- 1 orange, rinsed, dried, and cut into slices about 1/2-inch thick
- Whole cloves

Warm a teapot and teacups with hot water. Drain and dry them.

Put the tea leaves in the teapot. Add the boiling water. Cover with a tea towel or tea cozy and steep for 5 minutes.

Cut each orange slice in half, so

that each piece is a semi-circle. Stud the skin side with several whole cloves. Put an orange slice in the bottom of each teacup. Stir and strain the tea into the hot cups and serve. Yield 4 servings.

In 1951, while working as a district home economist for Westinghouse Electric in Pittsburgh, Cameron used one of the first microwave ovens. "It cost \$1,500, and we didn't know if it would take off," she said.

"Irene has the ability to please every customer or client she works with, she gives them full service, and information," said Albright. "You can count on her.

She's reliable, professional."

Cameron dabbled in television as host of the "Home Cooking" show in Youngstown, Ohio, early in her career, and has developed her talent as host of "In Good Taste."

In 1985 she was appointed to the cable commission in Livonia, and started "In Good Taste," in 1988.

"She really goes with the flow,"

said Paul Pyzik Scott, municipal production coordinator for City Channel 8 who has worked with Cameron for four years. "We bring all of our equipment to her house to tape the show. She's very flexible. We're there from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. every other month. She's taken an interest in TV, even the production details. She's very encouraging to the staff."

Helpful cooking tips to use, share

Here are some cooking tips from Betty Crocker to use or share with a friend.

 2 egg whites beaten until stiff
 Beat together the egg yolks, milk and melted butter until smooth. Mix flour, salt and seasoned bread crumbs and mix with a whisk until a batter is formed.
 Wash and pat dry smelt. Just before frying, fold in beaten egg

BROILED SMELT

2 pounds smelt, dressed
 1 stick butter or margarine, melted
 ½ cup seasoned bread crumbs
 ¼ cup cream
 Coat cleaned smelt in melted butter or margarine, place on waxed paper and refrigerate until butter or margarine has solidified and coated the fish. Remove from fridge, dip in cream, then roll in seasoned bread crumbs to coat. Place on a lightly greased broiler pan and broil until golden, about 3 to 4 minutes.

DEEP FRIED SMELT

2 pounds smelt, dressed
 2 eggs, beaten
 ½ cup seasoned bread crumbs mixed with ¼ cup flour oil for deep-frying
 Preheat oil in deep-fryer to about 370 degrees. Dip the cleaned smelt in crumbs, then in beaten egg, then in crumbs again. Fry in small batches, being careful not to crowd the fryer for 3 minutes. Drain on paper towel.

½ cup seasoned bread crumbs mixed with ½ cup grated Parmesan cheese

Lightly grease low baking dish with olive oil. Combine and spread chopped vegetables on the bottom of the dish. Place smelt on top. Sprinkle with all the wine. Bake at 400 degrees for 10 minutes. Remove from the oven, sprinkle with bread crumb and cheese mixture and pop under the broiler for 4 minutes or until nicely golden brown.

LEMON, LIME OR PARSLEY BUTTER

2 sticks butter, melted

 Toast bread until crisp; cool. Spread each slice of toast with an equal amount of cream cheese; sprinkle with an equal amount of brown sugar. Top each slice of toast with four apple slices and two slices of Canadian-style bacon. Carefully spread equal amounts of apple jelly

over bacon. Place open-face sandwiches on a 12-inch microwave-safe plate. Cook, uncovered, on high (100 percent power), for 3 to 4 minutes, or until bacon is hot, rotating plate a quarter turn after 1½ minutes. Garnish with fresh fruit and berries. Serve immediately. Makes 4 servings.

Tips for brewing tasty tea

Sylvia Thacker of Sweet Afton Tea Room offers these tips for brewing a delicious cup of tea.
 "At Sweet Afton, we brew tea in the British manner," said Thacker.

"First, we heat fresh, cold water in a kettle. When the water is hot, a small amount is thrown in the china teapot to heat it thoroughly.

"Next, loosely pack a mesh tea infuser with the tea of your choice, and place it in the pot while waiting for the kettle to come to a rolling boil. Take the teapot to the kettle — never the kettle to the pot.

"Pour the boiling water into the pot, and allow the tea to steep three to five minutes. Stir the mixture and remove the infuser."

Julia Hoglen's secret is using loose tea. She wraps it in cheesecloth before putting it in the pot. "The looser the tea, the better the flavor," she said. "I prefer a china pot."

Paris restaurants

Everyone's trip to French wine regions should begin or at least terminate with a stay in Paris. Deals for Paris accommodations abound, starting with the airlines, usually accompanied by bonus frequent-flyer miles.

If you want to meet Parisians and not other tourists stay on the Left Bank. With this recommendation, we're answering one of your most frequent questions about where to eat and drink wine well, but inexpensively in Paris — on the Left Bank:

Chez Toutoune, 5 rue de Pontoise; Le Petit Zinc, 11 rue St. Benoît. This restaurant is pricier than others recommended here, but is outstanding. Waiters are uncommonly friendly to English-speaking patrons.

Restaurant Polidor, 41 rue M.

le Prince, is very casual, but with first-rate escargots from Burgundy among other regional specialties. Chez Maitre Paul, 12 rue M. le Prince; Restaurant des Beaux Arts (across from Ecole des Beaux Arts) is good for lunch and Allard, 41 rue St.-Andre-des-Arts will not disappoint.

On nearby Ile St. Louis, Au Gourmet de Lisie, 42 rue Saint-Louis-en-Ile has a fixed-price four-course daily offering with a choice of 10 entrees for 110 French Francs. Just don't let them seat you in the basement dining room! For a special, fine-dining experience, we highly recommend the one-star Michelin restaurant Le Dome, 108 Blvd du Montparnasse (14th Arr). Try sensational seafood in a historic setting with a classic zinc bar. If you have time to investigate an open-air food market, the most colorful stalls are along the rue de Buci and adjacent side streets.

Exploring California vineyards

First-time California wine explorations can begin in Napa Valley. The following are recommendations for wineries with exceptional tours, a different twist or sufficiently small to offer a one-on-one experience.

Starting in the north, visit — Clos Pegase if you like art in addition to wine. A few hundred yards south is Sterling Vineyards with a self-guided tour and superior tasting room. Continuing south, drop in at Freemark Abbey and Beringer. Flora Springs, with a much smaller production, doesn't attract crowds of tourists, but has a cozy tasting room.

St. Supery's tasting room is the most unique while Robert Mondavi Winery still offers the best guided tour. Domaine Chandon's the place to learn about sparkling wine production and the winery's restaurant offers the best dining experience in the Valley. Advance restaurant reservations for either lunch or dinner are advised. Pine Ridge Winery's new caves give you the idea of California high-tech aging facilities.

If you're experienced with touring in the Napa Valley and have

not visited in the much larger Sonoma Valley, then consider Ferrari-Carano, Preston, Dry Creek, Domaine Michel and Quivira north of Santa Rosa. South of Santa Rosa, call on Chateau St. Jean, Kenwood, Ravens-

wood (especially if you like Zinfandel), Buena Vista and Gundlach-Bundschu. Also visit the newly-opened Sonoma County Wine & Visitors Center open (10 a.m. to 6 p.m.), 5000 Roberts Lake Road in Rohnert Park (seven

miles south of Santa Rosa). At the center you can find information on wine tours special events, lodging, restaurants and maps. To leave a message on the Heald's voice mail — dial 953-2047, mailbox 1864.

Transparent Red: A 'free' song

■ They've felt the pain of drug abuse and they use drug-inspired fliers to promote their shows. But the message Transparent Red offers in its music is drug-free. The former is used to heighten interest in the music.

Transparent Red's drug-inspired fliers promoting its shows have lifted the eyebrows of various venues' management.

But for members of the group who have felt the pains of drug abuse, it's disappointing that sometimes the misunderstanding gets in the way of the drug-free message. For example, administrators at an area college took down fliers that negatively mentioned drugs.

"I did it (the flier) because I like exciting people; I love controversy," said drummer J.P. Faiella of West Bloomfield. "That's how things get out in the open."

The group would like to get its views — specifically Faiella's — on drugs in the open. A few years ago, he escaped the rampant drug use in New York by moving in with his sister in Berkeley.

"I just didn't think it was a good idea for myself personally to be around other musicians. Heroin's such a big thing in New York and I just didn't want to be surrounded by it anymore."

That's only part of Faiella's problems as a youth. He also survived a bout with non-Hodgkin's lymphoma, during which he was given six months to live. He's been cancer-free for six years.

The last thing Transparent Red wants, however, is sympathy. They want their fans to see that there's hope in every scenario.

"Our first song that we wrote, 'Sweet Seven,' is just about nothing's that bad," Faiella said. "Everybody in this band has been

through so much . . . I've been through cancer and rehab. It's just about (someone saying) 'I have nothing.' You have yourself. You can still go on."

Faiella prides his band on having intelligent lyrics.

"Our lyrics are very intelligent. I

don't want people listening to 'Hey, baby, baby, backseat of the car.' I want somebody to listen to our lyrics a couple times to actually think about it," Faiella said.

Lightening up the mood, bassist Joby Brown of Birmingham added, "They listen to it a couple times just to figure out what he's saying."

The hopeful message of Transparent Red — which also includes guitarist John Sullens of Fraser — even spilled over into its search for a lead

singer. Gary Guzialek of West Bloomfield was eventually hired for the job.

"Gary has a big heart; he's a really good person," Faiella said. "He's just a beautiful person. He's very spiritual. The main point that our band is trying to get across is hope . . . That just shined out (in him)."

On the lighter side, Guzialek is the true standout of the band — literally. During a recent show in the State Theatre lobby, Guzialek, with his eyes closed, walked across the barrier along the landing at the top of the stairs. Bassist Brown said that's the norm for Transparent Red shows.

"During one of our songs J.P. was like drumming along and Gary had pulled up this chair. He got up and did this Jesus Christ pose. He's (also) been known to crawl around on the ground," Brown said.

"He just gets into this frame of

mind on stage," Faiella added.

Although that behavior comes naturally to Guzialek, it's subconsciously part of a marketing ploy to garner attention for Transparent Red and its drug-free message.

"I'm glad I went through it. I got it out of the way. I think I've got an understanding that it's a dead-end street. It's artificial joy," Faiella said.

What you'll need to fill out this season's daring and dramatic swimwear is a svelte body and a mega dose of attitude. No, you don't have to look like a "Sports Illustrated" icon to feel comfortable in a swimsuit this year, but it definitely won't hurt.

If the illusive search for a bathing suit wasn't tough enough, prepare to scrutinize yourself in suits that promise tan lines where the sun generally doesn't shine. Like spring and summer fashions, swimwear is bare, sleek and feminine.

Swimwear '93 borrows here and there from several decades: the sophisticated '40s, the fabulous '50s and the frivolous '70s. Wherever the inspiration comes from, suits are bold and beautiful, say local fashion experts.

One can only guess if chlorine will be kind to suits fashioned from shiny gold and silver Lycra, Lycra velvet and crocheted cottons with sheer or net inserts and touches of metallic everywhere.

Colorwise, we'll see fun Tarzan and Jane prints, African motifs and a slew of ethnic prints. There are ditsy florals (borrowed from the '70s), hot fluorescents and lots of black and navy, especially for nautical designs.

The basic tank suit, by designers like Gottex, is still around — this year much sexier in flashy fabrications with sheer or net inserts that start below the bust and end at the pelvis.

On the conservative side, there's Ralph Lauren's tank with capped sleeves, Jantzen's metallic print tank and Lisa Lomas' long-sleeved leopard print tank that resembles a body suit.

Bikinis and monokinis by Darling Rio and Gottex have cutouts so daring some have coordinating

net T-shirts and sheer full-body cover-ups to . . . well . . . cover up. Suits with deep cutouts by Malia Mills and Kiko feature long sleeves or higher necklines; some double for high-fashion exercise wear.

Highly stylized suits made of flashy Lycras and spandex prints with underwire bras come from Calvin Klein, LaBlanca and other designers.

"There's a major trend toward the glamorous looks of the '40s and '50s," said Cheryl Hall, Sak's Fifth Avenue fashion director. "This season's swimwear has a real screen goddess appearance."

But you don't have to look like a goddess to dress like one, assures Hall. She says many swimsuits have plenty of built-in structure, molded bras and lots of wrapping and draping around the torso. Some suits even have longer legs (the "poor boy" look). Gottex's shiny skirted suit resembles a dance costume.

"Don't judge a suit by how it looks on a hanger; you might think you can't wear anything skirted, but that depends on where you carry weight," Hall said. "The torso-wrapped look is feminine and very flattering to most figures."

She predicts that women who'd never buy animal prints for a regular wardrobe piece will opt for jungle prints in swimwear — "A swimsuit is for fun and it's not a major investment. You'll look back on the suit and say 'I wore it to death one summer.'"

Janice Hayes, Jacobson's public relations director, sums up swimwear '93 in two words — sophisticated and sexy.

'Boy's Life' relives writer's fear

"This Boy's Life," based on the autobiography by Tobias Wolff, twists the traditional Boy Scout virtues of honesty, thrift, and obedience into a living hell for a teenager growing up in the 1950s.

The mountain vistas and a playful Sinatra singalong (not to mention the film's evocative title) hint at a happy-go-lucky romp with mother and son in a clunky old Nash. Then the narrator says, "When my mom got beat up by her boyfriend, we lit out for the uranium fields of Utah" and we know we're in for a rocky ride.

After a year of trying their luck in Salt Lake City, Toby (Leonard DeCaprio) and his mother Caroline (Ellen Barkin) hop a bus for Seattle and yet another in a series of new horizons. When Caroline eventually ends up in the middle of nowhere married to an abusive mechanic named Dwight (Robert DeNiro), she admits, "I've run out of fresh starts."

The movie might use a bit of literary license when Caroline stretches her independence by getting involved with the Kennedy campaign, but the always-watchable Barkin plays a believable woman who tries desperately

to keep her sunny side up. When it comes to clashes between Toby and Dwight, she "won't play referee."

While DiCaprio is also quite convincing as the troubled teenager, the movie revolves around DeNiro's rock-solid performance. This is no "Cape Fear" and his Dwight is no ordinary psycho. He's cloddily charming at first, wooing Caroline with flowers and compliments.

And at first you might think he's doing right by Toby, who does lack discipline and is well on the way to becoming a juvenile delinquent.

He gets Toby a paper route and enlists him in the Scouts, complete with a subscription to a "Boy's Life"-type magazine. He insists that the teenager attend both church and school regularly and learn how to protect himself in a fight.

But Dwight also keeps the money Toby earns (he's saving it

for something important when Toby really needs it) and beats the boy to a pulp for minor offenses like failing to scrape the sides of an empty mustard jar. Dwight grows violently jealous when he thinks someone has shown him up, which Toby does when he dreams of a life beyond Cement, Wash.

The movie is not all doom and gloom. Some of it's quite funny. The terminally square Dwight tells stupid jokes and uses irritating phrases like "shut your pie hole." He's a lousy father, lover, saxophone player, sharpshooter, and mechanic. His pigheaded inability to realize this makes him strangely sympathetic.

The only simple nostalgic pleasure comes through the soundtrack, which resurrects gutsy rock 'n' roll classics like "Real Wild Child," "Summertime Blues," and "I'm Not a Juvenile Delinquent."

Michael Caton-Jones, the Scottish-born director of "Scandal" and "Doc Hollywood," and scriptwriter Robert Getchell have

reportedly retained the flavor of Wolff's 1989 novel. The use of wide screen, though not incredibly inventive here, does contrast nicely with the confines of Dwight's dumpy and oppressive house.

The darkness behind "This Boy's Life" will make it unpopular with some. Heartfelt and uncompromising, it's a kick in the teeth to the mindless nostalgia usually packaged for Baby Boomers.

Plan now for Christmas, group asks

It may be only May, but it's never too early to think about Christmas, especially if it's for a worthy cause.

Goodfellows board member Cathy Johnson is igniting the Christmas spirit by calling all creative people to think about toys and gifts — making them, that is.

"The men always seem to be excluded," Johnson said, referring to the Goodfellows' annual doll contest.

Every year, community women make or buy clothes to dress dolls that will be put in Christmas baskets for needy children. Johnson wants men in the community to be just as involved by making wood toys.

The toys can be anything, such as trucks, airplanes, wood blocks, or even toy cradles for the dolls. Men and women may participate in either the dolls or the wooden toys projects.

In the first week of December, the historical society annually holds its fund-raiser to support the Canton Historical Museum. The Christmas sale includes tree ornaments, pillows, dolls, cross-stitch items, for example.

In 1992, the Goodfellows distributed more than 70 baskets for needy families. The families also received food for a holiday dinner, including a turkey and two chickens.

Library gets 2 grants

Murphy prepares for USGF nationals

It will be a wiser, more confident and successful Shay Murphy who competes against the best club gymnasts in the country this year.

The 16-year-old Murphy hopes her added experience produces a good result at the United States Gymnastic Federation national championships May 15-17 in Baltimore.

Murphy, who qualified for the first time last year, earned a return trip to the big meet by winning state and regional titles earlier this month.

"There are new compulsories this year, so it will be new for everybody," said Murphy, a junior at Plymouth Canton High School.

"Last year was the fourth year for the same compulsories. Everyone had

them down pat, and it was my first year."

Level 10, which includes Murphy, and elite gymnasts are the only ones required to perform both optionals and compulsories, the latter of which change every four years.

Murphy doesn't need another first-place finish for the nationals to be a success. A place among the top 10 will earn her a spot on the U.S. Junior Olympic team.

"First place would be unbelievable," Murphy said. "I'll try as hard I can, and that's all you can ask of someone."

Murphy made the jump from Level

9 to elite and stayed there for three years until deciding she was more suited for Level 10 last year — a move that has made the sport more enjoyable for her.

"The compulsories in elite are really hard," she said. "A lot of people told me I'd have a great time (at Level 10) because they knew I wasn't having fun. I never scored the scores I'm getting now."

Murphy, who competes for Blakes School of Gymnastics in West Bloomfield, was second in the state and 14th in the regional last year but did much better in 1993, especially in the latter meet.

She scored 73.60 all-around, which includes compulsory and optional

Thanks for the memories: Bob Hope turns 90 on NBC

NBC celebrates the 90th birthday of its longest-shining star in the three-hour gala *Bob Hope: The First Ninety Years*, airing Friday, May 14. The special features clips from Hope's 69-year show business career, dozens of guest stars and hosts Jay Leno, Walter Cronkite, Roseanne and Tom Arnold, Angela Lansbury, Paul Reiser, Garry Shandling, Tom Selleck and Betty White.

A veteran of more than 500 TV shows, Hope can and does draw up a birthday guest list the likes of which is seldom seen. Film co-stars Jane Russell, Phyllis Diller and Roy Rogers make appearances, along with Dale Evans, Johnny Carson, Candice Bergen, Donald O'Connor, Carol Burnett, John Forsythe, Garth Brooks, Colin Powell, Jack Klugman and Tony Randall. Also

extending their regards are all six living American presidents: Clinton, Bush, Reagan, Carter, Ford and Nixon. Les Brown and his Band of Renown supply the tunes, and An Jilian, Rosemary Clooney, Whoopi Goldberg, Lucie Arnaz, Michael Richards and Dave Thomas perform. And just so Hope will have an elder with whom to swap quips, 97-year-old George Burns will be on hand.

Born Leslie Townes Hope on May 29, 1903, in Elthen, England, the perennial performer holds the distinction of being successful in every modern medium of entertainment; vaudeville, Broadway, radio, films and television. Hope even amused crowds in his short career as boxer Packy East. From his 1924 show business debut in a dancing act for the Fatty Arbuckle Revue to his

string of *Road* pictures with Bing Crosby and his annual Christmas specials on TV, Hope has brought a smile to more faces than perhaps any other comedian. No doubt his most appreciative audiences have been those he journeyed around the world to reach—American servicemen.

"March Field, 1941: They asked me if I would come down there and do a show," Hope recalls of the beginning of his relationship with the military. "I said, 'Yes sir.' I went down, and the audience was so damned good I said, 'Wait a minute, how long has this been going on?' And I started doing bases around different places. Then, of course, World War II started, and I went all over the world."

organization and success of the United Service Organization (USO), Hope continued to take his act to the front lines throughout World War II, the Korean War, the Vietnam War and Operation Desert Shield, with "peacetime" jaunts to Beirut and the dismantled Berlin Wall thrown in for good measure.

Hope's genuine compassion for U.S. servicemen is well known,

through few may be aware of the fact that in 1971 he applied for a visa to Hanoi, intending to offer the North Vietnamese government \$10 million dollars for the release of American prisoners. Still, reports that U.S. servicemen were required to attend his performances in Vietnam and the idea that his presence seemed to sanctify the controversial conflict with portions of the public gave rise to the perception that he supported the

war. Hope claims politics was not on his agenda.

"It didn't make any difference about the war," Hope says. "In Vietman, we had thousands and thousands of American kids over there, and they needed entertainment. And whether the war was right or wrong, they needed entertainment, and they got a big kick out of it."

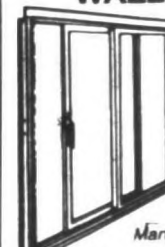

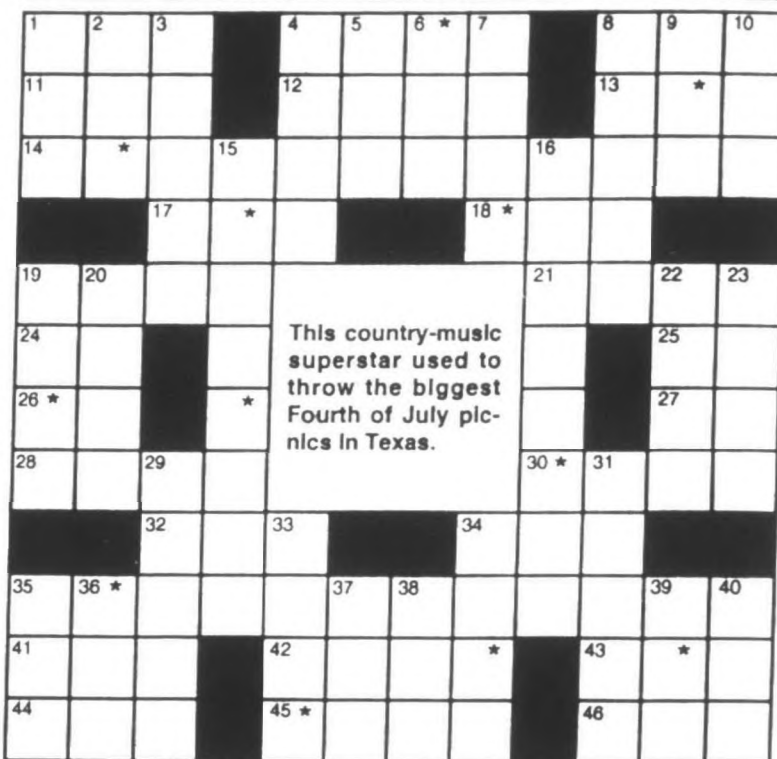

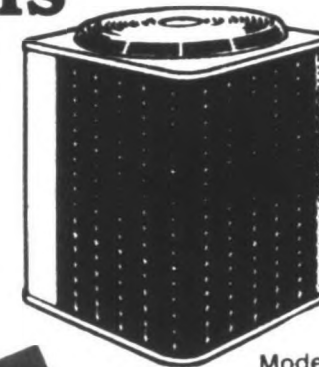

Foster caught on film many times before 'Accused'

Q: My friend and I have a bet, and we need your help. My friend says that when Jodie Foster starred in the movie *The Accused*, it was only her second or third major role. I say that she has had numerous roles in movies. Which of us is right? —Timothy Andrew Cannon, Sacramento, Calif.

A: You are. Born in 1962, Foster made her screen debut at the age of 10 with a starring role in Disney's *Napoleon and Samantha*. (She had been doing TV commercials and print ads since she was 3, including posing as the Coppertone child.) Foster played Becky Thatcher in 1973's *Tom Sawyer*, and as a teen had leading roles in *Taxi Driver* (1976), *Bugsy Malone* (1976), *Freaky Friday* (1977), *Candlehoe* (1977) and *Foxes* (1980). After taking time out for a Yale education, Foster returned to film work in adult roles.

Q: I saw a great picture years ago

but can't remember its name. Leslie Caron played the daughter of Charles Boyer, who owned a bar. Caron fell in love with Horst Buchholz, who left to go to sea, and she found out she was pregnant when he was gone and married Maurice Chevalier. Can you tell me what the title is? —Ernestine Murphy, Sedona, Ariz.

A: The name of that film is *Fanny*, a 1961 feature which delighted audience members with lush photography and fine performances that were worthy of several Oscar nominations. Incidentally, the home video version of this film includes an animated short and previews of "coming attractions" *Splendor in the Grass* and *The Roman Spring of Mrs. Stone* to simulate a night at the movies during that period.

Q: In regard to Lorenzo Lamas, now playing in the *Renegade* series, who is his real mother and is she still alive? —Ms. Daniel Bonillas, Soulsbyville,

A: Lamas is the fortunate son of actress Arlene Dahl (*Jamaica Run*, *Kisses for My President*), who is 64 years old, and actor Fernando Lamas, who has passed away. Lamas was once rumored to have told his mom, "Mother, I want to be a star... I mean an actor," to which she replied, "I heard you the first time." Needless to say, Lamas' entertainment in-roads opened quite a few doors, the most notable of which was one leading to his starring role on *Falcon Crest*.
