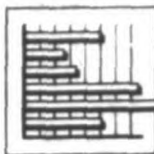

City to ease parking regulations



Plymouth is looking at easing parking restrictions on new businesses looking to locate in the city. A new set of proposed ordinances could lessen the number of parking slots required to be provided by businesses locating downtown.

The goal of relaxing ordinances to bring more restaurants and other developments downtown got some formal attention from Plymouth city commissioners last week.

On Feb. 7, the commission approved the first reading of an ordinance amendment to help meet that goal.

"This will provide notice to the public that the city commission intends to proceed with the parking

plan, subject to the outcome of the current parking lot acquisition negotiations," city manager Steve Walters said.

The action also sends a message to downtown business owners that the commission is acting, as several have criticized the commission for not acting swiftly to ease too-strict parking restrictions.

The ordinance won't become law until commissioners approve its final reading, hopefully before spring, Walters said, if negotiations with

downtown property owners are successful.

Among ordinance provisions are requirements that new businesses provide one parking space per 400 square feet of gross floor area.

By the current ordinance, restaurants have to provide one space per 100 square feet of floor area. Other businesses must provide one space per 250 square feet.

By the current ordinance, downtown businesses that couldn't provide

Plans set for 3rd judgeship

Two more candidates have announced they'll run for a district judge seat to become open next year, while State Rep. Jerry Vorva, R-Plymouth, has co-sponsored legislation to create an additional district judgeship.

Formally announcing their intention to seek the seat to be vacated by 35th District Judge James Garber were Ron Lowe and Thomas Hartnett.

If the move to create another district judgeship succeeds, observers predict a slew of local attorneys will join the race.

The 35th District Court serves Canton and greater Plymouth and Northville.

"There has been a move to get a third judge in this district for several years," Vorva said Wednesday, as he co-sponsored legislation to create a third judgeship.

"We have the courtroom, the finances and the need. Now we also

have the enabling legislation. As a former law enforcement officer, I am pleased to be a co-sponsor of this bill," Vorva said.

Garber has announced he'll retire at the end of this year. Candidates seeking to succeed him will vie for a six-year term on the bench.

Should the state legislature approve the third judgeship, candidates will vie for an initial four-year term, to be followed by six-year terms.

The bill has been referred to the house Judiciary Committee where hearings were expected to begin as early as this week, Vorva said.

Lowe, Plymouth city attorney since 1985, has a long list of endorsements. Supporters include retired district judge Dunbar Davis, former U.S. Congressman Carl Pursell, Northville Mayor Christopher Johnson, Canton Supervisor Tom Yack, Plymouth City Commissioners Ron Loiselle and John Vos, Northville Councilmen Charles Keys and Paul Folino, Plymouth-Canton school board President Roland Thomas and Schoolcraft Col-

lege board President Stephen Ragan.

In describing his judicial philosophy, Lowe said, "A judge must be able to recognize that the names on the dockets belong to people: flesh and blood men and women seeking resolutions to their conflicts."

"As an attorney I would label myself as practical, and I would be the same on the bench," Lowe said. "My father, who practiced law for 40 years, taught me that 'good law is just good common sense.' I have always found this to be true."

Hartnett, special assistant prosecuting attorney for the Wayne County Friend of the Court, said, "I believe that the breakdown in the family and loss of family values is the biggest domestic crisis facing us today."

"Judges need to interpret the law fairly but firmly particularly with youthful offenders," Hartnett said. "I believe that certainty of punishment is the deterrent that works best."

Canton Fire Marshal Art Winkel will conduct a safety audit of the state-owned Canton-Plymouth Mettetal Airport at 5 p.m. Wednesday.

"We're looking at it as we would a new occupancy," said Canton Fire Chief Mike Rorabacher. "It's like any new commercial site. We are looking to bring things up to code."

This is the first time in a long time that the airport has been inspected. Some items at the airport have long been grandfathered in despite new codes and regulations.

"We met with the pilots al-

Firemen OK new pact

The city of Plymouth's seven unionized firefighters have a new three-year contract approved by the city commission, giving them an average 3 percent pay raise each year.

The contract was approved as governments in Canton and greater Plymouth and Northville have

been talking about merging police and fire departments.

Plymouth City Manager Steve Walters said the signing of this contract could aid that effort. "It does make it easier to put the two (Plymouth-Plymouth Township fire departments) contracts together because they are more sim-

ilar now than they were before," Walters said.

Included in the new contract are provisions seeking to limit the amount of sick time an employee can take, while rewarding employees who use few sick days.

The agreement runs through June 30, 1995, and is retroactive to July 1, 1992.

Send tax cut forms back ASAP

Local officials are urging residents to fill out and return homestead exemption forms by a proposed March 1 deadline, so they can claim tax savings.

Mary Brooks, Plymouth Township treasurer, said she's sending the forms to township residents this week.

"It's really important they get them back by March 1 to me,"

Brooks said.

State Rep. Jerry Vorva, R-Plymouth, is also urging taxpayers to claim the lower homestead rate.

"The savings are well worth the few minutes it takes to complete the form," Vorva said. "The Treasury Department will begin mailing forms to every mailbox soon."

City and township assessors may also send out forms, he said, adding taxpayers who receive both documents should disregard the state form and file the one from local assessors.

"Anyone who has not received the tax exemption form by Feb. 10 should call their township, city or county assessor promptly," Vorva said.

ready in November (1993)," Rorabacher said. "We had a general discussion so they know what things we are looking at."

Fire officials are considering adding another hydrant at the airport as well as moving one already there. The audit will include electrical upgrades and fire alarm systems. The audit will likely involve township building inspectors to point out electrical and structural items, Rorabacher said.

"There are a lot of things down there that were in maintenance limbo," said airport manager Randy Collier, state Bureau of Aeronautics licensing and enforcement manager.

Yet there are some items that are peculiar to airports such as the need to preheat airplane engines in the winter. "He (Winkel) is famous for working with people to get things done," Rorabacher said.

The Canton-Plymouth Metropolitan Airport Advisory Board has scheduled a workshop at the time of the audit so members can be involved. Plymouth Township Supervisor Kathleen Keen-McCarthy asked if Plymouth Township firefighters and police could be involved in the safety audit.

"I know it would be helpful for our preplanning process," Keen-McCarthy said.

Rorabacher said Canton has updated a plan for emergency response. "It's an overall view of what could happen there. It (the airport) is just not a high-hazard area. Some businesses scare me more."

Even though Plymouth Township and a volunteer from the city

of Plymouth will be involved in the audit, Rorabacher said all 911 calls from the airport would go to Canton. "They (Plymouth Township and Plymouth) are only a phone call away. We do enjoy a

good mutual-aid relationship."

In the summer, Canton firefighters will have a joint practice session with neighboring communities for emergency response at the airport, Rorabacher said.

The position pays an annual salary of nearly \$100,000.

though downtown businesses and residents would benefit from new restaurants downtown.

As the downtown development authority began pushing for downtown renovation in recent years, city officials said changing the parking credit system was crucial.

Yet, the old parking credit system remains as negotiations between city administration and downtown parking lot owners continues.

The city has been trying to get owners of some key downtown lots to agree not to build on those lots. That's because building on a parking lot could be an attractive prospect if downtown development booms when parking requirements are relaxed.

City officials want to maintain available downtown parking provided by such lots, to head off a parking shortage.

City officials have also talked about assessing downtown businesses to contribute toward a fund by which the city takes control of downtown parking lots and refigures them to provide maximum parking.

These measures have yet to be determined, then detailed in a proposed ordinance, Walters said.

Historic schoolhouse may move to airport

State aeronautics officials are willing to listen to a proposal to move the unused historic one-room Hough School to Mettetal Airport.

"We have concerns but we haven't fallen down on one side or another," said Mettetal Airport Manager Randy Collier, state Bureau of Aeronautics licensing and enforcement manager.

A subcommittee of the Canton-Plymouth Mettetal Airport Advisory Board is studying a request from the Canton Historic District Commission to move the schoolhouse - one of five still standing in Canton - from its current site at Old Haggerty and Warren to the airport.

"We're still in the research stages," said advisory board member Barbara Bergenty, subcommittee chairwoman. The committee also includes advisory board member Mike Stankov, as well as resident Virginia Parker who has tried to preserve the schoolhouse in the past.

"Now it all comes down to money," Bergenty said, referring to costs of moving the schoolhouse.

Bergenty said the subcommittee has already secured offers of donations for a foundation for the schoolhouse, as well as a bathroom-kitchen and painting.

The schoolhouse could be used as a meeting room, classrooms, perhaps even a museum. "There is nothing like it on this side of the community," Bergenty said.

Developer Mel Belovicz, who

owns the school and the acreage where it sits, wants to get rid of the boarded-up building. He's apparently willing to give it to the airport.

"He wants us to have it now," Bergenty told the advisory board. She added that Belovicz would like it moved immediately because of the liability he faces with vandalism and weed growth.

The Canton Township Board of Trustees was expected to consider waiving water and sewer tap-in fees for the school Tuesday night should the house be moved to the airport. The waiver would greatly reduce costs for the preservation effort, Bergenty said.

"We realize that your board has a fiduciary responsibility to your sewer and water funds, but

foot facility on airport property. "We can't do anything until the state says, 'Here's some property,'" Bergenty said.

Meanwhile, the Experimental Aircraft Association, which has existing headquarters at the airport, wants to move into a portion of the large blue hangar - easily visible from Lilley and Joy roads.

"There is nothing about their proposal we don't like," said Collier, who is in the process of revising requests for proposals to hire an airport manager and fixed base operator, who would be allowed to operate a business from the airport, such as offering flying lessons.

In the rebidding effort, Collier said he would provide bidders with a design of the hangar so they can determine how much

space they need. EAA past president Doug Shumard said the EAA would use the space for a meeting room and provide hangar space. Sewer and water is not available.

"Our goal is to get us closer to where the action is," Shumard said.

If an FBO-manager bidder wants the entire blue hangar, Shumard said the EAA would be back before the advisory board and state with another plan.

Bergenty said she doesn't believe the EAA's plans will affect the Hough preservation effort. "If this thing goes through and we get water and sewer hooked up, they have the way paved. The EAA would have to pay to connect," Bergenty said.

School personnel learning how to deal with child abuse cases

Training sessions on how to deal with suspected child neglect and abuse are being planned for Plymouth-Canton school personnel.

Patrick O'Donnell, Plymouth-Canton executive director of instruction, Plymouth Township Police Chief Carl Berry and a representative from the Western-Wayne County Branch of the Department of Social Services have met to organize in-service sessions on how to handle suspected cases of child neglect and abuse.

By law, school personnel and others who work with children are required to notify the DSS if they have "reasonable cause" to suspect abuse or neglect. But complicating the issue is the fact that reasonable cause isn't clearly defined.

The sessions were prompted by a recent incident in a Plymouth-Canton school in which a parent was suspected of child abuse by leaving a first-grade student home alone. The DSS investigated, but found no problem.

However, the case raised questions about how and when child abuse should be reported to the DSS by teachers and others in the schools.

"What is reasonable cause is based on an individual interpretation," said Berry. "If a kid comes up and says certain things to you and exhibits certain types of behavior, that can give a teacher reasonable cause. It's my

feeling that we can probably sit down and better coordinate things between the three agencies and provide better service to the residents."

Sen. Robert Geake, R-Northville, said in a letter to the editor on the recent case that "while the number of reported child abuse cases is increasing, the number of cases substantiated after investigation has been falling, so that now less than one-third of these reports turns out to be valid."

Geake agreed with a board member who said guidelines for reporting by teachers need to be clearly established.

Reyes Smith, section manager with the DSS, says it's not up to individuals to decide whether abuse or neglect is occurring. "By law, that clearly is the department's responsibility," she said. "If teachers, physicians, coroners, nurses, EMS workers, psychologists, social workers, school administrators, child care providers or law enforcement officers suspect there is abuse or neglect, they are mandated by law to report it."

Smith acknowledged that individuals are sometimes falsely accused, but said it's a necessary evil.

"The system isn't perfect, but I don't think any system is. If we do an investigation and find there is nothing to it, there is no record of it. It's not on computer, or in our central registry.

The system has to err on the side of safety, she said.

"If someone failed to report

something serious and nothing was done, the community would be outraged. I guess we do need to find a middle road someplace. School and community groups do need to be educated. They do need to know what signs to look for and some training."

The DSS provides training sessions and speakers. Anyone interested may call DSS community affairs liaison Margaret Ansinger at (313) 256-8000.

O'Donnell has researched the law and says the summary of a Michigan statute says reasonable cause exists when "a reasonably prudent person of ordinary intelligence who got or received similar information would have made a similar kind of decision or concluded the same way" as the person expressing suspicion. "That's about as good as I've seen or heard in terms of definition. It doesn't allow for the greatest clarity, but it's the best we have right now," he said.

It's difficult to establish whether abuse or neglect is occurring, but there are signs to watch for, said O'Donnell.

"It's so varied. It could be anything from teachers noticing students being bruised, scratched or cut often and only getting a vague explanation of some type of accident. If that's repeated over and over, you'd begin to have reasonable cause to make a referral. Other examples are untreated medical problems, run-aways, students being frequently late, absent, or locked out of the house for long periods," he said.

Senate acts to cut transfer tax

The state Senate has moved to reduce the most unpopular part of the school finance reform package — the real estate transfer tax — before it even takes effect.

Senators voted to cut the rate from 2 percent to 0.75 percent and sent the bill to the House where an even stiffer battle is expected this week.

"It's frustrating," said the sponsor, Sen. Michael Bouchard, R-Birmingham. "I put the bill in at zero (tax rate). I would prefer zero. I'm trying to get as big a cut as I can.

"But the House absolutely won't take up anything less than a 0.75 percent rate, and nothing less than 0.75 percent will be signed into law."

Bouchard had to fight down a conservative Republican attempt by Gil DiNello of Eastpointe, Doug Carl of Utica and Jack Welborn of Kalamazoo to cut the rate to zero. They failed in a 6 to 17 unrecorded amendment vote.

Carl denounced fellow senators for the "height of hypocrisy" for

refusing his demand for a record roll call, a procedure that takes eight votes.

Senate Bill 999 was approved 31 to 3 with 4 absent. Here's how area senators voted:

Yes — William Faust, D-Westland, George Hart, D-Deerborn. No — none.

Absent (excused) — Robert Geake, R-Northville.

Bouchard said a little noticed feature of his bill will "grandfather" people buying on land contract. If they signed the land contract prior to the effective date of the law, they won't be subject to the real estate transfer tax when their purchase is completed.

Bouchard said transfers between related corporate entities also would be exempt — for example, if ABC Home Building transferred title to ABS Home Sales.

Under Proposal A on the March 15 ballot, the real estate transfer tax takes effect next Jan. 1; under the statutory plan B, this May 1.

At 2 percent, Bouchard said, the tax would have raised \$426 million; at 0.75, \$160 million a year. "That's still a \$266 million

savings," he said.

Senators supported amendments to exempt property transfers from parent to child and grandparent to child from the transfer tax.

They also exempted properties where the state equalized value had dropped between purchase and sale. That amendment was offered by Sen. Lana Pollack, D-Ann Arbor, who nevertheless voted against the bill on final passage.

Pollack said the tax cut would rob municipalities, community colleges, prenatal care and deferred maintenance on college buildings. "Yours was an irresponsible but understandably popular action," said Pollack, a U.S. Senate candidate.

Also voting no was Sen. Debbie Stabenow, D-Lansing, a gubernatorial candidate. Stabenow argued that next year school funds will be \$300 million short. She said the state can't afford the Bouchard tax cut because the fiscal 1994 surplus is "artificial" because of double taxation — the property tax doesn't expire until July 1, but the new taxes will kick

in May 1. "In year 2, there's a deficit and no billion dollar surplus," she said.

"Incorrect," said Gov. John Engler in an interview with this newspaper. "We've raised revenue projections for 1995."

Reducing the real estate transfer tax is expected to generate support for Proposal A among business groups, particularly the Michigan Association of Realtors and Michigan Home Builders Association. Most business groups have joined Gov. John Engler and GOP leaders in supporting Proposal A, whose cornerstone is a sales tax increase, rather than the B plan with its income tax increase.

Engler said the idea of a real estate transfer tax was born last fall when it appeared homestead property taxes might be wiped out entirely. It was added during late night negotiations in the Legislature's Dec. 23-24 marathon session as a "poison pill" to make Proposal A less palatable.

Push is on to extend tax-cut filing date

State lawmakers are scurrying to push back the March 1 deadline for homeowners to file forms for a homestead property tax cut.

Rep. Deborah Whyman, R-Canton, is sponsoring a bill to push the filing deadline to April 4.

Sen. Michael Bouchard, R-Birmingham, is working on a similar bill which also would create an appeals process for people who miss the deadline.

Gov. John Engler endorsed the efforts.

Under the Christmas Eve school finance reform package adopted by the Legislature, a primary homestead will be taxed at six or 12 mills and all other property, including vacation homes, at 24 mills.

For homesteads, the six mill rate takes effect if Proposal A (sales tax) is adopted by voters March 15. The 12 mill rate takes effect automatically under the legislative fall back plan B.

To get the lower rate, home-

owners must file a brief affidavit with their local assessors declaring the property to be their principal domicile, signing it and adding their social security numbers. The state treasury, counties and local assessors currently are sending out the forms.

Both plans have an uneven effect on farmland, according to state Rep. Dan Gustafson, R-Williamston.

Historically, agricultural land has been classed with residential. But Gustafson said the reform plan makes some farmland residential and some commercial.

For example, an entire farm could qualify for the homestead rate where the farmer earns more than 50 percent of household income from the farm. But farmland not adjacent and contiguous to the homestead would be taxed at the 24 mill rate.

With 40 co-sponsors, Gustafson this week will introduce a bill to tax all farmland at the residential rate.

CEP disturbance was caused by college protest group

The five young people ticketed by Canton police at Plymouth-Canton Educational Park Feb. 3 for creating a disturbance on school property are social activists who belong to the International League for Revolution, said Canton Principal Tom MacKenzie.

"Four of the five are University of Michigan students. The Inter-

national League for Revolution is a worldwide university student movement to overthrow schools around the world," said MacKenzie. "They've delivered pamphlets to a number of suburban districts, but this is the first time they've been caught."

The protesters, aged 19-22, aren't believed to be graduates of Canton or Salem High School, said school spokesman Richard

Egli. "They were distributing anti-Nazi literature and encouraging a walkout for noon," said Canton Police Officer Tammy Colling.

A flier they distributed urged students to "walk out and drive out the fascists and fight racism." The fliers also called for elimination of the dress code and the establishment of a smoking room.

Cited were Anita Wislocki, 22

of Detroit; Heather Bergman, 19 of Ann Arbor; Brandon Kierdorf, 20 of Ann Arbor; Shawn Murphy, 19 of Ann Arbor; and Jessica Curtin, 19 of Ann Arbor.

"There are students who are concerned about those issues. They aren't overt, but periodically we have Nazi-oriented graffiti and racial epithets appear on restroom walls," said MacKenzie. "But Plymouth-Canton has fewer than

any other high school I've been in. When issues like this surface, students are concerned, and we're concerned."

Around noon, about 150 students rallied outside. Most were dispersed, but a group of 50 or so remained, Colling said. That group met inside with administrators and worked out "an appropriate way to address their concerns.

"It's illegal for anyone to try to prevent orderly activities at school. We will continue to enforce this ordinance. It's the contention of the Canton Police Department we will not tolerate disruption of our schools and the normal flow of education," Colling said.

The five are to appear March 4 in 35th District Court.

Business owners like SMART route changes

The SMART bus system is soliciting the opinion of Wayne County business operators regarding how SMART routes might better accommodate employees who have no cars.

And the business people seem to be impressed.

At a public hearing Wednesday, about 60 individuals representing various private enterprises told SMART personnel how the buses might better serve carless employees.

"It was very productive," said Bobbie Shorter, manager of a Rally's Hamburgers outlet in Westland. "I assumed it wouldn't be anything that would interest me, but I came out with a very different opinion. They're really genuinely concerned with our needs."

What SMART is doing is adjusting its existing bus routes to accommodate specific needs of businesses. (To get your two cents in, call SMART at 223-2100.)

For example, Technicolor Video Services at Seven Mile and I-275 in Livonia hires many temporary workers who don't have cars. The nearest bus stop is a mile away. So SMART plans to change the route and drop the employees off right at Technicolor.

Kelly Services also has a problem. "Almost all the positions we have are west of Middlebelt," said sales representative Jessica Callaway. "It's hard to get (our employees) out there."

SMART has agreed to extend bus service to the Kelly sites, with the help of a little

Kelly green. "We're going to have to subsidize some of the runs, but the cost is negligible," Callaway said.

Richard Walker, the manager of Rally's in Livonia, is in a similar fix. Most of his employees live in Detroit, but the SMART bus doesn't roll any farther north than Wonderland Mall at Plymouth and Middlebelt. The majority of Walker's employees ride the bus to work, but must disembark at Wonderland to walk the remaining two miles. Walker wants SMART to extend the bus route.

Michael Duggan, the interim general manager of SMART, said it's no secret that the metro Detroit bus service is skimpy at best. "There's no question we need a major increase in service," he said, noting that just one SMART route penetrates Canton Township, two in Redford Township and two in Livonia. SMART has no service to Laurel Park or Schoolcraft College. After 11 p.m. SMART has just five buses running in the tri-county area.

Currently, SMART is negotiating with the Detroit Department of Transportation to consolidate services. For example, DDOT maintenance crews might repair SMART buses that break down downtown. And schedules might be coordinated to avoid duplication of service.

"Ultimately, a merger is the solution," Duggan said, but that depends on how well consolidation of services goes.

Candidates want to keep SC on track

Expanding business partnerships, community service, and a desire to lend expertise so that an already "fine institution" stays on track were themes echoed by nine candidates seeking an appointment to the Schoolcraft College Board.

The board interviewed nine of 13 candidates last Wednesday. The other four will be interviewed beginning at 7 p.m. Wednesday, after which the board is expected to make a decision.

The person selected will serve the remainder of Michael Burley's term, which expires June 30, 1995.

Candidates speak

"I am indebted to Schoolcraft College for my degree in nursing," said Bernadine Horan of Livonia. "It'll allow me to be marketable for a long, long time."

Horan, an emergency-room nurse at Botsford General Hospital in Farmington Hills, also holds a bachelor's degree in allied health management from Madonna University.

Horan wants to see more technical programs because "that's where the emphasis must be as the college responds to the needs of the community."

Harriet Larson said she too would emphasize vocational and technical programs as a board member.

Now retired, Larson taught for more than 20 years in Livonia Public Schools. She lives in Livonia and is president of the Livonia Library Commission.

SC praised

Larson praised the Women's Resource Center, the Citizen Advisory committees, and the college foundation for the programs offered and the progress they've made in the college community.

"I'm good at working with people, setting goals and expediting discussions," said Larson when asked what she would bring to the Schoolcraft board.

"I am interested in the Schoolcraft College board because I wanted you to have someone who knows about education, someone intensely interested in education, and someone who cares about the community," said Larson, who added that she was impressed with the high quality of candidates seeking the appointment.

John J. Pantalone, a retired school principal and present owner of a travel agency and motivational-seminar firm, told trustees: "I'm not here because I think anything's broken and needs to be fixed."

Opportunities here

He said, however, that education can be improved and there are tremendous opportunities for Schoolcraft to get closer to the community.

As a trustee, he would encourage more joint ventures with business and industry.

Pantalone, a Westland resident, said it's important to review curriculums to make sure that the college is offering curriculums where there are jobs for students when they complete the program.

Michael Reynolds, an attorney from Livonia, said he applied for the post because Schoolcraft has "a good track record."

Team player

"I see myself as a team player. I have no personal agenda. My impression of the school is that the present and past boards have done a tremendous job developing the school," said Reynolds.

"I don't believe in trying to fix something that's not broken," he added.

Reynolds said the principal

benefit that a lawyer can provide is objective analysis and an understanding of the concepts of public good and the benefit of compromise.

Mary Sieggreen of Northville told board members she applied for the position because after being so involved in her work for the last 13 years she felt she was neglecting her community.

"I see the role of a community college from two perspectives — as a jumping-off point for students starting out in college and for people who need to get to work."

Value of S'craft

"I believe strongly in the value of education and in particular the value of a community college," said Sieggreen, who has taught nursing at the community college level.

She told trustees there's a great need for people who have technical skills.

Sieggreen works as a clinical nurse specialist/case manager at Harper Hospital, Detroit Medical Center.

Luis Torres of Livonia said that as a trustee he would push the board to get more more involved with business and industry.

He too stressed the technical skills students need to enter the workplace. Among those are automotive design, drafting, and nursing.

Prepare students

"As students leave campus they must be prepared for the future."

"Technology is going so fast — We need to catch up," said Torres, who works as a mechanical engineer at AM General Corp. in Livonia.

"I would be honored to serve on the board. I think I can help. I'm convinced I can help," said Torres, who lives in Livonia.

Michael Dani, a self-employed certified public accountant, said it was former U.S. Rep. Carl Pursell who encouraged him to apply for the trustee post.

Expertise can help

Dani said his CPA expertise would be beneficial to the board.

A Canton resident, Dani said he likes the idea of a satellite center in that community, but it must be cost-effective.

Dani said that although the college is doing a good job, he would like to see computer courses expanded and improved.

Dani's wife works at the college, and trustees asked about a potential conflict when it came time for contract negotiations.

"I'm not a strong union person, but I believe unions are a necessary evil," said Dani, adding he could separate the personal and professional issues.

Dani holds a degree from Cleary College. He said being knowledgeable in finance, management and human services would help him on the board.

Linda Chuhuran of Canton Township said Schoolcraft is not "a new interest, but a continuing interest" with her.

"I have several degrees from Schoolcraft. It's part of me. I like the college; it's an important cornerstone in the county," said Chuhuran.

Chuhuran was formerly a candidate for the Schoolcraft board.



Bryan Amann launches campaign for U.S. Congress

As the February wind rattled through the cars at Jack Demmer Ford Thursday, Bryan Amann attempted to heat up his campaign for U.S. Congress in the parking lot.

Speaking over the whoosh of traffic on Michigan Avenue, and interrupted by a flag that keeled over, Amann criticized the federal government in general and the federal deficit in particular, adding, "If we think paying for the deficit is expensive, consider the cost of a bankrupt society."

A Wayne County commissioner since 1991, Amann now aims for the seat in Congress long held by his mentor, Democrat William Ford, who recently announced his retirement.

The only other declared candidate in the race for the 13th Congressional District is Republican John Schall of Ann Arbor, formerly of Livonia. Observer communities in the 13th District are Canton and Plymouth townships and the cities of Plymouth, Westland, Garden City and the southeast quadrant of Livonia.

Gesturing to the Ford Motor Co. plant behind him, Amann, 36, recalled the days when he worked there to pay his way through the University of Michigan. "The work was hard, monotonous and sometimes dehumanizing. But it was worth it," he said. "I was forever charged with an understanding of the values and sensibilities of working men and women and their families."

Chester Amann of Westland,

the candidate's father, said his son "is going to go to Washington to help carry out the garbage."

Dorothy Amann, the candidate's mother, clips every newspaper article her son is mentioned in. "I guess I'm going to have to get a bigger scrapbook," she said.

Although Amann has yet to raise the first dollar for his campaign, he already has a tidy stable of endorsements, including Canton Township Supervisor Tom Yack, Westland Mayor Robert Thomas, former Garden City Mayor Jim Plakas, Livonia city councilmen Dale Jurcisin and Mike McGee, Plymouth city commissioner Dennis Shrewsbury, Plymouth Township Trustee K.C. Mueller and Canton Community Foundation director William Joyner.

Other officials from Wayne, Romulus, Inkster, Huron Township, Northville Township and Sumpter Township have also endorsed Amann.

Yack's endorsement comes as somewhat of a surprise, considering Yack is a Republican and Amann a Democrat. However, Yack is reserving the right to support the Republican candidate after the Aug. 2 primary election.

"I know Bryan very well," Yack said. "The qualities he has are what I'm looking for in a congressman. And the qualities are? Integrity, talent, knowledge, intelligence, responsiveness to the citizens, hard worker, very hard worker."

Amann said he expects the campaign to cost \$1 million, which he calls "obscene." He will

"probably" accept contributions from political action committees, but "you have to be careful about who you take money from."

On mud-slinging campaigns, Amann said, "I won't start it, but I'm not going to stand here like a punching bag and take it (if someone else starts it)."

Given his druthers, Amann said, he'll stick to the issues. "One of the lessons Bill Ford taught me is never mention your opponent's name."

In December 1992 Amann said, "I think I can make a difference from within the system, usually by kicking the system in the butt."

But would that strategy work in Washington? "It wouldn't hurt a bit in Washington," he said.

Amann has lived in six of the 22 communities in the 13th district, including Westland, Canton and Garden City. He now lives in Wayne with his wife Mary and their daughters, Lindsay, 8, and Lauren, 5. He graduated from John Glenn High School in 1975 and earned his law degree from the University of Detroit and Georgetown University.

While studying in Washington, D.C., Amann served on Ford's staff. He also worked as assistant county executive for criminal justice under Wayne County Executive Edward McNamara and was instrumental in setting a noise abatement policy between the Federal Aviation Administration, Metro Airport and the airlines.

In private life, Amann is an attorney with the Livonia law firm Brashear, Tangora and Spence.

This Sanders melts away after Valentine's Day

The voice over the phone Wednesday was high-pitched, excited. The words came tumbling out, one over the other. "I had to call. My Sanders is closing."

The caller was Bonnie Rattner, normally an only slightly excitable playwright who lives in Franklin Village. She had, she said, taken her niece to the Sanders at Maple and Telegraph in Bloomfield Township that very day. There she was, sitting at a Sanders counter, as she has dozens of times in a lifetime of growing up in metro Detroit, when she heard that Tuesday, the day after Valentine's Day, it would be closing.

"This is unholy," Rattner said. "It was like one of the last places where you can go and sit at a counter with

your niece, your kid. I grew up with Sanders. What is left of the human element of our lives?"

Rattner, as a dramatist, might recognize the scenario. It has happened to more than 40 metro-area Sanders as the organization, built on mouth-watering confections — succumbed to stale business practices.

But that was then, insists Jim Brasier, president of Sanders Systems Inc., that now operates 10 corporate stores and oversees two franchise stores in Detroit and its suburbs — and says he's looking to expand.

Brasier says "a rather dramatic increase" in his rent is forcing him to relocate.

However, the story from Bloomfield Plaza shopping strip manager Marie Primo sounds more like a re-run. She

says complaints about Sanders service forced her not to renew his lease.

Whatever. The bottom line is that some employees will be out of a job and many customers will be unhappy. The most senior employees will be re-deployed, others laid off, Brasier hopes temporarily. "The loyalty of our em-

ployees is equal to that of our customers," Brasier said.

"The customers are very upset," explains one of those employees, store co-manager Phyllis Borchering, who's been with Sanders for 23 years.

A small survey showed she was correct.

"Oh no," Dorothy Wells kept saying. "Oh no. I came in to get a French bread. My heart is broken."

Wells had already weathered the closing of that Birmingham Sanders. She had forged a new route to include the Bloomfield store as she drove home to Pontiac from her job at Ford Motor in Plymouth.

Pam Durston of Bloomfield Township also used to frequent the downtown Birmingham Sanders. "I think it's sad."

She counts on sending Sanders hot fudge as gifts to out-of-town relatives and friends. "I will miss having some place that's available. It would be nice if they would go back to Birmingham."

"That's too bad," echoed Arthur Apkarian of Bloomfield Hills. "I remember going to the Sanders on Woodward and Davison. They had a big counter. People would line up behind your stool waiting for a seat."

Apkarian was selecting candy for Valentine's Day — bittersweet chocolate I suspect.

Graduates ought to have broad knowledge base

Question: What will be the impact of the new high school proficiency test students have to pass in 1996 in order to graduate? I can't see how one test, after 12 years in school, can be the criteria that determines if my son graduates. Do you believe the proficiency test is good or bad for Michigan education?

Answer: First off, your son will graduate whether or not he passes the Michigan proficiency test (which presently is the MEAP test), providing he accumulates the required high school course credits for the next three years. It is this year's freshman class who may have to pass a to-be-developed proficiency test to receive a diploma in '97.

Those who pass the present proficiency test, the MEAP, receive a State of Michigan endorsed diploma. Those who don't pass the MEAP, but who

met their high school course requirements, receive what is called an unendorsed diploma. That means the adolescent put out little effort in school and was given a "goodbye" and good luck piece of paper.

Indeed, the unendorsed diploma means he/she put in four years in high school and is leaving a warm, social environment without even a grasp of basic ninth grade material. The 10th grade MEAP is really only a reflection of what a "student" should have mastered in the middle school and the ninth grade. And those students who don't pass it in the 10th grade can re-take the test (a different version) in the 11th and 12th grades.

This endorsed diploma concept is not new. Years ago some large, major city school districts awarded a high school diploma to those who passed a district-developed minimum com-

petency test. Others received a Certificate of Attendance who couldn't pass the test but who, at least, "kept a seat warm" for four years.

You ask if I believe a proficiency test is good for education. I do! And I would recommend the test be revised each year, expanding the subject areas addressed and increasing the test item

difficulty. What I am saying is that a state proficiency test should be a reflection of knowledge a senior high school student should have, not just a mastery of ninth grade math and reading.

A graduation proficiency test should go beyond reading, math and basic science. By state law, government is required for graduation and most districts have a local American history requirement for graduation.

My point is that graduation competency test requirements have focused entirely on math, reading and science (see the MEAP for a sample). Should not a graduating senior have at least a conversational knowledge of the Constitution, the Bill of Rights, a talking knowledge of the Civil War, i.e., who

and what were Lee, Grant, McClellan, Bull Run, blacks in the Civil War? We may make great bombs with increased math and science knowledge, but decisions are made by governments and history is what one must draw upon to survive.

Aside from the exceptions: the learning disabled, the emotionally impaired, those with an attention deficit; young adults will recognize there is a new game in town and most will rise to the occasion. I have that much confidence in our youth.

I am a believer in the high expectation theory; that is, the level of expectation one sets determines the heights one achieves.

A diploma should stop being a gift for attendance.

Ballot plan is better

The March 15 school finance plan proposed by the Engler campaign is a better choice for Michigan voters than the compromised "back-up" plan agreed to if Engler's proposition is defeated. Young adults today are burdened with increased federal taxation, and the last thing we need in addition to repayment of student loans is an increased tax responsibility.

Governor Engler has provided a unique alternative to traditional school financing in an effort to improve the quality of education across

the state in all communities. No longer will the burden of school finance be determined by local property taxes. Young adults looking to purchase their first home will be guaranteed their property assessment will not increase more than 5 percent per year, maintaining a more stable tax liability. Under the Engler plan, costs will be diffused and shared across the state through sales taxes, in effect, lowering the state income tax.

Those who oppose the governor's plan unfortunately prefer that Michigan residents pay higher taxes in the tradition of tax and spend Democrats. The March 15 ballot proposal is a

step forward for Michigan in this time of restructuring and change. The Engler plan will decrease state income tax from 4.6 percent to 4.4 percent. Under the back-up plan, state taxes will increase to 6.0 percent from today's 4.6 percent. Is this what we want?

In addition to a higher state income tax, the opposition wants to raise the single business tax by 0.4 percent. This is not a good time for government to increase taxation when the Michigan economic recovery is doing so well. We cannot afford to stifle small business any more than President Clinton has already done with his new tax plan. We are all feeling the

effects of the federal increase at this critical time of the year, and the last thing business needs is for the government to take more of its money. This can only decrease the number of opportunities for young Michigan adults looking for work after school.

We must stand up to the old ways of doing things in government by not allowing the Democrats to throw money at the problem without significant change. Vote yes for the ballot proposal, and look to the future with the progressive plan proposed by Governor Engler.

"The apparel store expects to hire about 300 employees," said Michael Buescher, Laurel Park Place marketing director. "The company is looking for people who love fashion, enjoy helping people and have a sincere desire to excel."

Parisian will open at the five-year-old mall as a two-story, 150,000-square-foot specialty department store emphasizing customer service.

be on hand as well as mayors and other officials from neighboring communities.

Parisian spokeswoman Amy McRae described the Alabama-based retailer as an apparel and cosmetic store founded in 1887. It was purchased in 1920 by the current owners, the Hess and Abroma families. There are 30 Parisian stores nationwide, primarily in the south. The most recent Parisian was opened in Indianapolis.

McRae said knowledgeable sales associates are key to the success of the specialty retailer, which reported sales of \$450 million in 1992. To hire one person, Parisian will interview an average of 20. To attract high-caliber associates, Parisian mixes higher-than-average salaries, commissions, incentives and non-monetary forms of recognition.

Parisian's customer services include: a liberal return policy, competitive pricing (the company will match the price of any of its merchandise found for less anywhere else), free alterations, and

no interest on credit card purchases when a minimum monthly payment is made.

Each customer receives free fashion consultations from sales associates, who have received 42 hours of classroom instruction before being assigned to the selling floor.

There is shopping by appointment for busy clients. In the children's department, Cartoon Corners, young shoppers are kept entertained with videos while mom and dad make merchandise selections.

McRae said she considered Nordstrom's to be Parisian's competition in terms of style and service, though she acknowledged the store would carry merchandise similar to Jacobson's, the other major department store anchor at Laurel Park Place.

Jacobson's Laurel Park Place manager Burt Hyman said he hopes the Parisian addition will "bring a lot more people to the mall each day."

"They are a fine operation," he said, adding, "of course, they are

no Jacobson's."

Hyman pointed out that Parisian does not carry homeware, linens or gourmet foods or have a bridal registry like Jacobson's. Nor will Parisian carry the upper-end, designer clothing lines found at Jacobson's.

There are currently 60 stores at Laurel Park Place, located at Six Mile and Newburgh in Livonia.

A Pea In The Pod maternity shop and a Suncoast Video Store are the latest Laurel Park additions, which are set to open in the next few weeks. The shopping center's other major tenants include Talbot's, Eddie Bauer, Jos. A. Lenten season brings meatless meals, sacrifice

Rowing up in Wyandotte, we never called it "Fat Tuesday." We heard about Mardi Gras in current events at school, but never dreamed it was so raucous until we experienced it ourselves.

There was no such a thing as "Paczki Day." To us, it all started on Ash Wednesday, the only day of the year you could tell who was a good Catholic and who wasn't simply by the gray smudge of ash embedded on their forehead.

Ash Wednesday signaled the beginning of Lent, a time of fasting and other forms of self sacrifice. Since my oldest brother was an ordained Roman Catholic priest, the meaning of Lent stayed with us until Easter, far longer than the smudge of gray ash.

We did special chores around the house to earn money to "buy" pagan babies. In addition to Sunday mass, there were novenas on Tuesdays, stations of the cross on Fridays and confession on Saturdays.

For 40 days and 40 nights, meat did not grace the Janes' Gang dinner table. We wondered how McDonald's stayed in business. I can remember eating so much pasta one year, I thought we were Italian.

Meatless meals

Momma was, and still is, an amazing cook. Besides pasta, main dishes included potatoes or rice. Potato soup was a weekly favorite, usually coupled with what we called "johnnycake" otherwise known as cornbread. Fish, which I distinctly remember as being nothing but batter dipped and deep fried perch or smelt, was served with homemade french fries and coleslaw.

Oh yes, there was always tuna fish drained and tossed with Miracle Whip, a small chopped yellow onion, and served on toast. I can recall when Momma cooked her first tuna casserole, resplendent with tuna, noodles and of course, Campbell's cream of mushroom soup. We were especially enamored when potato chips were crushed by hand and spread over the top prior to baking.

Sweet dream.

Sweets were something we dreamed of getting in our Easter baskets. Doughnuts were forbidden, and to this day I still feel cheated knowing that we never gorged on rich foods and paczki before Lent began.

As kids, we looked forward to Jimmy Millstein's birthday party the first week in March because we knew that his parents knew nothing of Lent. After three weeks of fasting we welcomed the opportunity to gorge on Jimmy's favorite - Sander's yellow cake and Affholter's blue moon ice cream.

During Lent we ate gourmet but never realized it. Momma made quiche, but we called it impossible pie because it was impossible for Momma to remember the recipe if she didn't have a box of Bisquick to read from. When a recipe called for cooked ground beef momma substituted frozen broccoli.

We had a Frigidaire deep freeze in the basement that housed chopped tomatoes and frozen corn gleaned from the garden the previous summer. Tomatoes were simmered with a few herbs and served over cooked spaghetti. Corn was dumped into luscious cream based chowders.

There was little doubt it was still a few days before payday when homemade dumplings simmered in vegetable broth were the main course on the dinner table. Of course, we thought it was nothing more than meatless food. Little did we know then that Momma's culinary talents would be cherished today.

New traditions

Throughout the years, the Janes Gang has continued to hold sacred the season of Lent. But with changing tides, the new Catholicism, Mass changing from Latin to English, our thoughts have evolved. Yes, we observe the weekly ritual of meatless meals, but the fasting and purchasing of pagan babies has given way to modern rituals that accentuate the positive.

On payday, the first check written goes to the Salvation Army. We have agreed to prepare a meal at the Ronald McDonald House as a family for families in need. This year we will prepare a batch of cookies for a neighbor confined to a nursing home.

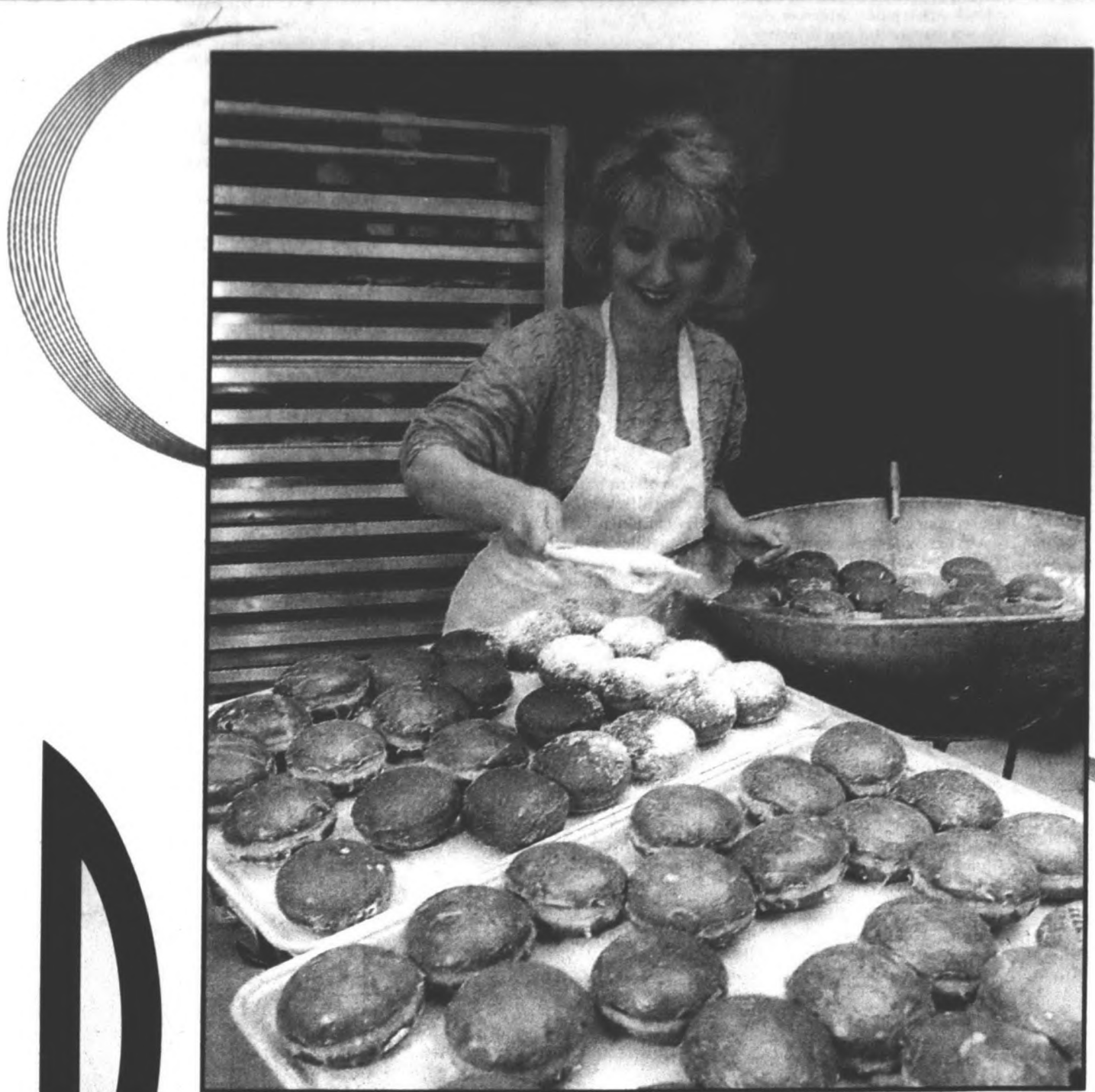

In Hamtramck Paczki Day is like a holiday. People start lining up at bakeries on Jos. Campau and Conant as early as 5 a.m. Nobody seems to mind waiting in line, and those that do buy their paczki on Monday.

It's a Polish tradition that has spread to the suburbs where it continues to grow more popular every year. A lot of the bakers I talked to said it's the biggest day of the year for them.

Lidija Vangelov, owner of Heritage Bakery in Livonia, averages 42 hours straight without sleep on Paczki Day.

"Four girls who worked for me while they were going to college take the day off work every year just to work in the bakery on Paczki Day," said Vangelov. "They said they wouldn't miss

it. It's like a holiday."

Vangelov and her husband Vasil (Vick) opened their first bakery, New Family Bakery, in Detroit in 1974. They've been in Livonia since 1983.

"Our paczki recipe is an original Polish recipe from the family we bought New Family Bakery from," said Vangelov. Heritage Bakery is a family-run business. Vick does the baking, and will work round the clock, with help from relatives, to meet the increased demand for paczki. The couple's children, John, 18, an engineering student at Henry Ford Community College, and Annette, 16 a junior at Crestwood High School, also help out at the bakery, after school and on weekends.

Health conscious restaurant owner enjoys low-fat fare

Lucy Mitchell grew up in a restaurant family and didn't plan to carry on the family tradition. She studied dance and fashion photography, and even had her own photo studio in downtown Pontiac for 10 years.

In June, she and her husband Darryl Date both 30, opened Mitchell & Max TOGO, a carryout restaurant at 28901 Southfield Road in Lathrup Village that specializes in barbecue ribs, chicken, pizza, pasta and more. She's also part owner of Mitchell's Barbecue and Grill in Royal Oak and the third generation of her family to be involved in the restaurant business. Her father and uncles owned Mitchell's on Cass Lake.

"We always had a big pot of spaghetti on the stove at my house," said Mitchell. "My dad would always say you can never put enough garlic or onion in food."

While pizza and hickory smoked ribs are family specialties, Mitchell who studied dance for over 20 years, and teaches ballet classes in Southfield's community Education program, said she's always been health conscious.

"I don't use butter when I cook. I use olive or

vegetable oil," she said. "I like to be creative when I cook. I always buy low-fat sour cream and cheese."

Mitchell likes to cook with chicken, her husband Darryl who makes a "very good lasagna," likes beef filets. Mitchell compromises when she cooks by mixing ground beef with ground turkey. "My husband would know the difference if I used all ground turkey," she said. Add whole tomatoes to the meat mixture, a little tomato sauce, warm and serve over rice for a quick dinner. This mixture can also be used to stuff green peppers.

Another Mitchell creation is sauteed zucchini, green peppers, onions, and mushrooms mixed with tomato sauce, sprinkled with Parmesan cheese and baked in the oven at 350 degrees for about 10 minutes until the cheese melts.

Sauteed broccoli and mushrooms tossed with pasta, olive oil and Parmesan cheese is also quick and healthy.

"Once I sauteed lean hamburger with zucchini, carrots, green pepper and onion, rolled it in Lavoosh bread, and served it with a yogurt and fresh dill sauce," said Mitchell. "It was very good."

Since they opened Mitchell & Max TOGO, Mitchell said she doesn't have much time to cook. "We provide quality food for people on the go," said Mitchell. Their motto is "An old tradition with you in mind."

Customers can either dine in or take-out. They also offer a catering service. Often, Mitchell and her staff are cooking for someone like you and me who are rushing home after work and don't have time to cook dinner.

Their oven roasted and barbecue chicken are big sellers and so are the vegetarian dishes and Greek specialties that are a family tradition. See recipe inside.

PACZKI

2 cups flour
2 cups boiling milk
¼ cup lukewarm milk
3½ ounces yeast
6 egg yolks
½ cup sugar
½ vanilla bean, ground
1-2 teaspoons grated orange rind
¼ pound butter, melted
Flour (for pastry board)
Jam
Deep fat for frying

Sift 1 cup flour into boiling milk, remove from heat, and beat until smooth. Cool. Dissolve yeast in the ¼ cup lukewarm milk. Add to flour mixture, stir, and let stand half an hour.

Cream egg yolks and sugar, add vanilla and orange rind and add to

dough when it begins to rise. Add remaining flour and butter, and work with fingers until dough begins to stand away from the hands. Let stand until it has risen to about twice its bulk.

Roll out on floured board to thickness of ⅓ inch, and cut out circles with a pastry cutter or glass. Place a teaspoon of jam in center of half the circles (using only fruit, not syrup), cover with remaining circles, press edges together, and let stand in warm place to rise again.

Fry a few at a time in deep fat, taking care not to heat the fat so much that the dough will burn. Drain and serve dusted with confectioner's sugar.

PARIS BAKERY PACZKI

1 cup milk at room temperature
3 eggs
½ cup sugar
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon baking powder
½ cup all-purpose vegetable shortening
4 packages dry yeast
4¼-4½ cups all-purpose flour
Juice from ½ fresh lemon
½ teaspoon vanilla extract
Vegetable oil for frying
Jam for filling

Cream dry ingredients with shortening. Add eggs and milk. Mix until dough is completely incorporated and pliable, approximately 5-8 minutes. Cover dough with damp cloth or cloth moistened with oil to prevent crusting, and let rest for 10 minutes.

Divide dough into 24 pieces, cover again and let rest until dough doubles in size, approximately 45 minutes to one hour.

Place doughnuts into pot containing pure vegetable oil heated to 375 degrees (doughnuts will not be entirely covered but will float on top of oil). Cook for two minutes or until golden brown crust forms.

Turn doughnuts over, submerge completely and continue frying for two minutes.

Remove doughnuts from fryer and let rest on screen or rack until cool. Split doughnuts partially and fill with your favorite preserves or jelly.

When doughnuts are completely cool, top with sugar water glaze or dust with either powdered or granulated sugar. Makes 24 doughnuts

For the uninitiated, paczki, correctly pronounced "pouch-kee," according to my friend Ewa Junczyk-Ziomecka, who's from Warsaw, Poland, and ought to know, are special jelly doughnuts made only on Shrove Tuesday, the day before Lent.

"They're not just an ordinary doughnut," said Carl Richardson president of the Metro Bakers and Allied Club at the January meeting held at Paris Bakery in Livonia. This year, the club is launching a national and statewide campaign that includes signs, bumper stickers and 108 billboards across to promote paczki.

"I grew up on the lower east side of Detroit and was 14 before I ever heard of paczki," said Michael Gralewski of Sweetheart Bakery who researched the history of paczki to make a presentation at the meeting.

I was all ears, he was talking about a subject near and dear to my heart. Both of my parents are

Polish, my maiden name is Kaleski, and my husband is Polish too. But I confess, I didn't eat my first paczki until I moved to Hamtramck.

"Years ago paczki were made on a skillet," said Grawlewski. "They were flatter and fried. I recall as a child that fat was very expensive. Anything fried in fat was a treat. Over the years, people added raisins, prunes and other dried fruits that were available during the winter."

They don't celebrate Paczki Day in Poland, but they do observe "Grease Thursday" — the beginning of Shrovetide which lasts six days and ends with the beginning of Lent on Ash Wednesday. On Grease Thursday, Poles indulge on paczki and other fancy pastries.

According to Richard Jurkiewicz, who is vice president of the Metro Bakers and Allied Club, translated, paczki means "fat and jolly."

Paczki are rounder, larger and fuller than regular doughnuts. The dough is richer and so are the fruit fillings. They take longer to fry than regular doughnuts, too.

Jurkiewicz and Vangelov both said the most popular flavor is raspberry, followed by strawberry, custard, apple, and blueberry.

Paczki should be eaten right away, but if you want to save some for later, Vangelov recom-

mends storing them in the box at room temperature. They can be frozen for up to 30 days to be enjoyed later.

Believe me, you'll be fat and jolly if you eat too many paczki. They are rich in taste, and calories. But that's the whole idea — indulge before Ash Wednesday and the fasting that accompanies Lent.

Serve momma's soup casserole during Lent

One of the recipes that remains dear to my heart momma's scrambled egg soup. It is known internationally as stracciatella which means "little rags."

HOT BROTH WITH EGGS AND CHEESE

1 quart chicken or beef broth
2 large eggs
3 tablespoons finely grated Parmesan cheese
3 tablespoons chopped parsley
A sprinkling of fresh grated nutmeg
Salt and pepper to taste

Bring the broth to a simmer. Beat together the eggs, cheese, parsley and nutmeg with a fork. Beat the egg mixture into the broth with a fork. Give the egg about 45 seconds to set — it should set into tiny threads in the same way as Chinese Egg Drop Soup.

Season the soup with salt and pepper. Serves 4.

Mommas famed scalloped potatoes are served year round, usually with leftover ham. But during Lent, the ham was omitted and in its place, a cheese au gratin potato casserole was served.

AU GRATIN SCALLOPED POTATOES

2 tablespoons all purpose flour
¼ teaspoon salt
¼ teaspoon black pepper
¼ cup shredded cheddar cheese (momma used Velveeta)
1½ pounds potatoes, peeled and thinly sliced
1 medium onion, thinly sliced
3 tablespoons butter
1¼ cups milk

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Generously butter a shallow 1½ quart casserole dish. In a small dish, combine the flour, salt and pepper. Cover the bottom of the baking dish with a layer of about ¼ of the potatoes, then make a layer of ¼ the onion, ¼ the cheese and sprinkle with ¼ the flour mixture, then dot with ¼ the butter.

Make two more layers in the same manner to use all the potatoes, onions, cheese, etc. Pour the milk evenly over the potatoes. Cover and bake for 35 minutes.

Uncover and stir gently and bake 30 minutes or until potatoes are tender and sauce is nicely thickened. Serves 4.

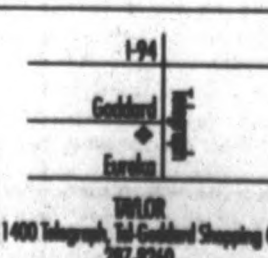

Make sure your diet is rich in calcium

Calcium has long been recognized as essential to building strong bones in children and averting the onset of osteoporosis, the brittle bone disease that afflicts many older Americans. More recently, calcium has been identified among the nutrients that may offer protection from colon cancer and other types of cancer.

Unfortunately, the average person consumes far less calcium than is needed in his or her daily diet. The recommended daily allowance (RDA) is 1,200 milligrams for people up to age 24 and 800 milligrams for adults, although many authorities believe that women at certain stages of life need more calcium than the RDA. Nutrition surveys, however, show that the typical adult gets only 450 to 550 mg per day.

The main sources of calcium in most people's diets are dairy foods, especially milk. An eight-ounce glass of skim milk provides about 300 mg of calcium, so three or four glasses of milk a day should have you covered, right? But what if you don't like milk, or are among the many people who are "lactose intolerant" and can't handle large amounts of dairy foods in their diets?

There are many calcium-rich foods, both dairy and non-dairy. High-calcium vegetables include cooked spinach (244 mg per cup); turnip greens (198 mg per cup); and cooked Chinese cabbage (158 mg per cup). Salmon, with bones, contains about 260 mg in a four-ounce serving. Low-fat cheeses, including part-skim mozzarella (207 mg per ounce), part-skim ricotta cheese (168 mg per 1/4 cup) and 1 percent milkfat cottage cheese (138 mg per cup) are also good calcium sources. Low-fat yogurt contains 300-400 mg calcium per cup, and ice milk contains 88 mg per 1/2 cup.

A person can maintain healthy stores of calcium by not eating too much protein or caffeine, which increase the body's excretion of calcium.

High calcium cookery can start with appetizers — such as dips made with cottage cheese, yogurt,

part-skim ricotta or buttermilk. A salmon dip would be especially rich in calcium (use salmon canned in water to keep fat content low). Serve entrees that include low-fat dairy products and leafy greens, such as chicken curry made with low-fat yogurt and greens, or spinach salad with salmon.

Here's a calcium rich entree from the American Institute for Cancer Research.

SPINACH-RICOTTA LASAGNA

- 6 ounces lasagna noodles (uncooked)
 - 1 (29-ounce) can tomato puree (about 3 1/2 cups)
 - 3 to 4 teaspoons dried basil
 - 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
 - 3 cups fresh spinach, washed, with stems removed
 - 1 1/4 cups part-skim ricotta cheese
 - 1/2 cup grated parmesan cheese (2 ounces)
 - 1/2 teaspoon pepper
 - 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg
- Cook lasagna noodles in a large pot of boiling water (12-15 min-

utes). In a small bowl, stir together the tomato puree, basil, and garlic powder.

Chop the spinach coarsely and steam for 2-3 minutes until it is wilted and tender but still bright green. Drain thoroughly. Place the ricotta, all but 2 tablespoons of the Parmesan, the pepper and nutmeg in a food processor or blender and puree until smooth. Add the spinach and process until well blended.

To assemble the ingredients in a 13 by 19-inch baking pan, begin with a thin layer of tomato mixture,

then a layer of pasta. Spread half the spinach-ricotta mixture on top, then add 1/4 to 1 cup of tomato mixture, another layer of pasta, the remainder of the spinach mixture, another 1/4 to 1 cup of tomato mixture, a final layer of pasta, remainder of the tomato mixture, and remaining 2 tablespoons of Parmesan cheese.

Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes. Let stand 2-3 minutes after removing from the oven before slicing. Each of the 6 servings has 5 grams of fat and 238 calories.

Restaurant owner shares favorite chicken recipe

CHICKEN LULU

4 boneless skinless chicken breasts

1 cup salad dressing or enough to cover chicken breasts

2 green peppers, sliced

1 onion, sliced

1/2 cup mushrooms sliced

1 jar of your favorite Marinara or spaghetti sauce

Olive oil to saute vegetables

Mozzarella cheese to sprin-

inkle on top of chicken breasts

Marinate chicken overnight in refrigerator in salad dressing. To prepare chicken, saute chicken until lightly browned.

Cover bottom of a casserole dish with marinara or spaghetti sauce of your choice. Put chicken on top of sauce.

Sautee vegetables in olive oil until tender. Smother chicken breasts with sauteed vegetables. Sprinkle mozzarella cheese on top.

Bake in 350 degree oven until golden brown.

Wash and thinly slice potatoes. Lay on baking sheet and cover with salad dressing. Sprinkle with pepper and Parmesan cheese to taste. Broil until golden.

FOR THOSE SEEKING IMMUNITY

Older people in apparent good health still have something to benefit from taking even modest amounts of vitamin and mineral supplements. So says a Canada-based researcher from the World Health Organization (WHO). He studied the effects of vitamin/mineral supplementation on 96 white, upper-middle-class men and women over the age of 65 who lived in their own homes. All the subjects were in good health and none took medications that are known to interfere with immune function. Half the subjects took placebos, while the other half took a formulation of 18 vitamins and minerals near U.S. R.D.A. levels. No one knew who was taking that pill. After one year, it turned out that the supplement users experienced significantly fewer infections and had been sick fewer days than the non-supplement users.

Vitamin and mineral supplements are a good idea for most of us — young and old. For instance, studies show vitamin C, or golden seal, with echinacea are terrific for combating the symptoms of flu and colds. Spicy seafood creole quick main dish

AP — Granted, you can't beat spicy creole made the classic Southern way — long and slow to blend the flavors. But when you're pressed for time, we've come up with a speed-cook microwave version that's a kissin' cousin to the original in flavor.

Your flavor helpmate is convenient Cajun-style canned tomatoes with the seasonings already in the can. Add fish or shrimp and serve this Creole to your family in less than 20 minutes.

QUICK SEAFOOD CREOLE

- 1 pound fresh or frozen catfish fillets or medium shelled shrimp
- Two 14 1/2-ounce cans Cajun-style stewed tomatoes
- 1/2 cup chopped green pepper
- 2 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- 2 teaspoons white-wine Worcestershire sauce or Worcestershire sauce
- Few dashes bottled hot pepper sauce
- 1 bay leaf
- Hot cooked rice

Thaw catfish or shrimp, if frozen. If using catfish, cut into 1-inch pieces and remove skin. If using shrimp, devein. Cut up large pieces of stewed tomatoes.

In a 2-quart microwave-safe casserole combine undrained tomatoes, green pepper, flour, Worcestershire sauce, hot pepper sauce and bay leaf. Cook, uncovered, on 100 percent power (high) for 5 to 8 minutes or until bubbly, stirring after every minute until slightly thickened, then stirring every 30 seconds.

Add fish or shrimp; cover. Cook

on high for 3 to 5 minutes or until done, stirring once. To test for doneness, catfish should just flake when tested with a fork, and shrimp should turn pink. Remove bay leaf. Serve over hot cooked rice. Makes 4 main-dish servings.

Three cheese omelet brunch treat

AP — For a weekend brunch, treat your family to a three-cheese omelet, served with chunky homemade applesauce and crunchy wheat and sourdough rolls.

To give the omelet a light, airy texture, the egg whites and yolks are beaten separately. Cheddar, Swiss and Monterey Jack cheeses are folded into the egg mixture along with chopped deli or Black Forest ham.

For the applesauce, chop a few red and green apples. Cook on the stove with butter, brown sugar

and allspice until the apples are crisp, about 10 minutes.

THREE-CHEESE OMELET WITH APPLESAUCE

- 8 eggs, separated
- 1 cup grated cheddar cheese
- 1 cup grated Swiss cheese
- 1 cup grated Monterey Jack or Teleme cheese
- 1/4 cup chopped, thinly sliced Black Forest or deli ham
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cayenne pepper
- 1 recipe Chunky Applesauce (recipe below)

In a large bowl, beat egg yolks until well blended. In a separate bowl, beat egg whites until stiff but not dry. Fold about 1 cup beaten egg whites into the egg yolks. Add cheeses, ham and cayenne. Mix in carefully.

Fold remaining egg whites into cheese mixture very gently. Pour omelet mixture into a buttered 2-quart shallow baking dish. Bake in a 325-degree F oven for 20 to 25 minutes or until puffed and set. Meanwhile, prepare applesauce. Serve immediately. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

CHUNKY APPLESAUCE

- 2 tablespoons butter
- 3 apples (red or green), chopped
- 2 tablespoons brown sugar
- 2 tablespoons apple jack or rum (optional)
- 1/2 teaspoon allspice

Melt butter in a medium saute pan; add remaining ingredients. Stir over medium heat until sauce has a syrup-like consistency and apples are tender, about 10 minutes.

Local Arm of National Program Helps Children with Attention, Comprehension, and Reversal Problems

LIVONIA—The rationale behind the Vision Improvement Program (VIP) is that if children are unable to intake, process and respond to visually presented information, they are missing 80% of the learning opportunity. "For these children, it is like placing a wall between them and knowledge and asking them to retrieve it," according to VIP Director John P. Jacobi, O.D.

His artwork is inspired by dreams

Christopher Wirth has always held art close to his heart. From abstractly painting tables at the 3-D nightclub in Royal Oak to producing videos for local acts Charm Farm, Discipline and Jeffrey Dean Marlow, this young Waterford artist continues to search for ways of expanding creativity.

Dreams inspire Wirth's current works — a series of mixed media paintings addressing the emotions and desires of modern man. Groove Gallery in Royal Oak will exhibit more than a dozen of Wirth's paintings March 4-26. An opening reception to meet the artist and view his work in a special black light art show will be at 8 p.m. March 4.

Compelled by an inner necessity to transfer dream images to paper, Wirth lays down fluorescent gouache undertones building up color with the addition of pastel and watercolor. When the sun starts setting, the lights in Wirth's skyscrapers seem to search out the night, glowing with warm animation.

In mixed media he taunts the viewer with wide eyed figures that shriek in fear of the unknown upon sighting UFOs. Along with the emotion of fear, frustration and security come to life through Wirth's use of cartoon like imagery.

Swaying buildings against a night sky lend a touch of whimsy to statements about the craziness of living in big cities.

"I paint what I dream — dream visions. I try not to father my images from other people's work," said the 26-year-old artist with a passion for painting. "I'm very expressionistic because I'm overwhelmed with emotions."

During a recent interview Wirth, who refers to his work as semi-abstract, was adamant about following his own vision.

"When I go into a piece everything else around me becomes invisible," he said. "I've had people say they're too dark. I can only paint what I feel. I'm not going to paint what everybody else wants me to paint, what everybody else wants to buy."

It's obvious by color and content that Wirth is an admirer of French Impressionist Vincent van Gogh and American Scene painter Thomas Hart Benton whose disgust for big cities emerged not only in his work but in the statement that they were nothing but coffins for living and thinking.

"Thomas Hart Benton didn't have any love for the city. I like his beliefs. '5:43 A.M.' alludes to the craziness of the city," said Wirth, motioning to a work focusing on big city life. "The guy driving the car likes being able to enjoy man's construction without man."

Art attracted Wirth early. In fifth grade he won a scholarship to the Creative Arts Center in Pontiac, but soon after sports took over his life. He wrestled from about age 8 until breaking a thumb in his senior year at Waterford-Kettering High School. That's when he became interested in photography, then video.

"Photography taught me about composition. Taking black and white photographs I learned the importance of contrast. Color seduces you. But if

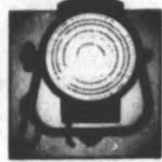

Show pairs SisterSeed, Breech

How you describe them may well explain their positions on the musical spectrum. Breech's music is "bare-boned, rough and tumble," while SisterSeed's sound is "solid."

Never use adjective such as concise, full or comfortable when describing Breech's music.

"'Comfortable' is not a word (be)fitting to Breech," said vocalist Missy Gibson. "It's not easy. It's not something you are at ease with. It's sort of prickly."

On the other hand, "solid" is a comfortable word to describe SisterSeed's music that won acclaim as an acoustic folk duo about the same time as it expanded into a four-piece modern rock band.

"We will always keep our acoustic roots, and we can always fall back on that if we have to, but we don't," said SisterSeed vocalist Alicia Gbur.

Even though the bands represent different ends of the modern Detroit musical spectrum, Breech and SisterSeed will perform at Lili's in Hamtramck on Friday, Feb. 18.

Being different is OK, but there's still one common denominator — each grabs you and refuses to let go. "Both bands grab your attention, just in totally two different ways,"

said SisterSeed drummer Benjamin Ridley Jr. "SisterSeed is musically more subtle, where Breech slaps you in the face. I think SisterSeed can slap you in the face as a band but differently."

Regardless if one gets hit or not, the bands' upcoming show should prove both acts are independent but interesting.

First of all, Breech's Gibson is the former lead vocalist for Strange Bedfellows, while partner Thomas Trimble used to be in Weeping Rachel. While SisterSeed, which includes members of the rock band Blue Nation, began as an acoustic duo.

Second, the angelic singers of SisterSeed are musically focused on a stable musical presence, while the "in your face" Breech prefers references such as gutsy, fully wired, bare-boned and rough and tumble for its pop art approach to music, according to guitarist Trimble.

"When you come to see Breech, you almost feel guilty to turn your back on us," Trimble said. "Usually people turn their backs on rock bands. Unfortunately, there is only Missy and I. You almost have to watch Missy and I — you feel guilty to go to the bathroom."

"In every show we pick up about five people who really weren't expecting what they saw, but about 20 people turn it off."

What they see is Gibson singing

loudly into a microphone and occasionally mimicking a bass drum sound by stepping on another mic. Trimble sits in a chair and strums his acoustic guitar. There are no other members to Breech.

The music, as Trimble describes it, is "emotionally jagged."

"When you see Breech, you are taking a subliminal voyage to places Missy has been," Trimble said. "It's almost like reading an (Ambrose-)Bierce book because you sit in a car with Bierce and he takes you for a ride."

"It's not as though one sits there watching traffic go by, but when you listen to Breech, Missy pulls up and you have to agree to go along and hope she brings you back to where you started."

Instead of traveling through dark musical passages, SisterSeed is striving to evolve as a unit. What started as a duo composed of Chrissy Kerwin and Gbur on acoustic gui-

tars has now sprouted with the addition of guitarist Michael Puwal and drummer Ridley — and a new musical direction.

Nevertheless, the acoustic material of old earned the band the 1993 Detroit Music Award for "Best Folk Duo."

"I think the award was a step in the right direction to put us on the right track . . . and now we want to strive for a sound that opens us up more," Kerwin said. "Our music writing has grown. Before it was so simple that guitars and our voices were enough."

"I think it was so natural to have Mike and Ben playing. . . It is to the point with our music that it is missing something without these two."

The members of Breech, however, look back on their past in rock bands with mixed emotions. Trimble and Gibson said they feel comfortable as a duo.

"It's hard being in a regular four-

piece because there is more to do, more responsibilities. When you are in a band, you are lazy. In Breech there is no room for it. You have your hands busy all the time," Trimble said. "Breech is sort of stuck between two things because half wants to be sort of in a rock scene and (the other half is) of an underground sound more like a Tom Waits sort of thing."

"We just have to be careful that we walk the line between what it is and what it should be."

What Breech is, is honest.

"When it fails to be honest and direct, it fails. It fails to be Breech. In a band you can hide behind others. In Breech, you can't," Gibson said.

Listening is understanding Restroom Poets

The Restroom Poets admit that a majority of bar clientele wouldn't find the band's music particularly attractive. It takes an element of thought to understand the Restroom Poets.

"We're not a band that is easily palatable if you're in one of those groups," lead singer/guitarist Jason Magee said of the typical drunken, talkative bar crowd. "It's not easy to listen to us and get what we're trying to do."

"It takes some effort on the listeners' part. The big part are our lyrics and what we have to say."

The Restroom Poets, who have gigged with the likes of Paw, Counting Crows and George Clinton, aren't about fluff. Ironically, that may be one of the factors hindering their popularity outside of the Restroom Poets' hometown of Ann Arbor.

Karen Koski, president of the Detroit Musicians Alliance, said the band's time will come once the right crowd is exposed to them.

"There is an audience here for them. The audience just hasn't heard them yet. (They need to find) an audience that appreciates somebody who's doing something a little more difficult, that's a little more important," said Koski, who also writes for "Jam Rag."

Magee, a University of Michigan graduate, said he's tried to write less-challenging lyrics, but he hasn't felt comfortable with them.

"I've tried to write stupid lyrics. I was trying to write a song for someone

else and I failed. . . He told me 'You have to make dumber lyrics.'"

"I don't think I could sing something like that anymore," he added.

His bandmates — drummer Ben Lorenz and bassist Brian Poore — said that sometimes listeners misinterpret Magee's point because he speaks in "long sentences and long words."

It just takes time for people to get his point.

"Lyrics really are poetry. Poems are dense. You can't just get the meaning out of the first try. When you do make a connection, even though it might not necessarily be the one that was intended, it was a struggle to get it," said Magee. Then, he added, it's satisfying.

Besides their lyrics, the band has a reputation for being musically challenging.

"I think they are more musically intense. Somebody who's really into music" will like the Restroom Poets, the DMA's Koski said.

The Restroom Poets' intensity is one that is often under fire by fellow bands. Drummer Lorenz said that they've been called everything from "cheesy college rock" to "not alternative enough."

Actually, the Restroom Poets are going for the "power rock trio sound." In mid-1993 the band scrapped their lead guitarist and strapped an ax on Magee.

"We're more energetic and tighter as a three-piece; we don't have someone who will space out in their own little

lead guitar world," Magee said.

Currently, the Restroom Poets are working on an album at PR Music in Detroit. However, it won't be released anytime soon due to "the powers that be," Lorenz said. They wouldn't elaborate any further. In the meantime, current and future fans will have to settle with their live show (or bootlegs, which they encourage).

"If anybody likes rock 'n' roll, rise to the challenge and be happy to see us," Lorenz said.

'War Room' looks at Clinton campaign

Actor John Malkovich would make a great James Carville, that is if the real thing weren't such a captivating performer himself. With his high forehead, deep-set eyes and Southern accent, he would look right at home in the uniform of a flamboyant Civil War general.

Carville's war, however, is fought in Bill Clinton campaign headquarters, where he and George Stephanopoulos miraculously dodge the bullets of scandal while trying to lob a few grenades into enemy camp. "The War Room," a new documentary about their unconventional exploits, is a fascinating and entertaining portrait of American politics in action.

After watching the movie, which plays exclusively at the Main Art Theatre in Royal Oak, you may be convinced that the wiles of these two men alone steered Clinton into the White House.

Stephanopoulos, a handsome, 31-year-old Rhodes scholar, coaches the Arkansas governor on key points in rally speeches, right down to pauses, asides and inflections. When election night results point toward landslide, he calls the shots about where each member of the first family will stand

during the acceptance speech. Carville, a veteran in the political arena, wisely reads the signs from a bank of television screens in the cluttered makeshift offices they call the "war room." He swears back at a George Bush speech harping on Clinton's character and breaks into an alligator smile when Perot stumbles into a mine field with women's issues.

"The War Room" is directed by D.A. Pennebaker and wife Chris Hegedus, whose "Don't Look Back" and "Monterey Pop" set the standard for rock documentaries in the 1960s, keeps the movie simple. He uses music effectively, especially the Fleetwood Mack standard "Don't Stop Thinking About Tomorrow" that became Clinton's anthem.

While the movie focuses on the action in the war room, key news conferences and speeches from Clinton, Bush, Paul Tsongas and Gennifer Flowers keep things in

"The War Room" is directed by D.A. Pennebaker and wife Chris Hegedus. Pennebaker, whose "Don't Look Back" and "Monterey Pop" set the standard for rock documentaries in the 1960s, keeps the movie simple. He uses music effectively, especially the Fleetwood Mack standard "Don't Stop Thinking About Tomorrow" that became Clinton's anthem. historical perspective. Unused footage from the Kevin Rafferty documentary "Feed" also appears early in the film when the Clinton campaign gets off to a slow start at the New Hampshire primary.

Don't blink or you'll miss it, but local news anchor Bill Bonds even appears in "The War Room," refereeing the now-famous debate between Clinton, Bush and H. Ross Perot.

One of the most interesting sequences in the film shows Carville's efforts to leak a supposed Bush inpropriety to the press. The adviser thinks he has proof that the President used a South American printer for campaign materials, and though the lead goes nowhere, it illustrates Car-

ville's ferocity at manipulating the media.

Though the campaign occurred almost two years ago, the documentary is no less poignant today. It was nominated for a Best Documentary Feature Oscar, but perhaps the most impressive reviews have come from the people on film.

Now in stressful White House positions, they say that watching their passion in "The War Room" reminds them what they got into politics for in the first place.

Now this is the kind of result anyone would gladly take credit for. Everyone wins.

Alyson Noune, Plymouth Canton's prolific point guard, has signed with the University of South Florida, an NCAA Division I school located outside Tampa.

Noune gets what she wants — which includes getting away from Michigan's lousy winter weather. She also gets up to five years to complete her scholarship, which will include books. And she may get a shot at playing as a freshman: USF has a freshman, Jenny Koppel, playing the point this season.

The Lady Bulls aren't doing too badly, either. Going into Friday's Metro Conference game at Tulane, they were 11-9 overall and 4-3 in the Metro — their most wins ever in conference.

"Their recruiting coach talked to me from July on," Noune said. "Their offer was unbelievable. They play (Canton's) type of game, and there could be an opening at point guard."

"I mean, everything clicked."

And what does USF get? Noune's numbers did not appear to be suited for NCAA I — she's just 5-foot, and she averaged only 10 points a game.

But: "She brought a little bit of everything to the team," said Canton coach Bob Blohm. "She's very strong mentally, she could definitely run your team for you."

"Plus she's a great outside shooter. She's just a solid, all-around good basketball player."

Blohm felt Noune's three-point ability — she converted 40 percent of them her senior season — was a key to her recruiting. That and her attitude.

"She was able to get the most out of her ability," he said. "She was always well-prepared mentally to play."

"I think she'll do the same thing for that team she did for us — and that's whatever it takes. Whatever you need to get done, she'll do it for you."

An honor roll student at Canton, Noune is considering both pre-med and education as a major. But there's other lessons to be studied in the next few months, too.

"I have to improve my quickness on defense and my quickness in getting the shot off on offense," she said, adding, "I'm real excited because I think I could (challenge for playing time my freshman year)."

"I'm just going to go down there and work my butt off."

The key factors in Thursday's women's basketball game between Madonna University and University of Michigan-Dearborn were evident everywhere:

- Pre-game notes;
- Shooting percentages;
- Rebounding;

And, of course, in the final score — 82-66 Madonna, in one of the Lady Crusaders' most impressive performances of the season.

The victory raised their record to 10-12; the Lady Wolves slipped to 11-12.

Now for those key factors. The pre-game notes indicated that the two teams were very close record-wise, which magnified the importance of this game regarding NAIA playoff hopes.

The notes also indicated Madonna's roster contained 13 names; UM-D's had eight. That proved decisive — UM-D coach Dave Mann's options were limited when fouls started mounting. Indeed, in the final stats the Crusaders had six players reach double figures in scoring to the Wolves' two.

One more thing: Don't underestimate the location of the schools. As Madonna coach Bill Potter said, "The girls really wanted this game. This is a crosstown rival. It was nothing I said. They just decided to play, and when they want to play they can play with anyone."

Factor No. 2: shooting percentages. Not from the field, mind you, although Madonna did have an advantage, making 39.7 percent to UM-D's 32.4. But more impressive was the Crusaders' free throw shooting — 26-of-31, 84 percent. The Wolves hit 15-of-27, 55.6 percent.

Finally, factor No. 3: rebounding. UM-D did rebound Madonna, but the margin (52-50) wasn't nearly enough, considering UM-D's starting front line measured 6-foot-1, 6-0 and 5-10 to Madonna's 5-11, 5-10 and 5-7.

Also, as Potter said, "They're leading."

ing the region in rebounding. Our main goal was to stay close to them in rebounding."

The stretch in the game that put Madonna into control started with 9:03 left in the first half. UM-D's Anita Beaty scored to put her team in front, 20-19.

The Wolves scored just one point in the next seven minutes, and had three the rest of the half. Madonna doubled its total in that same span, taking a 38-23 lead into the break.

UM-D made one serious run at the Crusaders in the second half behind center Heather Towery (24 points, 17 rebounds) and forward Gwen Kollmorgen (13 points, eight boards). Kollmorgen had six points and Towery four in a 12-3 spurt that narrowed Madonna's 22-point lead to 72-59 with 4:47 left.

Viewers of 'The Critic' can decide whether 'It stinks'

"He's balder than Siskel and fatter than Ebert," is how Mike Reiss, co-creator and executive producer of ABC's "The Critic," describes the appeal of the show's title character.

In the animated series, which premiered on Jan. 26 and airs Wednesdays, Jon Lovitz provides the voice of Jay Sherman, certified cinema snob and erstwhile ice cream gourmand. Jay's tag line for virtually everything he screens is "it stinks," and he's under constant pressure to sacrifice his artistic integrity and give more favorable reviews.

"Your job is to rate films from good to excellent," Jay's boss tells him during a commercial break. "But what if I don't like it?" Jay asks.

"That's what good is for!" his boss replies.

Reiss and his partner, Al Jean, who were part of the creative team behind the success of Fox's "The Simpsons," originally developed the idea for "The Critic" as a live action program. Ultimately, they opted to do it as an animated series in order to fit it into Lovitz's busy schedule in feature films.

"We didn't start with a set of drawings like we did on 'The Simpsons,'" says executive producer James L. Brooks. "We didn't start with the creation of the characters. We started with scripts and the ideas. The way you do a normal show."

"I really think when you do a series," Jean adds, "you have to have a voice to write for and Jon was ours. We sort of felt if we did it animated we could work around his film schedule, and (he could) pick his voice-overs when he was between shooting on movies, which he actually did during 'City Slickers 2.'"

"Also, more than anything, when we did 'The Simpsons' we just felt you really have this incredible freedom for writing that you don't get in live action."

Another reason for going with characters formed from pen and ink rather than flesh and blood is the show's trademark use of film parodies. From Arnold Schwarzenegger in "Rabbi P.I." to Marlon Brando starring as Mr. French in a theatrical presentation of "A Family Affair," the program's generous portions of celebrity "cameos" would put it well over

budget in anything other than an animated format.

Instead, impressionist Maurice LeMarche provides voices for the lampooned celebrities. LeMarche also "stands-in" as Jay Sherman's voice when Lovitz is unavailable, as well as doing the voice of recurring character Jeremy Hawke.

"He's a very gifted impressionist," Reiss says of LeMarche. "We just did our parody of 'The Piano' and we said 'Can you do Harvey Keitel with a New Zealand accent?' and he said, 'No problem.'"

But why a movie critic? Why make a television show about a character whose job it is to provide opinions to the masses?

"Well, Hollywood puts out so much garbage and calls it candy apples," Jean explains, "you want to say enough is enough, and ever since I've been in show biz I've thought, well, everyone is a critic."

"The best thing about these shows (as a writer) is you get an opportunity to vent yourself really quickly. You see 'Home Alone 2' and you get to write a parody and be done with it."

Like "The Simpsons," "The Critic" contains an array of unique supporting characters, such as Jay's quirky, absentminded, adoptive father (a dead-ringer for George Bush) and Jay's overweight, whiny, pre-pubescent son.

And what advice does Lovitz have for all the real-life critics out there?

"I would suggest (they) get a TV series, because it really pays. I wouldn't say it's a living... I'd say it's a killing! Let's just say I'm critiquing my way to the bank."

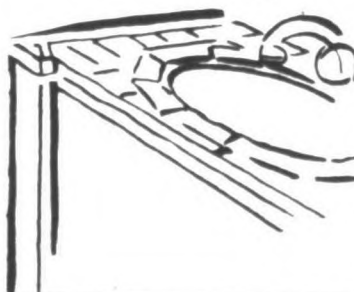
