# City makes face-lift appointment



It's been a long time coming and it almost became a victim of a ballot petition. But on Aug. 30 the first work on the long-planned downtown streetscape improvements is to start. First, though, the city commission must advertise a bond sale for the project.

The construction start-up for the downtown street/sidewalk project has been set for Aug. 30, but another delay could be looming.

The city commission was scheduled Monday to approve the advertising of a bond sale to pay for the \$2.4-million project, now four years in the making.

But with some commissioners say-

ing they'd like to see more finished plans, including a traffic study that discusses accommodating fire engines, that vote was put off to today. The commission meets at 7 p.m. at city hall, 201 S. Main St.

Commissioner Bill McAninch was strongest of the commissioners calling for the downtown development authority, which has overseen the project, to provide more detailed information on some project concerns.

McAninch cited possible poor ac-

cess for fire trucks and other design features to slow downtown traffic as concerns.

"We're going to have congestion that will hurt our downtown, not help it," he suggested.

McAninch said business recruitment and retention efforts suggested by a downtown consultant should have precedence over streetscape improvement, adding the planned improvements may not be in keeping

will feature the Chautauqua Express and the bilingual musical talents of Guiy Sferlazza. Sferlazza performs on guitar, mandolin and

# 'No' voters point to mistrust, high taxes

A lack of trust was a major factor in the defeat of the 4-mill property tax increase in the June 14 election, according to a Plymouth-Canton school survey.

Eighty-two percent of the randomly selected 294 respondents cited mistrust in government as a reason the millage failed.

Seventy-two percent said lack of trust in the board of education fac-

tored into the failure of the millage. A record 16,600 residents cast ballots in the election. Voters defeated the 4-mill tax hike, 8,767 to 7,558.

A 17.74-mill renewal was approved by a vote of 10,722 to 5,664.

"When asked about their knowledge of possible cuts," said district spokesman Richard Egli, "a high percentage, 88 percent, said they understood before the election what pro-

# Schools' wish list spends 4-mill hike

Plymouth-Canton school board members decided Monday how to spend \$4.1 million, should voters approve a 4-mill tax increase in a special election Aug. 17.

Tops on the list is \$2.5 million for the district's depleted contingency fund. To reduce the size of classes,

now averaging 30 students, \$1.1 million would be spent to rehire the 26 teachers laid off last year.

The maintenance department would receive \$200,000.

A total of \$107,000 would be spent on staff development. Allocated for assessing student achievement would

# Kmart duck checks out

Henrietta has flown the coop. "We don't know what happened," said Roger Whitehill, merchandising manager at Kmart at Sheldon and Ford roads.

Henrietta is a mallard duck adopted by Kmart employees more than a week ago when she took up residence in the department store's garden center. Employees noticed Henrietta flying in and out of the garden center. Then all of a sudden she moved in and built a nest — thanks to nearby garden supplies.

On Thursday night, July 1, employees said goodnight to Henrietta and the eggs she was nesting. When they returned to work Friday morning, she was

gone. "There is a big field behind here and it was mowed," Whitehill said. "It's possible another animal got scared and came into our fenced area (where Henrietta was living) and scared her."

Henrietta left — without her eggs. Two of the eggs were cracked. It's believed the remaining eggs were given to the Howell Nature Center with a promise they would be put in an incubator until they hatched. Center officials have not confirmed that they have the eggs.

"We're hoping they will be OK," Whitehill said.

This past Wednesday, Kmart employee Kelly Folsom was dismantling a pond employees had set up for Henrietta's duck-

lings-to-be. "Yeah, people have been in here looking for her (Henrietta)," said a disappointed Folsom.

Henrietta also had laid some eggs in the Kmart parking lot but abandoned those before sitting on her nest in the garden center, Folsom said.

Kmart employees are hoping Henrietta is ok and has returned to her comrades who hang out along Sheldon Road, north of Ford Road. And, of course, they hope the eggs will hatch according to nature's plan.

Bob Lumadue of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Services in Ann Arbor cautions people from taking eggs of migratory birds, such as mallard ducks. "It's against federal law," he said.

# Near-miss with auto sends biker to ground

A 22-year-old Plymouth man told police he was riding his bike northbound along Main Street about 2:30 p.m. Tuesday when he was injured.

He proceeded across Wing Street when the light was green. As he rode across the street, a large red vehicle traveling eastbound went through a red light, almost striking him.

The man said he had to take evasive action to keep from being hit. He lost control of his bike and went down, injuring his calf. The cut required 15 stitches.

The victim described the driver only as a white male. Police explained the likelihood of further investigation was slim due to a lack of a more detailed description of both the subject and vehicle.

### Committed

An 84-year-old woman was committed to a psychiatric facility after police checked on her at the request of a social services agency.

Plymouth police rang the bell and knocked on the woman's door on Ford Street about 4 p.m. Tuesday.

When she didn't answer the door, officers looked through the windows and noticed the apartment was in total disarray with garbage and food all over the floor, a foot deep in places. Police tried the door and found it was unlocked.

Police called the woman's name, but there was no answer. They entered the apartment and

saw the woman crawling out from the hallway. She then collapsed on the floor. Police called the building inspector, who declared the unit unfit for habitation.

The woman refused to be taken to the hospital. After protective services was contacted, the woman was committed to a psychiatric intervention center in Westland.

### Stereo stolen

A car stereo was reported missing July 5 from a 1991 Cadillac parked on Newporte near Joy in Plymouth Township.

According to the report filed with township police, the car was parked in a car port. The theft, and \$250 in damage as a car window was broken out, were discovered at 2:45 p.m.

with Plymouth's small-town character.

DDA chairman Lee Harrison responded that he and other DDA members were appointed by city commissioners to work on projects including the streetscape.

"If you try to micro-manage this at the commission level, you could end up with the proverbial camel designed by committee," he said.

"I do think the DDA has taken a long and serious look at this. We do need to move ahead. You will be putting this thing off until next year or the next year after. Other towns and malls are moving ahead; we need to do the same," Harrison said.

McAninch suggested that Harrison was asking the commission "to rubber stamp" the DDA plan, adding "shame on you" for not supplying detailed enough plans.

On the traffic study sought by McAninch, Harrison responded,

"It's there."

# 'Burbs find poetry beat

Dig this — poetry-coffeehouse culture has come to white-bread Plymouth.

Last Thursday marked the second session in a weekly summer series of live poetry readings at the Outback Cappuccino Bar on Main Street.

Headed by Plymouth library poet in residence Rod Reinhart, the two-hour sessions bring together experienced writers with the starting-out variety.

While some read from the works of Walt Whitman or Shel Silverstein, most read their own, with lots of encouragement from Reinhart.

"Keep that up; that's really something," he says thoughtfully, as Plymouth Canton High student Amy Furmanek, clutching sheets of paper, bounds off a high-legged stool in the middle of a half-circle of chairs.

Furmanek, 16, won applause from the 15 or so folks showing for the reading. She reads fast, heightening the effect of her first poem, a litany of landscape images. She punctuates the rhythm with an occasional head shake, tossing her bangs.

"Last week there were a lot of people reading politically correct poetry; I have some politically correct poetry," she says wryly, drawing laughter.

Renee Skoglund of Canton was a hit with the group for an earlier short story. Now, she's trying to decide between two other stories she's written.

"One's called 'Death and Resurrection' and the other is titled 'Ovaries,'" she said, sparking laughter.

"OK, 'Ovaries' it is," she says, to more laughter.

Reinhart's laugh booms over the others, and he keeps the proceedings moving with readings from his own work.

"Cass Corridor cadavers cross and re-cross these cold Kerouacian streets," he reads, "mean streets, submarine streets."

Some lean against a wall with eyes closed to listen, others lean

forward with arms crossed. Among those attending is Ken Chance of Plymouth, along with his wife and baby daughter.

"I want to support the activity going on in town, cultural events that are taking place," he said, adding, "I'm glad to see it so well attended."

Skoglund, a free-lance writer, said she found out about the poets coffee house by spotting a sign on Main.

"I hope this does something to change the face of Plymouth; Plymouth needs an update," she said.

Furmanek has brought along friends Scott Chuhnan, Sandra Charnoske and Robert Charnoske. Amy Dobbs, a recent Western Michigan University graduate, reads a funny piece about waiting in lines in college.

It's called, "Waiting for College to Pay Off."

Jeremy McCloud reads his poem, "Gracie's Grill, An Epiphany at Town Square Plaza."

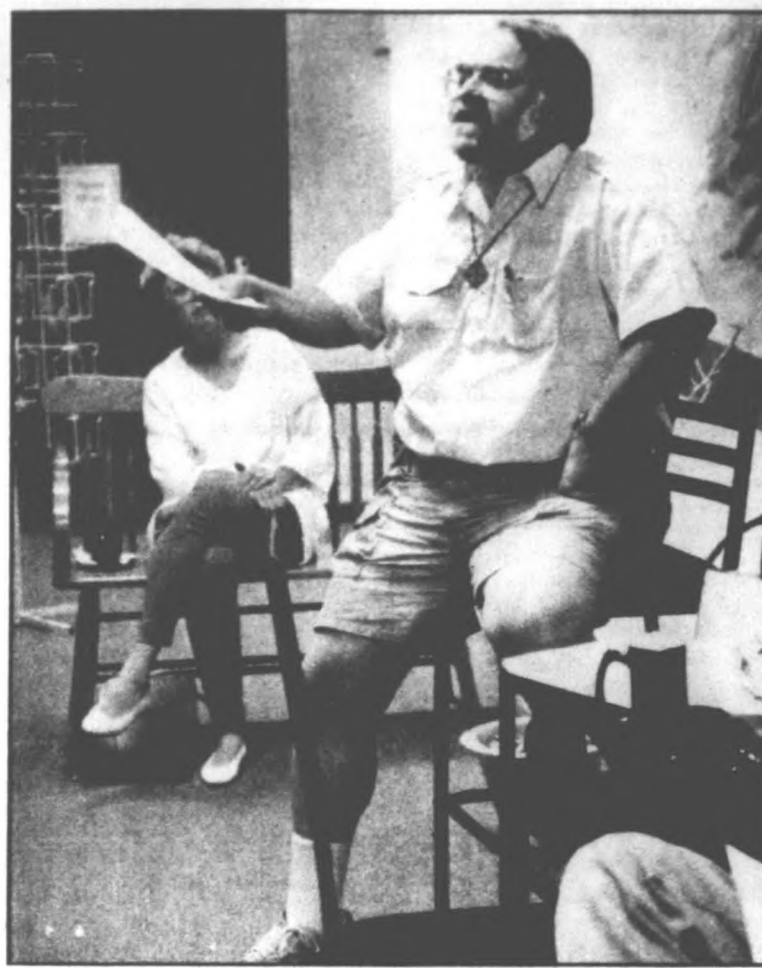
"It functions as a theological shaggy-dog story," explains McCloud.

Derek reads "Oh Captain, My Captain" by Whitman and Jerry Moore of Canton reads some of his own poems — including one he wrote as an Easter card to his girlfriend.

The readings are scheduled from 7-9 p.m. each Thursday through July. A "Poets on a Picnic" is scheduled for noon-3 p.m. Saturday, July 31 at the Plymouth library, and Reinhart wants area residents to enter a "Plymouth: The City of Poetry and Song!" poetry contest. Call 459-7319 for details.

## Myers says politics outweighed education

The Rev. William Myers, former pastor of Canton's Faith Community Church and an unsuccessful candidate for Plymouth-Canton school board, moved to Muskegon last week to accept a position with a Methodist church. Before leaving, he reflected on the campaign and his concerns for Plymouth-Canton Community Schools.

Prior to the election, Myers announced he wouldn't be able to serve his term if elected because of the outstate job he accepted. He finished third in balloting, behind incumbent trustee Dave Artley of Canton and Steve Kilijanczyk, also of Canton. Myers was endorsed by the school district's employee unions until he announced his move.

Myers said it saddened him to see that politics played a bigger role in the election than did genuine concern for educational issues.

Myers described the majority of those who supported Artley "not as educators, but as people who are essentially well-connected politically in the community. Dave is someone who's paid his dues and has been politically loyal, so he was supported," Myers said. Many of Artley's contributors included Canton public officials and Republicans.

### Political support

One of them was Canton Supervisor Tom Yack. "I don't look at it as a negative at all," said Yack of the support Artley received. "It's up to us to find individuals who will make good choices for the citizens. I feel as though in the past, we really haven't worked hard enough to encourage people to become involved in the school board process in Plymouth-Canton Community Schools."

Myers described those who supported his candidacy as "people in the community whom I think are the strongest supporters of education, who care the most about our school district."

Myers considered himself a "reluctant political aspirant" who filed only after Artley and others refused to address what he viewed as the main issues: pushing for passage of the millage, and press-

ing for Superintendent John Hoben to announce his retirement.

Strong allegiances, not only in the schools but elsewhere in the community, trouble Myers. "It's nice to have people with such strong ties, but it almost gets to the point where you're deciding between quality and the degree of connectedness a person has. People go with connectedness in this community. This is what has influenced the school board and the whole administrative process so much," he said.

### Hoben retirement

"Dr. Hoben has been around for a long time and has many connections within the community. He is revered. I don't dislike the man, but this is a time for significant change in public education, and this district needs to go in a new direction. I fear that if public education statewide and nationwide doesn't begin to change soon, we're going to see a voucher system develop that will really put public education in jeopardy."

Declining student achievement also concerns Myers.

"Sixty-eight cents out of every tax dollar goes to Plymouth-Canton schools, but people are demanding more quality and they're demanding more accountability. They want to make sure all kids are given an education so they can become productive members of society. We're beginning to see signs that's not happening with 372 fourth graders that couldn't pass reading on the MEAP test. That's a grave indicator."

"Our philosophy statement for the district says we are preparing our kids to participate in a global economy," said Myers. "How would we know? We don't even know how they're doing nationally (because no standardized national tests are given). What are we going to do with those 372 fourth graders six years from now? Wait and see how they do on the SAT?"

Safety also ranks high on Myers' list for Plymouth-Canton schools. He says he foresees the day a kidnapping could occur. Myers recalled picking up several children at a Canton elementary school recently.

"There was no adult supervi-

sion in the front part of the school. The principal was in the back of the school with the school buses, which is exactly where the principal needs to be. These little kids were walking around. One wandered up to me and said, 'Mister, are you my new bus driver?' Had I been a pedophile, I tell you, that little child would have been in difficult straits."

### Activities missed

It saddens Myers, who has two high school-aged children, that extracurricular activities will be canceled because of the millage failure.

"Co-curricular activities are more important in our district than they are in most schools, simply because you can't belong to a group of 5,000 (the number of students at the high schools)," said Myers. "I will predict this: If we run the school district without extracurriculars, you are going to see gang activity that will surprise the good and proper people of Plymouth and Canton. The bottom line is, kids need somewhere to belong, and there is nothing for young people to do in this community."

Myers summarized his thoughts by saying, "I hope that in future elections, voters would more seriously ask themselves, 'Is what I want to happen being accomplished? Do I agree with this agenda, or do I think my community needs some change?' I think I was a candidate representing change."

## Newman's own face pops up on wall, but McCotter's mug stays out of sight

Paul Newman isn't a Republican Wayne County commissioner from Plymouth, but he masqueraded as one for a day.

The real Republican commissioner from Plymouth, Thaddeus McCotter, is frustrated because there has yet to be a photograph of him placed alongside those of the other 14 commissioners on the wall outside their meeting room downtown.

McCotter surreptitiously slipped Newman's picture in the blank spot on the wall where his

mug is supposed to be. "It sat up there for a day and they took it down," he said. "They said it was making a mockery of the wall."

One of three new commissioners who took office in January, McCotter is the only one without a photo on the wall.

McCotter said he had a couple of other photos taken, but neither measured up to his high standards. "They had two pictures ready for me last week and they were just miserable," he said. "They make me look uglier than I already am."

be \$55,000. Extending media center hours would be a \$38,000 item. Currently, school media centers close when school ends.

Targeted for block grants (which pay for supplies and software in school buildings) would be \$90,000.

The marching band would receive \$10,000.

Board members also agreed to levy something less than 4 mills on winter tax bills if the millage passes and the state doesn't saddle the district with \$3.8 million in new costs. It's anticipated the Legislature will have the district foot the bill for \$2.4 million in employees' Social Security costs and for \$1.4 million in retirement costs.

"If it's less than that, we will levy something less than that," said school board president Roland Thomas. "If they come after us for \$5.2 million, we have the contingency fund to deal with that (if the millage passes)." The total bill for social security and retirement for Plymouth-Canton school employees is \$5.6 million.

The state doesn't pass its budget until October. School districts are required to adopt a budget by July 1.

"If we tie state action to something that happens here, voters will get a better sense of what we are going through here," said trustee Carl Battishill. "It's essential we link it to something the

state does, or they will think we can get by."

Said trustee David Artley: "Between August and September, we have to make clear what will happen if they hit us upside the head. Then the state will be holding the kids hostage." Since its decision to eliminate extracurricular activities, the school board has been accused by some of holding students hostage.

A parent in the audience who said she voted against the millage increase June 14 commended the board.

"What you're doing is laudable," she said. "I'm glad to hear you will be flexible. As a no voter who wants to be convinced, it seems to me you have the kids' best interest at heart. Voters will respond."

Not everyone concurred. Jim Mills, a parent concerned about problems with developmental education in the elementary grades, said, "If you want more enthusiasm, you have to show voters what you are doing is correct."

He said the district's promise to study the situation and report back in August won't do it. "It can't be put off and delayed until after Aug. 17 if you want to get the millage passed," he said.

Betty Block, a parent who worked on the millage campaign, suggested a committee of parents, teachers and administrators be formed to tackle concerns regarding developmental education.

grams would be cut if the request for additional millage failed.

"The follow-up question which asked, 'Do you believe that these programs actually will be cut now that the millage has failed?' was significant in that 31 percent of the respondents answered no, meaning that they didn't believe the cuts would really be made," he said.

More than 80 percent said a reason the millage failed was because property taxes are too high. Nearly 60 percent said school costs are too high. Identified by 54 percent of respondents as a factor was the state's failed effort to reform school financing in the June 2 election with Proposal A as a reason for the tax proposal's loss.

Fifty-one percent of those surveyed said teachers' wages are too high.

Nearly 50 percent said the need for additional millage was poorly communicated by the board of education.

Forty-seven percent of respon-

dents said the schools don't place enough emphasis on basic skills. Forty-five percent said residents pay too many different taxes. Twelve percent identified students being transferred to other schools as having played a role in the millage defeat.

An open-ended question asked why the millage went down. Answers included, "It's the only tax voters can control;" "Taxes are too high;" "The climate is negative. No one will vote yes on anything;" and "Voters don't know the seriousness of the problem and don't value education." The largest number of comments involved taxes.

Respondents also were asked why they thought people voted yes. Answers ranged from, "It's important to have a decent school system in the community;" to "Because they took time to understand it;" "They didn't want to see all the cuts;" and "To help the children. It's where our taxes should be going." Most comments involved children and their need for good education.

The location of polling places still is confusing for one in five voters, Egli said. "The June 2 election also created negative feelings about the additional millage among nearly 54 percent of those responding."

One item anticipated — but not found — in the survey was a correlation between quality schools and property values. "Since this was a campaign theme, it was disappointing to see that it was either not communicated, or not accepted as indicated by the relatively few responses which specified quality," Egli said. "I'm not sure the literature did what we intended it to."

Fifteen percent of respondents acknowledged they don't understand the difference between a bond issue and a millage issue. "People see buildings going up and there's confusion," said Egli. "We have to try to overcome that consistently."

"What I find disturbing," said Trustee Jack Farrow at the school board workshop, "is that more than two-thirds of people don't trust us."

Carol Bollman, an audience member and former school board candidate, said recalling six administrators and 10 teachers two weeks after the millage failed didn't bolster the board's credibility.

Resident Jim Mills said many voters upset because their elementary school-aged children are lacking in basic skills were irritated by campaign literature. "Parents have been trying to point out the problems for years," he said of the "developmentally appropriate practices" being used in the district.

The district is again asking voters for 4 mills in a special election set for Aug. 17.

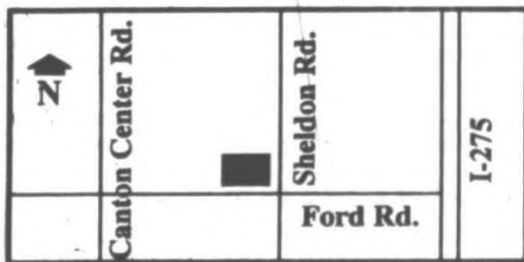

# Area lawmakers split on 'informed consent' bill

Step 3 in Right to Life's effort to curb abortions in Michigan will be taken this week when the state Senate completes work on an "informed consent" bill.

Voters took step 1 in 1988 when they eliminated Medicaid funding for abortions. The Legislature took step 2 later when it required parental or judicial approval for minors' abortions.

Steps 4 and 5 — if taken — would be to outlaw abortions as a state-paid health benefit for state employees and to prohibit abortions in state or local governmental hospitals.

"Today we are told that adult women are too immature, too ignorant, to make decisions about their bodies without the state acting in loco parentis," protested Rep. Maxine Berman, D-Southfield.

"It's not a 24-hour waiting period. It's a 24-hour stalking period," Berman said, referring to the chance clinic watchers would track down women making their first visits to an abortion clinic. "Ironically, last year Michigan passed the nation's toughest stalking law, and we are now declaring open season on pregnant women."

Rep. Jerry Vorva, R-Plymouth, agreed the bill was insulting to women. "When I married my wife, I promised to protect her, and

that includes her constitutional rights," he said.

"It's a reasonable bill," said Barbara Listing, president of Right to Life of Michigan. "It is not going to stop abortions. It is not going to make abortions illegal. It simply is going to provide women with information and the opportunity to make informed choices."

**How they voted**

The House passed Senate Bill 384 on a vote of 62 to 40 and sent it back to the Senate for concur-

rence in amendments. It was the narrowest victory yet for a measure restricting abortion.

The vote came Wednesday evening after an all-day session. Seven of 25 women members present (28 percent) voted yes, as did 54 of the 77 men (70 percent). Ten members missed the vote.

Abortion foes tried for a two-thirds vote (74) to give the bill immediate effect on Gov. John Engler's signature, but came up 12 votes short.

Area members voting yes: Republicans John Jamian of Bloom-

field Township, Greg Kaza of Rochester Hills, and Deborah Whyman of Canton, and Democrat William Keith of Garden City.

Area members voting no: Republicans Lyn Banks of Redford, Penny Crissman of Rochester, Barbara Dobb of Union Lake, Jan Dolan of Farmington Hills, Shirley Johnson of Royal Oak, Jerry Vorva of Plymouth, and Democrat Berman, Justine Barns of Westland.

Absent: Democrat Richard Young of Dearborn Heights.

**Berman wins one**

Berman, the House's staunchest pro choice member, won 60 to 39 approval of one amendment. It would make confidential the name and address of a woman provided information or consent to an abortion.

Local health departments would be required to "destroy the information containing the identity and address of the patient within 30 days after assisting the patient under this section."

In committee, Berman had lost, on a tie vote, an amendment re-

quiring men seeking vasectomies to wait 24 hours and be given a pamphlet detailing its medical risks.

"There is a fetus involved in abortion," countered Rep. Richard Bandstra, R-Grand Rapids, a pro-life voice, "and there isn't with tubal ligation or vasectomies. That's the difference."

In floor debate, Vorva of Plymouth lost an amendment to require the state to compensate women lost wages and transportation costs because of the 24-hour

# Legislator offers bill to prohibit abortion clinic blockades

Michigan legislators are about 60 percent pro-life, but Rep. Maxine Berman is confident a majority will like her bill to prohibit human blockades of abortion clinics.

"This protects the right to protest and the right to abortion," Berman, D-Southfield, told the House Thursday. "Stand up and vote for it, or stand up and vote against it."

Berman said many pro-life members are unhappy about threats by anti-abortion protest-

ers to block entry to abortion clinics in the Detroit area.

The House spent an hour debating procedures on Berman's bill but failed to vote it up or down. It will be on the agenda again Tuesday.

In a test vote, the House Thursday rejected an effort to send the bill to the Judiciary Committee.

Among 27 yes votes: John Jamian, R-Bloomfield Township, Richard Young, D-Deerborn Heights, and Deborah Whyman, R-Canton.

Among 74 no votes: Lyn Banks, R-Redford, Berman,

Penny Crissman, R-Rochester, Barbara Dobb, R-Union Lake, Jan Dolan, R-Farmington Hills, Shirley Johnson, R-Royal Oak, Greg Kaza, R-Rochester Hills, William Keith, D-Garden City, and Jerry Vorva, R-Plymouth.

Among 9 not voting: Justine Barns, D-Westland.

Berman's bill had been reported out of the Civil Rights and Women's Issues Committee, where it had been referred by

Democratic co-Speaker Curtis Hertel of Detroit.

"This bill should have gone to the Judiciary Committee as it always has in the past," said GOP floor leader Richard Bandstra of Grand Rapids. "Even the ACLU (American Civil Liberties Union) has concerns."

Bandstra cited the bill's provision for triple damages and payment of attorney's costs for persons charged with blockading

abortion clinics.

Berman protested vehemently, saying Bandstra felt "Hertel was obviously too ignorant to know where the bill ought to go."

She was joined by Rep. Tom Mathieu, D-Grand Rapids, a co-chair of the Judiciary Committee. "We've gotten away from the pattern of referring bills to committee to kill them. There's absolutely no reason to clog up this committee. We have hundreds of bills

in our committee," said Mathieu.

Vorva, a freshman representing Plymouth, Northville and western Livonia, scoffed at Bandstra's argument that the bill needed legal study. "He's a lawyer, and he knows what these bills mean," said Vorva, a former police officer.

Refer to House Bill 4618 when calling your state representative. A second reading vote is due Tuesday, and final passage Wednesday.

# Mettetal sale sticks in craw of opponents

It's no secret there are plenty of area residents who aren't happy with the state's planned purchase of Mettetal Airport.

"I'm so disappointed. I feel very sorry for the people who worked so hard on this," said Plymouth Township resident Madeline Tracht. "I am so outraged. People do not know the facts."

Bob Zaetta of Concerned Citizens is no happier. "I'm very disappointed. I think the deal was cut-and-dried. I think the deal was made in advance."

Canton resident Mark Merlanti of Concerned Citizens was un-

available for comment Friday.

Tracht and Zaetta were responding to the State Administrative Board's approval July 6 of a state contract to buy Mettetal Airport at Joy and Lilley roads, from the current owners. The administrative board had postponed a decision in June, pending requests for more information.

Bill Gehman, Michigan Aeronautics Commission director, said a purchase agreement for Mettetal should be completed within the week, with a closing scheduled for the next week.

When the state board postponed contract approval, many residents in the Canton-Plymouth area who are opposed to

state ownership thought they had another chance to convince state officials to abandon their plans.

But as Tracht put it: "They (members of the administrative board) only took three questions from each side" before reaching their decision. "They never justified the purchase. They never did a story of why not Willow Run instead."

Both Tracht and Zaetta said they and other concerned residents are not opposed to Mettetal Airport — as a private facility. "It has never been a problem. I'm against the state buying it. We want a freeze on spending. This is another lottery diversion of funds," Tracht said.

If the state has money to buy the airport, that money should be used to improve Detroit Metropolitan Airport and make it safer. "I'm a private individual who is so upset with our government," Tracht said.

The Mettetal sale is not about aviation, Tracht said. "It's about land speculation and some of the good old boys making a profit." He would not elaborate.

In addition to approval of the state contract, officials with the Michigan Department of Transportation and Michigan Aeronautics Commission agreed to four of five amendments to a contract between the state and Canton

Township regarding the airport.

The one amendment not accepted by the state was a request that limits on aircraft be based on their category and group description rather than weight.

That is significant to Zaetta. "That's critical. That tells you they plan to expand the airport. It spells out their plans. Our primary concern is that a larger class of aircraft will use that airport."

To accommodate larger aircraft, a larger runway is needed. Zaetta maintains the Federal Aviation Administration will say the airport isn't safe so the runway must be shifted with pavement added.

"That's why the state has been reluctant to do anything about

parcel 12," Zaetta said, referring to land south of the airport, over which the state wants an air easement. State officials, however, have said previously that there are no plans to expand Mettetal.

Zaetta also maintains that state officials will do nothing with the airport until after the November 1994 election. "They won't do anything to hurt (Gov. John) Engler."

The airport's purchase doesn't spell the demise of Concerned Citizens. Zaetta said a meeting is scheduled for next week. "I can assure you the Concerned Citizens will continue to exist. We see ourselves as a watchdog of government."

**INTERNAL DERANGEMENT OF THE KNEE**

It does not mean that a crazy breakdown occurred to the knee. The knee joint consists of more than bone and cartilage. The articulation includes menisci and ligaments that allow the knee to bend, turn and bear weight in a nimble manner. Internal derangement refers to a tear or fray to one or more of these special structures.

If a meniscus or ligament is damaged, you feel pain both on walking and at rest. Your leg may buckle when you start forward or give way when you arise after seating.

At times the pain and instability of internal derangement resembles osteoarthritis of the knee; making the correct diagnosis between the two conditions is important. Medication may manage osteoarthritis, but internal derangement often requires resurfacing of the torn meniscus, or excision of the frayed segment of a torn ligament.

Arthroscopy is an excellent means of undertaking such repair. As the surgical risk is limited, this procedure is applicable to individuals of all ages and with other medical problems such as lung or heart disease.

The individual with knee pain should not defer medical evaluation. If arthritis is present, your medical doctor can treat it, if the cause is internal derangement, then the orthopedist likely can resolve the problem.

(j) Establishment for sale and consumption on the premises of beverage, food or refreshments.	One (1) for each three (3) persons allowed within the maximum occupancy load as established by the local building/fire code.

Section 2. Section 5.196.3, Business and Commercial Parking Requirement Schedule, of the Zoning Ordinance of the City of Plymouth, is hereby amended by inserting a new subsection (j), and re-lettering existing subsections (j) through (y) to (k) through (x), as follows:

Business & Commercial	Number of Minimum Parking Spaces/Unit of Measure
(j) Delicatessen	One (1) space for each one hundred fifty (150) square feet of usable floor space for food and beverage items purchased and consumed or prepared off-site, plus parking spaces as required for that portion of the delicatessen used for consumption on premises and measured as follows: one (1) space for each three (3) persons allowed within the maximum occupancy load as established by the local building/fire code.

Section 3. Section 5.85, Definitions (C-D), is hereby amended by inserting a new subsection (10), and renumbering existing subsections (10) through (23) to (11) through (23), as follows:

(10) Delicatessen: An establishment where food and beverage items are sold for both off-premises preparation-consumption, carry-out and/or on-premises consumption.

Section 4. Rights and duties which have matured, penalties which have incurred, proceedings which have begun and prosecution for violations of law occurring before the effective date of this ordinance are not affected or abated by this ordinance.

Section 5. Should any section, clause or paragraph of this ordinance be declared by a Court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, the same will not affect the validity of the ordinance as a whole or part thereof other than the part declared invalid.

Section 6. All other ordinances inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance are to the extent of such inconsistencies hereby repealed.

Section 7. This ordinance shall become effective ten (10) days after enactment hereof and after publication hereof.

waiting period.

## What bill says

The bill declares the state "has an interest in protecting women" and the fetus, subject to limitations of the U.S. Constitution. It requires "private, individual counseling," a 24-hour waiting period after receiving abortion information, and written consent.

The physician or assistant must provide:

- The name of the physician performing the procedure.
- An oral description of the probable gestational age of the fetus.
- Information about what to do and whom to contact if medical complications follow.
- Information on how to obtain birth control information.
- A written summary of the abortion procedure.
- A medically accurate description of the fetus.
- A description of the risks of

abortion.

■ A description of the risks of carrying the pregnancy to term.

■ Actual size drawings of a fetus at four-week intervals from the fourth through 28th weeks of gestation. These are to be taken from the Michigan Model for Comprehensive Health Education's sixth grade materials, along with a non-technical written description. (Earlier versions of the bill had required photographs.)

■ A description of physical complications associated with each type of abortion procedure.

■ A warning that "some women may experience depression, feelings of guilt, sleep disturbance, loss of interest in work or sex, or anger," and advice to seek professional help if symptoms persist.

■ Advice about adoption and social services available if she carries the fetus to term.

# Memorial planned for GC's Gundella

Don't expect to call up the spirit of Gundella the Witch at a seance. Only souls who departed life suddenly or with unfinished work are likely to reappear.

"I'm getting everything finished," said Marion Kuclo, the Garden City grandmother who told stories and entertained a generation with experiments in the supernatural while using the stage name Gundella.

Two years ago, she was diagnosed with massive internal cancer, but held on to life with good cheer. "I've been given this time for a reason," she said. "The morphine has killed the pain."

She gave up entertaining publicly as Gundella, wrote books, recorded stories and set up a trust fund for her grandchildren's education. At Easter she took 20 friends to brunch. Then her health rapidly failed.

Marion Kuclo died Saturday, July 10, in her Bridge Street home with her family at her side. She was 63. Her body was cremated.

A memorial service will be held at 2 p.m. Thursday at Garden City's Maplewood Community Center, 31735 Maplewood, west of Merriman and south of Warren, the scene of many of her famed parties.

"Tell people to bring snapshots of her — you know, pictures from parties and the happy times — to share," said daughter Madelyn Mulleague.

Quay story drew her through repeated trips to the scene, county records and interviews with elderly residents.

Her daughters will use her notes to complete the book, also to be published by Thunder Bay Press.

## A green witch

Born in Port Huron and raised in East Tawas, Marion Clark, the daughter of Wilfred and Violet Clark, was taught the pre-Christian religion from ancient Scotland that had been practiced by her great-grandmother, grandmother and mother. Initiated at 18 into a coven, she took the name Gundella and also used it as her stage name.

She said her coven members were the green witches, and she colored her face green for costumed appearances. Green witches are into agriculture, herbs and potions; blue witches study the heavens and astrology; and red witches are into alchemy, she said.

"This really is much older than Christianity. It's not anti-Christian, simply non-Christian. There's nothing in the Christian Bible that conflicts with witchcraft," she said.

## Not black or white

"There's no such thing as black or white magic. Magic is magic."

## Books, tape out

Her "Michigan Haunts and Hauntings," a collection of stories from metropolitan Detroit and across the state, was published last year by Thunder Bay Press of Lansing.

Some of those stories are on an audiotape, "Ghastly, Gruesome, Ghostly Tales," from Ron Rose Productions of Southfield.


A cookbook with more stories than recipes is due to be published soon by Thunder Bay Press. "It's almost an autobiography — the story of my 40 years' cooking," she said.

An earlier collection of short stories, "The Werewolf of Grosse

Pointe and Other Tales," is due for another edition.

Almost finished at her death was a book about Minnie Quay, who died mysteriously in her teens in the 1870s on the shores of Lake Huron — one death certificate said suicide by drowning, another said she died two days later of pneumonia. Mrs. Kuclo stumbled across the story several years ago on a vacation trip to the shoreline town of Forester.

"I felt that Minnie was talking through me, asking me to tell her story," she said as the book and her life drew near their ends. Her most serious and heavily researched work, the Minnie

# Engler signs reform laws at area hospital

Gov. John Engler journeyed to metro Detroit Thursday to sign medical malpractice legislation, plus a series of bills streamlining the licensing and disciplining of health professionals, and one which reduces barriers for small hospitals.

In a ceremony held at William Beaumont Hospital, Royal Oak, Engler signed 11 bills designed to reform Michigan's health care system. He said they would "increase access, reduce costs and maintain high quality."

"I waited 10 years for this," said Sen. Dan DeGrow, R-Port Huron, who was among the lawmakers and medical professionals who attended the bill signing ceremony. "We've all known for years that Michigan's a good state to practice law. Now it can be a good state to practice medicine."

Gerald Robbins, president of the Michigan Osteopathic Society, and a neurologist at Garden City Hospital, said cutting liability costs will help keep young doctors who train in Michigan from moving away.

### Targets lawsuits

The new legislation is aimed at curbing lawsuits against health care personnel — and thus liability insurance costs. It's tied to 11 bills tightening discipline of health care professionals, first introduced in the House by Jamian.

When the House and Senate agreed on each other's amendments, it broke an 11-year deadlock.

The final Senate roll call was 27 to 11, with 20 Republicans and seven Democrats voting yes while nine Democrats and two Republicans voted no.

Voting yes were Republicans Robert Geake of Northville, David Honigman of West Bloom-

field and Democrats William Faust of Westland and George Z. Hart of Dearborn.

Voting no was Jack Faxon, D-Farmington Hills. Two Republicans broke ranks to vote no — Fred Dillingham of Fowlerville, who is nearing a complete separation from the GOP, and Doug Carl of Utica.

### Pollack objects

A last minute hitch developed when Sen. Lana Pollack, D-Ann Arbor, objected to time limits on the ability of women over age 35 to sue for damage to their reproductive systems. The House had added that amendment, and Senate agreement was necessary for final passage.

"The deals have been cut," said a bitter sounding Pollack. "I just wonder where the women were when the deals were cut. Many women over 35 are still having children. Why you discriminate against women over 35 is beyond me." She offered an amendment to remove the suit limits for women over 35.

"Without the amendment," added Democratic gubernatorial hopeful Debbie Stabenow of Lansing, "we do not have responsible medical reform legislation."

"Some of us were born to mothers past 35," said Sen. Jack Faxon, D-Farmington Hills — "35 is not an appropriate line to draw."

Van Regenmorter and sponsor Dan DeGrow, R-Port Huron, pleaded with senators to agree to the House version so that the bill wouldn't be sent to conference committee where the Michigan Trial Lawyers Association, sworn opponents of tort limitation, could tie it up.

DeGrow promised to address Pollack's concern in a separate follow up bill during the fall session.

But Pollack and Stabenow held their ground. "We always hear there will be another bill,"

said Stabenow, "but then we never see it."

"I resent that severely," said DeGrow. "Anytime I ever said there will be a follow up, there was a followup."

But DeGrow, Van Regenmorter and Senate majority leader Dick Posthumus of Alto held up the med mal bill for two hours, won House Speaker Curtis Hertel's agreement to concur in the Pollack amendment, and brought the bill back to the Senate floor.

The Pollack amendment won 37 to 0 approval.

On final passage, however, Pollack and Stabenow voted no anyway.

### Win for GOP

The bill embodies the Republican philosophy of controlling legal costs and rejects the Democratic philosophy of direct price controls on insurance premiums.

The battle in favor was led by outstate senators from both

parties who complained that Michigan's lawsuit happy climate drove physicians out of the state.

The medical malpractice law: ■ Sets \$250,000 caps on "pain and suffering" awards (non-economic damages) for many torts. ■ Restricts "expert" witnesses to those who devote 80 percent of their time to active practice or teaching. It's designed to crack down on non-practicing, out-of-state experts who testify for a living.

■ Restricts attorneys' fees to a smaller percentage of higher awards, giving trial lawyers an incentive to seek astronomical awards.

■ Sets time limits on when suits could be filed on behalf of children.

The licensing/discipline laws: ■ Speed up, the disciplinary process.

■ Create disciplinary subcommittees led by public members that can suspend or revoke licenses or registrations.

## Closing overdue

## School trustee watched growth of Young's career

Like many of my fellow suburban Detroiters, I have some complicated and mixed feelings about Coleman Young. He has influenced my life in some significant ways over the past 30 years.

I first came to know of Coleman Young through the political eyes of Westland State Sen. Bill Faust, who served with Young in the Michigan State Senate. A product of the labor and civil rights movements, Young was the occupant of a safe Detroit seat. He took to Lansing the ability to speak with unquestioned authority about his district and its people.

Faust in the late 1960s had great respect for the legislative abilities of Coleman Young and counted him among his good friends. As an active Democrat and a Faust supporter, I saw Coleman Young as a champion of things that were right and good in a place like Lansing, where such things

were not always valued.

In the early 1970s I finished law school and took a job as a civilian legal adviser to the Detroit Police Department, working closely with then Police Commissioner John F. Nichols (now Oakland County sheriff). When Nichols decided to run for mayor of Detroit, I was an eager recruit and eventually became his campaign manager at the tender, inexperienced age of 28.

We didn't expect to run against Coleman Young, who was a last minute filing in the mayoral race. Instead, we expected the opponent to be Mel Ravitz, whom Nichols saw as an ineffective potential administrator. Young's nomination (Nichols ran first in the primary by a substantial margin) suddenly left us facing an energized and hungry black Detroit electorate.

The 1973 Detroit mayoral election was highly polarized, comparable to the 1969 election in which Roman Gribbs edged out the moderate Richard Austin. But the 1973 results were

reversed and the campaign that preceded it was bitter and divisive.

Coleman Young had learned from the moderate Austin that you didn't win by being nice. Coleman Young's victory left me feeling alienated from a

city for which I had great affection.

I remained an active Democrat and often observed or felt the influence of Coleman Young. He was sometimes a welcome ally — in victories for Jimmy Carter in 1976 and Bill Clinton in 1992. Other times he was a resented poor sport — in his coziness with the Bill Milliken Administration in Lansing and his coolness to Jim Blanchard that may have cost Blanchard the 1990 gubernatorial election.

As a suburban resident, I suffered the inflammatory rhetoric Young often used, even as I recognized this talk was for the benefit of Detroit residents alienated from the suburbs.

Eventually, I came to feel that whatever community pride he created in Detroit wasn't worth the divisions he represented. When he retired I felt it was overdue.

It's interesting to engage in "what ifs." What if kindly and much less threatening Richard Austin had won the 1969 mayoral election to become

the first black mayor of Detroit? Would the Detroit metro area today be a haven of harmony? What if John Nichols had won the 1973 mayoral election? Would black aspirations for power have abated and would white flight from the city have stopped? None of these scenarios is very likely.

Coleman Young's departure, from a suburban standpoint, is a time for reassessment rather than celebration. The mayor's perceived antipathy to the suburbs was too often an excuse for many of us to indulge our worst instincts about the future of race relations. We no longer will have an excuse.

From here on, suburban attitudes toward Detroit and its residents should be based on two things: our own enlightened self interest and our innate understanding of what is right.

The idea here is that anything that shows up on the big screen will eventually play out in real life. The guy's instincts were right, but he missed a crucial fact: Yuppies just don't know how to relax.

I had the same vision as my friend. Volvo driving, Izod wearing people with too much money showing up at the trout streams of Michigan. But they didn't show up.

They were at the Midwestern Fly Fishing Show in Southfield in March, buying the place up. But they weren't in the Upper Peninsula in late June.

There were so few people at my favorite spot that I recruited a Mississippian I met at a bar to go with me. Southern people know much more about drinking Wild Turkey and taking time off to fish than northerners.

The \$900 rod buyers weren't at my favorite spots in the Lower Peninsula either. Like always, once you get 50 feet from a parking lot, you rarely see anybody all day.

The reason is simple. Yea, baby boomers were buying up every fly rod over the price of \$500 they could get their hands on, but chances are they've never had an opportunity to use them. They don't have time.

That's the perspective of a Canton Township professor of recreation at Eastern Michigan University.

In an interview, he told a reporter that young adults are so consumed with buying everything that they have to work too many hours to make the payments. They make payments on boats they never use, and let \$900 can-

fly rods gather dust.

"And even when they do go, they can't let go of the business world. One outdoor writer recently expressed outrage in an article over the use of telephones on trout rivers. It seems that he was fishing near a wannabe upper middle class bozo whose telephone kept ringing.

If it had been me, I would have rang the guy's bell in a different fashion.

The professor's assessment reinforced some of my old beliefs. Never take fishing advice from anybody whose clothes look too good or equipment too new. It's usually the guys with greasy, disreputable clothing with old fly rods who know the most. They've turned down the over time in order to fish.

And anybody driving a Grand Cherokee Limited can be written off the spot. Who in their right mind would drive a \$27,000 car on a two-track forest road where the branches would scrape the paint? Again, the guy with the beat up pickup has the best advice.

As Michigan author John Voelker once wrote: "The best time to go fishing is when you can get away."

And for us baby boomers that's turning out to be never.

## Universities should lead by helping teach change

To lead is to transfigure. But many education professors propound a "research"-based leadership theory which shows scant concern for transfiguring anything — particularly the unequal social conditions which are the root cause of our other problems.

Such "theory" is actually a propagandistic, static model of control. Universities must not promulgate propaganda or the status quo. Instead, they should help us give youngsters knowledge and skills to improve the world.

Any administrative leadership theory which threatens to substitute for experience rather than explicate it isn't genuine theory. Rather, it's mere theorizing: intellectual speculation unanchored in empirical reality. (*Theoria*, in the Greek sense, is a heightened mode of experience whose ideal is an unclouded view of reality.)

While theory may sometimes inform practice, practice must always inform theory. Dependence on esoteric research to train kindergarten through 12th grade principals celebrates the scientific method and gets professors published in journals, but it disregards our desperate need to humanistically transform the kindergarten through 12th grade administrative art.

Battle-proved kindergarten through 12th grade administrators should be brought in to teach full-time in universities regardless of whether they've published a blizzard of papers in journals, and untested or unproved professors should enhance or update their experience by periodically running kindergarten through 12th grade schools.

Administrators need to be humanistic, transfigurative liberationists, dedicated to helping teachers free students' minds and preparing them to solve social problems. Universities that don't support this liberative need render themselves irrelevant.

Our white male power triumvirate of higher education, industry and government proclaims itself egalitarian, but fails to fully free minorities and women. Further, it fails to educate millions of children whose families don't embrace traditional school values. Such failures stem from ingrained practices of oppression, aspects of culture, hard economic facts, college staff who lack kindergarten through 12th grade experience, and college-"certified" kindergarten

through 12th grade officials who play political survival games at kids' expense.

This nation needs more truly transfigurative professors and superintendents and other top-level leaders who will risk their careers to liberate school systems rather than sell out to them, and whose sense of self doesn't depend on memberships and titles. Far from seeking to sustain the existing social scene, leaders like this blast down the barriers established by it. They fight unjust educational conditions wherever they find them, even if they have to be calculatedly insubordinate.

That is why the buzzword "empowerment" represents a radically paradoxical concept. Top-level leaders' power can actually be enhanced by sharing it with school staffs and welcoming divergent views. Were teachers and principals empowered to apply their expertise at kindergarten through 12th grade executive levels of decision-making and university levels of influence, they could reformulate entire school systems.

Rather than perpetuate patterns that stratify us by sex and race and rank, we should design cooperative models to transform traditional processes and relationships. Today's leaders must ask hard moral questions about the institutions they lead. The right answers will transfigure our children's future.

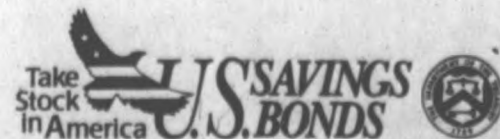

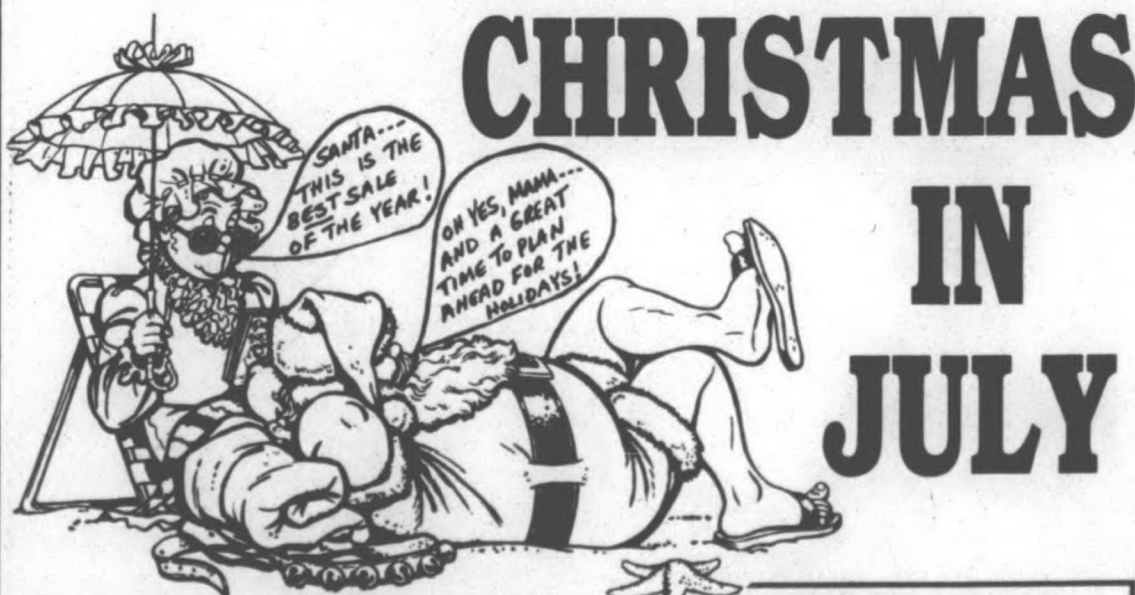

It's power. It can be used in a good way or a bad way," said Gundella, who never cast a curse or even used four-letter words. She abhorred Satanism and kept her distance from satanic cults she knew about.

She believed in life before birth and after death. She was conscious of two previous lives: one in 15th-century England, the other as a black in the pre-Civil War southern United States.

She inherited a love of writing from her mother, an accomplished poet. In her teens, Marion Clark went to work as a printer's devil, a print-shop job description rather than a theological term, for the Iosco County Gazette. There, owner Edna Otis taught her the publishing business from the broom up.

She earned a limited certificate from Central Michigan University, a bachelor's degree from

Wayne State University and later a master's degree from Eastern Michigan University. She left Tawas in the late 1940s to teach in South Rockwood, and later Inkster, for 20 years. She also did a brief stint as a county social worker.

Married twice, she had four children: James Mulleague, a Las Vegas entertainer famed for his Oliver Hardy impersonation; Madelyn Mulleague, a Dearborn postal worker and frequent writing assistant; John Kuclo, an engineer with American Yazaki Corp.; and Veronica Kuclo-Raub, a Garden City environmental activist and member of the city recycling board; and five granddaughters. Also surviving are a brother, Don Clark of Oscoda, and sister, Beatrice Abbott of Tawas City.

## Age of Aquarius

As Gundella, Mrs. Kuclo moon-

lighted as a storyteller for scout groups until 1972 — the dawning of the Age of Aquarius. It spawned an intense interest in the occult, astrology, Tarot cards, tea leaves and the supernatural.

Gundella left teaching and became a full-time lecturer at universities and schools, and an entertainer with Tarot cards and tea leaves at small private parties. Audiences ranged from a Presbyterian church congregation to the Livonia Symphony to the Oakland County Young Republicans. Occasionally there was controversy — as when Wonderland Mall and Plymouth-Canton schools came under religious pressure from conservative churches. The results: immediate jumps in her entertainment bookings.

She wrote two sets of columns for the Observer & Eccentric

Newspapers. The first, in the 1970s, was called "Witch Watch." Tim Richard, who edited it, recalled that she received 400 letters in response to a column on teas and once was asked by a Lovelorn psychiatrist for advice.

The second set, discontinued with her illness in 1991, was on cooking. Keely Wygonik, current editor of the Observer & Eccen-

tric's Taste section, said there were requests for some recipes several years after publication.

Meanwhile, Mrs. Kuclo met four times a year with an Ann Arbor coven with a full complement of 13 members, many of them educators.

Gundella taught that the supernatural is only what cannot yet be understood by science. "Power is

within you," she said, though most people fail to realize they have extrasensory powers.

Her chief regret was that she never traveled to Scotland, the land of her ancestors.

## Search for authentic French cookies ends

My Voice Mailbox has gotten pretty full. Susan Mikarski of Troy requested a recipe for authentic French Gaufrettes, those thin rolled cookies you see stuck in desserts. Mikarski said she searched high and low. I did, too. I searched my files, the library, and even called my old high school French teacher. The good folks at Kitchen Glamour directed me to "Larousse Gastronomique," a French cookbook which supplied the following recipe.

In order to be truly authentic, you will probably want to search out a French Gauffrette iron, but a pizzelle maker should do the trick.

FRENCH GAUFRETTES

- 2 1/4 cups all purpose flour
- 1 generous cup of sugar
- A pinch of salt
- A dash of vanilla, cinnamon and/or orange or lemon zest
- 1 egg white
- Generous 1/2 cup softened butter

Combine all ingredients as listed. Shape the dough into a ball and cook on a pizzelle iron as directed.

Eleanor Graham of Livonia wrote and told me about her red currant bush that is busting forth with a bumper crop of red currants this year.

She went on to say that she has made all kinds of jelly and can't bear the thought of making more so could I please find her some recipes for using fresh red currants? Glad to oblige Eleanor, hope you enjoy the following.

RED CURRANT PIE

- 1 1/2 cups sugar
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 1 quart red currants
- 1 prepared 9-inch pie pastry

Combine the sugar, flour and the currants. Mix and squeeze the currants with the back of the spoon while mixing. Pour into a prepared pie shell and bake at 450 degrees for 10 minutes, then lower the temperature to 350 degrees and cook for 30 minutes or until the crust is golden.

Jeanette Alder of Livonia couldn't wait to try the recipe that appeared several weeks back for a French Strawberry Torte, but couldn't locate white baking chocolate for the recipe. Once again, the folks at Kitchen Glamour in Redford came through with a supply.

Shirley McCullen of Livonia called to say she enjoyed my recent article on soup stocks, but wondered why she occasionally ends up with a cloudy batch of stock. I suggested she lower the heat a bit when making stocks so that everything in the pot is not bouncing around in a furious jumble.

If you're looking for some fun reading and a few great recipes, check out the July 1993 issue of "Gourmet" magazine. Laurie Colwin, a great food writer who passed away last year, has a deposition on "Deserts that Quiver" that is must reading for anyone who cooks and loves Jell-O.

The Janes Gang took a trip to the Eastern Market Saturday, and if you have yet to discover the Vietnamese market on Russell between Bert's Place and the State Street Market, check out their fresh squid, homemade spring rolls, sticky buns and wontons.

An anonymous reader from West Bloomfield called to say he misplaced a recipe for brownies that ran a few years back. I've changed computers since then, so I visited my local library and took a trip through past articles via microfiche and located what was by far one of the best brownie recipes I have ever come across. Here it is.

BLOOM'S BROWNIES

- 16 ounces unsweetened chocolate
- 16 ounces butter
- 7 eggs
- 1 tablespoon plus 1 splash vanilla
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoons cocoa
- 4 cups sugar
- 1/2 cup raspberry jam
- 3 tablespoons raspberry liqueur, optional
- 2 1/2 cups flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder

Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Melt the chocolate and the butter on the top of a double boiler. Line a large cast iron skillet with double layers of foil and lightly grease to prevent brownies from sticking. Using an electric mixer, mix together the eggs, vanilla, salt, cocoa, sugar, jam and liquor.

Fold in butter and chocolate mixture. Sift flour and baking powder into the chocolate mixture and mix well. Pour into the lined cast iron skillet and bake for 60 minutes. Cool in the pan as brownie will rise and fall. Wrap in foil and keep refrigerated. Best eaten at room temperature.

I tried this recipe and found that the brownie needed to cook a little longer than 60 minutes.

Serve rice and noodle pilaf with grilled pork chops and tossed green salad. The vinaigrette with lime juice is a favorite at the Rassel house. Let your kids squeeze the lime.

RICE AND NOODLE PILAF

- 3 tablespoons oil
- 3 ounces fine noodles, uncooked
- 1 1/2 cups rice, uncooked
- 3 cups chicken broth
- freshly ground pepper and salt to taste
- Pine nuts, sunflower seeds, nuts optional

Heat oil in large skillet and add noodles (and nuts, if desired) turning them frequently.

When crisp and browned, add rice, salt and pepper, and 2 cups broth. Cover skillet and cook over low flame 10 minutes.

Add remaining cup of broth, taste and correct seasoning. Cook, covered, until all liquid is absorbed and rice is soft and fluffy, about 25 minutes.

Note: the total cooking time is similar to the total time on directions of rice used. Serves 4-6.

VINAIGRETTE

- 1 small clove garlic, crushed
- 1/2 teaspoon coarse salt
- 1/2 teaspoon Dijon mustard
- juice of one lime
- 1 tablespoon dry vermouth
- 1/2 to 3/4 cup olive oil

Mash garlic with salt in small bowl or jar. Stir in mustard, lime juice and vermouth. Whisk in the oil. Shake or whisk before using. Serves 6 to 8

Serve dressing on a salad of mixed greens. Try mixing red leaf and bibb lettuce. Add sprouts, green onions and red pepper.

MEAT MARINADE

- 1/3 cup olive oil
- 1/3 cup lemon juice
- 1/3 cup wine, whatever is open and on hand
- fresh rosemary sprigs

Put meat in a shallow dish. Cover with marinade. Refrigerate overnight.

summer from Marquette University in Wisconsin.

In the summer, the family gives their grill a good workout. Russel marinates her meats usually with a mixture of oil, lemon juice, wine and fresh herbs. Her meat marinade recipe works well with pork chops or chicken. Use equal portions of lemon juice, oil, and wine.

"You can be real creative with rice and noodle pilaf depending

on the extras," she said. "Add spices, pine nuts, raisins, or dried cherries and you've got something special."

Russel says she's not a dinner planner, but knows how to stock a pantry and refrigerator. Having lots of fresh ingredients on hand is her secret.

She always has a variety of pasta, rice, nuts, dried fruits includ-

ing cherries and cranberries, chopped garlic with oil in a jar, flavored vinegars and oils, tomato sauce, pasta sauce, beef and chicken broth, potatoes, onions and cake and brownie mixes.

In the refrigerator are different kinds of cheese including ricotta, Romano, blue and feta, salsa, yogurt, flavored mustards, yogurt, fresh fruit, vegetables and herbs. She grocery shops about every two

weeks, and stops at whatever market is on her route for the day to buy fruit, vegetables and meat.

"Salsa is great. It's good for dipping vegetables in; add a little mayonnaise and you've got a salad dressing," she said.

Nuts and crumbled feta or blue cheese are added to salads with apples, pears and other fresh and dried fruits. Yogurt is served as a snack or a topping for fruit salads.

lished some 40 years ago. In it we found wonderful sketches of our patron saint, St. Hugo the Abbot of Cluny preparing meals in and about the Stone Chapel.

"So with the help of artist Doris Spanski, we added those sketches illustrated by another Altar Guild member Hope Ruessmann along with a number of additional sketches illustrated by Doris to be the divider pages in the book."

The volunteers and especially the six member executive committee organized the format of the recipes, established a testing

committee and worked with a local printer to design the book.

"We wanted to take the guesswork out of the recipes for the reader," said DiMambro so, we shopped and checked out the recipe ingredients in grocery stores making sure the recipes had the exact sizes for the ingredients listed.

Also an addendum was inserted which recommends substitutions for recipes which called for raw eggs or egg whites.

## CHILLED HUNGARIAN BERRY SOUP

- 1 package (10 to 12 ounce) frozen blueberries, strawberries, or raspberries or use fresh fruit in the same amounts
- ¼ cup sweet Madeira
- 2 containers (8 ounces each) blueberry, strawberry or raspberry yogurt
- 1 container (8 ounces) plain yogurt
- 1 to 4 tablespoons super fine sugar or as needed to taste (optional)

In food processor fitted with metal blade, puree all ingredients, using two or three 30-second churning of motor (scrape work bowl down between churning with rubber spatula).

Pour into stemmed goblets and garnish by floating an orange slice on each portion, adding a mint sprig and a cluster of fresh berries (blueberries look great!). Serves 4 to 6.

## ZUCCHINI CARROT BREAD

- 3 eggs
- 1 cup salad oil
- ¾ cup brown sugar, packed

- 1 cup zucchini, grated and drained
- 1 cup carrots, grated
- 2 teaspoons vanilla
- 2½ cups all-purpose flour
- ½ cup bran cereal
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 3 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 cup chopped nuts

Preheat oven 350 degrees F. Grease well, two 8½ by 4½ loaf pans. In large mixing bowl, beat eggs with oil. Stir in sugar, zucchini, carrots and vanilla. Sift in flour, baking soda, baking powder, salt and cinnamon and blend remaining ingredients into zucchini mixture, adding nuts last. Bake 1 to 1½ hours.

- 1-2 bunches scallions, finely chopped
- 2 large tomatoes, skinned, seeded and diced
- 2 avocados

- hearts, quartered and drained on paper towel
- 1 green pepper, seeded and diced
- 1 4-ounce jar pimento, diced
- ½ seedless cucumber, unpeeled and diced
- 1 cup celery, diced
- 1 1¼-ounce can flat anchovy fillets, chopped
- 1 6-ounce can pitted black olives, halved lengthwise
- 1-2 pounds frozen shrimp, cooked and cooled
- ½ cup olive oil
- 2 tablespoons tarragon wine vinegar
- 1 teaspoon Dijon mustard
- ½ teaspoon dried tarragon
- Salt to taste
- Pepper to taste
- 2-3 hard-cooked eggs, sliced (garnish)
- Parsley or watercress (garnish)

In a large bowl combine rice, scallions and tomatoes. Peel and dice avocados and toss in the lemon juice. Add to rice. Add artichokes, green peppers, pimento, cucumber, celery, anchovies and olives.

Save a few olives for garnish. Halve or chop shrimp if too large. Add to bowl. In small jar with screw top combine oil, vine-

gar, mustard, tarragon, salt and pepper. Toss with salad until well-mixed. Garnish with eggs and watercress. Serves 10 to 12.

## ZUCCHINI SOUP WITH YOGURT AND DILL

- 6 medium zucchini (approximately 2½ pounds)
- 3 tablespoons butter
- 3 cups onions, chopped
- 1 teaspoon garlic, chopped
- 1 cup tomatoes, peeled and chopped
- 3 cups chicken stock
- 2 cups plain yogurt
- ¼ cup fresh dill chopped or 1 tablespoon dried
- Salt to taste
- Pepper to taste
- Tabasco sauce to taste

Wash and trim off ends of zucchini. Cut into ¼-inch pieces. Melt the butter, add the onions and garlic; cook until transparent. Add zucchini and tomatoes, cook for 5 minutes. Add chicken stock and seasonings, simmer for 5 minutes. Cool.

Pour mixture into a food mill or processor and puree. Refrigerate the puree; when cold add yogurt. Serve cold; garnish with fresh dill.

- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 cup egg substitute

To prepare blueberry sauce, in small saucepan, combine cornstarch and 1/4 cup cold water until smooth. Add blueberries; cook over medium heat, stirring frequently, until thickened, about 5 minutes. Stir in sugar substitute; set aside.

Heat non-stick electric griddle or 2 medium non-stick skillets until hot.

In large bowl, combine remaining ingredients until just blended.

Drop batter by 1/2 cup measures onto hot griddle, making 6 hotcakes. Cook until golden brown, about 3 minutes. Carefully turn and cook until other side is golden, about 3 minutes. Serve immediately with blueberry sauce. Makes 2 servings.

Preheat oven to 400 degrees F. Spray twelve 2 1/2-inch non-stick muffin cups with non-stick cooking spray, or line with paper liners; set aside.

In large bowl, whisk together flour, sugar, baking powder, baking soda, and salt; cut in margarine until mixture resembles fine crumbs.

In small bowl, combine yogurt, orange and orange peel until thoroughly blended. Stir in eggs.

Make well in center of flour mixture. Pour in egg mixture and stir until just combined; gently fold in blueberries.

Spoon batter evenly into prepared muffin cups, filling each about two-thirds full. Bake 20 to 25

minutes, until lightly browned and a toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool on rack. Makes 12 servings.

In medium bowl or 4-cup decorative mold, combine gelatin and 2 cups boiling water. Stir until gelatin is completely dissolved; add pineapple, blueberries, and 1 cup cold water. Chill until set, about 4 hours.

In blender, combine remaining ingredients except pecans; blend until smooth.

Unmold gelatin onto serving plate; pour cream cheese mixture over top; sprinkle with pecans. Makes 8 servings.

## Give food processor a whirl

AP — Chefs consider the food processor one of their best kitchen friends. It can be yours, too, if it isn't already. With it, you can chop vegetables, shred cheese or puree a sauce in a fraction of the time it takes to perform these tasks by hand.

Hot foods can be processed in almost all machines, but just check your owner's manual before trying it. Check the temperature of hot soups, cooked vegetables and sauces after they're processed, and, if necessary, reheat the food for a few minutes.

To really take advantage of your food processor, skim recipes for ingredients that need chopping or shredding and try them in the processor. Food processors come in different sizes so you need to know how much food your model can efficiently chop. Keep these tips handy to remind you how much you can process at one time. Trying to process too much at once means some may not get chopped.

See if there is a fill line marked on the processor work bowl (or check your owner's manual).

If an amount is not suggested, pour liquid from a liquid measure to see how much the processor bowl will hold before it overflows at the top or center.

The consistency of a food mixture can affect how much can be processed at one time. Thin mixtures, such as broth, soups or beverages, are easily splattered, so they must be processed in smaller amounts. Generally, you can process about 2 cups of thin liquid at once in a standard processor.

Thick mixtures, such as bread batters, can be processed in larger amounts. Four cups total is the maximum suggested for a standard size processor. This means that bread recipes calling for more than 3 cups of flour must be halved.

For large amounts, you will need to process in several batches to prevent the work bowl from overflowing.

Most processors will handle small amounts of food as well as large amounts. This is helpful if you're working with leftovers or small quantities for special diets or baby food. The actual minimum amount that can be processed varies by brand and model. In some models, the blade sits closer to the bottom of the bowl, which allows the processing of smaller amounts of food.

The processor does not perfectly chop, slice or shred food into pieces exactly the same size. When using the processed ingredients in cooked dishes or mixtures, this doesn't matter. When uniformity counts, you must cut by hand.

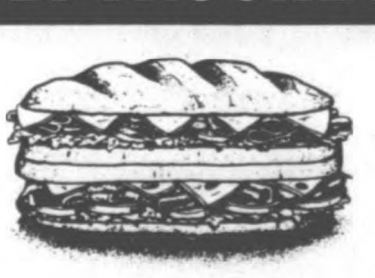

# Expand your pork repertoire

Listen to the sounds of summer: a breeze waiting through leafy branches, birds singing, waves lapping the shoreline — and the sizzle of food on the grill.

Outdoor grilling — and pork — are synonymous with summer.

Cooking over an open flame contributes a wonderful flavor to most foods, and especially to fresh pork. Yet, if you're like most Americans, you find yourself relying on two or three old standards.

It's easy to fall into the habit of always cooking the same things on the grill. Burgers, hot dogs and steaks are grilling classics — and for good reason. But if you want to be a virtuoso of the grill, expand your grilling repertoire.

Start by selecting the main course and build from there. Feeling a bit tentative? Play it safe by introducing a single new dish to a menu of tried-and-true favorites. Try pork burgers on sandwich buns instead of traditional hamburgers, served with two summer favorites — creamy cole slaw and sliced tomatoes vinaigrette. You can also add interest and a variety to your outdoor grilling repertoire with different cuts and shapes of meat.

Marinades and sauces harmonize with foods to create an exciting and exotic array of flavor sensations. F

For example, the tropical flavors of Caribbean pork kabobs, served with green beans with coconut and yellow rice will have family and friends offering accolades.

With a little creativity you can find yourself enjoying rave reviews. Let yourself go on the grill and create a completely original composition. Menu planning can be creative and fun. Use the following guidelines to help spark your artistic vision — and remember, variety is the key to creating a meal that appeals to all the senses.

■ **Color:** Give your eyes a feast. Think of foods that will complement each other on the plate. Contrasting colors are more appetizing than foods of a similar shade. For instance, the contrast of carrot-lime salad and gingered snow peas creates a splash of color and complements the more subtle color of Honey-Garlic grilled chops.

■ **Form:** Don't serve too many similar shapes or too many small pieces. Leave some foods whole and serve others sliced, cubed, shredded or cut into other interesting shapes and sizes.

■ **Flavor:** Complement tart or spicy foods with something bland or neutral. Usually plan only one highly seasoned food item per menu. So rice is a good foil for the stronger seasonings in Caribbean pork kabobs.

■ **Temperature:** Include a variety of temperatures. Hot, cold and room temperature foods make a good combination.

■ **Texture:** Combine a variety of textures in your menu. Serve soft or creamy foods with crisp or crunchy ones. Everything crunchy is too much.

If you want to make a claim to being a grilling maestro, you definitely need to master the two most basic grilling methods — indirect and direct heat.

■ **Indirect:** In this method, food is cooked by hot air circulating around the food, similar to the way your oven works. Simply position food away from the coals by banking the coals on one side of the grill; or in a ring around the outer perimeter of the grill bed. This method is ideal for larger cuts of meat, such as roasts and thick pork chops. Indirect heat allows you to cook meat without burning the surface.

■ **Direct.** This quick, high-heat method is best for grilling small pieces of tender meat, such as kabobs, sate, shrimp, scallops and ground meats such as sausage and burgers. Similar to broiling, direct heat is applied to the food being cooked.

Whether you are a master or beginner, anyone can put in a virtuoso performance when it comes to outdoor cooking.

### PORK BURGERS

- 1 pound lean ground pork
- Seasoned pepper to taste
- 4 large soft sandwich buns

Divide pork into four portions and shape into patties about 1/4-inch thick, handling meat as little as possible. Sprinkle both sides of patties with seasoned pepper. Grill over direct heat over medium-hot fire 5 minutes per side, turning once. Serve immediately on buns with favorite condiments. Serves 4.

### CARIBBEAN PORK KABOBS

- 1 pound pork tenderloin, cut into 1-inch cubes
- 1/2 cup orange juice
- 1/4 cup lime juice
- 2 tablespoons brown sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon thyme
- 1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1/8 teaspoon ground cayenne pepper

**Barbecue pork:** With a little imagination, you can orchestrate a symphony of exciting colors, textures and flavors to please the most demanding critics. Instead of hamburgers, try ground pork. Or experiment with different marinades on your favorite pork kabobs.

Combine all ingredients in a self-sealing plastic bag; seal bag and refrigerate 2-24 hours. Remove cubes from marinade; discarding leftover marinade.

Thread cubes evenly onto four skewers (if using wooden skewers,

soak them in water for an hour before using to prevent burning). Grill over hot coals 10-12 minutes, turning often, until nicely browned. Serve with hot rice and kabobs of grilled fruit and pepper chunks, if desired. Serves 4.

## Make burgers special

AP — It's easy to make ordinary burgers a special tasty treat, and one that's low-fat, too. Italian turkey burgers are flavored with Parmesan cheese and Italian herbs. The burgers are made moist by mixing in some plain low-fat yogurt to the patty mixture. Yogurt makes the meat juicy and helps distribute the seasonings evenly throughout the patties.

### ITALIAN TURKEY BURGERS

- 1 pound ground turkey
- 1/2 cup finely chopped onion
- 1/2 cup plain low-fat yogurt
- 1/4 cup unseasoned dry bread crumbs
- 3 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese

- 2 tablespoons ketchup
- 1 teaspoon Italian seasoning, crushed
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper

Prepare outdoor grill or preheat broiler. In a large bowl, mix just until combined, the turkey, onion, yogurt, bread crumbs, cheese, ketchup, Italian seasoning, salt and black pepper. Shape into six patties. Place on a grill or broiler pan 4 to 5 inches from heat; cook, turning once, until turkey is no longer pink in the center, about 5 minutes per side. If desired, serve on warm buns with tomatoes, lettuce and shredded mozzarella cheese. Makes 6 servings.

### POTATO PANCAKES

- 2 cups fresh grated potatoes (about 4 medium)
- 1 1/2 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- 1 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 2 carrots, grated
- 1 small onion, grated
- 1 egg, beaten
- 4 tablespoons oil

potatoes with flour, salt, grated carrots, onion and egg. Mix well. In a large skillet, heat oil until hot. Using a spoon, drop about 1/4 cup of potato mixture into a mound in the skillet. Repeat with remaining mixture.

Lower heat to medium and with the back of a spatula, flatten the potato pancakes. Cook, over medium heat for 3 minutes. Flip and continue cooking for 4 minutes. Cover and reduce heat to a simmer. Cook for 5 minutes.

Serve with apple sauce, if desired. Makes about 4 good sized pancakes.

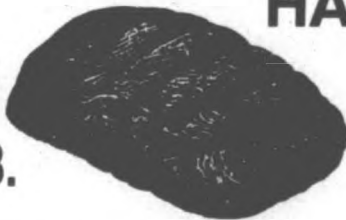

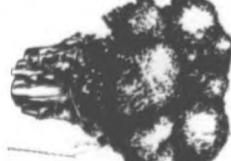

# These fast foods won't shortchange your health

Hectic lifestyles makes it very tempting to plan dinner around a bucket of chicken, a bag of burgers or a frozen boxed dinner. Fast foods can dent the budget and may shortchange you nutritionally. Most families are "into" lighter meals, easier preparation of foods, and faster cleanup. Time-consuming cooking (other than holidays) has really passed its prime. "Foods fast" as opposed to "fast foods" may be the perfect solution.

"Foods fast" preparation does not mean defrost and cook a frozen TV dinner or open a box, instead, use your imagination! The key to quick and easy nutritious meals is organization. Start by planning menus. Think about how much time you have for preparation, cooking and cleanup.

### Stocked kitchen

Have a well stocked kitchen of

food staples, the basics, such as flour, sugar, rice, shortening and pasta so you can immediately put together a meal. Always have some "no cook" foods handy. These are canned fish, canned vegetables and fruits, for a hot or cold meal. Streamline shopping by planning ahead for several meals and do the shopping all at one time.

Look at what convenience appliances you may have in your kitchen. The biggest time-saver is a microwave, the cooking time is cut in half or more. "Meal in a peel," a baked potato with meat, vegetables, and cheese on the top can be a very quick and nutritious meal from the microwave and certainly less expensive than the fast food restaurant. There is very little cleanup with microwave cooking because you can cook on the serving dish.

### Quick cooking

Leftovers can be made into your own TV dinners and popped into the microwave for a quick meal with more imagination and more nutrition than the pur-

chased kind. Stir frying is an easy way to cook quickly. Use a wok or a skillet to stir-fry chicken, beef, pork, other meats or seafood. The meat should be fully cooked, but all the vegetables are better if still crunchy. Lemon juice or herbs sprinkled on these will eliminate salt and bring out the good flavor of the vegetables.

Crock pots are great for long, slow cooking in the summer or winter. (They add only minimal heat to the kitchen). Let the crock pot cook all day and when you arrive home the soup/stew is ready. Serve bread and a piece of fruit and you have a nutritious meal in minutes! Since a crock pot makes a larger batch, freeze some for another time. Tough meats cooked in liquid with a slow cooking method can make them very tender.

Food processors and blenders make chopping, peeling, slicing, shredding, pureeing easier and quicker. Do extra for the next time so you are preparing two or more meals at own time. One mess, one cleanup. Broiling and stove top cooking

are usually faster than one item oven cooking. Do several things at the same time. If the oven is set on 400, in 30 minutes you can have meat pie, biscuit roll-ups, pasties, baked salmon, scalloped potatoes, cobbler, baked apples, and muffins. If the oven is set on 375, in one hour you can have meat loaf, casseroles, spanish rice, stuffed peppers, baked potatoes, upside-down cake, and gingerbread.

If the oven is on, make two roasts at the same time, use one and freeze the other. Remember when you double a recipe you only clean the kitchen once! A freezer can really be helpful for a quick meal by offering convenience and flexibility to meal planning.

Freeze foods in containers you can use in the microwave or oven. You do not have to wait to thaw them out — just pop in the oven.

Other helpful suggestions are: Shorten the cooking time by cutting ingredients in small pieces. So what if the spaghetti isn't 12 inches long! Recipes that call for water: Use boiling water or very hot water. A flat baking dish cooks faster than a regular casserole dish, for instance, use a cake pan for a casserole. Bake on the garnishes to save time. Just before baking, press nut meats or fruit gently into bread, cake and cookie batters.

Make individual portions as opposed to one large (for example, individual meat loaves instead of

one large). Look for recipes that are one dish meals or casseroles. Foods heat faster if they start out at room temperature. This does not mean leaving the food to sit out on the counter all day. Instead, when you arrive home, take the food out of the refrigerator, let it sit for 20-30 minutes, then cook.

You still may be tempted to turn into the first fast food place you pass on the way home, so make nutritious choices. Whether it be fast foods or making foods fast, remember the key is moderation and variety for good eating and good health.

## Tips to prevent moldy food

How do you know if it's OK to use that moldy piece of cheese you found in the back of the refrigerator? "This is a very common question for the staff of the Food and Nutrition Hotline in Oakland County," said home economist Sylvia Treitman.

"The best advice we can give about moldy food is to save only hard or firm foods with only minor mold and to discard soft or liquid foods," she said.

Small amounts of mold on cheese can be removed carefully

with a sharp knife by cutting away at least one inch around the moldy spot. Keep the knife or instrument out of the mold itself so as not to contaminate the remaining fresh cheese.

Prevention is really the best advice for mold growth. Here are some tips to help prevent the growth of mold on foods.

■ Clean the inside of your refrigerator every few months with 1 tablespoon baking soda dissolved in a quart of water.

■ Rinse well with clear water and dry.

■ Scrub visible mold (usually black) on rubber casings with 3 tablespoons bleach in quart of water.

■ Check food at grocery for mold before purchasing — many times it may have mold at the store and you unknowingly buy it moldy.

■ Keep opened cans or containers of food in the refrigerator covered and use up promptly.

If you aren't sure if an item that has mold on it is OK to use — call the Food and Nutrition Hotline, 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

## Artist crafts story without end

Joel Mesnikoff sculpts interlocking clay vessels and invented implements to provoke viewers into creating a narrative based on their experiences.

Mesnikoff exhibits his stimulating work as part of "New Generation: the first annual graduate exhibition," through July 19 at Habatat/Shaw Gallery, 32255 Northwestern Hwy., Suite 25, Farmington Hills.

"I like how minimal they are and the way they implement works within the vessel. They're very strong pieces," said gallery director Jeff Guido in reference to work from Mesnikoff's latest series, "Implements in Basins."

"One looks at Joel's work and questions what the purpose is. There's an obvious reference to tools."

Black basins cradle implements that look as if they were inherent to the labors of an ancient civilization. The vessels' roughly textured exteriors enhance the crudeness of the implied task.

"I'm interested in objects that speak about the hand. You see the handle; the tools are incomplete as themselves. They call on the viewer to find a use. In doing so they create a story," Mesnikoff said in an interview at the gallery.

"Ultimately I'd like the work to conjure up some sort of narrative: 'Oh, you could use it for this. You could use it for that.' That's when I feel like I'm successful, when they lead a person to speculate about what they are."

According to the Cranbrook Academy of Art graduate student, viewers of the work have ventured guesses that range from devil's tools to cooking utensils.

Mesnikoff's sculpture addresses the relationship of two separate elements coming together to form a whole: a specific tool designed for a particular space in which it carries out a task.

"My work draws on the tradition of objects created for a specific use," said the Bloomfield Hills resident.

Initially his work drew on architectural details and organic forms. The most recent series, begun in December, evolved from concerns discussed with Tony Hepburn, chairman of the ceramics department at Cranbrook. Hepburn asked if Mesnikoff had ever considered working in two parts.

"I took it as a challenge to create sculpture in two parts, the tool or implement and the basin. I'm interested in this place," Mesnikoff said, pointing to the black basin, "where an implement carries out a specific function like a Phillips-head screwdriver, for example. It's entirely specific. It only fits in this certain location, nowhere else. It's a discrete relationship."

Mesnikoff uses this relationship as a vehicle for investigation. He believes it is appropriate to craft invented implements that speak about hand labor in an age in which we are so thoroughly dependent on sophisticated machines which dominate our lives. "Our notions of progress are drawn into question in a world in which the mechanisms created to serve and protect us may also threaten our existence," Mesnikoff said.

From a historical perspective, he thinks machines created during the industrial age to provide goods for the masses enslaved dangerous workers in boring, repetitious and often dangerous tasks.

"For me personally my work speaks about the labor of my forebears, a labor of necessity," Mesnikoff said. "I feel I've tapped into something that I could spend my life working on, working and reflecting on what I've made."

Born and raised in New York, Mesnikoff has had an on-again, off-again relationship with clay for 22 years but questioned whether a career as an artist working with the material was feasible. The turning point for him came during two years of intense studies at the Kansas City Art Institute, where he worked under artists like George Tsimon.

Mesnikoff has a bachelor of art degree from Rutgers University, a bachelor of fine art degree from Kansas City Art Institute, a master's degree in ceramics and a master's degree in art education from Columbia University's Teachers College.

## Stinson finds fine 'replacement'

After more than 10 years as sideman to Paul Westerberg, fellow ex-Replacement Tommy Stinson is finally learning what it's like to be a frontman. He's formed Bash & Pop and now he's taking his own talent show on the road.

"It does feel good doing something that I created and started," said Stinson with his "one too many cigarettes" voice.

It may feel good but he admits it was harder than he imagined to record Bash & Pop's debut, "Friday Night Is Killing Me."

"It got hard right around the time we made the record. It was a lot more work than I thought," he said.

But now that the album's been released, Stinson is ready to relax on tour.

### STREET BEATS

"Now the fun's sort of kicked in. I get to do the stuff I like to do - play live and writin' songs," he explained.

Bash & Pop is currently on its second tour. (The band will play St. Andrew's Hall on Wednesday, July 14.) This time around, Bash & Pop is gigging with a new lineup. Aside from Stinson and drummer Steve Foley, Bash & Pop now includes bassist Janis Tamaka and lead guitarist Max Butler.

Stinson recruited the two new members after the first leg of Bash & Pop's tour was uncomfortable.

"It just didn't feel like a band. It felt like me, Steve, and a few other guys," said Stinson from his Madison, Wis., stop.

So Stinson and Foley decided to go back to Los Angeles and "take the dice and just roll them." Along with getting veteran West Coast musicians, Stinson got something else - new inspiration.

"It's Janis' first tour. She's having a ball. It's like having a little sister on tour. She saw her first cornfield - not that that's all exciting, but you know what I mean. It takes me back to when I first on the road," he said.

For the 26-year-old Stinson, that was about 10 years ago. At age 13, he started young with the Replacements - and trouble.

"I was starting to get at an age when I started doing bad things... I was heading toward stealing. I was lucky that I ended up with some sort of a career or lifelong interest," he said.

His mother, who sometimes sees his shows, was grateful too.

"My mother was real supportive. She saw things (get) better with me (after joining the Replacements). She's a pretty happy mom," he said.

As for the Replacements, the band is committed to do three more albums to its label, Warner Bros./Sire records. Westerberg's album "14 Songs" counted as one of those.

"Paul's album gets to count as one, but mine doesn't. I didn't have a lawyer at the time," he said.

# Improv troupe sees life's humor

Doctor. Wife. Mother. Student. Homemaker. Stand-up comic. Leader of her own improvisational comedy troupe.

These are a few of the many hats worn by Dr. Cynthia Shelby-Lane, a woman who possesses boundless energy.

"I sleep and eat every other day," Shelby-Lane said during a rare break. "I slept yesterday. Today is my eating day."

By night, you will find Shelby-Lane at one of three hospitals where she works the midnight shift in the emergency room. At Detroit's Sinai and Riverview Hospitals or Pontiac's North Oakland Medical Center, the doctor deals with a gamut of medical problems from stabbings and gunshots to heart attacks and strokes.

By day, you may find her at the mall buying the latest video game cartridge for her three children or perhaps jetting to Chicago for continuing classes in improvisational technique for The Second City. Sometimes she'll fly to Los Angeles to gather more hours toward her degree in motion picture and television production at the UCLA film school.

Some evenings the past three years, the busy doctor has appeared on stage at local comedy clubs, trying out material on open-mike nights. But her true comedic love is the improv troupe she formed two years ago.

"I was too scared to do comedy alone, so I decided to get a group around me," Shelby-Lane said.

Known as Girlfriend Village &

Co., the troupe features a mix of black and white, male and female members and focuses on learning to deal with life through laughter and humor. Shelby-Lane draws on her Second City training, passes it on to her cast, and creates a show that would be familiar to fans of sketch-oriented shows such as "Saturday Night Live" or "In Living Color." The group first performed in 1991 at 1515 Broadway in Detroit. While the cast has changed often during the past two years, the focus remains the same — keep it edgy and funny while never doing the same show twice.

"I started with a group of mostly comedians, and now I've got a group of mostly actors and actresses," Shelby-Lane said.

Currently doing shows at Ferndale's Magic Bag Theatre, Girlfriend Village & Co. does sketches that focus on current events, including local news. Detroit mayo-

ral candidate Dennis Archer and the Baby Jessica adoption battle were lampooned in a recent performance. Shelby-Lane's personal favorite involved her dressed up as Tina Turner, complete with blonde wig and barely there dress accentuating the legs.

"We were belting out 'Proud Mary,'" Shelby-Lane recalled, "and Steve Mitchell (a Detroit comedian) comes up to me playing Ike. He said he came to apologize for hitting me, but Tina and Ike end up arguing over how many times. The scene fades to black with everyone coming to blows."

"The show is good, clean fun, except for a few three- or four-letter words."

The talented doctor does not foresee leaving the medical profession. But working with an improv troupe and developing various film projects simultaneously could tip the balance someday.

"I try to be the best doctor I can be," Shelby-Lane said. "I knew in my heart when I was in college that I wanted to take care of people. Another part of my heart wanted to be on stage. I'm doing this (Girlfriend Village & Co.) because it's what I love to do. Some of the stuff I've learned here, I think actually makes me a better doctor. Laughter is crucial to your soul and your well-being."

Brad Vander Ark attributes his brother's growth to drummer Don Brown.

"Brian's been working with Don for a while. I think that has something to do with it. Don's extremely talented... He's inspired Brian."

# Art collector recalls real-life 'Matinee'

In "Matinee," released on video last week, John Goodman plays a horror movie producer/director who blows into a Florida town to premiere his big-budget epic "Mant." He wires the local theater with gizmos that bring the movie to life.

Dan Gruschuck, a long-time art and pop culture collector, recognized the obvious tribute to William Castle, the '50s and '60s filmmaker known for his wild gimmicks. As a kid, Gruschuck was a card-carrying member of the William Castle Fan Club and has scrapbooks to prove it.

Gruschuck, flipping through yellowing pages in his Detroit home, hadn't looked at this stuff for more than 20 years. But he'll never forget the midnight "world screamers" of Castle films at the Broadway Capitol, the downtown Detroit theater later known as the Grand Circus.

"I liked Castle's films especially because they were the scariest, but they were funny too," Gruschuck remembered. "All the great scary movies have humor in them. You have to have a little release from the tension."

Gruschuck was 14 years old on Tuesday, Aug. 4, 1959, when he saw the "world screamer" of "The Tingler," probably the best of the Castle films. In it, Vincent Price plays a doctor who discovers a large, slug-like organism that

attaches to your spine when you're really scared.

Price theorizes that you get a little tingle up your spine right before the creature snaps your back. Screaming your lungs out is the only way to destroy it. At one point, the film appears to break and the Tingler, crawling shadow-puppet-style across the screen, is loose in the theater.

Just in case the tingle didn't occur naturally, Castle rigged many of the seats with mild shock buzzers. He called this gimmick "Percepto."

He also gave each audience member an insurance policy (just in case he died of fright) and a penny-sized plastic disc. The instructions read: "As long as the magic disc glows in the dark, you are safe from the Tingler."

Of course, the little plastic disk stopped glowing about 20 minutes into the picture.

Castle arrived personally to rig the seats for the midnight "screamers." He mingled with the fans, many dressed up in monster costumes, during the "Tingler's Ball," which started at 10 p.m. Radio personality Dick Osgood also made a personal appearance.

The newspaper ads read, "Bring your date and watch her tingle."

Was Gruschuck dressed up like a vampire or wolfman that night? "I was lucky just to be there," he said. "My mom was really good about taking me to these things and all the Creature from the Black Lagoon movies."

A few months previous, Gruschuck had seen his first Castle film, "The House on Haunted Hill," also starring Vincent Price. "The gimmick at the Broadway Capitol that night was 'Emergo,' which had flying plastic skeletons ride on pulleys over the heads of the audience," Gruschuck remembered.

When Castle arrived in Detroit, his plane would be greeted by a hundred adoring kids, many dressed as monsters. The public relations gimmick, which usually ended up in the newspapers, was orchestrated by the Castle Fan Club as shown in a blue-inked

mimeographed letter.

"Be there with the rest of the spooks," the letter read, alerting young horror fans that chartered buses would take them from the theater to the Willow Run Airport.

Castle marked the end of his horror reign with "13 Ghosts" in 1960 (though he did go on to produce "Rosemary's Baby" later in the decade). The haunted house movie was over-the-top and jokey, but it still had a few chills. The gimmick, called "Illusion-O," used a "Ghost Viewer," which provided a 3-D effect when the spirits made their appearances.

For fans such as Gruschuck, who grew up in the '50s, "Matinee" brought his hero back into the limelight. The Castle cult continues when "The Tingler" appears with horror movie host The Ghoul at Ferndale's Magic Bag Theatre on July 31.

Gruschuck will be there, this time without his mother. He will be in the lobby with his scrapbooks and copies of those old "Tingler" insurance policies. He'll be looking for others who remember Detroit's "world screamers."

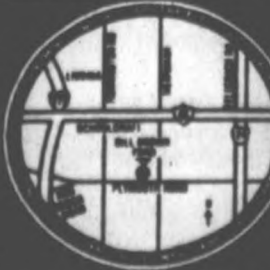

## Gerish basement loaded with sports memorabilia

**B**ruce Gerish has his own corner of sports history right in his own home.

It's Cooperstown, Canton and Springfield all rolled into one room.

Gerish, who played baseball and basketball at Plymouth Salem High and later pitched for Alma College, has amassed one of the most unique sports collections in western Wayne County.

His Northville home is filled with sticks, shoes, gloves, cards, programs, ticket stubs, bats, jerseys and balls, not to mention autographs of many of sport's most noted legends.

Here's a sample of his collectibles: Payne Stewart's golf spikes, Adam Oates' skates, the netting from Fenway Park's green monster, an Arnold Palmer original putter, a wooden seat from Tiger Stadium, an Olympia Stadium brick, an autographed photo from Red Auerbach, a hockey stick from Mario LeMieux, Gordie Howe's jersey and an autographed basketball by all the Lakers (including Magic and Kareem).

"All I want to have here is a piece of history, I really don't want to sell it," Gerish said. "I'd like to get ahold of a (authentic) Michigan football helmet some day. Alan Trammell's glove is also something I'm interested in obtaining. I have his bat. I understand he's quite a collector, too."

And not to be outdone, Gerish stages an annual Legends Hall of Fame induction ceremony.

## An entertaining MC

The gregarious Gerish, who stands 6-feet-5, is of course the master of ceremonies, coordinates the ballot process and designates the nominees.

Some may remember him doing stand-up comedy at local nightclubs, or as a regular during the morning drive on the Dick Puritan radio show (he does a mean Coleman Young imitation). He's also part sandlot baseball coach and father of two while moonlighting as a manufacturers rep (his real job).

The main wall of his sports shrine is now adorned with the jersey numbers with his local heroes.

A former inductee, Ron Egloff, No. 85, made it back from Denver. Donned in a tuxedo, the former Salem, University of Wisconsin and Bronco tight end was in town for his high school reunion.

This year's group of inductees covered a wide spectrum of local sports legends:

■ Tim Dillon, No. 24, quarterbacked Salem to the mythical 1974 state football title before going on to play at Miami "where he backed up Jim Kelly," Gerish panned.

Dillon, actually played defensive back as a walk-on at Miami of Ohio (not Florida).

■ Bill Fillmore, No. 13 (not to be confused with Wilt Chamberlain), where he starred in three sports at Sanford Meridian before going on to Alma College.

"Bill and his wife Kathy earned a total of 23 college letters, 22 by Kathy," cracked Gerish.

■ Brian Gilles, No. 1, ex-Salem baseball coach and standout athlete at Plymouth High during the '60s. Gilles made the U.S. Slo-pitch Softball Association All-World team (Snyder's and Choo-Choo Car Wash) four straight years.

"Brian popularized such sayings as 'in the wheelhouse' and 'that ball was jacked,'" Gerish said. "His two favorite pitchers were Brian Wolcott and 'Johnny Wholestaff.'"

■ Rich Hewlett, No. 2, former Salem standout (1979) who started at quarterback as a freshman for Michigan against Ohio State.

Nicknamed "The Deuce," Hewlett is now an attorney in Detroit. Hewlett's day was not complete without a letter of congratulations from Michigan head coach Gary Moeller.

## An Art-filled room

As for special inductees, Gerish honored his father Art, a builder who once played baseball at Central Michigan. Art's battery-mate at Mackenzie High School in Detroit was TV-50 sportscaster Ray Lane.

Jim Tucker, a former three-sport star at Garden City West, was not in attendance, but will join the wall of fame under the moniker (HWT). The ex-wrestler went unbeaten his senior year before a referee disallowed him to continue with a broken ankle.

"Jim's childhood heroes are Bobo Brazil and Ernie 'The Cat' Ladd," Gerish quipped.

Gerish also announced next year's inductees. "We had 96 this year on the ballot," he said. "The list continues to grow. There were some tough choices."

Former Michigan gridders Bob Thornbladh and Rob Lytle are next up, along with Gerish's wife Jennifer, and baseball coaches Bill Klenk (Alma College) and Bob Attkins (Redford Union and Adray Appliance).

The ceremonies will also include another legend by the name of Churchill, not the high school or Sir Winston, but a guy named Brian.

## SC officials explore semi-pro deal



Professional soccer may be expanding to a suburban site. The Windsor Wheels of the Canadian League are entertaining thoughts of putting a U.S. Interregional League team in Observerland.

Is semi-pro soccer coming soon to Livonia?

The possibility is being explored by a co-owner of the Windsor Wheels with an official from Schoolcraft College.

Antonio Soave, a resident of Troy and one of three partners with the Wheels of the Canadian National Soccer League, met Saturday afternoon with an assistant dean at Schoolcraft. The discussion was held during the Wolverine 14 youth soccer tournament.

The two parties were scheduled to launch preliminary discussions about housing a team in the U.S. Interregional Soccer League, an 8-year-old semi-professional outdoor circuit with 48 teams throughout the south and southwest.

The Detroit News reported Friday that Soave is interested in finding a suburban location to play games in the new Midwest Division, which may also include franchise bids from Cincinnati, Minneapolis, Toledo, Cleveland, St. Louis, Chicago and Milwaukee.

Soave, who could not be reached for

comment on Friday, was quoted in the News as saying: "We're negotiating with Schoolcraft College. They're interested in building a soccer stadium."

Soave said he is also looking into such areas as Rochester Hills, Troy and the Pontiac Silverdome.

"I'm surprised he (Soave) made it public regarding Schoolcraft College," said Midge Carleton, Schoolcraft's assistant dean for allied health, physical sciences and athletics. "He called Thursday and asked me to talk to him regarding the possibility of accommodating a team at Schoolcraft College. I set up a meeting to hear his proposal. That's all it is — period."

Schoolcraft has a home soccer field with a few bleachers. It does not have an enclosed stadium.

"It's not a negotiating session,"

Carleton said. "It's strictly a fact-finding meeting. There's no commitment, no criteria on the table. I just need to listen and take back what I hear to our executive administrators."

League play in the USISL begins next May. As many as 16 new franchises are expected to be awarded next month.

Schoolcraft Athletic Director Marty Nowak and men's soccer coach Van Dimitriou were unaware discussions were under way as of Friday.

"It would be nice, that would be my dream to have a soccer stadium here," Dimitriou said.

Nowak, meanwhile, said "I have not heard a word about it."

The USISL's aim is to develop local youth soccer players with few imports. Salaries are low, on a par with Class A or rookie league minor league baseball players.

## Walter's pursues playoffs

Walter's Appliance kept its Livonia Collegiate Baseball League playoff hopes alive Wednesday with a 10-3 victory over Del-Wal at Ford Field.

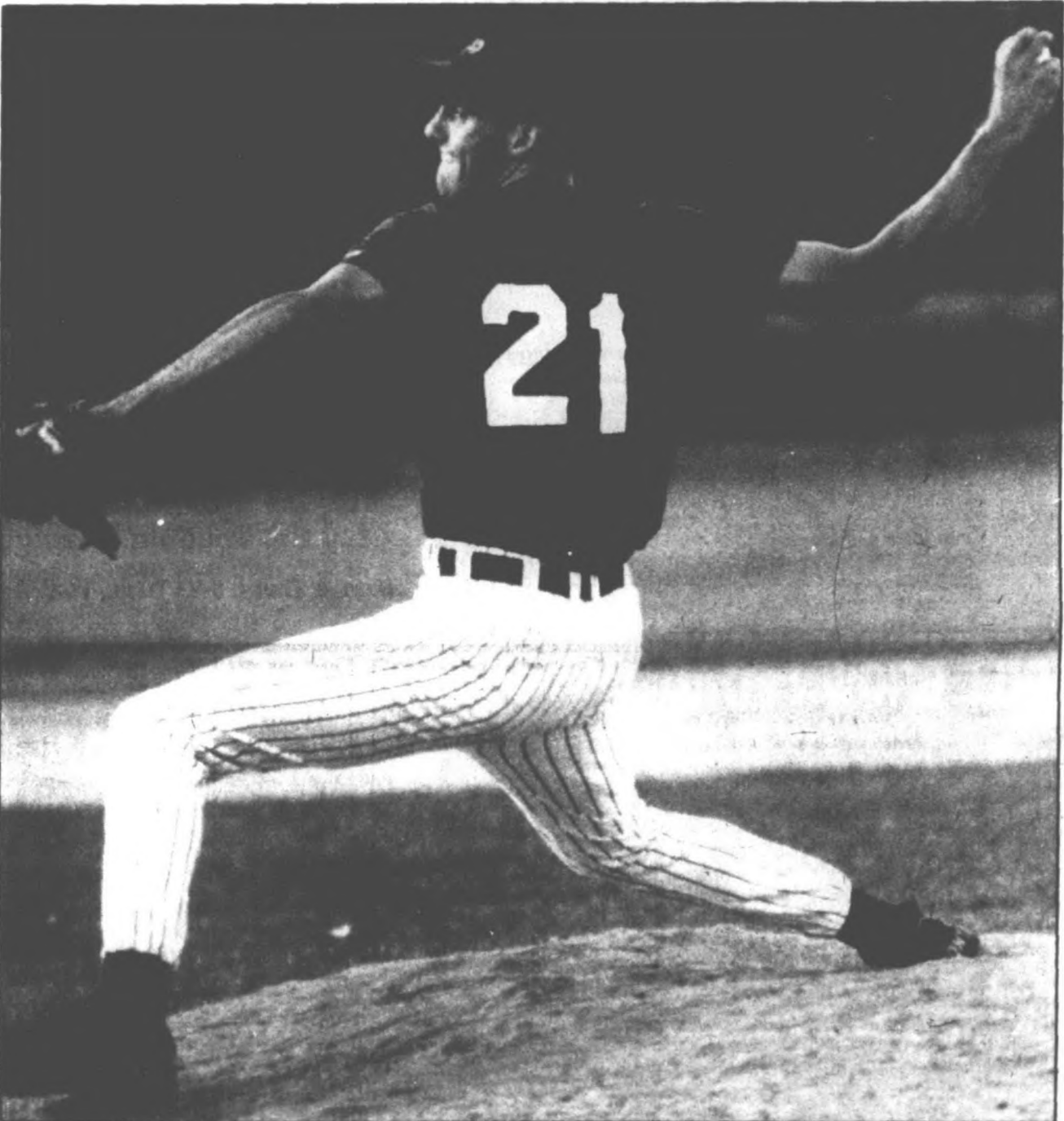

goals-against average last season, and Phil Oaser of Livonia.

Another Livonia native is forward Dustin Kuk, the team's leading scorer last season. Area defensemen include Scott Curtin of Redford, Westland's Dwayne McGowan and Mike Porter of Plymouth. The trio were primarily stay-at-home defensemen, although McGowan also possesses a strong shot from the point.

Brown preaches a team-oriented, defensive-minded style of play. He's so dedicated to the team concept that he was reluctant to even name his leading scorer.

"Our team's philosophy is, not a lot of all-stars," Brown explained. "It's just a lot of good, solid hockey players. And we play very, very good team play. We backcheck exceptionally well. But it all starts in the offensive zone. When we put the puck in the zone we forecheck a certain way. A lot of people are against what I do. But we create chances in the zone. When the puck's turned over to us, that's when we get our goals."

When Brown said that some people are "against" his style, he means that many prefer a more wide-open, offensive game. But he defends his team's style strongly, sounding like a lower-key version of TV commentator Don Cherry.

Brown said the wide-open game "is not our style. Our style is, instead of creating great plays going into the zone, we put the puck in and have the other team turn the puck over to us. And then we create chances from there."

Although the team is physical, Brown noted that "we don't take a lot of penalties."

Barry Tigay, David's father, said the team made "a very intense commitment. These kids play pretty much all year round. They play from four-to-six days a week. They attend hockey school and camps all summer."

This fall, the team will move up to the Bantam Major ranks, for 14- and 15-year-olds, although it's too early to know how many of last year's players will continue to skate for Brown's squad, which will be sponsored by Computware. In the long run, however, most of the players have the same goal — a college scholarship.



# Ocelots announce women's hoop recruits

The dark age has ended. Or so Schoolcraft College women's basketball coach Jack Grenan believes. Three-straight lackluster seasons, during which the Lady Ocelots struggled to reach .500, were difficult to accept for a program used to dominating its conference.

But that's in the past. Grenan foresees a bright future for SC, a return to the top. In a four-season span starting in 1984-85, the Ocelots finished either first or second. Since then, it's been a struggle to reach the Eastern Conference's upper division. Last season, SC was 11-14 overall, 4-10 in the conference, barely qualifying for the post-season tournament.

That will change, he vowed. "We should, by the end of the

season, be playing for a spot in the first division, instead of just trying to qualify for the playoffs."

The reason for such confidence? "This is the best recruiting class I've had in my 10 years here," Grenan answered. "It compares to the years when we were finishing first or second."

Gone from last year's team are Dana Hudson, the leading scorer who will attend Slippery Rock; Lori Murphy, headed for South Dakota State; and Michelle Ernst, Jen Audet and Jamie Alex. Audet and Alex both suffered season-ending knee injuries. Alex has a year of eligibility, but is still in rehabilitation.

**Recruits bolster returnees**

Returning are three key players: 5-foot-11 center Alisa Wechter,

who averaged 16 points and 11 rebounds a game last season; point guard Becky Piotruchowski, who started coming on midway through the season and finished with a 14-point average; and Angie Cerne, a 10-points-per-game scorer and one of the first substitutes.

Chris Nichols, who played early last season before a knee problem sidelined her, may also return.

That's not a bad foundation for optimism. Grenan's recruits, six of them so far, have inflated hopes further.

The biggest on the list is Julie Klos, from Dearborn Edsel Ford. She's just 5-10, but has bulk that's difficult to move. "You can't move her out of the post," said Grenan. "If she sets a blind pick, the opposing player won't get up off the floor." Klos aver-

aged 12 points, 10 boards a game as a senior and was all-Northwest Suburban League three-straight years.

Grenan improved the team's depth at point guard by signing Dawn Newlin, from Dearborn Heights Anapolis, and Cindy Nuha, from Walled Lake Central. Both are 5-5, both can shoot from three-point range, and both are quick. Newlin was twice all-Tri-River League; she averaged 13 points a game as a senior and was her team's MVP. Nuha was all-Lakes Division.

More, they can play together. "They can find each other and they can see the whole court," said Grenan. "And they do all the little things."

**More options**

Another shooter who should

help immediately is Shelly Sockow, a 5-8 guard from Plymouth Salem. Sockow was her team's most improved player last season, averaging nearly 10 points a game. She, too, has three-point range.

Two forwards who only lack experience are Jodi Graham, from Livonia Clarenceville, and Jennifer Walker, from Howell. Grenan called Graham, at 5-10, a "strong player who will develop. She has the ability, the speed, the strength and the intelligence. All she needs is experience." Graham played just one year at Clarenceville.

Walker, at 5-11, has long arms that enabled her to set a school record for blocked shots.

Grenan likes the depth the recruits will add, but mostly he likes the improved play he should

get in the pivot. Teams with strong inside players have dominated the league; when SC was winning, it had players like Sharon Miller, who went on to star for University of Detroit, and Barb Krug, from Plymouth Canton.

With Wechter returning and the addition of Klos, Graham and Walker, SC's inside play should be much improved. Also, with the outside shooting of Piotruchowski and newcomers Newlin, Nuha and Sockow, "No one's going to play one against us. If they do, it'll be a short game."

It all adds up to better balance. "It's nice as a coach to come in and not start the season looking for Band-aids to cover up weaknesses," said Grenan.

The options provided by the new recruits should allow SC to dictate tempo and style. It should put a few more wins on the board, too.

Which will brighten the SC picture considerably.

## Finesse runner-up in tourney

The road to respectability — and perhaps national recognition — can lead to some out-of-the-way locations. Like Milford, Ohio (a suburb of Cincinnati) or Shepherdsville, Kentucky.

That's where the Finesse under-16 girls slow-pitch softball team spent the last two weekends. On its trip to Milford for the Smokey Baker USSSA National Invitational Tournament, during the extended holiday weekend, Finesse took Stroker's of Cincinnati to the limit before falling 11-2 in the July 5 final.

Finesse opened the tournament

July 3 with wins over Connersville (Ind.), 6-1, and Touch of Class (Dayton, Ohio), 8-7, before losing 4-3 to Stroker's. **Hussey to coach Franklin boys**

Livonia Franklin athletic director Dan Freeman went out and hired a "name coach" to fill his boys soccer vacancy.

Mary Kay Hussey, who played on two state championship teams and coached Livonia Stevenson to the 1990 state Class A girls title, was tabbed to replace Frantz Lamarre as the Patriots' coach.

Hussey, who has compiled a 68-18-8 overall record with the Spartan girls in five years, is the second area woman to take over a boys prep program. (Cathy Cole-Kanaman coached both the Farmington boys and girls teams at one time.)

Freeman reviewed seven applicants, but narrowed his choice down to three candidates.

"We had some decent people apply, but Mary Kay has been there before," Freeman said. "She's worked in Olympic Development boys programs. She has the right perspective in place and knows what we're looking for in a high school program, which is different than a club program."

"She's very competitive and can teach the game, but she also

understands the purpose of high school athletics."

Hussey, an all-state striker with Stevenson from 1983-85, coached the Spartans to the 1990 Class A crown. She's also won three districts, two regionals, one Western Lakes Activities Association crown and two Lakes Division titles.

She takes over a Franklin team which finished 13-3-3 overall (best in school history). The Patriots won the Western Division of the WLAA and tied Farmington in the first-place crossover game.

Lamarre's contract was not renewed last winter by Franklin administrators after he failed to fulfill off-season obligations as coach. In five seasons, Lamarre posted an overall record of 40-31-10.

"I guess you could say I'm heavily involved in soccer, but even more involved at the high school level," Hussey said. "I'm not totally familiar with the history of Franklin soccer, but I know they're hard-working kids who do their best across the board in all sports."

Hussey admits there will be a transition period this fall.

"Coaching boys will be something different for me," she said, "but the game is basically the same."

"Like any new program, I'm sure there will be some adjustments along the way. I'm sure the gender thing will come up, but once we get past that, it should be business as usual."

Freeman said that "initially some players may be surprised" at Hussey's hiring.

"I would be lying if that didn't weigh heavily," the Franklin athletic director said. "But she had so many pieces that fit into our program. Being female won't hold her back at all."

"As far as I'm concerned, she can still play and teach the game. I'm sure there will be some hurdles, but I feel she'll be able to command respect. Being female should not make any difference. I coached girls basketball (at Franklin) and I don't see really any difference."

"We're looking forward to her bringing in her expertise."

Hussey, 26, is currently working on a college degree in health and physical education. She plans to student teach this fall in the Livonia Public Schools.

# What cable was made for: Network TV hits summer slump

Though it is not so solemn as death or taxes, there is something inevitable about television: reruns. Viewers who've been attending night school or reading bedtime stories to freshly bathed children for the last few years may consider reruns a godsend, but to most of the nation's 95 million TV-owning households, they're a bore.

This summer seems especially bad. For the last few years, Fox has been proud to get out ahead of the fall-season pack with new episodes of "Beverly Hills, 90210," or even a new series — last summer it was "Melrose Place." But in the dog days of 1993, even once-cagey Fox has gone into hibernation.

The loss of "Late Night With David Letterman" is another blow. Sorry, night owls, Dave is in reruns on NBC until his reincarnation Aug. 30 on CBS.

Yes, the pickings are slim indeed. CBS has introduced a couple of summer series, of which "Johnny Bago," the saga of a Brooklynite on the lam in a recreational vehicle, is the best.

But things couldn't be so bad that

somebody would haul out an old Richard Chamberlain miniseries, could they? Think again.

On Sunday, July 18, ABC launches an encore presentation of "The Thorn Birds." It is the third time the network has aired the 10-hour 1983 miniseries, which has also been seen in syndication on local independent channels around the country.

For those who may not know, "The Thorn Birds" features Chamberlain as an ambitious, young Roman Catholic priest in Australia whose secret love for a beautiful woman (Rachel Ward) keeps things interesting for three generations. The production earned six Emmys, including one for Barbara Stanwyck, who played a strong-willed rancher reminiscent of her Wild West matriarch from "Big Valley" days. Earl Holliman, Ken Howard, Richard Kiley, Piper Laurie, Christopher Plummer, Jean Simmons and Mare Winningham also star.

ABC will use "The Thorn Birds" to fill the chinks in a thin summer schedule, airing the miniseries in a record six parts this week. To catch the whole soapy saga, viewers will

have to tune in (or set their VCRs) every night except Friday, July 23.

Ten years ago, when "The Thorn Birds" debuted, ratings were good. Since then, two things have changed — 60 percent of all homes have cable TV, and 70 percent have VCRs — and it will be interesting to see whether "The Thorn Birds" can score double-digit ratings against such hefty living-room competition.

Among the week's other choices are several made-for-cable movies. Showtime brings out "Chantilly Lace," a film by and about women, on Sunday. Jill Eikenberry, JoBeth Williams, Talia Shire and Ally Sheedy star as friends who come together for three reunions within a year's time. Also on Sunday, The Disney Channel brings out a new, four-hour adaptation of "Heidi," featuring Jason Robards as the grandfather, Jane Seymour as the governess and newcomer Noley Thornton in the title role. Filmed on location in the Austrian Alps, "Heidi" concludes Monday, July 19.

On Thursday, July 22, basic cable offers a choice of the first-run films. On Lifetime, Robert Urich reprises his "Spenser: For Hire" role in "Spenser: Ceremony." Avery Brooks ("Star Trek: Deep Space Nine") co-stars as Spenser's streetwise ally, Hawk. On the USA Network, Gregory Harrison plays a hunky yet struggling actor who finds a new love at work and \$10 million in his bank account in "Caught in the Act."

As for the networks, well, it's a good thing there's so much to do outdoors in the summertime.
