Man surrenders after siege



A more than five-hour siege ended late Sunday when a man who was holding a woman hostage at gunpoint surrendered. The standoff at an apartment complex was apparently sparked by a domestic dispute.

Five and a half hours after breaking into the apartment of his ex-girlfriend carrying a shotgun and a pistol, a man surrendered to Plymouth Town-

ship police Sunday evening.

"He unloaded the weapons, described how he's doing it and walked out the door," said township police Chief Carl Berry just after the man surrendered to police at 9:28 p.m.

So ended the hostage standoff police were alerted to at about 4 p.m., upon receiving a brief 911 call.

Township police arrested John Michael Sniezek, 29, of Hamtramck, and said they planned to arraign him in district court Monday on charges of assault with a deadly weapon and assault to do great bodily harm less than murder.

Upon responding to the incident in a second floor apartment at the Plymouth Heritage Apartments, police

learned an ex-boyfriend of the apartment manager, a 31-year-old woman, had forced the door open to get inside.

Three children of the apartment manager, ages 5, 11 and 14, were also inside the apartment, at the southeast corner of the 16-building apartment complex off of North Territorial just west of Sheldon Road.

Berry asked the man to release the children and he did.

Church to turn seminary into family center

The proposed St. John's Plymouth Village project for seniors — which won praise from some as the most significant residential care facility in Michigan — will not be built, at least not on the grounds of the closed St. John Seminary as proposed.

On St. Patrick's Day at Most Holy Trinity Church in Detroit's Corktown, Archbishop Adam Maida announced after celebrating the "Sharin' of the Green" Mass that the seminary will be converted to a "world-class, first-of-its-kind center for families and young people."

The 175-acre site at Five Mile and Sheldon roads in Plymouth Town-

ship is to become a family and youth center with facilities for retreats, conferences and recreation. It closed due to declining enrollment in 1988.

Archdiocesan spokesman Ned McGrath said the purchase agreement with developer Eric Lindquist was nullified. "It was contingent on him providing evidence of financing

by a particular date several months ago, which did not occur." Lindquist's attorneys couldn't be reached for comment.

Joanne Bellaire, archdiocesan associate director for the office of family and youth, said early fall is the targeted opening date. She said the

Car buyers weigh making purchases

Because Proposal A, backed by Michigan voters, kicks the sales tax from 4 to 6 percent May 1, local car dealers say business is up as new car buyers seek to save money by buying now.

"We've had several comments so far from people who say they'll maybe make their purchase now," said Bob Dymkowski, a salesman at Fox Hills Chrysler Plymouth on Ann Arbor Road.

"For example, a Jeep Grand Cherokee is a \$30,000 vehicle; what you're looking at is instead of \$1,200 tax, an \$1,800 tax. It's significant to a lot of people," he said.

"We've had a big increase in business already; they're trying to beat the sales tax increase and save some money," said Len Gossman, sales manager at Blackwell Ford on Plymouth Road.

"They figure it's better in their pocket than going to the government."

Township vote count delayed by foam on ballots

Flaky foam, used as backing for punch ballots distributed to Plymouth Township absentee voters, caused a two-hour delay in computing election results Tuesday.

"I was really frustrated," said township clerk Marilyn Massengill, as flaking, powdery foam collecting on rubber rollers in ma-

chines that count ballots caused them to jam machines.

The absentee ballots have foam backing stapled to them to allow absentee voters to punch out holes easily, Massengill said.

The problem was that once foam was removed from the ballots to allow them to be counted by machine, some powder or foam flakes remained. The material stuck to rubber rollers that scoop

the ballots into the counters, causing them not to work as they should.

"It was flaking off and it covered everything," Massengill said. "When we were running it through, the machine broke down because it was so full of that stuff," she said.

Massengill went to Kmart and bought canned air to spray-clean the machine. "I still couldn't get

it to work. I went home and got alcohol and Q-Tips and cleaned the rubber wheels that pulled the cards through," she said.

"We finally got it working again. We decided to run the AV (absentee) cards last," she said, adding the 2,232 absentee ballots were run through 300-400 cards at a time, then the rollers would be cleaned again.

"If we continue to use punch

cards, there's a different kind of Styrofoam but it's like a sponge, it works much better and you can use it over and over," she said.

"I compared some of the Styrofoam from this election to what we had in previous elections. This stuff was twice as thin," she said.

The ballot count was finished at 12:30 a.m., but had there been no problem results would have been tabulated by 10:30 p.m.,

Massengill said.

"I would like to be in a position to buy new equipment so we would not have to deal with this at all," she said.

Massengill said she favors a system where voters mark thin cardboard ballots with a pencil, then insert ballots in a machine at the precinct that immediately rejects them if they are improperly marked.

Canton ordinances take aim at activities of youth gangs

To further clamp down on gang activity in Canton, the use of spray paint and beepers is now forbidden.

"I think these ordinances are unique to the times we are in. The reality is the gang situation does exist. Special situations call for special laws," said Canton Public Safety Director John Santomauro.

The township board adopted the new regulations that prohibit the possession or sale of spray paint to anyone under 18 years of age. That includes using spray paint, as well as paint or other pigments, for graffiti.

"We are having an increase in graffiti," Santomauro said. "I think we are being proactive in holding some of this off."

Neighborhoods and businesses in Canton have been the target of graffiti from gangs or gang "wannabes." "Some subdivisions are sending out notices for residents to be aware," said Tammie Colling, Canton police community relations officer.

Grffiti has been found on fences, traffic signs, walls and park signs in neighborhoods. The amended ordinance also entitles any owner who has to remove graffiti to restitution.

"This (graffiti) is free advertising for the gangs. It shows control," Colling said, urging residents and business owners to immediately remove any graffiti.

Grffiti is considered a gang tool. "It tends to perpetuate the myth of gangs. It establishes their turf. And it adversely affects the

community's perception of its safety."

Colling asks residents and business owners whose property is damaged with graffiti to call police. "We would like to read it. It would tell us what gangs are here."

Colling and Brenda Plecha, a family life education manager for Family Service, will provide information to businesses at the Canton Chamber of Commerce member luncheon at noon Wednesday, April 6. For reservations, call the chamber at 453-4040.

The amended ordinance also prohibits beepers, also used by gang members. Anyone under 18 may carry a beeper or telephone pager other than for employment with the prior consent and supervision of a parent or legal guardian or with written consent of the public safety department. Spray paint also may be used under the supervision of a parent or legal guardian.

Grffiti, threats of violence, and intimidation remain the tools of gangs or gang wannabes in the area. Canton has joined forces with Plymouth, Plymouth Township, Plymouth-Canton Schools, and social service agencies to develop strategies for putting the lid on gangs and their activities.

Gangs and wannabes first became publicized in the area with troubles at the Canton Commons apartments on Haggerty in 1993. Police mobilized efforts to address problems there, including working with the complex's management.

"We learned from the Canton Commons experience to involve different components of the issue. We realized there was a greater need to involve the schools, businesses, and social-service agencies," Santomauro said.

Colling said police agencies now recognize that gang problems cross many types of boundaries.

"Although the police continue to educate themselves, it's essential that the community educate itself."

Colling and Santomauro encourage parents to take charge of their children. "For us, Westland Mall is a hangout for the kids," Colling said. "We encourage parents not to let their kids hang out at the malls." She suggests parents check up on their kids when they say they are going somewhere.

Santomauro reminds parents that they must take responsibility for their children. "Gang activity is a community problem, not just a law-enforcement problem. It is not the responsibility of the schools or law enforcement to raise children. You are accountable as parents."

With the help of the gang task force, law-enforcement agencies and schools are able to share information. Field interview cards are used to compile information about particular youths, and that information is shared.

"We are on top of it. We are confronting some of the kids as their names come along," Colling said. "The local police departments are no longer ignorant on the gangs."

School custodian charged in theft

A 41-year-old Plymouth Salem High School custodian faces a felony charge in connection with the theft of money from the school.

Joseph C. Carli III of Plymouth was arraigned on one count of larceny over \$100 in 35th District Court March 16. He is free on \$1,000 personal bond. A preliminary exam on the charge is scheduled for March 25. The felony charge carries a maximum penalty of five years in prison.

School security officers worked with Canton police when they discovered items missing from the school. "They developed a suspect. They

watched him," said Tammie Colling, Canton police community relations officer.

Police documented serial numbers of money at the school. The money was then stolen, Colling said.

Carli was arrested at his home early March 16. The money also was recovered. "Other items are still missing," Colling said. Valuable items, such as microscopes, are believed to have been stolen from the school, as well.

School district personnel and employee relations director Errol Goldman said the district is continuing to work with the police in the investigation of missing items.

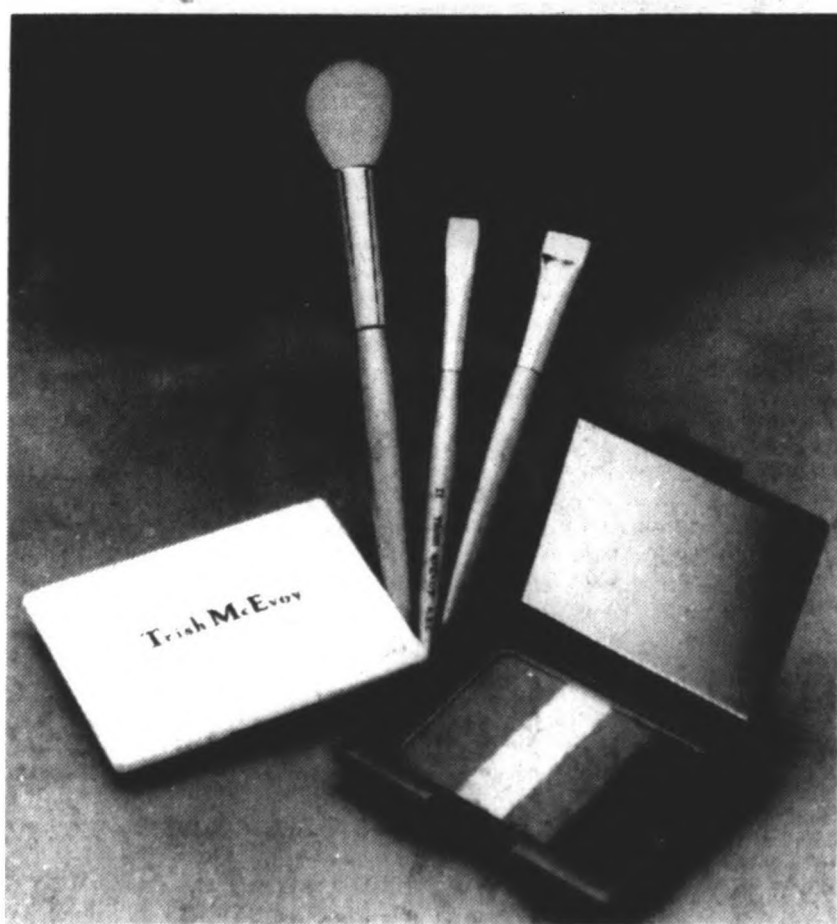

Governor applauds Michigan's top 25 businesswomen

Because women-owned businesses pump \$750 million into Michigan's economy, Gov. John Engler came to the Southfield Marriott on March 17 to honor Michigan's top 25 businesswomen, including one Plymouth woman.

For the first time, the Greater Detroit Chapter of the National Association of Women Business Owners (NAWBO) identified the state's top women business owners for an award based on revenue earned, company age and number of employees.

This year's nominees ran businesses that earned \$5 million in 1993, employing thousands of Michigan residents. The state boasts 134,000 women entrepreneurs who run auto dealerships, real estate firms and manufacturing and service companies.

Kathleen Dul Aznavorian, president of Fox Hills Country Club in Plymouth, said the award was a "thrilling surprise."

"It's nice to be recognized in what has been, up to now, a man's world, and for golf, a traditionally man's business," she said.

Aznavorian runs the golf course along with her mother, Estelle Dul, and sister, Sandy Dul Mily.

Nationally, according to NAWBO director Chinyere Neale, 5.4 million women own businesses, employing more people than all the Fortune 500 companies combined.

"I'm really delighted to be able to honor these Michigan businesswomen for their success," Engler said before the awards banquet.

"Women have always been out there working in the world and with an organization like NAWBO, women can enjoy the same networking and bridge-building opportunities their male counterparts have enjoyed for centuries."

The 25 honorees were pinned

with corsages. The evening was filled with hugs and handshakes.

Christine Meyers, president of Laine Meyers, a Troy publishing representative firm, said her nomination was proof hard work and a good education still constitute a recipe for success.

"The woman's struggle in business has been long and difficult," she said. "But it's getting better everyday. The business world is changing. People are paying more attention to the family-side of their lives and it's a more caring, aware business community. I like to think women in business had something to do with this."

Katherine Banicki, president of Testing and Engineering Consultants, a Troy environmental testing company, said her nomination meant that "women can really have it all."

"I do believe it's a cop-out to say a woman can't raise a family and work in the community as well," she said. "I see this award as a great honor to be recognized in the business world, especially in a field that has traditionally been a man's type of business. I attribute my success to having a very supportive husband as well as my desire to see progress and change managed to positive results."

Irma Elder, owner of the Troy Ford car dealership, said she accepted her award "on behalf of every single woman in the business world."

"We all walk the same paths, have the same struggles and hopes and dreams," she said. "To succeed, you need good employees and friends around you and the empathy to put yourself in other people's places."

Schools look to crack down on student smoking

Students who've paid the penalty rather than kick the tobacco habit soon will find that smoking will be costly, and not just because of the recently approved 75-cent tax increase.

Under new guidelines proposed by Plymouth-Canton High School principal Gerald Ostoin, a third offense will mean a \$50 fine and police contact.

Ostoin said new research and some alarming statistics prompted his action.

"Nationally, smoking has contributed to 400,000 deaths, more than deaths caused by drug

abuse, guns, irresponsible sex and auto accidents combined. Tobacco kills more than 15,000 Michigan residents each year, more than the combined deaths from AIDS, auto accidents, suicide, illicit drugs, homicide and alcohol," he told the school board.

"One out of every five deaths is attributable to smoking," he said.

The cost for health care and lost productivity is 19 times higher for smokers than for non-smokers, Ostoin said. "Kids who start smoking before age 15 average 75 percent more hospital admissions and their treatment

costs 50 percent more." The schools banned smoking in designated areas at Plymouth-Canton Educational Park last year, due in part to complaints from students unhappy about breathing secondhand smoke in school doorways and to new research on the effects of smoking and secondhand smoke, Ostoin said.

Despite that, students still are smoking near the creek between the buildings at CEP, Ostoin said.

"We're not talking about a lot of kids, but we want to put teeth into this so we don't have random smoking around campus,"

Ostoin said. "So we are asking for further police and court involvement in lieu of expulsion."

Tom Tattan, executive director for instruction, said "We were looking at how we could involve law enforcement. There's a Canton ordinance being worked on that would allow police and the courts to play a role. We had been working with intervention."

Under current policy, repeat offenders are suspended and eventually expelled.

Under the new guidelines, the first offense will mean sessions with a "smoking intervention" teacher.

A second offense will mean a day of in-school suspension. A third offense carries a proposed one-day out-of-school suspension, parent conference, \$50 fine and police contact. Students age 17 and over will be referred to 35th District Court. Younger students will be referred to Wayne County Probate Court and in turn to Growth Works.

Fourth, fifth and sixth offenses will bring five-day out-of-school suspensions, fines and police contact.

Trustee Carl Battishill said the law has been on the books for years "and we're just starting to deal with it."

In West Bloomfield schools where Battishill teaches, "We ticket students on site. Kids don't even smoke in their cars anymore because they know it's going to cost them \$50."

Troy schools also fine kids "on location" \$50, he said.

In accordance with state law, Plymouth-Canton's current policy is to allow no smoking for students or staff, except on Saturdays and Sundays, days when classes aren't in session, and after 6 p.m. on school days.

The new guidelines are expected to be implemented in the near future.

Farrand Elementary principal honored as an 'Extra Miler'

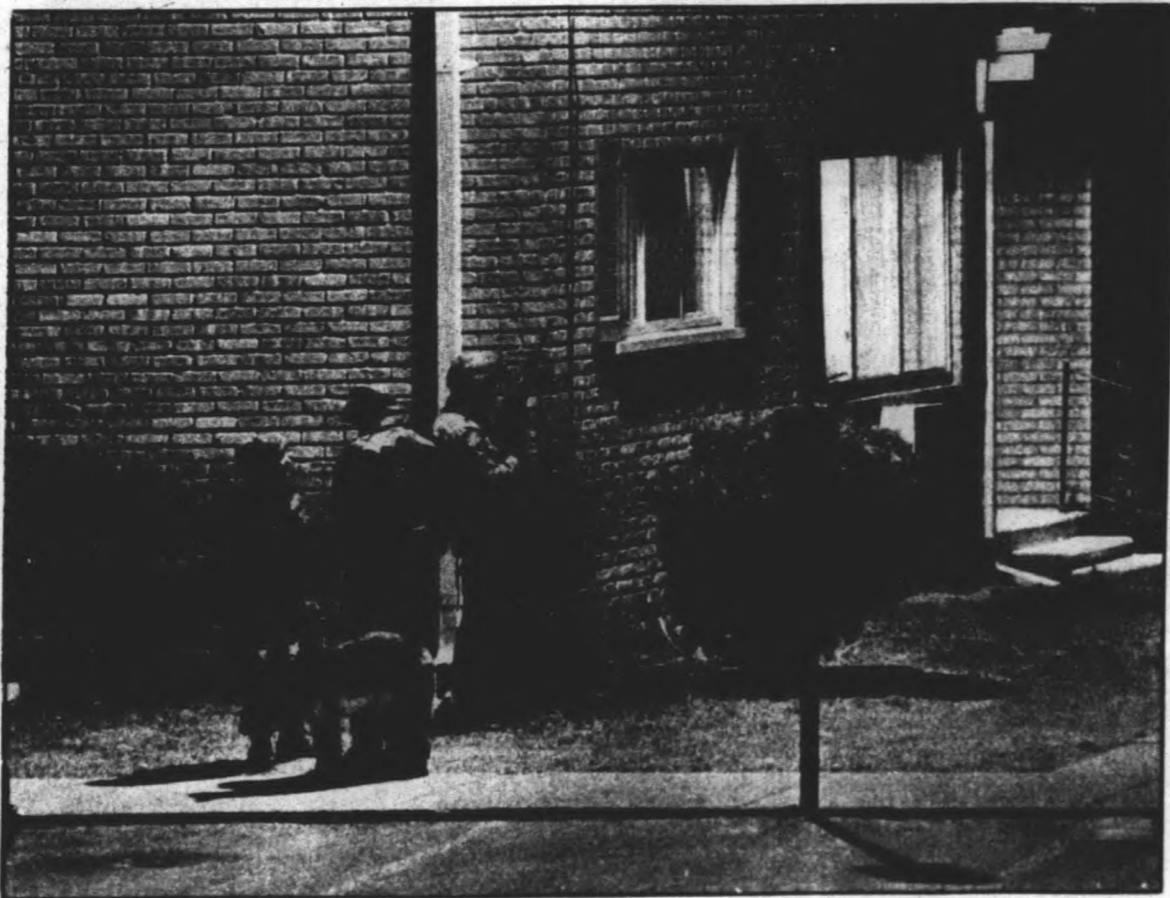

Police evacuated seven to 10 residents of the apartment building and kept a vigil outside the brick building. Several area police patrols from other agencies also responded to the scene, along with the Wayne County Hostage Negotiation Team and the county Special Operations Team.

At about 7 p.m., the man came out to a hallway outside the apartment, and asked police for a pizza. They denied the request.

Police kept up an ongoing conversation with the man over the telephone, as there were two port-

able battery powered telephones already inside the apartment, Berry said.

In talking to police, the man said "he's unhappy about certain things" about the couple's relationship, Berry said.

At around 8 p.m., the man came to the door saying he was going to come out, then changed his mind and stayed in the apartment, police said.

Police said the man had been drinking alcohol in the apartment, and that the alcohol ran out during the standoff.

One apartment resident who

declined to be named said the boyfriend "had been abusive, he brought her a big batch of flowers one time."

The resident added that lately, living at the apartments "is crazy," as the fire department in the past year has been called to two basement fires authorities say were suspicious.

Another resident, also declining to be named, said the apartment manager was "very nice. She works very hard, she's very busy."

Berry said the man did not threaten police by pointing either of the guns in officers' direction.

Upon giving himself up, "He was remorseful," Berry said.

After the standoff ended, the apartment manager was taken to St. Joseph Hospital for observation. Police said the assailant had struck her in the face.

After responding to the call, police patrol cars blocked the entrance to the apartment complex, and let in residents of other apartment buildings in the complex. The police presence drew several onlookers, who viewed the standoff along sidewalks on either side of North Territorial Road.

golf course and most of the facility will be left intact.

"Plans aren't set in stone. We're going to start small," Belaire said. "Things are in the talking stages. We'll begin with St. Edward's Hall." Some rooms in the three-story residential hall will be opened up to construct conference rooms, a new kitchen, dining rooms and offices, she said.

"We also will have use of the gym, bowling alley and recreational facilities. We're going to invite community and CYO groups to use the gym. We're going to invite any group that works with us to use the facility. We're really trying to open it up."

There'll be room to accommodate 40 youths or 80 adults for retreats and Marriage Encounter weekends in St. Edward's and St. William's halls, she said.

Maida said the idea for a family and youth center came to him last spring while attending a youth rally convened by the pope in Denver, Colo.

"I was thinking about our fractured families, and wondered

what can I do in my role?" said Maida. "We were waiting for someone to come and offer us a fortune. We were having to take care of the facility, and things deteriorate. I thought, 'Why not take this liability and make it an asset?'"

Maida said he wants to make St. John's "a center where young people in the archdiocese can come together in leadership to reflect on common problems, and build bridges. It's going to be a great place, believe me."

Maida envisions a place to help young couples contemplating marriage, and where "married couples can come back to reflect on their roles as husband and wife. It will be a focal point in the archdiocese for family life."

It's uncertain whether the township will continue to collect property taxes from the archdiocese, which last year totaled \$138,654.

"We have to find out what specifically is planned and see if it qualifies as a (tax-free) religious purpose," said Rosemary Harvey, Plymouth Township finance director.

The showroom's been rather packed because of that; the market has been picking up, too," he said.

"We've ordered some extra cars; we're stocking a bigger inventory. It may be pulling business from May and June," Gossman said. "We're looking at expanding our hours to accommodate the extra traffic."

The tax on a new Escort, which sells at around \$11,000, is now at \$440 and will rise to \$660. A Taurus, which sells for \$17,000-\$18,000, will rise in sales tax from the current \$700 to \$1,050.

Valerie Kornahrens, sales associate at Sunshine Honda on Ann Arbor Road, said, "I think business has been way up for the last

month and a half," due partly to the pending sales tax increase.

"The biggest concern right now is people that are leasing cars are trying to determine if they pay 6 percent on their payment or 4 percent," Kornahrens said.

"We think people are going to take advantage of the 4 percent. From the way traffic looks that's pretty true to form," she said.

Bill Collins, sales manager at Don Massey Cadillac on Ann Arbor Road, said business is up. "But I think it's because of our product line," he said, adding the sales tax increase may not affect his business as much because around 95 percent of new Cadillacs are leased.

Be flexible in changing marketplace, speakers say

Forget about job security. Start thinking instead about how to change, be flexible, develop new attitudes and start building success rather than building a career.

That's the message Rick Inatome, Troy business owner, delivered to journalists, managers and corporate executives of the Observer & Eccentric Newspapers.

"Job security will never be the same, never like it was 20 years ago," said Inatome, CEO of the Inacom Computer Co., who, along with public relations and marketing expert Fred Marx, were the featured speakers at the 11th annual Observer & Eccentric Journalist of the Year program Thursday in the Southfield Radisson Hotel.

"For the next decade and a half, we might as well call it job insecurity."

Inatome, who along with his father, Joseph, founded Inacom Computers and Computer Mart on \$35,000 in 1976 and built it into a multi-million dollar corporation, is considered a guru in the computer industry. Newsweek proclaimed him "one of the few super-dealers who helped shape the industry."

He masterminded the merger between Inacom and ValCom Inc. in 1991 to create one of the largest computer resellers in the industry.

Marx, who founded in 1985 Marx Layne & Company, a marketing, public relations and management development firm in

Inacom Corp.

Farmington Hills, has nearly 30 years experience in retail. He's held vice president's positions with Jacobson's, Macy's and Hudson's.

The topic under discussion was trends in business and technology, but the message — a warning, really — that both Inatome and Marx imparted was, "Change or die."

"The notion of the 'Corporate Man' and building a career is a 1950s notion," Inatome said. "We can't afford career management. We all have to learn to control our own destiny. It is a shift that we all have to go through in the journey to a new economy."

Today's CEO, said Inatome, has the "shelf-life of a cheeseburger." Companies today are thriving and dying in a 24-hour period. Particularly in the computer and retail businesses.

"Of the top 25 (computer) resellers in 1985, only one exists today," he said. "We kind of

think of our lives in dog years in this business: One year is like seven. We had to have (an additional) \$600 million in revenue last year just to stay in business. Our mission, as we define it, is like trying to change all four wheels on a car when the car is going 100 miles per hour."

Marx said the shift is equally pronounced in the retail business. "You cannot depend on loyalty anymore," he said. "When I started in the retail business, everybody went to department stores. We thought we would always be there. But that is not the case. By the turn of the century, 50 percent of the buying in retail will be done through interacting: arm-chair shopping."

The way to survive, both said, was through change. Be flexible, be responsive to trends, be not only adaptive to change but impact it, as well.

"I've never really been a proponent of change," Marx said. "It's just always been right behind me like a pitchfork. It can be disturbing, but once you get into it, it can be pretty terrific."

The next frontier of change, both said, will be along the so-called information superhighway, with computer technology paving the way to a new way of life and a new economy.

But there is a problem. Even though the power of the micro-processor doubles every 18

months, productivity levels have increased only one percent in the last decade. Plus, studies have shown that fundamental computer illiteracy is at 47 percent in this country and 65 percent of American adults are afraid of

technology. "We might be building a superhighway, but all the garages are shut tight," Inatome said. "The on-ramps aren't built yet." Inatome said the next challenge will be to close the gap between

the techno-power available and the ability for most people to leverage it. "We will have to drive it with the people first," he said. "To think the opposite is way off base."

"I can't wait until Parisian opens," said Sally Herbal of Livonia and mother of two toddlers. "I understand Parisian has excellent customer service, and they show cartoon videos in their children's department! I'll finally be able to shop for the kids while there is something going on to entertain them."

Janice Kelsey of Livonia agreed: "I'm very curious about the store. I heard they had lower price points

than Jacobson's and dedicated customer service."

To bring the surrounding business community up-to-date on a retail venture three years in the making, Parisian president Donald Hess flew into town to introduce the store's new manager, Elliot Marcus, and answer questions about the retailer from Livonia Chamber of Commerce members.

About 200 local dignitaries, retailers and residents attended the Parisian reception, where it was announced that Travel 2000, Ritz Camera, Easy Spirit Shoes and Limited, Too, will join Parisian in opening at Laurel Park Place soon. These new stores will occupy 30,000 square feet of expanded mall space on the way to Parisian's front door. There's still space left for two more retailers and a restaurant.

Southern hospitality

Parisian has been called "the Nordstrom's of the South" by retail

analysts — and Parisian officials love it.

"We certainly share Nordstrom's commitment to customer service," said Amy McRae of the corporate public relations staff. "Our motto is, *You're Somebody Special*. In fact, our personal service is the driving force behind Parisian's rapid expansion."

Parisian operates 30 stores in seven states with plans to open an additional 40 stores over the next five years. This year, Parisian will open seven new stores in 1) Livonia, 2) Atlanta, Ga., 3) Indianapolis, Ind., 4) Nashville, Tenn., 5) Knoxville, Tenn., 6) Orlando, Fla., 7) Jacksonville, Fla.

Parisian is owned by the Hess and Abrams families of Birmingham, Ala. It was bought by Hess's grandfather in 1920, when it was known as The Parisian Dry Goods and Millinery Co. of Birmingham.

Today, Parisian stores offer updated, traditional, upper-moderate to better-priced apparel, accessories, shoes and cosmetics for men, women and children. Parisian does not carry merchandise for the home or electronics.

Friendly competition

Hess said he expects Jacobson's,

the mall's other major anchor, to be Parisian's competition at Laurel Park Place. He expects it to be friendly competition because Mark Rosenfeld, president of Jacobson's, is a distant cousin.

Hess said Parisian became interested in the Detroit market through contact with Southfield-based Schostak Brothers & Co. and Jacobson's. Laurel Park Place is a Schostak Brothers property. It was built in 1989.

Rosenfeld attended the reception, smiling broadly and saying that he welcomed the mall's "other cork star."

"That's what my father used to call the mall anchors — cork stars," he said. "Jacobson's is happy to have Parisian in the mall. They will expand the market and, hopefully, increase shopping traffic."

The new Parisian manager, Elliot Marcus, is a 15-year Parisian veteran and native of Alabama.

When it was announced he would head the new Michigan store, he threw his personal life into fast-forward, proposed to his steady girl, set the wedding date for March 13 and arrived in Farmington Hills on March 14 with his bride to begin a

Superintendent's 'arrest' aids MDA effort

Wayne-Westland school Superintendent Larry Thomas was "arrested" Wednesday, but he posted \$1,162 and was released from jail on the same day.

He didn't break any laws, though. In fact, his mock arrest was part of a fund-raiser at Red Holman Pontiac on Ford Road, east of Wayne Road, to benefit the Muscular Dystrophy Association.

Thomas' \$1,162 in pledges for MDA was the most raised by any of the 28 people who were arrested during the fund-raiser, MDA spokeswoman Melissa McLachlan said. Altogether, the "inmates" raised \$12,370, averaging \$441 per person, she said.

"It was just so successful," she said.

John Glenn High School principal Dennis Connolly — setting a good example for his students by being arrested — was also among those who spent time in the mock jail, as was Adams Junior High principal Celestine Sanders. Many others, such as 18th District Court administrator David Wiacek, also spent time behind bars.

The amount raised "was fantastic," said McLachlan, who added that Red Holman was the first car dealership known by her to have set up a mock jail for the MDA event. She said she was pleased with donations by local business people.

Some of those jailed used tele-

phones to call friends and family, seeking money to get out of jail. Five phones were set up at the jail, McLachlan said.

"We don't keep the people in jail any longer than an hour," she said.

Those who were hungry in jail enjoyed some food donated by Tubby's, she said.

The inmates knew beforehand that they were to be arrested. In fact, Thomas announced his pending arrest at last Monday night's school board meeting.

"We gave them advance notice so that they could get sponsors," McLachlan said.

Let's hear it for college's alcohol-free club

Go blue. No, even in the midst of March madness, my cheer is not for the Fab Four plus a Fife. I'm rooting for a result that is much more important than whether U-M makes it to the Final Four.

The University of Michigan just announced it will open a night club next fall that features music, dancing, comedy, — but no alcohol. It's the first college-sponsored alcohol-free nightclub in the state — and one of only a handful nationwide.

Ironic, isn't it, that the announcement comes just a day after the school's long-time and successful hockey coach is charged with drunk driving and urinating in a public place.

And only a few weeks after under-age members of its basketball and football teams are apprehended taking beer

from an Ann Arbor party store. And that's part of the problem. The message from adults — whether university officials or parents — is mixed about drinking.

So, for a long time colleges and universities wouldn't own up to the problem.

Until the late '80s, they paid lip service to the fact that alcohol wasn't allowed in college dorms.

Meanwhile the kegs and cases were coming in the front door, notices of drinking parties were posted on bulletin boards, and dorm advisors let students know they wouldn't interfere as long as a bash stayed behind closed doors.

It took a small group from our part of Oakland County to get state universities and colleges to start assuming responsibility.

These folks had seen West Bloom-

field High School's Al Dicken mobilize a whole community against student alcohol and drug abuse.

They had seen waiting lists at alcohol and drug rehabilitation centers such as Henry Ford Hospital's Maple-grove residential center in West Bloomfield.

They had seen abuse of drugs and alcohol as the prevailing reason for arrests of local young people.

And they had seen local high school students win personal battles against drugs and alcohol, only to go on to a college and an atmosphere where they were all but doomed to fail.

I remember the terror in my own daughter's voice, as she tried to stay alcohol-free as a U-M freshman. "I can't even walk into someone's room on a weekend. It's always there."

First Oakland University, then East-

ern Michigan University and U-M, and now all Michigan's public colleges and universities offer the choice of an alcohol-free dorm room.

And every year, more and more students make that choice.

"I think it's great," Dicken said, of the new alcohol-free nightclub. "A lot of people will welcome it."

"It gives people the choice. It's like the alcohol-free dorm rooms. And the college is sending the message — you don't have to drink to have fun."

U-M has set a precedent for other state colleges and universities to follow.

Go blue.

Greg, our local computer guru here at the O&E, and The Computer People — more formally known as the Information Services unit — are into stuff like fax services, voice mail and computer bulletin boards.

Because of them — and their counterparts all over the country — newspapers aren't what they used to be. The only linotype machine you'll find at this shop is the one in the main lobby — standing there like a dinosaur carcass on display in a museum.

Come back to the "newsroom" and you'll see computers, video display terminals and laser printers. No paste pots, no copy spikes, no copy editors wearing green eyeshades and sitting around a horseshoe shaped desk. And you won't find any ashtrays. Smoking, in the newsroom of the '90s, is verbo-

You can play games, download files, check the latest stock prices or — soon to come — hook up to the "Internet" and prowl around other computers all over the world. And that's what got me

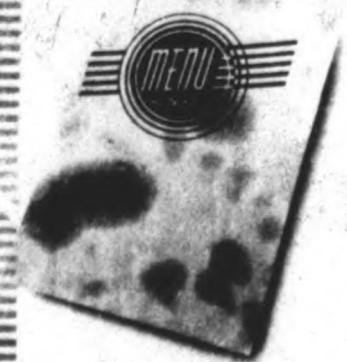
into trouble on the Information Superhighway.

I'm not sure what you're supposed to do when you get there. If I ever arrive I'll let you know. Right now I'm checking the Yellow Pages to see if anyone offers road service on the Information Superhighway.

Tobin expressed concerns before surgery

Reporter Pat Murphy had known Southfield public safety director Jerry Tobin since the 1970s. About a week before his surgery on Nov. 12, Jerry and Janet Tobin had dinner with Murphy and his wife, Mary. The following is based on conversations from that get-together. — Editor.

Rollin "Jerry" Tobin was apprehensive about his upcoming surgery.

Hip replacement is relatively routine, and Providence is considered a top-notch hospital.

But Tobin, ever looking beyond

the surface, was clearly worried. "Some screw-up," he said, "might cause problems." He joked about it, but the concern was real. So real, in fact, that Tobin, of West Bloomfield, went to a hospital official and asked, in effect, if he should reschedule his surgery.

"I know you are not supposed to buy a car made on Monday or Friday," Tobin said he told the official. "I asked if there was something comparable for the operating room."

The reference to not buying a car made on Friday or Monday, of course, is from a 1970s book critical of the auto industry. The knock on auto companies at that

time was that absenteeism was so rampant that any car rolling off the assembly line on those days had a good chance of being a lemon.

Was there a time, Tobin said he asked the hospital official, when operating rooms are less than perfect? Was there a time when an operation might be a lemon?

Tobin was particularly concerned about getting blood. He was familiar with medical assurances that the chance of getting AIDs, hepatitis or some other disease were virtually nil.

Even so, he didn't want to take a chance. Tobin stored up three pints of his own blood. Clearly, he

didn't want blood from an anonymous donor.

One more thing indicated Tobin was concerned about going under the knife. On the Monday before his surgery, Jerry and his wife, Janet, made a point of having a quiet lunch together at the Golden Mushroom Restaurant in Southfield.

As it turned out, Tobin's fears were well-founded. Doctors gave Tobin the three units he had stored up. When they needed a fourth, they used blood supplied by the American Red Cross.

That fourth unit was contaminated. It was subsequently traced to a donor in Wisconsin who acknowledged he had previously ex-

perienced a mild case of diarrhea.

Red Cross officials insist there is no way of detecting the bacteria — *Yersinia enterocolitica* — in the blood. They and other medical experts insist no test or screening procedure would have detected the bacteria.

Maybe so. But by all measures Tobin's death was tragic, especially in light of his concerns and his precautions. "This is an unnatural death that should not have happened," said Oakland County medical examiner Ljubisa J. Dragovic.

Apparently, the "screw-up" Tobin had been concerned about came to pass.

Cancer survivors symposium to meet March 28 in Livonia

Theresa L. Thayer was sentenced in 1988: cancer.

For a year the Plymouth resident was treated with chemotherapy and radiation. For a year she was horribly ill and in and out of hospitals. For a year, she wondered if she would die.

She didn't. She is one of some 92,000 cancer survivors in southeastern Michigan.

"I recently celebrated my fifth year in remission," she said. "And though I still live with physical and emotional late effects of treatment, I look forward to a long fulfilled life as a cancer survivor."

But surviving cancer, much like surviving any disaster, comes with numerous attendant after-effects. Such as insurance issues, job discrimination and a wide-range of emotional hardships.

"Cancer isn't an automatic death sentence," said Gwen MacKenzie, vice president of the MCF-Prentiss Comprehensive Cancer Center. "There are tens of thousands of cancer survivors in our midst. We need to be sensitive to their needs and offer help when we can."

To that end, on Saturday, March 26, 14 area hospitals and health care agencies will host a morning seminar on the complex needs of the cancer survivor. The symposium will run from 9 a.m. to noon in the Livonia Civic Center Library, 32777 Five Mile just east of Farmington.

Consumer advocate and cancer survivor Esther Shapiro will be the keynote speaker and featured will be art, poetry, prose and crafts from other survivors. In-

cluded will be the poetry of Theresa Thayer.

I hold my breath and ponder death but only in the far away then when panic comes my mind goes numb and I grab anything to make it seem okay...

"Instead of journaling, I wrote poems to express my ever-changing moods," she said. "Originally, I wrote only for myself. But as I did offer them to others, they liked them so much that, when I was well enough, I took writing classes and workshops."

And last November, her poems were published.

Ypsi lawyer will seek Ford's seat

One Democrat's out, another is in.

That's the latest in the race to fill the 13th U.S. Congressional seat being vacated by Democrat William Ford.

On Thursday, two days after Wayne County Commissioner Bryan Amann decided to pull out of the race, Ypsilanti Democrat Fulton B. Eaglin announced he was in.

"When elected, it will not be politics as usual," said Eaglin, a lawyer with offices in Ann Arbor who calls himself a progressive community activist with local, state and national administrative experience. "I will effectively promote all the diverse constituencies of the 13th District in Washington."

Though he has held only one elected position (Washtenaw Community College trustee in 1975), he has a broad background in business, labor, education, military and community service.

Among his past and current endeavors: board member of the Ypsilanti Utilities Authority (1989-1991), president of the Kiwanis Club (1988), chairman of the board for United Way (1988-1990), currently a member of the national United Way board of governors.

Eaglin, 52 and a native of Washtenaw County, has a long history of support for the Democratic party. He worked on the presidential campaigns of Hubert Humphrey, Lyndon Johnson and Michael Dukakis. He was a delegate to the national convention in 1984.

The 13th Congressional District includes Garden City, Westland, Plymouth, Plymouth Township, Canton Township, the southeast section of Livonia and Washtenaw County.

Eaglin is only the second candidate to announce his candidacy formally. The other is Republican John Schall of Ann Arbor and formerly of Livonia.

Other candidates reportedly considering entering the race include David Geiss, former aide to Democrat Ford, and Republican Cynthia Wilbanks, a formerly aide to Congress Carl Pursell.

Eaglin, born in Ann Arbor, raised in Ypsilanti and a graduate of Eastern Michigan University and Harvard Law School, is the son of retired U.S. Postmaster Simon Eaglin.

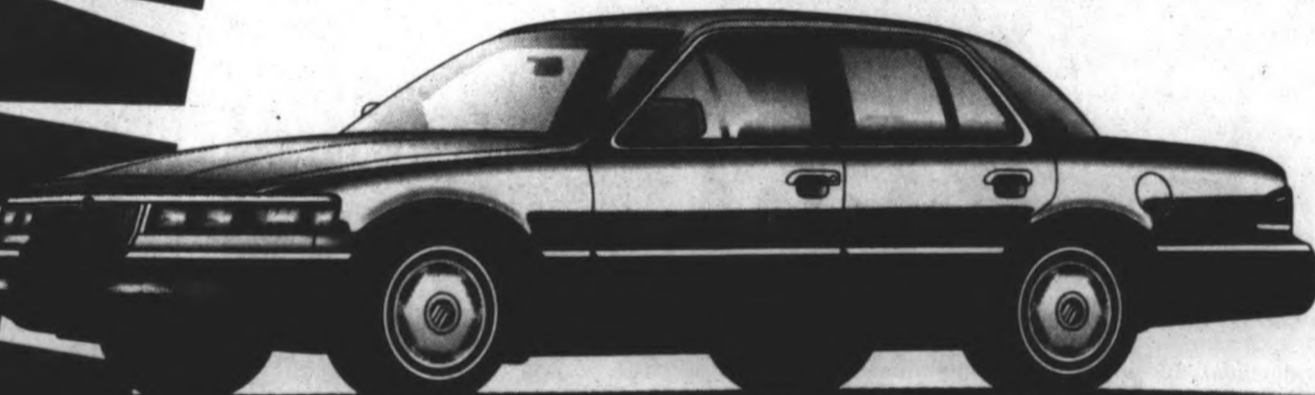

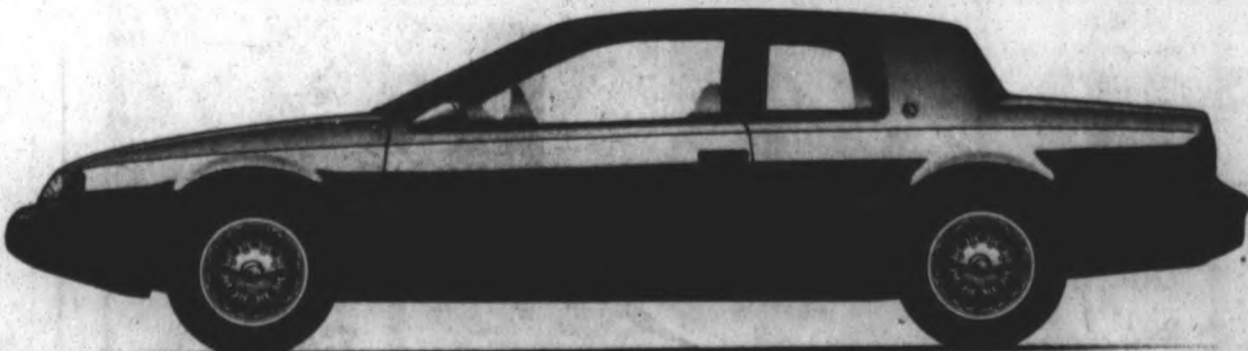

Chewy, nutty grain worth the extra cost

It has been called the "caviar of grain." French explorers who first came across it in the upper Great Lakes region had no idea that it was not a grain but an aquatic grass seed. They named it crazy oats.

But for American Indians who lived in the area, it was much more. They called it manomin after the Menominee tribe.

It was something that seldom graced the Janes Gang family table. When it did, it usually came in an Uncle Ben's box.

Give up? We're talking about wild rice here folks, and the Uncle Ben's box should have given the answer away. It wasn't the taste that kept wild rice off our family dinner table, it was certainly the cost.

Compared to other varieties of rice, wild rice is fairly expensive. Graduate your taste buds into the premium category of wild rice, and you can expect to pay up to \$10 per pound.

Old-fashioned harvest

The reason wild rice is so expensive is that much of the harvesting is done the old-fashioned way during what is known as the American Indian "rice moon" in September. As it was with American Indians hundreds of years ago, two people in a canoe harvest an allotted section of a flooded lake, one pushing the boat with a long pole, the other pulling plants down over the gunwale beating out the grain with cedar sticks. The grain that falls back into the water becomes seed for next year's crop.

As if harvesting weren't time consuming and expensive enough, preparing wild rice for the market is also a tedious and expensive job. It takes about three pounds of seed to get one pound of rice.

When you get down to the nitty gritty, wild rice might be expensive at the check-out, but when you cook it, you'll notice that when properly prepared, the rice can triple in volume.

One pound of wild rice can actually yield more than 30 one-half-cup servings! Nutrition-conscious folks will be pleased to note that wild rice is high in fiber, rich in protein with not a drop of fat. Ah, but what makes this writer a lover of wild rice is the only one measure of judgment - the flavor.

Delicious flavor

Wild rice has a chewy, nutty smoky flavor that makes it perfect as a side dish as well as for salads, soups and stuffings. Any time poultry is served, wild rice will elevate it to new heights.

Yours truly recently fired up the gas grill and grilled a turkey breast au naturel and did nothing more than serve it with some heated red raspberry preserves and a healthy shake of curry. Nestled on each side of the turkey was a healthy scoop of wild rice and a smidgen of steamed cauliflower. Upon finishing dinner, we were satiated and felt healthy, not stuffed and tired, as a big dinner normally makes you feel.

The best wild rice (and of course, the most expensive) is the giant long grain. Each grain is nearly an inch long, and because of its price, I recommend that it be reserved for special dishes.

Cooking method

To properly cook wild rice, start with about 6 ounces (1 1/3 cups) rice. Bring 4 cups of water to a boil and if desired, lightly salt the water. Stir the rice into the boiling water, stir, return to a boil, cover and lower the heat to a simmer. In 50-60 minutes, drain off any excess water and cover and allow the rice to stand for 10 minutes before serving. This procedure will yield a little over 3 cups of cooked wild rice. Trust me, you won't be disappointed.

The most popular grade of wild rice is the extra fancy medium. Clean and unbroken, this is what you see in the market for \$4 to \$5 per pound. The select or short grain is wild rice not uniform in length and possibly broken, so if appearance doesn't pose a problem, this would suffice. Avoid wild rices that are parboiled, precooked or processed, unless you really like the flavor of a five-minute rice, which, in my opinion, is almost tasteless.

Busy moms prepare to celebrate Passover with families and friends by cleaning, cooking and shopping for special foods.

Families blend old, new traditions

When Marcy Palmer Kass was growing up, her mother strictly observed Jewish laws concerning the festival Passover, which commemorates the exodus of Jews from Egyptian slavery to freedom.

"She had four daughters and wanted them to understand the rituals so they could pass them

on to their families," said Kass of Bloomfield Hills, the busy mother of two sons - Ryan 10 and Evan 5.

Passover is observed for eight days each year beginning with the 15th day of the month of Nisan on the Hebrew calendar. This year from sundown on Saturday, March 26, to sundown, Sunday, April 3.

The first two nights are celebrated with family and friends at a feast called the Seder, marked by the retelling of the

Merlot from St. Francis, soft and rich

Merlot is the stylish, "in" varietal among America's growing number of eclectic, premium red wine consumers. Touted as a softer wine than cabernet sauvignon, it has enormous appeal and is seducing avowed white-wine enthusiasts. They are attracted to the round and generous, oft-times fleshy, richly fruity, easily understood and long-lived characteristics of merlot. St. Francis winery in Kenwood, Calif., is a key player in production of this popular red wine.

"I'm striving to make a merlot, which, like the wines of Pomerol, accentuates the body of a cabernet, but with the floral character, softness and richness of a red Burgundy," said St. Francis winemaker Tom Mackey. "Our merlot is not blended with another varietal. We want the grape to display its own unique character."

With St. Francis wines, merlot should not be a consumer's only focus. Every wine in the portfolio is delicious. St. Francis winery is not a new kid on the block. It was formally bonded in 1979, but its history dates from 1971, when Joe Martin bought a 100-acre property in the Sonoma County community of Kenwood. Martin's first in-

attention was to grow grapes, not to make wine. And according to the master plan, for the first eight years, Martin sold his grapes to neighboring wineries with the renowned names of Jordan, Chateau St. Jean, Kenwood, Matanzas Creek and Ravenswood.

"When a grower sells grapes rather than making wine, control ends with the transaction," Martin said. "By selling grapes, I lost control over my identity and reputation as a grower. In 1979, therefore, I decided to build a winery. Tom Mackey has been my winemaker since 1980."

Today, Martin owns 100 acres of prime vineyard land, buys grapes under long-term contract from 10 to 20 growers, and produces 50,000 to 55,000 cases annually, which includes 10,000 cases of merlot. In the wine portfolio, in addition to merlot are gewurztraminer, chardonnay, cabernet sauvignon and 1,200 cases of a delicious old vines zinfandel. Additionally, St. Francis bottles reserve chardonnay, merlot and cabernet sauvignon.

In 1989, St. Francis took the problem of corked wines literally by the neck and began bottling its wines with synthetic cork. "Problems arising from bottling wine with natural wood-bark cork have plagued winemakers for centuries, and recently the situation has worsened," Martin said. "The accepted industry figure is that somewhere between percent to 6 percent of wine is spoiled by cork tainting. But many people in the wine industry would put it even higher than this."

Without going into a chemistry lesson on this problem, we'll summarize by stating that natural cork is not inert. It contains volatile substances that can be passed to the wine, significantly altering both aroma and taste. The new synthetic closure adopted by St. Francis has the look, feel and traditional appeal of a natural

exodus of the Jews from Egypt through prayers, songs and symbolic foods.

In their haste to leave Egypt, the Israelites did not have enough time to let dough rise to make bread. To this day, unleavened bread, and other foods containing yeast or leavening agents, are forbidden by Jewish law to be eaten during the eight days of Passover. Any possible contamination with leavening is to be avoided; even canned fruits and vegetables are to bear the word "kosher for Passover" label.

All such forbidden foods, called chometz (chum-mutz), are removed from the home no later than noon on the day before Passover begins. Separate dishes, silverware and cooking utensils are customarily used during the celebration.

Traditional Passover dishes include chicken soup with matzo balls, gefilte fish, roast chicken or brisket of beef and tzimmes, a cooked compote of vegetables and fruit.

Kass, co-editor of "The Health Club Cooks," published by the Health Club of the Jewish Community Center of Metropolitan Detroit, observes Passover as generations before her have but with a twist. "Occasionally, I try to sneak in something that's lower in fat," she said.

Joan Epstein of Bloomfield Hills keeps a kosher household and has been preparing for Passover for the past three weeks.

In addition to cleaning, she's been stocking up on special foods. Unopened packages of peas, corn, rice, noodles, regular flour and

products that contain leavening will be stored until after Passover.

"It's important to pass on the tradition and keep focused on where I come from," said Epstein, the mother of three children ranging in age from 2 to 8. "There is nothing low fat about this holiday; we use lots of eggs. To compensate, you put a little less on your plate."

"Passover is a lot of work. When it's over, I say 'I'm never doing this again.' But I would never give it up. I get pleasure out of getting the family together. Everyone tries to help."

Marci Zeman of West Bloomfield is really organized. When Passover rolls around, she gets out a file that lists who came to Passover Seder, the menu, how much food she ordered and what people brought.

"It helps a lot," said Zeman, who works part-time and has three children, ranging in age from 3 to 9. "You don't have to start planning the meal from scratch."

"Everyone is trying to watch their fat," said Zeman. "I try to cut back as much as I can. I take all the skin off the chicken and cut off as much fat as I can. I'm as light as you can get for a Jewish holiday."

The weeks before Passover are filled with baking and cooking. "My kids love to watch me cook, and help," said Zeeman, who believes she's making an impression on her children. "They are learning, too."

PRIMAVERA VEGETABLE FARFEL

- 3 tablespoons oil
- 2 garlic cloves
- 1 cup onions, chopped
- 1 cup carrots, julienned
- 1 cup celery, julienned
- 1/2 cup red pepper, julienned
- 1/2 cup zucchini, julienned
- 1/2 teaspoon crumbled rosemary
- 2 teaspoons chopped fresh sage
- 2 teaspoons chopped fresh parsley
- 6 cups matzo farfel
- 2 cups warm chicken stock
- 2 eggs

In a large saute pan, cook garlic, onions, carrots and celery in oil until onions are translucent. Add rosemary and remaining vegetables. Cook for one minute.

In a large bowl pour the warm chicken stock over farfel. Add the contents of pan. Season with sage, parsley, salt and pepper. When cooled to room temperature blend in eggs.

Oil the bottom and sides of a casserole dish. Put farfel in the casserole, cover, bake at 350 degrees for 20-25 minutes. Serves approximately 12 as a side dish.

PASSOVER KISHKA

- 2 cups tightly packed grated carrots

- 1/2 small onion, grated
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup matzah meal
- 1/4 to 1 stick melted margarine
- 1 tablespoon sugar

Mix all ingredients together in a bowl and pour it on a sheet of aluminum foil. Shape it into a loaf. Fold the foil around the loaf and put it on a glass sheet or cookie sheet.

Bake at 400 degrees for 1 hour. Let cool completely before slicing into 1/2-inch slices. Reheat when ready to serve. Serves 4-6 as a side dish. Recipe easily doubles and triples.

CHOCOLATE NUT TORTE

- Cake
- 4 squares (4 ounces) semi-sweet chocolate
- 1 3/4 cup shelled pecans or walnuts (about 7 ounces)
- 2 tablespoons plus 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 stick unsalted butter (at room temperature)
- 3 large eggs (at room temperature)
- 1 tablespoon vanilla or orange juice

- Glaze
- 6 squares (6 ounces) semi-sweet chocolate
- 6 tablespoons unsalted butter or margarine

- 20 to 22 walnut or pecan halves for garnish

Cake — Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Grease an 8-inch round layer cake pan and fit circle of parchment paper on bottom and grease paper. Melt chocolate in a double boiler. Cool slightly. Put nuts and 2 tablespoons sugar in food processor with metal blade. Pulse on and off until nuts are ground. Remove. Put butter and 1/2 cup sugar in food processor. Mix until well blended. Pour in melted chocolate and process until smooth. Add eggs and vanilla and mix until incorporated. Scrape down sides of bowl and add nuts. Pulse twice until nuts are incorporated. Pour batter into prepared cake pan.

Bake 375 degrees for 25 minutes. The cake will be soft but will firm up as it cools. Remove from oven and cool 20 minutes on wire rack. Invert onto cake rack. Remove paper and cool complete. (Cake may be frozen at this point)

Glaze — Melt chocolate and butter in saucepan, stirring until smooth. Dip half of each nut into glaze and place on wax paper. Refrigerate until set for garnish. Set glaze aside until thickened slightly and cooled. It should be soft enough to pour but thick enough to coat the cake.

With cake on cooling rack and over a cookie sheet, pour glaze onto middle of cake, tilting the cake so the glaze runs down the sides evenly. Try not to use a knife to smooth

as it will look better if it just runs down. Decorate the top with a border of the chocolate dipped nut halves. Cut into 20 small slices.

WILD RICE PANCAKES

- 2 tablespoons coarsely chopped pecans or other nuts
- 2 cups flour
- 1 tablespoon baking powder
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 2 eggs
- 1 1/4 cups milk
- 1 1/2 cups cooked wild rice

Sift the flour, baking powder and salt together, blend in the nuts. In a large bowl, whisk the eggs until they are light and frothy, then add the milk.

Continue to whisk while adding in the dry ingredients and whisk for

30 seconds only. Stir in the wild rice.

Heat about 1 tablespoon of butter or margarine in a heavy skillet and drop the batter by rounded tablespoon into the hot pan and cook until the edges seem dry, about 2 minutes.

Flip and continue to cook for 1 1/2 minutes. Serve hot.

Top with sour cream applesauce: Combine 1/2 cup of sour cream with 1/2 cup applesauce. Mix well and top with fresh grated nutmeg. What a treat!

An attractive side dish for pork, wild game or any poultry, this also

makes a great stuffing for chicken breasts.

WILD RICE WITH PEPPERS AND MUSHROOMS

- 4 tablespoons butter
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 1 green pepper, chopped
- 1 red pepper, chopped
- 1/2 cup mushrooms, thickly sliced
- Salt and fresh ground pepper to taste
- 1 teaspoon fresh grated lemon peel (optional)
- 2 cups cooked wild rice

Heat the butter in a large skillet and saute the onions over medium high heat, stirring constantly for 2

minutes.

Add the peppers and mushrooms and salt and pepper and continue to cook, stirring for 5 minutes. Remove from heat, stir in lemon peel and cooked rice. Spoon into a casserole, cover and bake at 350 degrees for 15 minutes or until heated throughout.

Chef's Secret: Toss this mixture with a basic Italian salad dressing or a good homemade vinaigrette and then chill in the fridge for about an hour before serving for a delicious cold salad.

Fruity scone cuts fat, not flavor

A tender, fruit-filled scone with golden honey and honey crunch wheat germ won the \$5,000 grand prize in the first Kretschmer Wheat Germ "Healthy Made Easy and Delicious" recipe contest.

Although she is an experienced baker, winner Patricia Schroedl of Jefferson, Wis., had never thought of baking with wheat germ. "I've been eating a lot less fat and sugar, cooking more instead of eating out, and walking every day," said Schroedl who lost 50 pounds during the past year.

Her Apple 'n' Honey Scones recipe calls for skim milk, no egg, and just enough margarine to make them tender in combination with gentle handling of the dough. (Overmixing scones and biscuits can make them tough.) By substituting wheat germ for a portion of the flour, Schroedl added a "nutrition boost" in the form of six essential vitamins and minerals, including vitamin E. Honey, apples and a light sprinkle of cinnamon-sugar combined with additional wheat germ provide just the right amount of sweetness.

APPLE 'N HONEY SCONES

- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 2/3 cup Kretschmer wheat germ, any flavor
- 2 teaspoons baking powder

- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 1/4 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/4 teaspoon salt (optional)
- 1/2 cup (5 tablespoons plus 1 teaspoon) margarine, chilled
- 1 1/4 cups finely chopped apple (about 1 large)
- 1/2 cup skim milk
- 1/4 cup honey
- 1 tablespoon Kretschmer wheat germ, any flavor
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon

Heat oven to 400 degrees F. Lightly spray large cookie sheet with non-stick cooking spray or grease lightly. Combine first seven ingredients; cut in margarine until mixture resembles coarse crumbs.

Add combined apple, milk and honey, mixing just until dry ingredients are moistened. Turn dough out onto lightly floured surface; knead gently 5 to 6 times. Pat dough into 9-inch circle. Mix together remaining 1 tablespoon wheat germ, sugar and cinnamon; sprinkle over dough.

Cut dough into 10 wedges; place 1/2-inch apart on prepared cookie sheet. Bake 16 to 18 minutes or until light golden brown. Serve warm with additional honey, if desired.

Trim calories in Greek favorites

AP — Spanakopita (Span-uh-KOH-pee-tuh), a Greek entree, traditionally denotes fat-laden layers of buttery phyllo pastry stuffed with spinach, feta cheese, eggs and seasonings. This version preserves the wonderful flavors of the classic while saving you 45 grams of fat (440 calories per serving). Here's how:

- Instead of margarine or butter, use non-stick spray coating to keep the phyllo light and flaky. Try the butter or olive oil variety of spray coating, if you like.
- Snip the amount of cheese. In this case, we halved the amount of feta, while retaining plenty of tangy cheese flavor.
- Use fewer sheets of phyllo. We went from 20 sheets of phyllo dough to just three, saving about 100 calories per serving.

GREEK SPANAKOPITA

- 1 pound fresh spinach or two 10-ounce packages frozen chopped spinach, thawed
- 1 1/4 cups chopped onion
- 2 cups low-fat cottage cheese, well drained
- 1 cup crumbled feta cheese (4 ounces)
- 8-ounce carton frozen egg product, thawed (1 cup)
- 1/2 cup quick-cooking rice
- 2 tablespoons snipped fresh basil or 2 teaspoons dried basil, crushed
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- Non-stick spray coating
- 3 sheets frozen phyllo dough (18- by 14-inch rectangles), thawed

2 teaspoons margarine or butter, melted

If using fresh spinach, remove stems; wash and chop. In a large saucepan cook fresh spinach, covered, in a small amount of boiling water for 3 to 5 minutes. (Do not cook frozen spinach.)

Drain cooked or thawed spinach well in a colander, pressing with the back of a spoon to force out excess liquid; set aside.

In a small skillet cook onion, covered, in a small amount of boiling water until crisp-tender; drain. In a large mixing bowl combine the spinach, onion, drained cottage cheese, feta, egg product, uncooked rice, basil, salt, nutmeg and pepper.

Spray a 13- by 9- by 2-inch baking dish with non-stick coating. Spread the spinach mixture in the dish. Lightly spray one sheet of phyllo with non-stick coating; fold in half crosswise. Place atop spinach mixture. Lightly spray the top of the sheet again with non-stick coating. Repeat with remaining sheets of phyllo dough. Brush the top layer with melted margarine or butter.

Bake in a 375-degree F. oven for 40 to 45 minutes or until golden. Let stand for 10 minutes before cutting into triangles or squares. Makes 8 main-dish or 16 to 20 appetizer servings.

Refrigerate Easter eggs after two hours

"Decorated Easter eggs need to be treated carefully if they are to be eaten later," cautions Sylvia Treitman, home economist for the Michigan State University Extension — Oakland County.

The hard cooked eggs should be stored in the refrigerator before decorating, after decorating, and after the Easter egg hunt. When hiding Easter eggs, a two hour time limit is the safest recommendation to avoid food poisoning.

"It's also a good idea," adds Treitman, "to make yourself a map of where eggs are hidden. It is easy to forget the whereabouts of a couple of eggs until it's too late to use them safely!"

If you find that the Easter egg hunt will take more than two hours, it is best not to consume the eggs.

Some simple tips to help you have a safe Easter egg hunt:

■ Wash hands carefully before handling and coloring eggs.

■ Use only clean, uncracked eggs. Do not color, hide or eat cracked eggs.

BONES OF CONTENTION

Mothers who tell their children to drink their milk to build strong bones should take a bit of their own advice. In fact, all women can benefit from increasing their calcium intake. Currently, the recommended daily allowance for women ages 25 years and older is 800 milligrams (mg.) of calcium. However, there is a growing consensus that the RDA should be moved up to 1,000 mg. of calcium for premenopausal women. For postmenopausal women who do not take estrogen, the recommendation is for 1,500 mg. of calcium. According to a recent New Zealand study of postmenopausal women whose calcium intake was increased from 750 mg. to 1,000 mg. daily, bone loss was reduced by one-third over women who took a placebo.

Ham with fresh pineapple festive for Easter brunch

AP — Perk up Easter with a new twist on an old favorite. Ham with pineapple is a time-honored main dish for Easter brunch, but this year, serve the ham with fresh pineapple. It makes a beautiful presentation when cut into serving size pieces and presented in the pineapple shell alongside the ham. Fully-cooked ham is always a popular main dish choice because it only needs to be heated through in the oven prior to serving. A full-

ly-cooked, smoked ham rump or shank half or portion will yield two to three 3-ounce cooked, trimmed servings per pound. A simple glaze of orange juice and brown sugar flavors the ham during the last 20 minutes of heating. The ham can be prepared that morning. Keep the accompaniments simple — hot cross buns from the bakery and steamed asparagus spears.

CITRUS GLAZED HAM WITH FRESH PINEAPPLE
6 to 8-pound fully-cooked smoked ham rump or shank half or portion
1 fresh pineapple
1/2 cup packed brown sugar
1 tablespoon orange juice
Do not preheat oven. Place ham (straight from the refrigerator), fat side up, on rack in shallow roasting pan. Insert meat thermometer into thickest part of ham, not touching

fat or bone. Do not add water. Cover pan tightly with aluminum foil, leaving thermometer dial exposed. Roast in a 325-degree F oven until meat thermometer registers 135 degrees F, about 13 to 17 minutes per pound. Meanwhile, cut pineapple in half lengthwise; cut each portion in half lengthwise to form two wedges. Remove core from each pineapple wedge. Cut pineapple away from skin, leaving 1/8-inch shell. Cut pineapple crosswise into 1/2-inch

slices. Push every other slice toward opposite edge of shell; reserve. In small bowl, combine 1/4 cup of the brown sugar and the orange juice. Remove foil and brush glaze over ham 20 minutes before end of cooking time. Remove ham when meat thermometer registers 135 degrees F. Tent with foil and let stand 10 minutes or until meat thermometer registers 140 degrees F. Meanwhile, place pineapple on rack in boiler pan so surface of fruit

is 6 inches from heat. Broil 10 minutes. Remove; sprinkle remaining 1/4 cup brown sugar over surface of pineapple and continue broiling 5 minutes. Serve ham with broiled pineapple. Makes 8 servings of pineapple.

Pack crisp vegetables, breadsticks and crackers for crunch.

Try a few new-to-you vegetables, such as sticks of jicama, parsnips or kohlrabi. Add fresh fruit that can double as snacks and desserts. Wrap cookies, granola bars, popcorn or a favorite cold cereal in small clear plastic bags for easy-to-carry brown-bag treats. Slip in a few coins to buy a favorite beverage. Remember to tuck in some colorful napkins, paper plates and paper cups, a great way to salute special occasions.

lunch safe and fresh-tasting for hours. When you prepare lunch, make sure anything that touches the food is clean. Seal foods in clean airtight containers or clear plastic food storage bags. (That means not reusing lunch bags from the day before.) Make sure all foods are well wrapped and tightly sealed. Pack saucy fillings separately from your bread and assemble your sandwich at lunchtime to keep the bread fresh. In the morning, pack lettuce and tomato slices in separate plastic bags. Use small airtight containers to carry condiments. Save precious early-morning time with made-ahead sand-

wiches. Make several different kinds, pack them in freezer bags and store them in the freezer. (Avoid freezing mayonnaise, sour cream, eggs and raw vegetables. These foods break down as they thaw.) You can pack your frozen sandwich in the morning. By lunchtime, it should be thawed enough to eat, but still properly chilled. You can also thaw frozen sandwiches or fillings overnight in the refrigerator. Then, in the morning, pack them in insulated lunch boxes with frozen ice packs. Insulated lunch boxes packed with frozen ice packs will help keep your meal icy cold for up to six hours. Use freezer packs specially designed for coolers. These inex-

pensive blue plastic ice packs are available in most discount stores, hardware stores and large grocery stores. Put your ice pack into the freezer the night before, so it's frozen solid when you pack your lunch. Pack other hot or cold foods in insulated vacuum containers. These containers work best if you preheat or pre-chill them. To preheat (or pre-chill), fill the insulated vacuum bottle with very hot (or very cold) tap water. Cover with the lid and let stand for 5 minutes. Empty the bottle and fill it with the hot (or cold) food. Remember to keep your lunch in a cool, dry place all morning or in the refrigerator, if one is available.

Pack a pocket pita

AP — For a something different brown-bag lunch, pack a pita pocket with crunchy cashews, cucumber, sweet pepper and a refreshing curry-yogurt sauce. To tote this sandwich to work or school, wrap the pitapocket in plastic wrap, then pack the cashew salad separately in an airtight container. Place the container of salad in an insulated lunch box with a frozen ice pack, where it should hold for up to 6 hours. At lunchtime, spoon the salad into the pita pocket.

1/2 teaspoon curry powder
1/2 cup dry roasted cashews
1/2 cup chopped cucumber
1/2 cup chopped red and-or green sweet pepper
1/4 cup chopped red onion
2 pita bread rounds, split crosswise
In a medium mixing bowl stir together yogurt, cilantro or parsley, and curry powder. Stir in cashews, cucumber, sweet pepper and red onion. Spoon evenly into split pita rounds. Makes 2 servings.

Shooting victim's testimony factor in conviction of Detroit gunman

A bullet lodged in the neck of Quinn Vellely serves as a reminder of the August night when he was shot trying to break up a fight, but his testimony in court helped send the gunman to prison.

Steven Douglas Nelson, 32, of Detroit was sentenced March 10 to a prison term of six to 10 years by Wayne Circuit Court Judge Richard Hathaway for the Aug. 28 shooting of Vellely outside a Detroit topless bar.

Nelson was convicted of the shooting Feb. 17 by a Wayne Circuit Court jury after a four-day trial, during which Vellely of Allen Park delivered key testimony. Nelson was found guilty of assault with intent to do great bodily harm less than murder, and of committing a felony while in possession of a firearm.

Conviction on the felony firearm charge requires a mandatory two-year prison term. The maximum penalty for the assault charge is 10 years behind bars.

Vellely, 24 at the time of the incident, was shot once in his left shoulder, and the bullet lodged in his neck, said Redford

deputy police chief John Buck.

He was shot after going to the aid of a man fighting with three other men outside of the LaChambre bar in the Telcraft shopping mall at Telegraph and Schoolcraft, police said. The bar is in Detroit, but the parking lot, where the shooting occurred, is in Redford.

Vellely was taken by ambulance to Botsford General Hospital in Farmington Hills for treatment and later released in time to testify against Nelson at a preliminary examination Dec. 17 before Redford's 17th District Court Judge Richard Manning.

Manning ordered Nelson to stand trial in circuit court and Vellely testified again.

After Vellely was shot, police believe Nelson was later present during an exchange of gunfire outside a west-side Detroit house. No arrests were made in that incident, Buck said.

Both of the shooting incidents in Redford and Detroit were apparently related to a feud between a 27-year-old Detroit man, who was initially involved in the fight outside the bar, and one of the LaChambre dancers.

Police describe events leading to the shooting this way:

A man had been verbally accosting the 32-year-old Detroit woman as she danced in LaChambre; then he left the bar shortly after 2 a.m. Police say he is the father of at least one child born to the dancer and was involved in a child-custody dispute with her.

Three men, including Nelson, who are friends of the dancer and known to the man, followed him out of the bar. Nelson and his two friends, who live near the man in Detroit, confronted him in the parking lot.

Vellely told police that he and a friend, a 22-year-old Allen Park man, were leaving LaChambre at about 2:30 a.m. when they saw the confrontation developing among the four men. Vellely and his friend intervened, and during an ensuing fight Nelson was struck and fell to the ground.

Nelson pulled a revolver and fired, striking Vellely, who managed to grab the gun. He twisted Nelson's arm until Nelson released the weapon.

Vellely then pointed the gun at Nelson to hold him until police got there. But after the shooting, Nelson's friends retreated to a pickup truck and drove toward the others.

Nelson jumped into the bed of the truck and the trio fled.

Several witnesses supported Vellely's account of the incident.

The Detroit man involved in the original altercation got in his pickup truck and followed the trio to a house in the 15500 block of Bramell, west of Outer Drive near Five Mile, police said.

There he was apparently involved in an exchange of gunfire, during which a 20-year-old Detroit man was shot once in the arm, Buck said. The victim was taken by ambulance to Botsford for treatment.

After the shooting outside LaChambre, Redford officers found Vellely in a bathroom in the bar, where they recovered a .38-caliber revolver on the floor, Buck said. Police believe the gun was used in the shooting outside the bar.

Nelson originally was charged with felonious assault, which carries a maximum penalty upon conviction of four years in prison and a \$2,000 fine. But the original charge was amended to the more serious assault charge during the district court examination for Nelson.

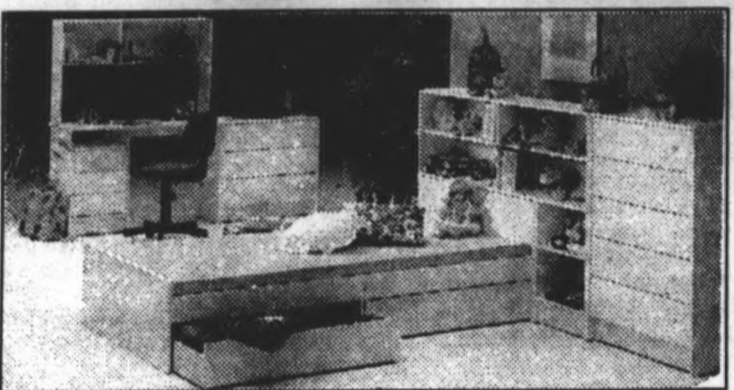

STREET SOUNDS

Home on the Range — LaTOUR



The 1990s pop music world is primarily composed of digital synthetic sounds dubbed with samples of other works. Practically everyone does it from MC Lyte to the Stereo MCs.

So what could be different or possibly new anymore? Nothing. The state of today's pop world has become a vicious circle of artists making and remaking, stealing and using whatever everyone else is using, which, of course, was never theirs in the beginning.

Unfortunately, LaTOUR's "Home on the Range" (Smash Records) is just another scream in a musical vacuum, and it will ultimately be smothered.

The 10 original tracks and two re-mixes are camouflaged in a colorful, abstract retro-1980s compact disc case. Once the CD is placed into the player, the retro feel continues with the same old techno sounds over the same old beats, all housed in the same old plastic, as all previous similar releases.

Computers, keyboards, drum machines, sampling and occasional horns and strings — it's all been heard before. The only difference here is LaTOUR's rough vocals placed simply over the melody, which tarnishes the sound even further.

"Home on the Range" has the potential and the appeal to be a solid dance release, but it hobbles along pulling its own dead weight behind it.

The two remixes of "Craziaskowboi" and "Don't Jump" are actually much more concise and appealing than the originals.

Current modern music is a cut-throat market full of simple and mindless songs. Possibly the simpleness has gone too far.

Wheel of Fortune — John Renbourn, Robin Williamson



Two legendary figures in British folk circles, John Renbourn and Robin Williamson, mark their recording debut as a duo with "Wheel of Fortune" (Flying Fish Records, Inc.), and it's as charming, musically magical and as full of blarney and gospel truths as fans of either have every right to expect.

Just for Williamson's reading of "Finn And the Old Man's House," I'd freely recommend this live set. That there are an even dozen tunes filling up 66 minutes here is the more reason to celebrate this masterful teaming.

Renbourn was, along with the great Burt Jansch, a founding father of the most celebrated of British traditionally rooted folk bands, Pentangle. Williamson and his partner Mike Heron were the core of Scotland's Incredible String Band who, for those oldies among us, were a major sensation when they signed with Elektra Records in 1966.

As Renbourn (I guess) says at the beginning of the instrumental triad of "Bunyan's Hymn/I Saw Three Ships/English Dance," they haven't come up with a name for the duet yet, though they're leaning toward the Impenetrable Stringtangle.

The music, as you would expect from Celtic harp and virtuosic acoustic guitar, is often airy, always delicate. That they cover a piece by avant jazz pianist Randy Weston tells of their brilliance in many ways, though the bulk of the program is rooted in the traditional British Isles or from the fully amazing pens of the protagonists.

It's as mesmerizing, truly gorgeous and wonderful a collection as either has ever been involved with.

'Over 21' stymies young bands

Underage kids often complain that they can't get into "21 and over" clubs to see their favorite bands play. It causes interesting problems for bands with underage members. Groups who have encountered that give advice to struggling young bands trying to get exposure.

Seattle rock band Sweet Water played what should have been a dream gig a few years ago — opening for the now-legendary Mother Love Bone. But instead of watching the headliners in the warm confines of the club, Sweet Water members were forced to stay outside and watch through a window until it was time for them to go on stage.

It wasn't because of an ego problem with Mother Love Bone. The club owners wouldn't let the band enter because some members were younger than the legal drinking age.

"There were many a day when we'd watch the shows from outside, playing acoustic guitar for the people walking by. . . . Or we'd have our faces pressed up against the window watching the show," said Adam Czeisler, lead singer of Sweet Water, who is now signed to Atlantic Records.

The problem is a common one but not something that crosses many minds. Record deals don't make it easier for bands to get exposure. Mutha's Day Out, whose members average age is 17, released their debut record "My Soul Is Wet" on Chrysalis Records in mid-1993, but they still

"It (the drinking age law) dissipates our whole crowd. We've got this whole suburban high school crowd now," he said. To accommodate their underage crowd, Fig rented a hall during the Christmas season to host a concert.

Halls are one way to get exposure. Coffeehouses, all-age venues, and school functions are other places where young bands can play their music and be heard by their peers. Layr Fron of Plymouth is opening a Hamtramck coffeehouse/concert hall with teens in mind. Starship Earth, which will be located at 2954 Caniff, will feature early shows for teens and late shows for the 21 and older crowd, beginning in April.

"In the last year or so, I've seen quite a number of things where the kids feel uninvolved," said Fron, who is also the president of the committee organizing the 1994 Earthfest concert.

"Obviously, there's the 21 and older problem, but I've seen bands (at private parties), and the kids come out in droves. They're very excited about the music, but they rarely get to see it," he added.

Kids count

Kids, he said, are the key to a band's success.

"If the band's going to have a long-term following, you have to get to the kids because they're the ones setting the trend."

For some bands, however, coffeehouses may not be appropriate.

"At Gotham City (in Ferndale), I used to play in an acoustic band. But with Fig, we're kind of loud and hard. Coffeehouses just wouldn't work right," said Wiseman.

School functions are another way for bands to get exposure. Third Stone, a Grosse Pointe-based 1970s-flavored band, has played at venues throughout town, but bassist Law-



rence DeLuca sometimes prefers playing at school.

"Sometimes it's in a sense better; we get paid more for doing it," DeLuca said.

Finney's Pub in Detroit is one of the area clubs that allows underage bands to play. The musicians are closely watched to make sure they don't drink, according to Sue Summers, who books shows for Finney's.

She recognizes Fig's concerns about their friends.

"They're allowed to play but unfortunately a lot of their crowd is under age. (But) it gives them exposure to the over-21 crowd," Summers said.

Mutha's Day Out, which hails from the heart of the Bible Belt (Batesville, Ark.), frowns on being closely watched at shows.

"Yeah, (club owners) give us a hard time. They just hassle us, (but) they have to let us in. Then they tell us we

can't do this, we can't do that," said bassist Jeff Mogan, who inked his record deal at age 15.

Many clubs simply "overlook" the fact that band members are underage even when it's obvious, DeLuca said.

"Our drummer is 15 but looks about 9. He has really, really rosy cheeks. He doesn't have acne or anything because it looks like he hasn't hit it (puberty) yet. He's really small, but he's really good. The people at the club didn't say anything, but when they went to get complimentary beer (for the other bands), they were hesitant. We just told them we wouldn't drink."

Seattle's Sweet Water, now of age, found a good way to make sure all their fans have the chance to see them. They book their shows at mostly all-age venues.

Weddings, funeral made for comedy

He forgot the ring. Searching clumsily through the vest pocket of his tuxedo, Charlie, the flustered best man at a fancy church wedding, gives a pleading look to his friends in the congregation.

The solution to this and other comic dilemmas makes up "Four Weddings and a Funeral," a quaint English comedy that opens next weekend at the AMC Maple in Bloomfield Township.

After all, there's nothing like a wedding to stir audience recognition. Just show last-minute doubts by the groom, a horrible wedding band and drunken guests at the reception and you've got movie-goers more or less hooked.

Mike Newell realizes this in spades. The less-than-subtle writer/director of the popular "Enchanted April" presents not one, but a quartet of weddings and a funeral. The laughs-to-tears ratio is more or less hinted at in

the title.

Hugh Grant isn't a familiar name, but chances are you'll recognize the handsome young actor from the Merchant/Ivory productions of "Maurice" and "Remains of the Day." He plays Charles, a confirmed bachelor who points out during the wedding toast that he admires anyone who can commit for life.

Enter Carrie (Andie MacDowell), a sophisticated and beautiful American who successfully seduces the attentive Charles. The next morning, however, she's back to the States, and it's not until another wedding months later that they meet again. This time she brings a fiancée.

In her earlier movies, model-turned-actress Andie MacDowell has done a competent job as a woman reacting to bizarre events taking place around her. As the movie's self-assured and sexy catalyst, she only proves that while she's still attractive to look at, her acting remains clumsy and stiff.

She's got plenty of competition in the memorable supporting cast, especially Charlotte Coleman as Charles' bohemian roommate Scarlett. James Fleet plays the clumsy-but-rich Tom, part of the tight-knit group of friends who attend countless weddings while never getting even close to the altar themselves.

In one of the funniest situations, Charles gets seated at a table populated by former girlfriends. "The only thing worse would be seeing Henrietta," he says to a friend, only to have the emotional "ex" pop in, anxious to hash out with Charles what went wrong in their fizzled relationship.

While some of the gags misfire, "Four Weddings and a Funeral" hums along to a satisfying conclusion. An engaging cast and liberal doses of British humor make this much funnier than the usual wedding comedy cranked out by Hollywood.

On another note, the Oscar ceremony is tonight and, as much as I try to ignore the spectacle, I'll be there watching every outrageous evening dress and each windy acceptance speech.

There's also a better-than-usual chance that I'll actually come close with my Oscar picks, so here goes:

Best Picture, "Schindler's List;" Best Director, Steven Spielberg for "Schindler's List;" Best Actor, Tom Hanks for "Philadelphia;" Best Actress, Holly Hunter for "The Piano;" Best Supporting Actress, Rosie Perez for "Fearless;" Best Supporting Actor, Tommy Lee Jones for "The Fugitive;" and Best Foreign Film, "Farewell My Concubine."

'Wind' lacks in translation to screen

A man's body is found in the New Mexico desert by an old man and his grandson. Hopi Indians, they don't tell anyone about the corpse — the dead man is a Navajo, as the grandfather points out, and killed by a Skinwalker or Navajo witch. How and why the man died are part of a bigger unfolding mystery in the 1991 film "The Dark Wind."

Nearby, Navajo Tribal police officer Jim Chee, played by Lou Diamond Phillips, newly assigned to the district, has been given exciting assignments like trying to pull over a speeding bootlegger and keeping an often-vandalized wind-powered well under surveillance. Naturally, it won't be long before Chee gets involved in investigating the Navajo man's murder and other apparently unrelated crimes, including a drug running pilot tricked into taking a final flight into some rocks.

The New Mexico Navajo reservation is familiar territory for fans of Tony Hillerman's mystery novels, one of which is adapted for this film. The plots of the novels and the personalities of the characters are closely connected with Navajo cultural beliefs, values and lore.

What works so well in the novels is apparently much more difficult to put on the screen. This film has difficulty trying to preserve the distinct Navajo flavor of the characters while keeping its plot clear and moving forward. Having read the novel was a definite advantage in watching this film which never really finds its

Part of the problem is Phillips, a tremendously bland actor who isn't able to carry the film by himself. He is too boyish and shallow to play Chee, a police officer studying to be a ceremonial singer. In his few scenes as another

regular Hillerman character, Lt. Joe Leaphorn, the always reliable Fred Ward does a much better job. Ward's probably a bit young to play Leaphorn as would be my own choice for the part, Graham Greene.

Another problem is the style of director Errol Morris, best known as a documentary filmmaker. The flat photographic style and voice-

overs that worked well in the real life murder mystery "The Thin Blue Line" just don't cut it with this fictional piece. The film goes along at a steady, if plodding pace, never really building any excitement.

Probably most disappointing is its failure to develop screen characters after having been given such a good start by Hillerman.

Holowicki gets unfair send-off

Redford Catholic Central's basketball team was getting ready to play a summer-league game last year when it came time to pick shirts and skins.

It was CC's turn to be skins. Coaches don't have to shed their shirts, but CC's 62-year-old coach Bernie Holowicki decided to anyway. It had nothing to do with the heat.

"He wanted to take off his shirt and go skins with us," said senior guard Anthony Hesano, who still laughs at the recollection. "He did it to let us know he was on our side."

It's just another example of a guy who was always willing to give his players the shirt off his back.

Sadly, there won't be anymore basketball teams at CC coached by Holowicki, who announced his resignation last week after 23 years.

The fax arrived at the office Thursday. Consider it an unlucky St. Patrick's Day for the Shamrocks. Holowicki also announced he will not coach in the McDonald's All-Star game, which will be played Easter Sunday in New York City.

The Michigan High School Athletic Association prohibits active coaches from coaching local players in all-star games. The local player happens to be Detroit Pershing's Willie Mitchell.

Holowicki's resignation from CC was rumored for months. But being forced to pull out of the McDonald's game by the MHSAA was a shock.

Holowicki said he has intentions of coaching somewhere else in the future. If he coached at the McDonald's Game, the MHSAA said he would be ineligible to coach again in the future.

Holowicki doesn't feel as welcome at CC even though he just finished one of his most glorious seasons, winning his 600th game and leading an over-achieving team to a 17-6 record, a record seventh Catholic League championship and 15th Class A district championship.

"I still feel like I can coach," he said. "Signs told me it was time to leave. I'm retiring from CC but not from coaching or basketball camps."

Still innovative

The phone rang like crazy at Holowicki's Livonia home Friday as coaching colleagues called from all over, including Livonia Stevenson's Jim McIntyre and Bill Foley (former coach at CC and Redford Union).

"Holowicki hot-line," said Holowicki's daughter Beth, answering one of the calls.

Only River Rouge's Lofton Greene and Lansing Eastern's Paul Cook have have won more games than Holowicki, whose high school coaching career began at St. Gregory in 1953. Holowicki won a Class A state championship at CC in 1976 and is 612-216 overall.

This year, Holowicki was as innovative and energetic as any coach half his age.

After a 2-2 start, Holowicki introduced his players to one of his favorite practice drills. The players wore work gloves during a dribbling drill to improve their ball-handling skills.

"We needed anything that would improve our confidence," said Holowicki, who also has been an influence on elementary age kids, teaching physical education at Fisher Elementary in Redford. "They gave me a weird look at first, but after that it was automatic. These seniors set the standard for future teams at CC. They would go through a wall for you."

Hesano is one of five seniors who didn't have great talent but owned special work habits, even during Sunday morning practices.

"Coach was well-liked by the basketball team and is a great man," said Hesano, a Livonian, who has attended Holowicki's basketball camps since grade schools. "Whatever he did, he always had our interests first. He'd buy us a dozen doughnuts on Sunday, do little things like that, but those little things mean a lot."

"We weren't expected to do anything, but we turned it around and pulled it together. Coach had everything to do with that. He has so much life in him, it's unbelievable. Like he says, 'It's not the years in your life, it's the life in your years.'"

Holowicki had a strong coaching staff (Jon Barbara, Dennis Cichonski and Bill Derderian) and some of the men who made his job easier include Jimmy Kennedy, Dick Karbo, Keith Karbo, Jack Herberholz, Sal Cipriano, the reverends Dick Elmer and Ned Donoher. And of course, the ball boys and ball girl.

But one of the players' parents said it best. "They don't know the treasure they had at CC. Not only is he a great coach, but a great man."

All-star snub

Holowicki has coached some great players like Tom LaGarde, Tom Zaliagiris, Mike Prince, Barry Spencer, Rob Gonzalez, Greg Wendt, John McIntyre and Bob Kummer and deserved to coach more at the McDonald's Game.

Loss can't ruin goalie's season



Bob Petrie knew what he wanted. When he decided to play junior hockey in Omaha, he knew; when he chose to attend Bowling Green State, he was just as certain. He knew what he wanted last Friday, too — and it was all right there in front of him.

He had to hear it. There was a minute left in regulation in this Central Collegiate Hockey Association quarterfinal between Michigan State and Bob Petrie's Bowling Green State squad, played Friday at Joe Louis Arena.

The Spartans trailed 2-1. They had called timeout to plan one final, desperate swarm at Petrie, the Falcons' goalie. He had frustrated them most of the night — most of the season, for that matter. And now MSU needed a goal. Somehow, somehow.

As the timeout wound down, the Plymouth Salem graduate and Canton native started his skate back to his special little lair. Petrie knew what he would face shortly after his

arrival there: green-and-white uniformed bodies pouring in from every angle, all trying to disrupt and distract him, with one goal in mind — putting that black, hard-rubber disc into the net he was charged with protecting.

That's when it happened. The fans behind his goal, most dressed in Bowling Green's bright orange, stood and gave their goalie a standing ovation. Petrie did nothing to acknowledge it. He still had a minute left; he needed to keep focused.

But the Falcon fans gave him his due anyway. Unfortunately, it didn't help. MSU pulled its goalie and, with an extra attacker, kept the pressure on Petrie. Finally, with just 10.9 seconds left in regulation, Steve Guolla got his stick on a bouncing puck and

from Petrie's left slid it into the net.

The overtime session was the only time the Spartans dominated the action for an extended period. Petrie made a couple of tough saves, but his nemesis — Guolla, who had all of MSU's goals — finally got one in for a 3-2 Spartan win.

Bowling Green was going home, its season over with a 19-16-2 record. MSU was still alive, advancing to meet Lake Superior State Saturday in the CCHA semifinals.

"It's been a great year," said Petrie afterward, "but it was a terrible way to end it."

Certainly, it had seemed as if it was Petrie's year. He's only a freshman, and yet he started 30 games, wrestling the No. 1 spot away from junior Will Clarke.

And what a season. Petrie was 16-11-2 going into Friday's game; he had a 3.11 goals-against average, with two shutouts and an 88.1 save percentage. Better yet, he had a 3.02 goals-against average in CCHA play.

All of which provided enough reasons for him to be named to the league's all-rookie team last week.

Against MSU, he provided a few more. The Spartans did little to challenge him through the first two periods — they had just nine shots on goal and trailed 2-0 heading into the third. In their four power plays through the first 2 1/4 periods, they managed just three shots on Petrie.

It had been much the same during the regular season. Petrie was in goal for two of the Falcons' three games with MSU; Bowling Green lost 3-2 and tied 2-2.

Which made him confident for the playoffs. "I thought for sure this would be the one," Petrie mused as time ticked away in the third period. "For sure."

But the momentum started to swing. Midway through the period, MSU finally got one past Petrie, and it was Guolla who did it, slapping a rebound into an open net.

Fortier lands college coaching post

So much for long-range plans. Michelle Fortier saw hers take a detour last week. And everything had been mapped out so perfectly.

Unlike those who approach life after college graduation with a "wait and see what happens" attitude, Fortier knew exactly what she was going to do. The former Plymouth Canton basketball standout was going to take her bachelor's degree and teaching certificate from Western Michigan University and find a job teaching and coaching in high school.

"My goal was to get my education, get out and start my own coaching career," she told the Observer a year ago.

That strategy started to unravel last fall. Fortier still had to finish her student teaching — she'll complete it this June — but when her former coach at WMU, Jim Hess, offered her a position as a voluntary assistant at Kalamazoo College, she figured it was too good to pass up.

"Jim called me and asked me to help out as a volunteer," Fortier recalled. "Then I came in and found out the (full-time) assistant was leaving."

That was Kim Barrier, a former teammate of Fortier's at WMU. She'd taken another assistant coaching position. Suddenly Fortier, just 22 and not yet a college graduate, was the No. 1 assistant at Kalamazoo.

And her future was changing. Hess, who recruited Fortier to WMU but then left after her first season, guided the Hornets to a 13-12 record this past season, 6-6 in the Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association. Now, after Fortier's first season as an assistant, he's leaving again.

And Fortier is stepping in. A week after her 23rd birthday, she's been named coach of the Kalamazoo women's team.

"I never thought I would get this," Fortier confessed. "It's something I've been very excited about."

Young, yes. Inexperienced, sure. But Fortier is hardly ill-prepared. As she told the Observer a year ago, "I've

had quite a learning experience (at WMU). I've learned what to do and what not to do when I'm coaching."

Her philosophy is established. "I'm pretty set on what I want to do," she said. "It's pretty similar to (Canton coach Bob) Blohm's and Jim Hess'."

Her attendance at a Bobby Knight

clinic should provide a pretty good idea on what kind of game her team will play. And although she has just one season of experience as a collegiate assistant, she learned a lot.

"I learned what (Hess') style was, how to recruit and scout," Fortier said. "My main responsibilities were to

scout and evaluate opponents."

That will come in handy. But Fortier will have a lot more to do as the head coach.

Still, don't expect her to be tentative. She wasn't as a starting point

John Glenn earns 1st-ever regional title

Westland John Glenn navigated its way through uncharted waters Saturday, surviving a harrowing ride to win its first boys basketball regional championship in school history.

The Rockets sailed into the state Class A quarterfinals with a stirring 74-71 win over favorite Ann Arbor Pioneer in the finals at Jackson High School. Glenn now faces Battle Creek Central in the round of eight. Both teams sport overall records of 20-4. Game time is 8 p.m. Tuesday at Lansing Eastern High School.

"Right now I'm excited about the fact — that as a team — we're going to the quarterfinals," Glenn second-year coach Mike Schuette said. "This team has worked hard all year and achieved something that hasn't been done in Wayne-Westland for a long time. I'm really proud of all of them."

There were several heroes for Glenn, but none bigger than 6-foot-4 senior forward Tony Goins, who finished with a team-high 23 points and 11 rebounds.

Goins hit three key field goals in the final quarter to keep Glenn within striking distance.

"We've been in a lot of situations when the game has been close, but that's no time to panic, you just have to play basketball," Goins said. "What this

means to me is that all the hard work has paid off. "We came into this season wanting to break some records, but all we wanted today was to come out with the win."

Savon Hubbard, a junior guard, played perhaps his finest game of the year, finishing with 15 points. Guy Rucker, Glenn's 6-9 junior center, added 14, including what proved to be the game-winning tip-in off a Goins miss with 57 seconds left.

Sophomore guard Albert Jones, who contributed nine points, calmly sank two free throws with 18 seconds remaining to give Glenn a three-point cushion.

Pioneer guard Brent Wall, who led all scorers with 25 points, tried to tie the game with a three-pointer with only 11 seconds to go, but had his shot blocked by Tariq Horne.

Goins grabbed the rebound and Hubbard was subsequently foul.

The Glenn guard missed the front end of a one-and-one, but Goins grabbed the rebound, only to have the ball stripped out of his hands.

Pioneer forward Dan Reed, who gave Glenn fits all day long with 20 points, wound up with the ball

and dribbled toward the top of the Rockets' key. As time expired he launched a three-pointer to tie, but the ball rattled off the front of the rim, back off the backboard and out, sending the Rockets into a delirious celebration.

Wall, who got red-hot in the third quarter with three straight treys to put the Pioneers ahead, cooled down the stretch, missing twice in the final 20 seconds.

"We wanted to get the ball either to E.J. Bates on some kind of drive to the basket or get the ball back to Brent (Wall) for the three-pointer," said Pioneer coach Harry Hayward, whose team bowed out of the tournament with an 18-6 record. "But Glenn put some good defensive pressure on us. We had a couple of chances, but those things happen in basketball."

"Reed has played well the last couple of game. It would have been fitting if he had knocked down that 'three.'"

Bates, a 6-5 senior transfer from Milan, finished with 17 points for the Pioneers.

But it was Goins who tipped the scales.

"They put so much pressure on our guards that Tony was going to eventually get the ball," Schuette said. "He can create in a one-on-one situation, and if it's not there, he's smart enough to get the ball to Guy inside."

Rucker rallies Rockets to regional victory

If Adrian doesn't see Westland John Glenn anymore this sports season, it would be none too soon.

In the first round of Class A basketball regionals Thursday in Jackson, it was another big Rockets' victory as Adrian took a 76-53 pounding.

Ironically, Glenn opened the state football playoffs last November against the Maples with a lopsided 31-0 win en route to the Class AA championship game.

Playing perhaps its best quarter of basketball of the season, Glenn pulled away from a 28-26 halftime advantage by outscoring Adrian 28-10 in the third period.

The Rockets led by as many as 30 points in the final quarter before moving into Saturday's Class A regional final against Ann Arbor Pioneer. (See related story on page 1C.)

"I was pleased the way we stepped up, I was real pleased,"

said Glenn coach Mike Schuette, whose team improved to 19-4 overall. "I guess it was the kind of game that started out being one possession at a time. But we did not buckle under pressure even though Adrian is a scrappy ball club."

Guy Rucker, Glenn's emerging 6-foot-9 center, led all scorers with 25 points. He also grabbed 14 rebounds and blocked five shots.

Amazingly, Rucker, who was an eye-catching 11 of 12 from the field, didn't take his first shot until there was 3:54 left in the half.

Other contributions came from starters Tony Goins (14 points), Savon Hubbard (12), Albert Jones (11) and Brent Washington (nine). Tariq Horne also came in and provided some effective defense.

Glenn made eight three-pointers on the night to offset the six by Adrian guard Mike Riley, who was the only Maple in double figures with 18.

"Rucker just took away all of our inside game, so our only hope was to kick the ball out and get the 'threes,'" said Adrian coach Pat McDevitt, whose team bowed out at 17-6 overall. "He (Rucker) is a great talent, but we knew that coming in. We were able to draw a couple of fouls early against him, but we couldn't get that third when we needed it. It was not to be."

Five 3-pointers in the first half by Glenn, including three by Hubbard, kept the Rockets in the game to a certain extent before Rucker took over inside.

"Their three perimeter players were better than I thought," McDevitt said. "We thought we did a good job of taking away their inside game, but then their outside game took over. And Goins

was tough to stop once he got going."

Glenn coach Mike Schuette employed a zone defense to start the second half.

"At halftime we emphasized three things," Schuette said. "First, we did not want to let their traps create turnovers. Secondly, we also emphasized getting back on defense. And third, we didn't want number 42 (Riley) to get out and shoot the 'threes.' We had to stay out on him and make sure nothing came easy."

With Rucker patrolling the middle, the strategy paid off as the Rockets held Adrian to 10 of 36 shooting (27 percent) from the field in the second half.

Glenn, meanwhile, got red-hot by hitting 17 of 29 (58 percent) in after going 11 of 28 (39 percent) during the first 16 minutes of action.

"Savon kept us in the game the first half, he hit some 'threes' at clutch times," Schuette said. "We

answered their three-pointers. The Rockets did just that and now the only one question remains this season. Will the same thing happen in baseball?"

That set up the dramatic finish, but it might have ended much earlier. Guolla broke in all alone on Petrie with 3:35 left, but was stopped cold. Fifty seconds later, as a Falcon penalty expired, Michael Burkett had a similar opportunity — in alone from the right side on Petrie. Again, stopped.

The ovation the Bowling Green fans gave him had been deserved.

But referring to Petrie as a rookie is a bit misleading. He'll be 21 in July; he spent last year in Omaha, playing for the Lancers in the U.S. Junior Hockey League. He made his mark there, too, posting a 26-6-0 record with a 2.98 goals-against average and a 91.0 save percentage.

His ability helped Omaha win both the regular season and playoff championships, which earned him all-league status. He was the Lancers' MVP and the fans' most popular player.

But Petrie was on a mission. "One of the reasons I left Canton was that I wanted to play college hockey," he said.

That had been his goal all along. He was contacted by several schools, including Michigan, after his standout season with the Lancers. He chose Bowling Green, and he couldn't be happier.

"I wouldn't trade this team for any in the world," he said. His performance this season makes that feeling mutual.

"I think it's been more than I

anticipated," he said. "I'm glad the coach gave me the opportunity. I didn't think I'd get into so many games."

Falcons' coach Jerry York had only praise for his goalie after the loss. "I think it was a real solid defensive game by both teams," York said. "It was a well-played game, and there was good goaltending."

"Without any question, it was the best game we've played as a club. And I thought our young goaltender played very well."

As he did all season, which makes Bowling Green's hockey future — the Falcons have just three seniors listed among their top 20 players — seem so much brighter.

It happened one night in Westland: a rare contest on the lanes, with one bowler matching the other strike for strike.

When the teams had finished, Chuck O'Rourke of Livonia had a 300 game, while at the same time his opponent, Larry Wayne Walters, scored a pin short of perfection with a 299, leaving only a 4 on his final shot.

This magic moment took place Thursday at Westland Bowl in the Thursday Night Ford Motor Men's League.

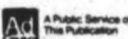

guard at WMU; indeed, she often disagreed with Pat Charity, who succeeded Hess as the Broncos' coach.

Fortier stuck with it, however, finishing her collegiate career third in assists and fourth in steals on WMU's all-time list. She didn't really enjoy it; her idea on how to play the game, with the guards dictating tempo, and Charity's philosophy, which centered around a strong inside game, were too different.

"The last couple of years at Western, it was more of a job," she admitted. When she came to

Smart, Pastorelli shine in flawed tale of family life

"I have to say 'The Yarn Princess' is one of my favorite things I've ever, ever done," says Jean Smart ("Designing Women"), who stars in the TV movie airing Sunday, March 27, on ABC.

"I just adore this character," she continues. "It was such a joy to go to work on this thing. It was hard work, but it never felt like it because it was such a pleasure from beginning to end."

Liking "The Yarn Princess" is important from the audience's viewpoint, too, since this largely satisfying film begs so many questions.

Smart plays Margaret Thomas, a happy wife and mother of six boys. Because Margaret is mentally challenged her husband, Jake (Robert Pastorelli of "Murphy Brown"), assumes much of the responsibility for paying bills, fixing meals and getting the boys to school. At bedtime, Margaret tells her sons fairy tales based on their own adventures, always with happy endings. Their favorite is "The Yarn Princess," the story of how their parents met and fell in love.

"He said, 'I just got out of the Army.' And the princess said, 'Fun-

ny, you don't look Chinese.'"

"But Mom, that doesn't make any sense."

"I know. That's why he married me."

Then the worst happens. Jake is taken to the hospital and diagnosed with schizophrenia. He is unable to hold a job, check the boys' homework or help out around the house. Faced with eviction and the care of an invalid, Margaret is overwhelmed. She turns to the welfare system for aid. Though the system is portrayed with fairness, Margaret struggles to get the help she needs and prevent the government from breaking up her home in the name of what is good for her children.

Both leads turn in strong performances in challenging roles. Pastorelli moves convincingly between lovable father and angry, delusional madman. In several scenes he must work up a rage over nothing more than a series of numbers that has meaning only for his character's subconscious. At other times, when his character is groggy from drugs, his face is completely altered.

"Isn't he wonderful?" Smart asks enthusiastically. "He's so great in it.

He's so much fun (on the set), and he also takes the work very seriously, which I think is the perfect combination for an actor."

"When you're somewhat recognizable to your audience," she says, "you want to create a character that's strong enough immediately so that the audience can suspend its disbelief and just get into the story." In Pastorelli's case, this meant steering his portrayal of Jake into the background to provide a setting for Smart's central role.

"I knew," the actress says, "that for this character I had to have it firm before we ever started, a real specific picture of her in my head. I had to find a specific vocal quality that would work for me but would also work for the audience, a subtle suggestion of certain things (that would) still make her understandable. It's a childlike kind of quality and almost a speech impediment." Though Margaret's intellectual powers are limited, her love of her sons gives her a sense of purpose, and Smart conveys all her joy and anguish without comic overtones.

Jason Brooks finds job on soap 'interesting'

For Jason Brooks, getting a job on one of the most popular soaps was a piece of cake. All he had to do was to go to sleep.

Brooks had auditioned for the role of Austin Reed, which went to Patrick Muldoon. When the "Days of Our Lives" producers decided to create the character of Peter Blake, they remembered Brooks' outstanding audition and thought he would be the perfect actor for the part.

"I was taking a nap when I got a call from my agent that I had the part," says Brooks. "You can bet I will be doing a lot more sleeping in the future."

This is Brooks' first foray into the world of soaps, and in his own words it has been "interesting. It has not at all been like I expected it to be. It is a very difficult medium to work in, and I underestimated it tremendously. In all honesty, I didn't give it the credit it deserved.

"The people I work with are very professional," he adds. "Once it is time for tape, no matter how scattered someone may have seemed in rehearsal, it all comes together once the cameras are rolling. It is like being in a whole different world from the other television and theater work I have done."

Another fine performance comes from Justin Burnette as the Thomases' son Mike, who reacts with anger at this mother's weakness in their time of need. Also starring are Giuliana Santini, as Peggy, the welfare worker intrigued by Margaret's case, and Dennis Boutsikaris, as a lawyer for the American Civil Liberties Union who becomes Margaret's white knight.

After an emotional courtroom scene in which Margaret declares that she "loves big" - big enough to keep her family together - the frequently eloquent script, by co-producer Dalene Young, heads for its own fairy-tale ending. Having built so much audience sympathy. "The Yarn Princess" regrettably funnels that good will into a resolution that leaves too many threads dangling and short-circuits this thought-provoking human drama.

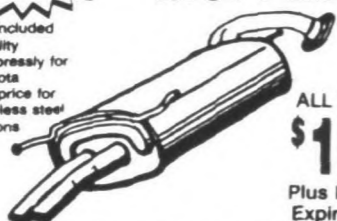

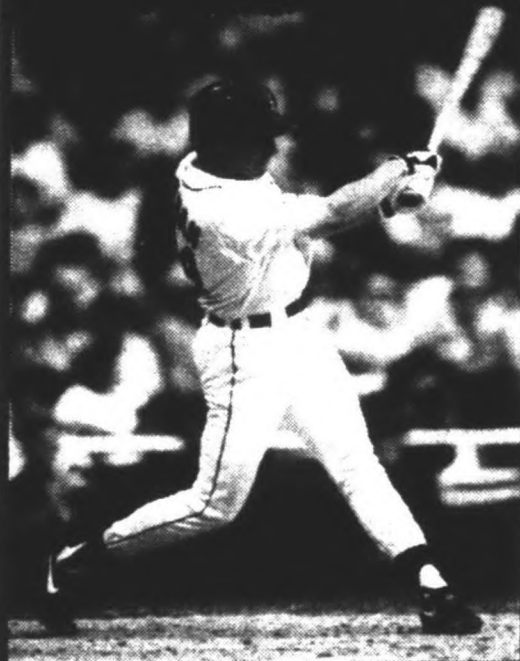
