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# Teachers agree to pay freeze



Plymouth-Canton teachers voted to freeze their salaries, postponing a raise for one year, paving the way to bring back 30 of 42 teachers laid off following the defeat of a 4-mill property tax increase.

Plymouth-Canton teachers approved a one-year pay freeze to bring back 30 of the 42 laid-off teachers. "It passed a little less than 2:1," said union president Chuck Portelli. In addition to the pay freeze, the agreement includes several other provisions.

"I think teachers understood what we told them on Monday," Portelli said. "They've chosen to underwrite the district by rehiring the 30 teachers." Tom Cotner, the teachers' chief negotiator, said teachers were resigned to the situation at hand.

"Ordinarily when we get an agreement there's jubilation," Cotner said. "And this time it was more like resignation than jubilation. Some of the attention now can go toward class size and some of the other problems, instead of the focus on what teachers make." Cotner said he hoped people will recognize that teachers yielded "in a time of need," and it will be considered during the next contract negotiations. School board president Roland Thomas said: "I am absolutely de-

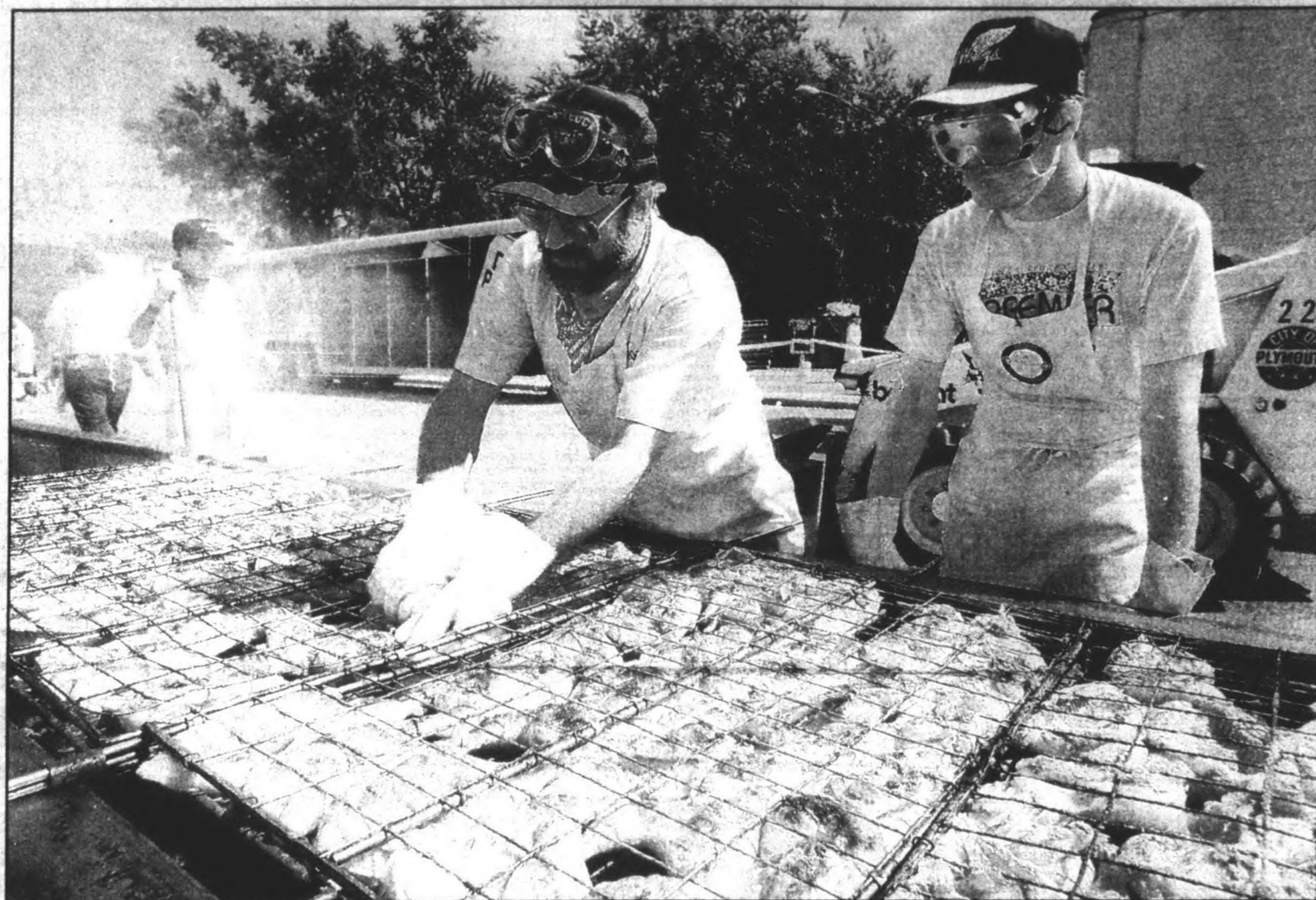
lighted and pleased that our teachers voted so positively to try and do the kinds of things we have to do for kids."

The board was to ratify the contract this weekend, Thomas said.

The wage concessions were sought by a coalition of booster clubs following the voter rejection of a 4-mill property tax increase Aug. 17. Voters in June rejected the same tax increase.

# New entertainment falls into festival

Last year, Plymouth Fall Festival goers said they wanted some new entertainment, and festival organizers are coming through.

But the 38th festival will include plenty of traditional features: food booths, activity booths, craft shows and more Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

Some schools groups —

cheerleaders, pompon girls and the band — were not scheduled because schools officials said earlier they wouldn't be available if the school millage failed.

It failed, and festival organizers were able to schedule others to perform.

"We went out and good entertainment, everything, is on go and confirmed," said Joe Bida, festival publicity chairman.

"Just pray for good weather," he said.

Also new this year is an area off of Penniman set up by McAuley Health Center to promote bike safety, strolling musicians in Kellogg Park, and an antique car show featuring 50-60 cars on Main Street between Church and Fralick on Sunday.

Main food events are the Kiwanis pancake breakfast Saturday morn-

ing and the Rotary chicken barbecue on Sunday.

While there has traditionally been a food event Saturday evening, last year's event didn't do well, so there won't be such a dinner available this year.

Comments from fall fest goers last year revealed karaoke on Saturday evening was a big hit, and karaoke

# State aid bill gives school district 6-percent increase

Plymouth-Canton Community Schools will see a 6-percent increase in state funding this year under the K-12 education budget approved by the Legislature.

The \$3.5-billion spending plan marks the last property tax-based school aid budget as lawmakers continue to examine fair and affordable alternatives to support public educa-

tion, according to state Rep. Deborah Whyman.

"After a summer of tough fiscal negotiations, the failure of Proposal A, and an unprecedented \$6-billion property-tax cut, I am pleased we were able to deliver a responsible funding bill," said Whyman, a member of the House Education Committee.

"The flexibility and commitment

by legislators to regroup and present local school officials with concrete funding totals was crucial to getting the new school year under way. I would have liked quicker results, but I am confident the needs of area schools will be met."

A special House Republican work group is exploring ways to restructure education and guarantee quality. Three other committees are studying

how to establish different funding alternatives, implement cost containment measures, and alter the tax system to assist in financing schools.

Whyman said she is certain the restructured school financing system will offer more equitable and stable forms of support, and is optimistic legislators will have a plan by year's end.

# Cable regulations spark static

The 1992 Cable Act will bring down cable rates for some Omnicon Cable subscribers in Canton and Plymouth — but it could also result in higher rates for others, and in the loss of one or more broadcast channels.

As of Sept. 1, Omnicon will be using adjusted cable rates for its customers. The new rates, according to Omnicon general manager Lisa Boland, will mean reduced bills for some customers.

"The rates are coming down just a little bit," Boland said. Rates for "customers with a lower level of service who need a converter box will go up."

The shift in rates is due to the Cable Act's mandate that cable companies' charges reflect the actual cost of a service; before the act, companies could keep the

price of basic service artificially low by shifting its cost onto additional services, such as remote controls.

But if the service is cheaper, it may also be less comprehensive; the Cable Act also allows commercial broadcasters the right to demand or deny their programming to cable TV. Four local broadcasters, representing the four major networks, have decided to deny their programming to Omnicon unless certain conditions are met: WJBK-2, WDIV-4, WXYZ-7, and WKBD-50. Omnicon has until Oct. 6 to sign an agreement with the broadcast stations.

But two of those four stations said they don't want cable customers to have to pay anything. Representatives from WXYZ and WKBD said they want service, rather than money, in exchange

for the use of their broadcast signals.

Tom Griesdorn, general manager of WXYZ, said the station is right to ask for some form of compensation for the use of its product.

"We're asking for a recognition of the value of our signal," Griesdorn said. "They have never compensated local station for the right to use the signal, which is what 70 percent of the people watch."

That "compensation," however, is not necessarily monetary, Griesdorn said. He is asking Omnicon for the use of its facilities, including the company's mailing list for cable subscribers.

Subscribers needn't worry about extra charges for WKBD, either, according to Paul Prange, program manager for the station. Instead, as part of a national Fox

network plan, the station is asking that, in exchange for the right to broadcast Fox, Omnicon agree to carry a new Fox-owned cable channel when it debuts in the spring.

"What we're all trying to do is benefit the consumers," Prange said.

Prange added that while WKBD will get no cash from Omnicon, Omnicon will have to pay Fox for the right to carry the new cable channel.

Omnicon Cablevision covers Plymouth, Canton, and Northville. Plymouth city manager Steve Walters said local governments currently have no jurisdiction over cable disputes.

"We will take the role which the federal government allows us to have, but nobody seems to know quite what that is," Walters said.

# Jobless rates rise

Jobless rates rose slightly in Canton, the City of Plymouth and Plymouth Township in July due to seasonal influences, the Michigan Employment Security Commission recently reported.

Yet jobless rates were down from levels reported a year ago.

In the city of Plymouth, the jobless rate was 2.4 percent in July, up from 2.2 percent in June but down from 3.2 percent reported in July 1992.

In Plymouth Township, the July unemployment rate was 3 percent, up from 2.7 percent in

June but down from 3.9 percent reported in July 1992.

Employment dropped in most labor markets around the state as temporary layoffs occurred in local auto industry facilities and as schools and colleges entered the summer vacation period.

"Seasonal job losses offset many of the normal employment gains in other industries such as construction, food and kindred products, amusements, hotels, eating and drinking establishments and real estate," said P. Robert Edwards, MESC director.

# Task force challenges gang activity

Parents would be legally responsible for their child's gang-related activities, according to a proposal submitted by a community task force on gangs, made up of Canton police, Plymouth Township and Plymouth, school officials and social service agencies.

The committee has devised a strategy for dealing with gang activities that include creating a task force to centralize information about gang activity; and continue community education that include social service agencies who are trying to educate families about gang information and will coordinate referrals.

Task force members agreed that sharing information and keeping each other informed would go a long way toward pre-

venting and controlling gang-related activities despite dwindling social service resources in many agencies due to budget cuts.

The task force is expected to meet again in late September to consider further action on the strategy and to fine-tune the responsibilities of each community agency.

The community wide task force was formed this summer after incidents attributed to gang activity surfaced in Canton Commons, an apartment complex on Haggerty Road.

Management at Canton Commons Apartments are taking an active role to clean and spruce up the complex on Haggerty Road, while Canton Police and residents at the complex are busy organizing a Neighborhood Watch group

to monitor future problems.

All over grown areas of high grass and weeds are being cut, the fence along the west side of the complex has been repaired and graffiti is being cleaned off walls; playground equipment and the pavilion.

Lighting is also being enhanced around the complex and residents are being encouraged to leave house lights on from dusk to dawn. Canton officials are also encouraging the complex to consider improved landscaping throughout the complex.

Canton Commons management is working closely with the township to respond to complaints, and have copies of complex rules to all residents to increase awareness and step-up enforcement.

Meanwhile, various other town-

ship departments and community groups are getting involved in activities at Canton Commons in areas residents believe involve gang-related activities.

Canton personnel are reviewing the 9-year-old summer camp program run by the Salvation Army to see if it can be improved. Inspectors will work with management to ensure the property is kept up.

Canton police will continue to monitor the Neighborhood Watch program. Police also are studying how their Explorers scouts can get involved in a mentor program.

Also, the Canton's Women's Forum is looking at programs for positive role modeling for residents, and various social service agencies are stepping up efforts as well.

# Boosters hire director

A Toledo musician, David Tippitt, has been hired by the Centennial Educational Marching Band to serve as band leader.

Tippitt worked with the Glassman Drum and Bugle Corps and as a freelance professional trumpet player. Tippitt also played lead trumpet with the Buddy Rich Band.

Most of his pay will be covered by the music booster club, according to Jim Vassallo, Band Booster president. However, a small stipend also will be paid by the school district, he said.

Tippitt replaces Dave McGrath, who left the district

when the Aug. 17 4-mill tax increase proposal was rejected by voters in the Plymouth-Canton district. He worked in the job about two months and would have been offered a position as music teacher and marching band director if the millage passed.

Vassallo credited a strong booster group with being able to cover the costs of Tippitt's pay.

"It's probably the largest, most powerful booster organization in the country," Vassallo said. "We get between 150 to 200 booster parents at each meeting every other month."

# Talented/gifted program shuttle to keep on trucking

A shuttle service for students in the Talented and Gifted program will continue despite concerns that it was going to be taken away in a round of budget cuts.

"We'll provide the busing without a charge," said Superintendent John Hoben.

He added, however, the district must find a way to pay for the service.

"We're still spending money that we don't have," Hoben said.

Reading from a legal opinion, Hoben said the service couldn't be offered without providing transportation, which costs the district about \$25,000.

Agreeing with Hoben's recommendation, board member Dean Swartzwelder said if the service was discontinued families could take their cases to court.

"I would, too," Swartzwelder said, adding that the amount of money the district likely would spend in legal fees would far outweigh the cost to provide the service.

Parents of TAG students are relieved the shuttle will run. John Kownacki, a TAG parent, said "I'm extremely pleased. Since busing was provided for all the private schools in the area and since this was an educational program, it was necessary for our children to be bused."

He said parents received a lot of information, supporting their efforts to maintain the shuttle, from State Rep. Deborah Whyman regarding the issue.

"I'm glad they got it passed," said Dick Haar, a parent of a

TAG student.

"With my work schedule and her (his wife's) work schedule we didn't know how we were going to get my son to school. I didn't think they could bus 90 percent of the kids and not bus the TAG kids. I know they have to cut money, but that wasn't fair at all."

He added, too, that he knows of at least one student in the TAG program who dropped out, because there wasn't going to be busing available and there was no other means of transportation.

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**A SPRAINED KNEE**  
What is a "sprained" knee?  
In medical vocabulary, a "sprain" refers to a ligament that is stretched or torn. With a "sprained" knee, you develop a painful and limping gait. Usually you can relate the onset to a particular move such as a twisting action when bowling or to a fall that resulted in an awkward tumble.  
The knee includes four ligaments, two menisci, the patellar tendon anteriorly, and 3 hamstring muscles posteriorly. Any of these structures alone or in combination can undergo a stretch or disruption of their fibers. The result is pain, also swelling, if irritation to the joint followed from the incident.  
The features of this injury is that neither rest nor activity help relieve your discomfort, that certain positions, particularly sitting with your leg straight out, relieve but do not end the pain, and that going downstairs is more difficult than walking up.  
Your worst annoyance may be at a site different from the injury. Other muscles may spasm in an effort to relieve stress, but the effect is strain on these muscles, and spread of your ache.  
Never accept a bystander's opinion that you have a "sprained" knee. Seek medical evaluation. The physician can separate injury from compensatory strain, pinpoint the knee structures impaired, and from this information develop a program for your recovery.

# Cooperative effort rescues co-curriculars

A grass-roots organization of parents scored a major win last week when their efforts saved sports, marching band and other Plymouth-Canton out-of-class activities.

Their plan calls for cooperation among teachers, administrators, students and a wide variety of 50-some organizations to pull together and maintain programs that some argue are as important as classroom instruction. It meant bargaining and concessions even among the students who will pay to play.

But the main goal was achieved: saving the programs for the kids.

"Let's throw all the past into a

barrel and flush it down the Detroit River. Regroup and realize now this is for the children of our community and the community in general," said Jim Vassallo, executive director of the Coalition of Booster Parents.

Academics come first, Vassallo said, adding, however, that the out-of-class activities are the "fiber" of school experience. He added, too, that he would like to see more students involved, because it points to the growth of the student.

That concept gave birth to the coalition, which formed after the first millage defeat in June. Its goal was to save programs that were to be cut after the millage failed again last month.

The group pursued a revised plan on what had to be done without the money from the millage. It meant changes in transportation, administrative pay freezes and other cost cuts. While the teachers' pay freeze doesn't pay for out of class activities, it will free up teachers to be involved in the programs.

"It certainly is an excellent concept to have the people who are working with the school district to be supportive of the co-curricular," according to Dick Egli, school spokesman.

"I think there were a number of people involved, and it was a case of them coming together as a group," Egli said.

Students and their parents will be making sacrifices, too, by paying directly for programs in the past were funded in the school district's general budget.

The fee schedule includes \$125 for all sports and \$125 for marching band — with a \$250 cap for each student involved in these programs. Also, there's a \$75 fee for all other activities in the high schools, said Vassallo, who is also president of the music boosters.

A \$50 fee for all extracurricular activities will be charged in the middle schools. A plan to help

"If they pay for one they should pay for everyone," she added.

The fees are expected to raise \$310,000. Fund-raisers, like selling pizza at University of Michigan games, are expected to raise \$40,000. Also, each booster group will continue to hold its usual fund-raisers to cover the costs they handled in the past.

Co-curricular activities cost \$843,000. The remainder comes from concessions between teachers and administrators, as well as other budget cuts that will be made by the school board.

The coalition includes two groups — a spirit team and a financial team, collecting money, organizing fund-raisers and "working with the school board making sure the money goes to co-curricular," Vassallo said.

"It will start to unite kids and the community to bring back school spirit," Vassallo said.

"We have the greatest school district in the country and we have the (most unique) school district in the country," Vassallo said, adding that the curriculum is outstanding and the fact the students from two high schools attend classes on one campus prepares them for a college atmosphere.

Throughout the summer the board said sports and after-school activities would be cut if the millage failed.

Sports and other activities are taking place, and booster groups are trying to raise money to salvage programs. (See related story.)

Portelli said that if Plymouth-Canton teachers' wages are compared to other teachers in the tri-county area, "We are nowhere near the top, and we are probably below middle now."

And the cost of living in this area is higher, he added.

"It would be nice to start focusing on issues," Portelli said. "Teachers have accepted the responsibility for hiring back teachers."

The 30 recalled teachers will restore counseling programs at the high schools and middle schools, as well as special programs such as art, music and physical education at the elementary levels.

The 3-percent raise will be deferred to the 1994-95 school year. Also under the agreement, teachers' wages will be reconsidered in the 1994-95 and 1995-96

school years. This was a renegotiated contract that was ratified in March.

Also, the board will provide a reserved seat during public board meetings for a teacher representative and create an advisory council that will include representatives from school employee groups.

A clause in the agreement covers teachers who retire in the 1993-94 school year to recoup the 3 percent they would lose by the freeze.

"The situation we find ourselves in is not the teachers' fault," Cotner said before the vote.

"We're being held accountable for something we have no control over," he added, referring to the voters' defeat of the 4-mill tax increase request Aug. 17.

A lot of concern has been expressed about class sizes that range from 32 students at the first-grade level to 40 at the high schools.

"These 30 teachers will not affect class size," he said. "We're moving people in the classrooms, returning programs and recalling people who were now on layoffs."

hardship cases will be developed, Vassallo said.

Nicole Kovachevich, a ninth-grade Plymouth-Canton High School student, said the pay-to-play system is unfair.

"If a lot of people can't pay, will they have enough money for everyone?" said Kovachevich, who hopes to play softball and volleyball.

# Abuses force Salvation Army to pack up its drop boxes

Say goodbye to the Salvation Army drop box.

Any time now, a truck should come and pick up the box behind the army office on Main Street, said Salvation Army Lt. Jeffrey Beachum.

He and other local Salvation Army officials around the Midwest were notified 10 days ago by Lt. Col. Marchus Stillwell in the Chicago, Ill., territorial headquarters that vandalism, theft and other problems have forced the removal of the boxes.

"One of the problems they have been running into for a long, long time is the drop boxes are being used for a dump site," Beachum said.

"The nature of the boxes is they aren't manned," he said, adding people have left things "that it would cost them to dump."

"We've seen motor oil; we've seen merchandise that is beyond recognition, furniture that even at its foundation is not usable again — a variety of items in that condition, beyond repair," Beachum said.

Useful items are picked up for the Salvation Army Adult Rehabilitation Center in Romulus. That facility houses 150-200 men recovering from addiction, and money raised by sale of dropped-off goods pays for their upkeep.

Still, the Salvation Army will still send trucks to pick up donated items. And at Salvation Army stores in Garden City and Ypsilanti, a manned truck will be available for dropped-off items, Beachum said.

Clothes in good condition can be sold, and other clothing can be sold as rags, Beachum said. The dumping of non-usable things "wasn't a major problem in

Plymouth," Beachum said.

Yet, used motor oil had been dropped off, and neighbors had reported that some people were taking items from the box at night.

At some Salvation Army drop boxes, people used bolt cutters to get inside locked boxes, and some waited at the boxes to go through donated items.

At these sites and in Plymouth, "some of the things the adult recovery center trucks wouldn't pick up, we had to spend our own money to get rid of them," Beachum said.

Beachum had been notified the drop box in Plymouth would be picked up last week. He said Thursday it could go at any time.

People wanting a truck to come by to pick up donated items can call 941-5100.

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## Proposed bill will close immunization loopholes

Parents will have fewer alibis for failing to have their children immunized against contagious diseases under a bill in the Michigan House of Representatives.

Rep. Lyn Bankes, R-Redford, sponsored the measure aimed at closing a loophole that allowed 1,800 schoolage children to skip their shots last year.

It was reported last week out of the House Public Health Committee chaired by Rep. John Jamian, R-Bloomfield Township.

"Parents who deny youngsters this preventive care without a

medical or religious basis put them and the children with whom they come in contact at risk needlessly," said Jamian.

Currently, parents may refuse immunization on medical, religious or "other" grounds; about one percent opt out. Bankes' bill would limit exemptions to religious objections and medical reasons verified in writing by a physician.

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## Women get more toilets with new law

New stadiums and theaters will have three women's toilets for every two men's under Michigan's "potty parity" law.

The state Senate last week gave final approval to a compromise that exempts restaurants with less than 150 seats and sent the bill to Gov. John Engler for signing.

"At least it didn't take 10 years," said Penny Steele, who started the campaign eight years ago with a series of articles in Observer & Eccentric Newspapers.

"When we walked out of that meeting with the Plumbing Board (in 1986), it looked like this would be a sloooow process," she recalled.

Then a freelance writer, Steele raised the question about too few, inadequate and

hidden restrooms in public places in a feature on Wayne County parks. It led to a three-part series in March and April of 1986 on restrooms in stadiums, theaters and malls.

The Plumbing Board listened with apparent sympathy but then took no action to modify the one to one ratio of women's and men's toilets. A long legislative battle followed.

Greeted with snickers at first, Steele's series of articles took a serious turn when she unearthed University of Michigan research showing women's infections and cancers were linked to "holding it."

Rep. Jan. Dolan, R-Farmington Hills, took over the project in the late 1980s with bills to raise the ratio and apply it to all building codes.

"That's sort of a textbook way it gets done — catch the

eye of someone who will take it on," said Steele.

She had hoped for a 2.5 to 1 ratio but called the 3 to 2 ratio an improvement. Steele said theater and mall owners should consider a high ratio "good business. They'd sell more pop if women didn't have to go dry."

"In Las Vegas they've got plenty of restrooms because they want to keep people out on the (gambling) floor, not standing in lines," she said.

Today she devotes part of her time to her own business writing service, part to administration and marketing in her husband's firm, Steele Engineering in Farmington Hills.

The Senate last week approved the final version in about an hour.

"We've fiddled with this long enough," said Sen. Joanne

Emmons, R-Big Rapids, who guided the bill through the upper chamber.

Senate voting was delayed when Sen. Joe Conroy, D-Flint, insisted on knowing the precise ratio of men's and women's toilets.

"It's a different number for every kind of restaurant," Emmons finally replied.

"Generalized," said Conroy, "it looks like 60 percent for women and 40 percent for men. It's just marginally more for women to move the line along."

The bill had passed the House twice, but senators raised objections about the impact on veterans' and fraternal lodges. Senators also got a "grandfather" clause to exempt buildings whose plans are near completion.

The Senate vote was 30 to 3.

# Ford holds forth as a real environmentalist

While many congressmen spent their summer breaks politicking, U.S. Rep. Bill Ford, D-Taylor, had different fish to fry. To be exact, it was elusive tiger muskie in Ford Lake near Ypsilanti.

Ford is mostly known to his constituents in the 13th Congressional District as the congressman who helps communities get new post offices; however, he's an avid sportsman who knows how to handle fishing rods and shotguns.

During a recent interview, there was a gleam in the eye of the pipe-smoking Democrat when talking about his recent days fishing on Ford Lake for that muskie.

"My brother keeps telling me they're out there and I keep trying. He's a better fisherman; he's out there more," he said, when asked if he was successful. "We did get some bass, though."

Just knowing that Ford is a sportsman makes me feel good about having him represent western Wayne County. There are things more important than the national deficit, fishing and hunting.

But there are some serious benefits to having a sportsman in Congress. They have a natural affinity for the environment, the serious environment, not the one concocted by the Sierra Club.

Ford is aware firsthand of the effect of pollution on the Great Lakes. He spends time fishing for lake trout in Lake Michigan off of Leland, near Traverse City.

He even has a recipe for smoked lake trout. "You've got to cut that layer of fat from the belly before you smoke them."

But Ford doesn't limit his angling activities to Michigan; he's also an accomplished east coast fisherman, plying the waters of Chesapeake Bay in search of bluefish.

"You've got to watch for the gulls; that's where you'll find the blues," he

said.

Ford talks with passion about the bay and its complex region, part freshwater and part saltwater. Also, it's controlled by both Maryland and Virginia.

"They've got a fishing dispute there that makes our Indian fishing dispute seem simple. Virginia has banned commercial fishing for the striped bass, while Maryland hasn't," he said, adding: "Telling some of those folks they can't fish is like telling people in the Upper Peninsula they can't poach deer."

Ford said that upon his return to Washington, D.C., after the August congressional break, he would head to his cottage on the Chesapeake for a weekend of dove hunting.

It's no wonder Michigan doesn't have a dove season. It's been proposed, but rejected.

Anyway, there's another benefit to having a congressman who knows his way around a shotgun. It's gun control.

Banning assault rifles is one thing, but even the National Rifle Association was a bit confused about one piece of legislation that Ford said would have banned most of the semiautomatic shotguns in his gun case.

"I could help write legislation to do that without banning shotguns," he said.

Outdoing a Texas congressman: There are always plenty of stories about how one congressman outfoxes another on the House floor, but Ford has one story about telling better fish stories than a Texas congressman.

It seems Ford was with a certain Texan, fishing for steelhead on the Manistee River, when Ford started telling stories about past large catches. The Texan was aware that folks from his state tend to be seen as people who can stretch the size of a fish by more than a couple of inches, perhaps as many as 12.

Anyway, at an appropriate pause in Ford's large fish tale, the Texan said: "You boys from Michigan can sure outdo us Texans on telling those fish stories."

And those stories are the flip side of Bill Ford.

### Learn from Poletown

There are compelling reasons for retaining Tiger Baseball in Detroit. What is less compelling is virtual unlimited public financing to support a new stadium. I am reminded of the debacle of City of Detroit and site acquisition for the Poletown plant.

I would be willing to support a new stadium with some tax dollars. I would not be willing to

enter into a carte blanche arrangement of unknown dimensions.

I suggest that any site acquisition/preparation agreement include a limitation on public participation and that overages be covered wholly or very substantially by the developer. To induce the developer to participate in an agreement to take on this risk, the developer must have significant control and incentives.

I propose that the county commit to a fund

equal to no more than 110 percent of the agreed-to appraised value of the property identified for acquisition including clearing, preparation, highway work or whatever the county commits to. The developer would then be responsible for negotiations and could draw from the fund.

Incentives should be included. For example, if the developer under-spends the fund, he would get to keep a significant percentage, e.g., 50 percent. If the fund is entirely depleted be-

fore the task is complete, the developer would have to pay an established percent up to one hundred.

My prediction is that in the absence of limitations and controls, the county will be unable to obtain approval of financing to support a new Tiger Stadium. I would support a carefully crafted plan. I will oppose any other. We must learn from Poletown.

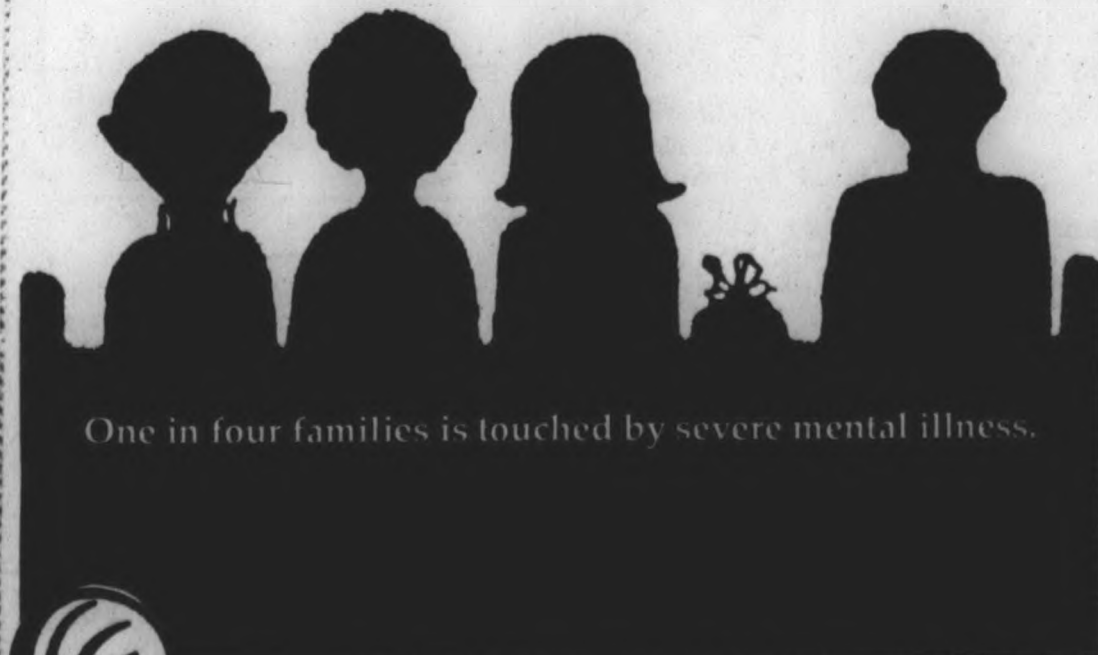

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# Health care dilemma

## Panelists criticize Clinton's plan

The panelists at U.S. Rep. Joe Knollenberg's forum on health care Monday had one big thing in common: They don't like President Bill Clinton's gestating health care plan.

The panel spoke to a crowd of more than 350 business persons and doctors at Glen Oaks golf course in Farmington Hills.

"The federal programs we already have (Medicare, Medicaid, et. al.) are the programs that have messed up the system," said Jack Strayer, the director of federal affairs for the Council for Affordable Health Insurance, representing 30 health insurance companies.

"How does it help Americans to provide them health insurance and deny them jobs?" said Nancy McKeague, director of government relations for the Michigan Chamber of Commerce.

"The Clinton Administration does not believe that the marketplace will keep costs down. It's difficult to see where the market is left in 'managed competition,'" said Susan Adelman, a pediatrician and past president of the Michigan State Medical Society.

"Bureaucracy and waste go hand in hand with the federal government and health care," said Karl Albrecht, a vice president with Action Benefits Co. of

Southfield.

### Knollenberg keeps cool

Knollenberg, a Republican who often issues press releases denouncing Clinton Administration policies, exceeded the forum in staid, non-acerbic style, leaving the criticism to his panelists.

Adelman, who was part of a 47-member Health Professionals Review Group that criticized the work of Hillary Clinton's Health Care Task Force, probably knows more than the other three panelists what form the ultimate Clinton plan will take.

Although "it's difficult to see what's going to come out at the end of the grinder," she said, "the system I saw in Washington is a one-payer system."

Adelman anticipates a system where one or several government organizations called "health care alliances" negotiate deals with health care providers to buy insurance. "You then have one regionalized one-care system which is no different from Canada," she said. "The choice will be the choice of health care plans, not doctors."

### Government's to blame

Albrecht, the insurance company vice president, said the main cause of rising health care costs is that the federal government doesn't reimburse doctors 100

percent for services provided under Medicare and Medicaid. Doctors and hospitals, he said, make up the difference by overcharging privately insured patients.

"If the federal government doesn't pay its fair share, that's going to show up in all of our premiums," he said.

Neither is Albrecht confident that the Clinton Administration will design a good plan. "They have a tendency to play games, and there's only one Joe (Knollenberg) to protect us up there," he said.

### Oxymorons in Washington

McKeague, the chamber of commerce government relations director, said the term "managed competition" in health care is an oxymoron. "Business needs incentives not mandates," she said, and the Clinton Administration only "pretends to be sensitive to the needs of small business."

Strayer, the insurance industry lobbyist, said "the real problem with American health care is American people."

In the current health-care system, Strayer said, patients are like pets who don't know or care how much their medical bills are. The insurance companies are like pet owners who pay the bills. "I think it's time we become a big dog and begin controlling medical costs," he said.

To that end, Strayer recommends something called a "medical IRA" that individuals would contribute before-tax income to, then use the savings to pay medical bills. Only after a certain threshold is reached (Strayer suggests \$3,000) would traditional insurance kick in and pay the rest.

In essence, it's a \$3,000 deductible, but individuals would be permitted to keep the medical IRA money they don't spend.

### 'Killing small business'

Lois Grant, who works for Realtor of Redford, liked what she heard the panelists say. Increases in the cost of health insurance are "killing small business," she said, but the Clinton plan is a no-win situation.

Rudy Gerhard is a co-owner of Viscount Industries in Farmington Hills. Viscount pays more than \$10,000 a month for the health insurance of 28 employees.

And if the cost keeps rising? "We either charge for it, or we make less money, or we go out of business," Gerhard said. "I hope somebody can come up with a solution."

Richard Helleppie, the president of Superior Consultant Co. of Farmington Hills, joined everyone else in criticizing Clinton's plan. Rather than simplifying the system, Helleppie said, the plan will add another layer of bureaucracy. "It's crazy," he said.

Just picked tomatoes  
luscious summer treat

I did something the other day that I can remember my dad, and Uncle Pete doing. I walked out to my garden when the grass was still damp from the morning dew, pinched off a seed sprout from the fresh basil, plucked the start of another obnoxious weed, and noticed a perfect red sphere of a tomato hanging singularly from a vine.

This could have been one of those "Kodak moments." It was a beautiful red globe. Beads of morning dew were still clinging to it. Instead of rushing inside for the camera, I opted, instead, to relieve the tomato from its vine.

I held it, observed its beauty and took a bite. I had never before eaten a tomato like an apple, but then never before had I felt the urge to eat a tomato right from the vine. It reminded me of a peach I had savored a few years back. The juices exploded and ran down my arm to my elbow. It was still cool on my palate, tempered from the evening's light breeze.

There was little doubt that if Daniel Webster had not defined the term "luscious" the taste sensation of this singular tomato would have caused him to coin that exact term. It was the best tomato I had ever tasted.

Tomato harvest

I have been receiving conflicting reports about household garden tomato harvests. My head swells when I report my success this year.

Could it be the composting? The mulching? The ever-present weeding? God only knows, but I give reaffirming thanks to whomever for whatever I did. This summer my tomatoes have graced countless bowls of tabbouleh, been sliced razor thin for bruschetta, broiled, breaded and pan-fried, and simmered into a satiny smooth soup.

I have passed bags to neighbors and the bounty seems to continue. This week I will begin yet another harvest and will freeze a batch hoping they taste as great in January as they have this past summer.

Preserving tomatoes

If you're wondering what to do with your excess tomatoes this summer pay attention. On Aug. 21, Lois Thieleke, O&E columnist, and home economist for the Michigan State University Cooperative Extension Service, Oakland County office, and I taught a free class on tomato canning at Kitchen Glamour in Redford Township. Participants also picked the winning tomato sauce in our contest.

Here's a sampling of what I learned from Lois during the class. The first shocker came when I was showing the class a jar of tomatoes canned in a mayonnaise jar. Did you know that mayo jars are a no-no for canning? Use mason jars which are considered generic, and manufactured by Ball, Kerr and Country Harvest. They are made of tempered glass especially for canning. Thielke went on to explain that the lids made for mason jars don't exactly fit mayo jars and there could eventually be problems with the seals if you use them for canning.

Mayo jars, if allowed to bang together in the hot water bath during the canning process, might explode.

By the way, did you know that you can freeze tomatoes, sauces and purees in mason jars? I didn't but again, Lois gave her blessing as long as they were are filled to the top and there is enough room for the contents to expand while freezing.

Here's an easier, more convenient way to skin tomatoes. Core the tomatoes, place on a baking sheet and freeze. I tried this at home the next day and it worked! The skins popped off like magic!

When processing tomatoes in a hot water bath, Lois said it's necessary to keep the water boiling just to the point where it "cracks" the surface. Too rapid a boil causes the product to literally boil out of the jar and will ruin an otherwise perfectly good seal.

Lastly, I learned that the screw type rings should be removed after the jars cool and that it was not necessary to keep the rings on during storage.

So whomever said that "you can't teach an old dog new tricks" probably never took a class from a source as knowledgeable as Lois Thielke. If you too are interested in canning, it might behoove you to call the Cooperative Extension Service Food and Nutrition Hotline, 858-0904, 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

"Use fresh garlic, and brown it before you add it to the sauce, but be careful not to burn it," said Huneke who jokes that for her being a good cook is hereditary.

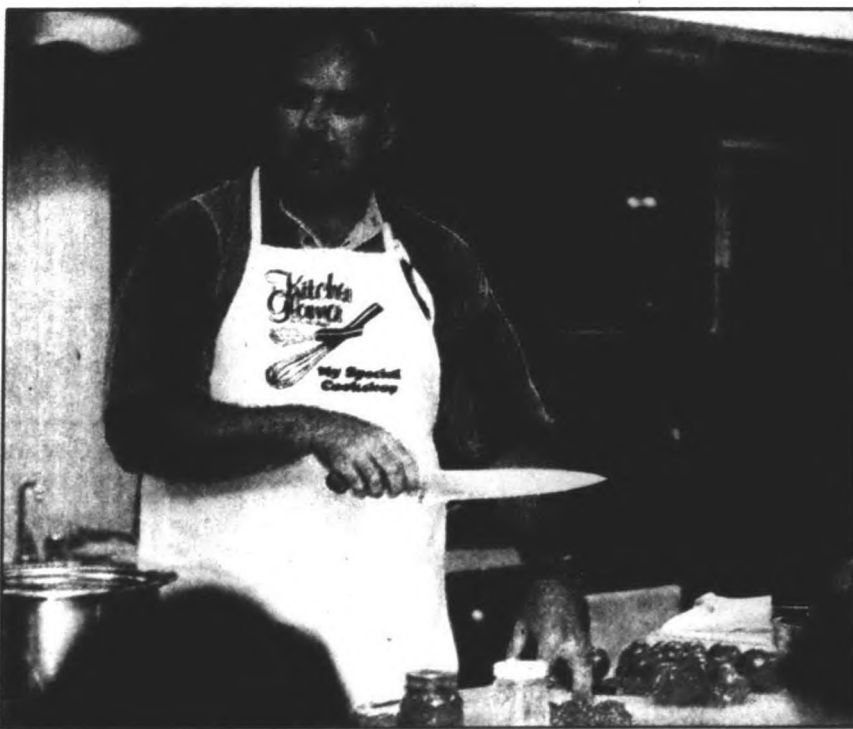

HOMEMADE TOMATO SAUCE

In a 4 quart pot put 1 tablespoon cooking oil, heat. Chop 4 cloves of garlic and saute until brown, then add:

- 4 pounds cut tomatoes (pureed in blender)
- 3 cups water (add more if needed)
- 1 1/2 tablespoons sugar
- 2 bay leaves
- 2 tablespoons fresh basil or 2 teaspoons dried
- 1/4 teaspoon dried oregano or 1 teaspoon fresh
- 1 (12 oz.) can tomato paste
- 4 whole cloves
- 1 1/4 teaspoons salt (to taste)
- 1 teaspoon pepper (to taste)
- 1 tablespoon fresh parsley or 1 teaspoon dried
- 2 teaspoons garlic salt

Cover and cook slowly 1 1/2 hours, stir occasionally.

### THE BEST BARBECUE SAUCE YOU'VE EVER TASTED

- 10 very ripe, very large tomatoes (skin and seeds removed) or 2 quarts canned tomatoes
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1/4 cup honey
- 1/4 cup Chinese rice vinegar
- 3 cloves garlic
- 1 tablespoon freshly grated ginger
- 1 tablespoon Chinese chili sauce
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
- 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard

Use blender or food processor to puree tomatoes, strain to remove remaining seeds.

Combine all ingredients in a pot over low heat. Stir until it begins to bubble. Continue cooking until sauce is thick and coats the back of a spoon — about 30-45 minutes. Cool and store in refrigerator in a jar until needed. (May be canned at this time).

chicken, but I find it's wonderful on fish steaks. I like best on grilled swordfish," said Yee of West Bloomfield.

"I hate bottled barbecue sauce. My husband is Chinese and we use a lot of Chinese ingredients," said Yee. She makes this sauce a couple of times a year with tomatoes from her parent's garden.

A pharmaceutical rep, Yee has two children, Lauren, 9, and Jason, 6, who enjoy helping their mom in the kitchen. "We eat home everyday," said Yee. "I've always liked to cook. You get healthier food, and it's more economical. We always have dinner as a family, it's important. I hope we can continue to do so as the kids get older and more involved in activities."

A word of caution, this sauce is spicy. Use less chili sauce if you don't like things hot! Yee shops for Chinese groceries like rice vinegar and chili sauce at Evergreen Supply Co., 20736 Lahser, Southfield.

Our third-place winner, Diane Billian, created a tangy tomato sauce with three different kinds of pepper. This chunky sauce can be quickly made into salsa, pasta sauce, or served over grilled Italian sausage.

Billian of Birmingham said she invented this sauce four years ago when her daughter, Bridget, became a vegetarian.

"It's a real basic sauce," said Billian. Add scallions and jalapenos and the sauce becomes a delicious appetizer. You can use it as an omelet filling, or to make lasagna.

Although her daughters, Bridget, 19, and Jennifer, 20, are away at college, Billian still spends a lot of time in the kitchen. "I love to cook. Cooking is my creative outlet. I love to entertain and share good food and conversation with friends," she said.

### TRIPLE PEPPERS

- Virgin olive oil
- 1 large onion, diced
- 1 large green pepper, diced
- 1 large sweet red pepper, diced
- 1 large yellow/orange pepper, diced
- 3 quarts fresh Italian Roma tomatoes
- 6 ounce can tomato paste (plus 2 cans water)
- 3 teaspoons salt
- 1 tablespoon freshly ground pepper/coarse ground
- 1 cup fresh basil, coarsely chopped
- 1 cup Italian parsley, chopped
- 1 head garlic, peeled, trimmed, and then minced
- 3 large whole carrots, peeled and trimmed

Fill one large pot with water. Cover. Put on high heat and bring to a boil. When water boils, drop all of the tomatoes in water. Keep heat on high and leave tomatoes in water for 30 seconds. Immediately drain and immerse in cold water bath. Gently lift skins off tomatoes and gently pull out stem with fingers. Cut tomatoes into quarters, then across into quarters. Set aside.

Meanwhile, put another large 6-8 quart pot on high heat. When pan is hot, pour in enough olive oil to

lightly cover bottom of pan.

Reduce heat to medium-high and saute onions for 5 minutes, stirring as needed. Add all of the chopped peppers to onion mixture and continue to cook, stirring occasionally, until all vegetables are limp and transparent. Be sure to add more oil if needed, to keep mixture in pan from sticking.

Add tomatoes to onion-pepper mixture. Add salt and pepper, tomato paste with can of water, 1/4 of the basil, parsley and garlic. Stir to mix. Bring to a boil. Skim foam from top of pan. Add whole carrots. Adjust heat so sauce simmers gently. Cook, covered, with lid slightly ajar. Stir occasionally.

Sauce is finished when carrots are easily pierced with a fork, (approximately 3 hours). At that time, remove carrots from pot and throw them away. Store in refrigerator or freeze.

Variations: For a spicy sauce, add 1 green cayenne pepper or 3 small jalapeno peppers, minced. Remove seeds.

Serve sauce on top of pasta, Italian sausage sandwiches, or as an appetizer with bread.

To make salsa mix 2 cups of sauce with two chopped scallions and 2 minced jalapenos.

Gala proceeds will benefit Interlochen and support the summer residency of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra at Interlochen.

"Since the idea is to raise money, the menu is written from two vantage points: cost, and to make it as user-friendly as possible," said Prentice. "A lot of people are vegetarians, or at least eating only fish or poultry, so we've chosen items that are healthful as well as tasty. Luckily, the board knows and trusts my taste, so I made up the menus without consulting anyone. Some people will try a little of everything, while others will go for what they know they like, and pass up everything else."

The menu includes — a table featuring Bruschetta (grilled country breads) with accompaniments such as Indiana duck liver pate.

A salad table, that will in-

clude char-grilled tuna salad; a pasta table offering fettucini with pesto, grilled chicken and roast peppers, and several other pasta dishes; a mushroom table with wild mushroom polenta, a salmon table featuring smoked salmon with freshly made pumpkinseed bread, a poultry table with apple-marinated grilled turkey, and a dessert table

loaded with jumbo strawberries, chocolate chunk and oatmeal raisin cookies, and Chambord brownies.

"Several tables break up the crowd," said Prentice. "And, from an appearance perspective, a number of tables with guests moving from one to the other makes the mall look cozier, less like a mall."

## TURKEY WITH MUSTARD THYME BUTTER

4 large boneless, skinless, turkey breasts (7 ounces each)  
**Marinade**  
 4 tablespoons mustard seed  
 1 cup Chardonnay (wine)  
 1 1/2 cups cider vinegar  
 1 1/2 cups Apple Jack (brandy)  
 1/4 cup sugar  
 1 tablespoon, plus 1 teaspoon fresh thyme  
 2 tablespoons fresh rosemary  
 1 tablespoon fresh sage  
 2 tablespoons chopped garlic  
 1/2 cup corn oil  
 2 tablespoons Kosher salt.  
 Combine mustard seed, Chardonnay, cider vinegar, Apple Jack, and sugar in a stainless steel pan (non-aluminum) and bring to a boil. Simmer until reduced by half. Cool to room temperature.  
 Add herbs, oil and salt to cooled mixture. Put turkey breasts in

stainless steel container. Cover with marinade. Marinate for two days, turning occasionally.  
 Drain the turkey breasts of marinade. Brown in heavy frying pan. Bake in a preheated 300 degree oven for 10 minutes. Garnish with: Mustard Thyme Butter, and a sprig of fresh thyme.

## MUSTARD THYME BUTTER

1/2 cup softened butter  
 2 tablespoons fresh thyme leaves  
 1/4 cup Dijon mustard  
 1 1/2 teaspoon Kosher salt  
 8 turns of fresh pepper (8 turns of the pepper mill)  
 Blend ingredients, serve with grilled turkey.

## TROPICAL FRUIT GRATIN

Sauce Sabayone  
 4 egg yolks  
 1/4 cup granulated sugar

2 tablespoons champagne  
 zest of 1/2 orange  
 1/4 cup heavy cream  
 4-5 cups mixed tropical fruit — papayas, mangoes, kiwi, bananas, grapes, cut into bite-size pieces  
 Combine egg yolks, sugar, champagne and orange zest in the top of a double boiler. Whisk vigorously over boiling water until thick. Plunge pan into an ice bath to cool.  
 Whip 1/4 cup heavy cream and fold into cooled mixture. Arrange 4-5 cups of mixed tropical fruit (papayas, mangoes, kiwi, bananas, grapes), cut into bite-sized pieces, on the bottom of a sheet cake pan, (9 by 13 inch) or other oven-proof dish.  
 If desired, apply a little non-stick spray to bottom of pan before arranging fruit. Spoon Sauce Sabayone over fruit and brown under broiler. (serves 4-5. If you only need 3 servings, use 3 cups of fruit with same amount of Sauce Sabayone.)

# Tips on selecting exotic fruit

If papayas and mangoes aren't exactly staples in your diet, here's a brief guide to selecting and storing these nutritious, exotic fruits:  
**Papayas:** Ripe papayas should be about as soft as a ripe peach, with more yellow than green in the skin. Avoid shriveled fruit. Ripen firm papayas at room temperature in a loosely closed paper bag. Refrigerate ripe fruit in a plastic or paper bag for up to 3 days.  
 To prepare: Peel with a vegetable peeler and cut into slices. Scoop out the seeds and give them to the birds. Papayas are a rich source of vitamins A and C

and potassium. Half a medium-size papaya is about 60 calories.  
**Mangoes:** Color is not a reliable indication of ripeness in mangoes, since different varieties are different colors. One of the best, Keitt, can be solid green even when ripe.  
 When ripe, a mango gives to gentle pressure like a ripe avocado. Mangoes are usually sold quite firm and need to be ripened further before eating. Ripen all varieties at room temperature, uncovered, out of direct sun. Turn occasionally. Refrigerate ripe fruit in a plastic or paper bag for up to 3 days.  
 To slice: score skin lengthwise in 4 to 6 places; pull skin off. Cut flesh cheeks from each side of pit,

and cut into chunks.  
 Mangoes are high in vitamins A and C. One medium-size mango has about 150 calories.  
**Kiwi:** When ready to eat, kiwi fruit is as soft as a ripe peach. Choose evenly firm fruit, free of soft spots. Ripen kiwi fruit at room temperature, uncovered, out of direct sun, turn occasionally. Refrigerate ripe fruit in a plastic or paper bag for up to 1 week.  
 To prepare: Cut in half crosswise and scoop out the flesh with a spoon, or peel and thinly slice crosswise to show off the decorative pattern of the seeds.  
 Kiwi fruit is high in vitamin C. A 3 1/2-ounce portion has about 35 calories.

# How to store tomatoes, speed ripening

Here are some "Produce Particulars" from "Fruit & Vegetable News," published by the Produce Marketing Association.  
**Store tomatoes at room temperature.** Storing tomatoes in the refrigerator can cause the ripening process to cease and reduce the tomato's natural flavors. Tomatoes give off a natural gas called

ethylene. Placing tomatoes in a closed paper bag or in a ripening bowl to trap the ethylene with hasten ripening.  
**Speedy cooking is the best defense against cabbage smell.** Here's how to keep cabbage family vegetables such as cabbage, cauliflower, brussels sprouts, and turnips from smelling when cook-


ing them. Use a lot of water already at a boil, so that it will return to the boil quickly after the addition of cabbage.  
**Grapes don't ripen once they leave the vine.** They are ready once you take them home. Refrigerate them in a plastic or paper bag and eat them as soon as possible because they are very perishable.

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# Loire Valley produces flavorful wines

Loire Valley, France — affectionately and correctly called "The Garden of France." This is the region of crisp white wines produced from sauvignon blanc grapes, delicious, juicy reds predominantly made from cabernet franc and refreshing sparkling wines from chenin blanc.

This is the magical land where medieval knights constructed fortresses, where the 15th and 16th century French kings built incredible pleasure castles, and where the 17th and 18th century nobility built chateaux. Today, residents go about their daily life and take the tourists meandering through their medieval village, or awing at the magnitude of a chateau, as a matter of course.

Vast farms abound. Each property, whether it's sufficiently large to be referred to as an estate or a small, local vigneron (grape-grower) produces wines generally uncluttered by wood. If cooperage is used, it's old, neutral, and sim-

ply a vessel in which to carry on centuries-old winemaking traditions. The wines have expressive fruit indicative of their origin and have not been wood-crafted into something other than what nature offered the vintage.

These are not ponderous wines or wines for extended cellaring. They are wines for pleasurable drinking. Sauvignons (as they are called, leaving off the blanc) match perfectly with the local goat cheese which can be purchased a day or two old, weeks

old, or so well-aged that it can be grated.

Cabernet franc pairs marvelously with roasted goat or leg of lamb, served at one of the local ferme-auberge (local farms with lodging and a small restaurant). If you like very fruity red wines, then Gamay fills the bill.

Let's take a closer look at the Loire Valley in west-central France that takes its name from the Loire River which flows east to west for nearly 350 miles before emptying into the Atlantic Ocean west of the city of Nantes.

Starting in the east is Pouilly-sur-Loire and Sancerre, each with a unique style of sauvignon blanc. From Pouilly sur Loire the wines are labeled Pouilly Fume (not to be confused with Pouilly-Fuisse from the Burgundy region). Just across the river to the west is Sancerre with a different soil profile and terrain lending a mineral, crispness to sauvignon blanc.

Travelling west, one enters the Loire Valley's Touraine region, roughly following the Loire River east of the city of Tours (about 3.5 hours by car, southwest of Paris). Here chenin blanc produces its most famous wines Vouvray and Montlouis. Vouvray is versatile and is made dry, semi-dry, sweet or sparkling.

A trip along the Loire west of Tours brings one to the heart of the Loire's red wines in Bourgueil and Chinon. These reds are made from the cabernet franc grape and are bigger, more earthy wines for heartier meat preparations — beef stews and game in particular. Chinon is generally lighter than a Bourgueil and can be drunk young or mature. It's a lively pairing for roast chicken, red meats or tangy cheeses.

Anjou (where half the production is rose wine from cabernet franc) and Saumur (with its crisp chenin blanc sparkling wines) are the Touraine's western neighbors. Besides rose, the Anjou region is famed for white wines from subregions. Savennieres wines are crisp, but Coteaux du Layon makes sweet finesseful dessert

wines often rivaling a fine sauternes.

Between the city of Angers and the mouth of the Loire at the Atlantic is Muscadet. The grape varietal melon de Bourgogne reigns supreme for production of a crisp, white wine perfectly suited for the broad spectrum of fruits de mer (shellfish) from the Atlantic. It's the perfect complement for oysters on the half shell.

Today's savvy wine shopper does not need to take a trip to France to learn about these wines. Many are being imported into the United States. The following are Loire wines and producers to look for. If you can't find them in your favorite wine shop, ask the retailer to order them for you. They are available in this market.

## Serve tomatoes with a twist

### TOMATO MARMALADE

- 2 pounds of tomatoes, (about 4) peeled, sliced, reserving all juices
- 3 cups sugar
- 1 small juice orange, quartered, seeded and sliced very thin
- 1/2 lemon, halved, seeded and sliced very thin
- 2 teaspoons whole cloves
- 1 1/2 sticks cinnamon

In a heavy kettle, cook the tomatoes with the juices, the sugar, the orange, and the lemon over moderate heat, stirring until the sugar is dissolved.

Wrap the cloves and the cinnamon in a piece of cheesecloth with string to form a bundle. Add the bundle to the tomato mixture.

Simmer the mixture, stirring occasionally for 20 minutes more. Onto a chilled platter, spoon 1 teaspoon of the mixture, chill it, and draw your finger through it. If the marmalade holds its shape, it's of correct consistency.

If the marmalade doesn't hold its shape, cook it until it thickens and repeat the test. Discard the cheesecloth bun-

dle and divide the mixture between 2 sterilized 8 ounce mason jars. Wipe the rims with paper towel and seal tightly.

### HOMEMADE FRESH TOMATO SALSA FRESCA

- 3 large ripe tomatoes
- 2 jalapeno peppers, each about 2 inches long
- 1 teaspoon finely chopped garlic
- 1/2 cup finely chopped onion
- 1 tablespoon fresh chopped cilantro
- 1/4 teaspoon sugar
- 1/2 cup tomato juice
- Salt to taste

Remove the stems, but don't peel the tomatoes. Chop into 1/4-inch dice.

Wearing rubber gloves, clean the peppers under cold water. Cut off the tops, slice in half lengthwise, scrape out the seeds. Chop finely.

Combine all ingredients in a glass mixing bowl. Allow flavors to mingle for 1 hour before serving at room temperature. Salsa can be refrigerated, covered but bring to room temperature before serving. Makes 1 1/2 cups.

## Round up helpers to make cheesy stuffed shells

AP — This cook-together, enjoy-together meal gives everyone a chance to unwind in the kitchen. Plus, with a couple of extra hands, the preparation time for these cheesy stuffed shells goes twice as fast. Round up your helpers when it's time to stuff the shells. Clear enough space and turn everyone loose with a job — cooking the pasta, shredding the cheese, simmering the sauce and making the filling.

### CHICKEN MANICOTTI WITH CHIVE CREAM SAUCE

- 12 packaged manicotti shells
- 8-ounce container soft-style

cream cheese with chives and onion

- 3/4 cup milk
- 1/4 cup grated Romano cheese or Parmesan cheese
- 9-ounce package (2 cups) frozen chopped cooked chicken, thawed
- 10-ounce package frozen chopped broccoli, thawed and drained
- 1/2 of a 7-ounce jar roasted red sweet peppers, drained and sliced, or one 4-ounce jar diced pimento, drained
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper

### Paprika

In a Dutch oven, cook manicotti shells in 3 quarts boiling, lightly salted water for 18 minutes or until tender but still slightly firm. Drain. Rinse with cold water; drain well.

Meanwhile, for sauce, in a small, heavy saucepan stir cream cheese over medium-low heat until melted. Slowly add milk, stirring until smooth. Remove from heat. Stir in Romano or Parmesan cheese.

For filling, in a medium mixing bowl stir together 3/4 cup of the sauce, chicken, broccoli, sweet red pepper or pimento, and black pep-

per. Using a small spoon, carefully stuff each manicotti shell with about 1/4 cup of the filling.

Arrange the shells in a 3-quart rectangular baking dish. Pour the remaining sauce over the shells. Sprinkle with paprika. Cover with foil. Bake in a 350-degree F oven for 25 to 30 minutes or until heated through. Makes 6 servings.

## Dorm form: Cut above the norm



A do-it-yourselfer, some two-by-fours, fabric, secondhand furniture and a dash of imagination can transform a dreary cinder block college dorm room into a "Home Sweet Home" away from home.

When Nicki Yuskowatz walked into her dorm four years ago at Central Michigan University, one word came to mind: institution.

The cinder block walls, cold tile floors and heavy, room darkening drapes in her suite and 22 others on her floor in Herrig Hall weren't exactly the student's notion of warm and inviting decor.

"Right off, I thought, 'If I'm going to live here, it's going to be nice, like home,'" said Yuskowatz, a Farmington Hills resident and 1992 Central Michigan graduate.

For starters, Yuskowatz and her three roommates decided who could contribute the things that are essential to dorm life these days — a TV, stereo, VCR, portable refrigerator and vacuum. From there, they shopped local garage sales to harvest a sofa, chair and lamps to fill the three-room suite.

### STREET STYLES

(Students say lamps are a must-have to replace fluorescent lights that sometimes buzz and always produce yellow glare).

They applied mauve floral contact paper on a half wall above the cinder block and ran matching border from the living room to the two bedrooms. They bought plush blue carpeting at a remnant sale and hung dance posters and a vine wreath.

Inexpensive floral throws from Penney's covered a secondhand velvet love seat and chair. One roommate splurged on a new entertainment center. Total cost: About \$200.

"You need a plan; decide what you need and how to arrange your bedroom and living room so that your things are available to you," said Yuskowatz, whose suite won third place last year in a campus-wide decorating contest.

These roommates happened to have similar taste, but that's not always the case. If you like modern and your roomies want a cowboy western motif, compromise in the living room and do your own thing in the bedroom, they suggest.

You generally can't paint dorm walls or put holes in cinder block (though students say toothpaste fills holes nicely), but don't overlook the decorating power of fabrics and contact paper.

Contact has come a long way since the 1970s, when all you could get were gaudy florals and ditsy prints in primary colors. Today,

there are style choices galore: Art Deco, graphics, geometrics and traditional prints in a range of colors. You'll probably have to remove it when you leave or have it approved by the next resident.

"Men decorate the main living area like a den; women decorate it like a living room," said Mike Thimsen, a 1991 Central Michigan graduate and a resident assistant at coed Tate Hall for two years. "Most guys set up their room around a stereo system and Nintendo. Women decorate with color and seem to change everything twice a year."

Thimsen, a Birmingham resident, said aquariums frequently turn up in men's rooms as do plants, sports and rock music posters. Women, on the other hand, opt for antiques, mementos from home and plush floor coverings "that actually fit and match the room."

Most students who live in residence halls turn to fathers or other do-it-yourselfers to construct a bedroom loft from two-by-fours. It raises the mattress off the floor, allowing room underneath for the school-issued desk and dresser. Best of all, it creates more living area.

Most universities issue guidelines for loft building and do a room check in the fall to make sure they measure up. In Mt. Pleasant, East Lansing and other college towns, some lumber companies sell loft kits; some will even install.

You can reuse the loft each year you're in the dorm and usually sell it to the next resident for a profit, said Yuskowatz. After three years, hers sold for \$80. An interior design major at Michigan State said her stylish loft with built-in storage sold for \$350.

Roger Serr, assistant director of residence life at Michigan State, said dorm life isn't so bad. Some newer halls even have basic cable TV service.

"First year students usually walk in the dorm and say, 'How will I survive this?'" he said. "Six weeks down the line they've done a lot to personalize the room. I've seen engineering students build a stereo, TV and phone into their loft."

College towns are great places for yard sales because sellers know students will snap up almost any furnishings that are in moderately good shape. Secondhand sofas sell for as low as \$30 to \$50 and used carpeting can be found for a few dollars.

You don't need a knack for decorating to turn a generic dorm into a clean, well-lit place. With some inexpensive finds and a

glut of imagination, even a cinder block room with no amenities can win the accolades of fellow students and parents alike.

# 'Helena' is worse than its premise

Kim Basinger made out on this deal. Her much-publicized breach of contract suit may have cost her millions, but it saved her the embarrassment of starring in "Boxing Helena," which opened last week at the Star John R.

The debut film from David Lynch's 25-year-old daughter Jennifer would have made a great short story. A distinguished surgeon, obsessed with a beautiful but unattainable young model, removes her legs, then her arms, so that she will grow completely dependent on him.

Julian Sands plays the doc, Sheryllyn Fenn the amputee, and I'm not sure who comes off worse. Sands, with his long blond hair, hollow cheekbones and wild eyes, has made a career out of obsessive nuts ("Gothic," "Impromptu"), so much so that he has started to parody himself.

Fenn, whose career was launched in "Twin Peaks," plods through one awkward scene after another. Mounted on a throne in the doctor's mansion, arms and legs hidden like some old vaudeville gag, she's completely unconvincing as the selfish model turned real-life Venus De Milo.

As the story goes, she and the surgeon once had a brief fling, but she grew tired of his sexual inadequacy. He believes a woman should help her man overcome problems in the sack, so, in a fantasy sequence, she cheers him quietly on while he ravages a sexy nurse.

Occasionally, the pathetic characters in this Lynchian "Of Human Bondage" really do strike a nerve. The idea, misogynistic at first glance, is actually a startling feminist statement about the desire in some men to keep their women boxed up at all costs.

## MOVIES

The movie focuses primarily on the couple, though Art Garfunkel pops in now and again to ring the doorbell and peer through the glass. He plays the doc's shrink, but he's more like a clown-haired Jiminy Cricket, warning about growing too obsessed with a woman that doesn't care for him.

David Lynch has made a career out of creepy compositions and perverse relationships. Surprisingly, and I suppose to her credit, writer/director Jennifer doesn't swipe too many of his camera tricks although she does rely heavily on wide angle shots and exaggerated sound effects, including a screaming tea kettle.

Worst of all, "Boxing Helena" is a snoozer. Visually, it should have been weirder and more surreal. Now, there's little to hold

your attention other than trying to figure out how they rigged up Fenn's throne so that her legs and arms don't show.

The story behind the film has proved much more interesting than what's unfolding on screen. Madonna, in one of the few wise moves in her film career, also backed out of the project. The MPAA rating board hesitated to grant the film an R rating until Lynch trimmed some sex scenes.

If it wasn't such a loser, "Boxing Helena" might rank among that rare breed of films that are so bad they're good. Tragically enough, it doesn't even have that leg to stand on.

# Schizophrenia still misunderstood

Dear Ms. Schiff: I read the letter from Harriet in yesterday's Observer & Eccentric. She is doing fine; she understands her illness and is trying to educate other people. In listing the resources, Alliance for the Mentally Ill was not mentioned. We have a national, state and local Alliance for the Mentally Ill. Every Tuesday night a support group meets at 6:30 at the Suburban West Community Center, 11677 Beech Daly Road, Redford. Much help and understanding is there. Please do an article on schizophrenia. Mrs. D.A.

Dear Mrs. D.A.,

Thank you for your comments and for alerting the readers of this column to help that is available for them in the community. It is an act of generosity for you to take the time to do so.

Schizophrenia is hotly researched; each year brings greater understanding of its causes and of valid treatment. For years, misunderstanding about the disease led to myths and misconceptions. Even now, one hears schizophrenic incorrectly used as an adjective to describe someone with a split personality. The symptoms of schizophrenia do not include split personality, but are hallucinations (perception of objects or events that are not real), delusions (false beliefs), bizarre behavior, social withdrawal, apathy and limited speech and emotional range.

For the schizophrenic, whatever the combination of these symptoms, there is never peace. One's mind is constantly flooded by chaotic thoughts and feelings of

which no sense can be made. Imagine being continuously bombarded by discordant sounds of cymbals and drums. Under these circumstances, even the simplest of tasks, like dressing or undressing, becomes insurmountable.

Another misconception, which has been disproven, is that of the schizophrenogenic mother, that is, a mother who causes schizophrenia. The cause of diseases of behavior is not yet pinned, however, it is clear that parents' behavior is not the blame. Presently, schizophrenia is understood as a collection of diseases with genetic, hormonal, and possibly viral, precursors.

There have also been some advances in early diagnosis, with some psychiatrists claiming they

can identify signs of vulnerability in the first few years of life. Drug therapy for the disabled patient, in combination with family educational counseling, are the treatments of choice. Clozapine is one of the anti-psychotics used, and risperidone, currently widely researched, shows promise as being highly effective.

Different energy . . . different things.

It wasn't just the suits that got the Detroit-based band into the world-renowned New Music Seminar this summer, it was Black Mali's highly touted sound. During the seminar, in which bands are chosen to play for industry executives, the group did a showcase at the Lion's Den in the city's West Village.

"We did pretty well. It was a warm crowd. We got an encore. The bar was thrilled with our presence," said guitarist Ted Canaday.

Manager J.P. Donahue said being at NMS helped begin the new mission of the band, which also includes Joe Canaday, Geoff Coman and Brian Smith.

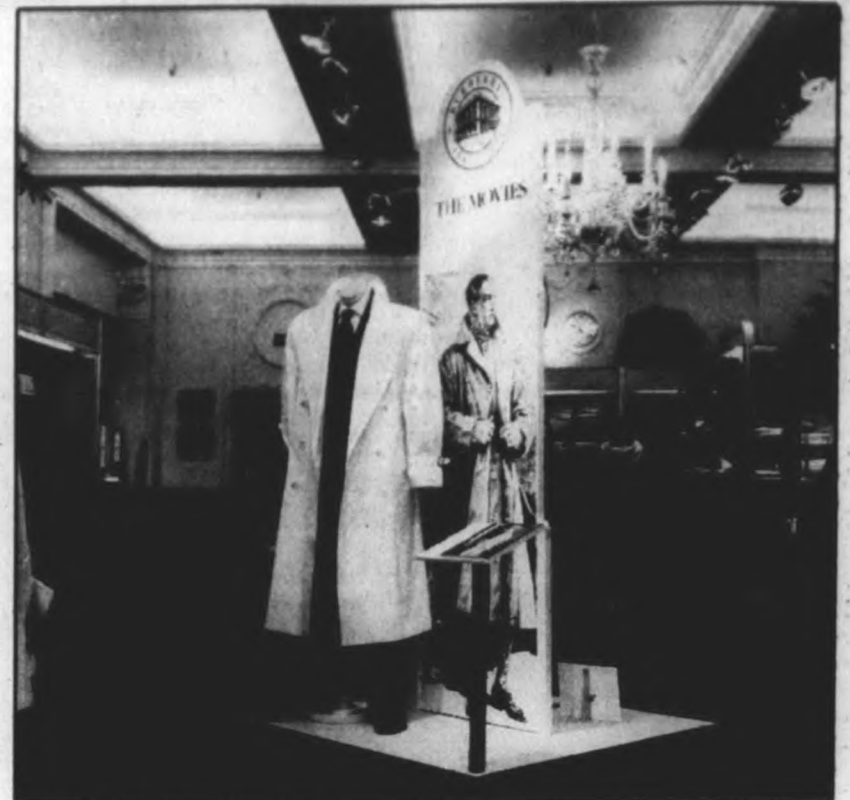

"We delighted in each piece of historical accessory we uncovered, including a WWI RAF (Royal Air Force) Officer's sword and a hat with a gorgeous plume."

Feemster said 15 vintage garments will be displayed in the store Sept. 10-30 for the first time in the United States. The clothing comes from museums and private collections all over Europe.

Two weeks ago a PBS camera crew set up in the store to tape a special program on the history of Burberrys. The documentary will be a tribute to the company that has served heads of state, men of letters, military men and women, film stars, explorers, foreign leaders and the British monarchy.

### Let it breathe

It all started with the invention of garbardine by draper Thomas Burberry of Basingstoke Hampshire, England in 1856. Burberry was determined to find a waterproof fabric that would let air reach the body, after listening to a local physician berate the rubber-lined macintosh of the day. Though waterproof, he argued, the macintosh was unhealthy and uncomfortable.

Taking a clue from the linen smock-frocks worn by shepherds and farmers, he realized that the ability to keep out the wet depended on the close weave of the fabric combined with a loose style of the garment. After years of experimentation, Burberry produced a superb cloth proofed in the yarn before weaving by a secret process (in which no rubber was used) and then closely woven and proofed again by the same process in one piece.

He called the cloth garbardine, after from a line in Shakespeare's The Tempest — "I hid me under the Garbardine for fear of the storm."

Garbardine was advertised as "a cloth for all seasons — a garment for all the elements." It was rechristened "the Burberry" by King Edward VII who got accustomed to yelling "Give me my Burberry!" as he bounded out the castle door.

### In the trenches

Burberry's most famous creation, the trenchcoat, was designed for British officers fighting in the trenches during WWI. The original features, epulets and belt loops, were for attaching equipment, but they remain on modern raincoats as a stylish feature.

The outdoorsy set quickly became steady Burberry customers and the garment line was expanded to include

## Dinersty: Just woks in

If you want a break from the burgers and fries syndrome, the new Dinersty restaurant is the place to go.

The quasi-fast food restaurant has 135 hot entrees to savor in the dining room or take out. Chinatown has come to downtown Plymouth.

Just place your order at the counter and be ready to pick up the tray when your number is called a few minutes later.

The kitchen's huge woks are presided over by several chefs and are visible from the counter. Sizzle and steam accompany the mixed aroma of seared beef, chicken, pork, squid and scallops. The Dinersty is the second self-service dining restaurant for Khee Kwok who opened The Dinersty in Ann Arbor a few years ago.

If business is good, he would like to open more. Kwok bought the old Cloverdale Dairy building at 447 Forest Ave. in downtown Plymouth and spent most of the summer remodeling it to suit his concept of modern dining convenience.

The bold purple exterior of The Dinersty has raised a few eyebrows in the quaint, downtown community. But in just three weeks, the restaurant has become a popular lunch spot.

"I've been here about 10 times," said Doug Ferner of Huntington Woods who works in Plymouth. "I recommend the Singapore-style rice noodles. It's a delicious lunch."

The Singapore noodle dish is stir-fried in curry with baby shrimp, jul-

windproof motoring coats, tear-proof shooting garments and "liberty-giving" golf suits "with such devices as pivot sleeves and expanding pleats which ensure increased downswing and perfect follow through when driving."

Burberrys were worn on the polar expeditions of Scott, Amundsen and Shackleton. Suits and tents were specially-designed and made by Burberrys for these treks.

Burberry clothing was also worn by balloonists, mountain climbers and aviators. Styles

ranged from the long, heavy draught-proofs coats for motorists to the original "Walking Burberry" inspired by the smocks of farmers with easy-fitting lines, fly-front fastening and raglan sleeves.

A lined Burberry coat "guaranteed to last a life-time" sells for about \$700 today. Unlined versions start at \$395. Burberrys' has a line of accessories and brings out a new collection of suits, sweaters and slacks each season.

There are only 17 Burberrys stores in the United States. The one in the Somerset Collection

opened in 1986. Carol Stoehr of Bloomfield Hills has shopped there on many occasions.

"The clothing is so well-constructed and designed I feel like a queen when I'm wearing them," she said. "My favorite piece is a lovely camel-hair suit that I can dress up in different ways with different accessories. I love the classic look of Burberrys. They never sell anything faddish. I just bought a raincoat and I'm waiting for foul fall weather to try it out."

### Star treatment

Burberrys went Hollywood in

the 1940s when Marlene Dietrich and Bette Davis wore trenchcoats in "Witness for the Prosecution" and "Deception." Burt Lancaster and Robert Mitchum sported them in "Sorry, Wrong Number" and "Farewell My Lovely."

The yellow raincoat worn by Warren Beatty as Dick Tracy in 1990 was also designed by Burberrys. Other celebrated customers have included Sir Winston Churchill, Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, Rudyard Kipling, George Bernard Shaw, Katharine Hepburn and Dustin Hoffman, to name a few.

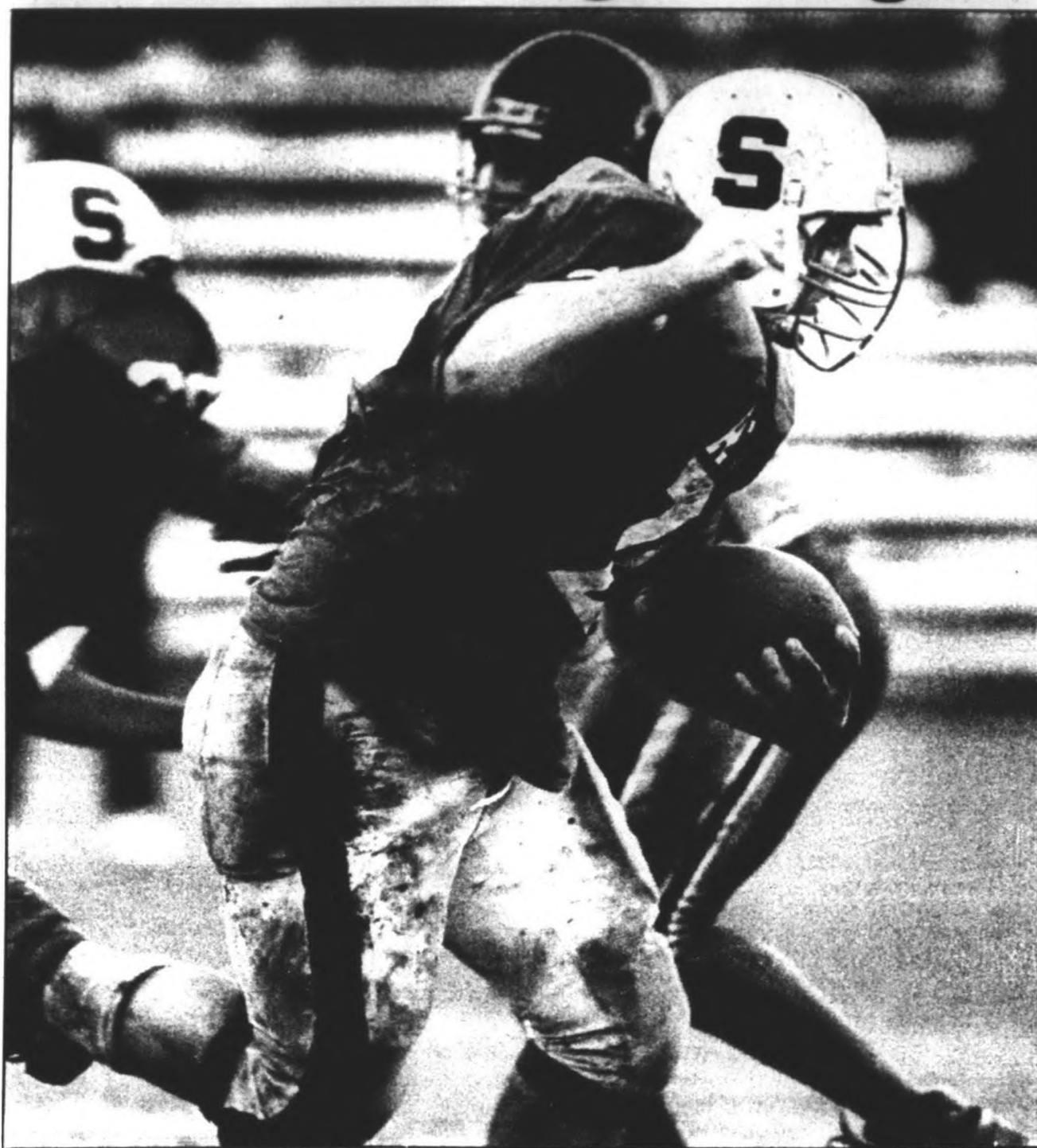

Plymouth Salem overcame the odds and obstacles to defeat visiting Belleville in its first football game Friday night, 16-7.

The Plymouth Salem football team had plenty of excuses not to win its season opener against Belleville Friday.

First, the Rocks were forced to practice the past few weeks wondering if they were even going to have a season because of the failure of a millage vote and continuing budget problems.

If that wasn't enough to think about, Salem players read they didn't have much a chance to beat the Tigers, which had one of the area's most touted quarterbacks in Ralph Truitt.

But the Rocks put all distractions aside and shut down Truitt and his teammates for a 16-7 victory at muddy Centennial Educational Park.

"We're tremendously happy with the way we played," Salem coach Tom Moshimer said. "I thought we could win but we knew we'd have to play well and we did. This was one of our best openers ever."

"Nobody thought we'd win. I told the kids before the game and I told them after that reporters don't win games in the newspapers; players win them on the field."

The Rocks received the official word the game was on Thursday when the teachers voted to approve a pay freeze until next year. The announcement ended weeks of speculation.

"I don't know what that did to the team but it was draining," Moshimer said. "The past month was the longest of my life and I'm sure it was long for the players, too. Chiefs lose another heartbreaker

It was only the first game of a new football season, but it looked like the last game in the Silverdome when it was over.

Plymouth Canton players lay prostrate on the soggy turf and Monroe players whooped it up after the host Trojans defeated Canton 12-6 in overtime Friday.

It marked the second straight season opener in which Monroe pulled out a victory at the end of the game. The Trojans scored on the last play a year ago to win 14-13.

"That's not snake-bit; that's alligator-bit," Canton coach Bob Khoenle said.

"We talked about how they were going to come in here and remember last year," Monroe coach Ralph Car-

ducci said. "We told our kids 'This is a new year, be positive and remember what it felt like to win last year.'"

Khoenle was in no mood to joke, however. He was upset with the way his team — a mostly veteran squad — played after losing two fumbles, having three passes intercepted and failing to capitalize on a lengthy fourth-quarter drive.

"You just can't do things like that," he said. "It was not very good. We're not pleased with this at all."

"I don't think coming back (next week against North Farmington at home) will be any problem. It's just execution; we have to quit fumbling and making big mistakes."

The Chiefs might have won with a

dramatic finish as they held the ball for 9:26 of the fourth quarter and moved 65 yards in 11 plays to the Monroe 20.

But a penalty for illegal procedure and a quarterback sack stopped the drive and forced Canton to punt from the Monroe 35.

"You have to do it yourself," Khoenle said. "You never should have done it. You have to execute. We have kids who played all last year who aren't doing what they're supposed to do."

The Chiefs stopped Monroe and got the ball back with 57 seconds left at the Monroe 42. Jeff Fliess attempted a 39-yard field with 16 seconds remaining, but the ball was short of the goalpost.

Monroe took the ball first in overtime and scored on second down

when backup quarterback Robby Redmon passed 8 yards to Shawn Pitt. The conversion pass failed.

Canton gained nothing on first down with a rushing attempt, and Brett Elledge's second-down pass was intercepted by Kirk Dixon.

"They scored and we didn't. We could have kicked the PAT and won the game," Khoenle said. "But we get down here and we can't block this guy and we can't block that guy."

Canton scored first when it recovered a fumble deep in Monroe territory early in the game. Tim Moritz leaped to catch an Elledge pass for the score.

The Trojans responded with a scoring drive on their next possession, which ended with Chad Eby scoring on a 5-yard run.

Canton girls topple defending 'A' champs

Everybody knew Plymouth Canton had a good team in girls basketball, but the Chiefs (3-0) gained even more respect and credibility Thursday.

Canton's stock hit an early-season high when the Chiefs defeated defending Class A champion Birmingham Marian in its own gym 59-54.

"First of all, this team is playing very well together," said Canton coach Bob Blohm of the perfect start. "The teamwork is awesome."

"The defense has been pretty solid. This is a real competitive, hard-working group, and that's really the key. They get better every time they play."

In the finale, the Mustangs missed an opportunity to tie the score and Canton started making free throws after that. Britta Anderson made all four in the fourth, and Nounne sank two after an intentional foul to push the Canton lead to five and enable the Chiefs to work the clock.

"Ralph didn't play as well as he could have. You could tell it was our first game. The team as a whole made more mistakes than we should have."

The Salem defense took control of the game early, stopping the Tigers on three plays. Belleville didn't pick up its initial first down until 5:55 of the second quarter and only made five first downs in all.

Salem marched down field on its first possession, going 52 yards in 13 plays and eating up more than six minutes on the clock. The duo of Shepley and senior tailback Brian Neal ran five and eight times, respectively, before Shepley finished the drive on a 6-yard run over left tackle.

Shepley and Neal each carried 16 times for 60 yards. The Rocks had a total of 178 yards in total offense and made 10 first downs.

The Rocks lined up for the extra point with the offensive line over at the left hash mark, leaving just the snapper, kicker, holder and Shepley. Lear took the snap and before spotting the ball, found Shepley wide open in the right corner of the end zone for the easy two.

The Tigers, meanwhile, were shooting themselves in the foot by committing seven penalties in the first half for 48 yards.

Belleville did get it going midway through the second quarter. A 35-yard scamper by Josh Speller (10 carries for 85 yards) gave the Tigers the ball at the Salem 8. Two plays later, Speller scored from 5 yards out. Doug Walters' extra point closed the margin to one.

Both teams exchanged turnovers before Salem led 8-7 at half-time.

Salem had trouble getting anything going on offense thanks to Belleville's Curtis Balough (6-foot-3, 235). The senior defensive end dominated the line of scrimmage and twice stopped the Rocks on third-and-short attempts.

But the Rocks got the momentum back when junior Matt Foley intercepted a Truitt pass and returned it to the Salem 39. Nine running plays later, Shepley completed the 61-yard drive with a 2-yard burst up the middle.

"We tried to keep it inside and go outside when we could," Moshimer said. "I think the field conditions were in our favor, but I'm not sure if it made a difference in the game. It hurt our option game, also."

"The field was the same for both, but (Shepley) took advantage of it," LaPointe said. "He just plowed along. He's short and powerful and this was a fullback's type field."

On the extra-point try, Lear took the snap and before placing the ball down picked it up and squeezed through two defenders for the second two-point conversion.

"We talked about the first one, but they still made it," LaPointe said. "On the second one, I thought we had him pinned in, but he slipped by us."

Moshimer could have taken the credit on the plays but instead gave credit to his special teams coach.

"Coach Tom Alles called the plays," Moshimer said. "They are read plays, but Alles prepared the team for those situations."

The Rocks ended Belleville's hopes when Jeremy Eaton and Rich Giddings stopped Pruitt 3 yards shy of a first down on a fourth-and-10. Salem's next three games are on the road, starting at Northville next Friday.

# Shamrocks stomp Henry Ford, 34-0

It appears Redford Catholic Central's football team hasn't missed a beat since winning last year's state Class AA football championship.

The Shamrocks started slowly, but finished with a bang in demolishing Detroit Henry Ford in Saturday's season opener at the Pontiac Silverdome, 24-0.

"Everybody on the line is new, we had nine guys on offense starting their first game and eight on defense," CC coach Tom Mach said. "I'm really proud of the way they played."

"In the first half we made mistakes, but that is to be expected. But I'm happy with the way we regrouped in the second half. We pounded it in and played our kind

of football."

Senior tailback Fred Taylor certainly picked up where he left off in 1992, rushing for 142 yards in 12 carries.

He opened the scoring with 10:56 left in the second quarter, dashing 82 yards for a touchdown. CC ran only one series and gained 2 yards in the first quarter. But the Shamrocks grinded their way down the field against the undermanned Ford defense over the final three periods.

With 9:52 remaining in the third quarter, Taylor broke free again on a 36-yard TD run.

The Shamrocks added a 43-yard field goal from Adam Borchert with 37 seconds left in the quarter to make it 17-0.

In the final quarter, it was a vintage CC scoring drive.

The Shamrocks moved 72 yards in 14 plays, consuming 8:31 on the clock, capped by John Spolsky's 2-yard TD run with 1:19 left.

"It's tough when you've got to play both sides of the ball," Henry Ford coach Mike Marshall said. "We started four freshmen. We had six guys who played little league last year. We just got worn down. They (CC) just don't make mistakes."

Spolsky, a 5-foot-9, 215-pound sophomore who bench presses 355 pounds, rushed for 85 yards in 17 carries and showed the ability to catch the ball out of the backfield (two catches for 23 yards).

"John is the prototype fullback," Mach said. "He's a rough customer who likes to go inside. It's nothing fancy, just good power and speed. He just a super kid

and a hard worker who is only going to get better."

New CC quarterback Barry Lingelbach also showed flashes of promise.

The 5-11, 170-pound senior hit five of six passes for 48 yards, but also rushed for 29 yards in five carries.

"He handled himself real well and made good decisions," Mach said. "He gives us some versatility this year. I think he'll get better every game, too."

CC racked up 308 total yards to Henry Ford's 121.

Henry Ford committed a pair of turnovers as Ken Marzec and Dan Wroblewski picked off passes. The Shamrocks held on fourth down early in the second quarter after the Trojans marched down to the CC 20.

# S'craft netters remain talented team

If there wasn't some sort of major obstacle to overcome, it wouldn't be a Tom Teeters' team.

Maybe that's a mark of a good coach — finding challenges, then prodding his team to meet, and beat, them. And whatever else might be said of Teeters, few can argue his coaching credentials.

Keeping in form, the Schoolcraft College volleyball coach now entering his ninth season has lamented the loss of several key players (a common ailment at the two-year college level, where rebuilding is constant) and a general lack of speed.

But consider the source before forming an opinion on the Lady Ocelots' chances.

In other words, it might be difficult to overestimate them.

Among those "key" losses are outside hitter/setter Nancy Ehlert, who walked away from a scholarship at the University of Toledo after one day of practice; Julie Wood, an outside hitter now attending (and playing for) Madonna University; and Jennifer Dampousse, an outside hitter who opted not to return.

Dampousse's loss is bothersome because she had eligibility remaining and, as Teeters put it, "We lost a lot of speed when she decided not to come back."

## Big-time talent

So what's left?

Some solid players in 5-8 Tracia Clendenen (from Walled Lake Central), 5-10½ Danielle Sheehy (Marysville), 5-4 Shannon Capstick (Walled Lake Central), 5-7½ Janine Sproul (Livonia Churchill) and 5-8 Sharla Yaklin (Walled Lake Central).

Clendenen can play anywhere on the front row and is a candidate for front row setter. Sheehy can also play left, middle or right on the front row. Sproul, Capstick and Yaklin are primarily back row defensive specialists.

A solid corps, to be sure, but the additions are more impressive. Particularly the transfers from Henry Ford CC: 5-11 Danielle Pfeffer (Dearborn Edsel Ford) and 6-1 Kristin Barnes (West Bloomfield). Both have sophomore eligibility.

Pfeffer should be one of the top players in the Eastern Confer-

ence. "Danielle looks like she could be our left outside hitter and back row setter. She's really improved her speed," said Teeters.

Barnes is slated for middle blocker or the right side. "She's been working really hard," Teeters said of the former Class A all-stater, "and she's gotten a lot stronger. She's got great hands, and has setting ability. She'll be a right side or middle person, and perhaps play the back row."

## Size and depth

With that lineup, Teeters would have an impressive team — certainly one capable of capturing a ninth-consecutive conference title, and probably a sixth-straight Region 12 crown. But there's much, much more.

Like Julie Campau (Churchill), a 5-10 setter/outside hitter who attended (but did not play at) Michigan State last year. She'll have freshman eligibility.

And freshmen like Margaret Heddle (Ypsilanti), a 5-7 defensive specialist, and Tricia Kazzyka (Warren Woods Tower), a 6-1 middle blocker.

It makes for an impressive, and sizable, lineup. "One of our strengths is our height," said Teeters, but he quickly added, "One of our weaknesses is our lack of speed. We'll hide one and use the other."

Areas Teeters believes will be much improved from last year are blocking and serving. "Our blocking speed is good. If we can make blocking valuable and consistent for us, we can be very good." As for serving: "Our serving has improved greatly. With more height, we should be more consistent and have tougher serves."

Now the weaknesses. "Consistency is a major factor in hitting, and right now it's a concern. Our hitting must be consistent. And passing is a key. If we can serve receive well and pass, we'll do very well."

Hitting consistently, passing effectively, and improving team speed ("Our team speed is in two players — Danielle and Shannon") are goals. If realized, there should be nothing to impede SC's march to conference and region titles, and perhaps even a top-four finish at the NJCAA Tournament in November.

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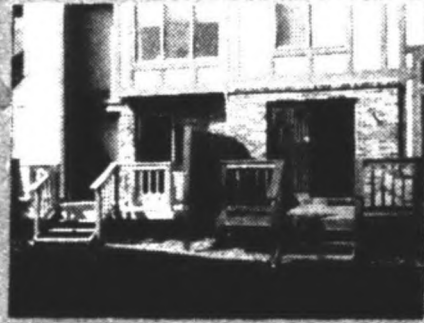
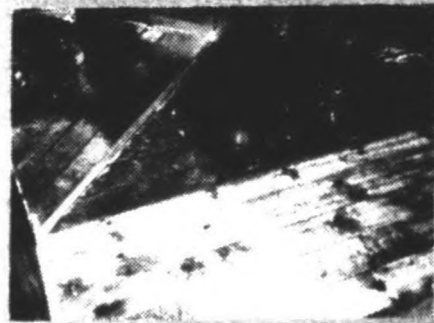
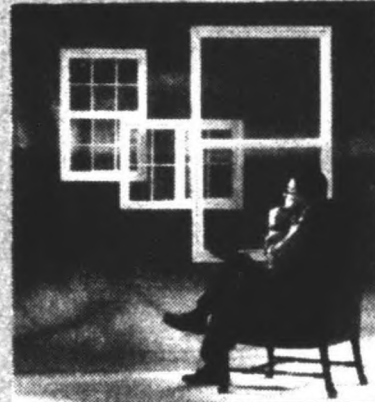
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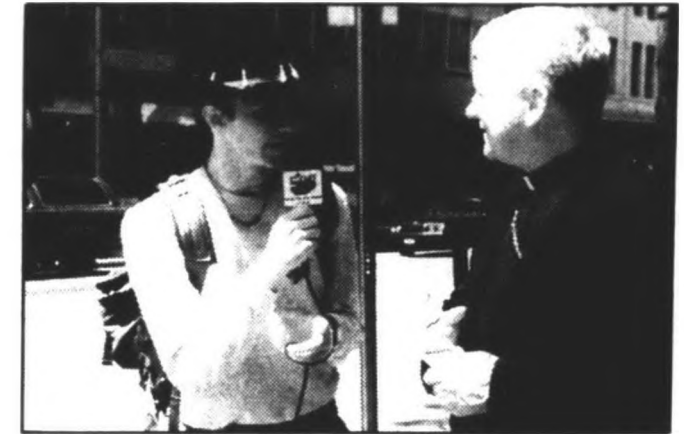
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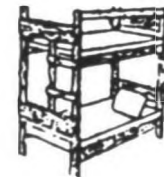


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# Aikman returns, but will Mr. Smith go to Washington?

Super Bowl MVP quarterback Troy Aikman will be strapped up and ready to play when his world champion Dallas Cowboys face off against the Washington Redskins in ABC's "Monday Night Football" season opener on Sept. 6. But will Pro Bowl running back Emmitt Smith, who at press time was still holding out, be there too?

Aikman has been chomping at the bit for more playing time this preseason after recovering from off-season back surgery. Coach Jimmy Johnson has stood firm, keeping his golden boy on ice to make sure Aikman would be 100 percent ready for the Cowboys' opener against Washington. When the injury was first diagnosed, doctors and team officials predicted

Aikman could miss four to six weeks of the regular season, but Aikman's remarkable recuperative ability and his hard work during rehabilitation have expedited the process.

"He's young, and that's the best part about it," says "Monday Night Football" commentator Frank Gifford. "I had back surgery myself a few years ago, and I wouldn't have wanted to play right away."

The 'Boys won't be the same team without Smith, who has led the NFL in rushing yards and touchdowns over the past three seasons. Smith has been holding out for a contract similar to Thurman Thomas' \$4 million-a-year deal. Without him, the Cowboys put the running game into the inexperienced hands of rookie Derrick Lassic, a fourth-round pick from Alabama, and

Michael Beasley, who spent the past season on Dallas' developmental squad.

When Smith's holdout began, most of Dallas was sure that owner Jerry Jones would have Smith signed before the season opener, but as the summer wore on, doubts crept in. This was bad news for Aikman and wide receiver Michael Irvin, who rely on Smith's potent rushing attack to open up the Cowboys' aerial show.

The Redskins open the 1993 season with a new coach, Richie Petitbon, who takes over for the retired Joe Gibbs after a long stint as Washington's defensive coordinator. Petitbon's arrival has already been felt by Redskins followers, who have seen their team experiment with a two-back set for the first time in years.

"I don't know why he hasn't been a head coach somewhere sooner, after all the big years he's had personally," says Gifford. "I just hope he's the kind of guy that can make the transition from a great assistant coach to a head coach. When you're a head coach, you've got to be half shrink, half P.R. man and 100 percent coach. Richie will have to do it in his own way."

The Redskins are trying to recover from a subpar 1992 season, despite going 9-7 and making it into the playoffs as a wild card. Last year's biggest disappointment was the performance of quarterback Mark Rypien, who fell from the heights of Super Bowl MVP to the basement of NFC passers.

"I think Rypien will probably be a lot different this year," Gifford predicts. "He went into a kind of a shell last year at the beginning of the season and had a couple of really bad games."

"As a team, I think they were embarrassed about what happened last season, but I would say that this year, they'll be the team right behind the Cowboys in their division."

CBS has high hopes for 'Angel Falls'

It looked as though there was going to be a void in the world of prime time after CBS canceled "Knots Landing" last season. It was the end of an era for nighttime soaps. But this season CBS has come to the rescue with a new soap based on a small town in Montana, called "Angel Falls."

Will it have the glitz and glamour of "Knots Landing"? Probably not, but it does promise passion and reality.

"Angel Falls," which debuted Aug. 26, is the story of a woman, Rae Dawn Snow (Chelsea Fields). After her father dies, Rae Dawn goes home to the small town where she was raised. Once there, her life becomes intertwined with the lives of those who never left. She meets the man she was in love with years ago and realizes she still has the same passion for him.

The show's writer and co-executive producer, Joyce Eliason, knows her material. She is from a small town in Utah, and many of the things she writes about are culled from her own experiences - although she is quick to point out that the show is not based on any one particular town or person.

"When you are from a small town, you make these lifetime friendships because you know these people from the time you are a little child until you grow up and leave," says Eliason. "Then you go away, but you still have these dreams from when you were a child, and they are connected to this place. Whenever I go home, it is like I never left because I always have that connection. It is strange but comforting."

Eliason says there is a reason for placing "Angel Falls" in Montana. "There is kind of a mythical feeling about the American West. There are still things that are open and free there, and there is still good air to breathe and clear streams. In a way it is a little bit of a fantasy that you can go back there, find love and be a part of the wild frontier."

"Angel Falls" has an impressive cast, including Peggy Lipton, Kim Cattrall, James Brolin, Brian Kerwin and Cassidy Rae. But only time and ratings will tell if the show is a success.
