

Fretter vetoes Highland deal

City of Plymouth officials were relieved when it was announced Fretter Inc. would take over the former Highland facility and continue paying taxes close to \$67,000. The balloon was burst when Fretter pulled out of the deal, citing building costs.

revenue next year, city manager Steve Walters said Friday.

"The building turned out to be more expensive than we anticipated based on repairs, maintenance, expenses and so on," said Fretter legal counsel Stuart Garson Friday.

Fretter maintains headquarters in Livonia.

"We haven't decided where we're going to go yet," Garson said, as the company is seeking to merge company offices and warehouse operations.

Asked if offering a tax abatement at the Plymouth site would have kept Fretter interested, Garson said, "That may have been of some interest."

Last month, Fretter officials said they planned to put in a bid on the property at a U.S. bankruptcy court hearing Thursday.

At the hearing, Judge Ray Graves approved a plan to pay out \$37 million to Highland's unsecured credi-

tors — about 33 cents on the dollar owed — and put \$17.5 million in escrow for disputed claims.

Highland began liquidation procedures in March after filing for Chapter 11 bankruptcy protection in August 1992.

Of Fretter pulling out, Walters said, "In the short term it doesn't have any impact."

He said ideally the city would like to see an industrial user obtain the property, as this would provide more

House sheds light on local history

Dale Freels and his family moved to a newly built house in Novi, but it just wasn't right.

"Old houses have so much more character than the new ones," Freels said.

Plus, their collection of restored antique furniture "didn't look right" in the newly-built home.

So in 1985, his family found a special house on South Union, built in 1893.

"My wife and I have always enjoyed antiques. We found a house to put them in," he said.

He and his wife, Nancy, are seeking to have the house at 168 S. Union put on the National Register of Historic Places. The Michigan Historic Preservation Review Board reviews such requests.

If the house is indeed deemed a historic place, it will join the Baker House, 233 S. Main, as the second city dwelling to win such designation.

To be named to the national register, houses must be 50 years old or older and have historic or architectural importance. The program is designed to encourage awareness by the public and community officials," said Bob Christensen, state coordinator of the national program.

Christensen said applicants are asked to show photos, a legal description of the house and other information on applications. The application materials were put together by Christensen, the local American Association of University Women branch, and the Freelses.

While the house is built in Queen Anne style — marked by elaborate colors, frilly iron work and decorative gables with spindles and knobs, a tower, stained glass and lattice work — it is the only Queen Anne in town built in "Eastlake" style.

This style is marked by decorative furniture design — posts, railings,

Mettetal advisory group charts a steady course

A time of community healing. "We want to get some community healing done," said Mettetal Airport pilot Doug Shumard. "It's time to realize the homeowners and pilots have more in common than they have differences. Let's start plowing some new ground together."

Those feelings marked the end of the first meeting of the seven-member Mettetal Advisory Board Thursday, during which board members and state aeronautics representatives charted their course.

"We'd like them (advisory board) to be the ears for community concerns and address those concerns," said Bill Gehman of the Michigan Aeronautics Commission.

The state — the Michigan Department of Transportation and Michigan Aeronautics Commission — bought the airport in July for \$4 million. The public purchase closed the door on years-long controversy and argument over Mettetal's fate. The purchase was accompanied by an agreement between the state and Canton officials for certain safeguards and assurances, including creation of the advisory board.

The state is seeking proposals

from companies or individuals interested in managing the airport. Two contracts will be sought, one for airport management, the other for a fixed-base operator, who would be responsible for administering services at the airport such as maintenance and flight instruction. A public meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, Oct. 27, at the airport for those who are bidding on the job.

On tap for the coming year will be a master plan for the now-state-owned airport at Lille and Joy roads, as well as a safety audit. Other plans and ideas also were offered, including the possibility of having picnic tables so families can eat while watching the planes, as well as hopes that the airport can become self-sustaining and draw business to the community. A restaurant at the airport also was suggested.

"This is really just a brain-storming kind of thing," said board chairman Ed Wendover, a newspaper publisher from Plymouth. Board members were asked to compile a wish list of things they would like seen accomplished at the airport by the next monthly meeting at 7 p.m. Thursday, Nov. 4.

Meanwhile, state officials, including Gehman, Mettetal manager Randy Collier, and John Wagner,

School workers lack contracts

With the second month of the school year well under way, Plymouth-Canton school employee groups, including food service, custodial-maintenance, para-professionals, transportation and office personnel still are working without contracts.

"The employer's bargainers continue to tell us they are interested only in a one-year freeze," said Maryann Ligato-Freydl, executive director for the Michigan Education Association. Ligato-Freydl is chief bargainer for three of the groups.

"At this point, we have not received any proposals from the district for the para-professionals and food service. We have received proposals on behalf of maintenance. They not only want a freeze, but they want to take away benefits they already have."

The district's hard-line stance has affected morale, she said.

"Morale is very low in all the groups. It's very difficult, considering what's happening on the state level," said Ligato-Freydl.

"But the groups feel that the school district could be cognizant of the fact that employees would like to be given the same security teachers received. Quite frankly, they don't understand the dis-

trict's unwillingness to do that. Neither do I."

Employees are working under contract extensions.

Errol Goldman, assistant superintendent for employee relations and chief bargainer for the district, said there's good reason for the district's position.

"Generally, the district is concerned about the uncertain situation of education in the state, so we are trying to maintain as much flexibility as we can," he said.

"So the positions we are taking at the table, without confirming anything, are designed to give the board maximum flexibility, yet still be sensitive to concerns of the employee groups."

All groups unofficially have told the district they will settle for a freeze the first year, and re-openers the second two years. Such a package would be similar to the teachers'. Teachers took a pay freeze this year, deferring their 3 percent raise to next year. Their contract calls for wage re-openers next year and the following year.

Goldman said the big difference in bargaining for teachers and other groups is timing.

"The teachers' settlement was reached in March, and conditions have changed significantly since then. So we have to adjust to

those changed considerations as we go through the negotiation process. I'm sure there will be give and take on the issues on both sides.

"A lot will depend on the financial ability of the district, and who knows what's going to happen with funding?"

The state has done away with property tax revenue as the chief funding source for schools. Gov. John Engler's educational finance and reform package has yet to be agreed to by the Legislature.

"The Educational Support Personnel units are sympathetic with that. That's why they're willing to agree to re-openers for the second two years," said Ligato-Freydl.

Kay McAllister, president of the food service union, characterized the district's treatment of cafeteria workers as discrimination.

"In your newsletter," she recently told the board of education, "you said we must draw together as a community. We can't draw together and move forward because we don't have a three-year contract. By your actions, you have treated us differently than the teachers. You have the power to stop this discrimination."

Joyce Harrington, president of the para-professionals' (educational aides) union, told the board

her members "feel like neglected family members."

Chris Gearn, president of the custodial-maintenance group, said employees worked "extremely hard this summer under almost impossible conditions" to get renovated school buildings ready to open. "Morale is low and the burn-out rate is high. There are times when these people are the most important people in the building. One way to address this problem is through negotiations. Let people know they are appreciated. We are willing to serve the community. We hope you are willing to do the same."

Ligato-Freydl said district bargainers were specifically asked whether the district is considering privatizing custodial-maintenance services. "They said no, but they haven't given us a reason, other than that's how they were directed by the board of education."

Talks are scheduled with the para-professionals today, custodial-maintenance Wednesday and food service Thursday.

"We want to settle as soon as possible, but both parties have to agree, so we try not to assign hard and fast dates," said Goldman.

"We have to be flexible. We are going to keep working and try to get contracts resolved. We're optimistic."

ballusters and pendants — used as decoration for the house exterior.

"One of the nice things is that everyone whose owned it didn't try to modernize it — that was one of the things we were looking for in an old house," Freels said.

In researching the house's history, the AAUW found that when Charles Curtis built the house, the tower and many architectural features were nearly out of style. Curtis died two years after it was completed, at age 65, and the house became his wife's.

She sold it in 1901 to the Motts, who sold it to the Carroll family in 1946, who sold it to the Livingston's, who sold it to the Joseph Garcia family, who sold it to the Freelses.

The Freels family is doing its part to keep the house in good repair by doing some maintenance work, including replacing sand placed between stones in the basement with mortar.

The sand, Freels said, "didn't hold up."

"We obviously enjoy old things," he said.

A NIGHT OF SLEEP AFTER A DAY OF ARTHRITIS

Arthritis, advanced sufficiently to need treatment, usually means that a night's sleep is the impossible dream. The usual reality is a night disrupted by pain, followed by an early morning arising characterized by marked stiffness. Retiring for the night poses problems for inflamed joints. Tossing and turning in bed does not provide the activity joints need. Circulation of blood decreases, bringing less heat to joints that need this flow. Furthermore, if you have suffered past sleepless nights, bedtime bring on tension as you worry about another such night.

None of the responses available guarantee success. Take your last dose of arthritis medicine at bedtime. You may keep the bedroom cool but use pajamas and covers that will give you warmth. Use a flat pillow. Keep a simple analgesic at your bedside with a glass of water.

Avoid sleeping pills or night use of tranquilizers. These medications leave you groggy, but not rested, and rarely diminish the pain arthritis gives.

If regular sleep proves elusive, you may have to incorporate a daytime nap into your daily schedule.

Arthritis robs you of rest, at present you may have no choice but to pay up. Return of rest may await a remission of your arthritis or the discovery of a medication whose time, as of now, has not come.

Light show madness

Parks project angers homeowners

Some homeowners are steamed about Wayne County government's plan to stage a light show in Hines Park over the holidays.

The problem is that no one knows exactly how much traffic will be generated by a four-mile-long Hines Park holiday light display planned from Nov. 22 to Jan. 9. The county hopes to attract 60,000 carloads of people who will cruise Hines Drive to see the display and contribute \$5 per car for the pleasure. The light show will operate for about three hours each night, weather permitting. Profits will go to the county parks' budget.

But a group of folks who live near Ann Arbor Trail adjacent to the western entrance of Hines Park don't like the idea because of the expected heavy traffic.

Last Wednesday, five of the residents met with parks officials, Westland police Sgt. Pete Brokas and county commission vice chair Kay Beard, D-Westland, to air their grievances.

"My complaint is the traffic," said Pamela Kirr, who lives on Ann Arbor Trail. "And I've been here 16 years. Every time they have an activity (in Hines Park) they don't include us in the planning. When they have the Marshmallow Drop, it's a disaster at the corner of Ann Arbor Trail and Hines. This is not a temporary situation. This is an ongoing situation."

Parks Director Hurley Coleman notes that the entrance to the light show was moved to Ann Arbor Trail and Merriman to lessen the congestion at Ann Arbor Trail and Hines, where the upset residents live.

At first, the entrance was going to be at Ann Arbor Trail and Hines, but it was moved after the upset residents' concerns were considered, Coleman said.

"We decided (that Kirr) had a legitimate concern and we answered it," said Kathy Lewand of

the parks department. Parks officials believe most of the traffic will approach the park on Merriman Road from I-96 and not drive down Ann Arbor Trail.

But Kirr remains skeptical, prompting Lewand to remark: "She's never going to be satisfied as long as there are people in the park."

Duane Snyder, who also lives on Ann Arbor Trail, attended the meeting, too. "There was just no talking to them, you know," he said. "They're just trying to save their jobs."

"They've got their minds made up. They're going to do it their way. They never asked what suggestions we had."

Coleman said he has done everything possible to help the upset residents short of canceling the light show. "I don't know what else to do," he said. "You come to the point where you realize there are some people who won't be satisfied."

Beard, who lives on Ann Arbor Trail, said moving the light-show entrance will "make all the difference in the world" where relieving traffic congestion concerned.



Senate OKs bill to deregulate trucking

The state would cease regulating 70 percent of intrastate trucking under a bill that cleared the Senate Thursday.

"We did not have the votes for 100 percent deregulation," said the sponsor, Sen. David Honigman, R-West Bloomfield.

"It's good for consumers. It's good for Michigan. There's an enormous concentration of intrastate trucking in the nation because of the auto industry."

Honigman likened the current law, passed in 1933, to Soviet-style regulation.

Honigman's original bill would have provided for total deregulation. After it stalled, it was sent to a second committee, softened and reported out with support from the Teamsters Union and neutrality from the

Michigan Trucking Association. The bill passed 33 to 2 with three absent.

Voting no were Republicans Jack Welborn of Kalamazoo and Fred Dillingham of Fowlerville. Missing the vote was Michael Bouchard, R-Birmingham.

All other area senators voted yes, including George Z. Hart, D-Dearborn, an early opponent of the measure.

Welborn lost amendments calling for total deregulation. Honigman said he agreed philosophically, but a deal had been cut. "We had to give something to get this," he said.

"It's obvious a deal has been cut," said Welborn. "This bill only deregulates the largest shippers. It's a step backwards."

Small movers would be regulated for distances greater than eight miles.

Sen. John Pridnia, R-Hudson Lake, praised Honigman's work on the complex issue, adding that "too much deregulation brings negative results. Look at deregulation of airlines. There are far fewer airlines today because of bankruptcies. Look at buses. Come to northern Michigan and try to book a ride," said Pridnia, whose district covers 15 largely rural counties.

The federal government deregulated trucking in 1980. Within Michigan, about 20 to 30 percent of trucking is intrastate and is regulated by a 1933 law.

Under that law, the state Public Service Commission grants "operating authorities" to trucking companies to carry specified products over certain routes. PSC regulates their prices. It is illegal for a trucker to operate without authority, carry

unauthorized products, use unauthorized routes or charge unauthorized prices.

Whenever a company seeks an operating authority, others can file protests with the PSC. Often lawyers are needed to fight lengthy regulatory battles, according to a Senate staff analysis of Honigman's bill.

Results have been intrastate rates 20 to 25 percent higher than interstate rates, and rates 15 to 20 percent higher than in Ohio and Illinois.

Under Honigman's bill, truckers wouldn't have to file route, cargo or rate information with the PSC, and PSC's and the State Police's roles would be reduced to safety regulation.

Talk show hoaxter has them reach out to touch someone

The Feminist was laughing her head off when I got home from work Wednesday. She was listening — as usual — to that infernal talk radio station — WXYT-1270.

"What's so funny?" I asked.

"This is a hoax," she said. "David Newman's pulling another hoax and his callers are all up in arms."

"So how do you know it's a hoax?"

"It's gotta be. It's too outrageous to be anything else. But these callers don't get it."

She filled me in. Newman's "guest" was some guy named "Joe Callahan," a 39-year-old Livonia resident, who had been named to head up the "enforcement" unit for Bill Clinton's health care plan. The enforcement unit was known as the Health Bureau of Investigation — HBI for short.

"I thought something was wrong when David said Callahan had been the subject of an interview published in the Livonia Eccentric recently."

"There is no Livonia Eccentric," I said.

"I know that," she said. "And so does David. But what really tipped me off was when some caller asked what would happen to doctors who didn't comply with the terms of the health plan. 'Callahan' — or whoever he is — said, 'They'll go to jail.'"

By now I was interested enough to listen in. Sure enough, according to Mr. "Callahan," anyone who didn't sign up for the right kind of insurance coverage under the plan, any employer who didn't follow the rules of the plan, any doctor who didn't go strictly by the books, would end up in the slammer — maybe for as long as five years. The HBI was going to be a tough enforcement unit.

And she was right. Newman's callers were livid. They were outraged. They were furious. But Mr. "Callahan" was

unmoved. Rules were rules and the HBI was there to enforce them.

Near the end of the program a woman caller identified herself as the "wife" of the reporter who had written the article in the Livonia "Eccentric" and said that there was some additional information that hadn't been brought out in Newman's broadcast — something about doctors being allowed to perform community service instead of doing jail time.

"Callahan" said that yes, indeed, there was a provision for some kind of community service in some cases.

Newman thanked the woman for calling and quickly cut her off.

After the last irate caller had hung up, Newman closed the show and confirmed The Feminist's suspicions: It had all been a hoax. "Joe Callahan" was really one of Newman's producers, there was no Health Bureau of Investigation and, although no one said it, there had, of course, been no interview with "Callahan" published in the nonexistent Livonia "Eccentric."

"Satire" was the way Newman explained his hoax. The whole interview had been phony, but he was trying to make a point — a point about how far things could go in a society in which Big Brotherism seems to be growing and growing.

When I got to work the next day, I was not thinking about David Newman and the HBI hoax. Not, at least, until the receptionist approached my desk with a copy of the Livonia Observer in her hand and a scowl on her face.

"Do you know anything about a story we ran about some guy named Callahan and something called the HBI?"

"Oh, geez!" I said. "Who wants to know?"

"Some caller. She wants a copy of the story."

"She must have been listening to David Newman."

"Yeah," the receptionist said. "She said she heard about it on his show."

"Let me talk to her."

It took some talking, but I managed to convince the caller that I, too, had been listening to the broadcast and at the end David Newman said it was all a hoax. There was no Joe Callahan and there was no story about him in our paper.

Six callers later I told the receptionist to stop giving me those calls and no, I was not going up to the lobby to deal with those people who had come in person to get a copy of the Callahan interview.

Although Newman spent much of his Thursday show making it clear that the HBI show was a hoax, people were still calling us on Friday wanting copies of the story.

But it's OK, David. The show was a good put-on and most of the people I talked to ended up laughing after I managed to convince them that their lovable talk-show host had been pulling their legs.

Still, if it was all a hoax, who was that mysterious caller who identified herself as the wife of the reporter who wrote the Callahan piece?

Hmmmm.



Plenty to 'grouse' about in DNR plan

The six wild Canada geese were cooking in the Paul Bunyan sized frying pan. My contribution to dinner was one brook trout and a bottle of Jack Daniels. I tossed the cap in the fire. It wouldn't be needed again.

The passing around of the Jack Daniel's among five geese and ruffed grouse hunters helped stories about the state Department of Natural Resources flow. All were for Gov. John Engler's plan to split the DNR into two agencies, one which would worry about grouse and the other about environmental problems.

However, other moose and goose folks I've talked to don't like the plan. The question is as murky as the Rouge River. The DNR has done a good job of managing our resources, and at a pretty cheap price. We've got some of the best trout streams in the country, and the price of our fishing licenses is still about \$20 bucks.

It's ruffed grouse as anyone who has stepped out of doors in Michigan during the fall knows.

A "ruffed" grouse is an irritated one. And that's what all of us who love Michigan's out-of-doors should be with the yuppie business mindset about Engler's plan.

Sure, the DNR is filled with the same dumb bureaucratic problems we all face, and there are as many inefficiencies as in the schools.

Getting rid of those problems should be like ridding a Michigan trout stream of sea lamprey: Poison it to kill the blood suckers, not the trout.

To do it right, you put the poison in the hands of an experienced conservation worker, not a yuppie business type who doesn't know grouse from sushi.

Engler's plan to reorganize the DNR may be fine, but I'm just afraid he's going to turn it over to the sushi eaters, not those who know a ruffed grouse from a "ruffed" grouse.

ROLL CALL REPORT

Area reps split on new defense budget

Here's how Observer & Eccentric-area members of Congress were recorded on major roll call votes in the week ending Oct. 1

HOUSE

Defense Budget: By a vote of 268 for and 162 against, the

ministration's first military budget (HR 2401). The \$262.8 billion, post-Cold War measure spends four percent less than the comparable bill of a year ago. It cuts missile funds by 25 percent to \$3 billion, shifting from a space-based "Star Wars" priority to the development of interceptor missiles such as the Patriot, which can be deployed in war theaters around the globe. It lowers active-duty strength by 108,000 troops to 1,62 million, provides \$979 million for the former Soviet Union, awards a 2.2 percent military pay hike in January and provides \$6 billion to help defense-dependent communities, workers and companies convert to a civilian economy.

A yes vote was to pass the bill.

Area representatives voting yes were: Bob Carr, D-Pontiac; Dale Kildee, D-Flint; Sander Levin, D-Southfield; William Ford, D-Ypsilanti. Voting no: Joseph Knollenberg, R-Birmingham.

Somalia: By a vote of 406 for and 26 against, the House called upon President Clinton to obtain congressional approval if he wants to keep U.S. troops in Somalia after Nov. 15 in a United Nations peacekeeping force. The amendment was added to HR 2401 (above). Several thousand GIs re-

main in Somalia under U.N. command, down from last year's peak deployment of 25,000 on a mission to ease mass starvation.

A yes vote was to require congressional approval of any U.S. troop deployment in Somalia after Nov. 15. **Area representatives voting yes were:** Carr, Kildee, Knollenberg, Levin, Ford.

Gays in the Military: The House voted 301 for and 134 against to write restrictive language on gays in the military into HR 2401 (above). The language goes beyond the "don't ask, don't tell, don't pursue" policy sought by President Clinton. But it stops short of requiring recruits to be asked about their sexual preference. It permits discharging gays who engage in or attempt to engage in homosexual acts.

A yes vote was to write into law traditional Pentagon restrictions on gays in the military. **Area representatives voting yes were:** Carr, Kildee, Knollenberg, Levin. Voting no: Ford.

Command and Control: By a vote of 192 for and 238 against, the House rejected a motion limiting the deployment of American forces under United Nations command. The Republican motion to HR 2401 (above) sought to require the president to certify to Congress that any such future deployments are in the national interest.

A yes vote supported the certification requirements. **Area representatives voting yes were:** Kildee, Knollenberg. Voting no: Carr, Levin, Ford.

Discharge Petitions: By a vote of 384 for and 40 against, the House adopted a measure (H Res 134) to make public the names of members signing a discharge petition. The petition is a device by which a majority of members — 218 — can force a reluctant committee to send a bill to the floor.

The vote ends the traditional practice of keeping petitioners' names secret until the majority threshold is crossed. The new openness will expose those members who claim to support a bill at the same time they condone its demise in committee. But critics say it will weaken the legislative process by making lawmakers more vulnerable to interest groups.

A yes vote was to remove secrecy from discharge petitions. **Area representatives voting yes were:** Carr, Kildee, Knollenberg, Levin. Voting no: Ford.

Rifle Practice: By a vote of 190 for and 242 against, the House rejected an amendment to end a program that spends \$2.5 million annually to help the National Rifle Association and private gun clubs teach shooting skills to young people. The Civilian Marksmanship Program, set up after the Spanish-

American War, donates ammunition to participating clubs. The vote occurred during debate on the 1994 defense appropriations bill (HR 3116).

Amendment supporter Robert Torricelli, D-N.J., said the program is an indictment of our national priorities. This Congress has been unable to provide funding for children who are eligible for Head Start. Children go to school each day and there are not hot lunches, but we find \$2.5 million to give them free ammunition."

A yes vote was to terminate the program. **Area representatives voting yes were:** Kildee, Knollenberg, Levin, Ford. Voting No: Carr.

Grazing Fees: The House voted 314 for and 109 against in support of sharply higher government fees for ranchers who graze livestock on federal land in the West. The non-binding vote urged a House-Senate conference committee on the Interior Department's 1994 budget (HR 2520) to embrace an administration plan to more than double the fees.

A yes vote was for higher federal grazing fees. **Area representatives voting yes were:** Carr, Kildee, Knollenberg, Levin, Ford.





Squash of any variety vegetable to fall over

Visit any farmers market this time of year, and you'll undoubtedly notice an abundant array of squash.

Hubbard squash that could easily resemble pod people vie for table space next to obscenely shaped crookneck squash.

Acorn squash of all sizes — ranging from bright orange to brackish green — abound next to pumpkins. Turbans, as colorful as the rainbow, are displayed gracefully next to blandly colored butter-nuts.

If you're lucky, you might see some zucchini or yellow summer squash.

But the Janes Gang's two fall¹ squash favorites, by far, are the little pattypans and bright yellow spaghetti.

James Beard once said that the pumpkin was the most famous of all winter squash varieties. Not wishing to contradict one of the best cooks of the century, I would probably agree.

Beard would probably argue that the pumpkin would be considered the most versatile, but momma only used pumpkin in her famous pie, period.

We would have squashed any and all attempts to make pumpkin soup in Wyandotte, let alone stir it into a quick bread. Even an attempt at steaming and mashing and plopping it on a plate next to meatloaf would have been looked upon with disdain.

I remember being served acorn squash and butternut squash once a year. They were usually baked upside down on a cookie sheet then right-sided and topped with butter and brown sugar, which led to a quick trip under the broiler.

We were mainly a meat-and-potatoes kind of a family, and if a vegetable ever did appear, it usually took the form of a wedge of lettuce gracefully topped with a dollop of Miracle Whip and garnished with a slice of canned pineapple. This was usually served only when company was coming.

Nowadays, the Janes Gang heralds the harvest season with an almost daily ritual of squash in some form. Tonight for instance, noticing three lonely pattypans that resemble small spaceships hiding in the vegetable crisper, yours truly decided to run them through the grater on my Cuisinart and press them into a hot skillet sizzling with butter. A firm press with the back of a spatula and a generous sprinkling of salt and pepper was all that was needed to transform an otherwise bland vegetable into a hash brown look alike.

Microwave squash

Last night the family enjoyed a spaghetti squash, steamed in its entirety in the microwave and then seeded and tossed with some Parmesan, pepper, a sprinkling of bacon bits and some caramelized onions. I'm probably more apt to lean toward cooking a spaghetti, acorn, butternut or turban squash than any other simply because all that's required is a few jabs with a knife and the press of a few buttons on the microwave.

I prefer to cook them whole, in their shell and can readily do so in the microwave by simply remembering the squash-in-the-microwave rule-of-thumb, which is simply put: 6 minutes per pound on high. Nuking the squash saves valuable stove space, and I don't have to dirty a pot. If you don't have a scale and can't estimate the weight, just cook it till it feels like a deflated basketball.

If you're cooking for one or two, half a squash can be cooked by covering tightly with microwave approved plastic wrap. Again, I would question the cooking of a half a squash simply because even if you have leftovers, the cooked squash can easily be stirred into soup or made into a quick bread or better yet, tossed with a few eggs and spices and made into a pie.

The pattypan is probably the most flavorful of all the winter squashes, and in my opinion, gets sweeter as it cooks. All the other squashes are noted for their bland taste and would definitely require the addition of some salt, pepper, brown sugar, cheese or herb. You can expect to see all of the above mentioned squashes readily available throughout the winter, probably because they keep so well. The pattypan and crookneck, in addition to the zucchini, are classified as summer squashes, and they will be fizzing out soon, but the others should be available way into spring.

Dieters will especially appreciate fresh squash as it can be chunked and steamed, boiled, microwaved and baked with nary a hint of fat.

Bread Winner

Blue-ribbon cook 'leaves' around kitchen



Every year, Evelyn Dugal rises to the occasion and enters her delicious breads and cookies in contests at the Michigan State Fair. She wasn't always a prize-winning cook. Dugal learned by doing, and we all know — practice makes perfect.

This has been a blue-ribbon year for Evelyn Dugal of Troy. This year she entered 10 cooking contests at the Michigan State Fair, and took home eight ribbons.

"We all love to try her baked goods and homemade jellies when she brings them into work," said Linda Parsons who works with Dugal at the Troy Police Department. "Evelyn is talented and energetic individual, who besides being a great baker, is also a wonderful cook."

Dugal won first place ribbons for her white bread and oatmeal raisin cookies; second place for her French, wheat, rye and gingerbread; third place for potato bread; and fourth for molasses cookies.

Forty years ago, Dugal was a blushing bride who didn't know much about cooking. "My mom always cooked. My sisters and I cooked a little," said Dugal who is department

secretary in the crime prevention section of the Troy Police Department. Newly married, she had a problem — her husband Chuck hated store bought bread.

"My grandma used to bake bread and we had it every Sunday for dinner at her house," said Chuck who grew up on the East side of Detroit in the Assumption Grotto parish area — Six Mile and Gratiot. "My mom was never a baker. We got freshly baked bread once a week at grandmas. It was special."

Encouraged by her husband who told her "you can make bread," Evelyn studied cookbooks. "I started reading a Betty Crocker cookbook and looked at the pictures to see how it's supposed to look. I realized I had the capability. I still have that cook-book."

She started baking bread in 1959, entered her white bread recipe in the Michigan State Fair in 1969, and won second place. After her son, Charles

III was born, she stopped entering contests, but kept baking bread.

Two daughters followed — Susan who is married to Darren Whitcher and lives in California, and Andrea, who is married to Jim Edwards and lives in Royal Oak. Evelyn recently became a grandmother, her grandson, Myles lives with his parents in California.

When the family moved to Troy in 1968, Chuck had a double oven installed in the kitchen so Evelyn could bake the family's bread. "I used to make eight loaves at a time when the kids were little. Four loaves on top, four on the bottom," said Dugal.

With her children grown, and settled, Dugal started thinking about entering cooking contests again. She's been entering her delicious baked goods in contests at the Michigan State Fair for the past four years. She still doesn't buy bread, she makes it, and gives a lot away to her appreciative friends and neighbors.

Over the years she perfected her techniques, and developed a feel for bread making. By the touch of her hand she can tell if water from the faucet is the right temperature for dissolving yeast, and if there's enough flour to work the dough.

She still doesn't buy bread, she makes it

"White bread is the easiest to make," she said. "Wheat and rye bread are made with heavier flours that don't rise as well."

She enjoys experimenting. "She's got hundreds of recipes," said Chuck who enjoys helping Evelyn make breadsticks. He likes to put red hot pepper seeds on the dough and bake them for a zesty treat.

Some of Evelyn's recent creations include — bread made with fresh spinach, onions and garlic, and dillweed and cottage cheese.

Her favorite tools for bread making are a Kitchen Aid Mixer for mixing and kneading dough, and a marble rolling pin.

"I used to have a wooden pin, but I like the marble one better. It helps you get air bubbles out of the dough. It was on sale, I tried it and liked it."

Here's a tip she passes along for making cookies — "take them out just before they're completely cooked, they continue to cook after you take them out of the oven. Put the cookies on racks to cool."

Working mom dashes from car to kitchen

Many youngsters have busy working moms who can whip up a batch of brownies or hurriedly mix a meat loaf for dinner, but 11-year-old Emily Sibthorp is a little luckier than most. Her mom Sally is a prize-winning cook.

Sibthorp, a single mother who lives in Rochester Hills with Emily and older daughter, Sharon, 17, has entered numerous recipe contests over the years. She's often won, including the time she entered the 1989 Crisco Baking Con-

test, and was named the Michigan winner for her "Secret Blueberry Pie" that featured the flavors of cinnamon and orange rind.

Recently, she entered six of the eight recipe contests held during the Michigan State Fair, and walked away with three awards — first place in the Blueberry Creation Contest sponsored by the Michigan Blueberry Growers, second place in the Cherry Pie Baking Contest sponsored by the Cherry Council of Michigan, and third place in the Sure-Jell Contest for her homemade orange marmalade which she used to create the delicious prize-winning stir-fry dish she calls "Company Chicken."

"It has a sweet-and-sour tang because of the oranges," she explained.

During the week Sibthorp dashes off to her job as a technical writer at Phoenix Group, Inc. in Farmington Hills after Emily's school bus has left at 7:10 a.m. She doesn't make it back to her cozy mobile home until 6:30 p.m., so Sibthorp has to race from her car to her kitchen as soon as she's parked. "I have to. I have a hungry 11-year-old waiting for me," she laughed.

Sibthorp is bright and cheery as she prepares one of her family's favorite quick, but delicious meals

Quick Beef Pasties. While she browns a pound of ground beef she "nukes" some cut-up carrots in the microwave.

"I usually use frozen peas and carrots, but I don't have any right now," she said as she sprinkled some onion powder over the browning beef.

After Sibthorp adds some cut-up leftover roast potatoes and canned gravy to the beef and carrots, she cuts six rounds from some pastry she's mixed up quickly, seals the edges of each pie and pops them into the oven where they will bake "just until the crust is done."

A delicious and easy cheesecake-like dessert, Peach Mousse Parfait, which can be whipped up

fast from fresh peaches (or any other kind of fresh fruit), cream cheese, whipped topping and jam, completes the meal. Sibthorp, Emily and Sharon will sit down to this evening.

Normally, Sibthorp said, they skip dessert and have a salad and vegetable to compliment the main dish. Or the girls go for her homemade biscuits which she serves frequently because they can also be prepared quickly.

On weekends she spends much of her leisure time "heading out for fruit stands," so she can make jam. This time of year she also bakes a lot of peach and apple crisps.

Do her daughters share their mother's love of cooking?

Emily says she likes to make spaghetti. She browns some ground beef and adds Ragu spaghetti sauce.

"Only the original Ragu — the spin-off sauces are too sweet," added Sibthorp.

But most of the time the girls are as busy as mom. Emily is a sixth grader at Hart Middle School in Rochester, and Sharon attends adult education at Rochester High School in the evenings and goes to beauty school at the Michigan College of Beauty in Troy during the day. She doesn't get home until 10 p.m. — so it's nice to get Mom's delicious leftovers from dinner.

Although you might think Sibthorp always loved to putter

around in the kitchen, she didn't. But when she was a teenager her younger three sisters (she had two older brothers as well) would "experiment" after her mother left the house.

"She didn't let us cook a lot, but she would let us take scraps of pie crust, sprinkle cinnamon and sugar on top and bake them," Sibthorp said.

Does she have any recipe contests coming up?

Sibthorp said she plans to enter the National Pillsbury Contest where you can submit "any recipe" and a chicken company contest "where you have to come up with a chicken recipe."

She leaned over the kitchen

counter, putting her elbows behind a bright splash of yellow and purple potted mums and a large turban squash.

"This is what I like," she said smiling. "I love to come up with new recipes — to cook and to compete."

QUICK BEEF PASTIES

Pastry for two pie crusts, or two frozen pie crusts (dough)
1 pound ground beef
4 small potatoes (1 pound), scrubbed
1 cup frozen peas and carrots
1 16-ounce jar beef gravy
2 teaspoons onion powder
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper

In a frying pan, brown the ground beef over medium heat. Stir occasionally. While the beef is browning, microwave potatoes on full power for 12 minutes. Prepare pastry crust. (I do this while beef and potatoes are cooking).

Chill the potatoes until they are cool enough to touch. Peel and dice them. Microwave the peas and carrots in a covered dish for 5 minutes on full power.

After beef is browned, place in a bowl. Stir in seasonings. Add cooked, diced potatoes and microwaved peas and carrots. Stir in 1/2 cup beef gravy. Divide dough into six equal parts. Roll out into circles. Place one-sixth of the hamburger mixture on the pastry round. Brush edges of the crust with milk. Fold the round over, and press with the tines of a fork to seal. Brush top of pastie with milk to make the crust turn a golden brown color when baked.

Place on a lightly greased cookie sheet. Bake at 375 degrees for 30 minutes, or until golden. Heat remaining gravy and serve with pasties. Serves 6.

PASTRY CRUST

2 cups flour
2/3 cup shortening (butter flavored, preferably)
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 egg yolk
3-5 tablespoons cold water
3 tablespoons milk

Place flour, salt and shortening in a bowl. Cut in shortening with a pastry cutter. Add egg yolk and three tablespoons cold water, fluff with a fork. Add more water, if necessary.

Divide dough into six equal parts. Roll out into circles.

(Trim with a knife if necessary. Use in Quick Beef Pasties recipe.)

PEACH MOUSSE PARFAIT

1 8-ounce package cream cheese
1/2 cup sugar
2 cups whipped topping
1/2 cup peach jam (chilled)
1/2 teaspoon almond extract
1 1/2 cups fresh sliced peaches (peel if desired, or use canned peaches)
2 teaspoons lemon juice

Combine cream cheese, sugar, jam and almond extract; whip until fluffy. Fold in whipped topping.

Combine peaches with lemon juice to keep peaches from darkening. Layer cream cheese mixture with peach slices in a parfait glass or sundae dish. Garnish with a peach slice. Chill until served.

COMPANY CHICKEN

2 pounds boneless, skinless chicken breasts
1 cup each green and red pepper, cut in strips
1 cup carrots, sliced
1/2 cup green onion, sliced crosswise
2 teaspoons each onion and garlic powders
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1/4 cup vegetable oil
3 teaspoons chicken bouillon
1 cup water
2 tablespoons corn starch
3/4 cup orange marmalade
3-4 cups cooked rice

Cube the uncooked chicken.

Place in a bowl with all spices, stir to coat chicken. Let set 1 hour for flavors to blend. Heat oil in skillet. Quickly add chicken, stirring until lightly browned. Lift from pan with a slotted spoon, and place in a bowl. Add carrots, and sautee for 4 minutes or until crisp-tender.

Add pepper strips, and cook a few minutes more. Remove vegetables with slotted spoon to bowl with chicken.

Mix chicken bouillon with water and cornstarch. Quickly add to saute pan, stirring constantly until bubbly and slightly thickened. Stir in orange marmalade, stirring until blended.

Add vegetable/chicken mixture, and heat through. Serve over rice.

OATMEAL-RAISIN COOKIES

1/2 cup soft shortening
1 1/4 cup granulated sugar
2 eggs
6 tablespoons molasses
1 1/4 cups unbleached flour
1 teaspoon baking soda
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon cinnamon
2 cups rolled oats
1/2 cup cut-up walnuts or pecans
1 cup raisins, halved

Mix together thoroughly: shortening, sugar, eggs and molasses. Sift together in a separate bowl: flour, baking soda, salt, and cinnamon. Mix all together on low with electric mixer. Stir in oats, nuts and raisins.

Crop by rounded teaspoons onto lightly greased baking sheet. Bake in 400 degree oven, 8-10 minutes. Remove before they brown. Let cool and cookies will set-up.

Yield: 4 dozen. Store in airtight container. Freeze a few in plastic bags to add to lunches.

EVELYN'S WHITE BREAD

2 packages active dry yeast
2 tablespoons sugar
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
5 1/3 to 6 1/3 cups sifted flour
1 cup milk
1 cup water
2 tablespoons shortening

In large bowl, stir together yeast, sugar and 2 cups flour; set aside.

In 2-quart saucepan over low heat, heat milk, water and shortening until very warm (120 to 130 degrees).

Using mixer at low speed, gradually beat milk mixture into yeast mixture until well blended. Increase speed to medium; beat 2 minutes. Add 1 cup flour. Increase speed to high; beat 2 minutes.

Stir in enough additional flour to make soft dough. Turn out dough onto lightly floured surface. Knead until smooth and elastic, about 8 to 10 minutes.

Place in greased large bowl, turning over dough so that top is greased. Cover with towel and let rise in warm place until doubled, about 45 minutes.

Punch down dough. Cover and let rise again, until almost doubled, about 30 minutes. Punch down dough. Divide dough in half. Cover and let rest 10 minutes.

With lightly floured rolling pin, roll out each half into a 16 by 6-inch rectangle. Starting with one short

side, roll up each rectangle, jelly-roll fashion. Pinch seams and ends to seal. Place each roll, seam-side down, in greased 8 1/2 by 4 1/2 by 2 1/2 inch loaf pan.

Cover and let rise until doubled, about 45 minutes.

Bake in 400 degree oven 35 minutes, or until loaves are golden brown and sound hollow when tapped. Immediately remove from pans. Cool on racks. Makes 2 loaves.

Variation — Braided Best-Ever White Bread:

Prepare dough and let rise as directed. Divide each dough half into thirds. Roll each third into a 10-inch long rope. For each loaf, braid three ropes; pinch ends together. Place each braid in a greased loaf pan, tucking ends under. Let rise and bake as directed.

In large skillet cook ground beef, green pepper and onion for 4 to 5 minutes or until beef is no longer pink. Drain off fat. Stir in tomato sauce, barbecue sauce and cabbage. Bring to boiling; reduce heat. Simmer, uncovered, for 10 minutes.

Spoon about 1/2 cup meat mixture onto each bun, into each tortilla or over each baked potato. Makes 6 servings.

SIMPLE MASHED WINTER SQUASH

1 winter squash (about 2 cups, cooked)
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
2 teaspoons brown sugar
½ teaspoon salt
¼ teaspoon ginger or cinnamon

½ cup orange juice
½ cup crushed pineapple
¼ cup chopped walnuts

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Scrub the outside of the squash, then pierce once or twice. Place on a rack in the oven and bake until it can be pierced with a fork. A four pound squash will take a little over an hour. Remove squash from the oven. Peel, if desired or cut in half and remove seeds.

Scoop out the cooked squash and

place in a saucepan. Mash gently with a large fork. Add remaining ingredients and cook, over low heat for 5 minutes or until heated throughout. Serve immediately. Serves 4.

SQUASH PIE

1 prepared pie crust
2 cups cooked squash (variety of your choice)
1 ½ cups evaporated milk or heavy cream
½ cup brown sugar
½ cup white sugar

½ teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon cinnamon
½ teaspoon ginger
¼ teaspoon nutmeg or allspice
½ teaspoon ground cloves
2 slightly beaten eggs

Prepare pie crust, set aside. Preheat oven to 425 degrees. Mix cooked squash with remaining ingredients and mix well until smooth. Pour the mixture into the prepared pie shell and bake for 15 minutes.

Reduce heat to 325 degrees and

bake about 45 minutes or longer or until a knife inserted in the center comes out clean. Serves 4.

SQUASH SOUP

3 cups cooked squash (variety of your choice)
3 cups hot chicken broth
1 tablespoon butter
1 tablespoon flour
2 tablespoons brown sugar
Salt and pepper to taste
A dash of cinnamon and nutmeg

¾ cup cream

Place the squash and the broth in a medium saucepan. Heat until well mixed. Melt the butter and stir in the flour to make a paste. Whisk into the soup. Stir in brown sugar, salt, pepper, cinnamon and nutmeg and mix well. Remove from heat.

Add a little of the soup to the cream to raise the temperature of the cream. Whisk cream mixture into warm soup. Serve immediately. Serves 4-6.

Grapes are one of the oldest fruits known to man

Grapes are a prehistoric fruit that have been known to man since Neolithic times. Grape and wine production was evident in the hieroglyphics of the Egyptians and referred to as the "fruit of the vine" in the Old Testament. Today, grapes are cultivated on six continents and are popular around the world.

Who can turn down sweet and juicy grapes from a bunch? They make great desserts, salads, snacks or as a complement to chicken or fish. An elegant way to serve chicken is to add a wine sauce with seedless grapes. Combine several varieties and colors of grapes to a fruit salad or gelatin mold. Stir halved grapes into low-fat yogurt as a treat.

Frozen grapes are a refreshing snack. Take the grapes off the stems. Place on a tray and freeze until hard, then pour into bag. While you're making dinner pop a few in your mouth to take the edge off your appetite. Grapes can be added to your favorite cole slaw recipe, chicken salad or pasta salad. Don't forget to use them as a plate garnish to add a special touch.

Grapes are not noted for their nutrient content as they contain only moderate amounts of vitamins and minerals. There are some varieties that have some vitamin C, but all are relatively low in calories.

Grapes are sometimes classified as either table grapes or wine grapes, although there is some overlap. American varieties are sometimes called slip-skin grapes as the skins can be easily separated from the flesh and their seeds are tightly embedded in the pulp. Concord grapes are a familiar variety and are grown here in Michigan. It's interesting to note that cream of tartar is made from concord grapes.

They are also processed into jam, jelly, juice and wine as they make a beautiful dark, flavorful product. They have a sweet-tart flavor with a nice fragrance and a beautiful blue-black color. A small quantity of these are in the market, but since they do not ship well, buy them locally, of course. Michigan concords are the best. All American varieties ripen in the fall and are available in October.

Popular variety

The Thompson seedless grapes are the most popular fresh variety grown in the United States and are used to make raisins. The growing season is June through November. The other months they are Chilean imports. Seeded varieties of grapes are thought to have better flavor than seedless. However, most of us prefer the convenience of seedless grapes.

Seafood tips

Here are some tips for seafood consumers from the National Fisheries Institute in Arlington, Va.

- Buy your seafood from reputable, commercial sources. Do not buy poorly iced or refrigerated products.
- After purchase, get product home quickly and keep it refrigerated until use.
- If you buy live shellfish — lobsters, crabs, oysters, clams, mussels and clams — discard any that die during storage.
- Thaw frozen seafood in the refrigerator or under cold running water, not at room temperature. Marinate seafood in refrigerator.
- As with any animal protein, keep cooked product from contact with raw, or the cutting boards and utensils used to prepare the raw product.
- Avoid raw or undercooked fish or shellfish.

Black Beauty are the only seedless black grapes and are spicy sweet and resemble Concords.

An Emperor grape is second only to Thompson seedless in quantity grown. These are known as European varieties that are grown in the United States. They are a little thicker skinned, ship better, stand up to consumer handling and store well. California grown are on the market from August to March and Chili imports the other months. The color of Emperors vary from red-violet to deep purple. They have a mild flavor and may remind you of a cherry.

Varieties of European grapes grown in America are Black Beauty (seedless), Calmeria (sometimes called Lady Fingers), Riber, which are sweet large blue black grapes; Tokay or Flame Tokay; Champagne (Black Corinth), and Flame Seedless, which are round deep red, sweet-tart, crunchy and a relatively new variety available in the stores.

The first grapes to arrive from California each year are Perlette Seedless. They are round, green grapes that have a hint of white on their surface. Red Globe, Queen, Red Malaga or Ruby Seedless are all varieties you may see at specialty markets from time to time.

Avoid any grapes where the stems look brittle, limp or brown. The grapes should stay firmly attached to the stem when lifted from the top. Grapes are thinned skin and easily damaged, so handle with care. Use color as a guide for the sweetest fruit.

Selection tips
When selecting grapes, choose bunches that have plump, unbruised fruit without spots or browning at the stems.

of the harvest is extremely important.

Store unwashed grapes in a vented plastic bag or lightly covered bowl in the refrigerator to allow for air circulation and prevent mildew. Rinse before eating. They should keep about a week. Prehistoric or modern, grapes can add a lot to dull meals.

Pillsbury cookbook makes baking easy

Those of us who have never baked bread approach the subject with trepidation. It's so complicated — you have to mix dough, be sure water is warm enough for yeast to dissolve, find a place to let it rise, then knead, pop in the oven, and cross your fingers hoping all this work pays off.

Pillsbury makes it look so easy in "The Complete Book of Baking," (Viking, \$25 hardcover). It's a compendium of the most-request and time-honored recipes developed in the Pillsbury kitchens.

The opening chapter "Baking from A to Z" answers questions about baking ingredients, equipment, terms and techniques like measuring ingredients, and freezing guidelines. There are lots of detailed diagrams, and color pictures that take some of the guesswork out of baking. You'll also find a list of emergency substitutions.

Each of the six sections — cookies, cakes, desserts, pies and pastries, quick breads, and yeast breads — contains Secrets for Success, Cook's Notes, Step-by-

Step Features, Special Hints, Handy Reference Charts, and Nutrition Information.


Whether you're a beginning cook, or pro, you'll find this book to be a welcome addition to your cookbook collection. Here's an easy recipe to try. Batter breads aren't kneaded or shaped. This bread is even better the second day.

EASY CHEESE BATTER BREAD

2½ cups all purpose flour
2 teaspoons sugar
1¼ teaspoons salt
1 package active dry yeast
4 ounces (1 cup) shredded Cheddar cheese
¾ cup milk
½ cup butter or margarine
3 eggs

In large bowl, combine 1½ cups flour, sugar, salt and yeast; blend well. Stir in cheese. In small saucepan, heat milk and margarine until very warm (120 to 130 degrees). Add warm liquid and eggs to flour mixture. Blend at low speed until moistened; beat 3 minutes at medium speed.

By hand, stir in remaining 1 cup flour. Cover loosely with plastic wrap and cloth towel. Let rise in

warm place (80 to 85 degrees) until light and doubled in size, 45 to 60 minutes.

Generously grease 1½ or 2-quart casserole or 9 by 5 inch loaf pan. Stir down dough to remove all air bubbles. Turn into greased casserole. Cover; let rise in warm place until light and doubled in size, 20

to 25 minutes.

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Uncover dough. Bake 40 to 45 minutes or until deep golden brown. Immediately remove from casserole; cool on wire rack. Yield 1 (18-slice) loaf.

Make yeast the least of your bread making fears

Here are some "Secrets for Baking with Yeast," from "The Complete Book of Baking."

■ Check the expiration date on the package — outdated yeast won't become active and the bread won't rise.

■ To substitute one form of yeast for another form of yeast, use these equivalents — One envelope of active yeast equals 2½ teaspoons of bulk active dry yeast or ½ of a 2-ounce cake of compressed fresh yeast. To substitute fast-acting yeast for regular yeast, reduce the rise time in the recipe by about half.

■ Use a yeast or candy thermometer to accurately determine the temperature of liquids. If the liquid in which the dry yeast is dissolved is too hot, it will kill the yeast cells. If it's too cold, they won't be activated. Use very warm liquid (120 to 130 degrees) if the active dry yeast will be added to dry ingredients. If it's to be added to liquid ingredients, use warm liquid (110 to 115 degrees).

■ Place dough in a warm spot to rise. Yeast doughs rise or "proof" best when the temperature is 80 to 85 degrees F. To make sure the dough is warm enough: Cover the

bowl loosely with plastic wrap and/or a cloth towel. Place the bowl on a wire rack over a pan of hot water in a draft-free spot. Or place the bowl on the top rack of an unheated oven. Put a pan of hot water on the rack below it. Or turn the oven on at 400 degrees for 1 minute, then turn it off. Place the bowl on the center rack

of the oven and close the door.

■ To make the dough a day ahead, cover and refrigerate it up to 24 hours, if desired. The dough is ready to bake when it has doubled in size. If it has not doubled in size in the refrigerator, let it stand at room temperature for 30 to 45 minutes or until it has doubled.

How to pick, store onions

AP — Even when they make us cry, we keep coming back for more.

We can't resist the flavor they add to the plainest of foods.

It's hard to imagine meatloaf, pot roast, lasagna, liver and French onion soup without them.

Of course, "them" refers to onions.

Surprisingly, everyday onions have aristocratic roots — they belong to the lily family. The color differences among white, red and yellow onions are easy to recognize. And some onion descriptions refer to the size. For example, boiling (or boiler) onions are ¾ to 1½ inches in diameter. Pearl (or creamer) onions are about ½ inch in diameter.

Dry bulb onions are easiest to differentiate by season:

■ Spring-Summer Onions: Generally available from April through August, the flavor of these onions is milder, sweeter and less pungent than that of fall-winter onions. They can be white, yellow, or red, and usually have thin, light outer skins and a high water and sugar content. Because these onions are fragile and bruise easily, they have a fairly short storage life. In this group are the special sweet onion varieties, including Vidalia, Walla Walla, Maui, Texas Spring Sweet, Imperial Sweet and Carzalia Sweet onions.

■ Fall-Winter Onions: You'll find these onions from late August through March or April. The dry bulb onions of the late growing season have thicker, darker outer skins and more pungent flavor than their spring-summer

counterparts. Like early season onions, these can be white, yellow, or red in color. They store well, hence their common name, storage onions.

■ Green Onions or Scallions: Available all year, these fresh, immature onions have a mildly pungent flavor. Their bulbs are small and white, with long green shoots or tops. You can use the tops of green onions to add a delicious mild onion flavor to dishes.

Buying tips

Dry onions range in size from ¼ inch to 4 inches or larger. Choose the size that's right for your recipe. Small onions are attractive in soups and vegetable side dishes. Larger onions are fine for chopping or cutting into wedges or rings.

Select firm dry onions that have short necks and papery outer skins and are free of blemishes and soft spots. Avoid onions that have begun to sprout.

Choose green onions with fresh-looking tops and clean white ends.

Storing savvy

Store fall-winter onions in a cool, dry, well-ventilated place for up to several months. Keep spring-summer onions in the refrigerator for up to several weeks, depending on the variety. Green onions should be wrapped and kept in the refrigerator for up to five days. For longer storage, freeze sliced or chopped onions in freezer containers for up to one year.

Pork ribs have German accent

There's a change in the air — days are shorter, nights cooler and fall fruits and vegetables are showing up at the market.

"This is the perfect time of year to start cooking with a German accent," said Anne Roberts, director of consumer affairs for the Michigan Pork Producers Association.

What began in 1810 as a royal wedding celebration in Munich has become an annual festival celebrated around the world. Today, whether you're in Munich or a nearby German-American neighborhood, you'll find people celebrating Oktoberfest in the same way — dressed in lederhosen, singing beer-hall songs and enjoying plenty of food and drink.

"Pork has always been a delicious part of the tradition," said Roberts. "Ribs make a tasty transition from summer grilling to fall meals. For an authentic German flavor, try simmering them with some sauerkraut, onions, apples and brown sugar."

Here is a recipe to try.

OKTOBERFEST RIBS

2 pounds pork spare ribs
2 jars (32-ounce) sauerkraut, drained
2 yellow onions, peeled and cut in half
2 tart green apples, cored and wedged
1/4 cup brown sugar
8 juniper berries or 1 tablespoon caraway seed (optional)

Layer ingredients into a large Dutch oven in this order: sauerkraut, onions, apples, brown sugar (sprinkle evenly over) and ribs. If using juniper berries or caraway seed, bury them evenly in the sauerkraut layer.

Bring to a boil, lower heat, cover and simmer gently for 2-3 hours, until ribs are very tender. Serves six.

DIRT CAKE

1/2 cup butter, softened
8 ounces cream cheese, softened
1/2 cup powdered sugar, sifted
3/4 cups milk
2 packages instant vanilla pudding or other flavor to your liking (3/4-ounce size)
12 ounces frozen whipped topping, partially thawed
1 7-inch flower pot or 10 small flower pots
1 20-ounce package chocolate sandwich cookies, crushed

In a medium size bowl, mix butter, cream cheese and sugar, with a mixer.

In another medium size bowl, mix the milk and the pudding.

Add the whipped topping to the pudding mixture.

Combine the two mixtures. Prepare the flower pots as follows; if the pots are plastic wash them with soap and water. If they are clay, rinse with water, do not use soap. The clay will absorb the ham (4-ounce servings); 1 pound of coffee (6-ounce cup per person); 2

To sterilize the clay pots, bake them in a 350 degree oven for 20 minutes. Cover the bottom of the pots with a plastic lid, a piece of foil or plastic wrap.

Start layering with a layer of cookie crumbs followed by the pudding mixture.

Repeat until the ingredients are used up, ending with the cookie crumbs.

Like the market squares of old, modern malls bring in jugglers, jesters and joyous celebrations to draw crowds and stimulate sales. When a celebrity or concert is held center court, store owners hope that when the crowd disperses, sales will increase.

Coordinating a special event at a mall is like planning a wedding with 2,000 guests. It's become a very sophisticated and complicated affair.

Winchester mall is sold for \$11 million

Sherr Development Co. of Farmington Hills bought the 225,000-square-foot Winchester Mall at the southwest corner of Rochester and Avon

roads in Rochester Hills for just under \$11 million, a source close to the deal said.

The long-troubled Winchester Mall was held by the Balcor Corp. of Chicago, which foreclosed on the property

in February 1992 after the original owners filed for bankruptcy and were unable to meet the obligations of the bankruptcy reorganization.

"We've been looking at the property for the past three years," said Andy

Shaw, project manager with Sherr Development, which also owns the shopping center at 14 Mile and Orchard Lake Road, home to Bed, Bath

weekends receives a free National Geographic world map. Interactive displays are also part of the program. Shoppers can play Ethiopian hopscotch, Scottish caber toss, and try their hand at deciphering Egyptian hieroglyphics.

The highlight of the event took place on Sunday, Oct. 3, when Greg Lee arrived to host a road show version of the popular children's geography program "Where in the World is Carmen Santiago?"

"The mall was packed. 'We brought our three daughters here to meet Greg Lee,' Au-

tumn Walters of St. Clair said. "They watch the program every day after school on Channel 56, and we knew they would love to see it live."

"It's a cool show," daughter, Autumn, 9, piped in. "Greg Lee is really funny."

The Cheney Family of Livonia also made the long drive to Sterling Heights to see the Carmen Santiago show.

"Wow, I'm really impressed with the whole exhibit," mom Barbara said. "I congratulate the mall for such an ambitious attempt. They did a good job. There's so much to see."

Lake Road in Orchard Lake; and in La Mirage at 12 Mile and Inkster in Southfield. The retailer buys close-outs of gift items manufactured by big names such as Ralph Lauren and Laura Ashley and then sells them at savings of 50-80 percent, according to a spokeswoman.

Tuesday Morning stores close when stock sells out. The doors remain locked until the next stock accumulation warrants a reopening.

The stores have a "spartan-like atmosphere," as described by their corporate office. No fancy cabinets or background music, just stock piled high with low price tags. In mid-November, a Vari-

ety Outlet will open at Opdyke and South Boulevard in Auburn Hills.

"The store will be an experiment in this market," said spokeswoman Mary Lorenz. "We have operated them successfully in Little Rock, Atlanta and in southern California, but the Opdyke store is a first for Michigan."

and Beyond, the Half-Off Card Shop, Marshall's and Loehmann's.

"I'm impressed with the community spirit in Rochester area and the success of some of the retailers in the mall like F&M, Marshall's and Kmart. It's already a shopping center. We hope we can make it a better one."

The mall sits on 29 acres, sharing the corner with Kmart, which operates a 90,000 square-foot store at the north end. It has been rumored that Kmart will buy the 14 acres of field behind its store and expand into a Super Kmart with a grocery center, and a Sports Authority store, but Mary Lorenz, Kmart spokeswoman, would not confirm that plan.

"I cannot confirm those stories," she said. "I just don't have any information about that. I'm not aware of any expansion plans at the Rochester Hills location."

While the Winchester Mall sale brings hope of new retail excitement to the area, it also marks the end of most of the smaller retail operations doing business at the mall.

"We are not renewing expiring

leases," Shaw said. "At this point, we don't have a definitive direction on the new tone this mall will take, but we are negotiating with large, national companies. Like any landlord, we are seeking the best tenant we can find. We are looking into a number of possibilities."

Did these include the likes of Mervyn's and Bed, Bath and Beyond, two stores that Rochester-area shoppers must travel a bit to visit?

"I have spoken to those retailers," Shaw admitted, "but again, no deals have been made."

At least one current Winchester Mall resident is fighting what he calls an eviction notice from the new owners.


"They've ordered me out by Nov. 30," said Mike Berry of the Baseball Card Outlet. "I'm talking to an attorney. I've ordered a half-million dollars of inventory for the holiday season. What am I supposed to do? I've been a tenant for the past three years. I'll sue before I leave."

Tenants that have left the center include Scoops Ice Cream, Keepsakes By Sarah, The Fountain Cafe, Shopper's Break, Belton's, Annie Music and Folands. Stores that will remain include Marshall's, Winkleman's, Lawler's Hallmark, F&M, Winchester 8 Cinemas and Joe Weider's Fitness Gym.

Ann Johnson of Annie's Music said her decision to move was not a result of the new ownership.

"We're moving because we've grown so big we need more space," Johnson said. "No hard feelings here. I think the new mall owners will be great for the area because they're local. They know the market. They know where Winchester Mall fits in relation to shopping centers like Oakland Mall and Lakeside Mall. There are a lot of stores this area could use that they don't have."

Annie's Music, one of the largest sheet music dealers in Michigan, is moving to the former U.S. SCUBA headquarters in the Oakridge Plaza at M-59 and Rochester Road. U.S. SCUBA moved north on Rochester Road, to the old Henry Ford Hospital clinic building near the bridge in downtown Rochester.

Imagination works well for his art

John Shannon, painting on a variety of materials ranging from canvas and wood to found objects, struggles with social concerns.

He volleys back and forth between creating two dimensional imagery that deals with the fragile balance between industry and nature and decorative functional pieces. Tables imitating cats and winged sphinxes, boxes mimicking human heads as well as totems and room dividers thrive on tropically flavored themes.

"I try to invoke an imaginative participation from the viewer. Why limit a table to a table when it can be a mystical object? Why should the legs be just supports when it can walk? It goes back to other cultures where they give spirits to objects," said Shannon, who graduated with a bachelor of fine arts degree from Center for Creative Studies in 1986.

"Instead of being just a cat, it has its own personality and even though it's not living, you feel like it could be."

Three works by Shannon including a cat box paused on four legs are part of "Fusion: A Blending of Talents," the third annual exhibition by alumni of Center for Creative Studies, College of Art and Design continuing through Oct. 30 at the Scarab Club, 217 Farnsworth behind the Detroit Institute of Arts.

Some of the functional works begin as found objects. On trash collection days, Shannon scours for antique sewing machines, tables and drawers on which to paint feline faces and tongues. The rest of the time he crafts the pieces himself before painting.

A "Sphinx Table" has wings, breasts and walks on four legs. Shannon first constructed the table from discarded wood, then carved into it. Finally, he oil painted the surfaces with pure reds, greens, yellows and blues. Shannon sees the process as "kind of meditative."

"There's a lot of sawing and drilling. It's as much about the construction as the image."

When he tires of building, he switches to painting two dimensional works. Factories, figures and nature dominate. Flat planes of pure complimentary colors keep the work bold and bright.

"Factories are so important to the Detroit area. Growing up it's always been a big part of the environment. Now with the decline so much is being torn down," said the Plymouth Salem High School graduate. "Is it going to be built back up or is it going to go back to nature or will they just leave it naked?"

Architecturally speaking, Shannon's factories are boxy child-like line drawings usually occurring in backgrounds. They seem to tug this way and that at the seams.

Music with a Colour

■ When the Living Colour tour for their most recent album "Stain" comes to town it will be a bit different than previous shows. Each leg of the tour has featured a slightly altered show, and with each leg comes a more polished performance.

Having a platinum-selling record and a performance in an acclaimed film before the age of 30 is a remarkable success.

Living Colour's Corey Glover doesn't see that as the most exciting aspects of his careers, however.

"Getting up in the morning is," said Glover from his New York City home while packing for the next leg of his tour. "I get a chance to do something different."

The tour for Living Colour's most recent album "Stain" has been about "something different."

Each leg of the tour features a slightly altered show.

"The lights are slightly different, we've been playing longer so it's (more polished) . . . the sets are much longer, too," he said.

The shows also feature new bassist Doug Wimbish who replaced Muzz Skillings. He joined the band in January 1992 for dates in Brazil and became a permanent member in June.

The next month he solidified Living Colour's new lineup by playing "live rehearsals" for "Stain" at CBGB and Wetlands in New York City.

"What Doug is playing is amazing," Glover said. "All over the record, he's playing beautiful things. I think that after making the change from Muzz, the band got a new beginning," he said.

The result suggests a darkening of the group's vision with song titles such as "Go Away," "Ignorance Is Bliss," "Never Satisfied" and

"Nothingness."

"These songs have a directness in the groove of them and the heaviness of them," guitarist Vernon Reid said. "The joy of life is in this recording in the way the four of us are interacting."

"This record doesn't put you in a bag and tell you to stay there. As

ternative music scene but nobody there was really alternative."

The band is pleased with its "Stain" tour which so far has lasted about five months. There has been one setback. The band's song "Bi" was banned in Singapore because of its "objectionable lyrical content."

When Sony Music in Singapore asked the band to delete it from the record, Living Colour refused to comply. Consequently "Stain" was not released there. Reid didn't see the song as offensive.

"Bi" isn't judgmental, it doesn't preach safe sex, and it's not about how the world should hold hands and sing," said Reid who co-wrote the song with drummer William Calhoun. "It's really more about desire."

For now, the tour continues and when it's over, Living Colour will

right into pre-production for its next album. Glover, who played a soldier in "Platoon," hopes to continue his movie career. The differences between acting and singing he finds appealing.

"They're (movie) a little more physical hours. We work like 18 hours. I have to think and react and move. With recording, all I have to do is sing. Sometimes, that's a little more difficult," he said with a laugh.


Austin's sound goes 'On the Road'

Ironically, it was at a showcase at CBGB's, one of the most recognizable venues in America, that he got one of the most important pieces of musical advice in his career. It was there that the local Warner Bros. representative suggested that his music, while very

good, just wasn't going to work in New York.

The difference, he said, is black and white.

"I needed a change from New York; It was hard to get anything done there," he said. "The music here is so together; it's a lot easier to get things done."

Musically, his sound is frequently reminiscent of early John Prine, Jimmie Dale Gilmore, Roy Orbison and Joe Ely . . . but mostly of Michael Fracasso. A flawless, inventive songsmith, his "Love & Trust" debut disc for the tiny Dejadisc label is a standout CD. The title cut, "Door No. 1," "Wake Up George" and, especially, "One That Got Away" qualifies him as one of the finest new singer-songwriters to come down the road in a while.

The good news is that this isn't just Fracasso's show. Stage sharing is done with three equally gifted

Films show an idiosyncratic Welles

Orson Welles would be first to admit that he wasn't your model studio employee. With budgetary and time considerations usually thrown to the wind, Welles practically provoked the moguls to tamper with his footage, leading to cries of outrage from the director.

No doubt Welles got the shaft with "The Magnificent Ambersons," his 1942 followup feature to the legendary "Citizen Kane." Behind his back, an entire third of the film was excised and a more upbeat ending taken, souring forever his brief love affair with Hollywood.

The subsequent dozen or so films he directed comprise some of the movies' richest and most frustrating experiences. Four of his more idiosyncratic works on both sides of the camera appear over the next week on Detroit-area screens.

"The Lady from Shanghai" was released in 1948, though it was actually finished some 18 months earlier. Columbia studio boss Harry Cohn couldn't understand how this "genius" went some

\$500,000 over budget and still couldn't deliver a movie that made any sense.

The visually stunning thriller (screening at the Magic Bag Theatre on Oct. 14) features Welles as an Irish sailor involved in a series of murders even the scriptwriter couldn't solve. Rita Hayworth, Welles' real-life wife at the time, plays a deliciously cold-blooded femme fatale.

The real star remains the camera, especially in the justly famous "hall of mirrors" sequence that climaxes the film. The disorienting gunfight between Hayworth and husband Everett Sloane was spoofed recently by Woody Allen at the end of his own "Manhattan Murder Mystery."

Financial failures like "The Lady from Shanghai" sent Welles out of the country in search of money to fund his films. These projects often stopped and started over several years, leading to a certain disjointedness in the final product but for Welles a purer vision.

"The Trial," a 1963 version of the Franz Kafka novel, screens on Oct. 11-12 at Ann Arbor's Michigan Theater as part of a Welles' retrospective. Anthony Perkins logs one of his best performances as K, on trial for a crime that no one will explain to him.

The film was made on an extremely low budget, much of it provided by French, German and Italian backers as well as Welles himself. The movie has an incredible paranoid power visually (lots of strange angles and claustrophobic compositions), though the dialogue is often unintelligible due to horrible dubbing on the soundtrack.

Welles the actor often lent his services to other filmmakers in order to keep his own projects afloat. While he made memorable appearances in "Moby Dick" and "Compulsion," his best-remembered role remains that of Harry Lime, the black-market racketeer in 1949's "The Third Man." It screens at the Michigan on Oct. 18-19.

There has been plenty of speculation in the years since about whether or not Welles helped director Carol Reed behind the

camera. While some of the individual shots may have been plotted by Welles, "The Third Man" is tighter than his own films and faithful to its source — the novel by Graham Greene.

He did contribute heavily that same year to "Black Magic," a rarely screened oddity playing at Rabbles Coffeehouse on Oct. 11. He and friend Gregory Ratoff created the lushly told story of Count Cagliostro, an 18th-century charlatan who rises to fame and power through his manipulation of magic and superstition.

Welles watchers will be pleased to know that footage from "It's All True," the director's unfinished 1943 documentary about South America, recently played in Chicago. Hopefully the Detroit Film Theatre, which has paid its respects to Welles in the past, will snag this for the 20th anniversary season next year.

He's no morose doomsayer, though. He knows how to rock it up a little, too. As John Hiatt and Bonnie Raitt have shown us over the past few years, it isn't written in stone that intelligent songwriting can't have a kick.

LaFave knows how to rock, too, though as his Bohemia-beat disc, "Austin Skyline," attests, he's more likely to work out of a Van Morrison-style. He's also one of the very few people on the planet who can get away with recording four Bob Dylan songs, not to mention an absolutely killer version of the Left Banke's "Walk Away Renee."

"They're an impersonable representation of a factory. If you drive down the street past it, you don't see the people. The modern ones with their sleekness and high technology are probably more impersonal."

On the other hand, his figures also are nondescript.

"It's an archetypal human instead of being a specific person. It's you; it's me," said the diversified young artist. "Sometimes they represent people. Sometimes they don't. They represent gods of wind or rain."

Weighing evil and good, Shannon sees industry nonetheless as something that has become part of our daily lives.

"I think our society should be a balance between industry and nature. We have both. We need both," he said. "I'm not trying to do an ecology pitch. We need all this stuff we learned how to make."

An exception to the social concerns is the diptych, "Adam and Eve." The work kindles the imagination. One wonders the mean-

ing of the sea of blue faces in the background peeking mysteriously through sword shaped leaves at the nude male and female figures with red lips and eyes.

By day, Shannon works at the Westland Convalescent Center as a (wall) painter in order to pay his bills and buy pigments. He literally works to create his art at night and on his days off.

Shannon has exhibited work at Industry in Pontiac, Urban Park-Detroit Art Center, Detroit Artists Market, Willis Gallery, Michigan Gallery, Detroit Focus and the now defunct, 55 Peterboro

Gallery. Nationally, he has shown in New York City and San Francisco and internationally, in France, Germany, Finland and Brazil.



But Friday, it was Harrison's time to gain revenge against Canton (3-3 overall and 2-2 in the WLAA).

"They ruined our homecoming (23-15) last year, so we wanted to get some revenge at their homecoming this year," said Nick Burgess, who led the Harrison defense with 11 tackles.

Granger and Harrison's speed made the difference Friday. Granger, only 5-feet-7 and 135 pounds, gained a career-high 229 yards on 23 carries, and scored three touchdowns.

CC is now 5-1 overall and all alone in first place in the Catholic League's Central Division.

"If we lose this game we go home early, but now we have hope of making the playoffs and playing for the Catholic League championship," CC coach Tom Mach said. "Nobody gave us a chance, but people forget we've won a lot of games the past six years."

"We had nine new starters on offense and eight on defense this year. We got beat earlier by a good team (7-0 by Toledo St. Francis on Sept. 11) and that really woke us up. Since then we've gotten better every week, plus that Catholic Central spirit is hard to beat."

It was a patented CC victory, a power running attack augmented by a bruising, smash-mouth defense.

Rice, however, got off to a quick start.

"You know how young boys are, if you're down deep and don't cash in there is a little bit of disappointment," Rice coach Al Fracassa said. "We still had a half to come back. Yes, there was disappointment, but that's football."

CC turned it up a notch in the third quarter as Rice coughed up the ball twice.

Marcus Harvey, who led all rushers with 92 yards in 23 carries, fumbled at his own 20 and CC's Brad Rainko recovered the loose ball.

Catholic Central took just four plays to score.

Jon Wolfe, a 5-foot-10, 175-pound senior blocking back with only nine carries all season, suddenly became a threat on the ground thanks to well-disguised counter-trap play. His 5-yard TD run with 3:13 left in the third period proved to be the game-winner.

"They (Rice) came in with a good line," Mach said. "We weren't so sure we could go at them. We thought we'd try to go around them, but as the game progressed, we went right at them."

Ironically, the shifty Taylor (89 yards in 20 carries) became the blocking back.

"They were keying on Freddie and he just led me through the hole and he'd give me at great block on just about every counter (play)," said Wolfe, who had 79 yards in 12 carries.

"They were calling my number and the line just did a great job of blocking."

Adam Borchert gave CC some insurance when he drilled a 24-yard field goal with 9:13 to go.

Pilut making Madonna career memorable

Spend eight years with someone and you get to know them pretty well.

Mazie Pilut knows Jerry Abraham. She's been playing volleyball for him for just that long.

Pilut is the last in the Redford Bishop Borgess line Abraham brought with him when he became Madonna University's coach, back in 1987. Pilut played one last year at Borgess — she helped the Spartans reach the Class B state finals in '88 — before following Abraham to Madonna.

Three other Borgess grads already had. That connection was instrumental in Madonna's early successes. But as good as the Crusaders of the past were, this season's club is even better.

Pilut is a major reason why.

Last year, her first full season as the Lady Crusaders' setter, she led the NAIA in total assists to kills with 1,884 and was second in the nation in assists per game at 12.73.

But that was last year. Abraham assembled a talented cast for this season, but it was new; only two of the top eight Crusaders returned from last year's 43-11 squad, including Pilut.

That called for some major adjustments, especially for Pilut. "Different hitters, different passers — I wasn't running around as much last year," she said with a laugh.

The Crusaders' passing game is one of its few weak points — if even that can be termed a weakness. With five newcomers, including two freshmen and a sophomore, among the top seven players, it might be anticipated. What wasn't expected was Madonna's ability to rise so quickly with such a new lineup.

Thursday's straight-set triumph over Spring Arbor, expected to be Madonna's toughest competition in the NAIA District 23, left the Crusaders unbeaten in district play, 28-2 overall and

ranked sixth in the nation.

All of it is a tribute to Pilut, who was named district player of the week the previous week after collecting 197 assists in 16 games (12.3 per). She also averaged 4.2 digs, 4.1 kills (.406 kill percentage) and 3.4 blocks per game, while being named to the Tiffin University Invitational all-tournament team, which Madonna won.

"Mazie," said Abraham, "is just a great setter. She's the leader of the team. She picks us up with a laugh."

Sometimes that requires an act of deflection. Asked to reflect upon her eight-year tenure under Abraham, Pilut replied, "It's tough at times because he always chooses to yell at me. But I'd rather have him yell at me than at the others."

"I guess I'm used to him."

What no one on Madonna is used to is a post-season. Northwood University controlled the district in the past, but Northwood switched to the NCAA Division II this year. That leaves it wide open for Madonna.

Don't think any of this has escaped Pilut. "I'd like to see us in the nationals," she said. "We have the potential. Our blocking's a lot better, and we have a lot better height. (Livonia Stevenson grad) Julie Martin is helping us a lot (at the net)."

Like her coach, Pilut isn't ready to call her current team the best she's played on at Madonna — mainly because "I don't think we've peaked yet."

Our offense is steady, our blocking is steady, but I still think we can get better defensively."

That, of course, includes the passing game. There's no doubt Madonna is on a roll — the win over Spring Arbor was the Crusaders' ninth in a row — but unless perfection is somehow attainable, Abraham probably won't stop pressing.

Which means Pilut will have to keep deflecting. "I don't mind running around," she said, presumably in reference to the not-real-accurate passing game. "It's my last year."

It looks like it will be a memorable one.

'I'll Fly Away' comes full circle on PBS

A poignant drama series that many critics hailed as being "too good for network TV" returns, however briefly, starting this week. "I'll Fly Away: Then and Now," an original TV movie that ties up loose ends in the now-canceled series, airs Monday, Oct. 11, on many PBS affiliates. Beginning the following Monday, PBS will rebroadcast all 38 episodes that aired during the series' two seasons on NBC.

"I'll Fly Away" focused on two families in the mythical Deep South town of Bryland as the turbulent 1960s were dawning. Sam Waterston starred as small-town prosecutor Forrest Bedford. Regina Taylor played Lilly Harper, housekeeper and caregiver for his three children (Jeremy London, Ashlee Levitch and John Aaron Bennett). All principals were able to recreate their roles for the TV movie with the exception of London, who was replaced by his identical twin brother, Jason, due to a scheduling conflict.

"I'll Fly Away: Then and Now" opens in modern-day Atlanta, where Lilly, now in her 60s, is living

comfortably. During a weekend visit from her 12-year-old grandson, a Californian fixated on rap music, she chafes at the boy's total lack of interest in their family's history.

Finally, Lilly firmly sits him down with a scrapbook and begins to relate her experiences in the civil rights movement to the reluctant boy. She describes the tragic murder case that forced her family to flee Bryland in 1962, and forever changed the lives of the Harper and Bedford families. At the conclusion of the film, Lilly returns to Bryland to learn the fate of her friends and former employers. This return visit is not only a sequel but a prequel to the series, setting the stage for the following 38 episodes.

The movie was shot on location in Georgia and directed by series executive producer Ian Sander. It also includes taped interviews with cast and crew members, who offer their views about the importance of the series, both historically and personally. More interviews will be featured at the end of selected episodes throughout the season.

Commenting on the series' impact, Waterston says, "I think it's

great that this drama takes on the history of the civil rights movement, which is one of the thorniest issues that the United States has had to deal with...and keeps on affirming that there is a way through the problems.

"It reminds people that the result of the struggle, which looked nasty and horrible at the time, was a tremendous benefit to society; that we can move forward and have moved forward; and that giving up and bailing out is not such a good idea."


Waterston, Taylor and the series all were nominated for Emmys during both seasons of the show's NBC run. While they struck out both times, the two actors have won Golden Globes and American Television Awards for their work, and the show itself has received a battery of other awards, including the prestigious Humanitas Prize and a Television Critics Association Award.

"It was a great shame that the show didn't go on for two or three more years," says Waterston, "because the story is so interesting and absorbing in its detail. It records historic acts by people who are completely unknown, and I don't think that there's anything more interesting than the evolution of a culture."

"If every person who wrote in and got excited about keeping it on the air sends their local PBS station \$10, public television would be able to do more quality shows like 'I'll Fly Away' on its own," he adds.

shines as new Mindy

There is a trend this year with West Coast actresses moving to the East Coast to accept soap roles. Colleen Dion (Brett, "Another World") and Glynnis O'Connor (Margo, "As the World Turns") were among the first to make the move, and now Barbara Crampton has joined them as the new Mindy Lewis on "Guiding Light."






